

This special issue of The Kansas Future Farmer deals with chapter programs and reports and is being published with the hope that it will prove of value to chapters in planning their activity programs. It contains a study made of the chapter activity programs sent to the State Executive Advisor November 1, 1934. Certain material on program building, previously published in The Kansas Future Farmer, is included. Suggestions for formulating annual chapter activity reports also are included.

Remarkable improvement has been made in program building by Kansas F.F.A. chapters in the last two years. This has been due largely to the sectional officers' training schools, the program building conferences, and the use of the material suggested in The Kansas Future Farmer.

PART I

A STUDY OF THE 1934 KANSAS FFA CHAPTER ACTIVITY PROGRAMS

In analyzing the 1934 activity programs, the material was grouped under three major headings as follows:

A composite list of chapter activities.

A grouping of chapter activities under the eight headings of the National Chapter Contest Score Card.

A record showing percentage of chapters conducting each activity listed in the composite report of chapter activities.

A Composite List of Chapter Activities: This was developed to illustrate the nature and scope of activities that may be included in a chapter program. Many suggestions as to suitable activities to include in a chapter program may be had by referring to this study.

A Grouping of Chapter Activities Under the Eight Headings of the National Chapter Contest Score Card: The various chapter activities were listed under the eight headings as found in the National Chapter Contest Score Card. They follow:

All chapter program activities should be classified under the eight headings of the National Chapter Contest Score Card. By listing chapter activities according to this score card, each chapter can readily see to what extent its program is balanced. The following omissions probably would not have occurred had each chapter checked its program against the National Score Card.

Supervised Practice activities omitted by 15 per cent of chapters.

Cooperative Activities omitted by 30 per cent of chapters. Earnings and Savings activities omitted by 20 per cent of chapters.

Chapter Program for Conduct of Meetings omitted by 2 per cent of chapters.

Scholarship activities omitted by 30 per cent of chapters.

It is reasonable to suppose that a chapter finding itself without any activity listed under "Scholarship", for example, could find at least one means of promoting better scholarship.

Twenty-four per cent of the chapters submitting their annual activity programs this year used the general headings given in the National Score Card. In the future, it will be necessary to ask each chapter to follow the plan of classifying activities set up in the National Score Card. Chapter programs submitted under this plan will be on a more comparable basis. When activities are listed in accordance with the National Score Card classification, the State Committee evaluating chapter programs can more easily understand the intent of the chapter concerning each activity.

In reclassifying programs in this study where the National Score Card was not followed in setting up the programs, it is highly probable that in some instances the activities were not given the same classification that the chapter listing them had in mind.

A Record Showing Percentage of Chapters Conducting Each Activity: A record showing percentage of chapters conducting an activity was developed to give a picture of what the chapters are now doing in Kansas. A study of this list shows that there are certain chapter activities conducted each year by almost all chapters, such as a father and son banquet or a project tour. We found many activities that were fairly new to the State and many that appeared to be original with the chapter conducting them.

The following is a composite list of activities taken from the 1934 Kansas FFA activity programs and classified according to the National Score Card. The per cent of chapters including these activities in their annual activity programs is indicated.

STEPS IN BUILDING AN ANNUAL CHAPTER ACTIVITY TROGRAM

In setting up a chapter program the chapter should endeaver to include activities of such scope and variety that all members will be given opportunity for training and experience. Definite attainable goals should be established. In building such a program, as well as in directing its effective accomplishment, the efficers and advisor have many duties and responsibilities. Every effort should be made to have a program built and endorsed by the chapter, and not merely a program set up by the officers and advisor.

All chapters are requested to use Form 1, page 19-25, inclusive, in setting up and submitting their chapter program to the State Executive Committee.

A suggested procedure in program building follows:

The first step is to list activities for consideration. This may be done by a general program committee, made up of advisor, officers, and appointees. Suggestions for suitable activities may be found by referring to Part I of this report, by examining chapter programs of other schools, and by listing new activities thought of by committee members. Do not attempt to eliminate too many activities at this stage, as careful thought is usually necessary to bring out the full possibilities of an activity.

The second step is to determine possibilities of each activity listed. A satisfactory procedure is to appoint sub-committees (drawing in all members of the chapter on some committee, if possible) to give time and thought to setting up Goals and Ways and Means for each activity assigned. After this careful study they will be able to report on the advisability of including the activities in the chapter program. The date for committee reports should be established so that all activities may be reported upon within a short time.

It is obvious that the reports of all sub-committees must be presented according to a standardized system. Form 2, page 26, should be used.

The third step is the coordination of the sub-committee reports into an achievable chapter program. This probably will be done by the general program committee with the help of the chapter as a whole.

The fourth step is the presentation of the tentative annual program to the chapter. There probably will be more desirable activities included in this program than it will be possible to carry out. Optional activities may be presented to the chapter and voted upon. The greater share of the program will probably be accepted as presented.

The fifth step is to perfect a calendar of chapter activities for the year, by months, showing activities or the phase of each activity to be carried out during each month. Form 3 should be used. An example showing how to calendar the chapter program by months is given on page 27.

It is important to balance the yearly calendar of activities. Too many activities at a given time will likely result in a scattering of effort and a lowering of standards; or, if standards are maintained, will demand too much of the members of the group. Too few activities will cause loss of interest. Fit your program of activities in with the school and community programs. This will avoid conflicts and the possibility of demanding too much time and energy on the part of certain members of your chapter.

The question as to whether or not a certain activity is rightfully an FFA activity has probably been raised in the minds of those building chapter programs. The appropriateness of an activity can be determined only by the definiteness with which goals and ways and means can be set up. If definite and practical goals and ways and means cannot be set up for an activity, such an activity does not belong in the program. To clarify the use of the terms "activities", "goals", and "ways and means", and to show the plan for recording them on Form 1, the illustrations on pages 28 and 29 are given.
