


Reserve Call-up Puts Mark On G&G Area




"I Don't Mind . . ."

U.S. Gets Tough On Effect Of Subsidies On Poultry Exports

The United States is calling for a return to orderly international trade in poultry through the curbing of government subsidy programs which it says have disrupted world markets by promoting inefficient production.

Harald B. Malgrem, a member of President Johnson's personal trade staff, presented the United States case against subsidies before a special poultry committee of the general agreement on tariffs and trade (GATT) that ended its second session at Geneva, Switzerland, last week.

To add weight to its argument, the U.S. served notice on the eve of the three-day meeting that it would not accept being shut out of its traditional markets.

The notice came in the form of an announcement by Secretary of Agriculture Orville L.

Freeman that Washington would subsidize American poultry exports to Switzerland to meet the cut-rate prices of the Common Market and other subsidized exporters.

Switzerland is a textbook example of how U.S. poultry raisers have lost out on traditional markets through the subsidized exports of their competitors.

Freeman said it was this subsidized competition that caused the U.S. share of the Swiss import market for poultry to shrink from an average of 67 percent in 1960 and 1961 to only 3 percent last year.

Switzerland expressed concern at the GATT poultry meeting over the effect on her own chicken farmers the U.S. decision could have by increasing the amount of low-cost foreign poultry placed on the Swiss market.

The U.S. delegate is understood to have stressed that Washington was resorting to subsidies only because its efforts to promote an accord to restore order to poultry trade had been unavailing.

While repeating the U.S. view that the discontinuance of all subsidies would be the best solution to the poultry issue, he is said to have recognized that such a radical step was hardly to be expected at this time.

The U.S. is seeking an accord that would at least limit the subsidization of poultry exports and assure that traditional exporters would have access to

markets under conditions meeting GATT's fair trade rules in their spirit as well as their letter.

The sale involved the transfer of 283,000 shares of United stock to the Junction City owners, worth approximately \$6.5 million.

The Junction City Telephone Co. serves nearly 10,000 telephones in Junction City and seven surrounding communities, and is the long distance switching center for Army facilities at Fort Riley.

It reported 1967 revenues of \$1,257,000.





Cut Federal Control Over Farms, Farm Journal Poll Suggests

Farmers want less federal control of commodities and more power to bargain on their own, a poll by the Farm Journal magazine shows.

The May issue of the magazine said its poll indicated most farmers are anxious to "organ-

ize into associations that will bargain with processors and buyers over prices and other terms."

They also want a fair play "marketing rights" law which would penalize buyers who discriminate against farmers who join a co-op or bargaining group, Farm Journal said.

The magazine, which claims three million circulation, said some 85 percent of the 5,000 respondents to the poll favor collective bargaining.

In it, 68 percent said they favored the practice of withholding commodities from market to try to force higher prices.

A total of 67 percent also indicated they opposed government-appointed boards of processors, consumers and farmers to negotiate farm prices and regulate production and marketing.

The Farm Journal said 78 percent said they opposed giving

the government veto power over a contract between a bargaining group and buyers if the government feels it unduly raises prices.

"If there's one thing clearer than any other," the Journal said in an accompanying editorial, "it's the fact that farmers want to call the shots themselves. They are asking for a favorable climate from Congress in which to bargain — but they do not want the heavy hand of government in bargaining itself."

Talk Another Hike In Cost Of Medicaid

Secretary of Welfare Wilbur J. Cohen says estimates of the cost of Medicaid, the federal program of medical aid for the poor, may have to be raised sharply over projections made only last December.

Cohen told Sen. Carl T. Curtis, R-Neb., in a statement that while the annual federal cost of the program five years from now was estimated in December at \$1.7 billion, the estimate probably will have to be raised to \$2.5 billion or as high as \$3 billion.

The \$1.7 billion estimate to which Cohen referred was made by a Senate-House conference

committee in a report issued Dec. 11.

It now appears that the 1972 estimate will be almost reached this fiscal year, a spokesman for the Medicaid program said Thursday in response to a reporter's question.

Cohen's statement was in re-



Problems, Problems For Rainmakers

UNIVERSITY PARK, Ja. — When it rains, it pours.

That about sums up the woes of Charlie Hosler, rainmaker.

Mr. Hosler is no flim-flam artist with crazy gadgets aimed at the sky. He's dean of the School of Earth and Mineral Sciences at Pennsylvania State University here, and he's a leading expert on "cloud physics" — which is to say, rainmaking.

With \$130,000 provided by the National Science Foundation, Hosler for the past six years has been trying to find out how rainfall can be redistributed inside storm fronts, thus concentrating showers in areas that need moisture.

But with the unusually heavy rainfall this summer, Pennsylvania farmers hurt by crop damage — and some lawmakers as well — are taking exception to Hosler's aerial activities.

These farmers pin the recent heavy rains directly on Hosler and his rainmaking research. Others blame him for the disastrous seven-year drought that ended this summer. Still others claim he's polluting the air with the iodine vapors used in cloud-

seeding, causing injury to man and beast.

"There's no question that during a dry season, cloud-seeding aggravates conditions to produce a drought," claims Paul Hoke, a St. Thomas, Pa., dairy farmer. "And during a wet cycle, it triggers even more rain and possibly floods. It's disaster either way."

While Hoke may feel there's little he can do about the weather, he thinks there's a great deal he can do about Hosler.

Hoke heads the one-year-old Tri-State Natural Weather Association, Inc., a group of about 1000 Maryland, West Virginia and Pennsylvania farmers protesting "unregulated" commercial and experimental "weather control" efforts.

Pennsylvania joins a growing number of states that are debating the merits of cloud-seeding. In recent years, more than 20 states have passed laws requiring rainmakers and other climate tinkers to secure licenses.

Typical is New Mexico's law, which set up a Weather Control and Cloud Modification Commis-

sion to license rainmakers for one month at a time.

(The New Mexico law doesn't interfere with rain dances by Indians on reservations; this comes under the heading of appeals to the deity, which, under the law, the commission can't restrict.)

Mrs. Scott Smith, who owns a 170-acre grain farm near Warfordsburg, Pa., sums up the view of many farmers in the area: "They ought to let God run the weather. He's always done a good job of it and always will. People never starved when the weather was let alone."

Apparently, a few farmers have started anti-rainmaking campaigns of their own. In the summer of 1966, during the height of the drought, the state department of agriculture attempted an aerial survey of oak wilt disease in south central Pennsylvania" Fulton County.

The survey came to an abrupt halt when farmers started shooting at the low-flying planes. Says a state official, "We had to go on the local radio every hour and say our planes had nothing to do with rainmaking."

No planes were hit. Hosler says that, to his knowledge, his plane hasn't been fired upon.

In 1965, the state legislature passed a law giving county commissioners the right to ban cloud-seeding. But farmers complain that the law is being ignored by Hosler and orchard owners using cloud-seeding to suppress fruit-damaging hail storms.

Many farmers reject Hosler's rebuttal that his seeding is limited to clouds over state forest land. They also don't believe orchard owners' claims that their cloud-seeding efforts ceased after 1964.

"I think they're all lying. There's a lot of secret cloud-seeding going on," mutters one Fulton County farmer, Garnet Gillan, a St. Thomas farmer who says he lost a third of his crop during the drought, says, "I live right where rain clouds usually enter the area, and I've seen planes go into those clouds and break them up."

"Utterly ridiculous," retorts Hosler.

The scientist points out that his work is aimed at redistributing the rain inside a "storm system," and he argues that this can't be done during a drought when there aren't any rain clouds with which to work.

"There's no possibility our research could be causing the troubles of these farmers," he adds. "We seed maybe a single cloud, miles away from their farms, and then only during the

school year — the drought hit the farmers in the summer when our plane is grounded."

Unappeased, some anti-rainmakers charge that the biggest danger of cloud-seeding is air pollution. Elmer Rife, an Upper Strasburg, Pa., logger, says that this spring he suffered pine burns on his arms after brushing against trees in an area beneath what he claims were seeded clouds. "It was just like getting a sunburn," he says. "I feel sure the rainmaking planes had something to do with it."

Hosler contends the quantities of iodine used are too small to be harmful. But William O. Shuman, the state legislator who introduced the rainmaking control bill, says that cloud seeding is having "toxic effects upon all flora and fauna." Birds have been especially hard hit, he says. And he adds, "The production abilities of eagles have been particularly weakened."


11% Population Gain In 8 Years

cores are available in square, round or cylindrical shapes. The one-piece latex foam cores are easier to use than loose stuffings and they hold their shape permanently for the latex foam will not shift or mat down.

Quite often you can find suitable covering fabrics in your home. A bright dress, a pretty towel, apron, tablecloth, old curtains or even a swatch of carpeting can be converted into a throw pillow.

Speedup In Farm Exodus?

The nation's farm population has declined about 778,000 to 19,817,000 and apparently at a faster rate than during the last full decade, according to the government's latest estimate.

Preliminary results of the Agriculture department's economic research division show that in the 12 months through April, 1967, about 1,150,000 people of all ages either moved away from farms or lived on lands where agricultural production ceased.

This farm population loss was partly offset by nearly 300,000 people who either moved to farmlands or took up farming, for a net loss of 851,000 from migration or cessation of farming. The excess of births over deaths among farm people was a further offset contributing to the estimated total.

Because the annual estimates of farm population changes fluctuate in part from sampling variations, the government places more reliance on longer-period computations. Thus for 1960-67,

the farm population showed an estimated annual average net loss of 811,000 because people left the land or ceased production for sale, for an annual decline rate of 6.1 percent.

The rate of loss over the 1950-60 decade was 5.3 percent.

The rural civilian population includes everyone, regardless of occupation, living on farms of 10 or more acres selling at least \$50 of products, or of less than 10 acres from which products worth at least \$250 were sold the preceding year.






May Get Farm Bill Earlier Than Expected

The Senate Agriculture Committee reversed itself last week and decided to bring out a general farm bill this year.

The committee had decided last February to have hearings this year on changes that might be needed to the present program but to postpone drafting a bill until next year.

Program Ends in '69

The present farm program expires at the end of 1969. The administration has recommended it be continued with some changes. Recently the House Agriculture Committee approved a bill for a straight one-year extension of the program.

Chairman Allen J. Ellender, D-La., of the Senate Agriculture Committee, said a new bill would be drafted based on the grass roots information developed at the committee hearings several weeks ago.

"It is to be in keeping with the hearings," he told a newsman.

General Agreement

Ellender, who favored the idea of a bill in 1969, said there was general agreement among committee members that legislation should now be drafted and enacted if possible.

He said the bill would be drafted immediately and there might be a day or two of hearings by the committee in the next two weeks.

"I hope to have the bill before the Senate early in June," he said.



Russell Throws Out Reappraisal

RUSSELL — A controversial reappraisal program to cost taxpayers \$73,000 has been scrapped by the County Commission which has proposed its own tax schedule.

In the 271 tax protest cases in which the commission's schedule was used, the county lost \$500,000 from its appraised valuation. "This figure may run much higher," said Russell County Atty. Jan Banker.

New property valuation figures were set by a reappraisal board headed by Carl Missimer, Russell, who has been involved in a running dispute with rural property commissioners.

Last February, Commission Chairman Vaughn Humes, Bunker Hill, charged Missimer with "taking it upon himself to change the grades of farm land" without consulting two farm appraisers — Lee Ross, Luray, Kans., and Bethol Hirt, who died recently.

"Rural land in Russell County has been graded in three price zones," said County Commissioner Ralph Tittle.

"We received about 600 protests on this matter."

Banker said in the event the state forces the county to conduct a new reappraisal, the cost will be \$100,000 to \$125,000 for a professional firm.

Cultivate By Night To Reduce Weed Growth

Ten acres of fallow ground near Tribune is the site of an experiment which may help prove a theory that some weeds must be exposed to light before they will germinate.

Richard Waldren, RR 1, Tribune, a junior in agronomy at Kansas State University, became interested in the theory while he was a student of Dr.

Kurt Feltner, K-State associate professor of agronomy.

Feltner, who was conducting laboratory experiments on the theory at the time, had gathered soil samples at night and germinated part of them in darkness. Others were exposed to red, far-red and white light. In all cases, germination was poorest in soil samples receiving no light. Although precise data were difficult to obtain, Feltner did find enough significant data to call for additional research.

Under Feltner's direction, Waldren tried the experiment on the ten acres, using a disc and stub-

ble mulch sweep to work plots of sandy loam and silt loam soils. Part of the plots were worked in the day and part at night.

The work was demanding at times, Waldren said, because it was sometimes necessary to work until dusk on part of the plots, then eat and wait for complete darkness to go to work on the rest.

In some plots, the weed population remained about the same, but germination of two species, pigweed and devilsclaw, was reduced 40 percent when cultivated at night.

Waldren said he thought the 40 percent reduction was significant and indicated need for additional research. Because many seeds lie dormant in want of light, it may be beneficial to expose these seeds to light by plowing before planting crops, Waldren said.

Use of implements covered with materials that either filter out or direct certain wavelengths is not feasible at the present time, but considerable research should be applied to the idea, Waldren said.

TOPEKA OK'S CHEMICAL MACE FOR POLICE USE

The chemical Mace is back in good standing with the Topeka police department. The chemical, which renders a person semi-helpless and has been used by police in controlling rioters, had been recalled from use after a warning concerning after-effects of it by the U.S. Surgeon General, but Topeka Police Chief Dana Hummer said he had reissued it for use by his officers after studying the report and concluding that there was no evidence of lasting harmful effects.

An 'Armored Safety Belt' Around GM Cars

General Motors Corp. says that many of its 1969 motor cars will be equipped with a virtual armored safety belt running along the inside of all car doors as an extra safety pre-

caution.

G. M. said the heavy steel beams would tend to cut down the hazards of side impacts, one of the biggest hazards in car collisions.

Carl Heeden, general director of engineering at G.M.'s Fisher Body division which developed the new feature, said the bar will increase the passengers' safety by "preventing the impacting car from penetrating the impacted car and it will cause the impacted car to be pushed aside."

Each side impact bar is eight inches high, two inches deep, and in 4-door sedans will weigh about 41 pounds, plus eight pounds of complementary structure change, mostly strengthened door latches and hinge pillars.

G. M. disclosed no probable costs on the newest safety item but outside sources estimated it would cost about \$10 a car. There was no indication how much, if any, of the cost would be reflected in price increases on the cars.

For 1969, the bars will be put on most full-sized Chevrolets, Pontiacs, Buicks and Oldsmobiles.

A GM spokesman said that since the beams require new styling and a whole new body, they will be installed on other GM cars in the next one to three

years.


The beams will not protrude into the cars, he said, and only





New Purina Plant At Liberal

Here is the new chow manufacturing plant just put into operation in Liberal by Ralston Purina. The mill has a maximum annual capacity of 100,000 tons thru a highly automated process. Most of the tonnage from the Liberal mill will be cattle feeds.

Major Pipeline Project Thru G&G Area

Natural Gas Pipeline Company of America announced expansion plans for 1968 which will increase its daily delivery capacity by 468 million cubic feet for the 1968-69 winter. Projects are planned in four

Kansas counties and in 47 counties in 10 other states. Kansas construction will include one 12,000 horsepower intermediate compressor station each in Ellsworth and Washington counties.

On May 3, the company received approval from the Federal Power commission, Washington, D.C., for the first segment of expansion — an addition in capacity of 364 million cubic feet at an estimated cost of \$68.5 million.

Construction on this project — involving both the company's transmission and underground storage facilities — will begin this month.

The company filed a supplemental application on May 8 requesting approval of plans to construct facilities to increase its peak-day delivery capacity by an additional 104 million cubic feet at an estimated cost of \$68.5 million.

George P. Garver, NPGL president, said total construction plans for 1968 represent one of the largest and most expensive expansion programs in company history.

Patrol Looking For Troopers

The Kansas Highway Patrol has 25 Trooper positions to be filled this summer. Fifteen of these openings are new Trooper positions authorized by the 1968 Legislature. Most of the other openings are the result of retirements since the last civil service examination for Trooper in 1966.

Written tests for these positions will be held in June in several cities over the state. The men who pass the written tests will be given the final physical-fitness tests, and car-driving tests.

The starting salary is \$505 a month and uniforms and all equipment are furnished. A Trooper should be earning \$647 per month after 27 months. Counting longevity increases, Troopers can work up to \$788. Still higher salaries can be earned by promotion to sergeant or other officer ranks.

No previous law enforcement experience is necessary. The Patrol will put all new men through an intensive ten-week training program at the Patrol Academy at Salina immediately after the appointments are made, probably in September.

The trooper examination is open to men born between September 1, 1933 and October 1, 1946. They must be at least 5 feet 8 inches in height, and have graduated from high school or have equivalent education.

The rural district includes all of Geary County with the ex-

ception of three incorporated cities — Junction City, Miford and Grandview Plaza — and two areas in Liberty Township con-

tained in Morris County and Wabaunsee County districts.



Cut May Wheat Forecast

The Agriculture Department has estimated this year's winter wheat crop at 1,193,553,000 bushels, down two percent from last year's record production.

The department gave no forecast for the spring wheat crop but a March report on prospective planting said a harvest of 315 million bushels was possible.

Thus a spring crop of this size and the new winter wheat estimate would give a total crop of 1,508,553,000 bushels. This compares with last year's record crop of 1,524,000 bushels and with the 1961-65 average of 1,214,000. Wheat is being grown this year under a government program calling for a reduction by about 13 per cent in plantings under last year.

The yield of winter wheat this year was estimated at 27.9 bushels an acre compared with 22.3 bushels last year and 22.7 for the 1962-66 average.

The condition of the rye crop on May 1 was put at 87 per cent of normal compared with 82 per cent a year ago and 86 percent for the five-year May 1 average.

The condition of pastures on May 1 was reported at 85 per cent of normal compared with 74 percent a year ago and 77 per cent for the five-year aver-

age. The indicated production of winter wheat by major produc-

ing states included: Missouri 42,330,000; Kansas 192,800,000; Oklahoma 135,650,000.





Another Area Hassle Over Reappraisal

EL DORADO — The Butler County Taxpayers Association will go to court to prevent the use of recent property reappraisals for 1968 taxes in Butler County.

Association President Archie Leben said that the board of directors had voted to seek a temporary restraining order and a permanent injunction against the commission's use of the re-assessment valuations.

Walter F. McGinnis told the board that Ron Dwyer, state property valuation director, had not ordered the immediate use of reappraisals and had told him that he would not order such.

McGinnis also quoted Dwyer as saying that Butler County's reappraisal was in a worse mess than any other county in Kansas.

But Dwyer refused to jump into the dispute.

In a letter to the board of county commissioners made public last week, Dwyer confirmed that he had not issued an order directing the appraisals be placed on the tax rolls in 1968.

His letter was in reply to correspondence from two of the three county commissioners and was dated May 3.

The commissioners appeared before the taxpayers group May 1 and announced that they would not implement the new valuations this year.

The association then passed a resolution that promised support for the commission in any legal action that might be taken against them by the state.

However, on May 7 the commission reversed their decision and voted two to one to use the valuations this year. Commission chairman Charles Dixon voted against the move while

Commissioners Joe Faulconer and Worth Showalter were in favor.

After the commission reversal the board of directors of the taxpayers association called the Wednesday meeting when they decided to start court action.

Cut Dollar Drain, But Not Enough, For Poor Reasons

The international dollar drain slowed to about \$600 million during the first quarter of this year, a three-fold improvement

from the previous three months despite a deteriorating trade picture.

The Commerce department said a strike at the New York port, the copper strike and incipitation of a possible steel strike this year may have reduced the trade surplus by as much as \$500 million in the first quarter.

Despite the improvement, the deficit in the U.S. balance of payments is still running at an unacceptable pace for the administration which hopes to cut \$3 billion this year from last year's deficit of \$3.57 billion.

At the first quarter rate the deficit for 1968 as a whole would come to \$2.4 billion.

55% Of Feeders Now In Commercial Lots

Cattle feeding "down on the farm" is expanding in Kansas, but commercial feeding is the new giant of the cattle industry of the "Midway" state.

"Since 1966 more than half of our cattle have been fed in lots with at least 1,000-head capacity," Dr. Phil A. Phar, Extension livestock specialist at Kansas State University, reported this week.

Ten years ago commercial feeders in Kansas handled 26 percent of the grain-fed cattle and calves and farmer-feeders fed the remainder of the 171,000 head. Now commercial feeders feed 55 percent of the cattle finished in Kansas — at the start of 1968, commercial lots contained 338,000 head while farmer-feeders had 272,000 head in feedlots. Capacity of commercial feedlots has grown tenfold in the last decade.

In 1966, 1 1/2 million grain-fed cattle and more than 2 million grass-fed cattle, totaling nearly 3 1/2 million head, were marketed from Kansas. "Grass-fed" figures include those pastured on bluestem and other tall grasses, short grass ranges, and wheat pasture, and some that were wintered mainly on roughages and limited grain.

In the finishing phase, the skill most important to a farmer-feeder or feedlot manager is the ability to produce cheap, efficient feedlot gains, Phar said. Improved nutrition and new methods of feed processing have played major roles in improving efficiency. He mentioned the use of steam-processed and high-moisture grain as two of these advances.

"A trend in Kansas for smaller feeders is to consider a shift in operations to growing instead of fattening programs," Phar said. In this way a feeder can increase his capacity without increasing his feed storage, crop land, equipment, and other resources, and take advantage of the high efficiency of commercial feedlots for the fattening phase. So, commercial feedlots have created a new market for

smaller feedlot operators.

"There is little doubt that cattle feeding will continue to expand in Kansas," Phar said. Abundance of feed grains, favorable climate, accessibility to markets, and availability of replacement cattle are major factors. He also mentioned skill, intelligence, and attitude of Kansas feeders as definite favorable factors.

Use of "futures" market is an example of growth to come in the cattle industry. However, Phar cautioned that any feeder considering use of "futures" must know the cost involved in feeding cattle.

More research is needed to refine methods of feed processing and work for greater efficiency in feeding, he explained. This research will have to be done in the feedlot and in the laboratory. The cattle feeding industry, the University, and all allied industries must work together to maintain and improve Kansas' position as a major cattle-feeding state, he said.

'The Chief' Goes Way Of All Passenger Trains

The Interstate Commerce Commission has given the Santa Fe Railway permission to discontinue its famed Chicago-Los Angeles streamliner, the Chief.

The commission ordered the Santa Fe to continue operating for one year another Chicago-Los Angeles passenger train, the Grand Canyon.

The Chief long has been considered one of Santa Fe's luxury transcontinental trains. The railroad had cited declining patronage and loss of mail from

several trains as reasons for proposing the end of the trains.

Here Are Suggestions On Keeping Help

Since labor has become such a terrific problem on farms, the Top Farmers of America Association (TFA) recently published a list of ways in which some of their membership have attracted farm laborers on a steady basis.

Some of the simpler incentive plans listed by the Cornell survey included: 1 percent of crop sales; 10 cents a case for eggs sold; 3 to 5 cents a hundredweight for milk sold; or, 50 cents a hundredweight for over 10,000 pounds of milk sold for each cow.

The Cornell survey indicated incentive payments equalled about 8 percent of the total wages paid to employees.

Kansas farmers and ranchers are finding that the offers of free rent and utilities, garden spot, milk and other items do not always attract top employees for long periods, too.

Regular farm labor bulletins indicate experienced farm hands can command all this benefit plus wages of \$250 to \$500 a month in many counties of the state. These jobs often are unfilled for long periods, officials said.

The Kansas Supreme Court has upheld Fletcher's ruling in the case of Frederick W. Mann, a Waterville farmer, against Tatge Chemical Co., Herington, which was tried without jury April 7 and 8, 1966.

Mann charged the chemical firm and its owners misappropriated his trade secret for manufacturing a device for combating face fly among livestock.

He said company officials were shown the device in late summer or early fall of 1961, and the firm received a patent on a similar device in June, 1964.

Mann asked for \$100,000 in actual damages, \$100,000 in punitive damages and a 25 per cent royalty on all devices manufactured or sold, which was said to be 6,500 at the time of the trial two years ago. Manufacture has continued.

Fletcher found there was an implied contract between Mann and company officials. By use of various components in a certain way he was an innovator, and the Tatge firm is liable for damages.

The Supreme Court decision said Mann's overall process was an innovation, but the individual components were not. It affirmed Fletcher's ruling.

An agreement made in a pre-trial conference calls for a jury trial to set the amount of damages if the court found Mann had been damaged.

Fletcher said another pre-trial conference would be held and a date for the jury trial, expected to be in September, would be set.

Mann's device has an inverted cone as a primary part. It is mounted in a livestock area, with a block of salt or other mineral under it, and at a height so the livestock comes in contact with the rim of the cone in reaching for the salt.

A reservoir of insecticide is provided at the top of the cone, with a wick extending out of it, downward and around the rim of the cone, thus dispensing the insecticide to the face of the livestock.

Mann said he started his device with the top of a chick brooder device as the cone, with a length of conduit pipe to carry the wick from the insecticide reservoir to the rim. The wick was made by sewing pieces of flare wick together.

Mann said he invited officials of the Tatge firm to view the device, with the possibility of undertaking its manufacture. They declined to enter into an agreement, he said, and then infringed on his trade secret by producing and marketing a similar device.

The Tatge company applied for a patent on its device October 23, 1963. One was granted June 2, 1964, and issued June 8, 1965.

COTTONWOOD FALLS — Members of a newly formed Chase County Taxpayers Association have started legal action here to block the use of new appraisals on the grounds that the property tax system in Kansas now is unlawful and oppressive. Although taxpayers in several Kansas counties have asked the courts to block reappraisal for various reasons, the Chase County action could have far-reaching effects because it challenges the unequal assessment ratio across the state on constitutional grounds.

The taxpayers association petition says 25 counties still have not complied with the law requiring appraisal, and adds that the 25 counties are not expected to comply during the current tax year. The petition contends that the state-wide average ratio of assessed values to real values this year is only 18 per cent.

The petition points out that the state collects a tax levy of 1.5 mills on all property in Kansas and asserts that, since many counties have assessed property at less than 30 per cent, it is unfair and unconstitutional for the state to levy a flat rate of 1.5 mills on land in Chase and other counties which have complied with the law.

The taxpayers association asks the court to order the Chase County Clerk, Darwin Reyer, to hold up the 30 per cent reappraisal because of the

unequal assessment ratio across the state.

Several other reasons for action are listed by the taxpayers association.

The petition contends that land in adjoining Lyon and Greenwood counties is appraised lower than similar property in Chase County. Land in pastures divided by the county line is appraised higher in Chase County than it is in a neighboring county, the petition states. The petition states.

The petition also said that utilities in Chase County, which are appraised by the state property valuation director, are assessed at less than 30 per cent of real value.

The association says that, although the state law requires land to be assessed at 30 per cent of its justifiable value, no effective means of enforcing this requirement have been set up by the legislature, except for the powers given to the state director of property valuation.

The petition claims that the property valuation director has not been able to achieve the 30 per cent assessment throughout the state.

The association said that the methods set up for finding "justifiable value" of property are "so ambiguous and vague that they cannot be reasonably interpreted and applied."

The petition also alleges that an illegal taxation will result if the county clerk is allowed to

use the 30 per cent assessment.

The association asks the district judge to restrain the county clerk "temporarily and permanently" from using the reappraisal figures for 1968 taxes.

As an alternative, the group asks the court to order the county clerk to cut the assessment ratio back from 30 per cent to the present statewide average. As a second alternative, it asks that the county clerk be ordered to use the 1967 property assessment level.

Farming Third Most Hazardous In Safety Risk

Time spent eliminating hazards and unsafe practices may be the most important time spent on the farm this year, Dr. Harold E. Jones, director of the Kansas Extension Service, said this week.

Farming ranks behind mining and construction work on the list of most hazardous occupations. Last year there were 45 fatalities on Kansas farms and a great number of crippling accidents. Tractor accidents took half of this toll, and use of other machinery accounted for an additional 18 percent.

Death on the farm is also associated with livestock handling, use of vehicles, burns, and falls. Electrocuting, drowning, and crash of crop-dusting plane each accounted for a death on Kansas farms last year.

Tractors are the main target for improved safety practices on Kansas farms, Jones said. Thirteen of the 22 fatalities associated with tractors last year were results of overturns. Death also resulted from falls from a tractor, being pinned between tractor and other object, and others were associated with mowing, silage loading, and pulling a tree limb.

Late morning and afternoon hours apparently are the most dangerous for Kansas farmers. This, of course, is reflected in the high percentage of deaths from tractor use. Death incidence increases at 11 a.m. and drops after 6 p.m.

Two-thirds of the Kansas farm fatalities last year were men over 50 years of age. Younger men shouldn't rest easy because during the past 5 years 77 percent of all farm-work accidents involving people under 30 years of age were attributed to tractor use.





See a Profit In Walnut Timber

Jerry Nickel, left, who farms near Burns in Butler county, has had encouragement from K-State forester Hank Deutsch, right, that he may turn a good profit from a 8 to 10-acre plot of walnut on his farm. A one-acre plot has been marked for study and evaluation.

In fact, a number of farmers in the Whitewater Watershed District are beginning to get serious about planting new stands of walnut trees and cultivating their native stands for lumber.

Deutsch said that a scattered grove of 75-year old walnut trees on the banks of the Whitewater river near Towanda recently sold for several thousand dollars. The trees were owned by the Kiowa Lands Co.

Growth of the trees on the Nickel plot is figured to be about two inches every seven years. By thinning the stand Deutsch figures the growth rate might be increased to three inches a year. Thus, he figures that in about three decades the trees would be around marketable size — about 18 to 20 inches in diameter.

Walnut is used for furniture, wood panelling, and gunstocks, among various things, and the supply is markedly under demand. Deutsch figures that the return would be at least a \$40 an acre net. Thirty more years, of course, is quite a time to wait, but the gross income would be significant considering that the land presently brings in no income and washes too badly from annual floods to expect any crops to be grown on it.



Lyons Creek Financing To Court Test?

JUNCTION CITY — A twice-rejected 2-mill tax levy for financing watershed construction in the four-county Lyons Creek Watershed District appears headed for a court test.

Three district residents have filed a protest petition calling for an election on a new 2-mill levy adopted April 2 by the district directors.

Hayes B. Beck, district president, said Lee Hornbaker, Junction City attorney for the board, has said the petition was filed after the 30-day deadline specified in the legal notice published April 4 in daily newspapers

at Junction City and Abilene.

The same notice also was published a week later in a Council Grove daily newspaper and in weeklies at Herington and Marion. The 30-day notice was not removed, according to Beck.

Spokesmen for the group carrying the petition said they were under the impression the deadline for submission of the petition was 30 days after the April 11 publication. Beck said Hornbaker said the deadline was May 5, which was 30 days after the publication in Junction City and Abilene.

"The petitions were accepted


May 9 by the district secretary but were rejected on the advice of our attorney," Beck said.

Beck said if the board refuses to accept the petitions, he believes a court test will be made by the circulators.

The district has accumulated \$18,000 which is available for construction work. Its use was blocked by the two previous rejections in elections which were forced by filing valid protest petitions.

The state is holding up submission of the district general work plan to Congress for authorization of more than \$2 million in federal funds until a local method of financing is approved.

How Car Insurance Stacks Up

G&G area drivers may figure their auto insurance is high enough, but the chart above suggests it might be worse.

The chart, from Insurance Information Institute, shows a typical insurance cost now and 10 years for Kansas City and St. Joseph plus nine other urban centers. Presumably rates in the G&G area for drivers in towns of 20,000 or less are slightly lower than even the lowest figure from the above chart, \$138 total in Atlanta.

These are manual rates charged by companies belonging to rating organizations that file rates with state insurance departments. Individual companies may deviate from these rates, as do most of the high volume mutual companies which generally show lower rates.

This is a typical policy with a car valued at \$2500. All figures apply to a car owned by a family with no youthful driver. The safe driver insurance plan discount applies to today's premiums. The policy includes liability coverage of \$50,000-\$100,000-\$50,000; \$50 deductible collision coverage; full comprehensive; and \$1000 medical payments.

Manual rates for a rural motorist in the G&G area on a comparable policy would cost around \$120-\$125. This rate would be modestly higher in towns the size of Manhattan, Emporia, Salina, or Beatrice. In Topeka or Wichita the same policy would cost about \$150 and closer to \$165 in Kansas City or Johnson county.

This of course again relates to "manual" rates — rather like "list prices" for tires or appliances, the insurance men might cringe at the comparison. The high volume companies — like Farm Bureau, Alliance, State Farm, and many other mutuals — are around 10 percent lower than the manual rates, and often have other inducements — like \$10 deductible — at the lower rates.

The rates quoted here also do not count in the extra charges that might be applied, for young male drivers, for example, or for poor claim records.


