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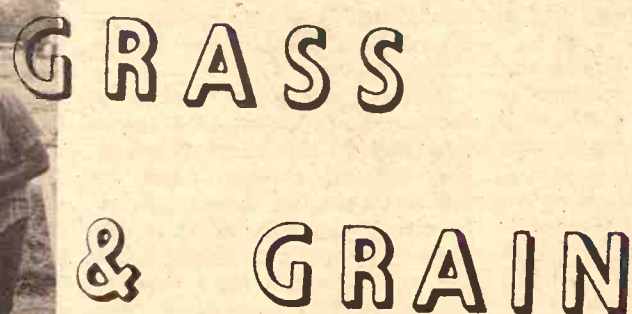

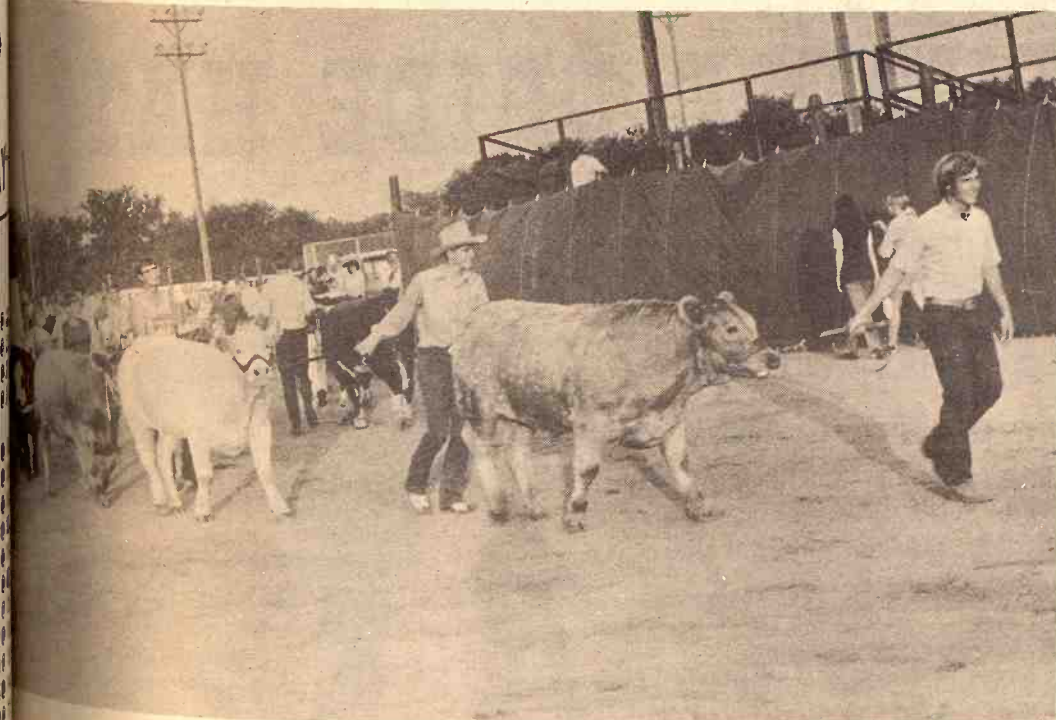

Streets Of Gold Tarnished

There's a little tarnish on the streets of gold.

The Golden State, California, which was causing the continent to tilt westward because of the mass migration to its borders for 30 years is beginning to untill.

It has now become obvious that more people are leaving California than are arriving. The state itself hasn't acknowledged the outflow, but it has regularly revised downward its early forecasts of continued growth.

Some private researchers figure the net loss of population actually started last year. The Wells Fargo Bank estimates that the state lost about 25,000 more residents than it gained from other states last year.

As telling a statistic as any comes from moving vans. Atlas Van Lines said in the first quarter of this year it shipped out 136 pounds for every 100 of goods it brought into California. A year ago the figure was 108 pounds out for 100 pounds coming in.

Eight years ago, Atlas Vans

figured that for every three loads it moved into California two had to return empty.

California passed New York as the nation's most populous state in the late 1960s. In 1967 alone its net immigration was close to a quarter-million people. But the net gain fell from 232,000 in 1967 to 187,000 in 1969 to what appears to be clearly a loss this year. Keep in mind that the figures used are state government estimates, and many private guesses are that the state figures are grossly padded. Bank and moving van figures seem to back this contention.

Even the state government concedes that its early forecasts for a 1980 population of 26 million was too strong. Recently the government placed its projections for 1980 to closer to 23 million. The 1970 federal census put the state count at slightly below 20 million.

Some of the exodus has come from disenchantment. The growth itself has contributed to the smog, clogged highways, overcrowding, and maze of cheap housing that have made day-to-day living unpleasant for some of the movers.

Whatever its description as either sunshine or smog, California is losing population because it has lost jobs. The unemployment rate is

currently 7.2 percent. The Bank of America forecasts that the rate will not get any better four years from now. The decline in jobs is symbolized by losses in the film-making and aerospace industries, but it has touched many other industries.

Moreover, the prospect is that natural growth (excess of births over deaths) will add five times more people than there will be new jobs available.

The nation's highest volume farm producer, California now has grave problems in the agricultural economy. As it has in the G&G area and other parts of country, whenever farm income goes up, farm expenses go up even more.

This fact, and the competition of farm produce from Mexico, has cut land values rather drastically. Land that ranged from \$750 to \$1000 an acre a few years ago is now being offered at \$600 to \$800 an acre. That

makes it hard for farmers to mortgage their land for financing.

Recently bankruptcy referee at Fresno had \$46 million worth of farmland on his hands. In the past the average was about \$1 million.

The turn of the westward tilt is not unanimously viewed with alarm. Many Californians hope that the out-migration might help clear up traffic jams, smog, crowded beaches and tacky housing.

What appeared to be nearly insurmountable problems—bringing in water from the mountains to the cities' masses and building campuses for the unending lines of students—now look more soluble. The water system already built or budgeted appears capable or taking demand in the decades ahead. Campus growth has slowed down and projections have been

drastically cutback. Californians hope to restore some of the gold. But many of the restored sparkle will be attraction that it has

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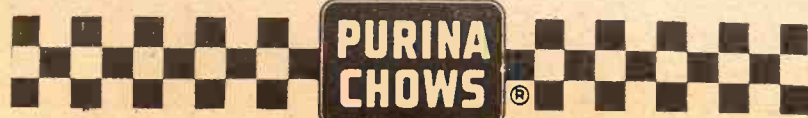
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Where Did Good Drivers Come From All Of A Sudden?

All of a sudden careless automobile drivers got to be good drivers?

That defies all reason and is not likely the reason why automobile accident claims have suddenly plummeted from levels of the late 1960s when insurance companies consistently lost money on claims despite a regular increase of premium costs.

The sudden switch has been dramatized by State Farm Mutual Insurance Co., which says it is the largest automobile insurer in the country. Profits of State Farm have been so high in the first half of 1971 that the company says it is going to refund more than \$30 million to policyholders.

The refunds will go to State Farm

customers in 31 states, which includes all of the G&G area in Kansas and Nebraska.

Refunds, which will apply to renewal premiums or be paid by check for customers not renewing, will vary from state to state, depending upon loss records. State Farm said the refunds will range from 1 percent to 17 percent.

The overall profits of an insurance company come from premium income less losses and overhead, plus income from investments, plus or minus additional income and expenses. For several years State Farm has said losses were exceeding premium income, by as much as \$34 million in the first half of 1969 and by \$8 million in the first half of 1970.

This year, however, there has been a profit of \$112 million on underwriting.

In 1969 and 1970, State Farm—and many other automobile insurers—was saved a corporate loss with income from investments making up for underwriting losses.

How did such a profit flip-flop take place?

Officials at State Farm, and at other auto insurance companies which report similar changes in their loss and profit pictures, tried to cite several reasons for the turnaround, though none by itself would seem to solve the riddle.

State Farm president Edward Rust listed a sluggish economy as a reason for the change in auto claims. "People are staying home more, not

driving as much, and consequently aren't having as many accidents."

There's evidence of the latter. State Farm said liability claims were down 7 percent, collision claims by nearly 10 percent, and comprehensive claims by 8.5 percent.

One obvious explanation for the improved insurance picture lies with rate increases of an average 20 percent in the past two years in all states.

Some safety features introduced or put into more general use may have helped also. Safety belts, laminated windshields, and collapsible steering columns may have protected motorists and their pocketbooks as well.

The National Safety Council reports there were 166,000 fewer car accidents in the first five months of this year than last. More driving of safer interstate and turnpike routes may have helped. Death rate on the interstates is 2.8 per 100 million miles of travel and the rate on turnpikes is even lower, 2.2. For all roads the average is 4.9.

Moreover, mileage on the safer roads has increased by 70 percent in four years, while overall road mileage has increased by only 25 percent.

How about just safer drivers being

a factor? There have been driving education and propaganda efforts for years, with no apparent effect on safety statistics. It seems unlikely that all the effort over the years would suddenly bear results in our year.

Yet, it may be so. Since 1964 three million persons have taken special defensive driving courses. Some research—but not all—suggests that such courses may lower accident frequencies by one-third or more. It is also possible that the increase in numbers with such training may have a multiplying effect. One firm which requires that its fleet drivers take defensive driving courses says its loss ratio has fallen from 77 percent to 33 percent since 1968.

Insurance companies and policy holders hope the improvement continues. State Farm apparently doubts it. The company made it clear that its \$30 million dividend was strictly a one-shot deal.

Control African Swine Fever

The Agriculture Department says the immediate danger of African swine fever coming into the country from Cuba has lessened considerably.

In July, the department added Cuba to its list of countries where A.S.F. exists. Others are France, Italy, Portugal, Spain and all African nations. Strict inspection and decontamination procedures were ordered for all ships, planes, articles and individuals entering from Cuba.

A spokesman for the Agricultural Research Service said it appears the Cuban government has A.S.F. well under control.

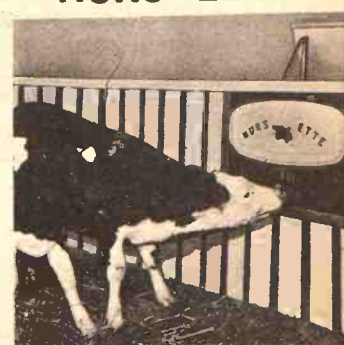
More than 400,000 hogs and pigs have been slaughtered in the Cuban A.S.F. eradication campaign, according to reports passed on to U.S. officials, the spokesman said. No outbreaks of the disease have been reported in Cuba for more than a month.

No other cases of A.S.F. have been reported in the western hemisphere outside of Cuba, the official said. An intensive program to prevent entry into Mexico is being conducted there.

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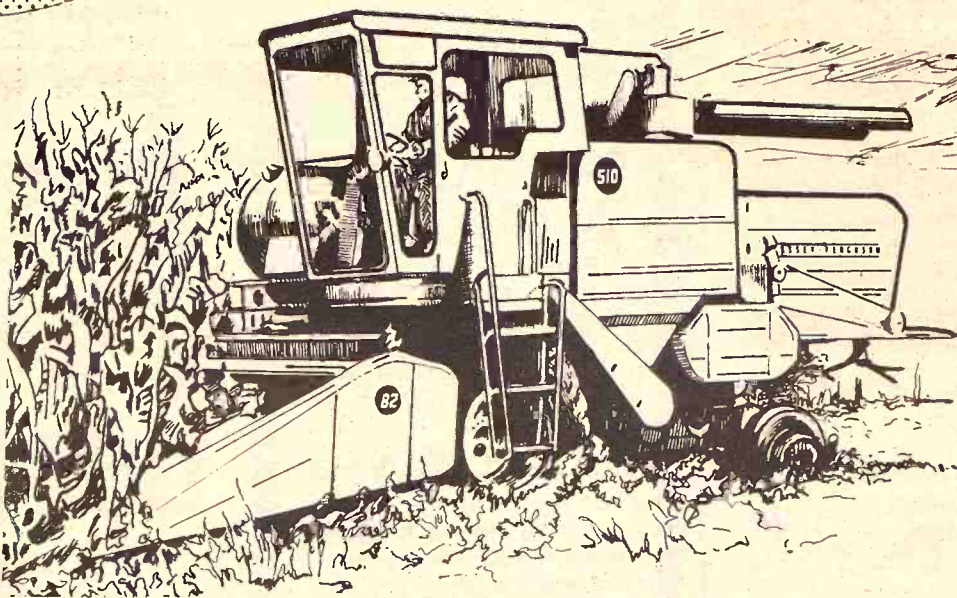

Where Do Feed Acres Come From?

The regular USDA monthly report, crop production, was issued on August 11—long after this letter went to press. Consequently, we do not know what the forecasts were for corn, sorghum grain, and soybeans. But judging from past experience, many farmers will be sure that the estimates are too high.

For example, some think that the acreage figures for corn (and sorghum grain, if they see the figures) are too large. They ask, "How was it possible for farmers to increase corn acreage 12 percent? Where did the extra 7.5 million acres come from?"

The Reason Why

Many farmers know the answer: Most of the increase in corn acreage came from land that was held idle under the Government Feed-Grain Program in 1970. Last year, farmers signed-up to divert 39.5 million acres; this year, only 18.7 million acres. Most of the difference, 20.8 million acres, was land available for planting corn, sorghum grain, or some other crop.

Actually, more farmers participated in the Feed-Grain Program this year than last. But in 1970, the average acreage signed for diversion was 43 percent of the base. The 1971 figure was only 20 percent. Acreage diversion dropped to this level because there was no payment for diverting more than 20 percent in the 1971 program.

The increase in crop acreage this year is considerably less than the reduction in set-aside acreage. According to the USDA survey and report the first of July, farmers planted 74.7 million acres of corn. This is only 7.5 million acres more than was planted last year. (The acreage expected to be harvested for grain was estimated at 64.5 million—up 7.1 million from 1970.)

Farmers also planted 20.7 million acres in sorghum—3.4 million more than last year. (Probably only about 16.6 million acres will be harvested for grain—2.9 million more than a year ago.) Wheat acreage totaled 54.4 million acres—4.8 million more than last year. (The amount to be

harvested for grain was estimated at about 48.5 million acres, which would be up 4.2 million from 1970.)

The acreage planted in soybeans was estimated at 43.6 million—only 300 thousand more than a year ago. Farmers also planted 11.2 million acres of barley—800 thousand more than in the previous year. Hay acreage was estimated at 63.6 million—up only 400 thousand from 1970.

Surprisingly, perhaps, oat plantings totaled only 21.9 million acres—2.6 million less than last year.

Summary

The amount of land diverted under the Feed-Grain Program has been reduced by 20.8 million acres, and oat plantings were cut 2.6 million acres. These two decreases total 23.4 million acres.

On the other hand, the increases in the plantings of corn, sorghums, wheat, soybeans, and barley, plus the hay cut, totaled only 17.2 million acres—6 million less than the reduction in oats and diverted acreage. The USDA regularly keeps tabs on 59 different crops. The total for these crops planted this year was estimated at 314 million acres.

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Facts Against Further Federal Pay Raises

Data that could jeopardize future pay raises for federal workers has been compiled by the government.

A Commerce Department study shows that the average civil servant received raises of more than \$1,000 in 1970 and cracked the \$10,000-a-year line, earning about 25 per cent more than the average private industry employee.

The study shows that a federal worker's pay jumped about 12 per cent, from \$9,442 to \$10,597. Private industry wages averaged \$7,462, up 5.5 per cent.

Meanwhile, the pay of state and local government employees rose 8.1 per cent to an average of \$7,818.

The figures could buttress the growing Nixon administration resistance to giving federal employees raises in the near future.

President Nixon has threatened to veto legislation that could boost the pay of blue-collar employees.

The head of the Office of Management and Budget, George Schultz, has said, that in his estimation government white collar employees have reached, if not exceeded, comparability with their colleagues in private industry.

The Commerce Department study is not broken down by type of work, and presumably includes the postal system, whose workers last year got raises of more than 14 per cent. These should not be included in calculations of the merits of future increases for the General Schedule and Wage Board employees.

Nonetheless, the commerce study does seem to suggest that, because the average government worker won increases more than double raises granted the average private industry employee, raises at this time are more warranted in private industry than in government.

SOUTH BEST PLACE FOR NEGRO TO LIVE

The best place for a Negro to live in the U.S. is in the South, not the North. So said James Meredith, the Black whose entry into the University of Mississippi in 1962 was the start of major federal intervention to open public accommodations to Negroes. A recent Gallup poll indicates that by a margin of 5-3, both blacks and whites tend to agree that there is a better life for the Negro in the South than in any other part of the country.

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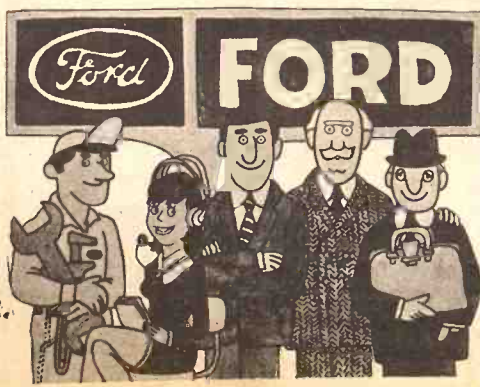

GROUND BEEF-EGGPLANT CASSEROLE

2 pounds ground beef
12 1/2-inch thick slices eggplant
1/4 cup chopped onion
1/2 cup chopped green pepper
2 tablespoons lard or drippings
2 tablespoons flour
2 teaspoons salt
1/4 teaspoon pepper
1/2 teaspoon oregano
2 cans (8-ounces each) tomato sauce
1 1/2 cups grated sharp cheddar cheese
Cook eggplant in salted boiling water for five minutes or until tender. Cook or saute ground beef, onion and green pepper in lard or drippings until meat is very lightly browned. Pour off drippings. Stir in flour, salt, pepper and oregano. Add tomato sauce. Arrange half the eggplant slices in shallow 2-quart greased baking dish. Add half the meat mixture and half the cheese. Repeat layers. Bake in slow oven (300 degrees) for 30 minutes. Eight servings. Menu note: Cottage-fried potatoes, mixed green salad with Roquefort dressing, rye bread and apple cobbler.

+++++ This recipe is from Mrs. Wes Hauserman, Longford: 48 medium tomatoes (about 8 pounds)
BLENDER KETCHUP
Use dead-ripe tomatoes, white vinegar and spices tied in a cloth. 2 ripe sweet red peppers
2 ripe green peppers
4 onions

3 cups vinegar
3 cups sugar
3 tablespoons salt
1 1/2 teaspoons allspice
3 teaspoons dry mustard
1 1/2 teaspoons cloves
1 1/2 teaspoons cinnamon
1/2 teaspoon hot red pepper
Quarter tomatoes, remove stem ends. Add peppers, seeded and cut into strips, and onions, peeled and quartered. Mix; put vegetables in blender, filling jar 3/4 full. Blend at high speed four seconds, pour into large kettle; repeat until all vegetables are blended. Add - vinegar, sugar, salt and spices tied loosely in a thin muslin bag. Simmer uncovered in slow oven (325 degrees) until volume is reduced one half. Seal immediately in hot, sterilized jars. Process in boiling bath water ten minutes. Makes five pints.

PEACH DUMPLINGS
6 firm medium-size peaches (not

too ripe and not too sour but be sure they're juicy. Leave stones in.) Prepare dough as for biscuits and roll 1/4-inch thick and wrap or pat enough dough to cover peach which has been washed and rolled in sugar. (A recipe for biscuit dough with 2 cups of flour or biscuit mix will more than cover the 6 peaches.) Place them in a buttered baking pan and bake for about 20-30 minutes at 425 degrees. Serve with whipped cream.

6 cups white sugar
6 cups vinegar
2 teaspoons turmeric
1 1/2 teaspoons celery seed
2 tablespoons mustard seed or 2 teaspoons ground mustard

Push around lightly with wooden spoon to be sure most of

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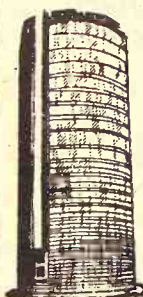

TURKEY AVOCADO CLUB SANDWICHES

8 slices cooked turkey roast
1 medium ripe avocado, mashed
1 tablespoon sour cream
1/8 teaspoon lemon juice
1 teaspoon dehydrated onion
3 strips cooked bacon, crumbled
12 slices bread

Butter
8 slices processed cheese
Lettuce
Mayonnaise

Combine avocado, sour cream, lemon juice, onion and bacon. In making each sandwich 3 slices of bread are used. Butter one side of each slice. Place 2 slices of cheese on the first slice of bread and top with lettuce. Spread other side of second slice of bread with mayonnaise and place on lettuce. Spread a tablespoon of avocado mix on buttered bread. Top with 2 slices of

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turkey. Spread another tablespoon of avocado over turkey slices. Top with lettuce and third slice. Yield: Four sandwiches.

Prolong Life Of Nylons

Here is a tip on how to prolong the wear span of nylons:

Soak them for several minutes in the bathroom wash basin in a solution of warm water and one-fourth cup of borax. Then without rinsing, hang them over the towel rack to dry overnight.

Why not rinse them? Because borax re-sizes and thus strengthens the nylon fabric. Borax is used as a sizing agent in the manufacture of nylon hosiery.

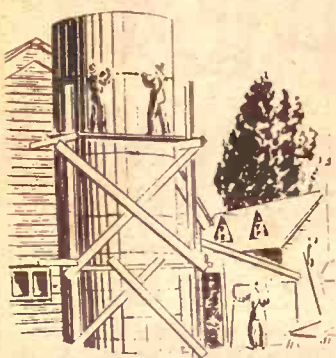
And for the best results, use a sophisticated borax based product which contains a soil suspender and bacterostat. Combined with borax, the mineral known as "nature's sweetener," they knock out dirt and deodorize.

The same method also adds strength and extra wear to brassieres and spandex stretch garments.



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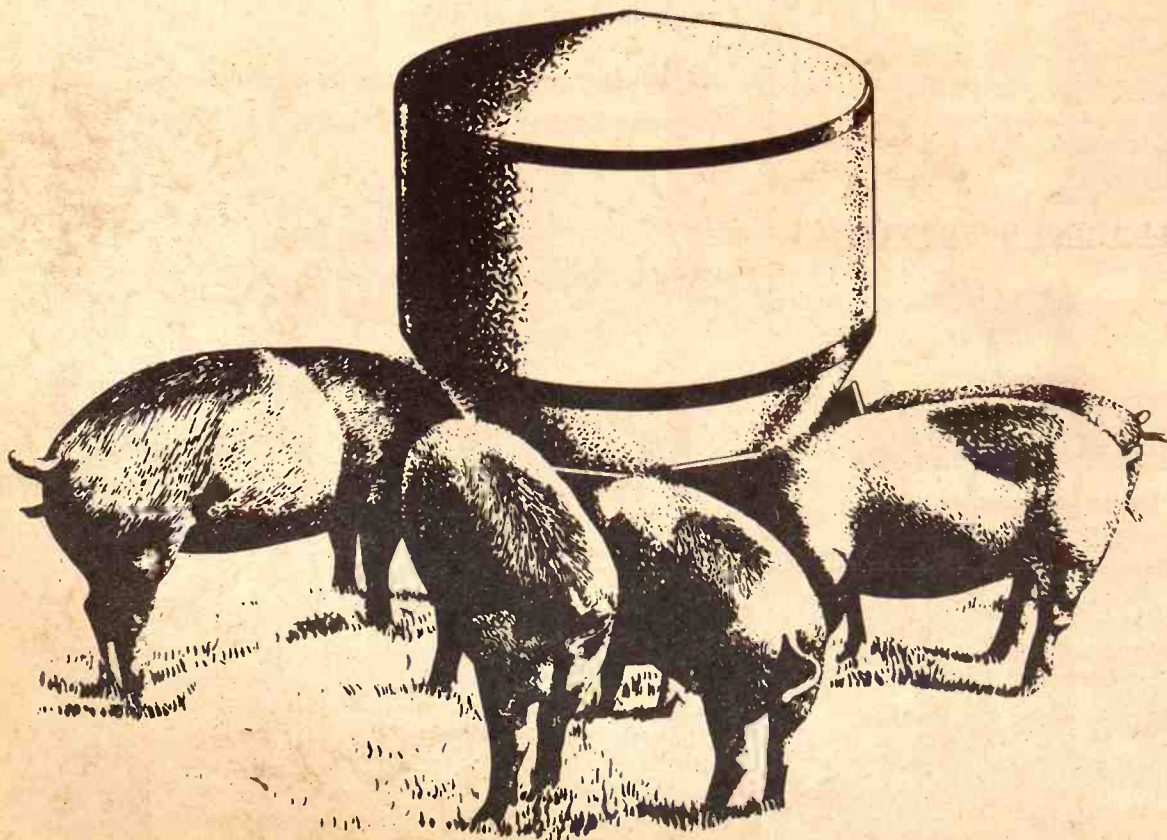
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Built-In Vacuum Swallows Up Inside Pollution



How much pollution does the average four-member family produce in a year? Considering dust and fine dirt alone, upwards of six bushels—a "particulate discharge" equivalent to a fleet of a dozen over-the-road trailer trucks.

Up until now the homemaker has needed a whole battery of tools and appliances to handle this "output"—rooms, vacuum cleaners,

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sweepers, dust cloths—with midding results since dirt is usually relocated rather than removed.

Now, however, she can install a whole-house central vacuum system which has five times the clean-up power of individual floor-care appliances to pull all the pollution from fine-grained dust to heavy debris up to one inch in diameter into a single spot for easy occasional disposal. Best of all, air is never recirculated and the home gets progressively cleaner.

To keep clean rugs, upholstery, drapes, hard surface floors, walls and even outdoor patios, the homemaker simply attaches a single feather-weight wand and hose to a nearby wall outlet, which turns on automatically. No more lugging heavy appliances from room to room.

Dirt of all description is pulled to a central collector. Since the collector is installed away from the living area in basement, utility room or closet, operation of the system is silent—even cutting noise pollution, permitting clean-ups at any hour. If a small valuable is picked up by mischance, it can quickly be retrieved undamaged from the collector. Because the collector is bagless, power is never reduced by the dust load and frequent container changes with resultant spillage are eliminated.

A central vacuum system is easily installed in the older home as well as in the house under construction, with an average of five outlets giving full coverage of all interior space.

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To Treat Candlewax Stains

To remove candlewax stains from a tablecloth, place the stain between clean white blotters or several layers of facial tissues and press with a warm iron. Then sponge with a grease solvent.

Need Correct Chair

It is easier to iron while seated. However, it is important that the chair that supports your back is of a height that permits you to use the same arm movements as when you are standing.

Prevent Yellowing

To keep lace from yellowing, store it in a cool, dry place. Do not fold tightly. When it is a very large piece of lace, lay tissue paper between the folds to prevent creases.

Belt Hanger

To make a handy belt hanger for a clothes closet, screw cup hooks into a wooden coat hanger on each side, spacing them alternately.

Clean Rugs Between Washings

To clean scatter rugs between washings, put them in the drier and see how much fresher they look and how much dust is removed by the lint catcher.

Cleans Lamp Bases

Glass or ceramic lamp bases clean easily when they are sprayed with one of the liquid glass cleaners. Polish the bases dry.

Sturdier Beads

A little strain on a string of beads is not likely to break them if they are strung with elastic thread.

Blot Spills

When linoleum-covered floors are splashed, drop a piece of paper towel over the spill at once. The towel will absorb the moisture and make cleaning easier. Quick action may prevent a serious accident.

Covers Nicks

A black crayon will fill in and cover minor nicks and scratches in wrought iron furniture. Wipe off the excess with a paper handkerchief.

Protect Fabric

Dust your hands with cornstarch if you are going to sew light-colored fabrics by hand. The cornstarch will absorb perspiration and keep the fabric clean.

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Cool Weather Sped Viruses In Wheat Crop

While Kansas produced a record wheat crop this year, some growers did not fare as well as others.

Claude King, Dr. Charles Niblett, and Dr. John Schafer, plant pathologists at Kansas State University, point out a considerable amount of wheat was lost due to infection by wheat viruses.

After early surveys, the KSU plant pathologists predicted losses of \$6 million due to soil borne mosaic virus and \$4 million due to wheat streak mosaic virus.

With wheat in the bin, they now feel the losses were greater because the cool, damp spring that produced record wheat yields also favored development of the viruses.

In experiments performed in a heavily mosaic-infested field at KSU's Newton experimental field, the soil borne mosaic-resistant variety Shawnee yielded an average of 40 percent more than the susceptible varieties—Gage, Parker, and Scout.

Where soil borne mosaic was light at the Newton field, the resistant varieties produced yields comparable to susceptible varieties. Yields in bushels per acre for resistant varieties were: Chanute, 64; Pronto, 69; Satanta, 63, and Shawnee, 75.

Susceptible varieties and yields were: Centurk, 72; Parker, 70; Scout, 65, and Triumph, 63. The plant pathologists urge farmers with soil borne mosaic infested fields to consider planting one of the resistant varieties to avoid losses next year.

The wheat streak mosaic virus was especially severe in Barton, Ellis, Finney, Gove, and Rush counties, where there was considerable volunteer wheat prior to seeding last fall.

The volunteer wheat resulted from hail damage prior to harvest, and provided a reservoir of virus and mites (the vector) to infect the newly seeded fields. Losses in individual fields ranged from 30-80 percent, indicating the destructive potential of the wheat streak mosaic

virus.

The best way to control wheat streak mosaic virus is by eliminating volunteer wheat 2-3 weeks before seeding, advise the pathologists. Most severe damage occurs when volunteer emerges early, such as in early July, and when there is a warm fall.

Damage is normally light when volunteer does not emerge until August. Considerable volunteer is anticipated next year, so control efforts will have to be increased. King, Niblett and Schafer point out that the varieties Bison and Triumph have some resistance to wheat streak, but are inadequate under severe infection.

Kansas wheat growers also may plant late and avoid planting in fields next to fields of millet or hairy grama grass, which serve as hosts of the virus.

Steelmakers Shave Price For Cars

Major steel producers, other than the Bethlehem Steel Corporation, have proposed to ship metal to automobile manufacturers after Dec. 1 without charging the auto companies the publicly announced higher prices scheduled to take effect on that date.

Bethlehem's action—when it announced that it would defer the 8 per cent increase on cold-rolled sheets until Feb. 1, 1972—was triggered by its refusal to go along with this policy of quietly discounting from the published price.

According to industry sources, the approach to the auto manufacturers was made by several steel concerns shortly after the Aug. 1 settlement with the United Steelworkers of America on a new, three-year labor agreement.

ROBERT ROTH, GREEN, HAS TOP CLAY HOG

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Takes More Cash To Get A Farm Loan

Tighter credit during the past two years has forced farm land buyers to make larger down payments, says the Agriculture Department.

In 1968 and 1969 the average down payment for a farm was \$26 for each \$100 it cost. The rate rose in 1970 to \$27 and during the year ended last March 1 soared to \$35.

"Lenders were more conservative, rationing credit by allocating it to low-risk customers

and requiring higher down payment," the Economic Research Service said in an annual report on farm real estate.

Regardless of this, a record high of 88 per cent of land sales last year were credit financed, the report said. The practice of a seller financing the sale to a buyer under "land contracts" fell last year to 37 per cent of the transactions. In 1970 47 per cent involved land contracts.

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The foreclosure rate also was up last year with a total of 3,600, the most since 1965. A spokesman said that was a foreclosure rate of 1.4 per 1,000 farms. Last year the total was 2,800 and the rate 1.1 per 1,000. In 1965 it was a 1.4 rate involving 4,100 foreclosures.

Nationally, the rate of "voluntary transfers" or sales not involving foreclosure was 28.7 per 1,000 farms, up from 27.8 a year earlier.

The average value of farm land increased to a record \$199 per acre last year, a \$6 boost or three per cent, from March 1, 1970. According to USDA records that was the smallest average increase in a decade. Six per cent annual increases had been the rule.

National averages, however, do not indicate the wide variations in farm real estate prices. The range, for example, was from an average of \$44 per acre in New Mexico to \$1,094 in New Jersey. Corn-belt land averaged \$383 per acre.

Hogmen Boost On-Farm Testing

The boars that Kansas hog producers use in their herds are the key to producing high quality, meaty market hogs that bring top prices because they satisfy consumer needs and desires.

Wendell Moyer, Extension swine specialist at Kansas State University, reminds hogmen that a boar is responsible for getting a pig crop started and that he also transmits one-half of the genetic traits inherited by every pig he sires.

In addition, replacement gilts selected from the pig crop will hasten herd improvement if sired by a good boar. That's why hogmen can't over-emphasize the importance of producing and purchasing good boars.

The Extension Service at KSU has a program aimed at helping swine producers identify superior boars on the farm. It is called the On-Farm Testing Program.

Willard Olson, Extension assistant in live animal evaluations, is in

charge of the program. The following information is for top young boars they keep days of age to reach 220 pounds (measured by electronic means).

Moyer says that a boar reach 220 pounds in 170 days will have less than 10 inches of loin eye area.

Your county Extension agent can provide on farm testing for swine producers. He also locates performance boars for sale that will improve crop quality.

Slight Of Hand In Ration Hog Butterfat Drop

Many Kansas dairy farmers are experiencing low butterfat income from their herds because milk prices are low and content declines.

Crude fiber in dairy rations is necessary to keep cows producing normal butterfat in their milk, reports Bonewitz, Extension specialist at Kansas State University.

He advises that roughage one-third of a cow's intake. The total ration should be 15-17 percent fiber may have to be grain.

Dairymen may have high-fiber ingredients in their ration. Such ingredients include mill feed, beet pulp, cottonseed meal, phosphate offered in delactosed whey in the ration also help maintain normal content.

Bonewitz explains that proper balance between content and energy in dairy ration is important. Organisms in a cow's rumen from a majority of bacteria.

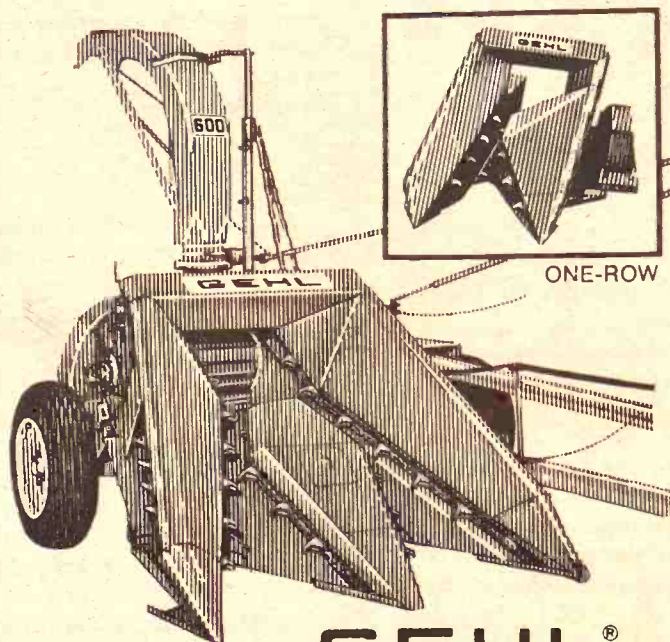

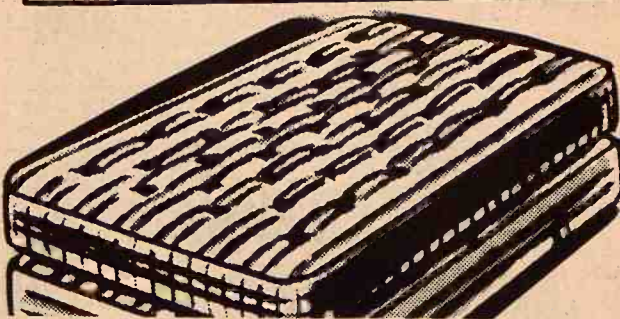

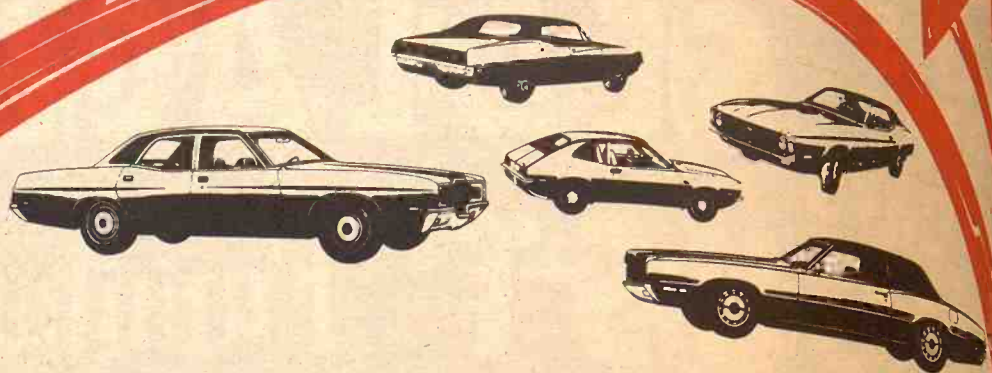

Duck And Goose Seasons Similar To '70 Program

Kansas waterfowl hunting this fall will be similar to the 1970 season except that the bag will be more restrictive on mallard hens.

Duck and goose season will open and close simultaneously but a five-day hiatus will come in mid-December to make the 70-day duck season coincide with the 75-day goose season.

Duck hunting will be split with segments running Oct. 16-Dec. 12 and Dec. 18-29.

The Kansas Forestry, Fish and Game Commission took the split within 70 days statewide although an option was offered by federal agents for a benevolent 90-day season west of Highway 283 if Kansans would adopt a point system for computing the bag limit.

Kansas Game officers rejected the point system last year along with North Dakota—the only two states that did not like the point-score bag within the central flyway.

The 1971 point system would have protected important production birds like mallard hens by assigning them 90 points in a 100-point maximum bag. Feasibly, two mallard hens could have been taken under the system which would end the day's hunt for any hunter exceeding 100 points.

The 1971 duck season allows no more than two wood ducks, two mallard hens and one redhead or one canvasback in the daily base. The possession limit will allow no more than four wood ducks, four mallard hens and one redhead or one canvasback. The limits generally are five daily and ten in possession.

The coot season will run concurrently with the duck season but will hold limits of 15 daily and 30 in possession. The five daily and ten in possession for the bulk of the season will be in effect for mergansers except that limits of one daily or two in possession is legal for hooded mergansers.

The goose season offers 75 days from Oct. 16-Dec. 29. The legal limits are five daily and five in possession with these restrictions:

"The five and five limit" may not include more than two Canadas, one white-front or one white-front and one Canada in aggregate and one Ross' goose to sunset Dec. 10. After

Dec. 10 the limit on Canadas is decreased to one, with two in possession, to protect the rare in-flying giant Canadas. In the late possession limit, one white-front is legal along with one each of the white-front and Canada species.

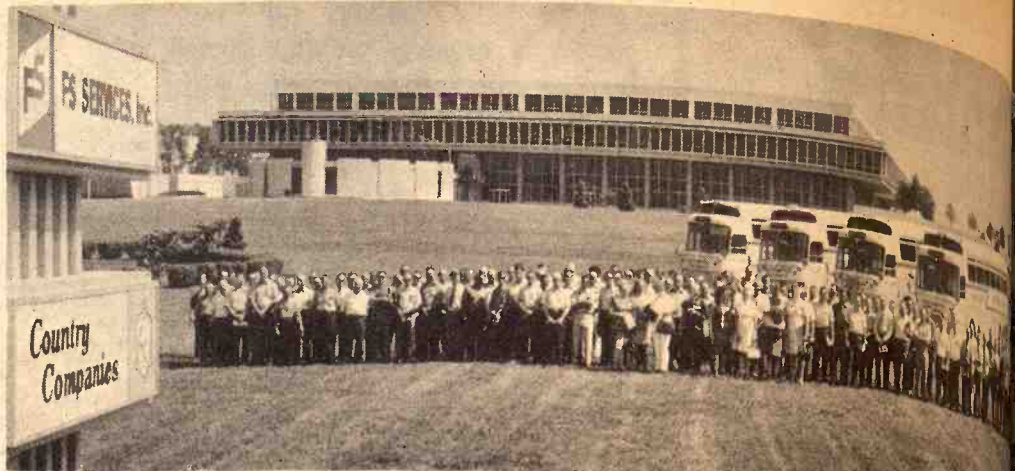
Shooting hours for all species are one-half hour before sunrise to sunset for regular waterfowl season.

The special Teal season, running Sept. 4-12, will again allow hunters to seek Teal from a portion of pool 5 at Cheyenne Bottoms as last year, game commissioners decided. Hunter blinds are located in pools 2, 3, and 4 at the Bottoms refuge but pool 2 will be dry during early hunting to aid needed construction, restricting part of the normal bottoms hunting area, state waterfowl biologist Marvin Schwillig of Great Bend said.

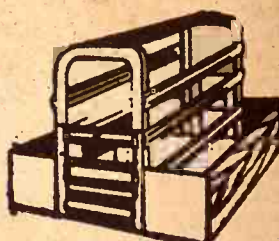

Uncertainty Over Corn Forecast

The government forecast of corn production, issued August 11, has been a hot subject of discussion among farmers. The report listed corn prospects at 5,345 million bushels, 30 percent more than last year.

Many farmers disagreed, saying that the blight was destroying much corn, which would cut production far below the figure compiled by the USDA. So, who is right, the USDA—or the objecting farmers?

This is not a case where one side is right and the other wrong. Both were relating important facts about the corn situation: The USDA was reporting conditions as they were on August 1, while the farmers were reacting to actual and possible destruction of corn by the blight after that date.

Weather Uncertain

But why did not the USDA make allowance for losses to the blight? Because no one knew then, or knows now, how much yields would be cut.

Plant pathologists agree that the development of the blight depends upon the weather. But no one can provide reliable 30-day forecasts of

temperature, rainfall, humidity, wind velocity, and cloud cover. So the crop reporters stuck to what they could see—which was the crop condition on August 1. Persons using their figures should subtract whatever they think is appropriate to allow for present and future damage by the blight.

The national average yield of corn was listed at 83 bushels, 11 bushels more than last year. But it is also 1 bushel less than the average of two years ago, and 5 bushels below the trend line of yields for 1955-1969.

State Reports

The Illinois corn crop appeared to be good for 92 bushels per acre, up 18 bushels from last year. Iowa was appraised at 97 and Indiana at 85,

both up 11 bushels. Ohio, at 83, was up only 6 bushels.

Three states that suffered from drouth in 1970 have better prospects this time: The Missouri forecast of 80 bushels is up 19, Nebraska with 92 bushels is up 17, and Wisconsin, showing 87, is up 7 bushels.

Minnesota, which hauled in 85 bushels in 1970, was credited with only 1 bushel more this year; and Michigan, with drouth this season, showed only 70 bushels, down 9 from last fall.

Most of the southern states have excellent corn this year. They have mostly N corn, which is nearly mature. The indicated production in six southern states totaled 347 million bushels, up two-thirds from 1970.

Sorghum Grain

Prospects for sorghum grain improved quickly when it began to rain in late July. Production was forecast at 908 million bushels, up 30 percent from last fall. The national average yield was indicated at 55.6 bushels per acre, 5 bushels better than in 1970 and about the same as in 1969.

The production of the four feed

grains combined (corn, oats, barley, and sorghum grain) was forecast at 200 million tons. This would be 26 percent more than the total feed grains produced last year.

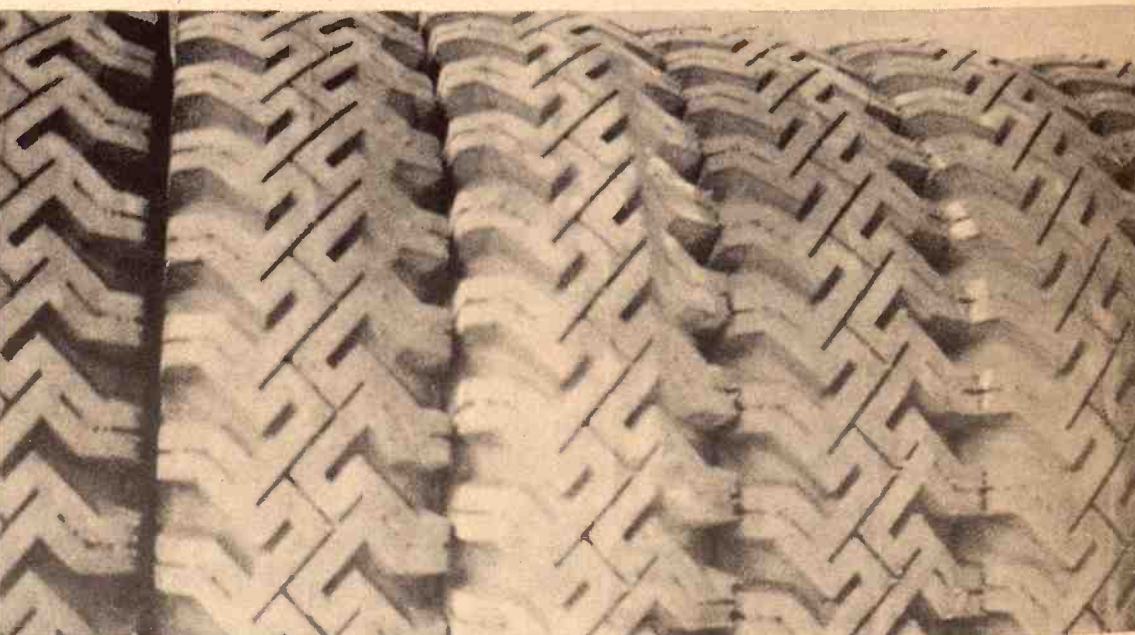

16 Haughty Hotels Sadly Eye Empty Rooms

A slumping economy has produced an unwanted guest at hotels—empty rooms. And the occupancy decline comes when hotel men had expected a boom in paying customers.

The pinch in the economy has shattered this dream and could shatter a few hotels, too. For example:

- Chicago's O'Hareport Hotel & Convention Center, which opened in June, 1970, filed for bankruptcy reorganization under chapter 11 of the Federal Bankruptcy Act. The hotel blamed poor occupancy, which in turn blamed on the economy.
- The Condado Beach Hotel, San Juan, Puerto Rico, was forced to close, citing high operating costs and low patronage. The closing forced the parent company, Executive House of Chicago, into court under chapter 11, which allows protection from creditors while a business tries to solve its problems.

- The Edgewater Gulf Hotel, Biloxi, Miss., is being torn down so the land can be used for a Sears, Roebuck shopping center.

- Occupancy rates in Honolulu dropped to 40 per cent last year from 85 per cent the year before. Sheraton recently added 1,904 more Waikiki rooms.

- National hotel occupancy rates in 1970 were 62.9 per cent, down from 68.1 per cent in 1969 and 68.4 per cent in 1968, according to a survey by Harris, Kerr, Forster & Co., Chicago accounting firm that works for many hotels.

"If we turned the economic clock back two years, most fine hotels would be full," said Dan G. Parvis, president of the company that runs O'Hareport.

George M. Horn, a partner in Harris, Kerr, Forster, says that "we have to look down the road." He sees more leisure time, more disposable income and persons looking for a place to spend it. That, he says, adds up to travel and a boom for hotels.

But Horn says construction costs and land costs will continue to climb. The longer hotel men wait to build, the higher the cost, he said.

Hyatt Corp. of Burlingame, Calif., has \$250 million worth of hotels under construction.

"We have great faith in the future," said Pat Foley, regional vice president, Midwest Hyatt Corp. "We are gambling on future growth with more leisure time. It takes 2½ to 4 years to put together a hotel deal. If people wait until the end of the recession, then they won't have hotels ready. We will be ready to go," he said.

When the economy does turn the corner, however, not all the present hotels will still be around, says Stephen W. Brener of Hemsley-Spear, a New York real estate firm with a specialty in hotels.

"This industry has always flirted with overbuilding," he said. "So much construction has been started or is planned that the danger of overbuilding may be too close for comfort."

He says just because a hotel is built, it doesn't mean the hotel will automatically survive.

Brener said the new hotels will have an advantage over older hotels because they are built to handle more money-saving techniques such

as direct dial telephones, automatic elevators and easy-to-maintain materials.

In New York, for example, he said the older hotels are on property that can earn more money used for an office building than for a hotel.

"I don't think any major hotels will be built in major cities," said Preston Robert Tisch, president of Loew's Corp., New York. The company manages several major hotels including the Americana in New York, the Ambassadors in Chicago and the Mark Hopkins in San Francisco.

Albert Quarles, head of the Chicago Hotel-Motel Association, says future hotels will probably charge \$40 a room. First-class double rooms today average \$30-\$33 a day.

Must Show Octane Rating Soon

The Federal Trade Commission (FTC) has ruled that all gasoline stations must post the octane rating of their gas by September 1.

Octane is a rating showing the engine's anti-knock qualities.

Some cars "ping" as they accelerate if low-octane gas is used, and this may result in engine damage.

The reason for the FTC ruling is to allow the customer to shop around

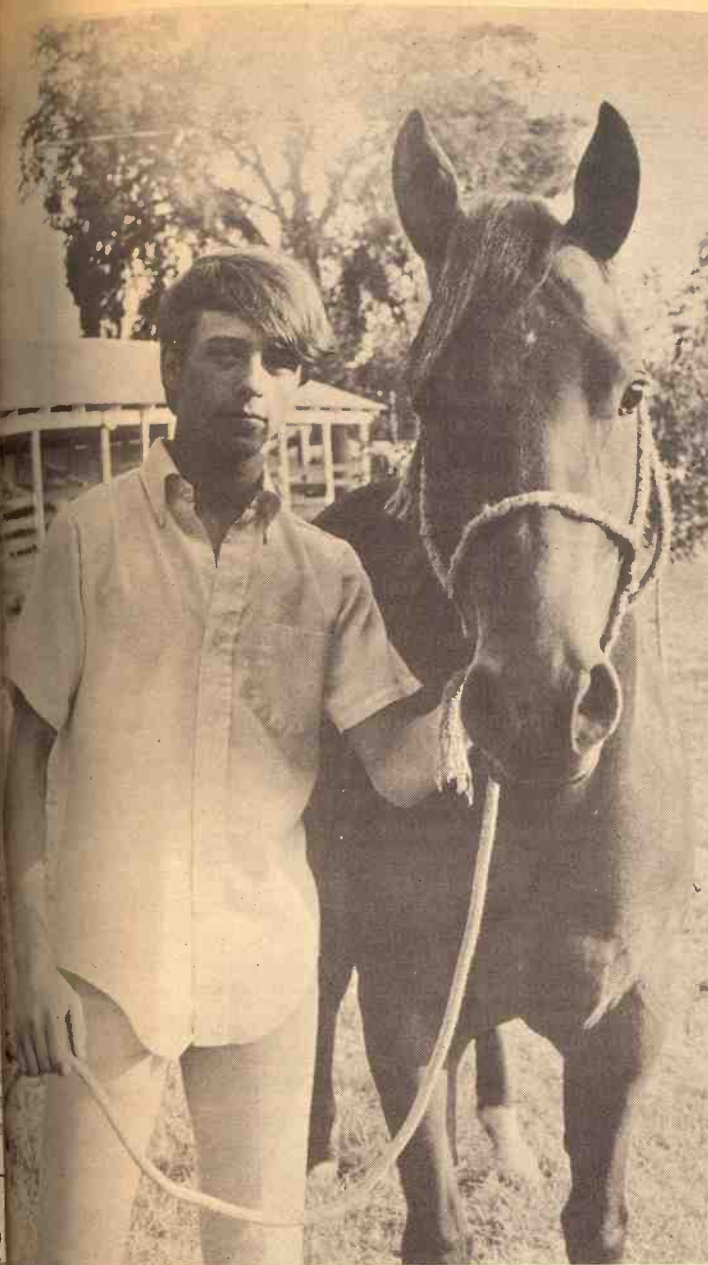

Bigger Payments, Fewer Contracts In Land Buying

Tighter credit the last two years has forced farm land buyers to pay larger down payments, says the Agriculture Department.

In 1968 and 1969 the average down payment for a farm was \$26 for each \$100 it cost. The rate rose in 1970 to \$27 and during the year ended last March 1 soared to \$35.

"Lenders were more conservative, rationing credit by allocating it to low-risk customers and requiring higher down payments," the Economic Research Service said in an annual report on farm real estate.

Regardless, a record high of 88 per cent of the land sales last year were credit financed, the report said. The practice of a seller financing the sale to a buyer under "land contracts" fell last year to 37 per cent of the transactions. In 1970 47 per cent involved land contracts.

The foreclosure rate also was up last year with a total of 3,600, the most since 1965. A spokesman said that was a foreclosure rate of 1.4 per 1,000 farms. Last year the total was 2,800 and the rate 1.1 per 1,000. In 1965 it was a 1.4 rate involving 4,100 foreclosures.

Nationally, the rate of "voluntary transfers" or sales not involving foreclosure was 28.7 per 1,000 farms, up from 27.8 a year earlier.

The average value of farm land increased to a record \$199 an acre last year, a \$6 boost or 3 per cent from March 1, 1970. According to USIA records that was the smallest average increase in a decade. Six per cent annual increases had been the rule.

National averages, however, do not indicated the wide variations in farm real estate prices. The range, for example, was from an average of \$44 an acre in New Mexico to \$1,094 in New Jersey. Corn Belt land averaged \$363 an acre.

Increases in individual states also ranged widely, from 1 per cent or

less during the year in Arkansas, California, Washington, Montana and Illinois to between 8 and 12 per cent in the Southeast.

Average land values declined last year in Kansas and Arizona, each down 3 per cent.

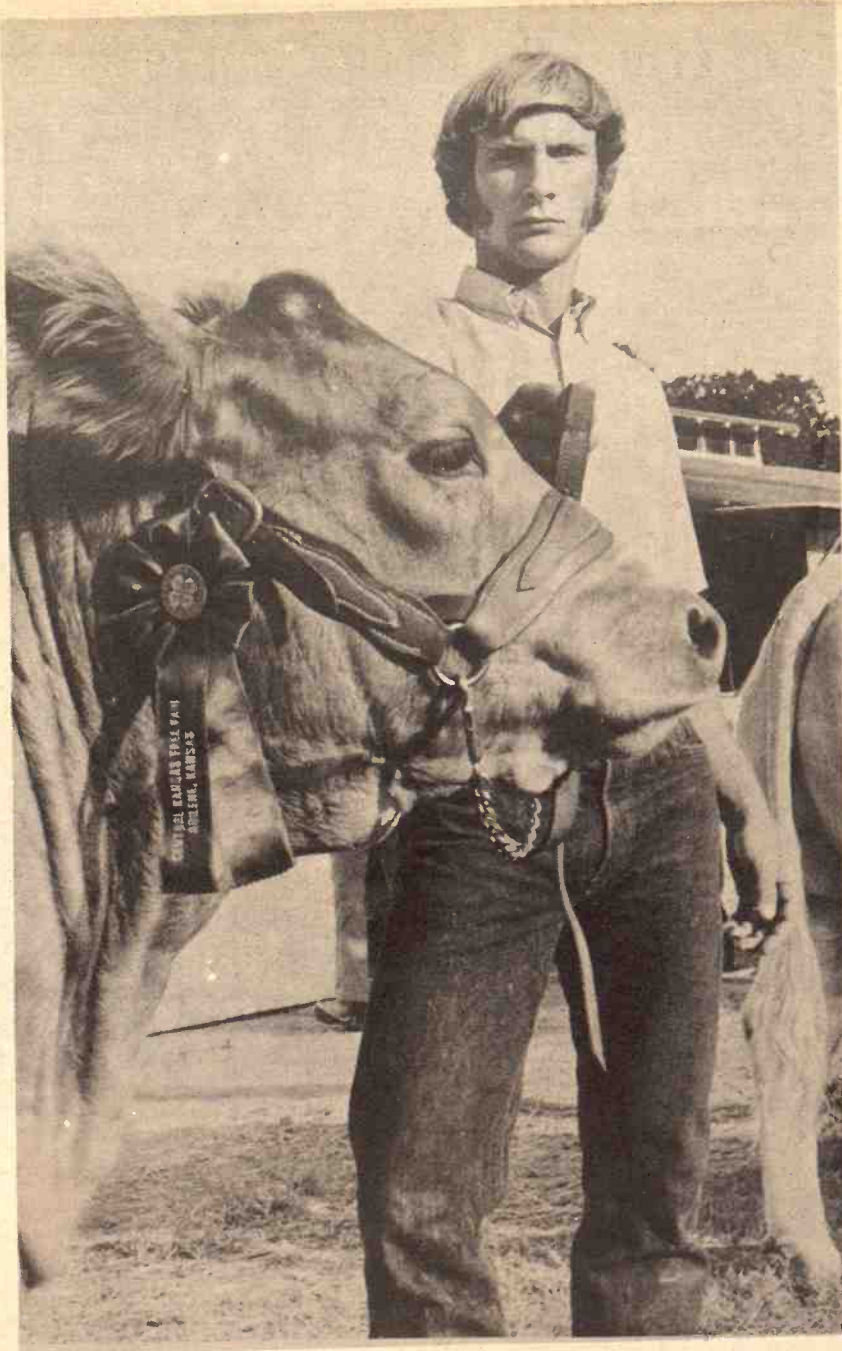

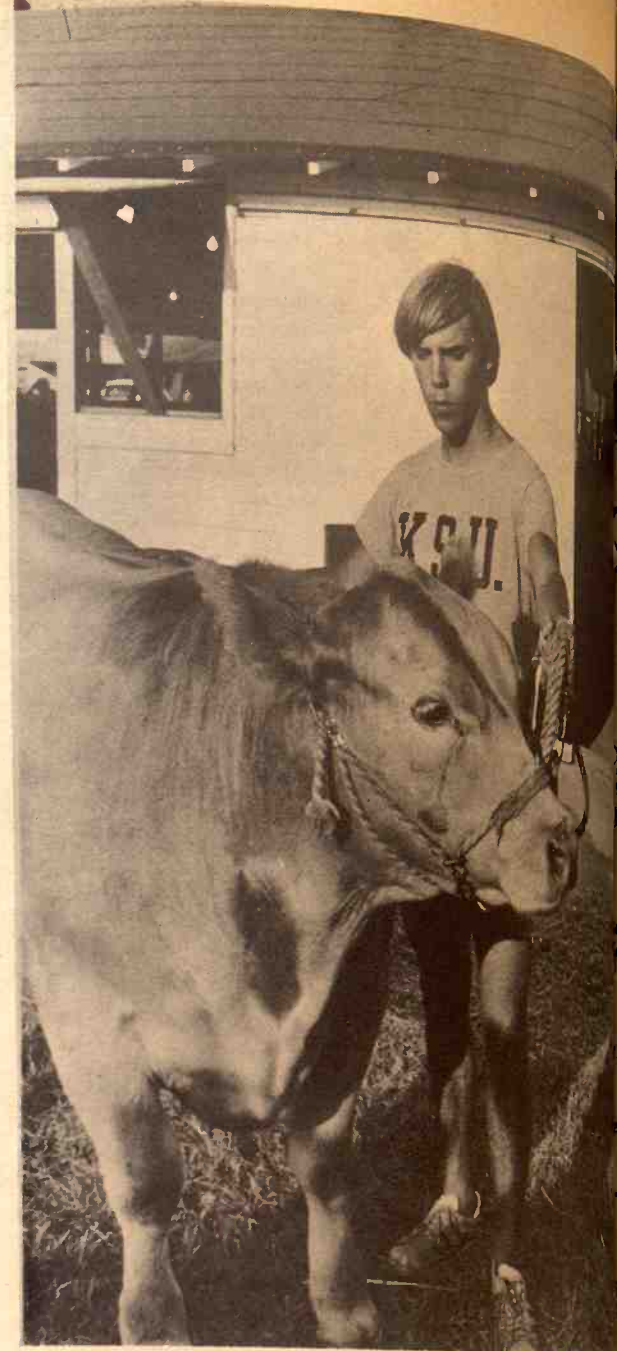

August 31 Date For Fall Forage Day At KSU

The annual Fall Forage Field Day at Kansas State University, Tuesday, August 31, will be a combination of professors showing and telling and farmers seeing and hearing all about the newest research developments in Kansas forage production.

The field day begins at 9:30 a.m. and concludes in early afternoon, reports Frank Bieberly, Extension agronomy section leader and coordinator of the event. Tours begin at 10 at the Agronomy Research Farm headquarters just north of the new KSU football stadium at the intersection of Kimball and College avenues.

Research projects to be shown and discussed include: three soybean varieties for Kansas; millet compared to sorghum; and forage sorghums; comparison of 2-dwarf and 3-dwarf sorghums; herbicide-tolerant combined application on corn behavior of anhydrous ammonia soil.

Also, weed control in alfalfa; comparison of alfalfa varieties; deep placement of nitrogen fertilizer; hunger signs in field corn and identification and control of marijuana.

Following lunch, Dr. Elmer E. Anderson, director of the Kansas Agricultural Experiment Station, will talk "Crop Production Technology Move."

A panel of Extension agronomists and agronomy department members answering questions will conclude the day.

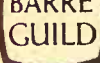

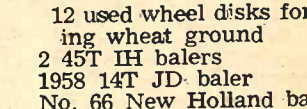

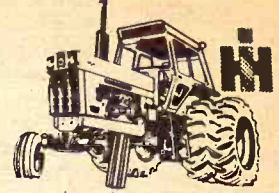

Cull Dairy Heifers After First Lactation

Kansas dairymen frequently must decide whether to give a first lactation heifer a second chance. Keeping a low producer can be a costly decision, reminds Ralph Bonewitz, Extension dairy specialist at Kansas State University.

Bonewitz cites statistics that show a heifer ranking near the bottom of the herd has only one chance in three of ever improving her ranking. She has only one chance in 10 of producing above her herd average in her second lactation. Chances are only one in 7 that she will ever produce above the herd average.

"Research has shown that a heifer can be evaluated quite accurately after her first lactation," Bonewitz says. "If she's a poor producer, there's little chance she'll ever

improve enough to justify keeping her.

"Too often dairymen making this important decision will remember only the few heifers that did improve and forget the many that never made the grade."

Bonewitz suggests that dairymen strive to control disease and reproductive problems in cows and heifers so culling can be done from a milk production basis.

He says dairymen should bring all heifer calves into production so numbers will be large enough that a strict culling program based on production can be used effectively. All heifer calves should be sired by high plus proven bulls that have high potential for improving production, workability, and wearability traits in their heifers.

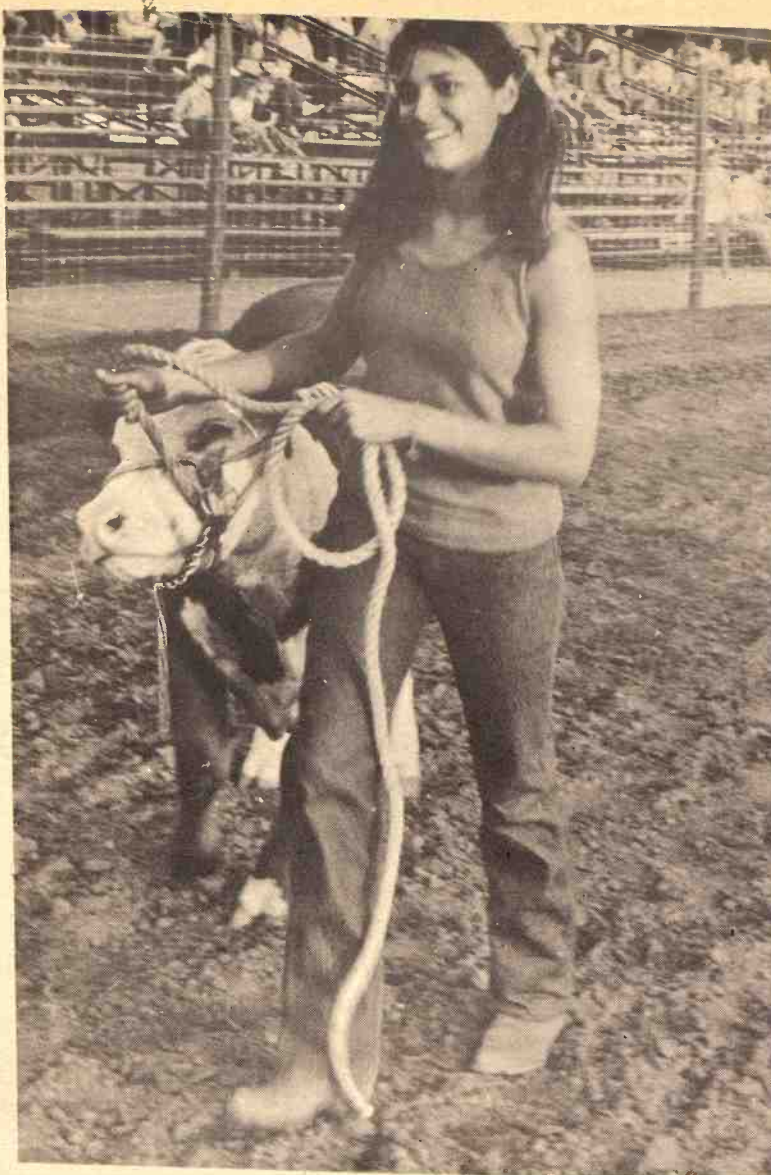

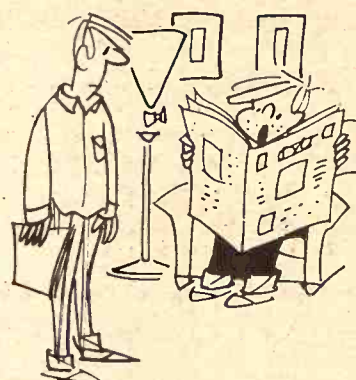

No Easy Ways To Rid Tree Stumps

Interested in removing that old ugly tree stump that's marred your

landscape for years?

Now until late fall is the time to do it. Unfortunately, no miracle chemical is available for dissolving the stump overnight. If the stump is large, removal is neither economical nor painless.

If the ground is being cleared for construction and a bulldozer is handy, such equipment can push out a tall stump easily and quickly. The job is not so easy if the stump is short.

A second machine method is done by equipment that literally chews up a stump. This method can be expensive, so consider it only for large stumps. Tree surgery companies in the larger communities have the equipment.

Another removal method is to bore holes one inch or more in diameter in the stump with a large electric or hand drill, fill the holes with a chemical, plug, and wait two or three months for it to diffuse. After a 10-day dry period, the stump can be burned out by building a fire over it.

One to three weeks will be required for the burn, depending on stump size. Obviously, stumps close to buildings should not be burned out. Don't forget to check on local burning regulations.

Stumps can be removed with dynamite, too. But only an expert should use this method. Here again, be sure there are no buildings in the vicinity. An error in the use of dynamite can lead to expensive trouble. Find out if using dynamite is prohibited in your area.

There is a simple way for a homeowner to take out a stump. Dating back to primitive times, this method requires a mattock, a shovel, and an axe—and some elbow grease.

After considerable digging and chopping—and a couple temper tantrums—you might remove a small stump in one to two hours. Stumps a foot or more in diameter may require up to half a day of digging, cutting, sawing and chopping.

Some larger stumps are used for seats, bases for flower boxes, or in some other way to turn a liability into an asset.

If you plan to build a house in a woodland area, locate it in such a place that you won't have to remove trees. This will solve a lot of problems that often crop up after a house is built.

When To Buy Used Machinery?

Buying second-hand machinery and equipment may be one way to

reduce farm expenses, says an Extension agricultural economist at Kansas State University.

Dr. John Schlender points out that many farmers purchase used machinery after the initial high depreciation has been charged off but while the machine has enough remaining life to keep repair costs down.

Buying used machinery is a common practice among young farmers with limited finances. Generally, machinery that has been traded off early in its life has a considerable amount of use remaining. Machinery of this type is available in most Kansas communities.

There is no particular guide to follow that shows positively when used machinery can be purchased to

reduce equipment costs. A rule of thumb is the machines until about 50% of the satisfactory life. At this point, repairs are the point where it is traded, says Schlender. Before purchasing, however, farmers should consider:

- Condition of the machine
- Cost of the machine compared to new
- Availability of repairs
- Comparison of the used machine and a new

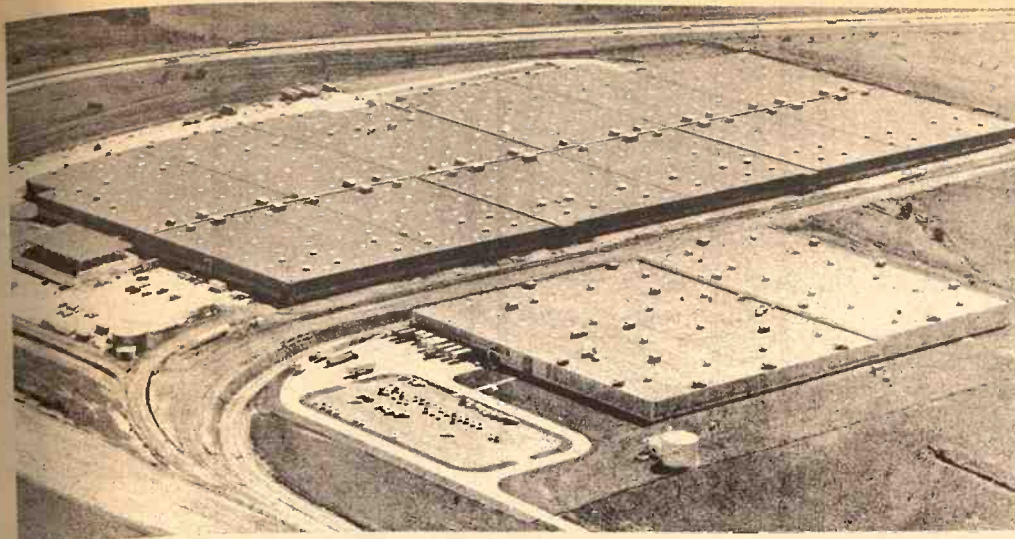

represents reappropriated balances which were estimated for expenditure in fiscal year 1971 but which have been carried forward to the current fiscal year.

The effective increase in the ending balance is thereby reduced to \$3.9 million.

"In addition," Bibb said, "if the state finance council or Legislature were to release any portion of the \$1.5 million in limited reappropriations, the increase in the ending balance would be further reduced to \$2.4 million."

The budget director, in his report to Gov. Robert Docking, said of the total increase of \$6.7 million in the ending balance estimate, \$3.5 million is attributed to underspending by state agencies and \$2.8 million to shifting expenditures from fiscal 1971 to fiscal 1972.

The excess of encumbrances over actual expenditures accounted for the remaining \$400,000. In addition, actual general fund receipts were \$40,319 below the revised estimate.

Bibb also said revenues from agency earnings were \$97,976 below the revised budget estimate. Docking said Tuesday agencies should examine their fee structures to determine if they are high enough

to cover costs.

Generally, agencies contribute 20 per cent of their fees to the state general revenue fund.

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Some Fear That Import Surcharge Will End Up Hurting U.S. Farmer

Early reactions from agriculture to President Nixon's new economic proposals were mixed and by the weekend considerable uncertainty prevailed while clarification on many points was awaited. One official clarification was that

raw agricultural commodities were exempt from the freeze on all prices and wages for 90 days.

The President's proposed cuts in government spending, restoration of investment-tax credits, repeal of the excise tax on automobiles, early

application of income tax cuts previously scheduled for Jan. 1, 1973, and efforts to safeguard the dollar drew praise from most farm leaders.

However, the exemption of raw farm products from the 90-day price freeze, it is believed, will have only a limited advantage, if any, for farmers.

Farm parity, measuring stick of how well farmers are doing in relation to the rest of the economy, is the lowest since the depression in the 1930s. It has been near this low level for many months.

Farmers are more concerned over that portion of the President's new program that deals with foreign markets. Increased farm exports, especially during the 1970-71 crop year, have done much to help prices on the domestic level, especially those on grain and soybeans.

U.S. wheat and flour exports during this period were up 21 per cent from the previous record high set in 1966-67. In dollar terms U.S. feed grain exports rose over \$100 million. Soybean exports have reached a new high of 416 million bushels during the current year. Meat and dairy products also showed export gains.

It is no wonder, then, that imposition of a 10 per cent surcharge on exports is viewed with some concern by farm leaders. One is William J. Kuhfuss, president of the American Farm Bureau Federation, the nation's largest general farm organization.

"There is danger that such action will bring retaliatory measures by our foreign customers and agriculture could be hurt seriously if our export market is curtailed," Kuhfuss said.

"The economic well-being of agriculture is dependent on the continuation of our ability to sell U.S. farm products on the world market. We already are faced with a growth of protectionism in the European Economic Community (The Common Market) through its variable import levy fees.

"The picture is further clouded by

the prospect of the enlargement of the EEC to include Great Britain. "Exports represent a significant part of the total market for our agricultural production; the production from one acre of four is exported. "Imports of items used in farm production also are important to farmers as they may help to reduce farmers' costs which are all-time high. The exemption of raw commodities from the freeze caught some farmers' attention. It has the effect of limiting the market on wheat and soybeans, while posing a freeze on other mill products.

Time To Order To Stock Farm Ponds

"Get 'em in early!"

That's the advice offered farm pond owners regarding application for farm pond fish.

"Farm pond owners who want fish should get their applications in now so they can be processed in time for fall deliveries," said Verl Stevens, hatchery superintendent.

"Now that the Kansas Fish and Game Commission acquired Farlington Hatchery we'll be handling all farm pond stocking in the state. For this reason, we'll be starting fish deliveries in mid-September this year, which is

earlier than in former years."

Ponds and lakes to be stocked must contain at least one quarter surface acre of water and not have an established fish population. Fingerling-size fish are shipped from commission hatcheries in tank trucks during early fall. Applicants whose ponds have been approved for stocking will receive notification by mail several days in advance of the date on which the distribution trip has been scheduled.

This notification will inform the pondowner of the date, time of day and place where he should meet the delivery truck. The applicants will also be advised of the number and kind of containers he should bring for transporting the fish from the hatchery truck to his pond.

August 24, 1971

Application blanks are available from the Commission's Fisheries Division, Box 1028, Pratt, 67124. Pondowners desiring fish should act now.

Largemouth bass, channel catfish, and bluegill are available or stocking in accordance with the size of the impoundment, water clarity and preference of the owner.

TELEGRAM TO LONG-McARTHUR, INC.

Sunday night August 15th, President Nixon announced an 8-point program which included elimination of the 7 percent federal excise tax on cars, effective August 15. As you know, congressional approval is required to repeal the excise tax.

Although Congress will not be recalled and congressional action therefore will be delayed until September, the administration has stated that the excise tax change would be retroactive to August 15.

Based on prior experience, the excise tax reduction would apply to all new and unused 1971 and 1972 models sold by dealers after August 15. The average amount would be about \$200 per car.

Congressional approval of this action cannot, of course, be guaranteed, but you can assure new car buyers who purchase before such approval that they will be reimbursed the amount of the excise tax savings if legislation similar to that enacted in 1965 is

approved. Procedures will be implemented so that people buying new cars prior to congressional approval will be reimbursed by the full amount of the tax cut, just as they were when excise taxes were reduced in 1965.

It is also expected that provision will be made for floor stock refunds of new and unused cars held for sale by dealers on the date of enactment.

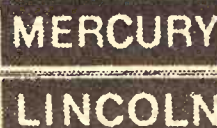

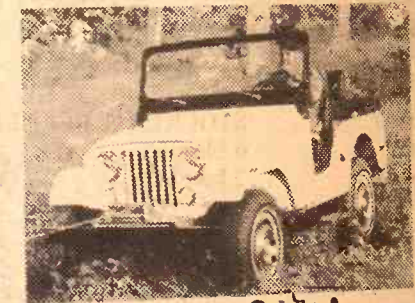

Wheat and Feed Crops May Compete For Rail Cars

Total grain production this year in the United States as indicated in the government's most recent crop report will reach a level that will bring a new challenge to farmers, the trade, and transportation facilities.

Assuming that the crops yet to be gathered will yield approximately in line with the government estimates,

anything that would seriously interfere with either the harvest or movement could bring chaos.

The national production last year was 8.6 billion bushels; the increase estimated for this year is a whopping 1.8 billion bushels.

Of this increase, 791 million bushels or about 44 per cent is destined to come from Nebraska, Iowa, Kansas and Missouri.

Last year, because of cooperation between the "trade" and the railroads, and as a result of reduced crop yields due to corn blight and drought, a severe boxcar shortage was avoided. This summer, because of light crops in Oklahoma and Texas, and because farmers have marketed sparingly, the railroads and trucks were able to handle the wheat harvest. The heaviest of the wheat movement thus far has been to the Gulf and the Western feedlots.

But most of this year's wheat is still "in the country." If and when it moves this fall, it will meet competition from the huge corn, grain sorghums and soybean crops. Ample storage space exists in the Middle West on farms, in country elevators,

and in terminals. In fact, most terminals in the area are embarrassingly empty, one result of diminished government surpluses. Problems may arise when the storage space is not exactly where it is needed at a given time.

If the harvest and the movement of huge grain yields could be accomplished in an orderly process, apparently a "roof" could be found for all the commodities.

But if a box car shortage should develop, this could be an interesting fall for all concerned.

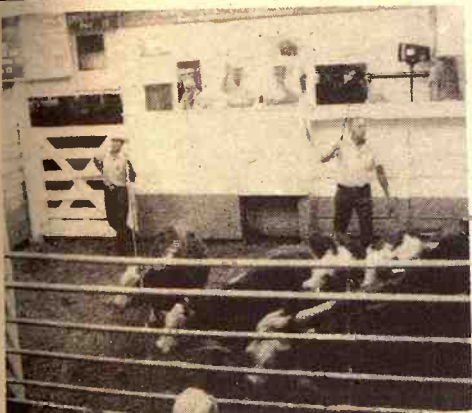
