



ch is obsolete for the original purpose. Delmar put a top on it and now uses it to store 0 bushels of high moisture grain. He uses a roller mill to prepare the feed.





Once Ames determined what frequencies sheep were able to hear, he taped three different types of noise. The first, white noise, was similar to radio static. The second was background music of a soothing nature and the third was IMS, or intermittant miscellaneous sounds. The latter was a combination that included band music, whistles, rifle shots, and even the noise of flying airplanes.

Different groups of sheep were then subjected to one type of noise at an intensity level of 75 decibles, similar to that of radio listening music, or one of 100 decibles, similar to the loudness of a busy New York City street intersection.

The white noise and music were



Preliminary results showed that sheep who listened to the white noise at the lower intensity grew more quickly. However, these studies were only for short periods of time, and there are indications that the animals adjust to the noises over a longer time interval.

Presently, Ames is studying groups of sheep subjected to different types and intensities of noise for 60-day periods. He hopes to run the experiment next year with a sheep flock at Colby, and perhaps with swine. This would show the practical value of such noises.

Already medical doctors have discovered sound therapy may help human females who can't conceive, and Ames feels the same may be true for livestock.







safety record of the turnpike was very good, except for an "unusually bad" period from mid-May to early July, when nearly half the fatal accidents and half the fatalities occurred.

In August 1970, the Kansas Turnpike Authority reduced the maximum speed limit on the Turnpike from 80 miles per hour to 75 MPH daytime and 70 mph at night.

The authority has said the reduction was made in the interest of increased safety and to conform to interstate highway speed limits in the state.

Traffic on the turnpike increased 3 percent in 1970, to 9.2 million gross vehicles which traveled a total of 484.1 million miles.

42% Of Land Now **Meeting Standard On Conservation**

A list from the Soil Conservation Service which shows how counties are getting land "adequately treated" with conservation measures suggests that areas with major conservation problems are making less progress meeting standards, even though their efforts are greater than in counties with lesser terrain problems.

The SCS list of the top 20 counties in 1970 in adding acres which were "adequately freated" by conservation standards mostly includes counties which do less conservation work than do counties in extreme northeast and extreme southeast Kansas, where government allocations to help pay for conservation work have been highest. Only Butler and Sedgwick counties are on the top 20 list for 1970 work reaching "adequate" standards and also rank as counties where major land conservation funds are spent.

During the fiscal year ended last June, a total of 1.17 million additional acres were adequately treated. meaning the land was used within its capability and that conservation practices essential to its protection and planned improvement have been applied.

This brings to 21.5 million acres of land adequately treated in Kansas, 42 per cent of the total land in the state.

Since SCS was established, northeast Kansas has led the state in dollar amount of conservation work done, with Nemaha, Jackson, Jefferson, Atchison, and Brown counties right at the top, and Marshall, Leavenworth, Clay and several southeast Kansas counties not far behind.

Not one of these counties was on the top 20 list of reaching "adequate" status during 1970, however. Only Butler and Sedgwick - the 1st and 3rd largest counties in area in the state - are on the 1970 list and yearly rank among the counties with the most dollars spent on conservation work.





received an average price of \$27.70 from a low of \$27.50 in December to a per 100 pounds for all beef cattle sold high of \$31.80 in March. during 1970 according to the Kansas Crop and Livestock Reporting cwt. in 1970, up \$1.75 from a year Service.

This was an increase of \$1.60 from last year and the second highest on records dating back through 1910.

Monthly prices for all beef cattle in 1970 were above the previous year in all months except June and December.

The price in January was \$26.70, gradually decreased to \$26.90 in August, increased to \$27.40 in October and fell again to \$25.60 in December.

Prices of steers averaged \$29.75 per cwt. in 1970, up \$1.35 from 1969.

Beef cattle producers in Kansas Monthly prices of steers ranged





Place the wrapped apples in a deep buttered baking dish which has the balance of the sugar scattered in the bottom. Then pour the hot water over the apple-sugar mixture. Bake at 300-350 degrees from 30-40 minutes. Serve warm with cream, sauce or milk.

Sift flour and baking powder. Add the shortening. Cut into flour as you would in making pie crust. When

The title appearing on the ballot by which this amendment is sub-met dece either in person or by absentee ballot notwithstanding the fact that such person may have become a nonresident of such precinct during the thirty days next preceding such election if his new residence is in another precinct in the state of Kansas." One of the findings was that faulty

Medical studies have shown that people under stress also often swallow an excessive amount of air. Extrapped air causes pain and discomfort, which in turn adds to the individual's anxiety.

The Internal Revenue Service is not usually known for its medical knowledge. However, its call for earlier returns is worth heeding, particularly by those who plan to do theirs as usual, in a frantic rush the eve of April 15th.

More Nike **Bases To Close**


The Army has advised Congress it will close Nike Hercules installations in 15 states as part of a realignment of air defenses to cut cost and shift focus to more sophisticated weapons. Neither Kansas nor Nebraska is affected.

The Army said inactivation by June 30 to 27 Nike Hercules firing batteries and 11 Nike Hercules headquarters will reduce operating expenses by \$31 million a year, starting in 1972.

The Nike Hercules is an antiaircraft ground-to-air missile which has been deployed around the United States since the mid-1950's. It can carry either nuclear or conventional warheads.

In the past three years there has been a gradual reduction in Nike Hercules batteries as the Army Air Defense Command moved slowly toward developing a new airborne warning and control system, as well as more sophisticated surface-to-air missiles

Including the ones tagged last week for elimination, the Army plans to close about 40 batteries in the nation. This would leave more

Triticale – Best Yet To Come? Farmers in several states last fall states are testing it. Estimates of

planted a new crop that could boost last fall's plantings range as high as grain yields and supply hunger- 300,000 acres, compared with a plagued countries with more harvest last spring of 10,000 to 20,000 nutrition. Or it could prove to be one of the biggest research flops in recent years. Experts appear divided about the prospects.

The new crop is triticale, a wheatlike cereal grain that is man-made by selectively crossing wheat and rye. Promoters claim it eventually triticale marketing-research will yield twice as much grain as either of its parents, making it a potentially important feed grain that development of potent triticale could stimulate increased beef, pork and poultry production.

Collister concedes that he bases his prediction on the varieties that can compete with wheat, corn and barley. "It's by no means a miracle crop, but it has

Even current, primitive varieties display impressive attributes, enthusiasts say. International Grain advertises that its variety, called Graze Grain 70, "normally produces

cent more grain 50 per than wheat or rye" and that it contains nearly 19 per cent crude protein, compared with 9 per cent protein in corn and 10 to 11 per cent in wheat.

It also is said to provide proteinrich forage. The company claims that as many as six heifers can graze on an acre of irrigated triticale all winter and gain up to two pounds a day under ideal conditions and good husbandry. By contrast, the company says, barely two heifers can be grazed successfully on an acre of combined wheat, oats and rye, which is a common mix in west and central Texas.

The other company selling triticale seed makes more conservative claims. FasGro Seeds Inc., an Amarillo, Texas, subsidiary of Prochemco Inc., tells farmers that its current four varieties won't yet fill the fall predictions being made for triticale.

"Right now, truthfully speaking, it can't stack up against hybrid corn,' says Prochemco's president, Paul Engler. "It just won't out-produce on a dollar-per-acre basis. But the exciting thing is the varieties that will be coming out in two to five years." FasGro plans to bring out two new varieties in 1972.

Many scientists agree that the best of triticale is yet to come. In fact, some worry that premature marketing and publicity could hurt the new grain's chances for success. They fear that farmers may get discouraged by poor results with initial varieties and write off the crop as a loser.

Wheat-rye crosses date back to 1875, but the resulting seed was sterile. This problem was solved in 1937, but the species remained unsatisfactory until 1956, when durum, the hardest wheat grown in the U.S., was substituted for regular wheat in the crosses. In 1964, B. Charles Jenkins, a geneticist in Salinas, Calif., developed a light-insensitive cross that would grow both in the long winters of Canada and the short winters of the southern U.S. Jenkins, of course, is a strong believer in the potential of triticale. So is Norman Borlaug, who recently won a Nobel Peace Prize for his work in developing improved wheat and rice strains that are being planted in underdeveloped countries. Triticale "has tremendous possibilities," he says.

But many scientists who are investigating triticale are skeptical. Some, like M.E. McDaniel of Texas A&M University, which is testing the grain at several experimental stations, say that triticale is overrated and overpriced in terms of demonstrated results. Triticale seed varieties sell for \$40 to \$46 a 100 pounds, compared with \$3 to \$4 for good wheat seed. (Most farmers pay nothing for seed, using a portion of each year's harvest for planting the next crop.) Collister of International Grain

says such conclusions don't apply to his company's seed, which was distributed for independent testing for the first time this fall. The price is high, he says, because "you're buying the genes, the genetic code bred into it."

Other scientists argue that triticale isn't as productive as proponents claim. Because the seed head of triticale is twice the size of a head of wheat, triticale seemingly should yield twice as much grain. But Louis Reitz, a wheat researcher at the Agriculture Department's laboratories in Beltsville, Md., says the heads on the triticale varieties that he has tested develop less than half of their possible seeds. He says the best tests showed the triticale yields were about equal to average yields of wheat, and most varieties he tested didn't yield even that much. He also says triticale has several other weaknesses, including that it isn't very winter-hardy.

But the triticale seed companies say the winter crop that will be harvested this spring has survived the winter very well. The other findings are unfair, they assert, because the new crop is being treated and handled too much like wheat.

The companies say that in some cases triticale may need to be planted earlier in the fall than wheat. They add that because triticale has a vigorous root system that seeks out moisture if has different water requirements than wheat on both irrigated and rain-fed land





Gray said an additional federal appropriation of \$10-\$12 million will become available to the state July 1. Gov. Robert Docking has recommended a fiscal 1972 appropriation of \$2.7 million as the state's matching share. The health department requested \$5.5 million

for the program. The Kansas House added \$716,000 to the supplemental budget for the current fiscal year to begin a state matching program.

Gray said if that appropriation if enacted, the state would recover about \$3 million of the money expected to be lost because of insufficient matching money.

The state official said his office already has projects totaling \$50 million on file awaiting funding.

The \$2.7 million appropriation recommended by the governor for the next fiscal year would match \$4-\$5 million in federal funds, making a

net loss of \$6-\$7 million.

Gray said if Kansas does not use its designated federal funds they will be returned to Washington and Bomb Range allocated to other states.

He said the problem is especially serious since 30 Kansas cities and sewer districts are required to install secondary sewage treatment facilties by Dec. 31, 1975.

That deadline was set by the state Board of Health at the insistence of the U.S. Department of the Interior.

"It's going to be difficult, frankly to meet the 1975 deadline," Gray told the committee.

In addition, the Environmental Health Service Division is faced with the problem of meeting new federal reporting requirements that now are prerequisite to obtaining the federal money.

"It's becoming extremely difficult from a staff standpoint to meet the federal requirements to keep the inflow of federal money," Gray said. Gray told the committee the board of health adopted the 1975 deadline after the federal government withheld operational funds for his department and other grants, including an urban renewal grant for Kansas City, Kan.

"So a little blackmail goes on if you don't jump through the hoop," obeserved Rep. Clyde Hill, R-Yates Center, chairman of the committee.

Rep. Franklin Gaines, D-Augusta, told the committee he believes "there's great resistance in the Legislature to funding this at all." He said waste treatment plant

construction always has been handled at the local level. The committee hearing also

touched on air pollution control.

Gray said the federal government has estimated 97 persons will be required to administer the air quality program including 50-60 on the state payroll and the remainder at the local level.

"I think this is an overenthusiastic estimate," Gray said. He said 37 persons probably will be required for a long range

program with a possibility he could get along with fewer.



parently believing the research may pay off, voted at its meeting Feb. 12 to set aside notice letters sent to Cottonwood Valley feedlot operators last July 30 telling them to clean up or shut down.

Girdner Crofoot, whose lot at Strong City would have been most difficult to control, went out of business. He is closing feeding operations and his brother, Jay, partner in the operation, is moving to Lubbock, Tex., Girdner Crofoot said.

Sen. John Crofoot, Cedar Point, a cousin of the two, said he intends to keep his feedlot in operation as long as he is able. Glenn Crofoot, an uncle to the above three Crofoots, who operates a lot eat of Strong City, also is continuing to operate.

Sen. Crofoot said Monday he believes the health board is approaching the critical problem wisely and that enough time to complete the research should be given before current regulations regarding feedlot certification are enforced.

Girdner Crofoot shut down his operation on the basis that federal criteria cannot be met in the locale. He said he does not intend to reopen the Strong City feedlot.

The health board in January 1971 adopted federal water criteria for Kansas rivers, streams and reservoirs.

The criteria calls for not more than 2,000 fecal colieform bacteria in a 100 milliliter sample in a stream which would be used as a public water supply or for sports fishing, and not more than 400 fecal colieform bacteria in reservoirs or other places where water comes into body contact.

Intermittent streams are limited to 4,000 fecal colieform bacteria for each 100 milliliter sample. Five samplings monthly are required for body contact water.

Kansas laws require that the water quality standards be implemented under laws adopted in

1967 following the 1965 Federal Water Quality Act.

The health board motion to delay enforcement came from Dr. M.L. Henrikson, Emporia veterinarian, Feb. 12. He asked that the Cottonwood Valley enforcement of the law be slowed until April 1972, giving time for the research proposed at the Cedar Point feedlot and at Kansas State University to become effective.

The motion, passed 5-4 with one absence on the 10-member board, does specify, however, that the motion may be brought back to further discussion or review at any time.

Dr. Edward Lyman, director of the State Department of Health, said the motion could come up for further review as early as March 12 at the monthly meeting of the board.

Along with tests of the inventor's theories, the federal water quality standards employes in Kansas City have asked Midwest Research Institute of Kansas City, Mo., to determine a "state of the art" report on animal wastes control from feedlots.

Dr. John Blank, Hutchinson, president of the State Board of Health, said that since the research was ready to go, and since no irrigation is possible in the Cottonwood Valley, the board seemed to believe that the research should be given a chance before the Cottonwood Valley feedlots were closed by administrative regulations.

Both Henrikson and a delegation from agribusinesses in the Cottonwood Valley feedlot area had asked for the extra time, he said.







said, "It smells like rain."

"What all this means," said an ABC television executive, "is almost incomprehensible. Obviously, it means that people are buying cigarets without the TV exposure that is supposed to be so vital. But it goes deeper than that.

"The tobaccom companies poured almost \$200 million a year into TV advertising. You have to ask some serious questions about television as an advertising medium when someone can increase sales by not spending \$200 million for it.

"What it all comes down to, I guess, is that this could be the beginning of the end for commercial television. People have been predicting that cassette players will put us out of business in 10 years. If the rumor is true and if advertisers begin thinking that TV exposure doesn't make that much difference, you can cut that figure another five years."

Talk of this sort may also be premature, however. As mentioned, no one is sure yet of what is going on. "Who cares?" confided one







Pearson, Dole More Often Vote Alike Than Figured

United States senators from Kansas — both Republicans — have a closer parallel in voting on issues than many of their constituents realize.

In the past two years, 1969 and 1970, they disagreed on only 19 per cent of the issues on which roll calls were taken or their stands were announced.

In 1970, when 418 roll call votes were taken in the 100 member body, Sen. James Pearson and Bob Dole, both of Kansas, agreed 81 per cent of the time on issues where both were on record.

On the 245 issue votes taken in 1969, they also agreed on 81 per cent of them.

These are tabluations from the staff of Congressional Quarterly and covers only those issues on which both senators took positions for.

It is a known fact that senators from the same state, and sometimes members of the same political party, often vote on opposite sides of a question.

In some cases, senators from the same state frequently cancel each other out on almost every other vote.

The CQ report notes that when senators from the same state vote on exactly the same issue, chances are better than one in four they will disagree. With the two from Kansas, it was near one in five during each of the past two years.

Records indicate that nationally senators from the same states in 1970 disagreed on an average of 26 per cent of the issues; Kansas' senators disagreed 19 per cent.

Senators from 13 states -California, Idaho, Iowa, Maine, Michigan, North Dakota, Ohio, Oklahoma, South Dakota, Tennessee, Texas, Utah and Wyoming - opposed each other on more than 40 per cent of 1970 roll call votes.

Leading same-state adversaries in 1970, were South Dakota's George McGovern, D, and Karl E. Mundt, R, who split 59 per cent of the time on those issues on which they expressed an opinion.

Texas and Utah, each with senators of differing political faith, split 51 per cent of the time in 1970.

Leading the list of those agreeing most often were the two Republicans from Nebraska and the two Democrats from Mississippi - 94 per cent for each team.



Testimony For Cooked Soybeans As Hog Feed

Raw soybeans contain an antigrowth factor when fed to swine.

Citing Kansas State University research, Extension swine specialist Wendell Moyer explained that KC Stockyards "soybeans must be cooked for good performance in the growing- Not Following finishing hog ration."

Whole-cooked soybeans (Roast-A-Tron process) and whole extruded soybeans were fed to swine by K-State swine researchers.

The cooked and extruded soybeans were fed to growingfinishing swine on a pound for pound basis replacing soybean oil meal and on a protein equivalent basis of soybean oil meal.

Moyer said researchers reported dry-roasted or pressure-extruded whole soybeans replaced soybean meal in the ration and did not significantly affect growth rate or feed efficiency.

Results were similar when the replacement was on a pound for pound basis or a protein-unit basis.

Farm cookers or roasters are available to process whole soybeans. The numbers of hogs fed and the tons of soybeans processed will determine the economical aspects of the roaster installation, Moyer explained.

For example, with 2,300 head the annual cost of roasting soybeans is \$5 per ton. With 1,000 head the cost per ton is \$10 per year.

Ark City Mill Gift To Study Wheat Feed

A Kansas milling firm, Dixie Portland Flour Mills, Inc., Arkansas City, has given Kansas State University \$5,000 to study the value of wheat mill by-products as a food for young animals.

Dr. Charles Deyoe, professor of grain science and industry at K-State, is helping coordinate the interdepartmental project. "Basically, the study is to evaluate the by-products and determine if the protein fraction would have a particular value for young livestock," he said.

Working on the study are Dr. Gary Allee, assistant professor of animal science and industry; Dr. Robert Hines, assistant professor of animal science and industry; Dr. Erle Bartley, professor of dairy and poultry science; and Dr. Lyle Helmer, Southeast Kansas Experiment Station.

Alle and Hines will evaluate use of the by-products as a food for young pigs, and Bartley and Helmer will study the value of the feed as a milk replacer and a starter diet for dairy calves.

If the product performs well, the researchers will have discovered a better use for these by-products from wheat milling.

The census also found that children under the age of 14 make up 25.4 per cent of the state's population, with boys outnumbering girls 290,500 to 279,338.

Males generally have the advantage in numbers until they reach the mid-20's, then women prove which is the sturdier sex. In the over 65 age category, women outnumber men by 155,165, or 58 per cent to 111,036, or 42 per cent.





FTC Clamps On Enzyme Ads, Sweepstakes

The nation's big three detergent makers - Lever Brothers, Colgate-Palmolive and Procter & Gamble have accepted the Federal Trade Commission's suggestions for advertising and packaging of their enzyme detergents.

The FTC announced the three firms have agreed to disclose in advertising and on packages that the enzyme ingredients do not work the washday miracles once claimed for them.

At the same time the FTC announced that the McDonald's hamburger chain has agreed to drop the type of promotion practices the FTC took exception to in the 1968 "McDonald's \$500,000 Sweepstakes.'

Both agreements are contained in consent orders provisionally accepted by the regulatory agency and open for public comment during the next 30 days.

When final, the orders will terminate proposed complaints in which the FTC accused the three detergent makers and the Mc-Donald's people of deceptive and misleading advertising.

The detergent order prohibits the firms from making the claim that their enzyme additives will remove all types of stains. Instead, the packages and advertising must disclose that while enzymes may be effective against such stains as blood and fruit, they cannot be expected to remove stains caused by





About 180 people have been employed at the Kansas City plant. Company officials declined to estimate how much the work force would be reduced.


Part of the company's existing property at Kansas City will be vacated, and construction of a 2addition for cattle story slaughtering operations halted when half built, will not be resumed.

Marketing Systems Changing

The trend toward new systems of marketing farm products will continue, particularly for the products with the most-unstable prices. Farmers will continue their efforts to obtain higher and morestable prices for their products through cooperative marketing associations. In some cases, producers will go into the processing and distribution of their products to consumers. At the same time, more processors will be producing their own raw materials. The growth of international conglomerates may make it possible to produce a product in the United States and deliver it to an overseas consumer without having it going through any market, except when the consumer buys it.

More Substitutes Coming

The development of substitutes for farm products will continue. In some cases, the substitutes will be made from other farm products. Margarine is a well-known example. It is made mostly from soybean oil. Likewise, most imitation meats are produced with protein obtained from soybean meal. But most synthetic made from fibers are nonagricultural products petroleum, for example. Synthetic citrus drinks, imitation milks, and coffee whiteners are also made fron nonagricultural products.

Synthetic products often find their first big markets in recipes used by processors, and in foods used in institutions - such as schools and prisons — where a large number of meals must be served and budgets are small.

More Good Food Needed

There is still great need for good food in the United States. A recent study showed that a larger share of the population is undernourished today than fiften years ago. Many of the ill-fed are low-income persons who are unable to buy adequate amounts of nutritious food. Many others, however, are poorly fed because of ignorance or indifference.

At one time the National Agricultural Conference was disrupted by a group of militant individuals claiming to represent the poor and hungry of our land. They demanded more food for the hungry poor, and reduced government payments to well-to-do farmers.

> The report caused amazement and consternation in areas in which it received wide attention. The grain trade, in particular, was alarmed over the prospect of a bearish influence in its commodites in trading tomorrow.

> The USDA action was not announced publicly and there was no hint in advance that the administration was changing its farmgame plan. The published report relied on instructions sent late last week to state offices of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation service.

> "It wasn't announced because it was no story," said one top USDA official. "This type of technical adjustment has been going on for years.

> "What I am saying to you is that regulations to county committees have not changed. They have always had the power to change conservation bases."

> Part of instructions sent throughout the country were not included in the circulated report. The unincluded part helps clear the air. It is a requirement that reductions in the conserving base acreages must be made on land that is suitable for continuous cropping.

That, in itself, would insure that most of the slightly less than 100 million acres in the base could not be freed for crop production. Much of it would be subject to erosion or other hazards and most farmers therefore would want to keep it in hay fields, grasses, and legumes.

There was no attempt by the USDA to estimate how much land could be affected by the technical örder, but ASCS technicians in Washington said "several million acres could be brought into production." That certainly would not be any more than has been lost from the base annually through attrition.

The USDA does expect heavier farmer participation this year in the feed grain program. It attributes this to (1) the attractive payment inducements and (2) the fear of another epidemic of Southern corn leaf blight.

"Those two factors in themselves are leading many farmers to inquire at the local ASCS offices on how they can reduce their conservation bases," a spokesman said. "We expect county committees to make adjustments as they are requested and as can be justified."

Frank Mosier, Kansas executive director for the ASCS, said he did not mittees a little more flexibility than, see anything in the notification from Washington that would lead to any increase in crop planting.

"It does give the county comperhaps, they had before," he said, "but overall I don't see any great change."



Hybrid Pearl **Millet Shows** Well In Test

Hybrid pearl millet produced more beef per acre than hybrid sundangrass in a test conducted at the Southeast Kansas Branch Experiment Station at Mound Valley. H. Bruce Perry, Kansas State University beef scientist, explained that Angus heifers averaging 630 pounds were used to study the beef production, grazing capacity and stocking rate of three pastures: hybrid pearl millet, hybrid sundangrass and sunda-sorghum cross. The pounds of beef produced,

number of grazing days and average stocking rates per acre were: 173 pounds, 158 days, 2.50 head for hybrid pearl millet; 107, 139, 2.20 for hybrid sundangrass; and 131, 148, 2.36 for sundan-sorghum.

Perry noted that visual observations indicated hybrid pearl millet was grazed more uniformly than the other crops.

If you don't get fertilizer down before Spring tillage, you may not get it down at all.

Things will be different this Spring.

Less fertilizer was applied last Fall and feed grains prices are expected to go up. These two factors and others should produce a big rush for fertilizer.

Some farmers won't get it when they want it. Others won't get it down at all.
