Wheat Harvest Moves Thru G&G Area

The wheat harvest should move into the northern parts of the G&G area this week. This picture well illustrates both the problem and the hope of the season: a dark sky threatening rain

that will keep farmers out of ripe fields, but the sun breaking thru the cloud, promising the dry, hot climate necessary to get the cutting done.

Puzzles In Building Farm Exports

The problems of opening up more international trade of U.S. commodities are formidable and tricky.

Agriculture Secretary Orville Freeman covered some of the problems after returning from a trip to Mexico, Japan, South Korea and Taiwan.

On these trips, Freeman was seeking to open the door for greater U.S. farm exports. It seems that almost all over the world, countries have trade restrictions, mostly designed to protect their own farmers, but in some instances they are rather futile even as far as their own people are concerned. The United States has restrictions

too, but not as many as others.

Freeman said about the first thing Mexican officials mentioned was that they want to sell more to the United States. He countered that we'd like to sell more to them too, and that they had more trade restrictions than the United States.

Japan, Taiwan and South Korea all have improved their balance of payments situations while our country's has worsened. Freeman said he tried to impress this fact upon the officials of these countries. A stable dollar is important to them just as it is to us, he added. Therefore, they should find it to their advantage to be more amenable

to removing restrictions which curtail our exports to them.

Freeman said he also tried to convince Japan that it has no real worry about the U.S. being a reliable supplier. Since Japan must import food to live, it obviously is concerned about constant supplies and recently it has been inclined to go into other markets so that it would not be entirely dependent on the United States.

The secretary of agriculture made it plain, he said, that this country has millions of idle acres which could be put into use if it did appear that more products were needed for export to Japan.

It is important, also, Freeman said, that this country have quality products for export. Cracked corn is a big worry for Japan. Somehow, there is a moisture problem involved in corn that is cracked and sent half-way round the world in a ship's hold.

The corn apparently is cracked in picker-shellers used to harvest the U.S. crop.

More about the problem of protectionism in markets around the world comes from Raymond A. Iones, administrator of the Foreign Agricultural Service. He says there is a growing problem of export subsidies.

The export subsidy has been used to perfection in the Common Market countries in Europe. One country, Iones said,

has a price support of 65 cents a pound on butter, yet it exported this dairy product for as low as 12 cents a pound. The government paid the difference as a subsidy to the exporter.

The trouble is, Iones said, this export idea is spreading to other countries. When a surplus is produced of a product, the government sees that it is exported at a price which will move it, and pays the difference in a subsidy.

This, he commented, can get ridiculous. So our country, he said, is trying to combat such protectionism. In fact, he indicated the U.S. would take some strong countersteps in the next few days to prove to the world that we mean what we are talking about.

Three Companies Still Keep Windmills Spinning

With REA lines strung to practically every quarter-section of the U.S. a viewer of the farm scene might conclude that the windmill industry is no more.

But such is not quite the case. There are still three manufacturers of the onetime sentinels of the plains, and while sales are far less than they were before the rural areas were electrified, they still produce about 5000 windmills a year.

In fact, there are some people who believe windmills could be sold by the truckload if salesmen really pushed them.

Dae Beltz, an Akron, Ohio farm machinery dealer, is one who believes that more windmills could be sold. People come from miles around just to watch mine run and to take pictures of it."

He thinks windmills have a market as advertising pieces or just gimmicks. A Westchester County, N.Y. contractor bought four to decorate a subdivision called Windmill Club. A Yukon, Alaska, hardware dealer has one over the store to attract customers.

A Detroitier bought a windmill to irrigate his fruit trees, mainly for sentimental reasons. He was disappointed when the new model didn't squeak like the one he remembered from his boyhood.

Some gentleman farmers have bought windmills just because

they didn't think the farm looked right without one.

Actually, cattle and sheep ranchers buy the bulk of about 5000 windmills made in the U.S. each year, and if it weren't for export of about half of them to water-short foreign stockmen, it's doubtful the industry could survive.

Already, Braden Aermotor of Broken Arrow, Oklahoma, the leading manufacturer, has more windmills produced thru licensing arrangements with foreign concerns than the three diehard U.S. companies produce. The third remaining manufacturer is Heller-Aller Co., Napoleon, Ohio.

Windmills have several practical advantages as remote pumping stations. In the first place, they are completely self-contained and practically maintenance free. A large weather vane keeps the wheel forever facing into the wind. A series of gears converts the spinning motion into an almost perpetual up and down stroke for pumping water.

On the western prairies, where a windless day is almost unheard of, a windmill will slowly and steadily pump water into a stock tank, maintaining a constant supply of water for cattle and sheep without ever pumping the well dry. With only an occasional check to see that they haven't been

struck by lightning, or knocked over by a twister, many have continued their lonely job for 40 years or more.

Some religious sects, such as the Amish, still buy windmills for their farmsteads because their faith forbids use of engines or electricity. But most working windmills are on modern ranches, watering livestock miles from the homestead where it would cost too much to string power lines.

For the same reason, Stanford University Research Institute bought one to pump drinking water for a shock-wave research center it's building at a remote spot east of San Francisco.

Even after adding the more frivolous applications, however, today's demand is only a fraction of the 99,000 windmills sold by 25 U.S. builders back in 1928, before Rural Electrification Administration cooperatives took over most the work.

One historian figures U.S. companies built 6.5 million windmills between 1880 and 1930. Most were used for pumping water, but others performed a host of chores, ranging from sawing firewood to grinding grain.

In the 1920s wind power also lighted many farms. A simple unit with a propeller-like blade instead of a wheel spun a generator used to light the house and barn and power the radio.

Windcharger Corp., Sioux City, Iowa, Subsidiary of Zenith Corp., still sells about 75 small wind generators a year at a suggested list price of \$223.75 each. Most find their way to remote regions of backward lands, but a few are part of the space age. They power isolated instruments that monitor signals from orbiting satellites.

Less-developed regions of the world hold the best promise for future windmill sales, say the U.S. manufacturers.

But, unhappily for U.S. wind-

mill makers, many countries, including such major markets as Mexico, Brazil, Argentina, and Colombia, have practically barred imports to protect their own "infant" windmill industries.

And many African and Asian countries that badly need windmills don't have the cash to buy them. They do buy some financed through U.S. aid programs, but not nearly the number they need, say windmill makers.

Not surprisingly, the windmill industry doesn't employ enough people to carry much weight in trade negotiations. It took several calls around the Washington bureaucracy concerned with international trade to find anyone who even knew windmills still were being manufactured.

And the one man who did know confided that U.S. negotiators frequently make concessions on windmills to gain reciprocal favors for some more important U.S. industry.

Braden-Aermotor says its only defense is to license foreign companies to make windmills, using Aermotor designs and patents.

Argentina and South Africa are the two biggest markets for the Oklahoma company, officials say. Argentine output alone, is three times U.S. production, and currently South Africa makes 5000 or 6000 windmills a year.

Australia, another country with plenty of grazing land, has from electric lines, builds its own windmills, some of the size of U.S. models, because wells "down under" must be deeper to find water.

on large acreages. Pawnee, once the state's leader, also continues to have modest plantings throughout the state.

Comanche, another former state leader, still gets some planting, and Concho and Ponca, two promising varieties of the late 1950s, have about disappeared.

Turkey, the wonder wheat which was brought to the mid-west 60 years ago, was still the major wheat in Kansas in the mid 1930s. High yielding but poor milling wheats like Black-hull, Red Chief, and Chiefkan supplanted Turkey in the late 1930s, altho Tenmarq was the state's major producer during the middle of World War II. Later it was Pawnee and Comanche before Triumph dominated the state for most of the 1960s.

GM Sign Switch Means Change In Policy

Everybody knows that Cadillacs, Oldsmobiles, Pontiacs, Buicks and Chevys are made by General Motors.

Not everybody, GM management apparently figures, for the auto giant is about to embark on a program of changing the signs at the dealerships where its cars and trucks are sold. The switch will cost \$275 million and take 10 years. There are more than 14,000 signs to be replaced. A few new signs are expected to be erected by the end of this year.

GM hasn't officially announced the policy, but business publications have caught wind of it.

The change apparently comes from a policy shift to more centralized management, retarding the initiative from the divisions, a management theory which GM put into practice in the 1920s and has held since.

It follows similar switches being made by Ford and Chrysler.

The new signs will identify not only the product sold (such as Buick, Cadillac, etc.) but will also feature the GM "mark of excellence," a corporate symbol the company has been promoting in some ads for the past year and a half.

GM and its dealers will share the cost of the signs. Ford and Chrysler have both shared costs with dealers on a 50-50 basis. Ford started the program in 1966 and figures it will cost \$110 million. Chrysler started back in 1962 and is now virtually completed the program at a cost of \$65 million.

As part of the research prior to the new sign program, insiders say, GM learned most people can't name the corporations that make most consumer products. GM researchers also learned that companies that have tried to link their corporate names with the consumer products they produce have often increased sales.

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New Laws Have Closed 40-50 Meat Packers

An estimated 40 to 50 meat packing plants throughout the country have closed since Congress enacted legislation to extend federal standards to all meat packing and processing plants.

Four of the plants were closed under an emergency section of the law permitting the shut-down of operations if a plant was found to be endangering public health. One was a large slaughterhouse and processing plant in a metropolitan area of Michigan. The other three were smaller plants in Connecticut, Delaware, and Illinois. The plants were closed by state officials after being designated as dangerous to public health by the United States Department of Agriculture.

The remainder of the plants that closed did so voluntarily. Department officials said that in most cases the plants elected to close because they could not meet the federal standards for cleanliness and production of wholesome meat without large

expenditures of money. Most of these plants were described as small slaughtering and processing operations.

The report on the closing of the plants and on the progress of the states in establishing federal standards for all plants came from agriculture department officials in their first comprehensive review since the new meat act was adopted last December.

The law is designed to bring under federal standards some 15,000 plants that have been subject to only state or local laws. These plants sell wholly within their state. They produce about 15 per cent of all slaughtered meat and 25 per cent of processed meat. Federal inspection on meat and meat products shipped in interstate commerce cover about 85 per cent of the country's meat supply.

The bill authorizes matching federal grants to states to enable them to make state inspection systems for intrastate plants at least equal to federal

standards. The states are given two years to revise their systems to meet federal meat inspection criteria and a third year if the secretary of agriculture finds that a state is making sufficient progress. If the states fail to act, the federal government would step in and impose federal inspection.



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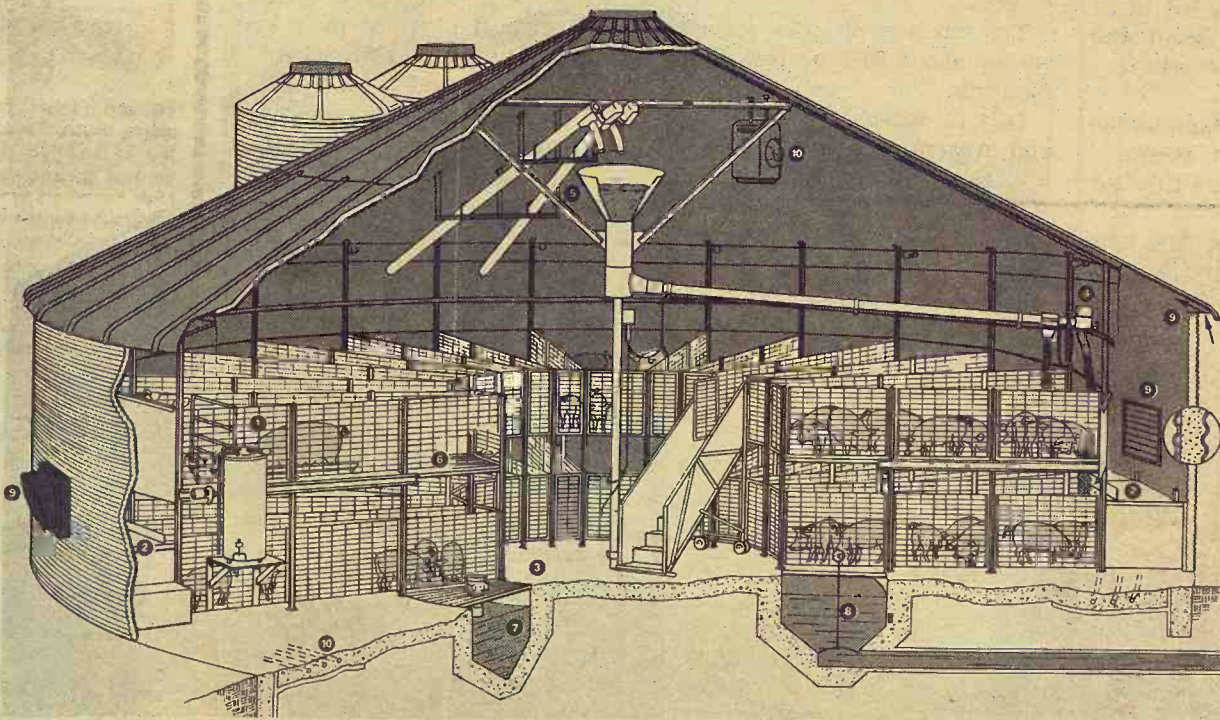

- 1½ cups sifted all-purpose flour
- 1½ teaspoons sugar
- ½ teaspoon salt
- ½ cup vegetable oil
- 2 tablespoons milk

Sift flour, sugar and salt in a 9-inch pie plate. Combine oil and milk in measuring cup and beat with fork till blended. Pour over flour mixture; mix with fork until all flour is moistened. With fingers, press mixture firmly against bottom and sides of pie plate. Make small edge on plate and flute. Bake at 425 degrees 12-15 minutes.

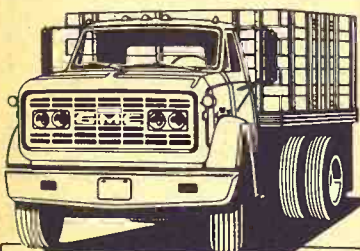

 - ½ cup cracker crumbs or quick-cooking oatmeal

FROZEN

STRAWBERRY FLUFF

- 1¼ cups crisp cookie crumbs
 - 2 egg whites
 - 1½ cups sugar
 - ¼ cup butter (room temperature)
 - 1 tablespoon lemon juice
 - 2 cups fresh strawberries (or 2 cups frozen berries may be used)
 - 1 cup heavy cream, whipped
- Combine crumbs and butter, put in 9x9-inch pan. Bake in 350-degree oven for eight minutes. Cool. Beat egg whites & lemon juice until foamy; add the sugar slowly. Continue beating until meringue forms stiff glossy peaks, add the strawberries which have been crushed or mashed; beat at high speed for about 12-15 minutes, then quickly fold in the whipped cream. Freeze overnight. Makes nine servings. If frozen strawberries are used instead of fresh berries, they should be drained of their juice. Garnish with whole straw-

berries or mint if desired.

RED RASPBERRY PIE

- 1 can frozen red raspberries thawed
 - red food coloring
 - ¾ cup sugar
 - 3 tablespoons cornstarch
 - 2 tablespoons flour
 - ½ teaspoon salt
 - 2 cups cream, scalded
 - 9-inch baked pie shell, cooled
- Drain raspberries and save juice. To berries add a drop of red coloring. Sift sugar, cornstarch, flour and salt and put in top of double boiler. Add juice off berries slowly. Blend. Add scalded cream and cool over hot water until thick. Remove and cool slightly. Fold in berries and pour into baked pie shell. Refrigerate until set.

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Window Styles Can Widen Outdoor View

If you're lucky enough to have a good view from more than one side of your house, don't lose sight of the advantage.

You may not want a fixed-sash picture window, or a bow or bay in every room, but there are other adaptable window styles that will bring the beauty of outdoors inside, and still suit the room in which they're installed. For instance:

Casement windows are an ideal way to give your kitchen a view. They swing outward at a 90-degree angle with the turn of a handle, making them convenient for that awkward area above the sink. Their uninterrupted glass area affords wide visibility, especially when used as double units or in a series above the countertop.

Sliders open to the left and right and are suitable almost anywhere. These also open and close easily and have no cross-bars to interfere with the view. Awnings open upward and outward at a 90-degree angle for maximum ventilation and also provide an expansive view.

Hoppers are similar to awnings, except that they open inward and down. Either style can be stacked three or four across and atop one another to create the illusion of a glass wall. They make an unusually

distinctive window treatment used this way, especially in dining and family rooms.

Sliding glass doors are a natural for rooms that lead to patios, decks, terraces or a rustic-view backyard. Insulating glass is recommended for glass doors as a safeguard against heat loss in winter and heat gain in summer. This assures that the room from which you will enjoy the changing beauty of the outdoors will be comfortable all year round.

His-And-Her Beach Wear, Fashion News

There's a new way to stake your claim. It's by wearing his-and-her look alike, an obvious but effective way to get the message across. The trend is turning up in twin shirts, turtle-neck sweaters and even suits.

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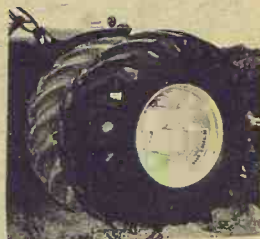
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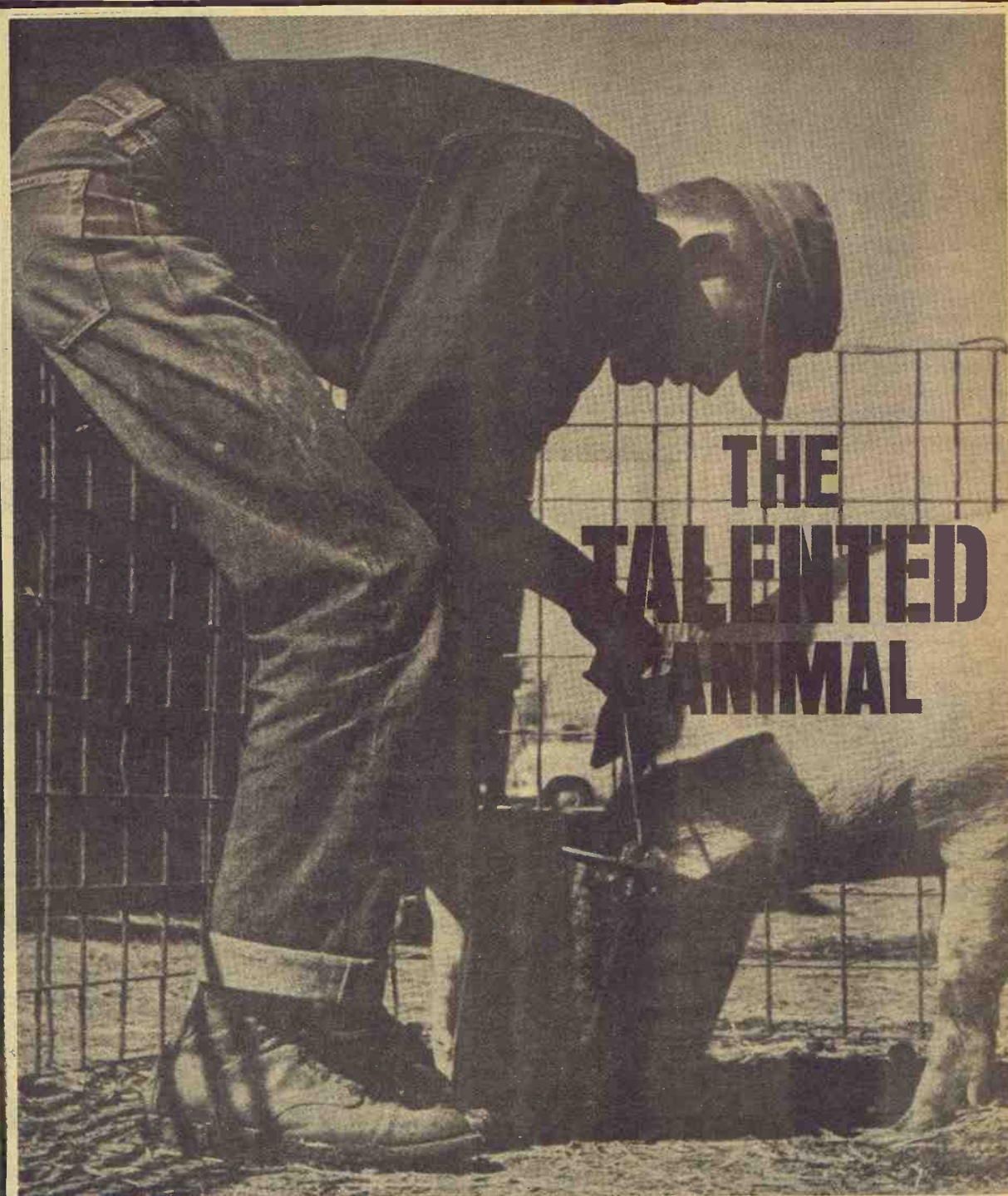
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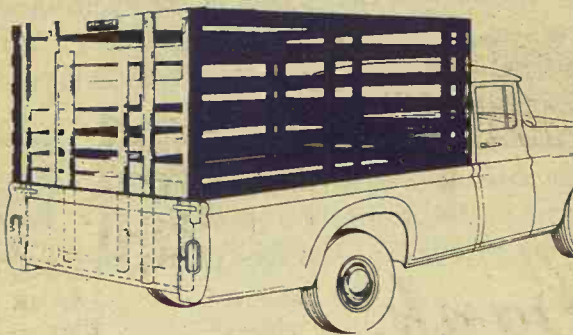
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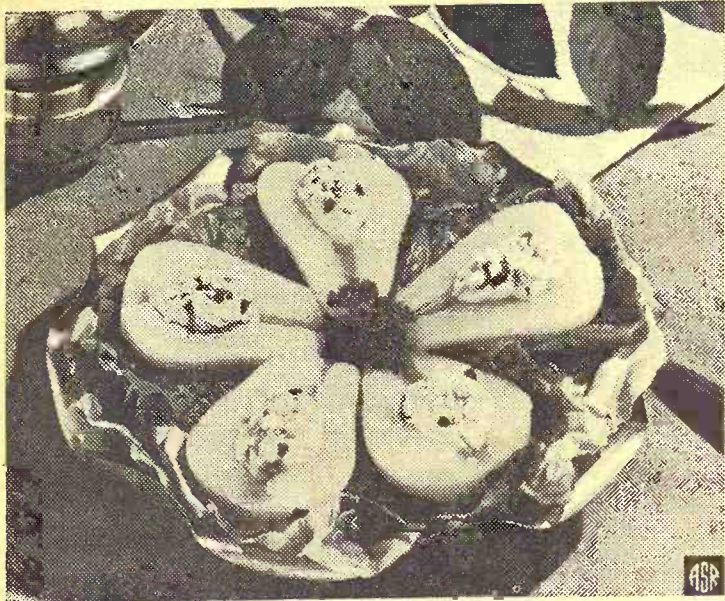


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Pears Combine With Cheese For A Continental Salad



Contrast delicately flavored, juicy canned Bartlett pears with a nippy cheese dressing. Top it off with crunchy cashew nuts and you have a mouth watering blend of flavors and textures.

Old English cheese and cream cheese are blended together with pear syrup and chopped dates, then mounded in the center of each pear half. Chopped cashew nuts go over all. Serve on individual lettuce-lined plates or arrange on a platter to accompany a buffet meal.

Use remaining pear syrup as the liquid in gelatin salads or to flavor dessert sauces. For a refreshing drink combine the syrup with fruit juices.

CONTINENTAL PEAR SALADS

- 1 (1-pound 13-ounce) can Bartlett pear halves
- 1 (5-ounce) jar old English cheese
- 1 (3-ounce) package cream cheese

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- 2 tablespoons pear syrup
- $\frac{1}{4}$ cup chopped dates
- $\frac{1}{4}$ cup chopped cashew nuts
- Lettuce

Chill pears. Bring cheeses to room temperature. Drain pears and reserve 2 tablespoons pear syrup. Place pear halves, cut-side up, on lettuce-lined platter or individual salad plates. Combine cheeses, thinning a little with reserved pear syrup. Blend in chopped dates. Place spoonful of cheese mixture in center of each pear half. Top with cashew nuts. Serves four to six.

5-CENT A BARREL HIKE FOR CRUDE OIL

G&G area oil leaseholders should pick up a few extra bucks from production on their land. There is a general increase in the price of crude oil, first announced by Phillips Petroleum and followed by other refiners in the midwest and southwest U.S. The National Cooperative Refinery at McPherson posted a 5-cent increase on the oil it buys, paying \$3.20 a barrel for 40 degree gravity crude. The price in the Texas and Oklahoma panhandle was jumped 5 cents to \$3.12.

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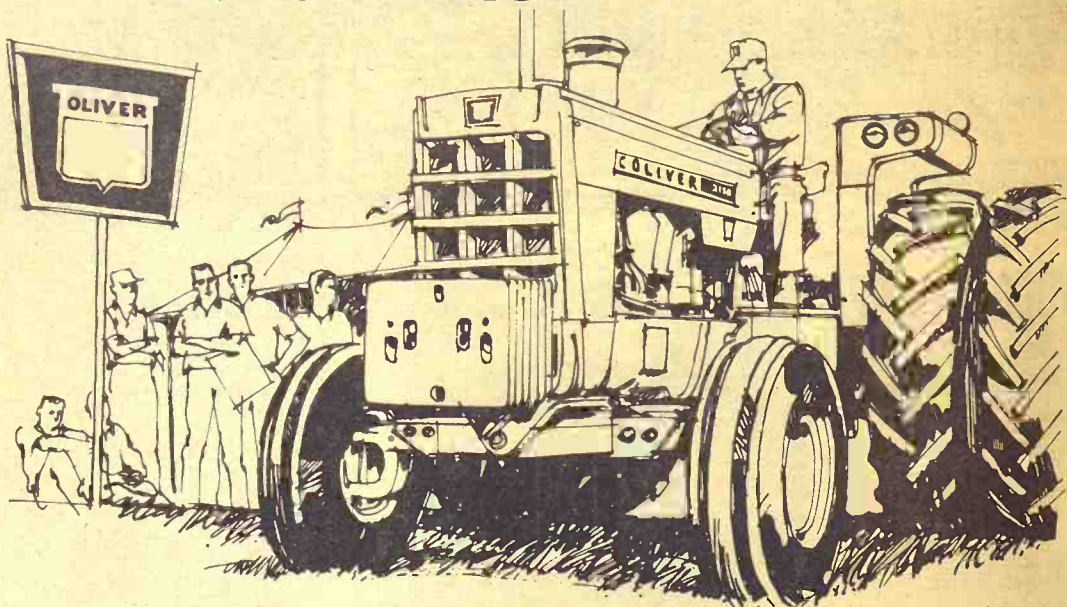
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Wheat Allotment Cut 13%

Agriculture Secretary Orville L. Freeman has announced a 13 per cent cut in federal wheat planting allotment for the 1969 crop in an effort to cut surpluses and boost farm prices.

Freeman said that in addition to the cutback in planting allotments, his department would offer diversion payments to farmers who hold planting below their allotments.

All told, the farm official said, his goal is an acreage cut of about 18 per cent from this year's level.

The 1969 crop allotment was

set at 51.6 million acres compared with 59.3 million for the 1968 crop. Under the government's wheat program, due to expire at the end of 1969, farmers who voluntarily comply with planting allotments become eligible for government price support loans plus direct support payments.

Freeman said support loans on 1969 crop wheat will be kept at the present level of a national average of \$1.25 a bushel. In addition, on 43 per cent of each participating farms' expected production, farmers will get additional payments bringing their total returns up to the full "fair" parity price, Freeman said.

Wheat parity last month was \$2.63 a bushel.

The 1968 planting allotment had also been cut 13 per cent from 1967 after a bumper, price-depressing 1967 crop. But preliminary estimates indicate the 1968 crop may set a new record of 1.55 billion bushels and increase the surplus.

"The reduced 1969 allotment," Freeman said in a statement, "will strengthen farm prices and reduce our carryover surplus by around 100 million bushels."

Freeman said his decision follows closely recommendations from a grain advisory committee in a series of field hearings for farmers. The advisory committee had proposed a 10 per cent allotment cut.

Farmers who cut acreage below their allotment and put the extra diverted acreage into conservation uses will receive diversion payments equal to 50 per cent of the county price-support loan rate on the wheat which might have been grown on the

idled acres.

Growers will be allowed to divert up to one half of their allotments and farms with allotment of 21.7 acres or less will be allowed to idle their entire allotment for diversion payment.

Freeman said also he is setting an export target of 750 million bushels for the wheat marketing year beginning July 1.

He added other features of the government grain program would be continued including permission for farmers to substitute wheat on feed grain acreage or vice versa if they enroll in the program for both types of grains.

Officials said there will be one change from the 1967 program affecting farmers who grow both wheat and barley. Farmers who wish this year to substitute wheat on acreage normally used for barley will be required to reduce the original intended barley acreage by 13 per cent.

Freeman Defends Food Plans

Orville L. Freeman, secretary of agriculture, has assured senators substantial progress has been made in the last year in expanding and improving government programs to feed the hungry.

He told a labor subcommittee that while 4,800,000 persons were getting aid from the food stamp commodity distribution programs a year ago, the number now had increased to 6,100,000.

Freeman said, however, he could not support suggestions that food stamps be made free.

This is one of the goals of the Poor People's campaign.

This, he said, could lead to diversion of the stamps to purposes other than food similar to those which occurred in the 1940s.

"Those diversions discredited the program and it was destroyed at that time," he said.

Sen. Gaylord Nelson (D-Wis.) said he could not see why Freeman would object to free stamps for persons or families with no income at all.

The secretary replied that such clearly desperate cases should be met by more successful antipoverty and welfare programs which would provide incomes to such persons.

Freeman said the commodity distribution program could hardly be transferred to the Welfare department, as has

been suggested, because it is tied in directly with his department's purchases made to support farm prices generally.

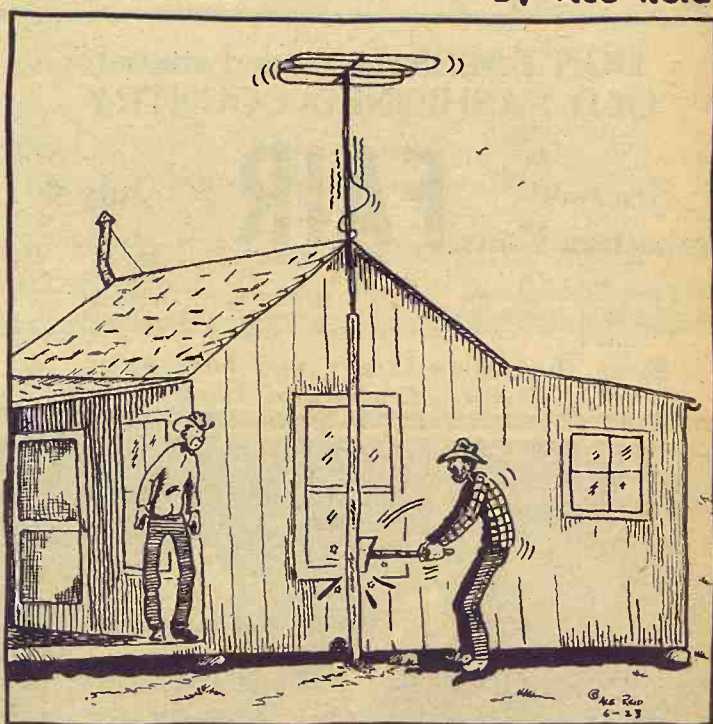
As for food stamps, he commented that "the welfare people and the OEO (Office of Economic Opportunity) would like to end them. They believe people on relief should get direct money payments."

Freeman said that when he was governor of Minnesota he found cases of old people with inadequate assistance payments who suffered from malnutrition because they took some of their money and used it to play bingo to have some companionship and brightness in their lives.

The virtue of food stamps is that they prevent such diversions, he said.

Bohannon is the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. J. Everett Bohannon of Holton.

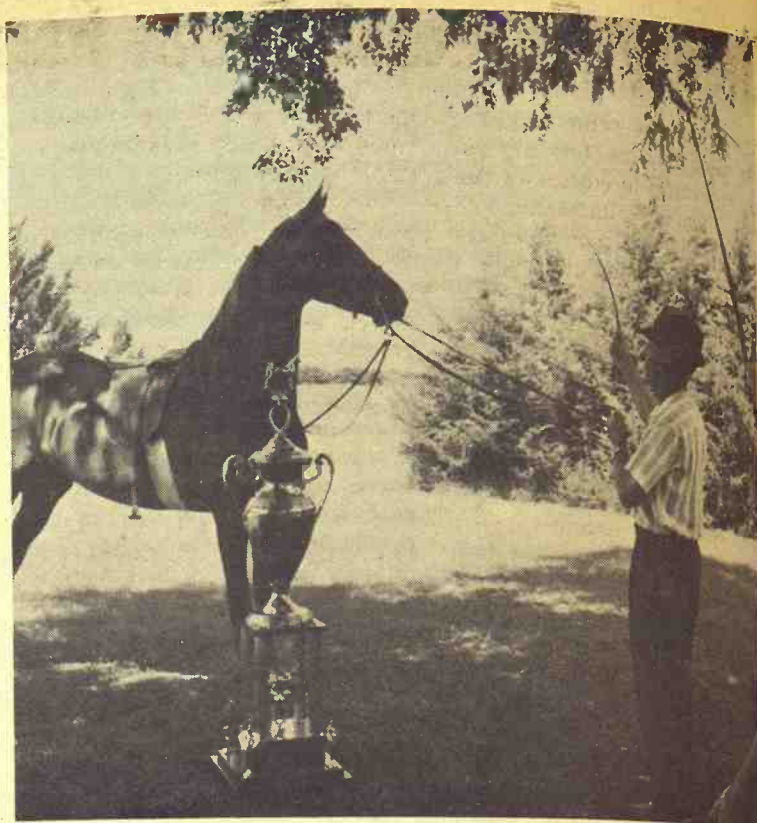

Oil Drop Mark In Russell County

RUSSELL — Kansas methods of setting values on oil property received the blame for nearly half of the 6 per cent drop in Russell County's oil valuation over the last year.

The valuation dropped \$1,417,775 to the \$19,694,630 mark.

The substitution of the state schedule, in place of the previously-used 9-county schedule, was listed by Richard Mai, county oil assessor, as one of the three factors that caused the

drop.

The second factor is that, for the first time in many years, production fell below the 8-million barrel mark for a \$7,998,552-barrel total in 1967.

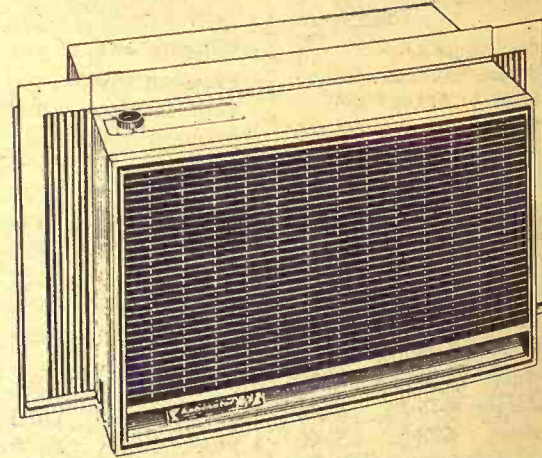
The third factor is the \$75,445 drop in value of equipment.

The 1968 total of \$19,694,630 for county oil valuation is well below the peak figure of \$37,012,555 set in 1951. Then, it was more than half the total county valuation.

But Mai said the decline would have been much greater, had it not been for some good, but small, new oil pools found in the county in the year.

Mai said there also was a drop in the number of producing wells, from 2341 to 2301.

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Cheery Forecast From Farm Journal

There may be some bright spots ahead in the farming future, according to editors of the Farm Journal, Philadelphia.

Claude Gifford, economics editor, said crops and livestock outlooks both are improving for later in 1968. He said December corn futures are 7 cents a bushel higher than last year indicating some strengthening in that area. Farmers are showing restraint in egg production, turkey and broiler placements, the spring pig crop and weights of finished cattle, he added.

All of these voluntary actions are likely to strengthen these various markets, he said.

Gifford also cited the record number of farmers signed up in the feed grains and wheat programs of the federal government.

Farmers will retire 32 to 33 million acres of feed grain crop land, an increase from 21.5 million acres last year.

Corn planting estimates are for 65 million acres of corn, down 8 percent from last year. Wheat men signed up in record numbers.

Last year, the nation's wheat farmers signed only 81 per cent of a 68-million acre allotment, Gifford recalls. With this signing, wheat production will be equal to last year almost despite the fact that 8 per cent fewer acres were planted.

Farm bargaining also has become a center for farm interest, Gifford said.

"The cost price squeeze is one reason that farmers have become so interested in 'farm bargaining power' which they see as one way to relieve the pinch."

"They want to have an active hand, right at home, in raising their prices and not be at the

mercy of politically motivated votes way off in Washington D.C.," Gifford wrote.

Heavy sign-up in the grain programs this year was caused by farmers' reaction to unusually low harvest prices last year and a "sweetened" feed grain program, along with the bitter lesson that world starvation will not bring more buyers for U.S. wheat and food grain.

"Farmers are demonstrating they'll farm the government with the same fervor they farm their land," he wrote.

The Farm Journal writer said a 3 per cent increase in soybean planting will bring that crop to the billion-bushel level the first time, but that the problem of selling the soybean crop will remain.

He believes either acreage control for soybeans or a cut in support prices will be necessary to make for disposal of the surpluses in soybeans as carryovers continue to rise each year.

Livestock prices are expected to be stronger in remaining months of the year. Hog prices are expected to move up to a peak in July or August equaling last summer's high of \$23-\$24, he said.

Fed beef prices will ease along until summer, then move up in the fall, if present number counts are accurate. Lamb prices are \$5 higher and will remain at higher prices through the fall, he added.

Egg and turkey prices are likely to move on up as both industries work their way clear of an "avalanche of production," Gifford said.

Dairymen with a 28-cent increase in hundredweight prices also are facing brighter futures.

Of special interest in the over-

all scanning of the agricultural scene by the Farm Journal reporters was a shift to specialized farming with farmers changing to fewer crops, more irrigation and more intensified farming of fewer kinds of crops.

An increase in cash renting and custom farming also was noted. Cash renting has an advantage for individual farmers of providing greater flexibility of management operation.

Farmers are continuing to look for contracts in their production. For instance, they contract to grow sugar beets, vegetables, silage, corn and other field crops in Kansas as the shift to intensified farming increases.

Other trends show the cost price squeeze is responsible in part for a rapid growth of artificial insemination in beef herds. The growing practice gives ranchers a chance to build their cow herd quality rapidly and cheaply.

Use of new products to control estrus in sheep and cattle also is growing. The Farm Journal reported some ranchers of the nation are treating up to 2000 ewes in order to bunch lamb crops.

Pork Specials To Disappear

Look for pork specials to disappear from most grocery ads.

Rising market hog prices, followed by increased wholesale quotations are almost sure to boost retail prices on loins and chops about 10 cents a pound past the middle of June. Prices at the slaughter and wholesale levels are the highest in nine to 10 months.

Chain stores started to feature pork loins and chops in late

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May because reasonable prices prevailed then. This created heavy demand for cuts and the supply contracted considerably. Many chains had to buy in a rising wholesale market to fill commitments and this added "fire" to the price climb. Moreover, a small reduction in hog movements to markets cut the volume of available chops and loins.

Central Soya Buys Naturich Plant

Sale of the Security Milling Co. of Abilene (Naturich Feeds) to the Central Soya Co., Inc. of Fort Wayne, Ind., was announced last week along with plans for stepping up production and employment at the Abilene plant.

The purchase was announced in a joint statement by H. W. McMillen, chairman of the board of Central Soya, and Jack R. Grubb, president of the Security Milling Co.

Effective date of the sale was June 10 and the new owners announced that Grubb will continue as plant manager.

Central Soya is one of the country's largest soybean processors, the second largest independent feed manufacturer in the country and one of the largest grain merchandisers — and recognized as one of the fastest-growing companies in the Agribusiness field. However, the Abilene plant is its first company-owned facility in the state of Kansas.

"While we have been marketing Master Mix feeds in Kansas the Security property will be the first company-owned facility located in Kansas," McMillen said. "We look forward to doing additional business in the area and are pleased that Mr. Grubb has accepted the position of plant manager."

McMillen said that the full line of Master Mix feeds will be made at the Abilene plant and marketed throughout Kansas and into Oklahoma.

The feed mill has a 4000 ton per month capacity, operating on two shifts. Grubb said that it will probably soon be going to double shifts and that new employees will be added as needed. The plant is presently employing 28 persons, operating one shift and Grubb said all of them will be retained.

Altogether Central Soya has about 5300 employees in its various plants in several states.

The Fort Wayne based company serves agriculture and industry through soybean processing, feed manufacturing, poultry production and processing, grain merchandising and soybean chemistry. Central Soya has facilities in 18 states, Puerto Rico, Guatemala, Trinidad and a European sales office in Brussels. It markets in the United

States and over 40 foreign countries.

Net sales last year were \$578,033,357, a record high. The company acquired through purchase, merger and construction 10 new facilities last year.

Grubb said the plant will continue to manufacture all the most popular Naturich feeds, as well as the full line of Master Mix feeds. Naturich salesmen will team up with Central Soya salesmen now in the state.

Kaw Valley Irrigation Increasing Despite Comparative Low Return

Irrigation in the Kansas River Valley has been expanding, despite the fact that under present technology, rainfall is nearly adequate in many years.

A study by a Kansas State University graduate student in economics, David Michael Nelson, indicates that irrigating field corn was not profitable for the average irrigator during 1951 to 1965.

Nelson, whose doctor of philosophy degree was conferred at KSU's annual commencement exercises June 1, surveyed Kansas River Valley irrigators in 1966. He estimated that the farmer who applied the optimal quantity of irrigation water increased yields 46.8 bushels over non-irrigated corn and realized a net return of \$7.11 an acre for 1966, a dry year.

In only five of 15 years (1951-1965) would the average irrigator have made a profit, and the most profit would have been about \$10 in 1952.

Nelson concludes that additional returns from irrigating field corn were not sufficient to pay both variable and fixed costs for the average irrigator.

He suggests that future expansion of irrigation in the Kansas River Valley needs to include fruit and vegetable crops.

Although the economics of irrigation are not encouraging, Nelson said that there were at least two situations in which a farmer might consider irrigating corn. One would be if he has a livestock operation and needs a stable yield. The other situation would be where a man was a better than average operator and could make a profit, even if his neighbor didn't. Thus, good management is important in making irrigation pay in the Kansas River Valley.

Nelson's 1966 survey revealed that the average investment was \$16,379, or \$140 per acre irrigated. The average farm had annual fixed costs of \$1100 and annual variable costs for irrigation of \$1663. Costs figured out to \$26 per acre of corn irrigated, or \$2.07 per acre inch of water pumped.

Much of the production used in the midwest will be shifted to the Abilene plant, Grubb explained.

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setup. Prior to the sale earlier this year of the Abilene Flour Milling Company, the Security and Naturich were reorganized under an independent corporate label.

"Under the new arrangement we are looking forward to considerable growth," Grubb said.



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Chinch Bug Threat In State

An area of potential chinch bug infestation in eastern Kansas has been outlined by Extension entomologists at Kansas State University. Heavy populations of these bugs can destroy wide margins of corn and sorghum fields.

The problem arises where small grains border row crops. When small grains, wheat and others, turn ripe, immature (wingless) chinch bugs begin to migrate to row crops. Now is the time to check for the bugs in the problem area, Dell E. Gates, Extension entomologist at KSU, said this week.

The Kansas area in question is bound on the west by the west border of Sumner County, north to about Salina, then northeast to include all of Dickinson, Geary, and Riley counties, then southeast from Alta Vista to near Fort Scott and on south to the Kansas border.

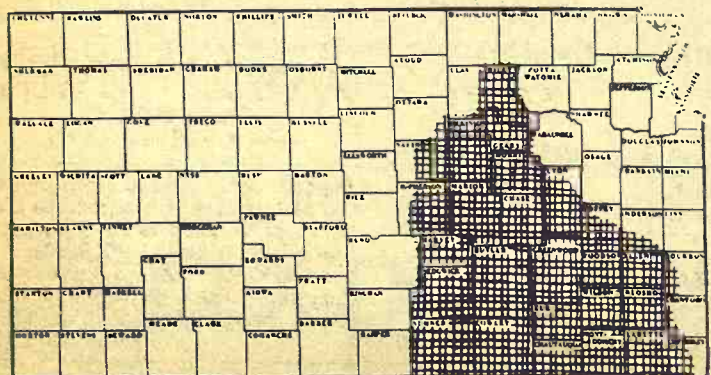
Sorghum plants less than 5 inches high are most vulnerable to chinch bugs when the migration occurs. Outside rows are killed and the migration contin-

ues through the field.

Wet weather is rough on chinch bugs, Gates reminds. Late harvest, delayed by wet weather, with grassy weeds in fields keep the bugs in the stubble until they have wings to fly to corn or sorghum. Adult bugs lay eggs at the base of corn and sorghum in July to produce the summer generation which damages these crops in late summer.

If there is a chinch bug problem, chemical control can be used now. Apply insecticide barriers at the base of the small grain plants now. Use as much water as possible (20 gallons per acre) for distribution of the insecticide. Apply a low-pressure spray early morning or late evening to get the greatest amount of spray on the ground.

Endrin applied at the rate of 1/4 pound per acre and Sevin, 1 1/4 pounds per acre, have reduced chinch bug populations 80 to 90 percent in 5 days. Toxaphene applied at 2 pounds per acre has been generally satisfactory.



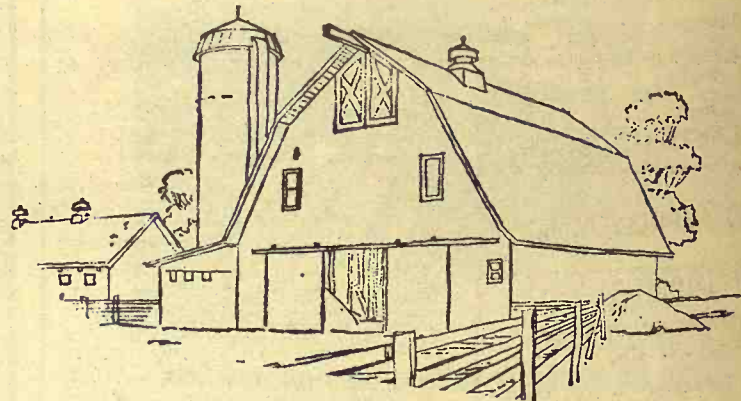
The shaded area represents potential chinch bug infestations in 1968.

Reciprocal Tax Collections Work Well For Kansas

While most states seek far and wide for new sources of revenues, Kansas has found an estimated \$2.7 million a year right next door.

As of July 1, the wheat state will have itself surrounded by reciprocal sales and user tax agreements with all its neighboring states, Missouri, Oklahoma, Nebraska and Colorado.

James McDonald, state director of revenue, estimates conservatively the agreements will bring in \$2.7 million. This all will be new monies, never collected before by the state.

The other states also will benefit, but not on the scale of Kansas, which even has its eye now on Iowa — not a border state.

Under the compacts, the border-crossing Kansas shopper who used to evade the state sales taxes is being caught for the first time.

For example, when a purchase is made in Missouri for shipment to Kansas, the Kansas 3 per cent sales tax is added on and paid back to the Sunflower State. The reverse is true for Missourians shopping in Kansas.

Merchants along the borders have to register not only in their own state, but also in the neighboring state under the agreement.

The most lucrative of the Kansas agreements is with Missouri, where there is heavy shopping over the border at Kansas City. As might be imagined, this was the first agreement Kansas initiated. It has been in effect since July 1, 1967.

The agreement with Colorado has been in effect since Jan. 1, 1968. The latest of the agreements, with Oklahoma and Nebraska, will go into operation July 1.

The first quarter intake for Kansas this year from the original two compacts was substantial: \$619,514 was received from Missouri and \$18,023 from Colorado for the first three months.

The total collections from Missouri from last July to the end of this March were \$1,532,137.

Nebraska was the last state Kansas talked into the compact and it took nearly a year. The reason was the sales tax is new to the Cornhusker state and more groundwork had to be done.

Tough To Start Feeder Futures Again

June 25, 1968

The Kansas City Board of Trade is trying again to establish a futures market in live feeder cattle.

The membership of the board has voted 16 changes in the rules and regulations for futures trading in feeder cattle. In general, the changes were designed to make trading easier. This doesn't mean that trading would be more simple. It does mean that both sides on a futures contract should find it easier to fulfill the terms.

The main trouble with the old contract — as it developed from experience — was that it favored buyers. Specifically, buyers of futures contracts simply looked upon the system as a way of getting delivery on choice grade feeders at a stated price at a certain time. They were not using the futures contracts either as price protection or in speculation.

Futures trading in live finished cattle was started by the Chicago Mercantile Exchange some years ago and later by the Chicago Board of Trade.

Kansas City is a major market for feeder cattle and also is in feeder cattle country. The Board of Trade felt there was a need for futures trading in cattle of this type and opened a market June 20, 1966.

For a time there was considerable activity. Deliveries were made on several contracts at the Kansas City stockyards, while futures were bought and sold at the Board of Trade.

The rules required that a futures contract would cover delivery of 25,000 pounds of choice or better grade live feeder steers. The average weight of all steers in the delivery unit would have to be between 700 and 800

pounds. Individual steers weighing more than 75 pounds over or under the average would not be acceptable. Up to five steers grading good might be included in a contract unit, but these steers would be discounted 2 cents a pound in price.

There were other specifications on time of delivery, notice of delivery plus other necessary requirements.

In writing the rules, the Board of Trade has consulted feeder producers, feeders, livestock commission men and other authorities. Efforts were made to produce a contract that would be equal to all. The assumption is in a futures market that those merchandising a product will use futures as a hedge against price fluctuations. Speculators enter the market in the hope of making money through price fluctuations. The product itself seldom changes hands, although in the contract a buyer actually agrees to delivery and a seller to make delivery at a certain date. In most instances, holders of futures contracts cancel them out by buying them back.

But this didn't happen often enough in the live beef cattle futures market. An Illinois cattle feeder, as an example, could look at the futures market and see that he could buy cattle delivered in Kansas City in October at a certain price. He could buy them sight unseen.

Instead of using futures as a hedge against the cost of steers in October, the Illinois feeder simply held onto his contract and took delivery. That way he was assured he would get delivery of steers graded choice under the rules, but it was more of a straight order-buying deal than a futures contract.

The final result was that trade dwindled and then finally ceased on feeder cattle futures. There hasn't been a trade in months.

Under the new rules, a delivery unit (still 25,000 pounds) may consist of all good or mixed choice and good grade feeder steers. When good grade steers are substituted for choice grades, the good grades will be discounted 1½ cents a pound under the choice. Also, the weight range was lowered to 650 to 750 pounds as a contrast to the previous 700 to 800 poundweights.

Other changes make it easier to assemble the kind of cattle at the stockyards for delivery under a futures contract. Putting it another way, there is less premium than before in taking delivery.

The Board of Trade is hopeful that the new rules will result in a viable market. Such a market would afford a producer of feeder cattle an opportunity to "fix" his sale price by selling feeder cattle an opportunity to tor could do the same by buying futures (buying cattle for future delivery). This would be made possible by speculators or investors who would seek to make money with risk capital

on market fluctuations.

With futures available on grain feeds, and on market cattle, futures on feeder cattle would make it possible to have others share in price risks all the way from the cow herd to the packing house.

Whether the feeder cattle futures market actually will thrive again in Kansas City must await time. It may be harder, some members of the trade say, to start again than it was for the first go around. Members of the trade feel such a futures market would serve an economic purpose.

Cattle Market Has Spring Fever

The beef cattle market has suffered from mild "Spring Fever." This is a weakness that often occurs as the seasons change from winter to summer. It is believed to be caused by excessive receipts of fed cattle — and possibly by some diminution of human appetites for beef. The cattle market usually recovers from this affliction during the summer.

This year average prices of Choice steers at Chicago declined about \$1 per 100 pounds from mid-March to early June. This decline was much less than many cattle and beef people had expected. Last fall it was frequently said that the "big corn crop" would lead to excessive cattle feeding and low prices this spring.

Price Recovery Expected. Prices of fed cattle frequently rise during the summer. The summer advance is not so dependable as it once was, but it still occurs more often than not. Advances occurred in six of the past eight years. For the eight years, prices averaged about \$1.50 higher in September than in May.

There are several reasons to expect prices of fed cattle to

rise during this summer. (1) Any influence of the "big 1967 corn crop" should be past. (2) The cattle cycle is at the stage where there is no opportunity for any large increase in numbers of cattle to be fed and marketed. (3) Supplies of competitive meats — pork, poultry, lamb, and veal — are not increasing. (4) Consumer buying power is strong and growing.

Prospective Supplies are Abundant. Figures in the USDA report of Cattle on Feed issued in April pointed to rather large marketings of fed cattle in June, July and August. Beef output could be 4 to 6 percent over year-ago levels. Such an increase in beef supplies might still permit a summer price advance — if other price-making factors remain strong.

Cattle feeding continues to increase rapidly in Texas. At the first of May that state had 726,000 head in feedlots, 23 percent more than one year before. Other states showing increases were Iowa, Nebraska, California, and Colorado. Arizona reported a slight reduction. Altogether these six states reported 5,828,000 cattle in feedlots, 6 percent more than a year ear-

Pasture Feed Is Good. Pastures and ranges are generally good. Grass is good to excellent in most of the eastern half of the nation. The western half has some dry spots, but seems to be better than average. Drouth in California has forced many cattle into feedlots in that state.

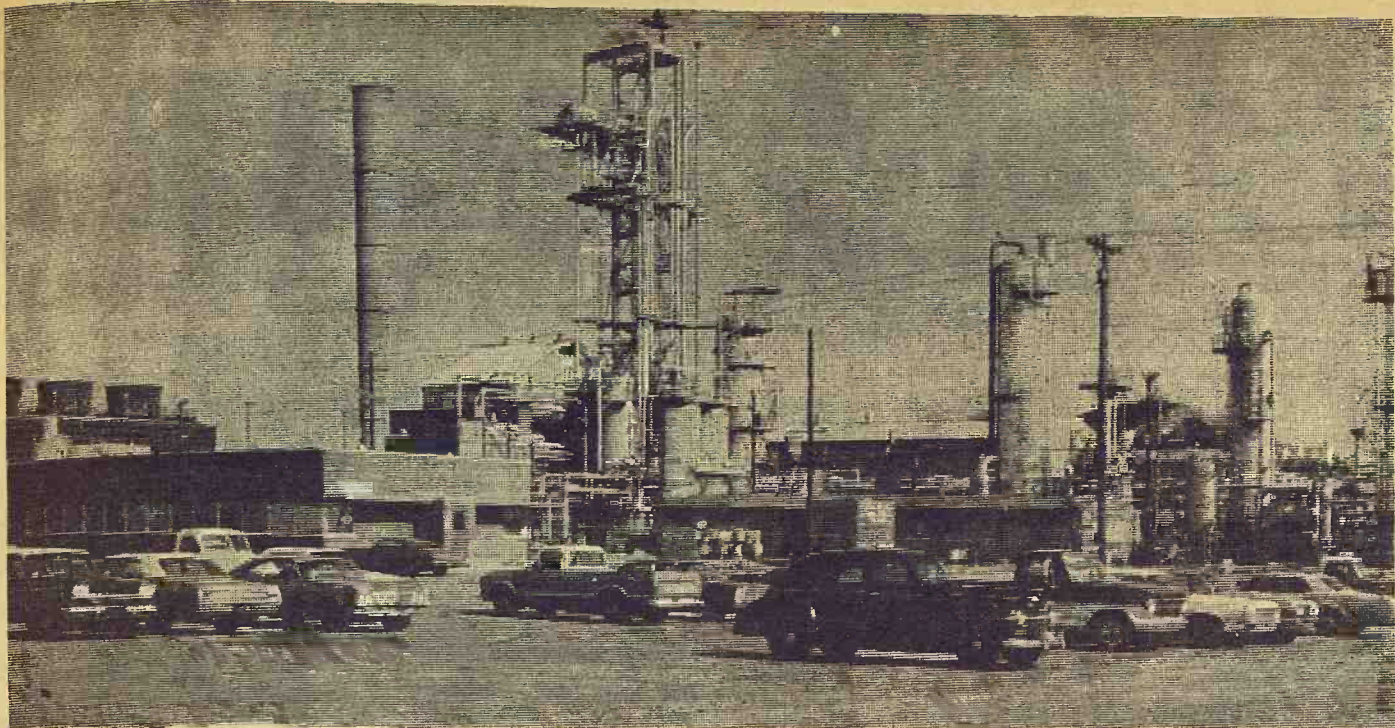

A \$15 million anhydrous ammonia plant built by Farmland Industries near Dodge City is expected to start production by July 15. The plant site covers 40

The plant will employ 65 people. It will operate round the clock, 365 days a year.

is not a fixed amount, being based on annual domestic consumption. As consumption in this country rises, exporters share in the increase, but there still is a stop line. The quotas have not yet been invoked.

The U.S. asked the cooperation of the Australian beef industry in directing production to effective demand. As one example, the Australian shipments often are seasonal — they pile onto the market at certain times of the year. Evening out these shipments might help.

The Australians also were urged to try to boost beef consumption in their own country — Per capita consumption there is 85 pounds annually compared to 107 here in the U.S. in 1967.

Aussie Weather Break May Stay Imports

A break in a longtime drought in two states in Australia may have an effect on the U.S. cattle market.

The break in a 12-year moisture shortage in Victoria and New South Wales may tend to reduce beef exports from Australia. The drought has forced the slaughter of cattle and increased the beef available for export.

Now, however, herds are being rebuilt and this may reduce slaughter. Steers for beef are selling at 12 to 13 cents a pound

live weight in Australia now, but at the same time, stock cows are bringing \$120 to \$140 per head as replacements.

Problems of international beef trade were discussed prominently at the recent Fifth World Hereford Conference at Sydney. The U.S. had 88 persons there, including Bill House of Cedar Vale, Ks., president of the American National Cattlemen's Association.

Much of the discussion revolved around what appears to be a basic division between the U.S. and the Aussies. American cattlemen are making a tremendous effort to tailor production to demand. The last two years, feeders have been urged to market cattle at lighter weights as this reduces the beef supply just the same as selling fewer cattle. The American National Cattlemen's Association has called for a 4-year moratorium on increases in the nation's beef cow herd "so that demand can catch up with supply."

The Australians, on the other hand, have the export of beef as a primary industry. They have visions of doubling their production within the next decade.

The U.S. cattlemen at the conference tried to explain why the Australians couldn't expect a complete open door policy in this country on imports.

The Americans realized, of course, that Australia must export to live. And Australia buys a lot of things from the

United States so this trade is a 2-way street.

Most of the Australian exports to the U.S. are lean beef, the kind that goes into hamburger and other processed meats.

In the early 1960s, beef imports expanded so rapidly that cattlemen demanded some sort of protection. As a result, Congress enacted quota legislation. This law establishes quotas on the amount of beef that may be imported each year. The quota

\$178 Average For 80 Acres

COUNCIL GROVE — Eighty acres of land 5½ miles east of here brought \$14,200 at auction, averaging \$178 an acre. The upland farm is about one-half native Bluestem pasture and the

Southwest Outbreak Of Screwworm

Screwworm outbreaks in the southwest are the highest since 1963 and cases continue to climb, reports USDA.

Since March 26, 1968, which ended the longest screwworm-free interval in the United States, 452 cases have been reported in the southwest. In contrast, only 61 cases were reported in the first six months of 1967.

All states along the U.S.-Mexico border have reported outbreaks with 341 in Texas, 64 in Arizona, 45 in California, and two in New Mexico.

5-Year Inspection Of Wilson Dam

WILSON — Crews are at work flushing and cleaning the outlet works, the tunnel and stilling basin at Wilson Dam preparing it for its five-year inspection.

The regular inspection is to detect any potential faults in the structure's construction, erosion or wear.

Work is also under way in the control tower, where excessive corrosion has caused the replacement of brass fittings with corrosion resistant stainless steel.

The parts to be replaced are indicator gauge stems which are used to indicate the height control gates are raised or lowered.

Recreation facilities will be expanded this summer with the construction of a shower and restroom building in the Minooka Park area. Construction is scheduled for completion late this year.

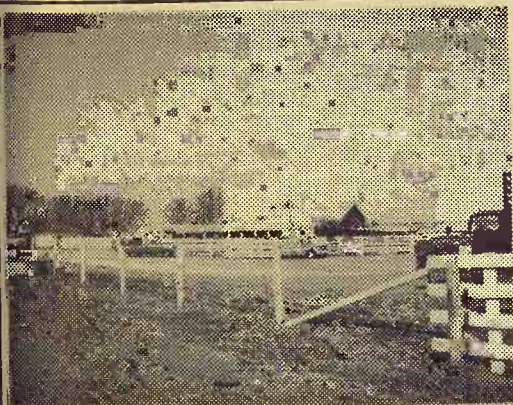
