Feed Grain Shipments Remain Steady

Total feedgrain exports by the major shippers were virtually unchanged — down 0.6 per cent — during the indicated periods of fiscal year 1968-69 compared with like periods a year ago. Corn and barley shipments each increased about 3 per cent, but sorghum and oats declined 19 and 10 per cent, respectively. Combined shipments by the major exporters totaled 35 million metric tons in 1968-69 (according to the data presently available) compared with 35.2 million for the comparable periods of 1967-68. These countries normally account for about 85 per cent of total world feedgrain exports.

Corn — Total shipments by the major exporters gained 700,000 metric tons, but U. S. corn exports were off by 1.5 million tons (13.0 compared to 14.5 a year ago). The decrease in U. S. shipments was mainly the result of a prolonged dock strike, since exports prior to that time were ahead of a year earlier. Shipments after the settlement were not sufficient to recover losses incurred during the strike.

Exports from South Africa declined about 260,000 tons as a result of sales being discontinued for several months. This stoppage was due to uncertainty of supplies because of drought during the early part of 1969. Shipments by most of the remaining major exporters increased significantly.

Sorghum — The total shipped by the four major exporters declined by about one million tons. U. S. shipments alone, however, were down about 1.7 million tons (7.7 million vs. 4.4 million a year ago). The drop in U. S. sorghum movements was due mainly to the unfavorable corn-sorghum price relationship prior to and during part of the period, reduced PL 480 shipments to India, and the dock strike. Shipments by Argentina increased considerably as a result of rec-

ord production, while South African exports declined about 35 per cent because of reduced supplies due to drought.

Barley — Exports by the United States and Canada dropped sharply — 395,000 and 670,000 tons, respectively. Shipments by France, Argentina, and Australia, however, increased considerably — 870,000, 80,000, and 230,000 tons, respectively. Increased French shipments to Japan alone totaled 425,000 tons, while U. S. and Canadian shipments decreased by about a like quantity.

Oats — Total exports declined mainly due to reduced Argentine shipments. Australia registered a sizeable gain, followed by a small increase for France. More exports were made to other EC countries by France, while Australia increased shipments to Japan and West Germany. The major reductions in imports were by Italy and Switzerland.

Importers — Japan was the largest market for feedgrains taking 7.9 million tons as compared to 7.1 million a year earlier — or an increase of 10.8 per cent. Belgium, Luxembourg, Switzerland, West Germany, and the United Kingdom — also took more feedgrains than a year earlier. Increased shipments to these European countries and Japan about offset the declines to France, Netherlands, Spain, and Poland. At the same time, exports to the feedgrain importers listed in the "others" category dropped about 475,000 tons.

Chile Makes Another Large Polled Hereford Purchase

Another deal in which a large number of cattle will be shipped by plane to Chile has been revealed by the American Polled Hereford association, at Kansas City.

Association officials said a purchase agreement had been signed with Chile for the shipment this fall of 3,350 Polled Herefords. The shipments will be mainly commercial Polled Herefords, but also will include 120 registered bulls and 100 registered females. All the cattle are going to breeding herds.

Cigar Smoking Has Perils Too

Cigarette smokers who switch to cigars may exchange one risk for another. According to two doctors at the University of Kentucky, such smokers may lessen their risks of getting cancer but develop carbon monoxide intoxication instead.

Carbon monoxide, the lethal gas present in coal gas or motor car exhaust fumes, prevents the red pigment in the blood from carrying oxygen. High concentrations of this gas can kill within a few minutes. Lesser concentrations may cause a chronic illness, with headache, shortness of breath, and trembling and unsteadiness of the limbs. This is found in people heavily exposed to exhaust fumes.

All the typical signs of carbon monoxide intoxication were found in cigar smokers seen by the Kentucky doctors. Their patients smoked up to 50 a day and inhaled deeply. Special tests showed that one part in six of the blood pigment was combined with carbon monoxide. In all cases the symptoms disappeared when the patients stopped smoking.

A chest specialist at a London hospital says this intoxication can be produced by heavy cigarette smoking. "The trouble is that many patients think that their symptoms are due to stress, and tend to smoke even more, and it may be difficult to break this vicious circle."

The new purchase by Chile is the third in 20 months and brings to about 10,000 head the number purchased.

Negotiations on the cattle shipments have been between the Polled Hereford association in Kansas City and Corfo, official agency for livestock productions in Chile. The full name of the Chilean agency is Corporation de Fomento de la Produccion. Signing the agreement for the Hereford association were Lynn Storm, Austin, Tex., president, and Orville K. Sweet, executive secretary, Kansas City.

Sweet said a 3-man inspection team from Chile is in the United States visiting ranches to buy the cattle, which will be from five to seven months old. The calves will be hauled in trucks to Greater Southwest International airport at Fort Worth, Tex., where they will be loaded on planes for the 7,500-mile flight to Chile. The destination is on the southern tip of that South American country. The first load is expected to leave November 10 and the final trip to be made December 10. From 230 to 320 calves will be carried on each plane, the number depending on the weight of the animals.

All three of the Chilean cattle purchase orders in the last 20 months have been financed as part of a 23-million-dollar loan issued through the Agency for International Development of the State department.

Chile has a shortage of beef cattle, which is the reason for

the purchases of breeding animals from this country. The air shipments, Sweet said, have turned out to be more feasible than transportation by ship because death losses are much lower.

NFO Mark In Texas

The head of the National Farmers Organization (NFO) says farmers are getting louder and stronger in their pursuit of higher prices for their products.

"Collective bargaining is working," Oren Lee Staley of Rea, Mo., told the first meeting of the NFO's Texas affiliate at Fort Worth.

"Already bargaining through the NFO resulted in prices higher for some commodities than we ever expected," Staley said.


He cited an increase in grain sorghum prices which he said brought 30 to 40 cents above government support levels. Staley said bargaining has been particularly successful in increasing prices of feeder cattle, white corn, dairy products and potatoes.

NFO marketing specialists also are making inroads into raising prices of scores of other food and fiber products, he added.

"Collective bargaining simply is farmers getting together in large enough numbers with production large enough to bargain for their products," Staley explained.

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
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
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
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Price Index Still Well Over '68 Level

Prices received by Kansas farmers at mid-September 1969 averaged slightly less than the previous month but moderately above September last year, according to the Kansas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service.

Prices of wheat and eggs were up moderately from a month earlier but those for soybeans, beef cattle and hogs were down moderately.

Prices for most livestock items, corn and sorghum grain were well above last year but those for small grains and soybeans somewhat lower.

The index of prices received by farmers for all commodities was 245 per cent of the 1910-14 base period. This compares with 246 per cent last month but is well above the 225 per cent a year ago.

Crop Prices

The crop price index was 143 per cent at mid-September, up 7 points from August and 1 point above last year.

Wheat at mid-September averaged \$1.16 per bushel, 8 cents above August but 2 cents below September 1968.

Corn brought \$1.13 per bushel, down 1 cent from a month earlier but 13 cents above September a year ago.

Oats were worth 68 cents per bushel, unchanged from August but 3 cents below September a year ago. Barley, at 80 cents per bushel, was 1 cent below August and 10 cents below September but 27 cents above September last year.

Sorghum grain averaged \$1.79

per cwt., down 1 cent from a month earlier but 27 cents above September last year.

Soybeans brought \$2.16 per bushel, down 29 cents from August and 16 cents below September last year.

Livestock Prices

The livestock and livestock products price index in September was 360 per cent of the 1910-14 base period, down 12 points from August but 40 points above September 1968.

The meat animal price index at mid-September was 426 per cent compared with 445 per cent in August and 373 per cent in September last year.

Hog prices, at \$24.50 per cwt.,

were down \$1.20 from August but were \$5.20 above September 1968.

Beef cattle brought \$26.40 per cwt., down \$1.30 from August but were \$2.70 above September 1968. Steer and heifer prices averaged \$28.10 per cwt., \$1.40 below August but \$3.00 a year earlier. Calves were worth \$31.50 per cwt. compared with \$30.50 the previous month and \$24.80 in September last year.

Dairy Prices

The dairy price index was 322 per cent in September compared with 316 in August and a year ago. Egg prices averaged 31.0 cents per dozen, up 2 cents from August and well above the 26.8 cents in September a year ago.

Prices Paid

Prices paid by Kansas farmers for protein supplement and mixed feeds at mid-September were about the same as a month ear-

United States

The index of prices received by the Nation's farmers for farm products at mid-September was 275 per cent of the 1910-14 base period compared with 279 per cent at mid-August and 268 per cent last year. Price increases from a month earlier were noted for small grains, sorghum grain, hay, milk and eggs and lower prices were received for corn, soybeans, hogs, beef cattle and lambs. The index of prices paid by farmers for commodities and services (including interest, taxes and wage rates) was 374 in September, 1 point above mid-August and 18 points above September a year ago. The parity ratio in September was 74, 1 point below a month ago and a year ago.



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
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Ceiling Moves In New Auditorium

MANHATTAN — With completion of a 1800 seat auditorium next year, Kansas State University will gain a concert hall, a theater and a meeting place — all under the same ceiling. And the ceiling is what makes it possible.

Designed by George C. Izenour, Yale University professor of theater design and engineering, the ceiling is adaptable to any of these purposes.

Izenour, who has been on campus for consultation on installation of the ceiling, said the multi-purpose structure was developed because, "with little more than \$2 million available, it was out of the question to build three separate structures."

The ceiling is movable and at its highest setting creates a large concert hall. When the front of

the ceiling is lowered, the auditorium becomes a large lecture hall. At its lowest setting, the room becomes an intimate 900-seat drama theater.

The ceiling is transparent to sound and contains only a few panels that reflect sound into the audience. The reverberation time and acoustics are controlled instead by absorptive materials. These materials, much like cotton felt, are placed behind a metal screen that appears to be the hall's wall.

The designer says this closes off the hall and makes it theoretically possible to "tune" the auditorium for a particular event.

For practical purposes, the hall will be programmed for five settings with reverberation times ranging from 1.2 to 1.8 per sec-

ond.

Operators follow instructions on a panel to create the size hall and acoustical treatment appropriate for a given group.

"The beauty of this scheme is that the people operating the equipment don't have to know anything about it," Izenour said.

Izenour is director of the Electro-Mechanical Laboratory at Yale's School of Drama and is an internationally recognized authority in theater design. He has been a consultant on more than 50 experimental theaters, including the Jesse Jones Hall for the Performing Arts at Houston and the Milwaukee Center for the Performing Arts.

See Lower Interest Rates

Interest rates will decline in the next year, two New York City bank economists say.

Tilford C. Gaines, vice-president of Manufacturers Hanover Trust Company and James J. O'Leary, executive vice-president of the United States Trust company told a meeting of the Na-

tional Association of Business Economists that a leveling off of business activity in the next several quarters is likely.

A slowdown compared with easier Federal Reserve money policies would dampen interest rates, they said. O'Leary told the group meeting here the quarter-by-quarter pattern of business activity should lead "to a softening of loan demand, especially in the short term sectors of the market."

"In addition, as the rate of business expansion cools down, I expect the Federal Reserve authorities to move gradually and carefully to a policy of lesser credit restraint," O'Leary said.

A year from now open market rates might be 1 to 1½ points below present levels, Gaines said. While yields of corporate bonds might be ½ to ¾ points lower. A major downward adjustment of mortgage interest rates is unlikely, he said, in view of the strong demand for mortgage money.

O'Leary predicted interest rates would cease falling by mid-1970 because he anticipates an upturn in business activity at that time. He also said he thought a down trend in interest rates during the period 1971-1975 unlikely. Among the factors he said would prevent a decline in interest rates in those years were inflationary pressures, which would necessitate a tight money policy, and a shortage of capital throughout the free world.

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
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

Garner outlined an industrious start toward a widespread pork promotion campaign spearheaded by the Council. He showed a color film "Facts About Pork," and described pilot newspaper advertising campaigns used in Oregon and Maine to promote pork.

He noted that the Council's women's auxiliary, the Pork-Ettes, have launched a program of distributing new pork recipes to home economics outlets across the country. Two other new programs include selecting 13 All-American Pork Producers and sponsoring a contest to develop new cuts of pork.

"The interest and investment of pork producers have carried

us this far but with mass support and massive investment we can bring pork to the highest esteem it's ever enjoyed on American tables," he concluded.

Others on the morning program were Dr. Homer Caley, KSU Extension veterinarian, who told the swine raisers where Kansas stands in its hog cholera eradication program.

Dr. Robert Wilcox, KSU professor of grain science and industry, described mycotoxins and their relation to the swine business.



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USDA Might Sell Some Stored Milo

The U.S. Department of Agriculture has announced that it would sell government-owned stocks of grain sorghums under certain conditions and at a formula price.

The terms for such sales were received by Carl M. Heaton, director of the commodity office of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service in Kansas City. This office handles the acquisition and sales of government grains. Over-all decisions, however, are made in Washington.

The announcement was specifically for the month of October,

indicating differing sales conditions might be expected in November.

The announcement said that grain sorghums in store only in Gulf port elevators or on tracks at the Gulf would be offered for sale at a price reached by using the 1969 price support loan rate plus a markup of 27 cents a hundredweight on grain sorghums received by rail at the Gulf and 31½ cents on grain received by truck. The loan rate at the Gulf is \$2.06 a bushel, thus the sale price on grain sorghum received by rail would be \$2.33 a hundredweight.

This price was a few cents over the market at the Gulf. Government sales always are made at the formula price or the market, whichever is higher. In this case the formula price would be higher. This would indicate that buyers, if opening prices should continue, still would make their purchases on the open market. However, it also would indicate that the government sales formula would put a ceiling on export prices at the Gulf. This ceiling might change for later months.

The grain sorghum harvest is on full blast in Texas, the biggest state in the production of this feed grain. Because of feedlot demand, prices have been relatively high. Sales yesterday were being made in Hale County, Texas, around \$2 a hundredweight, while the government loan in the same county is only \$1.62 a hundredweight.

The fact government sales were restricted to grain in store at Gulf ports would suggest that only exporters would be in line to buy. While sales would not be restricted to exporters, it would be costly to "back-out" grain from port elevators for domestic use.

Heaton said the government had about 9 million bushels of grain sorghums in store at Gulf points, or just over 4½ million tons. In all the U.S., the government owns about 198 million bushels.

Last year at about this time the Department of Agriculture offered to sell surplus grain sorghums anywhere the grain was in store in the United States at a formula price. This price was \$2.13½ a hundredweight in Hale County, Texas.

The Department of Agriculture obviously would like to get rid of some of its surplus while prices are relatively high — but it wouldn't want to break the market at harvest time. This would help explain why it set its formula price above the open market.

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

Mrs. Helen Kurtenbach Of Herington Wins Prize

Mrs. Helen Kurtenbach, R 1, Herington, wins this week's prize for the following recipe which she describes as a "good scalloped dish for fall meals." Mrs. Kurtenbach added: "Enjoy all the lovely recipes and have tried several from grass & Grain."

SCALLOPED CABBAGE

Parboil 1 medium head cabbage leaves. Boil 5 eggs hard, save one for top. Make a rich thin-like white sauce with lots of butter or margarine. Grate a generous amount of cheese, preferably cheddar, but any will do. Butter casserole and start with wide cabbage and alternate eggs, white sauce and cheese until all are used. Bake at 350 degrees for one hour. Finish top with cheese and egg yolks, grated. Serve hot.

The Italians sometimes stuff their onions. Why not try these and see how your family likes them?

TALIAN STUFFED ONIONS (Cipolle Imbottite)

Grease a 2 1/2 quart casserole. Cut off root, peel, rinse and cut 1/2-inch slice from top of each of 6 large onions. Cook loosely covered in boiling salted water over 10 to 15 minutes or until slightly tender. Drain well and oil. Melt in skillet 2 tablespoons butter or margarine. Stir in 1 (1 slice) soft bread crumbs. Turn into a small bowl and set aside. Heat in skillet 2 tablespoons olive oil. With a small knife, cut down around onions 1/2-inch from edge, leaving about outside layers. Scoop out centers with spoon. Chop centers, add to olive oil with 1/4 pound ground beef. Breaking beef into pieces with fork, brown. Combine

beef mixture with:

- 2 cups (2 slices soft bread) crumbs
- 1 egg yolk
- 2 teaspoons chopped parsley
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1/4 teaspoon pepper
- 1/4 teaspoon marjoram

Lightly fill onions with mixture. Put into casserole. Cover tops with buttered crumbs and sprinkle onions with: 2 tablespoons olive oil 1 tablespoon parsley Bake at 350 degrees for about one hour.

This sugar cake recipe originated in Moravia:

SUGAR CAKE

- 1 cup milk
- 1 cup mashed potatoes
- 1 cake yeast dissolved in 1 cup lukewarm water
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 2 to 3 eggs

2 cups granulated sugar
1 cup combined butter and lard
Flour, cinnamon, brown sugar, butter

Combine first 7 ingredients and enough flour to form soft dough; beat well. Let stand overnight. Spread in flat pans; let rise until dough is light. Sprinkle with cinnamon and brown sugar. Make holes at equal distances in dough; fill each with lump of butter. Bake for 30 minutes in 325 degree oven. Yield: ten servings.

The next recipe is from India:

CALCUTTA BEEF

- 1 1/2 pounds ground beef
- 2 onions, sliced
- 1 teaspoon garlic salt
- 1/4 teaspoon pepper
- 3 tablespoons butter
- 1 medium can tomatoes
- 1 tart apple, chopped
- 1 green pepper, chopped
- 1/2 cup cooked peas
- 2 cups beef stock
- 1 1/2 tablespoons curry powder
- 1 tablespoon flour

Brown beef, onions and seasonings in butter. Add remaining ingredients, blending in flour last. Mix until smooth. Place in casserole. Bake at 350 degrees for 30 minutes. Serve over cooked rice. Yield: six servings.

Solution Cleans Coffee From Rug

To clean spilled coffee from a rug, first blot up the excess then rub the spot with a solution of vinegar, detergent and water.

Treat Sticking Iron

When your iron sticks, put one-half cup of salt on a piece of waxed paper and rub the hot iron over it.

Best To Thaw Chicken In Refrigerator

It is best to thaw frozen chicken in the refrigerator. Whole frozen chickens under three pounds require about twelve hours refrigerator time. If you are

in a hurry and want to thaw at room temperature, allow two to three hours per pound for whole chicken, one and one-half to two hours per pound for smaller parts.


Pretty Garnish

Make Home Weathertight Before Winter Comes

If your home is still unprepared for bad weather, it's a good idea to check now on any necessary repairs and make them before winter sets in. These are the areas you should check to be certain the house is protected against possible damage from frosty temperatures, heavy winds and snow.

Insulation — Proper windows are essential to good insulation. Tests show that the most effective combination against heat loss and high fuel bills is insulating glass in weatherstripped wood windows.

Roof — Loose or damaged shingles need immediate attention to prevent leaks. If the roof already leaks, chances are you need a new one because roofs tend to wear uniformly and one leak is generally the sign of

many more to come.

Gutters and Drains — Cluttered gutters and drains must be cleared to prevent water overflow and water seepage under the eaves.

Starch Applique

To Iron Pleats



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
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

High Schools Divided For Grid Playoffs

Another major phase of the first Kansas high school football playoffs has been completed with the assigning of districts by the Kansas State High School Activities Association.

One team will be picked to represent each district in the playoffs. Selection of the district representative will be by a point system.







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Set Statewide Committee For National Farm-City Week

MANHATTAN — Representatives of Kansas industry, farm organizations, civic clubs, communications media and state and federal government agencies met in Manhattan Tuesday, Sept. 30, to plan the state's observance of National Farm-City Week, November 21-27.

Purpose of the nationwide observance, according to Don Wilson, assistant secretary of the Kansas Farm Bureau who is the Kansas Farm-City Committee chairman, is to provide farmers and city persons an opportunity to appreciate the problems of each.

The 26 Kansas committee members attending Tuesday's meeting discussed ways Kansas organizations and communities

may promote this understanding. Among the ideas were joint tours of agricultural areas, processing plants, factories, and cities by farmers and other businessmen; banquets honoring farmers, housewives and city businessmen; speeches by farmers and city dwellers which would explain the problems of each; special radio and television interviews; and newspaper and broadcast media feature stories on the relationship of urban and farm activities.

John Ferguson, representing the Kansas Cooperative Extension Service at Kansas State University, reported that during a similar statewide observation last year there were 102 meetings where farmers and urban

residents met during a one week period to discuss mutual problems. Attendance at the meetings was 14,972. Ferguson's figures were based on replies from county agents in 83 counties. Eighty-one of the meetings were held in cities. There were 12 tours of farms by urban businessmen and housewives.

Ferguson noted that there are many meetings between farmers and city businessmen throughout the year. His report showed that 208 such meetings attracting 26,686 urban and rural residents were reported for 1968.

George Smith, editor of Kansas Farmer magazine, Topeka, was elected chairman of the 1970 Kansas National Farm-City Week Committee, succeeding Wilson. Newly-elected vice chairman is Morgan Williams, Farm Home Adm., Topeka. Smith is serving as vice chairman this year. Paul Ijams, assistant secretary of the Kansas State Board of Agriculture, Topeka, was re-elected secretary-treasurer for 1970.

Named to the publicity committee for the 1969 observation of farm-city week were Bennie Bird, Farm Credit Banks of

Wichita, chairman; George Logan, farm director, WIBW, Topeka, and Fred Parris, assistant extension editor, Kansas State University, Manhattan.

Pallen, Crop and Livestock Reporting Service, Topeka; Walter Loucks, Federal Crop Insurance Corporation, Manhattan; Wayne Stewart, Meriden, and James Ingwerson, LeRoy, Kansas State Grange; Charles Sledd, Kansas Electric Cooperatives, Topeka; Harrison E. 





good practice to harvest as much of the grain as possible at this moisture level and then dry it.

If harvesting isn't done until cold weather, the grain could be held at high moisture content until spring, but then only if aeration is used when the air temperature is above freezing.

Holmes said that storing high moisture grain is a good practice for the grower who intends to

feed on a farm or who has an outlet through a feeder close by.

He said grain with 24 or 25 percent moisture should go into a storage facility that excludes oxygen. Otherwise, the grain may mold or over-heat.

Commercial facilities of this type are available, and in an emergency some farmers have used a tightly packed trench silo covered tightly with plastic.

Some loss can be expected if the trench method is used.

Grain with 18 to 20 percent moisture levels has reached full maturity and its quality can only be lowered by continued exposure to the elements.

Warning On Milo Moisture

Kansas farmers have been cautioned to make certain their fall crops have the proper moisture content before harvesting.

Ewyn S. Holmes, Kansas State University Extension engineer, reports that the safe storage moisture level of grain sorghum is about 13 percent, and 15 percent is not too high if cool, dry weather prevails after harvest and an aeration system is used.

However, Holmes said that if grain-drying facilities are available, grain sorghum should be harvested at around 18 to 20 percent moisture to reduce loss through shattering or bird damage. He said it is probably too late to install grain drying equipment for this fall's harvest.

For those who do have such equipment already, it would be a



See A Record Soybean Use

The Agriculture Department predicts a record billion bushels of soybeans will be used domestically and exported during the marketing year which began on September 1.

The outlook was made on the basis of large soybean stocks and lower prices, officials said in a report.

Prices paid to farmers for the new crop probably "will average near" the government price support loan rate of \$2.25 a bushel for No. 1 soybeans, compared with the average of \$2.42 paid for 1968 production, the department said.

Nixon administration farm officials decided last March to lower the price support loan rate on No. 1 soybeans to \$2.25 a bushel for the 1969 crop, about 30 cents less than last year. The action was needed, they said, to make the crop more competitive in the market.

Soybean acreage and production has increased dramatically since World War II and total supplies for 1969-70 were estimated at a record 1.377 billion bushels, about 10 percent more than last year.

This year's crop was forecast at 1.055 billion bushels, only slightly less than the record 1080 billion harvested in 1968. Total acreage rose 2 percent this year but the prospective yield is 1.3 bushels an acre less.

Carryover soybean stocks on September 1 totaled 322 million bushels, compared with 166 million a year earlier. The Commodity Credit Corporation owned or controlled more than 90 percent of the carryover and began sell-

ing part of its inventory.

Through late September, officials said, the CCC had sold about 30 million bushels.

Soybean crushings this marketing year were expected "to rise well above" the 606 million bushels of 1968-69 because of strong demand for soybean meal and oil.

"Lower U.S. prices for soybeans and expanding overseas demand are expected to boost soybeans well above last season's 287 million bushels," the report said.

But officials said that despite the outlook for larger usage

carryover stocks next September 1 may rise moderately.

The report also said cottonseed oil supplies for the marketing year begun August 1 will be about 1.9 billion pounds, compared with 1.6 billion in 1968-69. Prices this year were expected to average less than last season but more than those for soybean oil.

Cottonseed price support loans were reduced from an average of \$48 a ton last year to \$37 a ton for the 1969 crop.

Credit Card For Car Repairs?

When repair work is needed on a motor car, one of the toughest places to get credit these days is at the automobile dealer.

Money is expensive. Many customers don't pay on time and bad checks are a growing problem.

What does a person do when he needs repair work badly but

doesn't have the money? Obviously he either has to wait or look for credit. However, if he has a credit card, he doesn't have far to look.

A smattering of car dealers have solved the problem by taking on gasoline credit cards, Diners' Club, American Express, Carte Blanche, Master Charge and BankAmericard.

Most dealers have watched business move to the big chain stores such as Sears Roebuck & Co. or Montgomery Ward; where credit is readily available, or to the gasoline stations, where credit cards are just about standard.



CROP AND PASTURE CONDITIONS

The Kansas Crop Reporting Service sees pastures going into the winter at average or better condition, except in northwest Kansas. Estimates are for a record milo crop, 10% more than in 1968 with an average yield of 56 bushels across the state. The largest corn crop since 1944 is also anticipated, with an average yield of 44 bushels per acre, a record and two bushels higher than last year.

according to Peter Bryan, marketing vice president of Financial Services Company, a subsidiary of Diners Club, which is handling the plan for Ford:



A federal judge has ruled that a 1934 Ford owned by Ted Toddy


of Atlanta is the car in which Clyde Barrow and Bonnie Parker died in a hail of bullets more than 30 years ago.

In ruling that Toddy owned the actual death car, U.S. District Judge Sidney O. Smith Jr. gave this background:

- Toddy owns a 1934 DeLuxe Ford, motor number 649198.
 - The Ford owned by Toddy was sold by Mosby-Mack Motor Company of Topeka to Jesse Warren on March 15, 1934.
- On May 23, 1934, Clyde Barrow and Bonnie Parker were killed near Arcadia, La., while in a car stolen from Warren bearing the motor number 649198.

He also took note of testimony given in a preliminary hearing by Ted Hinton, a former deputy sheriff from Dallas, and the only surviving member of the group of six law enforcement officers who pumped nearly 200 bullets into the car from ambush.

Hinton identified Toddy's car as the one into which he pumped 57 of the bullets.

Smith issued a temporary restraining order against Johnny

Portemont and Mrs. Johnny Portemont, who are doing business as Johnny's United Shows.

Voters Resistant To School Bonds

Bond issue elections have failed in 9 of 15 Kansas school districts since April so the state's voters apparently have joined a nationwide tax rebellion which has led several districts into court seeking relief.

The \$2.75 million issue Derby voters vetoed by a four to one margin is the latest defeat.

Educators in Oklahoma, Missouri and Colorado, facing similar problems, say it has taken massive public relations efforts — and much confidence in local school boards — to successfully pass multi-million dollar bond

issues. In states like Missouri, where patrons must vote on tax levies to operate their schools, the two-thirds majority rule is being challenged in the courts.

Kansas school bond issues require only a simple majority for passage. School patrons do not vote on tax levies.

Kansas City schools face drastic cutbacks this fall, after failure of three bond levy votes to carry by two-thirds. A tax levy vote failed there July 1, forcing the district to operate on the \$3.75 levy minimum which does not require a two-thirds vote.

Largest issue passed in the state this year was not for elementary or secondary schools. Voters approved \$12.9 million for the new Johnson County Junior College campus.

School bonds passed in six districts — Columbus, Goessel, Parsons, Rolla, Spring Hill and Valley Falls — totaled only \$3.7 million.

Bond issue failures in nine other districts, including Derby, totaled more than \$16 million, according to the Kansas League of Municipalities.

Nationally, reports Kansas As-

sociation of School Boards Executive Director M. A. McGhehey, Topeka, "the number of schools passing bond issues has been lower than ever this year."

McGhehey and other educators recognize a spreading "taxpayer revolt." School bond issues, McGhehey added, are convenient outlets for a variety of com-

Co-ops Fight Tax Proposals On Patronage Return

October has long been observed by U.S. cooperatives as "Co-op Month," but there are some rumblings in Congress which shake any current mood of celebration.

The House has already approved a measure which would require co-ops to convert all capital investments made with patronage refunds into cash within 15 years. The measure has gone to the Senate, where it is meeting opposition from virtually all farm organizations.

Opponents of the legislation contend that co-ops already pay taxes on patronage refunds, even when part of the money is retained by cooperatives to improve and expand its operations.

Also, opponents say, further restrictions would diminish the role of co-ops in helping members develop self-help programs such as marketing and retail services.

"With limited exception," said former Sen. Frank Carlson, R-Ks., "the capital which has been provided by farmers to build and enlarge their sphere of marketing influence has come from reinvested earnings on which farmers have willingly paid taxes in order to supply to themselves as a group many of the services they could not economically afford to do individually."

Carlson, who testified before the Senate Finance Committee recently, said — as most other opponents — that the tax reform measure would not produce added revenue with its "pay-out" provision for cooperatives.

Open House For Relocated FLBA

ABILENE — The relocated office of the Federal Land Bank Assn. will be open for visitors at the building, 603 S. Buckeye, Friday, Oct. 10.

Managed by Richard Worley, headquarters for the three-county association had been in Herington for several years. The Herington business will be handled temporarily in the Chamber of Commerce building.

The Abilene FLBA operates in Dickinson, Morris and Marion counties. Worley started with the FLBA in Washington, Kans., and was transferred to Herington after Washington County was attached to the Marysville office, which is managed by Allen J. Holeman.

The FLBA building in Herington has been reported sold, to be converted to a "professional building."

4. Attached hereto, marked Exhibit "A" and made a part hereof as fully as if set forth herein, is a map showing the lands proposed to be included in the district and subwatersheds therein. The subwatersheds shall be known as Upper West Branch Subwatershed, Lower West Branch Subwatershed, South Branch Subwatershed, Center Main Branch Subwatershed and Lower Main Branch Subwatershed.

5. The lands proposed to be included in said district and subwatersheds therein are described in the attachment hereto, marked Exhibit "B" and made a part hereof as fully as if set forth herein, and include all of the incorporated cities of Alta Vista, Alma, McFarland, Paxico and Maple Hill.

6. The lands proposed to be included in said district and subwatersheds therein do not embrace the territorial limits of any incorporated city, or any part thereof, except those specifically described in this petition.

Wherefore, the undersigned, individually and collectively, pray that a watershed district be organized in the manner provided by law, for the purposes set forth herein, and that the Secretary of State and the Chief Engineer of the Division of Water Resources of the Kansas State Board of Agriculture proceed diligently in the performance of their duties so that the organization of this proposed district may be completed and approved at the earliest possible time.

That, on 24 September 1969 the Board of Directors of said Mill Creek Watershed Joint District No. 85, Geary, Morris, Riley and Wabaunsee Counties, Kansas, were duly elected by and from among the Steering Committee as provided by law, and by Resolution provided for the calling of an election of the qualified voters of the Watershed District for the purpose of submitting the question of whether said Watershed District should be organized and created in accordance with said Petition as so approved;

That, therefore, an election will be held in and for said Mill Creek Watershed Joint District No. 85, Geary, Morris, Riley and Wabaunsee Counties, Kansas, on Saturday, the 25th day of October 1969, for the purpose of submitting to the qualified voters of said Watershed District the following proposition:

Shall the following be adopted?
"Shall Mill Creek Watershed Joint District No. 85, Geary, Morris, Riley and Wabaunsee Counties, Kansas, be organized and created in accordance with the Petition as filed of record in the office of the Secretary of State of the State of Kansas on 4 August 1969 and approved by the Secretary of State and the Chief Engineer of the Division of Water Resources of the Kansas State Board of Agriculture?"

The polls at said election shall be open between the hours of 7:00 a.m. and 7:00 p.m., central daylight savings time.

Voting places within the district and the area to be served by each voting place are as follows:

(a) Qualified voters of that part of the district which lies in Morris County shall vote at the residence of Bill Clark, located 1 1/2 miles west and 1/4 mile north of Alta Vista, Kansas.

(b) Qualified voters of that part of the district lying in Geary County shall vote at the residence of Fred R. Clark, located from Alta Vista, Kansas, 1 1/2 miles west and 3 miles north on highway No. 177.

(c) Qualified voters of that part of the district lying in Riley County shall vote at the residence of Dannie Plummer, located approximately 1/2 mile south of Interstate 70 highway and near the east line of Riley County.

(d) Qualified voters of that part of Upper West Branch Subwatershed which lies in Wabaunsee County (including those in the City of Alta Vista) shall vote at the Fire Station in Alta Vista, Kansas.

(e) Qualified voters of that part of Lower West Branch Subwatershed in Wabaunsee County lying west of a line beginning at the southwest corner of Section 25, Township 12, Range 9, Wabaunsee County, Kansas (being the southwest corner of the Herman Schmitt farm) and running north to the north line of said Subwatershed, shall vote at the Spring Creek Community Center.

(f) Qualified voters of that part of Lower West Branch Subwatershed lying in Wabaunsee County, except those of the area described at paragraph (e), above, (including those in the City of Alma) shall vote at the City Hall in Alma, Kansas.

(g) Qualified voters of South Branch Subwatershed shall vote at the Hessdale School Building.

(h) Qualified voters of that part of Center Main Branch Subwatershed lying south of Interstate Highway No. 70 (including those in the City of McFarland) shall vote at the Grade School Building in McFarland, Kansas.

(i) Qualified voters of that part of Center Main Branch Subwatershed lying north of Interstate Highway No. 70 (including those in the City of Paxico) shall vote at the High School Building in Paxico, Kansas.

(j) Qualified voters of Lower Main Branch Subwatershed (including those in the City of Maple Hill) shall vote at the American Legion Hall in Maple Hill, Kansas.

Further Stir By School Officials Over Place In KSTA

Eight school superintendents in the Northwest Kansas League have recommended withdrawal from the Kansas State Teachers

Association to form a separate state administrators' group.

Led by Jim Nickel, former KSTA official, a large bloc of

western Kansas superintendents is questioning whether the teacher-oriented state association should represent them.

Kansas Association of School Administrators will vote during an October 11 and 12 conference in Lawrence on whether to continue its affiliation with KSTA.

The administrators group also is being wooed by Kansas Association of School Boards.

Nickel, Colby superintendent for six years, is legislative chairman for the school board association. He also served two terms as legislative chairman for KSTA.

"The thing is seething a little," Nickel said.

The Northwest Kansas League, which met last month, includes superintendents at Colby, St. Francis, Goodland, Atwood, Oberlin, Hoxie, Oakley and Norton.

In another meeting, held Tuesday at Hays, about 55 western Kansas administrators tabled a withdrawal motion. They will await outcome of the Lawrence vote, Nickel said.

KSTA was founded more than 100 years ago by an administrator, first state superintendent Isaac Goodnow. Superintendents and principals long have been among its top officials. It is largely made up of classroom teachers.

The superintendents' "mutual interests" differ from those of KSTA, Nickel said.

The state teacher association is considering changing its name to National Education Association — Kansas.

"There is a very strong feeling out here that as KSTA becomes NEA there will not be administrator representation," Nickel said. NEA president George Fischer has been quoted as saying he does not care for administrators. This irritated a number of superintendents.

"When the time gets right," Nickel said, "NEA will not want administrators. Labor does not want management. It's a national movement."

The school administrators' board has proposed than an entirely separate group be formed with \$100 annual dues. Kansas State Teachers Association membership now is a prerequisite for membership in the administrators' organization.

The teacher group has created an administrators' commission with retired Manhattan Supt. W. C. Robinson as temporary head. Nickel praised Robinson for his candor and honesty and said an effective commission within KSTA might halt a pull-out of superintendents. The commission is "a move in the right direction," Nickel said.

A separate group would have difficulty operating effectively on \$100 a year dues, the Colby superintendent said. He believes the superintendents will vote at

Education Association. Some state administrator groups have pulled away entirely from teacher organizations, saying a group which might strike against superintendents cannot represent them.



Reply On Meat Prices From National Livestock Board

Tired of hearing complaints about high meat prices and boycotts, the National Live Stock and Meat Board has offered this reply:

Dear Madam:
 We know you're concerned about higher prices. We are, too. The wife just bought new shoes, clothes, pencils and notebooks for the back to school crowd. Whew!

But about those meat prices . . . you've been looking for some answers. We'll answer first by asking a question. How much more money does your husband make now than he did in 1951? Unless he's a pensioner or unemployed, we'll bet it's no less than 65% more and possibly as much as 150% more. It's none of our business, you might say, and you're right—we really don't mean that you should tell us. We just want you to stop and think about it yourself. Of course, generally speaking, it is our business because it affects our business in two ways:

(1) part of that wage—only about 4 1/2% of it, actually—goes for the purchase of the products of our industry . . . beef, veal, pork, lamb, sausage, etc.

(2) each increase in your husband's salary is reflected in higher prices people in our industry must pay to stay in business and to care for their families.

How much more do you think the husbands of the ladies on the nation's farms and ranches are making today? Once again, it's probably none of your business . . . but in general terms it is your business because it affects what you pay for meat products. You may not believe it—but we've got the figures to prove it—the livestockman is making no more today than he did in 1951. Earlier this year, he finally got back to where he was in the early 1950's insofar as income from sale of his meat animals is concerned. Which means after nearly 20 years he is once again

realizing something like a reasonable return on his investments. And even now those prices are moving downward again.

For your sake as well as his, Mrs. Boycotter, we hope those prices don't slide back to where they were. If they do, it's a lead-pipe cinch many livestock producers will give it up and pursue less uncertain endeavors, rather than go through another period of financial drought. If that happens, this industry's record-breaking production of meat products would reverse itself. Beef, pork and lamb would become scarce food items, simply because there wouldn't be that many people willing to take the risk of producing at a loss. And then meat prices would really get high.

If the farmer-rancher isn't getting the big slice of the meat price pie, then who is? Is it the meat packer? With net profits of less than one percent . . . hardly! The meat retailer? Most of what he gets, over what he pays, is devoured by labor and equipment costs. No, he's not the culprit . . . not at his 1-2% profit.

We have read some newspaper accounts quoting you, Mrs. Boycotter, as saying you think the big profits must be going to some "middle-man." You are dead right, ma'am. And do you know who that middleman is? It is inflation! It is the cost of everything, including your husband's wages, that's driving up the cost of everything. Everything!

No one likes to pay more for anything! And when meat prices go up, they are more noticeable because grocery-shopping is a frequent thing, and, bless you, meat is a favorite food of yours! But, in the spirit of fair play . . . how about taking a look at what you are paying for other goods and services . . . and how much more you have of the good life than you had 20 years ago? Meat is part of that good life . . . as one of the more enjoyable necessities. You could boycott it right into the luxury category. We don't want that and we don't think you do either.

A Bonus From Urban Renewal At Salina


SALINA — Property owners who lose homes in the Northeast Industrial Park Urban Renewal project here will receive a bonus from the Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD).

Richard Worth, Salina Urban Renewal Agency director, said HUD has approved funds to pay special assessments on property in the area. These are taxes the city levies for sewer, street, sidewalk, and other public works improvements.

Until the policy was approved, special assessments were deducted from the price Urban Renewal paid for property. "The decision will affect many Northeast Salina residents," said Worth. "We will make every effort to make the decision retroactive."

The Salina agency plans to ask HUD to refund special assessments already deducted from property purchased.

Under the new policy, the agency will assume the special assessments and pay them until the property is purchased by industrial developers, who would then assume them.

Continue Hassle On World Wheat Agreement

The trembling International Grains Arrangement, aimed at setting minimum world wheat prices, is headed for another crisis in Brussels.

Agriculture Department spokesmen say a meeting scheduled involves senior officials from the major wheat exporting coun-

tries, including Australia, Canada, the European Common Market and the United States.

The IGA, which went into effect on July 1, 1968, was aimed at bringing order to international wheat marketing by specifying prices for the grain in export channels.

But huge world supplies and dwindling markets have contributed to price cutting by all the exporting nations. The United States, for example, has sliced export prices three times since

mid-July in an effort to meet competition.

Numerous meetings have been held to find some way to prevent an all-out wheat price war. The United States, Canada, and Australia in particular have attempted to hold the line on further price cuts until broader strategy can be developed.

For more than a year, officials here have blamed the Common Market's subsidy policies for much of the wheat price-cutting problem. Common Market wheat — mainly from France — has been sold at lower prices in a number of traditional U.S. markets, and this has led generally to undercutting by other countries.

Dr. Hendrik S. Houthakker, a member of the Council of Economic Advisers, said in New York that as a result of Common Market policies, wheat prices under IGA have been cut 15 to 20 percent.

But Houthakker indicated that administration officials hoped Common Market trade policies might be modified.

This was taken as a willingness

on the part of the administration to seek once more some way to make the IGA workable.

Nixon farm officials have not taken a firm stand on the IGA as such and point out the treaty will run until mid-1971.

The farm proposals outlined by Agriculture Secretary Clifford M. Hardin called for government price support loans to be set at rates less than prevailing world prices for cotton, wheat and feed grains, beginning with 1971 crops.

But Hardin offered no hard figures on the level of price

supports anticipated under 1971 plan, only that they will be less than the world price. Department officials told men at a briefing that the program could be operated without the IGA, and that no assumption had been made whether the treaty will be allowed to expire 21 months from or extended.



**All Food
Prices May
Drop A Bit**

Food prices can be expected to level off or be slightly lower in the months to come, J. Phil Campbell, undersecretary of Agriculture, predicted as newspaper food editors concluded their annual conference at Chicago. He pointed to seasonally larger supplies of meat, produce and poultry and good crops of fruit, which will be processed into large packs, but also predicted some increases in the cost of dairy products.

Campbell was one of a panel of experts in the field of economics, nutrition, marketing and government introduced by Richard Harrison, president of The Fleming Co., Topeka, and president of the Supermarket Institution. Campbell also pointed out to the 135 editors from all parts of

the country that the only products under government subsidy that are purchased in grocery stores are wheat products and that less government support to the farmer would not mean lower food prices. He observed that there is less profit to the farmer on beef than on any other commodity.

"The farmer isn't getting rich. Farm family incomes are still only about 75 percent of non-farm family incomes, and many farm people have to do some off-farm work to bring their earnings that high," he said.

"Food prices are two words meaning the stomach and the pocketbook," states Dr. Max E. Brunk, professor of marketing at Cornell University.

Keen sensitivity to food prices stems from the fact that food is the largest single and most necessary item in the household budget," he pointed out. "Unlike many other major expenditures, the dollars spent for food are visible pocket dollars put down on the counter each day. Also, the prices of individual food items frequently change — and change itself creates awareness."

Brunk labeled affluency, not inflation, as the major culprit behind the increase in food prices. He reported that disposable income has increased at a rate of 2.9 percent a year compounded and not doubled in 20 years. "It's not an easy job telling people they are rich," he said. "Perhaps this is why we are so suddenly conscience stricken with the poverty in our midst."

"It is not at all surprising that as people get richer they turn their demands from basic essentials to more luxurious services.

In fact, all the marketing service we have added to food since the turning point upward began in 1940 has not been able to keep up with the potential market which affluency seeks."

In spite of this, Brunk pointed out, as had Campbell, that consumers spend less of their disposable dollar on food today — "at no other time in history has man spent less effort in earning his daily food ration."

"Food is a bargain in America today, not in spite of increased marketing service, but rather because of it," he said.

MANHATTAN — Scheu's Cafe here has been sold to Rick Harman and Keith Kappelmann, executives of the Myron Green Restaurant chain in Kansas City, which has restaurants in Wichita, Topeka and the Kansas City area.


Harman, 1968 Republican nominee for Kansas governor, is a former basketball all-American at Kansas State University here.

W. F. "Bill" Farrell has owned the cafe since 1948. It was established by the late George Scheu in 1928 and is one of Manhattan's best-known restaurants. It employs 40 persons.

Harman, president of the Myron Green organization, joined the firm after his graduation from KSU. Kappelmann, a native of White City, is a graduate of the University of Kansas, Lawrence.





End Of Feud? New Animal Board Named

Six persons have been appointed to the new Animal Health Board, the office of Gov. Robert Docking has announced.

The board combines the functions of the Kansas Livestock Commission and state brand commissioner into a single agency. The law creating the new board was enacted by the 1969 Legislature.

One of the provisions in the law empowers the Animal Health Board to appoint a state livestock sanitary commissioner, who will have the new title of livestock commissioner.

The new Animal Health Board is an outgrowth of the feud between Docking and the cattlemen which erupted during the gover-

nor's first term.

Docking was not supported in his first term bid by the cattlemen and the governor refused to re-appoint A. G. Pickett as state livestock sanitary commissioner when his term expired March 31, 1967.

However, the cattlemen refused to submit the name of any other nominee and Pickett has continued to serve in the absence of a successor duly qualified under the law.

Docking and the cattlemen got into a further hassle over the appointment of a state brand commissioner. Under the law, the governor must appoint from a list of nominees submitted by the livestock industry.

The governor declared the list of brand commissioner candidates he was offered was "bogus," in that it contained the names of two other Republican party officials and one other man who declined the appointment when Docking offered it to him.

The Animal Health Board is viewed as a compromise piece of legislation designed to bring the warring Docking and cattlemen together.

Docking's appointees to the board include William D. Elliott of Herington, Walter Hand of Mulvane, Sidney Warner of Cimarron, Nelson H. Poe of Peabody, Eddie Hull of Ottawa and Ed Durbin of Moline.

The seventh member of the Animal Health Board is the president of the Kansas Livestock Assn., who is required by statute to sit on the agency.

Elliott, appointed to a one-year term, is a veterinarian. Hand, named to a two-year term, is a dairy farmer.

Warner, appointed to a three-year term, is a cattle rancher. Poe, appointed to a one-year

term, is a rancher-farmer.

Hull, appointed to a two-year term, raises purebred Hampshire hogs and represents the swine industry on the Animal Health Board.


Durbin, appointed to a three-year term, is a swine and cattle rancher.

The new law took effect July 1. The six appointive members of the Animal Health Board are nominated by the board of directors of the Kansas Livestock Assn. The law requires the cattlemen to submit the names of three qualified applicants for each of the six positions.



No census takers are to be hired for the 1969 Census of Agriculture, according to the U.S. Department of Commerce, Bureau of the Census.

The agriculture census will be conducted entirely by mail in January 1970. Every operator of a farm or ranch will receive a

census form by mail in early January and will be asked to fill it out and mail it back.

In addition to the number and acreage of farms, the agriculture census will ask farmers for an estimate of the value of land and buildings, the amount of cropland harvested, acreage of irrigated land, acreage in major crops, the number of farm operators by age, value of farm products sold, the amount of time farm operators worked at off-jobs, and the number of trucks, tractors, combines, corn pickers.

A completed questionnaire each farm, ranch or other agricultural operation will be completely confidential. The information obtained, without names to identify, will be grouped into statistical totals and published by counties and states as well as for the entire nation.



the shortage of spring pigs. The March survey and report revealed by a USDA survey report in June, was confirmed by the survey and report in September. Facts in the report indicate that hog production will continue at profitable levels for another year. In order to get a full picture of this unusual situation, it is necessary to review the three latest quarterly reports by the USDA on production trends in the hog industry. These reports, called "Hogs and Pigs," were released in March, June and September. They covered the ten leading hog production states, which produce about one-fourths of the nation's

ham, pork chops and bacon. The March survey and report indicated that farmers planned to increase spring (March-April-May) sow farrowings by 5 percent over last year. It was reasonable enough to expect such an increase, since hog prices had been at quite profitable levels for an unusually long time — four years. In June, however, farmers reported that sow farrowings had fallen 9 percent short of the 1968 level, and that the number of pigs saved had been cut 11 percent. Many people doubted the accuracy of this survey. There were two reasons: (1) In March, farmers had reported their in-

tention to increase production. (2) Prices for hogs had continued at profitable levels. Consequently, there was unusual interest in seeing what the September report would show. The September survey supported the findings made in June. The pertinent items were the number of pigs and hogs weighing 60 to 180 pounds on September 1. They totaled 18.6 million — 9 percent less than one year before. A final check on these figures will be provided by the number of hogs slaughtered during October, November, and December. All hogs slaughtered in federally inspected plants, about 90 percent of the total slaughter, are counted and reported each week. All other commercial slaughter plants are under state inspection, and report each month. From the information now available, it appears that hog slaughter during October, November and December will run 7 to 9 percent less than a year ago. The smaller supply plus a stronger demand may produce prices that are 15 to 20 percent higher than the general \$18 to \$19 level during the last quarter of 1968. 1970 prospects. The USDA report listed the number of pigs weighing under 60 pounds on September 1 at 14.7 million — 2 percent less than a year before. These pigs will become pork during the first three months of 1970. Prices should average a little over the \$20 to \$21 figures posted last winter. The September USDA survey indicated that farmers would have 1 percent fewer sows to farrow during September, October and November than last year. They also reported the intention of having 2 percent more sows to farrow during December, January and February than last winter.


