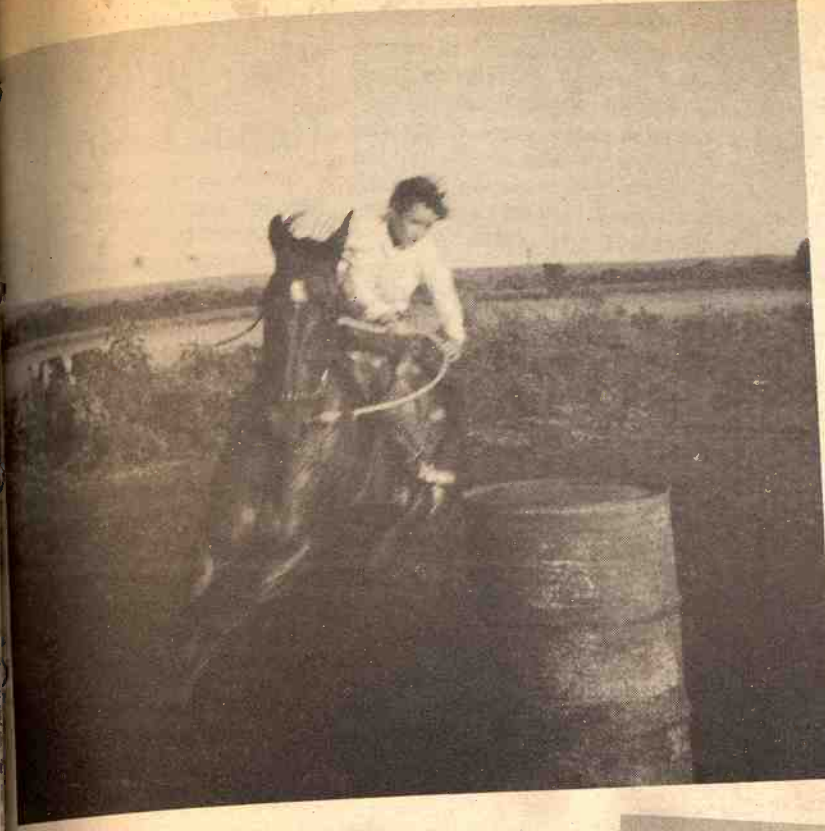

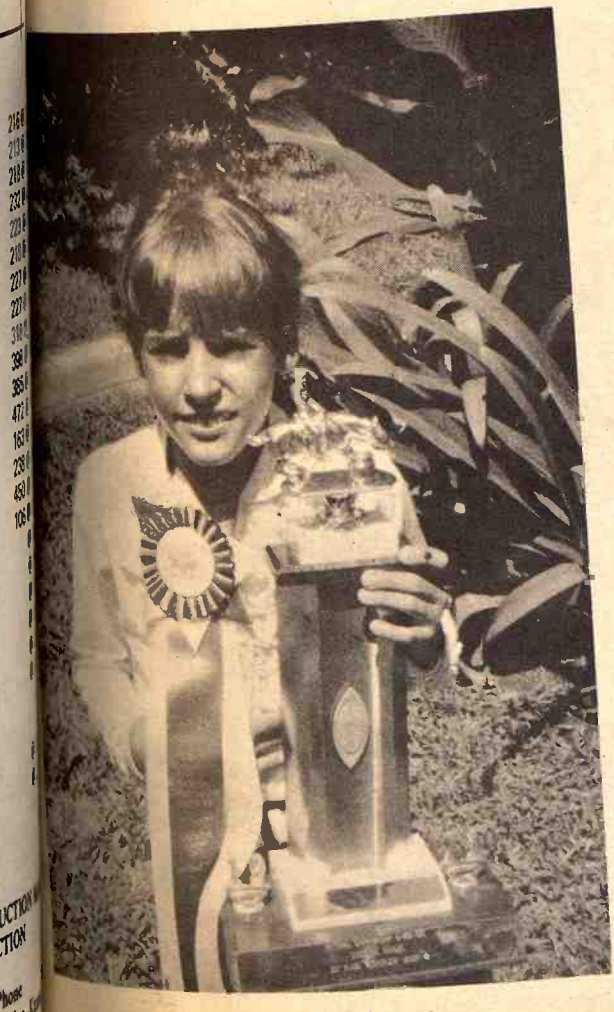
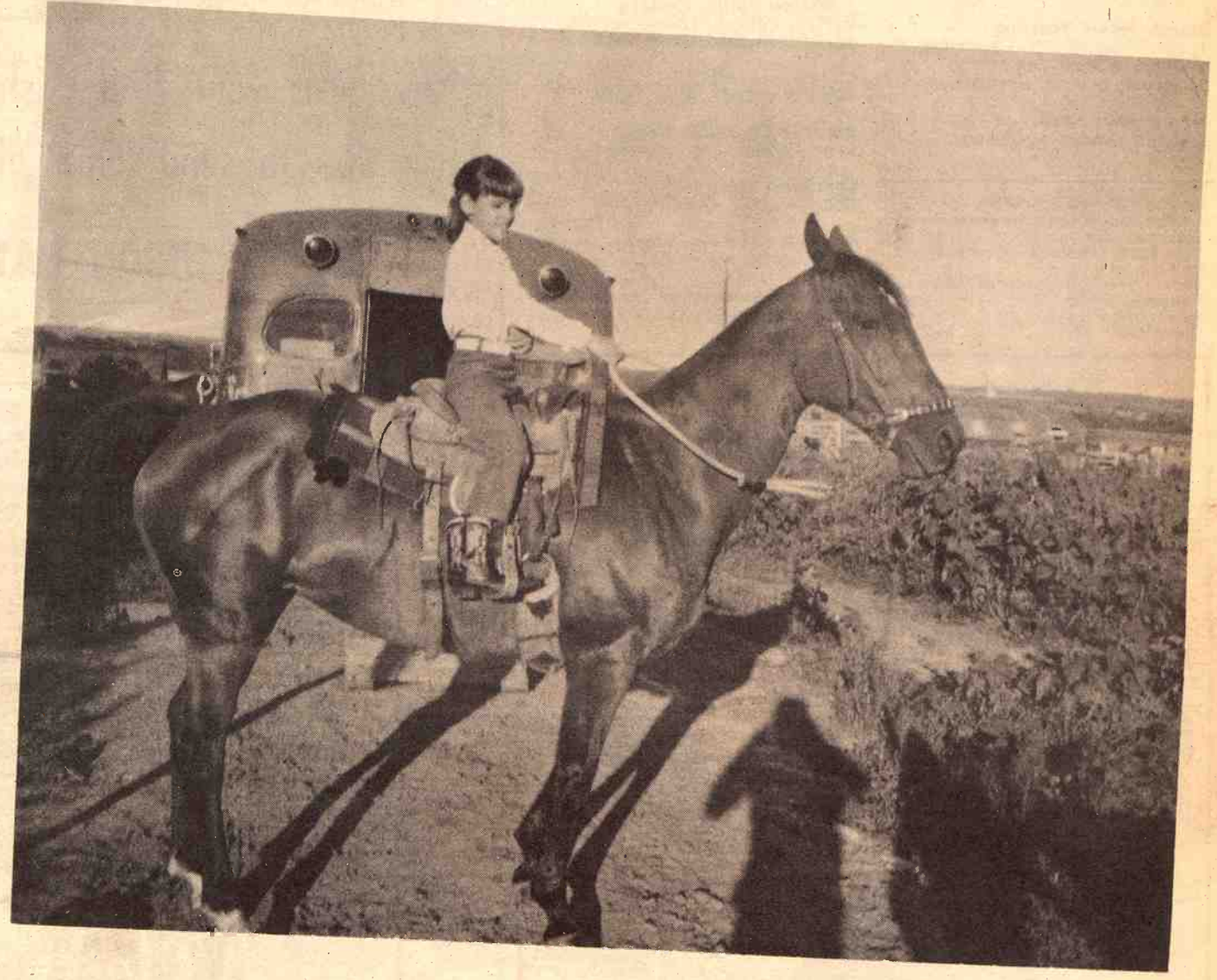

Another Million Dollar Ranch Sale By Wildin

For the third time in recent months a G&G area real estate company has sold a \$1 million ranch.

Doug Wildin, realtor with the Gene Watson Land & Cattle Co. of Hutchinson, said a 12,900-acre ranch near Ashland had been sold recently to Sol Bouziden, Bouziden Brothers and Sons of Alva, Okla.

The price was not disclosed but it is known that the Whiteford Ranch had been priced around the \$1 million mark.

The late Hugh Whiteford, Kansas

city banker, had owned the ranch located north of Ashland in Clark county in southwest Kansas.

The stone house which still stands on the ranch was built by Lot Ravenscraft, a stone mason and onetime sheriff in Clark county, who bought the ranch in 1886.

Auto Gain Avoids American Motors

Ford, GM and Chrysler had increased car sales in the first half of 1971 but American Motors has had a 5 percent drop.

General Motors was up close to 10 percent over last year, with sales of 2.265 million cars for January-June. Buick sales hit their highest figures for June in 16 years.

Ford sales for the 6 months were up 8 percent—to 1.168 million.

Chrysler had a 5 percent gain for the half year—to 716,000 autos.

American Motors was down 5.3 percent, with sales for the 6 months at 128,000.

New Surface Strickler Funds Turnpike Reading

The Kansas Turnpike Authority will help supply additional materials for the reading room of the KSU department of dairy and poultry husbandry. The gift was a Ford Motor Company Fund check presented by Ivan Strickler, Iola, a 1971 Ford Farm Efficiency Award winner in the dairy category.

Strickler, an outstanding Kansas dairyman and Holstein breeder, was one of 14 farmers and the only chairman in the United States selected to receive Ford Farm Efficiency Awards this year. Selections were based on the ability of farmers to combine management skills with feed and machinery available to other farmers to accomplish exceptional records.

Each of the 14 award winners was invited by the Ford Fund to recommend a grant of \$2,000 to educational institutions of their choice and to designate purposes for which the grants would be used.

According to Dr. C. L. Norton, head of K-State's department of dairy and poultry science, Strickler's gift has been deposited with the KSU Endowment Association and interest from the fund will be used for enriching reading materials available to K-State students.

Strickler is a K-State alumnus. Since graduating in 1947 he has farmed the home farm northeast of Iola. Strickler has three sons, Steve, Tom, and Doug, and the oldest, Steve, is a sophomore at KSU majoring in dairy science.

Accomplishments of the 14 Ford Farm Efficiency Award winners are

featured in the 1971 Ford Almanac, a handbook distributed through Ford car and tractor dealers and bookstores.

The Ford Motor Company Fund is an educational, scientific, and charitable organization financed primarily by contributions from Ford Motor Company. It is not related to the Ford Foundation.

New Contract Worth 265 Jobs At Wichita Boeing

Boeing at Wichita, Kan., has been awarded a \$41.7 million contract from the Air Force.

In a joint announcement, Sens. James Pearson and Bob Dole,

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Kansas Republicans, and Rep. Garner Shriver, R-Kan., said the money would be used for 17 electro-optical-viewing-system kits for B52 bombers.

A Boeing spokesman in Wichita said approximately one-half of the money will be spent to buy material from five major suppliers for the system, all located out of Kansas.

The system will be installed in B52 G-H level bombers, the spokesman said. Those bombers are designed for nuclear deterrence and are not used with conventional weapons, he said.

Work on the contract, which will last one year, will begin immediately.

The funding should employ about 265 persons in the Wichita plant, a legislative assistant said.

Pearson's office disclosed that Boeing-Wichita stands what it termed "an excellent possibility" of getting a four-year \$200 million contract for the visual system, which would be expanded to include more of the 280 B52s in the American arsenal.

The contract is the fifth one to be awarded in recent months to the Wichita plant, a legislative spokesman said. He said it is the largest one.

NEW ALBANY — For the first time in 40 years, a man has been elected mayor here. Women have held the position since 1931, when pranksters wrote in the name of Mrs. F.F. Bivins, wife of mayor at the time, and she was elected.

Mayor Frank Carr commented, "I guess the ladies sort of got caught with their votes down." Carr was asked to go on the ballot by a group of citizens when longtime mayor, Mrs. Zelda Maxwell, declined to run again.

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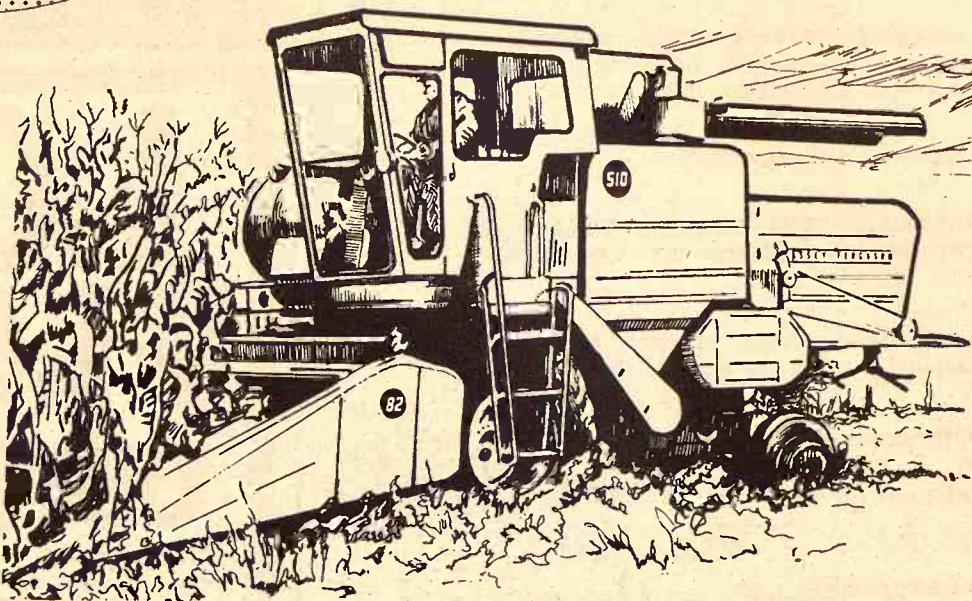

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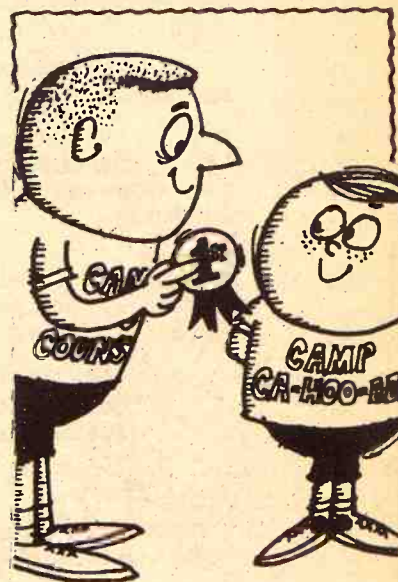

Mrs. Dloyd Strnad, R 2, Formoso, is this week's prize winner.
PINEAPPLE HAMBURGER LOAVES

Mix:

- 1 pound ground hamburger
- 1 pound sausage
- 1 cup tomato juice or soup
- 1 cup crushed cornflakes
- 1 egg
- Dash pepper

Shape into individual loaves and roll in additional crushed cornflakes. Top each loaf with 2 tablespoons crushed pineapple and put a maraschino cherry on top. Make a sauce of $\frac{1}{4}$ cup vinegar and $\frac{1}{2}$ cup brown sugar. Boil together one minutes. Baste loaves and put in a 350-degree oven for one hour.

QUICK CHERRY DESSERT

Take 2 cups tart cherries, $\frac{2}{3}$ cups crushed pineapple, $\frac{1}{4}$ cups sugar, one-third cup quick tapioca, almond and cherry flavoring. Cook till thick and clear, stirring constantly. Mix 1 cup bran flakes, $\frac{3}{4}$ cup oleo or butter, 1 cup quick oatmeal, 2 cups flour, 1 cup brown sugar, $\frac{1}{4}$ teaspoon salt, 1 teaspoon soda, $\frac{1}{2}$ teaspoons vanilla. Crumble all together till well mixed. Put half of mixture into 9x13-inch pan then spread on the

cooked cherry mixture. Next put other half of crumb mixture on top and bake at 350 degrees for around 30 minutes.

CHOCOLATE POUND CAKE

- 2 cups sugar
- 1 cup oleo, (soft)
- 4 eggs
- 2 teaspoons vanilla
- $\frac{1}{4}$ cup boiling water
- 1 bar German chocolate

- 1 6-ounce package chocolate bits
- 2 cups miniature marshmallows (if desired)
- 1 cup buttermilk
- 3 cups flour
- 1 teaspoon salt
- $\frac{1}{2}$ teaspoon soda
- 1 cup pecans

Cream sugar and oleo; add eggs, and vanilla; cream together. Set aside. Melt chocolate bar in boiling water, add to creamed mixture. Add chocolate bits, nuts and marshmallows. Mix well, add milk. Mix soda, flour and salt together and blend with creamed mixture. Bake in a tube pan. Bake at 300 degrees for approximately $1\frac{1}{2}$ hours.

FRESH APRICOT PIE

- 4 cups apricots (cut up in halves then quarters)

Mix and stir the following ingredients into apricots and set aside:

- $1\frac{1}{2}$ cups sugar
- one-third cup flour
- Pinch of salt

Make a double crust and line a 9-inch pie pan and spoon apricot mix and cut up $1\frac{1}{2}$ tablespoons of oleo and cover with top crust. Brush with milk with pastry brush. Bake in preheated oven, 425 degrees, for 30-35 minutes.

Pretty Eyes Depend On Properly Shaped Eyebrows

Beautiful eyes are more than just a skillful application of eye shadow and false eyelashes. Carefully shaped and groomed eyebrows create a lovely frame for expressive eyes.

pencils or crayons and to use.

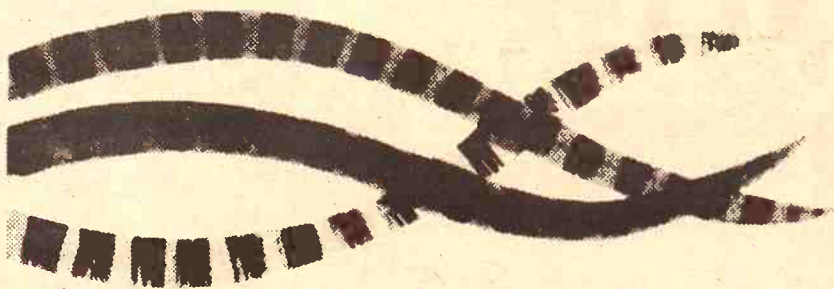

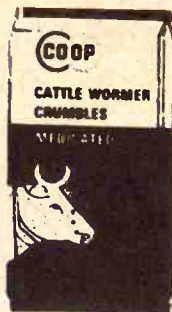

Tiles and panels produced for the general market have the aristocratic fissured surface that

looks like marble. Their absorption quality is rated superior to wood fiber tiles or panels.

Mineral fiber products are also fire safe, an important factor for the homeowner interested in remodeling or building.

Dirt and dust will not cling as readily to the painted mineral surface. Cleaning when needed, can be done with the vacuum cleaner brush, wet cloth or sponge. The surface can also be repainted, if desired.

Ford Considers Small Japanese Truck Import

Ford Motor Co. says it is still studying the possibility of selling imported Japanese trucks in the U.S.

Crofoot called Pearson's proposal "dumb" in a letter to the U.S. senator, which Pearson forwarded to the Emporia Gazette.

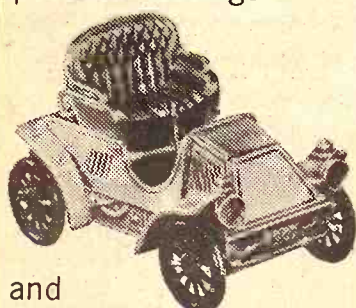

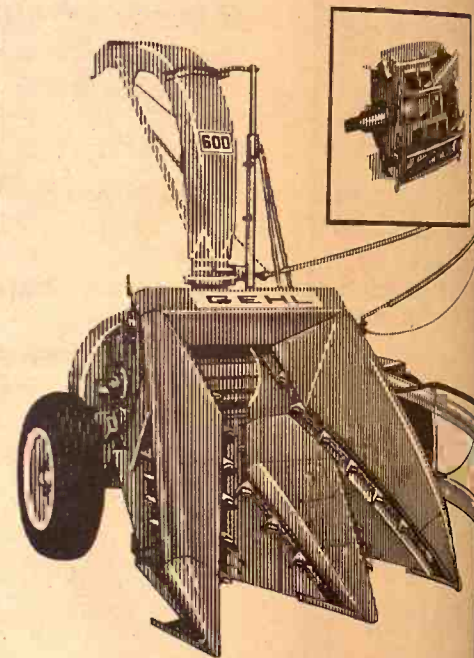
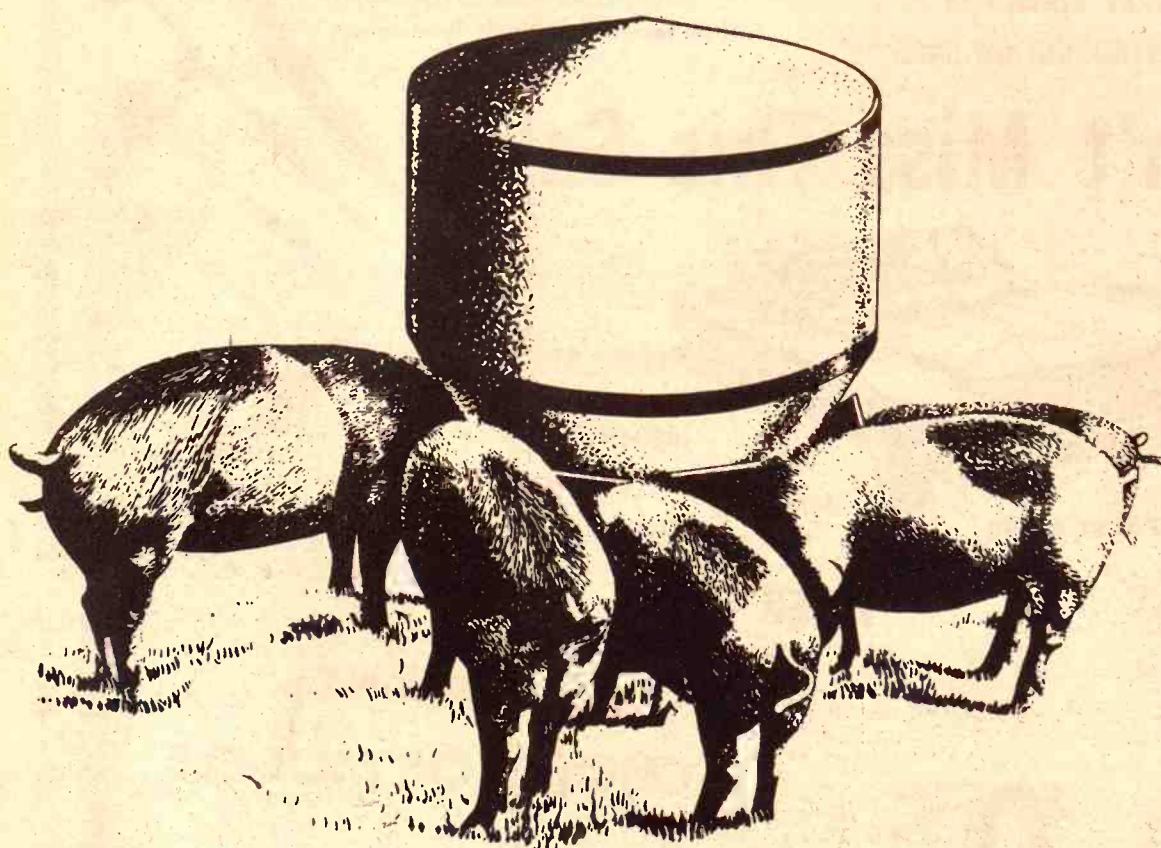

On 7,072 cars of wheat from 1971 harvest showed an average weight of 62.4 lbs. per bushel, compared with 62 last year and a 60-year average of 61.4. Highest test results, generally, were being recorded in southwest Kansas, where samples from 15 counties averaged 63 lbs. per bushel.

The statewide protein content averaged 12 per cent, compared to last year's 11.4 per cent and 10-year average of 11.8 per cent. Protein content in individual cars ranged from a low of 10.4 per cent in Jewell County to a high of 13.3 per cent in Jewell County. Generally, highest protein content was recorded in the north central states, and lowest in northwest states.

The southwestern and west central counties generally produced wheat with the lowest moisture content, which averaged 12.1 per cent statewide, compared with 12.2 per cent last year.

The survey also showed that this year's wheat was comparatively low in grade and that grade defects were below last year and the average.

Twenty per cent of the cars tested had less than .5 per cent dockage, only 3 per cent contained more than .5 per cent dockage. Grade defects totaled 2.3 per cent, compared with 2.4 per cent in 1970 and a six-year average of 2.4 per cent.

Eighty-eight per cent of the 1971 crop graded No. 1 and 11 per cent graded No. 2. Last year only 76 per cent graded No. 1, while 23 per cent graded No. 2.

The biggest loser among the airlines has been TWA, which had a \$63 million loss last year. In trying to economize TWA has cut employment 4500 below a year ago, slashed advertising by \$6 million, eliminated some departments and reorganized others, closed a pilot and hostess base at Boston, cancelled schedules, eliminated morning newspapers and movies on flights, and combined winter and summer uniforms for stewardesses into a single all-year outfit.

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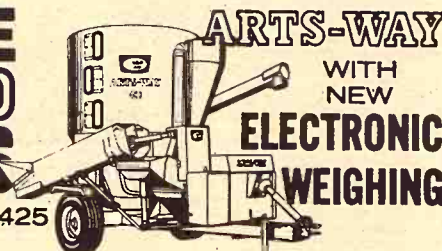

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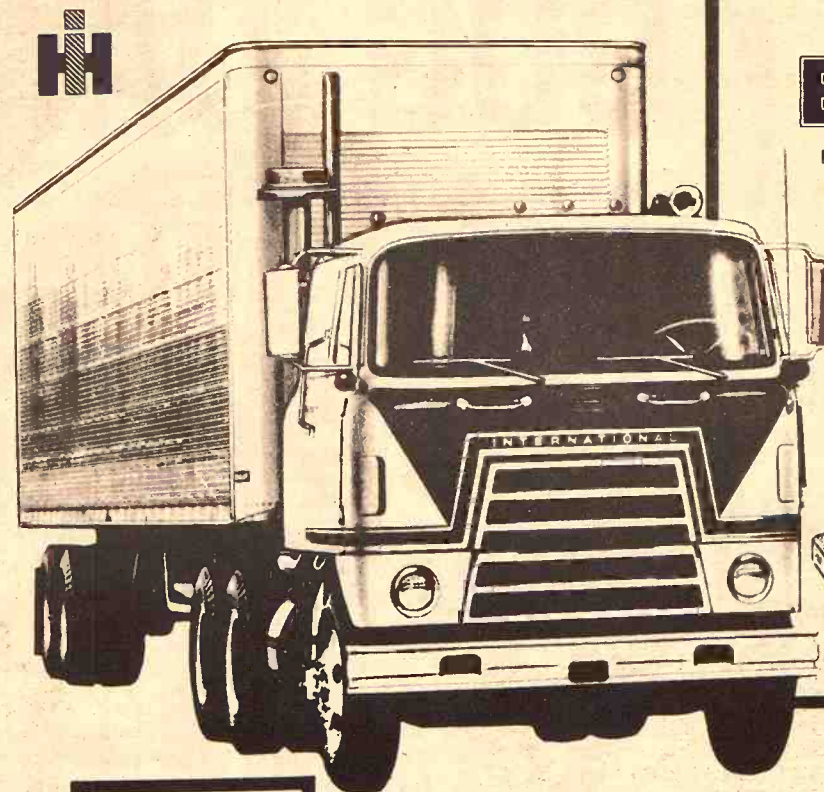

Feedlot Count Shows Another 18% Gain

Cattle on grain feed for slaughter market in Kansas on July 1 this year totaled 859,000 head, 18 percent above the previous record high for the date set last year according to the Kansas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service.

The number on feed was up 10 percent from April 1 this year.

In large feedlots of 1,000 head or more capacity there were a record 710,000 cattle on feed, 26 percent more than a year earlier.

In smaller sized feedlots, 149,000 head were on feed, 10 percent less than on July 1, 1970.

Marketings of grain-fed cattle during the April-June quarter totaled 449,000 head, down 9 percent from a year earlier.

Placements during the quarter totaled 528,000, and increase of 14 percent from last year and record high for the period.

Feeders' intentions to market indicated 540,000 of the cattle on feed July 1 would move during the July-September quarter, 20 percent more than last year.

Some 515,000 cattle on feed July 1 had been in feedlots less than 3 months, about 11 percent more than last year while 344,000 had been on feed longer, an increase of 28 percent.

Steers on feed July 1 totaled 574,000 up 17 percent from a year earlier and heifers on feed totaled 285,000 up 18 percent.

Light cattle on feed July 1 weighing less than 700 pounds numbered 223,000, some 14 percent more than last year.

Cattle weighing 700-899 pounds totaled 402,000, up 13 percent and

those 900 pounds and over totaled 234,000, up 30 percent from a year earlier.

Major Feeding States

Cattle and calves on feed July 1, 1971 for the slaughter market in the 23 major feeding states totaled 10,881,000 head, 2 percent more than a year ago.

Number on feed in the North Central Region totaled 5,879,000 head, 6 percent below a year earlier.

Placements of cattle and calves in the 23 States during the previous quarter totaled 5,478,000, up 5 percent from a year earlier.

Marketings during the April-June quarter totaled 6,311,000 head, 1 percent more than a year earlier.

Expected marketings during the July-September quarter (from cattle on feed July 1) in the 23 States is 6,165,000 head, 2 percent more than during the same three-month period in 1970.

Cattle and calves on feed less than 3 months in the 23 major feeding States on July 1 are estimated at 5,226,000 head, up 5 percent from a year earlier.

There were 4,002,000 head on feed 3-6 months, 8 percent more than a year earlier. The number on feed 6

months and over, at 1,653,000 head, was 16 percent below July 1, 1970.

There were 7,623,000 steers and steer calves on feed, a 4 percent increase from a year earlier while heifers and heifer calves numbered 3,226,000 head, down 1 percent.

Cattle in the light and medium

weight groups was up 6 percent from a year earlier with those weighing less than 900 pounds totaling 8,047,000.

In the weight groups 900 pounds and over there were 2,834,000 cattle on feed, a decrease of 8 percent from July 1970.

See Milford As Place To Rear Pike, Walleye

An area adjacent to Timber Creek cove at Milford Lake is being considered for a state northern pike or walleye rearing pond, William Cole of Manhattan, regional fisheries biologist for the Kansas Forestry, Fish and Game commission, has announced.

The 50-acre pond would support 500,000 to 750,000 fry to a good survival size, Cole said.

The site is northeast of the causeway near Wakefield. The land is owned by the Army Engineers, which would be asked to lease the site to the state. The pike or walleye fry would be put in rearing pond approximately six weeks and then would be released into the pond.

Three Factors In July Crop Report

The USDA crop report released on July 9 included three unusual and important features: (1) It showed that farmers had planted only 1 percent more soybeans than last year, (2) that they had increased corn plantings by 12 percent, and (3) that severe drought gripped the Southern Plains states.

Shortage of Soybeans

The relatively small acreage of soybeans planted probably will not produce enough beans to maintain the normal growth of exports and domestic consumption. The official report showed that to July 1 farmers had planted 43.6 million acres in soybeans. Judging from previous years, they will harvest around 42.8 million acres. A normal average yield would be close to 27.5 bushels per acre, and total production would be about 1,175 million bushels.

The carryover of old beans on September 1 apparently will be about 110 million bushels. This carryover plus the prospective crop, would make a total supply of around 1,285 million bushels.

The exports and domestic use of

soybeans this year will total about 1,255 million bushels. The same rate of usage during the year beginning September 1 would squeeze the carryover down to only 30 million bushels, which would not be enough to keep the mills and export lines running.

The carryover on September 1 and the crop to be harvested this fall will

differ from the projections set out above. The total supply will probably be between 1,250 and 1,300 million bushels. But even if the supply reaches 1,300 million bushels, it will not provide for any growth in the soybean market. During the 1960's, the exports and domestic use of soybeans increased at an average rate of about 50 million bushels per year.

Corn Acreage Up 12 Percent

By the first of July, farmers had planted 74.7 million acres of corn—12 percent more than last year. Judging from previous experience, there will be about 64.5 million acres to harvest for grain.

Because of the possibility of destructive blight, the USDA did not make any forecast of corn yields or total production. Blight damage is an uncertain factor; but if the national yield is the same as in 1970, total production would be over 4.6 billion bushels. That would compare with the 4.1 billion bushels harvested last fall.

The carryover of old corn on October 1 is expected to be around 700 million bushels. This amount

plus a crop of 4.6 billion bushels would make a total supply of 5.3 billion bushels. If domestic use and exports take 4.4 billion bushels, about the same as this year, this would leave 900 million bushels for carryover in the fall of 1972.

Severe Drought in the Southern Plains

The vast Southern Plains area has been suffering from severe drought. On the first of July it covered Texas, Louisiana, New Mexico, Arizona, and half or more of Colorado and Oklahoma. Western Illinois was the center of another dry area that spread from Michigan to Missouri.

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Least Feed Grain On Hand Since 1957

Feeders Take Less Wheat Ration, But Gain Less Too

Feed intake was 20 percent less with 3 wheat rations than with a milo ration in a steer finishing trial at Kansas State University's Fort Hays Branch Experiment Station.

In the trial, conducted in the winter and consisting of 100 percent wheat rations, decreased feed consumption was accompanied by decreased gains, especially where Scout wheat was fed.

However, because feed efficiency was greater among wheat-fed cattle, wheat appeared to be more economical than milo.

When Scout, Gaines and Golden-50 wheat varieties were ranked for various criteria (rate of gain, feed efficiency and steer carcass quality), Gaines produced slightly better performances, followed by Golden-50 and Scout.

Much of the difference occurred in the last 36 days of the trial and may have been related to founder, researchers observed.

Hard wheat types such as Golden-50 and Scout seemed more likely to cause founder than soft wheats, so a lower percentage of hard wheat than soft wheats should be considered for use in finishing rations. However, KSU scientists pointed out that when hard wheat types are managed to avoid founder they may be more efficient than soft wheats.

Farming Third Most Hazardous Occupation

Farm people fall from ladders while fixing storm windows and slip in showers the same as city dweller, but they also operate large, complicated machinery and pursue a

demanding life full of hazards unknown to average citizens.

As a result farming is the third most dangerous profession in the country, ranking behind only mining and the construction industry in terms of death and injury.

Secretary Clifford M. Hardin of the agriculture department says National Farm Safety Week, July 25-31, is a good time to concentrate on reducing rural accidents.

"American agriculture's ability to produce bountiful harvests has long been envied throughout the world," Hardin said. "Unfortunately agriculture has had the reputation as one America's most hazardous industries as well."

Although agriculture accounts for

only 4.4 per cent of the nations work force, it accounted last year for nearly 10 per cent of the disabling work injuries and 17 percent of the work-related deaths, Hardin said.

The council says that in terms of deaths per 100,000 workers, mining last year had a rate of 100 fatalities; construction 70, and agriculture 66. Manufacturing industry's fatality rate in 1970 was 10 per 100,000.

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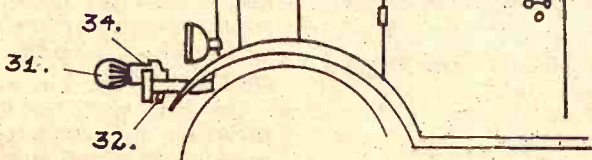

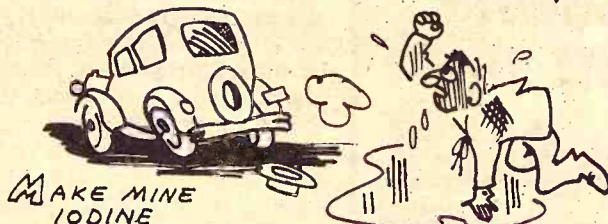
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Crop Forecasts From Radar Images?

LAWRENCE—The idea of beating swords into plowshares is still the same, but today's equipment is more exotic.

By using a radar system, Side Looking Airborne Radar (SLAR), developed originally for military use

and computers, two University of Kansas professors and their crew of 10 hope eventually to predict crop yields and note hail and disease damage, among other ideas.

Then, most importantly, they want to develop a way to get this

data down to the people it affects the most—county agents, farmers, equipment dealers, grain brokers and others.

Working from the remote sensing lab in the KU Center for Research Inc., Dr. Stanley A. Moraine,

assistant professor of geography, and Dr. Julian Holtzman, Assistant professor of electrical engineering, have been funded with a \$104,000 grant, although the early research started in 1964 in Finney County.

The grant is from U.S. Department of Agriculture and National Aeronautics and Space Administration.

"The grant was to evaluate the present state of the art and the future uses of imaging radar in making agricultural determinations," Dr. Moraine said in an interview. He added they are experimenting to see if radar imaging can be used and what kind of information can be extracted.

Their main experiment is the Standard Farm, Dr. Moraine said, explaining it essentially is trying to keep all elements of their experiment constant.

"This way, we will know how the responses we gather will look through time," he said. They are mainly working with wheat now, imaging it in the fall in planting time, again in the spring trying to predict yield and again after harvest to see how close they came with their prediction.

"We're trying to get our estimate close to or better than the USDA," Dr. Moraine said. Dr. Holtzman said that on a county level it runs within about 10 percent accuracy. "Even 2 or 3 percent increase would be good," he said.

The two also are looking for variations in moisture, height of crops, types of soil and "far down the pike," Dr. Moraine said, effects of disease or lack of moisture.

The radar equipment is used aboard NASA Lockheed Electras and C-130 transport aircraft, which, for the first time, this year made monthly flights over Garden City at altitudes near 20,000 feet.

"We will be able to monitor growing crops over the growing season," Dr. Moraine said. "Then we

put the images on the computer, get our responses."

Garden City was picked for the experiment because it is very flat," he added. "The radar is sensitive to the ground. Also, the area is large and there are not too many half-dozen main crops there."

A major disadvantage of which causes rough air to go to space altitudes," he said. Dr. Holtzman said the system (airplane) is a "fly on demand." The USDA programmed flight he added.

"With commercial," he said, "we have to set schedules a year, since wheat harvest is over before the wheat is over."

Dr. Moraine added that against the same thing is up against—the weather.

Ground crews work with the flights. "They get information in present," Dr. Moraine said, "such as height, soil, moisture, and they also interview crop yield."

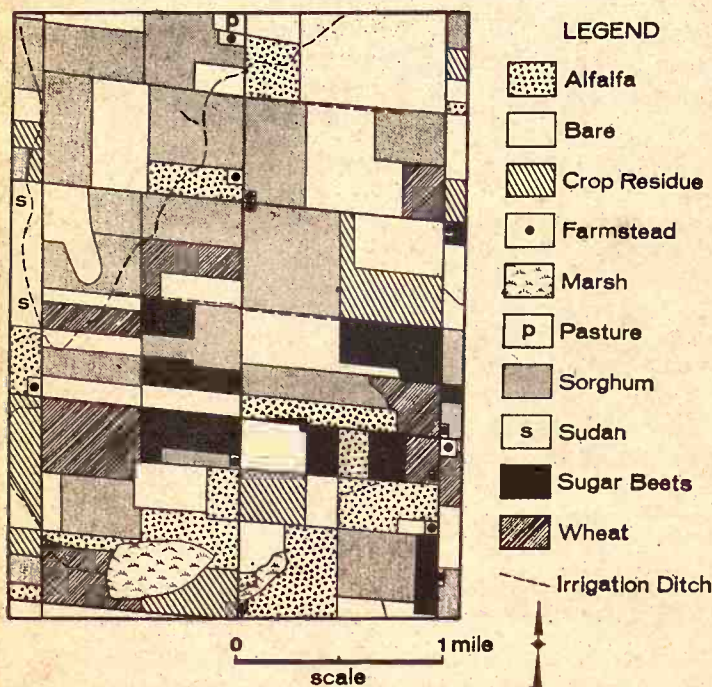

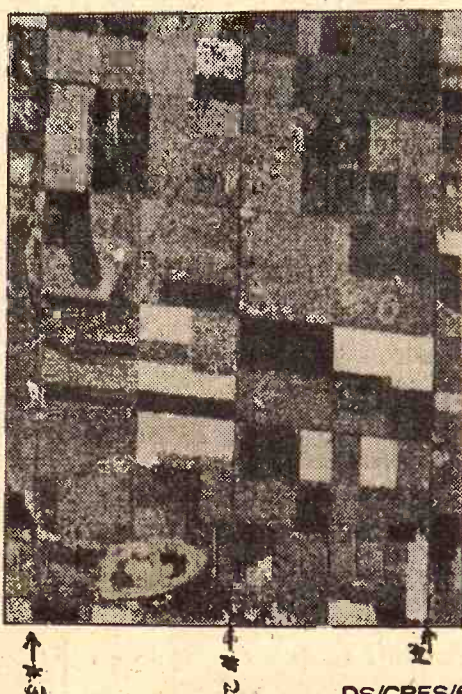

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You Get What You Agree To Get For White Corn

White corn has an "independent personality," says Rod Turnbull, the longtime writer of the grain trade in Kansas City.

Turnbull notes that white corn has no futures market, there are no statistics on supplies, and the government hasn't made a report in 25 years on acreage.

Thus, the market price is whatever can be agreed on at some particular time. It's not unusual that white corn prices might go up or down a quarter in one day.

The distinctive feature about white corn, compared with yellow, is that it is used almost exclusively as human food. Cornmeal, hominy, breakfast foods and the like are among the products coming from white corn.

The total white corn harvest, compared with that of yellow corn, which is used mainly as livestock feed, is relatively small. Likewise, the number of firms looking for white corn is small compared to the numbers of farmers and feedlots who use yellow corn.

This year, for the first time since 1946, USDA has included in its crop reports an estimate of the white corn acreage.

The July USDA estimate put white corn acreage in 10 principal states at 16 million acres. Kansas had a 7,000-acre guess, the same as Missouri. White corn plantings were most common in Kentucky, 253,000 acres; Tennessee, 200,000; and Illinois, 160,000.

The figures themselves do not tell the whole story, because no one knows how much white corn was planted in other years. The government is renewing the survey on white corn this year at the request of the industry. In the meantime, latest figures on total

planted corn acreage this year, which includes the white variety, is 74,651,000 acres.

Processors of white corn in the past have attempted to get an educated guess on the prospective size of the crop by garnering information on the amount of seed sold by major seed companies. Usually, at harvest time they have not had much more knowledge on the total yield than the growers. So at harvest time, the bargaining over price has begun.

Early last fall, white corn was traded in Kansas City for as much as \$2.85 a bushel, far above quotations for the yellow. Some farmers took advantage of this price, others held their grain hoping for still higher offers.

Processors apparently got what they needed and the price began to weaken. Then, as has happened before when prices were high, a shipload or two of white corn arrived from South Africa. This caused an abrupt break, or at least got the credit for it. No. 1 white corn in recent days has traded in Kansas City at \$1.65 to \$1.70 a bushel, a carload at a time. Discounts are severe for lower grades, as the food industry must have good quality.

Once the food industry's needs are filled, there is little demand for the

white corn, as livestock feeders prefer the yellow varieties. White corn, therefore, can become almost a white elephant when the food industry needs have been supplied, yet it also can be the reigning queen when there is an apparent shortage.

An element of luck prevails when a farmer happens to sell at peak prices. On the other hand, members of the trade in Kansas City profess certain knowledge of a few farmers who still have white corn on hand that they refused to sell at \$3.50 a bushel a few years ago. The farmers contend they have held this long, they might as well hang on a few months more in the hope of hitting the jackpot.

White corn usually is grown in areas where farmers have made a specialty of it. Similarly, the local elevator in such areas becomes a specialist in handling the grain. As mentioned, quality must be maintained.

Elevators which handle mostly yellow corn often do not want to be bothered with the white, as it is too much trouble to keep it separate. In the same vein, isolated farmers who grow white corn when all their neighbors have yellow, have trouble with cross-pollination.

The demand for white corn is said to be growing, and one reason is the current popularity of tacos. Demand has fluctuated over the years.

Once it was thought breakfast food could be made only with white corn, but in a year when prices skyrocketed, a processor switched to yellow and ran into no difficulties.

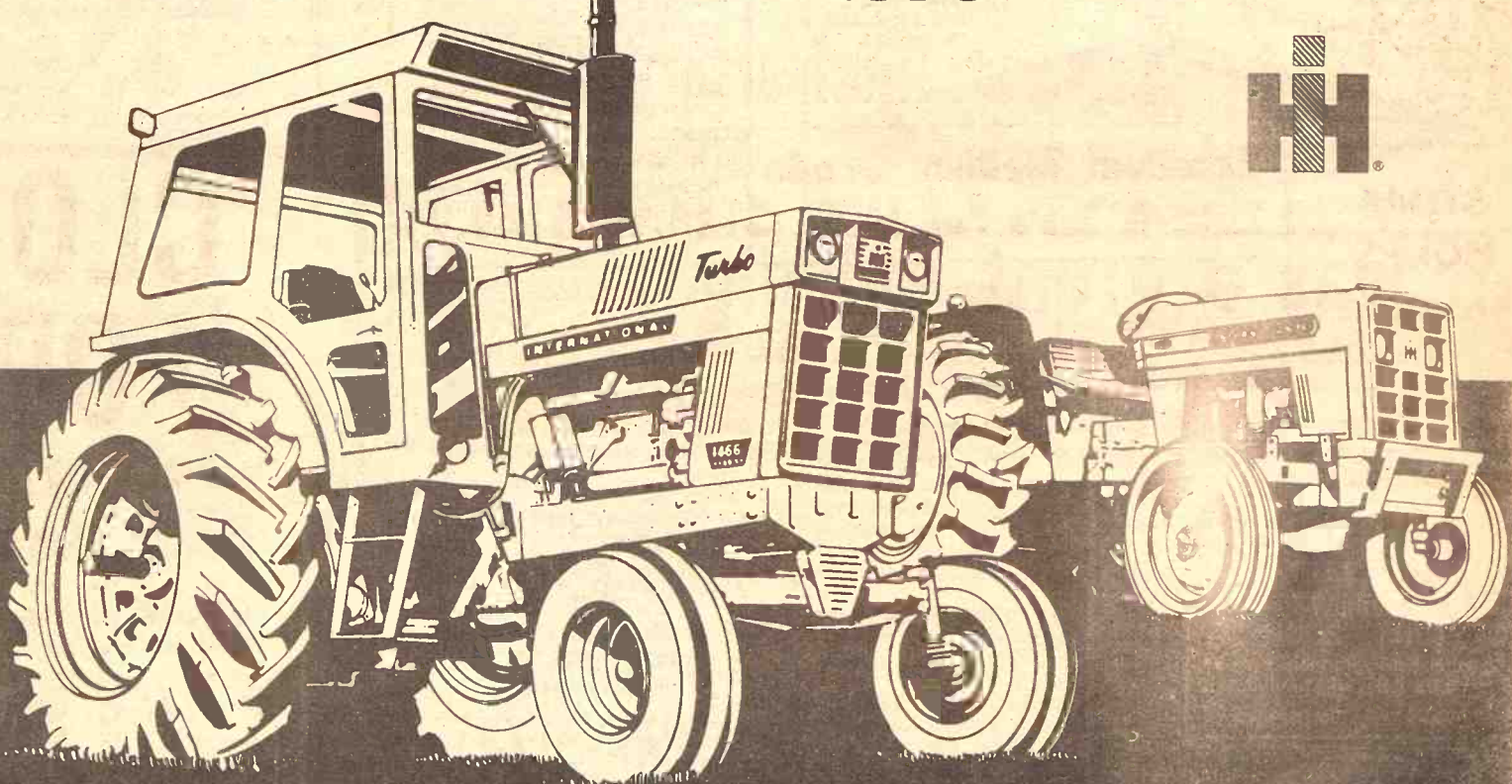

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Wheat Pact Draws Scorn Of Farmers Union

Tony Dechant doesn't like the new International Grains Agreement and he's not bashful about saying why. The national president of the National Farmers Union was in Salina last week for a conference of Kansas county NFU presidents. He

gave his view of the worldwide agreement concluded in Brussels and recently ratified by US Senate. Dechant objects because, he says, the agreement includes no provision on minimum price. There's no protection for the wheat producer of Kansas, he says. "The current agreement is a tea party; people can come and talk," he said. But without a basic price provision, the 1971 agreement won't be much of a show at all for the wheat producer.

"There have been worldwide wheat agreements, prior to the 1968 international grains arrangement, for the past 20 years. On the whole, they've been beneficial in providing some kind of order for the world grain market. "Down through the years, the 2 principal countries affected by agreements have been the United States and Canada; the treaties have worked about as well as these 2 wanted them to work."

But Dechant said the Nixon administration hasn't been favorable to the price provisions of the agreements; it was the U.S. delegation to the Brussels negotiations he says, that scuttled any floor price guarantee.

The basic price provisions had come under increasing attack by the grain industry; grainmen claimed they couldn't sell American wheat abroad because the price was too high.

"But the real problem was that there was simply too much wheat in the world" Dechant said, pointing to abundant harvests in the United States, Canada, Russia and Argentina. "The market was simply glutted."

Grainmen from the United States led the world in undercutting the established wheat minimums in 1969, Dechant said, and "once the grain trade succeeded in breaking the price minimums, we were off to the races throughout the world."

Under a 1968 agreement, adjustments in the basic wheat price could be submitted to an international board based in London for approval. Now, in the absence of any regulations, prices can float—and sink—freely under the new treaty.

Chicago Stockyards Closes This Week After 105 Years



This is the final week of operations for the Chicago Stockyards, once the world's largest trading market for livestock, now only a ghost of its former self.

No special events have been planned for the demise of the 345-acre tract on Chicago's South Side, once an maze of animal pens and slaughter houses. On Saturday, for the first time in 105 years, the stockyards will stand empty of livestock.

The owner of the yards says that dwindling of receipts in recent years caused the closing. Only cattle have been traded in recent months, and the total number has decreased to fewer than 15,000 a week, far under the number traded in former years.

The stockyards discontinued handling of hogs in May 1970 because of declining receipts. Sheep receipts have been only nominal in recent years.

Cattle sales have declined from 2.26 million head in 1959 to 860,000 head last year. The decline has continued this year.

Caught in the decision to close the yards were about 90 commission firms who are members of the Chicago Livestock Exchange.

Originally the company had planned to go out of business February 1. The Livestock Exchange filed suit to compel the company to continue operations until alternate facilities could be established. Under orders of the U.S. District Court an agreement was worked out whereby those interested in maintaining trading agreed to pay \$1000 a day for expenses until August 1.

U.S. Dairymen
Moving Exports
To Europe

An increased European demand
for American dairy products was
reported by Dr. George Mehren, San
Antonio, Tex., to 1,300 Kansas
dairymen at the annual meeting of
the Kansas division of Associated
Milk Producers Inc. at Wichita.

A former assistant secretary of
agriculture, he is program director
for AMPI. He reported the recent
sale of 15 million pounds of butter to
European markets.

He forecast sales of 100 million
pounds of butter to Europe by the
end of 1971.

Reasons for the European short-
age, he said, are that many small
European dairymen have quit
operating. Government programs
have shrunk production and there is
a drought in New Zealand—a
faraway source of some of the dairy
products consumed in Europe.

Dr. Mehren said there are many
things to be done in the dairy in-
dustry that can't be done by
dairymen but the industry must
have cooperation of the federal
government.

These, he said, include political
activity, improved price supports,
administration of federal market
orders, import control programs

and increased exportation.

Mehren congratulated the dairy
industry for a pooled marketing
operation that has resulted in a \$2.5
billion increase nationally for five
years—from \$4 billion to \$6.5 billion.

Dr. Mehren called for continuation
of the base plan under which the
industry has a two-price system.

Milk producers get higher prices
for milk sold to the local fluid milk
market than for milk processed into
butter, cheese and powdered milk.

Reviewing difficulties of getting
support in Congress, Mehren told of
his fight to get the \$104 million
special school milk program re-
instated.

"Even President Nixon and
Agriculture Secretary Hardin can't
make decisions without the support
of Congress and the U.S. Supreme

Court," he said.

It is essential that dairymen have
regulation of production geared to
market needs if they are to have a
satisfactory market price, he said.

The dairymen heard a president's
report from Norman Barker, Pratt,
and a Kansas division manager's
report from Jim Moore, Wichita.

All Of Southeast Getting Into New Industry Act

As harvesting has moved out of five southeast and south central Kansas communities—Arkansas City, Parsons, Neodesha, Emporia and Pittsburg—industrial development apparently has moved in.

Industrial expansion projects announced for this fall will mean creation of more than 300 jobs for the five cities during the next few months.

Three of the communities—Pittsburg, Parsons and Neodesha—are issuing industrial revenue bonds to help finance expansions proposed in their towns.

In Pittsburg, closing and receipt of the proceeds of a \$600,000 bond issue by the city for expansion of Vinylplex Inc. has been completed.

The bond issue will finance construction of the 15,000 square-foot facility in the new Pittsburg Regional Industrial Park. Vinylplex, manufacturer of PVC plastic pipe, will be the first industry to build in the park.

Company officials expect building construction to begin Aug. 1 with completion scheduled for year end. The extrusion plant initially will

employ 25 to 30 persons.

The bonds for Pittsburg are underwritten by Municipal Securities Inc., Wichita.

In Emporia, construction will begin soon on buildings for two industries—Fleetwood Enterprises and Kansas City Diesel Power Co.—which are opening plants there.

Both firms have acquired tracts in Emporia industrial park, Fleetwood 10 acres and KC Diesel two acres.

Fleetwood has awarded a \$359,000 contract to L.R. Foy Construction Co., Wichita, to build three steel structures to house the manufacture of mobile homes. The buildings will have a total area of 57,000 square feet.

When the buildings are completed, by Nov. 1, Fleetwood expects to hire more than 100 persons for the Emporia plant.

Markowity Builders, Emporia, have a contract to erect a steel building for KC Diesel, which has filed a \$96,800 mortgage to cover the cost of its new Emporia plant. The firm will repair and renovate diesel engines and hire 12 persons.

Fleetwood and KC Diesel both acquired land from Emporia En-

terprises Inc., a Chamber of Commerce-related organization set up to encourage industrial development in Emporia.

Of 145 acres acquired by the developers in the mid-1950s only 24 acres of the original tract remain unsold. Emporia Enterprises will spend \$25,000 to pave streets to provide access to the new industries.

In Parsons, city commissioners have voted to issue \$1 million in industrial revenue bonds and approved a building lease with TecTank Inc., Kansas City, Mo., which plans to build a manufacturing plant on a 10 acre site across from Labette County Medical Center.

Heavy steel bulk storage tanks will be produced in TecTank's Parsons plant.

Construction of a 100,000 square-foot building to house the firm is to begin this week.

Tec Tank will employ 72 persons in Parsons.

Arkansas City is getting a new industry this summer with the addition of Premier Corp., located in Dayton, Ohio.

The firm has announced it will construct a 20,000 square-foot manufacturing plant on property of A.C. Industries Inc., Arkansas City promotional organization. Production is to begin by September.

Premier Corp. will manufacture aluminum and safety-glass windows

for mobile homes, travel and vacation trailers.

The firm, which initially will employ 25 persons with expansion to 100 anticipated, becomes the third manufacturer in the mobile home industry for Arkansas City.

In Neodesha city commissioners have approved issuance of \$200,000 in industrial revenue bonds for expansion of Triad Engineered Aids Inc.



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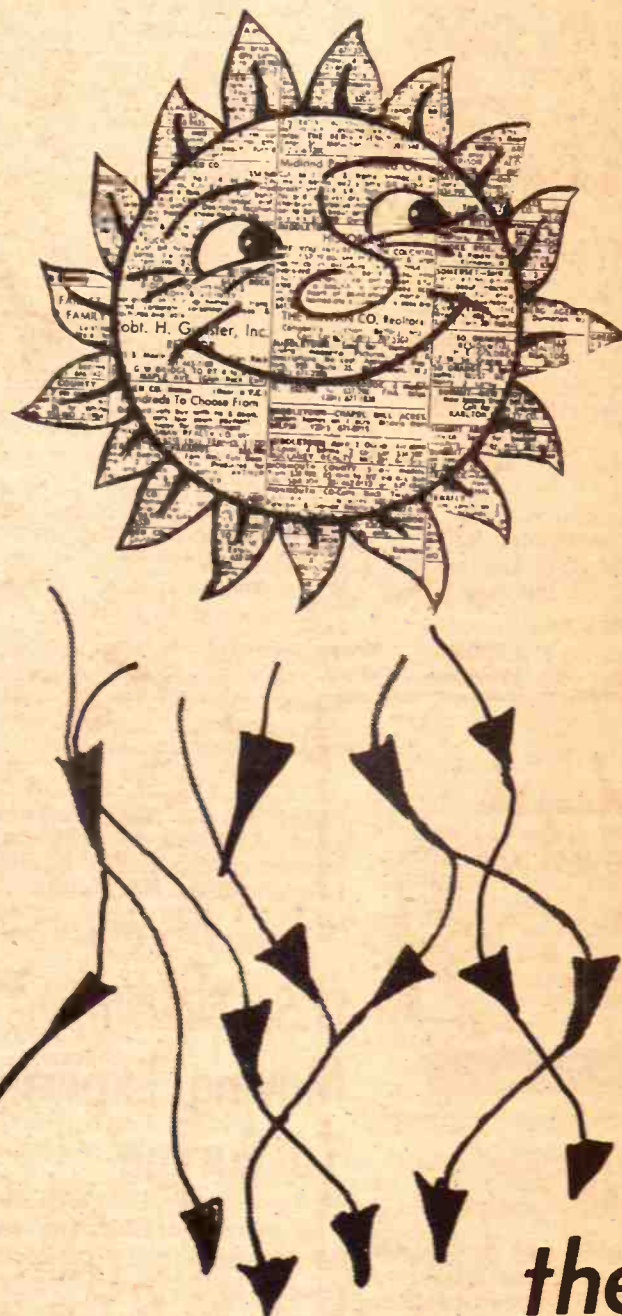

ASKS SUPPORT FOR CANCER FUNDS BILL

I am writing to ask your readers to support the Conquest of Cancer Bill. As Director of a hospital for cancer patients, some of whom have come from your area, I know of the great need for this bill. As a member of the National Panel of Consultants for the Conquest of Cancer, I am confident that the passage of this bill will speed the day when cancer is conquered, although no one can predict when that will be.

After extensive hearings, an excellent bill, S 1828, was passed by the Senate by a 79-1 vote. This bill, based on the recommendations of the National Panel of Consultants, is supported by the American Cancer Society, most cancer scientists, the Secretary of H.E.W. and the President of the United States. The bill provides for the acceleration of cancer research, and includes all reasonable compromises that were suggested during extensive hearings and debates. It combines the best features of two earlier versions.

Unfortunately, some H.E.W. officials are opposed to S 1828 because it will alter the arrangements within H.E.W. They are concentrating on the House Subcommittee that will consider the bill. We must persuade the members of this subcommittee that the people of the United States want S 1828 passed without amendments, and without delay. If the House passes the bill unchanged,

it goes to the President for his signature and becomes law promptly.

Your Congressman, William R. Roy, is a member of the key Subcommittee of Public Health and Environment. Please write to: Congressman William R. Roy, U.S. House of Representatives, Washington, D.C. 20515.

Ask him to vote for the Conquest of Cancer Bill without any amendments, and without delay. Remember that each day's delay will cost us 900 American lives — the daily toll of cancer.

Texas Now No. 1 As Feeder State

Iowa, at least temporarily, has lost its longtime leadership as a cattle-fattener.

July 1 figures showed 1.7 million cattle being fattened in feedlots in Texas, compared to 1.634-million in Iowa.

The Texas figure was up 26 percent from a year ago, reflecting a continuing emphasis of feedlot expansion in Texas and also the southwest drought which has forced many cattle in feedlots at weights lighter than usual.

There have been ample supplies of milo and feed wheat available in Texas, and the expansion of feedlots there has also drained off some feed supplies that normally go to Iowa and other north central feeding states.

Iowa had 13 percent fewer cattle in feedlots on July 1 than it did a year ago.

Here's how the feedlot numbers have been changing in the past quarter in Iowa and Texas: (the figures are in thousands):

Hog Cholera Nearing Zero

Hog cholera, once a threat to the nation's pork producers, dropped in June to its lowest level since the

federal government and states began a co-operative eradication program in 1962.

The Agriculture Department said only four infected herds were reported in June, compared with 89 in June 1970 and 212 in June 1969.

Moreover, the Agricultural Research Service said, there were only 418 herds infected with hog cholera during the year ended June 30, the lowest on record. In 1969-70 a total of 1,231 diseased herds were reported.

Officials said in the six-month period this year only 100 infected herds were found, compared with 361 in the first half of 1970.

The ARS noted growing concern over recent reports of African swine fever in Cuba. The disease has nearly identical symptoms as hog cholera, officials said.

"Farmers, especially in Florida and other Southeast states have been asked to report any cholera-like symptoms in their swine herds without delay," the ARS said.

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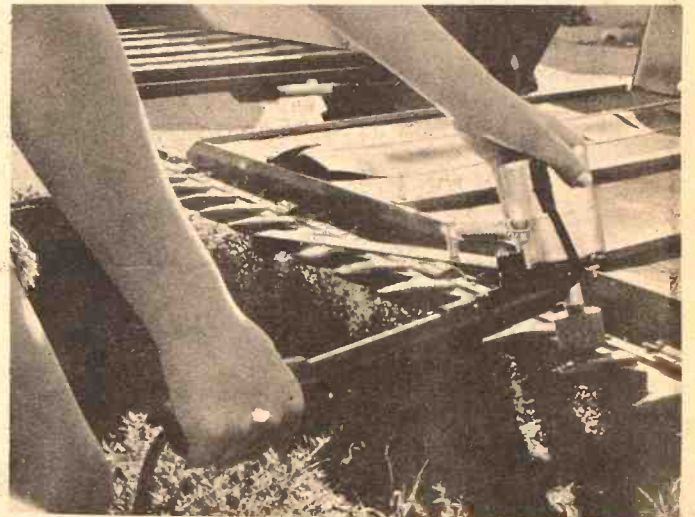
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Extension Wary Of Revenue-Sharing

Proposals for federal revenue-sharing with states and local government have included some variations in the way the federal government is presently accounting some of its funds. Some of the more abrupt changes in accounting procedures would be felt by Agriculture. Cooperative Extension personnel have especially become nervous over the implications of revenue-sharing to their programs. Here is the point-of-view of Robert A. Bohannon, director of the Cooperative Extension Service at Kansas State University.

The President's proposal for revenue sharing includes \$149 million of the Cooperative Extension Service budget at the federal level under the broad area of rural community development as a part of the special revenue sharing grants. (This is essentially the total amount of the federal appropriation for Cooperative Extension.) Special revenue sharing grants would require no matching funds from state and local governments. The plan appears to propose that federal funds for extension service programs be distributed to the states without specific enabling legislation as to how the funds are to be used.

This proposal, if implemented as outlined on pages 37 and 38 of the Budget of the United States Government, Fiscal Year 1972, raises serious concerns and implications as to the future and effectiveness of the Cooperative Extension Service program in each county and state as well as in the nation. The following are some areas of major concern and possible implications that deserve careful thought and consideration.

• The present arrangement of

Extension funding through the state land-grant colleges and universities has enabled the Cooperative Extension Service to develop a professionally trained staff that has been relatively free of political pressures and intimidations. In fact, the Cooperative Extension Service has long been considered an ideal model for providing federal financial support with definite provisions for state and local control. Local people are currently, and have been since its inception, involved in the development and implementation of Extension programs which permit each county to have a program designed to meet the unique needs of its people.

• The proposed elimination of the requirements of matching federal funds with funds from state and local sources, which account for approximately two-thirds of the funds supporting Extension programs, could conceivably be a major factor in the destruction of this historically successful educational program by permitting these funds to be redirected to other purposes.

• The proposal would require new enabling legislation at the federal, state, and local levels. Without compatibility in legislation between these levels of government, the existing potential of developing educational programs based upon national emergencies, interests, or concerns will be negated. Examples of effective mobilization on a national basis through the Extension Service are the drought and depression programs of the thirties, the organization of rural electric cooperatives, the national emergency food and labor programs of world War II and the present Expanded Nutrition Program.

• Without proper enabling legislation to insure some measure

of stability in state and local support, the effectiveness of long-range program planning and program development required in the solution of many complex Problems would be greatly diminished.

• Continuing education programs conducted through 4-H clubs, home demonstration clubs, and many kinds of short courses, workshops, and seminars could not be continued without the direction and support of the local county Extension staff.

• Without the direction of the present Smith-Lever Act, the federal funds for Extension could be distributed in any manner determined by the state. It is conceivable

that the funds could be distributed to numerous state institutions or agencies in such small parcels that the possibility of mounting coordinated attacks on state and national problems would be impossible or ineffective. By distributing the resources in this manner, no one institution could effectively develop a staff of professional resource specialists from enough disciplines to attack complex social and economic problems.

• Should the federal funds for the Extension Service be distributed to several institutions or agencies within a state, the existing relationship between research, resident teaching, and Extension as now experienced in most land-grant institutions would be greatly diminished. This would reduce the sensitivity of research and resident instruction to the problems experienced by rural people as presently communicated through the Extension Service.

The present decentralized nature of the Extension Service with its small corps of federal and state staff members in relation to the number of professionals in the counties working with local people is sensitive to the problems and needs of the people at the local and state level. The proposed revenue sharing proposal under consideration could destroy this capability.

• As educational needs expand and change, the involvement of local people in Extension program development is sound in theory and workable in practice. However, the combined expertise of a trained

interdisciplinary staff, coordinated by one institution at the state level supported by a resource staff at the federal level collectively study research facts and trends, the capability of detecting problems long before they appear at a local level, proposed revenue sharing under consideration, would destroy this capability.

• The Extension Service has trained and dedicated professional staff with the ability to employ proven methods and techniques to help people solve problems. The loss of some of the most competent professionals and the loss of confidence of the people are acceptable outcomes of the proposed special revenue sharing program.

• Should the anticipated use of the use of Extension funds in the of 100,000 population or more made a part of the rural community development special revenue sharing fund, the present demonstrated success of Extension ability to develop youth programs, Expanded Nutrition Programs, family living programs in rural areas, particularly as they apply to low-income families, would be negated. This is particularly disastrous when no other agency organization has been able to demonstrate a high level of effectiveness and efficiency in helping these people solve these problems. 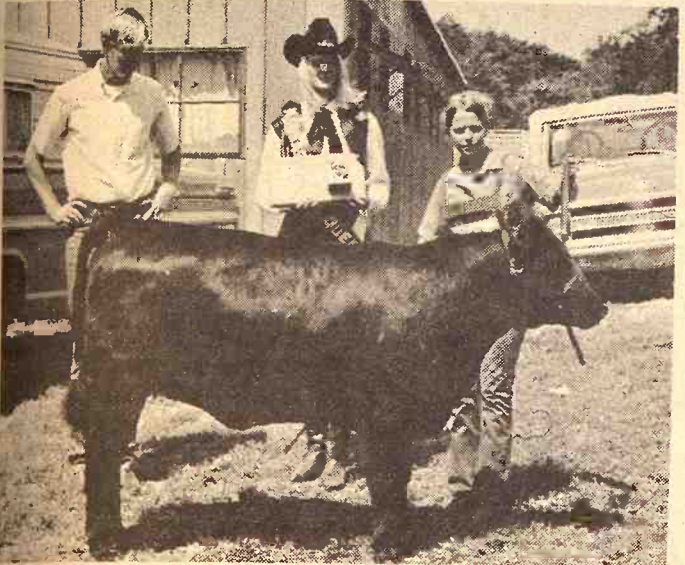
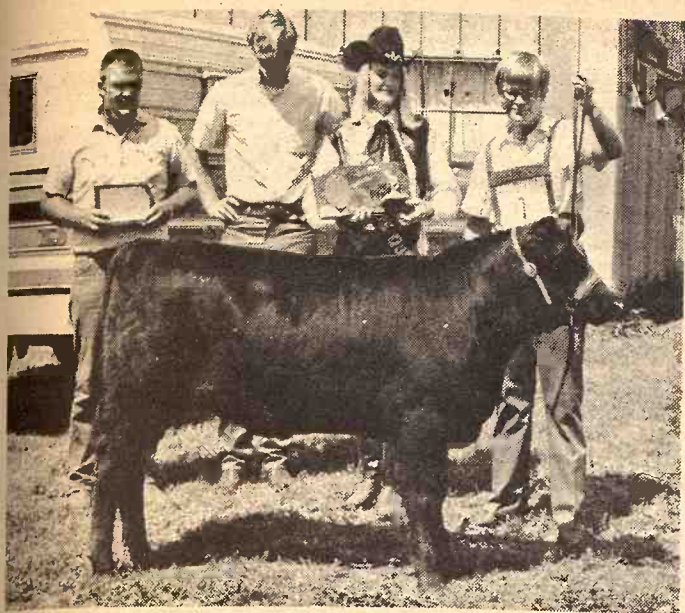

Bicycle Boom Sends Output Up 1/3, Leaves Stores Without Stocks

There are already 74 million of them wheeling across the country, and there soon are going to be many, many more.

Bicycles. With ecology and health concerns current, "people are buying bikes like mad."

"Sales are astronomical."

Retailers, making comments like these, report they have been literally overwhelmed by this summer's skyrocketing boom in bicycle sales. Frustrated customers are being put on waiting lists, salesmen—who can't sell what they don't have—are tearing their hair, and one giant retail store was reported to be so short on bikes it tried to buy the entire bicycle stock of another large retailer.

It's the adult bicycles, now up to about 65 percent of the total bicycle market, that are feeling the brunt of this summer's sales boom.

Sears, Roebuck & Co. and Montgomery Ward & Co. say their sales show that bike riding has swept the country. In some areas, waiting lists are necessary for specific types of bicycles, such as the increasingly popular 10-speed.

"Our entire bicycle production for 1971—1.2 million bicycles—is completely sold out," reports Ray Caparros of the Schwinn Bicycle Company. He says the firm has gone to 17-hour shifts to make that planned 1.2 million figure, which is up more than 25 per cent over 1970's

985,819 bikes.

Industry-wide, Caparros estimates a bike market reaching above the 8-million mark this year, up from over 6 million last year.

Gene Sloan, author of the best-selling "The Complete Book of Bicycling," says there are many reasons for the bike fad: They don't pollute; they're an economical method of commuting; they have health value, and they provide the social fun of meeting other cyclists in the park.

But the primary reason, Sloan believes, is that bicycles are earthy

and simple. Back to nature.

"When you're riding in a car or train all you experience is the car or train," adds David Shapiro, a bike rider. "But on a bike you really experience what's going on around you—the trees, the flowers, the air. You feel much more a part of the environment."

With all those bicycles around cars may get crowded off some of the highways—at least, that's what some avid cyclists hope. Bicycle riders have formed clubs and are lobbying for more bike paths and better parking facilities near office buildings.

"I think they should do away with all cars," Mrs. Janice Martin flatly states. A grandmother, she pedals a 10-speed.

National Horticultural Convention In G&G Area Next Week

For 100 years Kansas State University has been conducting investigations, and providing instruction, in horticultural sciences.

So it is fitting that in its centennial year KSU is hosting the annual meetings of the American Society for Horticultural Science (ASHS) August 1-4. More than 500 ASHS members are expected to attend—from all over the United States, as well as Latin America, Canada, Israel, and New Zealand.

Although horticulture has been a recognized area of study at KSU since 1971, almost from the day of its founding in 1863 the nation's pioneer Land Grant university found itself deeply involved in horticultural investigations.

There was urgent demand by early settlers for information as to the types of trees that could be grown successfully under prairie conditions, for trees were immensely valuable for fuel, fences, lumber, railroad ties, and wind-breaks.

But the pioneers also wanted to improve their circumstances by planting fruit trees, shelter belts, and ornamentals to make their homes more attractive.

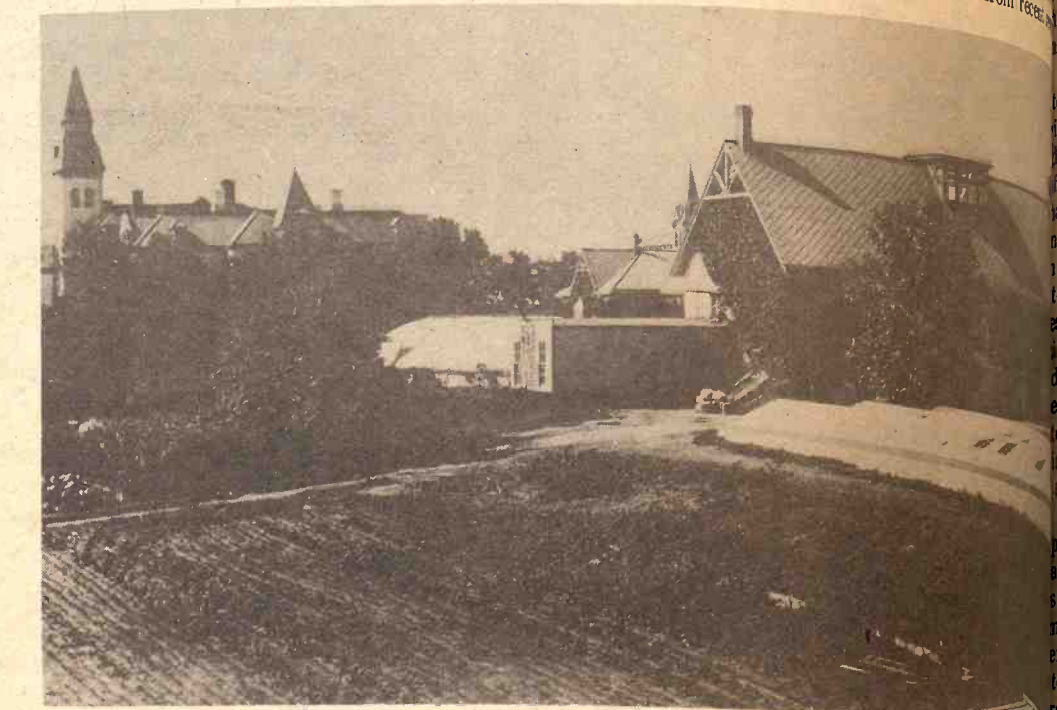
By 1865 one of the College's founding fathers, Isaac T. Goodnow, was presenting to the Board of Regents propositions for planting an orchard of fruit, shade trees, and other shrubbery on college ground.

By 1867 the first experimental plantings of vegetable and fruit crops were made, and some studies of the adaptation of forest trees were started as early as 1869. By 1872 the College boasted an experimental forest with 34,489 trees and an orchard which included 2,100 apple, pear, peach, cherry, and plum trees. In addition, the College had on hand about 40,000 nursery trees, for sale to the public.

Research conducted by Kansas State University scientists and others helped, at one time, to give Kansas the outstanding seedling apple nurseries in the United States, with Kansas producing 85 per cent of the nation's seedling supplies.

Through the years K-State horticulturists have continued to make important contributions. K-State researchers, for example, pioneered the first practical system for greenhouse cooling, using aspen wood padding and forced air circulation through wet pads—a system which made year around production of vegetables and flowers feasible in Kansas greenhouses and one still widely used.

More recently a K-State researcher, Dr. Charles V. Hall, developed a disease-resistant, striped, quality melon which he called "Crimson Sweet." It now is one of the three leading shipping melons in the United States. Hall has two more melon varieties ready for the public: "Petite Sweet," a promising ice-box type melon



HORTICULTURE INTEREST IN 1888

averaging around eight pounds, and "Supersweet," a sweet fleshed melon averaging 15 pounds.

A new medium-textured winter-hardy Bermuda grass selection, "Midway," by Dr. Ray A. Keen now is widely planted in Kansas and the Midwest. Keen has another selection, "Midiron," scheduled for release next year.

Contributions that horticultural research can make to the economic development of Kansas is pointed up by the booming pecan industry in Southeast Kansas.

Stimulated by establishment of a new experimental field at Chetopa where primary emphasis was placed on pecan production, Kansas, in less than a decade, has seen the value of its pecan production rise from \$500,000 to more than \$1,500,000 annually.

Comments Dr. Ron Campbell, head of K-State's department of horticulture and forestry and horticulturist in charge for the Kansas

Agricultural Experiment Station: "Pecan production in Kansas could exceed \$5,000,000 by 1975. This increase is due largely to research results obtained at the Southeast Kansas Experimental Field and the

application of findings by horticulture and forestry specialists."

Campbell anticipates an increase in Kansas pecan production will result from research

Orchards See Good Apples, Slack Peaches

A projected apple harvest of 360,000 bushels in Kansas is 40,000 bushels greater than last year's crop. The peach crop, though, will be slimmer than a year ago.

Dr. Frank Morrison, Kansas State University Extension fruit specialist, said the most recent Kansas crop report (July 1) foresaw a peach crop of 120,000 bushels, compared to 180,000 bushels a year ago.

Dr. Morrison said there are no peaches in the northeast corner of the state. "One longtime resident remarked this was the first year he had not seen a peach blossom in 25 years," he said.

There is a good set of apples, except for Golden Delicious, in the northeast fruit areas. A special effort is being made to insure an adequate supply of apple pickers for the apple harvest in early September. "A good picker can earn as much as \$50 per day," Dr. Morrison said. Because of school, teen-age help is available only on weekends, so orchard owners must look elsewhere for workers.

The Extension specialist said there is a good peach set on trees at Lecompton, but at Topeka, Manhattan, Salina and farther north and in southwest Kansas the peach buds froze last winter. Apple prospects generally are good in these sections.

In southcentral Kansas there is considerable variety in crop prospects. The apple set generally is good, Dr. Morrison said. At Hutchinson and Belle Plaine the peach

crop is big. In Sedgwick County there has been severe hail damage in apple and peach orchards. The peach set was in the top half of the trees around Haysville. Peaches were said to be large-size and of good flavor, according to housewives who participated this week in the pick-it-yourself harvest. The harvest will continue into August.

In southeast Kansas there is a good set of apples and peaches.

METAL PROCESSOR TO EXPAND AT MOUNDRIDGE

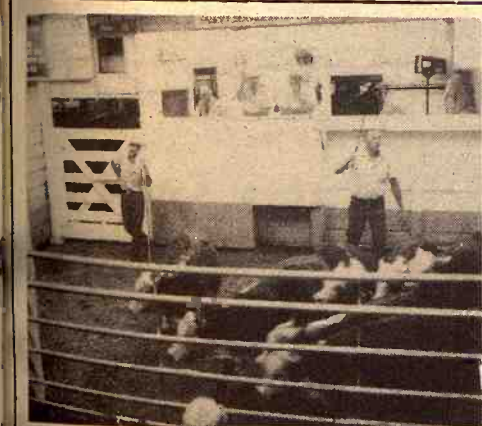


SLEEPING SICKNESS VICTIM

Kansas' embargo is somewhat stricter than federal limits. The state embargo includes horses which have been vaccinated for 14 days, while the federal quarantine allows movement of such horses under certain conditions.

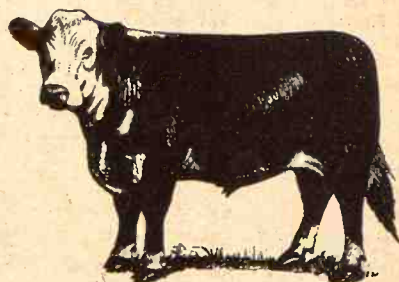

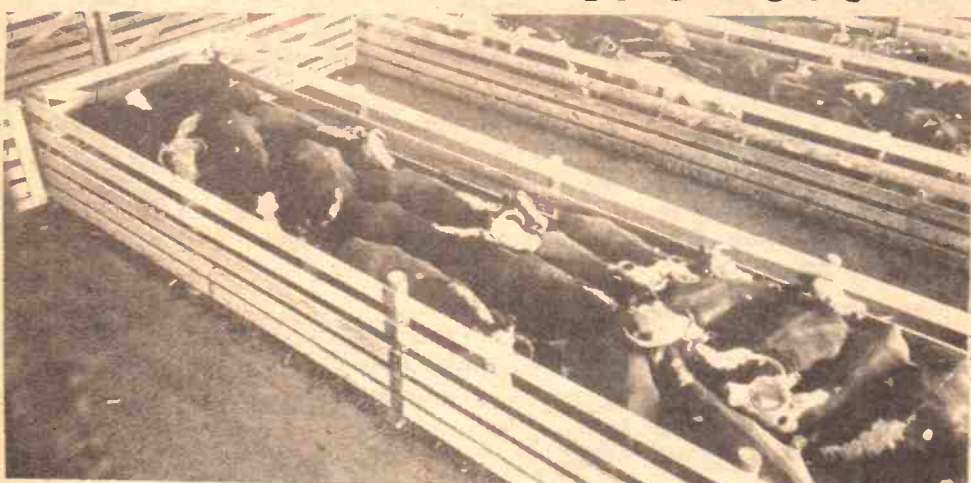
