Academy of Science Gives Feedlot Report—

Third Of Fish Kills From Runoff

A large number of G&G area livestockmen believe that stories of water pollution caused by feedlot runoff have been greatly exaggerated, or not based on proven facts, to the detriment of their industry.

The following article, much longer than Grass & Grain usually carries, is an unedited one written by a Committee on Conservation of the Kansas Academy of Science. Lloyd C. Hulbert of Kansas State University is the chairman of the committee, which included three from K-State, three from the University of Kansas, two from the state colleges, one from a private college, and one each from the State Highway Department and the Fish & Game Commission. More cattlemen have apparently become convinced that there is a strong scientific case for greater controls on feedlot runoff, and there is less opposition than there was a couple of years ago. Convinced or unconvinced, livestockmen may find points here with which they would take issue, but G&G presents the article as worth the reading.

In 1967 three fish kills occurred in the Neosho River between February and May. Such death of fish generally occurs because the dissolved oxygen in the water is depleted or is nearly depleted, or because the water contains toxic materials. Both result from pollution. Polluted water is poor or unfit for human uses, either as water supply or for recreation, so we lose both economically and aesthetically.

Pollution results when any waste material is washed or dumped into lakes or streams. As with money, the amount makes a lot of difference. If a sewage, or manure) gets into a river, a few bacteria will soon break it down and the river

will be little changed.

If large amounts of organic matter are dumped into the river, the great many bacteria that grow on it will soon use up the water, and other changes will occur.

Plants and animals are sources of organic wastes, such as leaves and animal droppings. If large amounts of such natural wastes get into water when water supplies are low, fish may be killed. However, natural processes account for few of our present cases of pollution. In the past four years about 120 separate fish kills were reported to the Kansas Forestry, Fish and Game Commission. Only 10 percent were believed to be due to natural causes. Approximately 33 per cent of these kills were attributed to runoff from feedlots, 17 per cent to unknown causes, and the remainder mostly to pesticides and industrial wastes. There are many sources and kinds of pollutants, and so it takes the cooperation of many to improve the situation. Fortunately, there are a number of people in industry, agriculture, and various branches of government who are working on the problems.

Feedlots are a relatively new, but rapidly growing source of pollution. Cattle have long been with us, but formerly they usually were scattered over the ranges so their wastes were not concentrated and very little of the manure reached the streams. It is the concentration of hundreds and thousands of cattle in feedlots that has created the recent problems. A sin-

gle steer may produce up to 40 to 60 pounds of waste per day, which may be 7 to 20 times the pollution load produced by an adult man. A feedlot containing 500 cattle could produce as much waste as 5000 people. Unlike human sewage, feedlot wastes tend to accumulate and are then washed into our streams in concentrated doses during rainstorms. On January 1, 1967, there were more than 586,000 cattle on feed in Kansas, an increase of nearly 20 per cent over the previous year and 40 per cent more than the average number for the period from 1961-1966. It is easy to see why special precautions are required to prevent large amounts of feedlot waste from washing into rivers.

The primary polluting agents contained in feedlot runoff are particles of manure, dissolved substances such as ammonia, and bacteria. Because these materials are foods for bacteria, the bacteria are able to increase in great numbers. When the pollution is heavy, bacteria become abundant enough to remove most or all of the oxygen from the water, and this alone will kill fish. Dead fish and other dead animals may then cause the water to develop foul odors and tastes. In addition, the decomposition can raise the water temperature.

Pesticide residues can come from feedlots as well as other sources. Many of the insecticides need to be present in only trace amounts (a few parts per million or in some cases only a

Slant On NFO Effect

After six weeks of a grain boycott and three of withholding livestock from the markets, the National Farmers Organization is differing with trade sources, USDA officials, and newspaper analysts of the effect of their action.

The Associated Press last week concluded that the NFO action was making little headway, with farm writer John Armstrong arriving at the opinion in the face of claims to the contrary by NFO leaders. Armstrong quoted unnamed "marketing specialists" as saying the 33-state NFO effort to shorten supply and boost prices has been ineffectual. He said a slight improvement in grain and meat prices can be attributed to seasonal factors.

Prices have fluctuated little

since the boycott started, and meat and grain deliveries at some major markets last week showed increases.

On January 11, start of the grain boycott, corn was selling in Chicago for \$1.13 a bushel. The price rose five cents briefly but dropped back to \$1.13 last week. The NFO is holding out for \$1.50 a bushel.

Cattle sold for 27 cents a pound in Chicago on February 12 when the NFO extended the withholding action to meat. The Chicago price last week was about a cent higher but still well below the NFO target of 32 cents.

Soybean prices have risen about four cents to \$2.72 a bushel. The NFO aim has been \$3. Hogs came up about a penny from the start of the meat strike, but were still three cents short of the NFO goal.

NFO president Oren Staley has challenged the Government's figures on livestock marketings, claiming they are being manipulated by processors, but a USDA official in Des Moines said this cannot happen. The receipt reports are checked against the slaughter count of federal inspectors and the processors' books are audited for taxes, the official said.

DRUGMAKER MAY BUY ASGROW SEED CO.

Asgrow Seed Co., a major seller of seed in the G&G area, may be bought by the Upjohn Co., pharmaceutical maker. Negotiations have been reported in the financial press, indicating an exchange of stock of around \$20 million value. Upjohn makes some agricultural fungicides and feed additives. Asgrow has had sales of around \$27 million a year, earning around \$1 million. Upjohn sales have around \$257 million with earnings of \$36 million.

First Increase In Flour Use In Many Years

The USDA has announced an apparent increase in the domestic use of flour during the 1967 year. This is the first increase in flour use in the United States in many years.

G. C. Fowler, director of the Kansas Wheat Commission, said "The estimate of 223,649,000 hundredweights of flour used domestically in the United States is based on the difference between 244,586,000 hundredweights of flour produced by U.S. mills and 20,937,000 hundredweights exported during the year. This is up 3,538,000 hundredweights from 1966."

"The increase in the domestic use figure is especially encouraging," Fowler said. "Since the 1966 domestic disappearance figure was 336,000 hundredweights below 1965."

few parts per billion of water) to cause the death of some aquatic animals. Many of these chemicals are extremely difficult to remove from water by city water treatment plants. Some fish and other aquatic organisms accumulate these chemicals in their tissues in amounts hundreds of times greater than the amount in the water about them. We do not yet know what some of these chemicals will do to man, but what we do know warns us to try to prevent pesticides from getting into our food and water supplies.

Ammonia, a product derived primarily from the oxidation of urine, may kill the most fish. It is not uncommon for the concentration of ammonia in feedlot runoff, after mixing with streamflow, to exceed 20 parts per million, a concentration which will kill game fish. The ammonia may eventually be converted to nitrate, a plant nu-

trient. The increased amount of nitrate may cause such an increase in algae as to create problems for water treatment plants. The nitrate itself can have detrimental effects when consumed by man or animals.

Finally, great numbers of bacteria and viruses introduced into the water in feedlot runoff can cause other troubles besides using up oxygen. Fecal coliform bacteria, which come from wastes of warm-blooded animals, may occur in amounts exceeding millions of bacteria per 100 milliliters (about 4 fluid ounces) of water. Only 1000 such bacteria per 100 ml. of water are considered to be unsafe for swimming, or other such uses. Furthermore, water containing more than 20,000 coliform bacteria per 100 ml. is considered undesirable for treatment for a city water supply.

Analysis of the water is important in finding the source of pollution. If an analysis reveals that the oxygen supply is reduced and that both ammonia and coliform bacteria are increased, the pollution may be assumed to be the result of sewage. The only sources are either a large community or a concentration of livestock. The former possibility can be checked by inspection of the sewage treatment facilities of all communities in the drainage or by observing whether the pollution is

constant or not. Bacterial examination techniques can help even more by checking to see whether the bacteria in the water are those characteristic of human sewage or of other warm-blooded animals such as cattle, swine, or poultry. It is sometimes more difficult to pinpoint which feedlots in a given drainage are responsible, but this too can be accomplished in an objective manner.

Preventing feedlot wastes from washing into streams or lakes requires some means of catching runoff from feedlots. The size, position, and number of such catchment basins will depend on such factors as the amount of rainfall, kind of soil, steepness of slope, and size of the feedlot. The idea is to catch the runoff from the feedlot and dispose of the retained wastes by irrigation or evaporation or more rarely by treatment. It is least expensive if the feedlot operation is laid out with such pollution control in mind, but catchment basins or other control measures can be added later with reasonable cost.

In passing the "Water Quality Act of 1965" the U. S. Congress required the establishment of standards for water pollution control, and gave the states until June 30, 1967, to prepare acceptable standards. If the states did not, the Federal Government was to do so. Environ-

mental Health Services of the Kansas State Department of Health, which had been the official water pollution control agency in Kansas for some years, prepared such standards for Kansas. These standards covered feedlot as well as domestic and industrial wastes. They have been active in working with individual feedlot operators to develop preventive plans tailored for their particular situation.

Feedlots have proven themselves to be an efficient way of producing meat for market, but just as we have decided that cities must treat sewage rather than dump it into streams, so we must prevent feedlot wastes from polluting our waters. It is a necessary expense of operation because we as a people are not willing to suffer the serious economic and aesthetic losses that would occur without such pollution control.

This article is particularly concerned with feedlot pollution because it is a relatively new problem, receiving considerable publicity, and about which there is considerable misunderstanding. However, other kinds of pollution are important also. Municipal sewage, petroleum, salt, and other industrial wastes still pollute our rivers and lakes at times, although progress is being made in reducing such pollution. Pesticide pollution is a serious threat requiring much study and more care by users of these chemicals.

Mankind has astounding ability to manipulate his environment, and he does so for many useful purposes. For each intended change, other unintended changes occur, of which pollu-



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
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Birth Rate At All-Time Low

Birth rate in the United States has plunged to an all-time low but not because of contraception.

A population expert said the reason is "a realization that rearing children in this complicated and expensive world presents big problems."

Rising costs of living and increasing 'competition' of education, especially at the college level, are key factors, said Robert C. Cook of the population reference bureau, Washington.

The 1967 birth rate computed by the National Center for health statistics is 17.9 per thousand population.

Last year it was 18.4

There were 3,530,000 births in 1967 as compared with 3,610,000 in 1966.

Cook predicts the 1968 rate will continue lower.

The downward trend started 10 years ago after a surge in the decade that followed World War II.

Actually, Cook pointed out, the decline has been going on for 30 or 40 years. The postwar increase was only a temporary "detour."

That the surge lasted for a full decade has had the experts puzzled.

"My own reaction to the current decline is not one of surprise that it is occurring but of surprise that it did not occur much earlier," commented Arthur A. Campbell, statistician for the National Center of Health Statistics.

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Western Farm Show Attracts 56,000 To K.C.

The Western Farm Show at Kansas City last week attracted 56,000 persons in its 3-day run at the American Royal Building.

The show is strictly a "looker and feeler" kind of show. No direct sales are made.

"At this show, we don't sell anything. Farmers can come in, look at the machinery and compare it with the competition without any pressure to buy," said J. Keith Melvin, executive vice president of the Western

Retail Implement and Hardware Association.

The show drew more than 250 firms as exhibitors, showing machines valued at \$10 million. Double the space could have been used by others who wanted to display in the show, Melvin said.

One huge attraction was a tractor and corn planter outfit that is set up to plow, put on a herbicide to kill the weeds, apply the fertilizer and plant the seed, all in one operation six rows at a time, covering about 80 acres a day. With this machine, in an ordinary year, no further cultivation is necessary. However, in wet years, it is possible for weeds to get a start and cultivation still may be required.

Some years ago, sturdy rotary mowers were developed to clear fields of brush. Such mowers have been joined in groups of three or four to cut swaths 18 to 24 feet wide.

Big combines have air-conditioned cabs for operators high above the machinery. From his cab the driver is operating a machine that costs about \$15,000 and will cut up to 175 acres of wheat a day.

Probably the most expensive of the farm implements at the Western Show were huge, 4-wheel diesel tractors used to pull the biggest plows and other

machinery. Some of these sell for more than \$20,000.

There were grain drills that seed a 24-foot width and will cover a 160-acre field in one day.

Electronics were entering the farm field this year. A north central United States firm displayed an electronic gadget which enabled a planter operator to tell if his seeds were being planted in proper spacing and the units were working properly.

Farmers from Kansas, Missouri, Oklahoma, Maryland, Nebraska, Colorado, Ohio and Illinois were listed at the big show this year.

During the entire show, wives of farmers who were inspecting machinery were entertained at fashion shows, book reviews and movies showing the electronic gadgetry and mechanical wizardry of the kitchens to be in 1999.

Among items on display were a spinning, conical device made into the form of a guard guide for combining grain.

This device, twirled by v-belts, is designed to pick up lodged corn and guide it into a corn picker.

Other displays showed latest equipment for irrigation, discing, harrowing, plowing, cutting, chopping, wind-rowing, bailing and many other farm jobs.

acid sales, at 92,689 tons, were off 2,326 tons.

Liquid nitrogen solutions experienced the largest increase among fertilizer materials with 41,264 tons, a gain of 13,555. Urea sales totaled 16,434 tons, an increase of 3,076. Ammonia nitrate sales were 50,769, a loss of 9,479; and anhydrous ammonia, 48,736, a decline of 1,543. Dry mixed fertilizer sales decreased from 228,978 to 226,911.

The fertilizer grade with the greatest increase was 18-46-0. Sales of 124,633 tons were up 8,308. Other grades with increases included 16-20-0, 17,838 tons, up 2266 and 16-48-0, 15,903 tons, up 3223.

Sumner County led the state in fertilizer sales with a total of 17,763 tons, followed by Reno,

with 15,611; Sedgwick, 14,222; McPherson, 10,816; Cowley, 9919, and Labette 9128. Tonnes figures by counties represent reports of sales to dealers and others, and do not necessarily imply actual usage in that county.


CLYDE ROGERS HEADS RILEY LIVESTOCK GROUP

MANHATTAN — Clyde Rogers has been elected president of a newly formed Riley County Livestock Assn. Ivan Wenck, vice president; Harry Harber, secretary-treasurer; and Bill Sharp, reporter. Dr. Phil Platter will discuss the futures market at the next meeting at the Riley County High School at 8 p.m. Tuesday, Feb. 27.

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Fertilizer sales in Kansas reached a record high for a six-month fall period, during the half year ending December 31, 1967. The new high was 414,311 tons, an increase of 2,126 tons over the corresponding period of 1966, which also was a new record. Only the spring of 1966, with 487,631 tons, had higher figures.

The report, based on commercial fertilizer sales by manufacturers to Kansas dealers, was issued by the Control Division of the State Department of Agriculture. Sales of actual plant nutrients totaled 219,202 tons. This was down 10,381 tons from the previous fall. Nitrogen sales totaled 115,997 tons, a decline of 8,005 tons; available phosphoric

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'67 Calf Crop At 1.7 Million Head

Kansas stockmen recorded a crop of 1.7 million head during 1967, Crop and Livestock Reporting Service officials say.

The figure, 1,760,000, is up 5 percent from the previous year, officials said.

The 1967 calf crop was 83,000 head more than the previous

year's crop and seven per cent above the 1961-65 average.

The number of calves born in 1967, expressed as a percentage of the number of cows and heifers two years old and over at the first of the year was 93 per cent — 5 percentage points more than a year ago.

The 1967 calf crop for the United States is estimated at 43,647,000 head compared with 43,526,000 in 1966, officials said.

Wheat Useful As Feed When Price Is Right

Kansas State University researchers have found that wheat is a practical food for livestock.

A recently completed wheat-feeding study at K-State shows wheat is a practical ration when the price gap between wheat and corn narrows. Gerald Clary, animal husbandry research assistant, says that the K-State study mirrors similar research.

Wheat is not only efficient but produces a high grade carcass. Comparing favorably with daily gains from corn and grain sorghum, wheat should be used as a part of the concentrate ration.

If wheat replaces up to 30 percent of the corn or grain sorghum in a high-grain ration, it is nearly 9 percent more efficient than when used alone. Animals fed on wheat, corn and grain sorghum in equal parts "seemed to out-perform" those fed without the wheat addition, Clary said.

Dr. Draytford Richardson, K-State professor in animal husbandry said wheat is economi-

cally practical when wheat prices approach the cost of feed grains. Wheat may be worth the added expense if its higher protein content is utilized.


Clary experienced no difficulties while feeding cattle all-wheat rations but cautioned farmers to watch cattle closely. Wheat should be ground, crack-

ed or rolled before being fed to cattle.

Feeding of wheat should be introduced over a two-to-three week period. Wheat feeding is beneficial to hogs and poultry as well as cattle, but lambs perform better on corn.

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

Mrs. Arnold Janssen of Emmett is the prize winner. She writes, "I am sending in a very good cookie recipe. They are just delicious and makes a good-sized batch. I have tried so many of your recipes and they are all very good. We sure do like the G&G paper and can't wait until we get it."

FOUR-IN-ONE COOKIE

1 cup shortening soft ("I use plain lard")
1 cup brown sugar
1 cup granulated sugar
2 eggs
1 1/4 cups sifted flour
1 teaspoon soda
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon vanilla
3 cups rolled oats (uncooked, quick or old-fashioned)
1 cup pecans
1 6-ounce package chocolate chips
Heat oven to moderate (350 degrees). Place shortening, sugars and eggs in mixing bowl. Beat thoroughly. Sift together flour, soda and salt. Add to shortening mixture; mix thoroughly. Stir in vanilla and oats. Add pecans and chocolate chips. Drop from teaspoon onto greased cookie sheet two inches apart. Bake in preheated oven, 350 degrees, 12-15 minutes or until done. Cool about two minutes, then remove from cookie sheets. For variety: Omit pecans and chocolate chips and add 1 cup raisins, 1 cup salted peanuts. ("I use salted peanuts most of the time.")

The following recipe is from Mrs. Frank L. Sterba, R 2, Belleville:

QUICK PARTY SURPRISE

1 6-ounce package flavored gelatin (strawberry, peach, cherry or raspberry)
1 1/2 cups boiling water
1 10 or 12-ounce package frozen fruit (not thawed) cor-

responding to gelatin flavor used

Dissolve gelatin in boiling water. Add frozen block of fruit; stir gently until fruit has completely separated. Beat with egg beater for one full minute. Pour into a mold and chill until firm. Unmold on tray. Add additional fruit and whipped

cream as garnish around the tray.

Mrs. Ray Jenkins, R 1, Riley: "When I have unexpected company drop in, I serve a quick and easy dessert like:"

SODA CRACKER PIE

10 crackers (individual squares)
3 egg whites
1/2 cup nuts
1 cup sugar
1/2 teaspoon cream of tartar
Pinch of salt
1 teaspoon vanilla
Whip egg whites until stiff and fold in 1 cup of sugar and the vanilla. Add soda crackers, nuts, salt and cream of tartar. Put into ungreased pie tin and bake in a slow oven (250-275 degrees) for 30 minutes. About 1/2 hour before serving, whip 1/2 pint of cream topping mix may be used) and add 1 cup of well-drained fruit (frozen strawberries, fruit cocktail, etc.) Spoon on top of pie.





Short Soak Most Helpful For Heavily Soiled Clothes

Asparagus Is Versatile Vegetable

Salad, vegetable or even main dish — canned asparagus is delicious served any of these ways.

Team canned asparagus and other vegetables for hearty, nutritious salads. Serve them with a nippy dressing and garnish with pimiento strips for a bit of extra color.

For the vegetable course, season canned asparagus with your choice of melted butter, lemon butter, browned buttered crumbs, hollandaise sauce or a cream sauce with cheese. Or, offer a one-dish meal with canned asparagus in a meat or fish casserole some evening when you are rushed.

Have you been wondering what is the best way to handle your husband's heavily soiled clothes, the children's play clothes or diapers?

For many years the answer heard most often has been to soak the clothes. Although soaking can be beneficial in loosening dirt, there is a danger.

Often you'll hear that if a short soak is good, a long soak is even better. However, during such a lengthy time, soil first loosened may be re-deposited on the garment.

The problems of soil re-deposition can be avoided if the heavily soiled laundry is put through the "soak cycle" on the

automatic washer. When the clothes are placed in the washer and set on "soak", the washer will agitate briefly to dissolve the detergent, soak briefly, then spin out the dirty water, leaving the clothes ready for a normal wash.

If the automatic is not equipped with an automatic soak cycle, much the same thing can be accomplished manually. Just load the clothes and detergent, allow the unit to agitate briefly, then lift the lid or otherwise stop the unit for a few minutes to permit the soak.

Organize Knitting Equipment Before Starting A Project

Always make certain your knitting equipment is in order before you begin a project. The first step in bringing order out of chaos is to wind each kind of leftover wool into a tight, firm ball. Stick a pin through the outside of the yarn so there are no loose ends.

Then begin to match your sets of needles. Fasten each set together with a bit of cellophane tape to save time later. Use the wrapper from a skein of yarn as a core when you wind wool into a ball. Then you will know the brand name or color to match it.

Treat Collars Before Washing

Collars of shirts and blouses often collect dirt and grime that does not come out when washed. Insure a bright-looking shirt by giving it a little extra attention. To get the collar band and the edge above it white again, squeeze on extra detergent or soap before you wash it and rub it in. This method will produce results whether you wash by hand or machine.

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Congress, Doctors To Battle Again?

When a medicare bill was hammered thru Congress in 1964-65 after a decade of stiff resistance from the medical profession, doctors predicted that such a program, if it were ever enacted, would have astronomical costs and that most doctors would refuse to participate.

After two years it is apparent that the doctors were right about the costs but the threats

of refusal to participate were almost completely wrong.

The costs have risen to a point that pales the original estimates, and there is little rebuttal even from the profession that doctors are profiting heavily from the program they opposed with so much passion.

Costs of the program have become so heavy that the next step may be one the medical

profession fears even more than they did the original medicare proposals: controls over fees.

Before medicare, doctors' fees were rising about the same pace as wages generally. But since medicare they have jumped at twice the rate of increase of the overall consumer price index. Doctors' fees jumped 7.8% in 1966 and 6.1% last year.

Total income for doctors in private practice jumped 11% in 1966; the median net income (after expenses but before taxes) of private practitioners rose to \$32,170 — four times the national average; one in seven doctors cleared at least \$50,000 a year, reports Medical Economics magazine.

The Social Security Administration says that in medicare's first fiscal year, payments to doctors under the program's supplemental health insurance program ran 8% ahead of the agency's \$861 million estimate. In his State of the Union message, President Johnson called for "measures to stem the rising costs of medical care." And no less than three Senate committees plan investigations into doctors' fees and incomes.

Also certain to be investigated are sharply rising hospital costs — generally believed to be the single most important reason for medicare's unexpected costs — and medicaid, the Federal program that underwrites health care for the poor.

In its first year, medicaid cost more than five times the Government's estimate of \$247 million.

There's little doubt that increased fees already are forcing reevaluation of basic medicare policy.

"Very frankly, unless there is some evidence of self-discipline or deceleration of fee increases — and there is no evidence so far — we'll have to go to a ceiling on fees," Thomas Tierney, who administers medicare for the Social Security Administration, said recently.

If this happens, the patient himself would have to pay any portion of his doctor's bill that exceeded the Government limit, Tierney said. Already, the Social Security Administration has boosted the monthly premium for the optional health insurance offered under medicare, to \$4 a month from \$3, effective

—Over Soaring Medical Costs

April 1. About 45 cents of the \$1 increase is needed to meet the cost of increased doctors' fees, either past increases or anticipated increases, says a spokesman for the agency.

Doctors leave little doubt that they would fight fee controls with all the power they could muster, altho there is evidence that the profession softened its attitude toward medicare in the two years of its operation.

Why have costs risen so much and so rapidly. The American Medical Association says that medicare is costing what it said it would cost, and that medicare proponents in the Government were simply not realistic about costs when they were selling the

program.

Another reason, the association says, is simple economics — supply and demand. Medicare has funneled a lot of new patients to the private practitioner. Until medicare, many of these patients were on a charity basis or without it.


Doctors contend that probably if they treated patients who had little ability to pay, the fee was nominal or not charged at all.

But now that the payment comes from the government, doctors are more likely to charge what they consider a "normal" fee. Normal economic law might suggest that as the level for low-income patients moves up, there's pressure for upward movement for all patients.

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
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

Medicare has allowed a practice dear to many doctors — the right to bill patients directly rather than submit the bill to the medicare insurer. Critics argue that if doctors were forced to bill the medicare insurer — it's optional under the law now — the insurer would act as a brake on fee increases.

One who believes doctors should accept the assignment procedure is George Meany, president of AFL-CIO. Meany charges that increasing medicare's health insurance premium to \$4 a month will work a severe hardship on medicare recipients.

recipients.

The AMA bristles at these suggestions. "Isn't it interesting," asks its president, Dr. Milford O. Rouse, "that labor wants a maximum fee limit for doctors when it's taking the lead in assuring a minimum wage for itself?"

Dr. Rouse argues that a Federally enforced fee schedule because "the profession disciplines its own members with a definite set of ethics and morality."

If the doctors have their own brand of discipline, why have both fees and incomes increased so dramatically? Besides the natural play of inflationary pressures caused by medicare's demands, it is apparent that there

is a grim determination by many doctors to make the government live up to the letter of the medicare law.

The letter of the next medicare law may contain fee schedules. If such a thing comes about, many doctors say they will not participate or even suggest they would quit the profession.

The Wall Street Journal notes in a recent report on medical costs that many doctors threatened the same thing in 1965 but all have since resigned themselves to it. There is already some scattered opinion among doctors that fees can be standardized, the Journal story noted.

Congress and other sources, it appears, may be on the way to persuading more doctors that medical costs have soared too much, too soon.

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
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Livestock Commission Bill Goes Governor's Way

TOPEKA — A major overhauling of the Kansas livestock commission, a legislative aim of Gov. Robert Docking passed the Senate last week by a vote of 31 to 0, and was sent to the House.

Passage in the Senate was seen as a victory for Governor Docking and a solution to his battle with the Kansas livestock association officers. The governor had insisted that he be provided a wider selection of names from which to make appointments to the commission.

It was the first time the commission and its regulatory agencies have been changed since 1905, with Governor Docking bringing to a head the propriety

of the livestock association's having solid control over the state agency.

Under the new bill the positions of livestock sanitary commissioner and state brand commissioner will be abolished, and the entire department placed under a single state livestock commissioner.

It was the insistence of the key officials of the Kansas Livestock association in submitting only one name to the governor for sanitary commissioner and brand commissioner that precipitated the controversy, with the governor threatening a court move if the Legislature did not take action.

Under the approved bill, the

Livestock Association, made up of persons in the livestock industry, will submit to the governor three names of persons willing and able to serve on the State Livestock commission. This would give the governor a freedom of choice, with the association now able to submit only a single name for a position on the 7-man body.

The commission, in turn, will name the livestock commissioner to head the entire agency.

The bill had been recommended by the Senate Federal-State Affairs committee to give the governor complete appointment power. This was defeated on the floor of the Senate, however, with the understanding the amended plan met with the governor's approval.

Sen. Norman E. Gaar (R-Westwood), who sponsored the bill giving the governor complete appointive power, contended it still would give the KLA control over appointments by restricting its list of three names. He said he objected to a

private association's being in a position of controlling a state agency.

A bill that would give counties authority to levy a local state income surtax aroused lengthy debate before its passage by a vote of 24 to 13. Whether such a tax was levied would depend on a vote of the people.


Sponsors of the bill contended it would be a source of new revenue to the local governmental units, and would be permissive. The bill provides, however, that the real estate levies

must be reduced by a proportionate amount of that raised by the surtax.

Under the bill, 50 percent of the revenue would go to the county's general school fund, 25 per cent to the cities, and 25 per cent to the county general fund.

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



Dole Wants To Limit Farm Census

Rep. Bob Dole, R-Kans., has introduced legislation limiting questions which farmers are required to answer on agricultural censuses.

Dole's bill would prohibit questions of production, acreage, operation and finances of farms in the agricultural census.

Noting current law requires a farm census every five years, Dole said the proposed survey for 1969 demands precise figures on the amount of irrigating water, fertilizer and other production methods and crop yields. In addition, he said the census would require the farmer to disclose how much money he owes, how he finances his work and an equipment inventory.

In a statement in the House, Dole said, "Not only are some of the questions so involved and complicated requiring outside professional help, some are actually invasive."

He said, "No farmer wants to publish how much grain he is storing while waiting for a good market price. Such information would put him at a disadvantage to the speculator and others."

Ringling Circus To Split Into Two Troupes

BALTIMORE — The Ringling Bros., Barnum & Bailey circus will become two separate shows next year as the new ownership begins a policy of introducing the circus to new generations of Americans.



with the growth of population. Our population is increasing at a rate of about 1½ percent per year. The number of beef cattle has increased at about the same rate during the past year. The situation was confirmed by the livestock report released by the USDA in mid-February.

The number of beef cattle on farms and ranches on January 1 was listed at 86.6 million — up just 1 percent from a year earlier. The number of dairy cattle was estimated at 22.2 million — down 3 percent. The total for beef and dairy cattle combined was 108.8 million — practically unchanged from the previous year.

Fewer Steers, More Beef Heifers. The number of steers on farms and ranches as of the first of the year was estimated at 12.6 million — 1 percent less than a year earlier. But the number of beef heifers 1 to 2 years old was listed at 9.3 million — 2 percent more than the previous year. So, steers and heifers combined totaled 21.9 million — just the same as last year.

Slightly More Calves and Cows. Beef calves under 1 year totaled 27.5 million — up just 1 percent from a year earlier. The number of beef cows 2 years and older was estimated at 35.3 million — up 2 percent.

Those small increases in the number of cattle are just about enough to match the growth in the demand for beef. This demand for beef increases 2 or 3 percent per year. About half of this increased demand comes from the growth of population, about half from rising incomes. When we say that the demand for beef increases 2 or 3 percent per year, we mean that consumers will buy that much more with no changes in average retail prices.

Cattle on Feed. Two other recent reports by the USDA showed small increases in the number of cattle being fattened for slaughter. The most recent report listed 6.2 million cattle on feed as of February 1 in six states — Iowa, Nebraska, Texas, Colorado, California, and Arizona. This number was 3 percent more than that listed for the same states a year ago.

Earlier, a January 1 report covering 39 states listed 11.3 million cattle on feed — just 2 percent more than last year. In both reports, most of the increase in cattle feeding was in Texas. Apparently, cattle feeding in California has passed its peak.

Beef Industry in Illinois. Many Illinois cattle feeders have closed their gates in recent years. The latest USDA report for January 1 showed 715,000 cattle in our feedlots. This number was 10 percent less than that of a year before, and 17 percent less than at the high point 7 years ago.

The cow-calf business in Illinois is holding up better. The number of beef cows on hand January 1 was estimated at 782,000. This number was 4 per-


cent more than a year earlier — down only 2 percent from the high point reached 2 years ago.

Few Farm Bills Expected Out Of Legislature

TOPEKA — Likelihood of any major legislation for agriculture in this session of the legislature appeared nil here as lawmakers got into the final stages of the 1968 term.

Several smaller bills affecting agriculture probably will become law.

A PROPOSAL to change the

amount of money paid from the 1 mill per bushel wheat levy on wheat farmers was killed early in the session. This proposal would have limited the money paid from the wheat fee fund to the general fund to \$20,000, leaving the remaining collected fees for promoting use and sale of wheat.

None of the tax bills introduced in behalf of farmers appeared likely to pass. A proposal to exempt farm machinery from the tax rolls appeared likely to fail because of the difficulty of separating farm machinery from a class of produc-

tion machinery used by industry.

Tax relief on real estate assessment or on real estate taxes appeared nil.

Rep. Fred Meek, R-Idana, said he doubted any major farm legislation would pass this session.

Rep. Jess Taylor, R-Tribune, said he believes the law should wait until "we can find out just how much the government is going to do."

IN ALL probability, most legislators believe the passage of a meat inspection law will depend on how the administration of the law will be financed. Generally, the federal law allows federal payment of up to 50 per cent of the enforcement cost.

Who pays for the state's share of the cost will make a difference to packing house people of the state. The Kansas Independent Meat Packers Association is on record favoring the law at statewide costs.

The House Agriculture Committee led by Rep. John Vogel. R-McPherson, is not likely to bring out any more bills, he said.

Vogel pointed out that even the dairy inspection law, which because of lack of funding was brought out with a two-year delay in its enacting clause.

Minor bills likely to pass were thought to be a proposal to change the name "oleomargarine" to just plain "margarine" to keep abreast of the terminology of laws in other states, and a law that provides for making certain the noxious weed "musk thistle" seed is not transported in grain.

Of interest to hog men of the state is a law requiring certain procedures in the sale and registration of specific pathogen free swine (SPF) hogs.


The Beatrice Swine Show & Pie-Baking Contest


Actually the show and contest isn't quite as incongruous as it first sounds. The rules of the baking contest require two-crust pies made from lard.




Nebraska Pork Queen Lois Kugel of Fairbury awarded the prizes after the show. With her is Clare Sward of Beatrice, chairman of the event.



The times (listed in story below) are based on planting in the shaded area running diagonally thru the center of the state. Those areas outside either plant earlier or later.

When To Plant Garden

Now is the time of the year when Kansans should be thinking about planting a vegetable garden.

The map above, made available by the Kansas State University Extension Service, illustrates when vegetable planting should begin.

The recommended times listed below are for the shaded area running diagonally through the center of the state. Those living outside of the shaded area should follow the recommended schedule on the map — 5 days later, 5 days earlier, 10 days later, 10 days earlier, etc.

Planting dates include:

March 1-5

Asparagus, rhubarb, strawberries.

March 15 - April 1

Onion, beets, carrots, chard, kale, kohlrabi, lettuce (leaf),

mustard, onion (seed), parsnips, potatoes, peas, radishes, turnips, spinach.

April 1-10

Broccoli, cabbage, cauliflower, lettuce (head), sweet corn, snap beans.

May 1-10

Peppers, tomatoes, watermelons, cucumbers, cantaloupes.

May 1-15

Pumpkin, squash, okra, cowpeas, lima beans and sweet potatoes.

Climatic conditions, the Extension Service warns, vary from season to season and with locations in the state. The gardener should consider weather forecasts before planting. It is recommended that you group cool season, short maturing crops together in one area of the garden. Then group warm season, long-growing crops together.

For the upcoming spring-summer months it's recommended:

March

Prepare garden soil for early planted vegetables. Plant tomato, pepper, eggplant seed in plant growing structures. Plant cool season crops.

April

Protect plants from cutworms and grubs. Throughout the cool season transplant to garden. Put in second planting of lettuce, radishes, onions, turnip greens and mustard. Prepare seed bed for warm season crops to be planted in May. Use shallow cultivation if weeds appear. Watch vegetables for disease and insect pests.

May

Plant and transplant warm season crops. Cultivate to control weeds. Spray or dust to control pests. Make second

planting of sweet corn, snap beans, etc. two weeks following first planting.

June

Make another planting of sweet corn. Continue cultivation and pest control. Irrigate if necessary.

Plant fast-maturing crops for fall garden such as radishes, lettuce, beets, carrots, cabbage, beans, summer squash, Chinese cabbage and cucumbers. Continue weed and pest control.

September

Sow fall lettuce, radishes, spinach. Harvest crops as they mature.

plan will cost and in setting up new required services for welfare recipients.

But Stephen Simonds, commissioner of the Assistance Payments administration, said most states probably will not reduce benefits because this lowers federal aid and state savings diminish rapidly.

"They're in a trap," Simonds said.

He added that states with reduced benefits probably would face strong objection from newly formed welfare-rights groups and other welfare supporters.

On the basis of a meeting with state welfare administrators here last week, federal officials reported the main concerns of the states are:

- The freeze imposed by Congress on federal contributions to the program of Aid for Families With Dependent Children; it means no federal funds will be available for a larger proportion of children in a state than were on the AFDC rolls January 1. In the first year alone, it's estimated 475,000 otherwise eligible children and parents would be unsupported by federal funds, costing the states 125 million dollars.





FARM IMPLEMENTS & TRACTORS

Price Index About Back To Year Ago Level

Prices received by Kansas farmers for products marketed at mid-February were considerably above January but slightly below February a year ago, according to the Kansas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service.

The all-farm products price index was 231 percent of the 1910-14 base period compared with 222 percent at mid-January and 233 percent last February.

Nearly all farm products were unchanged to higher than in mid-January except wheat and milk which declined slightly.

Crop Prices

The crop price index was 164 percent of the 1910-14 base period at mid-February, unchanged from January and compares with 178 in February 1967.

Wheat, at \$1.37 per bushel, was 1 percent below January and 10 cents below the previous year.

Corn averaged \$1.10 per bushel compared with \$1.07 last month and \$1.29 last year. Oats, at 77 cents per bushel, were 1 cent above January but 1 cent below last February. Barley brought \$1.01 per bushel, an increase of 1 cent over the previous month but 2 cents below February a year ago.

Sorghum grain averaged \$1.78 per cwt., up from \$1.69 in January but well below the \$1.87 last February.

Soybeans averaged \$2.50 per bushel, 7 cents above January but 17 cents below a year earlier.

Livestock Prices

The livestock and livestock products price index was 307 percent of the 1910-14 base at mid-February compared with 289 percent in January and 296 percent a year ago.

The meat animal price index was 363 percent of the 1910-14

base compared with 337 percent in January and 346 percent a year ago.

Hogs brought \$18.70 per cwt., \$1.40 above last month but 10 cents below a year earlier.

Beef cattle, at \$23.10 per cwt., were \$1.70 above last month and \$1.30 above last year. Steers and heifers brought \$24.60 per cwt., \$1.80 above January and \$1.60 above a year earlier. Calves averaged \$26.50 per cwt., compared with \$25.50 in January \$26.00 last year.

Lambs brought \$23.00 per cwt. compared with \$21.70 last month and \$19.80 last year.

Sheep, at \$6.00 per cwt., were 90 cents above January and unchanged from a year ago.

The dairy products price index stood at 309 percent of the 1910-14 base in February, down from the 311 percent last month but slightly above the 299 percent last year. The preliminary wholesale milk price, at \$5.25 per cwt., was 5 cents below Jan-

uary but 20 cents above February 1967.

Eggs averaged 20.9 cents per dozen, up 0.1 cent from January but slightly below the 23 cents a year ago.




