Meyers Herefords Gross \$82,010

EL DORADO — The George Meyers Hereford sale grossed \$82,010, with 253 lots selling.

Eighty-five buyers, including former Governor John Anderson, came from Kansas, Colorado, Missouri, Texas and Oklahoma to the ranch south of here.

Five top bulls sold for an av-

erage of \$1172 each. The average for all 59 bulls was \$505.

McLean Hereford Ranch, Springfield, Mo., got a little more than it bargained for — or a little sooner. Twenty minutes after the ranch paid a top price of \$7000 for a heifer, she gave birth to a heifer calf.

Own Herd Hub Of K-State's Beef Breeding Program

A hard look into the future leads Kansas State University animal scientists in a practical beef cattle breeding program. But it is coupled with sound judgment and a thorough knowledge of production performance.

That look into the future gives K-State a reputation of front-runner in breeding and selecting outstanding beef animals. The goal is to continually produce improved seed stock that will lead the way for better beef production.

At K-State, this focus of attention is on a 100-head herd of purebred beef cattle. And new at the helm of guiding the University's leadership in breeding and selecting registered animals for the herd is a native Kansan, Dr. Miles McKee, assistant professor of animal husbandry.

"To lead the way in the field, the University must have a foundation herd of good cattle," explains Dr. Don Good, head of the animal husbandry department at KSU. "K-State's herd of purebred beef cattle, including Hereford, Angus, and Shorthorn, provides some of the tools for giving the beef cattle industry a practical guide in modern beef production."

This demonstration herd has known premium leadership. Good has had charge of it since 1950, and a former manager is Dr. A. D. Weber, vice president

emeritus of KSU, and currently K-State's chief of party for the Agency for International Development-India project.

Work with this demonstration herd blends herd management with the opportunity to teach young men and women in the college of agriculture. Performance of the animals has been the strength of the breeding program. An early case study in production performance testing, this herd has 10 years of records.

The purebred herd is a teaching aid in herd management. "Breeders in Kansas have supported the program at K-State and are proud of the program being carried on," Good said. "Good livestock creates good interest in students, and we plan to be in a leadership role — not among the followers."

The herd includes about 40 Angus, 40 Herefords, and 15 Shorthorn. A self-sufficient enterprise for the University, proceeds from sale of purebred stock have purchased material for sheds and fencing for much of the paddock area surrounding the barn on campus.

Merchandising of the stock is accomplished through private treaty, herd sales, and national consignments. An international reputation of the herd has promoted sales that have sent animals to many parts of the world. Cattle have been shipped to many parts of the

United States, Canada, and South Africa.

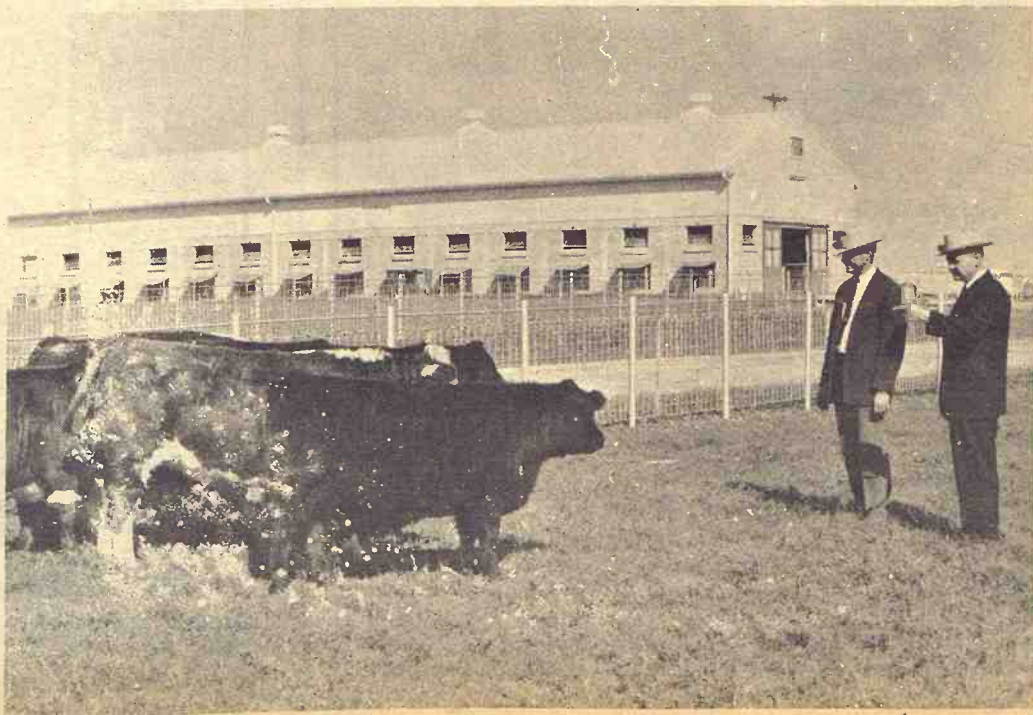
"The herd is not an experimental project, but a project for teaching livestock selection, breeding, and management," Good points out. It provides an important laboratory for about 370 students enrolled in the animal husbandry curriculum as well as other agricultural students.

County fair judges who annually train on the K-State campus work with animals from the purebred herd. Many 4-H and

FFA groups see demonstrations performed with these animals. Major breed national organizations have used the University herd to inform their breeders concerning changes in type and carcass evaluation.

Good established the early program of performance testing with the herd during his time as manager. He also expanded the size of the herd to its present size, the number they expect to maintain. "With this herd we have demonstrated that a small herd of well-developed and managed cattle can contribute to the industry with quality stock," he said.

McKee earned his B.S. and M.S. and from 1959 to 1966 was beef cattle herdsman at the University. During this

Governor, Livestock Association —

Both Sides Tiring Of Tiff?

The Kansas Livestock Assn. has rejected Gov. Robert Docking's request for another list of three nominees for state brand commissioner, the governor's office said last week.

The rejection came in a letter received from Earl Brookover of Garden City, president of the Kansas Livestock Assn.

The letter was addressed to Paul Pendergast, the governor's administrative assistant, and said the request was tabled pending submission of a new procedure for picking the brand commissioner to be introduced during the 1968 Legislature.

"After careful consideration regarding submitting additional names to the governor for selection of a brand commissioner, the matter was tabled and no action taken at present," Brookover's letter said.

"It was felt that since the board had previously approved an amendment to the state law changing procedures for selecting a brand commissioner, and since the Legislature will soon be in session, it would be better to wait until the Legislature takes action."

Pendergast said, however, the

governor's office is not aware of any such amendment on the brand commissioner.

Docking asked for a new list of nominees for brand commissioner in July, when the original list was rejected by the governor as "bogus."

Two of the three nominees were Republican county chairmen and the third nominee declined to accept appointment as brand commissioner when Docking offered it to him.

The rejection of Docking's latest request for more names keeps alive the feud between him and the cattlemen, but there were signs both sides are tiring of the battle.

The original cause of the dispute was the KLA's nomination of A. G. Pickett for re-appointment as Livestock Sanitary Commissioner. It was the only name submitted, and Docking rejected it.

Since then, the KLA has stood by Pickett as its sole choice.

The Livestock Assn. also has sent the governor a proposed amendment to the law which governs selection of the sanitary commissioner.

It proposes the sanitary commissioner be an employee of the

Kansas Livestock Commission (also dominated by the KLA) and that the governor's role in appointment of a sanitary commissioner be repealed.

Pendergast said the proposed amendment is unacceptable, but might be if the KLA would go along with a new law that would give the governor more freedom of choice in selection of the Livestock Commission.

The governor also has thrown out the KLA's list of nominees for appointment to the Livestock Commission on grounds they gave him one name for each of the vacancies.

An indication that Docking might be losing some fire for his dispute with the cattlemen is that he has not acted to name his own sanitary commissioner and take the cattlemen to court if they rejected his choice.

The governor did name Ralph Warren of Wichita as sanitary commissioner on Nov. 3, but Warren withdrew less than a week later.

Pendergast said the governor could appoint a qualified sanitary commissioner "today." But, Docking has made no apparent move to do so in the 37 days since Warren quit.

"Kansas State's students are at a premium because they have a solid foundation in the practical aspects of beef cattle production," McKee said. "To give the student a balance in training, he must become associated with this part of the animal science field."

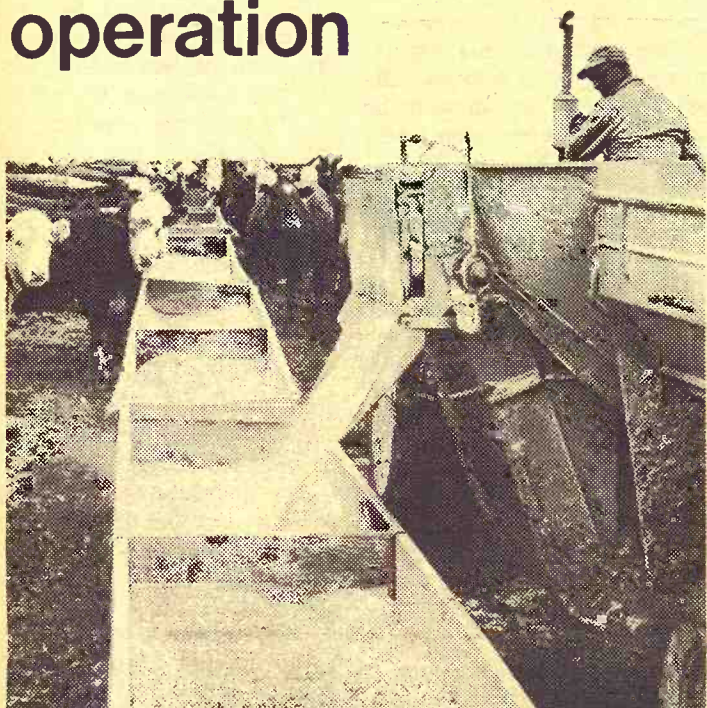

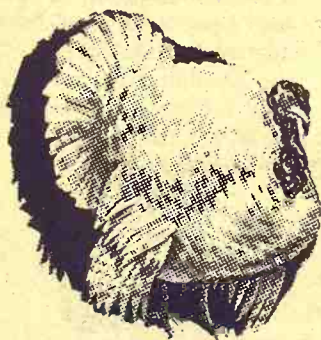

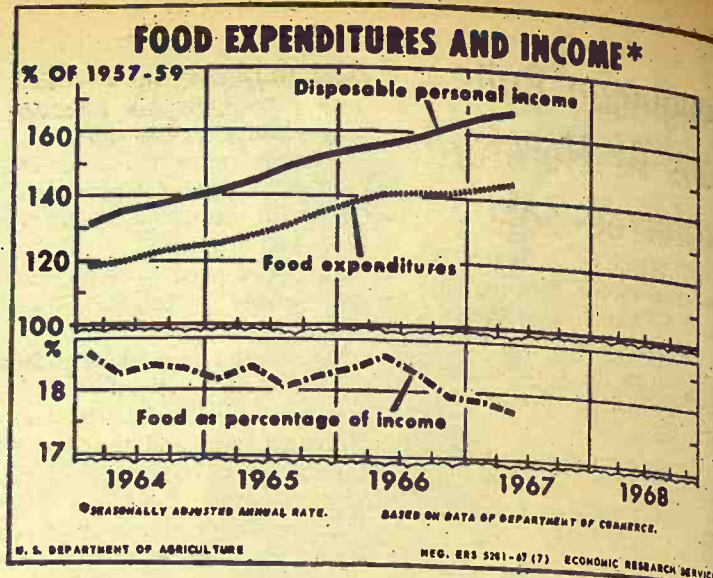

the last 20 years the hourly earnings of industrial workers have increased 123 per cent and corporate dividends are up 241 per cent," Poage told Texas Farm Bureau members. "During the same period, farm prices went down 9 per cent.

"Has any other segment of our society, except the agricultural service industries, suffered an actual net loss of income since 1947? I can't think of any one."

Poage is chairman of the House agriculture committee.

Cotton, for example, brought the farmer about 32 cents a pound in 1947, Poage said. Today, even with a government

subsidy, the farmer gets about 28 cents.

While income is up, production costs are up, Poage said. The per capita investment per worker averages around \$36,000, compared to \$21,000 a worker in manufacturing, he said.

"To use 1967 technology we must pay 1967 prices for our labor, our machinery, and our supplies. To pay 1967 prices we must get 1967 prices for what we grow. There is no other source from which these costs can be met," he said.

Urban Americans will be willing to pay higher prices if the farmer can get across this message, Poage said.

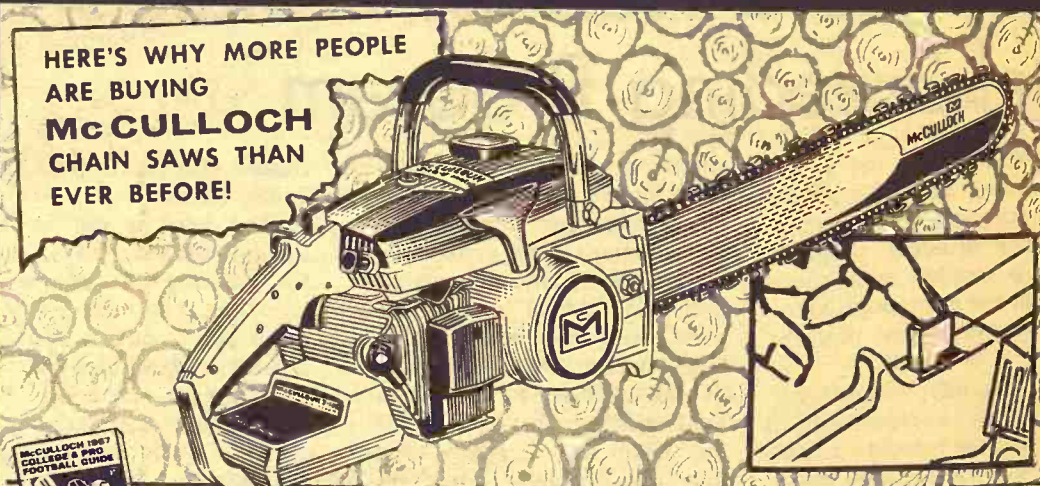

Baughman Bull Tops At Hereford Preferred Sale

HUTCHINSON — Golden Mischief 1, a spring yearling bull owned by Baughman Ranches, Inc., Russell, was judged grand champion in the Kansas Hereford Association Preferred Stock Show.

Reserve champion bull of the show was SHF True Onward 94th owned by Earl Sutor of Zurich.

In the female division grand championship went to Kansas

State University on Mischief Lass 1626. Only six females were entered in the show.

Placings were made by Daris Cummings of Cummings Cattle Co., Amherst, Colo., who judged the show.

Forty-two head — 36 bulls and six females — brought \$18,838 in the afternoon auction.

Top selling bull brought \$920. The sire, Real Regulator 26, was consigned by E. J. Long, Norcatur, and was purchased for the Fort Hays Experiment Station herd.

Second high animal was consigned by Rodney Arbuthnot of Haddam and purchased by Don-

ald Kraus, Hays, for \$850, giving both top selling sires to Ellis County herds.

The top 10 bulls in the sale averaged \$720 and the sale average on sires was \$488.

Booth Hereford Ranch of Lawrence bought the top heifer, Mischief Lass 1626, champion of the show and consigned by Kansas State University.

Record Level On Soybeans

U.S. soybean stocks should rise to a record level of "perhaps" 136 million bushels at the

start of the 1968-69 crop year next Sept. 1, the Agriculture Department projected.

The figure would compare with the 91 million bushel carryover on hand this past Sept. 1.

Soybean exports in the current 1967-68 year "may rise to around 280 to 300 million bushels" from 257 million bushels in the previous year, the department said. At the same time, domestic soybean crushings could reach a record 600 million bushels, up from the 1966-67 previous record of 551 million bushels, primarily reflecting strong demand for soybean meal.

The consumption gains, however, will be more than offset by this year's expanded soybean production, estimated at a record 985,184,000 bushels, as of Nov. 1, up from 931,491,000 bushels in 1966, the department said.

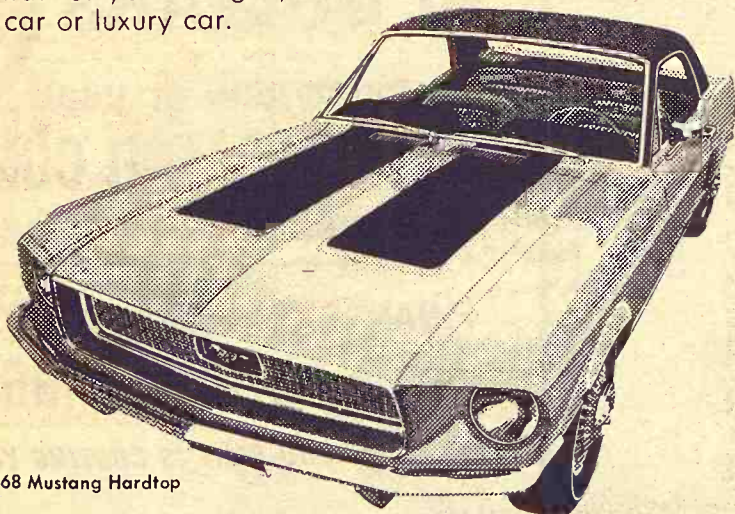

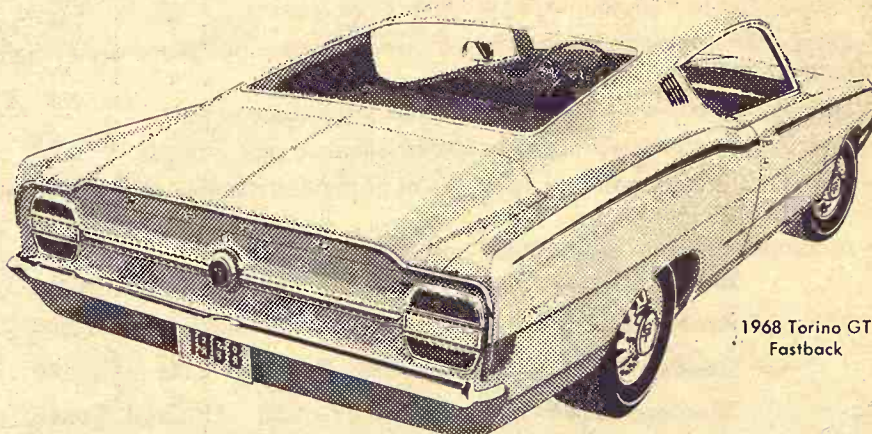

Why A Tax Hike?

Congress is considering a bill to increase our income taxes. Since most of us pay taxes, and all receive benefits from them, the bill is stirring up a lot of discussion.

Supporters of the bill claim that a tax increase is needed to restrain inflation. This is a worthy goal, since inflation is a legal method of robbery — taking from some to give to others. Inflation takes buying power from people who have savings accounts, life insurance, retirement credits, bonds, pensions, and relatively fixed incomes. It gives advantages to borrowers, and to those in a position to get big increases in wages or profits.

Most of us have sympathy for the poor family in debt. We would like to see them get their bills paid. But the poor family doesn't gain much from inflation; their debts are mostly short-term ones and they pay higher interest rates because of inflation.

Many relatively high-income people gain from inflation.

They live in expensive houses with big mortgages. They borrow heavily to swing "big deals." They can pay off in 10 or 20 years with cheaper dollars.

Inflation is known mostly by its consequences — rising prices for the products that we buy and the services that we need. Inflation can be defined as "an excess of demand over supply."

Demand is created by the desire and ability to buy. When demand exceeds the available supplies of products and services, prices are raised. Buyers bid against each other for supplies. Sellers, who must meet ever-increasing labor costs, naturally try to get as much as possible.

A nation has inflation when many of its people push too strongly for higher incomes — for more products and services than they are willing and able to produce. Inflation comes when the people and their government spend too much.

Some people favor a tax increase, which would take buying power away from the public. Others say that the Federal government should cut down on

its spending. Some want both; others want neither.

No one wants to take the blame for inflation. We want to put the blame on someone else: The President, Congress, big business, or big labor. But the President and the Congress respond to demands from the voters, and business and labor can do only what our government permits.

While many groups must share the responsibility for inflation, not all are equally guilty of getting and spending too much. Some must be bigger contributors to inflation than others. If we really want to control inflation, we should try to find out who is overspending, and take steps to stop it.

Is it farmers? Industrial workers? Teachers, college professors, or other public employees? Professional men, such as doctors and lawyers? Small business men? Corporation stock holders? Or Uncle Sam?

We have no formula for determining which groups in our economy are demanding, getting, and spending too much. But the transfer of our gold and money to other countries (our balance of payments problem) indicates that our costs of production and prices have become too high in relation to returns on investments. Farmers, we should note, work for profits — not wages.

Move On Milford Resort Project

A proposed resort development — called by some visionary, and by others unattainable — is going to get off the ground late this year, say its backers.

Bids will be opened December 30 for construction of marina facilities in the Curtis Creek area at Milford reservoir near Junction City.

L. W. Wisby, president of Thunderbird Resort Inc., said the work will include a floating snack bar and sales and service building, slips for boats, electrical work, fresh water facilities, and facilities for a swimming beach.

Construction would start February 15, with completion scheduled next spring.

Wisby said negotiations are underway for construction of

10 rental cottages on the west side of the marina.

A hotel and convention center will be started in the spring of 1968 and completed for the summer of 1969, Wisby said. He said original plans for a 100-room, 12-story structure have been revised to a 3-story hotel with a minimum of 120 rooms.

The convention center will seat 100 persons and have 10,000 square feet of space.

Wisby said his corporation has purchased 55 acres adjacent to its Laurel Heights subdivision for development of a shopping center.

Contest winner is Mrs. James Pettie, R 1, Gypsum:
BAKED APPLE CUTLETS

Combine:

- 1/4 cup sugar
- 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon

Prepare:

6 baking apples, pared and cored. Roll in cinnamon sugar. Place in buttered custard cups. Spoon remaining mixture into center of apples. Set aside. Sift together:

- 2/3 cup sifted flour
- 2/3 cup sugar
- 1/4 teaspoon baking powder
- 1/8 teaspoon salt

Combine:

- 1 slightly beaten egg
- 3 tablespoons melted butter
- 1 teaspoon vanilla

Add to dry ingredients; beat well. Place 2 tablespoons of batter over each apple. Bake in moderate oven (375 degrees) 40-45 minutes or until apples are tender. Serves six.

Make a syrup of:

- 1 cup sugar
 - 2 cups water
- Put the following ingredients

in a bag and boil in above syrup 10 minutes:

- 1 tablespoon of chopped whole ginger
- 2 allspice berries
- 6 whole cloves
- 2 sticks cinnamon

Remove spices and add:

- 1 1/2 cups orange juice
- 1 cup lemon juice
- 1 quart apple cider

Heat to boiling point and serve. Makes two and one-half quarts.

those extra special dinners that will be coming up. It is rich but oh, so delicious."

DATE NUT PUDDING

- 1 cup sugar
- 1 1/2 cups flour
- 3/4 teaspoon soda
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1 cup chopped nuts
- 1 cup chopped dates
- 3/4 cup milk
- 2 cups warm water
- 1 cup brown sugar
- 4 tablespoons oleo or butter

Place brown sugar, oleo and warm water in a 3 or 4-quart deep casserole. Heat until sugar and oleo are completely dissolved. Sift dry ingredients together and add milk. Mix well. Stir in nuts and dates and beat for one minute. Pour batter into liquid in casserole. Do not stir. Serve hot or cold with whipped cream. Serves eight.

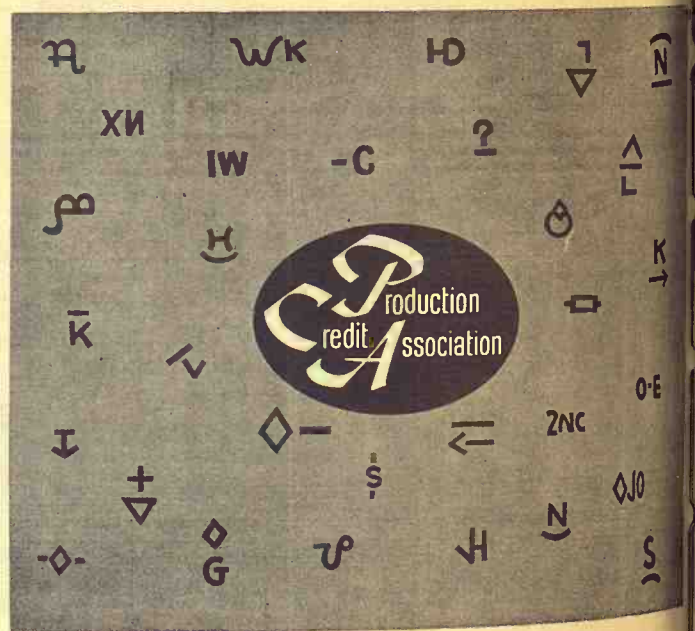

Use Of Wood Moulding Can Work Deocrative Wonders

The imaginative application of wood moulding can work decorative wonders in a room. For example, a cornice moulding installed around the room where walls and ceiling meet adds rich detail to flat uninteresting surfaces. The same is true of baseboard moulding which has the additional advantage of protecting the wall from everyday wear and tear. Moulding is often used at the top of wainscoting to give it a finished look.

Decorating with moulding is easy, even for a do-it-yourselfer. Stock molding is available in a wide variety of attractive styles from local lumber dealers. Moulding strips are simple cut to fit at the corners and nailed into place. They can be painted to match the wall, or stained or varnished to enhance the natural wood grain.

There are a number of unusual ways to use moulding. Moulding installed in a panel effect above the fireplace emphasizes that area as the focal point of the room. Windows and doors gain visual importance when framed with wide-face moulding. You can even use strips of moulding on plain furniture, such as chests and bookcases, to give it a new look.

Moulding can also be used to correct a room's architectural flaws. A long, narrow hall appears wider if you "break up" one wall into two panels with vertical moulding and paint the panels different colors. Leave the opposite wall unpan-

eled and paint it one color. Or, de-emphasize a too-high ceiling by installing horizontal moulding on the walls two or three feet above the floor. Then use contrasting paint or paper below the moulding to give a wainscot effect.

Louver folding doors are ideal for closets where floor maintenance is a problem. They are decorative and provide air circulation to keep clothing fresh.

Still To Be Family Farms, Says Frisbie

WICHITA — Agriculture still has some severe adjustments ahead of it, just as it has had in the past, Ray E. Frisbie, president of the Kansas Farm Bureau, said in his address at the annual meeting.

The adjustments are coming, he said, despite outside influences, such as government farm programs. Farmers are becoming fewer and farm units larger.

"But I am sure they still will continue to be operated as family units," Frisbie asserted. He added, however, that the definition of what is a family farm is changing.

"If there had been a proper definition of a family farm 10 years ago, it certainly wouldn't fit a few years from now.

"These larger units, Frisbie continued, will be able to compete and more than likely will be held by several members of a family through a corporate setup or something similar."

Having mentioned a corporate setup, Frisbie noted that there had been much discussion recently about corporation farming and he suggested that it appeared this discussion had at times been more emotional than factual.

While not speaking definitely for or against corporation farming, he said he was sure every Farm Bureau member wants to protect a system of farming wherein a large percentage of the units would be under family ownership and management.

The Farm Bureau president took note of the fact that farm prices are at 73 per cent of parity, one of the lowest ratios of all time. He said that food prices were rising despite low prices to farmers.

The Agricultural act of 1965

gives the Department of Agriculture some "pretty awesome powers over agricultural markets," he observed, and added that "it is generally agreed the philosophy of the department has been cheap food for the consumer."

Low farm prices and high costs have led to all the talk about bargaining power for farmers in the market place, Frisbie said.

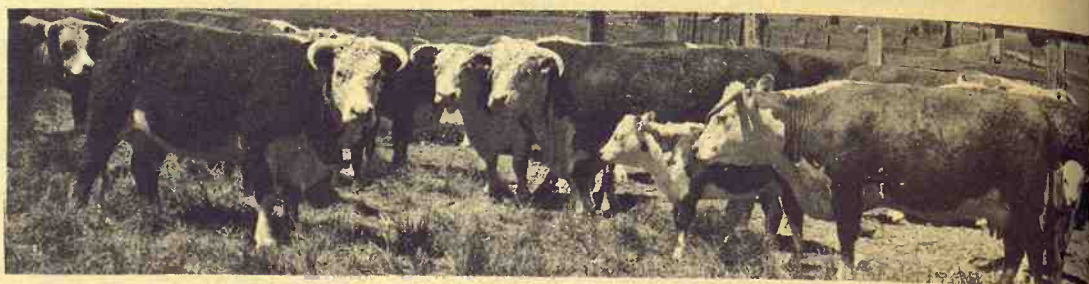

Farmer Ire Grows Vs. Careless Hunters

ABILENE — The head of the Kansas Farmers Union has threatened to call for the closing of at least 7 million acres of farm land to hunters unless the hunters stop destroying farm property.

Henry Veltman issued the ultimatum in an open letter to the Kansas Forestry, Fish and Game Commission.

Veltman warned hunters that "if any more of our farmers are assaulted or beaten up by hunters, we will call upon the National Farmers Union members in every section of the state to close their lands for hunting."

Such a move would close approximately 7 million acres of

farm land from hunters, he said.

The letter grew from increasing farmer resentment to hunters flagrantly disregarding farm property, Veltman said.

The beating of a 69-year old Viola farmer by four or five men last week added fuel to the flames. According to the man, Fred D. Weidman, he asked the men to stop hunting near his property.

Weidman said a small man threatened to work him over after he asked the men to quit shooting. He said he tried to make a U-turn and leave, but the men wouldn't let him.

He started to leave when the men grabbed hold of the back of his car. His car then skidded and hit the hunters' auto.

One of the men forced Weidman's car door open and whipped the farmer with the butt of his shotgun. Some arrests were made Friday.

The Kansas National Farmers Union publicity director John

Harvey said his office has been flooded all season with complaints.

Claiming farmers are "fed up" with the present situation, Veltman wrote hunters have "damaged our fences, killed our livestock and destroyed our pets."

"For some reason this fall hunters have been more inconsiderate than anytime in the past number of years," Veltman continued.

He said his group has thousands of "no hunting" signs available for distribution. He went on to say he hopes they won't have to be used, but he stressed farmers may have to post their land if hunters don't get "some horse sense."

an immediate meeting with the Forestry, Fish and Game Commission to discuss the problem.

One solution may be a bond on hunters, Veltman said. A bonding company would pay a farmer for any livestock killed by a hunter under the plan.

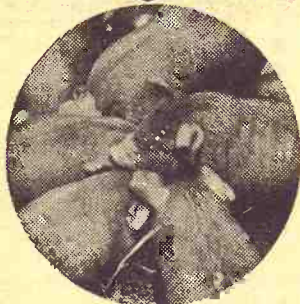

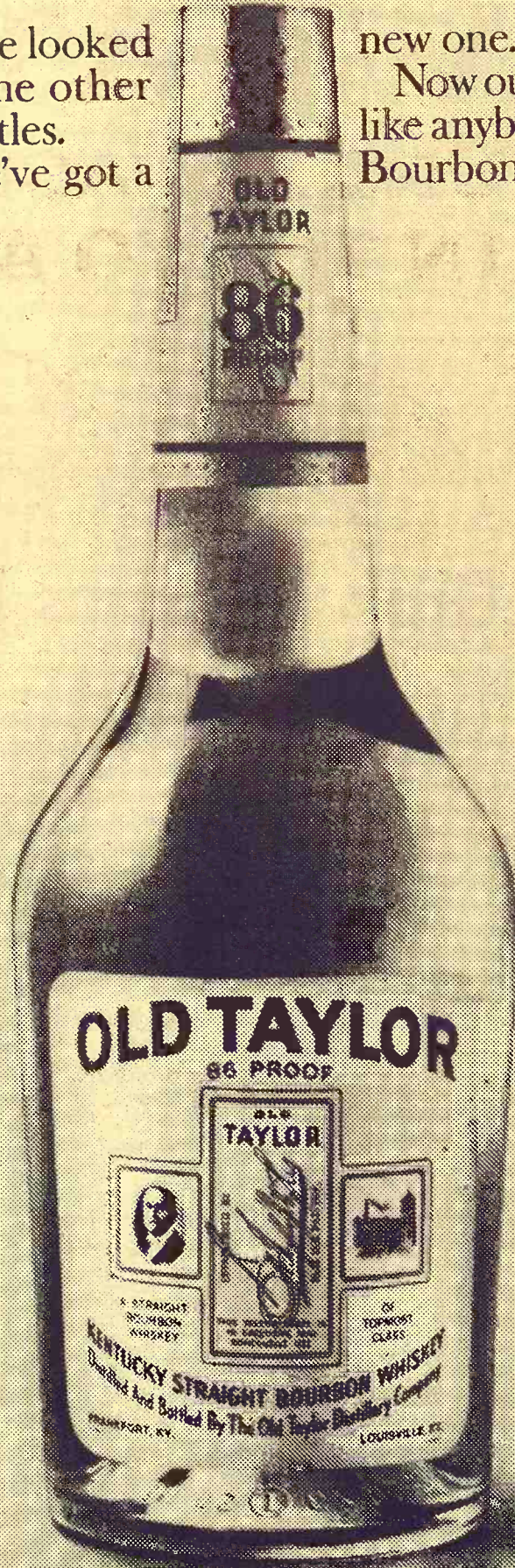

junctions, reparations, pre-
merger notice, jurisdiction and
chain stores — the change at-
tracting most attention is one
aimed at packers.
The department's jurisdiction
requires packers to maintain
records similar to commission
men and dealers is not clear,
and Acting Secretary of Agri-
culture John Schnittker said
that USDA feels that producers
are not being adequately pro-
tected.
USDA studies show that about
10% of the nation's packers
slaughtering livestock
have current liabilities in excess
of their current assets.
"From November 1965 to No-
vember 1966, the department
has information that 10 packers
went out of business owing
about \$3.25 million for livestock
Schnittker said, adding that
the proposed revisions would
strengthen the basic intent of
the P&S Act to provide financial
protection to producers.
"When the P&S Act became
law, direct sale of livestock to
packing firms was very small —
chain stores were just begin-
ning — and the sale of livestock
on a carcass grade and yield
basis was still in the dream
stage," Schnittker said.
"Now, about half the nation's
slaughter livestock is being sold
directly to packers — chain
stores handle the bulk of the na-
tion's meat — and grade and
yield livestock sales have be-
come a part of our operating
language."
One of the more important
provisions of the proposed bill
would give federal courts au-
thority to issue temporary or
permanent injunctions against
persons subject to the Act who
operate in a manner which
would reasonably be expected
to result in damages to another
person.
Present procedure allows
P&S officials to file an admini-
strative disciplinary action
against such persons. However,
these can take one or more
years to complete, with addi-
tional time spent in appeals to
higher courts.
"During all these years of liti-
gation, the respondent is free
to continue a practice which
may be causing irreparable
damage to countless numbers of
producers," Schnittker said.
He added that the section on
reparations would "put teeth"
into present provisions which
authorize money judgments to
producers who prove unfair
treatment by stockyards, com-

mission men, or dealers, and would make packers also sub-
ject to reparation actions.

Under present conditions, a
producer has to instigate court
action if the respondent refuses
to comply with P&S reparation
findings. Since many such cases
involve small sums of money,
farmers are reluctant to seek
legal relief. Thus, about 90% of
the money involved in repara-
tion actions is not paid.

"A meaningful administra-
tive remedy is necessary to give
adequate relief in such cases,"
Schnittker said.

The proposed bill would also
make it clear that the Secretary
of Agriculture has jurisdiction
over chain stores in their pur-
chases of meat and poultry,
and over integrated poultry op-
erations.

The section dealing with pre-
merger notice is designed to
provide needed study time for
proposed business mergers.

Any packer planning to merge
with another packer would be
required to give 90 days ad-
vance notice to the secretary.
This would permit a reasonable
investigation to determine whe-
ther the merger would signifi-
cantly lessen competition.

Schnittker said that the pro-
posed revisions will further en-
able USDA to investigate mar-
keting relationships and prac-
tices which restrict competition
for livestock, poultry and meat.

He said that the suggested re-
visions to the Act will enable
USDA to adequately meet chang-
ing marketing conditions, and
to carry out the basic philoso-
phy of maintaining a free com-

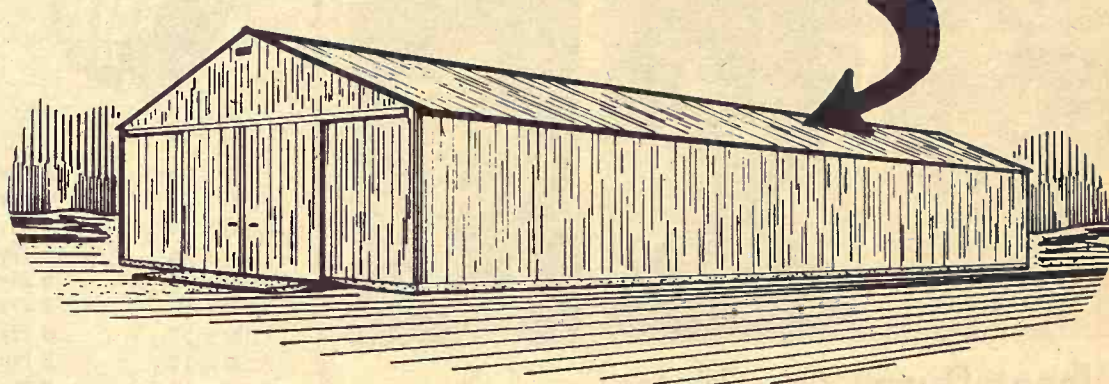
petitive marketing system for
both producers and consumers.

"The interest of our free en-
terprise system requires a mar-
ket place where producer and
buyer can meet on equal terms,"

Schnittker said. "These propos-
ed revisions will help clarify
and strengthen provisions pro-
viding greater protection for
livestock and poultry produ-
cers."

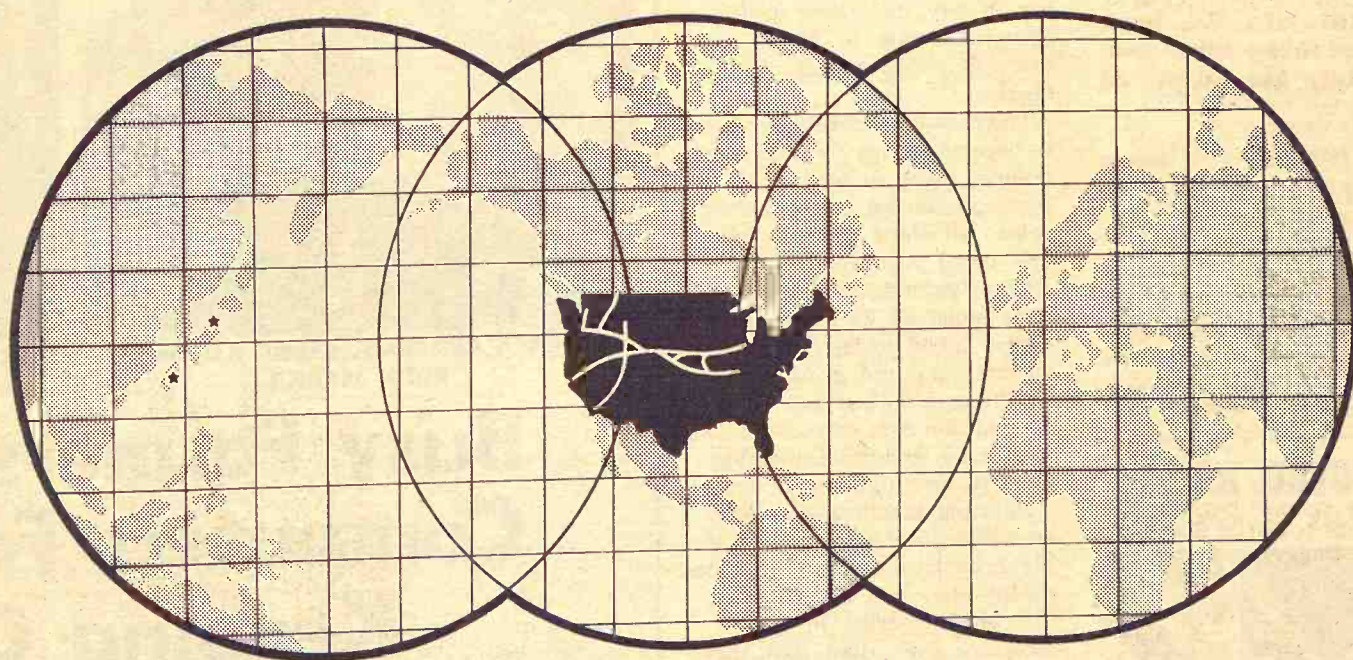

High Moisture Corn A Problem

"High moisture corn has become a real problem for farmers, elevators and processors alike," according to Jim Petr, Marketing Division director for the Kansas State Board of Agriculture, Topeka. "It costs eleva-

tors and processors more money to handle and process wet corn, and farmers receive a discounted rate for corn with excess moisture levels," Petr said.

Contributing factors include bigger corn crops coupled with increased use of the picker-sheller. When corn is field-shelled, it gets to market earlier, leaving less time for natural drying.

At the same time, some farmers have been reluctant or unable to expand their own storage facilities to handle shelled corn. They are even less willing to buy their own drying equipment due to higher unit costs of small drying operations.

The country elevator has had to become a corn treating-conditioning center as well as an unloading - storing - loading out point. All signs suggest that this trend will continue.

Corn refining officials say high moisture corn results in higher labor costs, reduced unloadings, reduced grind per day, rejection and then sale of out-of-condition cars because of contamination and mold, inability to store, and higher corn costs.

Refining facilities, they say, are inadequate to cope with the higher-moisture corn, and of necessity they will be forced to use properly-dried or lower-moisture corn than that they attempted to use from the past harvest.

Number two grade corn containing 15.5 percent moisture is normally the basis for setting

corn prices. Higher moisture corn is usually discounted, the amount of discount depending on the degree of moisture.

"If farmers wish to avoid the discount, they will have to do one of three things: 'Have their corn dried and stored commercially; dry and store it themselves; or leave it in the field — at the risk of greater losses — until natural drying has reduced

moisture to a proper level for harvest," Petr said.

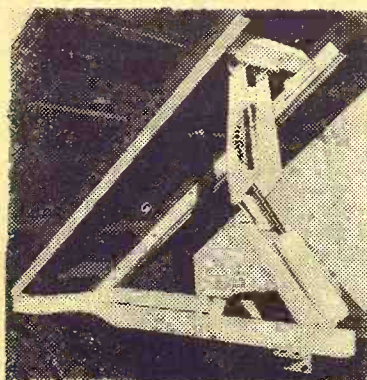

Farmers Need 'Bargaining Power'

— Freeman Tells National Grange

SYRACUSE, N.Y. — Secretary Orville L. Freeman said last week the time has come for

farmers to organize to demand and negotiate better returns for their products.

Freeman said many of the conditions which once made group action by farmers difficult have changed.

"There is a timeliness in the issue which has never before been present," Freeman said in a talk prepared for a convention of the National Grange, the oldest of the general farm organizations.

"More farmers now see more clearly what their lack in market power is doing for them. They see that in an economy marked by increasing organization of labor, of business, of teachers, they are the least effectively organized of all."

The cabinet officer said he did not mean to imply that it would be easy to achieve a goal of organized agriculture.

"But we are in dead earnest about helping the American farmer explore the possibilities of developing machinery that will give him power proportionate to that of the forces he must deal with in today's marketplace," Freeman said.

FREDONIA — A Charolais belonging to K-1 Ranch of Garden Plaine averaged 4.6 pounds a day of gain to lead the 37 bulls which completed the recent 112-day test at the Fredonia Bull Test lot.

The animal — a March 1966 calf — weighed 875 pounds when the test started and weighed 1390 when the test ended October 19.

Its weight-per-day-of-age of 2.36 pounds, however, was outranked by several bulls in the test lot. Tops in this category was a Hereford of Richard Stryker of Fredonia which weighed 2.86 pounds per day of age. Stryker's bull averaged 3.39 pounds per day gain while on the test.

An Angus — owned by Henry Ericson of Ft. Scott — had the second high average daily gain on test, at 3.80 pounds. The Angus bull — a June 1966 calf — came in at 705 and weighed 1130 pounds 112 days later.

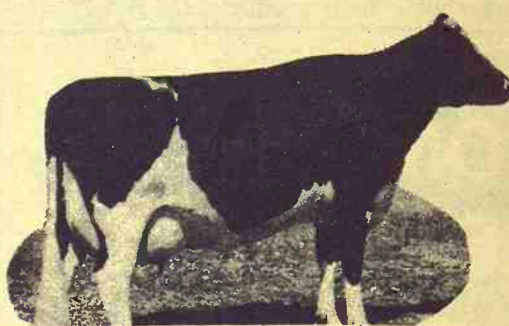

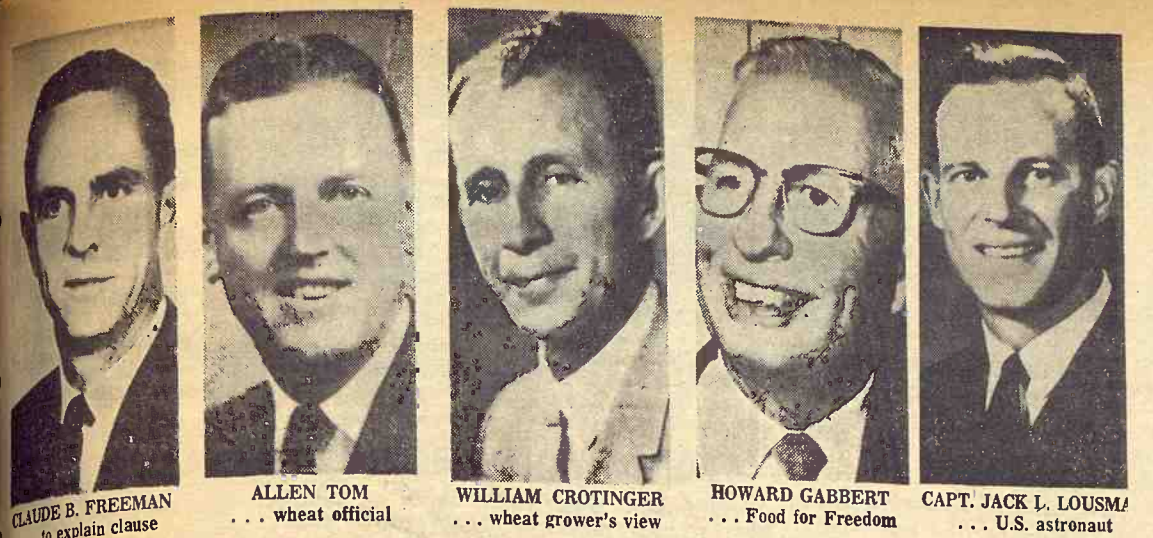

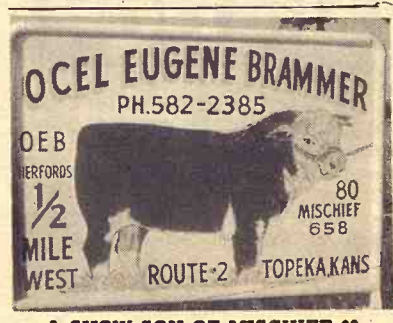
Move To Lift FLBA Ceiling On Interest Rate

Highway Patrol Gets New Headgear

Col. R. N. Woodson, chief of the Kansas highway patrol, said he thinks most troopers are anxious to don their new campaign-style hats.

Woodson was asked about a

report that some troopers don't want to change from the billed cap they now wear.

"Why, I haven't heard any think like that," Woodson said.

"In fact, all I've heard are

troopers wanting to know when they are going to get their new hats."

Each of the 270 troopers will be provided with two of the blue, dented crown hats with a double thick, 3-inch brim. The change is costing \$8,100.

"This was an item budgeted before I got here," Woodson said. "Of course, I had the authority to decide whether to get them."

"I've been very careful, listening, talking to find out what they wanted. I think that about 90 per cent of the troopers are in favor of them."

Woodson said that when the highway patrol was considering a change, officers at the headquarters were asked to pick out the ones they liked best. He said five men picked the hat the troopers will be wearing and two picked another one.

"If I thought it were going upset our troops, I wouldn't approve it," Woodson said. "Morale is too important for that. It wouldn't be worth the trouble if only 50 per cent liked it."

Milk Handlers Win At Inspection Cost

A large number of persons from the milk industry in Kansas appeared at a budget hearing last week to express concern over proposed financing of a new statewide milk inspection system.

The 1967 legislature enacted

the new milk inspection plan to eliminate duplicating and costly inspections.

The cost of the first year of operating the new system is estimated at \$351,285.

An advisory committee recommended the cost be financed mostly from fees, with \$75,000 coming from the state general fund.

Representatives of the milk industry indicated they feel the proposed division of the cost would place too large a burden

on their industry and urged that more of the cost be paid from the state general fund.

The milk inspection item was the major item discussed in a budget hearing for the State Board of Agriculture. The board requested a budget of \$1.92 million. The request was cut to \$1.49 million by the Budget Division, largely by cutting the milk inspection program in order to have a review of the proposed financing at the budget hearing.
