

More Social Security? Who's Going To Pay?

Middle-class wage earners are having more than twice as much taken out of their pay checks for Social Security this year as in 1959.

For Americans making \$6600 or more in 1967, \$290.40 will be withheld and placed, along with an equal amount paid by employers, in Social Security trust funds for present and future benefit payments.

Compare that to the maximum \$120 paid in 1959, or even to the maximum \$174 withheld in 1965.

If the Senate passes the House-approved version of the administration's Social Security package, the amount withheld will take another sharp jump for persons earning \$7600 or more.

In 1968, \$334 would be with-

held. The amount would jump to \$354 in 1969; \$395 in 1970; \$429 in 1973; and \$448 in 1987.

President Johnson wants even larger increases in the amount withheld.

While Johnson has varied the practice slightly, presidents and Congress like to increase benefits with an election approaching. Elderly Americans have responded by becoming more active as a voting bloc.

Past increases have had relatively little impact on paychecks. But providing hospital and medical care for 19 million older Americans has increased the bite.

The other aspect is what the administration calls adequate benefits for the elderly. It would appear impossible for a person to survive on the \$50-amonth minimum provided by the House bill or to make ends meet in a big city on the \$212 maximum. (Currently, the average monthly benefit to the retired worker is \$84.)

So the Johnson administration is becoming torn between

providing adequate benefits and taking more and more from the voters' weekly paychecks.

With the base for the maximum payroll tax going to \$7600 a year under the House bill, the largest bite will be applied to 85 percent of the nation's payroll workers. Relatively little will come from jumping the base to \$9000 in 1973 and \$10,800 in 1974 — the increases Johnson originally asked for,

The other alternative is increasing the rate of the withholding from the base. Right now 4.4 per cent of \$6600 is withheld at the top. Under the House bill, it would increase to 48 percent of \$7600 in 1969, 5.2 per cent on the same base in 1971, and to a top of 5.9 per cent by 1987.

The chief criticism of baserate increase approach is becoming louder every year - it's regressive, unfair and inadequate. As the brothers Kennedy told the Finance Committee, the pinch draws the most blood from those who can least afford it

The Kennedys have joined the ranks of other critics demanding that income tax dollars be infused into the trust fund system. Many experts, in and out of the administration, believe it only a matter of time before the historic step is taken.

Crop Prices

The crop price index stood at 161, down 7 points from a month earlier and 45 points below August last year. The price of wheat, at \$1.34 per bushel, was moderately below the average price of \$1.39 per bushel in July and well below the average of \$1.76 per bushel a year ago.

Livestock Prices

The livestock and livestock product index at mid-August was 313, up 1 point from July but 8 points below August 1966.

Corn averaged \$1.17 per bushel, 6 cents below July and 16 conts below a year earlier.

Sorghum grain, at \$1.87 per cwt, was 11 cents below July and 9 cents below a year earlier. Soybeans, at \$2.48 per bushel, showed a decrease of 11 cents from July and were well below the \$3.37 average a year ago.


The finance plan, which twice has been voted down, would allow use of part of a 2-mill tax levy now in effect for local finance to purchase easements and right-of-way.

The levy raises \$22,000 each year. It now may be used only for administrative purposes.

A little less than 50 percent of these funds are needed for administration, Beck said.

Opponents, however, claim that \$10,000 to \$11,000 a year would not be enough to cover

local costs and that once the levy was in use and more funds were needed, the board would have a mandate to add additional taxes.

Beck says the watershed is a 25-year project and there should be ample funds collected over the years to finance aspects other than administration.

Twenty-two percent of construction costs will be born by federal funds.

Other expenses, such as sites for dams and other structures mostly would be donated.

Previously the opposition has pooh-poohed the idea that landowners would give away land for pond sites. Beck, however, says the opposition is arguing against past experiences in oth er water districts.

"The landowner is getting a good deal," Beck said. He will be glad to cooperate.

Beck said that, if the opposition and board of directors were successful in their negotiations, the watershed plan would be

propriated.

The state has refused to sub mit the Lyons creek district plan to Congress until a finan cing method is established. Beck also said the board ha

appointed a new attorney for the watershed.



Co-op Bank Earnings Dip Net earnings of the Wichita Bank for Cooperatives dropped almost 30 per cent in the fiscal year ended June 30, compared with the previous year, accord-

ing to the annual bank report. It was released during an annual stockholders' meeting. It blamed "the higher cost of money borrowed by the bank" for the earnings decrease. They dropped over the past year from \$1,636,000 to \$1,144,000.

About 250 stockholders and agricultural leaders, mainly from Kansas, heard bank president John R. Williams say new records were set in average loans outstanding to member cooperatives. The average credit outstanding for the past fiscal year was more than \$175 million, compared with \$141.5 million for 1966.

On May 1, a record loan volume of more than \$217.5 million was reached, making the bank the first of 12 district banks for

cooperatives to exceed the \$200 million level.

Total loan advances during the year were \$209.4 million, an increase of almost \$21 million over fiscal 1966. Loans outstanding June 30 totaled 311 for grain organizations, 54 to cotton processors; 60 to irrigation users; 20 to petroleum cooperatives; seven to dairy associations; and 16 to other categories.

Citing a sharp rise in interest rates in borrowing, the report said the average margin realized by the bank during fiscal 1967 was .33 per cent, compared with an average margin of .76 per cent the year before.

Patronage refunds as a per centage of interest paid were 10.95 per cent for the year just ended, compared with 20.07 per cent a year age.

The bank on June 30 retired all C stock issued to borrowers

in 1956, almost \$500,000 worth. Loan applications received by the bank this fiscal year totaled 446, compared with 415 the year before. Number of borrowers totaled 468, compared with 473 a year ago.







County Scraps Entire Program Of Reappraisal

HAYS - All G&G area counties which have had property re-appraisals have done so with no little trouble.

But they may take heart from Ellis county, whose reassessment project has been griefstricken from the beginning.

Last week the county commissionres scrapped a program in which it had five years and \$52,000 invested. The state property valuation department had branded the Ellis county program a failure and after some study county officials decided there was no way they could salvage any part of the work done.

Spot checks of the work revealed inequities on rural property. It also appeared techniques were used that discriminated against some classes of property, Ron Dwyer, state director said.

The spot checks indicated a majority of homes were measured incorectly or poorly diagrammed.

"It is my opinion that the small number of classes used and prices applied have resulted in penalizing the owner of the average and poorer farm land and benefitted owners of better farm land," Dwyer said.



USDA Studies Changes In Milk Order Regulations

The Department of Agriculture investigating the need for any proposed change in federal milk order regulations.

Rep. Bob Dole, R-Kans., was advised of the department's action by George L. Mehren, as-

sistant secretary.

The National Milk Producers Federation had requested the Agriculture Department to increase Class I prices under all federal milk orders and to increase the support level for manufacturing milk to 90 per cent of parity.

The milk producers asked the department to hold an emeregncy nationwide hearing for the purpose of discussing the proposed price increases.

Members of the Kansas and Oklahoma congressional delegations supported the milk producers request for such a hearing. Mehren said the department was required to make an investigation of the need for any proposed change in federal milk order regulations before calling a hearing.

The department would complete its investigation "as soon







Case in point: A large room e decorating. tat can - with clever maneupring - do double duty as wo smaller rooms.

To achieve this coup, all that's needed is a "wall" of stock folding doors.

Here's how it's done: Hang a ries of folding louver doors an overhead ceiling track midway across the room. When you want to divide one room nto two smaller ones, simply all the doors open to their bil length. They form an attractive sculptured wall. If you want to transform the area inwone spacious room, close the tors by folding them back against each other.

A wall of doors has many dvantages. It's economical to istall because quality louvered foding doors, such as ponderosa pine units are available in stock sizes at local lumber dealers. Folding doors take up practically no floor space - unlike regular doors which open out into a room, folding doors fold back against each other in accordion fashion. The door wall can also provide extra flat space against which you can place furniture.

A series of doors can also be used to give a room the elegant look of expensive paneling. Standard-sized stock panel doors, or louvered doors, can be installed on any wall surface over furring strips or wall studs. Use stock pine moding as an attractive camouflage over joints.

If the wall contains closet space or an entry into another room, make one or more of

the doors operational as well as decorative. Just hinge the door over the opening so it can be opened and closed.

An additional decorative asset of ponderosa pine wood doors is that they can be painted to blend with the room's color scheme, or simply stained to enhance their natural grain. The rich look of wood and the custom appearance of panel or louver door styles are a sure way to win the battle for distinctive room decor.



It's made into a cobbler crested with shredded old-fashioned Cheddar cheese and pie-sliced apples. But the making is modern. Just unwrap the cheese and it's ready for shredding the apples come ready-to-use right from the can.

- HASTY CHEESE COBBLER (Serves Eight)
- 1 cup sifted all-purpose flour 1 cup yellow cornmeal
- 1/4 cup sugar
- 2 teaspoons baking powder
- 3/4 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 teaspoon baking soda 2 eggs
- 1 cup buttermilk
- ¼ cup soft shortening
- cups shredded (1 8-ounce package) Wisconsin Old

Fashioned Cheddar cheese 21/2 cups (1 pound, 4-ounce can) pie-sliced apples, drained

¼ cup firmly packed light brown sugar

In a medium-size bowl, sift together flour, cornmeal, sugar, baking powder, salt and baking soda. Add eggs, buttermilk, and shortening; beat with rotary beater about one minute, or just until dry ingredients are well moistened. DO NOT OVER-BEAT. Pour mixture into a greased 9x9x2-inch baking pan. In a medium-size bowl lightly mix cheese and apples together. Gently spread over cornbread mixture. It is important to spread mixture to sides of pan. Sprinkle brown sugar evenly over cheese mixture. Bake in a moderate (375-degree) oven, 40 minutes or until firm and golden brown.

Kansans On The Move

By Leslie Frazier Kansas State University

More than ever before, the Kansas population is on the move. One of every five Kansans 5 years of age or older was living in a different county in 1960 than in 1955, according to the U.S. Census Bureau.

Some are moving from farm to non-farm areas. Others are leaving their city residence to live in raral areas. Often their destination is the rural nonfarm home near the metropolitan center where the family wage earner is employed.

Thirty-nine of every 100 Kansans are rural residents. They live on farms or in rural areas or towns of less than 2,500 inhabitants.

The composition of the rural population in Kansas has been far from stable. During World War II, 34 percent of the total population of Kansas was composed of persons engaged in agricultural production. By 1960, this had changed to 15 per cent.

What has caused this migration? Forces of economic growth have put pressure on labor groups, and these groups have reacted to the pressures. The forces are created by new technology, new resources, education and training, changing testes, and changing incomes. As a result of these forces in the private enterprise economy, many workers find that their services will bring greater rewards in other industries.

One result is a longtime trend showing migration from farming and mining into industries specializing in the production of farm and non-farm goods and services.

Rapidly growing industries are often concentrated in ur-



ban centers. These industries generate immigration to satisfy their employment needs. The redistribution of population has been to the developing industrial centers of larger cities of Kansas.

How Much Land Is Tax Exempt?

HUTCHINSON _ A reappraisal of Reno County property illustrates well how areas grow but tax bases remain relatively stable.

Of 35,000 parcels of land appraised in Reno County, 7000 are tax exempt. That's 20% of the total, and it includes some choice land and improvements.


Certain properties are guaranteed by the state consitution to be free of taxes. These include properties owned by all government units, educational institutions, churches, or those owned by charitable or benevolent associations.

Few, if any, counties in the state even have appraisals of exempt property, so just how much property contributes no taxes is impossible to determine. Reno County's 20% of all land parcels is likely one of

the high figures in the state for exempt property, but the figure for any county would impress a county commission looking for new sources of taxes.

Unless there is some legislative change, the figure is likely to go higher. In 1966 more than a third of the \$8 million in

building permits issued in Reno County was for tax-exempt improvements.

County clerk Hubert Buckles figures the percentage will be higher yet in 1967.

nature of the seed. Federal and state enforcement officers currently are checking areas of southeast Kansas to determine extent of the area from which the poisonous seeds are coming.

Four specials of the plant are described in a bulletin from Kansas State University, issued two years ago. The plant, a legume, had been introduced in some areas of the state as a "ground cover" to halt water erosion, and also as a soil building agent since it is a legume.

Although it is poisonous to humans, Wright said it is highly unlikely the seeds could get into flour or human food, since normal flour milling operations call for careful screening and cleaning before the wheat is milled.

However, Wright said, the seed is poisonous to all warmblooded animals and often feed milling operations do not extract all foreign material before milling.

The seed is particularly dangerous to chickens, Wright said.



Freeman has the authority to set minimum prices for fluid milk in areas covered by the federal marketing orders but has not indicated whether he will call the hearings.

Retail prices of dairy products in July - the latest figures available - averaged 5 per cent higher than a year earlier. The gain has slackened since last fall, the report said, and likely will lessen in the rest of the year.

The report blamed part of the expected decline in production on continuing high prices for beef cattle and cull cows, which encourage herd culling. It added that high employment and wages elsewhere will continue to draw farmers and labor away from dairying.

Government action designed to help U.S. soybeans meet increasing competition abroad is being discussed.


Markets for soybeans and their products, particularly in Western Europe, have been hurt by a heavy flow of low-priced sunflower seed and oil from the Soviet Union.

Sen. George McGovern (D-S. D.) is proposing that the Agriculture department take aggressive measures to expedite exports of soybean oil. He suggests it buy large quantities of the oil from domestic processors and sell it abroad at prices competitive with sunflower and other vegetable oils.

pounds, or about 6,700 quarts of milk in a year, needs more than 51 tons of grass, hay, grain, and water.

A 1,300-pound cow will eat about three tons of grain and protein feed a year, two and one-half tons of hay, and six tons of silage. And she will wash the feed down with more than 80 thousand pounds of water. She eats and drinks about 255 pounds of fuel daily.

The water she drinks helps build up the blood she pumps through her udder. In a day's time, a cow reportedly pumps 400 pounds of blood through her udder to produce a pound of milk.

To produce 14,000 pounds of milk a year, one cow needs 11½ tons of feed and more than 40 tons of water. A 50-cow herd uses more than 2,500 tons of fuel annually.



Forage Research At K-State Almost Since Beginning Of School

MANHATTAN - Forage research at Kansas State University is almost as old as Kansas State University itself, Dr. R. V. Olson, head of the Agronomy Department, told over 500 participants at the Fall Forage Field Day on the KSU campus last week. Farmers from 42 Kansas counties and 8 surrounding states were on hand for the big agronomy event.

Experiments with grasses, clovers, and alfalfa started in 1874, he noted. Sorghum silage tests began in 1866 and have been continuous since that time. "Our research covers such

factors of production as development of improved varieties and hybrids, better methods of planting, fertilizing and managing, improving nutritional qualites, controlling insects and disease, and using better handling and feeding methods," Dr. Olson pointed out.

Greatest emphasis at the present time is being placed on forage sorghums, sorghum-sudangrass hybrids, alfalfa, and bromegrass, the K-State agronomist says. Progress is being made on developing short strains to serve as seed parents for forage sorghum hybrids. This will reduce seed production costs.

Sorghum-sudan lines are also being developed. A low prussic acid line has been released and extensive work is underway for selection of other low prussic acid materials of high yielding potential.

Alfalfa research includes breeding for the development of improved varieties that combine resistance to aphids, bac-

Extensive fertilization experiments are underway with bromegrass at several research locations in eastern Kansas. This work involves times, rates, and methods of application of different forms of nitrogen to determine the effect on yields and quality of forage.



The governor said he may request legislation from the 1968 legislature to bring the appointive power back to the governor's office.



Farm machinery displays will break all records. The fair continues to gain prestige as one of the biggest equipment shows in the entire U.S.


