



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

Worcester Is Regional Star Farmer

Star Farmer of America has been a goal of Dan Worcester from the Hill City chapter for many years, and now he is just a step away from the coveted award. Dan was named Star Farmer for the Central Region and will compete for the Star Farmer of America title at the 48th National FFA Convention in Kansas City in November.

"I feel the Future Farmers of America has developed my leadership and citizenship greatly. I can go into the community and be a leader in the city as well as on the farm," said Dan recently.

Dan's farming program includes 1,120 acres of owned and rented ground, plus an expanding beef herd of 120 head of cattle. He is operating four irrigation circles and has under cultivation 260 acres of corn, 260 acres of milo, and 200 acres of wheat. Dan started in the beef business in 1969 with ten cows and has expanded the operation into 70 brood cows.

During the four years Dan was in Vocational Agriculture, he served as President of the Junior Chapter and Vice President and Reporter of the Senior Chapter. He was State Parliamentarian and placed first and second in two years of competition at the State Parliamentary Procedure Contest. Dan also won State Proficiency awards in both Crops and Livestock Production.

Dan and the other three Regional Star Farmers were selected from among 692 members who had been recommended to receive the American Farmer Degree for 1975. The Star Farmer of America Ceremony will be at the Thursday evening session, November 13, at the National FFA Convention in Kansas City.



Morgan Williams, FmHA State Director for Kansas, attended the meeting held at the National FFA Center near Mount Vernon, Virginia. The meettttting was hosted by Alpha Trivette, National FFA President, and Frank Elliot, FmHA Administrator.

Williams said the meeting was called to promote understanding of the goals and purposes of BOAC and urge more enthusiastic FmHA and state participation in the program. The BOAC program is supported by FmHA and the Speery-New Holland Corporation. Discussions were held concerning the methods of conducting the program, and several FmHA State Directors described the use of Rural Rehabilitation Corporation funds to finance community development projects.

State Director Williams said the Farmers Home Administration and FFA in Kansas have cooperated fully on the BOAC program and have a very active program in Kansas.

BOAC is a program that involves American youth in activities to improve conditions in their communities through classroom studies and practical experience in community development projects. BOAC also develops leadership ability of young people by encouraging them to take an active role in their community.
