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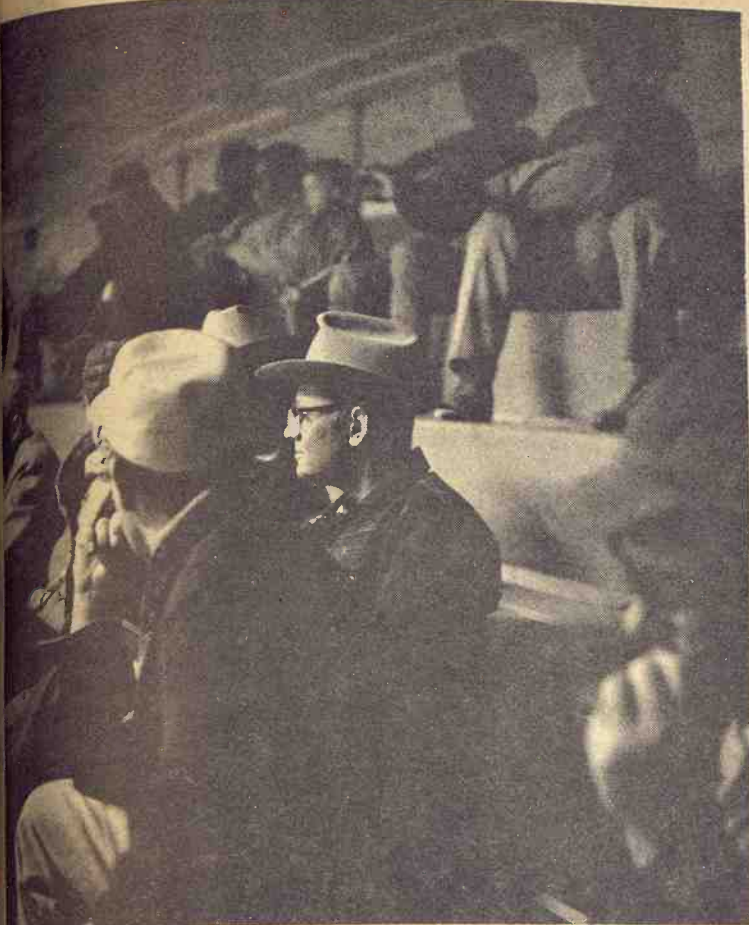

More Cowboys On TV Than Ranches

A shortage of cowboys has become a serious problem in Kansas, several members of the state's livestock industry say.

But the livestock industry is not the only one hit by a help shortage.

"Any farm labor is hard to get," Bob Huddelson, assistant secretary of the Kansas Livestock Association, said. "There are many openings for anybody willing to work for the fee involved."

Huddelson said ranches and farms are continually short of hands. He said this has been one of the major complaints of Kansas farmers and stockmen for a number of years — that they have not been able to get enough help to get their work done.

Some of the cattlemen said the cowboy "image" created by television has given some of the men who apply for jobs a false impression of just what a cowboy has to do.

An Arizona cattleman was quoted in a news story as saying "A lot of cowboys have a TV image of just what they should be doing, and just don't want to dig post holes or shovel manure."

Bill Roswurm, manager of the Bridwell Ranch near Council Grove, confirmed this. He said it makes little difference what salary is offered, most of the hands available today are just drifters.

Roswurm said the pay, even in the same cattle operation, differs from ranch to ranch. But he said the Bridwell spread near Council Grove offers a good combination hand, one who will feed stock, fence pastures and work with the cattle, from \$250 to \$300 a month, plus a good house, lights, fuel, telephone, milk cow, vegetable garden and what beef the hand and his family use.

Roswurm said the Bridwell spread tries to work regular hours starting at 7 a.m. and quitting at 6 p.m. with work occasionally ending at noon on Saturday.

"We don't always get through by noon Saturday," he said, but it is rare that we work past 4 p.m."

Roswurm said the cattle industry has been hit hard by the shortage judging by complaints

he had heard from other cattlemen while on trips to Montana and Wyoming.

"But we pool hands with other outfits around here for the cowboying, like at roundup, and we manage to get the work done pretty well," he said.

Wayne Rogler, Matfield Green, said the shortage is due partly to the old timers dying off and not many new men coming up to replace them.

Rogler said the shortage of good hands today is worse than it was in World War II.

He said wages on his spread vary, from \$250 a month and house and groceries upward. Hours are long. Hands work six days, 60 hours a week. Rogler said a real good man, a top hand, could make \$450 a month and house.

Rogler said it is possible to do more in a day now than it was when he began 40 years ago. Rogler said he is about 60.

"Then, we had to ride horse back to and from the pastures, as well as do the work after we got there," he said. "It took more time."

He said today's operation trucks the saddle horses to the pasture, arriving more quickly and in better condition to work.

Raymond Adams Jr., Maple Hill, said the Adams Ranch is pretty well staffed right now.

"But any kind of agriculture is competing with all other industries for help," he said.

Adams said cowboys, as a special kind of men, are fading from the picture.

"Most young fellows with something on the ball just take up something else," he said. "We get good men, capable fellows, and we have a good bunch now. But after they've been with us a few years it is just more profitable for them to do something else."

He said the old-time cowboy, who spent his life working cattle, is a thing of the past.

"You have to have a pretty capable man, to put him in charge of a herd that represents about \$100,000 cash money. And when a man is that capable, he goes somewhere else," Adams said.

That "somewhere else," Adams agreed, sometimes is a job as a manager of another ranch operation.

Exhaustive Study On Water Use

Studies that eventually could lead to more water for industries, urban areas, farm crops, recreation, and wildlife, and to reduced water pollution will be started by scientists at Kansas State University early in 1968.

The KSU scientists will record water losses every 15 minutes to see if they can determine various effects of wind, sun, humidity, temperature, clouds and other weather elements on the tremendous water losses from soil and plants.

More than 98 percent of the annual rainfall in western Kansas and similar areas in the Great Plains evaporates from bodies of water and soil and transpires through plants; 70 percent of the U.S. annual rainfall is thus lost.

The desperate need to increase water supplies has been recognized in urban areas and drier farm areas but little research has been done on methods that might reduce water losses by evaporation and transpiration.

Basic to such research is knowing which of the various weather elements is associated with the greatest water losses from plants and from soils. The KSU scientists recording water losses every 15 minutes will, at

the same time, record temperature, humidity, solar radiation, wind velocity and other climatic factors.

To take the measurements, they will build a scale so sensitive that it will measure water losses of only a few ounces from a 10-ton column of soil.

The two scientists in charge of the studies, Dr. William Powers, soil physicist, and Gary Paulsen, crop physiologist, will treat both crops and soils with various chemicals — in search of those that might reduce evaporation and evapotranspiration without harming water supplies or crops.

The study is being financed by a \$120,000 grant from the U.S. Office of Water Resources Research, the Kansas Water Resources Research Institute and the Kansas Agricultural Experiment Station.

Reducing water losses 5 percent would be worth \$62 million annually in Kansas crop production, a relatively small benefit compared with the value of the increased water for industries and urban areas.

Dr. Glenn H. Beck, vice president for agriculture at K-State, hopes that the measuring methods and promising chemical

treatments learned can be used in both field and laboratory tests as they are developed. The Board of Regents has approved a \$150,000 request in the 1968 K-State budget for such studies.

Unless the legislature should delete the request, discoveries made will be tested under field conditions almost immediately, Dr. Beck said.

He is particularly anxious for both studies to progress as rapidly as possible, because lack of water to him is the factor that most limits development of the Great Plains area.

Ten years ago, when Dr. Beck was chairman of the Research committee of the Great Plains Council, the Council proposed that the Federal Government establish a multi-million dollar water research laboratory in the High Plains area. He thinks such a laboratory eventually will be established and that it is likely to go to the university that has demonstrated the most competence in water resources research. The \$120,000 grant and the \$150,000 budgeted for fiscal 1968-69 will let KSU demonstrate competence in water research.

"This is the kind of research that could pay us back a thousandfold," Dr. Beck said.

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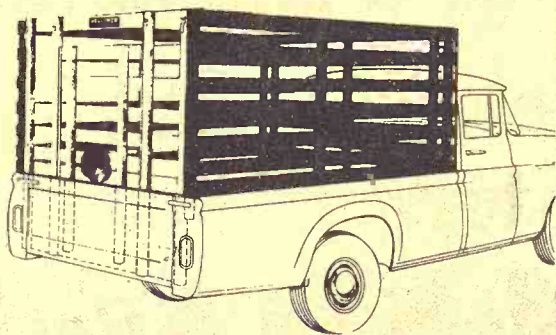

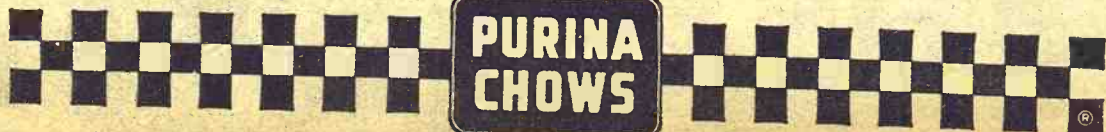

9. Control of many monopolies.
10. Right of women to vote.
11. Extension of social security to farmers and other self employed persons.
12. Acquisition of cabinet status for the Department of Agriculture.
13. Development of the domestic parity wheat certificate program in 1964, which became part of a 4-year program thru the Grange's efforts with other commodity groups.
14. Development of Soil Conservation Services, FHA, crop insurance, upstream small watersheds, school lunch programs, rural area development, milk programs

The above are a few of many dozens of resolutions that have gone from local to national levels of government.

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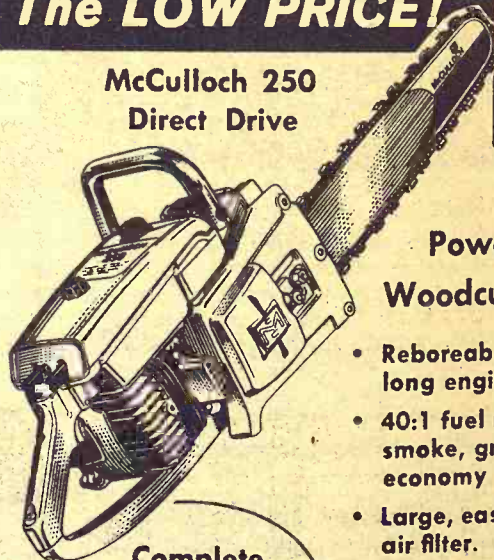

BEST FILLED ICEBOX COOKIES

- 1 cup oleo
- 1 cup white sugar
- 1 cup brown sugar
- 3 eggs
- 4 cups flour
- 1 teaspoon soda
- 1 teaspoon cinnamon
- 1/4 teaspoon salt

Cream oleo and sugars until fluffy. Add eggs. Mix thoroughly. Sift flour with soda, cinnamon and salt; add to creamed mixture. If dough seems soft, it may be chilled slightly. Then roll on a floured surface to make 1/8-inch thickness; spread with date filling and roll in jelly roll fashion. Store in the refrigerator or any other cool place until quite firm. Cut into thin slices. Arrange on a greased baking sheet. Bake in a moderate oven, 375 degrees, from 10-15 minutes.

DATE FILLING

- 1 pound dates, cut up
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 1/2 cup water
- 1 cup nutmeats

Combine dates, sugar and water. Cook until a thick paste is formed, stirring occasionally. Add nutmeats; set aside to cool before using. Spread on dough as directed in the cookie recipe.

Kraft caramels. Heat until partially melted. Add:

- 1 tablespoon cream
- Cook until all caramels are melted. Add:

- Stir well. Drop on cookie sheet in about the size of half dollars. Now legs are added. Slice pecans in halves or fourths and add to body. Put in double boiler the following:
- 1 9-ounce Hershey bar
- 1/4 stick of paraffin or less, depending on Hershey bar
- When melted pour over caramels and cool. Makes about two dozen turtle candies.

- CRANBERRY FLUFF**
- 2 cups raw cranberries
- 3 cups miniature marshmallows
- 3/4 cup sugar
- 2 cups diced, unpeeled red apples

- 1/2 cup chopped pecan nuts
- 1/2 cup heavy cream
- 1/4 cup heavy mayonnaise

- 1/8 teaspoon salt

Remove stones from plums and quarter the plums. Add to juice mixture. Pour into baked pie shell. Garnish with cream topping.

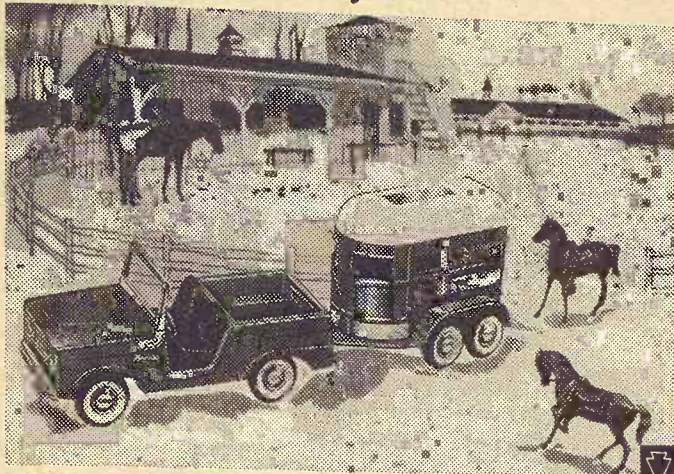

**Toys Play Important Role
-In Education Of Child**

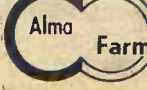

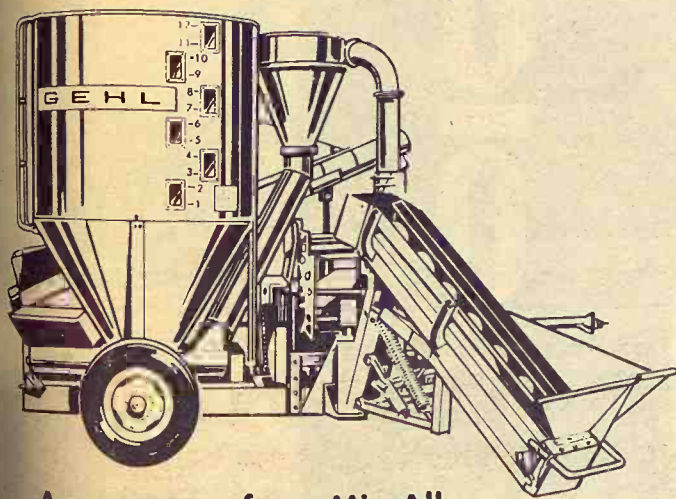

A County Fair May Call It Quits

WASHINGTON — The Washington County fair board is leaning on the ropes. Board members, Washington Jaycees and county commissioners will meet, probably in early January, to decide whether or not the 1968 fair will be held. "We're to the place where we've got to expand or quit," said Dr. Max Beam, county fair board president.

Annually the Washington Chamber of Commerce releases \$1000 to the fair budget. Next year that amount may not be available. The \$1000 usually earmarked for the fair may be absorbed in repairs to a food stand at the fairgrounds, to cost an estimated \$500. In addition, the chamber is pressed for funds for Christmas

promotions. "If the chamber pulls out its \$1000, the fair will fold," said Dr. Beam. County commissioners believe residents around the county think the Washington Chamber of Commerce "gets rich" from the sale of tickets for a car raffle and the stand. Chamber representatives and county officials say it isn't so. The county levy for the fair is 0.13 of a mill, all tagged for premiums. Total fair costs are estimated at \$7,651.98. The chamber's \$1000 buys the privilege of selling the car and operating the food stand. Money for this donation comes from the food stand and car ticket sales. Unfortunately officials here say profits have diminished. More land to add entertainment, a livestock building and increased space for commercial exhibits is needed, said Dr. Beam. Lack of funds has prevented acquisition of land. The city currently owns the buildings at the fairgrounds. Fair officials hope to solve the dilemma in early January.

prices. The quality stored under loans through November totaled 101 million bushels, or about 12 per cent of the record crop. Government officials have been urging growers to store wheat under loan, an action which reduces the market supply. They say such storage would help bolster prices, which

have been running 25 cents a bushel or more below prices a year ago. But despite this decline wheat prices are above the support rate of \$1.25 a bushel. Grain stored under loan can be repossessed by paying the loan and then sold in the market if prices improve later in the marketing year.

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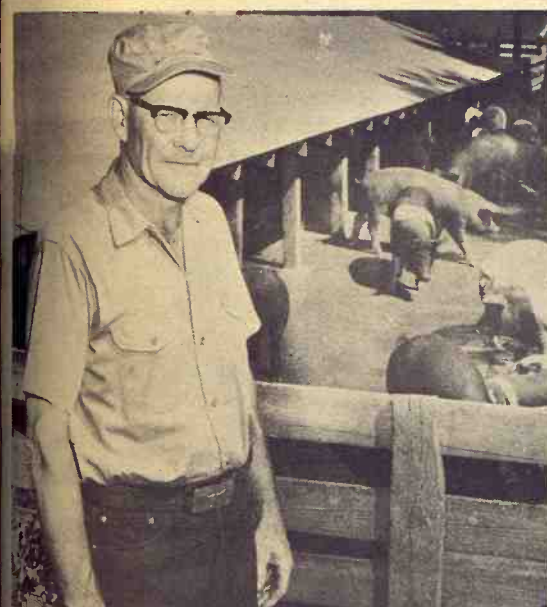

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Third Straight Milo Record

The Agriculture Department estimated the 1967 sorghum grain crop at 766 million bushels, setting a record high for the third consecutive year. This year's total is 7 percent

more than in 1966 and 14 percent above the previous year. The two leading states, Texas and Kansas, are both up from last year, but Nebraska, the third leading state, is down. These three states accounted for 81 per cent of the nation's total output.

The 1967 crop was estimated to yield 50.7 bushels an acre. This is exceeded only by yields of 51.6 in 1965 and 55.8 in 1966.

The 1967 acreage planted for all purposes, at 19.2 million acres, is 17 per cent more than in 1966 and the largest since the late 1950s.

Changes in the feed grain programs and sorghums planted on a portion of the large abandoned winter wheat acreage helped boost planted acreage from the previous year.

G&G AREA ELECTRIC CO-OP CUTS RATES

AXTELL — The Nemaha-Marshall Electric Cooperative Association will have a limited rate reduction, following approval of the rate change by the Kansas Corporation Commission. The electric co-op serves six towns and rural customers in Jackson, Marshall, Nemaha, Pottawatomie and Washington counties. The change in rate will lower charges by \$23,000 per year.

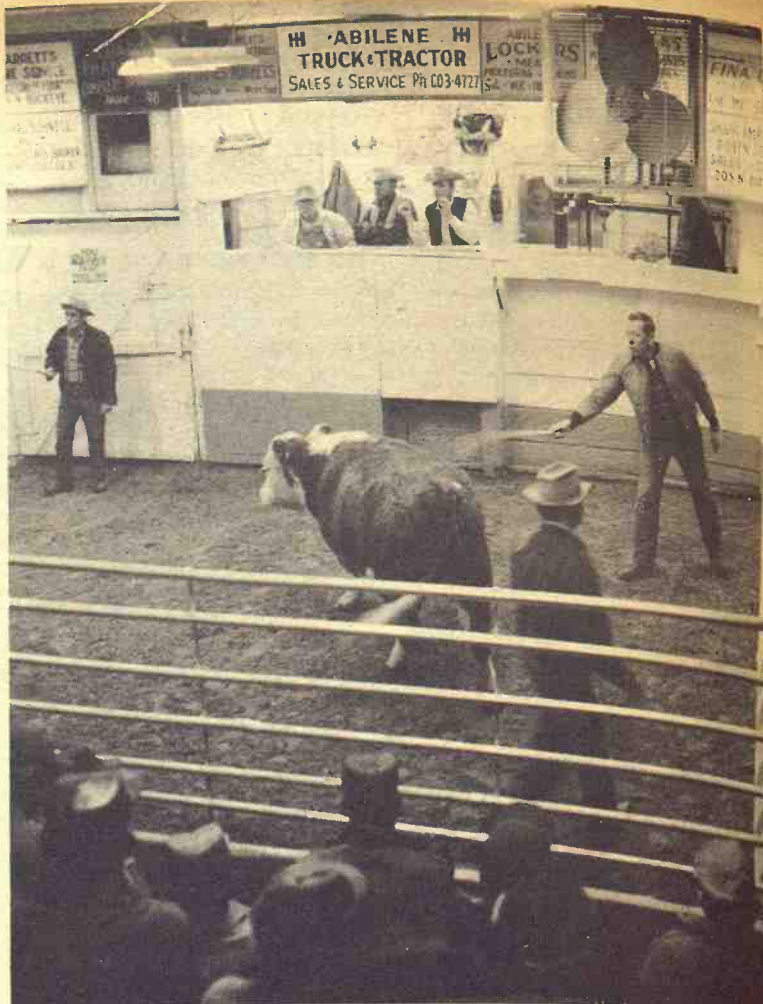
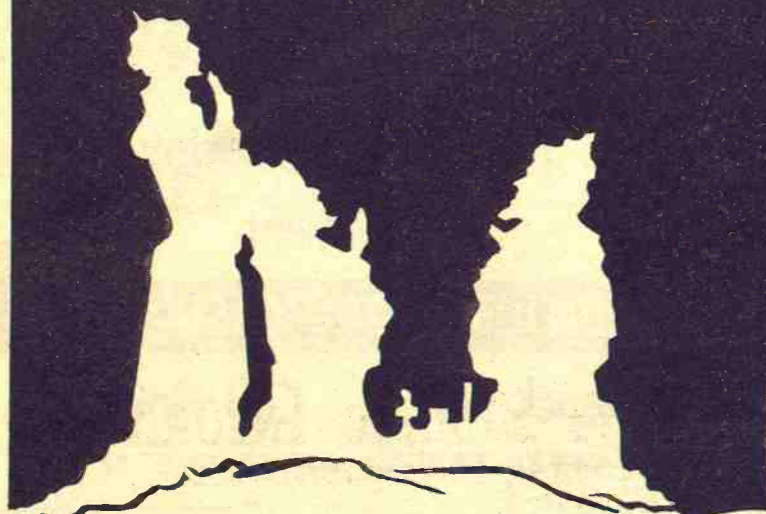

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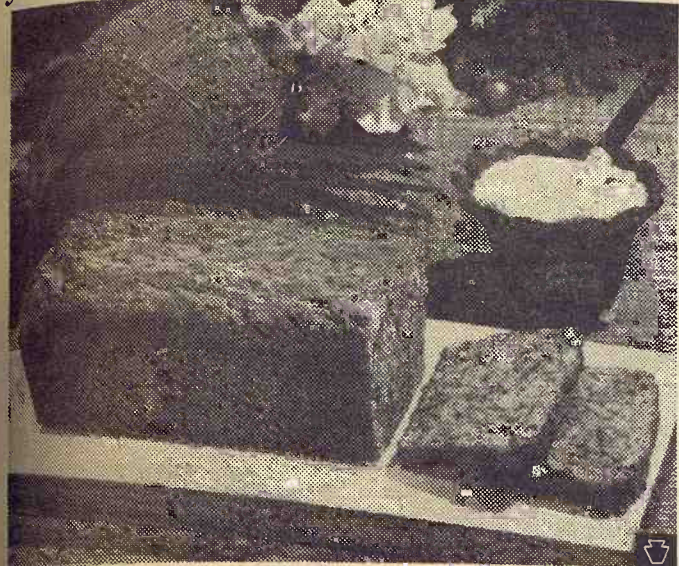

However, some people are more susceptible than others: The old and infirm, or the very young, the diabetics, arthritics, those with acne and skin allergies, those with serious illnesses, or those who work around or care for patients with staph infections.

degrees). For bread, grease an 8½x4½x2½-inch loaf pan. Line bottom with waxed paper; grease again. Combine pancake mix, coconut, sugar, pecans and cinnamon. Add eggs, milk and butter; stir until dry ingredients are thoroughly moistened. Pour batter into prepared pan. Bake in preheated oven (350 degrees) 55-60 minutes. Remove from pan. For ease in slicing, wrap cooled bread and store one day before slicing.

For whipped butter, beat butter until light and fluffy. Gradually beat in syrup. Serve with bread.

An inadequate diet and unsanitary conditions also invite invasions by staph. It attacks particularly when our bodies are in a rundown condition. It enters through nose or throat, through direct contact or contact with "carriers." It multiplies at an amazing rate.

Staph is resistant to many drugs. However, fortunately new synthetic penicillins have been developed in recent years which fight against stubborn staph — and win.

And there are a number of techniques known to prevent, prohibit and protect against it. Good personal hygiene and good housekeeping are the keys.

One procedure that is used by many hospitals and is very adaptable to the home, is to

keep hands as germ-free as possible. For the mother and housekeeper this means washing hands before preparing or serving food, after dusting or cleaning, before handling baby and especially after coming into contact with a member of the family who has an infection. These rules hold true, also, for every other member of the household.

Many hospitals use an antibacterial skin cleanser routinely for personnel and patients alike because it has helped to lessen the number of staphylococcal infections by reducing the colonization of bacteria on the skin.

A booklet on "What You Should Know About Staph" suggests that the battle against staph will be won "not so much by the efforts of modern science, as by the individual effort each of us expends in its behalf."

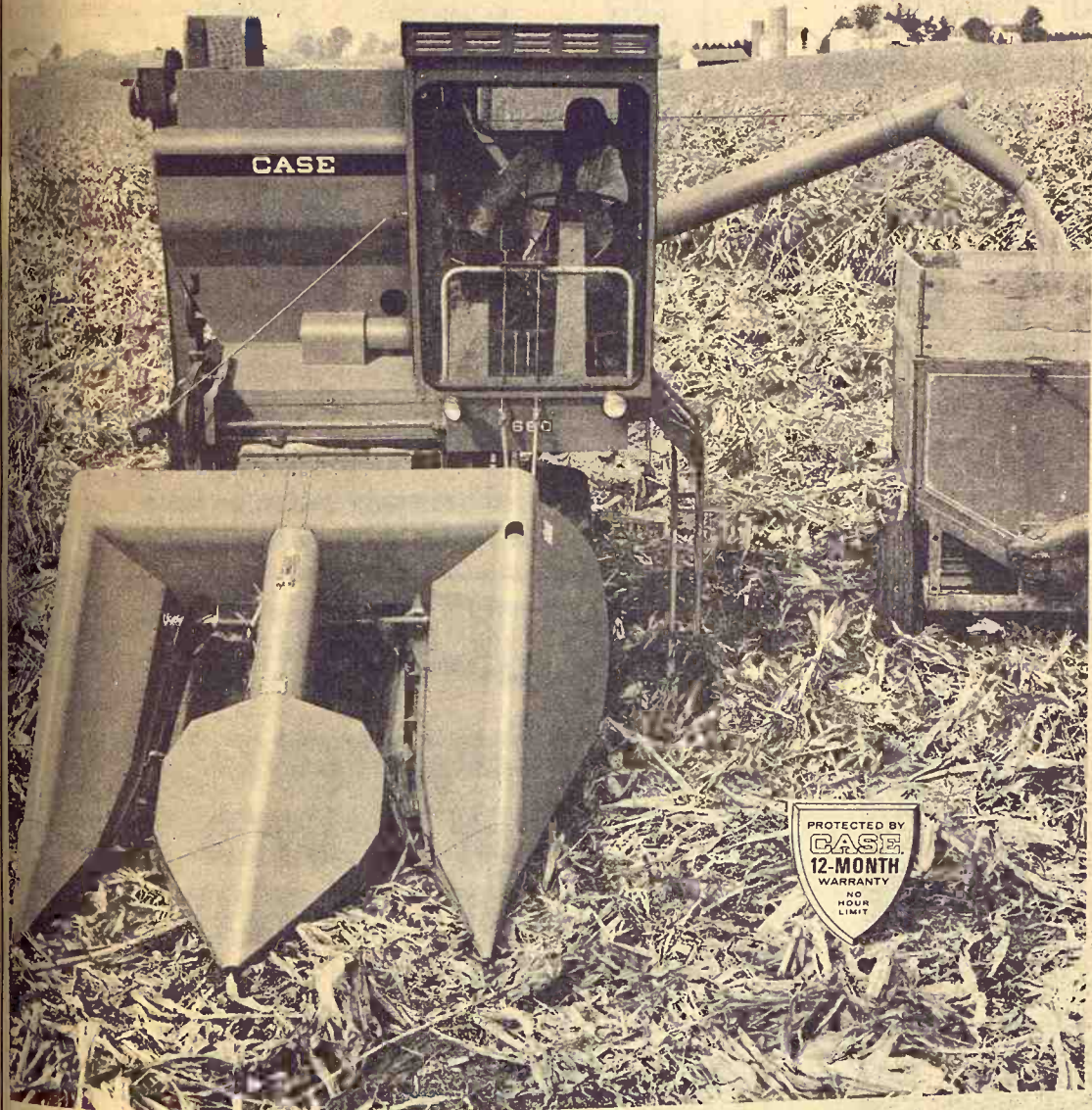

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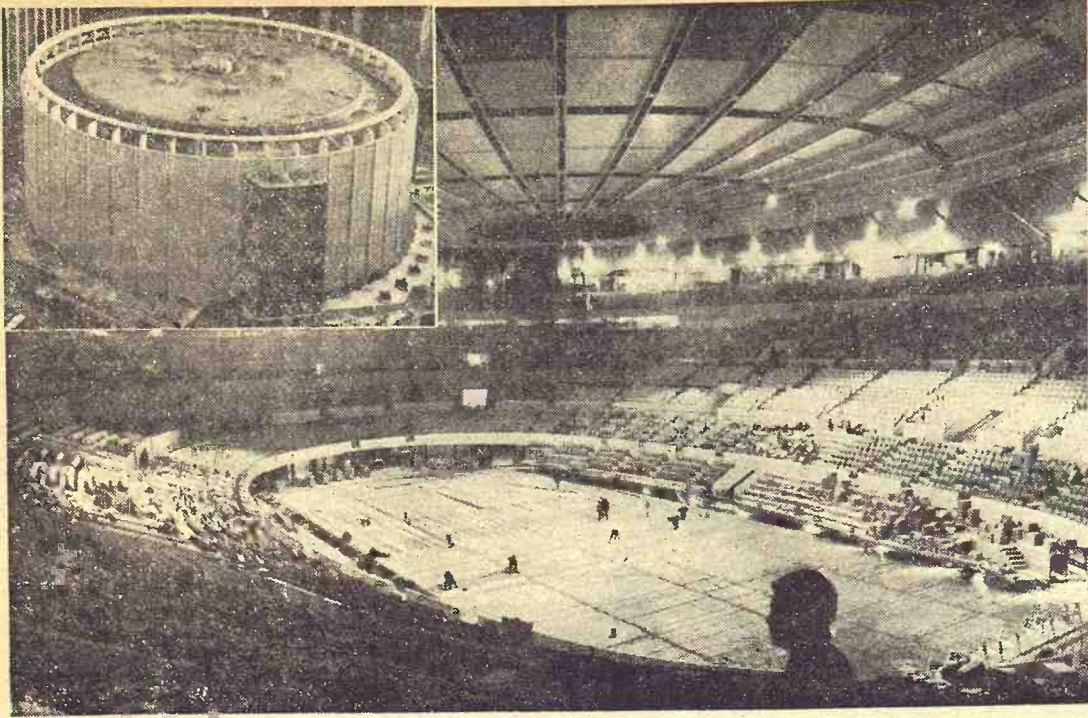

Final Corn Figure At 4.72 Billion Bushels

The Agriculture Department's final report of the year estimated this year's production of corn for grain at a record high of 4.72 billion bushels.

The wheat crop also was put at a record high of 1.52 billion bushels.

The corn estimate compares with 4.70 billion forecast a

month ago, with last year's revised production estimate of 4.12 billion bushels and with the 1961-65 average of 3.76 billion bushels.

Last month's wheat forecast was 1.55 billion bushels. It compared with a revised estimate of 1.31 billion bushels for 1966 and the 1961-65 average of 1.214 bil-

lion bushels.

Winter wheat was put at 1.21 billion bushels compared with 1.23 billion indicated a month ago, with last year's revised figure of 1.06 billion bushels and the five-year average of 970 million bushels.

Kansas harvested 1.06 million acres of corn for grain, or 68 bushels per acre and total output of 53.8 million bushels.

The state harvested 11.1 million acres of winter wheat, or 20 bushels per acre and total output of 221.6 million bushels.

First Snow

Divert Big Muddy Thru Texas?

Plans for a manmade river to irrigate western Nebraska, Kansas, Oklahoma and Texas were outlined by a consulting engineering firm at the 10th annual meeting of the Mid-West Electric Consumers Association at Omaha.

The report by the firm of R. Beck & Associates said the memory of the drought of the 1930s in the Great Plains along with its vast economic loss compels all Midwestern leaders to develop a better plan for wise consumptive use of water in the Missouri River Basin.

The report suggested 13 million acre feet of water could be pumped out of the Missouri River below South Dakota's Ft. Randall Dam, pumped west through the Niobrara River Valley through a system of eight or nine dams to a reservoir near Alliance, Nebr., and released to flow through a half-dozen states down to Texas in a 940-mile concrete canal.

The concept was developed by the firm's engineers in Denver and Orlando, Fla., and presented here with the assurance that

it is feasible from an engineering standpoint.

The report said such a project would cost between \$3 billion and \$3.5 billion exclusive of power features, based on 1967 costs. The report said the money would be repaid from water sold for irrigation, municipal and industrial use, and sale of power produced at pumped storage facilities that would be built along the Niobrara Valley waterway.

The pumped storage sites would be built at dams on the Niobrara, through which water would be lifted to about 2800 feet between the Missouri River and the reservoir near Alliance.

Turbines would pump the water into reservoirs, using "off peak" electric power, and the reservoirs would be opened during times of peak electric use, reversing the turbines and generating electric power as the water falls.

The report said the pumped storage reservoirs would be strung across northern Nebraska, providing new boating,

fishing and recreation areas as well as supplying water for consumption. The power facilities were viewed as generating up to 5.3 million kilowatts.

Beck's report said there is a potential for a pumped storage project on the Red River southeast of Amarillo, Texas, with a capacity of 1.2 million kilowatts.

The Mid-West Association urged the U.S. Department of the Interior to make detailed studies of the Beck proposal.

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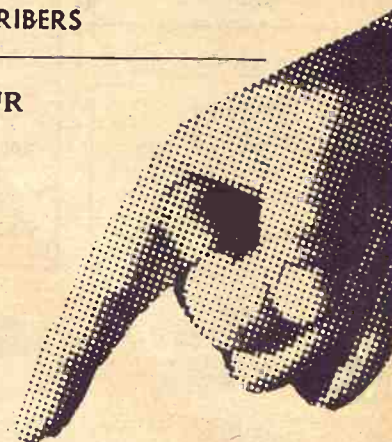

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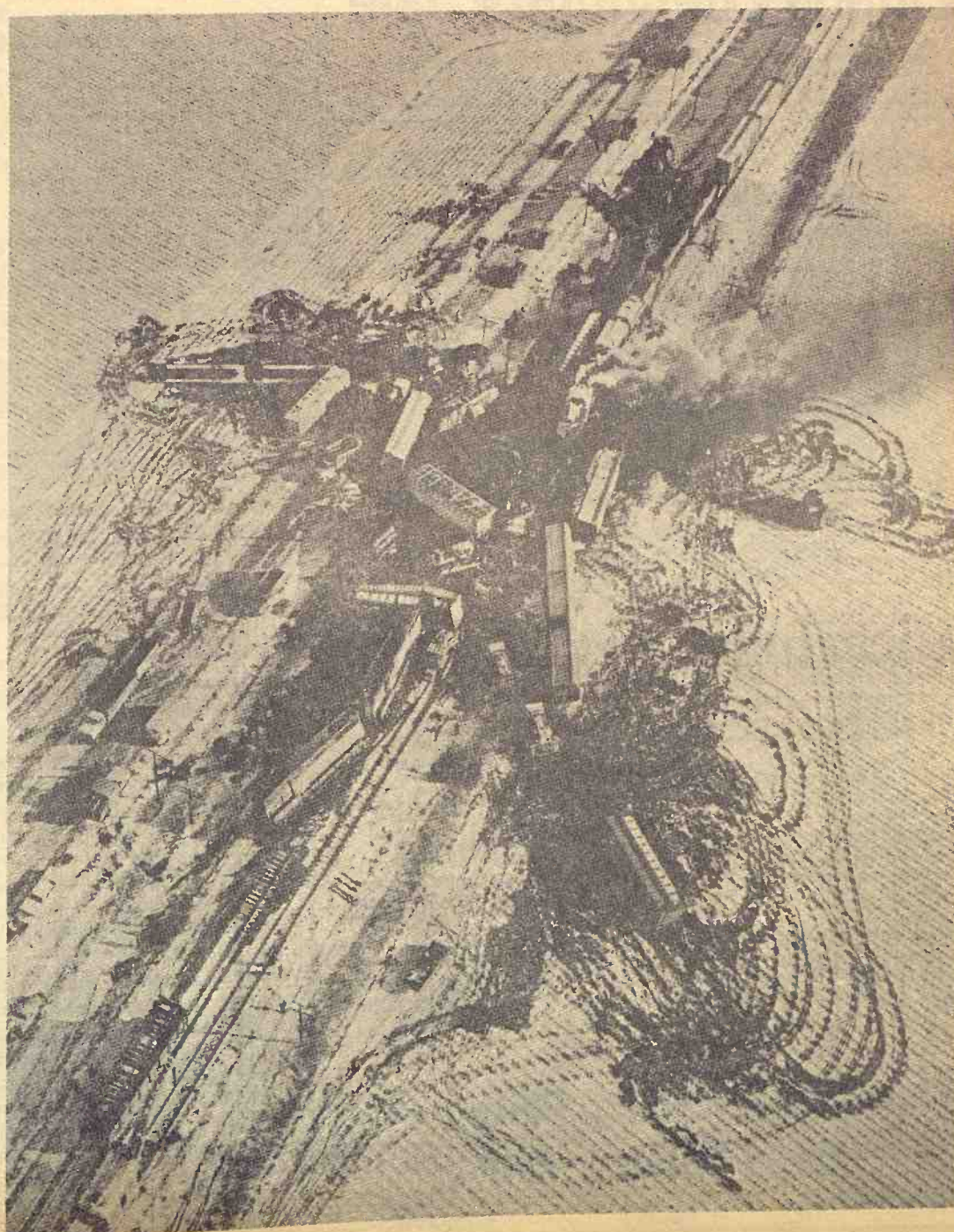
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No Deaths In U.P. Smashup Near Wamego

More On Devaluation

The devaluation of the British pound set off a succession of price disturbances that will continue for many months, perhaps years. Devaluation of the British money (and several other national currencies) was price-depressing. The prospect

of possible devaluation of the U.S. dollar was price-lifting. Official measures to prevent devaluation will be price-depressing.

The British buyers now have to put up more money (pounds) to pay for a cargo of corn or other U.S. products. So they aren't likely to be buying as much as before. At the same time, we don't have to pay as many dollars for British automobiles and other products. These changes will make for lower prices in the United States.

When fears and expectations of devaluation of the dollar developed, the effect was price-lifting. Trimming the gold content of the dollar would allow foreign buyers to get more dollars — and consequently more of our soybeans and other products — for their money. Devaluing the dollar would also require us to put up more dollars to pay for German Volkswagens, Australian beef, Venezuelan oil, Canadian iron ore — and all the other things our people need and want from other countries.

The administration has promised not to devalue the dollar: It has promised to keep on selling (and buying) gold for \$35 an ounce. But declarations and promises alone will not preserve our gold supply, nor maintain the value of our money.

During the past 25 years, we — our government, business firms, and individuals — have spent many billions of dollars in foreign countries. We bought raw materials for our factories; equipment for our industries; manufactured products for our people; supplies for our military bases; and transportation, lodging, and meals for our travellers.

Most of those dollars have been returned to the United States. They were used to pay for the farm and industrial products we have sold to foreign countries. Some of the dollars have been used to purchase gold from our vaults, at \$35 an ounce. But several billion dollars, in the form of bank accounts and paper currency, are still held by people in other countries. They are held by individuals, business firms, banks and by foreign governments.

We have promised to deliver 1/35 of an ounce of gold for each dollar presented for redemption. We keep our promise by selling gold for \$35 an ounce. But if too many dollars are presented for redemption, we would not have enough gold to make good on our promises.

What we need to do is make our dollars so valuable in trade that foreign holders of dollars will want our products instead of our gold. We can do that by offering our products, especially our manufactured items, at

more attractive prices. In short, we need to stop, or at least to slow, our inflation. We need to check the inflationary spiral of big wage increases and excessive borrowing and spending by individuals, corporations, and our Federal Government. Thus, measures to protect the dollar, if any, will be price-depressing.

Cutback On Wheat Shipping To India

The U.S. canceled a portion of its second half wheat shipment to India as a record wheat crop and a steady flow of imports in that country obviated the need for the grain.

A shipment of 500,000 tons,

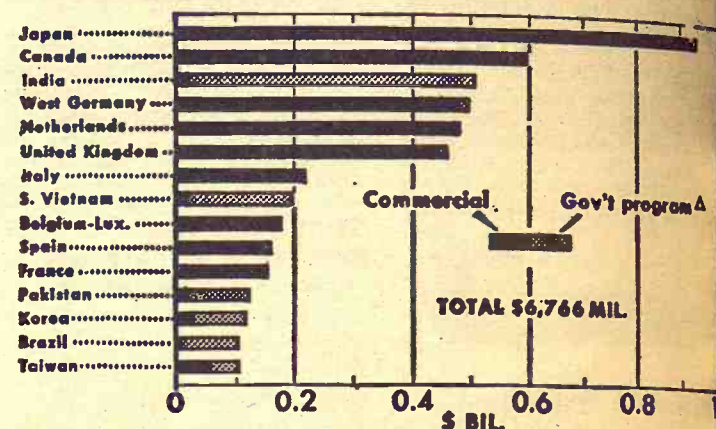

out of a total of 3,000,000 tons scheduled for India in the second half of 1967, was canceled outright. And speculation that supplemental shipments of 1,000,000 tons would be made to cover November and December proved false.

In the first half of 1968 the U.S. will ship 3,000,000 tons of wheat, and 500,000 tons of sorghums to India, the Administration announced last weekend. The government made no provision, as it had for 1967, that other wheat producers match the U.S. grain shipments.

A covering agreement on next year's shipments will be signed shortly and loadings will keep uninterrupted arrivals of grain in India at about 600,000 tons monthly.

It also is considering a request for a certificate relating to a proposed issue of the association's membership certificates of \$8,000 and REA mortgage notes in the amount of \$2.28 million.

Lloyd Shank, director of the KCC's utilities department, said the commission is awaiting further information before ruling on the Tri-County requests.

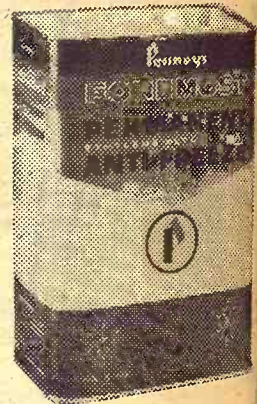

What's Ahead In '68

Farm income is down for most Kansas farmers this year, and prospects indicate little improvement in 1968. The picture is much the same for the rest of the nation's farm families.

Nationally, 1967 net farm income is estimated at \$14.4 billion, 10 percent below the near-record 1966 level. Increasing production costs and declining prices are the big reasons for the slump.

Net farm income may be up slightly in 1968. But farmers' incomes will not keep pace with expected gains in the rest of the economy, says Jack Richards, marketing information economist at Kansas State University.

Richards suggests we look at prospects for next year in the overall perspective of recent years. Farm income gains have been relatively rapid in the 1960 decade. Per capita disposable incomes of nonfarm people increased by 37 percent from 1960 to 1967.

In comparison, net income per farm and after-tax incomes of farm people in 1967 are estimated around 55 percent higher than in 1960.

Getting back to the outlook for 1968, higher prices and an expected boost in government payments should push gross farm income as much as \$1 billion higher than the 1967 level.

Offsetting most of this gain, though, will be a continuation in the trend towards higher production expenses.

As always, the 1968 agricultural outlook will be linked tightly with national economic conditions.

Total business activity is expected to continue to rise, with high employment and additional gains in consumer incomes. This, along with sizable military purchases, should provide some increases in expenditure for food and other farm products.

Foreign demand for U.S. agricultural products also will be strong next year. Exports for fiscal 1967-68 are expected to exceed the previous year's high in overall volume and may equal the \$6.8 billion value, despite stiffening competition from other world suppliers — especially for feed grains.

The 1968 feed grain program is designed to encourage diversion of about 30 million acres, says Dan Pretzer, grain marketing economist. This should result in a drop of about 10 percent in planted acreage for wheat and feed grains.

The national acreage allotment for wheat was reduced to 59 million acres for 1968 — down from 68 million in 1967.

It's still a little early to speculate on wheat prices for 1968. If wheat exports reach the 750

million bushels called for by USDA, however, the farm price for 1968 may average 10 to 15 percent higher than the loan rate.

But some observers feel that the 750 million bushel goal is out of line. Commercial exports for dollars will be off next year, they argue, and PL 480 shipments may not be enough to make up the difference.

Robert L. Coppersmith, livestock marketing economist, says that large feed supplies and lower feed grain prices point to higher production of livestock products at least through mid-1968.

A larger supply of slaughter hogs is possible later in 1968, along with generally heavier feeding of beef and dairy cattle.

With domestic demand and consumer incomes expected to expand, Coppersmith looks for some improvement in livestock prices during mid-1968.

The cattle market should begin to show some strength after the first of July, he says. Hog prices will hover around year-earlier levels during the first half of the year, with an improvement expected during the summer.

Longtime trend to fewer but more productive dairy cows is expected to continue in 1968. Milk production should be about the same as last year. Prices may show little change from the high levels of 1967.
