No Mass Cancellations By Insurance Companies In State

There have been no wholesale cancellations of insurance policies on Kansas property risks by companies operating in this state, the Kansas insurance commissioner says.

Frank Sullivan, the commissioner, issued his statement following recent national publicity concerning cancellations of property insurance policies in some states throughout the country, particularly those that have been involved in civil disorder and violence.

Sullivan said his office had attempted to eliminate the indiscriminate cancellation of such policies where no justifiable reason for cancellation exists, whether on a mass or individual basis.

"There has been no attempt to require the renewal of existing policies since such discretion is not granted by existing insurance statutes," Sullivan said.

The commissioner said a minor problem developed in Wichita last fall in regard to cancellation of insurance policies after last summer's disorder.

However, he said, the difficulties apparently have been handled effectively by the development of a participation plan through which most companies will share in writing "hard to place" insurable fire and extended coverage risks.

Kansas does not have a statute requiring insurance companies to insure property in deprived areas. However, authority for the state to require such a plan to be established was proposed in the 1968 session of the state legislature.

"That proposal was not enacted," Sullivan said, "but such a law or similar enabling legislation, now appears to be necessary if Kansas is to participate in the federal 'back-up' reinsurance program which is currently being considered in Congress as an incentive for insurance companies to continue to write coverage in 'riot-prone' areas."

Sullivan said the plan now

pending in Congress would require private insurers in cooperation with state insurance authorities to develop statewide plans to assure residential and business property owners fair access to property insurance.

It is intended that losses would first be shared by the private insurance sector, then by a layer of state participation. He said the federal government, through the creation of a national insurance development fund, would insure the balance of insured losses resulting from riots and civil disorders.

The insurance commissioner said that insurance companies had requested countrywide rate surcharges on fire and extended coverage and on homeowners policies to help pay the severe riot and civil disorder losses which they may sustain in the future.

"Kansas has not approved the proposed surcharges at this time, but it is obvious that insurance companies must have relief, either through increased rates, restriction or elimination of portions of coverage, guaranteed reinsurance facilities by means of a federal 'back-up' plan or a combination of these alternatives," he said.

Sullivan said his office contacted regional representatives of the Royal Globe Insurance Companies and the Continental Insurance Companies (the companies named in recent news articles in regard to cancellation of policies in New Jersey, Michigan and Kentucky).

He said the companies' officials reported no knowledge or instructions to "mass cancel" any Kansas business at this time.

Here's Mid-Year Crop Forecast

Kansas crop production prospects at mid-season point to a generally favorable crop year, with good yields per acre of early harvested grains helping to offset the smaller acreage of crops grown this year, according to the Kansas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service.

The 1968 Kansas wheat crop is expected to total 254 million bushels, moderately above last year and the 1962-66 average. Harvest started the second week of June and ran nearly a week behind usual through the month, but was winding up rapidly under favorable early July weather.

Small grains other than wheat filled well this year and yields per acre of oats, barley and rye all set record highs. Total production of these grains, however, was well below average because of this year's small acreages.

Corn, sorghum and soybean plantings increased this year, with the acreage of sorghums and soybeans moderately above average but the corn acreage still slightly below.

Corn production is forecast at 79 million bushels, the largest crop since 1950 and reflects an expected record high yield of 72 bushels per acre.

Production of fall hay is forecast at 4.8 million tons, moderately smaller than last year but above average.

Sugar beet prospects are for a crop of 624,000 tons, substantially above any previous Kansas crop.

Good rains during May and early June helped small grains recuperate from earlier moisture deficiencies but by late June portions of the State were under moisture stresses again and substantial summer rains will be needed to realize mid-season crop potentials.

Winter Wheat

The 1968 Kansas winter wheat crop is now estimated at 254,312,000 bushels, 15 percent more than the 1967 crop and 22 percent above the 1962-66 average.

The 9,973,000 acres for harvest was 10 percent less than in 1967 but the yield per acre of 25.5 bushels was 5.5 bushels above 1967 and 3.5 bushels above average. Cool, damp weather during late May and early June was ideal for filling, contributing to well above average test weights.

Dry weather during late June and early July favored rapid harvest and by July 6 some 83 percent of the acreage had been combined, well ahead of the 41 percent last year and the 10-year average of 79 percent.

Some 16.6 percent of the 11,963,000 acres seeded last fall was abandoned, compared with the 15.7 percent in 1967 and the 5-year average of 10.9 percent. Acreage losses were heavy this

year in many western counties due to drouth, winterkill, insects and hail damage.

Sorghums and Corn

Sorghum acreage planted for all purposes is estimated at 4,555,000 acres, 5 percent more than in 1967 and 8 percent above the 1962-66 average. Sorghum seeding progressed well during the season although in some local areas replanting was necessary because of hard washing rains and some local flooding.

Corn grain production is forecast at 78,624,000 bushels based on July 1 condition, 9 percent larger than last year's crop and 32 percent above average. This year's acreage for grain is expected to be 1,092,000 acres and the anticipated yield per acre of 72 bushels, if realized, will be the highest yield of record.

Acreage planted to corn for all purposes in Kansas totaled 1,393,000 acres, 2 percent more than last year but 5 percent below average. Sorghums and corn have made good to excellent growth and early development. About 76 percent of the corn crop was laid by and 13 percent tasseled by July 6.

Other Crops

Production of oats is estimated at 7,106,000 bushels, 23 percent larger than last year but 11 percent smaller than average. Yield per acre is estimated at 38 bushels, 2 bushels more than a year ago and, if realized, the highest yield of record. This year's crop is expected to be harvested from 187,000 acres, 16 percent more than a year ago but otherwise the smallest acreage in 97 years.

Production of barley is expected to total 3,300,000 bushels compared with the 2,160,000 bushels last year and the 5-year average of 7,283,000 bushels. Yield per acre this year is estimated at 33 bushels, 6 bushels more than the previous year and the highest of record. Acreage of barley for harvest is estimated at 100,000 acres, 20,000 acres more than in 1967 but otherwise the lowest since 1952.

The acreage of rye harvested is expected to total only 24,000 acres, about one-fifth the 5-year average. Rye production is estimated at 456,000 bushels compared to 405,000 bushels last year. The 1968 yield, at 19 bushels per acre, is the highest of record.

The 1968 soybean acreage at 931,000 acres marks a sharp increase from the 846,000 acres planted in 1967.

Sugar beet production is estimated at 624,000 tons compared with last year's 417,000 tons and the 5-year average of 317,000 tons. Some 41,000 acres were planted to sugar beets in 1968, 16,000 acres more than in 1967. Dry edible bean production is estimated at 260,000 cwt., up 69

percent from last year. Irish potato production is estimated at 133,000 cwt., up slightly from last year, but sweetpotato production as 81,000 cwt. is down slightly.

Fruits

Commercial apple production is forecast at 320,000 bushels (14.4 million pounds), more than double last year's crop.

Peach production is estimated at 130,000 bushels (6.2 million pounds), some 55,000 bushels more than last year.

Hay Crops and Pasture

Production of all hay this year is forecast at 4,810,000 tons, 9 percent below last year's output but 7 percent above average. Hay is expected to be harvested from 2,466,000 acres, about the same acreage as last year and just slightly more than average.

Alfalfa hay production is estimated at 3,084,000 tons, representing a yield of 2.6 tons per acre. First cuttings of alfalfa were generally light due to heavy infestation of pea aphids, but most second cuttings have been good.

Wild hay production is forecast at 908,000 tons, 8 percent below last year.

Pasture feed conditions on July 1 were rated at 83 percent of normal, 4 points above a month ago but 5 points below the same date last year.

Farm Grain Stocks

Stocks of old crop wheat on Kansas farms on July 1 totaled 14,405,000 bushels, 15 percent below those on hand a year earlier but 27 percent above average.

Corn stocks on farms totaled 12,974,000 bushels, 9 percent more than on hand a year earlier, but 6 percent less than average.

Sorghum grain stocks on Kansas farms, at 14,941,000 bushels, were 9 percent above average. Farm stocks of oats totaled 1,275,000 bushels, 34 percent below average.

Barley stocks, at 216,000 bushels, were less than half those on farms a year earlier.

Soybean stocks, of 742,000 bushels, were 20 percent below a year earlier but 18 percent larger than average.

Milk and Egg Production

Milk production in June totaled 149 million pounds, 3 percent below output for the same month last year. Egg production during June, at 74 million eggs, was down 8 million eggs from the same month a year earlier.

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Dazzling Technical Skills In Farming By Year 2000

How can perhaps three million farmers feed 300 million Americans, if that population forecast for the year 2000 is correct? If these same forecasts for the end of this century are correct in guessing the world's population at 6 billion people, how will they be fed, especially considering the numbers that are undernourished now?

A 2-year study of U.S. agriculture made by the Ford Motor Co. and Michigan State University just reported in the U.S. Labor Department's Employment Service Review sees some of these eventualities:

- A single acre of land will produce 300 bushels of wheat each year, more than 10 times today's yield, or 500 bushels of

corn, vs. today's average 75 bushels.

- A single cow will produce as many as 1000 calves in her lifetime, vs. today's 10, thru a process of transferring fertile eggs from prize cows to "incubator" cows.

- Milk production will soar from today's 8000 pounds per cow a year to 30,000. Milk also will be manufactured from carrot tops and pea pods.

- The typical farmer — with the aid of scientists and engineers — will till his soil plant and harvest his crops and regulate the growing process from a lounge equipped with computers, radar and remote control devices.

With such advances in farming, the Ford-Michigan State study says the prospects are promising to feed a world that might increase in population as much in the next 30 years as it has grown in the past one million years.

The U.S. farmer right now is making enormous increases in productivity. Today the average farmer grows enough food to feed 40 people, four times the number he could feed 30 years ago. Today the 7 million Americans living on farms are pro-

ducing many times the volume of food 31 million farmers produced a century ago.

Agricultural research is moving ahead at a fantastic pace. Public and private spending on farm research is topping \$1 billion a year. In this country some 30,000 research projects are now underway. We have 27,000 agricultural researchers a number which is expected to rise to 53,000 by 1977.

In the future, the study suggests, crop land might be tilled by huge plastic domes, by other means to control environment affecting crop growth.

Here are some other predictions:

- Crop harvesters (remotely controlled) will not only harvest but also grade, package, freeze and deliver food to wholesale markets.

- Agricultural space satellites with remote sensing instruments will collect up-to-the-minute data on soil conditions, insect damage, crop growth patterns, etc. The satellites will make long-range predictions of production forecasts.

- Many foods will be genetically tailored to individual needs and tastes. The housewife, for example, will be able to buy milk with whatever fat content she wishes.

The Ford-Michigan State study concluded that not only advances were possible in American agriculture but that we could export our technical skills to teach hungry nations how to feed themselves.

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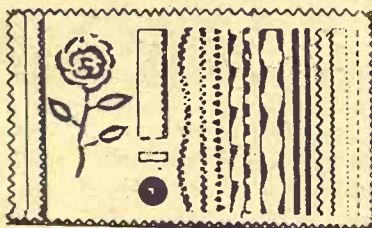
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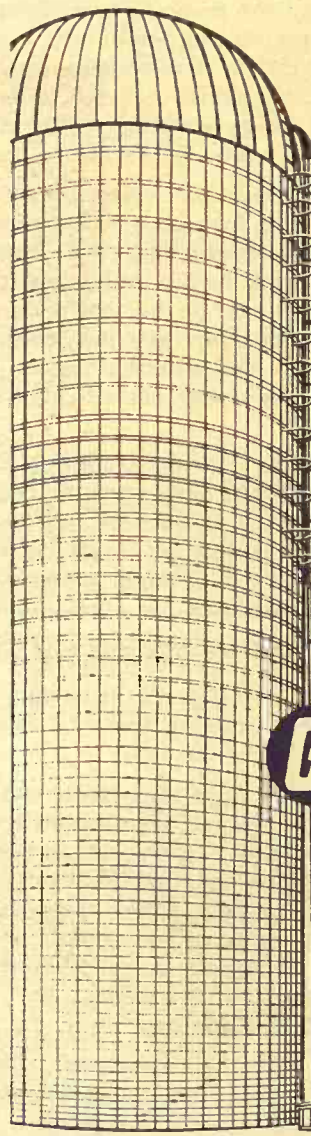
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Miracle Rice' Promises Big Yields

Orville L. Freeman, secretary of agriculture, has seen in the Philippines the latest improvements in fast-growing "miracle rice" and said he is "much, much more optimistic" that the world can win the war against hunger.

He cautioned that what he called "the breakthroughs" of the last year in the improved growing of grain foods may bring problems in storage, distribution and marketing of vastly increased production.

Freeman talked with farmers

and agricultural scientists, and walked through experimental growths of rice, corn, soybean and sorghum at the International Rice Research Institute at Los Banos, where "miracle rice" was developed. He told the institute's staff it was "involved in one of the great events of our time."

"It may be one of the most important developments in centuries, and may launch a totally new dimension in agriculture," he added. He pointed out that the increases in grain not only meant more for human consumption, but also more for livestock which means more protein on the world's dinner tables.

The new rice varieties devel-

oped at the institute mature faster than ordinary rice — enabling more crops per year — and are more resistant to diseases and more responsive to fertilizers. Rice yields have increased as much as four times a year from the same land.

The improved rice seeds have been sent to more than 60 countries.

The institute was founded in 1960 at Los Banos, about 25 miles south of Manila, by the Ford Foundation and the Rockefeller Foundation in co-operation with the Philippine government.

At nearby Bay Laguna, Freeman talked with a farmer who planted miracle rice seeds two years ago and reported the increased rice output jumped his income from 3,000 pesos, or about \$750, to 6,000 pesos a year.

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Wheat Grows To Music?

An old wives' tale that crops such as wheat and rice respond to music has been dramatically substantiated in a series of experiments at the University of Ottawa.

Dr. Pearl Weinberger, an associate professor there, has found that exposing wheat seeds and plants to high-pitched sound can triple their growth.

So far all her results have come from wheat plants grown in the laboratory, but a field trial is now under way on a Canadian governmental experimental farm where 9,000 sound-treated wheat seedlings were planted last month.

In August they will provide the answer to the all-important question: Do the bigger plants also produce more grain?

If the results are favorable, sound treatment could become of real economic importance.

Loudspeakers dotted over the wheatfields are dismissed as impracticable by Dr. Weinberger (the whine is also pretty intolerable to human ear).

However, treatment of the seed before sowing is also very effective. Even on a large scale this would be comparatively simple.

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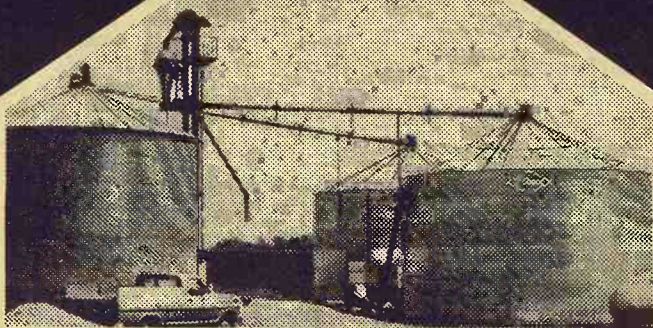

WALNUT CRUNCH PUDDING

- 1 cup sugar
- 1 cup chopped walnut meats
- 1 beaten egg
- 1 3/4-ounce package instant vanilla pudding mix
- 1 cup dairy sour cream
- 1 cup milk
- 2 bananas, sliced

Combine sugar, nuts and eggs. Spread thinly on greased baking sheet. Bake at 350 degrees for 18-20 minutes or until golden brown. Cool. Sprinkle half the crumbs in bottom of 8x8x2-inch baking pan. Combine pudding mix, sour cream and milk. Beat on low speed until well blended. Spoon over crumbs in pan. Top with rest of crumbs. Chill several hours before serving. Makes nine servings.

RED RASPBERRY CAKE

- 2 cups fresh red raspberries

 - 1/4 cup butter
 - 4 eggs, beaten

 - 1 teaspoon lemon juice
- Dissolve gelatin in 1 cup boiling water. Add cold water and stir well. Add the mulberries, apples and lemon juice. Chill until partly set. Stir well and return to refrigerator. Apples may be omitted, if desired.

CREAMY PUMPKIN PIE

- 1 envelope Dream Whip

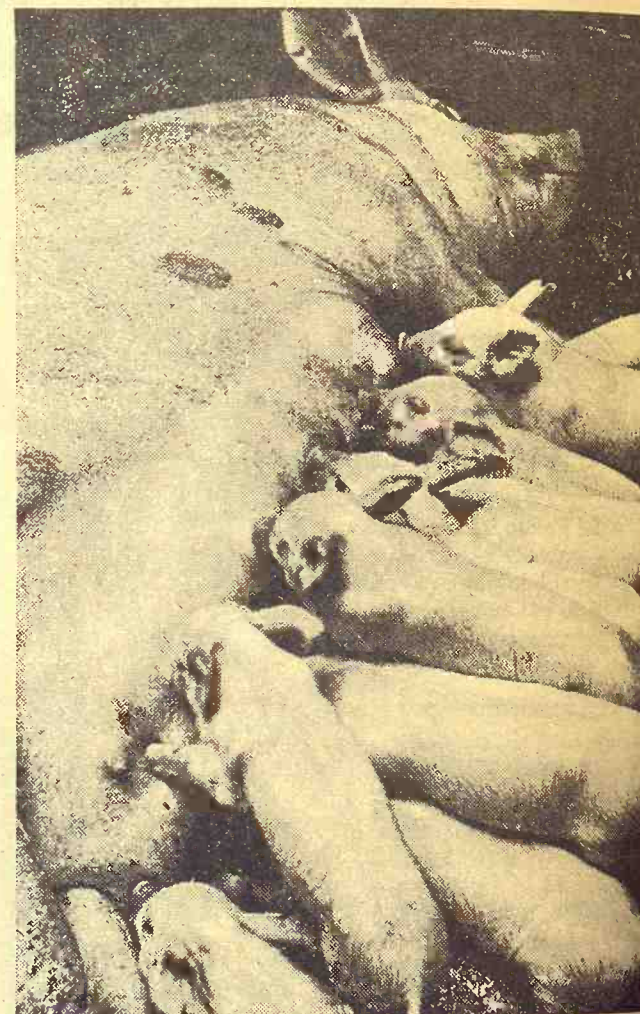
Broiled Dinner Good Choice

Summer is the season for easy living. A broiled dinner is a good choice for this time of year because the meat can be cooked quickly. For instance, ground beef patties require only 12-15 minutes to broil. Tomato halves topped with grated cheese and cooked potato slices brushed with butter can be popped into the broiler when the meat is partly cooked and ready to turn.

Three-Quarter Length Best For Knit Coat

If you're planning to knit a coat for fall, you'd be wise to make it three-quarter length instead of full length. You can eliminate the problem of knitting a coat too long or else being caught in a style change which alters length.

Shortening a coat that is already knitted is almost impossible and a three-quarter length is smart with slim skirts.



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
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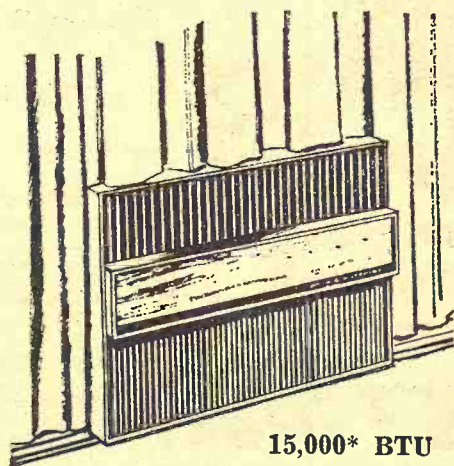
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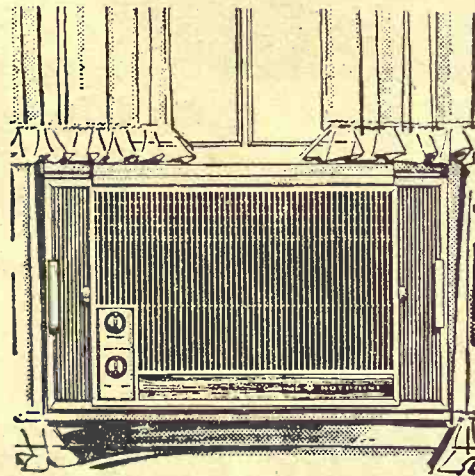


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Summer Safety For The Indoor Cook

When summer weather beckons activities out-of-doors, most people think of cooking safety as applying only to fire precautions for barbecues and cook-outs. Safety in the kitchen, where most of the meals are still prepared even on the balmy days, is often neglected in

the rush to get out of what is usually the warmest room of the house.

One habit that should be instinctive to any cook is to turn all pot and pan handles away from the front of the range when cooking, particularly when there are children in the

home. Make sure, however, that the handles do not extend over another burner. The handles should be heat resistant, but always keep a supply of pot holders and oven mitts handy. Be cautious about handling pots with your bare hands, even after you've turned off the range.

When draining boiling liquid from a pot, don't keep your head over the top of the pot and pour the liquid away from you. Don't use the pot cover or a

serving spoon to hold back the food; a free-standing colander is best as the pouring can be controlled with both hands.

Avoid spill-overs by using the right utensils. Aluminum funnels in different sizes are a must for even the most careful cook. For hot liquids use a measuring cup with a pronounced pouring lip and large handles. There's a special aluminum gadget for decanting hot oil or fat from a pan or skillet; it holds

back the food while allowing the grease to drain. Sponge off collections of grease on the outside of pans before returning it to the range to prevent fat flare-ups. Keep pots under $\frac{3}{4}$ full to avoid boil-overs. Liquids that spill to the floor should be wiped up immediately to prevent falls.

Use unbreakable utensils whenever possible. Keep flammable items away from the range.

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Garlic Cornmeal Croutons Are Easy, Versatile



Homemade Garlic Cornmeal Croutons top tossed summer salads and hearty soups. You might find them just right, too, for stuffings, bread puddings or casserole toppings. — Or use them as a zippy brunch accompaniment to scrambled eggs. However you use them, do try this easy recipe soon.

GARLIC CORNMEAL CROUTONS

½ cup enriched cornmeal
½ cup sifted all-purpose flour
1½ teaspoons baking powder
½ teaspoon salt

½ teaspoon garlic powder
2 tablespoons shortening
½ cup milk
1 egg

Heat oven to very hot (450 degrees). Sift together cornmeal, flour, baking powder, salt and garlic powder into bowl. Cut in shortening until mixture resembles coarse crumbs. Add milk and egg; stir until blended. Pour into greased 9-inch square baking pan. Bake in preheated oven 18-20 minutes or until golden brown. While warm, cut into ½-inch square croutons.

Separate croutons, then place in a large shallow baking pan. Place in preheated broiler three inches from source of heat. Broil about two minutes longer or until browned.

Roast Beef Should Be Cooked Slowly

To cook a good roast beef, place the roast fat side up on a rack in a shallow pan. A rack keeps the meat up out of the juices and allows an even circulation of warm air around the roast to cook the meat uniformly. Beef rib roast do not need racks because the rib bones, provided they are not cut or cracked, form natural racks of their own.

Insert a roast-meat thermometer into the center of the thickest portion of the meat, making certain that the point of the thermometer does not touch bone. Bones are conductors of heat. If the bulb of the meat thermometer touches a bone, you will not get an accurate reading of the internal temperature of the roast.

Do not add any moisture and do not cover. Place the roast in a slow oven, 325 degrees. A slow oven produces more even cooking, less shrinking and less oven spattering.

Roast until the meat thermo-

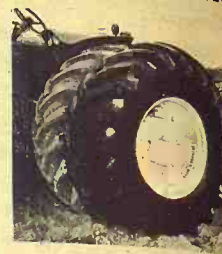
meter indicates the roast is done the way you like it. Roasting schedules serve as guides to tell you when to place the roast in the oven. For example, allow about 2¼ hours for a 4-pound standing rib of beef roast to cook medium done.

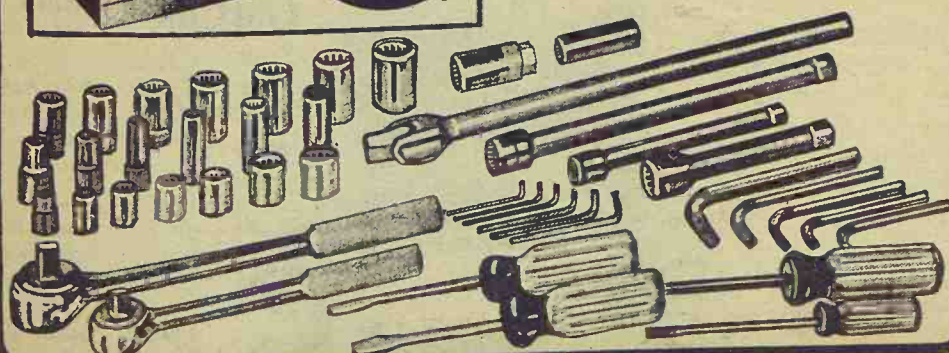

Mid-June prices received by Kansas farmers were slightly below a month earlier, with lower crop prices more than offsetting small gains registered by livestock and livestock products, according to the Kansas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service.

The all-farm products price index stood at 228 percent of the 1910-14 base period, down 1 point from mid-May and 9 points below a year earlier.

Moderate price declines were noted for wheat, barley and hay, while oats, rye and sorghum grain declined only slightly. The price of hogs increased moderately with beef cattle, chickens and eggs showing slight gains.

Crop Prices

The all-crop price index at mid-June was 150 percent of the 1910-14 base, down 6 points from May and 24 points below a year ago.

Wheat prices averaged \$1.23 per bushel, down 6 cents from last month and the lowest since 1943.

Corn averaged \$1.15 per bushel, one cent above May but 10 cents below a year ago.

Sorghum grain, at \$1.80 per cwt., was one cent below May and 17 cents below June 1967.

Soybeans brought \$2.51 per bushel compared to \$2.53 a month earlier and \$2.64 last year.

The oat price of 76 cents per bushel was one cent below a month earlier and 2 cents below June last year. Barley, at 92 cents per bushel, was 8 cents below the previous month and 6 cents below a year earlier.

Rye averaged 92 cents per bushel, down 3 cents from last month and last year.

Alfalfa hay averaged \$20.00 per ton, down \$2.00 from last month and \$2.50 below June last year.

Livestock Prices

The livestock and livestock products index as of mid-June stood at 317 percent of the 1910-14 base, up 5 points from a month earlier and 9 points above June last year. The meat animal price index was 378 percent, 6 points above May and 7 points above June a year ago.

Hogs averaged \$19.10 per cwt., up 90 cents from May but \$1.90 below June last year.

Steers and heifers brought \$25.40 compared with \$25.00 a month earlier and \$24.50 last June.

Cows brought \$18.50, 30 cents above May and 90 cents above June a year ago.

Calves averaged \$26.20 per cwt., \$1.00 below May but \$1.30 above last June.

Lambs averaged \$26.90 per cwt. compared with \$27.00 a month earlier.

Dairy & Poultry

The dairy products price index at mid-June was 304 percent, unchanged from May but 24 points above June a year ago. The preliminary wholesale milk price, at \$5.05, was unchanged from last month and 55 cents above June last year. The poultry and egg price index was 108 percent, 4 points above May and 5 points above June last year. Chickens, at 6.2 cents per pound and eggs at 20.9 cents per dozen both showed some increase over last month and a year earlier.

Prices Paid

Prices paid by Kansas farmers for protein supplements were unchanged to slightly higher than a month ago while complete feeds were unchanged to lower than last month.

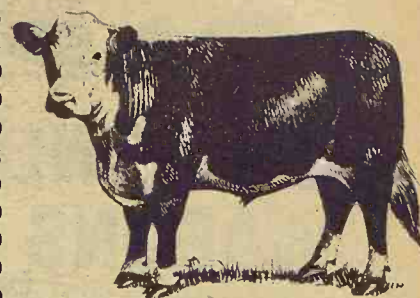

Pork Producers Apply Governor

Our nation's pork producers have put a governor on their business. This conclusion is indicated by the survey of hog producers recently reported by the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

The report is titled Hogs and Pigs, and is similar to the former Pig Crop Report. It shows that farmers will be producing about the same number of hogs this year as in 1967. Here are more details:

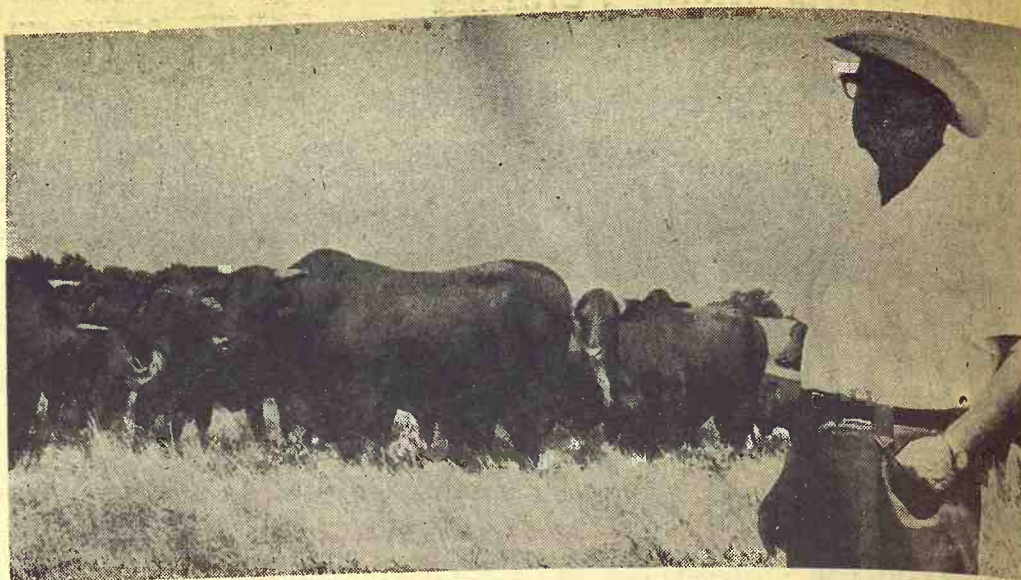
The spring pig crop totaled 47.7 million head, 1 percent less than last year. But this small de-

crease may be offset by a larger fall pig crop. Hog producers indicated that they planned to produce about 44.1 million fall pigs, 2 percent more than a year ago. Thus the total pig crop for this year may be very close to the 91.3 million reported raised last year.

Fall Market Outlook. Market supplies of hogs during the last half of this year seem likely to be close to 1967 levels. Prices for the six months may average near the 1967 figure of \$19 (for barrows and gilts at central markets.)

Weekly market receipts will increase beginning with the second week of July. Prices of hogs, however, need not necessarily tumble at that time, but they are expected to work lower later in the summer.

Market receipts will continue to increase during the fall, probably reaching a peak in November. The fall decline in hog prices should be moderate perhaps less than average. Competition for pork may be less than usual. The supply of beef and chicken is not expected to show the usual increases from year-before levels. And the supply of turkeys is being cut rather sharply.



From Charolais White To Santa Gertrudis Red

The 2680-acre Lauright ranch near Douglass in Butler county no longer is dotted with white Charolais cattle on its green pastures. The color now is red, the color of the Santa Gertrudis cattle of the new owner, Dr. Owen Robinson.

The ranch now is called the Santa Robin. Robinson, who practiced dentistry in Garden City for many years, bought the ranch for \$750,000 and now has over 600 head of Santa Gertrudis on grass.

Not common in Kansas, Santa Gertrudis were developed on the huge King Ranch in Texas, a cross between Brahma and Shorthorn breeds. Some cite them as the first distinctly American breed of cattle.

Breeding stock in the herd now includes a bull from the herd owned by Arkansas governor Winthrop Rockefeller, Masterpiece Junior III, son of a \$250,000 Masterpiece bull owned by O. E. Phillips of Dallas. Also at Santa Robin are a herd purchased from Ned Fleming of Topeka and stock from the Jones and Surprise Valley ranches in Texas.

Winter Market Prospects.

Farmers reported plans to increase fall farrowings by 2 percent, as compared with last year. This would be a very moderate increase, and it could be offset by the growth of consumer demand.

The actual increase in the fall pig crop is likely to be more or less than 2 percent, anywhere from 4 percent to none at all. Since there was no increase in the spring pig crop, no big increase in fall farrowings is likely. Farmers use much the

same facilities for fall farrowings as for spring litters.

Prices for hogs during the first half of 1969 seem likely to average between \$18 and \$20. This would be a profitable level for most producers.

State Figures. Illinois's share of the nation's hog business may be shrinking a bit. Where the U.S. total of hog numbers on hand June 1 was down 1 percent from a year earlier, the figure for Illinois was down 4 percent.

Farmers in Iowa, the leading hog-producing state, also report-

ed 4 percent fewer hogs than in 1967. Illinois still holds a firm grip on second place in pork production. Indiana, now ranking fourth, also reported 4 percent fewer hogs than last year.

The state reporting the biggest increase in hog production this year was Nebraska. Other states showing substantial increases were South Dakota, Kansas, North Carolina, Minnesota, Missouri, and Kentucky.

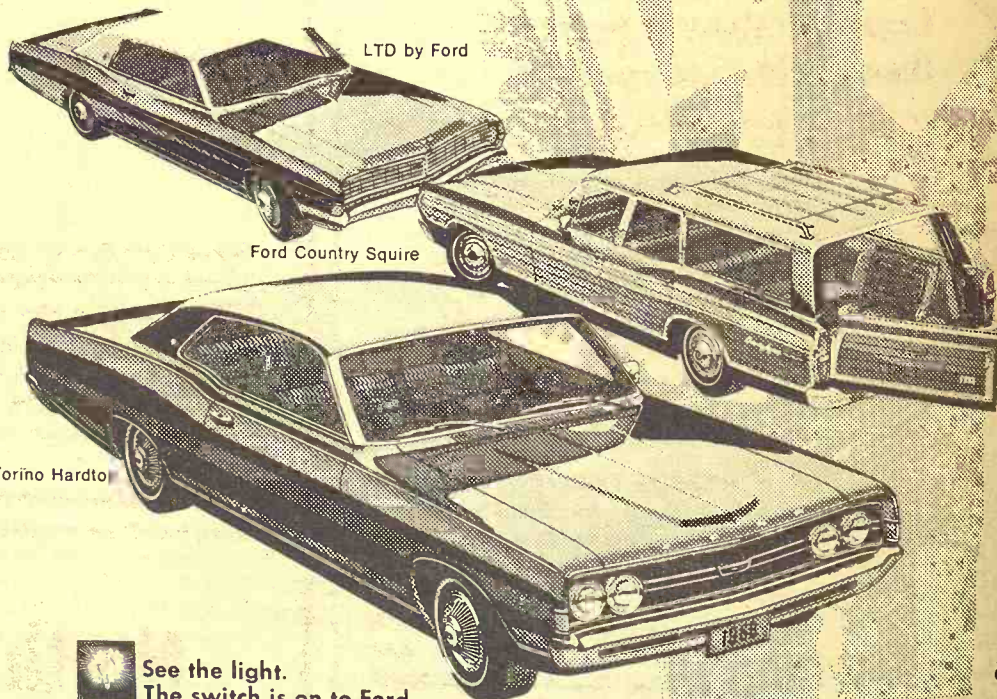

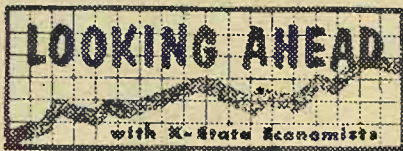

Consumers Prefer Meat, Potatoes

Changes in domestic consumer demand have significant implications for Kansas farmers who are seeking profitable markets for their farm products.

Important changes have occurred in the last decade, and will continue to occur in the future. For example, consumers are showing a decided preference for more meat, especially beef, and more potatoes, but less

wheat flour, fresh milk, fresh fruits and vegetables, and fewer eggs.
Meat consumption showed the greatest increase in the last decade. In 1967, Americans consumed an average of 106 pounds of beef, 63 pounds of pork, 37 pounds of ready-to-cook chicken, and 17 pounds of meat — a total of 223 pounds per person.



Two factors are behind these changes in consumer demand — an increase in youth in our population, and a trend towards higher consumer incomes.

Half our population now is under 25 years of age. Our young people demand "fun" foods — particularly hamburgers and french fries — thus the increase in preference for beef and potatoes.

As incomes continue to rise, the consumer can be expected to buy the kinds and amounts of food he likes and can afford. This means more convenience foods and thus a decline in fresh vegetables and fruits.

The decline in consumption of fresh vegetables and fruits in the last decade is largely offset by increases in canned and frozen vegetables and fruits. This, too, indicates a consumer de-

mand for more preparation and processing of food in the marketing channels.
Consumers can be expected to continue to buy more meat, particularly beef; more poultry products, especially chicken; as well as large amounts of dairy products, fruits and vegetables. However, consumption of wheat and flour products probably will remain at relatively low levels and perhaps may even decline further.

P&S COMPLAINTS AGAINST KC FIRM

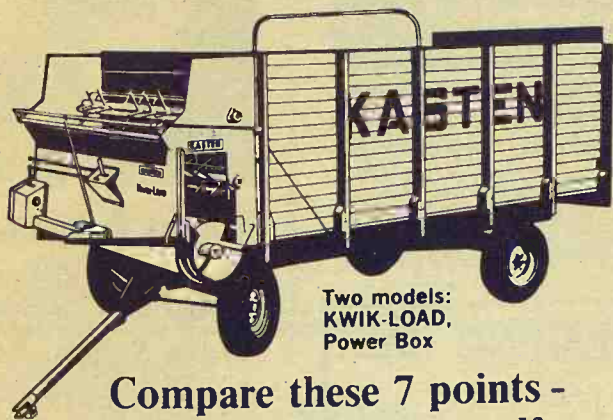

Drop In Dropouts

School dropouts are becoming less of a national problem, judging from Department of Labor statistics. An increasing need for better-educated workers to keep pace with the effect of rapid technological change on industry is credited with shrinking the proportion of dropouts in the nation's young adult population. In October of 1960, there were 5.2 million dropouts in the 16-24 age group totalling 20.6 million. Six years later, there were 4.8 million dropouts in the now much-larger group, 26.4 million.

The most material for cattle feeds comes from the northern half and the eastern two-thirds of the state. There is little hay production, of course, at the western end of the state, and feed grain output in the northeast, north central, and east central areas nearly matches or exceeds levels of feed grains produced in the southwest.

A National High School Rodeo queen will be selected Aug. 11 from 21 state queens participating in the girls' events. Kansas' entry this year is Sandy Humphrey, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Norman Humphrey, Topeka.

Competition will be in the two rings simultaneously for 11 separate events including bareback riding, bull riding, bull dogging,

calf roping, pole bending, barrel racing and cutting. More than 1100 head of stock will be used during the rodeo.

The riders must show proof of satisfactory scholarship in school as well as in rodeo events.

The location of the National Rodeo is rotated each year. "But if we make a good enough appearance, we could make Topeka the permanent home of the rodeo," Carlisle said.

Admission to performances is \$2 for adults and \$1 for children under 12 years of age.

Cattle fed the treated silage gained an average of 24 lb. a head more than those getting the non-treated silage. Tours of six farms are on the schedule for the young farmers to see livestock and crop programs including beef, hogs, dairy, corn, sorghum, soybeans, and hay operations. The tour begins with registration at 9:30 on Friday at the fairgrounds in southeast Lawrence.

The young farmers' wives will be on special tours Friday including a dairy, food equipment manufacturing, a cleaning company, a greeting card company, and will see demonstrations on laundering and floral arranging. Friday evening they join their husbands for a banquet and dance and will tour three farm operations with the men on Saturday.

Some of the outstanding farm businesses the young farmers will see include an 80-cow dairy herd of Jerry Ott, Eudora; a 900-head beef feeding operation owned by Homer Wulfskuhle, Richland; a confinement hog feeding program of Lloyd Wulfskuhle, Lawrence; and a farm feedlot operation with capacity of 800 head owned by Al Pendleton, Lawrence.

The Brangus herd and farm operation of Bill Sutton, Lawrence, is another tour attraction, and the Pine farm will be the final stop of the event. Pine combines crop and feeder pig enterprises in his farm operation.

See State Record Sugar Beet Crop

A record sugar beet crop for Kansas, double the average, was forecast for this year by the Kansas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service.

Production was put at 624,000 tons compared with the previous record last year of 417,000 tons and the 5-year average of 317,000 tons. The huge crop was partly credited to a big increase in acreage to meet the anticipated demand of a sugar refining plant under construction near Goodland.

Post-War Farm Exports Hit \$100 Billion

Secretary of Agriculture Orville L. Freeman said the value of U.S. farm exports since the end of World War II surpassed \$100 billion in fiscal year 1968 which came to an end June 30. "This is a tremendous accomplishment," Secretary Freeman said.

"The continued high level of our agricultural exports during the past trading year has assured its attainment."

"For the fifth straight season we have held well above the \$6 billion-a-year mark, an export goal never before attained by American agriculture."

Estimates for the year ending June 30 place the value of fiscal year 1968 agricultural exports at \$6.4 billion, well above most previous annual totals. Exceptions are the immediately preceding two years, which reached a record \$6.8 billion in 1966-67 and a runnerup \$6.7 billion the season before.

"Increased dollar sales of farm products have been the key to attaining the \$100 billion level," the Secretary said. "For the 3rd straight year they have reached almost \$5 billion or better."

"In fact," he added, "our dollar shipments in recent years have

been running about three times the rate of shipments under government programs."

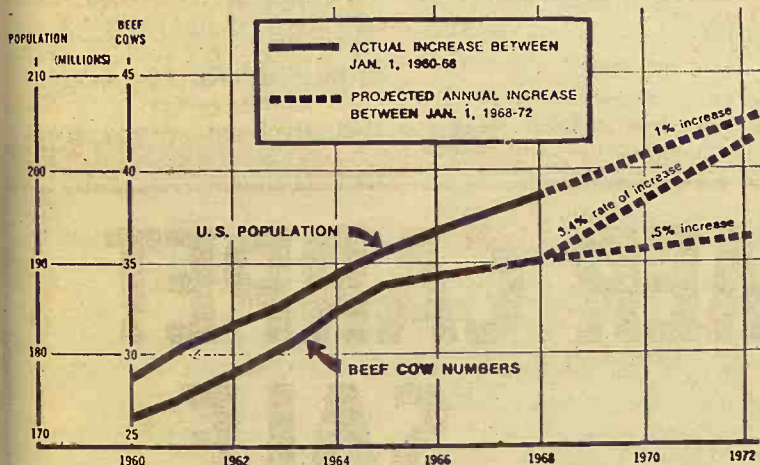
Government program shipments for the year just ended are estimated to total \$1.5 billion, down from \$1.6 billion a year earlier.

Leading farm products exported since World War II have included wheat, cotton, feed grains, oil seeds, tobacco and rice. Wheat and flour have accounted for a fifth of the \$100 billion total.

Cotton exports have amounted to \$15 billion; feed grains \$12.1 billion, oil seeds and vegetable oils \$10.2 billion, raw tobacco \$7.6 billion; and rice \$3.3 billion.

Big Drop In Reenlistments

Army reenlistments have dropped drastically in the past year, and Negro soldiers in particular have reduced their rate of reenlisting.

A pentagon report notes that Negro soldiers reenlisted at a 32 percent rate in 1967, compared to a 66 percent rate in 1966. White soldiers reduced their reenlistment rate from 20 percent to 13 percent in the same period.

An exception to the reenlistment rate was in the Air Force, to which white airmen were rising at a 17 percent rate in 1967, slightly higher than in 1966. Negro reenlistments in the Air Force were down slightly to 27 percent.

Navy reenlistments were down slightly for both white and black sailors, as were Marine figures.

Of the 16,000 Americans killed in Vietnam, 14% were Negroes. Negroes account for about 10% of the 568,000 U.S. servicemen involved in the war.

Colleges Ask 12% Hike

The Kansas Board of Regents has announced it has approved budget requests totaling 146 million dollars for the educational institutions under its jurisdiction for the 1970 fiscal year beginning next July 1.

That would be an increase of 15.46 million — or 11.8 percent — over the amount approved for the current fiscal year that began July 1.

The board approved general fund requests totaling 79.87 million dollars for fiscal year 1970, an increase of 19.6 percent over 1969 fiscal year budgets of 66.73 million.

The figures will be used by Gov. Robert Docking in preparing his budget requests for the 1969 Legislature.

The figures do not include funds for auxiliary expenses, operation of such things as dormitories and student hospitals. Here is a breakdown of the 1970 budgets with comparable 1969 fiscal year budgets in parenthesis:

Half of Hogs Reach Old No. 1 Grade

Forty-nine percent of the hogs slaughtered under federal inspection were estimated to grade U.S. No. 1 in a year-long study completed earlier this year, the U.S. Department of Agriculture announced. This was a sharp improvement in quality over 7 years ago, when a comparable study placed only one-third of the 1960-61 season's hogs in the top category.

The typical slaughter gilt or barrow carcass last season was also about one-third of an inch longer. The longer hog is generally leaner.

These preliminary findings, from a survey by USDA's Economic Research Service aided by the Consumer and Marketing Service, are being released before the complete report because of widespread current interest by the livestock industry.

There were 35 per cent of the hogs in the study grading No. 2, compared with 38 per cent in the earlier study.

Near the bottom of the scale, hogs grading No. 3 were estimated at 12 percent of the crop, down from 25 percent for the 1960-61 season.

Finally, hogs grading medium and cull totaled less than 3 per cent in both studies.

The study was conducted using the carcass grade standards in effect from July 5, 1955 to April 1, 1968.

The department revised the official standards for barrow and

gilt carcass grades as of April 1, 1968.

Under the revision a substantial number of carcasses formerly grading U.S. No. 1, 2 or 3 will now grade No. 2, 3 or 4 respectively. The new U.S. No. 1 grade is limited to a small proportion of superior meaty carcasses.

'68 Farm Cash Running Ahead Of '67 Income

Cash receipts from farm marketings in 48 states are running above a year ago, the USDA reports.

At \$12.2 billion during the first quarter of the year, they are figured to have been up 2.5 per cent. Though crop receipts at \$4.18 billion were off 1 per cent, receipts from livestock and livestock products, at \$8 billion, were up 4 per cent.

A breakdown shows that livestock receipts were above a year earlier in 28 states, but down in 20 states.

Crop receipts were up in 21 states, the same as a year ago in one state and down in 26 states.

Total farm marketings were above a year ago in 24 states, unchanged in one state, and down in 23 states.

During recent years, dollar shipments have been running about three times the rate of shipments under government programs.

The leading commercial buyers of U.S. farm goods in recent years have been the countries of Western Europe and Japan, with the latter being the largest single customer.

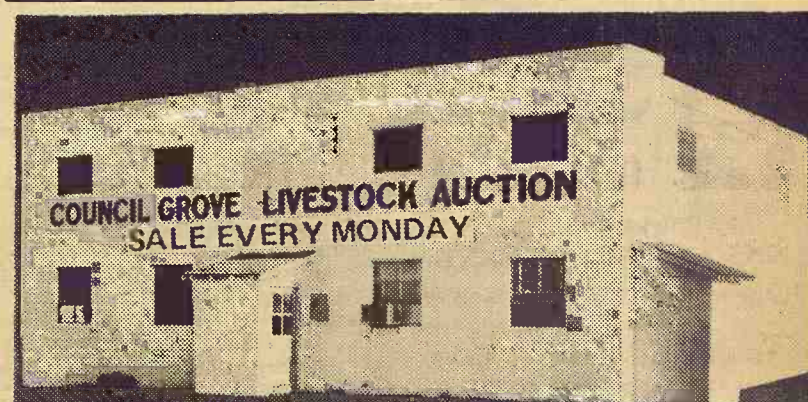
Exports Hit \$6 Billion Goal

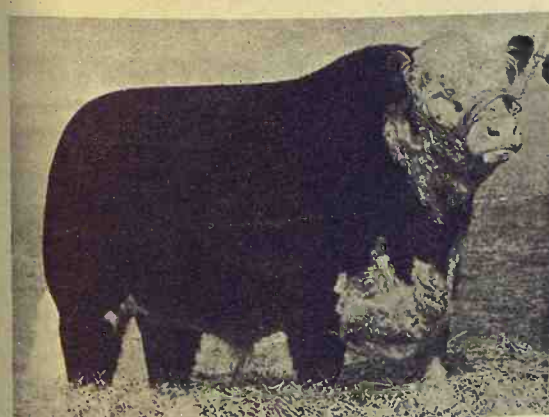

Bright Hog Outlook

Look for a good summer hog market with a less-than average price drop as we move into the fall.

That's the way Robert L. Coppersmith, livestock marketing economist at Kansas State Uni-

versity, sums up the summer outlook for hog prices.

He looks for prices to remain relatively steady between now and August 1, fluctuating between the \$21 and \$23 levels.

Looking ahead to the fall and

winter months, Coppersmith says supplies will increase, bringing a seasonal decline in prices. He sees prices dropping to a low of around \$18.



The U.S. Spring Pig Crop (December through May) was down 1 percent. Intentions to farrow for June through November are up 2 percent.

But the K-State economist feels that a growing population with high incomes will allow the market to absorb this supply of hogs without drastic price changes.

Although hog prices have fluctuated widely in recent years, Coppersmith believes the next few years will bring more stable prices.

There are more large scale hog enterprises these days, he argues, and modern-day hog farmers are less inclined to "jump in and out" of the market than was the case a few years ago.

In addition, multiple farrowings of hogs will tend to cause market supplies to be less erratic than in the past.

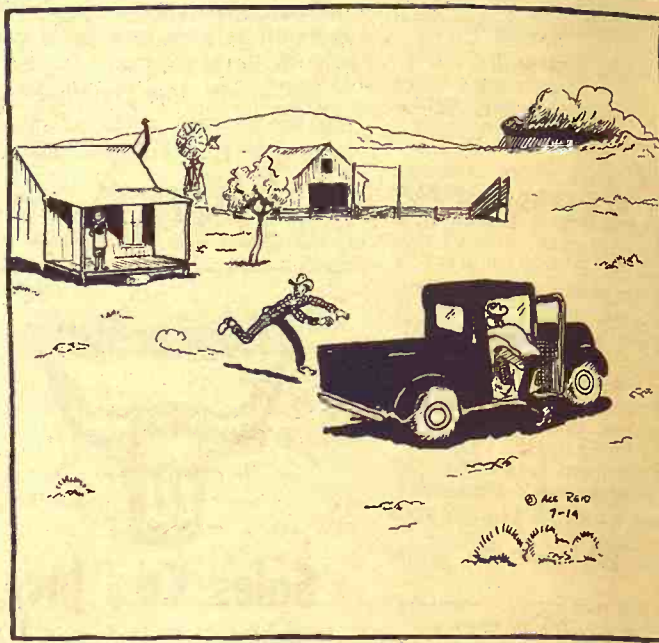

World's Only Wild Horses

These shaggy horses are Przewalskis, the only existing species of truly wild horses. The breed hails from a small area of Mongolia, near the China border. Less than 200 are in captivity. These two are at New York's Bronx Zoo. Dun-colored and with stiff black mane and thin, bristly tail, the Przewalski resembles to a great degree the likenesses of horses painted on caves by stone-age hunters.

A Screwworm Threat

Emergency measures may be needed this year to halt the spread of screwworms, a Kansas State University veterinarian said this week. An epidemic has moved out of Mexico into the United States.

The pest could be carried into other areas including Kansas where screwworms have not been a problem for many years, Dr. Homer K. Caley, Extension

veterinarian, said. Over 50 counties in Texas, New Mexico, Arizona, and California have reported 854 screwworm cases so far this year, according to the United States Department of Agriculture.

This outbreak is due to screwworm migrations from Mexico, but ideal conditions in the Southwest and Mexico have made it probable that cases now

being reported are resulting from second generation flies that have developed in those localities, the veterinarian said.

Treatment of the epidemic includes measures to break the life cycle of the flies. Sterile screwworm flies are distributed by air in all areas reporting cases. When sterile males mate with native female flies, the resulting eggs don't hatch.

Veterinarians, ranchers, Extension agents, and others interested in the Screwworm Eradication Program, are urged to collect and submit samples of all outbreaks of blow fly larvae. Specimens will retain excellent condition if they are preserved in alcohol (isopropyl or rubbing alcohol is satisfactory).

Specimens may be placed in a brucellosis blood vial and shipped to the State-Federal Brucellosis Laboratory or to Dr. R. E. Cardwell, Post Office Box 436, Parsons, Kansas 67357. Attach a statement of source of the larvae.

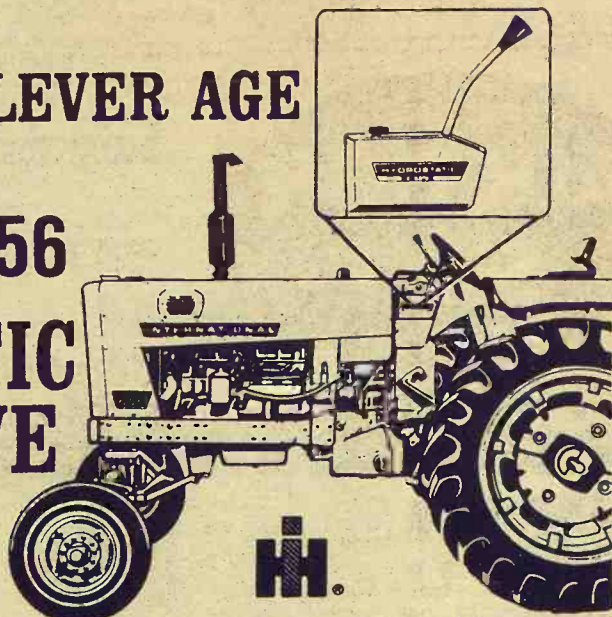

Bostwick Irrigation Tour Set August 15

MANHATTAN — The annual summer tour for irrigation farmers of the state will be Aug. 15 in the Kansas-Bostwick Irrigation District.

The district includes more than 40,000 acres of irrigated land in Jewell and Republic counties.

The tour has nine interest points including farm operations of irrigated corn, livestock feeding, and grain and feed handling, Lynn Shuyler, extension irrigation engineer at Kansas State University said.

Tour participants will see Lovewell Reservoir where water is stored, supply canals, distribution laterals, and drainage structures that serve land irrigated with water from Harlan County Reservoir in Nebraska.

The Kansas Irrigation and Reclamation association is sponsor of the tour. John Ayers, Courtland, past president of KIRA is president of the host district, Kansas-Bostwick, the largest irrigation district in Kansas, began operation about 10 years ago.

Tour planners expect more than 300 persons. The tour be-

gins in Courtland with registration at 7:30 a.m. at the school.

At Courtland

The tour will stop to hear several of the 250 irrigators in the two counties. Near Courtland the tour will stop at the E. M. Sothers and Sons farm where four brothers and their father combine an irrigated corn operation with cattle and hog feeding. They irrigate about 500 acres of corn.

The Farbaugh orchard and fruit farm near Courtland has small and large fruit production.

A view of canal operation will give tour members an opportunity to see how water is delivered and controlled to the farms. Lunch time at Lovewell Dam will include a visit of inlet and outlet structures. Water comes into Lovewell from Harlan and leaves the reservoir on the south side of White Rock Creek and is distributed another 30 miles south by canals.

Ray Clark, near Hardy, Nebraska, will discuss his hog and cattle operations in addition to irrigation. Clark irrigates 400 acres of corn and double-crops 50 acres with corn and wheat.

He farrows 24 sows a year and finishes 300 hogs in total confinement.

Near Scandia

The 160-acre Scandia Irrigation Experiment Field is on the tour itinerary. At this experiment project of Kansas State, tour members will hear about irrigation tests with soybeans, corn, sugar beets, and will see water management experimental work.

Darwin Householder, Scandia, will tell about his 160-acre corn and hog operation. He farms land that was altered considerably in the development for irrigation.

Final stop on the tour will be the Republican Valley Feedlot where up to 12,000 head of cattle can be fed. This feedlot is among the many businesses stimulated by irrigation in the area.

Last year nearly 31,000 cultivated acres were irrigated in

the Kansas-Bostwick District. The average crop value per irrigated acre was about \$120. Over 24,000 acres of irrigated corn averaged in excess of 120 bushels per acre yield.

AGREE TO EXTEND PL-480 FOOD PLAN

A House-Senate conference committee has agreed to extend Public Law 480 for two more years.

The new law, sometimes called Food-for-Peace — was a compromise of Senate and House differences. Included is a House provision insisting that when Public Law 480 recipients make transactions the U.S. receive its "fair share" of the trade.

Watersheds Stalled On Fund Holdback

Watershed progress in Kansas — as well as that over the nation — has been caught up in budgetary problems in Washington with the result that no new contracts are to be let until funds become available.

An earlier and still unresolved dispute over whether action of the Congress on watershed plans was necessary has resulted in a stalemate that may last until a new administration takes over.

Of more immediate concern, however, is lack of funds which upsets local planning schedules as well as halting development work. Uncertainty about new starts has been created.

Since the watershed program was started, Kansas has completed six projects, latest the Muddy Creek District in Butler County. Forty-three detention structures have been constructed in these six projects.

Work on 16 watershed districts in the state is now in progress and three districts are engaged in detailed planning for construction. One of these is the

sprawling Wakarusa District involving land in four counties — Wabaunsee, Osage, Shawnee and Douglas. Progress has reached the stage where contracts soon will be let.

One project has been authorized for construction. It is the Spillman Creek District in Ottawa, Mitchell and Lincoln Counties.

As of June 30, a total of 554 reservoir structures had been planned for Kansas and 258 are now complete. These vary in size from small ponds to areas large enough for water supplies and for recreation use. Twenty-five are under construction with 271 still to be built.

Uncertainty over funds has had an upsetting effect upon some projects but state officials are optimistic that once some of the federal budgetary plans are worked out, needed financing for local projects will be forthcoming. The watershed program is marking time but money-wise is not hurting any more than other projects involving federal funds.

Alternate Uses May Expand Wheat Production Potential

Wheat, the No. 1 cash grain crop in Kansas, has long been recognized as a basic foodstuff for human consumption. But wheat also offers additional possibilities as pasture, hay, silage, feed grain, and an industrial raw material, points out Dr. Floyd W. Smith, director of the Agricultural Experiment Station at Kansas State University.

Wheat, grown on fallowed land in western Kansas, produces vigorous vegetative growth in the fall and spring that provides highly nutritious pasture for cattle and sheep. With proper grazing management, grain yield reductions are minimized, and the amount of dry feeds necessary to carry livestock and feeder calves may be reduced by 75 percent.

A pasture program, worked out at the Tribune Branch Experiment Station, indicates that a fallow-wheat-fallow-sudan grass rotation can provide temporary pasture in western Kansas from late July into late fall, and in the spring. This sequence provides grazing at times when other grasses are not available, and also allows resting of native pastures.

On a 20-year average, this pasture rotation provided average grazing periods of 70 days with sudangrass and 59 days with wheat — 21 in the fall, and 38 in the spring. Carrying capacity averaged about one animal unit per acre for each crop.

Wheat has not been widely used for roughage, except in certain emergency situations, such as hailstorms or drought, which reduce grain production potential, Dr. Smith observes. Wheat hay can produce excellent yields of high protein hay, provided it is harvested at the right time, studies at the Colby Branch Experiment Station show.

The stage at which wheat is cut for hay influences both yield and quality. If it is cut before the first heads appear, the yield is somewhat lower than at a later stage, but the protein is higher. In fact, it approaches that of alfalfa hay.

Wheat forage can be ensiled instead of being utilized as a hay crop. Generally, it should be put in the silo before heading starts. Adding 100 to 125 pounds of ground grain, or 40 pounds of molasses, per ton as a preservative will help insure against poor silage.

Wheat can be used as a feed grain for cattle without adversely affecting feedlot gain and efficiency, Dr. Smith notes, if coarsely cracked wheat grain is used and limited to 50 percent of the ration concentrate.

Wheat protein can also be us-

ed satisfactorily to balance beef cattle rations. Cottonseed meal or equivalent protein supplements can be reduced $\frac{1}{4}$ pound for each pound of wheat substituted in high-grain rations.

Various commercial possibilities have been suggested for utilizing wheat. The most promising, at the moment, are the use of wheat as a starch source, and as a substitute for cellulose in paper production.

Wheat will continue to be in demand in the years ahead as a basic foodstuff, Dr. Smith emphasizes. But expanding alternative uses of wheat — for pasture, hay, silage, feed grain, and industrial materials — may provide a profitable new market potential for Kansas farmers.

Ag Chemicals Need Careful Storage

Store agricultural chemicals in a locked building or cabinet away from stored feed, fertilizer, and machinery. The ever-increasing use of chemicals brings a need for cautions in handling the materials, John Ferguson, agricultural engineer with the Kansas Extension Service, says.

Smoking should not be permitted in or around the building where chemicals are stored.

Three types of hazards are associated with agricultural chemicals, he says.

- The flammable or explosive nature of some chemicals or their solvents.
- Toxic fumes, vapors, dusts, and liquids of certain chemicals.
- Possible after effects of spilling or dispersing chemicals

on vegetation, crops, or farmyards, or into wells and other water supplies.

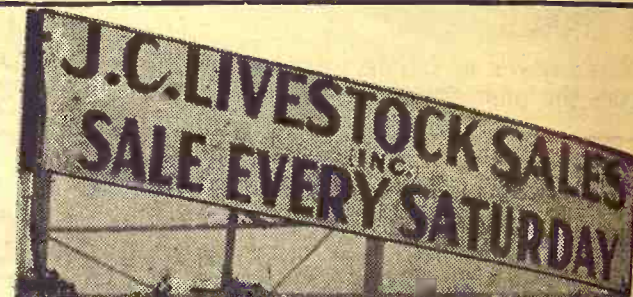

Bid Opening For Area Phone Expansion

COUNCIL GROVE — The Tri-County Telephone association, Inc., will open bids here July 17 and 18.

Bids have been submitted for construction of 815 miles of new line and dial buildings for seven exchanges within the Tri-County system.

Work will complete the firm's conversion to dial throughout its system, except for the Buckeye area northeast of Abilene.

Tri-County officials hope the latter project can be added to the project through another loan.

The seven exchange buildings will be constructed at the following cities, with the communities in parenthesis combined to be served from the accompanying exchange: Hope, Woodbine, Lincolnville (Pilsen), Ramona (Tampa), Carlton (Elmo), Navarre (Acme) and Burdick (Lost Springs).

Carrol Schrader, Tri-County manager, said the line will be entirely underground.

Work is expected to begin in September and be completed within a year. Construction of the buildings will begin at about the same time, to be completed by February.

When the conversion from magneto to dial service is completed, the areas will have 4-party rural service and private line service in the cities.

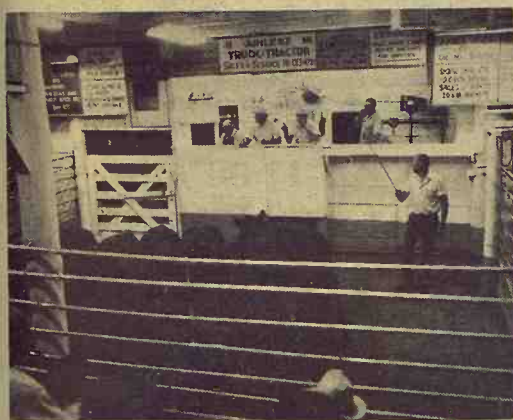
