Vision of Rural Communities

MANHATTAN — A Riley County commissioner has called on the Kansas Extension Service to help develop "communities of tomorrow" which will help end the flow of persons from rural areas to urban centers.

Ivan Sand urged more than 400 Extension workers attending the 54th Annual Kansas Extension Conference last week to look ahead to the day when the American landscape "is dotted with communities that include a blend of renewed small towns, new towns and growing rural villages."

"You can help build a "dream world" in which 300 million Americans live in less conges-

tion than 200 million live today, he said.

"Nineteen of every 20 Americans lived in rural areas in 1870," he pointed out. "Today, seven of every 10 live in urban centers. Seventy per cent of our people are living on one per cent of our land."

If this trend continues, another 100 million persons will be crowded on this same one per cent of the land within 30 years, Sand predicted.

"On one hand, we will have abundance of agricultural production throughout the Midwest and Great Plains," he explained. "It is and will be, a vast crop area with few persons to appreciate the beauty of the countryside.

"On the other hand, we will have over-populated cities with large pockets of ghettos which are without hope and which may threaten the existing structure of our system." must provide employment opportunities to retail their citizens, Sand said. "Individuals have been forced to migrate from rural to urban areas to find employment that provides a just standard of living for their family."

Communities must work to eliminate poverty within Kansas, he said, noting that rural areas have one-third of the nation's population and one-half of its poverty.

Store Or Get A Loan To Boost Feed Grain Price

As an individual farmer, you can do little to influence prices for feed grains and soybeans this fall. However, similar action by a large number of farmers could signal an improvement in prices.

GRAIN

A near-record 1968 crop, combined with high carrying and large free stocks, will put downward pressure on corn prices during the next few months. The situation is much the same for grain sorghums, with production and supply expected to be up from last year.

Don D. Pretzer, Extension economist at Kansas State University, sees a short-run price improvement only if a large number of farmers store or take out a loan on their grain.

You have two choices, he says — store and hope for a price advance, or sell at harvest. The economist looks for price to advance enough to pay interest, shrink on grain, and out-of-pocket storage costs if corn is stored or the farm in existing bins.

If enough farmers put their grain under loan or store on the farm, price could advance enough to pay all storage costs, he says.

The expected billion bushel soybean crop this fall will excced utilization by about 9 percent. The 1967 and 1966 crops exceeded use by 7 and 6 percent, respectively.

Pretzer believes these annual surpluses are large enough to push price well below the loan rate until the surpluses are put under price-support loan, or until the market determines that current price will not call forth needed supplies for crush and export.




Recent lower prices will be an incentive to put more soybeans under loan this year, Pretzer says. He looks for prices to adyance to near the loan level late1 in the year.

Chevrolet sells push-button headlight washers and a pushbutton chemical spray that coats rear tires for traction in snow and ice. Plymouth peddles a flowered vinyl top plus a matching interior for the ladies.

For \$34.75, Chrysler provides an array of dashboard warning lights as reminders to fasten seat belts, lock the doors and turn the headlights off when leaving the car.

Or there's a gadget that turns the lights off for the driver 90 seconds after he leaves the car.

Oldsmobile gives a push-button hidden ashtray free of charge while Pontiac Grand Prix buyers will find a microscopically thin radio antenna built into the windshields of their cars, whether they buy a radio or not.

But problems arise. Detroit had hoped to boast of electrically heated rear window defrosters as extra-cost options, only to find they're standard equipment on the lowly Volkswagen.

"Communities of tomorrow," the commissioner said, would help reverse these trends. He predicted these communities:

—May extend over several counties and include a large city, shopping centers, a number of towns, villages and open country in between.

— Will have villages, towns, cities and counties bound together by roads, rivers and other physical features.

— Will offer a wide range of industrial jobs and a full range cf services.

"Communities of tomorrow" will be based on sound multicounty planning, he said, urging the Extension Service to apply extensive leadership in this area.

Farming and ranching will play a key role in these communities, he pointed out. "Adequate income to provide an equal standard of living for rural persons and a just return on investment in agricultural production will be necessary."

Sand also called for retention of the commercial family farm, part-time farming opportunities, and programs to encourage young families to enter farming.

Centennial Of A Homestead

The diminishing number of farmsteads is a frequent concern of Dan Burris, SCS conservationist in Riley and Geary counties. No mean photographer, Burris often catches the poignancy of the changing rural face with his camera. This particular house, built perhaps a century ago on a homestead, is on the farm of Eldon Hargrave near Randolph in western Riley County.

It's abandonment, says Burris, gives testimony to the disappearance of 1000 farms in Riley County in 30 years. In the 1935 census of the State Board of Agriculture, Riley had 1625 faims. By 1964 the number had dropped to 737 and there are about 180 less than that now. The expansion of the Fort Riley military reservation and the construction of Tuttle Creek Reservoir were responsable for some of this decline, but Burris points out those projects accounted for only a third of the farmstead disappearance.

Joint Meeting Of Two State Wheat Groups

Annual meetings of the Kansas Wheat Commission and the Kansas Association of Wheat Growers will be held Tuesday and Wednesday, Nov. 19 and 20, at the Baker Hotel in Hutchinson, officials of the two state commodity organizations have announced.

Climax of the two-day meeting is the open Kansas Wheat Meeting, in which the two organizations cooperate after their separate annual meetings. The Kansas Wheat Meeting on the evening of Nov. 20 will present such highlights as the coronation of the 1969 Kansas Wheat Queen, naming the 1968 Wheat Man of the Year, and will present an entertaining speaker.

The Kansas Wheat Commission annual meeting will start at noon, Nov. 19, with the annual Governor's Luncheon, says Carl A. Dumler of Russell, chairman of the Commission. The Commission program on the afternoon of Nov. 19 and the morning of Nov. 20 will present reports on the work of the Commission, and will feature speakers on important wheat subjects, Dumler said.

The Kansas Association of Wheat Growers will begin its sessions on the morning of Nov. 19 and continue on the afternoon of Nov. 20. The program will consist of reports on the wheat outlook by qualified speakers, and adoption of resolutions by the organization for the coming year, says Ray F. Uehling of Ness City, president of the Kansas Association of Wheat Growers. A Kansas Wheathearts program is planned for women attending the convention, including the convention, including a tour in Hutchinson, and a demonstration at the Kansas Wheat Commission Test Kitchen.

"Wheat producers from all over the state are welcome to attend all sessions of the conventions," says G. C. Fowler, administrator for Kansas Wheat Commission, Hutchinson. "Both organizations are supported by wheat producers, and in addition to their reports on work done on behalf of wheat and wheat producers during the past year, the list of authoritative speakers during the two days will present important information for wheat producers of the state."

California To Close Its Bug Stations

For nearly 50 years, virtually every automobile and truck entering California has had to stop at a border inspection station.

This was California's way of weeding out hitchhiking agricultural pests and plant diseases which might threaten the state's farming industry.

The border check is coming to an end as state officials try to modernize their battle against the pink bollworm, the apple maggot, the corn borer and the cherry fruit fly.

Richard Lyng, state agricultural director, confirmed plans to close two of the 18 check stations within two weeks and to phase out the others over the next five years.

Modern transportation is reducing the value of the inspection points, referred to by Californians as "bug stations," Lyng said.

Before long, more travelers will be flying into California than driving, and "so we feel in a sense the border stations will come to the point where they will be about as effective as the Maginot Line was when the blitz came along."

Strategy Switch **On Discouraging** Smoking

The American Cancer Society, facing what it called unchanged social acceptance of cigarette smoking and zealous advertiseing, said it will try anew to

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Geary, Pottawatomie & Riley counties.

change the nation's smoking habits.

The society's national board, assembled from 50 states, adopted a nine-point program that will stress that "giving up cigarette smoking is immediately rewarding and offers a more pleasurable and longer life."

Two key aspects of the program are:

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MANHATTAN

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"We should strive to secure

the elimination of cigarette advertising in all media. It is hoped that this can be achieved by voluntary self-regulation and that governmental action will not be necessary."

"We should . . . support federal legislation . . . including proposals to make the warning label on cigarette packages more accurate, to place warnings on all cigarette advertising and to require the industry to list on packages and in advertising the tar and nicotine content in cigarettes."

In 1960, the society said, when it began its public education program, there were 36,520 lung cancer deaths. This year, the society said, 55,000 are expected; next year, 59,000.

The society said cigarettes also have been linked to oral cancer and cancer of the larynx, esophagus and bladder, and to cardiovascular disease, chronic bronchitis and emphysema.

The tobacco industry maintains that cigarette smoking has not been proved to be a cause of cancer.

"While medical research has produced a clear picture of the threat of cigarettes," the society said, "their social acceptability and the energy with which they are promoted have not been essentially reduced."


The society said it believes in the right of adults to decide if they will smoke, but added: "We do not see enough real freedom on this decision in our cigarette infiltrated world."

For youngsters, the society said, there is the example set by adult smokers, the lure of their contemporaries' smoking and "glamorous advertising." The adult smoker finds his habit confirmed not only by each cigarette he smokes but by a variety of social pressures."

Self-Ventilating **Toilet Eliminates** Bathroom Odors

Utilizing a new design principle, plumbing engineers have devised a means of harnessing the normal water flow in a toilet tank to create a vacuum that draws air (and odors) from the toilet and back through the flushing rim to the toilet's discharge outlet. The odors are then expelled through the regular vent pipe and the freshness of the bathroom is maintained. Maximum time for the venting action ranges from eight to ten seconds after the venting mechanism is activated. The flushing of the toilet automatically resets the ventilator for later use.

Sow Parsley, Spinach In Fall

Parsley and spinach may be sown in fall for use in spring. Both are hardy and will produce an extra-early crop. If you have rabbits in your garden and expect to eat the spinach yourself, better fence the area now.






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

Rail Experiment Can't Get On Track

The plan for high speed passenger train service in the congested Washington-New York-Boston corridor is chugging along almost a year behind schedule, and there still is no firm starting date.

Federal officials had set last October for the start of the government-supported project with a run between Washington and New York City.

Then the date was moved to early this year. Then the setting of dates was stopped.

"We've been burned too many times," explains Robert A. Nelson, director of the Department of Transportation's office of high-speed ground transportation. He says the government based its timetable on industry promises that he claims haven't held up.

Officials now are saying, however, that the other half of the project — a run between Boston and New York — should begin soon, perhaps in November. They report that many of the toughest technical and business problems have been overcome.

Nelson says public clamor for better intercity railroad service, combined with recent air traffic delays, has put his agency under the public gun. But he maintains that this kind of interest is healthy too, and needed for success of the project.

Nelson says that without a technological breakthrough, passenger trains will be feasible only for another 10 to 15 years.

One reason officials predict this limited future is that helicopters and other aircraft that can land and take off in small spaces are becoming available for trips of 50 to 250 miles. It is trips of this length that hold the only present hope for intercity trains, officials say.

Nelson concedes, however, that at the rate the demonstration effort is going, the improved rail passenger service might nearly be obsolete by the time it could be started elsewhere.

The most talked-about hope for a breakthrough to higher speeds without huge costs is a train that would ride on a cushion of air and be powered by a new type of electric motor. Such air suspension requires only a simple and inexpensive track, perhaps with unfinished concrete rails. Grass & Grain

Protein Woes, If Not Too Little, Too Much

Unusually high protein content of soft white wheat shipped from Washington and other Pacific Northwest states could drastically curtail future exports to Japan, warns a Japanese trade team.

The team represents more than 75 per cent of the Japanese milling industry which uses low protein wheat to produce flour for cakes, noodles, biscuits, crackers and similar products.

Paul Y. Sone, secretary interpreter for the team and assistant director of the Western U.S. Wheat Associates in Japan, described the situation as "a very serious problem."

He said Japan has immediate need of 1 million to 2 million tons of high quality, low protein wheat. If the United States can't supply it, the Japanese may turn to Australia and France, he said.



Screwworm **Problem Worst** In Several Years

Animal health officials are fighting the worst fall buildup of screwworms in years, the U.S. Department of Agriculture has reported.

Screwworm infestations are increasing daily in Texas and

the epidemic is expected to get worse before cold weather begins to take its toll of these pests, veterinarians of USDA's Agricultural Research Service said.

However, ARS veterinarians are even more concerned about the possibility that weather this. winter will be favorable to screwworms. Should the weather be mild and moist, the screwworm situation could be even worse next spring. By early October, the screw-

worm laboratory at Mission, Texas, had identified over 4400 cases of screwworms found in Texas, New Mexico, Arizona, and California. Of this total, Texas reported over 4000 cases, California 80, Arizona 279, and New Mexico 60.

With the fall buildup not yet at its peak in Texas, screwworm cases are running ahead of 1963 the second worst year for screwworms since the eradication program began. However, the frequency of cases is running far below the level of cases in 1962 when over 50,000 cases were confirmed in the laboratory.

Weather has been the main culprit in this year's outbreak, ARS veterinarians say. They point out that the mild, moist weather provided an excellent climate for screwworm development as well as good grazing in areas that ordinarily do not support livestock to any great extent. The presence of more livestock and more untreated wounds thus compounded the

problem. The screwworm plant at Mis-

sion, Texas, has been operating at top capacity and sterile flies are being released at close to 200 million a week in an attempt to keep up with the wild screw. worm fly population.

Because of the tremendous success of the eradication program during the past few years, many ranchers now practice year-round calving which they could not do prior to the screwworm eradication program. The ranchers have also stopped looking for screwworms and treating wounds - precautionary measures they once took as a matter of course.

Laboratory figures show that around one out of every four cases of screwworms result from man-made wounds such as branding, dehorning and shearing.

Ranchers can help get screwworms back under control by resuming their search for screwworms. They should examine their animals, collect suspected screwworm larvae and send them to the laboratory, treat wounds, and spray cattle to kill screwworms, program officials advise.

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

Good Prices At Timber Harvest

Now is the time to consider harvesting mature trees from Kansas timbers. Timber stumpage prices have been firm all year and should remain strong into next year, Leonard Gould, area Extension forester at Kansas State University, said this week.

The market for furniture lumber has been exceptionally good throughout the summer months. Consequently, sawmills have been unable to maintain or build up log inventories and are in need of good quality sawlogs to meet furniture industry demands for the coming winter production.

Black walnut veneer logs, where quality and size determine the value and price, will range from \$250 to \$1000 per thousand board feet, Gould said. Walnut sawlogs of lower quality that are used primarily for lumber and gunstock products range in price from \$150 to \$400 per thousand board feet.

Stumpage prices for mixed hardwood sawlogs will range from \$10 to \$30 per thousand board feet depending on quality, size, and distance to market. These species include hackberry, green ash, soft maple, cottonwood, red oak, sycamore and elm.

Bur oak lumber is used for barrel heading and staves. The quality bur oak stumpage price will range from \$30 to \$50 per thousand board feet, he said.

"Timber sales should be made on a lump sum basis with full payment upon signing of the sale contract," Gould said. He advised landowners to examine woodland now to see if timber harvest is possible.

If assistance is needed, a district Extension forester can be contacted through the county Extension office.





eral Trade Commission had in mind when its smoke-testing machine started puffing last November. The commission has been testing cigarets in cooperation with Sen. Magnuson (D-Wash.) chairman of the Senate Commerce Committee. The Senator, who receives and releases the FTC test results, has said the tar and nicotine rankings "will enable a smoker who is unable or unwilling to give up smoking to select the least hazardous cigarets on the market."

The FTC machine's first report covered the tar and nicotine content of 59 varieties of cigarets sold in the U.S. The second report, issued last June, covered an additional 68 varieties. The new test covered all 122 varieties commonly available. To get a fair sample, the FTC bought two packs of each variety in each of 50 representative locations throughout the country

The FTC machine smoked each cigaret down to a 23-millimeter butt or, in the case of longer filter cigarets, down to within 3 mm of the filter overwrap. The results were based on a test of 100 cigarets per variety or brand.

High Moisture Grain Out Of Trench

Rice county agent Virgil Biby looks over a double-ended trench silo with concrete hoor and sides on the tarm of the k Engelland and his father near Lyons. The Engellands are put-ting 700 head of cattle on high moisture grain stored in the silo. It is the first time they have tried storing high moisture grain for feeding, but they expect little spoilage because of the lack of a completely airtight seal on the grain. The secret, they say, is fine grind and tight packing. They use plastic sheeting across the top of their trench, holding it down with a thin layer of soil. of soil.



Winterize That Horse

Not quite like cars, but late fall is the proper time to treat horses for a bot infestation.

that can produce trouble in the form of disease, retarded growth, wasted feed, or even sudden death.

He says the larva stage of bot infestation is present in the stomach now, but they are small and have not caused much damage to this time. The bot eggs have hatched and are susceptible to treatment.

Female bot flies lay eggs on the forelegs, around the mouth, and other areas on the horse. The small, yellowish eggs are glued to the hair and are difficult to remove. Horses ingest bots, and the eggs hatch and pass to the stomach. Larvae then attach to the stomach lining and cause inflamation and pitting. Bots live on body fluids, and the entire life cycle takes 10 to 11 months.

When the female bot flies are depositing eggs on the horse, they cause considerable irritation. Horses fear the flies, and will try various methods of escape. They may also become unmanageable and injure their handlers or themselves.

Excellent commercial products are available for bot treatment, Dr. Caley says. They are effective and relatively safe; however, an occasional case of colic is reported following treatment.

Consult a veterinarian on the recommended route of administration and product to use.

Bots and other parasites should be controlled before signs of infestation are noticeable.

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


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Project To Spur Frozen Meat Cuts Several commercial firms, in-

The Kansas Agricultural Experiment Station has launched a research project which may help pave the way for widespread retail sale of individual frozen meat cuts.

The study, funded by a substantial grant from the American Sheep Producers Council, will help define the optimum processing conditions and economic feasibility of marketing retail cuts of frozen lamb. Five Kansas State University departments and 10 faculty members are involved.

Results of this study could lead to the direct expansion of central processing and freezing of red meats in Kansas and other midwestern states, says Dr. Harold J. Tuma, associate professor of animal science and in-




ordinator.

"Most red meats produced in Kansas are now sold on-hoof or in the carcass form to out-ofstate markets," he says. " If developed in Kansas, this new freezing - processing system could mean additional employment and income for Kansas communities."

USDA surveys show that most consumers accept frozen meat if they have confidence in its quality. But few homemakers buy individual frozen cuts at the retail counter because they lack confidence in quality prior to freezing, Tuma says.

This may be because most meats frozen today in transparent films lack the bright and attractive color the consumer desires, he adds. Ice crystal formation in the package and a darker meat color are generally unattractive to the consumer, resulting in low sales appeal.

A number of small frozen food or locker plants and a few retailers now sell individual frozen meat cuts successfully. The ap-

Leading Angus state is Missouri with 42,600. Texas, Iowa, Oklahoma, Tennessee, Kentucky and Illinois precede Nebraska.



Buy, Rent Or **Custom-Hire** Machines?

One of the problems the modern farmer faces is whether to buy, rent, or custom-hire the machinery needed to do his work.

Because much specialized farming equipment carries a high price tag, Delbert E. Lane, Extension farm machinery specialist with the University of Nebraska, recommends that some close figuring be done before buying.

"Figure the per-acre or perhour cost of using your own equipment. Then compare with the local rental or custom rates," Lane suggests.

He offers these tips for figuring machinery costs:

Estimate the cost of simply owning your own equipment. Include expenses for depreciation, taxes, shelter, insurance, and interest on money invested. Each year, ownership costs are likely to add up to 15 or 20 per cent of the original equipment cost.

Now determine the cost of operating your new machine. Estimate gasoline, oil and grease costs for each acre or for each hour of operation - then multiply by the total acres.

Be sure to include the cost of repairs, which are prpoportional to use.

Total repair costs during the life of equipment may be estimated as low as 60 per cent of the original price.

Since owning your own equipment requires an operator, value this labor at what it would be doing if you hired a custom operator for the job. Use simple addition and division to determine costs on a per acre, per ton, or per bale basis.

against possible losses in qual-



Asks U.S. To Get Tough On Steel Trade

The United States Steel Corporation has quietly posed a challenge to a wide variety of indirect aids to exports that have been used for years by most European countries and Japan.

U.S. Steel has applied to the treasury department for an investigation of these practices as applied by the European common market countries, with the aim of having "countervailing duties" imposed by the United States to offset them. Such duties would increase the price of imported steel from Europe by some presently unknown amount

Countervailing duties, long a dormant element in the basic 1938 U.S. trade and tariff law, have been revived this year by the administration as part of a new "get-tough" policy against foreign countries. Trade practices that are deemed to distort fair competition. Thus, the U.S. Steel application clearly stands some chance of being successful

Major Repercussions

Because the application alleges various subsidies and bounties on practically all steel products imported from Europe, a finding in favor of special duties, could have major repercussions in world trade policy and practice.

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Information on the federal Inernal Revenue Service-producd tapes shows 115,501 Kansans ARKET filed a federal return on 1966 inrome without submitting a state eturn to Topeka.

James T. McDonald, state partment has decided to take he 5869 Kansans who reported n adjusted gross income of \$10,000 or more for 1966 to the federal government and find out why they didn't file a state re-

The potential revenue from persons with less than \$10,000 in adjusted gross income would not justify the expense of checking them out, McDonald said.

Revenue department employes this week are manually checking those 5869 accounts to see if they find a filing for the taxpayer under a different social security number or different spelling.

"It appears that about 50 per cent of the accounts will be culled out," McDonald said.

The persons whose accounts remain will be asked by letter from the revenue department to file a state return for tax year 1966 and to explain why they didn't do it in the first place.

The state revenue director evenue director, said the de- | said he doesn't believe there could be too many good reasons why someone who reported an adjusted gross income of \$10,000 to the federal government neglected to file a state return. Kansans who ignore the let-

ters will have a tentative tax li-

ability levied against them by the revenue department, which will then send the information to agents in the field who will try to track down the non-filers.

The State Dept. of Revenue and the federal Internal Revenue Service have an exchange agreement which provides confidential swapping of information about taxpayers living in Kansas.

The program has been in effect several years, but the revenue department has had too great a workload until now to match the federal and state tapes.

Since this is the first time Kansas has tried to track taxpayers in the state who apparently failed to file a Kansas return, the amount of revenue which could be obtained is difficult to estimate.



Good Year For Truck Gardeners

The Kansas commercial apple crop for 1968 was estimated at 14,400,000 pounds (320,000 bushels) according to the Kansas Crop Reporting Service.

The expected 1968 crop was more than twice the size of last year's 6,800,000 pounds and, if the expectations are met, it will be the largest crop in 17 years.

Harvest of fall and winter varieties of applies was underway during September with good size, color and quality reported by most growers.

The 1968 peach crop was estimated at 6,200,000 pounds (130,-000 bushels) compared with 3,600,000 pounds produced in 1967 and the average for 1962-66 of 4,700,000 pounds. Peach production was limited in many areas by late spring freezes this year.

Vegetable Crops

Dry bean production in Kansas was estimated at 220,000 cwt., compared with 154,000 cwt. produced last year. This year's crop will be the largest since 1961

Harvest in western Kansas was in full swing by the first of

PER HUNDRED

October with yields being somewhat lower than earlier expectations.

The production of Irish potatoes in Kansas was estimated at 133,000 cwt., compared with 128,000 cwt. harvested last year. This year 1400 acres were harvested, 100 acres less than in 1967. The yield per acre of 95 cwt. compared with a yield of 85 cwt. per acre a year ago.

Sweet potato production was estimated at 81,000 cwt., down 4000 cwt. from last year and 31,000 cwt. less than the average. The yield of this year's crop is expected to be 90 cwt. per acre compared with a 1967 yield of 85 cwt. per acre.

The 1968 cantaloup crop was estimated at 63,000 cwt., some 18,000 cwt. less than last year. Harvest of melons was completed by mid-September in the southwest portion of the state while harvest in other areas of the state was completed somewhat earlier.

Sweetcorn production was estimated at 72,000 cwt., some 12,000 cwt, more than was produced last year. Picking of sweetcorn was virtually completed in September with only isolated late planted acreage being harvested during the month.

Unwanted Homes Go For \$500 Each At Salina

SALINA - Twenty-five homes once used by families at Schilling AFB have been purchased for about \$500 each.

The buyer was E. F. Murray Jr. of Manhattan, and the seller was the Federal Housing Ad- . ministration. Murray must move the houses at least 10 miles away within six months.

The houses, built in the early 1950s, have been unused and de-

teriorating since the air force base was closed. FHA had not been able to sell the homes, which were generally smaller and less marketable than other homes in the subdivision, and had been costing FHA about \$200 yearly in taxes and assessments.

Murray is expected to make the houses available near Fort Riley. He also acquires title to the lots on which the houses are located.

There were seven other bids received besides Murray's but they ranged from less than \$10 a house up to \$30.

FHA owns 485 houses in a subdivision between Salina and the former air base. More of them will be sold, with bids to be requested soon on 45.

Moisture Supplies Well Over Average

Mid-October soil moisture supplies in wheat fields in the western two-thirds of Kansas were up moderately from last year and average, according to the Kansas Crop Reporting Service.

The 4.42 inches of water available to plants in the top four feet of soil was 7 percent more than mid-October last year and 11 percent above the 1962-66 average

In the first foot of soil, 1.54

inches of water was available for plant use compared with 1.14 inches last fall. The increased amount in the first foot is partly a reflection of heavy rains over much of the western twothirds during the survey week. Available water for plant use in the second foot averaged 1.16 inches, slightly above the 1.11 inches last October. The third





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

This year, though, some aides of Agriculture Secretary Freeman are wondering whether Mr. Freeman, for the sake of Democratic presidential candidate Hubert H. Humphrey, will put off disclosing program details until after election day. They reason that available federal remedies for the current oversupply of corn and grain sorghums, the two chief feed-grain crops, will prove unpleasant medicine for many farmers, and might not promise much strengthening of. sagging prices either.

Clues to what's ahead for growers emerge from a two-day meeting between department officials and the Grains Advisory Committee that represents producers, handlers and users. It seems likely, though, that participants in the 1969 program will be asked to slash a bigger percentage of their feed-grain acres from production with little, if any, increase in the rate of compensatory Federal payments.


The extent to which farmers accept such a plan, of course, could have a profound influence on grain prices next fall, as well as on prices of pork and beef for which feed grains are a major raw material.

Under present law, growers of corn, sorghums and, next year, barley may voluntarily participate in the Government program. Inducing participation are direct federal price-support payments and payments for diverting feed grain acres to conservation uses, plus the offer of a low-interest, price-supporting federal crop loan. In return, the growers must agree to plant within Government-decreed acreage limits.

For the corn and sorghum crops currently being harvested, program participants are believed to have planted about 42 million acres and diverted another 32 million or so, while nonparticipants planted about 39 million acres.

To Agriculture Department planners, next year's technical objectives are quite clear: Lure more farmers into the program (nonparticipants usually plant "fencepost to fencepost" so that merely complying with the program's basic acreage limitations would represent a cutback for them), and induce previous cooperators to divert still more acres.

The problem is complicated by political considerations, however. Government crop costs are drawing heavier fire these days from urban Congressmen, irked by cutbacks in Great Society spending owing to Vietnam war costs. In addition, the Johnson Administration is committed to significant federal economies.

\$102,000 at the American Hereford Association's "Twenty Grand" sale at Kansas City.

The bull was sold by Winthrop Rockefeller's Winrock Farms of Sulphur, Okla., to T. W. Bill Lacy of Lacy Herefords, Kansas City. The price reportedly is the highest ever paid for a Hereford at auction.

The sale included only 20 Hereford bulls, picked by judges from 27 entries, averaged \$15,470 and lasted only 75 minutes. The association, encouraging only the best animals at the sale, required a \$250 entry fee for judging and \$250 for the auction.

School Official Sees Even **Bigger Districts**

Unification of school districts will be extended to a countywide or larger basis, thinks the state superintendent of public instruction.

"I probably wouldn't even mention if I were running for office," said Murle Hayden, whose office will be replaced next year by an appointed state education commissioner working with an elected policy-making State Board of Education.

While consolidation of schools has gone at a fast pace in Kansas since state aid was tied to various enrollment, valuation and faculty standards, Hayden sees a need for even larger districts.

for the children," Hayden told the Kansas Congress of Parents and Teachers. "I wouldn't say it would lower taxes."

Few of Kansas' 350 unified school districts are countywide, and some counties have as many as six districts. The statewide average is slightly more than three per county, altho this includes districts which overlap into more than one county.

Hayden told the group he favored larger districts, legislation to permit local boards to close schools without submitting the act to a vote of patrons, and a plan to force kindergarten programs into all districts. There are still 22 districts which do not operate kindergartens altho the number is down 12 from last year.



OK Reseal On '68 Crops Major farm crops produced in

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1968 and placed under government price support loans may bc resealed in storage and continued under the loan program this year, the secretary of agriculture, Orville L. Freeman, has announced.

The so-called reseal program allows a farmer to store his grain under government loan and keep it there beyond the normal maturity date of the loan. Without a reseal program, grain under bond becomes property of the government's Commodity Credit Corporation. With reseal the farmer

retains title and control of his grain and is in a position to sell it should the market price increase.

Crops announced for reseal next year are wheat, corn, sorghum grain, oats, barley and soybeans produced in 1968, Freeman said.

Grain from crops in 1964-67 previously under the extended lean-storage program also will be eligible for reseal next year, Freeman announced.

The department has encouraged farmers cooperating in the various government production control programs to use the loans as devices to keep grain from the free market in order to help boost cash prices.

Freeman said "farmers themselves hold the key," and that if they place more of their 1968 production under loan "market prices will be strengthened."

The department's National Advisory committee on grains recently urged Freeman to announce as soon as possible the department's grain reseal program for next year.
