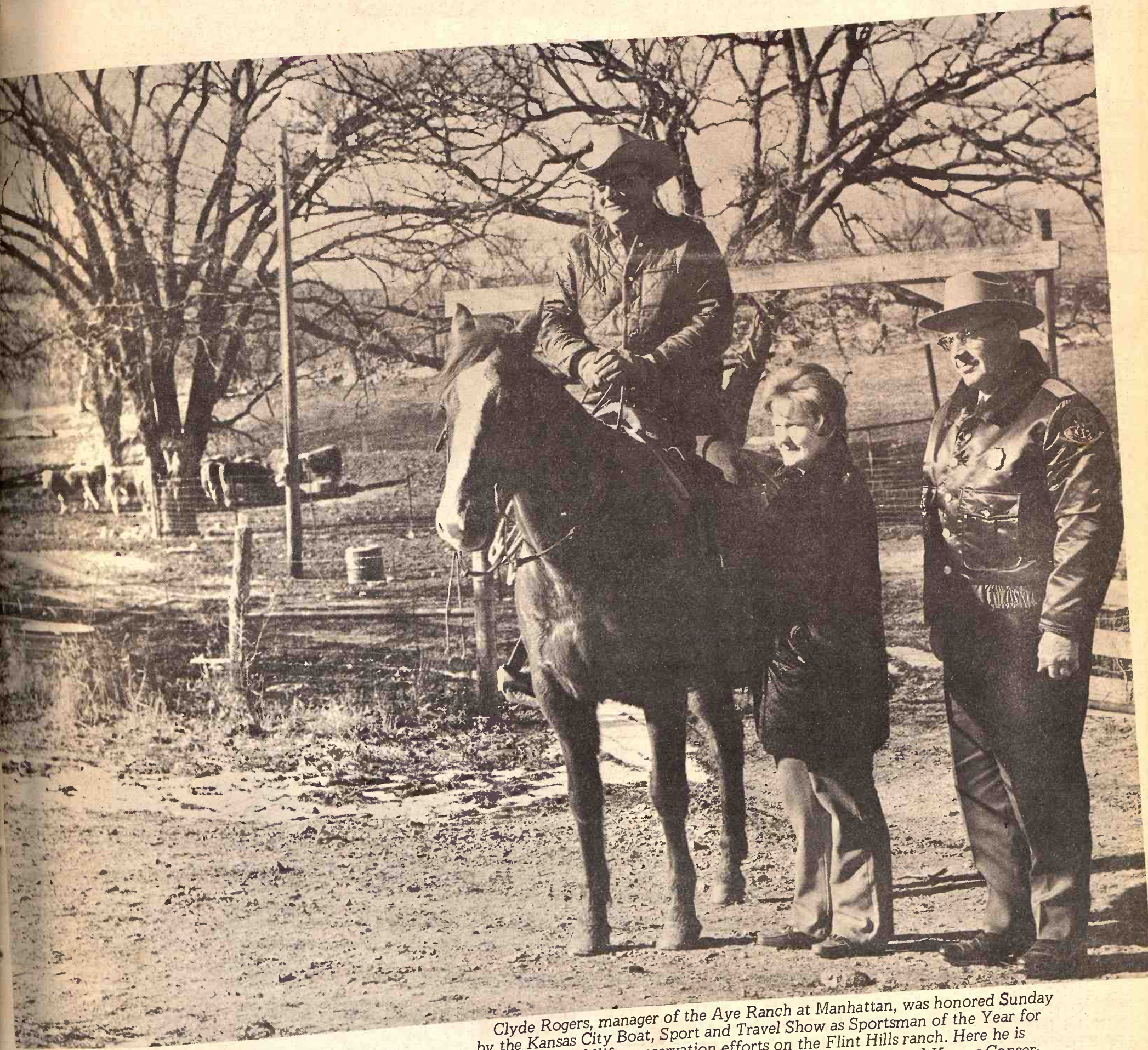

A Place For Wildlife Too

Clyde Rogers, manager of the Aye Ranch at Manhattan, was honored Sunday by the Kansas City Boat, Sport and Travel Show as Sportsman of the Year for outstanding wildlife conservation efforts on the Flint Hills ranch. The award has been given annually for 10 years, alternating between a Kansas and Missouri sportsman.

A Place For Wildlife Too

One of the G&G area's best known cattlemen, Clyde Rogers, manager of the Aye Ranch at Manhattan, was honored Sunday at Kansas City as Farmer-Sportsman of the Year.

The award is an annual one made by the Kansas City Boat, Sports and Travel Show. It is presented to a farmer, rancher or landowner who does something for fish and wildlife on his acreage in addition to making a living by raising crops, beef or pork on his land.

The award was started in 1963 and alternates between a Missourian and a Kansan.

Rogers was nominated by a Kansas conservation agent, Alvin Ayers of Manhattan, who was honored with Rogers at ceremonies Sunday.

Rogers, 45, was born on the 4000-

acre ranch which he manages. His father was the manager of the ranch before him, and Clyde Rogers has spent all of his life on the ranch except for a 3-year Navy hitch.

The wildlife conservation efforts on the Aye Ranch practically all started with Clyde. Ray Heady, outdoor writer for the Kansas City Star, wrote about the things that have changed the Aye Ranch to something of an outdoorsman's paradise: "There's a grass border where a prairie chicken or a quail could burrow deep and live. There's a weed patch where a cottontail could dig in and survive. There's a brushy fence row where wildlife can travel from place to place. There's a hedge tree under which birds can loaf and dust. "There's a pond with a weedy border where wildlife can drink in summer. Where bullheads and channel catfish can grow."

Rogers doesn't own the land. He is the first recipient of the award to be a manager, but not the owner, of the land on which the wildlife conservation practices are noteworthy. Why has he done so much?

"I like to hunt," he says. "So does my son Clyde Steven Rogers. He's in the Army Reserve now at Ft. Jackson, S.C. But when he comes home we are going to work on the ranch together. We are going to hunt together."

"When I was a kid, game was scarce around here. We've got more game now than I ever saw when I was a kid. Times were tough. I remember mother used to give me and my brother two shotgun shells each before we went hunting. She counted 'em out. They were real expensive then."

"When we went hunting, we were supposed to bring back two rabbits each. Sometimes we hunted hard to find rabbits. I don't remember ever seeing a prairie chicken on the ranch when I was a kid. I think the first

prairie chicken I ever saw was when I came back from the Navy.

"Now, you ought to see those chickens come into this pasture in the evening. Big flocks of them, maybe 40 or 50 birds at a time. It's a beautiful sight when the sun is going down. We got deer on the place now, mainly along Deep creek. Mostly whitetail, maybe a mule deer or two. Not enough yet to hunt. They come right up to the house at night. We see them in the garden. That's a real sight, to look out the window and see deer in your yard."

"We got 15 or 20 coveys of quail on the ranch. They were down a bit last fall so we didn't hunt them too heavy. We got lots of rabbits. 'Coon and possums along the creek. We don't trap any, but they are there. We got a badger in one of the pastures. Coyotes are thick, especially when they start hollering at night."

"My boy and I, we don't say, 'Let's go hunting.' We just take our guns along when we go out in the morning. We work awhile, hunt awhile. The day goes faster that way. He

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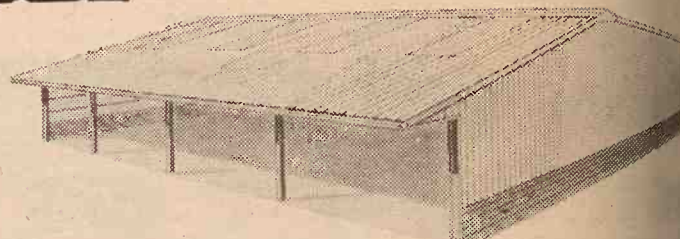
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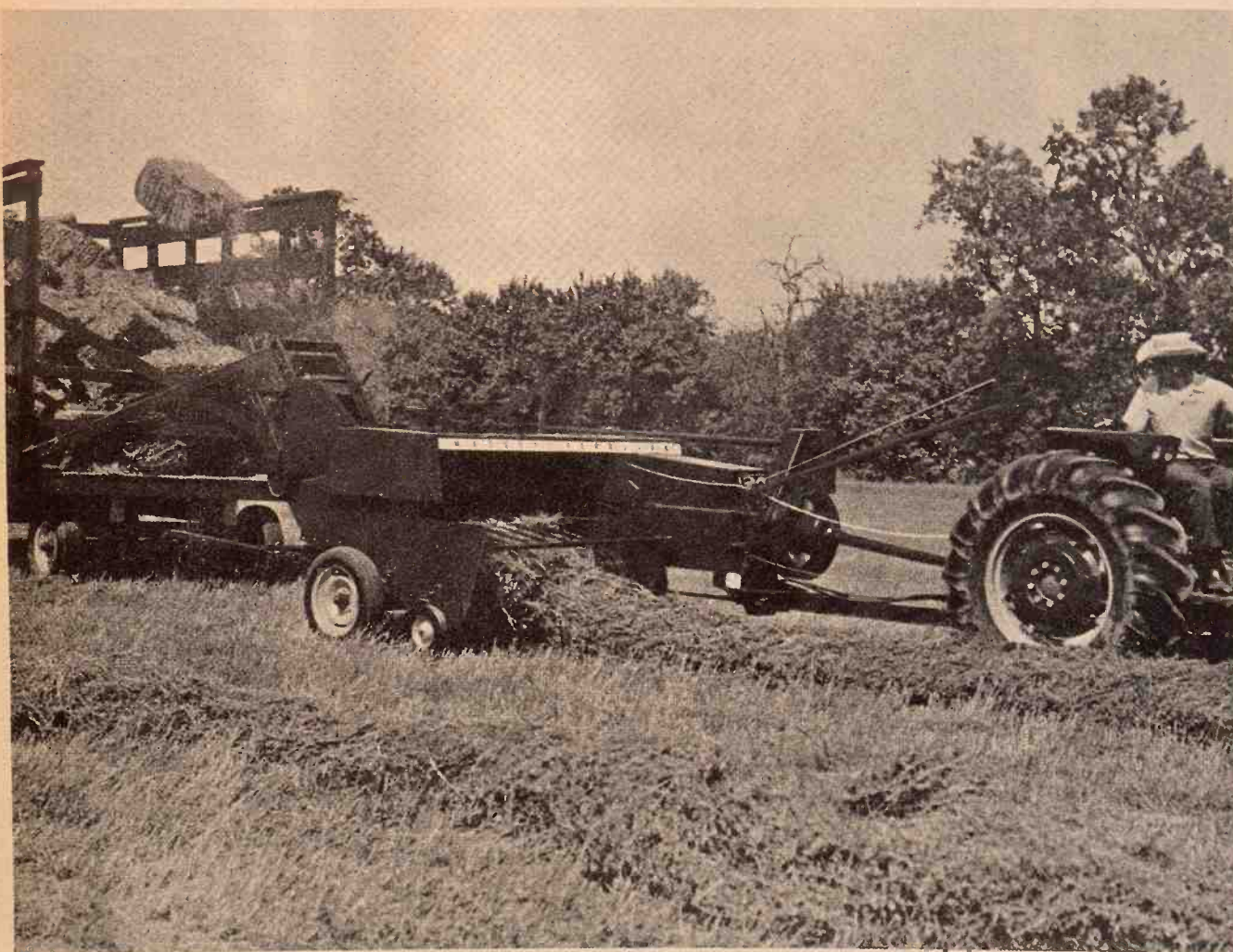
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likes this life. I like it. "We even get some flights of ducks and geese through here now. Not many, but enough to warrant sneaking up on a pond now and then. We didn't have any ponds when I was a boy. Water is the big problem on the prairie. It used to be awfully

scarce.

"We have a few pheasants. Not many. They are having a tough time. We stocked 75 ringnecks a few years ago when the Kansas Fish and Game department closed out its pheasant program. We see a few of them around but not enough to hunt them. I think they are reproducing to some extent."

The conservation agent, Ayers, said Rogers has been "easy to work with. He's really interested in wildlife. I've never sent a hunter out to his ranch that he refused to let hunt."

Do fish in the ponds and wildlife in the fence rows interfere with raising cattle on the Aye ranch? Apparently not too much. Rogers still pastures about 250 cows on one part of the ranch and between 250 and 300 yearlings on another. For years he was strictly a Hereford rancher. Lately he has been experimenting with a cross between the Hereford and the Simmental, a Swiss breed. The Simmental is larger than the Hereford and the cows produce more milk for bigger calves.

But he doesn't intend to go all the way on Simmental, probably not more than a quarter strain. The ranch has 12 Simmental bulls at present.

Back at the ranch house, which is about 100 yards from where I-70 crosses Depp creek, Rogers pointed to a couple of pointer pups curled up in the straw in a shed. They were about six months old, all legs and wagging tails.

"We do a little crossing on our bird dogs, too," he said. "Know what those dogs are?"

"They are half pointers, half Brittany spaniels. They look like pointers, but they have a little Brittany expression in the muzzle. "They don't range as far as pointers. They don't need much training. We took those two pups hunting last fall, and within an hour they were pointing and backing. They picked it up fast."

The sire of the pups, a rangy pointer, came out of the barn. He looked like he had been run through a grinder. His muzzle, one ear and throat were bloody. He wagged and asked for sympathy.

A big, brown, thick-coated cattle dog came out another door of the barn and asked for a hearing. He was holding up a front paw, which was bloody.

"Those two males have had a dispute," said Rogers. "They will have to settle it their own way. I can't keep them apart. The brown dog was here first. The pointer will have to realize that."

A brown quarter horse stuck his head out of a barn door and snorted for attention.

"There's my pal," said Rogers. "We go places together."

Both Mr. and Mrs. Rogers enjoy the wildlife on the ranch. She is not a hunter. She just likes to see deer in the yard, prairie chicken sailing over the grassland.

Both are clear-eyed products of the prairie. She grew up in nearby Alta Vista and was graduated from Junction City High School. He went

to Manhattan High School. They have two children. Their 19-year-old son still has several months to spend in the Army; their daughter, Marsha, is in the eighth grade in Manhattan.

The ranch is now owned by Mr. and Mrs. Gerald Green of Kansas City, Ks. Mrs. Green is the granddaughter of Melville C. Aye, who with a brother bought several thousand acres of prairie from a railroad as it pushed through the tall grass westward.

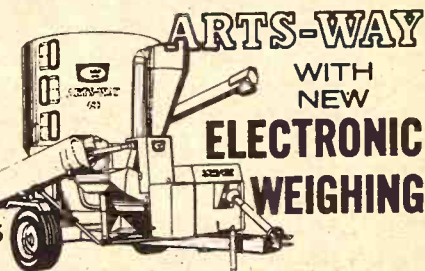
Parts of the original ranch have been sold, but it is still 4,000-acres large, one of several broad

grassland expanses as the Flint Hills start south of Manhattan.

The ranch spread into three counties — Riley, Geary and Wabaunsee. Some of the conservation features of the ranch include more than 300 osage orange, pine, cottonwood and cedar trees planted for cover; five large food plots, with grain left standing for feed in winter; 10 ponds constructed, with brush borders; weeds and grass left in fence rows; sercia planted for nesting; and leadership for youth groups provided by Mr. and Mrs. Rogers.

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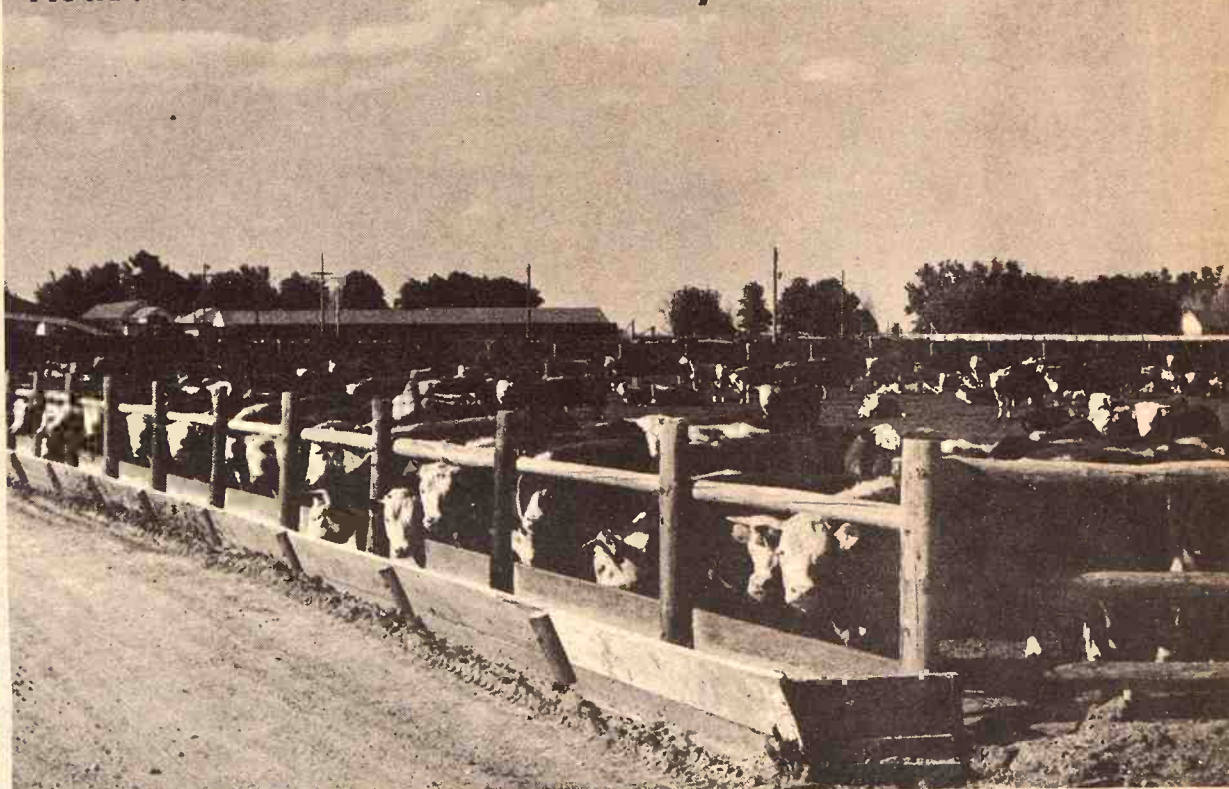
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Real Estate Assessment Draws Fire From KLA

A major guideline for distributing huge amounts of state aid to school financing is the real estate assessments. But close evaluation of our present system of assessing real property shows a glaring discrepancy in the procedures as they are applied by the various assessors due to such a wide variation in judgment values from one case to the next.

Kalo Hineman, Dighton, president of the Kansas Livestock Association, testified before the House Assessment and Taxation Committee offering enlightening information and testifying on behalf of H.B. 1486. Also testifying was Rolland Parr, Rossville, former director of the KLA and the current chairman of the Association's Tax Committee.

In pointing out the inequities in the present system, Hineman told the committee that a common denominator in real estate assessment procedures is badly needed in Kansas. "This need," he said, "is involved from the standpoint of equity among taxpayers and equity among different businesses, industries, and utilities. It is further vital in establishing a reliable measurement basis for determining ability of school districts to fund their budgets."

He added that attempts to legislate and administer good school finance plans are futile without some reasonable and reliable guide. "We can have equalization attempts from now until doomsday and they will all fail unless we perform our original assessment utilizing a system that fits equally well for all real property in the state."

The National Educational Finance Project, a study group composed of renowned people, has been conducting research over the past three years. A recent meeting of several Plains and Mountain states in Denver was held to hear the results of the study. Some startling information concerning the national average of property valuation per student was revealed which brought the Kansas system under close scrutiny.

"Throughout the United States, the highest property valuations per student is in the suburbs, followed by the smaller cities and larger towns.

The lowest property valuation per student across this country was found in small towns and rural areas. But in Kansas the reverse is true — the highest valuations per student are found in the small communities and rural areas. Why are we unique from the other states?" Hineman asked the committee.

He asserted that there was a pressing need to pursue this matter and to determine what extent Kansas finance plans are different from other states and why they differ. The KLA president continued, "What all this seems to indicate is that something is dreadfully wrong with the assessing procedures and priorities of our Kansas system. If this is true then it also is true that comparisons of valuation and of mill levies among school districts are meaningless. This issue must be resolved before we can come up with an equitable school finance plan."

In his testimony, Parr pointed out that the assessment sales ratio study has failed and should be discounted. He blamed gyrations of the system on the factor of considering only real estate sales to determine the ratio. He cited property valued and assessed above its actual value or

rental potential is "simply not an economic reality." "Tax inequities to a taxpayer are not statistics but a reality by the actual impact," Parr added.

Hineman also touched on the subject of the assessment ratio when he told the committee that there are as many underlying reasons for sale as there are actual transactions. . . some perhaps completely ignoring the economics of the purchase. He also pointed out that cash and contract sales of real estate differ markedly and each casts a different influence on the ratio study. Here he indicated that often a higher contract price indicates more convenient terms and not any higher valuation on the particular land in question.

"One final point of deficiency in assessing on sales value is that many types of property do not sell often enough to establish a current cash value. For example," Hineman concluded, "most industrial complexes are not currently revalued

because there are few sales of the plants and facilities to compare on the study."

Parr brought to light another need for revamping the assessing procedure when he said that during school unification the County Planning Boards were instructed to ignore county lines when proposing districts. This practice resulted in many districts with territory in two or more counties. This situation with two or more counties having unequal assessment of property creates agitation between residents of the districts.

"The patrons quickly discover assessment inequities of comparable land across county lines. This agitation destroys unity of purpose within a district, especially if the patrons are asked to vote bonds for a building program," said Parr. "Frustration resulting from this situation cannot be solved at the local district level, but rather, the solution can only be achieved at the state level."

First Water District Set In Brown County

The first rural water district in Brown county will begin construction soon.

The district includes 240 farm families and the towns of Fairview, Hamlin and Reserve in the north part of the county. Financing is through a \$370,000 loan from the Farmers Home Administration.

Over 66 miles of water line will be built, being serviced from five wells. An elevated tower will be built in Fairview and two standpipes will be constructed in rural areas. The district will include 80 square miles.

The FHA loan will be repaid in 40 years at 5 percent interest from the service and usage charges only. Reuben Mellenbruch of Fairview is chairman of the district.



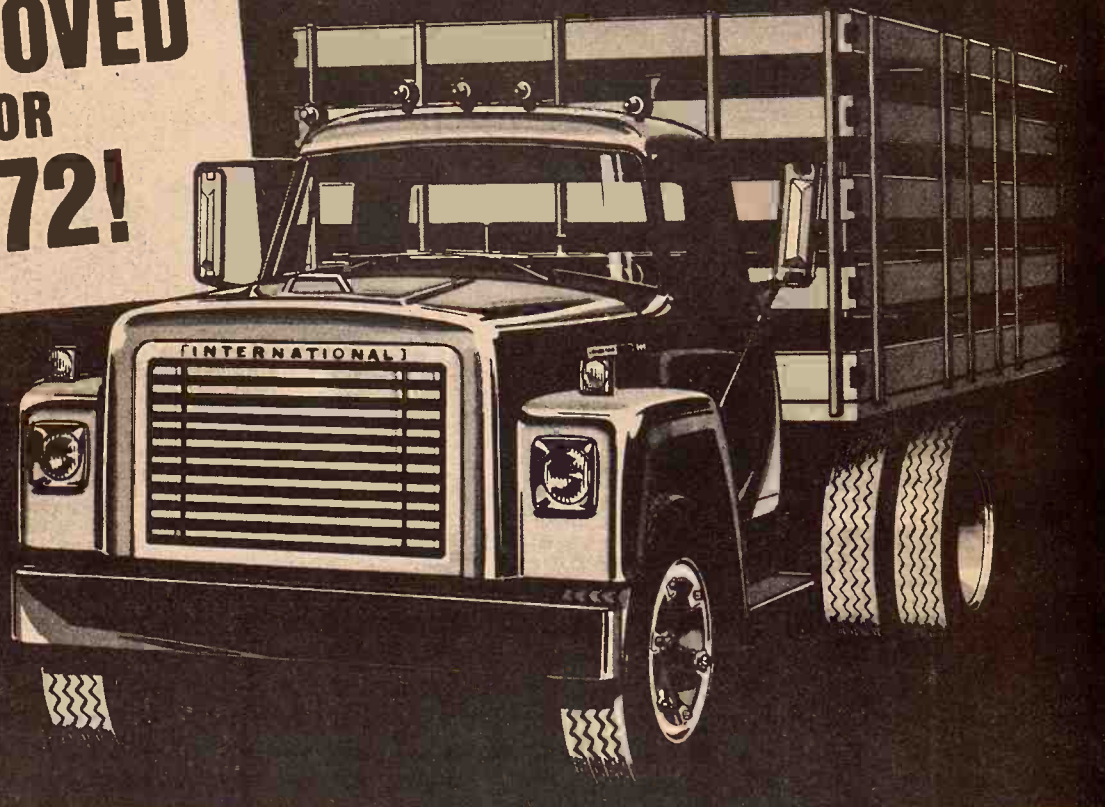
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New Set-Aside Option For Corn And Milo

As sign-up opened in the 1972
voluntary programs for feed grain,
wheat and cotton producers, a new
set-aside option was offered to corn
and grain sorghum producers by the
U.S. Department of Agriculture.
A higher set-aside payment rate
can be earned by producers who
agree to reduce their farm's corn-
sorghum acreage below last year's
planting.
At the same time, all previously-
announced options remain open to
feed grain producers, according to
Frank A. Mosier, Kansas farm
program official. Provisions of the
wheat and cotton set-aside
programs are unchanged. Ad-
ditional set-aside options for wheat
and grain sorghum were
announced in January.
Producer sign-up in the 1972 farm
set-aside programs opened
February 3 and will continue
through March 10 at ASCS county
offices throughout the Nation.
Under the new option for feed
grain producers with corn-sorghum
crops, the payment rate for up to at

least 10 percent and possibly 15
percent voluntary additional set-
aside will be the same as the
qualifying set-aside rate — 80 cents
a bushel for corn and 76 cents a
bushel for grain sorghum. USDA
will accept up to 10 percent of this
voluntary set-aside when offered by
the producer at sign-up. The
remaining 5 percent will be at the
option of the Secretary of
Agriculture, with a later an-
nouncement on whether it will be
accepted.

If he chooses this new option, a
producer will hold his 1972 corn-
sorghum acreage at not more than
last year's acreage minus twice the
additional set-aside acreage.

Producers who choose the new
corn-sorghum option in the feed
grain program will forego the option
previously announced for additional
voluntary set-aside for corn, grain
sorghum and barley.

Explanations of all 1972 set-aside
programs and options — except this
new corn-sorghum option — have
been presented to farmers, Mosier
said. Details of the new option are
currently being made available to
farmers.

The ASCS State Executive
Director expressed hope that every
farmer will make sure of un-

derstanding all program options
before making a sign-up com-
mitment.


When a producer signs up, he
chooses among the options open to
him. In each case, he agrees to set
aside a percentage of his land and to

comply with all provisions of the
farm set-aside programs. By par-
ticipating in the voluntary farm
programs, farmers will earn set-
aside payments and their program
crops will be eligible for Commodity
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Grass & Grain

Edquist, a Lindsborg farmer.

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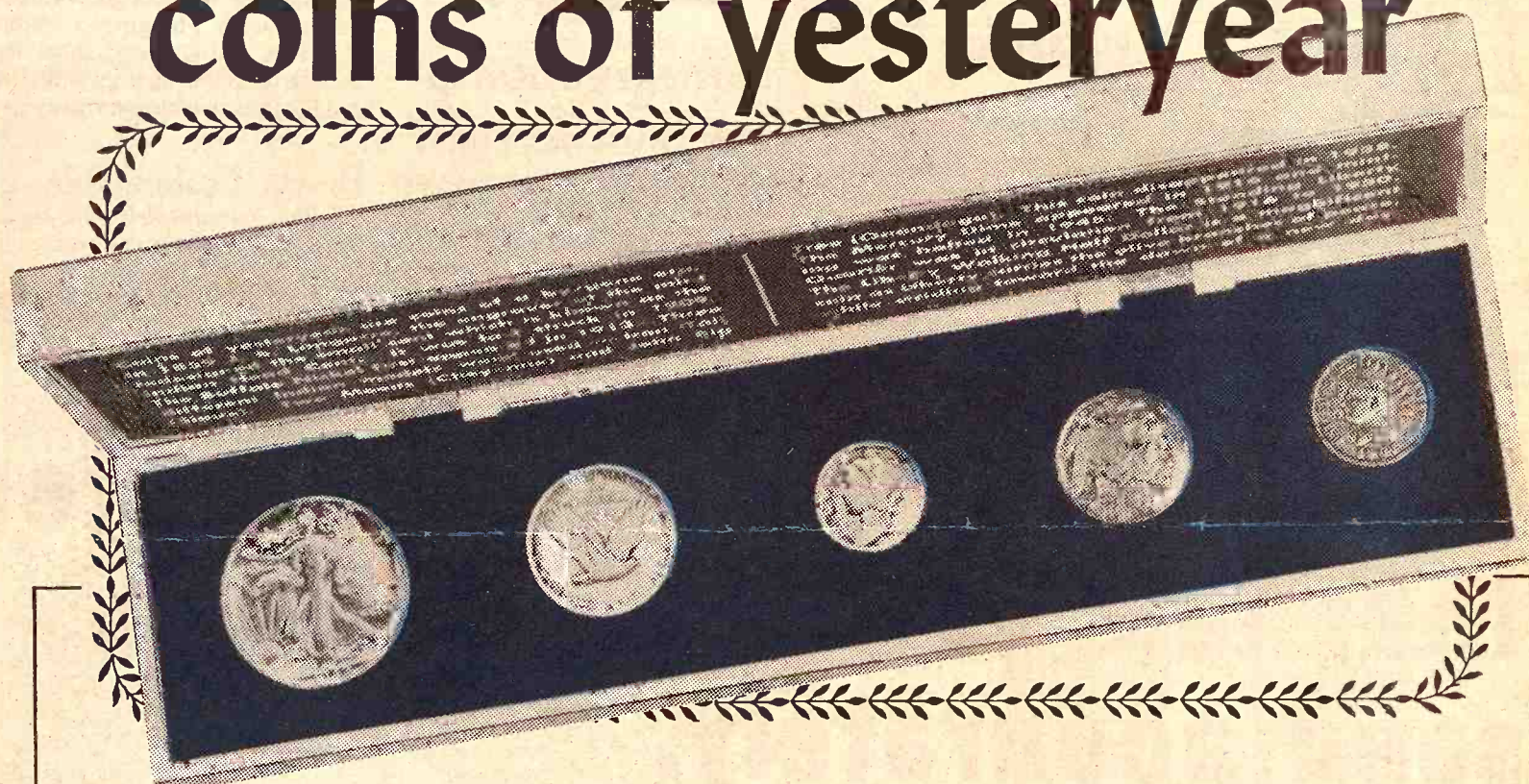


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OUR DAILY BREAD

Mrs. Fred Newell Of Oskaloosa, Prize Winner

Winner, Mrs. Fred H. Newell, R 2, Oskaloosa: "This cake really goes over big with my family. It is quite rich and stays so very moist."

FRUIT COCKTAIL CAKE

- 1½ cups sugar
- 2 cups flour
- 2 eggs
- 2 teaspoons baking soda
- 1 can (No. 303) fruit cocktail
- 1 cup brown sugar
- ½ cup chopped pecans

Mix white sugar, flour, eggs and baking soda together. Add undrained fruit cocktail and mix well. Pour into an ungreased 9x13-inch pan. Mix brown sugar and pecans and sprinkle on top. Bake at 350 degrees for 35 to 45 minutes.

FROSTING

- two-thirds cup canned milk
- 1 stick butter or margarine
- ½ cup white sugar
- ½ cup coconut
- 1 teaspoon vanilla

Mix milk, butter or margarine and sugar in a saucepan. Cook for five minutes then add coconut and vanilla. Pour over cake.

CHOCOLATE BUTTER BALLS

- Melt 2 sticks real butter

Add:



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2 cups graham cracker crumbs
1 cup flake coconut
1 cup pecans, finely chopped (I use my blender)
1 box powdered sugar
Mix well and roll in small balls. Melt 1 12-ounce package semi-sweet chocolate chips and ½ bar of paraffin in top of double boiler. Dip balls in chocolate and lift out with fork and place on waxed paper to harden. Will keep several weeks.
* Better with real butter than margarine.

The next recipe is from Mrs. Werner Monnich, R 1, Delavan:

MARASCHINO PARTY CAKE

Sift together into bowl:

- 2¼ cups sifted cake flour
- 1 and one-third cups sugar
- 3 teaspoons double-action baking powder
- 1 teaspoon salt

Add:

- ½ cup shortening
- ¼ cup maraschino cherry juice
- 16 maraschino cherries (cut in eighths)
- ½ cup milk

Beat vigorously by hand or with mixer. Add 4 egg whites; beat two more minutes. Fold in ½ cup chopped nuts. Pour batter into two round layer pans, 8-inch, 1¼-inch deep or 9-inch, 1½-inch deep or 1 9x13x2-inch pan, which are greased and floured. Bake at 350 degrees, 30-35 minutes.

APPLE SNOW SALAD

In a saucepan combine 1 8¾-ounce can undrained pineapple (crushed), 2 beaten eggs, ½ cup sugar, ¼ cup water, 3 tablespoon lemon juice and dash salt. Cook over low heat, stirring constantly till thickened. Chill. Stir in 2 cups diced, unpeeled apple and ½ cup chopped walnuts; fold in 1 cup whipping cream (whipped). (I often use Dream Whip—2 packages and 1 cup milk). Pour into 8x8x2-inch pan. Freeze till firm. Let stand at room temperature ten to 15 minutes before serving. Cut into squares. Makes nine servings.

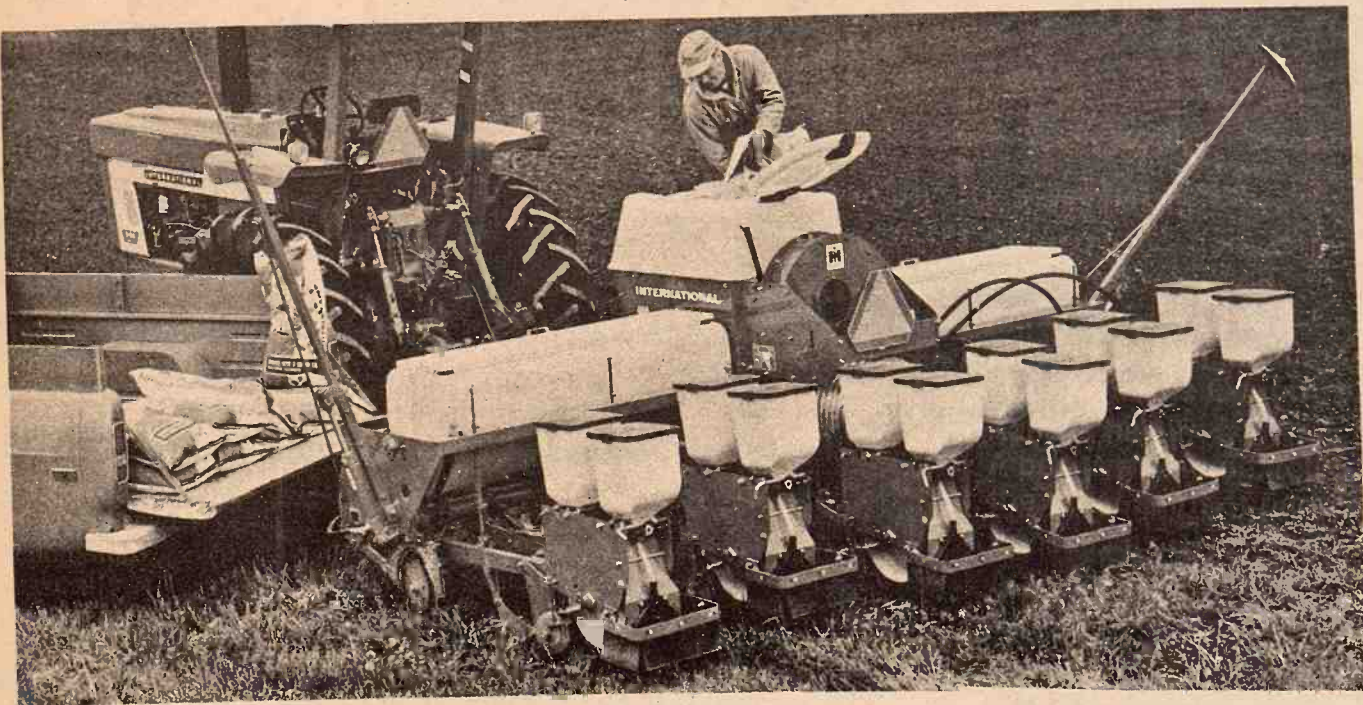

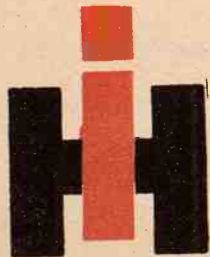

Livability Is Essential Quality In Furniture

Probably the most desirable quality a piece of furniture can have is livability. It has to have more than just good looks, it has to win its way into the home because it is necessary to the needs and comfort of its new owners.

And when the owners move, it should be able to go to the new home as much a part of the household as the family pet. Eighteenth-Century

English furniture is a perfect example of furniture's livability. It was designed to fit human beings—to be comfortable to sit in, eat at, sleep in, write at and relax in. New adaptations of the era are now available in a collection of furniture for every room in the house.

One of the most livable pieces from the English collection is an 86-inch high secretary adapted from a

Chippendale original. A large, bare wall in a dining or living room can be filled and decorated with a 77-inch wide breakfront for accomodating china, silver, crystal and linens.

Five tables that fold, flip or have raisable leaves, parallel the preoccupation the English designers of the century had with furniture that did something. An ideal apartment piece would be the flip-top dining table that opens from a narrow 19 inches to make a roomy 38x72-inch serving area.

Livable storage pieces can be found in all shapes and sizes in the collection, one of the most handsome being a chest on chest with the look of fine antique. And nothing could possibly be easier to live with than a mahogany bow-fronted dresser that would hold linens in a dining room, lingerie and sweaters in a bedroom or a selection of items in a living room or entrance hall.

Another wonderfully livable dresser is an authentic reproduction of a Queen Anne chest that is slightly taller than a conventional dresser. The living room is enhanced with a variety of upholstered pieces, one of the most impressive being a hump-back sofa in the Chippendale manner certain to be a family favorite.

With the dining rooms back in style, the collection features a variety of tables and chairs including a banquet table, a circular table, ribbon-back and fiddle-back chairs, a sideboard and other single pieces to make dining more enjoyable.

Reader Sends Method For Making Fireplace Logs

Mrs. Everett Sill of Burdick responded to a request from one of the G&G readers who desired information about making fireplace logs. Mrs. Sill's letter follows:

"I enjoy the paper very much, especially the 'Daily Bread' section. I noticed one of your readers requested information for making Yule Logs with chemicals and newspaper. Several years ago I clipped the following from a newspaper:

"Calcium chloride produces orange-colored flame; copper chloride—blue; potassium chloride—purple, and strontium nitrate—red. Lithium chloride—carmine, and copper sulphate—

emerald green.

"These may be purchased from chemical suppliers or drugstores. Use one pound of each to a gallon of water. Let the material soak for at least ten minutes or longer. To make a Yule log, roll a newspaper and tie with twine and soak in a solution of four pounds copper sulphate and three pounds rock salt in a gallon of water. This takes quite a long time to dry out enough to burn but lasts quite awhile and produces flames of beautiful colors.

"Pine cones, blocks of wood left over from building or other materials may be used. A grapefruit sack and a plastic pail are good utensils to use in the process."

"Hope this will be what your reader requested. Yes, I am a paper, magazine clipper and you can guess a good percent of the recipes are clipped and saved—also used."

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Take Proper Steps To Refinish Floors

Rich, gleaming hardwood floors are an asset to any home. If your hardwood floors have been dulled by years of heavy traffic, why not take steps to restore them to their former beauty? With proper care, even the do-it-yourselfer can refinish floors.

To begin, remove the old finish. You can do this most efficiently with an electric sander. Be careful not to let the moving sandpaper stay in one place too long.

Next, examine the floor for deep scratches. Wherever possible, sand the scratch out. If the scratch is too deep, you may be able to fill it with a

plastic-sawdust compound. Allow the material to dry thoroughly before sanding it smooth, flush with the floor.

Cleaning is the next step. Mineral spirits on a clean mop will do, but do not wet the floor to any degree. Do not use an oil mop, as the oil will interfere with the drying of the finish.

Sometimes pores must be filled. Apply liquid or paste filler with a brush, first across the grain, then with the grain. After the gloss disappears, remove the surplus at once, working only on one area of the

floor at a time. Remove excess with burlap, first wiping against the grain, then with it. Change to clean burlap frequently. The floor should then be perfectly smooth.

Apply the sealer when the filler is completely dried, preferably overnight. Usually you should use a long-handled lamb's-wool or nylon applicator and apply it liberally. First move across the grain of the wood, then with the grain. Follow the manufacturer's directions for mopping up surplus and drying. An electric buffer makes buffing the surface with steel wool fairly easy. Clean the floor thoroughly with a vacuum cleaner. Then apply a thin second coat only with the grain.

When the floor is dry, feel free to wax or varnish it for added protection.

Raggedy Ann Look

The Raggedy Ann doll rage has caught on in fashion. A bouncy red and white long gingham checked dress with a white apron on top gives you the look of Raggedy Ann, the longtime doll favorite.

Steady Candles

To keep candles firm and steady in their holders, add a little melted paraffin wax just before inserting the candles.

Chubby Jackets

Short furry jackets called chubbies look just as cuddly in wool. You can crochet a bulky chubby sweater to go with a favorite double-knit wool skirt.

Label All Cartons When Moving

Unpacking is an easier job if you label each carton when moving. Also, there will be less breakage in the trip, if you first label all packages of breakables with "fragile" stickers.

To Clean Comb, Brush

To clean a comb and brush, soak for 30 minutes in water to which a few drops of ammonia have been added.

Alcohol Good For Cleaning Records

To clean records, wipe them with a piece of urethane foam that has been dampened slightly with rubbing alcohol. This will remove all dust and fingerprints.

Beetgrowers Angry As Purchase Deal Falls Through

A cooperative of sugar beet producers who wanted to purchase the Great Western Sugar Co. was told by the firm's management that a deal is off unless the growers come up with at least \$100 million cash.

Spokesmen for the cooperative said the growers reacted to the announcement with "great dismay and consternation" and charged Great Western with bargaining in bad faith.

Great Western United Corp., which owns the sugar firm, announced there is no present basis for selling because the growers lack financing.

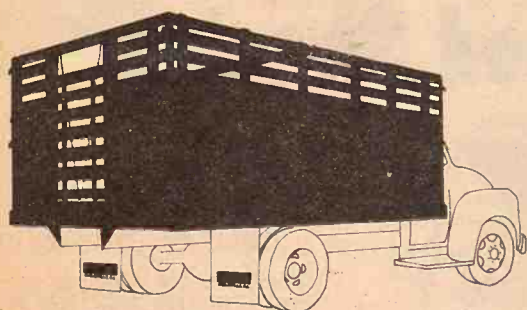

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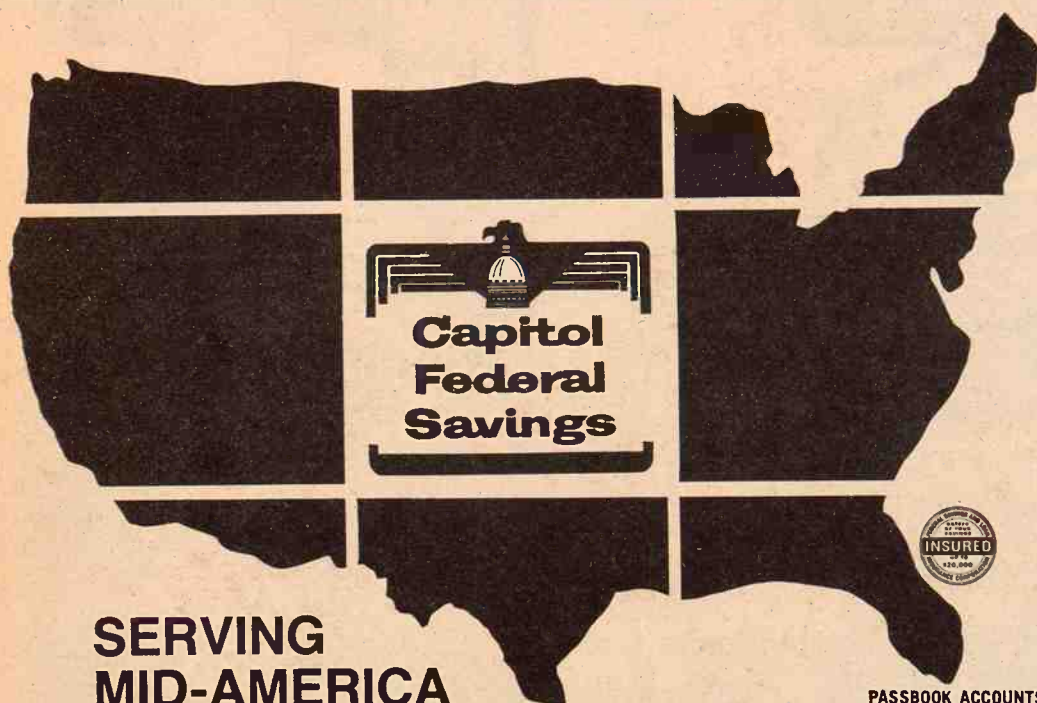

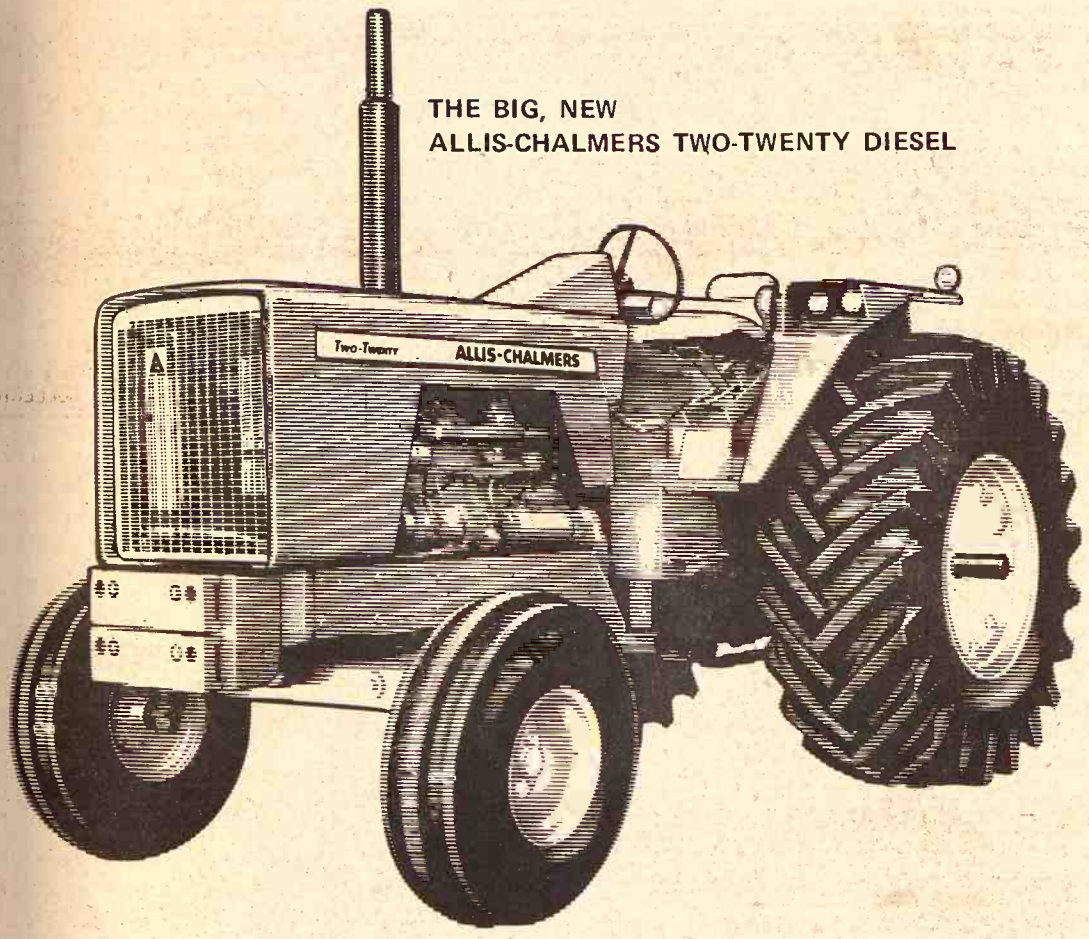
gains of more than 15 per cent. Minnesota led with a 17.2-per-cent boost. On a per-acre basis, New Jersey led with an average tax of \$20.78 per acre. The lowest was 20 cents in New Mexico. The report said the national average was \$2.47 per acre in 1970 compared with \$2.27 in 1969. Growing demands of school and welfare expenditures have spurred stepped-up reappraisal activities and higher tax rates in a number of states," the report said. "This has increased local government revenues, since approximately 85 per cent of local government revenue is derived from property tax," the report said. The analysis said about one-half of local tax spending is for education. During 1965-69 local spending for schools rose 36 per cent, while outlays for local welfare rose 70 per cent. Value of farm real estate has

increased steadily since World War II, but the report shows taxes on the property has risen faster. Based on each \$100 of real estate value, state and local taxes were \$1.18 in 1970, a gain of six cents from 1969. That rate was dropped to 99 cents, a two-cent reduction from 1963. Historically, the tax comparison on the basis of \$100 in real estate value shows that in the depression years of the 1930s the rate was much higher than now. In 1930, state and local taxes on farm real estate averaged nationally \$1.31 per \$100 of value. It went to \$1.52 in 1932 and did not decline below the 1970 rate until 1934 when it was \$1.17 per \$100 of value. The main reason for the relatively higher rates in the 1930s was because land values dropped sharply while taxes were much slower to come down.

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Livestock Prices Boom Farm Index

Prices received by Kansas farmers at mid-January 1972 were up some from the previous month and up considerably from the previous year, according to the Kansas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service.

The index of prices received for all farm products in January was 277 percent of the 1910-14 base period compared with 266 in December and 247 in January 1971.

Increases from last month were noted for meat animals, feed grains and milk while decreases were reported for food grains, soybeans

and eggs.

Compared with a year ago, prices were up substantially for most meat animals and some for barley and soybeans, but down considerably for sorghum grain, corn hay, wool and eggs.

Crop Prices

The crop price index was 160 percent of the 1910-14 base period at mid-January, 1 point below a month ago and 5 points below a year earlier.

Wheat at mid-January averaged \$1.31 per bushel, down 2 cents from

December and January 1971.

Corn was worth \$1.15 per bushel, 1 cent above a month earlier but 18 cents below a year earlier. Barley at 99 cents per bushel was up 1 cent from the previous month and 4 cents above January the previous year.

Sorghum grain brought \$1.78 per cwt., 4 cents more than in December 1971 but 21 cents below January 1971.

Soybeans were worth \$2.84 per bushel, 4 cents below last month but 11 cents above last year.

Merry-go-Round Speeds Milking

Guernsey cows belonging to

Morelli, dairyman from Turlock, Calif., take twice-daily rides on merry-go-round, an innovative design to speed milking.

The carousel provides milk with a continuous flow of cows allowing two or three to milk cows per hour, compared with 70 hour in a standard flat barn, Morelli said in an interview.

Morelli said, adding he and Hilmar contractor designed the carousel after inspecting similar European operations.

The hydraulically operated 46-foot diameter platform allows tendants to milk 14 cows simultaneously with one animal stepping on and off the slow, rotating carousel at regular intervals, Morelli said.

The system still has bugs in it, Morelli, who calls one problem a cow element.

"The platform when it's turning is like a clock. You can't stop time," he said. "And sometimes people, cows aren't always on the place they should be."



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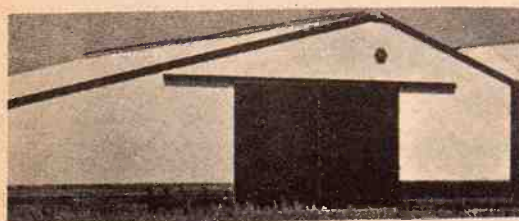
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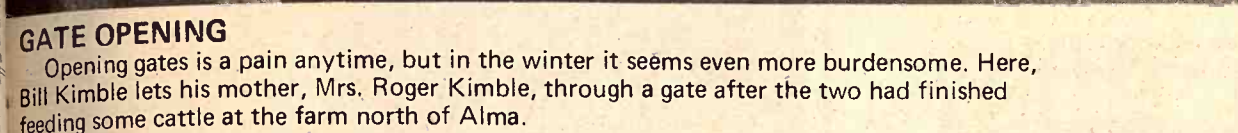

long time," Pearson said. "He has the qualifications, experience, professional capacity and integrity to fulfill the responsibilities of this position."

The nomination now will be sent to the full Senate for confirmation.

Fish Consumption - Only One-Tenth Of Beef Rate

Cattlemen should have no worries about consumers preferring fish to beef, according to an Agriculture Department report.

Last year, in fact, per capita fish consumption dropped to 11.2 pounds from 11.40 in 1970. Fish eating had

risen three years in a row before that.

Beef consumption, meantime, remained about steady at approximately 113 pounds per capita,

according to a preliminary estimate.

On the fish situation, the USDA said in a report: "Prices of fillets were considerably higher than

whole broilers or pork and, in some cases, more expensive than chicken parts. Also, some resistance was generated by reports of mercury in fish."

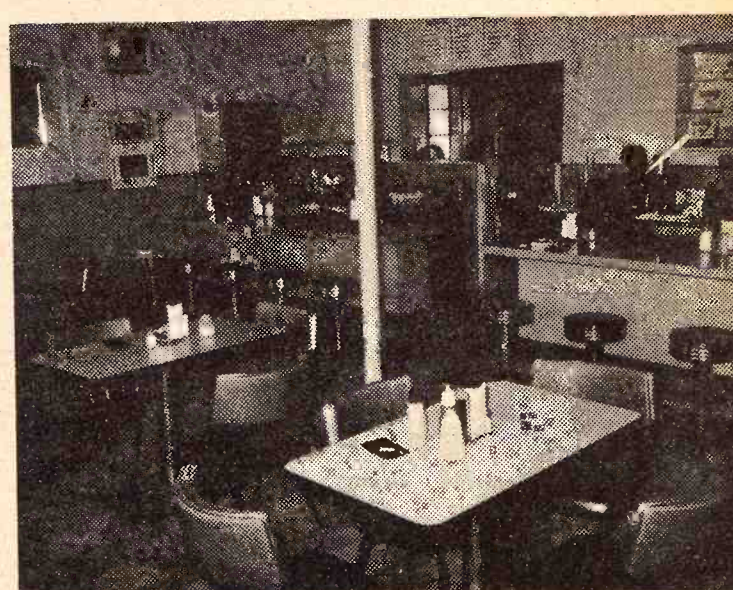

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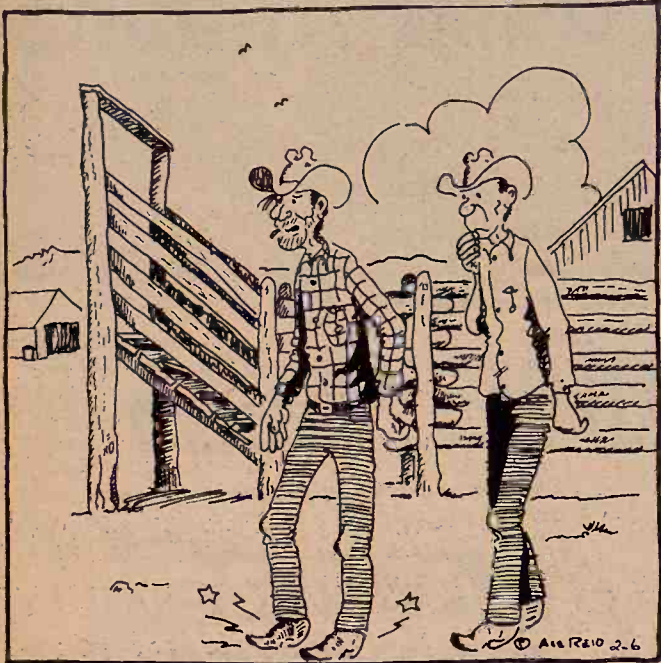

Promise Federal Help On Feedlot Waste Problems

DENVER—The nation's livestock industry has been promised government help in its efforts to solve the air and water pollution problems caused by animal wastes. Speaking at the 75th anniversary

convention of the American National Cattlemen's Assn. here, William D. Ruckelshaus, administrator of the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency, said his agency recognizes that "guidelines and regulations alone cannot solve the problem."

"We intend to help develop waste management technologies that are economical and effective for both livestock and poultry wastes. There won't be any one simple answer," he declared.

The EPA administrator spoke at a symposium on "It's the Cattlemen's Environment, Too," co-sponsored by ANCA and American Cyanamid Company.

Ruckelshaus praised the livestock industry for efforts already made to alleviate waste pollution. He listed animal wastes, irrigation return-flows and sediment run-off as the three most serious forms of agricultural pollution.

"Clearly we are coming into a new era in which your relationship to the land will receive much closer scrutiny," he observed. "That is simply because we are no longer a country with a small population and seemingly endless open spaces. In 1972 everybody is downwind or downstream from somebody else."

Citing industry attempts to control pollution with sloped lots, under-drains, paved lots, interceptor ditches, berms, grassed waterways, retention basins and lagoons, Ruckelshaus said the EPA is working to outline new waste management systems for the short run as well as the long haul.

"We are pushing forward with efforts to quantify agricultural pollutants and to develop new treatment methods. We are investigating the prospects for recycling and refeeding animal waste in cooperation with the Food and Drug Administration and the U.S. Department of Agriculture," he added.

Ruckelshaus said he believed future feedlots can be integrated into long-range plans for land use and water, air and solid waste

management on a regional scale. He called for continued study of the potential for converting waste matter into animal feeds, combustible oils, fertilizers and other marketable products.

"Our commitment to a better environment is irreversible and total," he declared. "From what I have seen and heard, Livestock and poultry producers have an equal commitment, but they are not sure what the policy means for their industry and they feel a need for guidance."

"Therefore, we intend to improve communication with the nation's farm and feedlot managers so that we can exchange views frankly and move forward together in a cooperative campaign to upgrade our common surroundings. We do not intend to go off half-cocked on any of the issues facing our agency. But we must act responsibly and demonstrate to the American people that the environment can and will be cleaned up."

Limousin Assn. Finds Fill-In To Run Promotion

Dale F. Runnion, Fort Collins, has been appointed interim executive vice president for the North American Limousin Foundation to fill the vacancy created by the resignation of Dick Goff.

The board of directors commended Goff for the stellar role he had played in the founding and organization of the foundation since its beginning.

"We're pleased that Runnion has accepted our draft to fill this important post during this rapid growth period of our organization", President John D. Moore, Newville, Pa., stated in making the announcement. "His many years experience working closely with

Runnion assumed the duties in the headquarters office in Denver February 1st. He will serve on a selection committee with North American Limousin Foundation President Moore and Vice President Burwell M. Bates, Konawa, Okla., to screen applicants for the new executive vice president position.

Runnion is the publisher and editor of the International Limousin Journal. His duties with the magazine will be assumed by Dean Jacobs and June A. Runnion during the period he will be serving the foundation.

Electric Co-ops Squirm Over Funds

Rural electric power cooperatives are unhappy over some money-juggling in President Nixon's budget proposal for financing the Rural Electrification Administration next fiscal year.

The Nixon budget calls for \$438 million in new REA loans during the year beginning July 1, less than half of what electric co-op representatives expect the demand to be.

Moreover, \$107 million of next year's REA budget amount actually is money Congress intended the agency to use now, before July 1, for loans. Here is how it went:

The REA, in the Agriculture Department, was held originally to a loan budget of \$329 million for the year which began last July 1. However, Congress appropriated a total of \$545 million for REA lending this fiscal year.

But the Office of Management and Budget, the White House money watchers, impounded \$216 million of the amount Congress had approved.

Loan pressure built up, however, and Nixon ordered OMB to release \$109 million for REA use this fiscal year. The partial thaw of the frozen funds was announced on Jan. 6, leaving \$107 million still on ice.

That made a total of \$438 million available to REA borrowers this fiscal year.

In the budget Nixon sent Congress last week, the new REA money sought for next fiscal year is \$438 million the same as for the current year. It includes the \$107 million in still-frozen funds Congress had earmarked for the 1971-72 program.

Thus, according to the Nixon budget, the actual new funds asked for REA next fiscal year total \$331 million.

The National Rural Electric Cooperative Association, which represents REA borrowers and carries their messages to Congress, is pushing for the immediate release of the still-frozen \$107 million so REA lending could be boosted to the full \$545 million Congress specified

this fiscal year.

Robert D. Partridge, NRECA general manager, sent a telegram to President Nixon saying the new budget for REA "is far short" of the actual needs of rural electric systems. Surveys, Partridge said, show capital demand currently at more than \$800 million.

"Even if the entire \$545 million

authorized by Congress were to be used this fiscal year and that much more approved for fiscal 1973, the backlog of loan applications at REA would continue to grow at an alarming rate," Partridge said.

Loan demand "may reach \$1 billion" next fiscal year, Partridge told Nixon.

The new budget notes REA money next year will continue at the current rate of \$438 million

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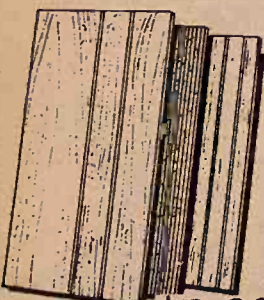

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Federal Lawsuit On Associated Milk Co-op

The Associated Milk Producers, Inc., has been charged by the Justice Department with monopolizing the sale of milk produced in 14 states. The suit, filed in San Antonio, charges that A.M.P.I., one of the nation's largest dairy marketing cooperatives, has conspired with milk haulers and processors to strain unreasonably and monopolize the sale of milk to processors in violation of antitrust laws.

The department said A.M.P.I., with headquarters in San Antonio, has acted to restrain and monopolize milk sales in the 14-state area since 1937 by practices designed to eliminate the competition of independent milk producers.

The practices cited include manipulating orders for the purpose of depressing the price of milk received by independent producers. The civil antitrust suit also alleged that producers have been denied restricted access to haulers and processors and that customers have

been deprived of the opportunity to buy processed milk and milk products at competitive prices.

The suit asks that A.M.P.I. be barred from continuing the practices and also that it be enjoined from using threats or coercion to induce dairy farmers to join the cooperative or to induce independent haulers and processors to refuse to haul or process milk for non-members of A.M.P.I.

The association has more than 40,000 members in Missouri, Kansas, Wisconsin, Minnesota, South Dakota, Iowa, Nebraska, Illinois, Indiana, Tennessee, Arkansas, Oklahoma, New Mexico and Texas.

Wage Gains Disappear To Taxes, Inflation

Wages and salaries have been so seriously depreciated by higher taxes and inflation that breadwinners who gained increases of up to 30 per cent over the last six years actually may have lost buying power, the Tax Foundation says.

Five base incomes analyzed by the private, nonprofit foundation show that in the 6-year span a 30 per cent increase in dollar pay resulted in a decrease in "real" pay.

Dr. Elsie Waters, senior research administrator for the New York-based organization, said economists and tax people "are considerably concerned by the trend. They are focusing on whether they will ever be able to control government spending. It seems to have run away."

The Tax Foundation based its calculations on a family of four, with one person working. A 30 per cent increase in a salary of \$10,000 in 1966 would be worth \$13,000 today.

How much is it worth in buying power now? Actually \$156 less, according to the foundation, which deducted \$745 as the increase in taxation in that period, and \$2,411 deducted as the inflation bite. This represented a 1½ per cent decline in purchasing power.

A raise in salary from \$20,000 in 1966 to \$26,000 in 1972, less the \$4,596

inflation bite and the \$1,722 increase in taxation, resulted in a net loss of \$318 in buying power, the foundation said.

A raise in salary from \$30,000 to \$39,000 in 1972 minus the \$3,244 increase in taxes and the \$6,523 deducted for inflation, resulted in a net loss of \$767, or 2½ per cent less in purchasing power.

Similarly a raise in salary from \$40,000 in 1966 to \$52,000 in 1972 resulted in a net loss of \$1,299 in buying power, and a raise from \$50,000 to \$65,000 resulted in a net buying power loss of \$1,789.

Dr. Waters blamed the loss of purchasing power on escalating inflation and rising state and Social Security taxes.

"State and local taxes are going up faster than federal taxes," she said. "From 1965 to 1970 these taxes rose by 12 per cent a year, which doubles them every six years. In that same period consumer spending was up 7 per cent, and the gross national product was up 7 per cent."

Dr. Waters said 30 per cent was a "conservative" estimate of salary and wage increase since 1966. But the figures make it quite clear that you would have had to get increases of at least 35 per cent in that period to just stay even in terms of buying power."

Co-op Managers To Get Schooling

The second annual Co-op Management Institute sponsored by the Kansas Farmers Service Association and the Kansas State University College of Business Administration will be held at the K-State Union, February 15-16.

Purpose of the institute is to increase job effectiveness of co-op managers. About 35 co-op managers from throughout the state are expected for the meeting.

Featured speakers include Dr. Robert Lynn, dean of the college, who will discuss "Economic Environment and the Co-op Manager"; Dr. Charles Hubbard, an assistant professor who will discuss advertising; and Dr. Richard Vaden, an assistant professor who will discuss management effectiveness.

Just Jeans, No Fancy Duds, For 4-H Horsemen

Fancy apparel for 4-H horsemen competing in events leading up to the Kansas State Fair will be traded in for plain old jeans and white shirts this year under a decree by 4-H officials.

The State Fair Board was told by Glen Bussett, Manhattan, the Kansas 4-H club leader, that the rule would apply not only to state fair horsemanship competition but the eight regional contests in which 4-H riders qualify for state fair competition.

"It really was a little ridiculous that some of the wealthier members could sport western costumes costing up to \$600 for competition to show the working of a horse and its rider," Bussett said.

The 4-H officials thought it would be less distracting for judges if all the riders were dressed the same, and in simple costumes, fair board members were told.

Bussett said the Kansas rule follows one that has been used successfully in Nebraska five years. The Kansas rule is on a trial basis this year, but will be extended if successful, he said.

There still will be outlets for individual fancy dress. No rule specifies what type of hat or boots

must be worn. Bussett agreed it would be possible for a contestant to wrap up a lot of money in a Stetson and a pair of handcrafted lizard skin western boots.

"But these won't look as different as some of the present costumes do

now," he said. "The way some members were dressing they looked like they should be in the Western dress competition at the American Royal." Saddles and fittings also will be restricted.

White Corn Is Market Situation Of Its Own

White corn continues to present an interesting study in marketing, because it is a grain that sort of operates in a world of its own. This year, apparently a lot of amateurs entered that world and it is obvious in the trade that they have found it confusing.

White corn is distinguished by the fact that it is grown primarily as human food, while the yellow variety produced in much greater abundance, is raised as a feed for livestock and poultry.

Up until this year, or at least since around 1946, the government maintained no statistics on white corn (it was included with the yellow). That is, no crop reports were issued, no acreage estimates made and thus no figures were available for comparing one year with another.

Growers of the white variety and processors relied upon what figures they could gather themselves from such things as seed sold by the seed companies, local elevator reports, and the like.

There is no futures market on white corn.

Prices, therefore, are set on a cash basis day to day, with bargaining between seller and buyer determining the level at which trades are made. Under this system, price fluctuation may be much greater than with yellow corn where there is both a daily cash market and an indication of futures values in the futures market.

White corn is of particular interest at the Kansas City Board of Trade because by custom in the grain trade, Kansas City is a basing point for white corn prices, just as Decatur, Ill. is the base point for soybean prices.

Generally speaking, white corn sells at some premium at least over yellow corn. But there are exceptions. When white corn supplies are so ample that all human food needs are met and the only other outlet is for livestock feeds, white corn suffers because livestock feeders prefer the yellow variety. Late in 1970, white corn prices hit a peak of around \$2.80 in Kansas City (not at the farm), far above the level for yellow corn, even though prices were high on that variety too. It will be recalled that was the year of the short corn crop because of the corn leaf blight.

Even though prices had moderated by the spring of 1971, farmers apparently remembered the good returns in 1970, and they planted accordingly.

Beginning in 1971, the government estimated acres planted to white corn and the yield. The final crop report for 1971, released January 14 by the U.S. Dept. of Agriculture, showed farmers had harvested 1,067,000 acres of white corn in the 20 important growing states and had a total yield of 81.3 million bushels. By states, the yields were Ohio, 1,224,000 bushels; Indiana, 7,505,000; Illinois, 11,480,000; Iowa, 3,956,000; Missouri, 9,831,000; Nebraska, 2,960,000; Kansas, 8,415,000; Ken-

tucky, 19,856,000; Tennessee, 10,285,000; and Texas, 5,760,000.

Since there were no reports in previous years, there are no official figures to indicate whether the 1971 yield was up or down. But the market says farmers produced too much. Despite the lack of official figures for comparisons, the trade assumes both the acreage and yield on white corn were higher in 1971 than previously. The yellow corn acreage was up too, and the total yield of all corn was a record 5,540 million bushels. This latter figure suggests that the white corn total is a small part of the whole.

White corn prices in Kansas City hit a low of around \$1.13 a bushel soon after harvest. They have rallied since and then had setbacks.

Under circumstances where supply is greater than demand, it is not unusual for a commission merchant to have one or several cars of white corn which he is offering for sale on the trading floor in Kansas City, and when he cannot get the price he asks, he simply waits for another day. Obviously, he hopes that a buyer eventually will come along and that they can make a deal. The same situation applies to elevators which have white corn for

sale. Obviously, price is a factor when a deal is made but the point is that experienced merchandisers of white corn are aware that this is all part of the business.

No Change For Food Stamps

Three changes in the food stamp program of the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA), used by welfare recipients in 86 Kansas counties, will go into effect March 1. "The only one that will affect recipients of the food stamps is one preventing retailers from giving them cash as change," said Harold

Smelser, director of commodity distribution with the Kansas Department of Social Welfare.

Food stamp recipients will no longer be allowed to use food coupons as payment for bottle or other container deposits, Smelser added.

"This has never been much of a problem in Kansas, but I think that in some large urban areas, there's been some abuse of receiving change in cash," he said.

After March 1, he illustrated, if someone buys \$1.51 worth of groceries with a \$2 coupon, he may go back and get 49 cents amount of food, or be given credit for 49 cents. USDA officials indicated he could also pay a penny and receive a 50 cent coupon in change.

Other changes will be in the redemption card filled out by the grocer and the appearance of the 50-cent coupon.

The redemption card, now a yellow paper certificate, will be in card form, so that it can be read automatically by a computer.

The orange colored 50-cent coupons will be a lighter shade, will have square instead of round notches along the left side. The 50-cent coupons currently in use are valid so long as they are in circulation.

Beetgrowers Think They've Been Double-Dealt

GREELEY, Colo.—A change in management of the Great Western United Corp. evidently has torpedoed efforts by growers to purchase the Great Western Sugar Co. through a cooperative.

Last week the Wall Street Journal said GWU officials were calling off negotiations for sale of the sugar company to the cooperative, citing the difficulty the co-op was having in raising funds.

Resentment boiled over in a meeting at Billings, Mont., between growers and officials of Great Western Sugar. The meeting was to determine the basis for payment of the 1972 beet crop.

The growers demanded the sugar company obtain a letter of credit from the sugar company's lead bank guaranteeing payment for the 1972 beet crop.

George Wilber, GW Sugar president, said such a guarantee was unnecessary but agreed to provide it if the growers paid the cost of the necessary credit investigation. The growers objected to paying for the investigation.

At the close of the meeting Harlan Seaworth, president of the Mountain

States Beet Growers Association declared: "Speaking for myself, I cannot under the present set of circumstances see any real future for producers of sugar beets."

Last September members of the Mountain States Beet Growers Association, dissatisfied with the operations of Great Western Sugar, formed the Great Western Producers Cooperative to purchase the sugar company from its parent concern, Great Western United.

The down payment was to have been about \$1 million, with the total price to be negotiated.

The idea of selling the sugar company was approved by William M. White, then chairman and president of GWU. The co-op named as its president Robert Owen who, several months earlier, was removed as head of the sugar company by White.

The co-op conducted a successful campaign to secure pledges of financial support from growers in GW's beet-producing region. Among the areas where money was pledged was the sugar beet growing area of northwest Kansas, centered around Goodland where GW has a year-old

refining plant.

During the campaign the co-op received encouragement from White, who wrote Robert Y. Sakata, Brighton, Colo., chairman of the cooperative: "We Western Sugar Co. through a cooperative would provide our growers with self-determination of their economic destiny."

"If growers' support reaches a practical and sufficient majority and adequate financing can be achieved, the management of this company is prepared to submit a reasonable proposal from you (to purchase the company) for consideration by our board of directors."

On Nov. 17, 1971, a week after that

letter was written, it was disclosed that White had exchanged all of his GWU stock, 240,136 shares, for stock of the Colorado and Western Properties Corp., a Denver real estate firm.

A month later White was replaced as president of GWU by Robert G. Everett, who had been executive vice president of the company.

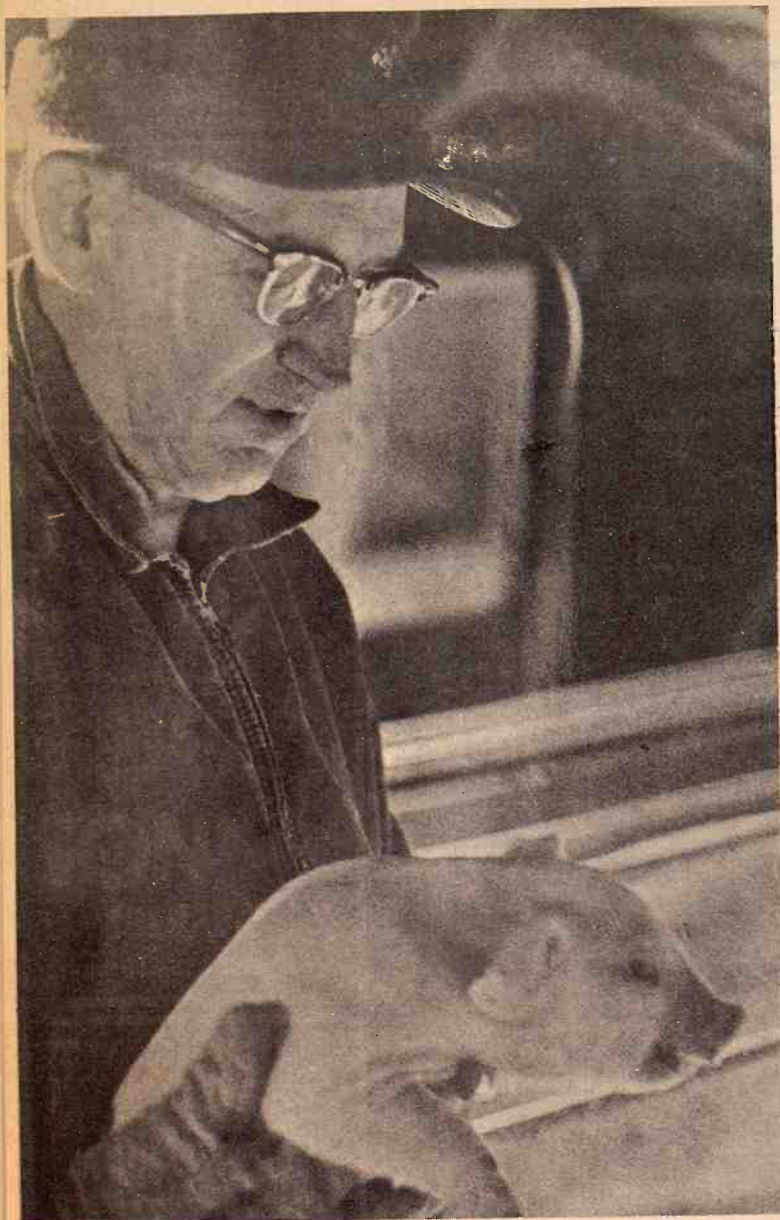

On-Farm versus Feedlot Finishing Depends On Individual Operation

Many a Kansas farmer has asked the question: "Can I finish slaughter cattle on the farm at less cost than in a feedlot?"

Wilton Thomas, Kansas State farm management specialist, says "The answer depends upon the individual situation."

Commercial feedlots have an advantage of size of operation, which allows efficient use of modern processing equipment, and makes it feasible to formulate low-cost well-balanced rations.

"Also, the feedlots' size allows for greater efficiency of labor and equipment," Thomas says, "and provides a substantial marketing advantage."

Some farmer-feeders can compete with the commercial lots.

For example, home-produced, high moisture feed grain can offset some processing advantages of commercial lots. Development of feeding whole corn in highly concentrated finishing rations also indicates an opportunity for feeding without processing equipment.

Also, the feed grain and roughage producer often has much of the needed feed available without marketing and transportation costs.

Suitable facilities and equipment are available on some farms, so a fixed cost for facility ownership would not enter into the cost of operation.

Marketing will often be the critical factor in deciding between on-farm

or commercial lot feeding. Says Thomas: "The farmer must ask himself whether he could sell his own finished cattle at the same price per hundredweight as the feed lot would get. Also, he must determine if his marketing costs would be greater."

The answer will vary for different feeders. Thomas believes younger

cattlemen considering investing in new feeding facilities are facing rough competition. To succeed, on-farm feeders must invest only in efficient facilities and be able to handle an adequate volume of cattle to keep the annual fixed costs per head not much higher than the same costs in commercial lots, Thomas concludes.

Fewer Acres Won't Cut Fertilizer Use

This year under the government's set-aside program for farms, some 25 or 26 million more acres of cropland may be idled than in 1971. On the surface, this would suggest poorer business for the fertilizer industry when compared to last year, but a look at past experience does not suggest this is a certain fact.

Actually, a look at the records indicates that farmers use more fertilizer almost every year, regardless of the acres planted. On charts, the trend shown since 1950 generally has been fewer acres in crops, greater use of fertilizer, and larger total production. Putting it plainly, farmers have been using fewer acres, but with better technology which includes more and more use of fertilizer, they have been getting bigger and bigger production. This has to be the case or we could not be producing record breaking crops.

The U.S. Dept. of Agriculture annually puts out a publication called the "Handbook of Agricultural Charts." The 1971 chart book has just been distributed. The trends on almost everything you can think of in agriculture are charted in the 146-page publication.

One chart shows that using production of 1950 as a base of 100, crop production to the acre in the United States had increased 59 per cent by 1971. Over the same period, land used for crops had decreased 8 per cent. In 1969, the land used for crops had decreased by 12 per cent under 1950, and of course, with the larger set-aside this year, the percentage decrease again will be larger than in 1971.

Another chart shows that total crop production has increased about 46 per cent since 1950, and total livestock production 41 per cent. In the early 1950's, farmers of this country harvested crops from around 344 to 349 million acres annually. In the last few years, the harvested acreage has hovered around the 300 million mark, with a low of 294 million in 1969 and a high of 310 million in 1971.

But in 1950 when the harvested acreage was 345 million acres, farmers used only 18,343,000 tons of mixed fertilizer. Last year on the 310 million acres they used almost 41 million tons, the greatest amount in

history, and they got the greatest production in history.

The Tennessee Valley Authority at Muscle Shoals, Ala., annually publishes a fertilizer review which uses charts to depict the trends in fertilizer production and use.

A chart on total plant nutrient (fertilizer) consumption shows there has been a continuous climb in use since 1950. In fact, every year except 1956, even though planted acreages have varied, fertilizer use has increased.

The biggest increase has been in nitrogen, followed by phosphate and potash.

The single crop that gets the most fertilizer is corn, with more than a third of all that is used going on this crop. Wheat is second and cotton third.

In 1950, when the total use of fertilizer was 18 million tons on all crops, U.S. farmers planted 82,859,000 acres to corn and harvested 81,818,000 acres. They harvested 2,7643,071,000 bushels as grain, and the USDA records assume another 310,843,000 bushels were harvested as silage and forage.

In 1971, as mentioned, U.S. farmers used 41 million tons of fertilizer on all crops. Corn records for 1971, which were calculated on a little different basis than in the 1950's, show a total corn acreage harvested of 74.6 million, with 64 million harvested for grain. These 64 million acres produced 5,540,253,000 bushels of corn.

Fertilizer, of course, does not get all the credit for the increase in yields as between 1950 and 1971, but obviously it accounts for some of it. This is why the grain trade as represented at the Kansas City Board of Trade and elsewhere, pays as much attention to yield trends as to acreages in attempting to project production.

In an analysis in its fertilizer review for 1971, the TVA predicts fertilizer tonnage by 1975 will be 25 to 35 per cent greater than in 1970, when total use was 39,590,611 tons, just 817,000 tons less than in 1971. The biggest increase in use is expected to be in nitrogen.

Christmas Tree Growers Already Planning Ahead

Kansas Christmas tree growers will plant more than 500,000 new trees this spring. About 300,000 of them will be ready for the market in 1978-80.

The figures came from the seventh annual meeting of the

Kansas Christmas Tree Growers Association in Manhattan.

Gerald Eck of Salina was elected president of the association.

Christmas tree production is expanding rapidly in Kansas, and during the past season more than 75,000 Kansas-grown trees were sold to the public. Most were scotch pine, although Austrian pine and white pine were popular in some areas.

Kansas trees are grown on intensively-managed plantations. Each tree is shaped and cultured five to seven years before harvest.

Kansans who want to plant trees this spring should pick up order forms from the county Extension office.

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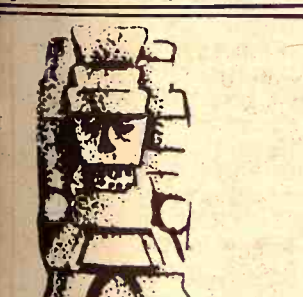

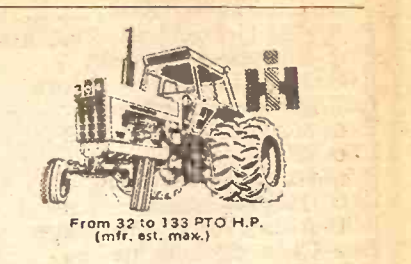

the new system will result in a majority of the 62 million checks written each day by Americans to be cleared and paid by the opening of business the day following deposit of the check.

For individuals and businesses making and receiving payments by check, this new system will mean earlier receipt of funds due to them or earlier payment of funds they are transferring to others, the board said.

Most payroll checks will be cleared and employees will have the use of their deposited pay within a day after they put it in the bank, the board said. "Similarly, a check written to pay a bill, or make a purchase, will be debited within a day after the check is deposited in a participating area bank," it added. The board said faster and better check-handling is urgent because of

the large number of checks now being written. About 23 billion with a value of \$13 trillion are written each year, and these totals are expected to double by 1980.

In addition, the board said, improving the check-payment system is a necessary transitional step toward replacing the use of checks with an electronic transfer of money. The board has been working on a system to move to a checkless

society by transferring funds electronically and officials say that day may come sooner in the United States than most people expect. The board envisions leasing space and, in some cases, computers to establish the regional centers. The system is expected to become operative on a region-by-region basis as soon as possible, the board said, with a target date of the end of the year.

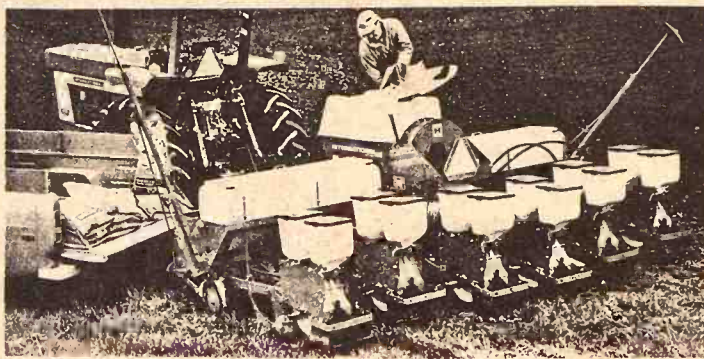

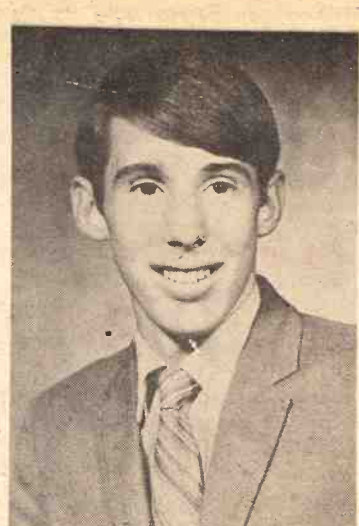

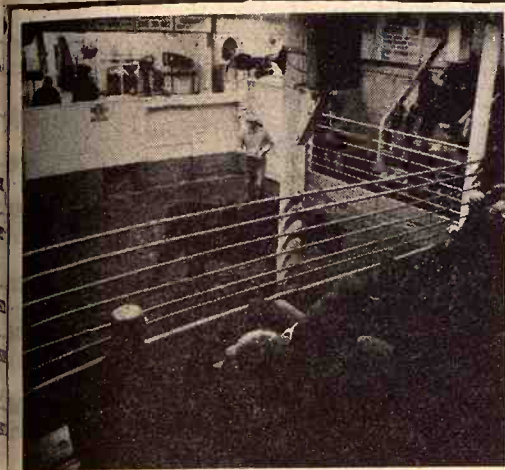

Area Cable TV To Avoid New Network Limits

Cable television systems already in operation will not be affected by the Federal Communication Commission's new rules which limit new systems to three networks and one to three independent signals, Robert K. Weary, Junction City, secretary of Communication Services Inc., says.

CSI operates 13 cable TV systems in Kansas and Texas. They offer 11 TV channels and a 24-hour music-weather service. The systems are

in Junction City, St. Marys, Wamego, Ft. Riley, Manhattan, Ogden, Belleville, Council Grove, Pratt, Kinsley, Salina and Arkansas City in Kansas, and Beeville, Tex.

Weary said a grandfather clause in the FCC regulations exempts present systems which will be required to comply with new rules making it mandatory to originate locally produced programs and open a public access channel.

The public access facility would be available on a first-come-first-served basis with no program control by the company so local citizens may express their views.

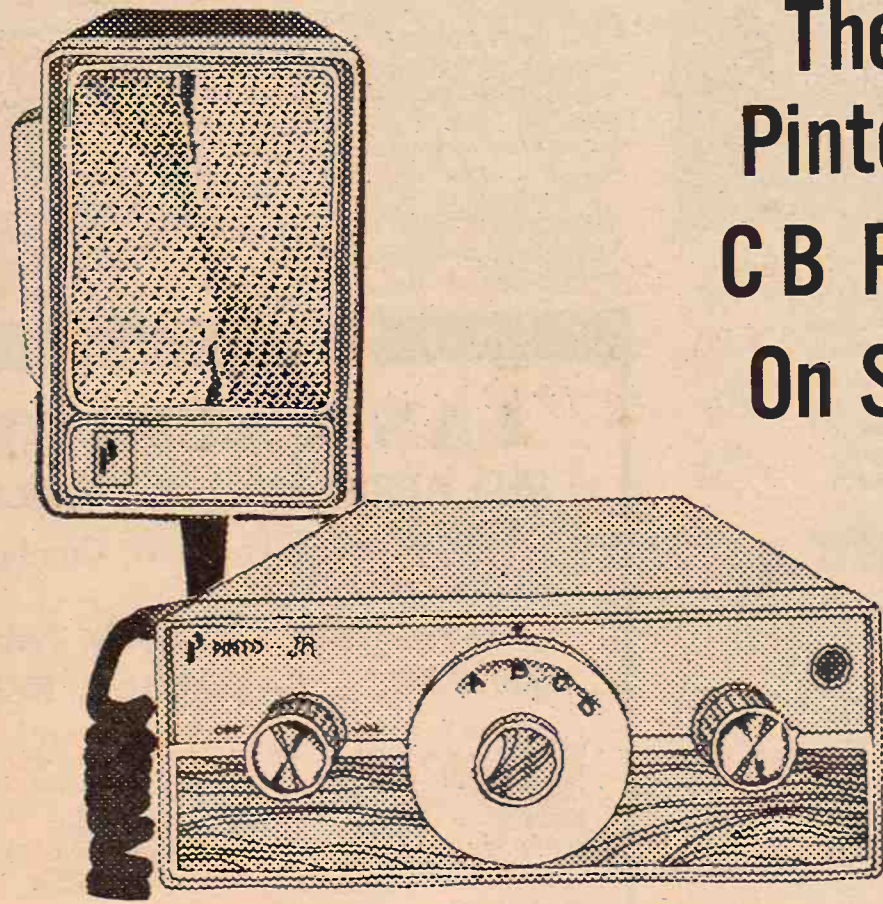

Cigaret Makers Must Show More Warnings

The Federal Trade Commission has accepted consent orders that will result in a health warning on every advertisement for cigarettes manufactured by six major companies.

The orders require manufacturers to print in all ads: "Warning: Quitting now greatly reduces serious risks to your health."

Newspapers, magazines and even billboards will come under the rule which the FTC says will be put in effect by summer, pending consideration of manufacturers' comments on the proposal.

The six companies agreeing to the rule account for 99 per cent of cigarette sales in the United States. They are American Brands, Inc., Brown and Williamson Tobacco Corp., Liggett and Myers, Inc., Lorillard, Philip Morris, Inc., and J. Reynolds Tobacco Co.

The warning must appear as a "clear and conspicuous disclosure" that is, in two lines parallel to the bottom of the ad, and enclosed in a black rectangle, the FTC said.

"These agreements resolve the last outstanding issue between the government and the tobacco industry in regard to cigarette advertisements," said Horace Kornegay, president of the Tobacco Institute.

An FTC spokesman disagreed. Robert Pitofsky, director of the Bureau of Consumer Protection, said some specific ads still will be supervised by the FTC.

In addition to newspapers, magazines and billboards, the rule will cover posters and cars in public transit vehicles, point-of-sale display materials, handbills and direct mail leaflets.

Radio and television cigarette advertising is prohibited by federal law.
