Conflicts Over More Or Less Farm Trade

The biggest issue which may face American agriculture this year is the code under which this country exports and imports farm products.

At the present time, U.S. farmers are the world's largest suppliers of food and fiber in world markets. The production of one acre out of four moves abroad. Exports are running at an annual rate of nearly \$6.8 billion.

Agricultural imports are at

the annual level of about \$4.5 billion. The bulk of the imports is in the non-competitive category, including coffee, tea, cocoa and the like.

But all of American agriculture has not been sharing equally in the big overseas markets. The bulk of the benefits has been going to growers of wheat, livestock, feed grains, oilseeds such as soybeans and cottonseed, cotton, rice and tobacco.

But producers of some U.S. farm commodities have been encountering sharp competition from imports. In this category are meats, particularly beef, dairy products, and cotton textiles. These commodities do not enjoy export markets of any appreciable size.

Legislation Pressed

As aconsequence, some congressional farm leaders and commodity organizations pressed for legislation last year which would have tightened restrictions on foreign supplies.

There is a distinc tpossibility that this year, these farm commodity groups may join with industrial producers being hit by imports, such as steel, some chemicals and the like. By working together, these groups might well be able to get through restrictive trade legislation.

In this matter, agriculture finds itself sharply divided. Major farm organizations, such as the American Farm Bureau Federation and the National

Grange, have voiced opposition to such legislation. They say it would bring retaliation against American farm exports and deprive farmers of vital markets.

The Johnson administration has made clear it opposes new legislation that would restrict trade.

Farmers Concerned

Charles V. Shuman, president of the Farm Bureau, recently told his organization's national convention that "farmers are very concerned with the present wave of protectionism that threatens to destroy the gains

that have been made under trade agreements legislation." Shuman argues that existing

laws provide mechanisms for limiting hurtful imports.

He said these laws were properly used last summer when the administration, after a public hearing before the U.S. tariff commission, cut down on imports of dairy products.

One good thing about these laws is the fact, the farm leader said, that they can be adjusted administratively and do not have the rigidity of laws setting import quotas.

But the livestock industry contends its future-and consumer supplies and prices of meatsare at stake.

Southeast Kansas Still Dominates)ip Back In Soybean Output

After the record soybean prouction in 1966, Kansas producers cut back a bit in 1967 but still produced the second largst bean crop in the state's his-

The total output, according to the Kansas Crop Reporting Service, was 18.562 million bushels, based on a yield of 22.5 bushels per acre. In 1966 the production was 20.632 million bushels on the same yield over 917,000 acres harvested. The acreage this year was 825,000. The map accompanying this article indicates that soybeans are now grown on at least 200 acres in each county east of a ine thru Mankato thru Lyons, Hutchinson and Harper. Production is still modest west of this ine, with only nine counties harvesting on 200 or more ac-

Production continues to be concentrated in a sweep of counties southeast of Emporia. Cherokee county (Columbus) continued to lead the state in gross output, as it has all but one year in the past decade, this time with 1.76 million bushels.

Coffey and Crawford counties were the other million bushel producers.

Ranking next was Brown, largest of the producers not in the southeast quadrant. Brown had 934,000 bushels. Allen, Anderson, and Labette ranked next, with Franklin, Osage, Neosho, Doniphan and Lyon rounding out the top dozen produc-

The southeastern section not only had the largest output, but yields generally were highest


in that section. Montgomery had the highest yield at 31 bushels, with Chautauqua and Greenwood about as high.


The state average yield of 22.5 bushels equaled the 1966 record. There were 846,000 acres planted to soybeans for all purposes and 825,000 of the acres were harvested for beans.

Unfavorably rainy weather during late spring and early summer generally hurt soybean plantings. The growing season was generally favorable except for hot, dry weather which hurt some late planted acreage.

Soybeans appear to have lost some favor in the past year after steady gains in Kansas since 1940, with rather spectacular increases in acreage thru the middle 1960s.


Kansas City - A proposal to change the name of the Missouri Livestock Association to the Missouri Cattlemen's Association will be considered when the organzation holds its annual convention here March 8, 9 and 10.

Joe Ewing, Joplin, Mo., who is the association president, explained that the change would give Missouri's beef cattle industry more representation. "Beef cattle is Missouri's No. 1 agricultural commodity, and needs stronger representation in the areas of marketing, promotion, legislation and taxation. Ewing said. "The primary function will be to represent all Missouri cattlemen in those areas."

If the change is approved, new bylaws will be adopted and new officers elected.

Harold Jones, Head of **Extension**, Steps Down

MANHATTAN - Dr. Harold E. Jones, director of the Cooperative Extension Service at Kansas State University, Manhattan, since 1956, has asked to be relieved of administrative duties by June 30 or "at such early date as is convenient," Dr.

Glenn H. Beck, vice president for agricutlure, announced today.

Beck said that Jones, at his own request, will be assigned as an extension specialist in agronomy on the K-State staff.

In requesting relief from administrative duties, Jones said his decision had been a "difficult" one. "My health, however, does not permit me to sustain the heavy load of activities necessary if Extension is to continue its development in the years to come," he said.

Beck expressed "deep regret" that Jones had asked to be assigned to less demanding duties.


Director Jones has contributed greatly to the advancement of Kansas agriculture during his 12-year tenure," the vice president for agriculture said. "He has been responsible for numerous innovations in the Extension program, keeping them in tune with the frequent changes in agriculture."

Beck, who joined the K-State

staff the same year as Jones, said the Extension director has been "especially" effective in working with Extension personnel. "Harold Jones has gained the respect and strong support of all Extension workers and of the total agricultural community of Kansas," Beck said. "I am pleased that he has chosen to remain in the state and on our staff as an Extension specialist."



TOPEKA - State financing of the Kansas Cultural Arts Commission was questioned in the Senate last week when its 1969 budget came up for approval.

Land Banks Offer 6% Bonds

The Federal Land Banks last week offered \$241 million of 6% 28-month bonds, due July 20, 1970.

Funds generated by the sale will be used for refunding \$111 million of bonds that fall due March 20 and for the banks lending operations. The 12 Federal Land Banks make longierm loans to farmers thru more than 700 Federal Land Bank Associations.

as a new school location.


The district includes 231 square miles covering the northern third of Jackson County and small sections in Atchison and Nemaha Counties.

A Defense Of Social Security

Social Security gets a cheer from an unlikely source — a private actuary.

Since the system was established in 1935, it has met continuing and often harsh criticism that it is "actuarily unsound" - meaning its rates can't pay all benefits promised eventually and bankruptcy could occur at some undetermined point. David H. Roenish, a well-known Chicago actuary, disputes the view in a paper written for Financial Executive magazine.

Despite 20 years of rising Social Security rates and wage bases to which the rates apply, and despite the expansion of benefits, Mr. Roenish calculates that the Social Security trust is solvent and likely to remain SO.

In fact, he argues, it is coming close to a point where benefits can be increased without increasing the proportion of earnings taken in taxes; in general, economic growth would finance the expanded benefits.

Mr. Roenish points out that some proposals for vast increases in benefits, however, could force financing from general tax revenues and effectively undermine much private pension coverage.

This is turn could mean that United States exports may be welcome in some of Australia's former markets - if they are unable to supply them, Fowler said.

Australia has been on a sixgrade system of export the past several years after going off the "FAQ" standard, Fowler said.

The Australian sale to China could mean that it has taken over part of the Canadian market in Red China. This would mea nCanada-already a bit overstocked - would have more wheat available for the international markets.

In a bulletin from Canada, the government noted that carryover of 615 to 655 million bushels of wheat is expected in Canada at the end of the 1967-68 market vear.

The Canadians said wheat exports to industrialized countries have leveled off and may be down from 1966-67. Exports to developing countries will be substantially lower, they said.

Depending on volume of shipments to mainland China, they said, total exports for 1967-68 may reach 400 million bushels.

Apparently, while the Australian deal was being consummated, representatives of both Australia and Canada were meeting with representatives from the United States in Washington, D. C., to work out ground rules for the new International Grains Agreement.

Both Australia and the Canadians have complained that the U.S. exporters have an unfair advantage in the international market because U.S. exporters

can register for subsidy payments before the sale is actually delivered.

U.S. sources have complained that the Canadians and Australians are taking unfair advantage of the market through lack of any production controls. They contend subsidized production without production controls

tends to oversupply the market. Indications in Washington are that the new Public Law 480 will have increased emphasis on the 'self-help' measures within the recipient countries. This "self-help" criteria would be used at a condition of eligibility for receiving the grain food aid from the United States.

The self-help measures include population control and efforts to improve domestic food production.

Since 1954, more than \$1.5 billion worth of U.S. expenses have been paid in foreign countries with their currency received from P.L. 480 shipments paid for in foreign exchange. The balance of payments has been assisted that much.

Countries now are buying for cash the same products they began to use under P.L. 480, he said. Among these are Japan, Taiwan, Brazil and Republic of Korea.

Two Livestock Events Set By KSU

Two special spring events for stockmen are anounced by Kansas State University. Sheep Day will be Monday, April 1, and Cattlemen's Day is set for Friday, May 3.

These events feature a roundup of research aimed at improving the livestock industry in Kansas and the United States, Dr. Ron L. Good, head of the animal husbandry department, said. Each event will include a ladies' program.

Included in the topics for sheepmen are accelerated lambing, lamb carcass research, feeder lamb research, and breeding and selection program. Sheepmen will hear about a special project aimed at developing the sheep industry and promoting lamb products, and several Kansans will receive awards for excellence in sheep production.

Assistant Secretary of Agriculture George Mehren will be the featured speaker at Cattlemen's Day, formerly known as Feeder's Day. He is expected to discuss possible impacts of international conditions on the

future role of the United States it: world beef trade, both dressed beef and breeding stock.

"Research information will be presented by the KSU staff relating to all phases of cattle production - nutrition, breeding, meats, reproductive physiology, and pasture management," Good said.

Other special events for Kansas stockmen include Sheep Day at K-State's Colby Branch Experiment Station, March 25; and Hays Round-Up at the Hays Branch Station, April 26. Swine Day as KSU is set for September 26.



Kansas State University One measure of the way hings are going down on the farm — the parity ratio shows that the nation's farm-

ers are being squeezed even tighter by lower prices and higher production costs. Parity shows the relation be-

ween prices farmers pay for the things they buy and prices they receive for what they produce and sell.

The higher the ratio, the more prosperous farmers are in relation to other sectors of the conomy.

The annual average parity ra-

tio was 74 in 1967 — the lowest since 1933. Parity reached a low of 58 in 1932, rose to 64 in 1933, and 75 in 1934. More recently,



it dipped to 76 in 1964, but rose to 80 in 1966.

The general idea behind parity is that 100 pounds of hogs or 100 bushels of wheat should bring enough money on the market to buy as much as it did during an earlier base period. Parity initially was thought

of as a fairly direct measure of income. It may have served that purpose in its early days. However, experience has shown that income and prices can go in opposite directions under certain circumstances.

USDA also computes an Adjusted Parity Ratio which reflects government payments. This measure was 79 in December 1967.





bean Yields Awards banquet at Manhattan last week. Gray won \$200 and a plaque for getting a 68.19 bushel per acre yield from 5.31 acres. The contest was sponsored by Kansas Soya Products, Emporia; Archer-Daniels-Midland, Fredonia; and Cargill Inc., Wichita.

In the pictude with Gray are Albert Kientz, Wamego; How-ard Birkbeck, LeRoy; and Wayne Dicken, DeSoto.

Kientz was the leader on irrigated land with a 53.62 yield. Birkbeck was the overall runnerup, averaging 63.9 bushels. Dick-en was another \$100 winner, with a 61.26 bushel average.

Other award winners were Leon Sinn, Fort Scott, and Milo Schroeder, Inman.

Gray, the winner from Doniphan county, has been raising soybeans for 10 years. This year he planted 230 of his 718 acres of total cropland to sovbeans, but lost all but 70 to a Missouri River flood. On the full 70 acres, he averaged 50.3 bushels. The contest plot, which was planted to wheat the year before, was in

contest piot, which was planted to wheat the year before, was in a field of 28 acres which averaged 62.4 bushels. Gray's operational procedure was to disc in one quart of Treflan per acre on April 20, and then plant 72 rounds to the acre of Clark 63 certified seed with 120 pounds of 7.21.7 fertilizer as a starter. He cultivated once, on June 20, and harvested on Oc-tober 20. Gray is 46 and has farmed the same ground for 18 years.



An Agriculture Department report shows that less than onesixth of 1 per cent of the meat animals it inspected for possible diseases were rejected for slaughter during the 1967 fiscal year.

The number of animals mainly cattle, calves, hogs and sheep - inspected totaled 112,-910,691. Of this number 112,731,-912 were passed for slaughter for food. This meant that only 178,779 animals were condemned

In addition, a total of 112,896,-166 carcasses were inspected af-





Prison Farms Cash In On Payments

The Dept. of Agriculture is paying subsidies to prison farms to keep part of their acreage idle, even though such farms are designed to keep inmates active.

Agriculture Dept. officials confirmed this when a reporter asked about the Cummins state prison farm, the Arkansas facility where convicts bodies were found in January.

Cummins, according to department records, has received \$255,000 in agriculture subsidies in the last two years, much of it for keeping 35 percent of its cotton acreage out of production.

Prison farms are "the same under the law as any other producer," an Agriculture Dept. spokesman said.

"We're just as interested in keeping their acreage out of production as anyone else's. It's cheaper to make payments than to take over the commodity after it's been produced."

He said the Agriculture Dept. has no power to require prison farms to grow crops not in surplus.

At least three or four other prison farms, mainly in the South, are receiving similar payments, the spokesman estimated.

The spokesman said thousands of recipients are recorded on a county-by-county basis, and he was unable to identify the prisons with such record keeping.

The Cummins payments were spotted only when a reporter suggested checking under Lincoln County, Arkansas.

Since cotton support legislation was approved late in 1965, Cummins has received \$114,294 in 1966 and \$141,443 in 1967 for acreage diversion and price supports.

To qualify, the prison has kept 35 per cent of its 1476 acres of cotton - the maximum allowable — idle.

Besides cotton, the government provides acreage diversion payments to some producers of wheat and feed grains.



He said Cummins has long produced rice and cotton "as a business operation to make money for the state." He said other crops would be less profitable.

Murton said the agriculture payments go into the state treasury, and the state, in turn, appropriates funds for the prison.

He indicated that because of financial considerations, the cotton program would remain as is. He said Cummins would participate in agriculture subsidies again this year.

Federal Tear Over Farm Program Signup

The federal government is waiting to put \$750 million into the pockets of American wheat farmers but says most of those eligible aren't cashing in on the potential harvest.

The money would be paid under the federal wheat control program, aimed at avoiding overproduction and consequent lower prices. The government

said last week most of the wheat growers won't produce more than the program limit but are not signing up for it. A signup drive for wheat, feed grains and cotton opened Feb. 5 and closes March 15. So far only about one-fourth of the

wheat growers have signed up. All the farmers have to do is certify during the signup period that they are abiding by, or will abide by their allotments. Under the 1967 program, par-

ticipating farmers get payments of about 48 cents per bushel on their wheat plus an average market price of \$1.41.

Thus a farmer with a wheat crop of 1000 bushels would lose nearly \$500 by failing to participate in the wheat control program.

Under the feed-grain program, less than half of the corn and sorghum growers had signed by Feb. 29 in a program designed to idle at least 30 million acres of the 153 million acres normally used for these crops. Full participation in this program could mean \$1.3 billion for the growers.

In the case of cotton, where the government seeks a larger planted acreage than last year's very small one, growers have signed up to idle a larger percentage of their planting allotments than the government recommends.



Emporia Pays More To Save **Packing Plant**

EMPORIA - The City Commission has announced it has voted to issue \$41/2 million in industrial revenue bonds for expansion of the Emporia plant owned by Iowa Beef Packers.

The action was taken in a closed secret meeting but City Manager V. A. Basgall said that Mayor Fred Fleming and Commissioner M. L. Henrikson voted in favor of the request by the packing company while Commissioner Ralph Daggett cast a dissenting vote.

Request for the bonds was made by Maurice McGill, an official of the firm based in Dakota City, Nebr.

McGill's request was for funds to pay Armour and Co. for its plant and to remodel it to specifications set forth by Iowa Beef Packers Inc.

McGill said the action was taken quickly so company of. ficials could study the bond market in New York City.

It also was announced that Iowa Beef Packers has been given a \$4½ million industrial bond issue for its plant at West Point, Nebr.

Under terms of the letter of intent regarding the bond issue, Iowa Beef Packers will pay taxes on an evaluation of \$195,000 which is the same as Armour paid on. The bonds will be for 20 years.

A Study Of Driver Reactions By GM To Test Safety Devices

General Motors Corp. is developing a new type of driving simulator designed to find out more about how drivers behave in accidents.

GM said the simulator reproduces every detail of the driving experience — sights, sounds, even the feeling of the car's movements. When a volunteer went for a three-minute test "dnive" in the device, he was thrust back into the seat as his "car" moved forward into a twolane rural highway. He leaned to fight the pressure of rounding several sharp curves at what felt like 55 or 60 miles an hour.

Suddenly, rounding one of the curves, a slow-moving truck loomed up before him. Terrified, he sharply turned to the left to pass the truck, only to find that the left lane was blocked by a row of red barrels. Tires screeched as he swerved

Radials, Cords Complicate Tire Business

The tire business, which has never lacked for confusion, is getting more complicated all the time.

A variety of brands, materials, types, prices and sizes have often confused the wary huver.

Now, even the tire makers share the perplexity.

The confusion is not all bad. Most of it concerns technological changes which the manuacturers hope will mean more sales of profitable premium tires, but which also promise safety, strength and comfort for the motorist.

Basically, there are two broad fields of change. One concerns materials, with polyester, glass fiber and even steel in use. The other concerns a revolution in configuration — that is, the way the fabric cords relate to the tread.

For years tires have been made as in drawing A. Fabric impregnated with rubber is laid on a drum with "bead wires" that will form the tire lip to grip the wheel rim. More fabric is then laid on. For years the bias body ply has run at a 35degree angle to the tire's travel

axis. The tread is laid over the fabric and both are forced into a mold under intense heat and pressure.

The radial ply tire has resulted from manufacturers' search for a stronger tire. As shown in drawing B, the fabric cords are laid over the body of the tire perpendicular to its travel axis.

Over the fabric and beneath the tread is a "belt" of rubber layers strengthened with rayon or glass fiber.

The radial tire deforms more readily, putting more rubber on the road, and the belt's stabilizing effect reduces tread "squirming" on the pavement. This construction reduces friction and roll resistance, its proponents say, and may double tread life. It also makes it cost 40% more than a conventoinal tire, and critics say it produces a harsher ride at lower speeds.

The latest wrinkle among the tiremakers is a hybrid, as in drawing C, which lays the fabric on a bias, as in the conventional tire, but retains the belt of the radial tire.


It mosts more than a conventional tire by 15 to 20% but offers most of the toughness of the radial tire but doesn't give nearly as rough a ride, say the manufacturers.

The tiremakers have another reason to favor the hybrid. It can be made on existing equipment, while the radial ply tire requires entirely new tire-building machinery as well as modifications in the vulcanizing process.

While the hybrid belted tire reduces the need for a major capital expenditure, it also means that small producers can get into production quickly,

which should lower prices to conventional tire levels.

Armstrong Rubber — supplier to Sears, Roebuck, the third largest tire retailer - scored first with the belted bias tire, and all the major companies -Goodyear, Firestone, Uniroyal, General and Goodrich - are ready for its production.

Goodrich, however, is one company with a considerable investment in the full radial ply tire, having nearly as much capacity for its manufacture as the rest of the industry combined. Company spokesmen say they are heavily backlogged and can't begin to fill orders for the radial tire.

The other big change has to do with materials. For years nylon and rayon competed closely as the material for the tire fabric, but in recent years nylon has forged ahead, now holding 65% of the market. Rayon has 18%. Now estimated to have 16% of the market is polyester, which adherents say is strong like nylon but rides like rayon. Nylon is considered to have a tentency to form a flat spot on the bottom of the tire after an auto has been parked for several hours. Such flat spots make for a few miles of rough running until they work out, experts say.

A fourth bidder for the tire cord market is glass fiber, used in tire belting for its great

Thus far glass fiber for tire cords is made by only two producers, Owens-Corning and Pittsburgh Plate Glass. Owens-Corning, of Toledo, says it will double its capacity and aims to allow "conversion in 1968 of 15% to 20% of all passenger tires," says a company official.

Steel tire cord, while used for nearly a decade in truck and offthe-road tires, and in some European passenger tires, has yet to be used commercially in the U.S. But Uniroyal has announced that it would begin making a premium tire with a rubberimpregnated mat of fine steel wire between the tread and tire body. The mat, claims the company, affords added protection from road hazards, disperses heat buildup and adds 20% to tread life.

Steel might also gain a share of the cord market in the belt of radial ply tires, say Goodrich engineers, especially if auto companies should revise auto suspension systems to compensate for steel cord's rougher ride.
