

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
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

Farmway Coop, Inc., the G&G area's biggest co-op, celebrated the grand opening of its new feed mill at the east edge of Beloit Wednesday September 15. The days events included guided tours of the new \$650,000 facility and a special program featuring Ernest Lindsey, president of Farmland Industries, as guest speaker. A free barbecue was served to about 1500 guests at noon.

Directors of Farmway Coop realized the need for a new feed mill about four years ago. The old mill had been in use for 25 years and its capacity had become inadequate. Decision was made in February 1970 to build the new mill and construction was started a year ago.

The new mill manufactures concentrated feeds with access to over 200 formulae. Feed can be made as meal, granules, pellets, and cubes. The new building stands 110 feet high. The warehouse room is 314 feet long and has storage





capacity for 1200 tons of sacked feed ready for distribution. There are 15 employees at the mill. They also operate five semi-trailer trucks in distributing the feed, 80% of which goes to Farmland Industries. The rest goes to most of the co-ops in northwest Kansas and to Colorado and Nebraska. Manager of the feed mill is Buck Gengler.

On hand for the program were eighteen managers of G&G area co-ops that will be serviced from here. They were seated on the loading dock which served as the stage for the program.

Master of ceremonies was Farmway's general manager Fritz Gwin.

## Family Farms Turn More Profit Than Corporate Ones

The family farm, if its owners can afford the large capital outlay necessary for full mechanization, often is more efficient than its corporate competitors, says the Agriculture Department.

The department's Economic Research Service says a well organized, fully mechanized family scale farm can produce goods at a lower cost per unit than either the larger, corporate-run farm or the smaller, non-mechanized far.

Researchers found that the low-cost one-man hog farm included 400-plus acres and produced 150 litters of pigs a year. And it took a total capital of \$200,000 to yield a net return of \$23,000. They said this assumes more normal hog prices than have prevailed in the past year.

They reported the low-cost one-man dairy farm had 235 acres, 40 cows, and required \$150,000 in capital. Net returns to operators would be \$15,000 or more.

The one-man irrigated cotton farm included 440 acres, of which 140 were in cotton. Total capital was almost \$300,000. This produced an operator-management income from the total operation of almost \$20,000.

The low-cost one-man corn farm had 760 acres of cropland. It needed over \$450,000 in capital to yield a return of slightly over \$30,000.

## Drought Knocking Out Corn Blight

The spread of southern corn leaf blight has come to a virtual standstill in the nation's corn producing areas, the Agriculture Department reports.

But the department said, a slight increase in the severity of infection has been noted. Plant pathologists generally attributed the slowdown in spread to a combination of dry weather in the corn belt states and fairly rapid maturing of the crop.

The only reportable spread of the disease occurred in the eastern states, where moisture levels have been somewhat higher than in the Midwest. The report said the spread was most noticeable in southeastern Pennsylvania, Maryland, Delaware and New Jersey.

The harvest is well underway in most southern states except for local areas where some lateplanted corn may still be subject to minor blight damages.

The department's report compares conditions during a two-week period beginning Aug. 9th against conditions existing last week. Blight was found in 77 percent of the 1500 sample fields in the corn belt states—seven percentage points more than the number of infected fields two weeks earlier.

## State Red Meat Slaughter Still On Rise

Kansas meat packers continue to show major increases in slaughter compared to a year ago. Through July slaughter was up 22 percent for the year, with July slaughter of 153 million pounds of red meat up 34 percent from July 1970.

Beef production is up 21 percent from a year ago. July cattle averaged 1032 pounds liveweight,

slightly lighter than the June slaughter.

Pork production was up 24 percent from a year ago, but has tapered off through midsummer. July production was less than June.

## Tighter Chemical Checks On Eggs

You may have heard of the small amounts of poultry and egg products being recalled in the Southeast because they were contaminated with polychlorinated biphenyls (PCBs).

As assurance to consumers, the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) has announced increased testing measures for PCBs throughout the nation.

Any commercial hens, breeder hens, or turkeys that come to market must have a written affidavit stating that they were not fed contaminated fish meal. Or they must have a private laboratory certificate showing what levels, if any, of PCBs they contain.

Poultry that comes to market without either of these must be held in cold storage after slaughter until samples can be tested under USDA supervision.


The poultry, submitted with affidavits or lab certificates, will be subject to check tests by USDA. If any of the tests show PCBs in unacceptable quantities—exceeding 0.5 parts per million—the poultry will be destroyed.

All egg products—liquid, frozen, or dried—also will be tested by USDA for PCB levels and will be destroyed if found to exceed the acceptable level.

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## Now A Registry For Multi-Cross

Beef Maker cattle are now a new registered and copyrighted American breed, G. A. Boucher of Ravenna, Nebr., founder of American Beef Maker Crossbred, announced Sept. 3.

Boucher said any beef animal with two or more crosses can be registered in this new association which is headquartered at Ravenna and Water Valley, Texas, near San Angelo.

Also a new registered breed is the Association of American Beef Maker (ABMC) is Char-Swiss, a breed founded by C. R. Adams of Water Valley. Char-Swiss are 3/4 Charolais and 1/4 Brown Swiss. This new breed is attained by breeding Brown Swiss cows to

Charolais bulls and then repeating purebred bulls on this offspring. A second method consists of using 1/2 Swiss—1/2 Charolais bulls on Charolais cows. The second method also results in a percentage of 3/4 Charolais and 1/4 Brown Swiss.

"I think that Char-Swiss will be the perfect bull to get the utmost hybrid vigor and lean carcasses from the English breed cattle and also produce replacement heifers within a herd that will give 25 per cent more milk," Boucher said.

"Talk and pedigrees don't raise calves—it takes milk. The greatest revolution in the cow business will come when breeders discover they can make 50 percent more profit by raising their own replacement heifers—heifers that put growth on the calf instead of fat on their backs," Boucher concluded.

## Trans-U.S. Air Fare To \$99

The Civil Aeronautics Board has approved a round-trip transcontinental family-dependent fare of \$99 designed to encourage businessmen to include their wives and children on coast-to-coast journeys.

American Airlines and Trans World Airlines plan to introduce the fares Oct. 1.

American will offer them for an experimental period ending Dec. 10. T.W.A. proposes to extend them through next May 31, with blackout periods of non-effectiveness during the Christmas-New Year and Easter holiday periods.

On both airlines the fare will apply between Boston, New York, Philadelphia and Baltimore-

Washington and Los Angeles and San Francisco.

The fare also will be available on American's flights serving Providence, R.I., and Hartford, Conn., and San Diego and Palm Springs, Calif.

The \$99 round trip tickets will be available for children and adults traveling with a head of family paying the regular round trip coach fare of \$310.

The regular coach round trip fare for children is \$155. Under the widely used family fare children are accommodated at 75 per cent of the adult fare, or \$232.50.

The new fare is valid only for trips with a maximum stay of four days. The family unit must travel together in both directions.

## French Try Communes To Hold Young To Farms

The French are experimenting with communal farming, partly in an effort to lure young people back to agriculture, the Foreign Agriculture Service says.

There are 2,000 such farms operating under provisions of a 1962 agricultural law designed also to achieve greater efficiency through

larger producing units.

For example, six people in a village in Burgundy organized a communal farm in 1967 with the primary objective of largescale pig raising on 740 acres.

When completed, the FAS report says, the communal will be able to raise up to 3,000 slaughter-weight hogs annually with much less manual labor.

A general assembly once a year reviews and analyzes finance and planning. Shortrange plans and operations are dealt with at weekly meetings where a different member is designated as manager.

Each member is responsible for a different area of farm production, and each is required to spend at least 15 days a year "studying a subject that will benefit the productivity of the whole organization," FAS says.

The farm was set up after a year of intensive study, conducted with the assistance of a government-paid management adviser.

## California Big Market For Meat Imports

California is one of the nation's largest feeding states, but its importance to the rest of the nation's livestock producers is pointed out by the fact that more than 136 million pounds of dressed beef, pork and lamb were shipped into the state from 41 states and four foreign countries during July. Iowa led all exporting states with 3.8 million pounds of beef and 16.7 million pounds of pork, followed by Colorado which shipped 11.4 million pounds of beef and 4.7 million pounds of pork into California in July.



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
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
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# Detailed Report On Farm Safety

Fatal farm accidents in Kansas reached a record low of 34 in 1970 with more than half of the accidents caused by tractor mishaps, according to a report by the Kansas State Dept. of Health.

In its annual report, the department included tables showing a constant annual decrease in farm fatalities since 1936. The decrease

coincides both with the total number of persons employed in agriculture and with such factors as increased use of modern equipment and decreased use of animals as farm power.

For instance, the total number of farm fatalities in Kansas in 1936 was 109, with only eight of those deaths caused in tractor accidents. In 1970,

18 of the 34 deaths involved tractor accidents, while there were no fatalities involving farm animals.

Altogether, farm machinery was listed as causing 21 of Kansas' 34 fatal farm accidents in 1970. The next greatest cause of fatal accidents was by falling objects and electrocution, each responsible for three deaths.

Of the remaining farm deaths in 1970, one was caused by drowning, one by lightning, one by heat stroke, one by accidental gunshot wound, one by falling off of a truck as it was being loaded, one by a fall from a moving truck and one by a welding explosion.

Of the 13 tractor-related fatalities, 11 involved the tractor being overturned. Four persons were killed when they fell from the tractors and three were killed in other tractor-related accidents.

The report also said that agriculture contributes more than any one single type of employment to the work fatalities in the state, with 38.6 per cent of the occupational deaths in 1970. The second highest figure was in the wholesale and retail trade category, which accounted for 15.9 per cent of Kansas' occupational deaths in 1970.

The report also shows that June is consistently the worst month of the year for farm fatality accidents. In 1970, nine persons were killed in farm accidents in June. August and October recorded four deaths each. There were no fatal farm accidents in November.


Other significant data in the report included:

- Only 1.8 per cent of the fatal farm accident victims throughout the past 10 years were females.
- During the last five years, fatal accidents on the farm occurred most frequently on Saturdays and Mondays and between 11 a.m. and

- More than 75 per cent of the victims of fatal farm accidents were age 15 or older.
- No farm work accidents have been recorded in Rawlins or Kingman during the past 10 years.

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# Half Of Serious Crimes Committed By Teenagers

Teen-agers now make up almost half of all persons arrested for serious crimes, and six out of 10 arrested for such crimes are under 21, according to government statistics.

"If you look at the figures, they're pretty shocking," said Jerris Leonard, working head of a new federal council charged by President Nixon with coordinating government juvenile delinquency problems.

The group was formed a month ago with John N. Mitchell, attorney general, as its chairman. Leonard, head of the Justice Department's Law Enforcement Assistance Administration, runs the council on a day-to-day basis.

At its first meeting the council looked at FBI crime statistics for 1970.

The figures show that arrests of juveniles jumped 114 per cent between 1960 and 1970; that 46 per cent of all arrests for serious crimes in 1970 involved juveniles, and that young offenders are most prone to be 2-time losers.


"The species with the higher market prices for the May 25, 1970, period include cottonwood, elm, hackberry, red oak, pecan-hickory, and willow.

"The hardwoods that remained even or had very little change include basswood, soft maple and white oak. Ash and sycamore are priced higher in the current market."

Gould believes the president's 10 percent import tax on all commodities will have a depressive affect on prices of export veneer log species.

Demand for export logs probably will be reduced for the 90-day period with a corresponding decrease in price. Providing the import tax is dropped when the price freeze expires, walnut veneer log prices probably will rise to their previous level, says Gould.

"In looking at the future of export log prices we must take into account the fact that prices will be depressed as long as the import surcharge continues because much of the exported raw materials are returned to the U.S. as components of manufactured items," he concludes.

## Timber Not Included Under Price Freeze

Timber sold by Kansas woodlands owners this fall is exempt from President Nixon's 90-day wage and price freeze order.

Leonard Gould, Extension Forester at Kansas State University, explains that timber products such as logs, bolts and pulpwood are considered raw agricultural products and therefore exempt from regulation.

Of course, prices for these items still will be subject to the competitive marketing activity of supply and demand.

Even if prices of these raw timber products were to increase in the next

few weeks, the increase would not necessarily be reflected in higher retail prices for wood products to consumers.

Rough and finished lumber is subject to the price freeze, which means wholesale and retail lumber firms and primary and secondary wood products manufacturers must abide by the freeze order. These would include sawmills, heading mills, furniture manufacturers, and firewood distributors.

Gould points out that the president's order states that the market price must not exceed the level attained for any lumber product for the base period July 16 through August 14.

This could provide some relief to the industry, says Gould, because if no transaction occurred from July 16 through August 14, the nearest 30-day period in which a transaction

occurred may be established as the base period. However, prices do not have to be set at levels less than those prevailing on May 25, 1970.






#### HYDROX PUDDING DESSERT

Dissolve 1 package unflavored gelatin in  $\frac{1}{2}$  cup cold water. Cook  $1\frac{1}{4}$  cups evaporated milk and 4 egg yolks until it bubbles (about five minutes). Watch closely as it sticks easily. Add gelatin and stir until cold. Crush 1 49 cent package of Hydrox cookies. Melt  $\frac{1}{4}$  cup butter and mix with crumbs. Line pan with some of this. Save some for topping. Beat 4 egg whites until very stiff. Beat  $1\frac{1}{4}$  cups or 2 packages Dream Whip until stiff. Add 1 teaspoon vanilla. Add cooked custard to egg whites. Fold in cream. Pour over crumbs and top with crumbs. Chill.



### Parents Must Direct, Encourage Child's Curiosity

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## Be Certain You Use Correct Shade Of Polish

If you are about to polish a pair of new brown shoes, make certain you use the correct shade of polish. Ordinary brown polish may deepen the shade of the leather and ruin the color scheme of your entire wardrobe.

According to the color consultants of a leading polish company, you should try as nearly as possible to match the color of polish to the shade of your shoe leather.

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To you, your shoes may be "brown" but to the manufacturer, they are chocolate, mahogany, charcoal, cordovan, ox-blood, taupe or rust. Applying a plain brown polish will change the shade of many of these browns and there's a shoe polish to go with each shade of brown.

It's best to ask the salesman where you purchased the shoes to suggest a proper shade of polish. And do polish your shoes regularly; polish keeps the leather supple, shining and protected.

To polish, make sure the leather is dry before applying polish. Do not place wet shoes near direct heat to dry as it will crack the leather. Brush mud and other dirt from shoes with a dry brush before polishing.

Use two coats of polish (paste polish is best), but brush and buff each coat separately. For badly soiled shoes apply a coat of saddle soap to shoes before the polish.

## Kid Drivers Getting Worse

The already disproportionate traffic death rate among young people is growing even further out of line from the rest of the population, the National Transportation Safety Board reports. And it called for action to cut the toll.

"Driving and riding with other young drivers constitute the greatest hazard to survival which American youth must pass successfully to reach adulthood," the board said.



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

The reserve champion crossbred was owned by Jeff Stroup, Linn county. The reserve Duroc was shown by Freddie Bond, Osage county.





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
## Rebut Complaint Over Government Jobs, Wages

Now a federal study indicates that municipal jobs often have higher pay than either federal or private employees in comparable jobs.



## Most Farm Land Value Increase Is In The South

The Agriculture Department reports the total market value of farm real estate as of last March 1 reached a record high of \$214 billion. It said this is a \$5.8 billion above figures for the same time in 1970 and \$11 billion above 1969.

The department said much of the increase in total dollar value occurred in the South. Between March 1970 and March 1971, the Southeast showed an 8 per cent gain in the average value of farm land—about twice the rate of most recent years. Total value increased only 1 per cent in the Corn Belt and Pacific regions.

The department said the appearance of farms on the open market is less effected by general economic conditions than by other factors, such as the advancing age and declining health of the operator.

Its report said the 82,600 voluntary and estate transfers larger than 10 acres accounted for more than 18.5 million acres in the year ending March 1, 1971, about 2 per cent of the land in farms. Total consideration for this acreage was \$4.8 billion.

Sales in the Corn Belt comprised 22 per cent of the total sales and a like percentage of the total dollar volume.

The report said, nationally, the average size of tracts sold was 224 acres, about the same as in other recent years. Parcels transferring in the Mountain States averaged 775 acres. The smallest tracts,





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## Utilities Tax Suits Still A State Case, Says Federal Court

A panel of three federal judges, seated at Wichita, has dismissed the Northern Natural Gas Co. \$1.8-million property tax suit against 38 Kansas county treasurers for lack of jurisdiction.

An opinion rendered by U.S. District Court Judges Wesley E. Brown, Frank G. Theis and Circuit Judge Delmas C. Hill sustained a motion by state attorneys alleging Northern's case was not eligible for federal court, because state court remedies had not been exhausted. Northern, an Omaha-based firm which owns and operates a gas pipeline running under portions of the 38 counties, filed the action June 20 seeking a judgment declaring the \$1.8 million in last-half 1970 ad valorem taxes void and illegal.

The suit alleged that Northern had been singled out for a higher property valuation, in violation of Kansas law which provides for a uniform standard to be exercised on a statewide basis.

Valuations and assessments for 1969 and 1970 were grossly excessive, the action said, "and the result of an adopted policy or practice of constructive fraud and discrimination."

The company said it had paid all of 1969 and first-half 1970 taxes under protest, with tax money impounded and held in trust by county treasurers pending outcome of legal actions.

Some 95 actions for refund were filed with the State Board of Tax Appeals, resulting in adverse decisions for the firm. Northern then appealed the 1969 order to a state district court and thereafter to the Kansas Supreme Court. Two appeals were taken from the 1970 orders to the state district courts. All are pending.

However, Northern did not pay the last-half 1970 taxes into the protest fund, and in order to avoid a 10 per cent delinquency penalty, the firm attempted to file the \$1.8 million with federal court, claiming only about \$811,000 of the amount had been legally assessed the company.

Although this move was rejected by the same three-judge panel, a temporary restraining order was issued enjoining county treasurers from confiscating Northern's property under delinquent personal property tax warrants.

In the opinion, the judges said the

U.S. Supreme Court has ruled where an adequate remedy exists in the state courts, taxpayers must exhaust such remedy before seeking federal relief.

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

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
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## 75 YEARS OF WEDDED LIFE

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

#### Area Appears To Have Escaped Corn Blight

Kansas seems to have escaped severe corn yield damages from southern corn leaf blight and a record corn harvest could be in store.

In a recent survey Extension plant pathologists at Kansas State University found that the disease confined most of its damage to corn leaves and ear husks and not to the grain itself.

Dr. William G. Willis said that the most severe blight areas were in southeast and east central counties as far north as Leavenworth county and west to Shawnee and Elk counties. A band of counties surrounding this area had moderate infection.

Willis indicated that losses will not be as extreme as they might have been in southeastern counties because early corn escaped severe damage even when late leaf infection was severe. Then dry weather in August halted the disease spread in northeastern counties.

Willis found but few fields where the corn ears were damaged

#### Blighted Corn Can Be Fed To Hogs

Blighted corn can be fed to swine without adverse effects.

Extension swine specialist Wendell Moyer at Kansas State University points out that blighted corn has been evaluated in swine experiments at various universities without indications that southern corn leaf blight is toxic to animals.

Most researchers were interested in the new strain of the fungus which appeared throughout the cornbelt in 1970.

In University of Florida tests control groups were fed corn with slight blight infestation and compared with hogs fed corn with considerable blight damage. Grain and feed efficiency were approximately the same in each group.

In University of Illinois trials, young pigs fed blight-free grain. When pigs were given free choice of normal or blighted corn, they ate three times more diseased corn.

In an Ohio State University experiment, pigs fed blighted corn ate less feed and gained more slowly but utilized feed better than pigs fed normal corn.

Pigs fed blighted corn by Purdue University scientists gained slightly faster and required less feed per pound of gain than pigs given blight-free corn. In another Purdue test, gilts fed blighted corn 10 days before breeding experienced no particular

pregnancy problems.

Moyer says that while no toxic effects have resulted from feeding blighted corn to hogs, secondary mold infection on the blighted corn is a potential danger.

If molds are present, producers should not feed the corn to breeding animals or to young pigs under 75 pounds.

Although blight-damaged corn is usually higher in fiber and protein and lower energy, no change in ration formulation is recommended.

#### More Talk On Sawdust Into Cattle Feed

The U.S. Forest Products Laboratory has reported development of a process "with strong potential" for converting sawdust into stock feed.

Director H. O. Fleischer said the

new method for making wood pulp stands the test of competing economic livestock feed.

Pelletized feed containing red oak sawdust is a medium quality hay. If the wood pulp is processed for feed, the combat hay shows periodically occur in the country.

"In addition, a process could lend itself to mechanical processing operations. It is also a year-round basis."

## Farm Groups Ask Nixon For Post-Freeze Break

Representatives of five major farm organizations have told President Nixon they would question wage and price increases for any sector of the economy unless provisions were made for a significant upward adjustment in farm incomes first.

Setting aside political and philosophical differences, the farm leaders told Nixon that the cost-price squeeze had been especially severe on farmers; and that partly because of dramatic gains in farm productivity, farm income rose only 10 per cent over the last two decades while prices paid by consumers jumped 52 per cent.

Accordingly, they joined in asking the President for the following two items of relief when the present 90-day freeze period expires:

A system under which other industries would be forced to justify wage and price increases on the basis of productivity—a move farmers clearly hope will curb inflationary wage settlements in manufacturing.

An unspecified increase in

government support for farm prices.

"Negotiated high wages not supported by increased productivity has placed pressure on prices and hence the wage-price spiral," said John W. Scott, master of the National Grange, in a statement read to the President at the beginning of the 90-minute White House meeting. "The power of both labor and management to set the costs of labor inputs and prices received—unrelated to efficiency or productivity—must be controlled if we are to have a stabilized economy and progressive economic growth."

Raw farm products are exempt from the present 90-day freeze, but the farm leaders made clear their belief that the exemption means little in terms of farm income since farm prices are so low to begin with.

Accordingly, their main objectives Tuesday were to persuade the President to keep a firm hand on prices of manufactured goods when the 90-day freeze period expires by linking wages increases to productivity; and to persuade him to ask Congress for stronger and higher price supports for their own products.

The meeting Tuesday was the third in a series of sessions with various interest groups. The purpose of the meetings, according to the White House, is to give Nixon a range of views on how to proceed.

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## X-Ray Dangers From Television Overrated

The Food and Drug Administration says that government-industry efforts to reduce X-ray emissions from home television sets have made it possible to rescind previous warnings to viewers.

Several years ago, FDA's Bureau of Radiological Health recommended viewers sit at least six feet away from an operating TV set to minimize the relatively low biological damage potential of possible X-ray leakages.

A new consumer pamphlet issued by the FDA says there now should be no significant health hazard in watching a properly serviced and operated home TV at a distance at which image quality is satisfactory to the viewers.

The pamphlet says X-ray emissions from sets produced since mid-1968 have been found to be too low to present a public health problem.

There is no evidence of human injury caused by X-ray emissions from TV sets, the pamphlet says; however, it cautions that scientists have not yet learned what health effects may be expected from even the smallest doses of low level radiation over long periods of time.

Since June 1 of this year, manufacturers have been required to produce sets that will not emit X-rays at levels above 0.5 of a milliroentgen per hour under the most adverse operating conditions. Most sets, when operating under normal conditions, emit far less than the allowable level set by law.

The television X-ray problem dates from 1966 when a TV manufacturer discovered that certain large screen color sets emitted X-rays in excess of the 0.5-milliroentgen level.

Television manufacturers are required to submit test results on X-ray emissions from their sets to the federal government and also are

subject to inspections by the FDA's Bureau of Radiological Health. Imported television sets also are required to meet the U.S. standards. The pamphlet says to date, foreign-made sets have been in compliance.

The pamphlet advises consumers to check the back of sets before buying to verify that a tag is affixed certifying the set is manufactured to government standards for X-ray emissions.



## Still Too Much Corn, Too Few Soybeans

The prospective corn crop shrank 1½ percent during August, but the expected harvest still exceeds year-ahead needs by a near-record amount.

Dry weather in western and northern Corn Belt areas during the late summer cut prospective crop yields. The largest losses were in Nebraska, South Dakota, Minnesota, Iowa, and Michigan. Most other Corn Belt states reported small improvements in corn prospects during August.

On the basis of September 1 conditions, the federal-state crop reporting service at Springfield estimated the Illinois corn crop at 955 million bushels. This was 1 percent more than the August 1 forecast, and 28 percent more than last year. The average yield for the state was listed at 93 bushels per acre. This yield would be 19 bushels more than last year, but 7 bushels short of the 100-bushel record set in 1968.

The USDA estimated the national corn crop at 5,265 million bushels, down 1½ percent from the figure indicated on August 1. But this small reduction makes no significant change in the corn situation and outlook. There is still too much corn.

**Surplus Tops 600 Million Bushels**  
The prospective corn harvest exceeds expected needs for domestic uses and exports by more than 600 million bushels. This excess of crop over needs is second only to that of 1948, when the harvest exceeded needs by nearly 700 million bushels.

Neither farmers nor grain dealers will want to add such an amount to their holdings, so the Government will get the excess grain. Farmers can limit the price decline by using the Government's price-support program. Judging from past experience, however, farmers will not make adequate use of the USDA

program until prices hang below the loan level for several months. If too few farmers use the program, prices may decline again near the end of the marketing year.

The soybean situation is quite opposite that for corn: The expected crop is short of potential sales—and reserves are almost gone.

The carryover of old soybeans on September 1 has been reduced from 230 million bushels last year to around 100 million bushels this year. (The official figure will be released on September 23.) This amount was little more than enough to keep the mills and pipelines running until new beans flow freely.

Judging from conditions on September 1, the USDA estimated the new crop at only 1,1876 million bushels, compared with 1,136 million last year. If the beans were available, domestic and foreign buyers probably would take at least 1,300 million bushels of U.S. soybeans this year—100 million more than are in sight. Foreign buyers now take more than half of our soybean crop.

While the United States has a near-monopoly on soybean production, there are many substitutes for the primary soybean products—soybean oil and meal. Hence the course of soybean prices may depend largely upon the production of competitive materials. The products that are competitive with soybean oil include cottonseed, peanut, sunflower, rapeseed, olive, coconut, palm, and fish oils; and butter and lard. The materials that compete with soybean meal include cottonseed, linseed, peanut, copra, meat, and fish meals; and tankage, milk products, gluten feed, and distillers and brewers grains.

# People Collecting Most Of Interest Money

The clamor for a lid on interest rates is growing and politicians are making labor heads in advocating a freeze. The administration does not see fit to include interest or corporate profits in the 90-day freeze on wages and prices.

There are briefs that could support a limit on interest or profits, but those who favor such a move overlook the fact that the public could be affected more than corporations.

The impression is gathered that interest payments are chiefly a burden exacted by banks and other financial institutions upon individuals and nonfinancial business concerns. Overlooked is the fact that corporations, banks and other financial institutions pay interest and that individuals are by far the largest recipient of interest.

There are those who picture an economy heavily indebted to banks (which of course is true) and fail to recognize the fact that the banks and other institutions are themselves heavily indebted to the rest of the country.

The investment banking firm of Monon Brothers, New York, one of the largest underwriters and dealers in the country, last week analyzed the interest payments and receipts, based on 1970, and the results showed that the amount of receipts (the difference between what was paid and what was received) was heavily weighted to individual. In fact, over three times as much went to individuals as to institutions.

The gross interest receipts of individuals were about the same as those of institutions, but the gross interest payments of individuals, including interest on home mortgages and on consumer credit, were far less than gross interest payments of institutions.

The difference was made up largely by nonfinancial business and the federal government, both of which made very heavy net interest payments. State and local governments were about in balance with interest receipts approximately equaling payments.

The breakdown by the Salomon firm, which was derived from national income accounts (official) and others, was its own projection, based on official estimates of debt totals:

- Individuals.** The amount of interest received in 1970 totaled \$65 billion and the amount that was paid on debt totaled \$33 billion. This left a net receipt of \$32 billion.
- Financial Institutions.** Interest received aggregated \$64 billion and payments to other on their own debt amounted to \$50 billion. The net interest received by the banks and other financial institutions, therefore, was \$14 billion.
- Non-Financial Business.** In this category were the borrowings of corporations that sold billions of dollars of bonds to investors. The amount of interest they received was \$19 billion, but they paid out \$50 billion resulting in a net outlay of \$31 billion.
- U.S. Government.** The federal government's gross interest received was \$9 billion and the interest paid on debt was \$24 billion. The difference was a net payout of \$15 billion.
- State and Local Governments.** The amount received and the amount paid was about \$6 billion each. Included in the income figure was the interest earned by retirement and operating funds.

"From these data it can be said that if all interest rates were allowed to fluctuate freely, the largest income beneficiaries of high interest rates would be individuals as a group, and the largest sufferers from high interest rates would be nonfinancial business concerns," according to Sidney Homer and Henry Kaufman, economists for the investment firm.

The ultimate success of the President's new game plan for the U.S. economy depends more on monetary policy than on specific measures in the program itself, First National City Bank, New York, states in its September letter.

Those who are pressing for price restraint in the credit markets—for voluntary or legal ceilings on interest rates—can claim to be on the side of a responsible monetary policy. The difficulty is that inflation expectations in the credit markets may not wither fast enough to offset the upward pressures on interest rates that will be generated by improved business conditions, notes Citibank.

In such an event, open market rates would climb despite voluntary constraints, and interest rates charged by banks and other financial intermediaries could be held steady only at the cost of more and more nonprice rationing of credit.

Business fears of government-imposed credit controls, the New York bank observes, could lead to a surge in credit demands that would "overwhelm the voluntary rate ceilings and precipitate the very controls that borrowers were beginning to hedge against."

With such thoughts in mind the decline in interest rates to date have been moderate in the wake of the President's message. Market interest rates remain below their August 13 levels, the week preceding the announcement of the new

economic policies. The rise in prices and, conversely, the decrease in yields presumably reflects the confidence of market participants that the new policies will succeed in reducing the rate of price inflation.

The rally in the debt market since mid-August is strongly supported by a sharp drop in the volume of new long-term corporate bond financing and also by the extraordinary volume of new savings flowing into

institutions.

Some observers add that the response (to interest rates) also was the belief that monetary policy will no longer be the only defense against inflation and that the international defense of a fixed dollar parity will no longer require high interest rates.



## Law Requires Slow Vehicles To Be Marked

Kansas employers are now required by federal regulation to display a slow-moving vehicle emblem on all vehicles operated by employees on public roads at speeds less than 25 mph.

The requirement for display of this warning on all slow-moving vehicles is the result of a new regulation enforceable under the Williams-Steiger Occupational Safety and Health Act of 1970, points out Richard Jepsen, Extension rural civil defense specialist at Kansas State University.

The National Safety Council issued a policy statement in 1966 urging the use of this warning emblem.

The emblem consists of a fluorescent yellow-orange triangle with a dark red reflective border visible in daylight. The fluorescent border creates a hollow red triangle in the path of motor vehicle headlights at night.

The regulation applies to farmers who have employees driving slow-moving vehicles on public roads as well as to contractors and similar firms.

The emblem can be purchased from most implement dealers. It is not expensive and is transferable from one vehicle to another, Jepsen concluded.





# Rails In Better Shape To Handle Big Crops—But Good Enough?

The view at the Kansas City Board of Trade is that the transportation industry is better oriented this year than in recent times to move grain, but whether it will be able to handle this fall's huge crops without serious trouble remains to be seen.

The situation for the fall is full of "ifs."

Curiously, as the grain trade here sees it, the indicated improved ability of the railroads to move large quantities of grain is not because of the adding of needed equipment. The fact is, there are fewer boxcars available now than some years ago. These traditionally have been the workhorses of the grain movement. There are, however, more of the new big hopper cars, but it is not believed the new hopper cars are of sufficient number to replace all the older boxcars which have been abandoned as obsolete.

Where the improvement lies is in cooperation among the railroads, the trade (grain shippers), and the Interstate Commerce commission. In effect, this cooperation was forced by "boxcar shortages" which had grown from something regarded as chronic, to one of crisis proportions.

A few years ago, the Kansas City Board of Trade asked railroads to

meet with grain men to see if something could be done. The meetings have continued twice a year since.

At the start, the principal contention of the western railroads was that too many of their boxcars were being held by eastern and southern railways. Grain men began to learn what railroad men were talking about when they referred to "percentage of ownership" on their own lines. As an example, if a railroad owned 10,000 boxcars but had only 5,000 on its lines, regardless of which railroad owned the cars, it would then have equivalent to 50 percent of ownership on line.

The western railroads complained that in the movement of commodities, boxcars hauled grain from the middle of the country (the main farm belt) to the east and south, and then these same cars were loaded with other freight for transportation throughout the industrial east. The western railroads had a hard time getting them back. On this problem, they asked for help.

Meanwhile, grain transportation needs were being expanded. The amount of grain being produced far exceeds the totals of some years ago. Not only that, more of it moves from the farms where it is produced. The huge broiler plants and cattle feedlots require feed that once would

have been utilized on farms. In addition, our exports are double what they were 15 or 20 years ago. So not only is more grain produced, but a greater proportion has to be shipped.

The grain trade's side of the issue was much more simple and blunt. They just could not get the boxcars when they were needed.

To get more of the boxcars back onto western lines when they were needed, the Board of Trade, farm organizations, farm belt members of Congress, and others appealed to the Interstate Commerce Commission. The ICC has the authority to issue "service orders" which require railroads to return empty boxcars to the lines that own them. The ICC would do this after proof that such action was necessary. The grain trade at Kansas City was contending that by the time proof was established each year, a boxcar shortage crisis would have developed.

At the most recent meeting of railroads and the grain trade in Kansas City, the Union Pacific, Burlington Northern, Missouri Pacific, Rock Island and Santa Fe Lines were represented, as well as the Interstate Commerce Commission and the government's Commodity Credit Corporation. The subject was the movement of the fall

harvest. It was agreed generally that some improvements seem apparent in the case of nearly all past difficulties. These improvements were manifest in the movement of the 1970 harvest, which was accomplished with a minimum of difficulties.

However, the transportation problem in 1970 got a big assist from smaller crops of corn and milo. This year, exactly the opposite is true as record harvests are promised not only on corn and milo, but also soybeans, and the nation has harvested its biggest wheat crop.

But it was pointed out at the meeting that the ICC is much quicker to act now than previously. In fact, commented one railroad official, "They are asking us to warn them if trouble is approaching instead of insisting on proof of the fact." The result is, cars are ordered west earlier in anticipation of the harvest movement.

The grain trade has been trying to do a better job of utilizing cars. Board of Trade officials compliment the railroads for trying to do a better job overall — and this is an innovation. The railroads reported that they were getting more power — bigger engines to pull longer trains.

Thus, with some optimism, the railroads and the trade look forward to the big harvest.

## Require Less Money For State School Aid

State aid to Kansas school districts would decrease slightly under budget requests approved by the State Board of Education.

The board requested \$83,321,540 to finance the State Foundation Finance Plan in the 1973 fiscal year. This compares with \$86,717,000 estimated for the current fiscal year.

This is in line with a downward trend in the amount of money needed to finance the foundation formula. The requested supplemental aid figure of \$26 million would be unchanged from the present year.

In all, the board asked \$159.04 million for aid to local education agencies.

Dr. C. Taylor Whittier, Kansas commissioner of education, said this compares with \$158.34 million for the current year if \$7 million in federal funds which has become available is included.

The federal money cannot be included in this year's budget without approval of the State Finance Council, however. A request is pending with the council for approval to include the ad-

ditional federal funds in the current budget.

Whittier said the request includes an increase of \$525,000 in the amount sought for aid to vocational-technical schools and a hike of slightly more than \$1 million in the amount of state aid proposed for special education programs.

The board asked state aid to vocational-technical schools and a

The board asked state aid to junior colleges be increased from \$3,336,000 a year to \$4,153,688.

The board approved a request for \$475,000 to pay a state share designed to keep federal school lunch money available to school districts in the state.

State Easing  
Out Of Farm  
Project In India

The Agricultural Production Project of Kansas State University in India is now being phased out. The project, which began in 1967, was a successful operation, Dr. Ray V. Olson, Director of International Agricultural Programs for KSU,

the last of the American specialists to serve on the project, M. Hamon, a KSU agronomist, leave India in October, Olson said. A total of eight specialists have worked on the KSU team in India in the past four years. The purpose of the KSU work in India was to assist the Indian State Department of Agriculture and the Andhra Pradesh University in developing an Extension Service which would help Indian farmers increase their production. The project was to bring closer the relationship of Andhra Pradesh University with the Extension Service. This meant the mobilizing of agricultural education, research, and extension services into a unified coordinated effort, Olson said.

The KSU project in India was operated under an agreement with the U.S. Agency for International Development at the request of the Government of India.


The KSU team worked in five principal areas including soil fertility, irrigation, seed production, farm mechanization and plant protection. They established several projects for teaching and demonstration purposes including a water utilization laboratory, farm implements demonstration centers, a farm machinery training center, a root grubs control project, and intensive training for field evaluation of pesticides and research into the problem of pest control.

While K-State is phasing out the Agricultural Production Project, Olson said, it will continue to work with Andhra Pradesh University in the development of irrigation,



## 'Welfare Cuts Don't Hurt Administrators'

The chairman of the Kansas Senate subcommittee on Public Health and Welfare has charged that injustice is riding high in the Kansas welfare program. He said what is needed now is fair distribution of available funds and not more money.

Sen. John F. Vermillion (R-Independence) said the 1971 session of the Legislature did not intend that cuts be absorbed entirely by Kansas welfare clients.

"The Legislature's appropriation for welfare was ample, but the

distribution has been misinterpreted," Vermillion said. "The intent of the Legislature was for the reduction of funds to be divided equally throughout the agency, including administrative expenses."

"The intent of the cutback was that all unnecessary fees be eliminated as well as inefficiency and fraud, so long as welfare needs were met in each Kansas county," Vermillion added.

Earlier this week, Richard S. McAnany, vice-chairman of the state Board of Social Welfare, said a \$1.2 million cut was being made to welfare clients during August and September. Vermillion said he was surprised to see really needy people's allotments cut, while salaries of administrators and employees were not.

Vermillion said in his home county

of Montgomery, social workers and clerks in some instances were drawing in excess of \$800 monthly while comparable jobs in the county courthouse paid only \$450.

"I believe not enough concern is being shown to the really needy and there's too much shown for staff salaries and fringe benefits," Vermillion said.

"I also believe many of the aged, who are needy, are being denied funds simply because no big effort is being made to correct the sad state of affairs in the Aid to Dependent Children Department."

Foreign agriculture experts are more conservative and estimate the crop to be closer to 110 million tons, but even by their figures it will be a bountiful harvest.



# Soviets A Market For Feed Grain?

rising demand in the Soviet Union for meat is creating interest in the Agriculture Department over the possibility of a new export market for U.S. livestock feed, particularly soybean meal.

A top-level team of USDA specialists is in the Soviet Union. One of its aims is to check on export possibilities for high protein livestock feed, officials say.

The Soviet Union is a small export market for U.S. farmers, buying less than \$16 million worth of products last year, mostly cattle hides. Total U.S. farm exports last year amounted to \$7.8 billion.

Soviet teams are expected to visit the U.S. this fall to study production of soybeans, fruits and vegetables. Per capita meat consumption in the Soviet Union has been rising steadily, from 41 kilograms in 1965 to nearly 50 last year, according to USDA information. A kilogram is about 2.2 pounds.

The increased demand has meant an expansion in Soviet livestock production, with recent interest in feedlot operations similar to those which have dominated U.S. beef

production.

## Use Chemicals Or Have Famine, Seen As Choice

A return to organic farming is not the answer to the war against chemical food treatment, a former assistant secretary of agriculture said last week at the St. Joseph Area Chamber of Commerce Agri-Business dinner.

"If we go back to it, we must decide which 50 million of our people will starve," said Dr. Earl Butz.

Dr. Butz is a former dean of the Purdue University School of agriculture and served in the Department of Agriculture during the Eisenhower administration. He is director of the Purdue Research Foundation.

"We must decide if we want to eliminate risk in using chemicals or antibiotics in food production or whether we want to have an adequate, nutritious and economical food supply for our growing millions," he said.

# New Rules May Be Tough For Small Airports To Heed

Many smaller airports throughout the country, including several in Kansas, face major renovation of their operating procedures and physical facilities if regulations proposed by the Federal Aviation Administration go into effect as scheduled next May.

The regulations, part of the Airport Airway Development Act of 1970 approved by Congress, would require airports served by certificated air carriers to implement services and plans not now being provided in some smaller cities.

## Nine Airports

There are nine airports in Kansas which would be affected by the new rules—Topeka's Municipal Airport, and those at Manhattan, Salina, Wichita, Hays, Goodland, Liberal, Garden City and Tri-Cities Airport which serves Parsons, Independence and Coffeyville.

The proposed standards include 24-hour fire and rescue service at the airport site, around-the-clock police protection, smoke control and several directives pertaining to airport safety.

The regulations will go into effect May 21, 1972, unless the deadline is deferred by congressional action, according to Ray Arvin, director of the aviation division of the Kansas Dept. of Economic Development.

## Delay Possible

A congressional delay is possible, Arvin said, since several U.S. senators favor a one-year deferment. The regulations may be altered, but the most controversial requirement—that of 24-hour fire and rescue protection—is expected to remain.

## Fire Protection

Arvin said he believes the fire protection provision, if included, will

be one of the more difficult for smaller airports to meet.

The regulations also would require airports to adopt and forward to the federal government for approval an emergency plan outlining specific procedures and duties of personnel in case of an accident, natural disaster, medical emergency or similar situation.

Other safety provisions call for special handling methods for aviation fuel, daily safety inspections, and high level of safety on principal runways, taxi and ramp areas.

## Safety Standards

The guidelines are aimed primarily at airports that do not have adequate facilities to meet safety standards, Arvin said.

Financing the items required by the rules probably will be the biggest problem facing airports, Arvin said


there is an aviation trust fund maintained by the federal government, but he has no indication now that any of the money will be made available to municipalities to buy equipment to meet the certification rules.

A proposed change to the Airport Airways Act would make some federal funds available for that purpose, Arvin noted.

## Periodic Inspection

If the rules are placed into effect, airports will receive their certification from the FAA and will maintain the certificate as long as the airport meets the standards, subject to periodic inspection by the FAA.

"The city of Topeka is going to have to really get concerned and get moving in the event the rules become effective next May," Arvin warned.


