



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

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Wheat Protein Highest In Past Decade

The 1967 Kansas wheat quality report released Friday by the Kansas State Board of Agriculture showed protein content to be the highest since 1956 but test weight to be well below av-


As of Aug. 1, Kansas wheat production for 1967 was estimated at 229,820,000 bushels.

Protein content averaged 12.9 per cent, which compared with 12.2 per cent in 1966 and the 1961-65 average of 11.7 per cent. Weight per bushel averaged 60.2 pounds, well below last year's record 62.1 pounds.

Dockage was less than 0.5 per cent in 77 per cent of the samples tested and 1.0 per cent or more in only 4 percent.

Yield per acre, at 20 bushels, was one-half bushel higher than in 1966 but otherwise the lowest for the state in the last decade. The acreage seeded and harvested was the largest since the 1953 crop.

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WE HEARD OF GO BLLS BEFORE BUT DICULOUS:"

E. C. Riley Case To Fraud Trial

businessman was ordered last week to stand trial in Mitchell county District Court on charges of obtaining money under fraudulent pretenses.

Edgar C. Riley, former Cawker City implement dealer, midway through his preliminary hearing in Mitchell County Court waived conclusion of the hearing and agreed to be bound over on six counts alleged in the charges.

Riley was charged with obtaining \$45,974 from Trader's State Bank, Glen Elder, Kans., by selling the bank fraudulent promissory notes. Thirty-two alleged fraudulent promissory notes were introduced in evidence during the hearing. Riley was charged only with negotiating six fraudulent notes.

The only witness called during the hearing, which lasted 1½ hours, was James B. Warren, former president of the Glen Elder Bank. Warren said Riley first contacted him about doing business with the bank early in 1964.

"Riley explained his business operations and gave me an open line of credit and endorsed line of credit. He mentioned that he wanted to cut down his line of business at the state bank of Downs," Warren said.

Warren first was made aware that notes his bank subsequently discounted for Riley were worthless when informed by a district bank examiner July 31, 1967, he said.

He quoted the bank examiner:
"By God, Jim, it looks to me
like your bank is broke flatter
than hell."

Under cross examination by Paul Aylward, Ellsworth, one of Riley's attorneys; Warren testified that he had obtained controlling stock of E. C. Riley Implement Co., Inc., Cawker City. Aylward asked Warren if that didn't cancel out the bad notes. Warren said it did not and that the notes still were property of the bank.

"I lost a bank that was worth \$225,000 to \$250,000 and I didn't get a damn thing for it. Riley said he wanted me and my wife to recoup some of the money we had lost on this," Warren said in an outburst.

Under questioning by Mitchell County Atty. Harry Gantenbein, Warren testified there were other losses to the Glen Elder bank caused by Riley.

"There was a loss on this check kiting (covering insufficient fund checks) deal. At this time, it was down to \$158,000 and something," Warren replied.

He previously relied heavily upon Riley's signature in his credit dealings, although he had discussed each note and its security thoroughly before any transaction, Warren said.



Meat Packing Grows In Kansas

Meat packing, already one of the leading industries in Kansas, will become even more important to the state's economy in the future, according to two Kansas State University agricultural economists.

Professor John H. McCoy and Research Assistant Don A. Johnson list three factors which point to an even larger meat packing industry in the state:

-Greater importance of livestock production.

The trend towards slaughtering nearer the source of supply.

-Continued emphasis on development of off-farm business-

Later figures are not available, but in 1963 — the year of the last Census of Manufacturers - meat packing was the third most important industry in the state (as measured by value added by manufacturing). Aircraft manufacturing and petroleum refining ranked first and second, respectively.

Dollarwise, the importance of meat packing is indicated by these figures: \$516 million worth of meat produced and \$440 million pair for raw ma-

terials. Total payroll in 1963 was \$54.2 million.

The industry empoyed 8,070 employees, or 7.1 percent of all manufacturing work force in the state, and contributed 5.2 percent of the state's total value added by manufacturing.

Prior to the early 1950's, slaughter exceeded livestock production in Kansas. This trend has been reversed since then, particularly in slaughter of cattle and calves. Increased livestock production has been the big reason for this shift, according to McCoy and John-

Figures on per capita production and consumption bear out the fact that Kansas is a net exporter of processed meat. In 1965, per capita production in Kansas was as follows: beef, 381 pounds; pork, 130.8 pounds; and lamb and mutton, 8.2 pounds.

Data are not regularly published on per capita consumption by state. A recent study, however, reported Kansas per capita beef consumption at 132 pounds, considerably higher than the U.S. average estimated at 106 pounds for 1967.

Average 1965 per capita con-

sumption for the U.S. was 58.7 pounds of pork and 3.7 pounds of lamb and mutton. Assuming these figures are representative of consumption in the state, then plants in Kansas slaughtered and processed more than twice as much pork, lamb, and mutton as was consumed in the state.

Studies show an excellent basis for increasing livestock production in this state. Kansasgrown feed has generally exceeded livestock requirements.

Purina Profits Dip A Third

Profits at Ralston Purina for the fiscal year just ended were down one-third.

The St. Louis feed company's annual report for the year ending September 30 showed record sales of \$1.275 billion but profit was down to \$29.9 million. Net income dropped to 99 cents per share, compared to \$1.49 a share last year. Gross sales were up by 10.5%.

Raymond Rowland, chairman, and R. Hal Dean, president, said that a less advantageous economic year with respect to poultry prices and soybean crushing margins were factors in the earnings dip. 

Speaking at the opening s sion of the department's ann national Agricultural Outlook Conference in Washington, ly noted that record output declining prices this year a continued raise in costs h combined to reduce 1967 net come about 10% from the vious year's high average.

"Looking to next year, supplies of farm products will tinue large, but prices receiv in general are expected to strengthen from reduced le this fall," he said. He added that some increase in government payments to farmers is so anticipated.

Accordingly, he forecast a gain in gross farm income for 1968, "perhaps around a billion

"But production expenses v continue to increase and may largely offset the gain," he a

Thus, farmers incomes will not keep pace with expected gains in the rest of the economy. Net income per farm, how ever, is expected to increase in 1968, compared with a small de cline this year. Daly also said that after-tax incomes of persons on farms will likely improve next year.

This year's realized net farm income is expected to total \$14 billion, down from \$16.4 billion in 1966. "Despite expanding demand, supply increases in 1967 were large enough to duce prices received by farmer in January-September by 5% from year-earlier levels," Daly

said. He reported that, with comm dity program changes, planted acreage for 1968 wheat and fee grain crops may be about 109 smaller than this year Howel er, he said there is little basis for expecting overall crop out put next year to change much in total.

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

Some Late Season Strength In Slaughter Cattle Market

By Robert L. Coppersmith Kansas State University

Cattlemen can look for some strengthening in the slaughter cattle market during the rest of 1967, but no major price rise

An increase in numbers of light cattle on feed October 1 may weaken the market next



spring. Steers weighing 500 to 700 pounds were up 7 percent. Heifers under 500 pounds were up 43 percent.

Most of these cattle will come to market next spring and summer. If feeders bunch marketings from these weight groups next spring, prices could be depressed considerably.

The number of heavier cattle on feed October 1, on the other hand, was less than a year earlier. Steers weighing more than 1100 pounds were down 14 percent. Heifers weighing more than 900 pounds were down 7 percent. Most of these weight groups will be marketed before December 1.

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

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

What Devaluation Means To Farmer

Our farmers will lose a little because of the devaluation of the British pound. They will lose more as other nations follow the example set by Britain.

The devaluation of British money raises the costs of everything Britain buys from countries that do not devalue. For example, before devaluation, Britain could buy 280 dollars worth of U.S. products for 100 pounds. Now they will have to pay 117 pounds for the same products. Because of the higher costs, Britain will cut her purchases of products from the United States. She will also cut her buying from other countries that do not devalue. This could divert more of some products - meat, for example - to the United States.

Britain is the fifth best foreign buyer of U.S. farm products. Last year (1966), the British bought farm products worth \$471 million from the United States — 7 percent of our total exports.

The biggest item on this British shopping list was tobacco. They bought \$137 million worth of tobacco last year. More important to Midwestern farmers, the British also bought \$106 million worth of corn; \$50 million of wheat; \$15 million of soybeans; and \$30 million of other grains, feeds, soybean oil, and similar products.

They also took \$49 million worth of animal products, such as lard, meats, hides, tallow and wool. Other important agricultural products purchased by the British in our markets include cotton, fruits, and vegetables.

At this writing (Nov. 20), we do not know how many other countries will follow the British lead and devalue their own currencies. Ireland followed quickly. The Irish took \$31 million of our agricultural products last year, principally tobacco, corn, and other grains.

Some of the other countries that have joined with the U.K. to form the European Free Trade Association (EFTA) may also devalue their currencies. The EFTA nations are Austria, Denmark, Finland, Norway, Portugal, Sweden, and Switzerland. Altogether, the EFTA countries took nearly \$800 million worth of U.S. farm products in the latest fiscal year.

Of these countries, Denmark is our largest customer. Last year, the Danes bought \$86 million worth of U.S. farm products. More than half of their purchases were soybeans and soybean meal. Other important items were barley and tobacco.

Switzerland bought U.S. farm products worth \$70 million — wheat, tobacco, cotton, and a

large variety of other items. Sweden's total was \$61 million; the largest items being tobacco and cotton. Norway bought agricultural items worth \$54 million; the largest ones were soybeans, wheat, corn, sorghum grain, and tobacco.

If any of our competitors in world trade devalue their currencies, it would give them the advantage of being able to lower their selling price relative to prices of U.S. farm products. Countries that maintain the closest financial ties with Britain would be the ones most likely to devalue. These nations include New Zealand, Australia, South Africa, and India.

"So we find the farmer looking to Washington for help and Washington preoccupied with our cities. How long can we expect the farmer to look - instead of demand - like his city cousin?"

The senator noted that farm product prices declined in October for the third consecutive month. They are now six per cent below the level of a year

A Big Cut In Sheep Feeding

There are nearly a third less sheep and lambs on feed in Kansas this fall that there were a year ago. The Livestock Reporting Service places the number as of November 1 as 72,000 smallest since records were started in 1960.

He predicted the net farm income for 1967 may be down as much as 10 per cent from last year when final figures are in.

"This distressing news comes at a time when personal income of nearly all other Americans is setting new records," Senator Carlson said.

"While this situation exists," he continued, "prices paid by farmers for goods and services used for production and for family living increased to the highest level in history.

"In the past 20 years, white collar workers have kept well ahead of inflation," he said. "From 1947 to today, hourly earnings of industrial workers

At a time when the cost-price squeeze is so noticeable, the need for the farmer to produce food has never been greater, he said. Seventy-three per cent of the nation's wheat crop, more than 900 million bushels, was exported in 1966 to help meet the problems of world hunger, Senator Carlson said.

"This is a most impressive contribution to this country's effort to try and reduce the current trend towards a world food crisis," he said. "Through such a program, the wheat farmer furnishes our country with one of the strongest forrose by 123 percent. Over the eign policy tools possible."

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
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

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

May Be A Wild **Turkey Season** In Five Years

Within the next five years, Kansans may be able to take to the field and bag their own turkey dinner for Thanksgiving.

That's the word from Oliver Gasswint, of the Kansas Forestry, Fish and Game Commission.

The commission has a program under way to increase the population of wild turkeys in the state and set up a hunting season.

Gasswint says the feeling is that within five years the population will be sufficient for a season on the wary gobblers.

"Our production so far has been tremendous," he says, "and the prospectus is excellent."

Gasswint says the 1963-64 winter flock count was 145 birds. These birds had migrated from Oklahoma. Two years ago the commis-

sion brought in 125 turkeys from the King Ranch in Texas and stocked them at various points in Kansas, mostly in the central region. Last spring less than 50 more were transplanted from Oklahoma.

In the two years, the Kansas turkey population has skyrocketed to more than 891 birds. That was the winter flock count in 1966-67.

Gasswint says the birds being stocked in Kansas are the Rio Grande sub species of the wild turkey.

They thrive in a relatively op-

en area with between 20 to 30 inches of rainfall. This is why the birds are being stocked mainly in central Kansas.

The turkeys gather in large flocks, sometimes up to 200

During the 1966-67 winter count, the 891 birds tallied were in small flocks, about 80 in num-

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




Pearce said the creamery with







Worst Hoof And Mouth Epidemic In English History Still Rampant

In the rolling farm country of west central England and north Wales, hundreds of farmers, accustomed to rising before dawn, are sleeping late this week. The reason is simple and grim: Their cows are dead.

So are their sheep and pigs. By the end of last week, more than 170,000 animals on nearly 1000 farms had been slaughtered in the worst outbreak of hoof and mouth disease in this country's history. Government veterinarians and volunteer workers still had not traced the cause.

Many farmers are bitter because the Ministry of Agriculture has not yet clamped a ban on imports of meat, especially from Argentina, which supplies 10 per cent of Britain's meat and where the disease is endemic.

It is possible that the virus, which attacks only beasts with cloven feet but which can be carried by almost anything, came from South America, or from a number of other countries which sell meat to Britain, but no one knows.

A series of restrictive measures have been taken to control the spread of the disease.

Movement of livestock is forbidden without special license and a number of livestock shows, meetings of farm groups and horse races have been cancelled.

People have been urged not to travel unnecessarily in the infected areas, and special disinfectant pads have been laid on key roads leading to uninfected areas to prevent cars from carrying the virus on their tires.

There has been no difficulty in getting farmers to comply with the restrictions. In fact, many have virtually barricaded themselves off from the world.

The first sign of the disease came a month ago when a pig on a Shropshire farm was found to have hoof and mouth disease.

Gradually, the outbreak became an epidemic, and 21 counties were affected. Although the number of animals slaughtered has been rising by about 10,000 a day, the disease has not invaded any new areas in several

The ministry of agriculture still insists there is no danger of a meat shortage in Britain, which has about 35 million live-

The alarm has spread to other countries as well. Italy and Holland have banned imports of cattle, sheep and pigs from Britain; in fact, Ireland has not

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



Carlson was once thought likely to retire after the current term, but events of the past four years (since William Avery quit the House to become Kansas governor, then lose a bid for a second term) suggested he would indeed be a candidate next year. But last week, the senior senator said he would make up his mind soon, pointing out that if elected for a fourth term he would be over 80 at the end of the tenure and would have been in public office for 40 years.

Regarded as almost a sure shot for re-election, Carlson, if he decides not to run, will be altering political plans of Congressmen Dole and Shriver and perhaps Democratic Governor Robert Docking too.



Triple Rice Crop In Amazing Indian Output

TANJORE, India — Farmers here in the leading rice-growing district of Madras state have written India's biggest agricultural success story of the year by tripling the size of their early crop.

They did this by sowing a high yielding variety of rice called ADT 27, on 600,000 acres of paddy land. Moreover, half this acreage is being doublecropped for the first time this year.

When the harvest is completed, the early crop is expected to add up to 900,000 tons - a net increase of 600,000 tons, by far the biggest addition any single district will make to the record crop of 95 to 100 million tons that India expects to reap this year.

Part of the increase will be due to unusually well distributed monsoon rains after two years of widespread drought. But part of it will also be due to the new high yielding seeds that have been planted on eightmillion acres, or 5 percent of India's arable land.

ADT 27, which was developed locally, does not have a potential yield as high as some of the new imported varieties. But officials here are convinced it promises better results because it is much more resistant to disease, requires less in the way of fertilizer and expert cultivation and produces a grain that suits local tastes.

At the moment Tanjore district seems almost to be bursting with rice. Extra freight cars and trucks have had to be laid on to cope with the enormous increase in output.

Derrick Marks Russell On I-70

RUSSELL — An 88-foot high oil derrick will hold 5foot high letters at the top, spelling out "Russell." The derrick will be placed at the I-70 and US 281 interchange a mile south of town.

All of this is part of Russell's five year \$8500 sign program to promote I-70 and the city.

Average Tractor HP To 65

OTTAWA, Canada — Tractor sales in North America have decreased steadily over the last 17 years and the trend is continuing. At the same time the average horsepower of tractors sold in North America is on the increase.

Statistics provided by Ford of Canada at a public hearing of the royal commission on farm machinery, showed tractor sales in Canada decreased to 32,000 in 1966 from 54,000 in 1950. In the U.S. the drop was to 227,000 from 400,000.







The four leading causes of death were heart disease, cancer, vascular lesions and accidents. These accounted for nearly three-fourths of all deaths.

Heart disease accounted for a new yearly high of 8,565 deaths. There were 3,490 deaths from cancer, 2,669 from vascular lesions, and 1,391 from accidents.

Lung cancer was the principal site of this disease among males , while the breast was the leading site among females.

Motor vehicle fatalities established a record high of 708.

There were no deaths in 1966 for such formerly deadly dis-

eases as diphtheria, measles, polio, smallpox, typhoid fever and whooping cough.

There were 780 infant deaths in 1966, a record low.

There were more marriages in Kansas in 1966 than in any year since 1948. The average age of 19,360 grooms was 26.2 years. The average age for brides was 23.7.

There were one-third as many divorces as marriages, with 6,144 recorded.


