Football



Football, 1919

THE FOOTBALL season of 1919 opened with fine prospects for a championship team. Fourteen letter men reported for practice the first week and many substitutes were also on the job. Success was the daily forecast in the Aggie camp, but something seemed to hold the Wildcats in check. We don't know what this something was, but it is up to "Ike" Gatz, captain-elect, to see that it does not show up next year.

The season opened with a victory over Baker University. This was closely followed by a big score over the Army, but this was a costly victory for the Aggies, as with it went the assistance of Fairman and Roda. "Hobe," the big fullback, was knocked unconscious and played no more during the season. Roda received a broken shoulder and it was several weeks before he was in condition to play.

Next came Missouri, the final Valley Champions, and after a hard battle the game ended in a 6 to 6 tie. The following week, the Wildcats invaded the Washington camp, and after a desperate fight they suffered their first defeat of the season. With it went the hope and spirit of the team, never to show up again until the last game against the Sooners, which we lost 14 to 6.

Even our ancient rivals, the Jayhawkers, could not arouse in the Wildcats the usual spirit, although the student body was there with pep, enthusiasm and support. Next year, our claws will be sharpened, our muscles set, and our eyes brightened—and the sun will shine again.



Basket Ball

THE 1920 basket ball season promised well for the Aggies at the time the first practice was called. Four men, Bunger, Hinds, Jennings, and E. Cowell, were returned from the Valley Championship team of 1919. There were also some likely looking candidates for positions from last year's Freshman squad. The team rounded rapidly into shape with Warren Cowell playing the left guard position, filling out the team with the four first-string men from the 1918 quintette.

After taking two games from the Funston team by lop-sided scores, the Wildcats initiated the Grinnell basketeers into Valley circles with two sound trouncings.

Bennie Owen's Sooners were the next to fall before the Aggies. The next week end the Ames squad invaded the Aggie camp in an effort to retrieve the reputation of the Iowa teams in the conference, but were turned back by Clevenger's men.

It began to look as though the championship bunting would again float over Nichols Gymnasium. But such was not to be, for the Missouri Tigers, ancient rivals of the Aggies, took a two-game series at Columbia the next week end, and then the K. U. quintette split the series at Manhattan.

The mid-season trip to Norman was looked to to fatten up the percentage column with two easy wins, but the Sooners, playing on their own court took a brace, evening the score for the season with the Wildcats.

Meanwell's Missouri quintette came to Manhattan for their last two games of the season with a record of 16 straight games to their credit, expecting to round out an ever-victorious season. They won the first game after a hard fought battle, and came back the second night to make it unanimous. Aggie rooters will remember that game for many moons. Missouri was disappointed in her expectations after one of the most thrilling games ever seen in Nichols Gymnasium and the Aggies gained the distinction of being the only team to stop the Tigers.

The last two games of the season were dropped to the Jayhawkers at Lawrence. K. S. A. C. placed fourth in the conference with a record of eight wins and the same number of losses.



Heinie Hinds played his last basket ball game for the Aggies at the close of the 1920 season. He captained the Wildcat team and played the same steady, consistent game that has characterized his work during his three years of Missouri Valley basket ball. Heinie's brilliant floor work was a feature of all the games and Aggie rooters will long remember the "old fight" and pep he displayed. The team will miss Heinie.

Everett Cowell, alias "The Blacksmith," played a consistent game at guard throughout his second season. The forwards on teams that opposed the Aggies will testify that "Old Shorty" earned his sobriquet of the Blacksmith by his hammer-and-tongs style of guarding. He made the All-Missouri Valley five this year, and will be back next year to clinch his claim to fame as the biggest little man in the Valley.



Ham Bunger, captain-elect, was chosen for one of the forward positions on the mythical All-Valley five. Ham was high-point man on the Aggie team and also stood among the first five in the Valley on tallies. Ham was in there to win every minute of every game. To find a more consistent trainer or harder, cleaner player one would have to search far. He is well able to take over the reins of leadership from the hands of Heinie.

"Jinks" Jennings, a lanky Aggie center, played his second season of Varsity basket ball this year. He was good at getting the tip-off from opposing centers, but his long suit was those long shots that bring the thrill that comes but once in a life time. 'Member that perfect shot from center-court that started the Aggie rally in the last Missouri game? Jinks, of course! He'll be back next year.



Warren (Brady) Cowell teamed up with his brother at the guard position to prove that basket ball ability runs in the family. It was his first season of Varsity basket ball, but he displayed the fight that made the Cowells famous. With another season of experience "Young Shorty" will rank with the best in the Valley.

Bill Knostman was late in getting into condition this year, but played in nearly every game of the season. He played every place on the team during the campaign. It will be hard for any aspirant for a forward position on next year's team who has to buck Bill.



Baseball, 1919

THE CLOSE of the war and the return of old students revived the national sport for the Aggies. Due to the heavy expenses incurred through a season of college baseball and the lack of students, the game had to be ruled out the preceding year. Early in the spring of '19, loyal supporters of athletics canvassed the town and college and found that enough tickets could be sold to make the game pay.

There were only three letter men in college and around these men the team was built. Johnny Clark, the old reliable first baseman, was unanimously elected captain. In Magrath a coach had everything he could want for a college pitcher. Dick Richardson, although somewhat out of practice, was a valuable asset at shortstop. The new men to fill the remaining positions were soon found and the combination started its work for a successful season. Twelve games were hurriedly scheduled, many of them being return engagements. Only a few of the Valley schools had baseball teams and an extensive schedule could not be arranged or Valley Championship decided.

The season started with a boom and the team annexed seven straight victories. Crowds were good and the sport created a wonderful interest among the students. The eighth game of the season was lost to St. Marys after they had already been defeated three times. This was probably due to overconfidence after winning so many victories. However, this loss steadied the team and the next week they defeated K. U. in the first game of their series. The second game was lost to the opponents. The most memorable game of the season was the third game with the old rival. After a twelve-inning fight the Wildcats worked an unexpected squeeze play which spelled victory. The last game of the season was dropped to K. U.

In all, the season was very prosperous for the Aggies. Starting with new material and winning nine of the twelve scheduled games is a record of which every Wildcat rooter can be proud.

He was one of the old letter men of the days of Michael Ahearn and as an old settler in baseball he holds no rivals at K. S. A. C.

Magrath is the third and last of the letter men of the squad of '19. As a twirler "Mac" has no equal in the Missouri Valley. Ever since he started playing on the Aggie diamond he has had a special desire to pitch winning games against K. U. No happier moments ever entered Mac's life than those after that twelve-inning battle completing his first two victories against the rival. In acknowledgment of his services he was elected captain of the team of '20.





Snapp had the true essentials of an outfielder both as to hitting and fielding ability. He stood at the top of the batting average with .384 and his "Snake Eyes" were ever on fly balls to center field.

"Shorty" Cowell, although being a blacksmith by trade and having an "Iceman's" stature, finished the season second on the list of batting averages. Shorty was a speedy runner and a clever base stealer. Left could want no better protection during his next two years of play.



And then here's McCollum, the steady man of the team. He was as regular as a clock and consistency was his middle name. The coach always knew what to expect and he also knew "Mac" would fulfill his expectations. The team will always remember Mac's squeeze-play that was so instrumental in bringing the twelve-inning K. U. game to a successful close. We are all glad that we can have this letter man with us for the two coming years.

Behind the bat, Burton had no contender. He was fast on foul tips and covered an abundance of ground. A sore arm bothered him at the first of the season, but as warm weather came on he began making some wonderful throws about the diamond. "Ding" was always in luck on days when he carried an old suitcase before the game.



Last year Otto entered the Valley for the first time as an Aggie twirler. Merton always pitched a steady, consistent game and was no bad stick artist. Two more years in the box will undoubtedly develop him into an admirable pitcher for Wildcat fans.

The coach debated for some time over a man for third base but he finally decided upon Homer Willis. Homer, while not a great talker, was a steady fielder and a consistent hitter. Graduation will allow him but one season with the Purple squad.





"Shorty" Foltz played his first and last season with the team at right field. He was a consistent fielder and during the first of the season did well at the bat.





Track, 1919

"GERMANY" SHULTZ did not come back from his Christmas vacation with the smile so characteristic of one who has spent the holidays with kin and friends, the reason being that 1919 Track prospects looked exceedingly gloomy. He had only three letter men whom he could use as the nucleus for an Aggie team. As a support to these three letter men, Captain Foreman, Earle Frost and Clyde Beckett, he had three sophomores, Gallagher, Evans and Neally of whom he knew, and whatever other material would show up.

It wasn't very long until Germany's gloom began to lighten, because the old letter men were improving and the three sophomores of whom he was sure, were rounding out fast into true Aggie Tracksters. Besides these, Watson had showed up to help on the total score.

Each night the gloom became perceptibly lighter, and on returning from the K. C. A. C. Indoor, Germany's face was radiating sunshine and prospects of future Aggie victories, for with the home-coming was a gold and silver medal in the open mile, a silver in the pole vault, a bronze in the half, a silver in the 50-yard dash, and a gold in the 50-yard low hurdle.

Then the old men began to roll in and you could often hear Germany say "Oh Boy!" in very emphatic tones. After beating K. U. indoors, outdoor was started with Enlow, Billings, Beatty and Totten as valuable additions to the team. With these men added to the regulars the team won from Baker, K. U., Haskell Indians and then went to Ames. Although starting poorly in the first few events they soon began to loom up and finally brought home a Missouri Valley Championship.

The next week end Coach Shultz took Frost, Evans, Gallagher, Foreman and Watson to the Big-Ten Conference Meet at Chicago and with these five men brought back a fifth place made possible by a first in the two-mile by Foreman, fourth in the 100 by Evans, second in the 220 low hurdles by Gallagher, and second in the half-mile by Watson.

Foreman, although captain of the team, took about as much care of his running charges as a hen does of her adopted progeny. At first sight, Evans might seem to carry considerable avoirdupois for a track man but in action he ran so fast that no one was able to notice how heavy he was; they were only sure of the fact that he had enough weight and speed usually to be the man who broke the tape. He was master of the 220, often shared first place with Gallagher in the 100, and was one of the dependable relay men.

In the ordinary walks of life he is big, easy-going, and quiet; but when the gun cracks for the start of the 120-high hurdles, Totten usually leads the gang and then holds on to his position to the end.



Here we have the other man of the high hurdle team. Beatty was handicapped because of a late start and consequently a short period of training, but he delivered the goods in true Aggie form and brought in his share of the points.

Tom came to K. S. A. C. from Enterprise, Kansas, and with him brought a record of an enviable high school star. When time came for the quarter, Heally was always on deck and ran true to Aggie fashion, putting all that he had into his race.





Here we have Jack Frost the youngest of "Germany's" children. He still loves to jump and to play with the big pole; and, by the way, he's a specialist too. Jack could always be counted on for not less than seconds in the pole vault and high jump and he usually brought home firsts. Our ears will forever ring with the sound of hand-clapping and sweet girls' voices, as at the sight of our young hero, they cried, "Oh, there's Jack!"

The last call for the shot-put has been sounded and 3 B's respond. "Big Bill" Billings got to school late because Uncle Sam held on to him after he had been practicing the weights by heaving grenades at the Germans. In his short training period Bill certainly came to the front and put fear into the opponents by increasing the Aggie's total number of points. This year B. B. B. will undoubtedly create a sick feeling among the other M. V. weight men.



The most that can be said of any man is that he gave his best; and this surely can be said of Charley. When we saw Enlow grip the discus, balance it in his hand, then get into form, grit his teeth, give three swings and a whirl, while every sinew strained and every muscle yielded its maximum power, then we knew that the Aggie scoreboard had some more points to be added.

Ray Watson of Wichita is one of the best distance runners K. S. A. C. has ever known. In every race entered during the season he brought home points for the team. In his own race, the half-mile, he was only defeated twice. He holds the state record of 1:59.2 for the half mile and it was his second in the two-mile race at Ames that brought the points high enough for the Aggie's championship.



Becket opened the season as one of the old "K" men, a point winner in the half mile, but due to a bad ankle he was unable to stand the hard grind of the cinders. Clyde is out on the track again this year and unless his ankle goes bad on him we can feel sure he will add another stripe to the sleeve of his track sweater.

Division of General Science




DEAN WILLARD

The Division of General Science includes general fundamental work in Languages, Mathematics, and the Physical and Biological sciences which are essential to the study of subjects more directly vocational in character. Courses which qualify one for the intelligent performance of one's duty as a citizen are also given in this division.

While thus giving the basic work for the special professional and vocational curricula administered in other divisions, this division is in charge of the following four-year courses leading to the bachelor's degree: General Science, Industrial Journalism, Industrial Chemistry, Agricultural Chemistry, Biological Chemistry, and Music. A three-year course in Applied Music is also offered and a two-year course in Public School Music. These courses lead to appropriate certificates.

In addition to these fundamental classes of subjects the division also handles the work in Military Science, Physical Education, Music, and Industrial Journalism. There are eighteen separate departments in the division and considerably more than one-half of all the teaching work of the college is done in these departments.



Division of Agriculture

The underlying purpose of the Division of Agriculture is to supply training and inspiration which will assist young men in becoming leaders in the various enterprises involved in the improvement of American country life. This requires the teaching of the principles—physical, biological, social, and economic—upon which successful agriculture is based, and the teaching of modern agricultural practice.

The training supplied to students in the Division of Agriculture is not like European trade-school training. It develops skill, but it also stimulates the development of character, initiative, broad vision, and sympathy. It is distinctly and consciously American.

To meet the demand for engineers trained along scientific lines, the Kansas State Agricultural College offers courses of collegiate grade in Civil Engineering, Electrical Engineering, Architecture, Agricultural Engineering, Flour Mill Engineering and Mechanical Engineering.

The equipment in the laboratories, shops and designing rooms, used purely for the instruction of engineering students is valued at more than \$150,000. The erection of the addition to the Engineering Building, now under construction, will help to relieve the congested condition which now exists in the Engineering Division of K. S. A. C.

K. S. A. C. is being classed now by educators, engineers and manufacturers among the leading engineering schools of this country. Our courses of study are standard, our engineering equipment is well selected, and the members of our engineering faculty are well trained and are men of standing in their profession.

From the inauguration of industrial training in sewing and cooking far back in the Anderson Administration, the women students in K. S. A. C. have enjoyed the privilege of instruction in subjects pertaining to work in the home. In 1898 the college organized a four-year course in home making. Since that historic venture, the division has developed through accumulation and evolution until it finds itself today housed in suitable buildings, furnished with modern equipment, administered by an earnest and efficient faculty, and supplying to its students information, inspiration, and working principles for life.

Scientific effort in behalf of the homes, the schools and the community, daily practice of hygiene, economy, and social service are the logical results to be expected from students going out from the Division of Home Economics. Many a spot in Kansas has felt the influence of the college through the women who have studied here. Education, arts and industries have been benefited by their leadership.

Division of Veterinary



DEAN DYKSTRA

AT THE Kansas State Agricultural College every facility is offered for training young men as veterinarians. Its veterinary building, erected in 1907, is modern in every respect and contains well equipped laboratories and class rooms. Veterinary instruction is given by a corps of ten veterinary specialists who devote their time exclusively to college duties. Both the hospital clinic and the ambulatory clinic afford a large amount of material for student instruction. By these means students are thoroughly drilled in the practical handling of diseases of animals that the veterinarian is ordinarily called upon to handle in a country practice.

In order to meet his responsibility successfully, the prospective student in veterinary medicine must first have a sound basic education acquired in a high school or other institution of equal standing. The veterinary curriculum proper extends throughout a period of four years.



Dean of Women

The work of the Dean of Women is administrative, academic, and social. Her duties are to realize for the women students the highest possible intellectual, moral, social, and spiritual development to the end that they may become the best kind of women. The measure of her success is manifested in the character of the young women who go forth from the institution as graduates. The world has a right to expect of its women graduates the finest type of educated women. They must be splendid products—cultured, disciplined in mind, strong in physique, unselfish, honest, self-controlled, tolerant; they must have their standards well enough defined to make it easy for them to eliminate the unessentials and conserve the essentials in every phase of human life and endeavor. It is the aim of the Dean of Women to, as far as possible, realize these ideals for the women of the institution she serves. Her problems of living conditions, of health, of student employment, of intellectual life, of vocational guidance, of social life, of student discipline are but aspect of the fundamental purpose—to develop the finest type of college women.

Extension Division



DEAN UMBERGER

The State of Kansas is the campus of the Extension Division. With its eight busy departments, under the guidance of H. Umberger, Dean, it delves into practically every feature of agriculture in the state.

Farm and Home Institutes, general agriculture meetings, and work of specialists in horticulture; poultry production; dairying; rodent control; diseases of live stock, hog, sheep and beef cattle production; crops; soils, etc., are fostered by the department of the farmers' institute and extension schools.

As a result of the farm bureau organization, Kansas farmers are actively behind the programs of the Extension Division and the Agricultural College, and, for the first time in history, as advisors and co-operators in an organized way, are assisting the institution in promoting agricultural education in the state.

School of Agriculture



DEAN KENT

The School of Agriculture is the School of Opportunity for the Kansas boys and girls. It is the type of school which aims to prepare people for doing things in the world. For young men and women who do not expect to finish college and take up professional work, the courses in home making, farming and shop work, together with the cultural work offered, cannot be excelled. The young people who have taken work in the school have made good in every way. Those who entered military service made especially fine records.

The school was established in 1913. More than fifteen hundred boys and girls have been enrolled in it during that time.




THE enrollment in the Tractor Mechanics Short Course this year numbered 126 men. The work consisted of one hour lecture and six hours laboratory work each day. The Short Course was under the direction of Dean A. A. Potter and the supervision of "Cap" Sanders. The men studied tractor construction, ignition, carburetion, stationary gas engines, dead engines, tractor operation, repair work, and tractor machinery.

The members of the class were not always found in greasy overalls. Under the leadership of Prof. Hugh Durham, the different sections of the short course united in giving a few entertainments. Every two weeks an entertainment was given; the earlier part of the evening being devoted to music and readings, and the latter to dancing.





That the Kansas State Agricultural College has the only completely equipped flour mill that is used for demonstration and teaching purposes?




Two Methodist Sunday School Classes



The Methodist Sunday School at Manhattan this year has two Bible classes that break all previous records at the College. In fact, we doubt whether any Sunday School classes at any college of the State can equal either of these. The above picture illustrates a part of the large class of college girls taught by Professor Ralph R. Price of the Department of History and Civics. This class is using Luccock's "Studies in the Parables of Jesus," followed by Rauschenbusch's "Social Principles of Jesus," as the texts for the two courses studied during the year. The class was organized in September, and had an average attendance of 94 for October. In spite of the Thanksgiving holidays and one very stormy Sunday in November, the average attendance for that month increased to 102. For January, the attendance at this class reached an average of over 170 girls present each Sunday, the number present the day the above picture was taken being 179.



Meanwhile, rivalry had sprung up between this class and Attorney George Clammer's class of college men at the same Methodist Sunday School. As a result of this rivalry, together with the splendid work done by this class in studying "The Fundamentals of Religion," the theme of the ages, Mr. Clammer's class reached a total attendance of 142 on January 18th, the day that the two pictures on this page were taken.



CAPTAIN FREDERICK B. TERRELL

Capt. Terrell came to this institution in July of 1919 at a time when the school was upset by war conditions. He has, within the space of one year, placed our military department on a very sound footing. He has definitely established an infantry unit of the R. O. T. C. and is now working for the establishment of a field artillery unit. He is a man of very excellent personality, and has won the respect and admiration of all. He entered the United States Army as Second Lieutenant of the 19th Infantry in June, 1904 and took part in the Moro Campaign during 1905 and 1906. During March, 1911, he was advanced to First Lieutenant with the 22nd Infantry and to Captain in 1916. When we entered the World War in 1917, and the need for officers became great, Captain Terrell was at once recommended for the rank of Major, and received his appointment in July, 1917. In September, 1918, he was advanced to the rank of Lieutenant Colonel and held that position until the end of the war. In January, 1920, he received his former rank of Captain. During the recent war, he served with the First Corps, Sixth Division, in the Vosges and Argonne.

CAPTAIN L. D. DAVIDSON

Captain Davidson graduated from the United States Military Academy at West Point with the class of 1915. Since February, 1919, he has been on duty with the Officers' Reserve Corps at Kansas State Agricultural College. He has served most efficiently as Assistant Commandant during the past year. His energy, enthusiasm and ability has further demonstrated itself in the establishment of boxing at K. S. A. C. His success and popularity as a boxing instructor was proved by the large number of voluntary enrollments in boxing and the interest shown in his very successful tournament this spring.



MAJOR E. L. CLAEREN

In Major Claeren we have an example of the highest type of military man. Enlisting as a private in the 6th Cavalry in 1884, he had risen step by step until he was retired in 1910. In April, 1910, he was detailed by War Department orders as an assistant to the Professor of Military Science and Tactics, Kansas State Agricultural College, and served in this capacity until June, 1911, when he was ordered on active duty as a captain of Quartermaster Corps, U. S. A. In August, 1918, he received his promotion to the rank of Major. In February, 1919, he was discharged from active duty, and shortly thereafter was detailed by War Dept. orders as an Asst. to our Commandant. In Jan., 1920, he received his appointment as major, Q. M. C., U. S. R.



Senior Class History

On September 18, 1916, 693 freshmen made their first bow into the college life of K. S. A. C. Soon after college opened the class became organized, and under the guidance of Frank Dale and Chauncey Yeoman, we soon became able to stand alone. The first thing we did was wear our Freshman caps and showed that we had real college spirit. In the spring of this year came the call of our Nation, and our response was in the form of men from the class of 1920, several of whom made the supreme sacrifice. When school opened the next year, the Sophomores were on hand with well made paddles and with one look at some of the sturdy members of the class, such as E. S. Lyons and Harold Woodard, the Freshman knew that we meant business. The girls in no way took back seats in class affairs and the fall semester of 1919, elected Ada Robertson, President of the Senior class. In the spring, Leo Magrath was chosen to guide the class to the final goal. The record in athletics of the class has never been surpassed. With just pride, we can point to Ike Gatz, Pete Hixon, Leo Magrath, Jack Frost, Hobe Fairman, Carl Roda, Leo Ptacek and Heinie Hinds.

Now listen, my friends, and you shall hear the story of that crook we prize so dear. On Thursday, the 4th of April, 1918, spring semester of our Sophomore year, Glenn Hoffhines overheard a conversation between George Gibbons, keeper of the Senior crook, and Alice Neiman. George was going to get the crook out of the bank and take it up to Alice for her to press the ribbons for presentation ceremonies at Junior-Senior, the following evening. Hoffhines phoned Ellet Robison, and with Everett Stearns and Ike Gatz they plotted to steal the crook from the Tri Delt house that night. Gladys Burris, a Sophomore and also a Tri Delt, was told about the plan and the five determined to get the crook. Being unable to get a trace of it, the party disbanded for that night. The next evening Ding Burton, Harold Epperson, Robert Meeker and L. Hamilton were put on guard at the Tri Delt house. When Gibbons came out, they all rushed him at the same time with excellent team work. They succeeded in escaping unharmed with the bag which contained the crook and ribbons. It was then hidden in a vacant building in the southwest part of town. The next morning the boys got the bag and took its contents to an old brick kiln south and east of town. The much battered and bent bag was returned to Gibbons. Later, the prizes were deposited for safe-keeping with a nurse at the Park View Hospital where they remained until Ellet Robison secured them and then deposited them in a safety vault in—

The School of Agriculture



"Home of the School of Agriculture."

THE SCHOOL OF AGRICULTURE was organized in 1913. This is a secondary school offering three year vocational courses, intended to meet the educational needs of the boys and girls of the State who can not afford four years of high school work and then four years of college work. The curriculum outlined and the instruction offered are purposed to make productive workmen and good citizens of the young men and women of Kansas who desire vocational training above the grades and who do not have the opportunity to attend college.

There are two courses for boys, Agriculture and Mechanic Arts, and a course in Home Economics for girls. The school is housed in the Agricultural College buildings, and the instruction is given by members of the different departments of the college faculty. Students in the School of Agriculture have free access to the college library and the splendidly equipped laboratories of the college.

A Junior R. O. T. C. is maintained by the Military Department of the College, and all able-bodied male students of the School are required to take at least one year of military training. The School maintains its own literary societies, debating clubs and athletic teams. Its students unite with the college students in Christian Association and other student enterprises.

The students of the School are, in the main, young men and women who could not go directly from the rural or graded schools to high school, but who were out of school for a time and now enter school with an earnestness of purpose, a maturity of thought and an ability to work which is not found in the ordinary type of secondary schools.

The School of Agriculture has found its place in the inner life of the great white city upon the hill, and its graduates are finding their places in the busy productive life of the state.

Senior Class School of Agriculture

This is the sixth and largest class to be graduated from the School of Agriculture, the secondary school connected with the Kansas State Agricultural College. The class was first organized in the fall of 1919, and has held regular meetings during the year.

Very little interest was shown in athletics during their first and second years in school. There were mixers and social functions, however, that promoted good fellowship among the students. During their third year, there was remarkable enthusiasm shown by the members of the class. In the fall they hiked to Wild Cat, which brought the class more together. In the spring the class motored to Dripping Springs, where they enjoyed another good time; and of course the annual senior sneak day could not be forgotten. All of these events meant a great deal to the class. Toward the last of the year, a program was given by the class for the Philomathian and Lincoln Literary Societies of the School of Agriculture. Most of the class belong to one of these societies, in which they have taken an active part and interest, and have gained a great deal in the way of literary training. After the re-organization of the School of Agriculture in the spring of 1919, more interest was given to athletics, and the third year was never without their support.

On the whole, the members of the class have had a successful three years' training. Whether they go on to college, go back to the farm, or take up some other occupation, the class of 1920 will succeed in accordance with their success while in school; and will always boost for the School of Agriculture, not forgetting the many friendships, the jolly times, and the careful training that they received while in school.

Superior Mine, No. 1, is located one mile north of Scammon and fifteen miles southeast of Pittsburgh. The mine is one of the largest in this section of the country, both as to size and capacity. The normal capacity of the mine under ideal conditions is nine cars a day. The coal runs in layers or veins about twenty feet underneath the surface.

Those Alpha Theta Chis are well represented here, eight in the lottery bunch and six in the second contingent.



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
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


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



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
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
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
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CONSOLATION
