

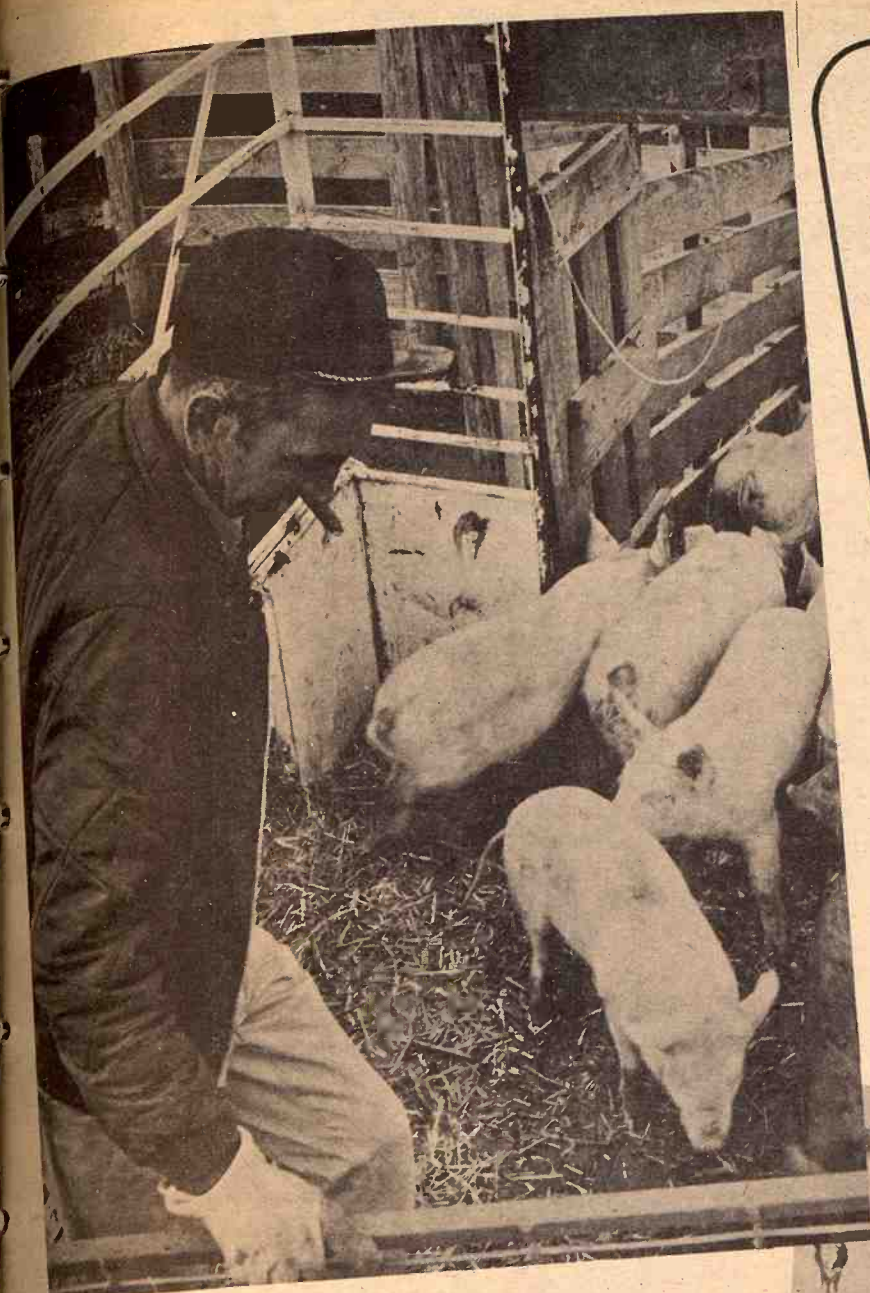

Bill Bruckner, from Delavan, unloads some pigs that he brought to sell at the Junction City Sale Barn.

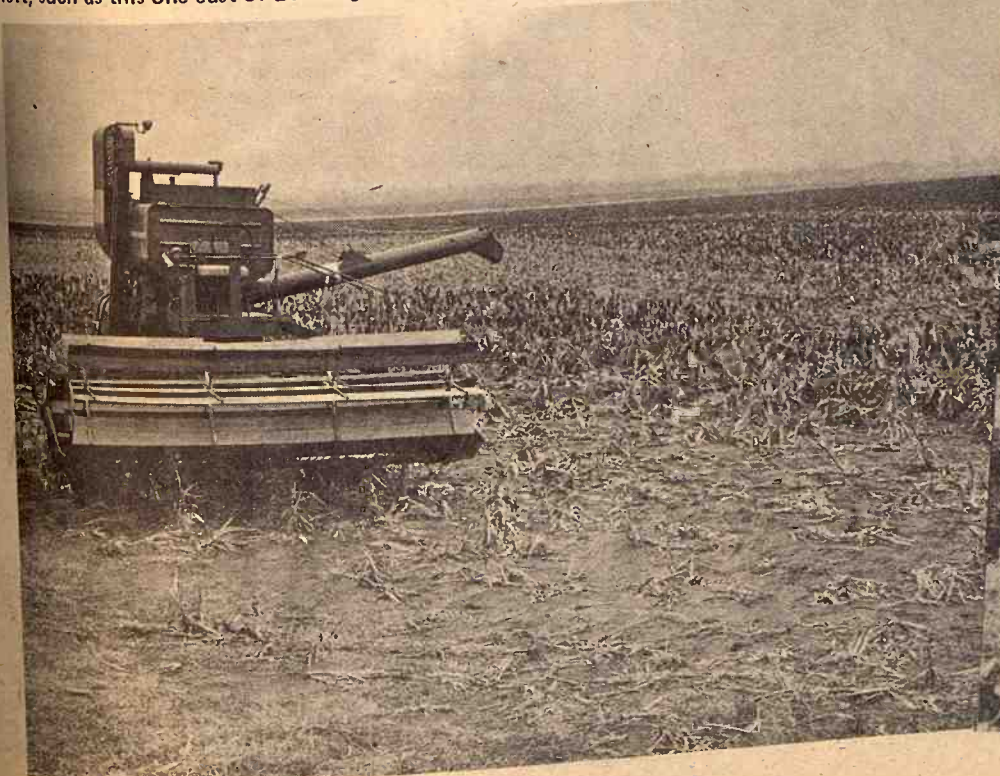


KEEPING THE FEEDER FILLED

May Ban 'On Farm Only' Tire Sales

The National Highway Traffic Safety Administration, has tentatively decided to put a total ban on the sale of automobile tires that do not comply with federal safety standards.

Present regulations permit the sale of such tires to farmers and others for use on vehicles that are not driven on public roads or highways. But stiff labeling requirements, in effect since last January, have failed to break up a thriving black market that has channeled thousands of them to unwary or indifferent car owners.

"There is no effective method available to insure that these tires

are not used on the nation's highways," the safety agency said recently in publishing the draft of a regulation barring their sale "for any purpose."

The regulation, if promulgated in its present form, will take effect next March 1. The agency invited interested persons to file comments in the meantime.

The tires are manufactured for general use but reclassified as fit only for non-highway purposes because of defects that keep them from passing federal safety tests.

The safety agency said more than 80,000 of the reclassified tires, intended for farm equipment, had

been sent by manufacturers to distributors and dealers since Dec. 1, 1970. This, the agency said, was "a much higher number than was believed necessary to satisfy the off-road market."

Gooch To Update Salina Feed Mill

Plans are nearing completion for modernizing the Gooch feed mill in Salina, Mervin R. Eighthy, president of Gooch Feed Mill corporation, has announced in Lincoln, Neb.

Eighthy also announced plans for a new Gooch feed manufacturing plant to serve markets east of the Mississippi river.

The facility will be constructed adjoining the Archer-Daniels-Midland company soybean plant at Decatur, Ill. Completion date for the new, nearly 200,000-ton-per-year plant is mid-1972. Ross W. Zumwalt, a vice president of Gooch Feed Mill corporation, will direct the new operations. Zumwalt is currently responsible for evaluating and implementing sales and production expansions for Gooch Feeds.

Construction of the new plant in Decatur is the second major expansion of Gooch Feed manufacturing facilities in the past year. A major expansion of the Lincoln, Neb., plant, which nearly doubled service capabilities, was officially dedicated in August, 1971. Eighthy also indicated plans are nearing completion for increasing and improving the feed manufacturing facilities at Emporia, Kansas.

The Gooch Feed Mill corporation presently serves the Oklahoma, Kansas, Missouri, Nebraska, Colorado, South Dakota and Iowa

markets through feed plants at Lincoln, Nebraska; Salina, Kansas and Emporia, Kansas.

The Gooch mill at Salina formerly was owned by J.J. Vanier, Salina industrialist, who sold it to Archer-Daniels-Midland. The Vanier family remains active in operation of Gooch facilities.

Plan To Cut Potato Acreage

Kansas growers of early summer potatoes will plant about 5 percent less acreage in 1972 as in 1971, if they

follow U.S. Department of Agriculture acreage marketing guides.

These recommendations are designed to reduce overall spring and early-summer potato acreage by 3 percent.

Planting guides suggested are voluntary acreages based on the prospective marketing situation.

This would amount to early-summer plantings of 1,330 acres in Kansas, points out the USDA's Consumer and Marketing Service.

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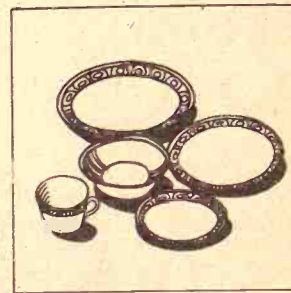

Black Bears In Southeast Kansas

COLUMBUS, Kan.—A black bear has been sighted by a motorist and his two passengers along K96 halfway between the Columbus and Crestline highway junction, according to game protector Tommie Crispino, Parsons, Kan.

Wayne Wilson, Parsons, telephoned Crispino Saturday and asked, "Are there bears in Kansas?" When Crispino told him some have been seen, Wilson said, "Then I want to report that I saw one last night. If I didn't have two witnesses to back up my story, I don't think I would say anything about it, it's so unbelievable."

Wilson, who is in the import business, was returning to Parsons

with two business associates, Mitch Carr, Staunton, Va., and Mer Vanderhoot, Ulmbrecht, Holland. According to Wilson, the animal appeared along the roadside in the headlights of his car, stood up on its hind legs, dropped to all four feet stood up again and dropped to the ground before disappearing into the darkness. Wilson said all three men got a look at the bear, estimating it stood about five feet and weighed

about 200 pounds.

There have been isolated reports of black bear in eastern Kansas, since Missouri released some a few years ago. Black bear have been found near Cherokee, 11 miles north of Columbus, in recent years. About six years ago, a bear was treed and shot in Douglas County.

They are thought to be shy of humans and are not believed to be harmful if left unmolested. Their

diets do not include livestock or humans, the game protector said.

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Kansas Packer Volume Up 19% In Past Year

Red Meat produced in Kansas slaughter plants during October totaled 159 million pounds, 4 percent more than in the same month a year ago, according to the Kansas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service.

Cumulative production for the first 10 months of 1971 totaled 1,509 million pounds, 19 percent more than in the same period last year.

Production of beef in October this year totaled 128 million pounds, 7 percent more than in October 1970.

There were 204,000 head of cattle slaughtered, compared with 189,000 last year.

Average liveweight per head was 1,060 pounds this year, compared with 1,065 in October 1970.

Cumulative beef production in the first 10 months of 1971 totaled 1,213 million pounds, 19 percent more than in the same period of 1970.

Pork production in October totaled 31 million pounds, down 7 percent from the year earlier.

There were 197,000 hogs slaughtered in October, compared with 206,000 a year earlier.

Average liveweight per head of the hogs slaughtered was 245 pounds, down 6 pounds from a year ago.

Lamb and mutton production totaled 16,000 pounds this year, compared with 15,000 a year ago.

Cumulative production for the first 10 months of 1971 was 229,000 pounds, more than double that a year earlier.

United States

Commercial production of red meat in the 48 States totaled 3,129 million pounds in October, 5 percent below a year earlier.

Commercial meat production includes slaughter in federally inspected and other slaughter plants, but excludes animals slaughtered on farms.

Beef production in October was 1,824 million pounds, 5 percent below October 1970.

Cattle kill totaled 3,009,700 head, down 4 percent from a year earlier. Liveweight per head was 1,019 pounds, 5 pounds less than last year.

There were 43 million pounds of veal produced during October, down 12 percent from 1970.

Number of calves slaughtered was 13 percent below a year earlier, but average liveweight was up 1 percent.

Pork production totaled 1,214 million pounds, 5 percent below a year ago.

Hog kill was down 7 percent from October 1970.

Liveweight per head was 238 pounds one pound less than last year.

Lard rendered per 100 pounds of liveweight was 8.0 pounds, com-

pared with 9.3 in October 1970.

There were 48 million pounds of lamb and mutton produced in October, unchanged from last year but 2 percent above last month.

Sheep and lambs slaughtered totaled 959,200 head, 1 percent less than last year. Average liveweight was 103 pounds, the same as last year.

Ft. Riley Finds Many Weapons, Crime Gear

FT. RILEY — An unannounced postwide inspection netted more than 75 unregistered guns and an assortment of other weapons struck a blow to the "would-be criminal

element" according to Maj. Gen. Edward M. Flanagan, commanding general of Ft. Riley.

Authorities said that in addition to the 75 unregistered pistols, rifles and shotguns, contraband confiscated included 22 switchblade knives, 53 other knives and assorted weapons such as clubs, brass knuckles and ice picks. Small quantities of drugs, marijuana and drug paraphernalia also were seized.

"This coordinated effort to locate contraband, equipment and weapons directly benefits the post population and surrounding communities," said Flanagan. "The would-be criminal element has received a setback from our inspection. Weapons that might be used in crimes have been confiscated."

"As this is a routine procedure, we have served notice that no one is

safe in keeping an illegal weapon (at Ft. Riley). The next unannounced inspection may come at any time."

Inspection teams checked automobiles, barracks, offices, mess halls, supply rooms and other areas of the post following a 7 a.m. muster last week. When a soldier's room or automobile had been searched by military police and commanders, he was cleared to return to normal duties.

Medical Society Backs Expulsion

The Kansas Medical society has reaffirmed support of a membership expulsion action taken by the Clay County Medical society.

The county society expelled Dr.

Ronald Strand on a variety of charges. He also has been removed from the staff of the Clay Center hospital. The Healing Arts board, after an investigation, suspended his license, subsequently reinstating it on the basis the doctor would continue to practice elsewhere.

"This necessary action has understandably, met mixed reaction in Clay Center," said Dr. Gerald Mowry, KMS councillor for the Council District involved. "But it was a medical problem handled ethically, legally and correctly; and, I firmly believe, in the best interests of the community."

"The council unequivocally feels the Clay Center doctors were correct in the steps they took," he continued. "Their first concern must be the health and well-being of the citizens they serve. That alone was their motivation in expelling Dr. Strand from membership."

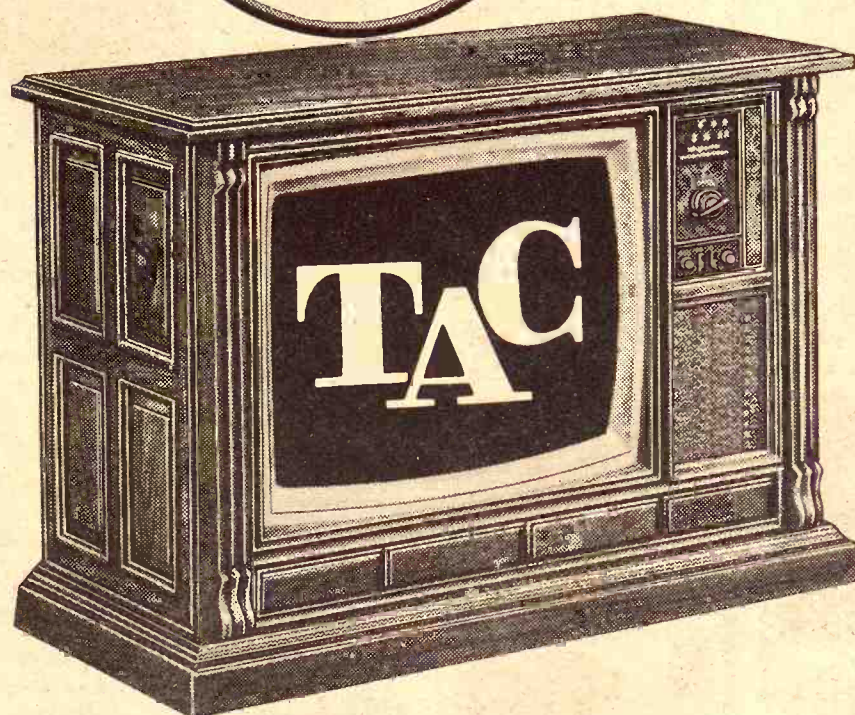
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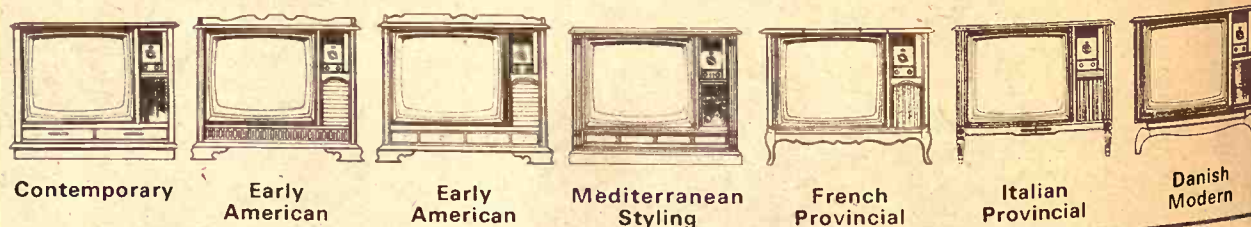

Farmland Speaker Sees More Co-op Marketing Effort

"The survival of the farm family depends upon sharing in the profits which a successful marketing

system can develop," Dr. William E. Black of Texas A&M University said at Kansas City last week.

And Black, extension economist for marketing and policy at the university, said successful marketing can be assured through cooperative organizations.

Black made the remarks in the opening session of the annual

meeting of Farmland Industries, Inc., a three-day convention which attracted about 13,000 persons from the Midwest and Southwest.

"Cooperatives in the '70s will perform more of the vital functions of marketing than just assembling and initial processing," he said.

"They will, in order to survive, relate more realistically to the open market and perform more product refinements, marketing and marketing services needed to win and keep a place in the market."

Black said "cooperative marketing of farm products and the procurement of needed equipment offers the greatest promise to the farmer or rancher."

"These cooperatives, though fewer in number by the end of the '70s, will handle a larger share of the total agricultural business."

Black said the most valuable asset a farmer or rancher can have "will be a firm market for each product he produces. The best place to find this asset is in his own marketing cooperative."

Ernest T. Lindsey, president of Farmland, said in his annual report total consolidated volume for the fiscal year that ended Aug. 31 was \$685 million.

Farmland is a regional farm supply cooperative headquartered in Kansas City that serves about 2,000 local farm cooperatives.

Job Gains In Wichita

The Boeing Co. has announced an increase of 666 workers employed

during November, bringing total employment at the plant at Wichita to 5,514.

The current figure is well up from the 4,204 low employment point reported in July.

Newly acquired government contracts were credited with the increase and cut in the project drop in employment after the Boeing SST program was dropped by Congress.

Employment at the Gates Learjet plant at Wichita also was reported up. Fifty employees were added in each of October and November.

Gates employment now totals 825 compared with 450 at mid-year.

However, total employment at all Wichita aircraft plants remains far below that of the start 1970.



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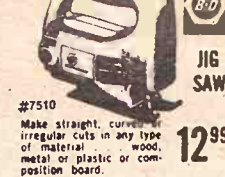

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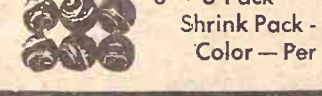
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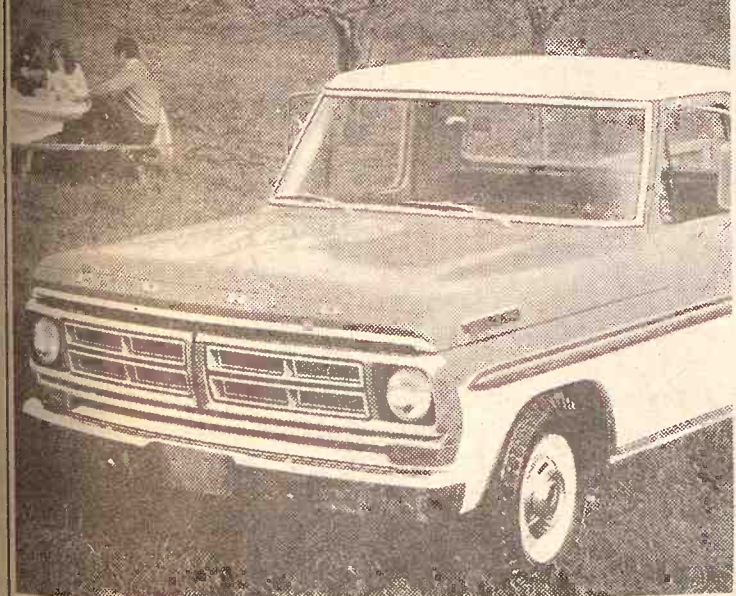
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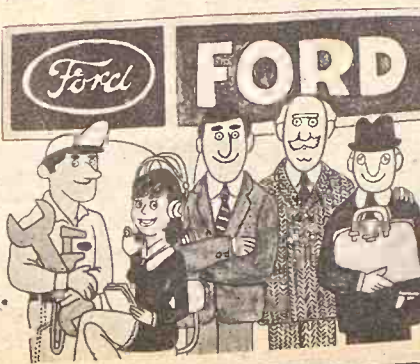


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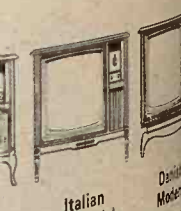


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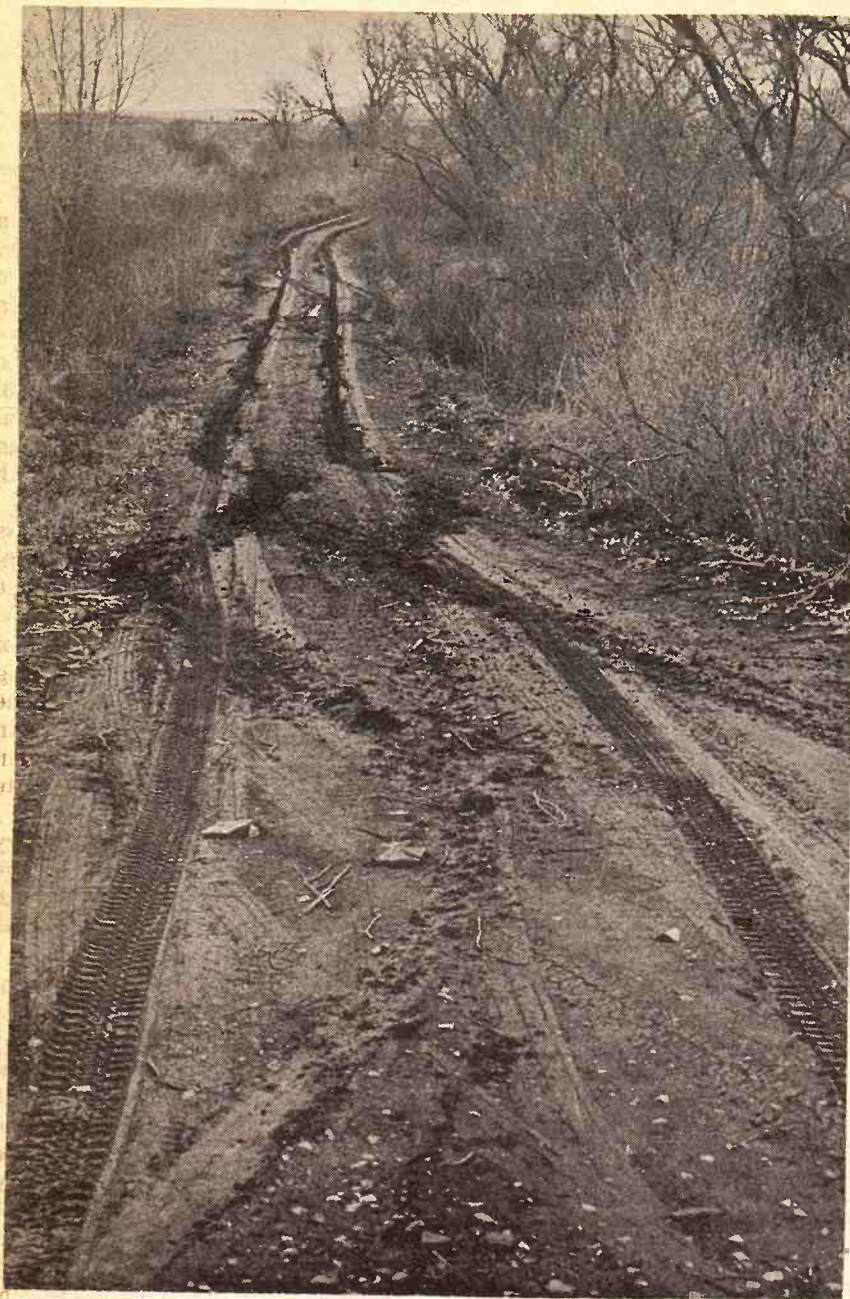
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SLIDING ROUND THE CORNER

Cattle Feeders Tour Into Georgia, Arkansas

Kansas cattle feeders will be heading for the warmer climates of Arkansas and Georgia February 27th thru March 2nd for their Fifth Annual "Feeders Tour". The tour will attempt to combine business with pleasure including visits to

some of the most famous livestock operations in Arkansas and Georgia as well as some of the most popular tourist attractions.

The tour, sponsored by the Cattle Feeders Council of the Kansas Livestock Association, is open to any stockman that wants to go along and reservations can be made through the Kansas Livestock Association office at 2044 Fillmore, Topeka, Kansas 66604.

The livestock portion of the tour will include stops at Winrock Farms at Morrilton, Arkansas owned by

Former Governor Winthrop Rockefeller, a 100 head yearling cattle grazing operation owned by Mr. Curtis Avery in Georgia and a 2,400 head commercial cow operation owned by Mr. George Berner also in Georgia.

Other stops on the tour will be the Horse Races at Hot Springs, Arkansas, Stone Mountain State Park at Atlanta, Georgia; as well as the Lockheed Georgia Corporation home of the world's largest plane, the C-5A.

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Roy Enters Bill On Farm Housing

Rep. Bill Roy, D-Kan., has introduced in Congress the Emergency Rural Housing Act of 1971, a bill designed to provide adequate housing for all rural Americans within five years.

Roy said in introducing the bill that almost two-thirds of the sub-standard housing in the United States is in rural areas.

The act would establish an Emergency Rural Housing Administration as an independent agency with the responsibility of providing housing to persons in rural areas and small communities who could not otherwise obtain housing.

The EHRA would make loans for acquisition of land and construction or improvement of housing facilities. Terms of the loan would be set according to the borrower's income.

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Healthier Men? Higher Death Rates Say No

After falling or leveling off for half a century, death rates for most American men rose in the late 1960s—dramatically so for younger whites and for nonwhites of almost all ages.

For example, according to a special federal study the death rate jumped 21 per cent among whites aged 15 to 19 in 1968, compared with the rate among those in that age group five years earlier. Among nonwhites at the same ages, the increase between 1963 and 1968 was 35 per cent.

The federal study disclosed these increases even though war combat deaths were excluded.

The study covered all other deaths of persons 15 years old and more between 1900 and 1968.

Aside from broad social significance, the findings of the federal report could have important specific bearing on medicine, insurance, Social Security and population estimates.

Word of the report, published by the National Center for Health Statistics, startled authorities

consulted about such implications. They expressed confidence in the center, but said they could not assess implications until they had seen and studied the report.

In addition to the death rate among most men, the findings showed that death rates among most women are much lower and are growing far more slowly—or not growing at all. The result is a growing female majority in the population.

The male death increases applied to all white adult age groups under 45—and to all nonwhite age groups under 65. The death rate among nonwhite men is as much as six times higher than among white women.

Detailed figures, broken down by age, sex, and race, have not yet been published for 1969 or 1970. But

authorities say preliminary figures suggest that death rates are continuing to increase, at least among younger men.

A principal effect of the rising male death rates has been to increase the deficit in adult men. For all ages, there now are about 95 men for every 100 women, the low point in a steady decline since 1910.

Then, with heavy immigration, there were about 106 men for every 100 women. In 1940 the numbers were nearly even.

While there were no generalized figures in the report, computation of percentages of changes produced the following findings:

- Car accidents were the biggest killer of young men, particularly among whites. Among whites aged 15 to 19 who died in 1968, almost half were crash victims. Among nonwhites, only 22 per cent of the deaths were in car accidents.

- Close behind in the list of principal causes of death among nonwhite youths was murder, accounting for 20 per cent. The figure among whites was 3 per cent. In 1963, the nonwhite figure was 16 per cent, the white figure 2 per cent.

- The suicide rate among nonwhite men in their late 20s had been substantially lower than among whites. But between 1962 and 1967, it increased 68 per cent and surged

ahead of the white rate.

- That jump was largely offset, in the total nonwhite suicide figure, however, by a 48 percent drop in suicides among nonwhite men in their early 60s.

The death rate report was written by A. Joan Klebba, chief of special mortality studies in the National Center for Health Statistics, an agency of the U.S. Public Health Service.

In a detailed interpretation, Miss Klebba offered a series of conclusions which included the following:

- Successively younger cohorts of white men are at higher risk of dying from lung cancer. For example the lung cancer death rate for persons in their late 50s was higher in 1967 than it had been for persons in their late 60s in 1952.

- The death rate for circulatory diseases increased among every age group in 1967 as compared with 1952. Among white men between 50 and 65 the rate almost doubled.

- Nonwhite male death rates for cirrhosis of the liver climbed steeply between 1960 and 1967, particularly among younger men. While this disease commonly is associated with alcoholism, Miss Klebba cited evidence that it is also associated with low income and, possibly, dietary deficiencies.

- While the death rate for white men pedestrians has generally fallen since 1952, it has gone up for most nonwhite men.

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\$25 Hogs By Next July?

An agricultural marketing economist expects \$20 to \$21 per hundredweight market hog prices to hold through December, and the market to advance to a \$25 high next July.

Dr. R. L. Coppersmith of Kansas State University spoke at the First National Bank of Omaha's annual Beef Cattle Forum.

He carried his forecast into the fall of 1972 and said he did not look for prices to fall back to 1971 lows.

He forecast "reasonably steady" prices on fed cattle during the next 60 to 90 days, with choice 1,000-pound steers selling at about \$33 with short periods of gain "perhaps as much as \$1 higher."

However, he said, "with placements up 13 per cent in October, and there is reason to believe farmers will continue placements at a high level, prices will probably experience a drop of as much as \$2 in the late March-April period."

For the summer and fall of 1972, his projection was that cattle prices would recover back to the \$33 level.

Dr. Coppersmith said he could see no weakness in feeder cattle prices during the next few months.

"Light 200 to 300 pound calves will continue in the high \$40 range with heavier calves in the 400-500 pound range fluctuating in the \$37-\$39 range," he said. "Heavier feeder steers will hold in the \$34-\$35 range."

By next fall, he added, "you can look for feeder cattle to drop by as much as \$2 per hundred."

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Share Of Food Markets A New 'Right?'

A drift in world thought that could be tremendously important to the American farmer, the grain trade and all agribusiness was in evidence at the 16th biennial session of the Food and Agriculture Organization (FAO) of the United Nations in Rome. The 3-week session ended November 26.

What surfaced was that the underdeveloped nations of the world want export markets for their products, and since they are primarily agricultural producers they are talking about agricultural products.

This in itself would be of no great moment, as trade in farm products has existed since one man was able to produce a surplus over his own family's needs. But the lesser developed countries indicate much more than this. They are demanding access to markets in the industrialized nations and they say these markets should, in effect, be allocated to them as part of their development programs.

To put it bluntly, the lesser developed countries were saying to nations like the United States, "You should produce less and thereby deliberately let us into your markets, and at prices which will give us a profit."

Of course, they did not put it that bluntly. The key phrase here was agricultural adjustment. These are not new words for America, but they were given a much wider application here than in the States.

In the United States, agricultural adjustment means primarily production control, generally through acreage reduction. Among the lesser developed countries at FAO, it has meant increasing agricultural production, access to new markets in the rich developed countries, employment for rural people, and in general a better life for mankind.

The Food and Agriculture organization, which had its origin in the United States in 1945, serves as a forum for the nations of the world to discuss the international agricultural problems. Primarily, the problems have been of feeding the hungry.

The organization also has a budget which it can use in aiding needy countries through technical assistance. The regular budget is \$6 million dollars for the next 2 years. In addition, it administers funds from other sources. These funds have amounted to about 100 million dollars a year during the 1970-71 biennium. The United States supplies about 31 percent of the total

funds. No other nation supplies more than 8 percent.

FAO now has 125 member nations, with the lesser developed countries far outnumbering those that are called developed. When reference is made to the developed or rich nations, usually the United States, Canada, Western Europe, Oceania and Japan are indicated.

Every member nation has a right to speak at FAO sessions, and most of them take advantage of this privilege. The United States had the largest delegation made up of men and women from the Agriculture, State, and Commerce departments who are experts in their fields and knowledgeable in world affairs. They are fully aware of the implications of the proposed world agricultural adjustment.

World Agricultural Adjustment, incidentally, is to be the theme of the next FAO biennial session to be held in Rome in 1973. Americans should get used to the phrase, because it is certain to be a major world issue.

I attended 10 days of this year's FAO session as a member of the U.S. delegation, officially described as an advisor. Frankly, my participation consisted entirely of listening.

From listening to countless speeches in many tongues of the world (but all translated into English), I developed certain conclusions. Admittedly, others more experienced in international

affairs might have other conclusions which more accurately reflect the feeling of the conference.

But to me, the primary trend in the session was that toward the demand for access to markets in the industrialized nations. Ironically, in a session at an organization which I had assumed had at least the initial purpose of seeking ways to feed the hungry in the world, the priority at the 1971 session was on market outlets for the lesser developed countries.

Yet hunger still exists and with the population explosion, the problem may be compounded in years to come. The great current hope is in the Green Revolution which for some countries, at least, is "buying time."

But country after country, day after day, in the Rome session, in

position statements, told of plans first to become self-sufficient and then to enter the export market. In almost every instance, they referred to the access of markets as a "right" that should be accorded the poorer nations.

One of the basic reasons for the anxiety of the developing countries and those trying to help them in the effort to find markets at stable prices for the agricultural products they have for export is the projection that there will be an additional 400 million people in the rural areas of Asia, Africa and Latin America by 1985.

Unless ways are found to keep them on the land, producing food either for domestic consumption or export, they will flock to the already overcrowded cities with their masses of unemployed and underemployed. Many people —

sociologists, economists, demographers — believe this trend could build up social and political pressures leading to violence.

Americans, steeped in the tradition of free enterprise, will find these proposals difficult to understand. They run counter to anything we have ever considered. After all, any country has the right to export if it can find a buyer at its price.

Despite this tradition, there may be areas where the poorer nations can make a case. Europe, for instance, might produce more proteins and less sugar and let the tropical countries grow more sugar cane.

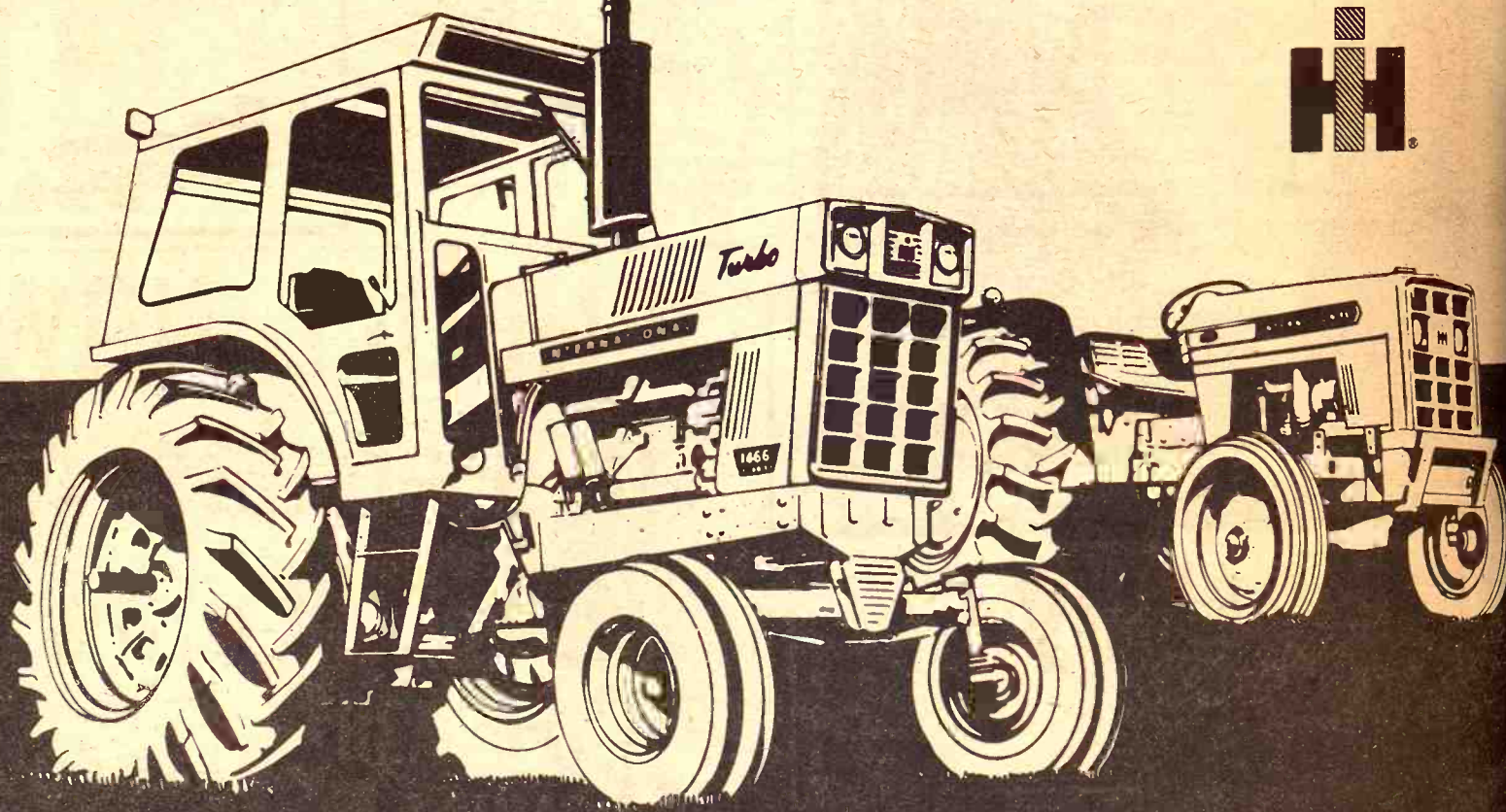
It is in such areas that discussions may take place in the years ahead. But the problem appears terribly difficult. Before the session ended, the delegates from the lesser developed nations were beginning to recognize some of these difficulties, but they knew they had planted seeds for world digestion.

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Wabaunsee Co. Closes Three Bridges

ALMA—Wabaunsee County commissioners have closed three key bridges in the county after an engineering survey found them inadequate by federal inspection standards.

The bridges are all on Federal Assistance Secondary (FAS) routes. Eugene Durr, county engineer, said one bridge is located a half mile south of Hessdale, another at Bradford southeast of Eskridge and the third at Chalk Mound in southern Wabaunsee County. The firm of Cook, Platt and Strobel from Topeka made the survey.

The engineers found such things as rivets missing, abutments deteriorating, structures beginning to move laterally and metal rusted badly, Durr said. He estimated it would take \$130,000 to replace the three bridges, and, "with federal specifications rough," six months to do surveying and planning for new structures.

Durr said traffic on the roads will be handled in the meantime by building bypasses through the streams with county equipment. He added that during heavy spring rains such construction probably would be short-lived.

Walter Wilkinson, county commissioner, said the problem could be compounded with the Federal Bridge Inspection Law requiring the county to inspect all bridges on federal assistance routes by next April.

Durr said there are 70 bridges on

FAS routes in the county. He said in addition there are 142 other bridges in the county that county officials want inspected. On township roads these structures vary from 10 to 100 feet in length.

Durr and Wilkinson are concerned from a safety standpoint that the bridges might be inadequate. Both men said school buses routinely run over the bridges.

Most of the township road bridges have load limits of four tons; the newer school buses weigh slightly over that, Durr said.

He added that much of the problem stems from running modern machinery over bridges built for horse and buggy days. "Farmers take tons and tons over them," he said.

New Health Group Not Under Insurance Wing

A proposed Health Maintenance Organization (HMO) is not subject to state insurance laws, Atty. Gen. Vern Miller said in an opinion.

In response to an inquiry from Fletcher Bell, state insurance commissioner, Miller said an HMO also would not be subject to state law regulation under the nonprofit Medical and Hospital Service Act

(Blue Cross-Blue Shield).

The question arose after the Atchison, Topeka and Santa Fe Memorial Hospital, Topeka, was awarded a grant by the U.S. Department of Health, Education and Welfare to prepare a plan for the operation of an HMO.

Bell asked whether operation of an HMO would constitute transaction of the business of insurance as outlined by Kansas law.

Citing an opinion by former Atty. Gen. John Anderson Jr., Miller said the key to determining whether the operation falls within the jurisdiction of the state insurance code is whether the overall purpose of a particular contract is indemnity or service.

"We concur in those opinions, and applying them to the furnishing of health services proposed by the health maintenance organization, we cannot but conclude that, as set forth in your letter, the proposed operation would not constitute the transaction of insurance," Miller said.

The attorney general also said an HMO could not be subject to the statutes governing Blue Cross-Blue contemplate "an organization not contemplate "an organization not

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directly responsible for dispensing services at a single facility but rather one which contracts with numerous medical dispensing units."

The HMO contemplated by the Topeka Hospital would be a non-profit organization providing health services for members making a regular prepayment.

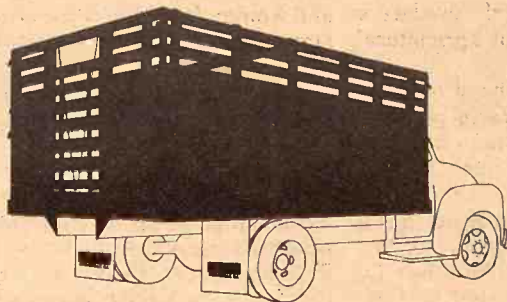
It would provide medical care and services for sickness and accident to

its members with emphasis on preventive medical services through outpatient treatment.

Plans are to provide all services at the hospital, utilizing physicians either employed by the HMO or physicians who have contractual arrangements to work with it.

It would not provide indemnity for services rendered by any other doctor or hospital.

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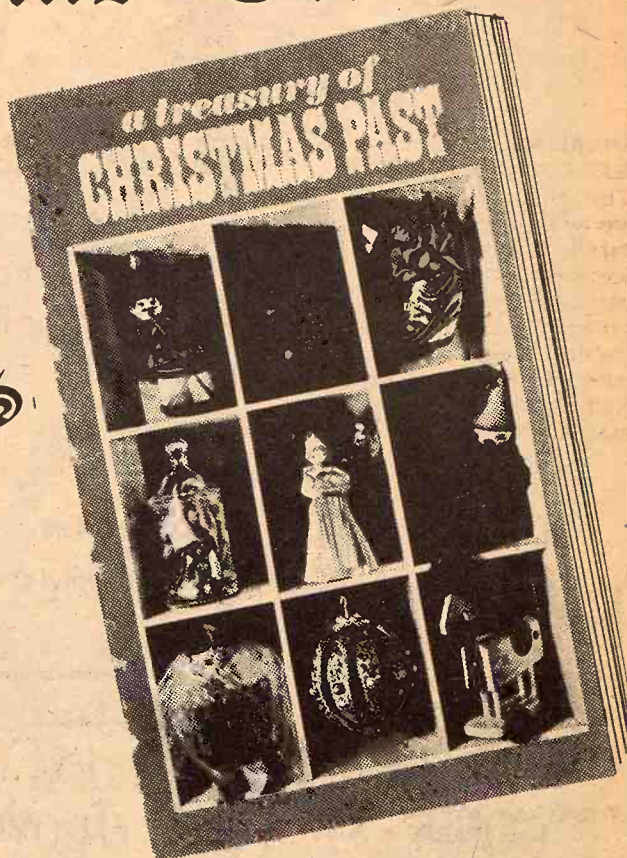

In saucepan combine fruit juices, lemon juice, cornstarch, cinnamon and allspice. Cook, stirring constantly till thickened. Cool slightly. In a bowl combine fruits and sauce. Serve warm or cold. Makes six servings.

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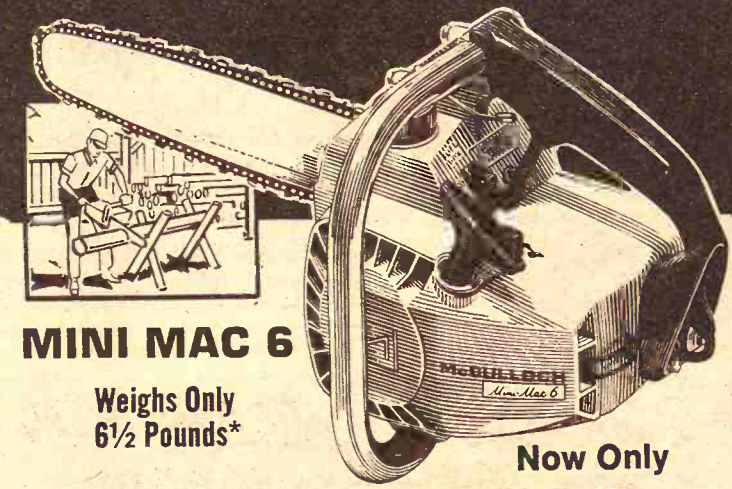


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Herington's City Manager Vote Legally OK

A March 9 city election which approved a commission-city manager form of government for Herington has been ruled valid by Dickinson County District Judge A. B. Fletcher Jr., Junction City.

The court was asked by county clerk Mrs. Marie Sullivan to validate the election, which was challenged by the city of Herington because it had been called by Mrs. Sullivan, instead of Mayer Richard Hager.

Herington voters approved the commission-manager government by a 668 to 317 vote in the March 9 election. In a subsequent election April 6, called by Hager, approval was 788 to 333.

Fletcher ordered the present city commission to reorganize itself into a commission-city manager form of government as provided by law. No time limit was set to carry out the directive because there is no Kansas statute covering such a situation, the judge said.

Petitions calling for the city manager election were filed Feb. 8 with city clerk Mary Mullin and were ruled valid by her the next day.

State law requires the mayor to set an election date within 10 days after

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certification of a valid petition.

The lawsuit stated that former utilities commissioner Claud Thompson Jr. on Feb. 9 asked that no official action be taken on the petitions because they didn't state what type of city manager government was requested.

Mrs. Sullivan set the election date as county election officer when Hager failed to call the election

within 10 days. She had consulted with Secretary of State Mrs. Shanahan, who is Kansas' election officer.

A legal notice announcing the manager election was published Mrs. Sullivan on Feb. 25. On March 3, 23 days after the petitions were certified, Hager proclaimed an April 6 election, according to lawsuit.

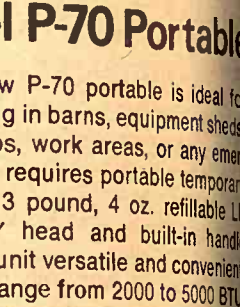

BRUESTLYTIC Brooder Problems

As your community look bare that most of the American elms have been cut out?

Communities from the eastern toward the Rocky Mountains are faced with the dilemma of replacing their tall, graceful American elms.

Now, the oaks are threatened by a fungus that resembles Dutch Elm disease. Oak wilt infects the red oak of oaks. Its movement is faster than Dutch Elm disease, but species is endangered.

Many of you remember the chestnut? What makes happen to our shade trees? One of the most important causes

of these epidemics is that we overplant a simple species in our landscape. Dutch Elm disease would never have been a major problem if our grandparents had planted a diversity of species.

Certainly, the elms were planted because they are fast growing. They should have used many slower growing trees with the elms, rather than planting entire cities to elms. This would have aided in avoiding the wholesale removal of our city trees today.

Western Kansas is suffering today because Siberian elms have been so widely planted. This time disease is not causing the problem. The Siberian elms are being attacked by throngs of Elm leaf beetles, which nearly defoliate the trees each year.

The loss of the Siberian elms in western Kansas will, indeed, be a sorrowful plight, because relatively few preventive measures are being taken.

Now is the time for community action! An inventory should be made concerning the species percentage and quality of the existing trees. Plans should be made for planting a diversity of tree species to take the place of these elms.

Many good trees will grow in western Kansas. These should be planted now and the elms removed once the new plantings are established.

Each member of the community is responsible for providing a legacy for future generations.

Now Is Time To Plan Farm Pond

If you're thinking about a farm pond, fall is a good time to become serious about it.

With work loads easing up, a rancher can utilize this period to make plans without much interruption.

Dr. Clenton E. Owensby, assistant professor of range management at Kansas State University, says that the most important consideration is the watershed area.

If there is not enough drainage space, the pond will dry up and not provide a dependable source of water. The pond area, particularly the bottom, should consist of some clay to prevent leakage. If clay is not available, bentonite — a chemical — or plastic may be used as a seal.

Owensby warns that both of these materials are fairly expensive and are sometimes used only for small

ponds.

In eastern Kansas, the pond should be at least 10 feet deep. Owensby recommends at least a 14-foot deep pond for western Kansas, pointing out that the deeper the pond the less surface area per unit of volume is exposed to air for evaporation.

He also suggests a 3:1 slope for the downstream side of the dam and a 2:1 slope for the upstream side. The upstream side should be riprapped with rock to keep the face of the dam from washing.

A clay core in the center of the dam will provide a seal between the dam and the soil beneath. The

spillway should be three to four feet below the top of the dam and seeded to grass to prevent washing.

A trickle tube one foot below the top of the spillway will keep water from oozing. This damages the spillway.

A fence for the pond area is recommended, although an opening may be designed for livestock watering. Better yet, install a draw-down tube and watering tank below the dam during construction and fence off the entire area.

Livestock will muddy the pond water, lowering its quality. Provide a way to shut off tank water so better grazing distribution can be attained.

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Labor Prices Itself Out Of Jobs

The chairman of President Nixon's Council of Economic Advisers has warned that labor is in danger of pricing itself out of the market in nations all over the world.

In a speech delivered at the 34th annual dinner of the Tax Foundation in New York, Paul W. McCracken—who has resigned effective at the end of the year—said that “we must candidly face the obvious fact that the relentless tendency of wage and salary rates to drive upward at rates which markedly exceeded any reasonable expectation about on-going gains in productivity is the single greatest reason for excessive rates of unemployment in many industrial nations today.”

McCracken, who received the Tax Foundation's award for distinguished public service, gave a broad-brush review of the economic scene from the perspective of his nearly three years' service as the eighth chairman of the council.

“Faced with sharp declines in profits after taxes (including the inventory valuation adjustment) per unit of output,” McCracken said, “a decline of 36 per cent for the United States economy from 1967 to the third quarter of 1971, employers are forced to be extremely cautious about additions to payrolls, and those at the outer margins of the labor market have been particularly hard hit by this process.”

McCracken predicted that stronger consumer demand will soon push industry into spending substantially more for inventory and new plants and equipment. “The economy is stronger than sentiment about the economy,” McCracken said.

Business will be forced to rebuild inventories which have been depleted by an encouraging pace of retail sales, he said. Retail buying has been climbing since January at a 12½ per cent annual rate, he said in prepared remarks. Even when items recently in high demand like automobiles and lumber are eliminated from consideration, the economist said, the retail volume has been gaining at a 7 per cent rate. “These are strong gains,” McCracken said.

“They represent a fairly typical process by which the operating rate for the economy is thus moved up to the zone where a growing number of companies begin to activate plans to improve and enlarge their

production facilities.

It is clear that there will have to be substantial increases in inventories to service the enlarged volume of sales. As the economic expansion continues, and confidence in its staying power becomes stronger, it is reasonable to expect some enlargement of stocks as needed inventories rise in response to higher sales,” he said.

Meanwhile, in other developments at the meeting, Rep. Martha W. Griffiths (D-Mich.) attacked spiralling costs of pensions for public employees and a Treasury department official, in guarded fashion, supplied some additional details of the administration's plan for a broad overhaul of the nation's private pension system.

Speaking to the conference by telephone from Washington, Mrs. Griffiths said that “it is totally unfair in my judgement to give a public worker a pension after 20 or 30 years of work that is so high that you are ineffect paying for a job to be done two or three times. At some point, she said that specific reference (among other cities) to pension awards in New York City and state, “a sensible set of rules setting forth how much the public can finance in retirement benefits

will simply have to be arrived at.”

The Treasury official, Gilbert Rudney, assistant director of the Office of Tax Analysis, said that Washington's prime concern would be to protect older workers from loss of pension benefits, should they be forced to change jobs. By the government's calculations—which are controversial among pension experts—most workers today do not have “vested” pensions, in other words the right to collect benefits whether or not the employee is working for the company at the time of retirement.

According to Rudney, a key provision of the reform plan would be what he called a “rule of 50”—that is any worker with at least three years on the job whose combined age and years of services totaled 50, would have a contractual right to half his pension. In each of five years thereafter, he said, an additional 10 percent of the benefits would be vested. Thus, a 40-year-old worker with 10 years on the job would have 50 percent vesting, and by age 45 would be fully vested. Rudney maintained that the cost of implementing such a requirement would be limited—he estimated about 1.5 cents an hour for each worker covered by a private pension plan.

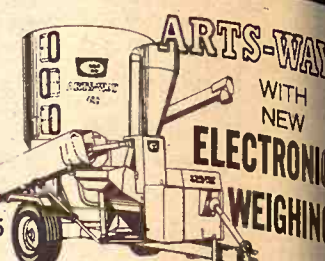

The percentage of very young

from 1757 to 2519. In 1964 the per-
centage of very young farmers to the
total was under two percent but five
years later the number of farmers
was nearly three percent of the total.

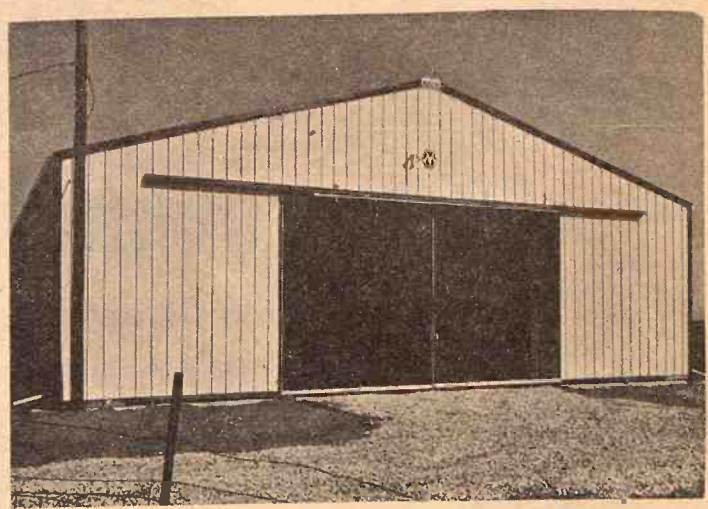

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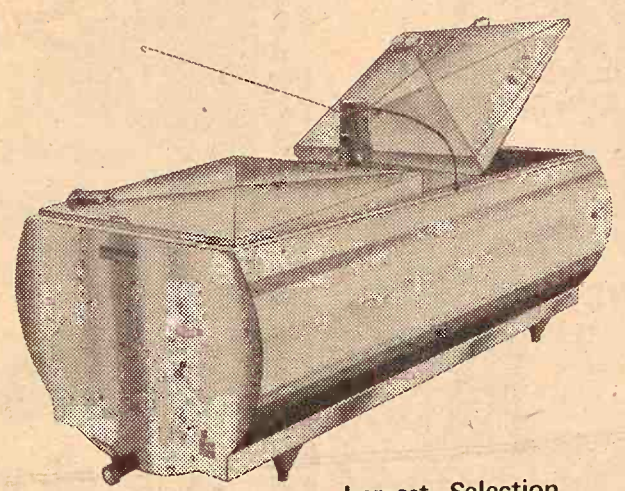
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Programs Aim To Hold Off Surpluses

U.S. farmers are being asked to reduce production from 1971 record levels to head off surpluses that could come back to haunt them.

That, in a nutshell, is what the governments' 1972 feed grain program is all about, says Dr. Roy Frederick, Extension economist at Kansas State University. Another production year like 1971 will in-

crease the surplus stocks of feed grains and depress farmer-received prices, he contends.

"Since both low prices and large surpluses are undesirable in an election year, the Nixon administration will attempt to alleviate these twin evils as soon as possible," he believes. "This is reflected in the provisions of the 1972

program."

Frederick says the government hopes to have a feed grain set-aside of 38 million acres in 1972, more than double this year's 18.2 million acres.

With average growing conditions, the 1972 corn crop would total about 4.5 billion bushels, considerably under this year's 5.4 billion bushels.

"Direct costs to the government will increase next year because more land will be taken out of production and farmers must be compensated for reduced production," says the KSU economist.

Estimates are that total direct subsidies for feed grains will be nearly \$2 billion, compared to \$1.2 billion in 1971.

Frederick explains that a 1972 feed grain crop similar to this year's would not cause prices to drop 30 percent from summer highs — as was the case this fall — because the price support program provides a price floor.

Specifically, the 1972 feed grain program:

1—raises the feed grain set-aside to 25 percent of the base (20 percent this year),

2—boosts set-aside payments (40 cents per bushel for corn from 32 cents this year),

3—brings barley into the feed grain program,

4—adjusts loan levels for grain sorghum and barley (consistent with the feeding value of corn),

5—extends farm stored grain resale provisions,

6—offers farmers two new options to set aside additional acreage beyond the minimum qualifying 25 percent, and

7—allows farmers to plant soybeans to protect the feed grain base or wheat allotment.

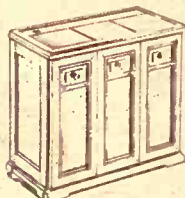

So if your evidence points to low humidity, investigate getting a West

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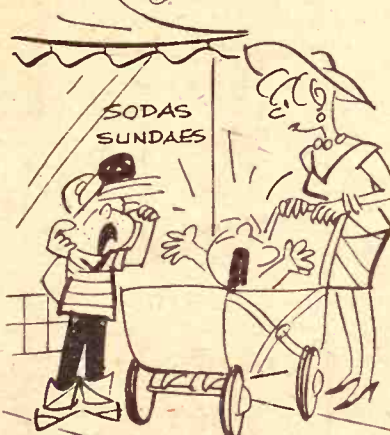


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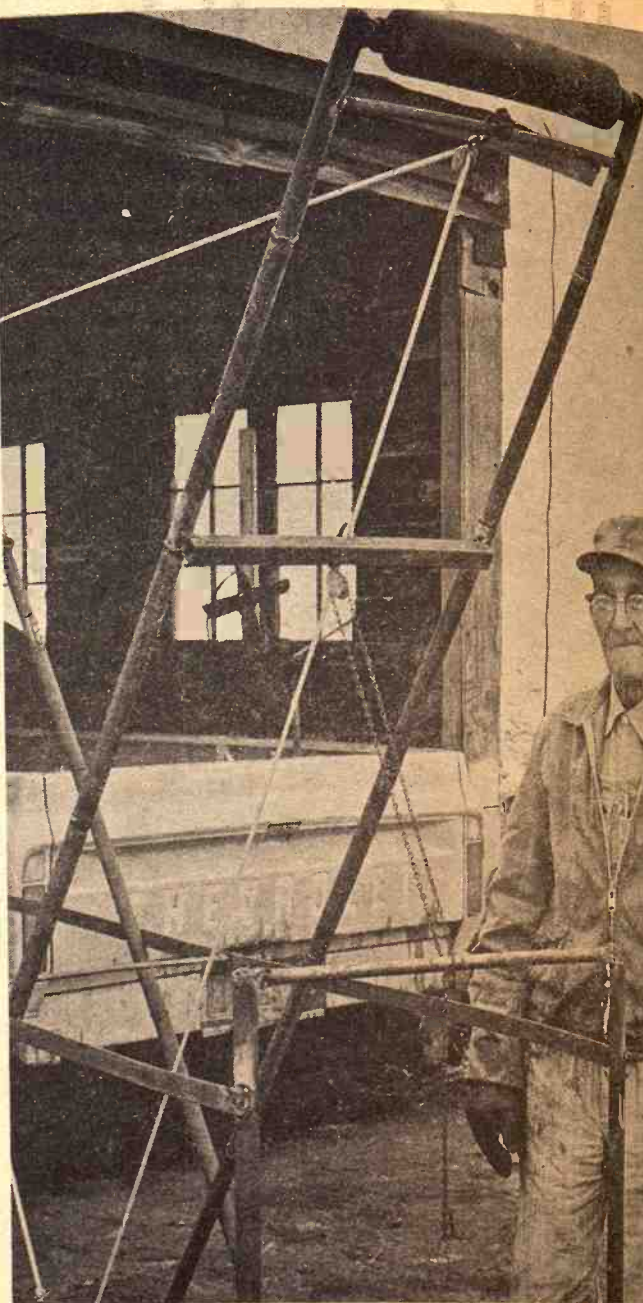
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INVENTION FOR PLASTERBOARD

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Beef, Milo Gains Help Farm Price Index

Prices received by Kansas farmers at mid-November 1971 were up moderately from November last, according to the Kansas Crop Livestock Reporting Service. The index of prices received for all

farm products was 262 percent of the 1910-14 base period, compared with 256 the previous month and 245 in November last year.

Principal increases from last month were in beef cattle, calves, sorghum grain and hay, while

principal decreases were in soybeans, seeds and hogs.

Compared with a year ago prices for beef cattle, calves and hogs were up considerably while prices for wheat, corn, sorghum grain and eggs down.

Crop Prices

The crop price index was 156 percent of the 1910-14 base period at mid-November, 2 points above a month ago but 9 points below a year ago.

Wheat at mid-November averaged \$1.29 per bushel, the same as the previous month but 6 cents below November last year.

Corn was worth \$1.06 per bushel, 3 cents above a month earlier but 21 cents below a year earlier.

Barley at 94 cents per bushel was unchanged from last month but 3 cents above a year ago.

Sorghum grain brought \$1.64 per cwt., compared with \$1.58 in October 1971 and \$1.92 in November 1970.

Soybeans were worth \$2.78 per bushel, 11 cents below the previous month and 1 cent below the previous year.

Livestock Prices

The livestock and livestock products price index at mid-November was 385 percent of the 1910-14 base period, compared with 371 the previous month and 335 a year earlier.

The meat animal price index was 467 percent in November, 18 points

above October 1971 and 78 points above November 1970.

Beef cattle brought \$31.20 per cwt., \$1.70 above the previous month and \$5.30 above the previous year.

Hog prices averaged \$19.00 per cwt., 80 cents below a month earlier but \$3.80 above a year earlier.

The dairy price index was 349 in November, compared with 347 last month and last year.

A preliminary wholesale milk price of \$5.85 was 5 cents below the previous month and 15 cents below the previous year.

Eggs averaged 22 cents per dozen, 1 cent above a month earlier, but 4 cents below a year earlier.

Prices Paid

Prices paid by farmers for protein supplements and mixed feeds were unchanged or slightly lower than a year ago.

United States

The index of prices received by the Nation's farmers for farm products at mid-November was 290 percent of the 1910-14 base period, up 3 points from mid-October and up 20 points from November 1970.

Prices were higher than in October for beef cattle, calves, milk, barley, hay and eggs.

Price decreases from October were noted for hogs, lambs, corn, rye and soybeans.

The index of prices paid by farmers for commodities and services (including interest, taxes and wage

rates) was 415, up 1 point from mid-October and 20 points above a year ago.

The parity ratio in November was 70, up 1 point from October 1971 and 2 points above November 1970.

Union Hindrance At Stockyards

Six major stockyards in the Midwest were hampered by a strike of operating employees last week.

Included were Sioux City, St. Paul, Fargo, Sioux Falls, Indianapolis and Milwaukee, all members of United Stockyards Corp., Chicago. At issue is the desire by members of the striking union, Amalgamated Meat Cutters and Butcher Workmen, AFL-CIO, to negotiate for all of the yards in a package, rather than individually.

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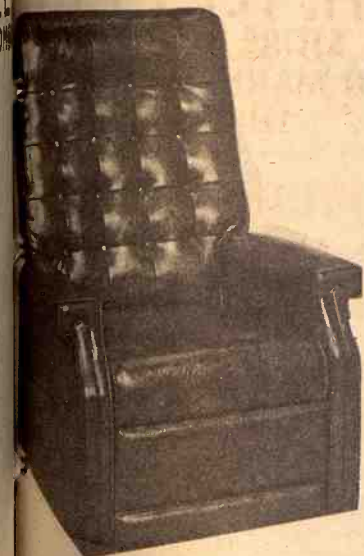

Wichita Owns Allis Hotel On Paper Only

In spite of the city's ostensible purchase of the Allis Hotel in downtown Wichita, the city does not and will not own the hotel, John Dekker, city attorney, said.

"It's really a paper recording of the sale," Dekker said. "We own the land, subject to the prior mortgage, and taxes. The sheriff won't give us a deed until we satisfy (pay) the

taxes and mortgages, and we're not going to satisfy them."

The "sale" was made at a Sedgwick County sheriff's auction to satisfy a court judgment of \$4,481 for nonpayment of water bills. Since no other bidders were present, Arthur G. Johnson, representing the city, made a bid for \$8,126. That amount included about \$3,000 in unpaid taxes plus interest and costs.

Dekker said the city bid was made for the amount of indebtedness. He said Johnson did not need authorization from the city to make the bid because doing so is merely a standard procedure for an attorney

who is trying to collect a debt. Dekker said that because the purchase still is subject to mortgages totaling about \$500,000 the city really owns only a very small interest in the hotel unless it should decide to pay off the mortgages. He said the purchase actually will "have the same effect as having a lien against the building." He said this means the owner, Gotham Hotels, Ltd., New York, cannot sell the building without paying the indebtedness to the city.

The hotel chain has one year in which to recover the hotel from the city by paying the water bill. Dekker

fully expects Gotham will do just that. The Allis was scheduled for another sheriff's sale Oct. 3 to satisfy a \$363 court judgment to

Wichita Coca Cola Bottling Co., Inc., but Gotham sent a check to cover the debt a few days before the sale.

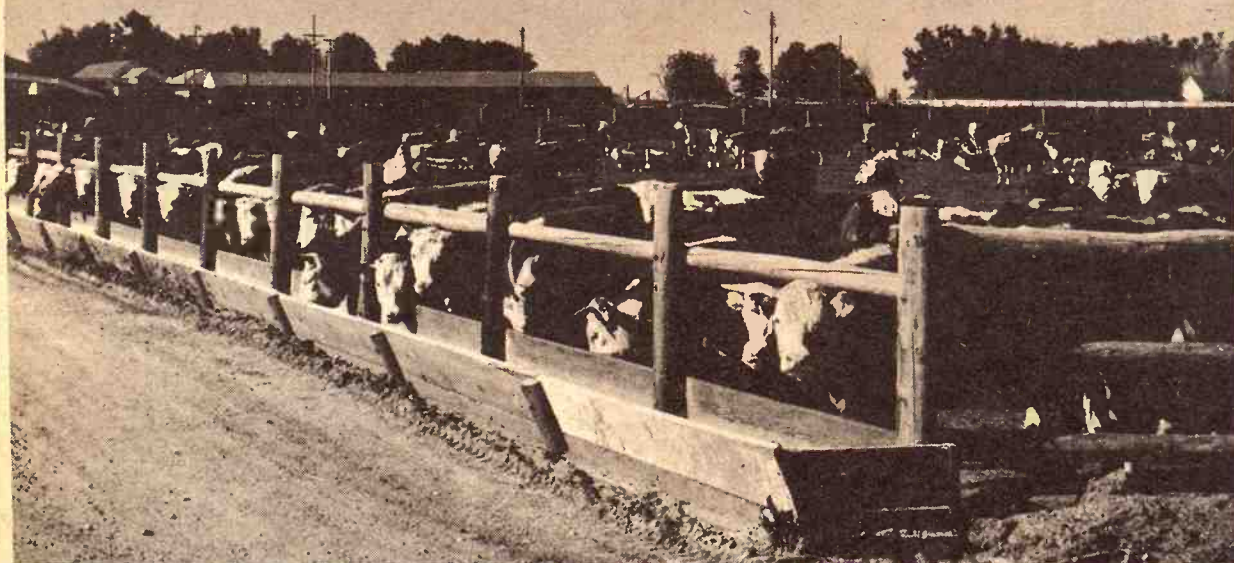

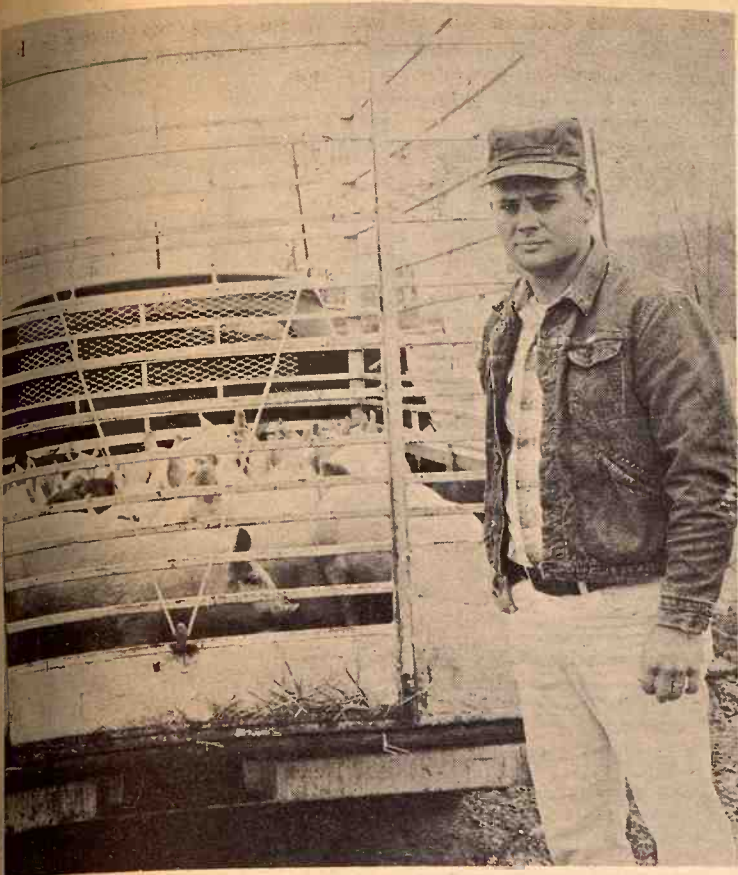

Farmland Able To Finance Most Of Its Own Expansion, Reduce Bank Debt

Farmland Industries, Inc., Kansas City-based co-operative which did \$685.6 million of business in the fiscal year ended Aug. 31, continues to add to its facilities for the expansion needed to generate additional business.

Sales in the latest fiscal year increased \$55.8 million and additions to facilities aggregated \$45.4 million. In the previous year sales were up \$89 million and additions were \$25.7 million.

The largest part of the capital outlays was for more efficient operation, higher quality products and replacements.

A breakdown showed that 17 per cent went for oil production and refining; 68 per cent for fertilizer

plants (principally the phosphate complex at Green Bay, Fla., and the nitrogen plant at Lawrence, Kan.) 4 per cent for feed mills and 11 per cent for marketing facilities and other capital expenditures.

At fiscal year end Farmland had commitments for plant and equipment of about \$20 million.

About \$43.6 million was generated internally from savings (net income), depreciation and depletion and was sufficient to finance most of the facility growth last year.

In addition to generating funds internally for facility growth plus security sales, the cash flow was \$58.9 million, which permitted a substantial reduction in bank debt.

Net savings (net income) after

income taxes for the fiscal year ended Aug. 31 were \$19,675,000, up from \$18,114,000. Patronage refunds in cash and certificates totaled \$16.1 million, or \$2.3 million greater than in the previous year.

The higher earnings resulted from greater petroleum, feed and fertilizer unit volume purchases by local co-operatives and improved processing margins on hogs and beef. The volume generated a 9.4 per cent increase in gross profits which more than offset the impact of higher crude oil costs and the inflationary squeeze from other operating expenses.

Aussies See Shortage Of Beef By 1980

A world deficit of 1.5 million tons of beef by 1980 has been forecast by the chairman of the Australian Meat Board and the United States if viewed there as the prime market for the future.

Citing an expected increase of 30 million in the U.S. population and an increase in the per capita consumption of beef in the U.S. from 113 pounds to 130 pounds, Col. M. H. McArthur, chairman of the Australian Meat Board, says another 20-25 million head of cattle will be needed to meet the demand.

He said Australia, New Zealand and Ireland are about the only countries capable of meeting this need with their exportable surplus of beef. Speaking before a Queensland cattlemen's convention, McArthur warned, however, that Australia is beginning to lean too heavily on beef exports. Total meat exports there have climbed from 33 percent of production in the 1950s to 57 percent at the present time.

McArthur said Argentina is capable of huge expansion in its beef industry, but can't maintain production levels at present. He said he doubts that Argentina will ever be able to overcome the hold of political interference that stopped full development of its potential or foot-and-mouth disease which restricts its export sales.

Canadian Farmer Tentatively Tries Foreign Tractors

Canadian farmers, unhappy with the cost of tractors produced by North American firms, are showing more willingness to try tractors made in Italy, Romania, and the Soviet Union.

The multinational farm machinery companies—John Deere, International Harvester, Ford, Massey-Ferguson and J. I. Case—still have a firm hold on most of the market.

But Statistics Canada, the national office for data, reports that Romania, Russia, and particularly Italy have been making inroads in the last five years.

Peter Appleton, an economist with the Agricultural Economics Research Council, said these tractor brands could make still more progress if their after-sales service and marketing were better. Often they're rough and out of style compared with sleek new models from established manufacturers.

Italy sold 281 tractors to Canadian dealers in 1967. Sales in the first eight months of this year rose to 1,228, the data bureau reports.

The Soviet didn't sell tractors in Canada as recently as 1969. But they shipped 52 in 1970 and 65 during the first eight months of this year.

The Romanians, also at zero in 1969, had shipped 506 to Canadian

dealers by the end of August this year.

Appleton said the Romanians were making the most ambitious pitch to Canadian farmers, showing at prairie-country fairs and offering to train Canadian mechanics and set up credit plans.

"But if you're a pampered North American farmer, you're not going

to buy a Romanian tractor," he said.

The dissatisfaction with traditional tractor makes surfaced in government commission on farm machinery which charged large companies with discriminatory pricing—charging more in Canada than elsewhere for low-horsepower machines.

But these companies' service

network and part supplies—added to the greater sophistication of their products—keep the newcomer brands from selling more.

Of the 14,523 tractors imported last year, 7,556 came from the United States. More than 4,200 came from Britain, 1,592 from West Germany and 30 from France.

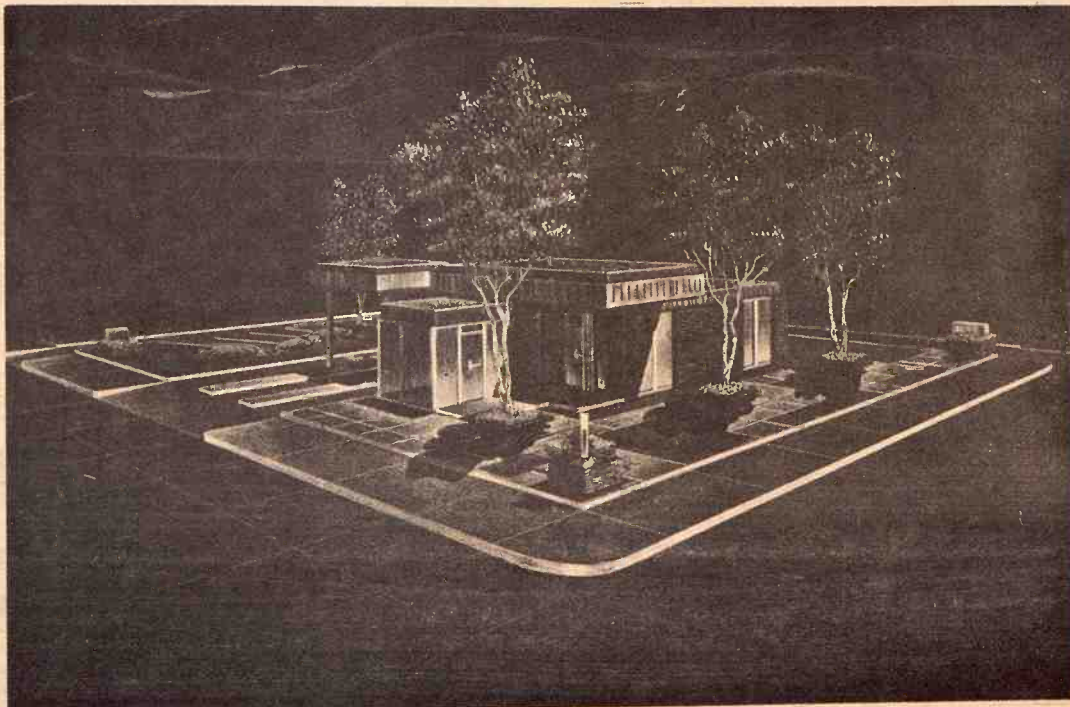

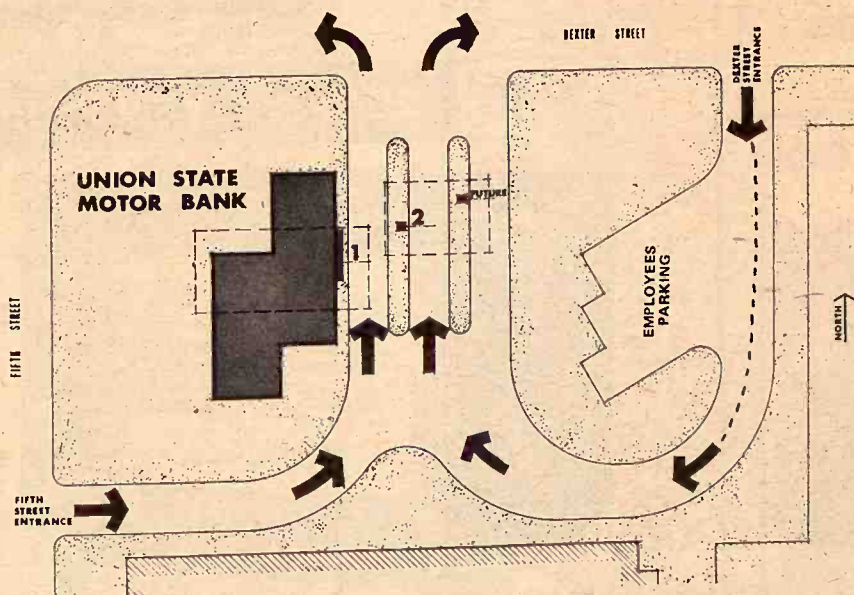

Loblolly Pine Adaptable To Southeast Kansas

Loblolly pine has made the greatest impact in the rapid expansion of forestry in the southern

United States in recent years.

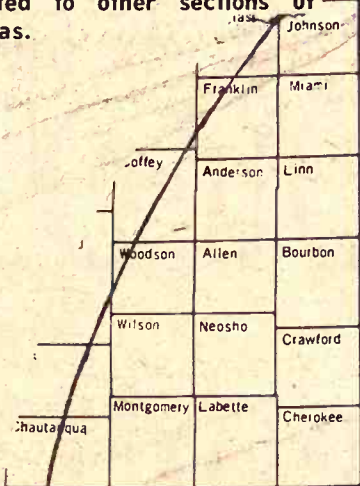
Now, with more than 25 years of test plantation growth, loblolly pine seedlings are being made available through State and Extension Forestry at Kansas State University.

KSU foresters point out that loblolly is a long-needed pine with rapid growth potential. It grows well on acid soils and is adapted to soils

of varied texture as long as internal drainage is adequate.

The best soils for loblolly pine in Kansas appear to be the sandy loams and silty loams of the Bates and Dennis series. Blackjack oak

areas, where soils are 25 to 35 inches deep, are ideal planting sites. Limestone bedrock areas should be avoided.

Loblolly pines planted in a test on Bates sandy loam soil at Lake Parsons have grown to more than six feet tall in three growing seasons.

Extension foresters point out that loblolly pine is ideal for erosion control on light textured soils, and for peeled posts, poles and lumber. It is also a popular pulpwood species, and is used for production of turpentine in the southern states.

Because of its rapid growth and long needles, it is not considered desirable as a Christmas tree.

KSU Extension Forestry has a limited supply of loblolly pine seedlings available for distribution next spring. Order forms are available at county Extension offices.

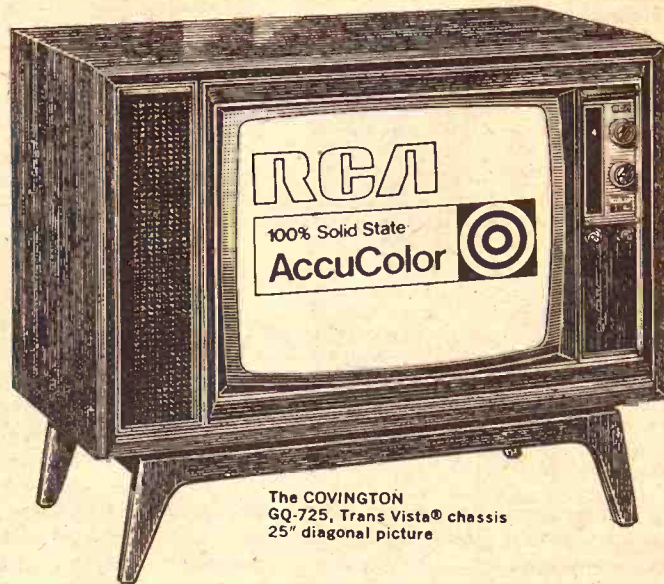

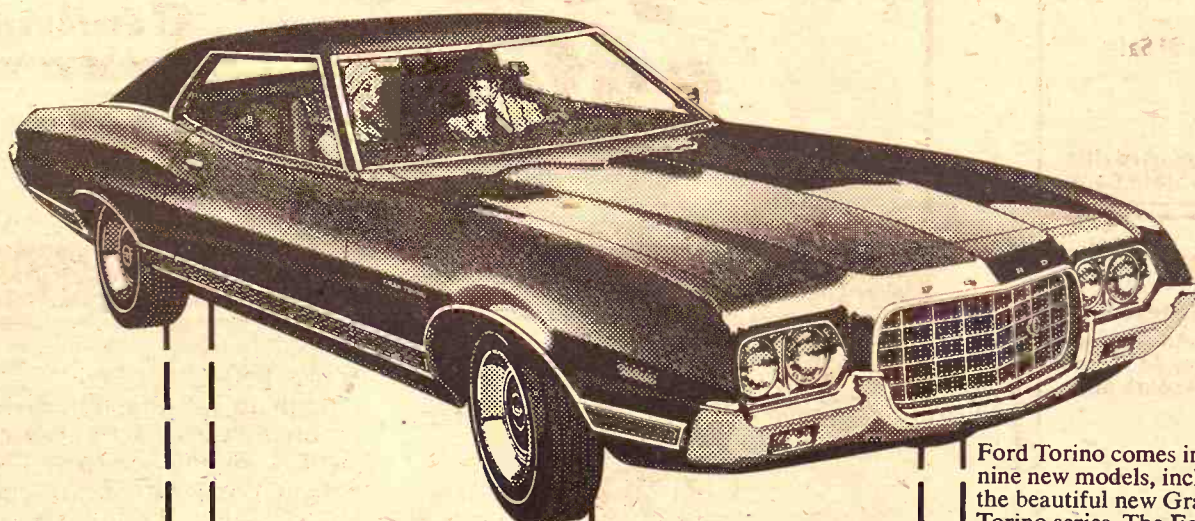
RETIREES FROM GEARY CO. JOB

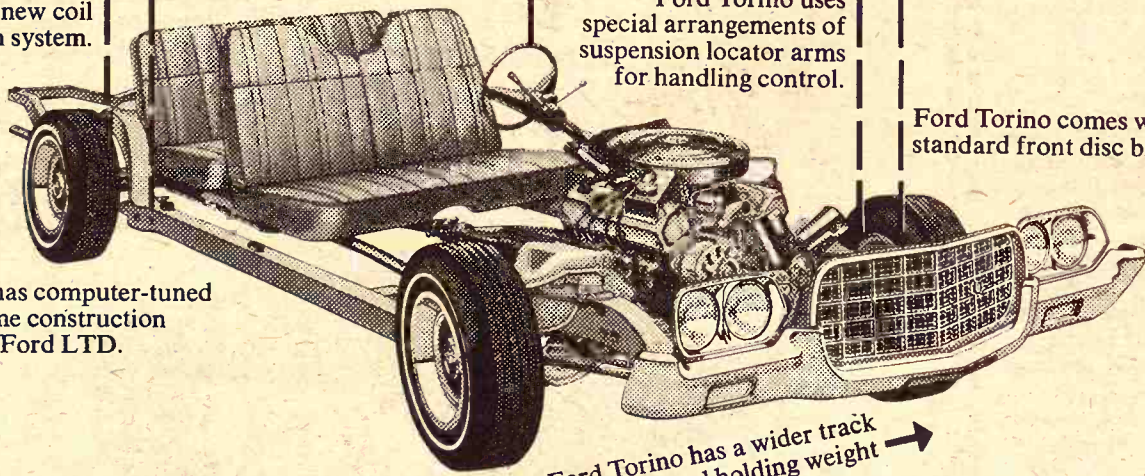

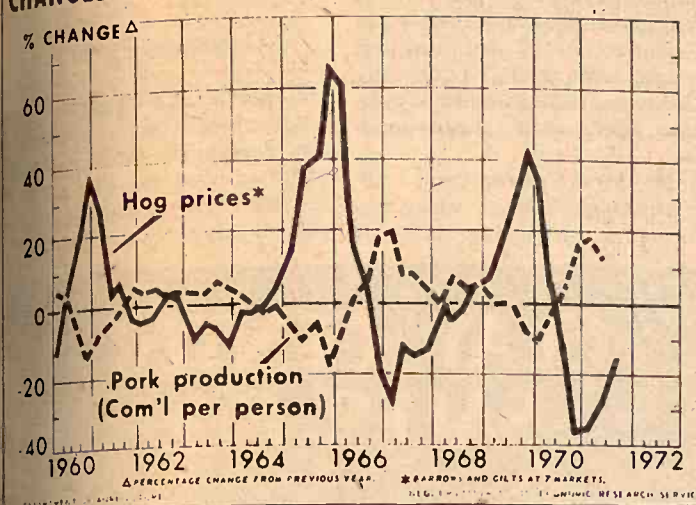

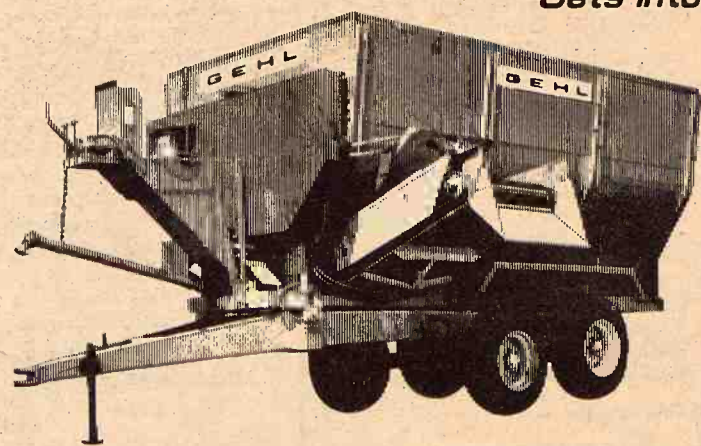

Highest Natural Radiation Level In Colorado

Colorado residents are exposed to the highest level of natural radiation in the United States while residents of Texas and Louisiana are exposed to the least, the Atomic Energy Commission says.

The AEC released a state-by-state breakdown of natural radiation levels, which it said will assist the Environmental Protection Agency "in making estimates of potential future radiation risks." The report did not deal with man made sources

of radiation.

Colorado residents are exposed to an average of 250 millirems of natural radiation a year, the AEC said. Louisiana and Texas residents are exposed to an average of 100 millirems. The Kansas exposure is 135 and in Missouri it is 130. Nebraska's is 155.

The national average was placed at 130 millirems.

The AEC said radiation exists everywhere, but is higher in mountainous areas because of increased cosmic radiation. Differing concentrations of naturally occurring radioactive materials and differences in latitude also can affect natural radiation levels, the AEC said.

The AEC said radiation, both natural and man made, is believed to cause some types of cancer. But it said there is no known danger level for natural radiation.

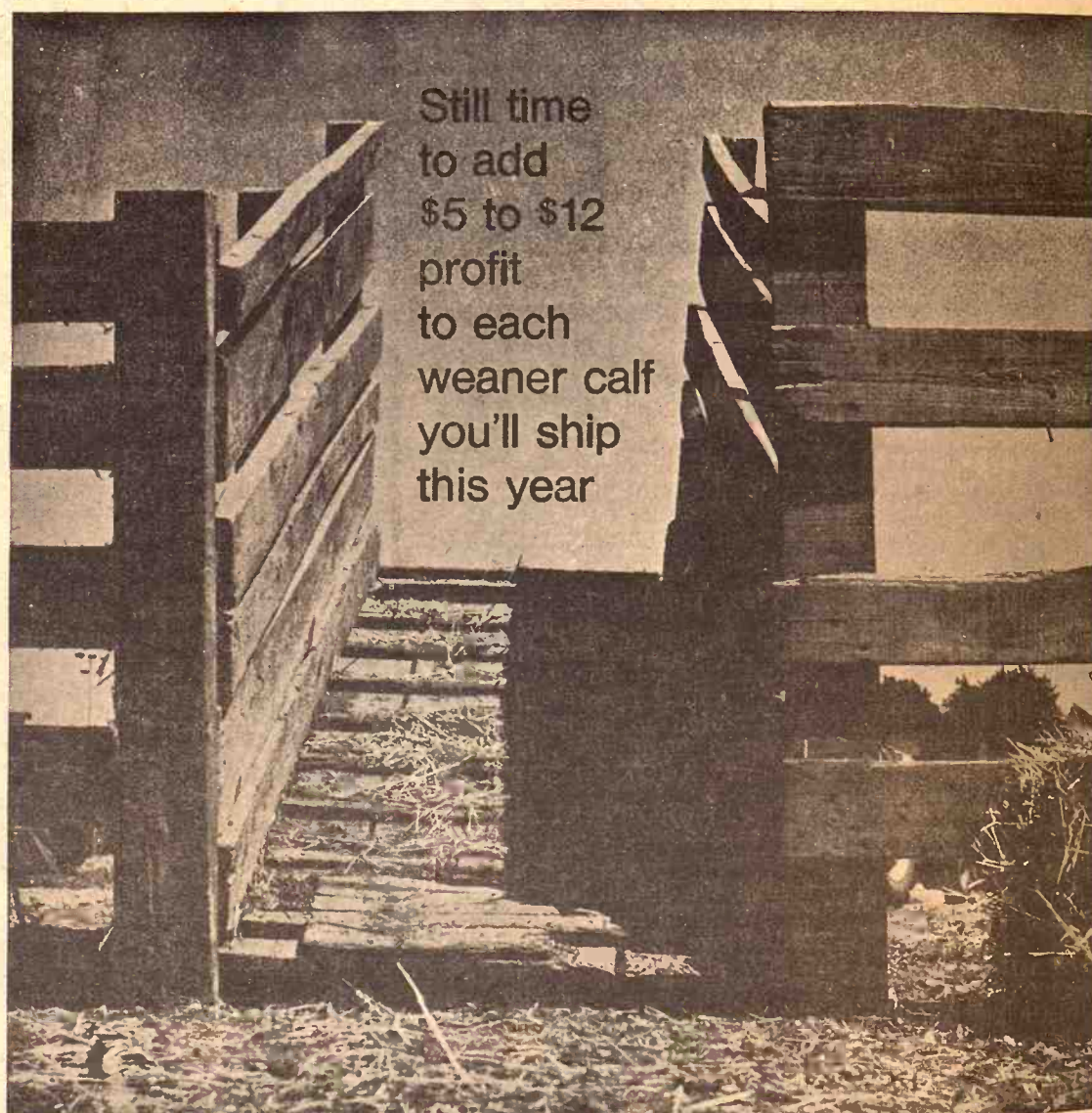

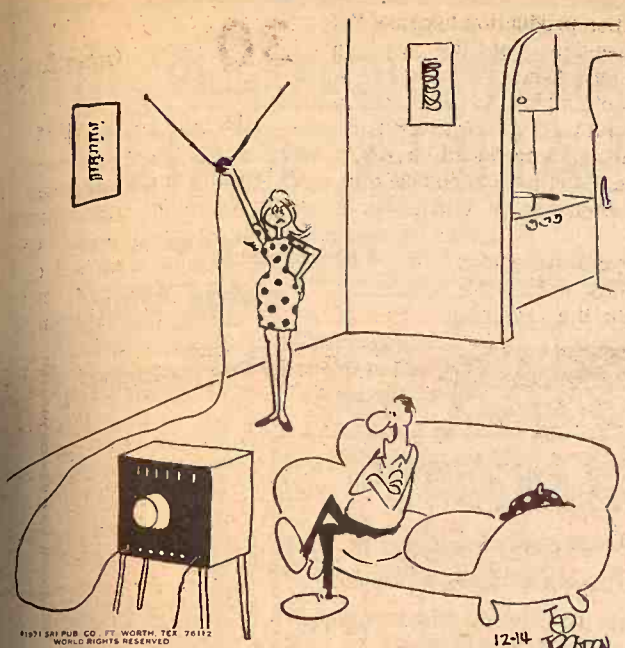

Working His Way Thru College As Auctioneer

"All right, turn 'em around, and what are ya gonna give for 'em. I'm bid 31 now a quarter..."

With this chant the auctioneer, Chuck Shada, Kansas State University senior, is barking out costs per pound in a sale barn setting that's as familiar as auctioneers themselves.

"My dad was an auctioneer and as a kid I used to imitate him," says Shada. "I guess I learned the tricks of the trade from him."

Each auctioneer develops a chant of his own, he explains, although he did attend Reisch Auctioneering College, Mason City, Iowa, to learn how "to put it all together."

Shada, who is from Anamosa, Iowa, began auctioneering at his father's sale barns two years ago and still manages to auction at Sylvan Sale Barn, Sylvan Grove, each Friday this semester between a heavy schedule of classes and labs.

He's the first to admit auctioneering isn't easy.

"It takes a lot of hard practice, and I'm still far from being good, but I find it easier than I did a year ago."

At age 22, Shada certainly doesn't fit into the general stereotype of an auctioneer. Dark hair, just a shade long, accompanied by sideburns and a brightly flowered vogue shirt easily give him the collegiate look. A pair of the popular halter boots add a Western touch.

Most people don't believe Shada

when he tells them he's an auctioneer.

"At first they sorta laugh, but most of them are fascinated by it."

Majoring in animal science and industry, Shada, operating in partnership with his father, also buys feeder cattle. Once the purchase is made, he arranges to have them shipped home, where his father resells them.

"When I first started auctioneering and buying cattle, the older buyers thought I was a punk, hot-shot kid," he says, "but now I've earned their respect and they tell me when I should have bought a certain steer, or when I maybe spent a little too much for another. We really work together."

"The very first time I bought a load of cattle I stayed awake all night wondering if I'd paid too much

for them, but they seemed to work out all right." He grins, "I think maybe I sent another load home last night that might be too high."

The type of beef now on the market has changed to a longer, taller, faster gaining animal that will grade choice when fat, Shada says. "Crossbred Angus-Hereford (black-white face) steers generally feed out the best, even though they cost a little more."

Applying his agriculture oriented major to his current role as a buyer, Shada says, "Generally this education prepares you in what to look for in basic concepts, such as feeding and selection in type of animal, but it doesn't prepare you for the marketing and economic end of it."

Last year's champion barrow brought \$4.50 a pound for less than \$1,000. The 1970 grand champion steer sold at \$7.25 a pound for around \$8,900. The record price for a champion steer at the show was \$30 a pound in 1951. The previous record price for a champion barrow was \$27 a pound in 1968.

He said his company pays 4 cents a board foot for cottonwood trees, making good trees worth \$30 to \$60 each. Paper pulpwood cutters pay about \$1 per cord. Foresters say two to four average trees will yield a cord of pulp. Stacy said he pays 6 cents a board foot for hackberry and ash and 8 cents a board foot for oak.

"We would like it put in the news what this timber is really worth," Stacy said.

He said his company and other reputable buyers do not condone damaging the landowner's woodland property in the process of harvesting timber.

"We just do not leave until we get everything right. Get your money before they get the trees. There's no sale until you get your money. We give contracts even if we have to put up a bond," he cautioned landowners.

Stacy said he has put his equipment to work without cost—cleaning up the mess left behind by some

Honest Timber Buyers Hurt By Cheating Ones

Articles in Grass & Grain and other state newspapers dealing with cheating timber buyers have drawn a response from C. R. Stacy, El Dorado timber buyer, who says that reputable buyers are opposed to fraudulent tactics of some buyers.

Stacy said reputable timber buyers harvest only those trees ready for harvest, conserving and protecting younger trees for future utilization. He said his company, with headquarters in St. Paul, Kan., buys timber following the terms of written contracts and pays before the cutting is started.

Stacy said he is concerned because landowners distrust all buyers after having a bad experience with a disreputable buyer. He said prices paid by regular buyers are much higher.

"I don't pay less than 20 cents a board foot on a walnut lumber log and up to \$1-1.50 a foot," he said. "It can be better if it is brought to our yard."

of total farm cash receipts. "It is not
too surprising," the bank reported

receive nearly 90 per cent of their
income from off-farm sources."

There are some 1.1 million far-
mers with more than \$10,000 in
annual farm products sales and they
account for 90 per cent of farm cash
receipts. "Nearly half of the far-
mers in this 'commercial-size' group
had average family incomes of
\$9,660 in 1970 and off-farm earnings
accounted for over one-third of the
total," the bank said.

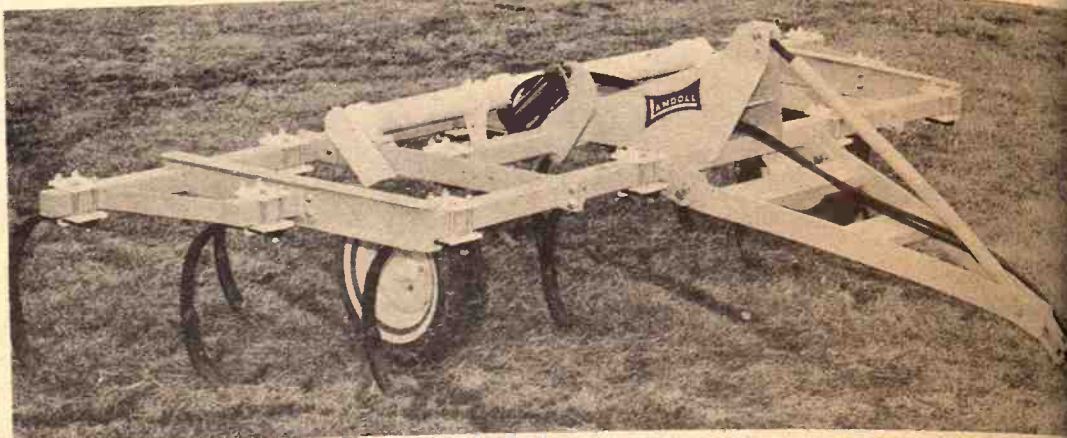
