California Dominates Major Farm Producer List

Kansas didn't come up with any, but Nebraska marked three counties among the top 100 U.S. counties in farm produce sold in 1964, the last year for which the Bureau of Census has complete records. It took over \$35 million in farm product sales to make the top 100 list, and the chart is dominated by California counties, which are several times the size of Kansas counties. The big truck-gardening areas of Fresno, Kern, and Tulare counties led the country. Fresno County, California, had 1964 sales of \$349 million. Kern County's total was \$286 million and Tulare's \$244 million. In fact, eight of the top 10 counties were from California. The other two on the list were Maricopa County, Arizona, similar in size, crops and growing season to the California leaders; and Weld County, Colorado, the big beef county around Greeley. Five more California counties were in the second top 10, with additional entries from Florida, Maine, Washington and Pennsylvania. The Florida counties — Polk and Orange — are, of course, major citrus producers. The Maine county was the big potato producer, Aroostook, of about 10,000 square miles — about 10 times the size of a typical Kansas county. The Washington county, Yakima, is a

major apple producer. The only county on the top 20 list which has Kansas-size acreage and has a limited growing season, is Lancaster County, Pennsylvania, which ranked 18th on \$109 million in sales. On the top 100 list, which required \$37 million to make, California was represented 26 times: Illinois 13; Iowa 12; Florida 6; Texas 5; Arizona, Colorado, Washington, Hawaii, Nebraska, Wisconsin and North Carolina, 3 each; Pennsylvania, Arkansas, Mississippi, Oregon, and Minnesota, 2 each; and Maine, Delaware, Idaho, New York, Connecticut, Virginia and Alabama, one apiece. The three Nebraska counties to make the list were Scottsbluff (potatoes and truck gardening in western Nebraska); Cumming (heavy irrigation around West Point in northeast Nebraska); and Dawson (Lexington and Cozad in the central region). No Kansas county made the list of 100, and from state statistics on production by counties it appeared that the state's major farm producers missed the list by about \$5 million. The last year which the State Department of Agriculture has figures is 1965, and the top producer in the state that year was Reno County which produced some \$29.625 million from crops

and livestock.

Slowdown To Land Value Trend

The upward trend in land values in the Seventh Federal Reserve District has continued through the first quarter of 1967, according to a recent survey of about 350 country bankers, but the rate of advance has materially slowed. The Seventh District is composed of Iowa and parts of Wisconsin, Illinois, Indiana and Michigan. The Chicago Federal Reserve Bank says that although gains in land values continue to be widespread — 12 of the 17 areas reported increases since the beginning of this year — the rates of increase in nearly all of these areas were smaller than reported a year earlier. Overall, the average value of "good" farmland increased about 2 percent during the first quarter and was about 7 percent higher than at this time

last year. In comparison, increases of 4 and 10 per cent, respectively, were reported for the similar periods last year. Further evidence of a slowing in the upward advance of land values was indicated by bankers' expectations of the future trend in land prices. While the majority of the bankers responding to the April survey still view the current trend in land values as an upward one, an increasing proportion of them expect land values to stabilize in the months ahead. According to the survey, farmers continued to be the largest buyers of farm land. About four-fifths of the farms sold in the five states during the past 12 months were purchased by either owner operators adding to their present holdings or by tenant operators desiring to become owners.

Freezes Sure To Take Another Wheat Bite

How much have late freezes hurt the Kansas wheat crop? Guess 20 million bushels have been cut from the April 1 crop estimate, says Tom Roberts, head of the Kansas Wheat Improvement Association, after a late April tour with 10 other experts who covered some 4500 miles in three cars. There have been some freezes since the statewide inspection, so it's possible the crop has been reduced even more.

"But, of course, we always kill this wheat crop at least three times before we get it in the bin," says Roberts. If the 20-million bushel decline is accurate, that would predict a 168-million bushel crop. The 168 million bushel anticipated production would be far below the 300 million bushels hoped for by the Department of Agriculture on expanded acreage and well below the 10-year average of around 225 million bushels.

"We have raised as much as 300 million bushels," Roberts said, "but the recent average under production controls has been around 220 to 225 million bushels. Many farmers, particularly south and west of Great Bend, have surrendered the crop and are pasturing cattle on the wheat. In fact, we saw more of this than any of us could remember seeing before."

The estimate from the Kansas Crop Reporting Service as of April 1 was 197 million bushels. But drought, freeze and insect

damage has occurred since. "We started with an estimate of 250 million bushels," said Roberts, "and we've been subtracting ever since. Between December and April the reporting service subtracted 57 million bushels." A discouraging report of wheat prospects has also been made by the Santa Fe Railway agricultural department. "Assuming normal production on the irrigated acreage and some recovery of the non-irrigated acreage from moisture already received," the report read, "it will require very favorable conditions during the remainder of the growing season for the five states of Kansas, Oklahoma, Texas, Colorado, and New Mexico to produce much more than three-fourths of the 418.5 million bushels produced in 1966. "A crop of this size would be the poorest produced in these states since 1957."

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Deadline To Certify Seed Is May 15

May 15 is the deadline to apply for certification of barley, oats, rye, wheat, sweet clover, and smooth brome grass with the Kansas Crop Improvement Association. Applications are due in Manhattan on that date.

Inspection of fields will start in late-May or early-June, Howard Wilkins, Extension crops and soils specialist and secretary of KCIA reports.

Application materials are available at county Extension offices or from KCIA, Kansas State University, Manhattan 66502. The tag and seal from the seed planted or a bulk sale card must accompany the application as proof of the seed source. Those who use their own seed should indicate it on the form, Wilkins explains. If seed from other states is used it must be eligible for certification in that state.

Crops that qualify for certification must be isolated from other crops to insure purity of seed, must be free of noxious

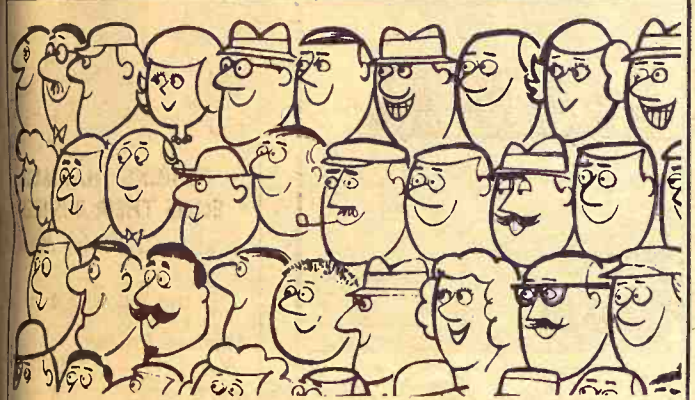

Ft. Riley Hears Soldiers Coming

An Army town without soldiers, Junction City has hopes that it will soon fill up again with soldiers from Fort Riley.

Talk around town last week appeared to have some basis that the transfer of 35,000 military men from Germany will find many of them making their way to Fort Riley.

Army officials would not say in direct words that some of the troops were headed for Fort Riley but Brig. Gen. John A. Seitz, commanding general at Fort Riley, has reportedly told Chamber of Commerce officials that Junction City will be called upon to help find housing for military personnel. School officials have also been told to expect full enrollment next fall.

The schools, under local jurisdiction, which includes those at the military post, reached record enrollment of 7174 last fall just before the 9th Infantry Division was shipped to Vietnam. After the 9th cleared Fort Riley, school enrollment dropped to 5500.

Without official confirmation, one report said 17,000 men would be assigned to Fort Riley by July 1.

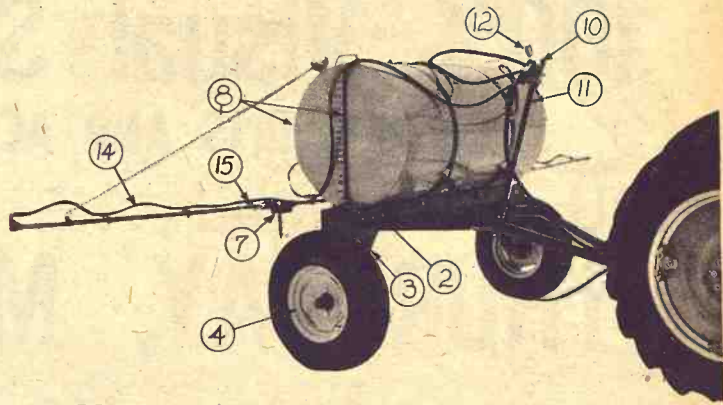
There has been speculation since January that elements of the 24th Infantry Division in West Germany would come to Ft. Riley. Army authorities had denied the report.

Front view of feeder, showing mechanism and obstruction-free mineral tub.

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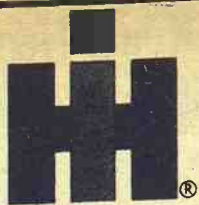
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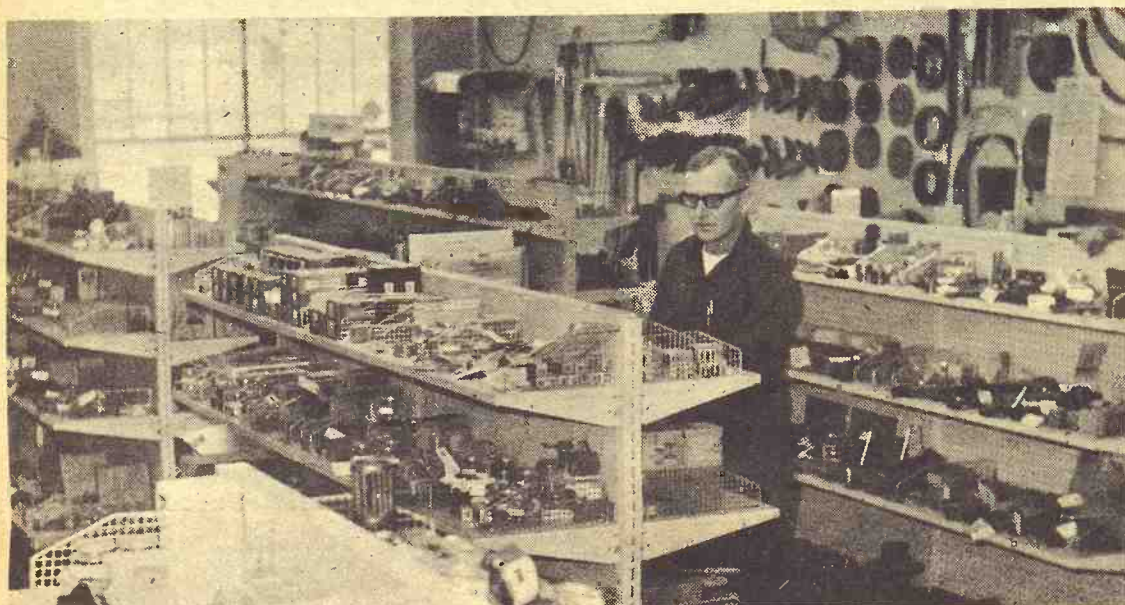

A livestock auction at Norfolk, Nebr., continues to be the U.S.' largest livestock auction market.

The Norfolk Livestock Sales Co. had sales of \$68 million in 1966, selling 246,000 head of cattle; 350,000 hogs; 14,000 sheep; and 2300 horses.

The McKinley-Winter Livestock Commission Co., of Dodge City, Ks., had the largest cattle volume, selling \$57.7 million worth on 351,000 cattle auctioned.

The Amarillo, Texas, Livestock Auction Co. sold slightly more cattle — some 371,000 head — but grossed less money at \$50 million.

The largest seller of sheep and goats was the Producers Livestock Auction at San Angelo, Texas, which sold 672,000 head, besides marketing 136,000

cattle, for a total volume of \$30 million.

The Missouri Livestock Market Center of Mexico, Mo., had the largest rate of increase, grossing \$30 million in 1966 and starting a 5-day-a-week hog auction which turned 211,000 hogs thru the ring.

The Certified Livestock Markets Association reported that there were 10 other association firms which grossed \$20 million or more.

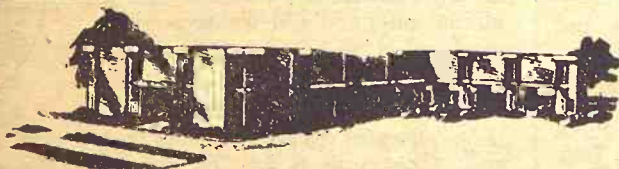

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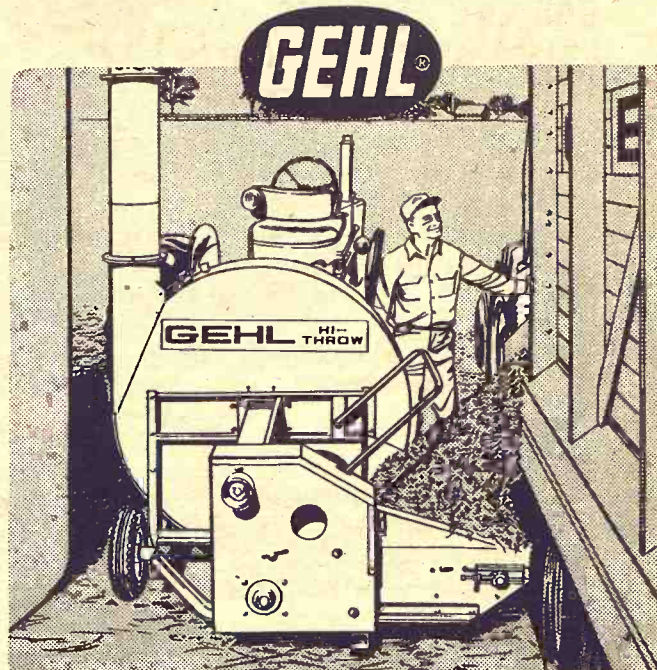

FRENCH DRESSING

- 1/2 cup vinegar
- 1/2 can tomato soup
- 1 cup salad oil
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 1/4 teaspoon paprika
- 1/4 teaspoon cloves
- 2 teaspoons Worcestershire sauce
- 1 medium onion, chopped
- 1/2 green pepper, chopped

Mix the above in a blender, or with a mixer, and store in the refrigerator overnight. Then strain the onion and pepper pieces out and store, covered, in the refrigerator. Makes about 1 1/2 pints.

RHUBARB MERINGUE PIE

- 2 egg yolks
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 1 tablespoon flour
- 1/4 cup water
- 1 cup rhubarb, cut into small pieces

Beat the egg yolks with 1/2 cup sugar, 1 tablespoon flour and 1/4 cup water. Mix with 1 cup rhubarb. Place in an unbaked pie shell and bake in a moderate oven until the filling is well set. Beat the egg whites until stiff. Add 2 tablespoons sugar. Heap roughly over the pie. Return to oven to brown the meringue.

The next recipe was sent by Mrs. Charles J. Heitschmidt, Holyrood:

STUFFED GREEN PEPPERS

- 4 green peppers
- 2 teaspoons minced onion
- 1 cup cooked rice
- 1/4 or 1 teaspoon curry powder
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/4 teaspoon paprika
- 1/2 pound ground beef

Cut off stem end of pepper and remove the seeds and veins. Rub the inside of the pepper with butter or bacon drippings. Stuff with the following: Cook onion in fat. Add ground beef and cook until light colored. Add rice and seasonings. Pack into peppers. Arrange in baking dish. Bake in a moderate oven, 350 degrees, 25 to 35 minutes if raw meat is used in stuffing. If cooked meat is used the peppers may be par-boiled before they are stuffed and the baking time reduced.

Lawn Spreader Necessary Tool To Protect Turf

A lawn spreader is an indispensable tool for today's lawn. With it, you can literally "roll on" a lush, green turf.

Fertilizers and weed killers in granular form are easily applied with a spreader merely by rolling it over the lawn. With today's modern insecticides even the two major lawn insects, chinch bug and sod webworm, can be "rolled" away by application with the same spreader used for plant food and other garden chemicals.

Chinch bugs may infest lawns from spring right through frost. They are tiny culprits, difficult to see with the naked eye. But the damage is easily noted as brown, dead areas in the lawn.

Feeding mostly at night, the sod webworm causes irregular brown, dry spots in the turf. During the day, the little caterpillars hide in the grass at soil level.

To control these two major lawn pests, the proper insecticide should be applied regularly. Consistent application on a schedule of every two weeks or so will control the pests before they have a chance to increase their population and ruin the lawn. When it is possible to see chinch bug and sod webworm damage, it is sometimes too late.

When spreading the insecticide, you also receive a bonus in that other insects will be controlled. These include lawn-damaging insects such as cutworm, army-worm and billbug. There are also nuisance pests that the all-purpose granular insecticide will control — brown dog ticks,

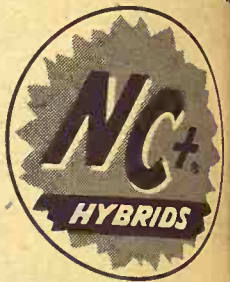
chiggers and fleas. These are bothersome to both humans and pets.

With a little care a lawn spreader will give years of service. Be sure to empty each use.

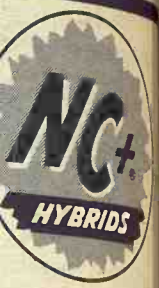

What Ever Happened To Redi-Wheat?

What ever happened to Redi-Wheat, the canned wheat paste that the Kansas Wheat Commission hoped might substitute for potatoes and rice as a table staple?

"We still get some letters asking where Redi-Wheat can be bought," says Jerry Fowler, administrator of the Kansas Wheat Commission. But the stuff hasn't been produced for several years, lasting only a few months in the 1961 experi-

ment.

Since the project was abandoned, a cooked and cracked wheat product of the bulgur variety has been developed. It is being manufactured now in several grades for export and domestic consumption. In Kansas, the product is known as Treat-o-Wheat.

Redi-Wheat's market test was mostly in Kansas, and Fowler thinks the stuff might have done better elsewhere. Kansans

were perhaps too familiar with the price of wheat, which was low compared to the Redi-Wheat price, but they were not used to high wheat diets.

Some of the current requests come from Armenians and Lebanese living in the East or California. These people, Fowler says, have always had a lot of wheat in their diets.

Redi-Wheat was cooked and swollen until it was malleable to

tooth or gum. Some people like the stuff for breakfast, like rolled oats. But apparently many people who tried it didn't like it for breakfast. Or lunch or dinner for that matter.

The Wheat Commission itself put \$25,000 into the Redi-Wheat project. There were other expenditures by government agencies and private investment as well.

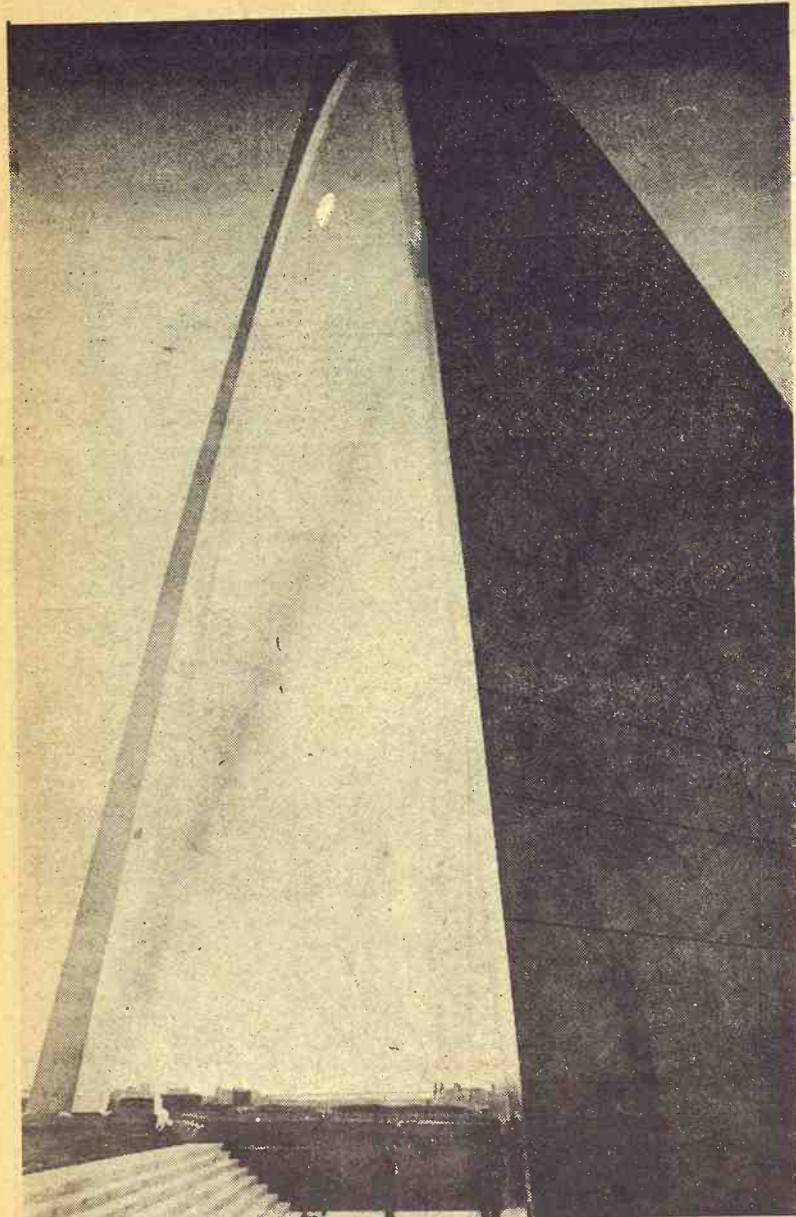

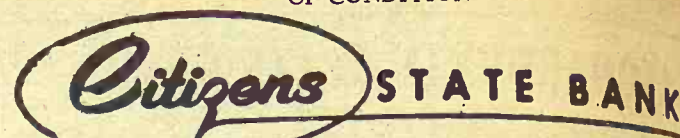

Kansas Wool Output Off Norm

Kansas sheepmen got about 3½ million pounds of wool off their animals in 1966, worth slightly more than \$1.5 million — both figures off about one-fourth from the norm of the 1960s.

The actual figures, from the Kansas Reporting Service, were 3.598 million pounds of wool, valued at \$1.547 million.

The figures were slightly better than in 1965, however, when the clip brought in only \$1.445 million. Prices averaged 43 cents a pound in 1966 compared to a 41-cent average in 1965.

Fleece weights averaged 8.4 pounds, up slightly from '65 and the best in 10 years.

Nationally, wool production was 218 million pounds, about 8.49 pounds per fleece, with prices over the U.S. averaging 52 cents.

More Slings At Heavy Smoking

The Public Health Service is continuing to mount evidence that heavy cigarette smoking is harmful to health.

Last week Surgeon General William Stewart released a study which reported 33 percent more chronic health conditions and lost work days for heavy

smokers over nonsmokers.

The study, based on 42,000 interviews, showed 72 percent of the men who smoked two or more packages of cigarettes daily had one or more chronic conditions. Only 35 percent of the nonsmokers reported similar conditions.

The situation was similar

with women, with both heavy smokers and nonsmokers reporting more complaints than men, but in about the same relative proportion — 57 percent to 85 percent.

The Tobacco Institute, an organization of major tobacco firms, declared the report might be misleading.

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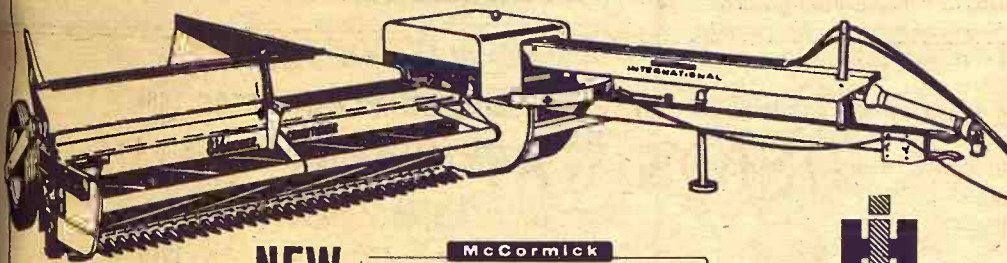
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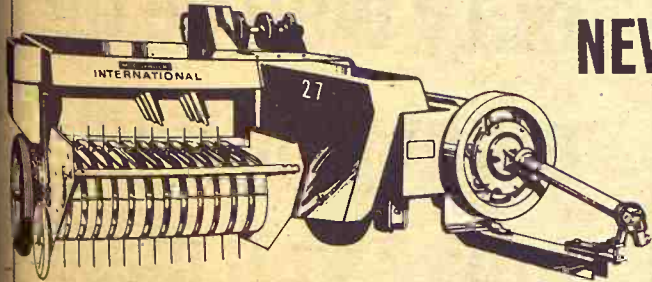


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See Wheat Harvest 10 Days Early

Grain tradesmen are predicting the 1967 Kansas wheat harvest may well be over by July 4.

Usually the July 4th holiday marks the heaviest runs of wheat, but it appears now that the harvest will be about 10 days early this year. This prediction assumes warm weather from now on and dry weather for harvest.

Obviously, a rainy period when the wheat is ripe could prolong the harvest.

A large part of the wheat country still is relatively dry, altho April rains saved the '67 from disaster.

This won't be the worst crop the hard winter wheat area has had so far, but seldom have farmers been on edge so much of the time. From December 1 on, crop analysts said the crop would have to have rain soon or would be lost. Moisture didn't come, but as long as it lay dormant there was a possibility it

could be revived with moisture.

When rains arrived, prospects brightened in a hurry. Some wheat was dead, but not all by any means.

Then came the recent freezes. Again, no one could tell for sure how much damage was done, if any. Once more there was a period of worrisome waiting.

Wheat combining has started in South Texas, between San Antonio and Corpus Christi. The start there was the earliest on record.

Grain tradesmen now see the harvest to Hollister, Okla., in the southwestern corner of the state, by May 15 and to Blackwell, in the northern part, by May 25.

By June 10, cutting should start in southern Kansas. In fact, some are saying wheat will be ripe as far north as Indiana by June 10 and in Northwest Kansas by June 20.

A stretch of cool, wet weather could alter the timing on all these predictions.

Kansas Gets Break In Sales Tax Agreement

An agreement between Kansas and Missouri for a reciprocal collection of sales taxes should give Kansas most of the advantage.

Revenue department officials figure that perhaps \$1.3 million will be collected and that Kansas will get at least \$750,000 and perhaps \$1 million of it.

As important as the revenue increase is the precedent the agreement sets is more significant, says James T. McDonald, Kansas director of revenue.

The new Kansas director said he has contacted Nebraska revenue officials who say they are interested in such a reciprocal agreement.

"I haven't been able to contact the people in Oklahoma yet to see if they also would be interested," McDonald said.

The revenue director added there is little need to try for an agreement with Colorado, which has a quirk in its sales tax law which would seem to prohibit this type of agreement.

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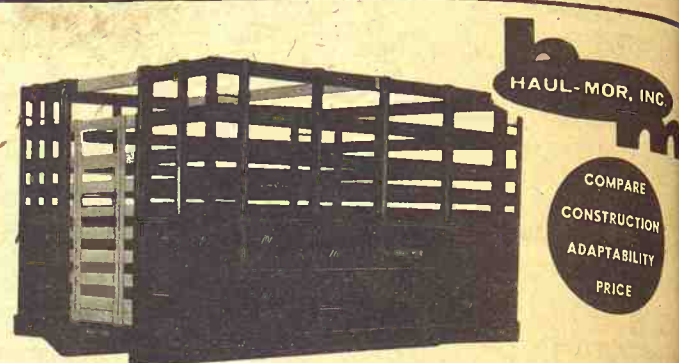

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Florida Grassland In Long Drouth

Florida, a Johnny-come-lately into the cattle business, is having its first experience with a major grassland drouth. Cattle-men say some cattle are starving to death.

Cows that survive the lack of feed are going to market 50 pounds skinnier than usual, according to the Florida agriculture commissioner, Doyle Conner.

Arthur Higbie Jr., vice president of the cattlemen's association, called it a "disaster" for ranchers.

"The calf crop is in deep trouble as a result of the burned grasslands since they can't eat anything else," he said.

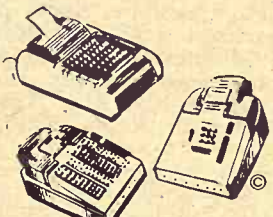

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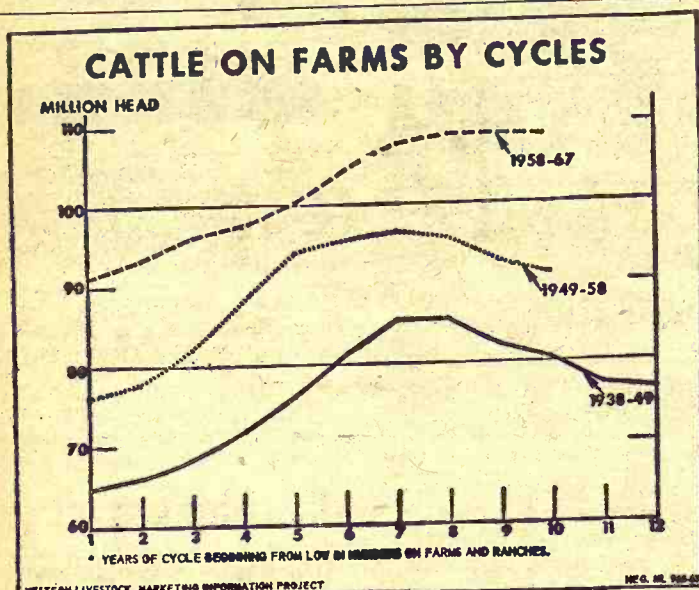

In Feedlots Heavier Cattle

There is always important news for cattle feeders in the USDA reports of Cattle on

Feed. The latest report, issued on April 18, covered 32 major cattle feeding states.

The report showed that feedlots were crowded with heavy cattle on April 1. But except for these heavy cattle, the number on feed was just about the same as a year earlier.

The total number of cattle on feed was listed at 10,496,000 — 3 percent more than last year. Steers on feed made up 71 percent of the total this year, compared with only 69 percent a year before.

Steers totaled 7,492,000 — 5 percent more than a year earlier. Heifers on feed totaled 2,962,000 — a 4 percent decline from last year. Now let's check the numbers in different weight groups, beginning with the heaviest. As a basis of comparison, figure that farmers will be marketing around 400,000 fed cattle each week.

The heaviest groups are steers weighing over 1100 pounds and heifers that weigh over 900. These groups totaled 806,000 — 36 percent more than last year. Most of these heavy cattle have been marketed by mid-May. But by that time, many of the lighter cattle will have moved up into the heavy-weight groups.

The second-heaviest weight groups were 900 to 1100 pound steers and 700 to 900 pound heifers. These groups totaled 2,979,000 — only 1 percent more than last year. Most of these cattle will be sold before the end of May.

The middle-weight groups — 700 to 900 pound steers plus 500 to 700 pound heifers — were estimated at 3,750,000 — the same number as a year before. Most of these cattle will be sold in June and July; some of them won't get to market until August or later.

The number of lightweights — 500 to 700-pound steers and heifers weighing under 500 pounds — was 2,551,000 — just 2 percent more than last year. Marketings of these cattle will be spread over a long period — mainly in August, September, and October.

Steer calves — under 500 pounds — on feed numbered 386,000 — down 6 percent from last spring.

Judging from the above figures, the market receipts of fed cattle may continue to be above last year's levels for a few weeks. But receipts during the summer may be just about the same as in 1966.

Marketings of other cattle may not be much different from last spring and summer. Much of the central and southern Great Plains (that had been dry) got good rains around the middle of April. These rains have improved the pasture and range situation and the outlook.

Supplies of pork are expected to be a little larger than last year — up maybe 5 or 6 percent. Supplies of broilers are also expected to be up 5 or 6 percent — maybe more.

The strength of consumer demand is quite uncertain. Employment and consumer demand are at record levels, but there have been some layoffs. Furthermore, strikes and threats of strikes interfere with the distribution of livestock and meat. The result is that consumers are unusually cautious about spending their money.

Just about every price-making factor in the cattle market seems to be unfavorable at this time. If and when one or more of them becomes favorable, cattle prices could move up \$2 or \$3 over a period of 60 to 90 days.

Farm Bureau To Ignore More USDA Invitations

The Secretary of Agriculture Orville Freeman has any more "fact-finding" meetings in Kansas, don't look for any Farm Bureau officials there. Ray Frisbie, president of the KFB, said his organization

wouldn't take part in any more such meetings.

Frisbie said the state Farm Bureau has declined to send any representatives to three future meetings ordered by Freeman to be held by the Agricultural

Stabilization and Conservation Committee.

The ASCS was instructed to hold the meetings as a follow-up to the recent meeting in Hutchinson in order to "obtain comments and suggestions from agricultural leaders and farmers on agricultural programs and problems."

Frisbie said the Hutchinson meeting had been used for an entirely different purpose than was originally intended.

"The Kansas Farm Bureau feels that it is inappropriate, improper and a clear violation of our constitutional system of government to promote meetings such as this for the sole purpose of promoting programs or legislation," he stated.

"Farmers will speak for themselves through their own organizations. They do not recognize people who are hired to administer programs as proper spokesmen for farmers, and they do not recognize county ASC committees as their spokesmen."

People serving on these committees are recognized by farmers as hired employees of the secretary of agriculture. At the governmental level, the prerogative of determining public opinion and of making basic policy decisions belongs to the legislative branch — the Congress.

"Our membership has spoken many times on this subject of 'who shall speak for the farmer?' and they are real conscious of the fact that when policy is made by the same people that administer it, we no longer have a democracy."

Oil Still Major In State's Taxation Tables

The Kansas oil industry may not be the industrial giant it once was in this state, but it still is a potent factor in the economy.

In fact, in at least seven counties oil and gas dominates the economy, paying around 40 percent of all property taxes in the county.

The counties — all in western Kansas — are Ellis, Graham, Morton, Rooks, Russell, Stafford and Stevens.

The industry pays more than 20 percent of all property taxes in several other counties — Barton, Grant, Kearney, Kingman, Rice and Trego.

Across the entire state, the industry pays close to 5 percent of all property taxes. The figures are from the Kansas Independent Oil and Gas Association, an organization with an obvious propaganda task. The figures, however, are authentic.

In all of Kansas, the KIOGA figures show, local property taxes amounted to some \$372 million and oil and gas property

paid some \$17 million of them. KIOGA noted in its release of tax figures that oil and gas taxation went up \$2 million although the valuation of petroleum properties actually decreased by \$33.4 million.

Only 18 counties in the state had no oil and gas taxable production: Atchison, Cherokee, Cheyenne, Doniphan, Gray, Jefferson, Jewell, Logan, Mitchell, Osage, Ottawa, Pottawatomie, Republic, Shawnee, Smith, Thomas, Wallace and Wyandotte. In 20 other counties the oil and gas tax amounted to less than one-half of one percent of the total county tax.

Most of the heavy tax contributions were in western Kansas which has major oil production in many counties with small populations and comparatively small county budgets.

The highest percentage east of US 81 was in Greenwood County, in which 17 percent of all taxes were contributed by petroleum taxation.

The figures were next highest in Chautauqua, Butler, McPherson and Marion counties.

More Permits, Area For Coming Deer Season

Two additional areas, an increase of 450 firearms permits and a new starting date for the

firearms season await Kansas deer hunters for 1967.

The Fish and Game Commission has set the third annual firearms season for December 8-12. This calls for a Friday opening date, compared with a Saturday opening the last two years.

"The Friday opening on the firearms season will give us the effect of a 3-day weekend," said Dave Coleman, Pratt, chief of the Commission's game division, "and should increase the deer harvest." He explained that a "slow" hunting period has been experienced on Monday and Tuesday in each of the last two seasons. "This way," he said, "Monday should be the only slow day, since several areas will allow the taking of any deer on Tuesday, the last day."

The annual archery season, as in previous years, will precede the firearms season. This year, it will extend for 57 days, from October 1 thru November 26, and hunting will be allowed statewide, with the number of permits to be unlimited.

Applications for permits for both archery and firearms hunting will be accepted by the Commission if postmarked earlier than July 17 or after September 1.

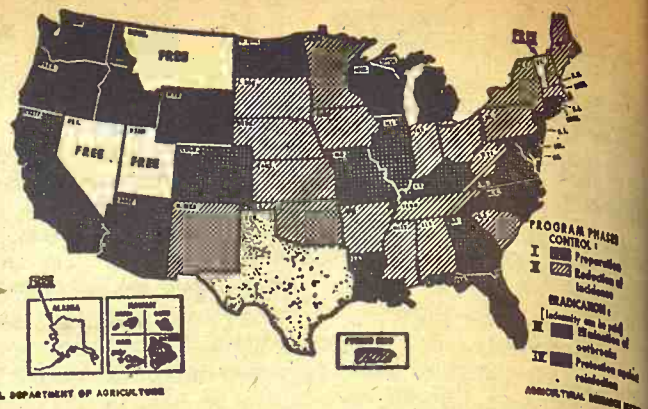
Firearms permits, as last year, will be allotted on a first come, first served basis, with the applicant to list a first, second and third choice of hunting areas. Twenty percent of the permits in each area will be issued to landowners and farm tenants at \$5 each, while the other 80 percent will go to Kansas residents at \$10 each. No permits will be issued to out-of-state residents.

Firearms permits will be increased by 450 over last year, to a total of 6450 for the year.

Two new areas, the Pawnee and Middle Arkansas units, situated in the Great Bend and Hutchinson areas, account for 200 of the new permits (100 each). Several others are being raised slightly over last year, while some are being lowered in areas which experienced heavy kills. Several units have also been increased in area (square miles) this year.

In addition to the new units, the former Missouri River management unit has been divided for 1967 hunting. The eastern portion of the unit, to retain the Missouri River name, will have 200 permits, and the western section, to be called the Delaware unit, will have 400 permits.

Other units and the number of permits to be available on each include: Smoky Hill 200; Kanopolis 150; Kaw 850; Marais des Cygnes 300; Neosho 350; Lower Arkansas 150; Solomon 400; High Plains 400; Kirwin-Webster 750; Republican 700; Tuttle Creek 800; and Chautauqua Hills 600.

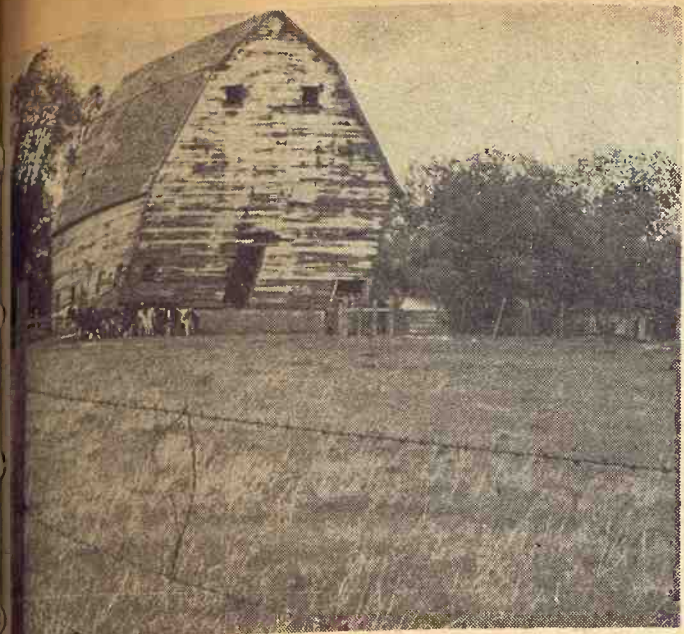

Fertilizer Use Depends On Higher Yields

Fertilizer usage in Kansas has quadrupled during the last 10 years. About 200,000 tons were applied to Kansas farms in 1966, reports Dr. Donald H. Sander, Extension agronomist at Kansas State University. By 1966, the total was 850,000 tons. Nitrogen usage increased

from 31,000 to 254,000 tons, phosphate increased from 41,000 to 114,000 tons, and potash increased from 5,000 to 18,000 tons. Fertilizer use increased 30 percent from 1965 to 1966.

Can this phenomenal increase in fertilizer use continue?

In 1966, the average yields of wheat, grain sorghum, and corn was 24, 45, and 60 bushels per acre, respectively. These three crops removed about 269 thousand tons of nitrogen, 109 thousand tons of phosphate (P_2O_5), and 58 thousand tons of potash

(K_2O).

So, Kansas farmers applied about 16 thousand tons less nitrogen than removed, 5 thousand tons more P_2O_5 than removed, and 40 thousand tons less K_2O than removed.

This means that Kansas cannot use much more fertilizer unless yields are increased, Sander points out. Increased fertilizer use will create some demand by increasing average yields. But the greatest yield increases will come from improving overall management.

What kind of yield potential does Kansas have?

"It seems possible that in 25 years we could average 40 to 50 bushels of wheat, 120 to 140 bushels of corn, and 79 to 90 bushels of grain sorghum," says Sander.

Before wheat yields can increase greatly, new hybrids will have to be developed that have high yield potential under high fertilization. Present hybrids and technology are available to produce high yields of corn and sorghum.

However, Kansas yield potential is dependent on water supply. So new methods of water conservation and utilization may be required.

Increasing pressure for food production, increased research, and improved management are keys to future fertilizer use in Kansas.

By doubling present yields and by planting more cropland acres because of declining government reserve programs, Kansas could use about 700 tons of nitrogen, 280 tons of P_2O_5 , and perhaps 150 tons of K_2O by 1980 or 1990.

Personal Income On The Rise

Personal income in the U.S. in 1966 rose 7 percent, with average per capita personal income at \$2940.

Kansas and its neighboring states were slightly below average, Kansas averaging \$2814 per capita, Missouri \$2845, Nebraska \$2819, Oklahoma \$2456, and Colorado \$2872.

Highest average in the country was in the District of Columbia which averaged \$3960 per person. Connecticut at \$3678 average, Delaware \$3563, Illinois \$3511, New York \$3480, California \$3449 and New Jersey \$3414.

At the low end of the scale was Mississippi with a \$1751 average.

Consumer prices were up 3 percent for the year, lowering the net gain of the 7 percent income increase.

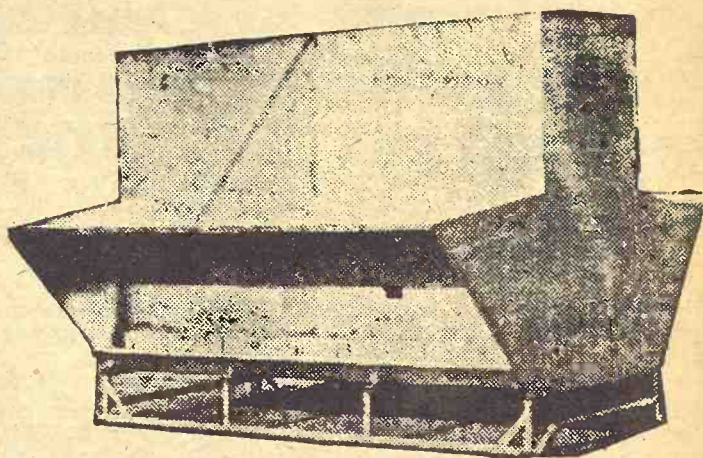

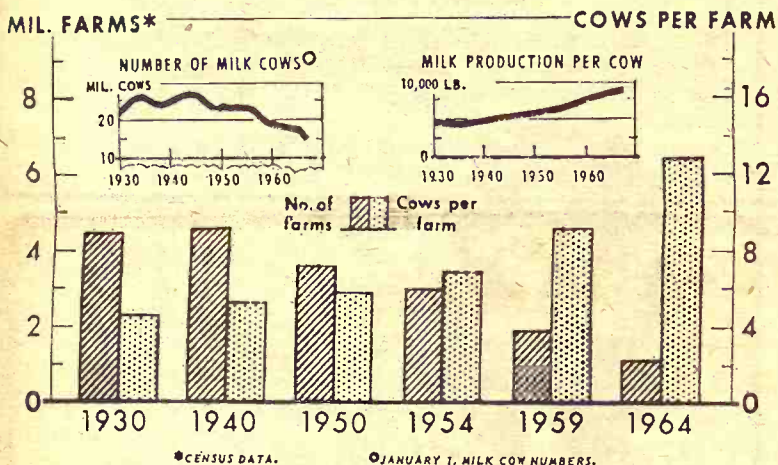
