# Corps Explains Revised Plans For Grove Reservoir

TOPEKA — The Army engineers have recommended a new site for the proposed Grove reservoir which would nearly double the flood storage and provide 23.5 million gallons of water supply daily for Topeka, Col. William G. Kratz, Kansas City district engineer, said last week.

downstream from the Delia site proposed in the corps' re-study of its Kaw basin plan after the 1951 flood. It would be three miles east and two north of Silver Lake, at the confluence of Soldier and Little Soldier creeks, and less than 10 miles northwest of Topeka.

Kratz told a public meeting at Seaman high school that the enlarged Grove project would drain 259 square miles instead of 142, with an improved ratio of benefits over costs of \$1.40 to \$1. It would have a conservation lake of 6,900 acres, with recreation potential, and 189,000 acre-feet of flood storage.

The estimated cost of 35 million dollars would include 5 million to be repaid eventually by local interests for water supply. The Kansas Water Resources board has endorsed the new site and Topeka has affirmed its desire for the water supply storage, Kratz said.

Recognizing opposition to the project by some landowners, the district engineer said:

"There is no question but what the relocation of persons often involves heartaches, the loss of sentimental values and intangible benefits in the economic analysis of the project. We at the corps, however, do all in our power to mitigate these adverse effects."

Government land acquisition policies, including payment of moving costs, will be fully explained at a later meeting.

Kratz reminded the meeting that some federal land above normal pool within the reservoir can be leased back to former local government's 75 per cent owners for farming with the share of lease returns often exceeding previous tax yields.

About 200 persons attended the hearing. Most of them are residents in the proposed reservoir area and are probably opposed to the project in principal but curious about the government's plans.

Several indicated they were satisfied with the announcement that land acquisition likely would start in 1970, with the

date having a bearing on whether landowners should continue plans to improve their properties or start looking for relocation sites.

Speaking in opposition to the project in its new location was Gerald Tibbs, Topeka, one of the larger landowners in the area. He said it would take a large amount of class one and class two valley land out of production, with the acreage considered some of the best land in Kansas.

He said about 80 families would be affected by the relocation, but that the loss would be felt by a large number of persons in the Silver Lake school district west of Topeka. With the crop land being taken out of production, he said the tax burden would be shifted to the remaining property owners in the district.

Tibbs said the former location five miles upstream on Soldier creek would be adequate for any additional flood protection needed in the Kaw river valley.

He said the new Grove reservoir location would supply only about half of the future water needs of Topeka, and that twice as much water would be available for the city by piping it from the Perry reservoir, now near completion northeast of Topeka.

The Tuttle creek and Milford reservoirs upstream on the Kaw also are supplying necessary flood protection and water reserves needed for the Kansas river, he added.

## HERINGTON CLOSES ITS MOVIE HOUSE

## A Big Corn Carryover

The government forecasts a heavy carryover of around 1,100,000,000 to 1,200,000,000 billion bushels of corn next October 1 despite increased domestic use and exports before this year's crop is harvested.

This would compare to stocks of 823 million bushels at the end of last summer and indicates to the Agriculture department the probability of lower average prices for the next few months of 1968.

Although corn consumption

has been slightly above last year it failed to offset reduced use of other feed grains. With the indicated slowdown of domestic use total carryover of all feed grains before the next harvest is estimated at 47 million tons, an increase of about 10 million tons over stocks at the start of this year.

Feed grain exports for the crop year are put at 23 million tons, about 5 per cent more than they were a year earlier, with corn accounting for all and more of the rise. Corn exports are expected to total 625 million bushels, a rise of 28 per cent.

But sorghum grain shipments abroad of only 160 million bushels would be about one-third less than last year's.

Total use of sorghum grains is now expected to drop about 15 per cent below last year, resulting in an October 1 carryover of more than the 244 million bushels a year earlier.

Oat consumption may be from 6 to 8 per cent less than last year, but the July 1 carryover may show little change from last year. Barley use and carryover are unlikely to show a substantial change from year-earlier levels.

Price levels and uncertainties have prompted farmers to place over 15 million tons of feed grain under loan so far this season. This is nearly double

the loan volume of last year. But with corn prices rising and holding near the loan rate since February, the pace of loan placing has slackened.

## \$197,000 For Marshall Co. Land

MARYSVILLE — A thousand acres of Marshall county land came close to bringing an average \$200 per acre at auction last week.

The land belonging to the Mrs. Charlotte Harry Estate brought \$197,000, selling in four tracts. The auctioneer was Don Roche of Blue Rapids.

The top price was \$275 an acre for a quarter-section upland farm northeast of Home City. Byron Wankler, a farmer of adjoining land, paid \$44,000 for the 160 acres.

Another quarter, near Marysville, brought slightly over \$220 an acre, grossing \$35,500. The buyer was Paul William Blumer, also a neighboring farmer.

The largest tract in the auction was 400 acres north of Home City, about two-thirds of it in cropland, which brought \$75,000 — about \$183 an acre — from Don Newton of Marysville, a landowner in Marshall county.

The other tract, of 280 acres of which 145 acres was cropland, brought slightly over \$150 an acre from Hubert Kroeger of Marysville. The total price on it was \$42,500.

# What's Ahead For Farm Youth?

A few years ago, research studies showed that for each 10 farm boys reaching age 20, there would be only one good opportunity to go into farming and make a good living. At the same time, some farmers were saying that good farmland would be left idle, because not enough boys were going into farming.

We have seen a lot of young men leave the farm in order to earn a living. Some older farmers also have left to take places in business and industry. A few young men have started farming, and some are doing quite well.

There are many empty feedlots, barns, and hog and poultry houses on farms today, though the total livestock industry is larger than ever before. But there is no good idle land — except that being kept out of production by Uncle Sam.

So, what's ahead now? For farm youth? For Agriculture? The best answers to these questions are obtained by carefully observing what's happening today.

**Animal Agriculture.** To a large extent, poultry and egg production are no longer a part of the ordinary farm; these have become large-scale, semi-industrial enterprises. The men who feed the birds and gather the

eggs often work for wages, a commission, or some other arrangement with a business firm.

Cattle feeding is also concentrated in fewer and larger units. It is disappearing as a sideline enterprise on Corn Belt farms, becoming concentrated in a relatively few large-scale businesses. Dairying, too, is slowly but surely becoming a big-scale industry.

The hog industry is also concentrating on fewer and larger production units. Although health and sanitation problems are slowing down this trend, they will not stop it.

The beef cow-calf business still remains widely scattered, using grass and other roughage. But some ranches have been big business since the pioneer days, and others are combining to become larger.

**Grain Farming.** Crop production is a different story. Farmland area is pretty well fixed. You can't "build" a 1000- or 10,000-acre farm, in the sense of

creating a new "facility." It is difficult to buy or rent land in large blocks. Even so, many Corn Belt farmers now operate 500 and more acres, mostly with little or no hired labor. There will be fewer and larger grain farms next year — even fewer 10 years from now.

**Farm Youth.** We believe that there will be good opportunities in farming — for top thinkers and hard workers. But most of the farm teenagers of today will be working and living in the suburbs in 1978.

They can get fair to good jobs with a high school education. But most of the best jobs will require graduation from college; many, advanced degrees as well.

Average starting salaries for university agricultural graduates in 1967 were over \$7000. Those with one more year (MS degrees) averaged over \$9000. With two additional years training (Ph.D. degrees) the average starting salaries were over

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\$11,000. Graduates from other colleges — engineering, business, etc. — have done just as well or better.

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## Pearson Still Plugs For Rural Job Bill

STILLWATER, Okla. — Sen. James B. Pearson has renewed his call for congressional approval of his Rural Job Development Act.

Speaking before a National Manpower Conference at Oklahoma State University on the problems of the rural to urban population shift, Sen. Pearson said that enactment of the Rural Job Development Act would represent a good, solid beginning in the effort to revitalize rural America.

The Rural Job Development Act introduced by Sen. Pearson and co-sponsored by Sen. Fred Harris of Oklahoma and 31 other Senators would seek to attract new job-creating industries to rural areas through a series of tax incentives to encourage private investment in rural plants.

## Danger From Polaroid Sheet

The popular use of polaroid cameras has provided a new hazard on livestock farms. The tear-off negative sheets, which have no permanent value to the photographer, are often discarded where animals can get them. The chemicals on the negative film are poison and can cause the death of animals which eat them.

The Kansas Senator noted that Oklahoma State University Conference was "Symbolic of a new national attitude toward the decade — old rural to urban migration." He said, "Up to about two years ago most discussions of the rural to urban population shift emphasized the benefits of the migration and how it could be speeded up."

Pearson attributed this change in attitude toward the rural exodus in part to the growing crisis of the cities. "We now realize that this great migration has created enormous problems and liabilities both for the cities which are already overcrowded and overburdened and for rural areas, many of which have seen so many of their people, talent and resources migrate to the urban areas that they may no longer survive as viable communities."

Pearson said that it would be necessary to create at least 500,000 new rural jobs each year if the present out-migration is to be stemmed. He also pointed to the following general needs:

"Higher farm prices and steps to better assure the preservation of the family farm system of agriculture.

"Improvements in rural education, health and housing.

"Improvements in public services such as water, sewage facilities and transportation.

"More equitable geographic distribution of federal research and development funds."

Pearson concluded by saying "The revitalization of rural America will not only benefit

those who prefer to upgrade their living standards without migrating to the cities but will benefit the nation as a whole in the most meaningful sense of the word. The present trends which continue to result in

mounting urban congestion, rising urban costs and a widening gap between urban aspiration and urban achievement can and must be altered through an aggressive program of rural revitalization."

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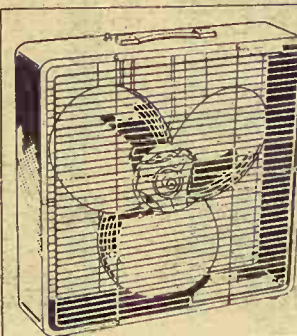
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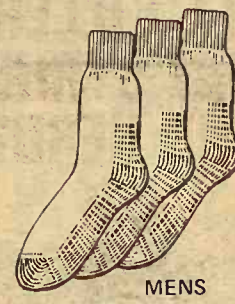


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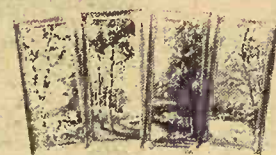
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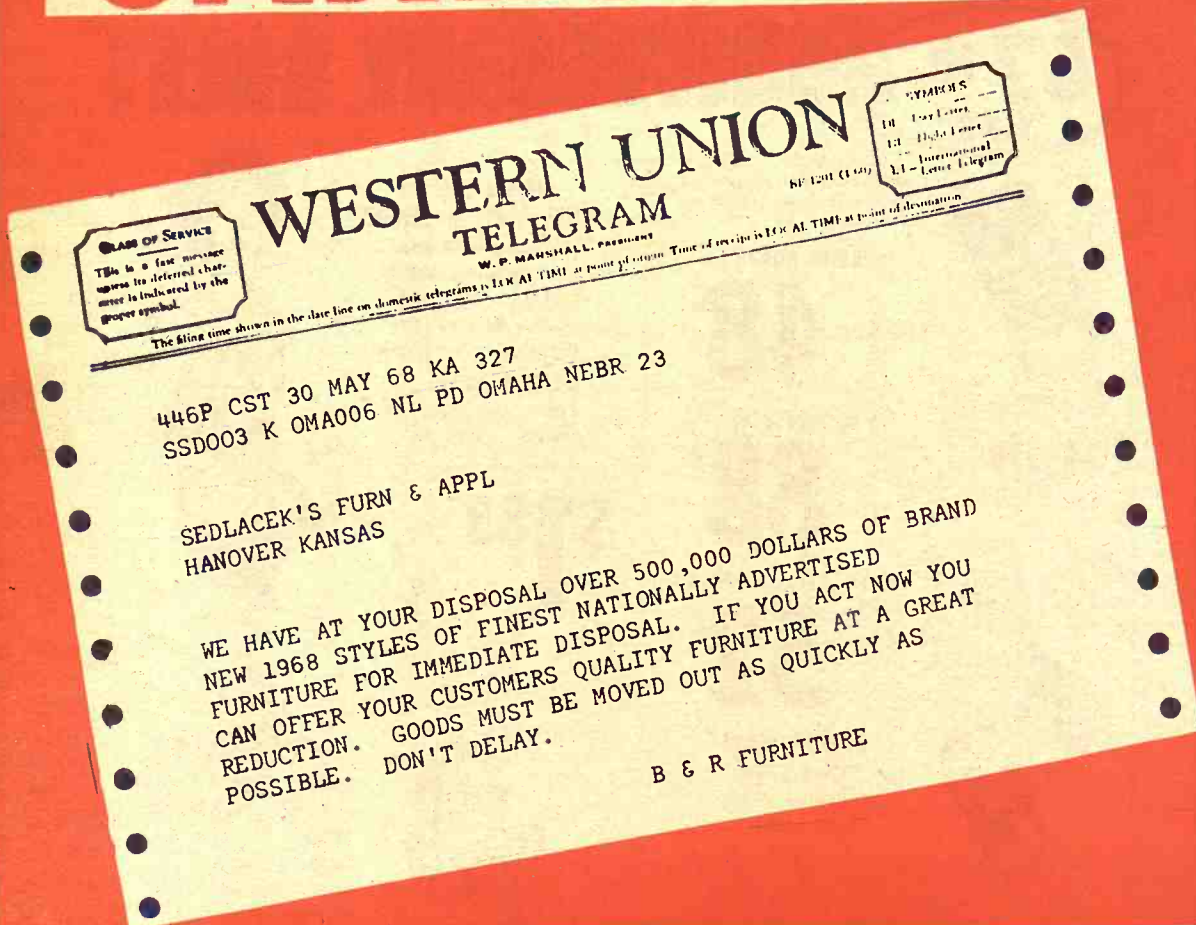
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## OUR DAILY BREAD

- by G&G Area Cooks

### Mrs. Mamie Stubble, Minneapolis, Wins Prize

#### SOUR CREAM BUNS

Dissolve 1 package yeast in  $\frac{1}{4}$  cup warm water. Heat 1 cup sour cream to lukewarm in a large saucepan. Remove from the heat. Add:

- 2 tablespoons shortening
- 3 tablespoons sugar
- $\frac{1}{4}$  teaspoon soda
- 1 teaspoon salt

Stir until well blended, then add:

- 1 large unbeaten egg and the dissolved yeast

Mix in:

- 3 cups sifted flour

Turn out onto a lightly floured board and knead gently to form a smooth ball. Cover with a damp cloth and let stand 5 minutes to give it time to absorb some of the moisture. Roll dough  $\frac{1}{4}$  inch thick into a rectangle. Spread with 2 tablespoons soft butter. Combine:

- $\frac{1}{2}$  cup brown sugar
- 1 teaspoon cinnamon

Sprinkle this mixture over the top. Roll as for a jelly roll, beginning at the wide side. Roll. Slice into  $1\frac{1}{2}$ -inch thick slices and place in greased muffin cups. Cover with a damp cloth and let rise about one hour. Bake 12 to 15 minutes at 375 degrees. Ice while warm. Or postpone the icing, let cool quickly, package for freezing, and freeze for not over two to three weeks. When ready to use, take from freezer and heat for 30 minutes at 325-350 degrees F. Ice while warm.

#### BAKED RHUBARB

- 3 cups cubed bread (no end crust)
  - 3 cups rhubarb, cut into short pieces
  - 1 cup sugar
  - $\frac{1}{4}$  stick butter, melted
- Add melted butter to bread cubes. Mix. Add sugar to rhubarb and mix. Mix all together; put into an oblong pan. Add 1 tablespoon water in each corner. Bake 45 minutes at 325 degrees. Serve hot.

The following recipe is from Mrs. Art Schlehuber, Marion:

#### CHOCOLATE PIE

Crust:

- Beat 2 egg whites, a little salt to taste and  $\frac{1}{4}$  teaspoon cream of tartar; beat and gradually fold in  $\frac{1}{2}$  cup sugar. Fold in  $\frac{1}{2}$  cup pecans. Pile into an 8-inch pan and bake 50-55 minutes in 325-degree oven. Cool.

Melt  $\frac{1}{4}$  pound German sweet chocolate in 3 tablespoons water in top of double boiler. Cool. Add 1 teaspoon vanilla. Fold in 1 cup cream, whipped. Pile into cooled shell. Serve.

Mrs. Albert H. Schild, Herington: "Now that strawberries are in season, I'd like to share this dessert which my family thought was 'special' at our Mother's Day dinner."

#### FRESH STRAWBERRY SQUARES

- 2 cups sifted flour
  - $\frac{1}{2}$  cup brown sugar
  - $\frac{1}{2}$  cup walnuts
  - $\frac{1}{2}$  cup melted margarine
- Stir together. Spread two-thirds of these crumbs in a shallow baking dish (10x6-inch) and bake in 350-degree oven for 20 minutes. Cool. Combine: 2 egg whites, beaten stiff, fold in 1 cup sugar, 2 cups sliced strawberries, 2 tablespoons lemon juice. Fold in 1 cup whipped cream ((Dream Whip may be substituted). Spoon over the crumbs. Cover with the remaining crumbs. Freeze about six hours. Cut into squares; top with whole berries and serve.

#### SENSATIONAL SLAW

- 3 cups finely shredded cabbage
- $\frac{3}{4}$  cup chopped green onions
- $\frac{3}{4}$  cup chopped pimiento
- 1 cup well-drained pineapple chunks
- $\frac{3}{4}$  cup sliced olives (stuffed)
- 1 cup shredded American cheese

$\frac{1}{4}$  cup whipping cream  
 $\frac{1}{2}$  cup mayonnaise  
1 teaspoon lemon flavoring  
Salt and pepper to taste  
Combine cabbage, onions, pimiento, pineapple, olives and cheese ("I used salad olives for this since the more expensive sliced olives would only come apart when the salad was mixed.") Whip the cream and fold into the mayonnaise to which the lemon flavoring has been added. Season to taste. Combine and refrigerate for two hours. "This is supposed to serve six generously, but don't count on it as you'll want seconds. It is delicious and different tasting slaw."

#### EASIEST CHICKEN CASSEROLE

- 1 can cream of chicken soup
  - 1 can cream of celery soup
  - 1 can cream of mushroom soup
  - $\frac{1}{4}$  pound melted butter (optional)
  - $\frac{1}{2}$  cup milk
  - $1\frac{1}{4}$  cups minute rice
  - 1 3-4 pound fryer, cut in pieces
- Blend together the soups, melted butter, rice and milk. Pour into 9x13-inch baking pan; lay pieces of chicken on top, brush with melted butter. Season with salt, pepper and paprika. Bake for  $2\frac{1}{2}$  to 3 hours at 275 degrees uncovered.

#### SPEEDY BAKED BEANS

- 4 slices bacon, dried

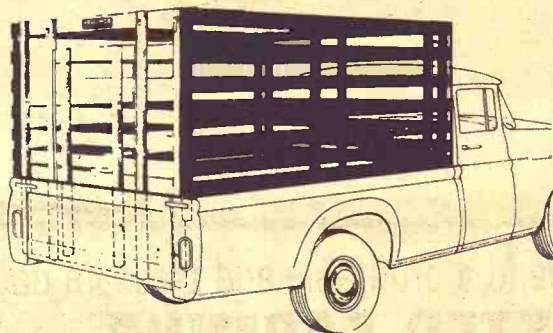

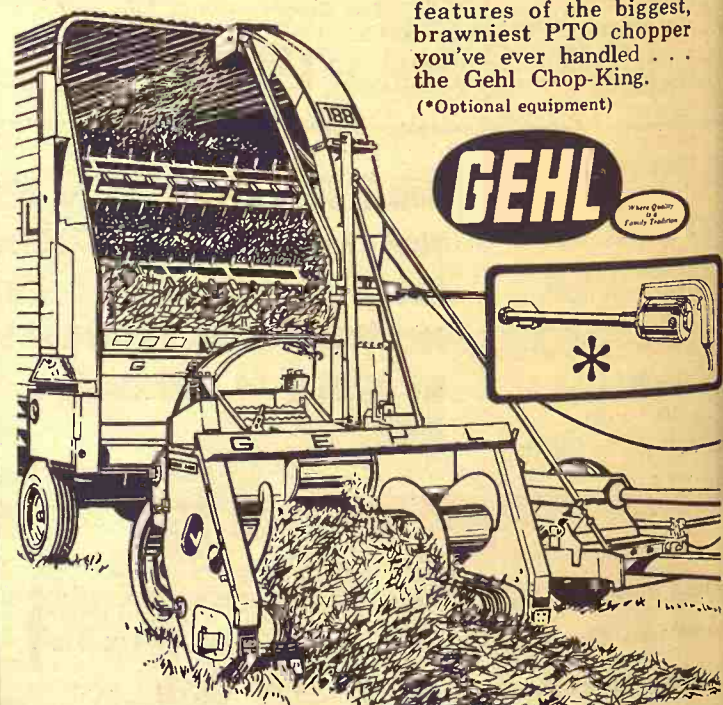

#### CARROT LOAF

Cook 10 large carrots in salt water until tender. Mash fine and add 3 tablespoons melted butter, 2 cups cracker crumbs, 1 small onion, 2 cups rich milk, 2 egg yolks, salt and pepper to taste. Fold in beaten egg whites and pour into buttered baking dish. Bake in moderate oven for one hour.

## Window Shades Can Add Much To Room Decor

How you treat your windows can make all the difference in the world when it comes to decorating.

Treat them indifferently and they show it. Treat them imaginatively and they respond by becoming a vital part of room decor.

One of the most effective ways of dealing with windows is to treat them to handsome paper or draperies. Or let them make important decorating points on their own.

For example, shades can be laminated with the same cotton fabric that's used for chair or couch covers. You can have the work done by a shade dealer or do it yourself with a new adhesive-coated shade cloth that's heat sensitive. Any cotton fabric can be ironed on to the specially treated shade cloth. The heat does all the work by activating

the adhesive.

Solid-colored shades can be tied into the room's decor by applying cut-out fabric designs or bands of ribbon. Closely woven cottons are the best fabrics for appliques.

To keep fabric from raveling, paint the cutting line on the back with clear nail polish before cutting. Cut out motifs carefully with sharp scissors and arrange the design on the shade.

Then apply glue to the reverse side, making sure to cover the entire surface before pressing onto the shade. Smooth out, checking to see that all edges are attached securely and no air bubbles remain.

After gluing is completed and adhesive has dried, the face of the fabric can be protected by a coating of clear acrylic spray.

While shades add a big plus to ordinary windows, they have a special talent for transforming problem windows into decorative assets. Any window — whether it's a bay, casement, jalousie or L-shaped type that turns the corner — can be shaded to perfection.

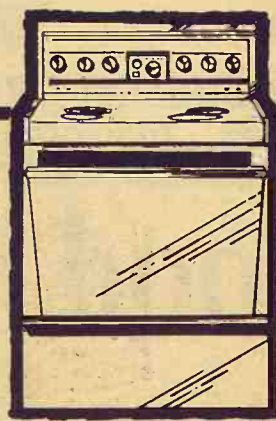

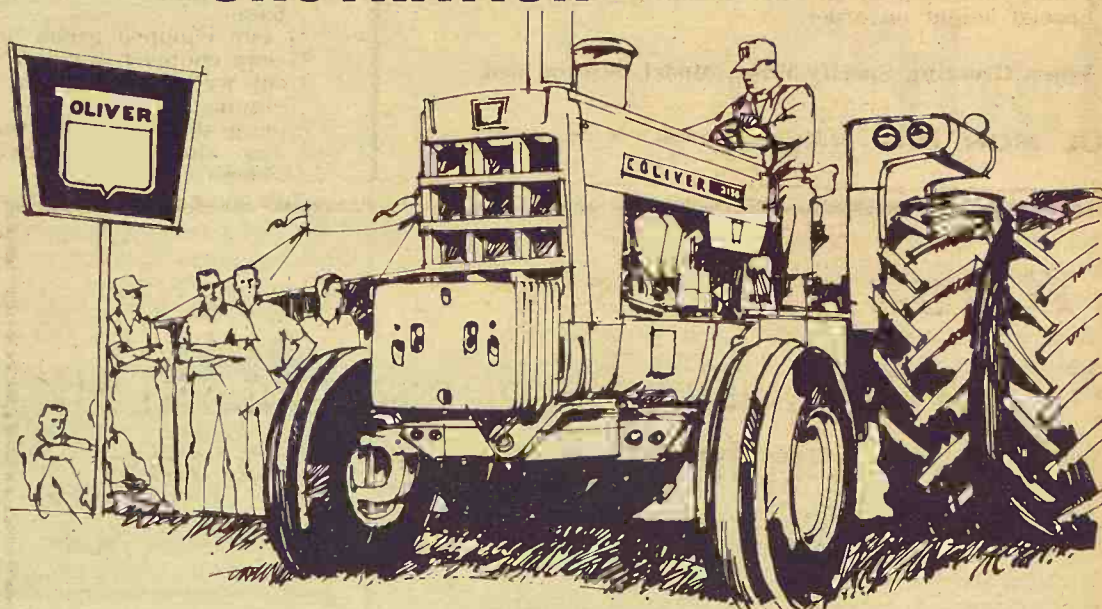

# Soviet Crop Aims Lowered

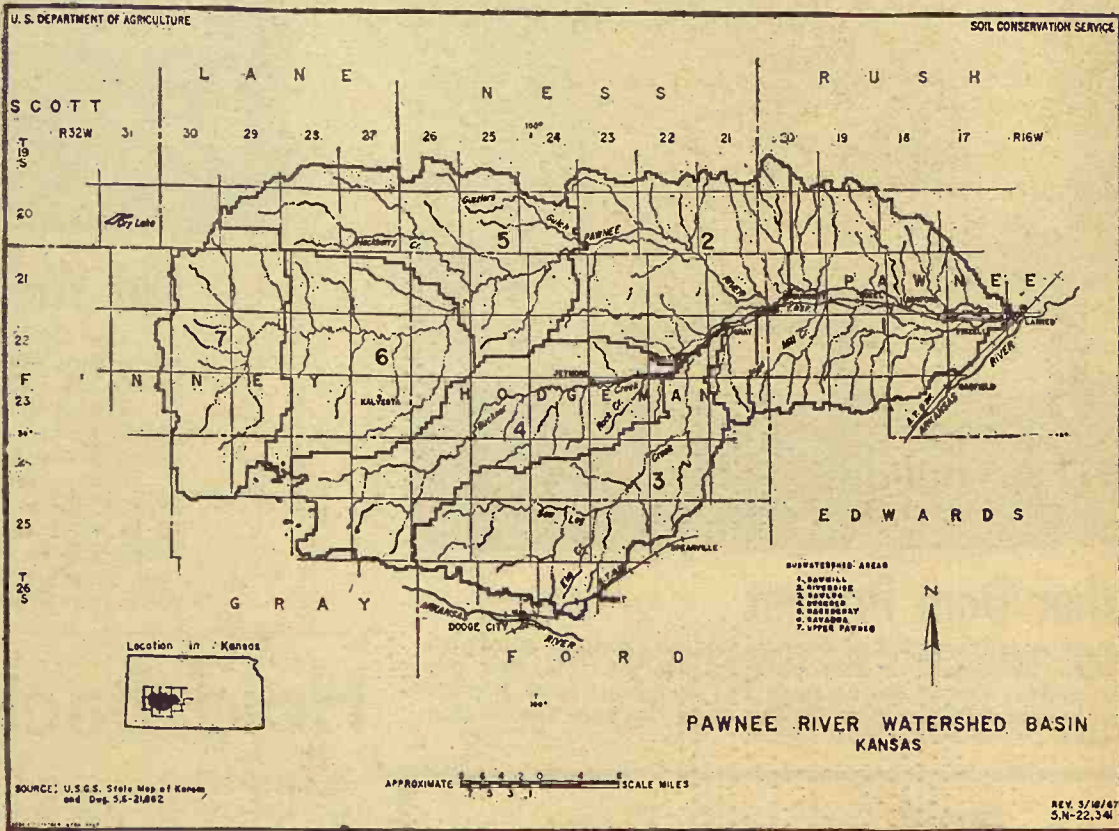
Early indications of this year's Soviet agricultural prospects point to an average wheat crop that will cover domestic and export needs while failing to fulfill long-term goals. Other types of agricultural production appear successful enough, however, that the Soviet Union might reach its goal of increasing over-all output in 1966-67 by 25 percent over the 1961-65 economic planning period. Spotty regional reports published in the official press and

the observations by travelers point to the likelihood of a wheat crop roughly the size of last year's. That was officially reported as 77.3 million metric tons of wheat out of total grain production of 147.6 million. The total was the third best in Soviet history. But it was a sharp drop from 1966's record 171.2 million metric tons of wheat out of total grain production of 147.6 million. The 1966-70 goal is an average annual grain production of about 167 million metric tons. Prospects now are for significant under-achievement in this unless 1969 and 1970 crop conditions are usually good and unless difficulties are overcome in getting fertilizer production and distribution up to targets. A generally dry autumn was followed by good snow cover and adequate spring rains in Southern European Russia, the main grain-producing area. But icy conditions seem to have required more resowing than usual in winter wheat areas. Press reports on the "virgin lands" of Soviet Central Asia and Siberia indicate officials are concerned about lack of moisture in that important bread-basket area. Soviet domestic wheat needs

are estimated at about 70 million. Union also supplies wheat to such East European countries as Czechoslovakia and to Cuba. The Soviet Union is committed to buy from Canada, during the crop year beginning this summer, the last third of a 9-million-ton wheat order placed in 1966.

## Nation's Biggest Watershed District OK'd By Nine Western Counties

**JETMORE** — Voters in nine Kansas counties overwhelmingly approved establishment of the nation's largest watershed district last week. The Pawnee Watershed Improvement district takes in the drainage area of the Pawnee river from its sources in Lane, Finney and Gray counties eastward to where it flows into the Arkansas river. It encom-

passes 1,567,240 acres and includes several subwatersheds, including the Upper Pawnee, Hackberry, Ravanna, Riverside, Buckner, Saw Log and Saw Mill creeks. The vote was 1,034 in favor, 321 opposed. The issue carried in every county except Ford, Lane County, with a small vote, was unanimously in favor of the proposal.

## Old Wakefield Bridge Still In Use

The old bridge over the Republican river at Wakefield was due to be scrapped when the Milford reservoir put that area under water. But two spans of the old bridge are still in use on county roads in Clay county.

One is over Spring Creek five miles northeast of Clay Center, here viewed by Maloy Quinn, Clay county engineer. The other span is over Mall Creek about 10 miles southeast of Clay Center.

Both are 90-foot spans. The bridge was built over the Republican as access to Wakefield in 1935 and 1936. When Milford Dam was built and Wakefield was forced to move up the hill out of the water area, the bridge was sold by the Corps of Engineers to the county for about \$17,000. County crews concentrated on two 90-foot spans, which were cut, numbered and shipped to two locations, where they were reassembled to replace outdated bridges.

## Hold Back On Extra Weight

MANHATTAN — Better think twice if you plan to put that extra 40 to 50 pounds on your feeder steers this summer, warns a Kansas State University economist.

Costs of adding weight to animals already in the upper weight brackets are steadily climbing, says John H. McCoy. And there's a good chance that an increase in steer weights could have a negative effect on

Average weights, lower than year earlier levels since the latter half of 1967, have shown signs of increasing during recent weeks. And higher average weights mean two things — greater beef output and lower prices.

A 20 lb. per head increase in average slaughter weights would boost beef output by more than 2 per cent. The effect on prices would be even greater — in the opposite direction.

So you'll be dollars ahead if you sell your animals when they are fed to grade, McCoy says.



prices.

Average weight will be a critical factor in determining prices during the coming weeks, McCoy says. Here's why. Number of cattle on feed April 1 was up 2 per cent from a year earlier. This increase was entirely in heifers, which normally are slaughtered at lighter weights than steers.

Looking at numbers alone, the prospective increase in beef production would be reasonably well in line with anticipated increases in demand. However, if average weights should increase, supplies could outrun demand.



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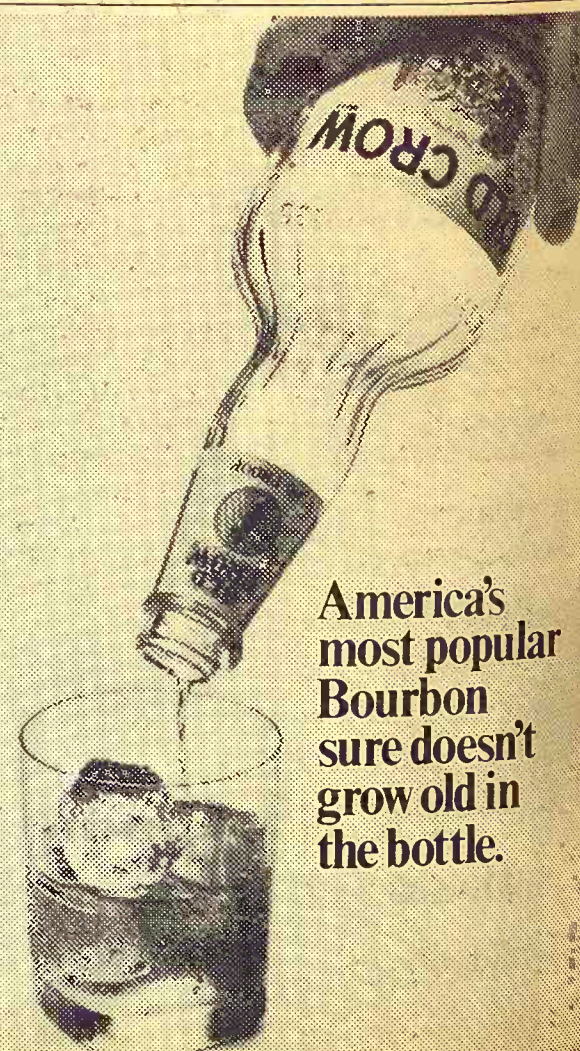
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# Corn Belt Impact By Fertilizer Pipeline Plans

The proposed construction of three major pipelines to carry anhydrous ammonia from the Gulf Coast into the Corn Belt may or may not have a happy price impact on the midwestern farmer, but the multi-million dollar moves are almost sure to close down smaller or less efficient plants in an already marginal market.

And the pipelines are making the railroads awfully nervous.

The pipeline concerns themselves hope to get the sweet smell of success from ammonia, altho there seems general agreement in the industry that there isn't room for all three.

The three proposed ventures would spend \$165 million to handle ammonia, a basic nitrogen-bearing fertilizer, which is currently handled by barge, rail, and truck.

Transportation charges by pipeline are not particularly lower than those by barge, industry sources say, but the pipeline advantage comes when ammonia must be hauled from river terminals to inland farm areas, at higher rail and truck rates. The prospect of laying down ammonia almost in the farmer's backyard is already shaking the industry, although pipeline deliveries aren't expected until fall.

Some pipeline operators say they may be able to cut the cost of hauling ammonia by one-third or one-half when long "in-bound" hauls are involved.

Pipelines are used to transport a wide variety of products. Their use for ammonia has been delayed because only in recent years have ammonia-production volumes appeared adequate to support the large initial capital investment. Ammonia lines cannot be used to transport other products because ammonia would contaminate them.

Both consumption and ammonia capacity are growing. The Agricultural Nitrogen Institute, a trade group, expects demand for nitrogen (ammonia contains 82% nitrogen) to grow 12% a year thru the 1971-72 fertilizer year.

Fully one-third of U.S. ammonia production is centered along the Gulf Coast, in large plants using low-cost natural gas. Nitrogen from air is combined with hydrogen from natural gas under pressure to produce anhydrous ammonia, which can be applied directly in the soil in liquid form, or used to make a variety of other nitrogen fertilizer products.

The high usage areas, of course, are the major corn and soybean regions of Iowa, Illinois and the Corn Belt, some 2000 miles away from the concentration of production in the Gulf Coast. As ammonia for agriculture is used only a few weeks in the spring planting season, there are extensive storage requirements.

Mapco Inc., formerly Mid-Am-

erica Pipeline Co., Tulsa, has a significant lead in the pipeline scramble, and major advantages as well. Almost half of its proposed 850-mile, 8-inch and 6-inch diameter line from the Texas Panhandle to Iowa is in the ground, much of it on right-of-way already purchased for the company's existing propane line.

In addition, Mapco's pipeline supply will come from a new \$18 million, 1000-ton-a-day ammonia plant to be built at Borger, Texas. Shipments will pass thru major fertilizer-using areas, and barge lines won't be able to compete for the transportation service.

The other two proposed pipelines are more ambitious than Mapco's. Both would stretch 2000 miles from Texas and Louisiana plants, somewhat parallel to the Mississippi, and branch out in a T-shape to serve the Corn Belt.

One is proposed by Gulf Central Pipeline, a subsidiary of the Santa Fe Railroad. It will have a one million ton per year capacity at the outset, expandable to 3 million tons.

The move by a Santa Fe subsidiary is significant, for the railroads have reason to worry about tariff competition. Under one tentative rate structure, pipeline movement would cost \$5.25 a ton from the Gulf Coast to northern river points, increasing to \$8 to \$9 a ton at the end of the lines.

By contrast, a movement by barge and rail can cost up to \$23 a ton to distant points.

The Missouri Pacific has proposed cutting rates for handling anhydrous ammonia in tank

cars, based on annual volumes and trainload hauls. The new rates would cut roughly in half some present rates for standard tank cars, to less than \$15 a ton in some cases.

The railroads hope to forestall construction of pending pipelines and of additional barges by rate lowering. The pipeline promoters seem to agree that three lines are not economically feasible. But each also seems to figure that it's going to be one of the others who will drop out.

The pipelines face opposition from some quarters. Some producers and city industrial groups opposed Mapco's line in hearings before the Iowa Commerce Commission. A spokesman for the Industrial Development Council of Sioux City, for example, complains that Midwest ammonia makers have to pay almost twice as much for natural gas as do Gulf-Coast producers. He blames the price gap on Federal price controls. A multi-million-dollar ammonia plant built right in the market, he adds, would be of more benefit to Iowa than a pipeline.

The Iowa Commerce Commission granted Mapco a permit. Opponents have sought a rehearing.

The pipelines' impact on ammonia demand and pricing is debated in the industry. There is a surplus of production, yet distribution problems often leave some areas with shortages.

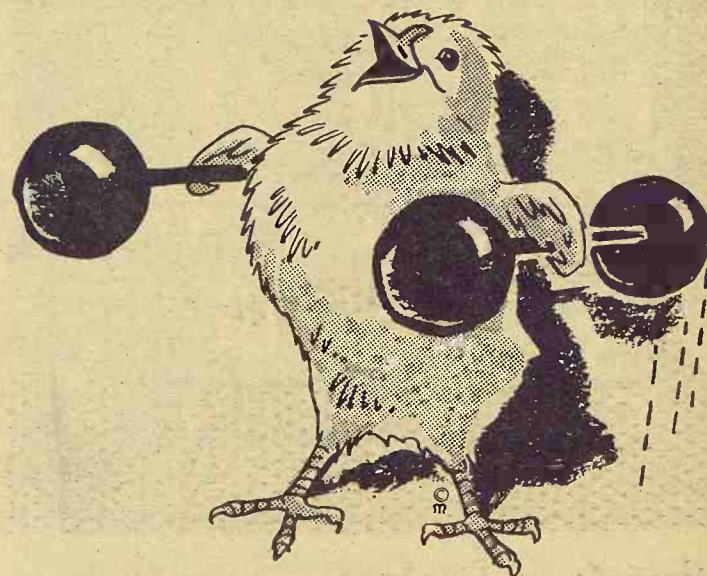
One pipeline planner, however, asserts that more favorable weather has increased demand this year. "Carryover inventories from last year are all

gone," he says. "Producers can see their way to dry tanks."

Current pricing, says an

equipment man, "is almost like a gasoline war — selling to maintain market position, not to make money." Pipelines, he suggests, will "accelerate the closedown of some smaller, less efficient plants."

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## Last Of Cavalry Horses

Chief, the last of the U.S. Cavalry horses, died last week at Fort Riley at the age of 36, the equivalent of 108 human years. Born in Nebraska in 1932, Chief was bought by the Army in 1940 for \$163 and was retired in 1949. The horse was billeted at Fort Riley's riding stables, billed as the "last of the old horse cavalry."

## At Least One State Senate Race By Incumbents

State Senator Theo. Sanborn of Belleville has announced that he will be a candidate for the new 24th Senatorial District, thus setting up the first battle between two incumbent senators thrown together in the same district by the U.S. District Court decision reapportioning the state.

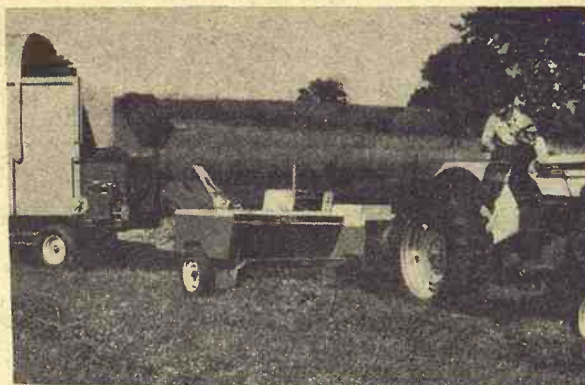
The other incumbent in the

new district is Sen. Harm Voss of Downs, one time chairman of the former sixth congressional district. Sanborn is chairman of the Senate Ways and Means committee and as such is a member of the State Finance Council.

The district comprises Jewell, Mitchell, Republic, Rooks, Phillips, Smith and Osborne. There is also one other candidate in the field, besides Sanborn and Voss. He is Gene Hall of Kirwin, a Smith County commissioner who has been highly critical of the new state reappraisal law.

Charles Arthur, R-Manhattan, is running for lieutenant governor and is in a primary race with House Speaker John Conrad of Greensburg.

Kent Frizell, of Wichita, another Republican, is one of four in a primary race for Attorney General.

Keith Sebelius, R-Norton, seeking the Republican nomination for U.S. Representative from the 1st Congressional District.

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# Asks Easing Of Limits On Young Farm Labor

Sen. James B. Pearson, R-Kan., has asked the U. S. Labor Dept. to relax its restrictions prohibiting 14- and 15-year-old youths from doing such jobs as driving a tractor and operating

power machinery for someone other than a parent or guardian.

Pearson said that he has written to Labor Secretary Willard W. Wirtz, urging that the hazardous occupations order be amended to make it possible for youths to perform such jobs after completing a short safety training course conducted by

4-H clubs under the supervision of county extension personnel.

Under regulations that became effective last Jan. 1, the Labor Dept. declared a number of farm jobs as off limits by law to persons under 16 years old.

The restrictions do not apply to the employment of a minor under 16 by his parent or by a person standing in the place of his parent.

Pearson said, "These new regulations have caused a great deal of confusion and much concern among farmers and the youth they normally employ during the summer months."

"Of particular concern are those parts of the order which prohibit 14- and 15-year-old youths from driving or riding on a farm tractor and other machinery such as combines or field balers."

The Republican senator said the Kansas Cooperative Extension Service has adopted a training program, and that 3000 youths have already signed up for it.

Pearson described the regulations as "unrealistic and unnecessarily restrictive."

"This unrealistic attitude was due partly to the fact that Labor Dept. officials are so accustomed to thinking in terms of large city working conditions that they just don't understand the personal relationship which exists between the farmers and the young persons whom they employ and carefully train and supervise," Pearson said.

The senator said he was gratified to hear that the department would probably approve the training program amendment.

## Judge Finds No Wrong In Courthouse Plan

WESTMORELAND — A district judge last week denied an appeal for an injunction to halt the construction of a \$585,000 Pottawatomie County courthouse in Westmoreland.

District Judge A. B. Fletcher Jr. of Junction City ruled procedures by the county commissioners for a special building fund levy and the issuance of bonds were in order and denied a lawsuit filed by Eli Pinet of Onaga and Alfred Wille and Lyle Honig of Wamego.

The courthouse project has divided Pottawatomie County voters, with some efforts to have the 84-year old courthouse at Westmoreland remodeled and some later efforts to move the county seat to Wamego.

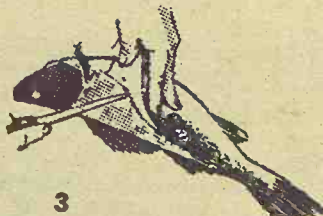
# Here's How to Fillet Fish the Angler Brings Home



Take the fish as it comes from the water, lay it on a board and with a sharp knife make a straight cut through the skin from the back of the head right down to the top of the tail. Make a similar cut on the opposite side of the dorsal fin.



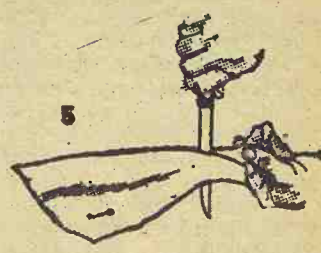
Now cut around the back of the head down to the rib bones, then make a straight cut from the first incision behind the head down to the back bone, running all the way to the tail.



With your knife and fingers, carefully free the flesh all the way along the ribs leaving the rib bones attached to the back bone.



Cut the fillet free at the end of the ribs. This leaves a strip of flesh with skin still attached. Repeat this on the other side of the fish.



Once the fillets are removed lay them, skin side down on the board. With the blade of the knife held flat, start a cut between skin and flesh at the tail end. Grasp skin and pull, still holding knife flat. The fillet will peel right off ready for cooking.

## A New Box To Clock Speed

A speeding motorist may soon have more trouble evading a Kansas Highway Patrolman. The Patrol is trying out a new device which can clock speeds of cars either meeting or passing a Patrol car, and the little gray box can be operated by just one patrolman. The Patrol has had two general methods of clocking highway speeds. One is by a radar unit which requires two patrolmen. The other is by following a car and clocking on the Patrol speedometer.

Presently the new device is being used only by Trooper Roger Thompson in the Salina district, but it is expected to be put to use in other areas.

## List Big Farm Payments In Area

Delaware Senator John Williams is on his annual campaign to limit payment of farm subsidies to \$10,000 per farm.

Williams has inserted into the Congressional Record, as he has for several years, the list of farms which get very large payments from the federal government for removing land from cultivation.

Five farm operations were paid more than \$1 million each in 1967, 15 got more than \$500,000, 338 more than \$100,000, 1290 more than \$50,000, and 4881 more than \$25,000.

Payments over \$25,000 per farm totaled \$72 million in Texas, \$61 million in California, \$56 million in Mississippi, \$32 million in Arizona, \$28 million in Arkansas, and \$11 million in Louisiana.

The figure for Kansas was \$3.8 million, mostly to far western Kansas farming operations for not growing feed grains.

In the G&G area these individual payments were listed: Neil Durham, Jewell County, \$26,385; Leonard Long, Linn County, \$29,926; Paul Mears, Mitchell County, \$34,660; Clarence Cox Estate, Phillips County, \$27,333; Ferguson Brothers, Smith County, \$25,490; and Herman Bott, Washington County, \$33,817.

## BURLINGTON OKAYS SCHOOL BOND ISSUE

BURLINGTON — The school district here has approved a \$98,000 bond issue for an addition to the grade school. The vote was 439 to 237. The district includes Burlington and rural areas east and west of the Coffey County town.

## He Left Money To Home Town

CLAY CENTER — A retired Clay Center postal carrier who died May 8 has left \$40,000 in bequests to church and community groups in a will filed in the Clay County Probate Court.

The organizations which will benefit from the estate of Lou Drantman are the Lutheran Church, Missouri Synod, \$28,000; St. Paul's Lutheran Church, Clay Center, \$8,000; Clay County Red Cross, \$2000; and Clay Center Chamber of Commerce, \$2000.

The bequest to St. Paul's is to be used for improvements.

The synod was directed to use its money in special ways. The Red Cross bequest for Clay Center projects was directed for the benefit of Clay Center residents in need of special assistance.

## PROFITS DIP FOR SWIFT AND COMPANY

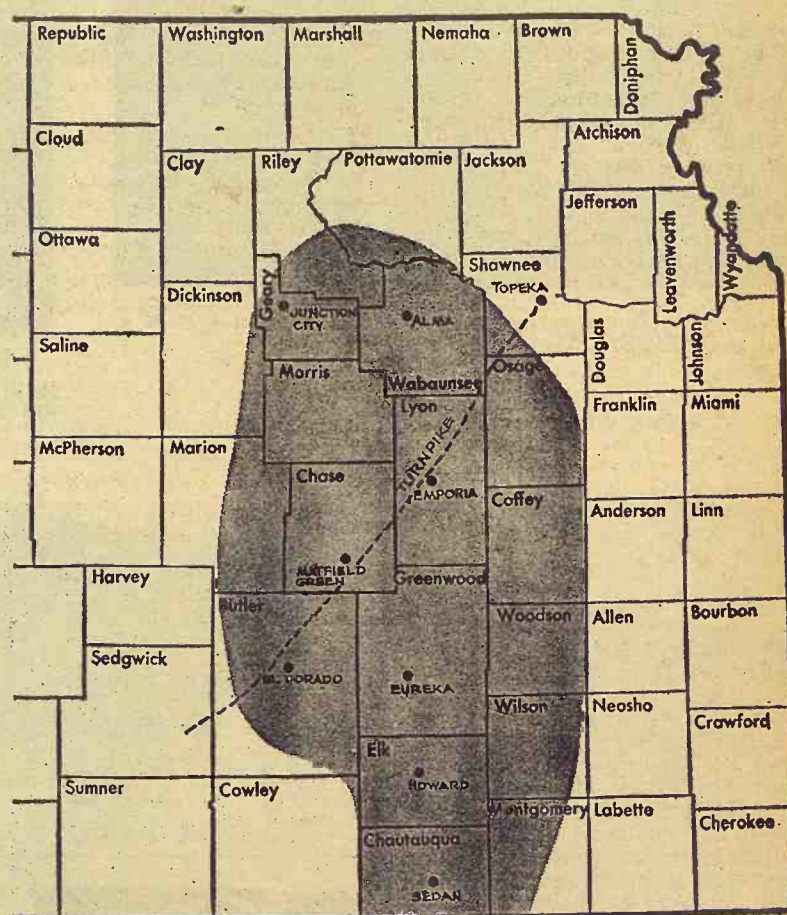
The earnings of Swift & Co. plunged 55% in the first half of 1968 compared to 1967. The net for the first six months of the current fiscal year was \$6.4 million on sales of \$1.35 billion. Sale were down by 6%. Much of the decline was attributed to inventory changes, which by Swift's accounting methods, tend to detract when raw material prices — in this case, rising livestock prices — are on the increase. Company officials said Swift would continue a stepped-up schedule of closing antiquated plants and using capital in more profitable areas.

## Flint Hills Still Hold As a Major Cattle Empire

Major changes have taken place in the Flint Hills thru the years, but the big pasture empire still holds forth as the most productive prairie grazing region in the U.S.

All or part of 19 counties in Kansas make up this grasslands empire. Chase county lies near its heart. It is a county in which only 13 percent of its area is in cultivation. Of the other 87 percent, nearly all is grass.

Wabaunsee, Greenwood, Elk and Chautauqua counties range from 70 to 80 percent in native grass. Pottawatomie, Geary, Morris, Lyon and Butler are more than half in pasture, running from 60 to 70 percent. Riley, Osage, Coffey, Woodson, Wilson and Montgomery average from half to 60 percent pasture. Marion, Dickinson, and Shawnee lie only partly in the Flint Hills region but about 40 percent of their areas are in native grass.

An important factor in making this the great beef-producing area is its geographic location, providing a longer growing season than most of the nation's other great grazing areas.

Weather records disclose that the growing season at Eureka is 35 days longer than at Pawhuska, Okla., and 53 days longer than the sandhills region of northwestern Nebraska and southern South Dakota, a factor which shortens the winter feeding time.

Oldtimers found that the dominant bluestem grasses could put 250 to 300 pounds on a steer during a summer's grazing. As early as 1897 nearly a half-million cattle were shipped into the bluestem region from the Southwest. It became big steer country with two, three and four-year olds coming for fattening on the rich grass. Most went directly from grass to market, some steers weighing 1450 and 1500 pounds when they reached the packers.

This pattern continued right thru World War II. Basically, Flint Hills landowners marketed steers from their own herds. They also might buy other young cattle each fall, rough winter them on forage and alfalfa, graze them on their own or lease-land the following summer, feed them on corn after grass was gone, and market two or three-year olds around Christmas.

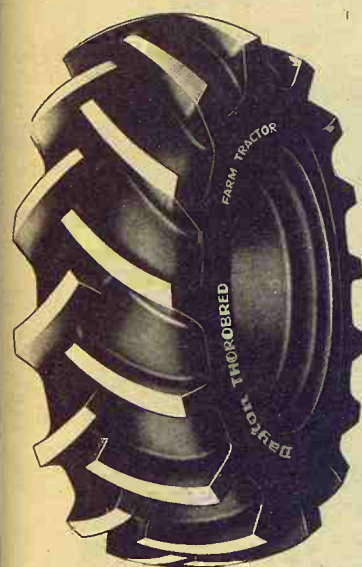
In recent years, demand for smaller and better cuts of beef have changed the mode of operation in the Flint Hills, but made it no less important in the industry.

Today, probably 95 percent of Flint Hill cattle go directly to the feedlot instead of the killer. With the change has come a younger type of cattle to the bluestem region for grazing. Most are yearlings weighing from 450 to 550 pounds. They will put on an average 250 pounds off grass, then move the feedlots for finishing and selling at from 1000 to 1250 pounds.

There are more cowherds in the bluestem region now, cows making up perhaps 15 percent of the total.

Long drouths and overgrazing has changed the region some, but stockmen generally have learned their lessons. Thousands of ponds have been permanently constructed in the Flint Hills. Oldtimers say there may be less bluestem than there once was — that perhaps there is more Indian grass and switchgrass now — but the majestic old hills stand beautiful and productive.

Bottle cap dimensions already go metric. A standardized line of 30 new metric Timken bearings replaces 281 old types sold in 133 countries.

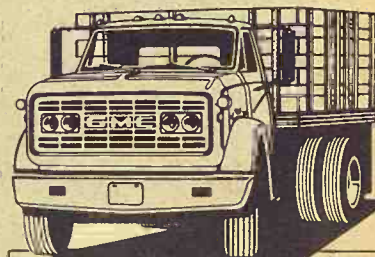

## Seek To Ban Interstate Shipping Of Hog Vaccine

Several livestock organizations have recently called for a halt in all interstate shipments of hog cholera vaccine. The request apparently comes from areas which have markedly cut down on the costly hog disease, in the belief that vaccines may possibly spread infection.

Thirty-seven states are now in the final stages of wiping out cholera entirely. Now, instead

of vaccination, if a herd of swine is found to be infected with the disease, it is disposed of and the owner is paid.

Some states, including Kansas, have not yet reached the stage where they indemnify farmers, but these states are instituting quarantine and other measures to restrict spread of the disease.

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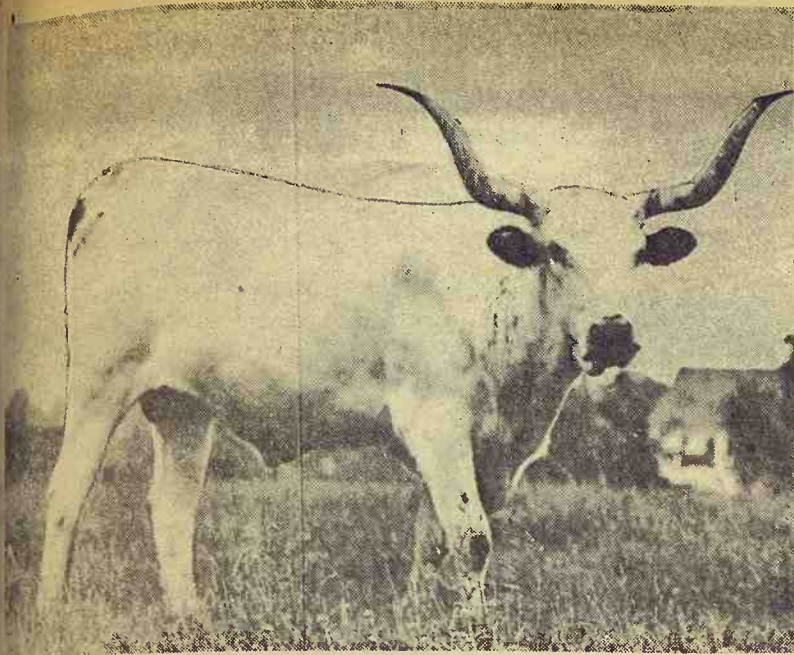
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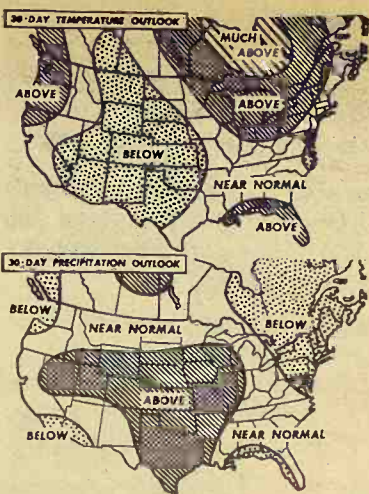
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## Longhorn In The City

## Big Air Exercise Over Fort Riley

The Military Airlift Command will conduct a training exercise over Ft. Riley Tuesday.

It described the exercise as one of the largest non-combat formations in the 20-year history of the command.

Thirty-six C141 Starlifters and three C130 Hercules transports will fly in formation and each plane will drop two Army paratroopers over Ft. Riley's Milford drop zone. The planes will come from MAC wings in the eastern and western parts of the country.

Twenty-one aircraft will rendezvous in the air at a predetermined location in the east and 18 will meet at a point in the west. The transports then will proceed to Ft. Riley to join up for two airdrops.

Aircrews will be scored on how close parachutists land to a specific target area.

Upon completion of the exercise, the C141s will return to their units. The paratroopers will be taken to Forbes AFB near Topeka, where aircraft will pick them up and return them to their home stations.

The exercise, nicknamed Operation Cold Mass II, is designed to provide training in large-scale formation and tactical air-drop procedures for MAC aircrews.

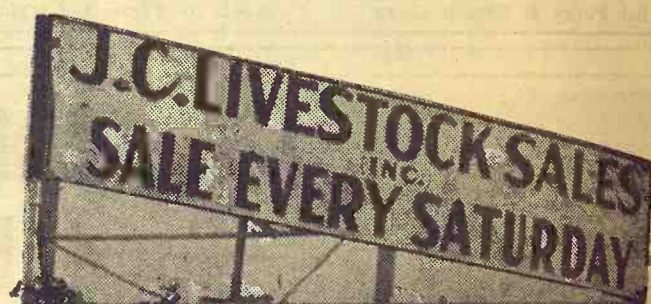

## Sues For Weed Law Enforcement

COUNCIL GROVE — L. J. Blythe, a White City farmer, has petitioned the Morris County District Court for an order to force the Morris County commissioners to enforce the Kansas noxious weed laws.

In his mandamus action against the commission, Blythe alleges the panel in the past has failed to enforce the weed law,

especially as it pertains to musk thistle. He said if the court does not grant his petition, he will suffer damages and injury.

Blythe is seeking payment for damages he may have sustained and costs, including attorney fees.

The state noxious weed law requires the commissioners to notify all property owners where musk thistle is found to eradicate the noxious weed. Eradication must be undertaken by the county, if the offender

fails to comply within a specified period, with all costs assessed to his property tax bill.

SALINA — Bob D. Muir, one of the owners of Farmers & Ranchers Livestock Commission Co., was reported in "fair" condition after suffering multiple cuts and bruises on his right side in a feeder wagon accident at his farm Friday.

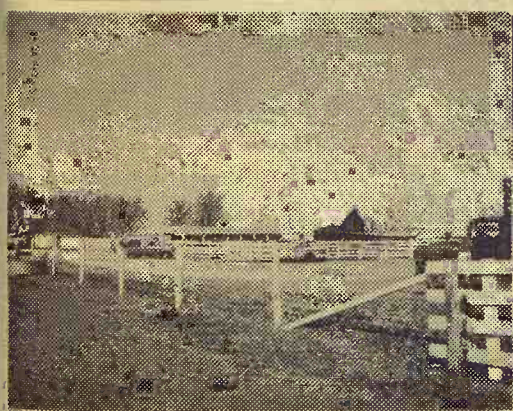

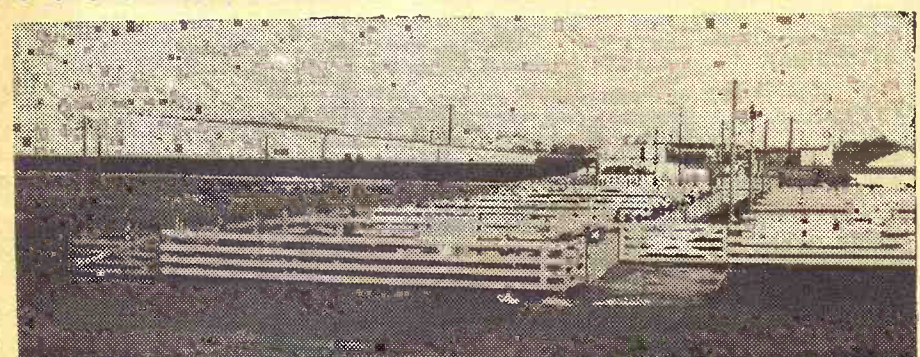
