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




Kansas 1959 State Farmer Class - 136 members from 70 chapters received degrees.





KANSAS ASSOCIATION OF FFA HIGHLIGHTS 1958-59

- 1. James Jarnagin of the Jetmore chapter was declared Star Farmer of America.
- 2. Five FFA chapters were chartered. These include: Russell,
 Dorrance, Uniontown, Johnson, and the Kansas State University Collegiate chapter.
- 3. There are 207 departments of vocational agriculture in Kansas, with a total enrollment of 6,392.
- 4. Two hundred one chapters have paid state and national dues. Five chapters failed to pay state and national dues. One of the five was maintained in two departments.
- 5. The Kansas Association has an active FFA membership of 6,894 members. This is 108% on the basis of enrollment.
- 6. Seven Kansas FFA members were awarded the American Farmer Degree at the 31st National FFA Convention.
- 7. The Effingham chapter won the gold emblem classification and the Lawrence chapter won the silver emblem classification in the 1958 national emblem awards program.
- 8. Ten Kansas FFA members sang in the 1958 National FFA Chorus and nine members played in the National FFA Band.
- 9. Kansas teams participating in national FFA judging contests won three gold, one silver, and one bronze emblem classifications.
- 10. Dick Duer, Shawnee-Mission chapter, represented Kansas in the regional speech contest at St. Paul, Minnesota.
- 11. The Lawrence chapter placed first in both the booth exhibits and the farm mechanics exhibits at the Topeka Fair. Buhler chapter won first in the farm mechanics exhibits at the State Fair at Hutchinson.
- 12. Fifteen Kansas FFA members won a total of \$1,000 in the James F. Lincoln Arc Welding Foundation program.
- 13. State FFA Convention delegates met in five business sessions, while attending the 31st Annual State Convention in Manhattan. Delegates were members who were not judging contestants.

- 14. At the 31st State Convention, 149 chapters seated 295 official delegates. Each delegate worked on one of 14 different committees, which considered various items of business of the State Association. Each of these committees gave a report to the delegates.
- 15. One hundred thirty-six chapter farmers from 70 chapters were raised to the State Farmer Degree at the 31st Annual Convention of the Kansas Association of FFA.
- 16. The Altamont chapter won the Agricultural Education Club award plaque in 1959.
- 17. Eleven Honorary State Farmer Degrees were awarded.
- 18. The Kansas Association was honored by having the National FFA Vice-Preside Tom Stine, Ozark, Missouri, present to assist with the State Convention.
- 19. One hundred fifteen three-man teams entered the 1959 annual high school judging contest in agriculture, 80 two-man teams entered the farm mechanics contests, 43 three-man teams entered the entomology contest, and 32 teams entered dairy products judging. In addition, 20 individuals competed in the FFA public speaking, and 20 competed in the news writing contest.



31ST KANSAS FFA CONVENTION - 1959

The State FFA Convention opened with a vespers program in the College Auditorium at Kansas State University. During that program the Quinter FFA quartette sang and James Ochampaugh of Stockton played the French horn. Other numbers included announcements by President Ralph Young and remarks by the State Advisor, C. C. Eustace. Dr. Samuel S. George, Minister of the First Presbyterian Church of Manhattan, gave the evening address. Dean Koeneke of Hanover, who has been a member of the National FFA Chorus for two years, sang The Lord's Prayer.

On Monday morning, the first session of the delegates met in Williams Auditorium. Delegates were seated, and Dr. C. Peairs Wilson, director of the School of Agriculture, gave the address of welcome. Musical numbers were furnished by Kenny Michaelis of Hoisington, Larry Irsik of Holcomb, and Don and Jerry Devore of the Oxford chapter. National FFA Vice-President Tom Stine spoke. The collegiate chapter gave a report. Reports of the state treasurer and secretary were given. The delegates were then appointed to committees and spent two hours in developing reports.

At the second session, entertainment was furnished by the Quinter quartette and a film, "Here and There With the FFA," was shown. Roy Freeland, secretary of the State Board of Agriculture, spoke to the delegates. An educational awards presentation was made by Mr. Bill Burk of the Santa Fe Railway. The finals in the State FFA Speech Contest were held, and the session ended with a tour and demonstration in the veterinary hospital.

Governor George Docking spoke at the third convention session. Also, at this meeting the State Farmers were elected; the Kansas State University singers performed; Tom Stine gave an address; the Honorary State Farmers were

elected; and the Star Farmer of Kansas, Clint Birkenbaugh, was given his National FFA Foundation Award. The other state winners in the Foundation awards program were announced.

Officer reports and committee reports took up much of the time scheduled for business Tuesday morning. Other numbers on the fourth session program were: Entertainment by Don and Jerry Devore of Oxford, Bill Stark of Powhattan, and by Kenny Michaelis of Hoisington. The district Foundation award winners were recognized and the Kansas gold emblem chapters were announced. Two other program numbers which captured the attention of the delegates were talks by Miss Ellen Carnahan, past state president of the Future Homemakers in Kansas, and by Miss Sharon Whitacre, Kansas teenage chairman of the March of Dimes.

Officers of the Kansas Association of FFA were elected at the fifth session. Mr. Manke, of the Union Pacific Railroad, presented the Carl Raymond Gray scholarships. Committee and officer reports were given; the film, "Four Star Farmers," was shown; and music was provided by Larry Irsik of Holcomb, and by Jerry Devore and Melvin Harris of the Oxford chapter.

On Monday and Tuesday noons the delegates and contestants were served hot lunches on the campus. Many departments of KSU cooperated in making the Thirty-first Annual State Convention a success.

The State FFA Convention came to a close with the Manhattan Chamber of Commerce barbecue and banquet on Tuesday evening. The Poultry Science Club had charge of the preparing and serving of the food. After the meal, the Kansas State University Band presented a group of outstanding numbers. KSU President, Dr. James A. McCain, brought greetings from the University. After a brief program, Dr. Rufus Cox and his committee gave the results of the judging and farm mechanics contests.

Budget Committee Report

The facts presented in this report come from the report of W. E. Wilson, Auditor of the Kansas Association of FFA finances for the year of 1958-59. The value of the State Association's United States Savings Bonds is \$1,104.60. The value of the general fund is \$5,362.64, and the value of the Sears Sheep Fund is \$2,871.77, so this leaves a total cash balance of \$8,234.41.

The recommendation was made for more money for the state officers to step up our public relations. The motion passed to raise it to \$500.

The recommendation was made to ask the State Executive Committee to look into the possibility of an interest raising plan for the cash balance not being used.

It was also recommended that each chapter should set up a budget for the new year by October 1.

The motion was then passed that the budget for next year remain the same as the 1958-59 budget, with the exception that the expenses of the state officers be increased to \$500.

It is the opinion of this committee that the State Association's finances are in good shape. We wish to commend our State Association officers and leaders for the job they have done.

FFA Camp Committee Report

This committee discussed location possibilities and the facilities necessary to operate a camp. Lone Star, in S. W. Douglas County near Lawrence, was mentioned as a possible camp site. Lone Star is open 6-7 weeks in the summer months and will accommodate 150 people to a session. It covers 400-acres and, compared to other camps, it is rather large.

The delegate body voted to refer the state FFA camp idea to a committee of advisors and state FFA leaders for additional work.

Parliamentary Procedure Committee Report

The purpose of this committee was to determine a method of increasing the correct usage of parliamentary procedure at FFA meetings.

Mr. Huitt, parliamentarian of the Collegiate FFA Chapter, explained how the Missouri FFA sponsors a parliamentary procedure contest each year.

The Missouri contest is as follows: A team of four to six FFA members is handed a suggested motion as it enters the stage for the contest. All members then become familiar with the motion; then they have a certain time limit during which they propose the motion and act upon it in various ways, using correct parliamentary procedure. These can include amendments, point of order, discussion, etc. The team is graded upon the number of these things it will use before taking final action on that motion. The object is to get as much parliamentary procedure into the discussion as possible before the motion is acted upon.

The committee was unanimously in favor of this type of action to encourage more correct usage of parliamentary procedure, but due to the lack of enough time, were unable to make definite recommendations for such a contest; neither were they able to work out a sample parliamentary procedure demonstration.

Our recommendation is that further study be made of this contest before final action is taken.

Public Speaking Committee Report

Our committee decided that the time schedule for the different divisions in the FFA speech contest was good. We also felt that the speeches should be about agriculture. We recommend that the top five from the district speech contest be allowed to enter the state contest. We suggest that there be more than one judge, and that a speech should be judged by both speech and English teachers and men having a knowledge of agriculture. We also recommend that the speakers wear FFA jackets and that the use of a manuscript in the district be optional. We suggest that the State FFA Office send out, in the Kansas Future Farmer, suggested topics for speeches. We recommend that the questions the speaker should be asked in the district should be like those in the state contest and that the district speech contests should, if possible, be held on Saturday.

 - d. Editors.
- 9. 100% of chapters in Kansas have annual banquet.
- 10. Chapters use the following during National FFA Week:
 - a. Exhibits in store windows.

 - d. P.T.A. and open house.
 - e. Attend church as a group.
 - f. Wear FFA clothing.
- 11. Chapters participate in Public Speaking Contests.
- 12. 100% of the members have FFA jackets.
- 13. Chapter sponsor a calendar if possible.
- 14. Chapter sponsor signs and stickers.
- 15. Initiate Green Hand with formal ceremony.

In the area of publications, the committee recommended that:

- 1. Every member subscribe to the National FFA Magazine.
- 2. Chapters subscribe to leading farm magazines.
- 3. Each member of chapter have an FFA Manual.
- 4. Each chapter have at least 16 news articles published in local newspaper each year.
- 5. Each chapter contribute at least once a year to the Kansas Future Farmer newsletter.

Leadership School Committee Report

We recommend that:

- 1. The dates for leadership schools be the same corresponding dates as were used last year.
- 2. Moving of leadership school centers be considered.
- 3. Earlier meeting time be considered. Would like to see the starting time set so that every school could leave no earlier than 1:00 o'clock and could arrive on time.
- 4. Each chapter attend and participate.
- 5. More emphasis be put on ritual contest. Every chapter in the state should participate in this activity.
- 6. Parliamentary procedure be considered for inclusion in the information contest.
- 7. All chapters eat together.
- 8. Host chapter make provisions for entertainment.
- 9. More emphasis be put on officers' meetings.
- 10. Committee report to entire group after each meeting.
- 11. With an earlier starting time, demonstrations be given before supper.
- 12. After the meal, hold officer meetings.
- 13. Ribbons or certificates be given to the master ritual team and to the top ten high boys in the information contest.

We feel that every officer in the state should participate in a leadership school and, in doing so, will become a better leader in his chapter and community.

Conventions Committee Report

The committee went on record as commending the state FFA staff and the state officers for the revised convention program of the Kansas Association of FFA. The committee felt that this was a great improvement and recommended that we follow the same pattern at our 32nd State Convention.

The committee recommended that the method of calling roll and registering delegates be speeded up, if possible.

It was suggested that the treasurer's report be more complete and that it be given completely at one hearing.

The motion was passed by the committee that we continue to practice close supervision of our FFA boys at the National Convention in Kansas City.

It was suggested that, if possible, a longer period for tours of points of interest on the campus be held another year.

Conventions Committee Report continued -

The committee felt that committee-type meetings were a benefit to the convention and hoped they could be continued and enlarged another year.


