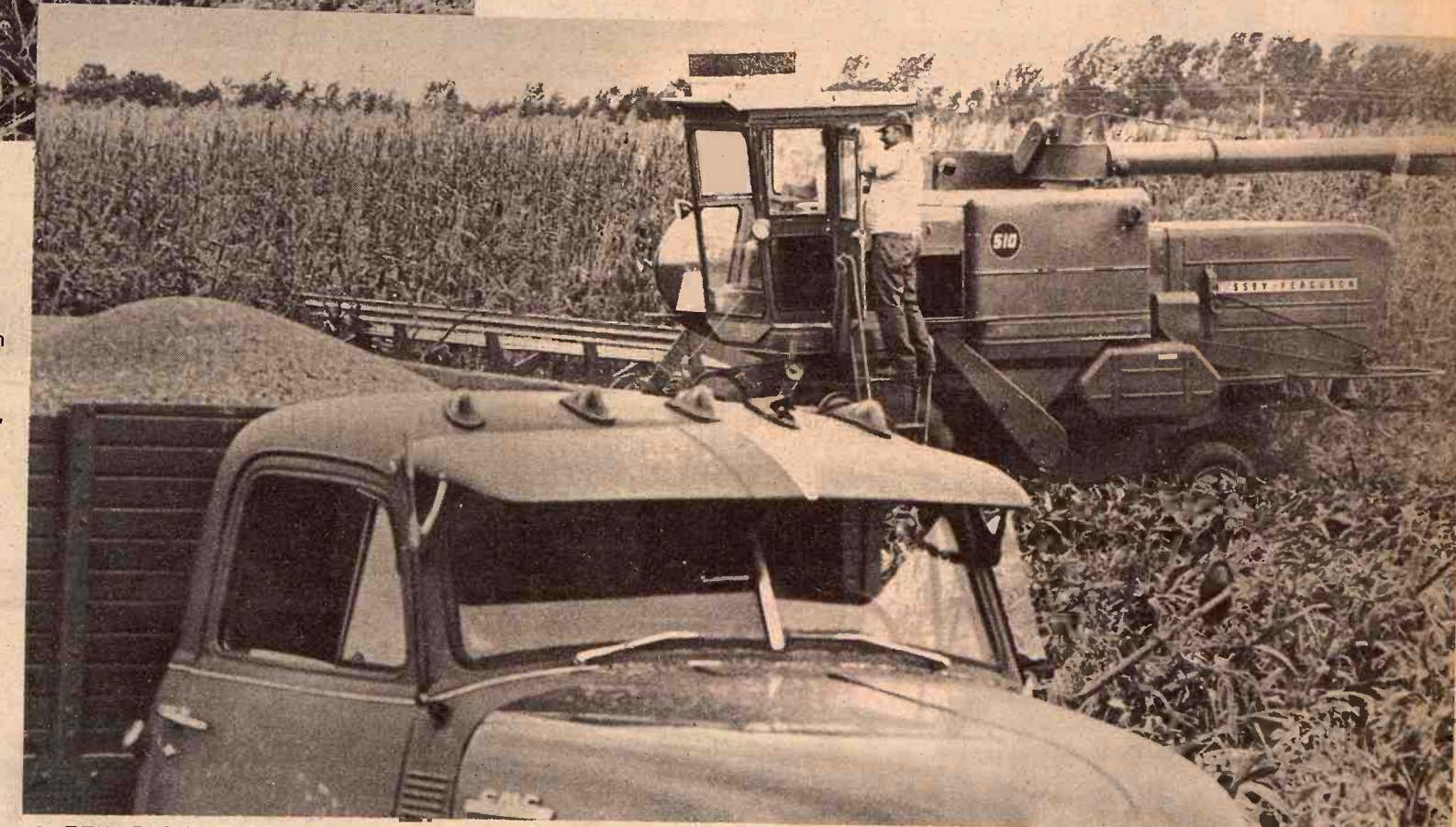

Butz Says Further Business In Moscow Endangered By McGovern 'Innuendoes'

Agriculture Secretary Earl L. Butz told Congress big U.S. grain sales to the Soviet Union have helped everyone. But if Sen. George McGovern persists in "innuendoes, misstatements, falsehoods and haranguing," further business in Moscow will be endangered, Butz added.

Further, Butz said at a House subcommittee hearing, there is no truth to accusations by McGovern that he and other administration officials failed to pass along promptly to the public information on the Soviet transactions.

Meanwhile, Rep. Benjamin Rosenthal, D-N.Y., announced he

will ask Government Accounting Office investigators to make "a more comprehensive search" for campaign contributions to the Republicans by big grain companies.

"Powerful grain traders reaped a harvest of profit from early inside information" on the U.S.-Soviet grain dealings, Rosenthal said.

Butz discounted such accusations as "wild, unsubstantiated and inaccurate" attempts to make a political circus out of what he called a historic event.

Butz's comments were at the opening of a hearing called by Rep. Graham Purcell, D-Tex. to look into the government's role in the grain sales to the Soviet Union. Those are expected to be worth about \$1 billion and to include 400 million bushels of U.S. wheat.

"The partisan attacks on this historic sale to Russia, and the poor judgement displayed, are jeopardizing the present and future sale of American farm products, and all commercial products, to the Soviet Union," Butz said.

The subcommittee called for Charles Pence of the Agriculture Department's export marketing service to testify regarding questions raised by Rep. John Melcher, D-Mont., concerning whether export subsidy information was leaked.

While making no accusation of wrongdoing, Melcher asked whether Butz or other department witnesses at the hearing knew if Pence made phone calls to anyone outside the

department Aug. 24, the day before it was announced wheat export subsidies would be brought under control.

Pence, contacted by a reporter, said it is "strictly a misunderstanding," not a leak of information.

The Agriculture Department confirmed earlier reports that U.S. wheat has been sold to mainland China. The sales so far amount to about 15 million bushels, officials said.

The Export Marketing Service in USDA told a reporter it could not, under the regulations, identify the company involved or whether more than one firm had made applications for export subsidies to China.

Armand Hammer of Occidental Petroleum Corp., said Premier Alexei N. Kosygin had given his blessing to a series of commercial

deals including development of a permanent U.S. trade center in Moscow that could serve as headquarters there for American firms.

Kissinger arrived in Moscow Sunday and, before leaving early Thursday, conferred at length with Communist Party Chief Leonid Brezhnev, Foreign Minister Andrei A. Gromyko and others.

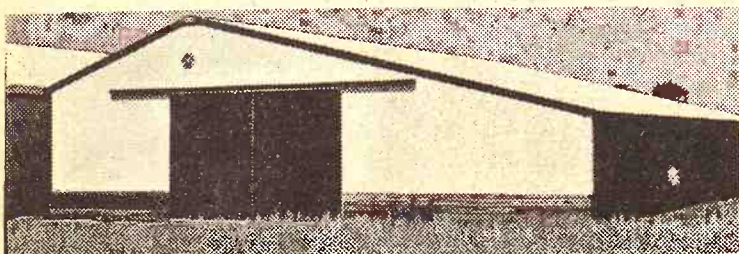

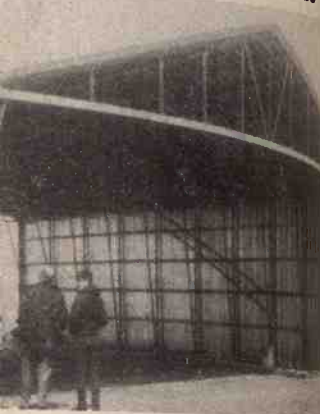

Topeka Goodyear Plant Building On

Two separate expansions with a total value of approximately \$20 million will be added to the Goodyear tire plant.

Ground will be broken for both expansions later this year.

One of the expansions will be for radial earthmover tires, F. B. Conrad, plant manager, said.

"Radial earthmover tires, the giant tires of radial design, have been produced at Topeka since 1968," he added. "This expansion will enable Topeka to double its present radial earthmover capacity and will keep Topeka in the forefront as a leading producer."

The radial earthmover tire expansion will add 77,500 square feet in the form of three buildings at the north end of the facility. These buildings are expected to be completed in March, 1974.

"The second new expansion will be for steel-belted radial passenger tires," Conrad said, adding that this expansion will add 127,500 square

feet to the plant.

Conrad said, "We expect that the two radial tire expansions, then completed in March of 1974, will add more than 100 employees to the payroll."

Current employment is 3,750.

The new buildings in the two expansions will bring the acres-under-roof figure to 63.

"The monies will be matched by cities using the funds," Gene Robert Docking said.

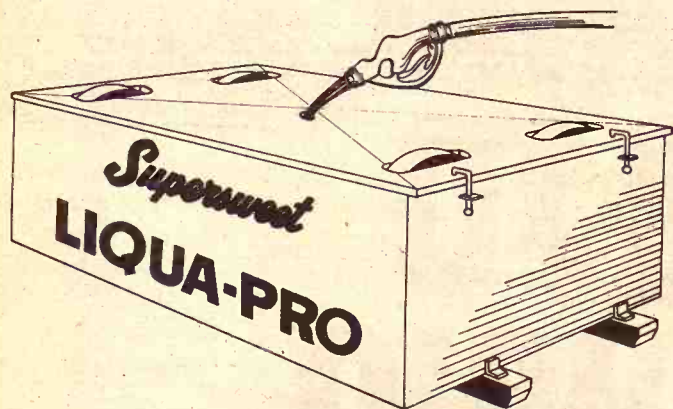

Nation's Corn Crop Forecast Lower Than Record 1971 Harvest

The nation's corn crop, a key to consumer meat supplies next winter, will be 5,124,425,000 bushels, down eight per cent from the record harvest in 1971 but 4 per cent more than forecast in August, the Agriculture Department estimated.

Wheat production was estimated at 1,559,501,000 bushels, five per cent less than the record last year but one per cent more than indicated last month.

The two grains, particularly wheat, are also in large demand for export. The Soviet Union has purchased an estimated 400 million bushels of wheat, one-fourth of the 1971 crop, plus corn, other feed grains and soybeans.

and one per cent more than in August.

The department's "all crops" index based on field conditions Sept. 1, was 111 per cent of a 1967 base used to rate production, compared with 110 in August and a record 112 last year.

Government programs for corn and wheat were tightened this year in hopes farmers would produce less. Since then, however, the Soviet Union has bought grain and soybeans totaling an estimated \$1 billion.

The huge Soviet wheat purchases point to a record large export year for the bread grain, perhaps as much as 1 billion by the time other customers also are served.

That would compare with the previous high of 867 million bushels

of wheat export in 1965-66 and 632 million last year. It also means, including domestic requirements, total wheat use is likely to exceed this year's production.

By next July 1, when another wheat crop begins to enter the market, the carryover or reserve may be down 50 million to 600 million bushels, about enough to satisfy U.S. domestic needs. This summer the stockpile was 865 million bushels.

Corn exports and domestic use of livestock also are running large. Total use for the marketing year beginning Oct. 1 may exceed 1972 production and bite into the estimated billion-bushel surplus now on hand.

The indicated production of other 1972 crops, compared with 1971 production and the August estimate,

respectively, included:

Rice 84,563,000 hundredweight for 1972; 84,315,000 last year and 85,888,000 estimated in August; Flaxseed 15,051,000 bushels; 18,653,000 and 14,240,00; Dry beans 18,206,000 hundredweight; 16,168,000 and 18,207,000; Dry peas 1,998,000 hundredweight; 3,967,000 and 2,079,000; Peanuts 3,116,210,000 pounds; 3,003,693,000 and 3,210,560,000; Fall potatoes 235,531,000 hundredweight; 253,796,000 and none made; All potatoes 294,975,000 hundredweight; 319,354,000 and none made; Sweet potatoes 12,456,000 hundredweight; 11,718,000 and 12,170,000.

Southwest Kansas Firm Developing An Orbiting Privy

ULYSSES—Man's technological ability has had to stretch to nearly unbelievable lengths in meeting the needs demanded for putting a man into space for an extended period of time.

A Ulysses industry may play a vital part of all this in its manufacture of a product, the design of which is currently under top security wraps with the National Aeronautics and Space Administration.

Uly-Pak, a company that specializes in open and reclosable liquid and bacteria type bags, used in hospitals has designed a unique plastic container which will hold human waste while astronauts live in an orbiting space lab set for launch next year.

Keith Howard, president and general manager of Uly-Pak, said he could not disclose the precise design of the "orbiting privy", except to say that it would have "unique features that will enable it to do the job." He said this information was "classified."

Howard said NASA singled out the Ulysses industry for the test run for this necessary facet of space exploration due to the specialization of Uly-Pak products.

NASA is currently testing four orders of 200 bags each sent by Uly-Pak in late August. Howard said he hasn't heard from NASA since the shipment.

However, word has it that if there is a security leak during the testing of the unusual product, it could cause quite a stink.

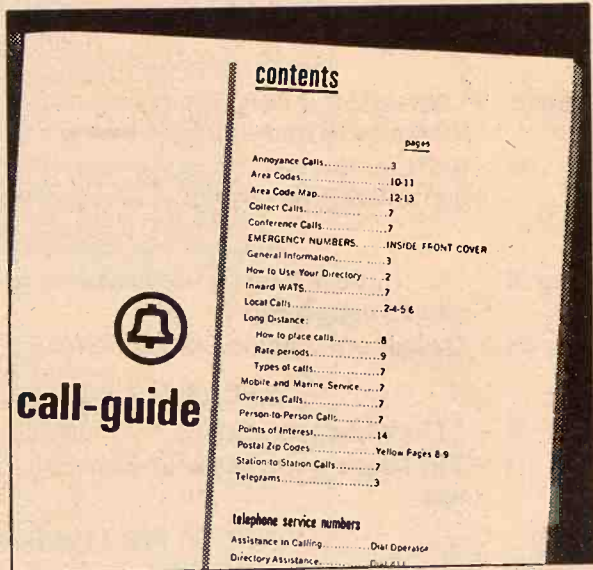

Beef Carcass Data Service Now Open To State Producers

Kansas beef producers now have an opportunity to obtain much-needed data on the value-determining characteristics of their cattle.

A unique new program, called the Beef Carcass Data Service, is provided through the Livestock Division of USDA's Agricultural Marketing Service in response to the

requests of numerous livestock associations coordinated by the Beef Improvement Federation.

In Kansas, the program is made available on a self-supporting basis to producers through the Kansas Livestock Association (KLA). Individual producers and industry organizations are paying the costs.

The service works like this: KLA, cooperating with the USDA on the program, makes official beef carcass data eartags available to producers for 50 cents each. When the tagged animal is slaughtered in plants serviced by USDA graders, the grader evaluates the quality and yield grade factors from these carcasses on an official beef carcass data form. The form is forwarded to KLA, which, in turn, gets it back to the tag purchaser.

A fee of \$1.50 is charged for the completed form. Eartags sometimes get lost, so a carcass data form is not necessarily returned for every eartag issued.

through a sound performance reputation.

The specialists indicate the success of this program will depend upon the cooperation of various segments of the beef industry—including producers, feeders, and packers—to assure that the tags remain with the carcass until data can be collected.

High Wheat Prices Could Trigger Increase In Kansas Wheat Acreage

Higher prices buoyed upward by massive Russia purchases of U.S. grain may trigger a 6 to 8 per cent increase in Kansas wheat acreage this fall, reports a Kansas State University Extension economist.

Roy Frederick believes farmers will plant about 10 million acres in 1973, compared to about 9.6 million a year ago.

"Wheat prices have risen about 40 cents a bushel since the announcement of the Russian grain sale," he says. "Many farmers are bullish about price prospects for 1973 and will plant more acres of wheat this fall."

Farmers have the following options, he says:

- Participate in the 1973 government wheat program at the regular set-aside level.

- Participate in the program and exercise an additional set-aside option.

- Not participate, but plant as much wheat as possible in hopes that prices will stay high through harvest next summer.

Producers exercising the first option will be eligible for both a

price support loan and domestic market certificates if they set aside 86 per cent of their domestic wheat allotment.

The national average loan rate for 1973 will be \$1.25 a bushel — the same as in 1972. Farmers who participate may repay the loan, plus interest, and sell the wheat at the market price. Or they may deliver the wheat to the government in lieu of the \$1.25 loan price.

Market certificates are based on the difference between the average price of wheat received by farmers during the first five months of the marketing year — July through November — and 100 per cent of the parity price. Frederick estimates that the certificates will be worth about \$1.45 to \$1.50 a bushel this year.

Producers exercising the second option may voluntarily set aside an additional acreage up to 150 per cent of their domestic allotment in return for payment of 88 cents a bushel times the established yield for their farm.

Another alternative would be to take part in the program, but plant wheat on the set-aside acres, graze

the wheat pasture until May 15, 1973, then destroy the excess acres.

Farmers who do not participate in the program are not eligible for either the loan or the marketing certificates.

Frederick believes many farmers will participate at the regular level, but will plant more wheat than last year after setting aside the required acres. This will allow them to receive the loan and the certificates, but still seed more acres this fall.

The economist sees some danger

in increasing production, however, noting that carryover from this year's bumper crop could total 500 to 600 million bushels on July 1, 1973, despite exports of more than one billion bushels.

"If production soars and sales to the Soviets do not continue at a high level in 1973, we could see a return to the situation of the late 1960s when a glut of wheat had such a depressing effect on prices," he says.

"On the other hand, increased demand from East European

nations and Communist China could take up some of the slack caused by a possible slowdown in sales to the Soviets."

U.S. — Soviet Grain Deal Pushes World Wheat Prices

The Soviet wheat purchases not only have pushed up prices in the United States, but around the world.

But no place in the world is there a daily posting of just what the world price is on wheat. It always is something that has to be calculated.

In an effort to explain the world price on wheat, it should be emphasized that the bread grain comes in different qualities. Higher quality wheat naturally is priced above that of a lower quality. Location also is a factor.

The market, however, tends to establish all prices in relation to the wheat most commonly in commerce and currently that is hard red winter, the kind traded at the Kansas City Board of Trade and produced in the Great Plains area of the United States.

Egg Price Outlook Is Not Looking Up

The outlook for egg prices isn't conducive for increasing production in the state during the coming months, according to a Kansas State University Extension economist.

M.E. Jackson says egg prices will average about 29 cents a dozen between now and next July. Production costs, however, are expected to average 29 to 30 cents a dozen.

New egg production should be carefully planned, he advises, and unless in a deficit area should probably not be started as an independent venture.

Turkey prices do not encourage much increase in production in the rest of 1972. Young hen turkey prices are expected to average 39 cents per pound during the last quarter of the year.

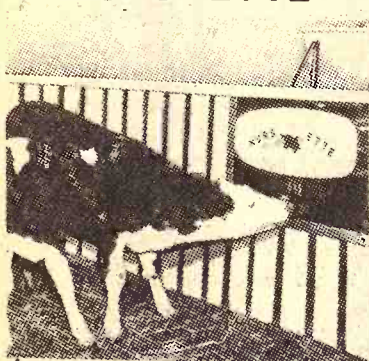
The economist says "free" market turkeys are almost a thing of the past. Production in the state will expand only on contract, he says.

Broiler prices are expected to average 26 cents a pound during the last three months of the year, about one cent higher than a year earlier. Prices will be up to 28 cents during the first quarter of 1973, up one-fourth cent from a year earlier.

In fact, currently, it can be said with reality that the world price on wheat is the cash price in Kansas City, plus the freight cost to the Gulf and minus the amount of the U.S. subsidy. This becomes the base price from which other exporting countries establish their price.

Supply and demand affect world wheat prices just the same as on any other commodity. But also involved are international trade policies including subsidies. The United States for many years has provided a subsidy to keep U.S. export prices competitive with those around the world, because our domestic price generally is above the world price.

The export subsidy rate, on any day, is supposed to be the difference between the U.S. domestic price and the world price.

A committee of the Export Marketing Service, an agency of the U.S. Department of Agriculture, meets each day in Washington to determine what the export subsidy rate shall be for the next day. The principal function of the committee is to determine, from information received from around the world, just what is the world price. Then the subsidy rate is set as the difference between this price and the domestic price. The subsidy applies to sales to any nation, the Soviet Union or anyone else.

The U.S. government's price support on what, or its loan rate, when set at an average of \$1.25 a bushel at the farm was supposed to be around the world price level.

Last July 1, before the negotiations between Moscow and the U.S. on the sales of grain had been revealed, the cash price on hard red winter wheat at the Gulf was \$1.62 a bushel. Two cents a bushel must be added to load the wheat onto a vessel. This makes \$1.64. The subsidy at that time was 1

cent a bushel. Subtract the subsidy and you get \$1.63, which was the competitive or "world" price of wheat on board a ship at that time. In fact, for about 2 years, the world price had been close to that figure.

When the Soviet Union began to buy wheat in great quantities, domestic prices rose and the government began to increase the subsidy rate, finally reaching a level of 38 cents a bushel. Yet, importers still were getting the grain at around \$1.63 a bushel at the Gulf.

Meanwhile, pressures were building in the United States from bakers and others to halt the rise in domestic wheat prices under rising umbrella of the subsidy. Also, other nations were increasing their export prices.

On Aug. 24 the U.S. Department of Agriculture officially began to back away from the policy of continuing to increase the subsidy as domestic prices rose and the spread between the domestic and world prices widened. It announced, in effect, that it would protect exporters on all deals made prior to Aug. 24, but that after that date, the subsidy rate would reflect any rise that had occurred in world prices.

More specifically, under the revised policy, any rise in domestic prices would have to be passed on to world prices. If trades were made at the higher prices, this would be the concrete evidence that the world price had risen in fact.

Prices change daily, but as of the close of business on Sept. 8, the Kansas City price on wheat was

\$2.01 a bushel. Freight to the Gulf was 14 cents, making the cost at the Gulf \$2.15. Add 2 cents a bushel for loading the wheat onto a ship and the price was \$2.17. By this time, the subsidy had been reduced to 30 cents a bushel. Subtract 30 cents from \$2.17, and you get the actual FOB cost of the wheat to the importer at \$1.87, the "world price" on that day. Comparing this with the world price of \$1.63 on July 1, shows an increase of 24 cents a bushel.

During the same period, from July 1 to Sept. 6, Canada had increased its export price on wheat in store at the western port of Vancouver from \$1.78% to \$2.06% or 28 cents, and at the Lakehead from \$1.70% to \$1.95% or 25 cents higher.

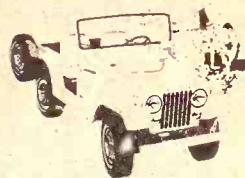

2 cups flour
1/2 teaspoon salt
one-third cup shortening
1 1/2 teaspoons baking powder
two-thirds cup milk
Mix and divide dough into approximately 8 or 9 balls. Roll out into a circle and core, peel and place apple in middle of circle of dough. Put a teaspoon of cinnamon and sugar (1/4 teaspoon nutmeg, optional) and a small chunk of butter in the cavity of each apple. Bring dough up around apple and pinch to seal at the top. Place all in a large baking pan. Make syrup of:
1 1/2 cups sugar
1 1/2 cups boiling water
1/2 cup oleo or butter
Boil this five minutes. Pour hot syrup over apple dumplings. Bake one hour at 350 degrees. These are rich and delicious hot or cold. Serve with cream, ice cream or just plain.

Farm Economist Says Wheat Prices Should Hold

Record sales of wheat, corn and grain sorghum by this country to Russia should not show up in higher prices for bread and meat on the nation's dinner tables, a University of Arizona farm economist argued.

While acknowledging the immediate shot-in-the-arm which the sale announcement gave the grain futures markets, Dr. Elmer Menzie said carry-over and new crop grain stocks "appear big enough to absorb the export sales agreements as well as fairly significant new ones without major price changes."

Due to a disappointing harvest, Russia is buying 400 million bushels of wheat; 130 million bushels of corn; and eight million bushels of grain sorghum from U.S. suppliers for delivery before July 1, 1973.

While wheat is normally considered a bread raw material, it is also growing in importance as a livestock feed grain, the primary outlet for both corn and grain sorghum, the economist pointed out.

Assuming again that enough of the domestic supply of livestock fattening grains were sold abroad, the resulting shortage could reflect itself in higher cattle feed prices and push cost of the ultimate consumer

Hog Cholera Outbreak In Kansas, Destroy Two Osborne County Herds

OSBORNE — Kansas has been added to the growing list of states recording outbreaks of hog cholera this year.

Two Osborne county swine herds have been destroyed to stem an outbreak of hog cholera, and herds in all of Osborne and part of Smith counties have been quarantined.

The quarantine means, according to Dr. David O. Manley, Topeka, veterinarian in charge of federal programs in Kansas, that hogs may not be moved within or outside the area except to slaughter, and then only with a permit issued by federal or state regulatory officials.

It's the first positively-diagnosed hog cholera in Kansas in almost 2 years.

While officials did not identify the infected herds — both now destroyed — Dr. George Allen, a veterinarian working the case at Osborne, said one herd was "fairly sizeable".

Owners of destroyed herds are paid market price for the animals through an eradication indemnity program.

First reports of the disease came to Osborne County Agent Lowell Byerly early last week from a farm 4 miles north of Osborne. Byerly said about 200 hogs have been destroyed.

Dr. Allen stressed the cholera virus poses no threat to humans.

"What we must do is protect the remaining hog population and keep the virus from spreading," he said.

"We also are looking for the source of the virus."

As of late last week, a survey of a fairly wide area had not uncovered further cholera infection. But the source of the virus has not been found, either.

The veterinarians are "playing detective" in seeking the source. Cholera is highly infectious among animals but the virus can be carried in other ways, Dr. Allen said. It can be carried in feed, on vehicles, by flood waters, he said, and the veterinarians must check all possibilities.

"I wish I could tell you we have found the source," Dr. Allen said "but we haven't as yet."

According to Dr. Manley, the quarantine area includes all of Osborne county and that portion of Smith county south of a line formed by Kansas Highway 9 and county highway 868.

Dr. Homer Caley, extension veterinarian at Kansas State University, while expressing concern, said the situation is not severe or crucial at this time — either in the affected area or in the state.

"While there have been losses in 2 herds, the number of animals has

been relatively small," he said.

Of greatest concern is the fact that Kansas will lose its cholera-free

status, Caley said.

Because the state has been cholera-free, vaccination has not

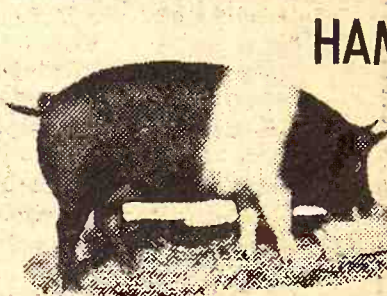

Timing, Moisture Critical Keys In Double-Cropping

Double-cropping may be economically appealing to some Kansas farmers, but this management strategy doesn't always pay off.

Verlin Peterson, Extension crops production specialist at Kansas State University, says timing and moisture are the "critical keys."

He advises farmers to "Hustle in" soybean or grain sorghum after harvesting wheat if they want to improve chances of successful double-cropping.

It is essential to capitalize on available soil moisture and secure the maximum number of growing days," Peterson says.

When double-cropping behind wheat, the date of planting will be delayed as compared to a full season crop. Peterson recommends selecting varieties that will mature before the average killing frost.

Since the idea is to get the second crop into the soil quickly, Peterson advises no-tillage planting—planting directly into the stubble—as a possibility.

"No-tillage offers farmers an opportunity to reduce labor, production costs, and erosion, while conserving water," he points out. The stubble acts as a mulch that reduces evaporation."

Another requirement for double-

cropping success is good weed control.

"Under no-tillage planting, herbicides must be used for weed control since cultivation is usually impossible due to the crop residue," Peterson advises.

He says contact and residual herbicide applications may be necessary to control existing weeds and weeds that germinate after planting.

Peterson offers these tips for selecting a no-tillage planter:

- It should place seeds into the soil at uniform depth and then cover them adequately,
- It must be equipped with a booster to prevent trash collection in front of the openers,

- It must loosen enough soil to insure direct seed-soil contact, and,
- It must have a press wheel to firm the soil over the seed in the tilled row.

Research is underway at the KSU East Central Kansas Experiment Field to study various methods of preparing a seedbed for soybeans

and grain sorghum planted behind wheat.



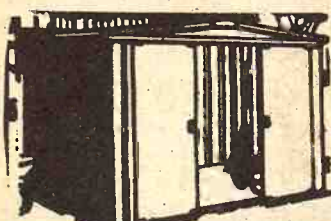

Toxic Chemical PCB Widespread In Nation's Rivers

Government scientists have found a toxic chemical called PCB to be

surprisingly widespread in the nation's waterways.

The U.S. Geological Survey said its scientists "were surprised to find detectable levels" in samples from 19 of the 39 jurisdictions covered by the sampling.

The Geological Survey said details

of the samplings were not yet available, but it listed the following jurisdictions in which samples contained detectable PCB:

Arkansas, California, Colorado, Connecticut, Florida, Georgia, Maryland, Massachusetts, Minnesota, Mississippi, New Jersey, New York, Oklahoma, Oregon, Pennsylvania, Puerto Rico, South Carolina, Texas, Virginia, and West Virginia.

PCB stands for polychlorinated biphenyls, a group of chemicals related to the pesticide DDT which was recently banned as an environmental hazard.

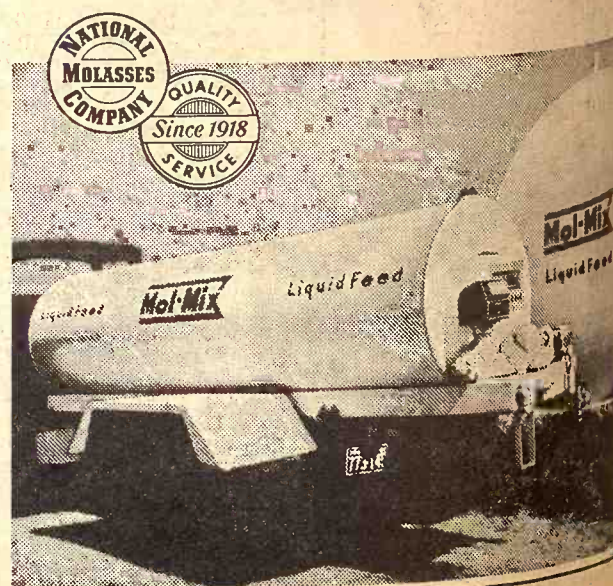

Poultry flocks in Kansas produced 61 million eggs during August, down 5 percent from the same month in 1971 and the lowest for August in records dating back through 1925, according to the Kansas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service.

The rate of lay during August averaged 1,950 eggs per 100 layers, compared with 1,907 a year ago. There were 3,130,000 hens and pullets of laying age on Kansas farms during August, 6 percent less than a year ago.

The Nation's laying flock produced 5,834 million eggs during August, 1 percent less than in August 1971. Layers on hand during August averaged 304.4 million, 3 percent below a year earlier.

The average rate of lay during the month was up 2 percent from a year earlier and partially offset the reduction in layers.

HATCHERY PRODUCTION
Commercial hatcheries in Kansas hatched 354,000 chicks during August, down 4 percent from a year ago. Egg-type chicks hatched during August totaled 350,000, down 4 percent from last year.

Planning Ahead Important For Retiring Farmer

The more a person thinks and plans for retirement, the easier it is to adjust to change. Studies show the happiest retired farmers are those who planned for it. Social Security retirement

payments have made it possible for many farmers to retire who otherwise could not afford to do so. Social Security retirement pay was never intended to be and likely will never be sufficient for an adequate retirement income. The retirement pay needs to be supplemented by income from other sources.

The amount of money a farmer can earn from productive labor is limited while drawing Social Security retirement benefits. For this reason, many farmers are forced to make plans for renting out or selling the farm.

This in turn, often results in a younger man taking over the farm, says Cecil D. Maynard, extension economist at Oklahoma State University.

Besides Social Security retirement income, many farmers also have some income from their farm, income from savings and a few have incomes from a self-employed retirement program and annuities.

Some farms can be rented to other commercial farmers and the owners can get satisfactory returns. Others, especially those highly mechanized and equipped, may not be so easy to rent.

Depreciation and other overhead expenses may be costly if the farm is not properly operated at full capacity. Farmers approaching retirement and owning these types of farms may want to hire managers or sell the farms.

Farmers who are presently in a rather high income tax bracket should seriously consider developing a retirement income program. They can deduct from taxable income 10 percent of their net income up to \$2,500 annually under an approved plan.

The amount deducted is not taxed until they retire.

Some farmers are also investing in Series E Savings Bonds and not paying taxes on the interest until they retire, at which time their taxable income will likely be lower.

Besides financial decisions that must be made in connection with retirement, authorities advise that other retirement decisions are equally important.

Farmers should not let retirement come all at once. They should decide where they want to live, what they want to do with their time and how they want to live.

The more one thinks and plans for retirement the easier it is to adjust to change. Studies show the happiest retired people are those who plan for it.

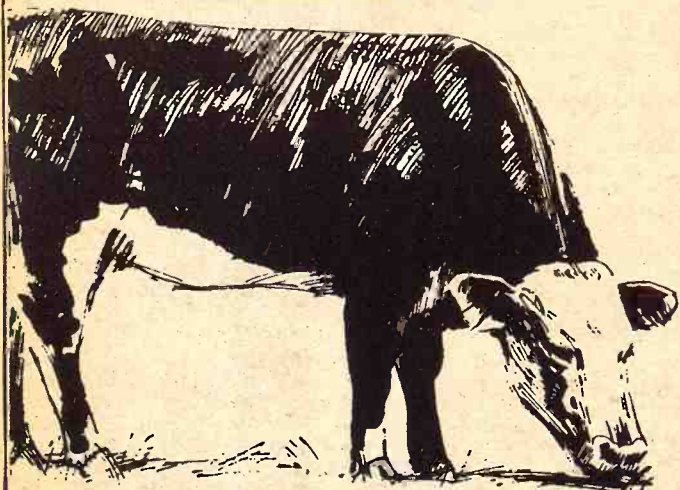

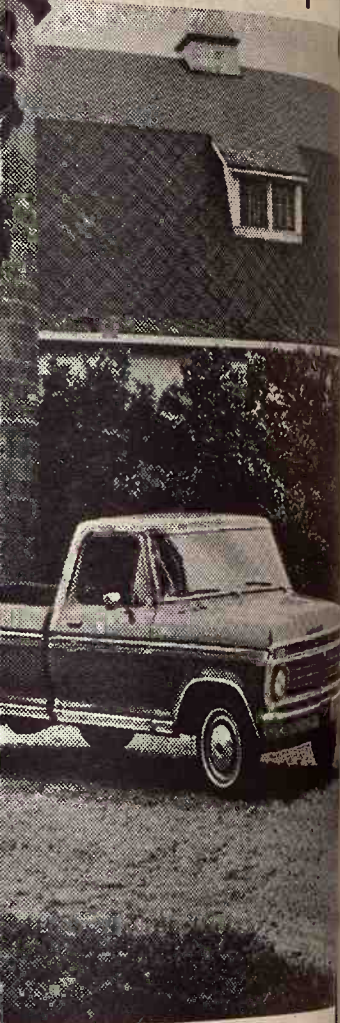

Bell Still Working On State No-Fault Insurance Program

Automobile insurance rates in
Kansas would increase three per-
cent with full coverage under a
mandatory no-fault insurance bill in
the U.S. Senate, the state insurance

commissioner, said with medium
level coverage rates would be seven
percent higher. With minimal

Equal Schooling Doesn't Mean Equal Adults

Reforming the nation's schools so
that all children have an equal op-
portunity for a good education would
do little or nothing to make them
more equal when they grow up to be
adults, a team of Harvard research-
ers has concluded.

Instead, the Harvard researchers
argued, the character of any
school's output "depends largely on
a single input, the characteristics of
the entering children." These
characteristics are determined by a
number of factors, they said.

The researchers principal finding
was that non-school factors such as
family background are more im-
portant in determining educational
achievement than anything con-
nected to school, was based on data
on 570,000 students in 4,000 schools.

Beef Industry In The Money For At Least Two More Years

Prices of stocker and feeder cattle reached alltime highs on the Kansas City market last week and a University of Missouri specialist predicted the beef industry will remain profitable for at least two or three years.

That means the housewife may just as well face the fact that retail beef prices may be higher in that period, Glenn A. Grimes, an agricultural economist and livestock marketing expert said. The retail rise in 1973 should be in the range of 2 to 3 percent.

Recently choice 800-pound steers sold in Kansas City for more than \$44 a hundred pounds and 350-pound steer calves sold for \$63. The heavier cattle, already partly finished, will

come back on the slaughter market as fat cattle in February. The lighter animals are a year or more away from final marketing.

Grimes calculated the heavier cattle will have to be sold at \$37.65 a hundred for the feeder to break even. The lighter will have to bring \$33.90 when they are sold. Some of their gain will be put on by grazing and silage instead of high-priced grain.

At the same time, February 1973 live cattle futures reached \$38.12, indicating to Grimes that the man who bought the 800-pound steers probably would be able to "lock in" a profit on the futures market, but one that would be slim indeed when risk, feed costs, transportation to

and from feed lots and other management factors were included.

He said the potential for profitability assumes the feeder planned to market those steers at 1,200 pounds with the feedlot ration costing 25 cents for a pound of weight gain.

If the same feeder depends on the February cash market, he could be on shaky ground after paying so much for 800 pounders, but Grimes does not have "a bearish market in sight."

Some cattlemen maintain a feeder buying replacement cattle at current prices has no hope of making them pay. Their opinion is that feeders are only trading dollar-for-dollar to keep their lots filled which they must do because of the huge investments involved. Feed mills and other facilities in large modern feeding operations cannot be operated at half speed.

Grimes believes, however, most feeders will show good profits for 1972 when averages are struck for the year. Those who could be hurt are the small farmer-feeders who market only once or twice annually.

Grimes stressed the surge in feeder-stocker prices was achieved in the face of weaknesses in slaughter cattle and in the dressed beef trade, both of which he thinks are temporary. Those weaknesses in turn have brought about a modest reduction in the retail beef level in the last several weeks from July and August peaks.

The Missourian said the strength of the replacement cattle market is evidence that "we are in a new ballgame." It is one in which the demand element is much stronger than the supply factor.

"As we look at the data, we conclude the price increases are brought about by increased consumer demand rather than by reduced supply," he said. "The production of beef so far this year is almost exactly the same as in 1971. Our calculations are that the consumer will account for about 112 pounds of beef in 1972, down fractionally from 113 pounds in 1971 and 113.7 pounds in 1970.

"Our increased population, however, takes up that slack, which higher prices may have caused as well as absorbing the extra import beef authorized by the administration last summer."

That demand is not confined to the U.S., Grimes added, but is worldwide with the results that U.S. beef imports this year are up only 12 percent despite the door being thrown open to exporters in Australia, New Zealand, Argentina and elsewhere.

"There is a real strong market around the world," he said. "Unless our price is much, much better—which it is not—other beef producing countries are not going to pull out of their established markets for ours."

What this demand is doing, the economist asserted, is throwing the traditional U.S. beef price cycle out of kilter. As a general rule expanding production for several years leads to a period of declining prices. That situation occurred in the hog market 18 months ago.

"U.S. cattlemen have been increasing their herds for four years," Grimes said. "If we were in a normal cycle, they would be in trouble now. However they are still under pressure to increase their herds rather than to slow down."

Summing up, Grimes believes one must look realistically at the supermarket price of beef and relate it to his family's own disposable income. He noted wages on the average are up 5 percent or more this year and for retired families Social Security payments also have risen.

"Beef prices look high to us," he said. "But, when you relate them to income, they don't seem quite so high. And they haven't risen out of

comparison to everything else. Look at the price of a new car; it has reached a historic high too."

Grain sorghum also appears destined to set a record, at 78 bushels per acre, according to monthly estimates of the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

The estimates are based on conditions Sept. 1 and reflect a marked improvement in outlook in the past month.

At 98 bushels per acre, the corn crop would produce a record-shattering 499,800,000 bushels, 10 percent above last year's record production.

The per acre yield estimate on corn was up eight bushels from the estimate a month earlier, while the sorghum yield estimate gained a whopping 17 bushels for the month.

Soybean yield, estimated a month ago at 30 bushels per acre, is estimated now at 31. Sugar beets continue to shape up as a 19-ton-per-acre crop.

The massive corn crop has developed despite a weather-start in planting.

James Tippet, assistant statistician in charge of the state-federal Division of Agricultural Statistics, attributed the crop success to the above-normal precipitation during the growing period, April 1 to Sept. 1, in all sections of the state.

"In northeast Nebraska, where we have nearly half of our dryland corn, the precipitation was 28 percent above normal," he noted. "There is no doubt about it, the northeast area is where a lot of that extra corn is going to come from."

Although rainfall was below normal in August in six of the eight crop reporting districts, earlier precepitation carried the crops through, and August rains were timely when they fell.

Despite the late start, corn crop development is just about normal, Tippet said. "This doesn't rule out the possibility of early frost, but the crop is not as late as it could have been."

Nebraska corn last year yielded 85 bushels per acre for a total of 455,260,000 bushels.

The indicated sorghum yield of 78 bushels per acre would produce a crop of 132,600,000 bushels, six percent above last year and second only to a 1966 crop which went 68 bushels to the acre. The 1969 crop yielded 76 bushels, and last year's crop yielded 60 bushels per acre.

The indicated soybean yield of 31 bushels per acre would top last year's mark by six bushels but fall short of the 33.5 bushel record in 1969. Indicated production of 23,002,000 bushels would be 44 percent above last year's short crop.

Rain and disease problems have bothered dry bean growers in western Nebraska in August, and the yield now is pegged at 1,800 pounds per acre, compared with 1,850 last year.

Sugar beet production is estimated at 1,577,000 tons, up 11 percent from last year. The 19 tons per acre would be slightly below the record 19.2 set three years ago.

Fall potatoes are estimated to be yielding 220 hundredweight per acre, compared with 210 last year. Total production of 968,000 hundredweight as now expected would be eight per cent below last year.

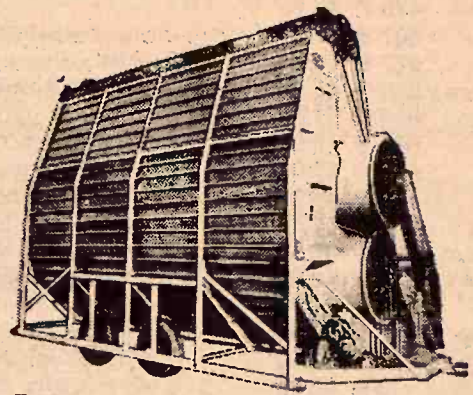

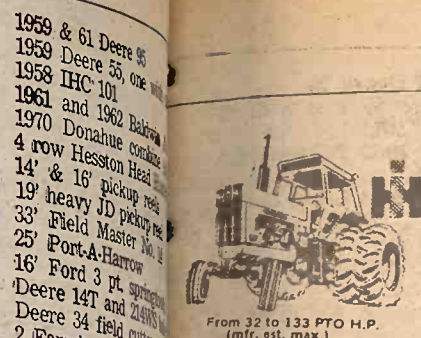

Junction City Gets
Warning On Open
Burning At Dump

Junction City officials have been
warned legal action will be taken if
they fail to comply with an order to
halt open burning at the city dump,
just off I-70 on the Smoky Hill River.

William H. Ward, an assistant
attorney general, said his office is
keeping a close eye on the Junction
City dump to see that it is in com-
pliance with an anti-burning order
issued by the State Board of Health.

The city was ordered to discon-

tinue open burning at the dump as of
July 1. However, flames were ob-
served—the dump several days in
August. City officials attributed the
burning to an accident.

In a letter to Francis Hoag,
Junction City city manager, Ward,
said "regardless of the cause of such
burning, whether it be by spon-
taneous combustion, arson, or
simple vandalism, the city has a
responsibility to take reasonable
precautions to insure that the
burning does not take place and that
when such fires start they can be put
out within a reasonable time."

"This letter is to advise you that,
should the evidence indicate that
you are permitting violations of an
enforceable order of the State Board
of Health, appropriate legal action
will be instituted according to law,"
Ward said.

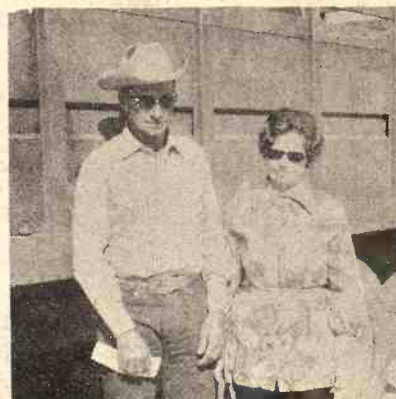

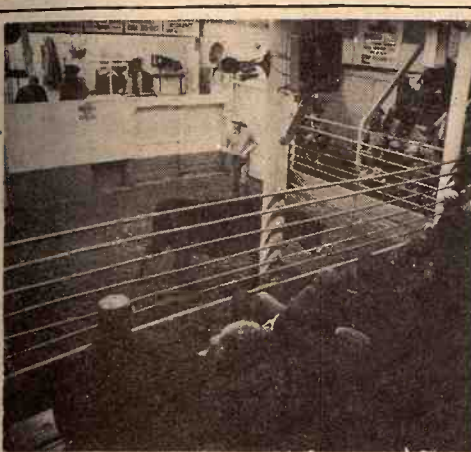
