











Decisions will be made affecting the entire state. The State Convention will pay dividends to those participating.

If your chapter has not sent in the names of delegates, please do so immediately.

It is hoped that both advisors and delegates will attend the Delegate-Advisor Luncheon on May 31, 12:00 noon, KSU Student Union.

Advisors may purchase a ticket by sending \$2.25 to the State FFA Office in Topeka. Make checks payable to the Kansas Association of FFA. A ticket will promptly be sent to you.

The National FFA President, Tim Burke, and other distinguished guests will be present. It is hoped that all advisors will attend.



HELPFUL CONVENTION HINTS

Congratulations to the delegates who have been selected to represent their chapter at the State FFA Convention. If you happen to be a recipient of an award or scholarship, be sure to be in attendance. Donors take a dim view of an individual who is not present to receive his award, so make every effort to be present at the official presentation.

Follow these suggestions and you will make this State FFA Convention outstanding:

- Wear your official FFA jacket in the air-conditioned University Auditorium. You need not wear it outside if it is too warm.
- 2. Be prompt in attending sessions. If for some reason you are late, enter quietly.
- 3. If you must leave the auditorium before the session is over, please leave between numbers. Always respect a speaker.
- 4. Be a mature FFA representative. Loud talk, boasting, profanity, vulgarity, kid stuff, and horse play are not becoming of an FFA member.
- 5. A number of young ladies will be attending as delegates and guests of the State Convention. Wolf calls and whistling are not appropriate.
- 6. Do not smoke while wearing your FFA jacket. It is against the fire regulations to smoke while in the University Auditorium.
- 7. Sit with your group and advisor during convention sessions (if you are not a delegate).
- 8. A gentleman (FFA member) always removes his hat when he enters the convention hall.
- 9. If you hoot with the owls at night, you can't soar with the eagles in the daytime. Retire by 11:30 p.m. so you will feel alert the next day.
- 10. Treat all people inside and outside of the convention hall with respect. You may be speaking to or sitting beside a very distinguished person, a donor, sponsor, or others who will judge the FFA by your actions.
- 11. The best pictures are taken within 10-15 feet of the individual.
- 12. Report all items lost or found to the State FFA secretary's desk.
- 13. If you are a delegate please use the microphones for all official business and discussions. You should also make sure the State FFA secretary has your name and chapter before presenting your motion or discussion.

In order to change the constitution, a 2/3 vote is required by the delegates present. Clear thinking should be given to each item voted on. - The following resolution is recommended by the Jetmore FFA chapter.
 This will be voted on at the convention:

WHEREAS, We, the Jetmore Chapter, consider it practical and to the best interest of Kansas FFA youth and vocational agriculture education, to have any member eligible to compete in State FFA Contests and,

WHEREAS, The rules for the State FFA Contests state that if a member has competed in one area of the state contests he is not eligible to compete in the same area of the state contests again, Therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED, that it is the sense of the chapter that any member may compete in the state contest in the same area more than one year and that a member should be eligible to compete in the state fair judging contest even if he has competed in the State FFA Contests.

STATE FFA ADVISOR RETIRES

Mr. C.C. Eustace, State FFA Advisor, has announced he will retire on August 1. He has served as advisor from 1954 to the present.

Mr. Eustace is a native of Wakefield, Kansas. He completed three degrees at Kansas State University -- a BS in Agronomy in 1930, an agriculture education degree in 1937, and an MS in animal husbandry and education in 1953. He started his career as a vocational agriculture instructor in 1937 and taught three years at Hoxie and two years at Pratt.

He served four years in the Army. After this he taught one semester at Burns High School. From 1946 to 1954 he served as a field supervisor for institutional on-farm training. This federally funded project was cooperatively sponsored by the Kansas State Department of Vocational Education and KSU to provide on-the-farm training for veterans of World War II. He served a brief period of time as acting State Director and executive officer for the Division of Vocational Education.

Mr. Eustace will be honored by the Kansas Association of FFA at the 44th State FFA Convention, University Auditorium, KSU, on Thursday evening, June 1.

SECOND ANNUAL TALENT CONTEST

The Astronotes, a four member rock group from Concordia, placed first in the second annual Future Farmers of America talent contest held May l at Kansas State University in Manhattan during the State FFA Contests. Taking second place was a country and western group from Arkansas City, and third place went to twins, Arlan and Harlan Jensen, from Concordia.

The FFA Talent Contest was open to members of FFA chapters in Kansas.

Judges were Dr. William Burke, associate professor of speech at KSU; Dan Commerford, graduate assistant in music from KSU; and Lauren Libby, 1969-70 State FFA President from Smith Center.

Miss Kim Schoen, Downs, present State FFA Sweetheart, acted as master of ceremonies.

Others taking part in the talent contest were a nine member jazz and rock band from Powhattan; Debbie Doebele from Hanover; Steve Knoll from Morland; and Steve Burd from Northern Valley.

FFA ALUMNI HOLD FIRST NATIONAL MEETING

More than 200 farmers, agribusiness leaders, and government officials, all former members of the Future Farmers of America (FFA), were in Chicago, Friday, May 12, for the organizational meeting of the National FFA Alumni Association. The meeting was held at the O'Hare Inn adjacent to Chicago's O'Hare International Airport.

Purpose of the meeting was to elect a national slate of officers and to decide on state, local, and national activities in which members can participate. This was the first national meeting of the FFA Alumni Association which was formed two years ago at the National FFA Convention when state delegates of the national youth organization voted to create an alumni membership status.

According to Gus Douglass, National FFA Alumni Council Chairman and Commissioner of Agriculture in West Virginia, "The FFA Alumni Association is striving to develop activities that will complement the activities of local vocational agriculture departments and FFA chapters."

Although the National Alumni Association has been formally organized for only slightly more than a year, 15 states have already chartered State FFA Alumni Associations. Total membership in the National Association now stands at over 3,000 members and according to Alumni Association Administrative Secretary, Jay Benham, the membership is growing rapidly. "We estimate that over 3 million students of vocational agriculture have been FFA members over the 44 year history of the organization," says Benham. "We realize that the present membership is only a small beginning, but response to date makes us optimistic that the Association will grow to a sizeable organization. Our biggest challenge so far has been to locate former members and to inform them of our organization's existence and purposes."

According to Benham all former FFA members, honorary members and teachers of vocational agriculture are eligible for membership in the FFA Alumni Association. All who join prior to May 12 will be considered "Charter Members" and will receive a special charter membership card. National dues for the organization are \$4 per year or \$100 for life membership. The purposes of the FFA Alumni Association are:

To support and promote the FFA organization, FFA activities, and vocational agriculture on the local, state, and national levels.

To provide a tie to the FFA and to assist FFA and agricultural education personnel to involve former members in worthy activities.

To promote a greater knowledge of the agricultural industry and support education in agriculture.


JOBS IN AGRICULTURE

According to Charles Pratt, Capital-Journal Farm editor, the number of persons in the hired farm work force in the nation gained 4 percent during 1971. This temporarily interrupted the downtrend in process since 1967.

The report was issued by the Department of Agriculture and indicated that about 2.6 million persons 14 years of age and older did some farm work for cash wages in 1971. All the gain was in the nonmigrant sector.

In Kansas at this time farm labor demands are strong and undoubtedly will increase as the soil dries after the recent rains. There already is some demand reported by the Department of Labor for operators for customs crews to go south for the wheat harvest.

Demand in many areas of the state is increasing for single persons and married couples. General farmhands are wanted in a wage range from \$200 to \$350 per month, plus housing.

Last year the East Central District Vocational Agriculture Teacher Association started giving district sweepstake trophys to be presented in the school with the highest score combined in all district contests. The hope in giving a district sweepstake trophy was to get more schools to all district contests. The scores for the district trophy are determined in the following manner: First place - 10 points; second place - 9 points; third place - 8 points; fourth place - 7 points; fifth place - 6 points; and 5 points to all other schools competing.

In addition to the district sweepstake trophy this year, the top three teams in each contest were presented a trophy. Money for the three team trophies was solicited by the host school from local merchants.

Participation in the East Central Kansas District contest this year was greatly improved from the past several years. Of the 14 contests held this year, the average percentage attendance was over 60 percent. Contests of highest attendance were Farm Mechanics, Livestock Judging, and Dairy Judging. Contests of lowest attendance were meats, crops, horticulture, and entomology.

The top five schools in the overall district contest placing were: Seaman - first; Paola - second; Prairie View - third; Osage City - fourth; and Burlington - fifth. There are 18 active schools in the East Central district.
