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













#### ELIGIBILITY

Eligibility for Kansas teams representing Kansas in the National contest: Team members must be eligible for the National contest at the time they win a State contest to represent Kansas in the National FFA contest.

If the Kansas team winning first place in the State contest consists of more than one team member who is not eligible for the National contest, the next place team with all members eligible shall represent Kansas in the National contest.

#### HELPFUL CONVENTION HINTS

Congratulations to all who have been selected to represent your chapter at the State FFA Convention. The officials and citizens of Manhattan give unselfishly of their time and effort to assure you of a successful convention. The character of our organization and its membership is judged to a certain degree by the actions of members at the State Convention. You are on parade. You represent your chapter, your community, and the FFA. Follow these suggestions and you will make the State Convention a success.

- 1. Wear your official FFA jacket whenever possible.
- 2. Sit with your group and near your advisor during convention sessions (if you are not a delegate).
- 3. Be prompt in attending sessions. If you are unavoidably detained, enter quietly.
- 4. If you must leave the assembly room before the session is over, please leave between special numbers.
- 5. Do not smoke while wearing your FFA jacket.
- 6. Wolf calling, whistling, and booing are not appropriate for FFA members at the State FFA Convention.
- 7. Make sure you are properly registered in your hotel. Someone may need to find you.
- 8. Inquire about hotel rates when you register. Tell the room clerk when you plan to go home.
- 9. Retire by 11:30 p.m. so you will feel well and be alert during the day.
- 10. Leave your room key with the desk clerk in the lobby when leaving the hotel.
- 11. You will be held responsible for any damage done to furniture in your room.
- 12. Telephones in your hotel rooms are for house calls. Calls outside of hotel are charged to you at about fifteen cents per call.
- 13. Bellhops answering room calls expect tips. Do not call for room service unless you expect to tip.
- 14. Loud music and other noise in hotel rooms will be reported by other guests. This may lead to the hotel detective calling on you. Be mindful of others.

- 15. Loud talk, vulgarity, boasting, and profanity are unbecoming to a Future Farmer. Watch your language.
- 16. Throwing material out of a hotel window is an offense subject to police action.
- 17. The elevators should not be misused. Other guests in the hotel also have important appointments.
- 18. Be courteous to the employees of the hotels and eating places.
- 19. Ask your advisor for tips in ordering meals.
- 20. Once you have selected a seat in a restaurant, remain there. Moving about confuses the waitresses and delays your order. Think of others.
- 21. Be courteous to young people and adults on the streets.
- 22. Be friendly to adults who wish to talk with you about the FFA.
- 23. Stay out of bars and other questionable places.
- 24. Watch your money and other valuable possessions, especially in large crowds.
- 25. Be a gentleman, first, last, and always.

It will be appreciated if you will give attention to these items. If you do this, you will represent your local chapter and your State Association in a very fine way at the State Convention. You will also have a good time.

#### STATE FFA CAMP - JULY 24 to 27

All local FFA chapter officers for the 1969-70 FFA year and advisors are invited to attend the Tenth State FFA Leadership Training Camp. Enrollment for the camp will be from 1 p.m. to 3 p.m. Thursday, July 24. The camp will close 1 p.m. Sunday, July 27. The camp will be held at Rock Springs Ranch, which is located thirteen miles south of Junction City, Kansas.

This camp will help train, motivate, and inspire new chapter efficiers to carry out their duties and responsibilities. This activity will also assist candidates applying for State Farmer, American Farmer, State officer, and in Superior Chapter Awards. No other one activity can do as much in creating a group spirit in the local chapter officers. Leadership School in September will be patterned after activities at the summer camp. The camp has also been used as a proving ground for activities at Leadership School. This has been particularly true in Parliamentary Procedure.

The local 1969-70 chapter officers with their advisor are eligible to attend and will be expected to enroll for the entire camp period. Late arrivals or early departures cannot be accepted. The total cost of the camp will be \$13 per person. This includes nine meals, two official camp T-shirts, and all facilities available at the camp. Each camper will furnish his own bedroll, towels, toilet articles, personal leadership material, and enthusiasm.

The Kansas Association of Bank Agricultural Representatives (KABAR) is again going to provide the awards for the camp. This group also plans to sponsor a session of the camp emphasizing the free enterprise system and citizenship. Mr. Harold Walker of Arkansas City is the coordinator of FFA and KABAR relations.

The following registration blank asks for a definite commitment of a chapter wishing to enroll. If more chapters enroll than the camp can accommodate, chapters will be enrolled on a first-come, first-served basis.

A committee of FFA members who attended the 1969 camp made the following recommendations. If the delegate body passes the following recommendations, they will go into affect at the 1969 FFA camp.

- 1. One leadership FFA camp for State.
- 2. Limit number to 400 FFA members and advisors. Rock Springs requires 350 to hold camp just for the FFA.
- 3. Chapter officers are preferred, but advisors may substitute if one or more officers cannot attend.
- 4. Full payment must be sent in to Kansas Association of FFA office by July 1 (full payment is \$13).
- 5. If one or more individuals do not attend camp, all but \$5 registration fee per member will be returned after the camp. This plan would assist in the following:
  - a. to determine more accurately the number to plan for at the State FFA Camp
  - b. save time and manpower plus confusion in enrolling
  - c. herds could be organized prior to camp
- 6. No chapter will be allowed to enroll without instructor.
- 7. Ten herds will be used.

#### KENT HAMILTON TO DENMARK

The National FFA Center has announced the selection of Kent Hamilton, State secretary, as a participant in International Agricultural Exchange Program to

A PERSON

Denmark in the summer of 1969. Approximately 40 FFA members across the country will represent the United States to eight European countries,

Australia and New Zealand. Kent will be working on a 275-acre farm near Kolding, Denmark. The farm includes mixed farming as well as 60 milk cows and 300 head of swine. The length of stay will be the three months of June, July, and August. The program also will include an opportunity to tour many historical sites in Europe.

The IAEA Program not only works toward improvement of the United States' image abroad, but provides an opportunity for greater understanding between nations as the participants will be more than happy to speak of their experiences after their return.

The exchange program is operated by the National FFA Organization in cooperation with other farm youth organizations and the International Agricultural Exchange Association.

#### THE NATIONAL FFA LEADERSHIP AND CITIZENSHIP CONFERENCE

The National Association of FFA is sponsoring a leadership and citizenship conference for chapter presidents on three different dates this summer, June 23 - 28, July 7 - 12, July 14 - 19.

The Concordia Chapter plans to attend the National conference June 7 - 12. Mr. Steve Reedy, advisor at Concordia, plans to take a car of FFA boys to attend this first National chapter president conference. He has space available for two other FFA chapter presidents who would desire to share trip expenses. The cost would amount to about \$50 per FFA member. Chapter presidents or advisors may contact Mr. Steve Reedy, Vocational Agriculture Instructor, Concordia High School, Concordia, Kansas 66901.

#### NEW LOOK IN VOCATIONAL AGRICULTURE

There is a new look in vocational agriculture, and it's getting newer every day! Significant changes are being made in instruction at the high school level. These are in keeping with aspirations and competencies of the students as well as in the changing needs for manpower on the farm and in agricultural businesses. New programs are being offered beyond high school.

Recent statistics collected by the U. S. Office of Education show that 38 percent of 105,000 students completing high school vocational agriculture in 1966 continued their education in colleges or in postsecondary vocational programs.

Thirteen percent entered the armed forces and about 5 percent are unaccounted for. Of the remaining group (about 46,822 students), 67 percent

were placed in agricultural occupations including farming; 25 percent entered jobs not closely related to their training; 5 percent were employed part time, and 3 percent were unemployed.

"Please credit the high school vocational agriculture program with providing a springboard for those students who continue their education," says H. N. Hunsicker, head of agricultural education in the Vocational and Technical Division of the Office of Education. "These are some of our finest students and most of them continue their study in the field of agriculture. They are encouraged to do so by their vocational agriculture instructors. There is a shortage of professionally and technically trained men in the agricultural economy."

#### THE 1969 FFA STATE GOOD WILL TOUR

January 27, 28, and 29 the State FFA officers and Mr. Harold Shoaf, State executive secretary, conducted the annual State FFA Good Will Tour. This year the tour covered mostly the western half and some parts of central Kansas.

The purpose of the tour was to visit and thank those industries that have supported the Kansas FFA Association. Also, many new and nonag-related industries were included in the tour for the purpose of telling them what the FFA organization is about and what it is doing in Kansas.

The tour began in Garden City on Sunday, the 26th, where the State FFA officers and Mr. Shoaf were to be guests of Mr. and Mrs. Fielding Hands, who are the parents of State president, Gregg Hands. However, bad weather and hazardous driving conditions delayed Mr. Shoaf; Kent Hamilton, State secretary; Alan Johnson, State treasurer; and Kenneth Conway, State sentinel; in eastern Kansas.

On Monday morning Gregg Hands, State president; Danny Scott, State vice president; and Steve Davis, State reporter; along with the assistance of Mr. Ira Mann, a former vocational agriculture instructor and now vice principal for vocations at Garden City High School, toured several industries in Garden City.

The group first toured Producers Packing Company, which is a part of Farmland Industries, Inc. This is solely a cattle-slaughtering operation that employs around 140 people.

The next stop was Oswald Industries. This is a new plant that builds specialized equipment for feedlots. The company's biggest product is grain dryers.

Monday afternoon was spent in Dodge City. The first visit was to the High Plains Journal. Ray Pierce, editor, took the group out to lunch. The journal is a farm newspaper that has wide distribution over Kansas and Colorado. Mr. Ray Pierce has been a friend and supporter of the Future Farmers for some time.

The next stop was the Mayrath Machinery Company. Their main product at this plant is grain augers and grain handling equipment.

The last stop in Dodge City was the new Farmland Industries anhydrous ammonia plant. This \$15 million plant was just recently completed. The tour through it was very interesting and very informative. From here the group traveled on to Hutchinson where they met Mr. Shoaf and the other State officers.

On Tuesday morning the entire group visited the Farmers Cooperative Commission Company, which has been recently changed to Far-Mar-Co. The company is the marketing arm for all of the local cooperatives. It is also a part of Farmland Industries. At this same stop the group also visited the Board of Trade, which is in the same building. Here the grain companies put their grain on the market and it is bought by millers and bakers.

The next stop was perhaps one of the most interesting and thought provoking of the entire tour. This was the Hutchinson State Industrial Reformatory. The group got to tour the whole reformatory and observe life on the inside of the wall. It was much different than what many think.

Tuesday afternoon was spent in Wichita. The group was luncheon guest of the First National Bank. Much was learned about banking and especially on the farmer's banking problems. The hour spent at the bank was an educational and enjoyable one.

From there the group went to the Federal Land Bank of Wichita. Here they learned more about the Federal Land Bank system and borrowing money for farm land and farm improvements. The Federal Land Bank has been a supporter of the FFA for many years.

The last stop for the day was the Wichita Beacon and Eagle. Seeing how all of the paper's departments compiled information and put together a daily newspaper was quite different and interesting.

On Wednesday morning, the 29th, the first stop was Dodson Manufacturing Company. The group had an interesting talk with Mr. Kenneth Carson, who is vice president of the company and was a former vocational agriculture instructor at Fort Scott. The company is a manufacturer of upright silos, feeding equipment, and Dodstone building material.

The next stop was in Newton at the Full-Vision Cab Company. This industry manufactures tractor and combine cabs. It was one of the first and now one of the largest manufacturers of farm implement cabs.

Hesston Corporation was the next stop. This company is one of the largest manfacturers of farm equipment in the United States.
