Soybean Sugar Beet Crops Set For Records

The Kansas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service says the state's soybean and sugar beet crops are expected to set

production records this year. Total crop production is expected to be higher than 1967 and higher than the average.

The reporting service said the wheat crop is expected to be the largest since 1961 and the corn crop is expected to be the largest since 1950.

Kansas wheat production is estimated at 254.31 million bushels, 15 per cent above last year and 22 per cent above average. The average yield of 25.5 bushels an acre is 3.5 bushels above average and the highest yield since 1961.

Sumner County ranked first in wheat production, followed by Reno and McPherson Counties.

Sorghum grain production was forecast at 160.27 million bushels, seven per cent more than last year and 23 per cent above average. The projected yield of 47 bushels an acre is up one bushel from 1967 and five bushels above average.

The anticipated production of corn is 78.62 million bushels, 9 per cent more than last year and 32 per cent above average. The projected yield of 72 bushels an acre establishes a record high yield, four bushels above last year's yield per acre.

Barley production is estimated at 3.70 million bushels, nearly double last year's crop but about half of an average crop.

The oat crop of 7.66 million bushels was 32 percent above last year but four per cent below average.

Both the 1968 barley yield of 37 bushels an acre and the oat yield of 41 bushels an acre are records.

Soybean production is forecast at 22.70 million bushels, surpassing all previous outputs. An average yield of 25 bushels an acre, 2.5 bushels an acre more than last year, is anticipated.

Production of all kinds of hay is expected to total 4.45 million tons, about an average size crop.

Sugar beet production indicated a record high of 624,000 tons.

Meat Imports Over Quota?

A projection of meat imports into the U.S. for the balance of 1968 by American National Cattlemen's Ass'n. predicts that the quota set under 1964 law will be exceeded for the first time.

This calculation brought an urgent letter from President Bill House of ANCA to Secretary of Agriculture Orville Freeman calling for immediate attention to plan for curtailment of meat imports before the "triggering point" is reached.

House, Cedar Vale, Kans., rancher, said that for the first time six months of 1968 there were 457 million pounds (product weight) imported subject to the Meat Import Act of 1964.

Using the import figures by quarters for the years 1964-67, House said, "we find that the average percentage breakdown by quantities by calendar quarter are: First quarter, 22.5 per cent; second quarter, 23.8 per cent; third quarter, 28.1 per cent; and fourth quarter, 25.5 per cent."

The ANCA president pointed out these figures show that during those four years an average of 46.4 per cent of the meat imports subject to PL88-482 arrived in the six months prior to July 1. This leaves a balance averaging 53.6 per cent to come in during the last six months.

Applying these averages to 1968, he said based upon the 457 million pounds received in the first six months, "we can expect a total for 1968 of 985 million pounds. This is about 25 million pounds over the quota of 950.3 million pounds announced by you on Jan. 1, 1968, and only 60 million pounds under the trigger point as called for in the Meat Import Law."

Feed Industry Raises Funds To Modernize Research Mill

The nation's feed industry, which 15 years ago raised nearly half a million dollars in equipment and funds to establish Kansas State University's pilot feed mill and other feed technology facilities, now is raising funds for an extensive modernization of these facilities.

According to Dr. William Hoover, head of K-State's department of grain science and industry, preliminary plans for the modernization have been completed and sufficient money and equipment is on hand to begin work, although additional donations of equipment and money will be needed to complete the project as planned. Budget for the proposed improvements will run more than \$300,000, including money and equipment.

Construction of a feed mill warehouse is to begin within a month, while major equipment installation should be underway by mid-winter.

"Modernization of the mill has been made necessary by the rapid change in the feed industry in the past 15 years," Hoover says. "The present mill modernization is being planned to present both current industry practices and the best current thinking of industry leaders on projected foreseeable requirements and changes over the next five to ten years."

A special Feed Technology Advisory Committee headed by Dr. Richard Eaton, St. Louis, suggested two years ago that the department take a serious look at modernizing the mill. Since then extensive planning has been underway involving numerous committees of industry and university personnel.

Coordination of the various subcommittees has been directed by a committee headed by Vernon Hayes, Fort Worth. Dr. Harry Pfost and Dr. Charles Deyoe of the department of grain science and industry have represented the University, while industry representatives have included Gerald Karstens, Chicago; Eric Carlson, St. Louis; and Phil Murray, Minneapolis.

Hoover says that as soon as there is determination of equipment to be used, engineers will draw final working plans and specifications and construction will begin. Much of the new equipment is expected to be donated by feed mill equipment manufacturers. The fund drive for the remodeling has been conducted by the Feed Technology Advisory Committee headed by Dr. Eaton.

The KSU pilot feed mill has four primary purposes: instruction and demonstration in the feed technology curriculum; production of experimental and maintenance feeds used in KSU nutritional research; special study by graduate students; and pilot plant research for feed industry projects.

The mill includes equipment for receiving, grinding, flaking, continuous and batch mixing, pelleting and bagging. Provision will be made for an experimental area which will permit many different equipment arrangements and the flexibility to operate several experimental systems simultaneously.

The modernized mill will be able to produce all types of feed including mash; pellets; cubes; and molassified, extruded and crimped products. Past production of the mill has been approximately 1,000 tons a year and feed production is expected to increase with the addition of flaked products.

Feed can be made by either conventional weigh hopper with batch mixer, volumetric simultaneous proportioning of ingredients with batch mixer, or continuous volumetric proportioning to a continuous mixing system.

Material handling equipment is either drag flight conveyors with self-cleaning elevators or self-cleaning pneumatic conveying systems. Dual systems, both pneumatic and mechanical, are provided so that comparisons can be made under controlled conditions to determine shrink-

age, separation and other factors.

The mill includes equipment for receiving, grinding, flaking, continuous and batch mixing, pelleting and bagging. Provision will be made for an experimental area which will permit many different equipment arrangements and the flexibility to operate several experimental systems simultaneously.

Dr. Pfost says the mill layout was planned for good material flow patterns and with particular emphasis on avoiding cross contamination. Provision has been made for dust control to permit good house-keeping. Facilities also are being provided for research on biological contamination control, such as control of salmonella.

Alternative items in the proposed layout modernization include punch card batching, automatic continuous mixing, pressure cooking, flaking rolls, instrumentation including recorders for temperature and humidity monitoring, and special proportioning equipment. The incorporation of these systems will depend on donations or loans of specific equipment by industry, plus funds available. Pfost said space and utility provisions will be made so that these installations can be made at a later time, if necessary.

Indian Splurge With Oklahoma Land Checks

CLINTON, OKLA. — The federal government paid Cheyenne-Arapahoe Indians 15 mil-

ion dollars last week and almost forced Western Oklahoma bankers to close their doors.

The money — paid by check — was for land their grandparents left reluctantly in the late 1800s. Much of the money, which arrived this month, went for motorcycles, used cars, tape recorders and alcohol.

Banks ran short of cash and sent out of town for more money. Some refused to cash checks unless the Indians would deposit part of their money. One store sold 50 bicycles and about that many tricycles.

The Indians received about \$2,300 each for their share of land the government bought for five cents an acre in the late 19th century.

The big impact in Oklahoma was at Clinton, Hammond, Seiling, Taloga, Arapaho, Elk City, Canton and Watonga.

A department store manager said, "We've sold a jillion tape recorders. They use them in pow wows and church work."

One official said, "It has boosted sales in the area, used car dealers, furniture stores. It all helps, the money changing hands. I would say the liquor stores and beer joints did all right especially."

One merchant in Elk City said he cashed a check for one of the Indians and the bank was so low he had to accept \$1,000 in \$5 bills.

In Clinton, a bank official said, "We went through over \$13,000 in \$20 bills in the first one and one-half to two hours."

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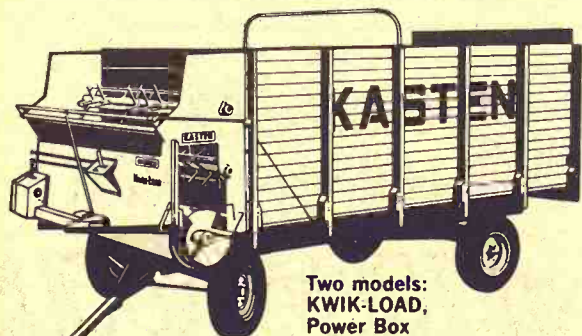
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Dehy Anniversary

The dehydrated alfalfa industry in working in its 35th year since its start in Neodesha, Kans., and Kansas dehydrators are having a peak year, figuring they'll sell some \$9 million worth of the seed this year.

This picture was taken where the industry started in the 1930s, at Neodesha, where W. J. Small, now of Phoenix, Arizona, applied dehydrating techniques to alfalfa. Small later spread operations to Wichita and then to Nebraska, which now produces about 40 per cent of the nation's dehy production.

Archer-Daniels-Midlands bought the Small operation in 1952 but sold it to Kansas-Nebraska Natural Gas Co. of Hastings, Nebr., this year. K-N, a major supplier of gas to the industry, bought the A-D-M facilities, as part of a diversification program. They have 11 of the 67 plants in Kansas. The K-N plants, under the name of Western Alfalfa, have plants at Douglass, Lawrence, Marion, Mt. Hope and Neodesha in the G&G area, and storage facilities at Hutchinson, Wellington, and Topeka.

Area Trial Of Hog Artificial Breeding

JUNCTION CITY — The first attempt at artificial breeding of swine in Kansas was made last week on the Geary County farm of Hayes Beck of Junction City.

The project is a cooperative venture between Kansas State University's Extension Service and the Geary County Extension Council.

Semen taken from registered and tested Duroc and Yorkshire boars was shipped by bus to Junction City from Tri-State

Breeders, Crescent, Iowa. It was used to artificially inseminate purebred specific pathogen free hogs raised by Beck.

Wendell Moyer, a KSU professor, was project supervisor. He was assisted by Dr. Guy Kiracofe of the K-State faculty and Geary County agent N. E. Stroud.

Moyer said artificial breeding of swine has been performed in Iowa, Wisconsin and Nebraska. The hogs inseminated here were made to come to heat by synchronizing the weaning of their litters.

Moyer said boar semen can't be frozen as in the case of bulls and must be used within two days after discharge.

"In Iowa, near the source, they experience 70 per cent conception during the first servicing," Moyer said. "It remains to be seen in Geary county."

The results will be known in the first few days of September.

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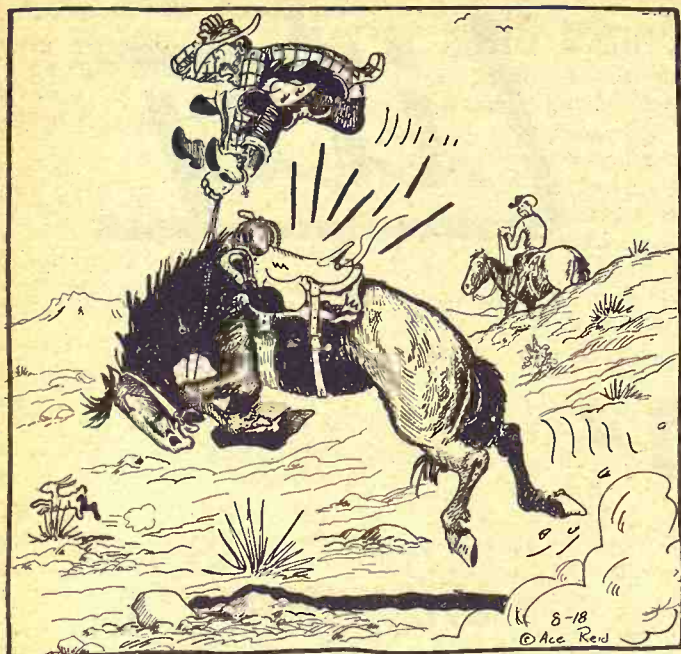
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Feed Handling Conference Set At K-State

Kansas State University will host a conference dealing with handling, storing, and conditioning of feed grain crops here September 9.

The day-long event is designed to keep farmers and elevator operators up to date on latest techniques and equipment for handling feed grains, says Donald D. Pretzer, Extension grain marketing economist who is coordinating the conference. Subject matter presentations will cover such topics as mold growth, toxin formation, food and drug regulations, air pollution, aeration, and grain drying and shrinkage.

A panel of specialists will discuss feed grain problems which affect the farmer, elevator operator, and processor. Panel members and speakers for the event will be announced in the near future.

Fall Slaughter Cattle Outlook: "Reasonably Optimistic"

The outlook for slaughterings The outlook for slaughter cattle prices is reasonably optimistic for the next 30 days. But any price increases will be relatively minor ones.

The market will not be burdened by excessive marketings, says Robert L. Coppersmith, Extension economist at Kansas State University. However, it will pay the cattleman to keep slaughter weights down, he adds.

Number of cattle and calves on feed in 32 states July 1, 1968,

was up 7 percent from a year earlier. Increases from 1967 were recorded at all weights except the "over 1100 pound group" which was down 1 percent.

Most cattle for market during the next 30 to 60 days will be heavier than 900 pounds along with some heifers from the 700- to 900-pound weight groups, says Coppersmith.

Thus, marketings will be up at least 4 percent during the next 60 days. Slaughter will probably not increase by more than 2 percent during the next 30 days when marketings will come primarily from the "over 900-pound weight group."

Coppersmith says high consumer income will absorb this supply and maintain a strong market.

The economist believes the longrun outlook for beef is good. And beef is a bargain, he says.

In 1967, consumers spent an average of 2.5 percent of their disposable income to buy 105 pounds of beef. In 1955, 2.5 percent of the disposable income

purchased only 82 pounds of beef.

Thus, the consumer is getting about 40 percent more beef today for the same fraction of his disposable income.

Grain Futures Hit Low Spot

All deliveries of grains, new crop soybeans, and soybean oil futures declined to season lows last week.

Wheat futures at Chicago dropped to \$1.17½ a bushel on September 1968 delivery, the lowest since July 1942.

Corn, oats, rye and soybeans all had declines.

Selling of futures was touched off by the Government crop report forecasting a record U.S. wheat crop, bumper crops in other grains, and a soybean output of more than 1 billion bushels for the first time.

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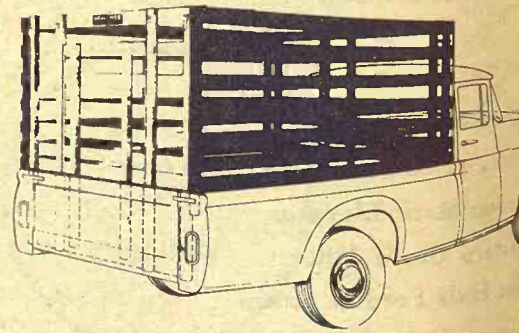
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Hog Prospects Not Unfavorable

The hog market has been performing about as was expected. Prices have been close to year-before levels — \$21 and \$22. Higher in some cases.

Looking ahead, we expect prices to continue near 1967 levels, with a moderate seasonal decline to the level around \$18 or \$19 by November.

Market receipts of hogs usually increase slightly during August, then step up sharply just after Labor Day. A part of this increase in market supplies can be offset by a strengthening demand. The weather usually turns cooler about mid-September, and cooler weather is believed to strengthen the demand for pork.

Judging from the USDA report on Hogs and Pigs, issued in June, the supply of hogs during August and September will be about the same as a year ago, while the number avail-

able for the last three months of the year may be slightly less than in 1967.

In June and July, hog slaughter was very close to the total indicated by the pig and hog survey made at the first of June — shown in the USDA Hogs and Pigs report. (This is the new name for what was previously called the Pig Crop Report).

Last year, hog prices were around \$22 in June and July, \$21 in August, \$19.50 in September, \$18 in October, and \$17 in November and December. If market receipts are no larger than is now indicated, prices during the remainder of this year should average a little higher than in 1967.

The survey made by the USDA about June 1 indicated that farmers would increase sow farrowings by about 2 per cent over last fall. For statisti-

cal purposes, the fall farrowing period runs from June through November. Pigs from these farrowings will make the nation's pork supply during the first half of next year. Thus, we may guess that hog prices will average about the same during the first half of 1969 as in the first half of 1968. That would be around \$19.

Hogs have been good money makers for midwest farmers since pioneer times. They are still our most-profitable livestock enterprise. Profits differ greatly from year to year, but over a period of four years or more, hogs have paid market prices for feed used and other expenses, as well as good wages for the farmer's labor. Better-than-average hog producers also received a good return for their management.

The longer-range outlook for hog producers is fair to good. The hog business is not a spectacular growth industry — like beef and poultry have been. But it is expected to grow about as fast as the population, perhaps 12 to 15 per cent during the next 10 years.

While the industry as a whole will grow, competition will squeeze out many present producers. Possibly as many as half of the farmers who are raising hogs today will quit before 1980.

They will quit for several reasons: (1) Many older farmers will retire or will take it a little easier. (2) It is becoming very difficult for farmers to hire the dependable farm labor that is needed on a modern hog farm. (3) Many younger farmers who are now producing hogs will drop the hog enterprise to concentrate on others or to take off-farm employment.

Learn First Aid For Snake Bites

If a person is bitten by a snake, immediately determine whether the snake was poisonous or non-poisonous.

If the snake was non-poisonous, clean the wound with soap and water or an antiseptic, says Miss Martha Brill, Extension health specialist, Kansas State University, Manhattan. Then immediately report to the doctor.

If the snake is definitely identified as a poisonous species or is unidentified, have the victim lie down at once and remain absolutely quiet.

Kill the snake immediately and keep it. Its identity is necessary before specific antivenim can be given.

As the victim lies quietly, be sure the bitten area is in a position below the level of the heart. Any fear or excitement could be counteracted by reassurance that snake bite is rarely fatal.

Never give alcohol to a snake bite victim.

If the bite is on arm or leg, apply constricting band or tourniquet 2 to 4 inches closer to the heart than the site of the bite.

The slightly tightened tourniquet will usually make the arm or leg bluish in color and make the veins stand out, Miss Brill says. It may also cause the bite to ooze. It shouldn't be so tight that the arm or leg is white.

If you know where you can feel the body pulses, check to see that a pulse is present below the tourniquet.

Loosen the band for 30 to 60 seconds every 15 minutes.

Place an ice pack, if possible, directly over the bite where ever it's located.

Take the victim in a lying-

down position to the doctor. If possible, have someone call ahead to alert the doctor when you will arrive, and ask about antivenim, the antitoxin. The doctor can call for the antivenim, and perhaps have it by the time you arrive.

When you can't possibly get medical attention or advice by telephone, treat as follows:

Sterilize a sharp knife, and apply antiseptic to the skin. Open the wound at the fang marks by making shallow cuts 1/4 inch long in the skin. Let the cut only break the skin and not go deep. Apply suction by mouth or by a suction cup for 30 to 60 minutes.

Most of all, the health specialist concludes, keep the victim comfortable and quiet. You must be calm and reassuring!

Good Year For Truck Farms

Fruit crops in Kansas for 1968 were expected to be the best in three years, according to the Kansas Crop Reporting Service.

Although winter and spring freezes cut the potential fruit production in some areas of the State, a fairly good peach crop is being harvested and apple prospects are excellent.

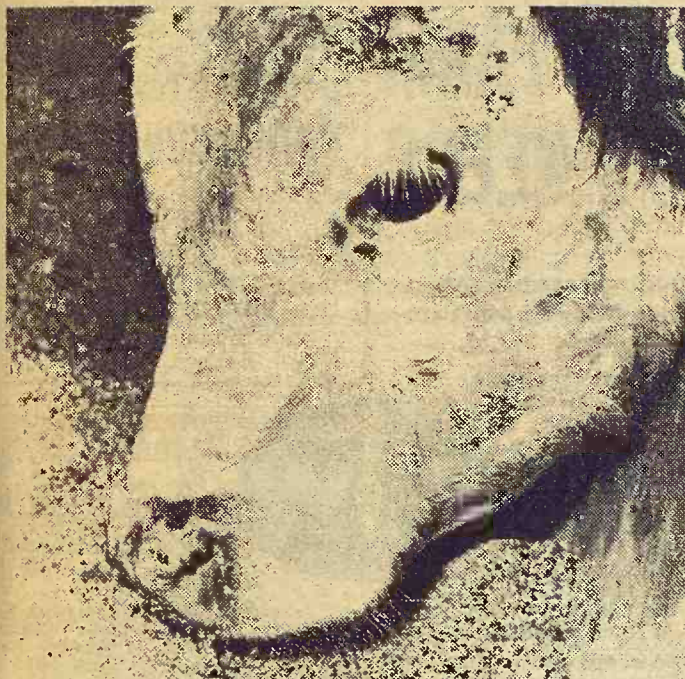
Vegetable crop prospects are mixed with dry bean prospects near record and an above average sweet corn crop, but rather small crops indicated for potatoes, sweetpotatoes and cantaloups.

In most areas moisture has been ample and temperatures to this point have been favorable for promoting good sizing of fruits and vegetables.

Excessively wet weather during July caused some deterioration in the quality of some vegetable crops.

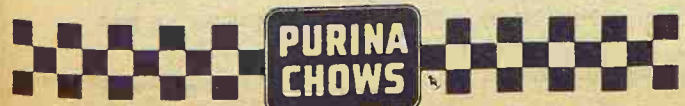

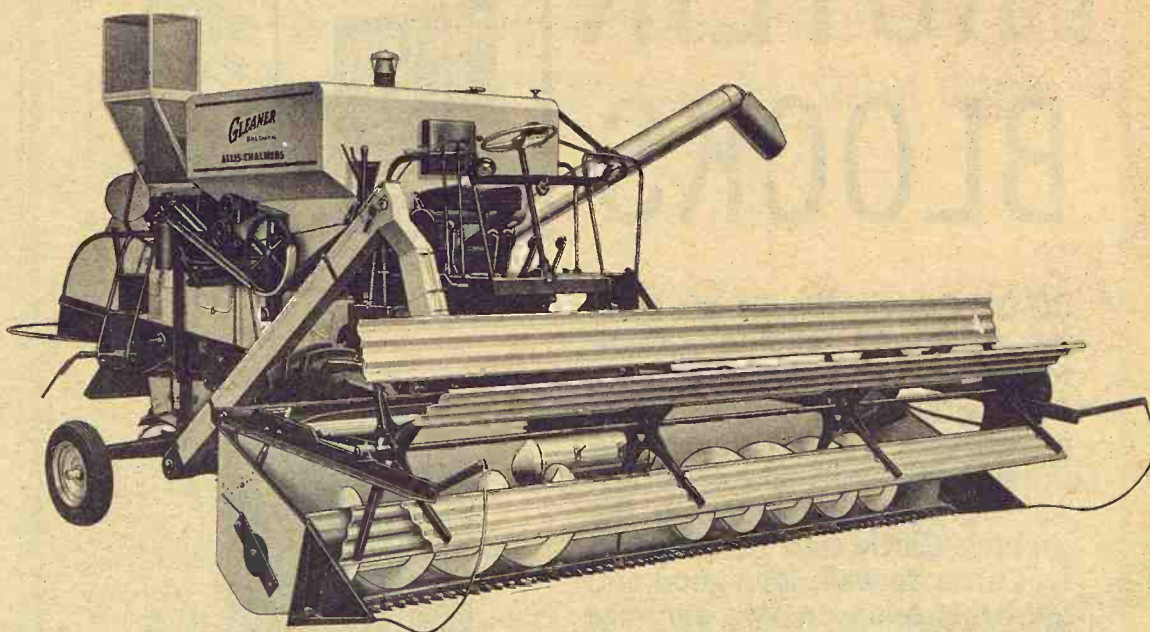

SKILLET COOKIES

2 tablespoons butter or margarine
1 cup pitted dates, finely chopped
1 cup granulated sugar
2 eggs
3 cups Rice Krispies
½ cup chopped nutmeats
confectioners' sugar

Melt butter in heavy fry pan or electric skillet; add dates, granulated sugar and eggs. Cook over low heat, stirring constantly until mixture forms a ball (five to eight minutes). Remove from heat; cool slightly. Stir in Rice Krispies and nutmeats, mixing well. Sprinkle two pieces of waxed paper lightly with confectioners sugar. Shape cookie mixture into two rolls about two inches in diameter; roll in confectioners sugar and wrap in the waxed paper. Chill. To serve, cut into ¼-inch slices.

KENTUCKY NUT BREAD
1½ cups brown sugar

¾ cup shortening
3 eggs
1 teaspoon vanilla
2½ cups flour
2 teaspoons baking powder
1 teaspoon salt
1 cup milk
1½ cups chopped nuts
Beat shortening and sugar for five minutes; add the eggs, vanilla, and mix well. Sift and then measure the flour with the baking powder and salt. Add the dry ingredients alternately with the milk. Mix well. Fold in the chopped nuts, turn into two loaf pans, 9x5x2½ inches. Bake at 325 degrees 50-55 minutes.

Glazed Carrots Good Side Dish For Meals

Glazed carrots make a superb side dish for meat or poultry. To make them, blend 2 tablespoons fat or oil with ¼ cup brown sugar and 1 tablespoon water in a heavy fry pan. Add 2 cups drained cooked carrots that have already been cut into strips.

Cook over low heat, turning several times, until the syrup is very thick and the carrots are well coated — about 15-20 minutes.

Midday Shoe Change Will Help Those Aching Feet

The eight-mile hike you take in an average day will go along more comfortably if you change shoes midway through the day and pamper your feet.

Just as the freshness of a different pair of shoes will make the feet feel better, so will a change of stockings.

For women who wear high heels, a midday shoe change is especially important. Wearing high heels does not use all the muscles in the same way as wearing lower ones. Changing heel heights will avoid or ease muscle strain.

When going outside the home, many women carry a shoe tote

bag containing a pair of low-heeled shoes, especially for long periods of walking or standing. Crepe soles cushion the feet and prevent fatigue.

Calling a halt for yourself before you get overly tired will also promote better foot comfort. During rest periods evaluate your feet for better circulation.

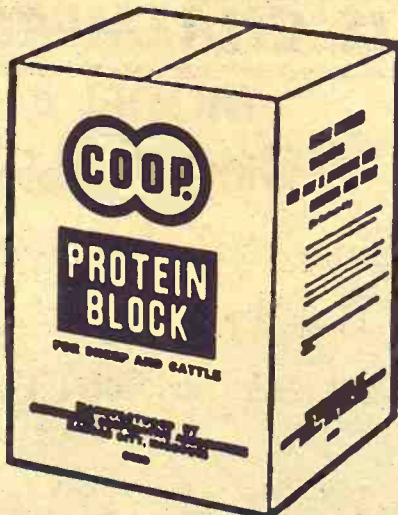

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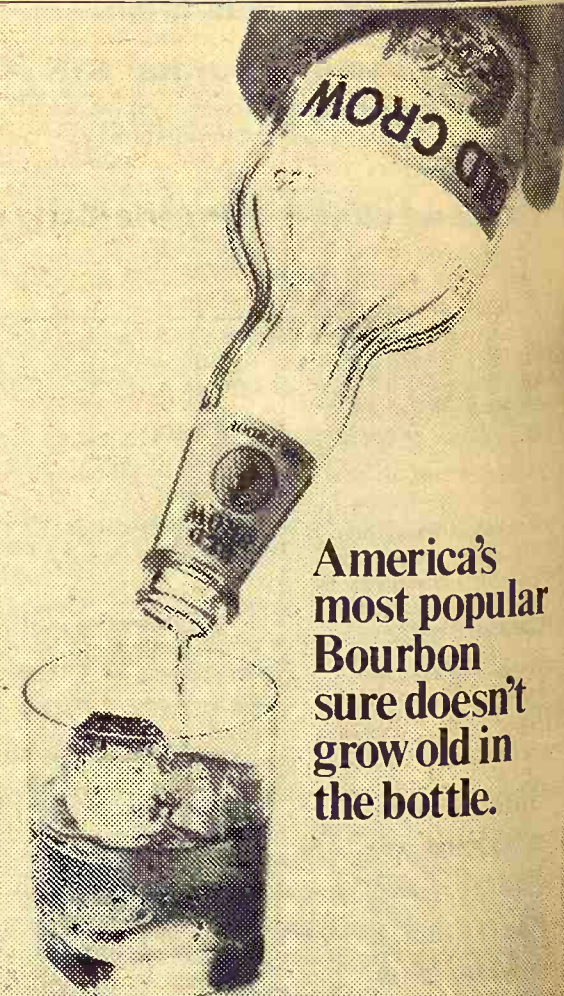

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Easy Hollandaise Sauce Contains Powdered Creamer



Every good cook should learn a simple yet satisfactory way to make hollandaise sauce. More than just a classic trimming for asparagus, broccoli and other vegetables, hollandaise serves as the basis for Bearnaise and other famous sauces. Offered here is a new, fret-free method for making hollandaise, one that features a

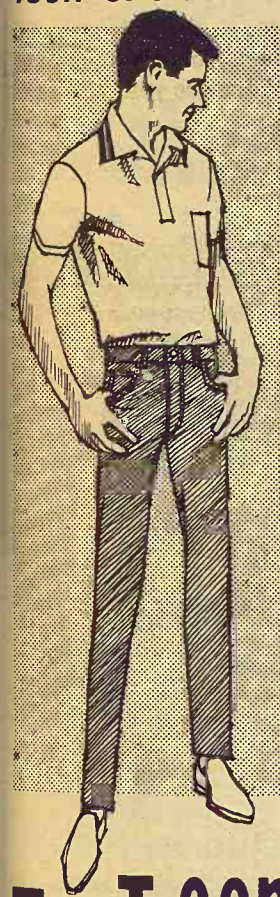

Serve it warm, not hot, as too high heat can spell grief for any sauce based on an emulsion of butter and egg yolks.

EASY HOLLANDAISE

- ½ cup butter
- 3 tablespoons powdered creamer
- 4 egg yolks
- ½ teaspoon salt
- ¼ cup lemon juice
- ¼ cup water

Heat butter in top of double boiler over hot (not boiling) water until just melted. Beat together powdered creamer, egg yolks, salt, lemon juice and water. Stir egg mixture into melted butter; continue to cook over hot water, beating with wire whip until thick. Makes about 1½ cups.

\$700 A Cow Gross A Dairy Goal

"Old Bossy" must gross at least \$526 just to pay her bills, according to a study by Bill Collins, Kansas State University Extension economist from Hutchinson.

Collins, a fieldman for Farm Management Association No. 2, examined Association records of dairymen in 11 south central Kansas counties from 1965 to 1967. He found that dairy cows grossed an average of \$645 a year during this period.

Expenses for each animal averaged \$526, leaving an average of \$118 for labor and management per cow for the operation.

Collins says 1965 was the low year for dairy income. Nonfeed

costs averaged \$151 per cow and feed costs \$371 per cow that year, he says.

Nonfeed costs include interest, machinery costs, building depreciation, personal taxes, hired labor, veterinary and livestock expenses, and repairs on permanent improvements.

Collins says that a reasonable goal for modern dairymen is an annual gross of around \$700 per cow. This would allow a decent return for operator's labor and management.

Some dairymen are realizing this goal, he says, but a majority are not.

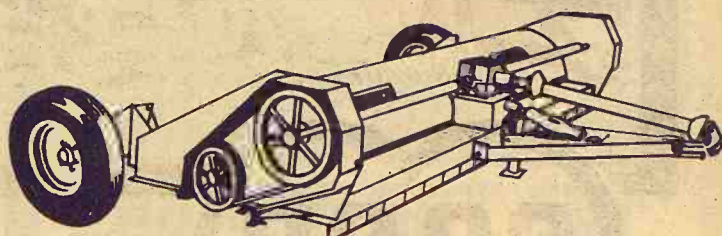

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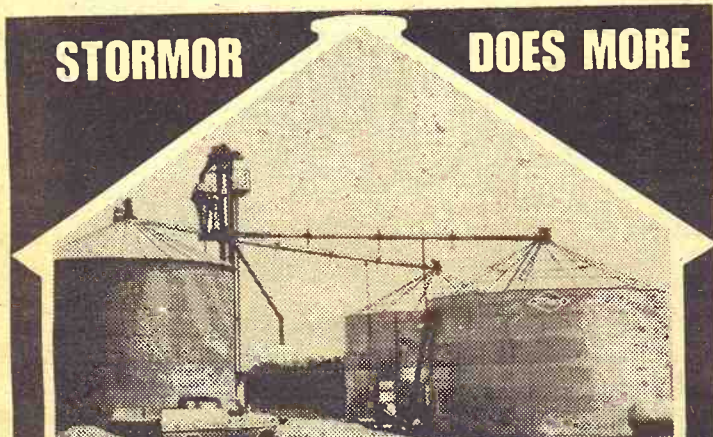

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Farm Dams Need Maintenance

When construction on a farm dam is completed, the most important phase of flood control and grade stabilization is just beginning, says Walter E. Selby, Extension agricultural engineer at Kansas State University.

The best designed dam in the world will not function well with a clogged debris rack or overgrazed and eroded emergency spillway. Other problems can develop even with normal wear and tear. Continuing inspection by landowners or tenants is the key to timely maintenance.

The proper functioning of a farm pond, a grade stabilization structure, or a detention dam is dependent on keeping the em-

bankment in good repair and the spillway and an outlet structure in serviceable condition, Selby points out.

Excessive seepage in the downstream toe of the embankment, or sloughing of the downstream slope of the embankment or the abutments should be brought to the attention of the construction engineer.

Maintain a good cover of suitable grass on the embankment. If the traffic of livestock tends to damage the embankment, or if grazing damages the grass cover, fence out the livestock.

If the emergency spillway is subject to travel by livestock, it should be fenced to assist in establishing and/or maintaining a good grass cover. If erosion occurs before vegetation is established, or because of unusual flow of water afterward, repair and seed or sod the damaged

area as quickly as possible, K-State engineer suggests.

Inspect the outlet structure of the principle spillway through a nearth dam periodically, particularly following heavy storms, to insure the removal of debris from the trash rack or obstructions that might become lodged in the riser barrel.

Area Dams Did Work In Recent Heavy Rains

District Engineer Vernon W. Pinkey of the Army Corps of Engineers reported six federal reservoirs in Kansas protected 78,000 acres of land and prevented an estimated \$242,000 in flood damages during recent heavy rains.

He said the Marion, Council Grove and John Redmond reservoirs on the Grand River watershed prevented more than five feet of flooding below the John Redmond Dam, located near Burlington.

Toronto, Fall River and Elk City reservoirs on the Verdigris River watershed prevented up to eight feet of flooding in the reach below Toronto Dam, Pinkey said. The Toronto Reservoir rose over 20 feet during the rain storms.

Chemicals Require Careful Handling Around Livestock On Farm

Sprays, dips, and wormers are essential to a successful livestock operation — when used properly. Improperly used, they can and do cause tremendous loss to the producers.

Farm chemicals are potentially as harmful to the farmer as to his livestock, stresses Dr. Homer K. Caley, Extension veterinarian at Kansas State University.

Increased livestock production has also increased the use of various insecticides on farm animals, Caley adds. Chemicals are routinely used for control of internal and external parasites, especially when crowded livestock production units contribute to the parasite problem.

In most instances, losses of livestock from chemical poisoning can be traced to misuse of the chemical or failure to read and understand the directions on the product label. Poisonings are nearly always associated with the use of sprays or accidental ingestion of toxic compounds, the Extension veterinarian said. Wormers may also cause adverse reactions in animals, as some wormers are extremely toxic.

Chemicals may be suspected when a group of animals are sick or dying, when the animals were exposed to the same chemical at the same time, when postmortem examination reveals the same organ affected in a group of animals, and when there is an absence of other causes of death.

However, not all cases attributed to chemical toxicity can be verified, Caley says. And frequently unknown causes of deaths may be blamed on sprays

or other farm chemicals.

Symptoms or signs associated with toxicity are varied and dependent on the chemical involved. The toxic effects of some compounds may vary for different species, and it is difficult to list a set of signs for a specific chemical, Caley explains.

Toxicity to the operator is the most important consideration for safe use of insecticides. Special equipment is available to insure the safety of the user. Use it when working with toxic compounds, Caley emphasizes.

Suggested safety practices in using insecticides and other chemicals include:

- Read and follow directions on the label.
- Do not increase recommended concentration.
- Use toxic compounds only when necessary.
- Do not mix farm chemicals unless it is recommended by the manufacturer.
- Wear protective clothing and equipment when indicated.
- Avoid prolonged contact with toxic materials, (man and animal).
- Store farm chemicals in a safe place. Locked storage is ideal.
- Apply only recommended amount.
- Use the lowest effective dose and apply only when necessary.
- All insecticides should be considered toxic to man and animals.

Dr. Caley points out that failure to read directions and follow precautions is the primary hazard associated with insecticide use.

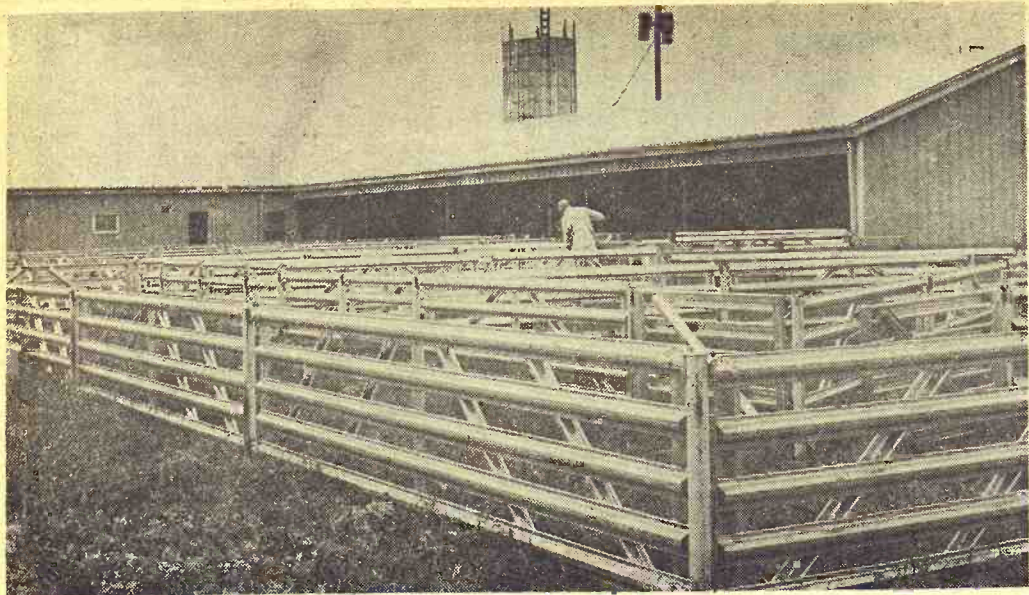

Replacing the facilities destroyed by a tornado two years ago, a new sheen unit at Kansas State University is nearing completion. It contains equipment for breeding and nutrition studies and for an environmental study of the effects of temperature and humidity on sheep.

Little Slack In Farm Borrowing

Higher interest rates and 'tight' money slowed the ever increasing demand for farm credit but little the past year, said R. B. Tootell, governor of the Farm Credit Administration.

Farmers increased their borrowing by 11 per cent in the year ending June 30. This compared with a 17 per cent increase in credit in the preceding year.

Farmers and their cooperative increased outstanding loans from the Cooperative Farm Credit System to nearly \$12 billion. Outstanding individual

farm loans increased to \$9 billion.

"The agricultural revolution continues unabated," Tootell said at Blacksburg, Va., "A major factor in this revolution has been substitution of capital for labor — much of it being borrowed money," he added.

He explained a trend of many years that finds fewer farmers producing more on larger farms but with less total land in production.

"In tight money times, such as those prevailing the past two years, farmers are especially fortunate to have their own farm credit system that can tap investment funds in the nation's major money markets," Tootell said.

He reported the high reputation of its securities enabled the system to meet farmers' essential credit needs by selling nearly \$10 billion worth.

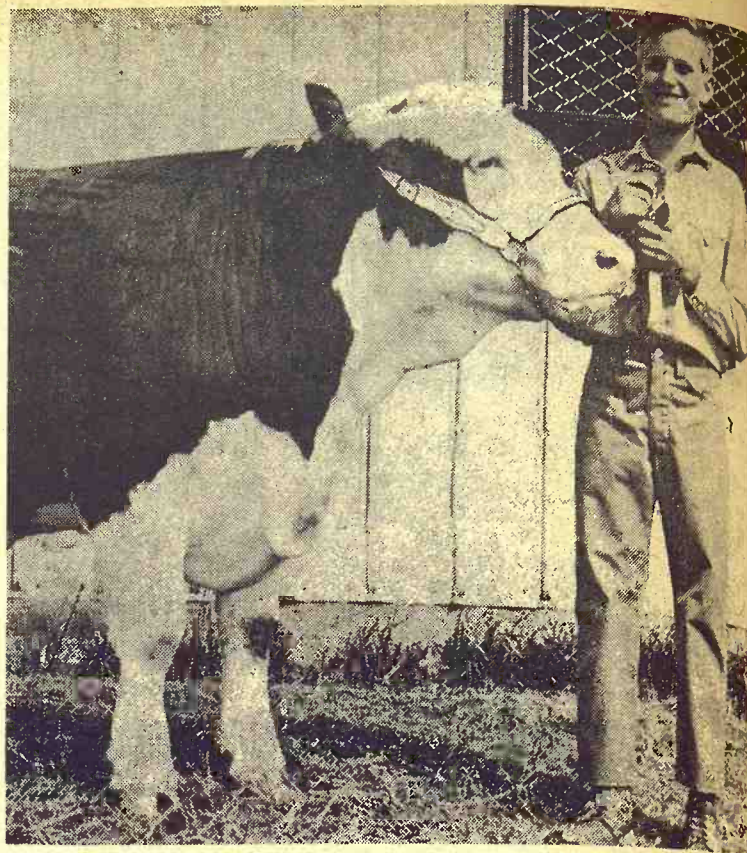
Careful Plotting Of Giraffe Path

Grange Pioneers In Insurance

Your answer to the man who asked about the Farm Bureau was good as far as it went (G&G July 16) and it went a long way, but there might be one false inference from the statement about the Bureau going into the insurance business. Long before the Bureau was writing insurance, the Kansas Grangers had a mutual insurance association in business, and it is still going strong, after 79 years.

It may not be the biggest insurance organization in the state but not long ago one of the agents for an old line company, here in Manhattan, said "I'll sharpen my pencil against any company doing business in this territory except one — the Grange. I can't match them on the residential and auto insurance."

As a matter of fact, one of the very real problems that the Grangers have encountered is the proportion of 'insurance members' who join the Grange, take out insurance, and then never take any part in Grange activities except to pay their dues and premiums. The Association operates on a basis of no profit to anyone, and operating costs held as low as is possible while still giving adequate service.

The Farm Bureau folks are our good neighbors and we wish them well, but compared to the Grange, they are newcomers in the field, and we still claim that we can shade them just a little on cost of equal protection.

Remembers Big Salina Farm Show 50 Years Ago

I was wondering if those in the Grass & Grain range recall a big tractor and implement show at Salina some 50 years ago.

I was a small boy then, but I remember a few things, also with what others have told me since.

It was the biggest show of its kind. All of the big implement men were there, even Henry Ford himself, with his then new Fordson tractor. It was there that IHC bought the PTO Plow Company, by what I heard later, and so with many other companies.

There was the Oil Pull Avery, Dutman Taylor, Titan, Bates Steel Mule, Waterloo Boy, Case and about 20 more different makes. The show went for a week and each afternoon they would plow 160 acres of land close by.

They also had self-propelled wheat binders, row crop tractors, the big tractor of that day that pulled 10 to 12 plows. Many of the ideas of that day are in use today. There was a 4-wheel driver tractor, a half-track tractor, as well as small

crawlers. The location was just south of Salina, where the big Welles store is now. There for one half mile were the big tents and dust about six inches deep, where the steel lugs bit into the ground.

Even if this was 50 years ago, I think it was a start to replace the farm horse. It would be interesting to hear what others might remember about the great tractor show of long ago.

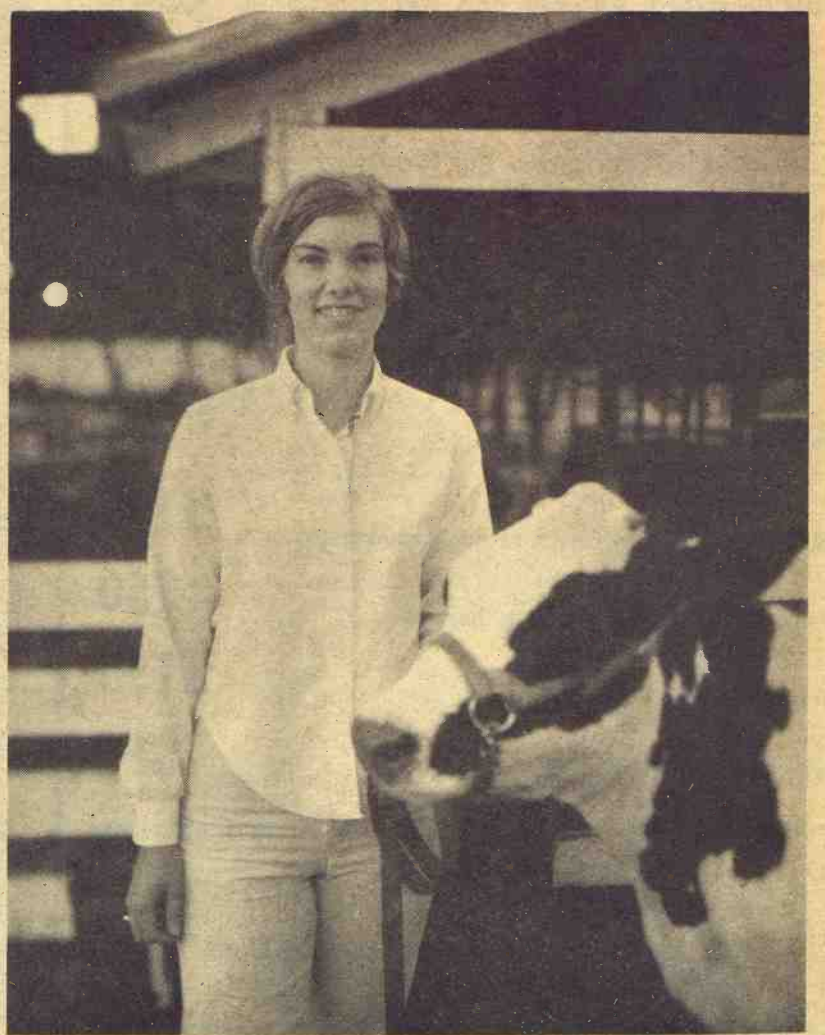

An End To Flying U's and Lazy J's?

The Tanners Council of America thinks the livestock industry can get into the space age by following its advice.

The Tanners' advice is to quit branding cattle with a hot iron and start doing it with a cold one.

Freeze-branding, of course, is not new, but it's not been accepted with great enthusiasm on the part of cattlemen either, and the Tanners are promoting it be-

cause they think brands scar the hides and ruin them for making leather goods. A brand is often put right in the middle of the cow's hide — the part of the hide that leather workers say is best for making shoes, handbags, coats and other garments. A hide branded in that part sells for 40 percent less than an unbranded hide.

The Tanners Council says that branding scars cost cattle own-

ers \$50 million a year, and they advocate anything that doesn't harm the hide — even painting the critter or ear-tagging it.

More likely is the freeze-branding method developed by Roy Farrell, a veterinary researcher at Washington State University at Pullman, Wash. It involves dipping a branding iron in a refrigerant until the tool's temperature drops to 90 degrees below zero.

The iron, really made of copper alloy because it gets cold faster than iron does, is then placed on the hide for 20 or 30 seconds. The cold kills the pigment cells of animal's skin, but doesn't scar the skin itself. From the day it is branded until the day it dies, the animal merely walks around with a white symbol.

Besides being scarless, the freeze-branding is painless. "A cow can go on chewing her cud without even knowing she is being branded," Dr. Farrell claims. This eliminates the necessity of a cowboy roping an animal and wrestling it to the ground or penning it in achute.

Farrell advocates a freeze-branding technique using ordinary letters and numerals instead of fancy symbols. The ordinary characters are more readily adaptable for electronic data processing, an advantage for big ranchers, he claims.

"Flying U's and Lazy J's are fine on the range, but they won't program into a computer," Farrell says.

Despite the claimed advantages, though, there's hardly a stampede to freeze branding. One of the firms that sells the freeze branding outfits is Hawkeye Castings Inc. of Manchester, Iowa, and they have sold only 490 sets in the past couple of

years. The sets sell for \$75 and include nine irons with the numerals zero thru eight (the six can be turned upside down and used as a nine). One thing holding down sales is that some state laws require hot-iron branding iron.

Cattlemen say that one disadvantage of freeze branding is that it's difficult to supply cowboys scattered across the Plains with the liquid nitrogen needed to cool the branding iron.

The hot-iron method, says Sterling VaVrner of Matador Cattle Co. of Wichita, is best because "a cowboy finding an isolated bunch of cattle can brand them on the spot since he can carry a regular branding iron and can pick up brush nearby to build a fire to heat it."

True enough, although Varner admits that there are more "cowboys" in pickup trucks than on horses, and that branding irons are about as often heated with bottled gas as by a small brush fire.

\$2.3 MILLION FROM SALES TAX AGREEMENT

Kansas collected \$2.3 million in the first year of a reciprocal sales tax agreement with Missouri. A similar agreement with Colorado has brought in \$35,000 in six months. The Missouri

agreement has been criticized by Attorney General Londerholm for giving too much authority to James McDonald, state revenue director.

Pursuant to Article 14, Section 1 of the Constitution and in compliance with House Concurrent Resolution No. 1063, adopted by the legislature on March 7, 1968, a proposition will be submitted to the voters at the November 5, 1968, General Election for their approval or rejection to amend Section 2 of Article 4 of the Constitution as follows:

"Sec. 2. General elections and township elections shall be held biennially on the Tuesday succeeding the first Monday in November in the years bearing even numbers. All county and township officers shall hold their offices for a term of two years and until their successors are qualified: Provided, One county commissioner shall be elected from each of three districts, numbered 1, 2, and 3, by the voters of the district and the legislature shall fix the time of election and the term of office of such commissioners; such election to be at a general election, and no term of office to exceed six years."

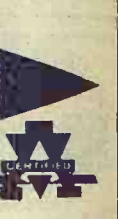
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Greenbugs - or green bugs - They're Posing Crop Problem Across State

Much of this year's sorghum crop in Kansas, estimated at 60 million bushels, is endangered by hordes of aphids that appeared in dangerous numbers only a few weeks ago.

Concern is spreading to the 1969 wheat crop if the insects are not brought under control within the next few weeks.

Vast acreages of milo in western Kansas could be damaged by the pale green aphids, formerly thought to be greenbugs.

Scientists haven't named the insect villain for sure yet. It is believed to be a new strain or a new species feeding on the underside of the lower leaves in sorghum. They work up the plant as their numbers increase threatening what could be the second largest sorghum crop on record.

The bugs first became apparent in sorghum fields in eastern Kansas in early July. Entomologists were puzzled as greenbugs ordinarily don't feed on milo in mid-summer.

But beneficial insects appeared in sufficient numbers to control the aphids in eastern Kansas and it is believed crop danger there has passed. A survey of 20 fields in Jefferson, Atchison, Doniphan, Jackson and Brown counties failed to reveal

a single live colony of aphids.

Entomologists believe an earlier corn leaf aphid infestation in eastern Kansas served to increase the number of beneficial insects in many fields. This undoubtedly helped in bringing the sorghum aphid infestation under control in that section of the state.

At present, entomologists regard the greenbug situation as critical in a large part of western Kansas. In several southwestern Kansas counties, clouds of aphids have been observed late in the day. Entomologists say every milo field from Manhattan to Grant County has some measure of greenbug infestation.

"It is difficult to speculate on the pattern of the next week or two," said Dr. Leroy Brooks, extension entomologist at Kansas State University. "As yet the numbers of beneficial insects in western Kansas do not appear large enough to be capable of eliminating the aphid population on a wide-scale basis."

The worry of entomologists and farmers does not extend to the milo crop alone. They fear that if not brought under immediate control the aphids will move into wheatfields and when the new plant emerges, feed on

it. They could do untold damage to the 1969 wheat crop that will be going into the ground in the next few weeks.

Danger to current milo crops in the big high plains producing area is so great a meeting involving U.S. Dept. of Agriculture officials together with research specialists was held in Fort Collins, Colo., last week in an effort to devise a means of control.

"We are hoping the Ft. Collins meeting will provide a course of action that will lead to control of the threat in western Kansas," Dr. Brooks said. He noted the USDA has a task force in Oklahoma running tests with insecticides. Milo production all the way from the Texas panhandle to Nebraska is threatened.

In most fields, the K-State entomologist said, the damage to sorghum plants must be stopped instead of waiting for natural enemies to take over. Beneficial insects which are believed to have stopped the assault in eastern Kansas include lady beetles and their larvae, green lace wing flies and their larvae and a small parasitic wasp that deposits eggs in the aphid.

A number of insecticides appear to be effective in controlling the aphids with the use of both aerial and ground equipment. For control by ground equipment, malathion or diazinon is recommended. For aerial application, parathion, Phosdrin and Systox have proved effective.

Farmers are urged to keep infested fields under surveillance. Control measures are advised when small plants become heavily infested or when it is apparent that several of the leaves are in danger of being lost on larger plants. This is especially important when plants are in heading and blooming periods.

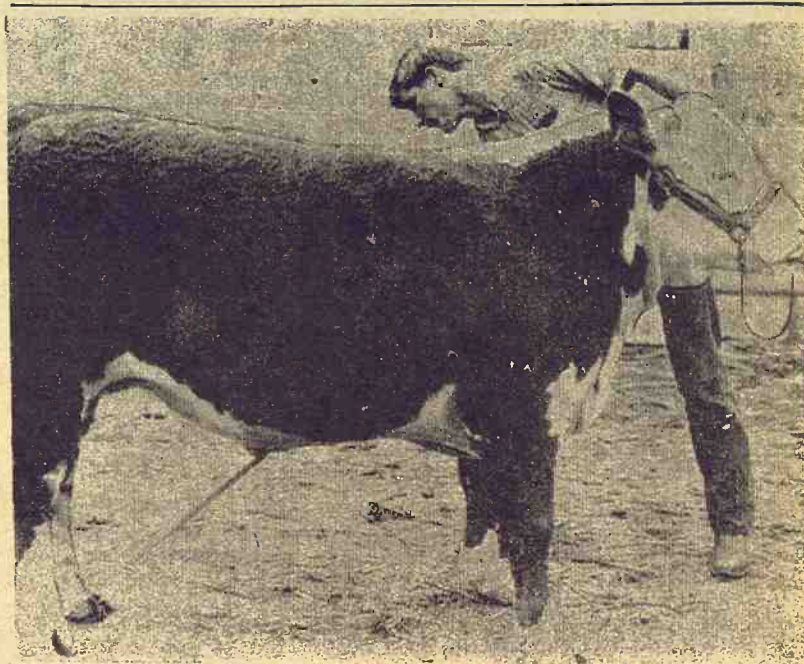
Affected leaves of sorghum turn red and die as feeding by the greenbugs continues. In fields where milo is headed, the loss of the bottom pair of leaves will probably not be of economic

importance, Dr. Brooks said. Where Upper leaves are attacked, however, the plant's food-producing ability is severely curtailed and serious damage may result.

First notice of the green aphid

danger came from Jefferson County where late-planted milo was found loaded. They caused lower leaves to turn crimson, wither and die.

K-State Hog Center Ready

Hog producers attending the first annual swine day at the university September 26 will be given a guided inspection tour of the new facilities considered the latest in design and usage.

Bean Prospect Blooms

Good rainfall in the Kansas soybean areas and large acreage seeded this summer mean a record crop of the plant this fall.

Ralph Moore, soybean representative for Cargill Inc. in Wichita, said he believes Kansas will crack the golden 25 million-bushel mark this year in soybean production.

The U.S. Department of Agriculture estimated a month ago

that Kansas farmers had seeded 931,000 acres in soybeans. Moore said he believes the acreage since has topped a million acres.

Moore said he believes the price of \$2.43 for soybeans at the current truck prices probably will decline to \$2.15 to \$2.20 a bushel by harvest time in October.

Most of Kansas production comes from dryland farms but some 5 per cent comes from irrigated acreage.

Recent rainfall has enhanced the probability of a good soybean crop, it was reported. Some farmers continued to plant soybeans until late July to keep cropland in production.

Some farmers followed wheat with the soybean crop, merely discing the wheat stubble and planting the beans directly along with fertilizer and herbicide.

Research May Aid Budgets

Mrs. Bobbie Jaax, wife of a K-State student, expresses the delight of housewives as she learns about a unique research project at Kansas State University, Manhattan, which may lead to lower beef production costs and more quality meat for consumers. The research, headed by Dr. Harold J. Tuma (above) of the K-State animal science and industry department, is believed to be a "first" for the beef industry.

It involves the performing of biopsies on the loin or back area of breeding bulls. The purpose is to determine, in advance of breeding, bulls which will sire calves with the characteristics of tenderness, juiciness and flavor most consumers desire in steaks, roasts and other beef dishes. The carcass being viewed by Mrs. Jaax and Tuma is typical of the kind of beef the K-State scientists are endeavoring to develop — namely, meat with a minimum of fat cover and a maximum of flavorful muscle.

Reliability of biopsies for predicting meat quality of bulls and their future calves is based on the high hereditary characteristics of breeding bulls. If a biopsy reveals that a young bull probably will not sire calves with meat qualities desired by consumers, that animal can be eliminated as a herd bull at an early age. The result will greatly reduce production costs as livestock men now must wait two or three years until calves are slaughtered to determine whether a bull is siring progeny with quality meat traits.

More than half the drivers killed in single-vehicle crashes are drunk, and drinking by drivers and pedestrians kills about 25,000 Americans a year, according to a broad federal study.

The Department of Transportation study concluded alcohol

is the largest single factor in traffic deaths and said the serious problem is heavy drinking, predominately by men.

Drivers with extremely high amounts of alcohol in their blood, the report said, are responsible for 50 to 55 per cent of single-vehicle accidents involving drivers.

Drinking figures in 1967, 800,000 traffic accidents in the United States each year. And accidents involving people frequently also involved "hazardous amounts of alcohol."

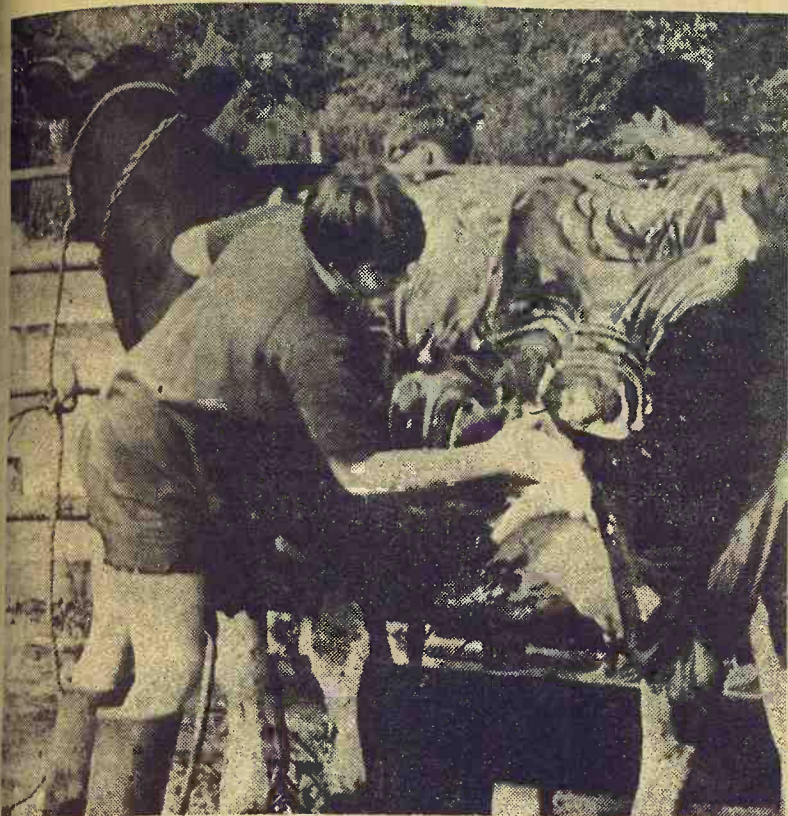

What To Do With All That Manure?

There is a move under way in the Department of Agriculture to solve the growing problem of what to do with cattle manure.

The department has awarded a \$32,000 contract to Texas Technological college, Lubbock, for a 3½-year study of manure disposal problems of large cat-

tle feedlots.

At stake is how to return "millions of tons" of manure to the land as fertilizer and thereby avoid what the department calls "environmental pollution problems" at the feedlots.

"Texas Tech will find ways of cutting the volume of, and at the same time preserve the fertilizer value of the waste while it awaits future application," the department said.

Other portions of the study will include the effects of different types feed in making manure a better fertilizer, the effects of feedlot designs, animal population, rainfall and management factors, the department said.

Large cattle feedlot operations have increased greatly in recent years and so has the manure problem.

The department said last month that beef production from feedlots in the 32 major producing states increased 77 per cent in the past five years.

Farm Truck Relief from Port Of Entry Stop

A recommendation by Gov. Robert Dockett for the Kansas Port of Entry board to exempt small, farm-registered trucks carrying farm commodities from required stops at Kansas ports of entry has been adopted. The only small trucks that will be required to stop for port inspection will be those carrying livestock, which must be cleared, the entry board said.

James T. McDonald, director of the Kansas revenue department and chairman of the Port of Entry board, said the new exemption will apply to farm trucks having a gross registration of 8,000 pounds or less. The exemption will include practically all pickup trucks.

"These vehicles will be free to enter Kansas without stopping at the ports unless they are hauling livestock that is not bound for a licensed community sale, to a processing or packing plant for immediate slaughter, or for immediate delivery at the terminal markets," McDonald said.

Governor Dockett said that for many years the regulation has caused unnecessary delays to farmers in border counties on both sides of the Kansas line.

Last year about 318,000 trucks were cleared at ports of entry, with about 250,000 of them being farm pickup trucks, the governor said.

In most cases the stops were unnecessary and the new policy will eliminate much of the routine work that has slowed down port clearance, Dockett added.

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Wheat War With France?

The United States is on the brink of a cut-rate wheat export war with the Common Market, particularly France, Agriculture Department sources confirmed Friday.

At stake is the new International Grains Arrangement treaty ratified by the Senate in

June. The three-year agreement sets minimum and maximum prices for wheat in the world market.

American exporters have been holding the line on IGA wheat prices, but France has been undercutting them and is threatening to move into areas the United States considers its traditional markets, mostly in the Far East, the department source said.

There have been rumors for some weeks that the United States and France are headed for a showdown over the wheat situation.

"France has been offering wheat to some of these countries for 15 to 18 cents a bushel less than it would be possible for us to sell it under the agreement," the spokesman said.

The Agriculture Department has "strong indications" that France, which has a large supply of surplus wheat and a bumper crop this year, is trying to sell cut-rate grain in Japan, the Philippines, Hong Kong, Tunisia and Greece.

Should France, with apparent Common Market help, continue its practice, the source said, the United States will be forced to abandon the wheat treaty and cut its own prices.

"There's no question that they're cutting the hell out of the market," the source said. "And either they are going to get right or we are going to have to take action to meet this competition."

In the meantime, he said, the United States is making its position known to the Common Market through normal diplomatic channels. A wheat export meeting is scheduled for mid-September in Canberra, Australia, to review the situation.

Ehram Sale Complete By Fall

ABILENE — The merger of J. B. Ehram and Sons Manufacturing Co. and Combustion Engineering Co., New York City, will be effective Oct. 1, W. J. Ehram Jr. of Abilene says.

The merger was announced in May. Final contracts were signed last week.

Combustion Engineering acquired all of the Ehram assets, including several subsidiaries, in exchange for common stock.

A change in the official name of the company is expected to be announced later.

Combustion Engineering has various types of plants in 35 cities. Its 1967 sales totaled \$688,589,000. It has more than 20,000 employees.

Ehram manufactures machinery for the manufacture of wall board and bulk material handling equipment.

The firm, the oldest corporation in Kansas, was founded as a machine shop in 1872 by Jacob E. Ehram.
