# Here's Annual Flint Hills Report

Pastures in the 14-county east-central Kansas Bluestem area were well filled on April 1 and lease prices were generally

strong, according to the Kansas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service.

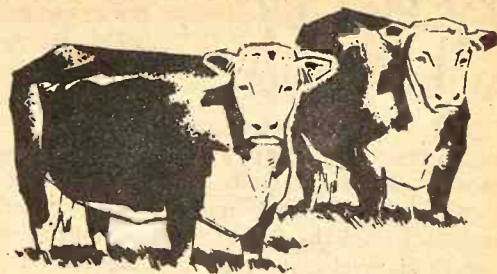
The percentage of available pasture leased by April 1 was the largest in the last four years. An estimated 90 percent of available grassland was leased by April 1, some 8 percent more than last year but still moderately less than the record 97 percent in 1952.

Ranchers indicated pasture still available this season was limited, but in a few areas was not filled because of scarcity of prospective grazing cattle.

The April condition of pasture feed was 86 percent of normal, down 5 points from last year's very good conditions and 2 points below average.

With an early start, grass prospects were fairly good. However, surface moisture was short following a dry winter and rain will be needed soon.

Ponds ranged from low in some drier areas to well filled in others, with water supply adequate for current needs.



The Bluestem pasture lease prices this season averaged slightly higher than last year.

For steers and heifers under 700 pounds, lease prices per head for the season averaged \$25.10 compared with \$24.10 last year.

The rate for steers and heifers over 700 pounds was \$28.70 compared with \$28.00 last April.

The season leasing rate for cows with fall calves increased from \$41.90 last year to \$42.70 this year and the rate for cows with spring calves went from \$38.10 to \$38.20.

The average for all cows with calves was \$39.90, up 40 cents from a year earlier.

The leasing rate per acre for pasture was at a new high of \$6.20, compared with \$6.00 in 1971 and a previous high of \$6.10 two years ago.

The guaranteed acreage of pasture per head this season was down slightly for steers and heifers but unchanged for cows.

The acreage guaranteed for steers and heifers under 700 pounds was 3.9 acres and for steers and heifers over 700 pounds was 4.8 acres, both 0.1 acre below a year earlier.

Grass acres guaranteed per head for cows with fall calves was 7.3 acres, and for those with spring calves 6.4 acres, both the same as last year's.

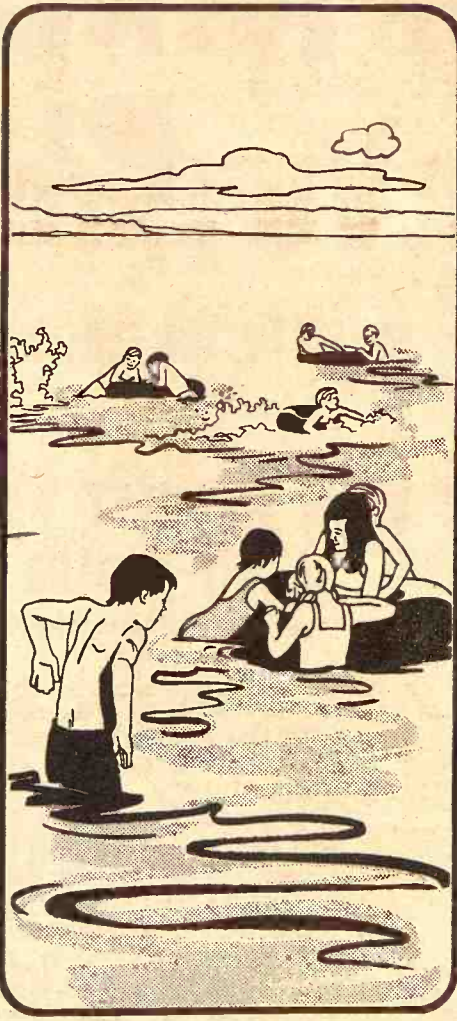
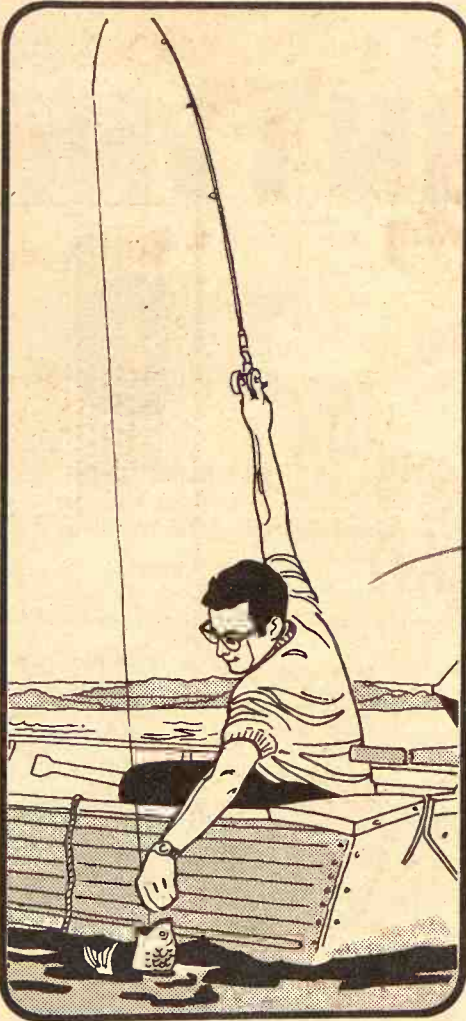

## Hold Judgment On Orchard Damage

The cold snap in early April that plunged temperatures to the 21-degree mark may not have damaged area orchards so much as owners originally feared.

Ralph Skinner, Topeka orchard grower, said the 21-degree temperatures didn't seem to hurt his 40-acre peach crop. If the weather stays warm for the next couple of weeks, he said, what is left of his crop — a 60 per cent loss was suffered last January — will probably be all right.

"The buds were still pretty tight and they seemed to take the cold weather real well," Skinner said.

Another Topeka orchard grower, Norris Rees, was unsure what effect the recent cold spell had on his apple orchards. Last week he feared losing the entire crop valued at \$40,000 to \$50,000.

"If apples get injured around their seed pod then this won't show up until later on. It will take at least until June before we can evaluate percentagewise what effect the 21-degree weather had on us," Rees explained.

Varieties that have been damaged the worst include red delicious, winesap and some of the softer cooking apples. Rees said he had more hope for jonathan and the golden delicious varieties.

## Guilty Plea By Area Ex-Mayor

ABILENE — A former Herington city commissioner, Claude F. Thompson Jr., 46, pleaded guilty to a charge of obtaining money under false pretenses from the city at the beginning of his trial last week.

Thompson was charged by Dickinson County Atty. Max Hinkle with obtaining \$944.97 from the city by having his mother-in-law, Mrs. Estella M. Miller, North Kansas City, Mo., bill the city for electrical equipment which it allegedly never ordered or received. District Court Judge A. B. Fletcher Jr. accepted Thompson's change of plea, ordered a pre-sentencing examination and set June 1 for sentencing.

Thompson, a train engineer, now lives in Kansas City.

Information filed in the case disclosed that City Atty. Thomas Butler presented information to the county attorney May 3 that he had discovered the allegedly fraudulent warrant had been issued and payment made to "E. M. Miller," 2029 Swift, North Kansas City, Mo., May 5, 1970.

The court information stated that Mrs. Miller gave a sworn statement to Kansas Bureau of Investigation agent Raymond D. Macey in which she said that Thompson had asked her to submit the bill so that "I and two other guys" could recover money they had personally paid for purchase of the electrical equipment for the city. She then turned the money over to Thompson after cashing the city check, she said in the statement. Thompson was a commissioner on the city governing body which approved payment of the bill.

## Egg Prices Down, USDA Steps In

With the egg market cracking up the USDA has decided to start buying scrambled egg mix in an

effort to help boost prices for laying flock owners.

Egg prices have sagged for more than a year and at mid-March averaged 32 cents a dozen for farmers. If producers received full parity for eggs-based on their expenses the price would have to be about 56 cents a dozen at the farm level according to the Crop Reporting Board.

The scrambled egg mix will be bought for donation to needy families participating in USDA food programs. Last year about 17 million pounds of egg mix was purchased, equalling 22 million dozen shell eggs.

## Miller Now Sees State Crackdown On Cockfighting

Atty. Gen. Vern Miller said in a letter to county attorneys and sheriffs across the state last week his office considers cockfighting to be illegal, and solicited their support in eliminating the activity.

Miller's letter follows in the wake of a raid he conducted on a cockfighting operation near Ottawa, and after a Sedgwick County district court judge held cockfighting to be unlawful.

The attorney general said investigations his office has conducted into cockfighting in Kansas has revealed it is more widespread than is generally acknowledged and he added "I respectfully request your cooperation in eliminating these activities."

The attorney general said in the

letter, "We deem cockfighting per se to be legally subjecting the birds to cruel mistreatment, and thus a violation of (Kansas statutes)."

"Not only those individuals who directly fight cocks are in violation of the criminal code, but those who promote these fights and provide facilities incident thereto also violate the law by aiding and abetting the cruel mistreatment of animals."

"Those who engage in cockfighting, promote or furnish facilities for cockfights should immediately be notified that these violations of the Kansas Criminal

Code will not be permitted.

"Investigations in this area by this office are continuing," Miller said in his letter to county attorneys and sheriffs, "and findings will be submitted to your respective offices for possible court action."

## Sugarbeet Farmers May Own Great Western Sugar Co.


Sugarbeet farmers may own their own processing plant, through the

Great Western Producers Cooperative.

Great Western United Corp. says a board of directors committee has prepared a draft of a letter of intent to sell its subsidiary Great Western Sugar Co., to the Great Western Producers Cooperative.

The corporation, in the unsigned draft, has offered to sell the sugar firm for book value, payable in cash, according to Mike McCafferty, corporate secretary. He estimated the present book value of the firm at \$90 million.

Great Western Sugar operates plants in Ohio, Nebraska, Kansas, Montana, Wyoming and Colorado.

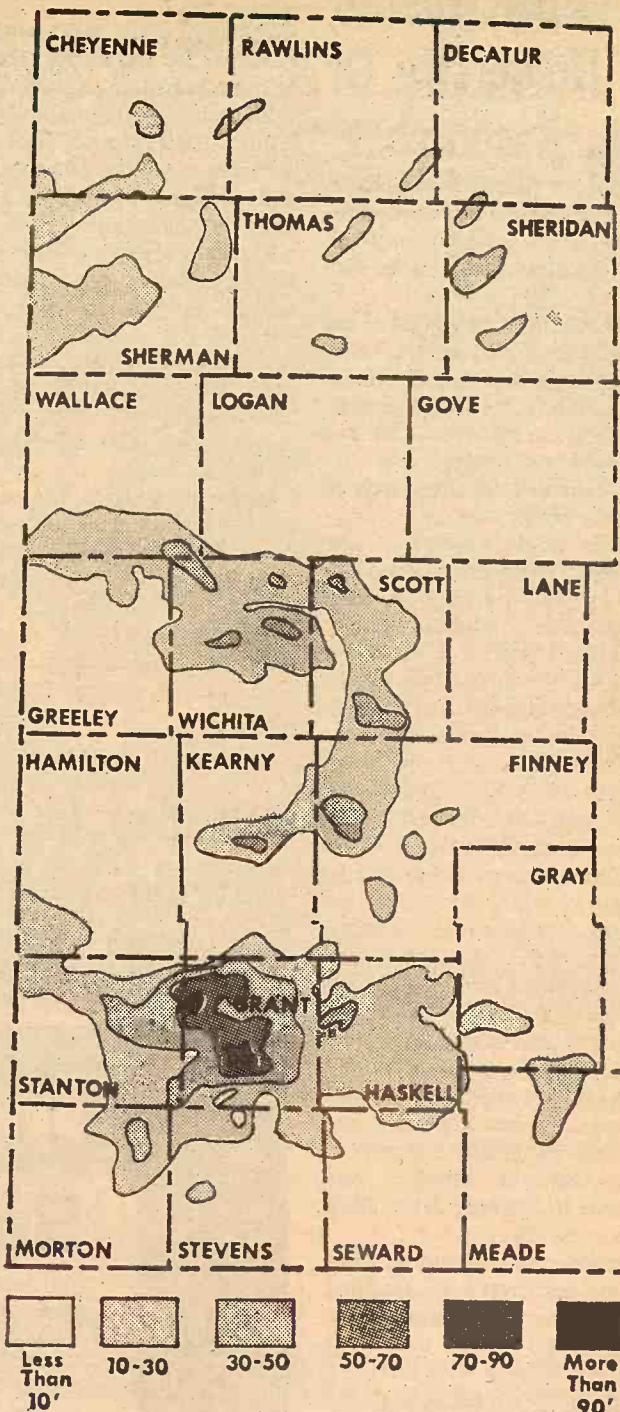
# Water Level Dropping, When Will It Be Gone?

April 18, 1972

Water levels in southwestern Kansas are dropping, and everybody is guessing the time when this underground water supply will be depleted. The latest study was completed recently by the Division of Water Resources of the Kansas State Board of Agriculture. Harris L. Mackey, engineer on the water level testing project earlier this year, said there already are some trouble spots in western Kansas. In reality "it's just a

mining." He referred to the fact that water is being taken out without a return supply coming back in to recharge the aquifer sands. Measurements are made each January as a continuing program of observations by the U.S. Geological Survey, the Kansas Geological Survey and the Division of Water Resources. In the six-year period from 1966 to 1972, ground water levels declined from 2.2 feet in Rawlins County to as

much as 19.1 feet in Grant County. Twenty-one counties were in the survey, Cheyenne, Rawlins, Decatur, Sherman, Thomas, Sheridan, Wallace, Greeley, Wichita, Scott, Hamilton, Kearny, Finney, Gray, Meade, Stanton, Grant, Haskell, Morton, Stevens, and Seward. Three counties did show some recovery in the year from January 1971 to January 1972, Mackey said, because of adequate rainfall. These three were Rawlins, 4 of a foot; Meade, 1.3 feet; and Seward, 2.1 feet. One area in Grant County has shown a water level drop of more than 90 feet since 1951. Other areas

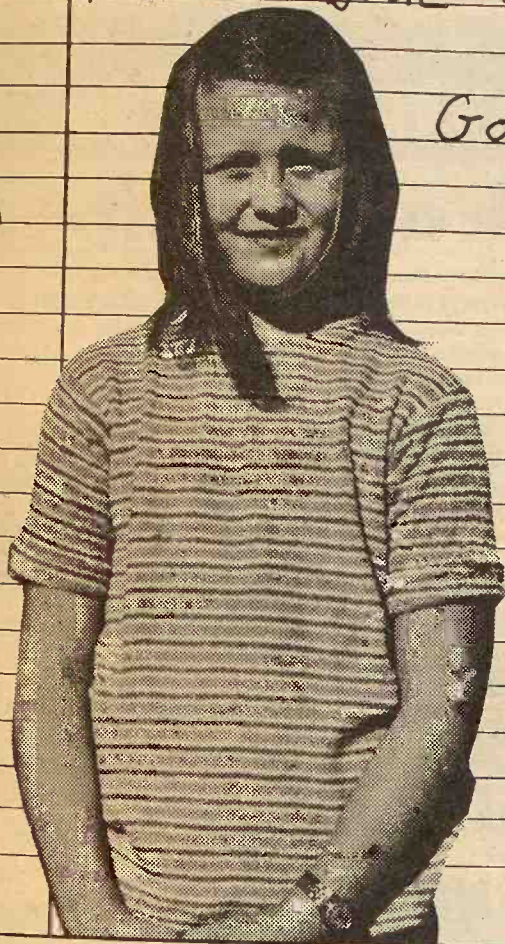


MAP SHOWS MAJOR WATER SUPPLY LOSS

of Grant County show declines of 70 to 90 feet. Other studies are under way to learn if less irrigation water use can be efficient. Trapping tailwater in pits so there is no waste also is a conservation method becoming more widespread. Some plant studies are under way to learn if plants producing as much yield with less water can be introduced in the territory. No absolute conclusions have been reached in the studies, however, Mackey said. He pointed out that most wells are tapping the water deposits as deep as possible.

Studies have not been able to foresee how soon the ground water supply in the area will be depleted, or if it can be maintained at an adequate supply level, he said. Many sections of Meade, Gray, Haskell, Stevens, Seward, Morton, Stanton, Grant, Kearny, Hamilton and Finney counties show draw-downs of from 10 to 30 feet. Declines in levels from 10 to 30 feet are shown in Wallace, Greeley, Wichita, Scott, Logan, Sherman, Thomas, Sheridan, Cheyenne and Rawlins counties, in the past 20 years. Depth of wells in western Kansas range from 500 feet in southwest Kansas to 250-300 feet in the northwest part of the state. Kansas State University, the geological survey and the Division of Water Resources are studying the recharge possibilities in the area.

## DDT Replacements From University Of Illinois Research

University of Illinois researchers say they have developed pesticides that have DDT's power to kill insects, but lack its undesirable side effects.

Dr. Robert L. Metcalf, head of the five-year research effort, was honored at the American Chemical Society's annual meeting in Boston last week for the discovery. He has been named to receive the International Award for Research in Pesticide Chemistry.

About 100 DDT analogs — or relatives — have been developed, of which 10 or 12 "have solid commercial potential," Metcalf said.

He said development of these new pesticides was completed last year, but no manufacturer has yet obtained a production license from the University of Illinois Foundation, which holds the patent rights.

Metcalf said that the DDT-type pesticides can be produced in existing facilities for manufacturing DDT, some of which are idle — or about to be — because of government restrictions.

DDT is a persistent, man-made chemical which is passed along in the food chain and stored in animal fat.

Although the effects of DDT on the human body are not known, it has killed many wildlife species — especially fish and birds — has caused birds to lay eggs with shells too weak to hatch.

Some mammals, including rats, mice, hamsters, dogs and monkeys, have been shown to develop cancer, birth defects and genetic mutations in laboratory studies with DDT.

Use of the pesticide to kill flies and mosquitoes and other insects, however, has been an important factor in reduction of malaria and other diseases and in increasing food production by cutting losses from insect damage.

Metcalf, an entomologist, is chairman of the department of zoology at the university. He worked primarily with Dr. Inder Kapoor, another entomologist, and Dr. Asha Hirwe, a chemist, in development of the DDT analogs, under a grant from the Rockefeller Foundation.

The analogs are biodegradable, whereas DDT is not, and so persists for a long time, Metcalf said.

The analogs, Metcalf said, do not accumulate in living tissues and are rapidly excreted, yet are persistent enough to be effective against flies and mosquitoes and other insects.

The DDT derivatives are about as safe as some common garden pesticides and can also be sprayed, Metcalf said.

## Cattle For Rent—Inquire Within

"Beef cattle for rent...inquire within." This advertisement may have sounded strange a few years ago, but today the idea of leasing livestock has become an accepted farm business arrangement.

Two Kansas State University economists, Leo Figurski and Ken McReynolds, recently authored a publication to help Kansas farmers understand and make use of beef cow leasing arrangements.

The economists indicate that leasing livestock is a form of borrowing capital. "However, rather than borrow from a bank or lending institution, the operator borrows from another individual or firm," they say. "This way the farm operator acquires the use of capital, and usually shares the cost and returns of the operation."

Advantages of this type of arrangement for the operator are many. He can make use of working capital without going into debt for breeding stock; capital can be obtained over and above the limits of credit agencies; and, for the beginning operator, it is a method of

getting started in livestock production.

Leasing also has several advantages for the owner. One is that he can maintain a breeding herd even though he is unable to provide labor. Others are that leasing provides a source of rental income and may have income tax and social security advantages.

Figurski and McReynolds list several factors to consider when setting up an arrangement, including: who provides replacements, who re-breeds the cows, length of the lease, what are the feeding practices, when are calves sold, and how is income divided?

In the publication, the economists discuss fixed and variable costs that must be considered when determining the amount each party contributes towards an operation.

The publication, "Beef Cow Leasing Arrangements," is available at county Extension offices.

## No Alley In Tornado Sweep

"Tornado Alley," once popularly thought to be a narrow strip confined to the heart of the Midwest, is ac-

tually more of a wide boulevard that sweeps northward to Minnesota and as far south as the Gulf of Mexico, weather records show.

Since 1953, when the National Severe Storms Forecast Center in Kansas City established the present tornado warning system, forecasters have produced figures that challenge Kansas' reputation as the "Cyclone State."

"The more we learn about tornadoes, the more we tend to move away from the 'tornado alley' concept," says Allen Pearson, director of the storms center. "There are all kinds of tornadoes and no real limit on where or when they might occur."

Both Texas and Oklahoma average more tornadoes per year than Kansas, the records show, and the most severe ones occur in four other areas — northern Mississippi, southern Illinois, eastern Arkansas and eastern Missouri.

Records for the 18 years through 1971 show that there were 2,068 tornadoes in Texas, 1,131 in Oklahoma, 944 in Kansas, 637 in Nebraska, 561 in Missouri and 537 in Florida.

There were 292 tornado deaths in Mississippi during the period, 286 in Texas, 218 in Michigan, 147 in Indiana, 131 in Kansas and 127 in Oklahoma.

Forecasters say the real heart of

tornado activity stretches from Oklahoma City, across southeast Kansas to Kansas City, Mo.; into western Arkansas and across Missouri to St. Louis.

A broader definition of the high-frequency area starts at San Antonio, Tex., goes as high as Fargo, N.D., and Minneapolis-St. Paul, then pushes through Michigan to the south and west of Chicago, including almost all of Indiana and Illinois. The wider area also includes east central Alabama and much of southwest Georgia, then doubles back along the Gulf Coast to Houston.

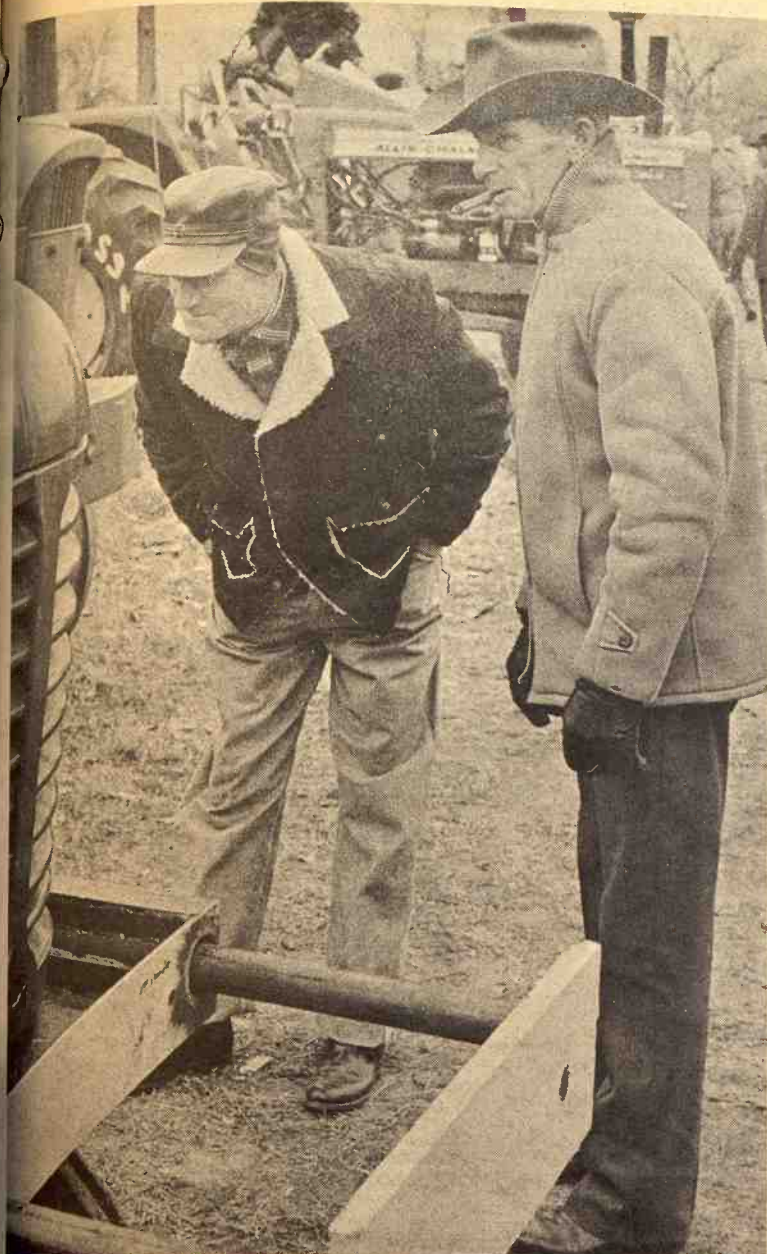

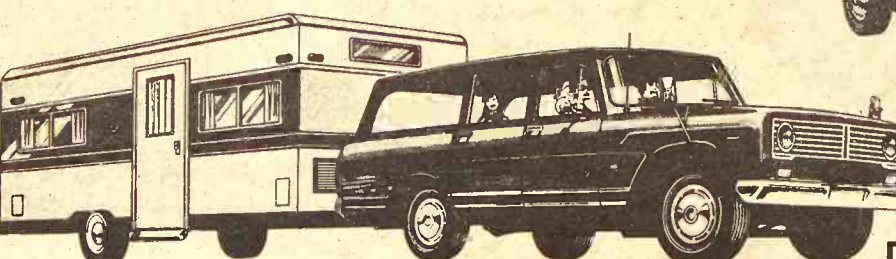

## Blue Cross Exaggerates Loss On Federal Plan

Blue Cross-Blue Shield says that its original estimate of a \$68 million loss the past year in operating the government's service benefit health insurance program was vastly exaggerated.

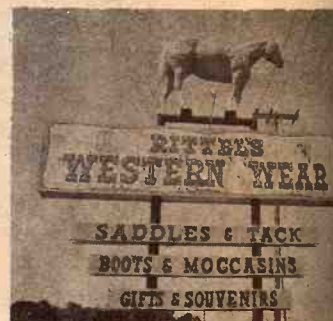
The actual losses were held to \$16 million in the program which covers more than 60 percent of federal workers, Blue Cross said.

Commenting on the revised figures, Civil Service Commission Chairman Robert Hampton said this could have significant impact as far as the cost of future health insurance premiums in concerned.

The implication was that there might not have to be an increase in the cost of federal employee health insurance premiums next year or only a minimum one at most.

"This is especially gratifying," Hampton said of the revised figures, "because it is the first indication that a turning point may have been reached in the rapid escalation of health care costs, which have been rising sharply since 1965."

Although the Blue Cross-Blue Shield announcement concerned only federal employees, its revised cost estimates could have a bearing on future premium rates of non-federal enrollees as well.

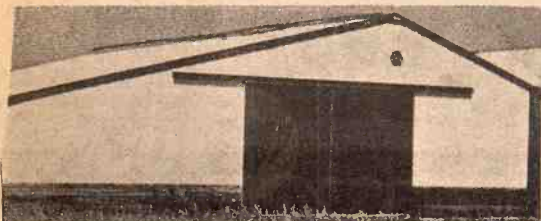

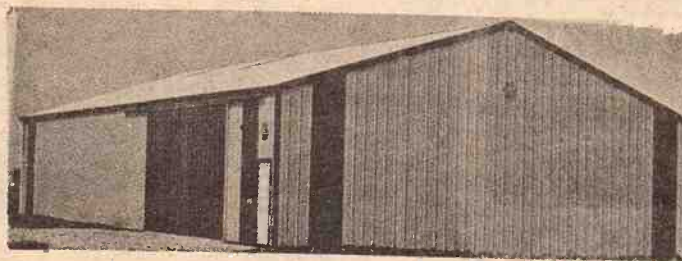

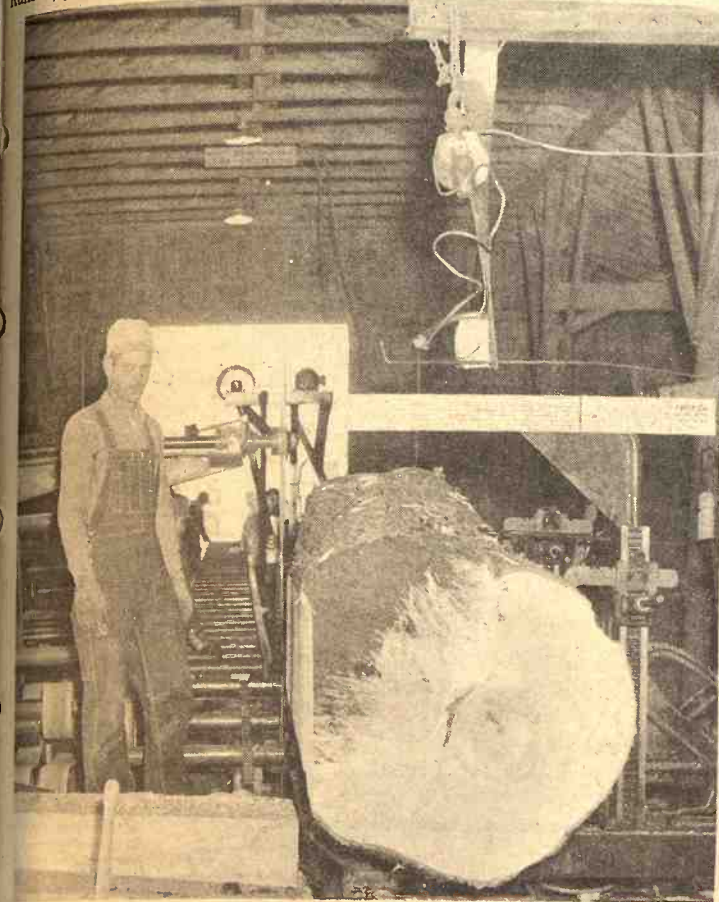

# Kansas Logging Yields \$12 Million Annually

Logging and sawlog processing in half of the state, contribute an average of \$12-million annually to Kansas, particularly in the eastern

the state's economy, Kansas State University Extension foresters estimate.

Leonard Gould, specialist in utilization and marketing of forestry products, predicts the growing sawlog industry will keep right on progressing.

Sawlog production is an important part of the present multi-million dollar forestry industry in Kansas which got its impetus in 1957 when the legislature appropriated state funds to match federal funds for a forestry program in Kansas.

Gould, obviously pleased with the success sawlog businesses are making in the state, cautions, however, that the sawlog industry probably will have its production "hills and valleys" throughout the years.

Tree harvests, like those of other crops, are subject to climate and other conditions, Gould explains. Overall, however, the Kansas lumber supply — including some of the highest quality walnut and other hardwoods to be found anywhere — is in excellent condition and plentiful.

Kansas now has an overgrowth in all of its tree species used for commercial wood products except soft maple.

"The supply looks very good in walnut growing stock and we are now cutting only about one-third as much cottonwood (a desirable hardwood) as is available," Gould informs.

Other Kansas hardwoods in demand by wood products manufacturers are elm, ash, sycamore and hackberry — a specie whose popularity as a furniture wood has surged upwards since 1964.

A recent U.S. Forest Service report by the U.S. Department of Agriculture's North Central Forest Experiment Station, St. Paul, Minn., shows that Kansas loggers harvested nearly 23 million board feet of sawlogs during 1969 (latest official figures) compared with 16.5 million board feet in 1964. Cottonwood was the volume leader followed by walnut, elm, hackberry, ash and sycamore. All of the logs were processed in the state except for 2.2 million board feet shipped to Missouri.

The majority of Kansas' sawmill processing, the U.S. Forest Service report points out, is done by 21 commercial sawmills. A commercial mill is one that produces more than 100,000 board feet annually. One Kansas mill, however, saws more than five million board feet yearly and each of six other mills cut between one and five million board feet annually. In contrast, only two mills sawed more than one million feet in 1935.

Gould says the state has lost one commercial sawmill since the U.S. Forest Service report was published giving the state a current total of 20 commercial mills. They are located in eighteen counties including Neosho and Wyandotte (two mills each), Anderson, Atchison, Butler, Coffey, Cowley, Doniphan, Elk, Jefferson, Labette, Linn, Lyon, Montgomery, Reno, Shawnee, Smith and Wabaunsee counties.

Kansas lumber is used to manufacture a variety of wood products such as office, church and home furniture; cabinets, camping equipment, gunstocks, boxing and crating containers, award plaques, pallets, novelties, posts and char-

coal briquettes. It also is used in local construction projects.

Gould believes there is good potential for attracting manufacturers of wood products to Kansas.

Kansas State University Extension foresters are conducting several programs to benefit the sawlog industry and related businesses. Here are a few examples:

- Foresters are experimenting with ways to shorten the growing time of quality hardwood species.

- They assist mill owners in cost analyses and consult with them on such problems as wood-drying methods and types of machinery to use.

- They regularly provide assistance to loggers and sawmill firms in the procurement of trees.

- They assist farmers and other landowners in recognizing trees with market value and provide management assistance.

"We are ready to help in any way we can to further develop what is

already a fine Kansas industry," Gould says.

Residue (waste material) from sawmill operations is a challenging problem for the industry. Thirty-five percent of a processed log now ends up as residue, Gould says. The KSU Extension foresters are trying to do something about that problem.

"There is real potential, we think, for using residue for fiber products such as roofing, pulp, and for animal litter," Gould suggests. "Right now we are working with industries to develop a sawdust and fiber product that could be used as a soil conditioner."

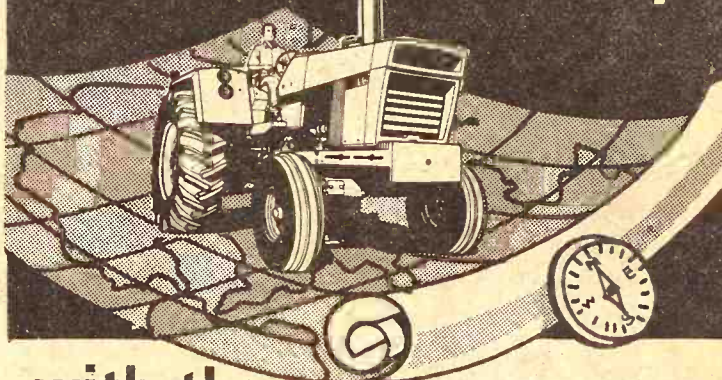

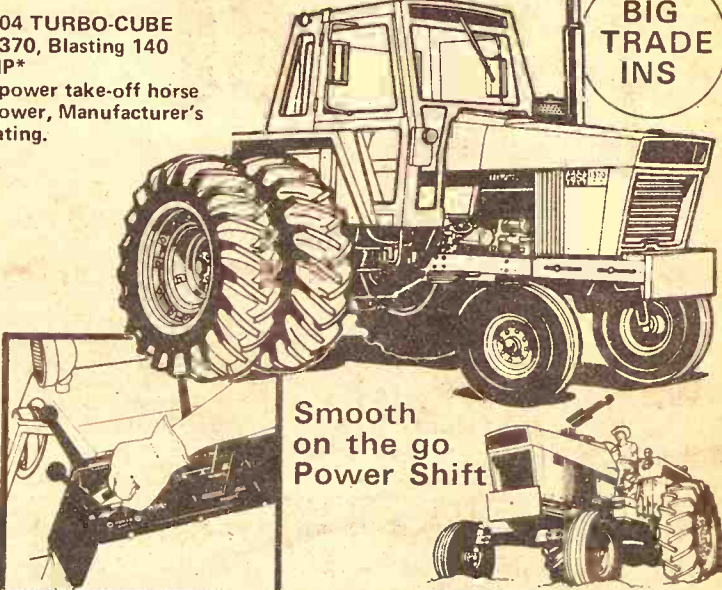

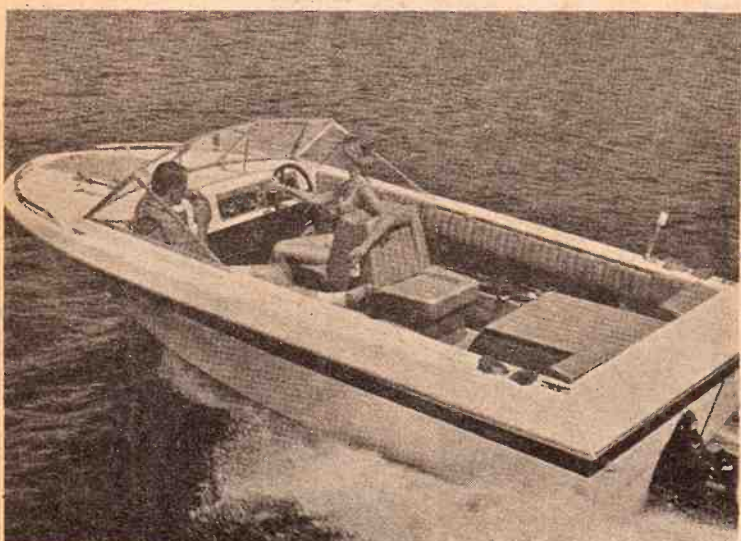

### Tracked In Grime Hard On Rugs

If we westerners know what was good for our rugs, we'd take off our shoes and boots at the front door the way they do in the Orient.

Yet even here, with hard heels and heavy shoes clomping over the rugs and tracking in grit and grime, a good Oriental rug is the most durable kind of rug you can buy. It'll outlast a machine-made carpet many times over; it will even outlast you, with proper care.

According to the president of the Oriental Rug Importers Association, it isn't shoes that are the No. 1 enemy of Oriental rugs, but the grime that is tracked in by shoes. These fine particles have a way of working themselves down to the base of the pile, where their sharp edges cut fibers of the wool, shortening the rug's life.

To fight dirt, keep as much of it out as possible. Never place an Oriental rug directly in front of an outside door. If you place one in your entrance hall, be sure the outer

vestibule is equipped with a soft-piled doormat.

A rug in ordinary home use should be vacuumed about once a week with an upright "sweeper-type" vacuum cleaner, one that has, in addition to suction an agitator or brushroll action that reaches down into the pile to get at the embedded dirt. Vacuum both with and against the nap. A carpet sweeper or even a broom will help remove dirt between vacuumings.

Blot or wipe up ordinary food or drink spills right away with a paper towel and then sponge the area with water and a little soap or detergent. Greasy spills should be wiped up, treated with spot remover, and later sponged with detergent, if necessary. Bad stains or extensive soiling are no do-it-yourself jobs, the association warns and they should be referred promptly to a professional cleaner.

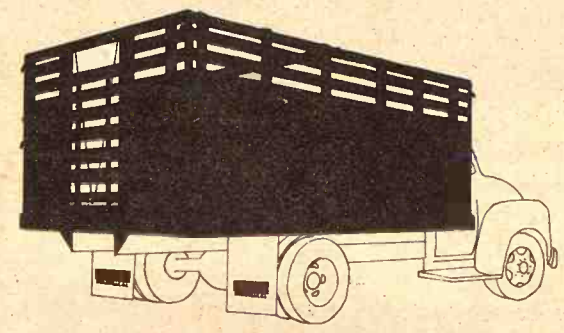
before beginning your sewing project.

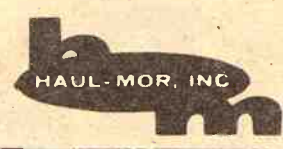

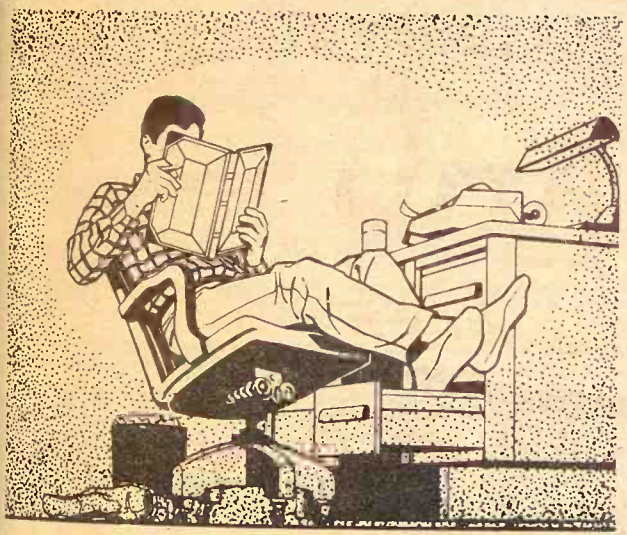

## Reorganize USDA Inspection Service

A new regulatory agency, the

Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service (APHIS) and a renaming of the Consumer Marketing Service as the Agricultural Marketing Service (AMS), was announced by Secretary

of Agriculture, Earl Butz.

This reorganization of regulatory and marketing services was proposed in January to enable the USDA to more effectively carry out its responsibilities for animal and plant health protection, meat and poultry inspection and marketing service activities.

It combines the meat and poultry inspection program formerly a part of the C&MS, with the Animal and Plant Health Service (APHIS), which was separated from the USDA's Agricultural Research Service in October 1971.

Both the new APHIS, and the renamed AMS will report to Richard E. Lyng, Assistant Secretary of Agriculture for Marketing and Consumer Services.

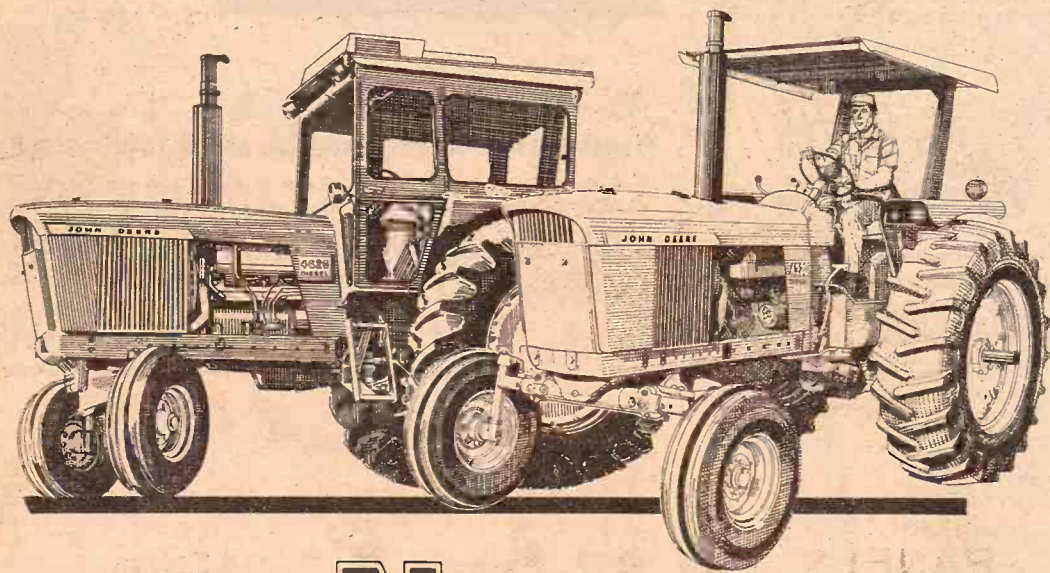
Commenting on the change, Secretary Butz said, "Fixing responsibility under one administrator for meat and poultry inspection and animal disease control will provide closer coordination and surveillance of meat and poultry production from the farm to the market—thus assuring even better protection for consumers of what is now the cleanest and most wholesome supply of meat and poultry products in the world."

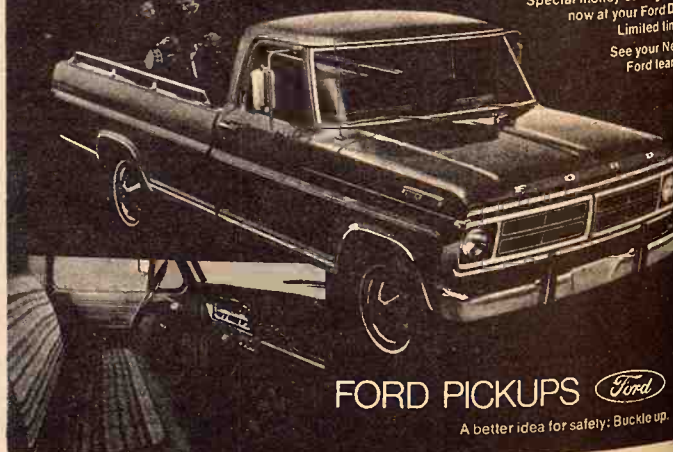

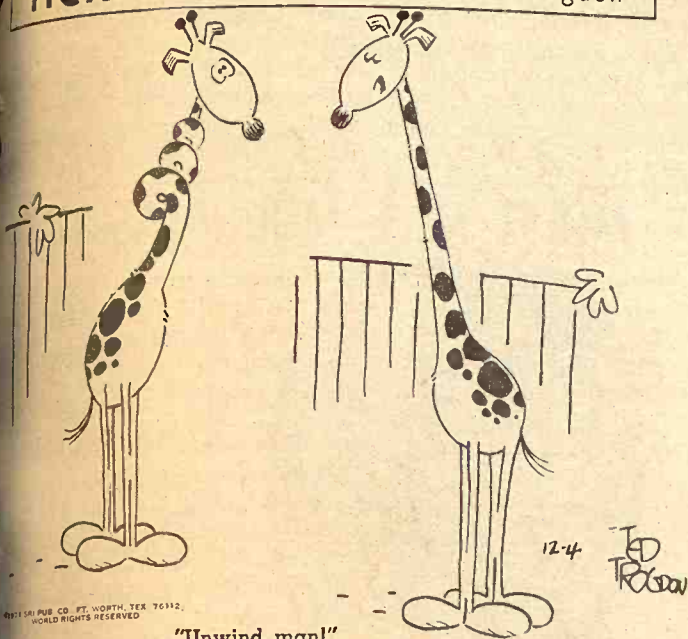

## Portent Of Insect Troubles With Milo, Corn Seed

If last year was any indication, farmers planting sorghum and possibly corn seed not treated with an insecticide could be in for a rough 1972.

That's the word from two Kansas State University Extension specialists, entomologist Leroy Brooks and plant pathologist Claude King, who point out that farmers who purchase seed that hasn't been treated with an insecticide should do the job themselves.

"The bulk of the sorghum and corn seed sold by most major seed companies will be treated with a fungicide such as captan or thiram to prevent loss from seed rots and seedling blights," says Brooks and King.

"But if the seed tag does not say that aldrin, dieldrin, lindane or heptachlor has been used, then we encourage the farmer to treat the seed himself. The treatment is

inexpensive, with labor being the biggest item."

The specialists explain that several soil inhibiting insects are capable of attacking planted seeds and reducing germination, especially in heavy soils during cool periods when plant growth is slow.

Typical species include seed corn beetles, kafir ants, and perhaps low levels of wireworm infestations.

For many years most major seed companies routinely added a fungicide and insecticide treatment to corn and sorghum seed. Losses due to seed-attacking insects were rarely heard of, but in the spring of 1971 complaints of poor sorghum stands resulting from insect activity were received in many county Extension offices in Kansas, particularly in eastern areas.

In some fields, say Brooks and King, replanting was necessary two or three times before adequate stands were obtained. No com-

plaints were received on corn. This may have been due to the season or to the fact that soil insecticides are routinely used in most corn fields for rootworm control. However, damage to corn must also be viewed as at least a potential problem, say the specialists.

In each sorghum case investigated, it was found that an insecticide seed treatment had not been used. The effective materials are the chlorinated hydrocarbon insecticides, and restrictions have been placed on the use of these chemicals in some states in recent years.

To avoid difficulties in selling treated seed in different states, the seed companies stopped using insecticide seed treatments.

For farmers whose seed tags do not indicate that one of the insecticides was used, these directions are recommended:

Mix one of the following wettable

powder insecticides per bushel of sorghum or corn seed — two ounces (six level tablespoons) of 50 percent aldrin, dieldrin, lindane, or heptachlor. Specially packaged planter box treatments containing one of these materials plus graphite will be available in most communities. Follow the directions on the package label.

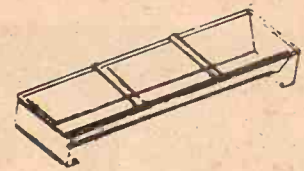

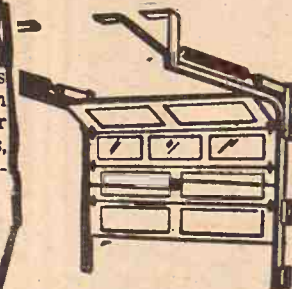

## Thanks But No Thanks, Chinese Say To Kansans

Apparently the Kansas Wheat Commission didn't have the right game in mind when it approached Red China about a spring agricultural tour this year.

After several months of negotiations, Peking sent its "regrets" to KWC administrator Creel Brock, Stafford.

However, the director of Peking's China National Cereals and Foodstuffs Import and Export Corp. didn't grand slam a possible agricultural market development tournament in the future, says Brock.

The communist country left the door open for an exchange of information. Brock plans to continue correspondence and to send educational material on the availability of quality milling wheat from the Great Plains area.

"We want to do anything we can to develop the Chinese market. We have the best wheat in the world. The grain will blend with most anything else grown in the world to make a good flour," Brock said.

Red China is purchasing wheat from Canada and Australia for cash. Potentially the country offers a large, new export market for American wheat producers. Brock noted that in the Hong Kong area, the per capita consumptions of wheat has doubled in the past five years.

Last fall Rep. Keith Sebelius and Sen. James Pearson approached the Wheat Commission suggesting a possible agriculture tour to Red China. After studying the proposal until the first of the year, the Wheat Commission contacted the Red Chinese embassy in Canada to make arrangements for the tour.

Brock said that a number of Kansas wheat producers had also talked up the idea of an agricultural tour to develop a Red China export market after hearing about President Nixon's China trip.

Although an immediate tour has been rejected by Peking, Brock believes there is still a possibility for such a tour in the future.

"We hope that sometime this fall we will be able to make a 21-day, people-to-people tour," he said.

The spring tour would have included Brock, Dr. Robert Vasey, Stafford farmer and veterinarian; several Kansas State University specialists; Kansas millers; and several wheat producers. Individuals making the tour would have paid their own expenses.

## Federal Aid Programs Overlap, Study Initiative

Programs for the aged, disabled and the unemployed overlap and react on each other in ways that produce inefficiencies, discourage jobseeking and sometimes frustrate their original purposes, a congressional study says.

The study prepared for the Joint Economic Committee of the Senate and House gave this measure of overlap:

Simply adding up the numbers of beneficiaries of each program would indicate that 119 million persons — more than half the U.S. population — are benefitting from one or another.

The actual number of individual beneficiaries probably is no more than 60 million, because many are receiving payment or services from at least two programs simultaneously, a few from as many as four.

The study, by James R. Storey of the committee staff, covers income-transfer systems usually thought of as being in the welfare category — and on an estimate of need — and other, notably Social Security, which has no such connotation but is related to earnings and contributions.

Storey estimated that the welfare rolls probably represent 30 million individuals,

although the gross number of individual payments is about 64 million.

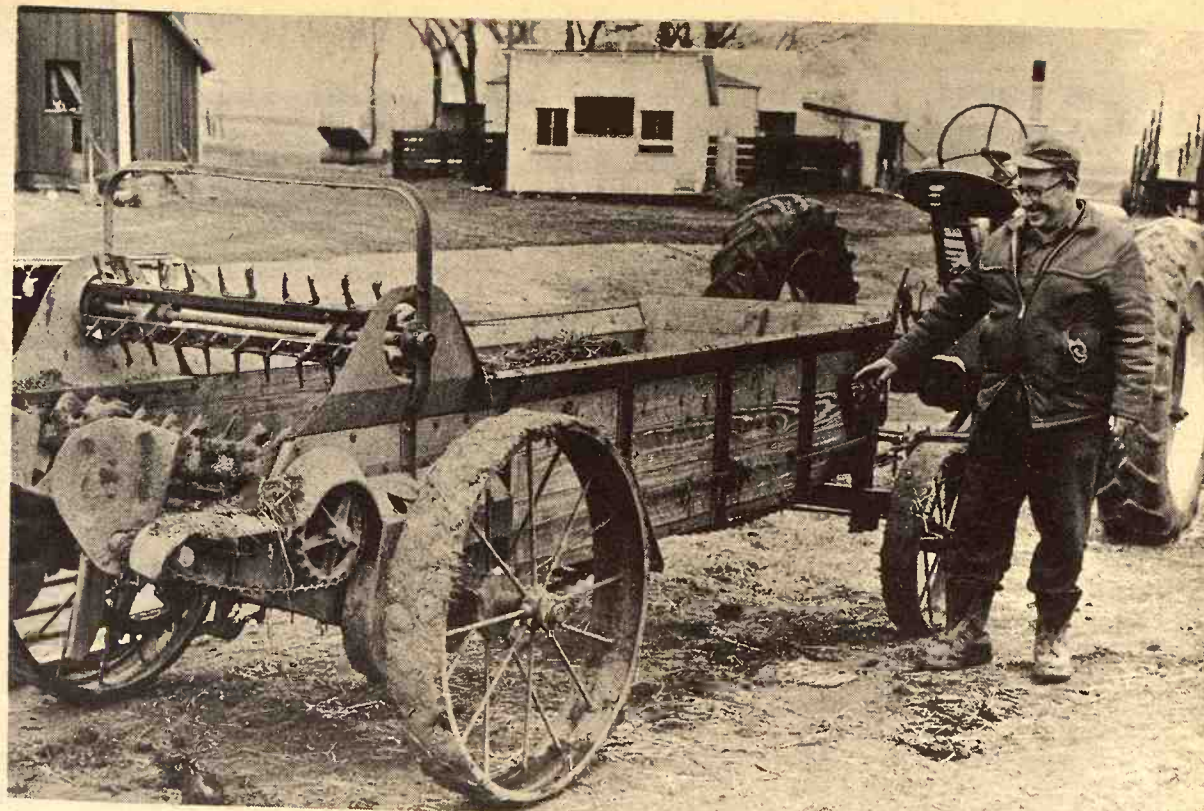
Roughly the same number of persons receive Social Security old age or disability pensions, and Storey estimated about a fourth of these also receive some other cash payment. Typical cases would be persons with small Social Security payments supplemented by welfare.

The linking of eligibility for one benefit to another, or to a specified income level, was blamed by Storey for penalizing some recipients willing to work to improve their condition.

"As a person's income rises," he wrote, "a higher price will have to be paid for the same food-stamp allotment, rent for the public housing unit will increase and the Aid for Dependent Children grant will be reduced."

He cited the hypothetical case of a man in New York City working half time at the minimum wage. He would have a total income of \$5,420 in earnings, aid for children, food benefits and similar help. But if he worked full time at the same hourly wage, his total income would drop to \$4,952.

In Atlanta, Storey said, an unemployed mother of three children would be eligible for total benefits of \$2,710, including cash, free food and medical care. The unemployed male head of a 4-person family would be eligible for only \$474 — or, if he had unemployment in-

surance — \$1,712, Storey said.

"Benefits in New York for the female-headed family," he said, "are twice the amount the same family could get in Atlanta... In Chicago, Detroit and New York City, the average working woman, who earned from \$5,500 to \$6,100 a year and does not qualify for any public assistance, is not much better off economically than she would be if she stayed at home with her children."

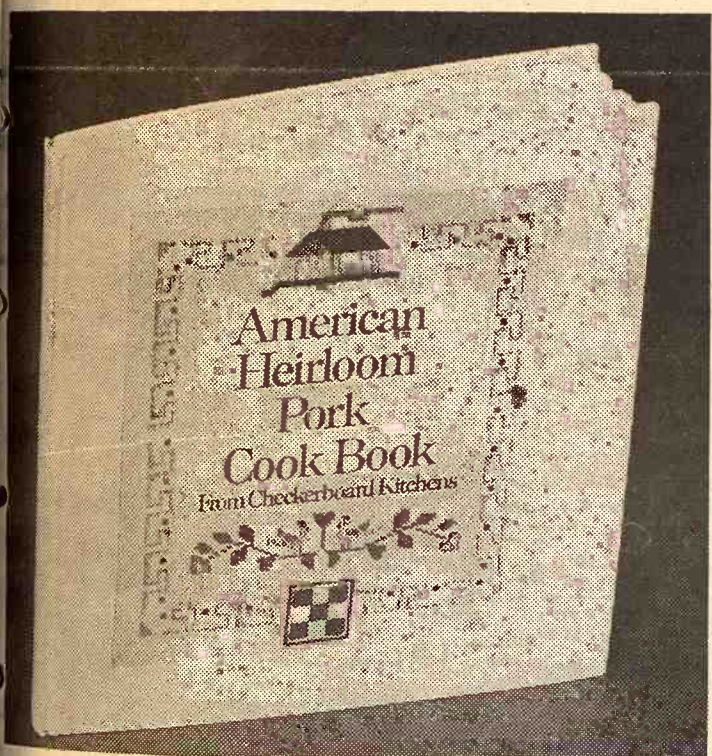
Some of the differentials, he said, "constitute an incentive for low-income fathers to desert their families" or may "set up large financial incentives for the childless to bear children."

Moreover, he said, "a low-income aged person who is eligible for old age assistance may not be much better off for having entitlement to a veteran's pension or Social Security and may be worse off if he is eligible for both."

"A non-age unemployment male covered by unemployment insurance may have a total income

which is less than the benefits he would have received from the unemployed-father segment of the program for aid to families with dependent children, but he is not eligible under the latter program while he is eligible for unemployment insurance benefits."

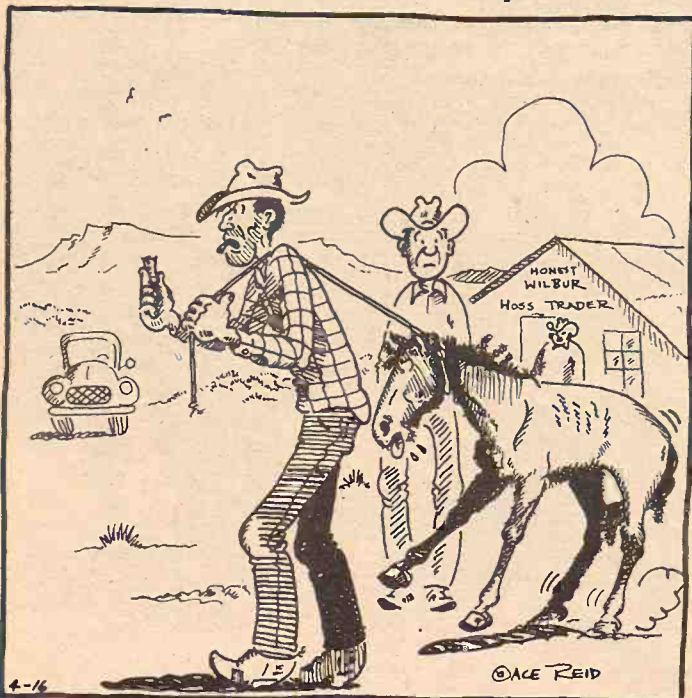

## Two Towns Forget Old Grievances, Join Together On New School

GALVA — Some say small towns are on the way out.

"People just don't buy that," Galva — Canton school superintendent Don Margreiter said as he planned the next step toward construction of a new \$185,000 junior high in Galva.

Past bitterness apparently forgotten, voters in both towns turned out to approve the school bond issue, after two unsuccessful attempts.

For the first time, 13 high school students were able to vote, Margreiter noted, and the youth support in both towns was a factor in the election's success.

At Galva five of the 15 students in Joseph Monsam's government class voted at the election, their first. Ten others registered for future elections.

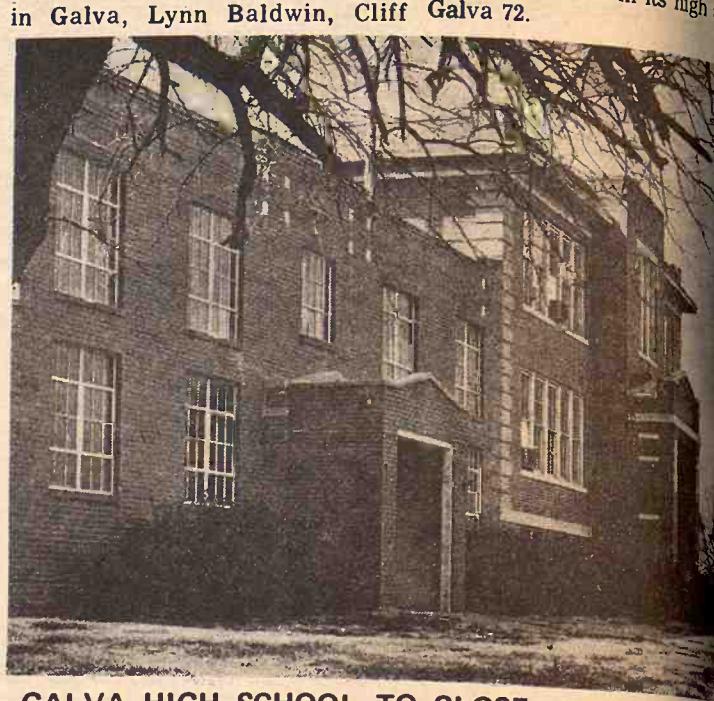
One boy was quite disturbed, librarian Vida Vinduska said, because he had to work and thought he might miss the chance to vote. He was concerned about the aging Galva High School and its wooden stairways built in 1914.

The librarian and the teacher saw to it that the youth and four others could vote, to close their own school. The high school will be demolished when the new junior high is ready next year, the superintendent said. All high school students will go to Canton, which built a new building when unification came in 1966.

Two previous elections which would have closed the old Galva school failed. This time the bond issue passed 247 to 204 in Canton and 290 to 72 in Galva, where most of the previous opposition had existed.

Voters apparently realized the old high school had outlived its usefulness, the superintendent, said, and Galva patrons backed the new junior high, first separate junior high facility the district has had. It will be adjacent to the Galva grade school.

Eight 18-year-olds went to the polls in Canton. The five new voters

## Artificial Light Law Ends Night Hunting

Hunters are going to have to develop eyes like an owl since a bill prohibiting the taking of animals by use of artificial light was passed.

It will be unlawful after July 1 to use spotlights, headlights or other artificial lights for the purpose of hunting, spotting, locating, taking or attempting to take all animals while in the possession of any firearm, bow or other instrument.

One exception will permit the taking of raccoons or other furbearing animals when such animals are treed with the aid of dogs. However, it will be unlawful to hunt by artificial light at any time with any pistol or shotgun or any firearm larger than a .22 caliber rifle using .22 long rimfire cartridges.

The law will also make it unlawful to take live wild rabbits to be used for the purpose of coursing or training greyhound dogs by aid of artificial light and firearms without written permission of the landowner.

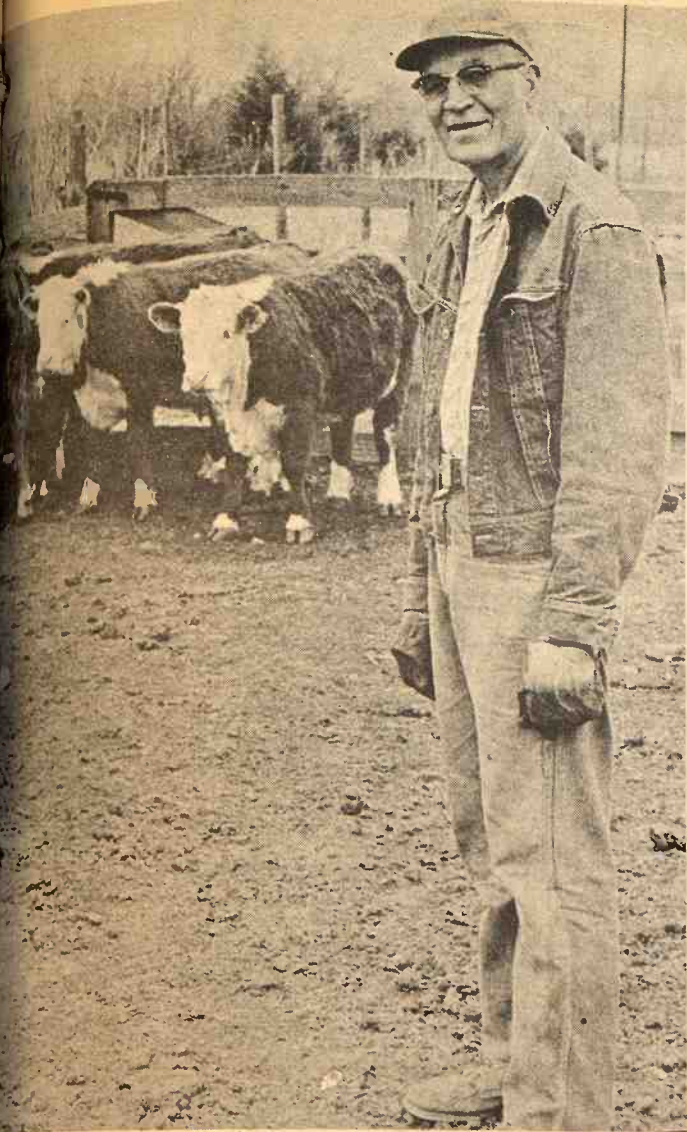

## What's Stuff In Lipstick?

Avon — the house-to-house cosmetic firm — has broken an industry tradition of hush-hush by listing ingredients in lipstick and other beautifiers.

Avon will tell the ingredients in a product if asked for it. The policy change has been a quiet one, in effect since last July.

Government officials, who have been pressuring for disclosure of cosmetic ingredients for years, say they hope the rest of the industry will follow suit, but even Avon's move doesn't go far enough to suit them.

Avon won't answer a customer directly if asked for the stuff that goes into lipstick, rouge, eye makeup and the like. But if a doctor, treating a patient for skin allergies, asks, Avon says it will answer questions about contents of cosmetics. Some doctors say the responses are often slow and are not specific enough.

Avon says it received less than 100 requests so far.

There's no law that requires manufacturers to tell of ingredients, but Rep. Leonore Sullivan of Missouri has introduced a bill requiring labeling.

Cosmetic manufacturers agreed a year ago to tell the government what was in their stuff, but only if the government would keep the lists secret. So far, the Food and Drug Administration hasn't implemented regulations, however.

The FDA has been concerned over cosmetic contents because of recent public outcries against hexachlorophene, mercury and other chemicals which are known to be in cosmetics but not in what quantities in what products.

## Fewer Fire Losses In State

Fires in Kansas last year took the lives of 44 persons, representing a sharp decrease from the 66 fire deaths in 1970. In addition, property loss from fires decreased by more than \$1 million, Robert W. Wolfe, Kansas fire marshal, said today.

Wolfe said fire loss in 1971 was \$9,583,560. He attributed much of the decrease to a strong enforcement policy exerted on educational facilities, with increased security patrol measures and more rigid

inspection.

Wolfe, in a report to Gov. Robert Docking, said the decrease in fire deaths to 44 persons represented a record. The low in any previous year was 62 persons. He attributed the improved record to regular fire prevention seminars over the state, better communication with fire chiefs on their problems, and a more active program of inspecting hazardous properties.

### MOVING A HAYSTACK

Not an uncommon sight in the Dakotas, says Ralph Stahl, is the sight of a haystack being moved down a highway. Truckers who specialize in such an operation pick up the stack whole, truck it several miles, and then drop it off in another field. The stack doesn't topple off nor is there any loss to wind, says Stahl, who left the G&G area in 1920 and has spent most of the years since farming near Bath, South Dakota.



Back to visit in his native Wakefield and Manhattan areas, Stahl says the special trucks have open bottom beds of I-beams. A wraparound chain walks around the I-beams, biting into the stack as at left. As part of the stack is lifted by the moving chain, the truck is backed under the stack until the entire load is on the bed. The load here, says Stahl, weighs 28 to 30 tons. Lloyd Fluke of Bath, S. D. is the trucker. Stahl has a brother Ed of Junction City, now a retired railroader. Another brother Roy is also retired from farming near Dwight. His son Dick runs the farm.

That pledge is from W. W. (Bill) Duitsman, station superintendent, who adds that the viewing of nearly 500 head on experiment will be a "real experience," even for old-timers who've been taking in the Roundup for years.

Wheat feeding, milo, silage, alfalfa grazing, possible substitutions for DES, and cross breeding with offspring from exotic

breeds, are among the subjects to be discussed.

This year's Roundup marks the 70th anniversary of Kansas State University's Fort Hays station. The public is invited, and of course there is no admission charge to the ground or to the all-weather arena in which the cattle will be shown.

## 40% of U.S. Farm Exports To Europe

Despite a high level of farm production, Western Europe accounted for 40 per cent of the \$7.8 billion in U.S. farm exports last year, the Agriculture Department reported yesterday.

Top U.S. exports were oilseeds, protein meals, wheat, tobacco, animal fats and oils and fruits and vegetables. Recent changes in the

dollar value may favor some U.S. farm exports, the Economic Research Service said.

The research service said total farm output in Western Europe increased 7 per cent last year largely because of a record 133-million-ton grain crop. Also red meat output advanced.

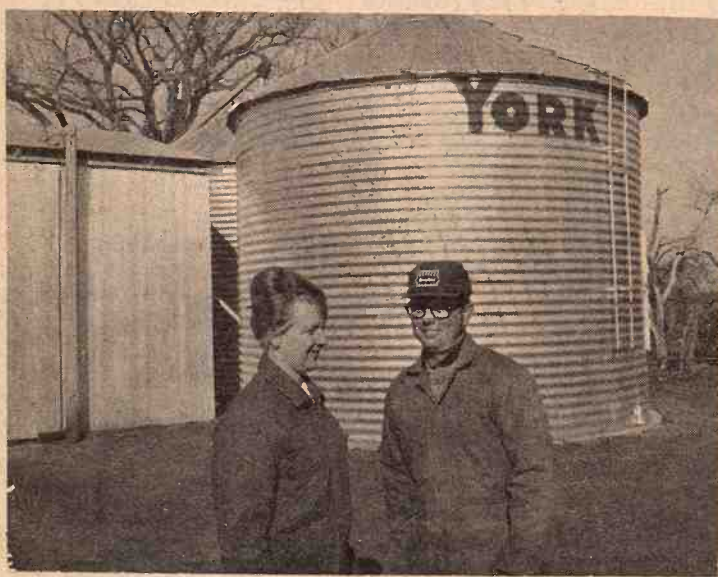

## IRS Plan To Try Short Form Again

The Internal Revenue Service (IRS) plans to resume using the short form income tax return next year when returns for 1972 are filed. The old short form, abandoned after 1968, was a card. Present plans are for the new one to be about half the size of the regular form 1040. Reinstating the short form is only one of several revisions planned by IRS to try to simplify tax returns. IRS Commissioner, Johnnie M. Walters said instructions will be reissued to make them simpler. In a related development, Walters appeared before a House subcommittee probing the tax preparation industry and told the panel that 2200 of 3174 tax preparers surveyed by IRS agents submitted

incorrect returns either because of incompetence or outright fraud.

An IRS spokesman said the agency decided to resume using a short form "because there is still a demand for it."

Some items to be left off the first page for the new short form include income from other than wages, dividend and interest and adjustment and sick pay.

The IRS quit using the card form after announcing too many taxpayers were not taking advantage of itemized deductions.

"Our people felt that people were shorting themselves by filing the 1040A," the spokesman said.

The short form is a simple return and taxpayers with income from salary and wages who take the standard deduction can fill it out quickly.

In 1968, about 18 million of the

nation's 78 million taxpayers used the short form.

As presently worked up, the 1040A form would be a sheet of paper 8 inches by 5 1/2 inches.

According to the IRS spokesman, one reason for going back to the short form is that "more people don't have to itemize now."

For 1972 returns, the standard deduction will go up to a maximum of \$2000 or 13 percent. In 1968, the minimum standard deduction was \$1000.

## Aerial Spray To Plug Dam Leaks

ALMA — The spraying of 50 tons of bentonite, a sealer, is expected to be completed this week at the Alma city reservoir in an attempt to plug a leak.

The operation will be done by an airplane, similar to pesticides spraying techniques.

Max Kraus, manager of Alma city utilities, said a recent geologist's

survey showed the leak through layers of Flint Hills rock is somewhere in the middle of the reservoir.

Bentonite is valued at \$35 a ton.

The city of Alma quit drawing water from the reservoir last fall for the first time since it became the town's water source in June, 1967. Since last fall the city has relied on a mobile unit taking water from Mill

April 18, 1972

Creek.

City officials see no problems in continuing to rely on the creek temporarily since there is no immediate possibility of drought.

Kraus said the city has used bentonite in the reservoir before, in the second year after its completion in 1966.

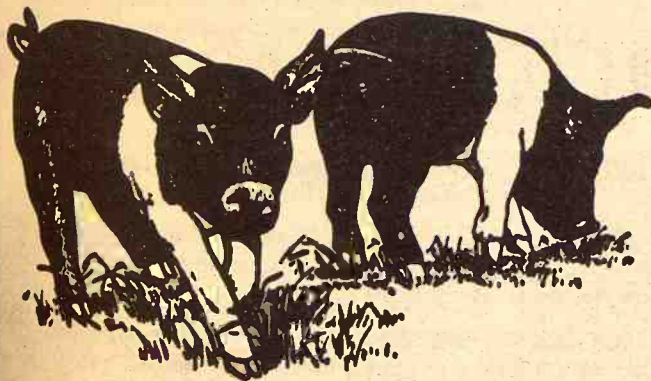

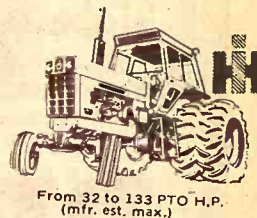

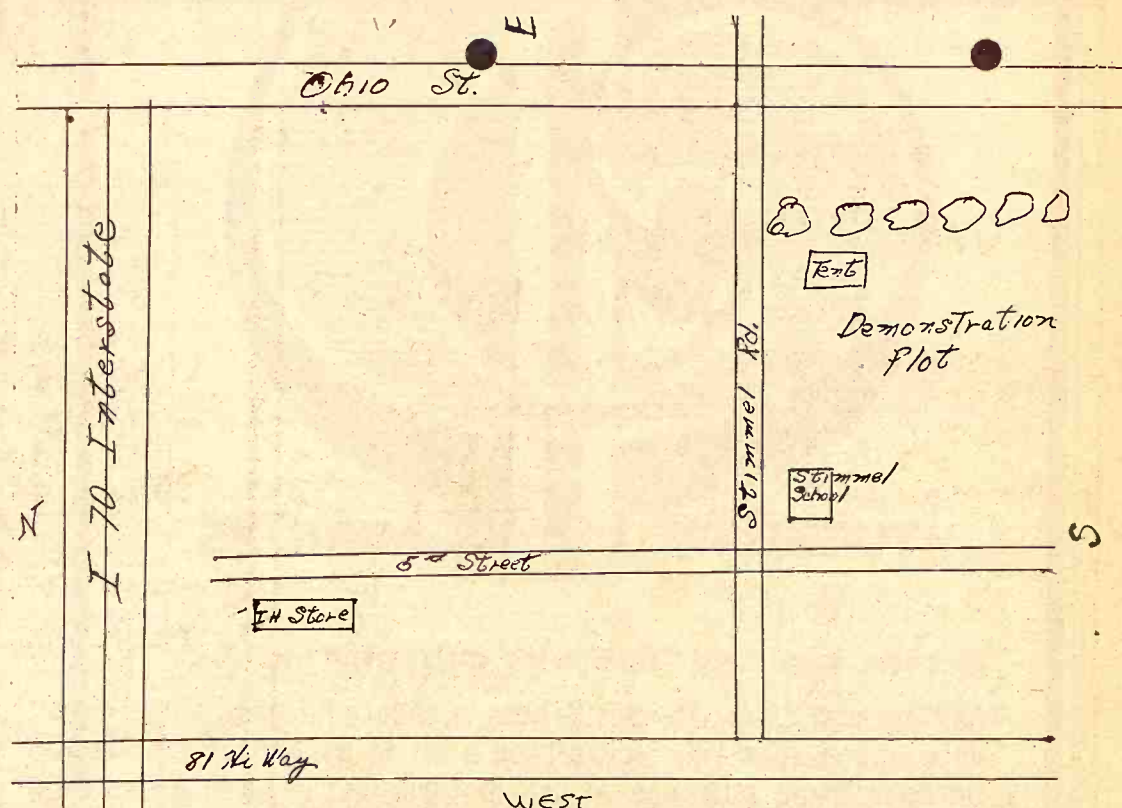

# What Effect From Unlimited Imports?

Cattlemen and their organizations probably wouldn't agree, but some U.S. economists argue that taking off the import barriers against foreign meat probably wouldn't have a great deal of impact on average retail beef prices this year.

The great unknown is the exact quantity of foreign meat that might be imported into this country if all import controls were dropped this year. But USDA spokesmen say they do not see a potential for much more than 100 million pounds over currently-expected levels even if controls were taken off.

They said if imports did increase 100 million pounds. The expansion might shave no more than a penny a pound off present retail average price prospects for this year.

As the situation stands now — with 47 House members cosponsoring a bill to repeal meat import controls — beef imports under a system of voluntary control agreements with supplying nations are expected to reach 1.2 billion pounds this year. This would be up about 10 per cent from actual imports in 1971.

"Estimates suggest this may lower the farmer's price for all cattle by 30-40 cents per cwt below what it would be with no increase in imports the primary effect will be on cow prices rather than on fed cattle prices, since the imports are mainly of cow-beef quality and aren't used in steaks and roasts," economists

said in an agricultural outlook digest report.

"Translated to the retail level this effect could reduce the average price of beef by a penny a pound," the report said.

If this penny saving were supplemented by further reductions due to elimination of import ceilings, the net retail cut suggested by putting together the guesses of trade experts and economic analysis would add up to not much over 2 cents a pound. Since the imported meat goes

largely into processed products like hamburger and hot dogs, economists were asked if the per-pound savings there might be larger than the amounts they estimate for all retail beef. A spokesman said, however, the department's estimating methods were not precise enough to allow any breakdown of the price forecast.

Looking beyond the possible 1972 effect of eliminating import ceilings, one USDA spokesman warned it could boomerang against consumer

interests by discouraging needed expansion of domestic beef herds.

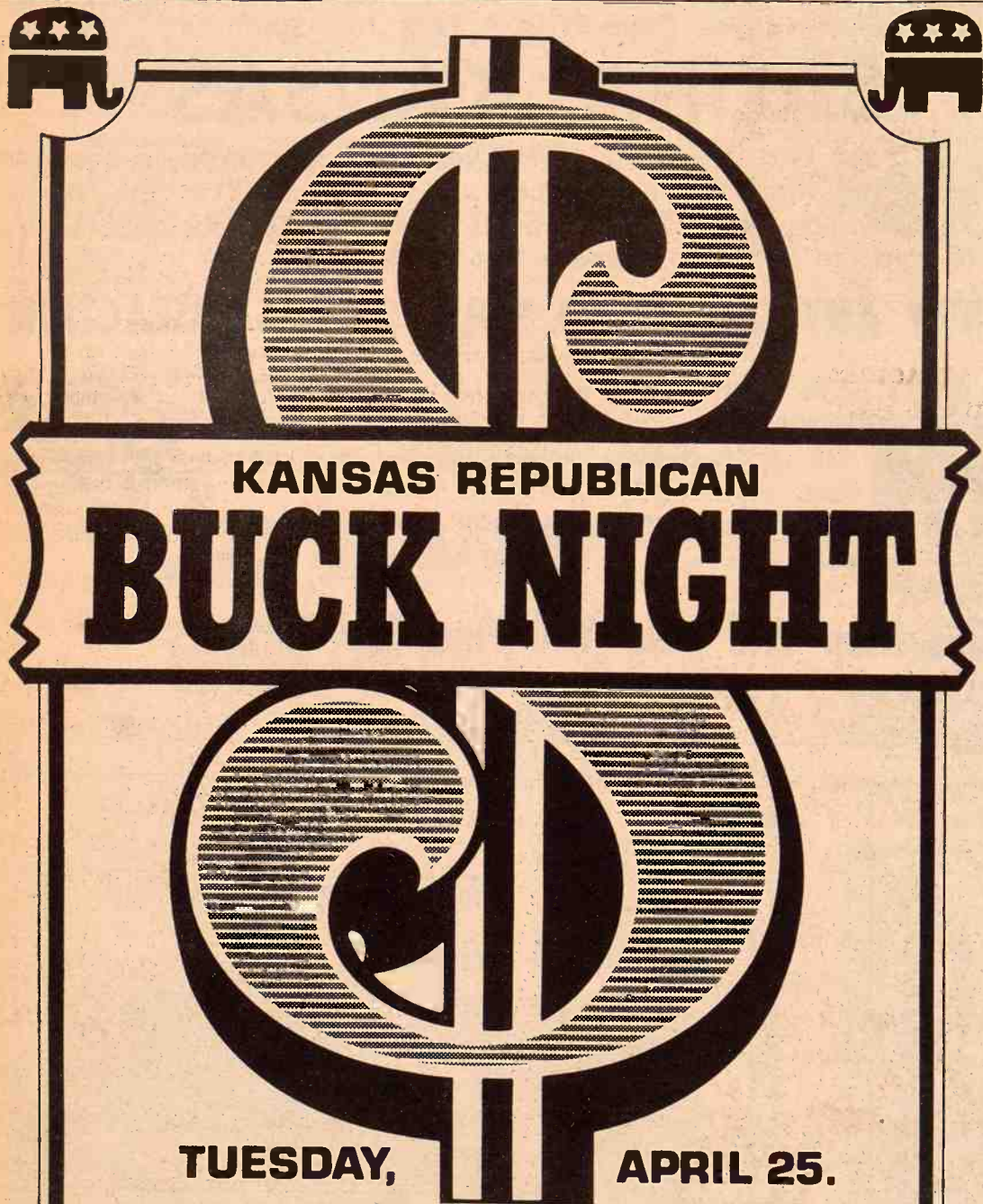

## Controversial Beef Prices Bring Freeze Suggestion

Ideas to cope with recent higher beef prices have brought forth a call for a freeze on the price between the cattle producer and the consumer in an effort to catch the illusive mid-point.

By Carpenter of the National Farmers Union made the suggestion as he told congressmen in a House

subcommittee meeting that meat marketing margins have a tendency to grow wider regardless of what is happening to the cattlemen's prices.

He said that prices in the beef markets in the Midwest a week ago were down \$1 per hundredweight and have sagged some more since then.

"If indeed the farm price has gone down by \$2.50, then the retail price ought to be back at the August 1971, level — down about 15-20 cents a pound at retail if the meat packers and food chains use the same rule of thumb on the way down as they did on the way up," he said.

Chairman Graham Purcell, D-

Tex., opening the hearing, said it is imperative that ways be found to improve the present marketing system.

"We are saddled with an antiquated, high cost, inefficient system of marketing that no longer responds to today's needs," he said.

Purcell said that "while consumers certainly would maintain that prices are too high, producers feel that any of the proposed remedies for lowering prices will adversely affect their income and be counterproductive to consumer interests in the long run."

Marvin H. Schlesinger, President of the Montana Cattlemen's Association, said "it would be temporary and artificial to require the chains to freeze prices without attacking the practices which permit the chains to control prices."


"Once centralized buying practices are stopped, then the regular interplay of market forces, supply and demand, would be able to set prices as determined by the market place," he said.

Rep. John Melcher, D-Mont., said he couldn't understand why prices of beef cuts escalate sharply as the beef moves to the populous Eastern seaboard from the meat

producing areas.

Gene Potter of the National Farmers Organization suggested establishment of a continuing congressional watchdog committee

to examine closely and publicize "what is really occurring in relation to farm and food prices and to find out what the administration's farm price policy really is."

## Speculation Shows Beef Prices Lower, Pork Prices Up

Two witnesses told a House Agriculture subcommittee Tuesday that beef prices probably will be down until sometime this summer. Clarence G. Adamy, president of

the National Association of Food Chains, said that the beef supply situation then would put upward pressure on prices but that competitive pressures in retailing would help offset this.

Herrell DeGraff, president of the American Meat Institute, said that "prospective cattle marketings over the next few months have led meat industry analysts to believe that relatively stable beef prices are in prospect at least until mid-summer

of this year."

He said hog prices and wholesale pork prices probably will increase somewhat in the weeks ahead.

Adamy said that the current and recent price conditions in meat are not really the result of inflation or profiteering by retailers but merely the result of supply and demand relationships for certain specific products.

But Rep. Neal Smith, D-Iowa, said his investigations have showed that the chain stores are pricing according to what their customers will pay.

Spokesmen for cattle producers said they had no apologies for beef prices.

William C. Donnell, president of the Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association, said that "by any standards, our profits today are modest and far below par for the rest of the U.S. economy."

John Trotman, president of the American National Cattlemen's Association, said that recent price decreases at the retail meat counters were overdue because live and wholesale prices started a decline in mid-February.

"Had there been a faster reaction by retailers instead of their maintenance of wide margins, we are confident that consumers generally would not have so vehemently complained about retail meat prices," Trotman said.

# Natural Growers' Plan Own Cannery

ULYSSES — Upcoming construction of a cannery in Ulysses is a dream coming true for farmers of this area.

Behind the \$200,000 installation is a group of farmers who have formed Western Natural Growers, Inc. They expect the plant to be completed by Sept. 1 to handle their first crop of organically grown vegetables.

President of the new corporation is Charles Basham, who was district extension horticulturist for the area in 1964-65. Basham now is teaching horticulture at Colorado State University, Fort Collins.

The Grant County Development Corporation is furnishing a site for the cannery at the west edge of Ulysses. Construction is expected to begin after final financing is worked out.

Other corporation organizers are Dale Williams, vice-president; John Boylan, secretary-treasurer; C. E. Battin, and Lyle Morris, all of Ulysses, and Carl Thurow, Andy Miller, and Gordon Bane, of Hugoton.

Farmers of Grant, Stevens, Stanton, and Haskell counties all have tried various vegetable crops for many years. They have tried cucumbers, tomatoes, lettuce, onions, potatoes and cantaloupes. Marketing problems of one kind and another stifled progress.

They needed a cannery and a marketing system. Now they have plans for both. The organic food market throughout the United States is under-supplied, they said, and they hope to furnish some of the food demanded.

Basham said only land that is free of pesticides will be used for production after soil samples have been examined.

Produce will be tested by commercial laboratories to ascertain that it is chemical-free before it is canned, he said.

Prices for the organically-grown produce probably will range from 15 to 50 percent higher than chemically-grown vegetables, he believes.

This year's crop will include tomatoes, snap beans, cucumbers, cabbage, red table beets and spinach greens. Tomatoes will be planted within the next few weeks. Other crops will be planted in July.

The cannery will have 12,000 square feet of space and will employ about 20 persons, Basham said. Most of the crops will require extra farm labor, but planting and harvest times will be spaced so that a uniform number of employees can be kept busy.

Most of the farmer-growers will be planting 10 to 15 acres of crops the first year, or a total of about 100 acres, Basham said. Plans are to increase that amount by 75 acres the second year and total about 300 acres by the third year.

The general feeling of the organizers is that the demand for organic foods has given farmers in southwestern Kansas an opportunity to put their vegetable-growing experience to work. Although the venture is likely to have a high risk

factor since no pesticides can be used, "at least it will be farmers doing something for themselves," Boylan said.

In addition to the on-farm experience of the area, the group will be using research experience from Basham's stay there in the mid-1960's, as well as his successor, Milam Jones, who continues as horticulturalist for the district.

Vegetable growing experience at Kansas State University's Garden City Experiment Station also is available to the organic growers.

Basham said he has been in communication with the National Farmers Organization's organic growers group, and expects to meet later with Vincent Spader, Corning, Iowa, who guides that section of NFO.

Plans call for the cannery products to be marketed through wholesalers who deal with retail organic food stores.

# Implement Assembly Lines On 'Go'

The nation's farm equipment makers are stepping up production sharply to keep pace with rising retail sales to farmers.

Deere & Co. said it has raised its production schedules 25 percent above last year's output, up from a 15 percent gain over the year before in February.

International Harvester Co. said its domestic production was 33 percent above a year-ago output.

Massey Ferguson Inc., the U.S. arm of the Toronto-based Massey-Ferguson Ltd., said its tractor and combine production was up about 30 percent and that output of other implements had risen "substantially."

J. I. Case Co., a unit of Tenneco Inc., said it was "keeping pace with the industry."

Allis-Chalmers Corp. said it was "stepping up the manufacture of selected products where dealer inventories are inadequate to supply the strong retail demand." Richard

T. Lindgren, head of the company's agriculture equipment group, said the sales of the company's retail dealers were up 17 percent from a year ago.

Deere said its production boosts "reflect a continuation of the strong demand that started in the last half of fiscal 1971." If its production schedules and sales forecasts are realized in fiscal 1972, ending Oct. 31, Deere said, its total sales will increase to more than \$1.4 billion from \$1.2 billion in fiscal 1971.

David C. Haney, head of the Harvester's domestic farm equipment operation, said he sees "no diminishing of retail sales activity for the remainder of the year. Our sales are strong across our product line, but especially good in tractors, combines, cotton pickers and planters."

Jacob Jaeger, director of the Massey-Ferguson's North American manufacturing operations, said: "The increased demand doesn't

surprise me, but I don't think I or some others in the industry were expecting the boom to be so strong." He said that farm equipment sales had been flat the past two years, "indicating that sooner or later a lot of pent-up demand would hit the market."

Mr. Jaeger said farmers have "more cash in their pockets" because of higher income from livestock and maintained income from crops. Deere has predicted that cash receipts from farm marketings and government payments would exceed \$56 billion this year, about 4 percent more than last year.

Moreover, as a J. I. Case spokesman said, the 7 percent investment tax credit may have been enough added incentive to loosen farmers' purse strings.

The farm equipment industry has been winding down its production for the past three years as demand slackened and inventories began accumulating. Poor farm-equipment demand was a factor contributing to earnings decreases for Harvester the past two years and for Deere in fiscal 1970.

Last year, Deere said, its production was below both wholesale and retail sales, resulting in a reduction of inventories. This year, the company said, plans call for scheduling production at about the same rate as retail sales.

## Land Banks Hit New Level At \$3/4 Billion

WICHITA, KANSAS, April 7, 1972 — "The Federal Land Bank of Wichita has reached a new lending plateau when it surpassed three-quarters of a billion dollars of loans outstanding," said Wm. G. Plested, Jr., president.

Plested said the record loan volume represented by 37,350 farm real estate loans is evidence of the service the Land Bank and Land Bank Associations are providing to farmers and ranchers.

Fifty-three Federal Land Bank Associations make and service Land Bank loans for the Wichita Land Bank in Kansas, Oklahoma, Colorado and New Mexico.

Land Bank officials pointed out that it required 46 years, from 1917 to 1963, to reach the first quarter billion dollars in loans outstanding. The second quarter billion and third quarter billion each required only four and one-half years.

The Land Bank's present unpaid loan balance is more than 10 times its 1950 level and has doubled in the

past six years. New money lending of \$105.1 million the first nine months of the Bank's present fiscal

year has already surpassed any 12 month lending record in the 55 year history of the Bank.

## Kansas and Nebr. Rank In Angus Herd Improvement

Angus breeders during the first six months of fiscal year 1972, weighed and graded 49,810 bulls and heifers in the Angus Herd Improvement Record (AHIR) program. This is an all-time high for the first six months of any year and is a substantial increase of 7,500 head over the first six months of 1971, Lloyd D. Miller, executive secretary of the American Angus Association reports.

During the first six months from October 1971 to March 1972, 40,940 weaning weights and grades were processed and returned to breeders. The number of yearling weights and

grades recorded was up to 8,870 head for a total of 49,810 head or an increase of 7 percent from 1971 figures.

The top state in total weights for the first six months was South Dakota with 4,943 head of calves and yearlings measured. Following closely was Kansas with 4,586 head and Montana with 4,374 head. In all, there were 14 states that weighed and graded over 1,000 head of Angus calves and yearlings.

The top state in total weaning weights for the first six months was South Dakota with 4,421 head of calves measured. Following closely was Kansas with 3,929 head and Montana with 3,498 calves measured. In all there were 12 states that weighed and graded over 1,000 head of calves.

Nebraska led in yearling weights

processed with 940 head. This was followed by Montana with 876 head and Missouri with 861 head of yearlings weighed and graded. There were six states measuring over 500 yearling records in the first six months of 1972.

The top 10 states in production measure participation, along with a breakdown in weaning (W) and yearling (Y) weights are: 1. South Dakota 4,943 (W 4,421) (Y 522); 2. Kansas 4,586 (W 3,929) (Y 657); 3. Montana 4,374 (W 3,498) (Y 876); 4. Nebraska 4,124 (W 3,184) (Y 940); 5. Missouri 4,075 (W 3,214) (Y 861); 6. Iowa 3,278 (W 3,077) (Y 201); 7. North Dakota 2,526 (W 2,148) (Y 378); 8. Oklahoma 2,415 (W 1,722) (Y 693); 9. Minnesota 2,300 (W 1,893) (Y 407); 10. Texas 1,535 (W 1,199) (Y 336).

An agreement to sell \$200 mil-  
lion worth of American soybeans  
to the Soviet Union is being  
completed when President  
visits Moscow next month.  
Secretary of Agriculture Earl  
Butz has indicated.  
Butz said he suggested to So-  
viet Communist party chief Leonid  
Brezhnev that the Russians delay  
Siberian oil and natural gas  
payment for the American  
produce.

"I got the impression  
Brezhnev would be willing to  
this," he told a news conference.  
The Russians, plagued with  
erratic crop yields at home, want  
10-year grain purchase agree-  
ments. Butz said. A U.S. trade delat-  
ion in Moscow has pointed out to  
U.S. congressional restrictions  
foreign credits and offered a  
year pact, he added.

"We are offering at the pres-  
ent time the same credit terms we  
to western nations. It's the first  
time we've ever done this here,"  
secretary said.

The trade delegation led  
Clarence D. Palmby is scheduled  
wind up its talks this weekend.  
would produce no "consummation  
sale" at this time, Butz reported.  
Asked if the grain deal would  
announced during Nixon's visit,  
smiled and said, "I would think

A strong effort by the tribal council, headed by Lester Jessepe, Topeka, council chairman, and Frank Battese, Holton, council business manager, had a successful ending.

Father Charles J. Murray gave Jessepe and representatives of the Prairie band a deed to the land and buildings as the group stood where the first altar was erected more than 100 years ago when the school was an Indian mission.

"This move will be recognized as an advancement of respect for the Prairie band Potawatomi and Indians generally, and will help rectify the injustices which Indians have suffered from the white man since he came to these shores," Father Murray said.

Jessepe said the tribe hoped the action would "serve as a historical model of brotherhood and social justice to guide other religious groups and all of American society in their future relations with all Indian people."

The Potawatomi originally had

deeded 320 acres to the Jesuit fathers and the body later purchased additional acreage to keep the site intact. The Potawatomi not only got back their original tract but an entire college facility.

St. Marys long has been involved with the prairie Indians, with missionary work starting as early as 1847 in the St. Marys - Rossville area on the north banks of the Kansas River. The Jesuit fathers were sympathetic and understanding as colonization pushed the Indians westward. The Potawatomi finally were given a 30-mile square reservation, with Topeka as its southeast base point, and the Jesuits helped form the new settlement.

The order needed the present tract for its mission school, and later the seminary, with a clear title. This was granted by the Indians at no cost. Through the years St. Marys developed into one of the most outstanding academies in the country and trained more than 150 Jesuit priests every year.

The land and native stone buildings have been valued as high as three-quarters of a million dollars.

"We see the need to help the Indians and this is one place we could help," Father Murray said. "I know it is kind of crazy to give away property of this kind, but we have a deep conviction to help emerging people and we must do more about it than just teaching it."

He said the order had gone over plans for operation of the site with the Potawatomi leaders and that assistance would be given where needed.

"Whenever poor people cry out for bread, homes or equality and justice, the Prairie band Potawatomi will forever remind America of what the Society of Jesus and the Prairie band have wrought with all mutual trust and respect," Jessepe said in a message to Father Gerald R. Sheehan, provincial of the Society of Jesus, Missouri Province, in St. Louis. "The future of our children unfolds more securely and humanely because of your actions."

Battese said plans for the institution will be disclosed within a month. He said it would be used as some sort of educational facility, stressing self-help for the Indians and community services training. The property is to be held in trust for all members of the Prairie band.

Included on the campus are the church, class buildings, dormitories, dining halls and kitchens, a gymnasium, swimming pool, and considerable farm land leased to farmers on a yearly basis.

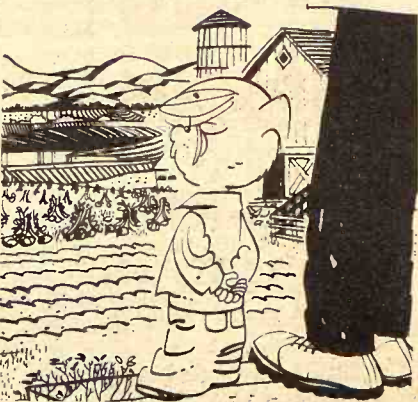

# Ship Corn By 250-Mile Conveyor Belt

Visualize a 255-mile-long conveyor system. The Goodyear Tire & Rubber Company has proposed this system which would be the world's longest)

to the National Corn Growers Association as the solution to an impending transportation crisis in the Iowa corn belt. Goodyear says the hookup could

haul as much corn in eight hours as a 100-car train and that the cost could total \$291 million if corn growers carry out the plan to use rubber belts to link Storm Lake in northwest Iowa with barges at McGregor, a Mississippi River town.

James P. Fritsch, of Goodyear's industrial products division, said the "trans-Iowa belt line" would meet transportation needs if railroads proceed with a plan to abandon lines serving the corn belt. The Chicago and North Western railroad reportedly may abandon 633 miles of track in Iowa. Other railroads are

scheduled for abandonment hearings this month.

The proposed belt system has capacity to handle both seasonal surges and a "nine-fold" growth in total shipments, Fritsch said.

To handle current shipments 42-inch-wide steel cable belts would operate eight hours daily loaded to 60 per cent of capacity. At a speed of 500 feet-a-minute, a kernel of corn would take 45 hours for the trip from Storm Lake to McGregor. More than a million bushels of corn would be in "live" storage along the belt, but delivery would be continuous — with

capacity, rather than transit time, the prime factor.

The trunk line would be supplied by 148 miles of feeder belt lines from grain elevators near farmlands. The belt system would be enclosed to protect grain, and the trunk line would consist of 22 individual conveyors all interlocked electronically so if one stopped, all would stop. This would prevent jamups at transfer points.

The system could negotiate all types of terrain and bridge roads, rivers and other obstacles, Goodyear said.

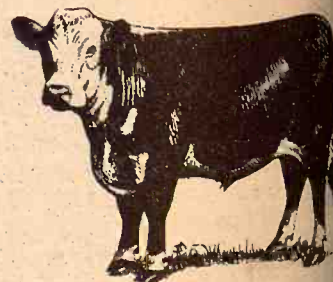
