





Top breeding stock at commercial prices summed up the situation at the Kansas All Breeds Sale, Abilene, which was sponsored by the Kansas Pork Producers Council. There were 104 boars and gilts sold at an average of \$183.70 a head.

"The producers were there but there seemed to be a buyer shortage," Robert Hines, swine specialist at Kansas State, said. This was unusual because champion boars and gilts from both the Kansas and Nebraska State Fairs were in the sale ring.

A summary of sale averages shows Hampshire boars averaging \$184.17; Chester White boars averaging \$162.50; Durac boar A summary of sale averages shows Hampshire boars averaging \$184.17; Chester White boars averaging \$162.50; Duroc boars averaging \$232.33; Spot boars averaging \$215; and Yorkshire boars averaging \$222.22.

Hampshire gilts averaged \$149.29; Chester White gilts averaged \$154.38; Duroc gilts averaged \$187.14; Spot gilts averaged \$142.14; and Yorkshire gilts averaged \$175.57.

The overall average on 46 boars was \$207.17, and 58 gilts averaged \$165.09.

An important aspect of the sale is that the boars and gilts are judged by breeds and placings are given. A small percentage of the animals brought to the sale that are on the lower end of the judging scale for their breed are not sold. This selection, along with placings at

other fairs are available so the buyer will have some idea of what he is buying. "Also, some of the animals had been in selection tests," Hines said.

The importance of using a good boar in any hog operation was summed up by Dean Davis, Riley county extension agricultural agent, in a recent report to pork producers in his county. It is as follows:

"Have you heard the old saying a good boar is half the herd and a poor one is the whole herd? 87.5 per cent of your herds genetic material is made up of the last three boars you have used. This is why the boar is so important.

A boar influences over 1,000 offspring during his service period; therefore, hogmen must select boars that will improve their hogs.

In selecting boars, we must keep in mind that there is more difference within a breed than between breeds. breeds. Hogmen soon learn that meatiness, fat thickness, rate of gain, and feed efficiency are examples of highly inheritable characteristics while litter size, birth weight, and weaning weight are examples of low inheritability. More rapid improvement can be made through selection of those hogs with superior highly inheritable characteristics.

We must familiarize ourselves with desirable measurements and performance and select only boars that meet these standards. A good boar should be from a litter of eight or more pigs, reach 200 pounds by the time he is 150 days of age on 270

or less pounds of feed per 100 lbs. of gain. A good boar should have litter mate barrows at least 29.5 inches in length with no more than 1.3 backfat and at least 5 to 5.5 square inch loin eye area. If the boar has been sonerayed, we'd like him to have less than .9 inch fat and 5.5 or more square inches loin eye area.

Visual appraisal of correctness of feet and legs, underline, conformation and etc. are all important also."

With this in mind hog producers can plan for the next All Breeds sale which will be this spring and there will be sales by the Kansas Boar Testing Station and SENEK early next year, too. Keep an eye on Grass and Grain for the times and dates.





Part of it perhaps as much as 180 million bushels - will be delivered to East European countries, FAS believes. Grain purchases this summer included some from France, Australia and Sweden as well as the United States.

Of some concern to the Soviets is that their ports, able to handle up to 2-million tons of grain monthly, may have problems unloading in midwinter and some ship tie-ups at ports can be expected. Internal movement of grains away from port areas also is a matter of some concern in Russia, the reports said.

As harvest was being concluded last month in Russia, FAS estimated





## Farmer's Luck And Credit Run

GREEN RIDGE, MO.-From 1946 until this summer. Jay Rice was the owner of a 751-acre farm three miles west of the Pettis County community.

Today the 51-year-old farmer, his wife and two of their six children are leasing 251 acres after losing ownership of the farm to the Prudential Life Insurance Co., of Kansas City. Rice's luck - and credit — just ran out.

"There's not really anyone to blame," Rice says.

Rice said his plight is due to three factors: a drought, bad timing on the Russian wheat deal and lack of credit. The first 500 acres of the Rice farm were sold earlier this summer. Last week a Warrensburg farmer, Forrest Yankee, bought the other 251 acres — including the Rice house - and agreed to lease it to the family.

ruined his corn crop. A year later blight struck his corn and he estimated he lost \$14,000.

This summer Rice put his entire acreage into wheat, hoping at least to pay the mortgages on his farm machinery and land. He didn't make it. One of the driest summers ever in west-central Missouri (Green Ridge is about 15 miles south-west of Sedalia) reduced Rice's wheat yield to 24,000 bushels; he was hoping for about twice tat amount.

On July 7, Rice sold his wheat at Kansas City for \$1.41 a bushel. Shipping costs, however, were 10 cents a bushel, and he pocketed only \$31,000 for his efforts.

A day later agriculture officials in Washington announced the \$750 million wheat agreement with Russia, and a few weeks later prices began to soar. Rice says he could have saved his farm had he sold at a later date:

Late last month wheat was selling for \$1.85 a bushel at the MFA exchange in Sedalia. At that price, Rice could have made the additional money to keep his farm and machinery.

"Why the hell didn't they tell the farmers about the deal?" Rice asks. "My wheat at the same elevator in Kansas City today would sell for \$2.10 a bushel. I didn't make any money off the deal. The millers said they didn't get any richer because of it. I guess the operators got it all."

Rice needed at least \$15,000 more to keep his farm and machinery. Before planting this spring, Rice went to a Lincoln bank and obtained a \$16,000 loan. After paying it back, plus \$500 interest, and other debts from his wheat receipts, Rice found himself \$8,000 short on his machinery payment and with only \$11,000 of the \$18,000 he needed to make his mortgage payment.

In August, an implement dealer in Kansas City confiscated Rice's machinery, worth about \$100,000. "I paid him about \$80,000 for that equipment," Rice frowned. "I only had \$20,000 left to pay. It just don't seem right."

After losing his machinery, Rice had about one month to scrape up the \$7,000 for his mortgage payment.

## More U.S. Corn Shipped To Russia Than Wheat

Wheat has been making most of the news lately as politicians debated the sale of grain to the Soviet Unions, but the Department of Agriculture published statistics revealing that recently more corn than wheat has been shipped to Russia.

The USDA's grain market news center in Independence said 48.5 million bushels of corn have been loaded into vessels at U.S. ports for shipment to Russia, compared with 29.5 million bushels of wheat. The figures cover the period from July 1 through last week.

In the same period the Russians also purchased 2.5 million bushels of oats, 7.8 million bushels of barley and 2.5 million bushels of soybeans from the U.S.



**Rod Turnbull Kansas City Board of Trade** With bountiful fall harvests just getting under way, perhaps the time is appropriate to suggest that the American consumer, the housewife who buys the groceries, doesn't concern herself with supply.

All she is interested in is price. The reason is pretty simple. In her lifetime, the American housewife never has seen the time she couldn't go to her store and get all the food

she wanted-if she had the money. She hasn't even had to stand in line. She never has known a problem on the supply side.

But she does know that food takes a substantial part of her budget. When prices go up, she takes notice. Of course, supply has something to

do with the price Mrs. Consumer pays at the grocery store. When, as an example, demand is extremely heavy for beef all across the United States, so strong that every ounce of

mediate buyer and there is no sumption." surplus, the price on a steak rises. But Mrs. Consumer still will find the meat counter full, just as she will

see ample supplies of eggs and milk in the coolers, stacks of bread and canned goods on the shelves. As she walks down the long aisles of the grocery store, her eyes will be on the price tags, not in a vain search of something available for sale.

This is one mark of a land of plenty.

These comments were triggered by a look at the government's most recent National Food Situation Report, a 33-page booklet prepared by the Economic Research Service of the U.S. Department of Agriculture. The reports are issued quarterly.

The booklet is replete with charts, tables and explanatory comments on the food situation.

The very first paragraph states: "The all-food retail price index this year may average 41/2 percent above last year. Most of the rise for the year already has occurred." The next few pages are devoted

entirely to food prices. The next major heading is "Food

Spending and Income," which is followed a page or two later by a



All through the report are references to crop production, but the main emphasis is on what is food costing the consumer, which obviously reflects the principal consumer interest.

Under the circumstances, Mrs. Consumer should not be criticized for her lack of attention to, or concern over production statistics. She doesn't particularly care whether the corn crop this year is 4,900 million bushels or 5,100 million; or whether the number of cattle on feed as of July 1, was 12,455,000 or 10 percent less. These aren't directly her problems.

But to the trade which supplies Mrs. Consumer, the statistics on production are part of the lifeblood of business. At the Kansas City Board of Trade, for instance, grain men not only become fully cognizant of the periodic government crop reports, but they keep as fully aware as possible on day-to-day weather, not only in this country but around the world; they watch the figures on storage stocks; they keep informed on the volume of utilization or disappearance of farm commodities.

In fact, the trade, as near as it can. tries to assess every bit of information available both on supply and demand.

Five flour millers from Japan visiting the Kansas City Board of Trade a few days ago, took careful notes not only on what our government thinks the wheat carry-over will be next July 1, but what estimates were being made in the trade. They were interested in available supplies for next year.

Members of the Board of Trade are not alone in this endeavor to equate supply and demand, although they specialize in it. Everybody involved in farm commodities, from the producer to the retailer, seeks to be knowledgeable on the subject.

It is the judgement of all these people, as expressed in the market, which sets prices.

Despite all the effort to keep abreast of available supply-demand factors, surprises occur. The weather can alter the supply situation in a hurry, ruining a promising wheat or corn crop in a matter of a week or so. On the demand side, the huge Soviet purchases from the U.S. this year have come almost completely as a surprise, and they continue to amaze the trade.

The market never can take any situation for granted for any length of time. In other words, observance requires constant attention in







## Western Kansas Sugar Beet Crop **Biggest Ever**


GOODLAND-Western Kansas and Eastern Colorado sugar beet

growers have shifted to high gear in this year's beet harvest. The daily average yield was about 40,000 tons from the 8-county growing area.

About 200 growers, producing for 15.5 percent, about one percent the Great Western Sugar Co., processing plant west of Goodland, have been harvesting since late September. The plant began processing beets into sugar Oct. 3. This year's crop is estimated to be one of the biggest ever, LaMar Henry, manager of the GW

Goodland plant, says. He predicts a total yield of 800,000 tons, a 50,000-ton increase over the 1971 harvest. "We've processed about 100,000

tons so far, and the sugar content of the beets has been very good," Henry said. The average sugar content last year was between 14 and Henry said.

## **U.S.** Dollar Makes **Quiet Comeback On World Market**

That key indicator of a nation's economic health, the value of its money in world markets, is sending out an important and hopeful message about the United States: The dollar is making a comeback.

The dollar's worth in terms of other currencies, including such lusty ones as the German mark, the Dutch guilder and the Swiss franc (but not Japan's yen), has gained quietly but significantly in recent weeks. The outlook for at least the near-term future is for even more strength.

In fact, some analysts see a classic international monetary "bear squeeze'' tightening around

speculators who sold billions of newsletter for specialists on inborrowed dollars early last summer. The bears expected that by now, or within a few months, they would be able to repay their borrowings by acquiring dollars at distress prices.

Instead, these transactions now must be settled by selling foreign currencies at prices well below their levels of last summer and buying dollars in a rising market. And these purchases will buoy the dollar even more. "Until recently, the dollar was heavily oversold by professionals and corporate treasurers; now these (transactions) are maturing, and continued speculation against the dollar is something new. 

Since both farming and cattle feeding are considered high risk enterprises by the banking industry, the limit on local capital available has caused the Southwest Kansas cattle feeding market to turn more and more to outside investors.

"When gas became a major part of our economy out here, the landowners retained one-eighth of the interest, with the profits flowing to investors outside the state," the Hugoton attorney said. "And if some moves are not made to assure local capital supplies, the same thing could happen to our newest industry, livestock feeding."

Concannon said founders of Fortune Insuance have been accumulating experience figures on the feeding industry for five years. The insurance company was organized with a paid-in capital of \$300,000. Concannon said the company had a capital structure of \$1,050,000 at the time the charter was granted.

There are now about 200 stockholders in the company.

Premium for the coverage will be on one of two bases. A set premium can be paid or the insurance company will insure on a retrospective basis.

"Again we are different," said mortality. Concannon. "On the retrospective basis we will charge less when the company's charter also will allow it cattle lose money than when they make money. The secret of success, the founders believe, lies in the insurance underwriter and in insuring only efficient feedlots.

So far the firm has approved six lots which have presented statistics confirming their low rate of cattle mortality, feeding effeciency and feed costs.

## **Uniformity Bred** Into Hybrid Corn **Could Spell End**

Corn, the most extensively harvested crop in the United States and the food staple for most of Latin America, is being threatened on two fronts, according to reports issued in recent weeks:

The plant breeders responsible for the extraordinary productivity of hybrid corn have produced varieties so uniform and universally planted that the crop is highly vulnerable to new blights, such as the one that crops," cites ominous precedents. struck the United States in 1970.

The wild corn-like weed that is believed to cross-breed with corn, periodically reinjecting vitality into the plant, is threatened with extinction.

The threat to corn is but a dramatic example of a hazard that faces most of the world's basic food crops. Despite many millenia of agriculture, those basic foods are still few in number: rice, wheat and corn, with sorghum and potatoes of lesser importance.

The genetic uniformity of such crops has been a triumph of plant breeding, satisfying farmers who want high-yield crops suited to machine cultivation, machine harvesting and machine processing. Now, according to a report to the National Research Council of the National Academy of Sciences, plant science must produce varieties that not only meet such demands but also retain enough genetic diversity to survive a fungus or other blight to which one or two strains are vulnerable.

In warning of the perils of crop uniformity, the report, entitled "genetic vulnerability of major

In the 1840s the Irish grew a single variety of potato called the Lumper. Since potatoes are typically grown by cutting up and planting the previous year's potatoes (rather than from seed), cross-fertilization is eliminated and crops tend to become regionally uniform a fungus to which Lumper potatoes were highly vulnerable appeared in Ireland in the 1840s and a catastrophic famine followed.

In 1942 a fungus to which the rice grown in Bengal was vulnerable

struck a cropalready weakened by a typhoon. Tens of thousands of persons died in the resulting famine. In 1870 Ceylon grew most of the world's coffee and it was the favorite beverage in London. But the coffee was vulnerable to a rust and in 1885 not a single bag was exported. As a result, said the report, "The British became a nation of tea-drinkers."

The latest such calamity, and the one responsible for the new report, was the corn blight that hit Florida early in 1970 and moved north with the spring season. About half the crop was destroyed in the South and 15 percent was lost nationally. The blight was caused by a fungus whose spores, in heavily infected fields, "boiled blackly" above the harvesting machines, according to the report.

The alarm was sounded for the wild weed-a cousin of corn-by Dr. H. Garrison Wilkes of the University of Massachusetts in the September 22 issue of Science. The cousin, which some believe was the ancestor of corn, is teosinte. It is native to Mexico, where the cultivation of corn is thought to have originated, and its cross-breeding with corn, over thousands of years, is thought to have helped sustain the vigor of that food crop.

Teosinte grows within Mexican corn fields and around their edges but. Wiles said, current farming practices are wiping it out. It appears to be only half as extensive as it was in 1900 and, he reported, "in the last 10 years I have watched the rate of extinction accelerate." He added: "We can ill afford the loss of such genetic wealth in this day of exploding population."

The origins of corn remain controversial. It is said to be the only food crop whose cultivation began so long ago and which was so drastically changed that its origins are obscure.



Despite all the disadvantages, there are many cattle feeders buying light weight calves and making money with them. By the same token, there are too many cattle feeders buying heavier calves and getting further behind every year

• Keep cattle on the farm longer. Money is made by producing the maximum pounds of gain at a reasonable cost. Two hundred and fifty pounds gain won't do the job but 350 pounds or more should.

• Spread buying and marketing periods over as much of the year as possible. It is extremely risky to buy and sell only once a year.

 Use feedlot and feeding facilities to maximum. Using feedlots, bunks, wagons, etc., for half as many cattle as they can handle makes these costs twice as high per pound of gain.

One more word. If you are one of the feeders who hasn't made any money with cattle the past two years, you better take a good long look at your program and situation before buying any more cattle.

Is it foolish to buy calves at the present prices? The fellow that knows the answer to that question stands to make a mint of money. Unfortunately, (or fortunately) no one knows what will happen to the price of cattle in the next month, six months or 12 months.

About all we can do is speculate and throw in a lot of "ifs". If the economy continues to expand, if the consumer incomes keep raising, if consumer demand for beef continues strong, etc. If all these "ifs" come about, (and right now the guess is they will), beef prices "should" remain strong.







## **Dairy Specialist** Stickler For Sound Program

The dairyman who gets the most profits for his efforts "does everything right," contends a Kansas State University Extension dairyman.

"In a relay race the team loses when just one member drops the baton; likewise a dairyman can't afford to make a mistake if he is to get the profit he's entitled to," says Ralph Bonewitz.

A profitable operation begins with understanding the cow, he believes. Gentle treatment and calm surroundings are necessary for the important steps to be carried out. "Begin with observation of milking procedures,'' advises Bonewitz. ''Washing and massaging the udder causes a stimulation of the nerve endings, which releases a hormone called oxytocin from the pituitary gland.

'In the udder oxytocin causes a contraction of the muscle tissue, thus expelling milk into larger ducts and cisterns. Response to oxytocin will begin 50 seconds after washing and massaging the udder and will last two to 10 minutes, depending on the quantity released.

Bonewitz believes stimulation should begin a minute or two before the milking machine is attached. This is an extremely important interval.

If stimulation is performed five or 10 minutes before the machine is attached, much of the effect of oxytocin will be lost.

Kansas State University research shows that a milking delay of eight minutes after stimulation decreases milk yield five percent and increases machine time 14 percent. A milking machine should not be placed on a cow until her teats are plump and fully distended from the pressure of the milk, reminds

Bonewitz.

Check your machines closely-you may find that changes are necessary to bring older installations to present day standards. Bonewitz recommends regular equipment checks and prompt repairs.

Lactation treatment, dry period treatment, and dipping of teats after milking are important factors in Mastitis control, points out the K-State specialist.

He believes in using bulls that sire daughters with the "will to milk." Since genetics set the ceiling for herd production, dairymen should use bulls with a high predicted difference of at least 400 pounds of milk.

"If young bulls are used, breed to many well selected young sires and use on only 20 percent of the herd," Bonewitz advises. "Feed cows plenty of grain and roughage, and be sure to include needed energy, protein, minerals and vitamins in the feed."

Bonewitz is a stickler on cleanliness, proper feeding, and a sound vaccination program.

"It was an almost miraculous recovery," says Claude King, Extension plant pathologist at Kansas State University.

"The problem of 1971 reminded me of 1962 and 1963, when northern corn leaf blight cut production in half in some parts of Kansas. But it was cured in one or two years."

## Grain Shortage -- How Severe?

The Grain Shortage: How severe is leave 41 million tons for carryover it? The answer to this question next year. This would be 8 million would help farmers sell their crops to good advantage.

The widespread crop failures and losses in Europe and Asia are boosting our export to levels undreamed of a year ago. Even so, our reserve supplies appear to be more than ample to meet all domestic needs until our 1973 crops become available.

**Corn Supplies and Utilization** 

According to recent estimates by the USDA, our supply of corn for the marketing year that began October 1 consists of about 1,100 million bushels of old corn plus a new crop of 5,124 million bushels (as estimated at the first of September). That makes a total supply of about 6,225 million bushels.

The utilization of corn during the year just beginning was forecast as follows: feed for livestock and poultry-4,017 million bushels, about 100 million more than was used in the year just ended; corn used for food, industrial products, and seed-408 million bushels; and exports, 875 million bushels. Such exports would be about 90 million more than was exported in 1971-72, and 358 million more than was shipped our in 1970-71.

These expected usages of corn total about 5,300 million bushels. Taking this amount from the beginning supply would leave about. 925 million for carry-over a year hence. That would be 175 million less than the carry-over this fall, but 262 million bushels more than the carryover last fall-after the corn blight in 1970.

Even if the actual utilization of corn exceeds the government forecast by as much as 200 million bushels-which seems to be very unlikely-the carryover next fall would be at least as large as it was a year ago following the short crop of 1970.

All Feed Grains, Wheat, and Soybeans

The carryover of the four feed grains combined (corn, sorghum grains, oats, and barley) is around 48 million tons; and the new crops will add just 189 million tons, according to USDA grain economists. Thus, the total supply is expected to be about 237 million tons. Domestic use and exports are forecast at around 196 million tons, which would

more than the 33 million tons carried over a year ago.

Our wheat supply for the year that began July 1 included 865 million bushels of old wheat plus a new crop of 1.560 million, making a total of 2,425 million bushels. The USDA forecasts a whopping export total of 1,125 million bushels, nearly 500 million more than was shipped out last year. The amount used for flour and other food products will be about

The soybean situation is quite different. The carryover of old beans on September 1 was only about 72 million bushels-and most of them were gone before the new crop became available. Soybean yields are reported to be good, but field losses may be greater than usual. At the first of September, the

USDA estimated the 1972 soybean crop at 1,286 million bushels. If Russia takes 40 million bushels as expected, and our other markets take as much as they did in 1970-71. soybean stocks will be down around 70 million bushels again by next September 1.

The Agriculture Department reported wheat at \$1.73 per bushel last month, the highest September price in nine year. Feed grains and hay were up as a group by more than 5 percent from August and averaged 11 percent higher in price than a year earlier.

But that meant an increase in prices farmers pay out in production expenses. Those, USDA said, were up 1.5 percent in the month ended Sept. 15 and were 7.0 percent higher than a year earlier.

In other words, using USDA figures, if a corn producer sold grain at mid-September for \$1.22 per bushel, that made him seven cents happier than in August. The cattle feeder who bought it, however, was that much unhappier.



The industry's position is that few if any Americans have signed up for cane-cutting, which is regarded as standards, lowest paid types of farm work.

In late September, the union asked a federal judge here to stop the importation of Jamaicans.

At the end of several days testimony, United States District Judge Peter T. Fay indicated the importation in itself does not deprive Americans of their right to be hired in preference to foreign laborers.

"It is my opinion that even while the Jamaicans are coming here, what greater protection is there to domestic workers that to know that they are qualified and if they apply for work they must be given the job," Judge Fay said.

The judge was expected to rule on the petition in mid-October.

Union and industry officials appear to agree that regardless of Fay's ruling, the next phase of the controversy would be played out in



the canefields.



## High Percentage Of Dairy Cows Freshen In Fall

A high percentage of dairy cows and heifers freshens in the fall. This is as it should be, because production is higher for cows that freshen in fall and winter months.

'These cows must be rebred soon," points out Ralph Bonewitz, Extension dairyman at Kansas State University. "Efficient reproduction in Kansas dairy herds is now the most critical problem facing the industry.

"Every dairyman should keep a complete breeding record on all females in the herd from 13 months of age until they leave the herd."

A set of herd breeding records is essential for the efficient management of a dairy herd, regardless of size, emphasizes Bonewitz. Most decisions made by the dairyman and veterinarian will be based on daily records.

A cow which has not shown a heat by 30 -35 day needs to be checked by a veterinarian, fed more grain and plenty of phosphorus and Vitamin D. All heat dates should be recorded by the cows' herd number on the barn breeding calendar or other sheets. A normal heat cycle occurs every

17 - 23 days, Bonewitz says. The veterinarian and dairyman should be particularly interested in heat dates longer than 23 days and shorter than 16 days.

"As a dairy herd grows larger, one person should be given the responsibility of seeing that all open cows in the herd are detected when in heat," says the K-State dairyman. "The cow in heat should be

isolated in an individual stall with feed and water. The heat date should be recorded even though the cow isn't bred." Bonewitz believes all cows must be clearly identified for



Dr. Elmer Heyne, KSU researcher, and Extension agronomists Frank Bieberly and Verlin Peterson, cited a three-year variety test by K-State showing that spring or intermediate triticale types may planting this crop with the hope that fall planting, but should not be supply abundant fall grazing from planted too early or grazed too closely if the stands are to have a chance of getting through the winter.

> Early spring growth of these types is slow because of winter damage or problems stemming from changing spring temperatures.

> Winter types grow more slowly in the fall and become prostrate as winter sets in. These types probably have a hardiness level equal to that of winter barley, says Heyne.

> The winter triticales that make it through the cold months appear vigorous in early spring, but grow slower than rye and seldom exceed wheat in spring forage potential.

> Two and three-year yield averages favor wheat over triticale, the KSU tests show. The poor test weights of triticale depress yields but may result in relatively high protein contents on a percentage basis.

High protein varieties with a higher proportion of lysine (an amino acid) than common feed grains could decrease supplemental protein costs in rations for nonruminants.

However, the experts point out, farmers need to consider production costs compared to competitive feed grains, and other factors before making the triticale plunge.

Ergot, for example, is more serious in triticale than in rye. The disease reduces palatability, feed

be toxic to animals.

Dr. Robert Wilcox, KSU Extension specialist, formula feeds quality control, says farmers who can't resist the urge to try triticale should plant it on a limited basis, probably an acre or two.

Noting that triticale plantings are being promoted heavily by a new organization, he cited research results at Nebraska, Minnesota, and North Dakota that closely parallels the findings of experimental work at K-State.

Winterkill, lodging, ergot, palatability, and feed efficiency were some of the problem areas associated with triticale in those states.

## Neosho Refuge Water Shortage **Reducing Hunting**

NEOSHO- Neosho Waterfowl Refuge north of Parsons is expected to be short of water early in the waterfowl season, greatly reducing the hunting opportunity, according to the Forestry, Fish and Game Commission.

Low water at the Commission's pumping station on Flat Rock Creek near the Neosho River is the main reason for the water shortage at the refuge. At present only a few barrow pits contain sufficient water for the coming seasons.







The preliminary crop production index for Kansas in 1972 is 153 per cent of the 1957-59 base, equal to last year's record high production. Prospective sorghum grain production of 226 million bushels is the second largest of record. Cornproduction is expected to total 117

since 1932.

Expected production of 24 million bushels of soybeans in 1972 is the largest on record. Also, the 5.7 million ton hay production tops all previous hay crops. Row crops were maturing somewhat late this fall and considerably later than the early maturity a year ago.

Seeding of the 1973 Kansas wheat crop moved ahead rapidly this fall as a result of timely rains that provided moisture for planting in western sections.

About two-thirds of the State's expected acreage was in the ground by October 1, compared with one-

half of the crop seeded a year ago and a 10-year average of three-fifths seeded on this date. Wheat in. western sections was up to good stands with generally adequate moisture to get growth started well. Only a few acers were in need of rain to get the wheat sprouted.

On October 1, sorghum grain production was forecast at 226.300.000 bushels, moderately below the 233,550,000 bushels produced last year but otherwise the largest production of record for Kansas. Yield per acre, forecast at 62 bushels, is a record high, well above the previous high of 56 bushels in 1969.

Some excellent yields have been obtained from early combined fields. The sorghum grain crop was in need of two weeks or more of warm fall weather to realize full production potential, as many fields were still sufficiently green that an immediate freeze would materially reduce yields.

Corn grain production is expected to total 116,640,000 bushels, about 4 million bushels below last year but otherwise the largest crop produced in the State since 1932. Corn yield per acre is indicated at a record high of 96 bushels per acre, 4 bushels above the previous record set last year. On October 1, corn harvest was oneeight completed, moderately behind the 10-year average of about onesixth of the crop harvested by this date.

#### **Other Crops:**

Soybean production of 24,180,000 bushels as indicated on October 1 was a new record high for the State, topping the previous record production of 23,925,000 bushels produced in 1968. The expected yield of 26 bushels per acre also was a new high for Kansas. Soybean prospects have improved since early August with mostly adequate moisture available over the major producing areas. Sugar beet production is estimated at 595,000 tons, moderately below the 697,000 tons for 1971. Production of all hay is estimated at 5,663,000 tons, an alltime high for the State and moderately above the previous high of 5,523,000 tons produced in 1965. The alfalfa hay out put was above last year and all other hay production of 2,064,000 tons was up 3 per cent.

Pasture and Range Feed:

The October 1 pasture and range feed condition was 89 per cent of normal, best for this date since 1965 and substantially above the 1961-70 average of 80 per cent. Early fall rains have encouraged late growth of pasture and range grasses in most areas of the State. Volunteer wheat growth has made an unusually fast start with cattle and sheep already getting some supplemental grazing from this source. #### Farm Wage Rates:

Wage rates paid to farm workers on October 1 increased from a year earlier. Farm wage rates paid by the month with house (no meals) averaged \$382.00, compared with \$354.00 a year ago, while monthly rates with board and room averaged \$293.00 compared with \$273.00 on October 1 last year.

Daily wage rates with board and room averaged \$13.20, up \$1.40 from the previous year while daily rates without board and room averaged \$16.10, up \$1.20 from a year earlier. Hourly farm wage rates averaged \$1.88, up 14 cents from October 1, 1971.

#### **United States:**

Sorghum grain production in the United States was forecast at 868 million bushels, 3 per cent below 1971. Corn grain production was estimated at 5,266 million bushels on October 1, down 5 per cent from last year's crop of 5,540 million bushels. Soybean production prospects at 1,317 million bushels were 13 per cent above last year's crop.





## Kansas Wheat Growers Assn. **Cautions Against Overplanting**

The head of the Kansas Association of Wheat Growers has cautioned Kansas farmers against overplanting this fall because of the foreign grain sales and the current high price for wheat.

"To overproduce for a market that we are not sure will exist next year would be folly," said Don Crane, Wright.

"Since Kansas is primarily an agricultural state,"Crane said, "the unprecendented sale of hard red winter wheat to Russia will reflect favorably on agriculture and all other facets of the Kansas economy. The sale has helped in terms of reducing our surplus grains. However, farmers must be cautious that they do not overplant and again be burdened with excess wheat as we have been since 1967.'

Crane said there is great pressure on the U.S. Department of Agriculture by millers and processors to increase the allowable

for wheat plantings.

"Overproduction and no market makes for cheap wheat," Crane said. "Cheap wheat makes for more profits in the processing end of the wheat industry.

Growers and the National Association of Wheat Growers have requested the USDA to administer the program as written. USDA ofthe program as written. USDA of-ficials assured us that the program Of Eroding Soil woud remain as it now stands."

Crane said he couldn't understand those who say the price of wheat is now too high, in the wake of the Russian and China grain deals.

"Why in the world anyone would say that the price for wheat is too high is beyond me," he said, "Because when you stop and consider the facts you will find that wheat was selling for about \$2.70 per bushel in 1947 and a farm tractor costs around \$1,800.

"Today, until the Russian wheat

#### sale, wheat averaged less than \$1.40 per bushel and that same farm tractor will cost you about \$7,000.

'When you consider these figures and all the other involving costs and returns, I certainly don't see how anyone can truthfully say that the farmer is getting too high a price for wheat."

# **Harvesting Time** For Edible Nuts

Edible nuts such as pecans, walnuts, and hickory nuts will soon be maturing. If you have nuts to harvest for your home, don't be over-anxious to remove them from the trees.

Allow the nuts to mature fully on the trees and to fall naturally or with paragraph: mild shaking. Forcing the nuts to fall before they are fully ripe may cause under developed and poorly-

#### shaped kernels.

Pick up the nuts from the ground as soon as possible to prevent the shell and kernel from discoloring. This is particularly important with English (or Persian) walnuts and chestnuts which mold quickly if they remain on the wet ground,

Husk black walnuts before the husks turn black if you want a lightcolored, high quality nut crop. With small quantities, the nuts can be tramped or beaten out of the husks. With larger quantities, the oldfashioned cornsheller is useful.

If balck walnuts are washed as soon as the husks are removed, the nuts will be more attractive when dried.

Spread nuts of all kinds out in thin layers to dry immediately after they are gathered. This helps to prevent a poor quality nut crop.

Shrunken kernels and poorly filled nuts cause concern to home growers each year. Some causes of this condition include harvesting before the nuts are fully mature; too short a growing season or too little summer heat for the particular nuts grown; drought; lack of cross-pollination or a nutrient deficiency.

Another common cause is damage to the foliage by insects and disease, reducing the ability of the leaves to manufacture necessary carbohydrates.

Some instances of poor nut quality can be traced back to one of these conditions, while in other cases combinations of these conditions cause the poor quality.

## Soviet Public **Gets First Hint** Of Grain Deal

The Soviet public has been given its first guarded indication that the Kremlin has made massive wheat purchases abroad to compensate for a bad harvest.

At the same time, the government conceded publicly that this year's harvest was at least 271/2 million tons short of the planned target.

The hint was contained in a long article in Komsomolskaya Pravda, the Communist youth organization newspaper, to commemorate National Farm Workers Day.

The author was Pavel P. Lobanov, president of the All-Union Lenin Academy of Agricultural Sciences. The key part of his article was this

'No less grain will be obtained in the country (this year) than was obtained in an average year during the eighth five-year plan (1966-70),

especially since additional measures are being taken to satisfy the country's normal grain needs." It was widely assumed that by additional measures Lobanov was referring to the Soviet purchase of more than a billion dollars worth of grain from abroad. This includes 20 million tons of wheat from the United States.



Wood said last year's count by the Federal Bureau of Sport Fisheries and Wildlife showed a total population of whooping cranes to be about 60. He explained their until early April and will pass migration.

"Whoopers travel an extremely narrow migration route from Canada's Wood Buffalo National Park, about 1,000 miles north of the Canadian border, to the Aransas National Wildlife Refuge on the

He said the 2,500 mile journey from Canada is made along a path no wider than 150 miles. The path. runs right through western Kansas. "Whoopers usually travel in

family groups of two to four birds. On occasion, a single whooper may be seen feeding or flying with a flock of sandhill cranes. Reported sightings of flocks larger than four whoopers invariably turn out to be either sandhill cranes, pelicans, snow geese, or egrets," said Wood. Wood explained the whoopers will winter at Aransas Refuge in Texas

through Kansas again by April 20 on their way back to Canada to nest. He said the annual count of the rare birds will be conducted by federal biologists at Aransas and will be announced around the first of the year.
