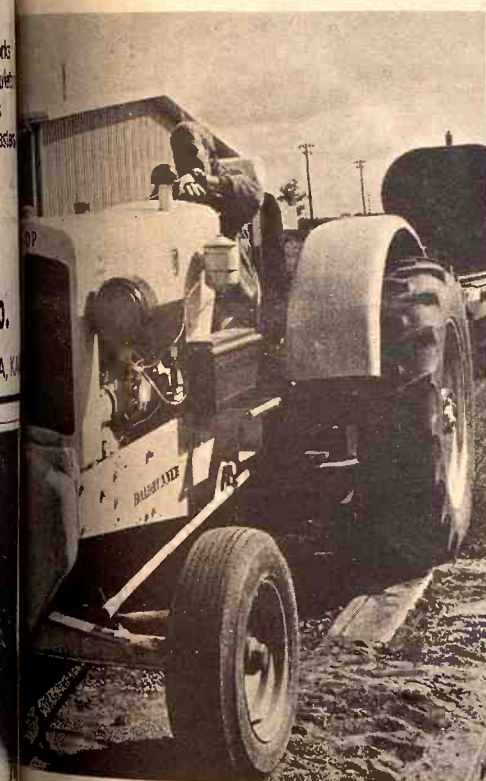

# Lengthen DES Withdrawal Time

The government's food monitors have announced new controls on a suspected cancer-causing hormone found in livestock and immediately drew criticism that the controls are inadequate.

The hormone is diethylstilbestrol, or DES, which the Food and Drug Administration announced last week had been found in 10 meat animals. The FDA and the Agriculture Department said they are increasing the length of time farmers must stop feeding the hormone before animals are sent to market.

"The new regulations are not nearly strong enough," Sen. William Proxmire (D-Wis.) said. "They suffer from the same defects as the old regulations—they rely upon the voluntary compliance of those who are using this cancer-causing hormone. The solution is to prohibit the use of DES in any cattle feed."

Originally the government required that farmers stop feeding the hormone to animals two days before their slaughter. Now it is going to lengthen the withdrawal

period to seven days.

"Although the 48-hour period is scientifically adequate when observed, FDA concluded that a 7-day withdrawal period is a more practical time period and is more certain to be followed," the joint announcement by the FDA and the Agriculture Department said.

A year ago the FDA doubled the amount of the hormone farmers could feed to cattle to make them gain weight faster. It had kept the same 2-day withdrawal period in force since the hormone was first used on cattle in the 1950s, despite the contention of some specialists that modern agriculture practices make the withdrawal periods ineffective.

This June the Agricultural Department responded to criticism that its residue-sampling program was statistically unsound by increasing its annual sample total from 250 to 6,000.

Aug. 31 the USDA told Proxmire it had found no DES contamination as of June 31. Yesterday the USDA conceded that seven of the 10 tests

showing DES contamination were made prior to June. Of the 10 positive samples seven were in beef livers and three in sheep livers.

"The samples were not reported earlier because the responsible laboratory officials considered the results to be preliminary until confirmed by a second more lengthy analytical process," the joint announcement said.

"All of us recognize that we simply cannot have any DES residues in the food supply," said Dr. Clayton Yeutter, administrator of USDA's Consumer and Marketing Service. Any cancer-causing chemical is banned from the U.S. food supply under the Delany Amendment, which the FDA used to ban cyclamates last year.

The USDA also announced yesterday it will require farmers to certify they abided by the 7-day withdrawal period.

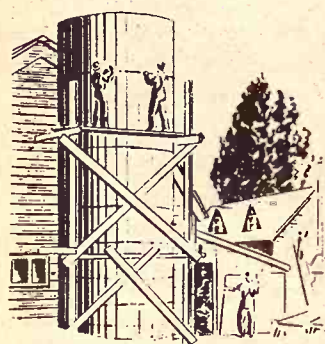

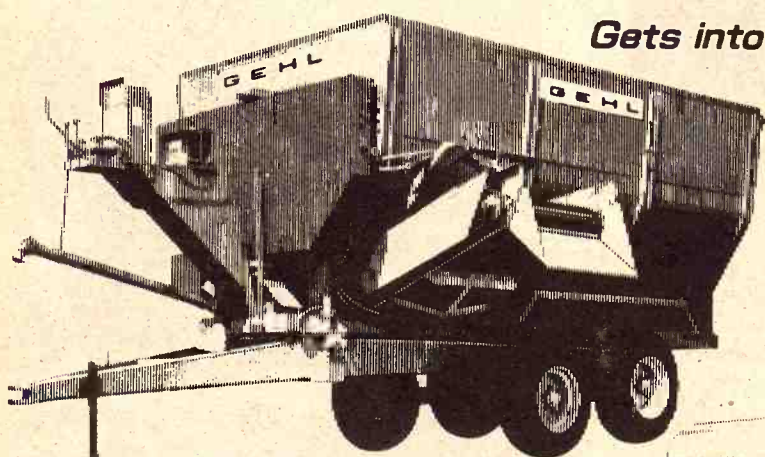

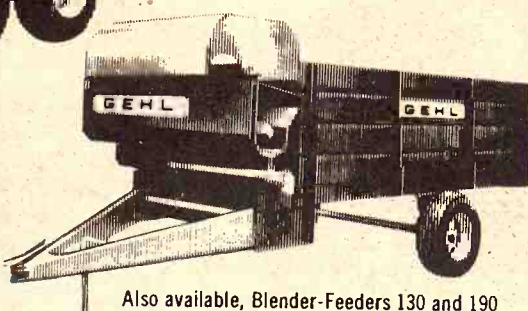

bald eagle anywhere in the United States.

The reward program was started recently by the NWF as a result of hunters expressing their outrage at the recently revealed mass slaughter of eagles in Wyoming. A national furor was raised when recent testimony before a Senate Subcommittee in Washington revealed that air-borne sharpshooters in Wyoming are hired by local ranchers to slaughter eagles and other wildlife. More than 65 golden and bald eagles were reported in a pile at one ranch.

"American hunters are tired of being tarred and feathered for the actions of criminals erroneously identified as hunters," said Thomas L. Kimball, NWF director.

The bald eagle, America's national bird and emblem, is in serious trouble from hard pesticides and diminishing habitat. The total bald eagle population in the lower 48 states probably numbers from 3,000 to 4,000 birds.

There are a few eagles nesting in Kansas and some of the majestic birds can be found during winter, particularly around some of the

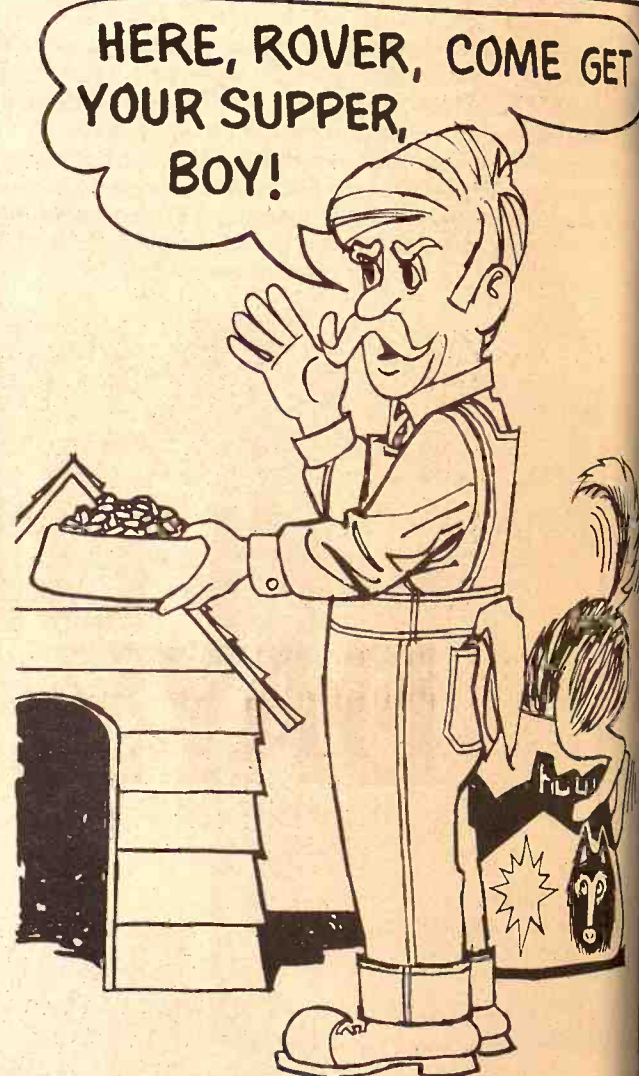
larger reservoirs.

Since 1940 it has been against federal law to shoot or otherwise molest bald eagles but as numbers decline, illegal shooting is becoming a more important factor in working against the bird's survival.

To claim the reward, the claimant must write to the National Wildlife Federation, 1412 16th Street, Washington, D.C. 20036, within 30 months after a conviction is

obtained. Illegal shooting of bald eagles is not only drawn the wrath of men but also of legislators. Congressman John D. Dingell (Michigan) and 11 co-sponsors introduced legislation to strengthen penalties for violations of the Eagle Protection Act.

Dingell's Bill, H.R. 10450, provides for a fine of \$5000 or one year imprisonment for first offenders who illegally kill bald or golden eagles. For the second offense, the fine could go to \$10,000 and the jail term to two years. Each killing of an eagle would constitute a separate violation under the law. The current law provides for a \$500 fine or six months imprisonment.

A farmer gazes at his hailed-out field of wheat, purses his lips and then draws: "This patch is 30 hectares. If I make 700 liter to the hectare I'll be damn lucky."

He isn't from another planet. He's a mathematically enlightened Kansas. And his day probably isn't far off, according to State Sealer John O'Neill, guardian of the weights and measures system for the Sunflower State.

"It's kind of hard for us older people to accept this, but it looks to me like it's on its way," O'Neill said. What seems to be on the way is the metric system for America. Land would be measured by the hectare (2.5 acres) and wheat by the liter (there are 35 liter in a bushel). A perfect Miss Kansas by today's 36-

24-36 standards would be 91-60-91 and consumers would be buying meat by the kilo (2.2 pounds) and gas by the liter (1.1 quarts). And a weatherman who announced tonight's low at 20 degrees wouldn't be suggesting that a viewer get out the long-johns. Twenty degrees centigrade, a metric standard, is 68 degrees Fahrenheit today.

And those are only a few of the changes.

"It won't be easy in Kansas, but the metric system has been legal here for a long time so I don't think it will have all that much trouble," said O'Neill.

"But I have to admit I had hoped - I'd be retired before we started into it. It's going to be a lot like the (daylight) time thing, I'm pretty

sure. It's going to be confusing," said O'Neill, who became the state sealer in August of last year after 20 years with the department. His office is a part of the State Board of Agriculture.

The state sealer's office has a low profile, but it has a vital function. It checks the net content of packages, propane gas meters, binder and baler twine and vehicle and small capacity scales for accuracy. It acts as the custodian for all state weights and measures standards.

The proposed changeover from the customary system to the metric system comes at an ironic time for Kansas. The state is one of only 10 in the union that is just now being drawn into the use of U.S. Bureau of Standards scales.

The first standards for weights and measurements for the state arrived in 1869 at the University of Kansas. The duties were transferred to the Board of Agriculture in 1947.

"The standards we have been using are really antique. We're just getting into this thing and we'll be starting on the metric thing too. We'll have two sets of weights during the conversion," O'Neill said. The Agriculture Department has rented an office at Topeka to use as a laboratory to work on the new standards.

The metric system was first made legal in the United States in 1877 and the Kansas Legislature legalized it sometime between then and 1900. But its widespread use has been repeatedly shoved aside in the belief that other nations might come to readily accept the U.S. System.

All other major nations in the world are either converting to metric or have already established it.

Metric system proponents say it is a much easier system to use since it has a scientific basis and is computed in units of 10. They insist that while it may be uncomfortable in everyday use for some persons, it can be made easy for the average man by inexpensive conversion wheels.

There is no guarantee that the plan will be put into force by Congress, however. George Washington was the first U.S. president to suggest a change in the weights and measures standards in this country.

But the U.S. Commerce Department insists the metric system is one "whose time has come" and has set down a 10-year plan for conversion.

O'Neill said he believes it will take more time than that for a transition in Kansas.

"There are some third grade students who know more about the metric system than us old-timers... but I think Kansas will go along and be in step with the other states," he said.

Some businesses in the state already are measuring by both the customary standards and the metric standards, according to O'Neill. Some packaged meat in grocery stores already shows both. Plants in Kansas that ship products all over the world also show both measurements in specifications.

At Ft. Riley, roads already are marked in miles and in kilometers. The signs went up recently, and are the only dual signs in the state.

It is estimated that it would cost the entire nation between \$10 billion and \$40 billion a year to convert to the metric system. O'Neill said he "couldn't even guess" what it would cost in Kansas.

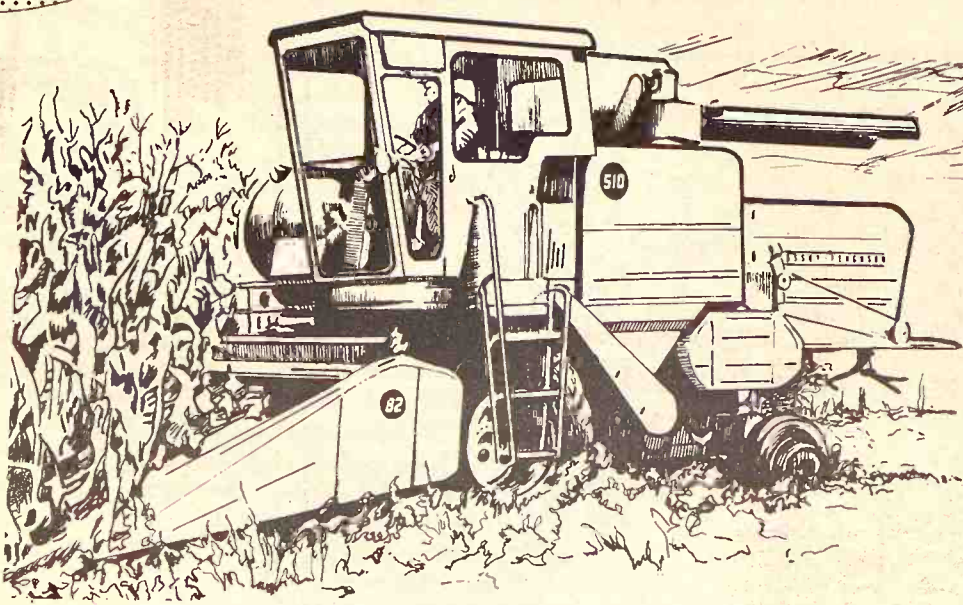

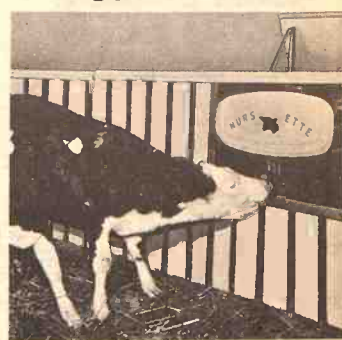

## Car Warranties Stick With 12-12

What's going to happen when your new 1972 car breaks down and you take it in for repair?

About the same things that happened this year.

In some cases, the dealer is going to fix it and tell you your new-car warranty covers the cost of the repair. In other instances, he's going to tell you your 1972 car warranty doesn't cover the charge.

Except for American Motors, which appears to be the lone innovator this year, the 1972 new car warranties are virtually unchanged from the 1971 models. General Motors, Ford, and Chrysler all have retained a 12-month, 12,000-mile (whichever comes first) warranty, during which the companies promise free repair or replacement of any defective or malfunctioning part of the car. These "12-12" warranties, as they are called, do not cover maintenance parts, like filters or spark plugs.

In addition, some companies have some special provisions. Ford's warranty, for instance, includes a 90-day break-in period for special servicing at no extra charge. These services include wheel alignment and carburetor adjustments on most Ford cars. Economy models are excluded to keep their prices competitive with import dealers who generally do not provide such coverage, a Ford spokesman said.

General Motors has a similar 90-day period in which it will make service adjustments at no charge; Chrysler does not.

Each of the companies warns consumers someplace in the warranty that repairs necessitated by accident, abuse, negligence, racing, or the car owner's failure to have the "required" maintenance services at the proper times, are not covered. Auto company critics have maintained that "negligence" and "abuse" are big words dealers can blame a lot of car troubles on.

The warranties for the major

imports also appear unchanged from last year. Toyota and Datsun both have a "12-12" warranty, with provision for two inspections during the car's early life. Volvo, too, is sticking with its 1971 warranty for the 1972 cars. Volvo offers a six-months warranty, with no mileage stipulation. It covers defective parts and workmanship, but no maintenance items.

A Volkswagen spokesman said its warranties will probably be unchanged from last year's 24-month, 24,000-mile warranty. The rules are similar to the U.S. warranties: no fix-ups for abuse; the owner must maintain and service his VW in accordance to a VW schedule; normal maintenance items are not covered. There is one free maintenance at 600 miles and free "diagnosis" four times at 6,000-mile intervals. One must pay for the repairs diagnosed.

American Motors is the one

company that has changed its warranty. Calling it a "guarantee," the company claims it has done something "no other company would dare do." American Motors will be responsible for fixing anything that goes wrong within a 12-month, 12,000-mile period.

"Except for rotten abuse of the

car, anything that goes wrong within the 12 months or the 12,000 miles, we will fix it," Robert Prendergast, an American Motors zone manager said. "This includes a light bulb, points, plugs, clutch and brake adjustments, front wheel balancing—anything."

"There are a lot of people who

won't believe it, but this is a guarantee—no whereases, wherefores," he said.

A lot of people, of course will be watching the American Motors program to see how it works—some companies, to see whether AM get the jump on them, prospective customers, and consumer groups.

The mill operates to fill orders for flour, sometimes only a few days a week, sometimes seven. Obviously, when it is operating seven days it produces more millfeeds than when it is on a short schedule. Thus when mills are running heavily, they have more millfeeds to sell. Few of them have sufficient bins for long-term storage of these bulky products.

The fact is, they must price them to move into market channels with higher prices when supplies are short, and lower prices when they are ample or in surplus, always of course, in response to demand.

Thus it is with varying rates of production of the by-products and at various locations, price becomes the factor that channels all these items into utilization. The almost innumerable factors that determine both supply and use are commented upon weekly by the "Feed Market News" put out by the Consumer and Marketing Service of the U.S. Dept. of Agriculture at an office in Independence, Mo. The government report quotes feed prices over the nation.

Under this system, all the byproducts eventually are used and they add appreciably to the value of the raw product as waste virtually is eliminated. Thus a farmer gets

more for his wheat, as an example, because there always is a market for a price for the mill products. When they wasted, wheat would be less. The same is true for all other products.

Essential to the system, as applied to all products, is the opportunity for price fluctuation.

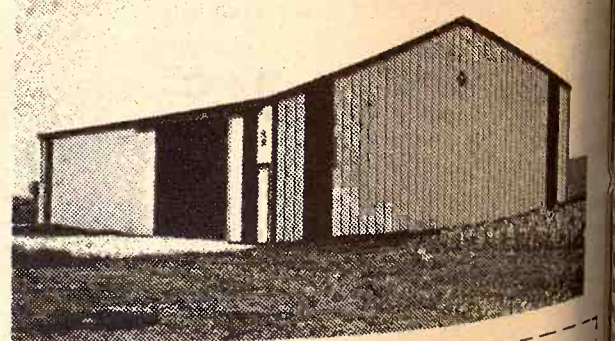

# Mixed Reviews On No-Fault Trials

Legislation for motor car insurance reform has been enacted by five states this year, but the extent of meaningful improvement is in dispute.

Although all five laws are referred to by supporters as "no-fault" insurance plans only one or two deserve the label in the estimation of many no-fault advocates.

The others, according to these critics, will do little or nothing to achieve the major no-fault goal of cutting insurance costs by prohibiting damage suits against negligent drivers in the vast majority of car-accident injury cases.

Under the no-fault concept insurance claims are paid without regard to which driver causes an accident. Hospital and medical expenses, lost wages and other tangible losses of each policyholder are covered by his own insurance company rather than by the liability insurance of the driver at fault.

The main issue arising from this year's actions by state Legislatures is whether the high volume of costly and time-consuming litigation can be significantly reduced without restricting the right to sue for damages.

Of the new laws, all effective in January, only those enacted by Florida and Illinois include any such restrictions. The others, enacted by Delaware, South Dakota and Oregon, simply add no-fault coverages to the existing liability system. "Innocent parties" retain full rights to sue for damages.

Advocates of the Delaware, South Dakota and Oregon plans contend that much of the incentive to sue would be removed as a result of the prompt payment of most tangible losses by the policyholder's own insurance company. Most innocent parties, it is argued, would thus be less inclined to file liability claims for intangible "pain and suffering" losses, also known as "general" damages.

The theory is sharply disputed by no-fault advocates as Prof. Robert E. Keeton of the Harvard Law School and Prof. Jeffrey O'Connell of the University of Illinois Law College.

They were co-authors in 1965 of the widely discussed no-fault plan. Keeton predicted that plans of the Delaware-South Dakota-Oregon variety would increase rather than reduce incentives to sue for pain and suffering.

He argued that no-fault coverage, by easing the economic plight of injured motorists through prompt payment of tangible losses, would relieve the pressure on them for seeking liability claims out of court in order to avoid lengthy litigation.

The effect, he said, would be simply to finance the tort liability suits. "States that adopt one of these pseudo no-fault plans," he maintained, "are simply handing higher profits to insurance companies through higher premiums on insurance policies."

Keeton described the Florida and Illinois laws as "scaled-down no-fault plans" that "might work," at least for a few years. His main objection to them was that the no-fault coverage might not be high enough to eliminate significant numbers of liability suits in the long run.

The Florida law provides compulsory no-fault compensation of up to \$5,000 for the driver and each injured passenger or pedestrian. The maximum required to be offered in basic policies under the Illinois law is \$9,800.

None of the five laws complies with all of the guidelines laid down by the Nixon administration in March for insurance reform by the states. The administration is counting on the states to enact no-fault laws and head off passage by Congress of federal no-fault legislation.

The Delaware, South Dakota and Oregon laws do not comply because they preserve full rights to sue for negligent parties for damages. Limitations on no-fault com-

pensation under the Florida and Illinois plans, according to administration officials, do not qualify as "reasonable."

One high official said "reasonable" coverage might be \$100,000 or \$200,000 instead of the \$5,000 and \$9,800 provided respectively by the Florida and Illinois laws.

He noted that the administration, in urging states to enact no-fault laws, had advocated an evolutionary approach, with experimentation in various types of reform.

"Possibly," he commented, "all of the purposes of true no-fault can be achieved without having to face up to philosophical questions of whether we ought to eliminate tort liability claims."

A "true" no-fault system, according to the strictest definition, would do away entirely with the liability concept. The American Insurance Association, whose membership consists of the stock-companies that write about 30 per cent of the country's automobile insurance, advocates such a system but even Keeton and O'Connell have not gone that far.

The Massachusetts no-fault law, in effect since Jan. 1, is commonly described as the country's first. Like the new Florida law, however its no-fault coverage and liability exemptions are modest by comparison with the goals of most no-fault advocates, including the Nixon administration.

Massachusetts provides no-fault coverage of \$2,000 for medical expenses and wage losses. Losses above that level are subject to liability claims. In addition liability suits for pain and suffering may be filed if medical expenses exceed \$500 or if death or specified permanent injury, such as dismemberment or loss of eyesight, result from the accident.

The Florida law, in providing no-fault bodily injury coverage of \$5,000 allows liability suits for losses above that level and for pain and suffering if medical expenses exceed \$1,000. Pain and suffering suits are also allowed for death and specified serious injury.

Although the Illinois law requires insurance companies to offer basic no-fault coverage of \$9,800 for bodily injury, car owners are not required to buy it. Liability suits for pain and suffering are allowed with restrictions on the amount that can be recovered. Recoverable damages may not exceed an amount equal to 50 per cent of the first \$500 of medical expenses and 100 per cent of any medical expenses above \$500.

No-fault bodily injury coverage of \$10,000 for each person is provided by the Delaware law, with a

maximum of \$20,000 payable for any one accident. The South Dakota law provides bodily injury coverage of \$5,120 a person and \$10,000 in death benefits. Oregon provides \$9,000 a person for bodily injury.

The South Dakota law provides the same no-fault coverage as one enacted in 1969 by Minnesota. Only lately has the no-fault label been applied to the Minnesota law.

Melvin L. Stark, vice-president for government affairs of the American Insurance Association, complains that opponents are confusing the issue by trying to stretch the no-fault definition.

"Some insurance interests," he said in an interview, "are alleging

that they have complied with the Department of Transportation objectives for meaningful reform in Illinois and other states. These do not qualify as no-fault plans but only serve to confuse the public and mislead them in terms of accomplishment or savings."

Delaware, Florida, Illinois, and Oregon were among about 30 states where Legislatures considered insurance reform this year. Many of the others created study commissions and several are expected to pass laws in 1971.

#### BEST CARCASS AT WICHITA SHOW

### Statistics Back Arguments Vs. Young Marriage

The Census Bureau has released striking statistical evidence that mother knows best: People who marry young are twice as likely to be divorced as somewhat older couples.

According to a new analysis, the bureau found that within 20 years of

marriage, 28 percent of men who married before the age of 22 had been divorced. This compared with only 13 percent among men who married when they were older.

The figures were almost identical for women. Among those who married before their 20th birthday, 27 percent had been divorced, compared with 14 percent of those who married after.

Census Bureau analysts acknowledge that it is conventional wisdom that young marriages are more likely to end in divorce. But the

striking aspect of the new study, they say, is its showing of the magnitude of the phenomenon.

Unlike other studies measuring the number of marriages and divorces in a given year, the Census Bureau study is regarded as unusual because it covered the whole adult lifetime of those surveyed.

The analysis recently completed is based on a 1967 survey of 28,000 households in 701 select counties encompassing every state.

Other findings include the following:

- The divorce rate for young marriages is even higher among black couples than white. Within 20 years, divorce resulted in 46 percent of marriages involving black men under 22 and 47 percent of those involving black women under 20.

- A single white woman's probability of getting married reached a peak between the ages of 22 and 24. At those ages, 26 of every

100 single women surveyed were wed each year. After age 24, the probability drops sharply. Among black women, the chances were about the same for all ages between 20 and 29.

- During the first two years of marriage, the presence of a child doubled the chances of divorce — probably because many such children followed premarital pregnancies and the consequent "weakness of the marriage ties."

- The chances of divorce were twice as high among men who made less than \$8,000 than among those who made more. Similarly, the chances of remarriage improved proportionately with higher income.

- Men were more than twice as likely to remarry during the first five years following divorce than later. Overall, according to other census data, about three-fourths of all divorced men and three-fifths of divorced women eventually

remarry.

- Men were somewhat more likely than women to remarry in any year. The odds for men were 17 in 100, for women 13 in 100. The study found that the chances of remarriage were particularly high among men who were poorer than five years.

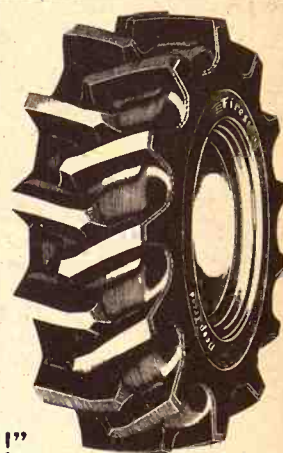

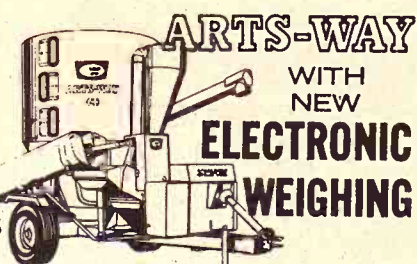

on a hill northeast of Manhattan, the  
4-H'ers were able to watch prairie  
chickens put on their famous early-  
morning dancing exhibition.  
(Henderson says male prairie  
chickens have been known to return  
to a particular area over a period of  
years to dance during the mating  
season.)

Next year the group will plant and  
take care of trees in a Manhattan  
park, pick up cans for recycling, and  
gather trash in the Casement Road  
and Griffith Drive areas.

The eight club members in the  
conservation project exhibited  
notebooks at the county fair, with  
topics ranging from hunting and  
fishing regulations to pollution. Six  
of the books received purple ribbons,  
one rated blue, and one red.

The conservation project partic-  
ipants went on three field trips,  
spotting deer, coyotes, a badger,  
rabbits, a beaver dam, and beaver  
cuttings. They also identified tracks.

Mrs. Dellen said other adults who  
have worked with the ecology-  
minded youths are Dr. Clyde  
Ferguson, Brian Gleason, and

### K.C. Corporation Out Of Large Colorado Ranch

Add another sign that the big corporations which foresaw farming and ranching as a way to future profits are backing out.

Oppenheimer Industries, a Kansas City-based firm which had gotten into farming in a big way in the past 15 years, has sold a large ranch which spanned into both Colorado and Wyoming.

The price reportedly was nearly \$1 million. Buyers were two dentists and their financial advisor.

The ranch originally was acquired by Oppenheimer Industries, Inc., in 1958, and later assigned to the Armendaris Land Development Corporation, an affiliate of the Oppenheimer firm. Both companies have their headquarters in Kansas City.

It was sold as an investment to dentists in Texas and Chicago and their adviser. The property consisting of 50,000 acres of deeded and leased acreage is the Baggs Livestock Ranch of Baggs, Wyo. About two-thirds of the land is in long-term leases from the Bureau of Land Management.

Ronald Jarvis, Jr., president of Oppenheimer Industries, said the move was part of the Armendaris plan to divest itself of ranch lands and concentrate on property more immediately suitable for development. Several other ranch

properties also are to sold, Jarvis said.

of the largest landowners in New Mexico, California and other Western states. It also owns more than 600,000 square feet in urban Kansas City.

"Generally, we will sell property which appears to be a long way from immediate development possibilities," Jarvis said.

The Baggs ranch currently carries 1,200 head of commercial Hereford cattle and is operated as a cow-calf

enterprise. It also has significant mineral rights. There is some natural gas production on the property. It also is believed to contain oil and uranium deposits.

Management of the operation for the new owners will continue to be the responsibility of Oppenheimer Industries here. The Kansas City firm has arranged a lease with Colorado-Wyoming ranching interests for the continued maintenance of the present cow herd.

The history of the ranch goes back

October 19, 1971

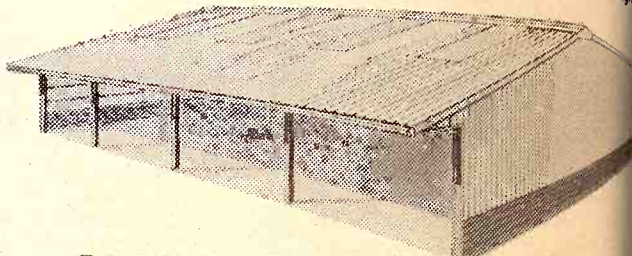
to the days of the Old West. In earlier days the ranch was in sporadic violence as local chers struggled for possession of federal and state lands and rights. When it acquired ownership in late 1950s, Oppenheimer found it necessary to station an armed cowboy at the main head gate to assure the flow of to the ranch's hay meadows.

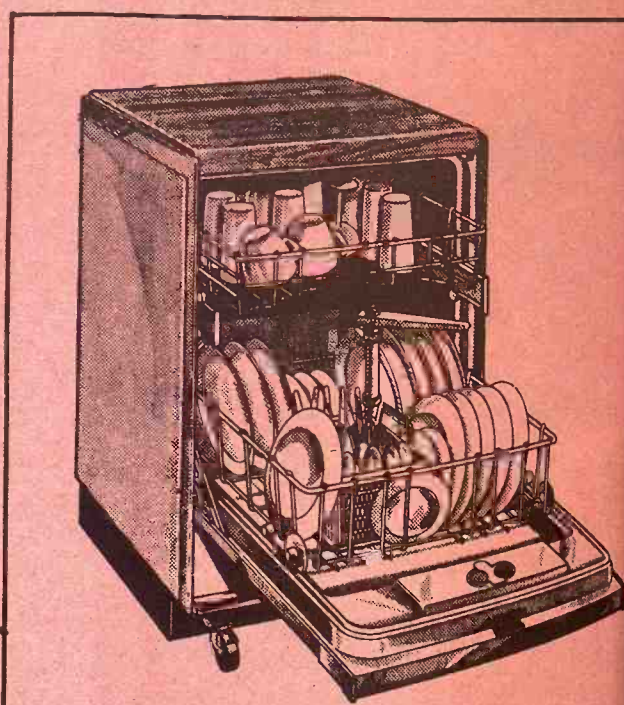
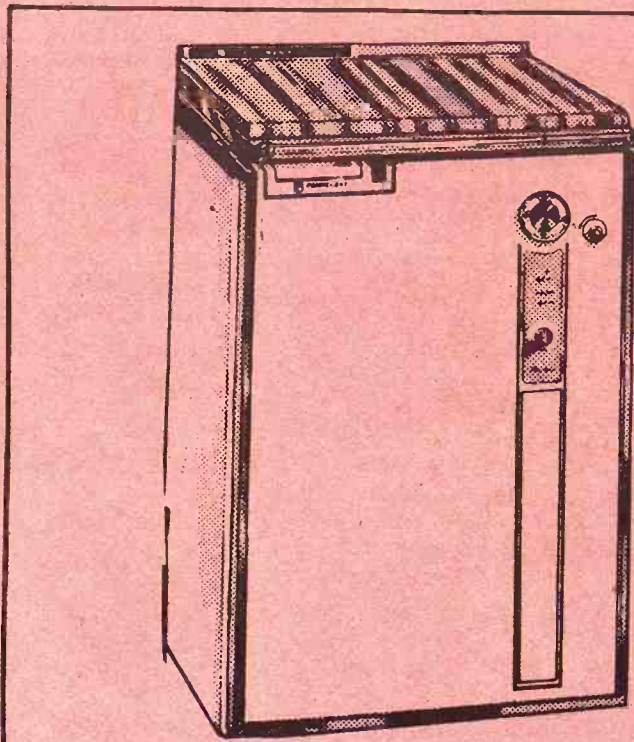

# Crop Forecast Spells Out Glutting Fall Harvest

Large production of major fall crops in Kansas indicated on October 1 combined with this year's bumper wheat crop to make 1971 a bumper crop year for the State, according to the Kansas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service.

The preliminary crop production index for Kansas in 1971 is 150 percent of the 1957-59 base, compared with 128 last year and the previous record high of 140 percent set in 1969.

Prospective sorghum grain production of 219 million bushels is one-fifth above the previous record high set in 1969.

Corn production is expected to total 110 million bushels, the highest since 1932.

Expected production of nearly 20 million bushels of soybeans in 1971 is third largest on record for Kansas and 5.1 million tons of hay fourth highest.

Row crops matured rapidly during September and early harvest operations were considerably ahead of usual progress on October 1.

Seeding of the 1972 Kansas wheat crop started rather slowly in early September because of dry surface soils, but speeded up after rains the latter part of the month.

About three-fifths of the State's expected acreage was in the ground October 1, only a little behind

average.

Most of the early seeded wheat was up to good stand, but in many areas subsoil moisture is still lacking and rain will be needed to assure good fall growth.

## Milo Output

On October 1 sorghum grain production was forecast at 219,132,000 bushels, about one-half larger than last year's crop.

Yield per acre was rather variable but for the State is expected to average 54 bushels, second only to the high of 56 bushels in 1969.

Excellent yields on early fields and on irrigated acreage more than off-set some fair to poor dryland yields in drouth damaged areas.

Frost in the latter part of September in northwestern areas hurt some sorghums and late field in southwestern Kansas could still be damaged by premature freezes.

## Corn Production

Corn grain production is expected to total 110,124,000 bushels, 38 percent above last year and the highest since 1932.

Corn yield per acre is indicated at 84 bushels per acre, 9 bushels above the previous record set in 1968.

Excellent yields on many early planted fields and fine prospects on this year's increased irrigated acreage more than offset some drouth damage to late dryland

fields.

Nearly one-fifth of the corn acreage had some degree of Southern Corn Leaf Blight this year but lateness of infection and dry late summer weather kept damage mostly light.

## Other Crops

Soybean production of 19,668,000 bushels was indicated on October 1, much larger than last year's 15,075,010 bushels, but well below the record crop of 23,925,000 bushels in 1968.

The expected yield per acre of 22 bushels was a little less than a month earlier but 7 bushels above last year. Late soybeans that survived the summer dry spell were helped by September rains but will need a full growing season to mature.

Sugar beet production is estimated at 640,000 tons, moderately below the 706,000 tons for 1970.

Production of all hay is estimated at 5,096,000 tons, nearly one-fourth above last year and the State's fourth largest crop. The alfalfa hay output was indicated at 3,150,000 tons, 22 percent above last year and all other hay production of 1,946,000 tons was up 29 percent.

## Pasture Feed

The October 1 pasture feed condition was 73 percent of normal, slightly above the same date last year, but considerably below the 1960-69 average of 81 percent.

Dry late summer weather reduced available grass in many grazing areas.

Rains late in the month improved prospects for late fall grazing and wheat pasture. Only a limited amount of volunteer wheat was currently available for grazing.

## Farm Wage Rates

Wage rates paid to farm workers on October 1 increased from a year earlier.

Farm wage rates paid by the month with house (no meals) averaged \$354.00 compared with \$338.00 a year ago, while monthly rates with board and room averaged

\$273.00 compared with \$256.00 on October 1 last year.

Daily wage rates with board and room averaged \$11.80, up 50 cents from the previous year while daily rates without board and room averaged \$14.90, up 30 cents from a year earlier.

Hourly farm wage rates averaged \$1.74, up 9 cents from October 1, 1970.

The ordinance providing for the curfew was passed at the Oct. 4 commission meeting.

Beseau said youngsters under 16 are allowed on the streets after 10:30 p.m. only if accompanied by a parent or guardian or if they are on their way to or from home, authorized places of entertainment (such as school functions) or employment.

Violation of the ordinance is punishable by a fine of \$10 to \$100, up to three months in jail, or both.

## Can You 'Eyeball' Forage Quality

As a dairy farmer, how many times have you looked at some of your hay and silage and wondered just how good they were?

Or looked at shelled corn from a new hybrid variety you had fertilized a little heavier than usual and wondered how much protein it contained?

If you have been in the dairy business long and are concerned about the efficiency of your feeding program, this is a familiar situation to you, suggests Ralph Bonewitz, Extension dairyman at Kansas State University.

"You know that feed quality varies with the crop, the amount of lime and fertilizer applied, the season, the stage of cutting, the preservation, and storage methods," Bonewitz explains.

"Using this information you can make what is known as an 'eyeball' estimate of the feed quality by looking at it, smelling it, and feeling it.

"Your experiences, however, probably back up the fact that at best this is only an estimate, and not

a very good one at that."

Are there more accurate ways of estimating feed quality? The answer is yes, says Bonewitz.

Have a chemical analysis run on your feeds. While this may not be 100 percent accurate, data have clearly shown that it is more accurate than

any system of visual estimation. After chemical analysis has been run, use the information to properly balance your rations.

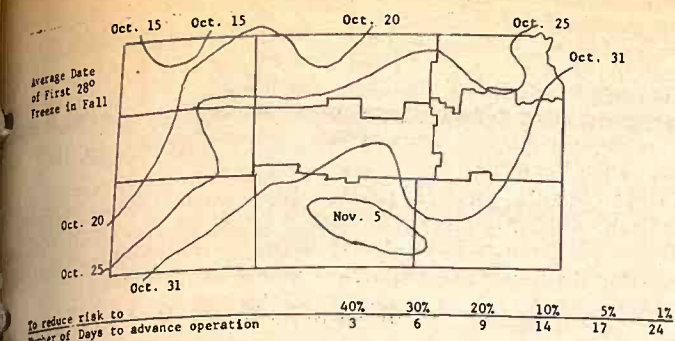

**USDA Sees Red China As Farm Market**  
The Agriculture Department says there is a possibility of U.S. farmers selling wheat and cotton to Red China in the next few years if the Chinese continue current trade patterns.  
A major problem, said a report, is a similarity of farm crops produced by the United States and China. The difference is that China does not consistently produce enough for its own use and has to import some major items.

production totaled between 210 million and 220 million tons, possibly still a record.

Washenko said the success or failure of China's agricultural policy for expanding production can have a bearing on world farm trade, keeping in mind the following qualifications:

"First, while China's potential appetite for Western goods is excellent, its present international trade is small. Total trade in 1970—exports plus imports—has been estimated at about \$4 billion."

That total trade compares with \$7.8 billion worth of U.S. farm exports alone last year.

"Second," Washenko said, "both China and the United States are among the world's largest producers of temperate-zone agricultural products, although China does import considerable quantities of wheat, cotton and wool."

"Third, the Chinese economy is not consumer oriented. China is a developing economy, and its import trade emphasizes acquisition of capital equipment and other materials necessary for industrialization."

Washenko said China's present buying pattern, including imports of wheat and cotton, is expected to continue through the 1970s.

"Although China's over-all farm output is large, the portion available for sales abroad is usually small," Washenko said. "This means, in turn, that China can afford to import only limited quantities of foreign goods unless it is willing to have a trade deficit."

Premier Chou En-lai recently put Red China's 1970 grain production at a record 240 million tons. Washenko said U.S. analysts, however, believe

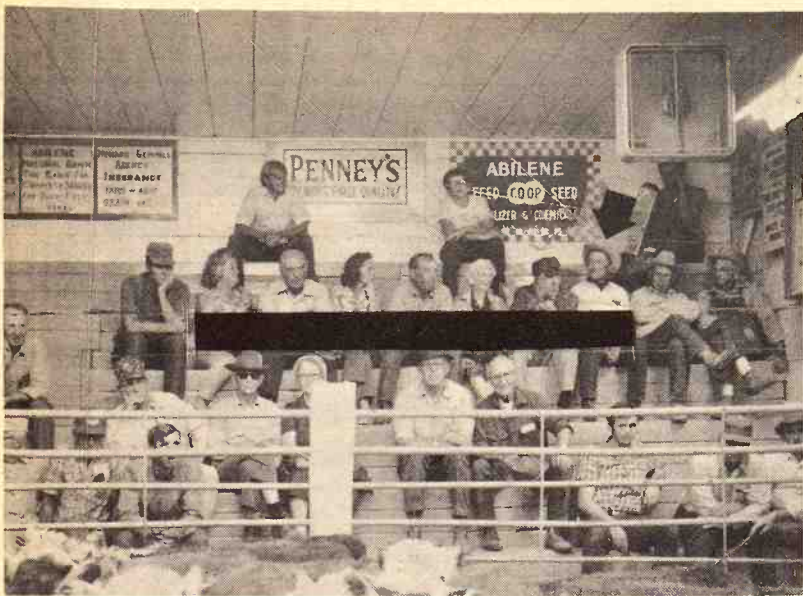

## Not All Churches Back Prayer Amendment

The 42-member executive council of the United Church of Christ has voted unanimously in Wichita to oppose the bill supporting "prescribed prayer" in public schools now before the U.S. House of Representatives.

In doing so, the 2 million member denomination becomes the first national religious body to formally oppose the proposed constitutional amendment (House Joint Resolution 191), expected to come before the House in November. The amendment is an attempt to override Supreme Court decisions declaring prayer reading in public schools unconstitutional.

The resolution called attention to the fact that the Supreme Court has affirmed the freedom of schools to include the study of religion in their curricula.

The proposed amendment reads, "Nothing contained in this Constitution shall abridge the right of persons lawfully assembled in any public building . . . to participate in nondenominational prayer."

The UCC resolution based its opposition to the bill on the need for "scrupulous fairness" to people of all religious convictions. The responsibility for religious education and worship, said the council, lies primarily at home and in the church.

"The UCC strongly supports efforts of schools to increase and improve the teaching of moral values and the appreciation of the role of religion in the development of our heritage," said the executive council statement.

The proposed constitutional amendment was bottled up in the House Judiciary Committee from 1963 until early this month, when proponents obtained enough signatures to bring it to the floor of the House.

The UCC executive council, which conducts the business of the United Church of Christ between biennial meetings of its General Synod, held its annual fall meeting in Wichita last week.

## Farm Bureau Favor On Phase II Anti-Inflation

President Nixon's latest moves to control inflationary pressures were commended by William J. Kuhfuss, president of the American Farm Bureau Federation.

But the president of the nation's largest general farm organization added that Congress and the Federal Reserve Board "must move vigorously to back up the president's leadership by adopting local and monetary policies which will cut off inflationary pressures at their source."

Kuhfuss said President Nixon's establishment of wage and price boards was "made imperative by the need to impose discipline on the monopoly power of labor unions and those industries which have the ability to offset higher labor costs through administered prices for their products."

Farmers, Kuhfuss said, "are victims of inflation. We are seeing our incomes lowered by deflation in the prices we receive and inflation in the prices we pay."

"Prices received by farmers have dropped two percent since the wage-price freeze was initiated on August 8," he said. "Farm parity, the measuring stick of how well farmers are doing in relation to the rest of the economy, has fallen two points in a month and is the lowest since the depression days of 1933. At the same time the government's index of prices paid by farmers has risen to the highest level in history."

"Many of our current economic problems are the result of the undisciplined monopoly power of labor unions. This economic power has been used to increase wage rates in excess of gains in productivity. The resulting higher cost levels create economic problems domestically and reduce our competitive position in world trade, as indicated by our current unfavorable balance of trade. The exercise of monopolistic economic power—whether it is by industry, labor, agriculture, or government—is a threat to the maintenance of the competitive enterprise system."

The Farm Bureau president said Congress must reduce inflationary pressures by reducing the federal deficit. The Federal Reserve Board, he added, must keep a tight rein on monetary policy if further inflation is to be avoided.

"Wage and price boards," Kuhfuss said, "can call attention to the problem of inflation, but past experience proves conclusively that wage and price controls treat the symptoms of inflation rather than its cause. Unless something is done to deal with the root causes of inflation, we can expect a recurrence of the inflationary pressures which prompted current emergency actions."

Kuhfuss said "President Nixon's portable loading choker and other company creation of a huge general bureaucracy to enforce controls is encouraging evidence of

the President's dedication to the American competitive enterprise system.

"We hope," he concluded, "that the President's efforts to control inflation will bear fruit in the coming months and that the new economic controls can be lifted promptly."

## Can't Compete With Free Bus

JUNCTION—Implementation of free bus service at Ft. Riley has

caused indefinite suspension of local bus service from Junction City to the Custer Hill area of Ft. Riley.

"Service has been suspended until we find out what Ft. Riley is going to do," said Coleman Bruce, Junction City, president of the Junction City-Ft. Riley-Manhattan Transportation Co.

"The commanding general and others in authority are now in Germany and we're awaiting their return before deciding what we'll do. If their buses continue to run, ours won't," he added.

Local bus service between Junction City and Manhattan, via Ft. Riley, was discontinued by the Junction City firm several months ago. The Junction City-Custer Hill run was resumed at the request of the Army according to Bruce.

# Big Stakes In Foreign Farm Trade

U.S. farmers have big stakes in the international trade game now being played by the leading nations of the world. Foreign trade provides farmers with markets for agricultural products and sources of farm supplies and equipment.

During the fiscal year 1970-71 (ended last June 30) exports of U.S. agricultural products were valued at \$7.8 billion. This amount was an increase of 15 percent from the year before—and it was 14 percent larger than the previous record set in 1966-67. Two-thirds of the 15-percent gain

from 1969-70 was due to greater volume, and one-third was due to higher prices for the commodities that were exported.

All of the gain in agricultural exports in 1970-71 was in commercial sales for dollars. Such sales brought in about \$6.8 billion, \$1.1 billion more than during the year before. The value of farm products exported under government-financed programs held steady at about \$1 billion.

Large Share of Crops Exported  
Foreign buyers took a large share

of every major crop, or the production of about one acre out of every four acres harvested. Foreign markets took more than half of our output of soybeans, wheat, and rice; over one-third of our tobacco and cotton; and one-fourth of the corn sold by farmers.

Exports of soybeans during 1970-71 totaled 421 million bushels. In addition, overseas buyers took about 4.3 million tons of soybean meal from our mills, and 1.8 billion pounds of soybean oil. About 180 million bushels of soybeans were required to produce the meal and oil that were exported. Thus exports of beans, meal, and oil were equivalent to 601 million bushels of soybeans, or 53 percent of the crop harvested in 1970.

Exports of corn during the year amounted to 507 million bushels—despite the corn blight. Foreign buyers also bought about \$58 million worth of corn products from our mills. The exports of corn alone took about 12½ percent of the crop harvested last fall, and probably more than 25 percent of the corn sold by farmers.

## Imports Increase

Imports of agricultural products in 1970-71 were valued at \$5.8 billion, up from \$5.6 billion in 1969-70. Of these imports, \$3.7 billion were competitive with U.S. farm products, and \$2.1 billion were noncompetitive. The principal competitive items were meats, valued at \$1.0 billion, and sugar, valued at \$750 million. The leading noncompetitive agricultural import was as usual, coffee, valued at \$1.2 billion.

Farmers also have a vital interest in imports of essential materials used in producing farm supplies and equipment for example, much of the material in farm machinery, trucks, and automobiles is obtained from foreign suppliers, as is the fuel used in tractors, trucks, crop dryers, and farm homes. Costs of many items used in farm production and family living would be increased if imports are restricted.

#### USDA Hangs Head Over DES Statement

The Agriculture Dept. has said it made an "inexcusable" error in telling Congress and the public that laboratory tests disclosed no residues of a cancer-causing growth hormone in beef from cattle that had eaten feed containing the substance.

"We are conducting a thorough investigation and will pinpoint responsibility for this gross malpractice," Assistant Secretary Richard E. Lyng said in a letter to Sen. William Proxmire, D-Wis.

"When we have all of the facts we will consider what level of punitive personnel action is warranted, and action will be taken," Lyng said.

But Proxmire and Lyng disagreed about whether new controls put by the Agriculture Dept. on uses on the synthetic hormone, diethylstilbestrol, are adequate to protect the public.

The senator said the government, which has barred DES from chicken feed, now should ban it from livestock feed, as do 21 other nations.

"will provide more than adequate protection."

The error conceded by Lyng occurred in an Aug. 31 letter in which he told Proxmire that the testing laboratories of the department's Consumer and Marketing Service had uncovered no evidence of DES in any beef samples tested in the first six months of 1971. The last test report at that time dealt with 3,000 carcasses.

On Oct. 8, however, the department admitted DES residues had been found in seven to 10 beef carcasses before June 30. The Food and Drug Administration indicated the disclosure had been delayed until initial findings could be confirmed.

Neither the department nor the FDA, however, had hinted at the initial findings, although on Sept. 15 Rep. L. H. Fountain, D-N.C., chairman of the House Intergovernmental Relations subcommittee, asked the department about reports that DES residues had been found. He had no reply as of Oct. 8.

Proxmire told Lyng the new rules "suffer from the same defects as the old" because they rely upon voluntary compliance. In hearings in March, the department admitted to the Fountain subcommittee that it was testing less than 1 per cent of beef carcasses for DES.

## Beekeeper, Minnesota Cattleman Get National FFA Honors

Minnesota cattleman and a beekeeper were named America's two top young farmers last week at the 44th annual convention of the Future Farmers of America.

Lonney Eastvold, 22 years old, operates an extensive beef herd in Hartland, Minn., and was named the 1971 Star American Farmer. Named Agribusinessman was Wayne Robert Morris, 19, manager of the California Division of Morris in Fullerton, Calif.

Selection of the winners in the

Municipal Auditorium drew thunderous applause from thousands of Future Farmers who packed the auditorium.

"I feel that I'm very fortunate to have accomplished what I have in the past year," Eastvold said. "I'm looking forward to achieving some of the goals which I've set for the future."

The Star Farmer owns and operates two farms where he maintains 130 head of Angus cattle and 180 acres of cropland.

Morris, an experienced beekeeper has increased average honey

production at his apiary from 68 pounds to 117 pounds a hive and his average wax production at his bee colonies has almost doubled.

"My father is about ready to retire and I will be taking over his 1,600 colonies in the near future," Morris said. "I have 500 colonies and I plan to also acquire another producer's operation in Montana that would give me a total operation of 5,000 colonies."

## Mercury Scare Exaggerated

Recent scares over mercury levels in fish and fishing waters may have been exaggerated.

Some researchers say the scare was based on "emotionalism and ignorance." That's what they said at the annual meeting of the American Public Health Assn. at Minneapolis, Minn.

The report said mercury levels in human tissues have actually declined, based on analyses of tissues taken from human organs at autopsy between 1913 and 1970 and preserved at the University of Michigan.

One of the researchers, Dr. Jack Kevorkian, said the Food and Drug Administration was unrealistic in setting standards of 5 parts per million of mercury in fish as the greatest level that should be allowed.

There are no data to support such a standard, he said, and added that it is based on "emotionalism and ignorance." Sweden permits a level twice as high, he noted.

The study found that the level of

mercury in human tissue, which ranged upward to 34 parts per million, does not remain constant but reaches peaks in early childhood and again in middle age, indicating that it does not accumulate in the body. Tissues were studied from persons ranging in age from the newborn to 81 years.

The researchers also found that there was "an extraordinary degree in mercury content in almost all organs studied, sharper in the early decades of this century, leveling off recently."

"The facts indicate a gratifying cleansing of the environment, or the absolute reverse of recent 'scare' pronouncements which led to such inexcusable panic actions on the part of authorities who had no factual knowledge for truly sound judgement," the authors stated.

They speculated that one reason for the mercury decline was the drastic reduction in use of coal for fuel. Coal smoke has been found to contain mercury.

## Allow An Extra Game To Test 12 Ft. Baskets

An experimental program has been approved for Kansas high school basketball teams for the purpose of furnishing information on the effects of increasing the height of baskets to 12 feet.

The board of directors of the Kansas High School Activities Association has voted to permit senior high schools in the state to participate in one additional basketball game during the 1971-72 season as part of an experiment

sanctioned by the National Basketball Rules Committee of the United States and Canada.

During these research games, the baskets will be elevated to 12 feet and the current rules against goal tending, basket interference and dunking will be disregarded.

The current height of baskets is 10 feet.

Kansas high schools desiring to participate in the experiment may do so with the approval of the activities association. All experimental games are to be played on a Saturday night, with profits to be divided equally between the two participating schools. After the end of the season a detailed report will be filed by the activities association

with the National Basketball Committee.

Bruce Durbin, executive secretary of the activities association, and a member of the rules committee, said it is generally believed by the rules committee and other individuals involved in the administration of basketball at the high school and collegiate level that many of the problems in officiating are created by calls involving goal tending, basket interference and dunking. Such decisions result in awarding or taking away points.

Durbin said that before the rules committee can give serious consideration to any recommendations on changing the height of the baskets, research with the elevated

baskets is necessary to show the effects on all phases of the game.

Schools participating in the program would be able to play a 17th regular season game. Normally they are limited to a maximum of 16.
