## Price Index A Nick Over Year-Ago Level

The index of prices received by Kansas farmers at mid-January was slightly below a month earlier as prices for major crop and livestock items recorded mixed trends from the previous month, according to the Kansas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service.

The all-farm products price index was 241 percent of the 1910-14 base period, down 3 points from the previous month but 3 points above mid-January 1966.

Major commodities showing price declines from a month earlier were wheat, soybeans, dairy and poultry products, while prices for most other major items were steady to higher.

The mid-January livestock and livestock products price index, at 303, was up slightly from a month earlier but down moderately from a year ago.

The meat animal price index, at 349, rose 10 points from mid-December but still 24 points below the mid-January 1966 index.

Hog prices, at \$18.00 per cwt., were up 10 cents from the previous month but \$8.30 below a year earlier.

Beef cattle prices, at \$22.00 per cwt., were up 80 cents from the previous month and 40 cents above a year earlier. Calf prices, at \$25.80 per cwt., were the same as a month earlier and only 10 cents below a year ago.

The dairy products price index, at 298, was down 8 points from the previous month but 25 points above a year earlier.

The preliminary wholesale milk price, at \$5.05 per cwt., registered a 10 cent per cwt. decline from mid-December but a 60 cent per cwt. increase from January 1966.

The poultry and egg price index, at 145, was down 11 points from the previous month and 4 points below the same month last year. At Mid-January, egg prices averaged 29.2 cents per dozen, down 2.3 cents from a month earlier but .2 cent above

the same month last year.

Chicken prices averaged 6.6 cents per pound compared with 7.0 cents last month and 8.5 cents at mid-January last year.

The crop price index, at 186, slipped 9 points from the previous month but was 17 points above a year earlier.

Wheat prices averaged \$1.56 per bushel, a drop of 9 cents from mid-December but were 14 cents above the mid-January 1966 average price.

Soybean prices averaged \$2.67 per bushel, compared with \$2.74 the previous month and \$2.55 a year earlier.

Corn prices, at \$1.30 per bushel, were unchanged from mid-December but 9 cents above January last year.

Oats and barley prices were unchanged from the previous month but averaged 4 and 8 cents, respectively, above a year earlier. Rye, at 97 cents per bushel, was 1 cent below mid-December but 2 cents above mid-January last year.

Sorghum grain prices, at \$1.86 per cwt., were 4 cents above the previous month and 14 cents above a year ago.

Prices paid by Kansas farmers for feed at mid-January were slightly higher than a month earlier and for most feeds well above a year ago.

## 'Cautious Optimism' At Feeders Convention

DES MOINES, Iowa — More than 1,000 livestock feeders from 22 states and Canada Wednesday heard a cautiously optimistic report from their president and moved to the serious business of discussing feeders' problems in a rapidly changing economy.

National Livestock Feeders Association is meeting here in annual convention through Friday.

NLFA president Robert H. Ray, Norfolk, Nebr., said an over-optimistic attitude by feeder-buyers last fall caused a problem of "negative margins" in the feeder business.

"While we are accustomed to ups and downs in the feeder business," he said. "We are getting a little tired of prolonged downs."

Ray listed major feeder problems as:

- Encroachment of the packing industry into the market.
- Consumers' marches on retail stores that showed what he termed "behind the scene manipulation."

- Substantial increases in costs of production, machinery, labor charges, supplies, taxes and living costs.

"It is difficult to understand why millions of people readily will pay much higher prices for automobiles, furniture, entertainment, clothing, education and nearly all other items — and then throw up their hands and complain when they step up to a meat counter," he said.

He believes livestock feeders should have a greater return for their investments so they may maintain an equitable footing with other segments of the national economy, Ray added.

He promised that an amendment to the Federal Packers and Stock Yards Act will be sought again by the NLFA in the 90th Congress. The amend-

ment proposal which would curtail packers in the feeding business was defeated in the 89th Congress.

Ray took a blast at U.S. government officials:

"I was shocked by the high level slap taken at farm prices and farmers last year by officials in our federal government.

"Though this attitude was withdrawn quickly and an attempt made to explain it away, a great deal of unnecessary damage was done. This industry should not have to tolerate such blows nor can it stand them," he said.

### Slowdown In Loss Of Farms

Farms operating in the U. S. during 1966 are estimated to have numbered 3.26 million, government figures show.

Although this is 4 per cent less than the number operating in 1965, the actual number of farms disappearing was less than a year earlier.

Total land in farms, accounting for 1.15 billion acres, continued to decrease but at a much slower pace than the number of farms.

During the past 8 years, the number of the Nation's farms has declined nearly a fourth. During the same period, land in farms has decreased only 4 per cent.

These changes have caused the acreage in the average farm to increase from 288 acres in 1959 to 359 in 1967, or a 25 per cent increase.

Discontinuance of small farming enterprises and merging of larger units with existing farms continue as the important influences in the change in farm numbers.

### Extend Signup To March 17

Signup for the 1967 wheat and feed grain programs in Kansas has been extended to March 17.

The previously announced closing date was March 3.

The extension is to allow farmers time to discuss the ASCS programs thoroughly with county office personnel.

It was determined that in counties with a large number of farms there were not enough hours available in the original signup period to accommodate all the farmers.

Topics will be planning for irrigation, soils, water, limitations, herbicide research and use, developing the farm for irrigation, field layout, length of run, waste water disposal, bordering, furrowing, land development, understanding herbicides and limitations, precautions for herbicide use and application.

Friday, speakers will be Herpich and Howard Wilkins, extension agronomist at KSU.

Topics will be cropping programs, crops and crop varieties most responsive to irrigation planting, potentials and returns, managing water, pipelines, open ditches, handling runoff water, application of water, planning for successful crop production, and outlining production practices.

Kenneth Fromm, Mitchell County Agent, said there will be time for questions and perhaps a visit to an irrigated farm.

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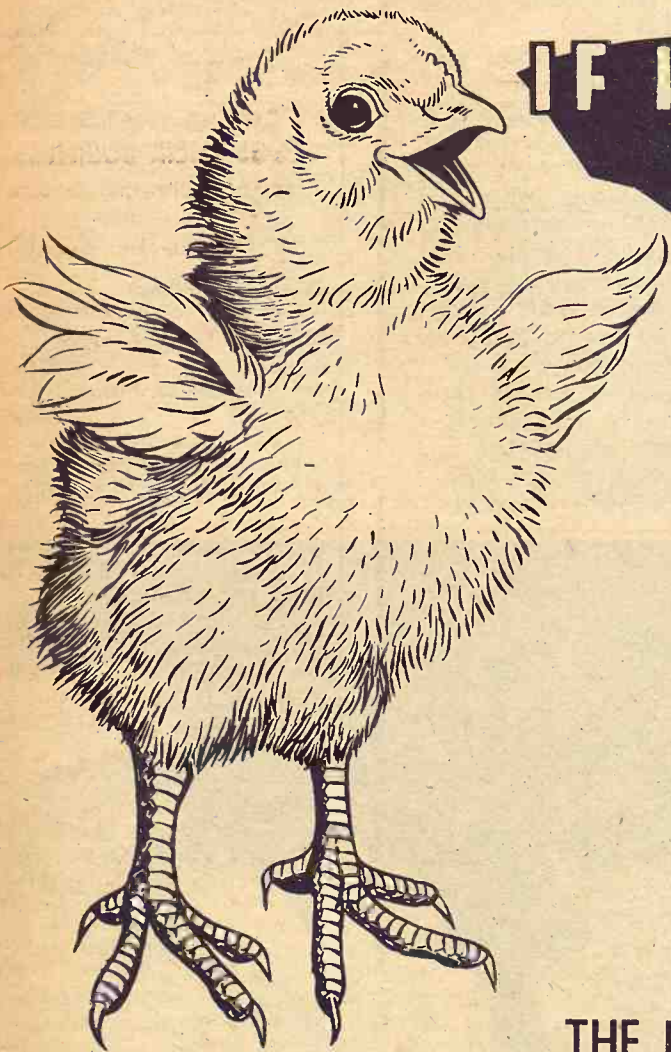
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## K-State To Add Post-Graduate Vet Studies

The Kansas State University College of Veterinary Medicine plans to increase its post-grad-

uate course offerings in answer to urgent requests for veterinarians in the state.

Kansas' only veterinary college, and one of only 18 in the United States, the college graduates 80 each year, and must try to serve the continuing needs of some 500 Kansas veterinarians, according to Dr. C.

E. Cornelius, Manhattan, Kan., dean of the college.

He told of the plans to offer more veterinary courses during the annual convention of the Kansas Veterinary Medical Association.

"In the last eight years," Cornelius said, "there has been more new research and infor-

mation gathered in biology and medicine than in all former history, and our field is no exception.

"We have offered three courses in this last year, in, for instance, reproductive diseases, and have a course coming up this year on laboratory diagnosis," he said. "Other major areas

we want to cover will include control of dairy cattle diseases and special surgical techniques. Most of these courses will be concentrated efforts of one or two days."

Teaching emphasis at the college will shift slightly, according to Cornelius, who added, "In the past, they've been mainly concerned with teaching undergraduates." More effort is to be given to the practicing veterinarians, who, he said, "have been very, very progressive in coming to us." The college staff and facilities will not be strained by the extra duties, Cornelius said.

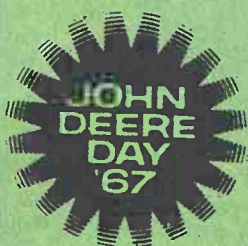

## Sees Summer Hog Top At \$25

Management will take on added importance in the hog business this year.

Higher feed costs and lower hog prices will put a squeeze on profits in 1967. But the outlook could be worse.

Hog prices have exceeded \$20 for most of the time since June 1965, topping out at the \$28 level a year ago. High prices usually lead to excessive increases in pig numbers and a corresponding reduction in prices. But last year saw a moderate — rather than excessive — expansion in hog production.

Spring 1967 will bring an increase in the pig crop, probably as much as 3 to 5 percent. June through November 1966, farrowings are up about 7 or 8 percent.

Look for hog prices to show strength early this year, reaching a top of more than \$25 by summer. Fall prices will drop to the \$18-\$19 level.

Feeder pig prices will follow hog prices, but will experience more erratic fluctuations. Forty-pound pigs sold for more than \$22 during late 1965 and early 1966. Pig prices have decreased along with slaughter hog prices the past few months, however, and have slumped to the \$16-\$18 level in the Corn Belt.

The winter feeding program for a beef cow herd often determines the success or failure of the enterprise, says Dr. Keith Zoellner, Extension livestock specialist at Kansas State University.

The greatest single factor in the expense of producing a calf is the cost of wintering the cow. Winter feeding is also a major determinant in the cow's reproductive performance, he continues.

Cows require enough total digestible nutrients (TDN) from their winter ration to maintain body weight and produce a strong healthy calf in the spring. The energy requirements of the cow can be met either by roughage feeding or by the use of grain.

He indicates that the nutritional needs of a cow depend on a number of factors: 1) age and condition of the cow, 2) climatic conditions, 3) available feed, 4) quality of the feed, and 5) the time of calving relative to spring grass.

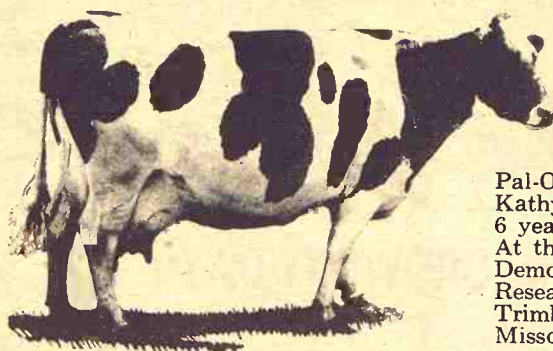
Zoellner adds that no matter when a cow calves, she requires extra energy and protein after calving. In the case of spring calving, this additional TDN and protein requirement is often met by spring grass. With fall calving, it must be met with increased energy and protein in the ration.

A 1000-pound mature pregnant cow should get 9 pounds of total digestible nutrients daily. This cow should also receive 0.8 pound digestible protein, Zoellner recommends.

Typical rations that will meet these requirements for energy and protein are: 1) 18 pounds prairie hay and 1 pound of 40 percent protein supplement, 2) 50 to 55 pounds of sorghum or corn silage and 1 pound of 40 percent protein supplement, 3) 30 to 35 pounds of silage and 6 pounds of alfalfa hay, or 4)

be met by adding 1½ pounds of grain or 4 pounds of prairie hay to the suggested rations. To meet the additional protein requirements use 2 pounds of good quality alfalfa hay or ½ pound of 40 percent protein supplement.

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CO-OP Calf Starter  
Feed

Begin offering to calf at 5 days of age, in addition to Milk Saver. Calf should be eating 2-3 lbs. daily at weaning. Feed also good quality hay, salt, fresh water. This is a complete feed. Feed until calf is 4 months old.

CO-OP Calf Grower  
Feed

Feed either the complete CO-OP formula feed, or CO-OP Calf Grower Concentrate custom-mixed with farm grains. Feed also hay, salt, minerals, water. Feed from 4 months to 10-12 months.

#### BLUEBERRY MUFFINS

1 15-ounce can blueberries  
2 1/4 cups flour  
3 teaspoons baking powder  
1/2 cup sugar  
1 teaspoon salt  
1 egg, well beaten  
1 cup milk  
2 to 4 tablespoons fat, liquid or melted  
Sift dry ingredients together. Drain blueberries saving 1/2 cup syrup. Combine milk, egg, syrup, fat and blueberries. Combine mixtures, dry and wet. Stir only enough to mix ingredients slightly. Batter will be lumpy. Put batter into oiled muffin tins, filling about two-thirds full. Bake at 375 degrees 15-20 minutes. Makes approximately two dozen.

#### HERSHEY CAKE

8 plain Hershey bars  
1/4 cup Hershey chocolate syrup  
Melt together and set aside. Cream together 2 sticks of oleo and 2 cups sugar. Add 4 eggs, one at a time, beating well after each egg. Add 1 cup butter-milk with 1 1/2 teaspoons soda dissolved in it. Add 2 1/2 cups flour (not cake flour) and beat until smooth. Add chocolate mixture and blend thoroughly. Bake in greased and floured angel food cake pan 1 1/2 hours at 325 degrees.

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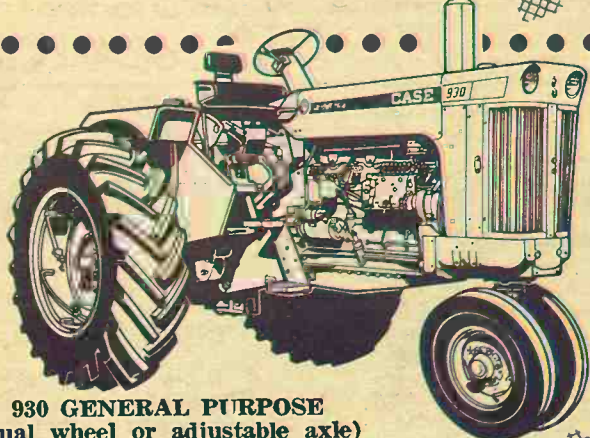
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- 1 No. 2 1/2 size can crushed pineapple

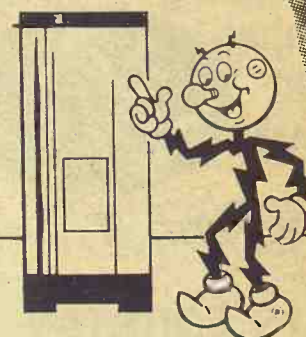
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### Buy Only Two Sets Foundation Garments For Teens

### Unusual New Bush-Type Sweet Pea Award Winner



Unusual in several ways is a new sweet pea named San Francisco, an All-America Selections winner for 1967. First, it's a selection from the Knee-Hi strain introduced last year.

This means that it not only has sturdy stems to keep the plants upright without staking, but that it is not all-growing.

Because of climatic variations, it grows only eighteen inches high over much of the country, but to forty inches in Louisiana and Colorado and reaches its greatest height, four feet, in the Pacific northwest.

Next it was selected for its unique coloring — and what coloring! It is not easy to describe and the official description, "salmon cream pink" doesn't help one to form a mind's

eye picture.

Overall, that is at a distance, the color effect is of brilliant salmon-pink, but part of each flower is pinkish-cream and this is visible as soon as you are close to the blossoms. And how gay they are!

Other vital statistics: Flower stems are long and strong enough for cutting. Each has four to five florets if plants grow eighteen inches tall, more when plants grow taller, which persist without shattering or dropping. The plants are heat-resistant, therefore bloom longer than most sweet peas when hot weather arrives.

### Good Marinade

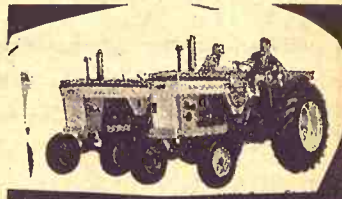
Equal parts of oil and lemon juice, plus garlic, make a good marinade for chicken that is to be broiled. The garlic may be crushed or it may be peeled and halved.

Never use galvanized pots and tubs for preparing or storing food, as zinc poisoning can result.

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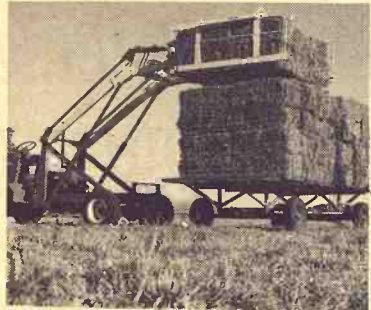

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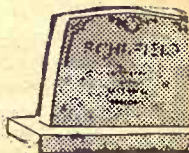

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# Gas Price Hike May Not Fly

Gasoline prices at the pump are up. Maybe.

Major oil companies — among them American, Conoco, Phillips, Sunray DX, and Gulf—have raised their prices to jobbers and dealers, figuring the net result would be a one-cent increase at the pump.

After a couple of weeks of trials, it is not certain yet that the pressures of retail competition will let the penny increase stand up.

The increase was passed on by the suppliers as a quarter-cent increase to jobbers (wholesalers) and 0.6 cent per gallon to dealers. By following the refiner's suggestion that the pump price be increased by one cent, the station operator should have been able to increase his profit by 0.4 cent a gallon, surely not unwelcome to a retail business in which profit failures are most common.

By the script, the refiners and the jobbers would have passed their increases along and the price at the pump would have gone up a cent all over the state (and all over the U.S. too, as the price hikes by the major companies are general.) While there are infinite variations on this scheme, the prevailing price then would have been 33c a gallon for regular and 37c for premium gas at major company stations and 2c per gallon less at independents. (Actually, of course the figures are 32.9c and 36.9c, a merchandising gimmick of dubious origin, which both retailers and customers would like to see eliminated for to-the-penny figures, but no company or station is willing to be first to do it.)

Two factors sway station operators from following the script. Because wholesale costs

and many fixed costs are unvariable, retailers look to their profit from sheer gallonage. To make more profit than a competitor, a retailer must sell more gallons of gas. Aside from advertising and extra services, retailers hope to gain volume thru discounts to regular customers and commercial accounts. This of course is done by private agreement. Cutting prices also might work to gain volume, if competitors didn't follow suit, a situation which often leads to gas wars, especially in the larger towns in the G&G area.

Thus, when wholesale prices are increased, some retailers are tempted to absorb it and make up for the higher cost in selling their competitors. Even increased gallonage by underif the station operator is not of that disposition, he is reluctant to raise his price if his competitor has not. The fact that not all major oil companies announced their price hikes at the same time emphasized this fear.

The two-cent "differential" in price between major company station and independent station is another factor which forces switches from the price script. The independents (Quality, Apco, Champlin, among others) figure they must be two cents lower than the major stations to be competitive. Sometimes major station operators figure the independents are their principal competition and try to lower the price gap to a cent. As the price hike was announced only by some major companies, retailers feared the price differential might be 3

cents, which is too much in the favor of the independents to suit most major station operators.

Will the 1-cent hike fly then? Probably it will take several weeks to find out. The refiners have not increased gasoline prices since 1958, when a 1-cent wholesale increase was finally pared to a quarter-cent.

If it does go thru, it will cost Kansans about \$10.4 million. Last year there were about 1½ million Kansas vehicles, which consumed a billion gallons of gas. On the average, the price increase would cost 58 cents per month or close to \$7 a year.

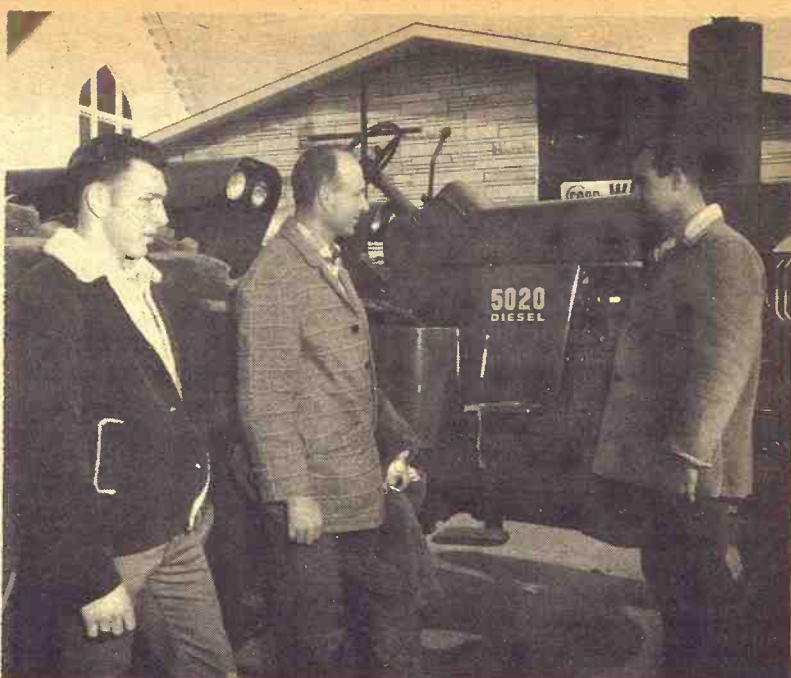

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# Squeeze On For Feedlot Pollution Control

Another major fish-kill attributed to feedlot runoff last week poured fuel to the fire stirring over water pollution caused by such drainage.

And there were increasing signs that there might be something produced more than talk about the causes, cures, and costs of the problem.

The legislature has the problem before it — as it has for several years — but a federal law which becomes effective June 30 should force it to do something besides just talk about it.

The law is the Federal Water Quality Act of 1965 which empowers the federal government to move in and enforce uniform regulations on industries inclined to pollute water supplies.

The state can avoid federal intervention by taking steps of its own, including control of pollution from livestock feeding operations.

Heightening pressure on the legislature last week was a fish kill of an estimated 100,000 on the Cottonwood and Neosho Rivers south of Emporia. Two large fish kills occurred on the Cottonwood-Neosho system in 1966.

The State Board of Health attributed the fish kill to a lack of oxygen, which had been depressed to "zero" by the runoff from the feedlots. Mel Gray of the Board of Health said the runoff occurred as a result of rains in the area January 25-26.

Gray has been working on a set of proposed regulations to curb feedlot pollution, but the application of these rules seems unlikely on the basis of an opinion from Attorney-General Robert Londerholm.

Londerholm said there was a statutory requirement that any regulations be applied "equally" and he noted that the Board of Health's proposal would apply only where a feedlot actually presented a water pollution hazard.

Instead of blanket regulations, Gray had suggested controls based solely on pollution hazards. Some feedlots because of size, terrain, potential hazard, or other individual characteristics presented pollution risks that Board of Health engineers and feedlot operators could cooperatively ascertain and decide on remedies. But if no hazard to public water supply were presented by a feedlot, Gray suggested no regulation would be required.

It is this selective application of the rules that Londerholm doubts is legal under existing statutes. Gray thinks that blanket regulations would bring unneeded rules and expenses for both the health department and the feeders, and hopes that a new law will be written that would allow control on an individual feedlot basis.

It is obvious that much of the feedlot industry fears Board of Health regulation and some members of the legislature think that feedlot regulation by the Kansas Livestock Sanitary Commission rather than by the Health Department would be preferred.

A bill introduced by the Senate Livestock committee last week seemed to be aimed in that direction. The measure provides that lots without adequate drainage systems be declared unqualified for licensing by the livestock sanitary commissioner. While the bill did not specify what was an "adequate drainage system," it did make clear

that it would be the livestock commission which would do the deciding.

The bill was written so that it would generally strengthen authority of the livestock commission over regulation of feedlots and at the same time remove a fee, based on size of the feedlot, paid by operators for a state license.

Mrs. Walter Porter, R-Reading, chairman of the Senate livestock committee, is the wife of a well-known Flint Hills rancher. Mrs. Porter has publicly objected to suggestions that she is less than unbiased about feedlot regulations.

That the livestock industry is also indifferent to pollution problems is denied by various livestock leaders. Girdner Crofoot, Cottonwood Falls feedlot operator and president of the Kansas Livestock Association, said, "The board (of the livestock association) has always been on record as supporting a solution. For several years we've matched state money in sponsoring research at Kansas State University and the University of Kansas. We knew we

had to know scientifically what the problem is and scientifically work out a solution."

Obviously what livestock feeders fear are controls so expensive as to put them out of business.

Suppose a feedlot operator simply installed a sewage system like a city uses to handle its waste? Suggestions like this make operators cringe? "It would cost our operation \$16 million to do what the city of Wichita is doing with its waste," Crofoot says.

Gray is of the opinion that reasonable controls can be put into effect without bankrupting anyone. "We have not the slightest intention of forcing one feedlot operator in Kansas out of business."

"I heard of one operator with 2000 head of hogs on feed who was told he would have to pay \$27,000 to \$30,000 to bring his lots under control."

"This is asinine. While I am not familiar with either the topography of the land, or the feeding operation involved, I believe this man can make his lots safe for \$1000 to \$2000 — at the

most."

Gray said he believes that on an average, maximum per head cost for pollution control of feedlots will be \$1. Most lots can be controlled for less — and the costs can be amortized over a 10-year period so that the anti-pollution control will not be a major factor in feedlot costs at any time.

State officials are not shooting for "pure water in Kansas overnight," Gray said. Plans call for gradual implementation with consultations for beginning feedlot operators, pollution corrective practices, and gradual control by established operators, so that it may be "5 to 10 years before we get the whole situation cleaned up."

Pressure to control pollution from feedlots has grown in recent years as the feedlot business has grown.

Sixteen of the 23 major fish-kills in Kansas rivers and small streams in 1966 were traced directly to feedlots, Gray says.

The major cause of fish-kill is the bacteria formed in the colons of feedlot animals which destroy enough oxygen in water

to suffocate fish as they swim miles downstream. The kind of runoff is dangerous to humans, Gray says. "What I am really concerned about is that one of these things will wake up and find troops surrounding a reservoir in Kansas. We have shown it contains bacteria or virus that forbid body contact with beings."

# How Many Beans In The Bins?

Many farmers apparently expect prices of soybeans to go up more than enough to pay holding costs. Most speculators, however, seem to think that recent prices are too high to be maintained until next summer. These conclusions are based on the futures prices for soybeans: Contracts for July delivery have been 5 cents or so lower than the March futures, whereas the July future is normally higher than the March by about the cost of holding the beans for four months.

### How Many Beans in the Bins?

Stocks of soybeans on hand January 1 totaled 725 million bushels, according to the USDA. This amount was surprisingly large — 17 percent more than a year earlier. It was around 25 million bushels more than would be expected from official estimates of the 1966 crop and known crushings and exports. Possibly, the crop was larger than estimated. Also, stocks on hand January 1 probably were smaller than reported to the USDA.

Stocks held on farms were reported at 347 million bushels, up 22 percent. Stocks in elevators and mills totaled 378 million bushels, up 13 percent.

### Demand Prospects Are Mixed

Although the demand for soybeans will be greater than last year, it may not increase enough to match the available supply — now indicated to be larger than expected.

Exports from September 1 to February 1 (five months) were about the same as the year before figure of 128 million bushels. The USDA estimates exports for the entire marketing year at about 275 million bushels, 10 percent more than last year. Larger exports are expected because of an upward trend in demand from Europe and Japan. But even though the demand is growing, sales are still influenced by prices. Soybean oil and meal must sell in competition with many other products.

### Crushings Increase Slightly

Our mills used 179 million bushels during the four-month period September through December. This amount was only 7 million bushels (4 percent) more than a year before. However, USDA specialists expect crushings in this marketing year to reach 575 million bushels, 7 percent more than in the past year. It now appears that the carryover of Soybeans next September 1 may be 60 to 80

million bushels, compared with only 30 million bushels last fall.

The use of soybeans has not increased as much as some people expected — because the cost of soybeans has been high, in relation to the value of the products obtained from the beans. Our latest newspaper shows the cost of a bushel of soybeans is 2 cents more than a year before, but the value of the products is 10 cents less.

Demand for soybean meal is strong because of the increase in hog production and cattle feeding. Hog production and cattle feeding seem to be up about 8 percent from last year. Furthermore, there is a shortage of cottonseed meal, which is widely used in cattle rations. Around 22 million bushels of soybeans are needed to make up this deficit.

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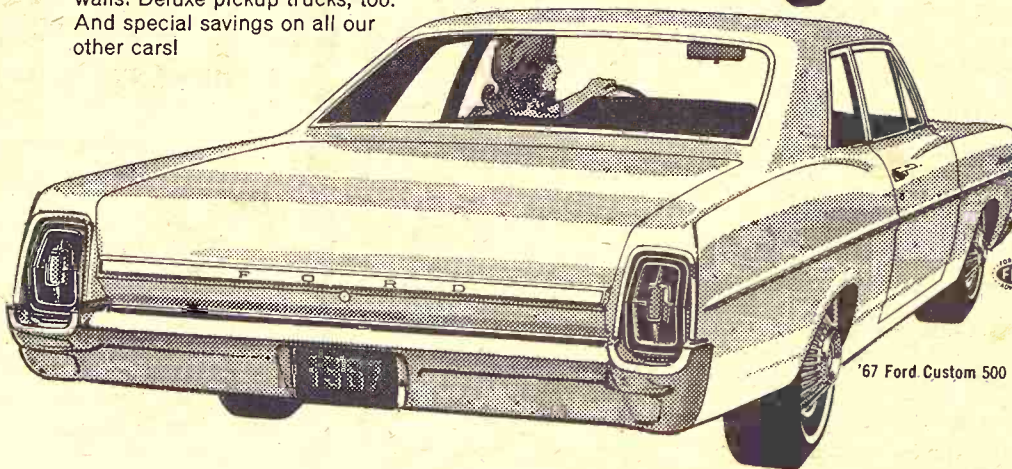
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# USDA Forecast: Cheer For Housewife, Headache For Stockman

Good news for housewives and more headaches for cattle-men. That's the import of the Agriculture Department's latest meat-production analysis.

The department has been forecasting that heavy cattle slaughter in the initial months this year will keep meat prices from rising and will probably be reflected in a broader range of supermarket bargains.

Slaughter was expected to taper later in the year as cattle-men rebuilt herds. Now the department is suggesting plentiful meat supplies might continue further into the year than anticipated.

Wholesale prices for livestock and live poultry last month, however, were up 4.9% from December, the Labor Department reported Monday. The rise was attributed to curtailed marketing of animals due to snow storms.

The Agriculture Department noted that Chicago prices for choice fed steers strengthened somewhat in late January, to an average of about \$26.50 a hundredweight. "But with substantially larger supplies, prices

were about \$2 below a year earlier," the department said.

"Prices are expected to remain near this level during the rest of the winter, but may strengthen moderately in the spring," the report continued. However, it added the hedge that "if marketings are bunched, price weakness could develop during the next several months."

An important consideration is the weight of marketed animals, which has been at higher-than-usual levels in recent weeks.

The department said, "Market weights will strongly influence the price level of fed cattle in the coming months. Weights above the present levels would put additional downward pressure on fed-cattle prices and likely extend the lower price level."

Similarly, a "substantial" increase in pork production also is anticipated by the department.

Together with the fed-beef increases, this "will more than offset declines in supplies of lower-grade beef, lamb and veal," the report stated.

Hog slaughter under Federal inspection in the fourth quarter last year rose 16% from the low levels of October-December 1965, when retail pork prices were soaring. "Slaughter during January continued heavy and during the first half of 1967 likely will average around 10% above January-June 1966," the department said.

## New Specs For TV Sizes

A new federal requirement that television screen measurements be measured in square inches of the viewable area instead of the old diagonal measurement, which included part of the tube which was encased in the set and not viewable, may cause some confusion.

New Federal Trade Commission regulations require tv advertising to state the set's size in either square inches or the viewable diagonal. If the latter is used you can subtract one inch from the old diagonal specification. (Or two inches on the larger color sets).

Here are the square inch equivalents of the old diagonal measures:

### Black & White

11-inch	60 sq. in.
21-inch	212 sq. in.
25-inch	327 sq. in.

### Color

11-inch	60 sq. in.
19-inch	180 sq. in.
23-inch	270 sq. in.

## Seek To Continue Agreement On Hereford Registration

KANSAS CITY, Mo. — American Hereford Assn. directors have offered to the American Polled Hereford Assn. the opportunity to continue the present joint certificate agreement between the two associations. The agreement would continue the program of the registration and transfer of Polled Herefords for another five years, either in the agreement's present form or with certain modifications which have been under discussion between the liaison committees of the two associations during the past year.

Terms of the agreement provide that unless terminated by either of the associations during

this year 1967, the fifth year of tenure, it will automatically continue for the 10-year period ending Dec. 31, 1972.

In the offer to continue the agreement, the AHA recognized the mutual benefits that have been realized by both segments of the breed under the contract which has operated smoothly during the four years since its inception.

In its offer, the AHA agreed to relinquish the requirement of membership in both associations on the part of polled breeders as a prerequisite for membership rates on their joint registry certificates. The AHA also agreed to substitute a flat fee charge for registry and

transfer sufficient to provide no loss in its operating revenue.

The terms of the offer also make clear that the AHA in the event the agreement is not extended will continue to register all Hereford cattle under the registry rules which require that the sire and dam of any calf to be registered must have been recorded previously in the American Hereford Record.

The AHA additionally stated that should the agreement not be continued it will resume its full service program for all Hereford breeders as of the date of termination.

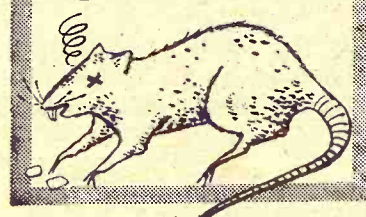
## Open House At Vo-Tech School

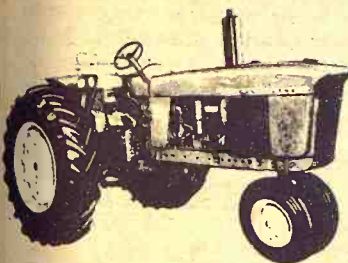

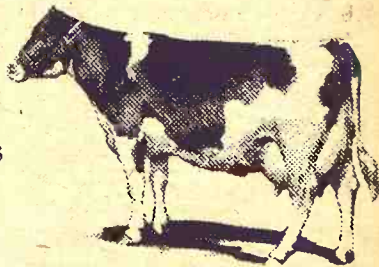
