Does 4-H really work?

We who know the answer to that question is a resounding YES probably don't spend much time telling ourselves (or anyone else) **how** we know. To me, there is one piece of evidence that forms the real foundation of our faith that 4-H works. But it is evidence that we have come to take so much for granted that we have all but forgotten about it.

Today, we note the relocation of our population as the essential reason for moving 4-H into the larger towns and cities where most of our young people now live. We are convinced that the basic principles of 4-H have as much relevance in an urban setting as in a rural one. Without reducing a bit of the emphasis on our rural program, we would like to create a new image of 4-H that embraces youth totally.

With nearly 40 per cent of 4-H membership already living in towns and cities above 10,000 population, it is our goal that eventually most of our membership will come from these larger communities where 65 per cent of our young people are now to be found.

We readily recognize that the progress we have already made toward this goal graphically illustrates the present dynamism and future potential of the 4-H movement. But have we forgotten to mention that the very existence now of the **opportunity** to widen the benefits of our programs is the strongest evidence we have of how effectively 4-H has been functioning in the past?

Had it not been for the awe-inspiring success of U.S. agriculture in the past 50 years, had it not been for the soaring productivity of our farms which was the catalyst for this nation's social and economic progress, at least a third of our population would still be rural as it was in 1921 when 4-H was 100 per cent a rural program. Instead, where one farmer, then, could supply 15 other people, he now supplies 60

About the cover

4-H Around the State

ELLIS COUNTY — A workday at the fairgrounds was held April 24, with the major emphasis being planting of trees. Other work included cleaning up the grounds and installing a drain in the washrack area. Trees were definitely lacking at the new fairgrounds west of Hays, and with the impetus of a \$500 donation to buy trees from the Buckeye Community Club and Buckeye Junior Farmers, the other clubs came to help out with the planting.

FORT HAYS KANSAS STATE UNIVERSITY — A group of 4-H girls under the leadership of Jan Dugan (and others) have organized the second Clovia house in Kansas. Working with the Kansas 4-H Foundation board of trustees, the new Clovias have contracted to purchase a house near the Fort Hays campus and will begin operations as a Clovia 4-H Scholarship House in the fall of 1977.

STOCKTON — The second Rooks County Invitational Geology Fair was scheduled for May 14. 4-H members had an opportunity to exhibit their collections and take part in the educational classes and exhibits of the fair. Dr. Harold Jones worked with a local committee to assist in developing an educational program to help geology project members.

JOHNSON COUNTY — A pre-basic entomology project suitable for young members in the Exploring project is being promoted. It is proposed that the Explorers would collect 25 insects, placing them in cigar boxes. Labeling would be by common name, such as bee, grasshopper, fly, and so on. The pre-basic project would be a good way for younger brother or sister to get started, particularly if there is an older sibling already in the entomology project.

LAKE PERRY OUTDOOR EDUCATION CENTER — A new 11 minute color film depicting aspects of the outdoor educational opportunities at Lake Perry this summer is now available. The film was made

toward the end of the 1976 season, showing canoeing, backpacking, overnight tenting, and other parts of the Threshold and Explorer phases of the program. Copies of the film are available for loan from the State 4-H Office. Request schedule dates from John Abell.

FORD COUNTY — The Southwest 4-H Camp will begin operations at the Ford County Lake site outside Dodge City as usual, starting in early June. At a recent meeting of extension personnel of northwest and southwest Kansas, there was not a positive decision to purchase the Baptist Camp (Camp Christy) in the Lake Mc Bride vicinity. The Kansas 4-H Foundation will continue to operate the Southwest 4-H Center, as it has the past few years, at the request of the Southwest Camp Corporation.

BARBER COUNTY — The Barber County district livestock judging event is scheduled for Elmer Angell's ranch west of Medicine Lodge, Tuesday, July 19. For further information and details about entering a 4-H judging team, contact the Barber County extension office in Medicine Lodge.

MANHATTAN — 4-H clubs interested in applying for a Citizenship in Action grant to handle a community improvement project should be making plans and preparing a proposal to request the grant. Forms for submitting proposals are available in the county extension office.

ROCK SPRINGS RANCH — The Kansas Association of Conservation Districts Youth Committee will again offer an adult scholarship to each county in attendance at State 4-H Conservation Camp with nine or more youth enrolled. In 1976, Ellis and Pottawatomie counties qualified with nine or more youth enrolled.

HUTCHINSON — Shoppers in Reno County had an opportunity to observe 4-H members in action on 4-H Day when almost 200 4-H'ers

gave their presentations in business firms in downtown Hutchinson. The Chamber of Commerce office was 4-H Day headquarters, with the C of C providing courtesy parking stickers for 4-H families. Banks and a variety of stores made their facilities available for the 4-H'ers use.

MANHATTAN — The LABO program, planned visit by approximately 170 Japanese boys and girls along with their adult sponsors, is already at full capacity. Kansas was able to accommodate an additional 30 youth when Colorado found that due to economic conditions, they were not in the position to handle as many as they expected. Kansas 4-H youth will have the opportunity to return the visit in 1978. LABO is a cultural and linguistic educational experience. What do you do after 50 insects and 7 orders?

Here you are, the fervent young entomologist setting out on your 4-H career. You read your records and they tell you to collect. So you explore the joys of killing jars, nets, collecting spots, and the like. But your frustrated instincts cry out—there must be something more than collecting!

turn its head? Also, that the mantis, when eating, starts at one point, nibbles its way down a row, and then goes back to begin another row?

These facts are examples of what can be learned from merely watching an insect, preferably in its natural surroundings. Insects are

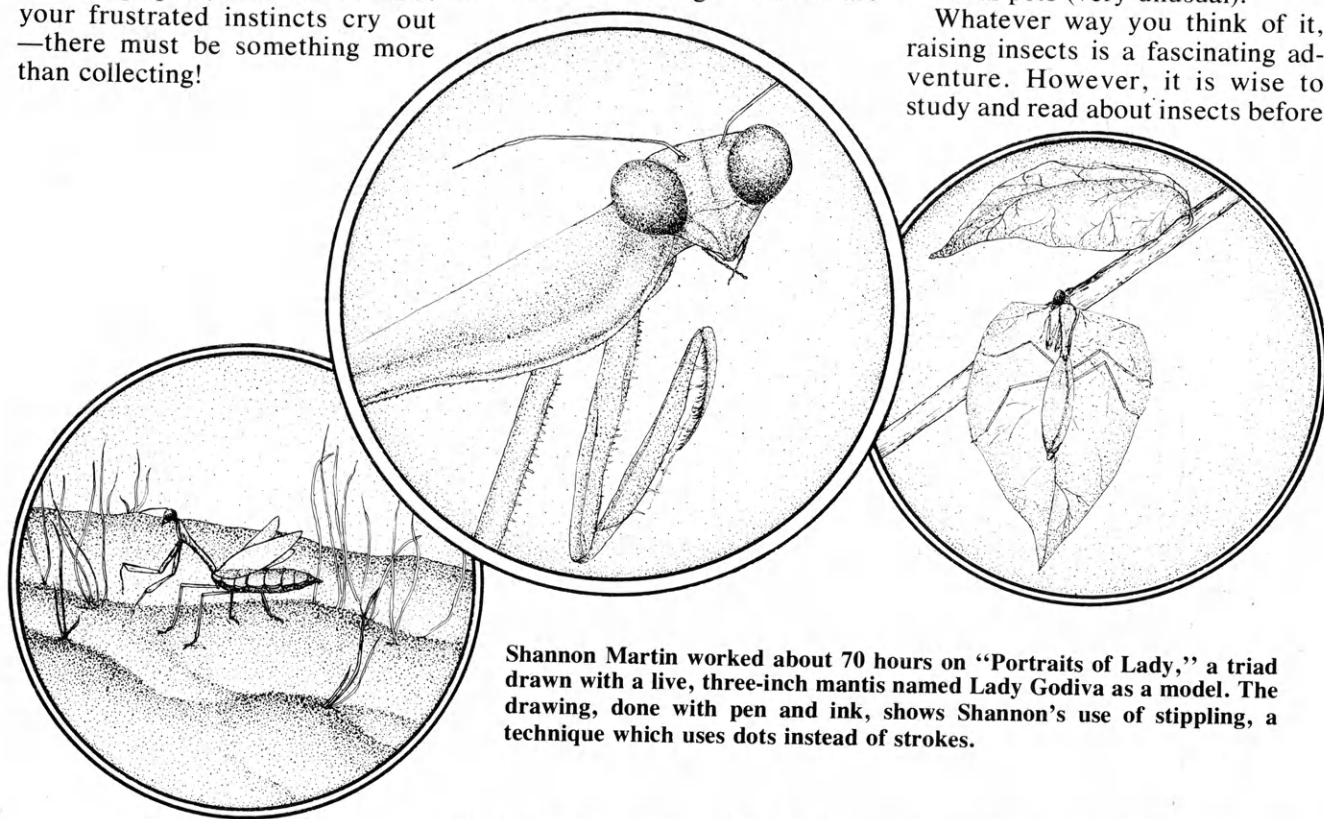
The next branch is raising insects. You can view this three different ways.

1. You are raising insects for scientific study.

2. You are keeping a miniature zoo.

3. You just acquired some very unusual pets (very unusual).

Whatever way you think of it, raising insects is a fascinating adventure. However, it is wise to study and read about insects before

And so there is. You must remember, though, that the entomology records are designed by the state office to provide a basic outline for the project and are not intended* to be the limit to your endeavors. Strive. Dream. Aspire. Collecting is just the base for bigger and better things, and for the determined entomologist these better things are just around the corner.

To me, entomology falls into two definite parts, **learning** that not all insects are bugs and **convincing** the rest of the world that not all insects are bugs. There are a few things that don't belong in either part and are strictly for **fun** and enjoyment. Therefore, everything I want to tell you in this article fits into one of those categories or is classified as fun.

LEARNING

Did you know that the praying mantis is the only insect that can

curious creatures with reactions that are intriguing and involving and deserve a fitting study.

There is a fine line between studying and raising insects, but studying them should come first. After all, you need to walk before you run, right?

So walk, don't run, to the nearest meadow, garden, or ant hill and watch these fascinating creatures live their lives.

Experiment 56. Discrimination between More or Less Sweet Sugar Solutions and Memory in Bees (18)

What's this? It sounds like a science class. Well, it's an insect experiment and if you're really into studying the quirks and habits of insects, then you might find this area interesting. A good guide for this type of activity is **101 Simple Experiments With Insects** by H. Kalmus, D.Sc. It covers experiments on locomotion, digestion, mechanical senses, reactions to light, behavior, and other areas.

you start raising them. General reading will do at first, but do an intensive study on any insects you raise.

For example, you just found two Salt Marsh caterpillars (larva of *Acraea* moth) and you want to raise them. Latch onto every piece of literature that mentions *Acraea* moths that you can find. You need information on what they eat, how they pupate, and so on. If you can't find the information you need under *Acraea* moth, then look under the family name. At last! A use for those scientific names! And if that fails, start experimenting—and hope.

You don't need to stick to moths and butterflies. During my 12 years in this project, the most appealing insects I raised were praying mantis, various water beetles, and the fearsome cicada killer wasp. From the pig louse to the monarch, they all have interesting lives.

CONVINCING

"Good morning, Mr. Phelps. Although it may seem hard to believe, many of the people in this world are laboring under the misapprehension that all insects are bad. Your mission, Jim, should you decide to accept it, is to change public opinion by education. You may use any of the methods outlined below. Good luck, Jim. This message will self-destruct in three seconds."

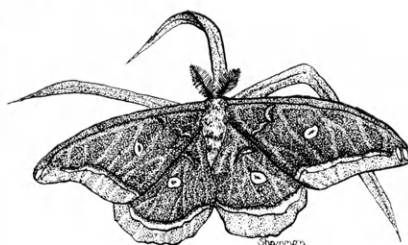
Although stemming the tide of public opinion may seem like "mission impossible," you can help by throwing entomology at the public every opportunity you get.

Many counties hold annual 4-H Days. These are ideal for entomologists. The study of insects provides an endless supply of fresh ideas for demonstrations, talks, public speaking, and such. Too often the topics in projects like food and clothing have been used and reused.

When it comes time for you to give part of the program at your

club's monthly meeting, use entomology as your subject.

Try submitting a story on entomology to your local newspaper. A well written story has a good chance of being accepted. Talk to the editor. Maybe you can work out a regular column if he likes the first

one. The same thing goes for the director of the local radio station. Remember, they are there to serve the community.

The county 4-H fair is another 4-H event that provides a showcase for education of the public. Aside from the collection entry, there is also an entry for an "educational display." Most people don't know

what it is, and so there is little competition in that area. It is, simply, a display intended to educate the public on some aspect of entomology. These boxes are designed to catch the eye, and they certainly attract a lot of attention at the fairs.

FUN

Then there are the things that can be fitted into the Learning or Convincing areas if you try hard enough. But why try? They're all right as they are: fun activities.

1. Drawing. If you like to draw, insects are a natural. You'd be surprised at how good they turn out.

2. Embedding. Using a plastic resin, you can make a wide variety of things.

3. Photography. Make a collection of insects that don't break as easily as the regular kind.

4. Communicate. There are groups of entomologists that exchange letters or ideas. One such group is TIEG or Teen International Entomology Group, based at Michigan State University.

5. And many, many more.

You are a determined entomologist. Let imagination be your guide and there will never be an end to the things for you to do. As the old saw says, "Opportunity's knocking." Get up and let it in.

Editor's note: Shannon Martin, a 1976 national winner in the 4-H entomology project, says one secret of getting maximum learning from 4-H is to tie projects together - to take projects which relate to and reinforce each other.

For example, in addition to entomology, Shannon has worked in geology, forestry, arts and crafts, reading for project enrichment, and growing garden flowers, and all these projects have combined well together.

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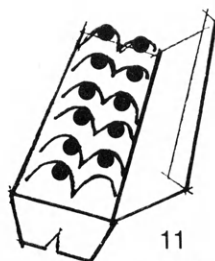

give us dairy products in abundance year round, but it still seems fitting to set aside a special month to acknowledge such a wonderful, life-giving product as milk.

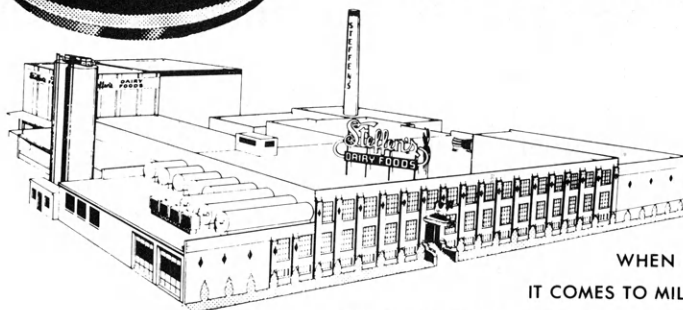

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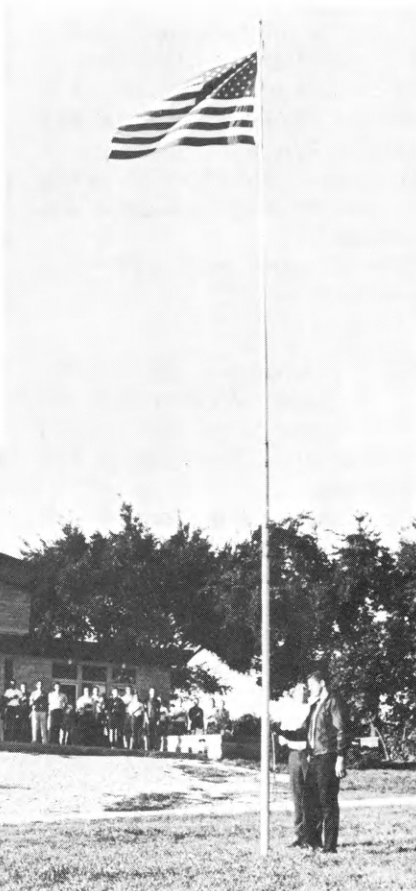

Foundation Serves Youth of Kansas

Twenty-five years of service in supporting and enriching the youth program of the Kansas State University Cooperative Extension Service is the story of the Kansas 4-H Foundation.

Founded in 1952 by a committee of Kansans interested in providing boys and girls opportunities for citizenship and leadership development, the Foundation has each year built on its past and planned for future service.

Prompting the decision to form a 4-H Foundation was the need of having a non-profit corporation to hold title to the Rock Springs Ranch property. The KSU Endowment Association held title for seven years until the 4-H Foundation was established.

Here are some highlights of the Foundation's growth.

1952 November 21 was the date, Wichita was the place for the formal organization of the Kansas 4-H Foundation.

The Kansas Committee on 4-H Club Work originally named the board of trustees and this group elected officers. W. Dale Critser, Wichita, was the first board chairman. Other officers were Senator C. L. Huxman, Sublette, vice chairman; Fred D. Wilson, Andale, treasurer; and George B. Powers, Wichita, secretary.

Others on the first board of trustees were W. Laird Dean, Topeka; Max Foresman, Kansas City; L. C. Williams, Manhattan; Harry Darby, Kansas City; E. B.

Shawver, Wichita; and A. D. Jellison, Junction City.

Critser, Powers, Darby, and Shawver are still affiliated with the Foundation.

The enrichment and expansion of the Kansas 4-H work by the Foundation is made possible through funds contributed by individuals, business concerns, and associations.

Major projects of the new Foundation were Rock Springs Ranch State 4-H Center, international programs, leader training, supply service, and sponsorship of trips, scholarships, and awards.

1953 Kansas Saddle Horse Association and Tennessee Walking Horse Association donated 63 registered mares, valued at \$31,500. These became part of a new interest phase of the state 4-H horse project. In addition, the American Saddle Horse Association added 20 mares.

R. B. Christy, Scott City, took the leadership in this project until his death in 1959 and the program was phased out beginning in 1960. At that time the Foundation owned some 230 mares in 60 counties.

1954 During the year 12 Kansas young adults went abroad as International 4-H Exchange delegates and 32 ex-

changees came to Kansas from other countries. A total of 44 participants in the two-way exchange made 1954 a record year in the program.

1956 Kansas 4-H clubs and Extension personnel began a campaign to raise \$200,000 for a dining hall to be named in honor of L. C. Williams, former director of the Cooperative Extension Service.

The Kansas 4-H Journal became a project of the Kansas 4-H Foundation when it was accepted as a gift.

The A. D. Jellison family, Junction City, gave the Foundation funds to construct a meditation chapel, health center, and auditorium. They have become the No. 1 contributors to the Foundation. The Jellison Unit was dedicated in 1957.

Late 1950s J. Harold Johnson, state 4-H leader from 1944 to 1958, became the first full time executive director of the Foundation. He was acting executive director for six years while state leader. He served as director until 1971 and continues as a field representative.

Johnson has given 50 years of leadership to Kansas 4-H as the first Sedgwick County extension 4-H agent, member of the state 4-H and youth department, and with the Foundation.

Rock Springs Ranch added the

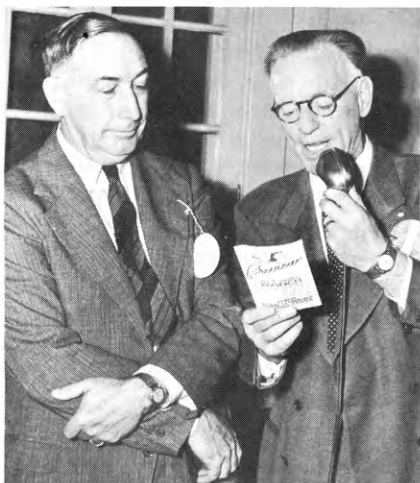
first permanent housing with the dedication of the Asa Payne Cottage made possible by the R. H. Garvey Foundation, Wichita. It was named in honor of Asa Payne, a pioneer in northwest Kansas agriculture. The second cottage provided by Cooperatives of Kansas was also dedicated in 1959.

Early 1960s A Memorandum of Understanding was signed by the Kansas 4-H Foundation and the Cooperative Extension Service in 1960 outlining responsibilities of each concerning program, services, and facilities.

Merle Eyestone, former Leavenworth County 4-H club member and Shawnee County extension 4-H agent, became associate director of the Foundation in 1962. That year Rock Springs expanded as an all-seasons facility with the completion of the Williams Dining Hall.

Late 1960s Clovia 4-H House at Kansas State University, a campus home for 62 women, was constructed and became a part of the Kansas 4-H Foundation program in 1967. The Foundation loaned Clovia \$160,000 for construction. This money now is being returned in annual payments.

Ethel and Marie Taylor, Eureka, received a Kansas 4-H Foundation membership in 1967 and started a lifelong interest in the support of 4-H work in Kansas.

William Riley, Jr. became assistant director of the Foundation in 1968 and was promoted to associate director the following year.

WaShunGa, a 17-acre Lutheran Camp adjoining RSR, was purchased in 1969 and increased the summer capacity by 200. The K. T. Wiedemann Foundation, Wichita, made this purchase possible.

Early 1970s J. Harold Johnson resigned in 1971 and Merle Eyestone became Foundation director. Another resignation found Erna Bly completing 37 years of service to Kansas 4-H as secretary in the state 4-H and youth office and in the Foundation office.

Dolph Simons, Lawrence, was elected chairman of the Foundation board of trustees in 1971. That same year Lake Perry 4-H Center was established with the lease of 273 acres from the Corps of Engineers. The following year 200 acres of land surrounding the lease was purchased and an outdoor educational program developed.

Balfour Jeffrey, Topeka, was

elected Foundation chairman in 1974 to succeed Dolph Simons, Lawrence.

The Kansas 4-H Foundation added the management of the Southwest 4-H Camp to its programs in 1975 and Wiedemann Dining Hall was added to the WaShunGa area.

The American Heritage Hall of Kansas was dedicated on October 7, 1977, at RSR with the Spencer Foundation, Kansas City, and Mr. and Mrs. A. D. Jellison, Junction City, as major contributors.

1976 The total number of donors this year was 2,102 with \$368,000 received. The Statewide 4-H Fund Drive for \$700,000 closed its third year with \$168,000 contributed.

At Rock Springs Ranch the Dane Hansen Cottage was completed and the Johnson Administration Center was begun. Both buildings will be dedicated on June 12, 1977.

Trips, Scholarships, Awards

Incentives and recognition in some 65 programs are provided for annually by the Foundation through trips, scholarships, and awards. The Foundation staff secures sponsors and provides for necessary budgets.

The Foundation is sponsor of some state awards such as for outstanding achievement in the horse, newswriting, and public speaking projects. It cooperated with the state 4-H and Youth Department in establishing the Kansas 4-H Congress. The Foundation secures some sponsors for the trips to the National 4-H Congress and Kansas 4-H Congress.

Nearly \$100,000 was directed through the state trips, scholarship, and award programs in 1976 to provide youth with 4,000 county medals, 22 scholarships, 8 county awards, 12 club awards, and 450 trips for 4-H members and leaders.

Journal Begins Its 28th Year

KANSAS 4-H JOURNAL, the only state 4-H family magazine in the United States, continues to provide information to and about 4-H members. Now in its 28th year of publication, the Journal has been part of the Foundation program for over 21 years.

Although it currently reaches into the homes of more than 17,000 4-H families, the Journal first appeared in March 1950 as a 16-page newspaper publication for Jefferson County 4-H club members. The monthly newspaper soon expanded to Douglas and Shawnee counties.

For one year the Journal was published in Perry. In 1952 Elizabeth Pettit, Topeka, became editor and initiated the sponsor concept whereby business concerns paid for subscriptions for 4-H families in their county.

An early sponsor, beginning in September 1952 and continuing today, is the First National Bank of Phillipsburg. By May 1977, 62 other banks had sponsored the Journal for 25 years or more.

In 1956 Elizabeth Pettit and her husband Frank gave the Journal to the Kansas 4-H Foundation. Dale Apel, a former Chautauqua County 4-H'er and Saline County extension 4-H agent, became editor. At that time, the Journal changed in format from a tabloid newspaper to a magazine.

Beginning in 1958 a special issue, "Kansas 4-H in Review," was published. A cooperative project with the Kansas State University Collegiate 4-H Club, the Review gave each county an opportunity to provide pictures and information on 4-H club activities.

This first special edition was a huge success. It was presented to the President of the United States in a ceremony in Washington, D.C., as a major part of the 4-H "Report to the Nation." The special edition continued annually for 17 years until declining interest and increasing costs stopped production.

Another special issue appeared in 1961 with a "Go to College" theme. Entitled "Education and Careers" this special edition continues today, going to each high school and junior high school in Kansas, as well as to regular subscribers.

Editorship changed in 1962 when Dale Apel resigned to become a member of the state 4-H and youth staff. Don Esslinger succeeded him until 1966 when he joined the KSU extension information staff. Esslinger was a Greenwood County 4-H member and Rice County extension 4-H agent.

Persons who edited the Journal for one year or less were Jon Brake, Jack Estlow, Bob Judd, and Susanne Johnson. Marie Rupp, a member of the Foundation staff



since 1960, became associate editor in October 1968 and served in this position until November 1975.

Bill Riley, associate director of the Foundation, assumed administrative responsibility for the Journal in January 1969. Glenna Wilson, a former Riley County 4-H club member and KSU journalism graduate, became production editor in 1970 and editor in 1975 when Marie Rupp retired.

Highlights of Journal issues include an editorial by Dr. Glenn M. Busset, assistant director of extension, Kansas State University; reports of club and county-wide activities; information from extension specialists and other authorities; and previews of state and area events.

Clovia—Home for Girls on the Campus

From the founding in 1931 by seven former 4-H women students at Kansas State University, Clovia has grown to its present size, a campus home for 62 members. Their functional house was made possible by the Kansas 4-H Foundation, Clovia alumnae, and various other contributors.

Clovia is an independent cooperative scholarship house. All housekeeping and meal preparation is divided among members.

Social events include a fall retreat, homecoming brunch, holiday dinners, a spring semi-formal dance, parents weekend, scholarship dinner, senior dinner, and crystal ball.

Clovia members are actively involved in intramural sports, functions with other houses, and campus activities.

Selection for membership is based on a written application, personal interview, and approved by a state 4-H representative and committee. Although a majority of the members are former 4-H'ers, women of similar background and interest find Clovia an enjoyable and satisfying campus home.

Clovia became an official Kansas 4-H Foundation project in 1967 with the construction of their new house and the underwriting of a loan of \$160,000.

A Clovia 4-H House will become a reality at Ft. Hays State College in August. Fourteen former 4-H members will begin their cooperative living experience at that time.

Projections for 4-H and Youth

The first 25 years of the Kansas 4-H Foundation was characterized by strong leadership, devoted staff, and the financial support of thousands of individuals, firms and foundations. The cooperative effort of these individuals and of the people of the state and county staffs of the Extension Service have produced quality 4-H programs for several decades, providing educational opportunities for youth of Kansas.

I anticipate continued growth of the Kansas 4-H Foundation in the next 25 years, based upon past performance of the 4-H movement, the world's largest youth organization. Continued growth will depend on the quality and quantity of 4-H programs offered, continued training of 4-H club leaders, and the success of our society to maintain a private enterprise system.

The activities of the Foundation will probably change somewhat in the years ahead. There may be (1) a deemphasis of building programs at the various Foundation owned facilities, (2) an outright effort to gain endowments for maintaining of properties and also for the support of programming for youth, (3) specialized leader training for adults, and (4) membership promotion.

More emphasis from national and state levels will be made in training Extension agents and volunteer leaders in methods of resource development from the private sector within their own counties. More and more groups outside the 4-H Extension family will be taking advantage of the citizenship, private enterprise and heritage programs at the Heritage Hall at Rock Springs Ranch. The need for support from the private sector may become much more evident as federal funding of Extension and other governmental programs declines.

The public image of 4-H has changed considerably since the Foundation was organized in the early '50s. From a program for farm youth belonging to project and community clubs, the present program has expanded into urban areas with 4-H club work being offered via television, with short term program experiences, and participation in outdoor educational activities.

Change in program and youth participation will probably continue; however, needs from the private sector will remain as great.

Boys and girls will continue to benefit from programs offered through 4-H, regardless of change. These programs can be enriched and expanded as private donors, the Kansas 4-H Foundation, and the Cooperative Extension Service continue to work together for youth.

No one can foretell the future. Perhaps it is well, for if we could foresee the difficulties that must be overcome, we might never attempt that which we do achieve.

We may not know what will work. But based on many years of experiences in educating farm boys and girls through informal 4-H projects at home, we can project some expectations. Many of these are projections of emerging situations, others are admittedly hypothetical.

(1) More and more adults will assume leadership roles, often of only temporary or short time nature. Training facilities and funds of the Kansas 4-H Foundation will assist greatly in the recruitment, training and retention of this specialized educational force.

(2) The community 4-H clubs will continue to increase in size and be the mainstay of the youth educational program.

(3) Programs for older youth will feature interstate exchanges; area events such as trail rides; threshold and adventure camping; and international educational experiences, all emphasizing growth opportunities beyond the local club and county.

(4) The entire 4-H program will become less rural with adult leadership drawn more and more from people who did not grow up on the farm. The 'junior leader trained to take over the club' concept has almost disappeared in our mobile American Society.

(5) Awards programs will gradually change, featuring group projects in which the entire 4-H club will work toward meeting a community need. It will mean involvement of young 4-H members, parents, and other community groups.

(6) Other elements of society concerned about problems of youth will continue to apply pressure, especially at the point of 'favored funding' for 4-H.

(7) Special groups that can organize, complete a project or task within a relatively short time, and then become inactive until another opportunity arrives will continue to attract large numbers of unattached boys and girls.

Whether or not these expectations come about in the next 25 years, it is certain that progress in Kansas State University's educational program for youth will be dependent on cooperation with the Kansas 4-H Foundation. It is a working partnership that has had no parallel since its inception 25 years ago.

Foundation Manages Three Centers

Rock Springs 4-H Center

A Sears-Roebuck Foundation gift of \$25,000 inspired 4-H members, leaders, families, and Extension personnel to consider establishing a state 4-H center.

A state camp selection committee was formed in 1945 and evaluated 22 sites before making Rock Springs Ranch, a 348-acre farm, their unanimous choice. In less than five months, 4-H members and their friends raised the purchase price of \$22,500 and burned the mortgage at State 4-H Round-up in June, 1946.

A Rock Springs Ranch committee with H. S. Hinrichs as chairman was formed in 1946. The first camping season that year found 2,267 club members and their leaders participating.

Following 4-H members recommendation, the first major improvement was a swimming pool in 1948. A supervisor's residence and sewage treatment plant were completed in 1949 and 1952.

The gift of a stable of Palomino horses from the Kansas Palomino Breeders Association in 1947 and a stable in 1959 from R. B. Christy, Scott City, added to campers' pleasure.

In the spring of 1955, Mr. and Mrs. A. D. Jellison, Junction City, gave money for a conference auditorium, meditation chapel, and health center to represent the four H's in 4-H club work — head, heart, hands and health.

A major milestone in the development of RSR came in 1957 when Mr. and Mrs. R. H. Garvey, Wichita, provided funds for the first permanent cottage. It was dedicated in 1959 to the memory of Asa Payne, a pioneer Northwest Kansas farmer.

The Cooperatives of Kansas gave funds and furnishings for a second permanent cottage, dedicated in 1959. The same year the KSU Collegiate 4-H Club gave funds for a shelter with a fireplace.

Another major improvement, completed in 1962, was the L. C. Williams Dining Hall. Kansas 4-H clubs and Extension personnel raised \$200,000 for this building in 1956 to add to the original \$25,000 from Sears-Roebuck Foundation.

First used on July 7, 1962, the dining hall marked the beginning of RSR as a year around conference center.

The H. W. Clutter Family Memorial Shelter and Vesper Outlook made possible by Kansas Master Farmers and Master Farm Homemakers were 1963 and 1964 additions.

The third winterized cottage, given by Kansas bankers, was completed in 1964. Major 1966 improvements were a dam for a 1.6-acre lake, Preston Cottage for year around use, and establishment of a primitive area for 50 campers.

The adjacent Camp WaShunGa site of 17 acres was purchased in 1969 by the Foundation with funds provided by Mrs. K. T. Wiedemann, president of the K. T. Wiedemann Foundation, Wichita. In 1974, she made possible the construction of a dining hall for the WaShunGa area.

The fifth modern cottage was dedicated in 1969 in honor of the late Lester W. Weatherwax, Wichita. It was made possible by Mr. and Mrs. Sam Wallingford, Wichita.

American Heritage Hall of Kansas, the largest single project at RSR, was completed in 1972. Jamie Schwartz was appointed the citizenship program coordinator for Heritage Hall. In 1976, the Dane Hansen Cottage was completed, made possible by the Dane Hansen Foundation.

The newest structure, the John-son Administration Center, will be dedicated at the Friends of 4-H Day on June 12. The Center was provided by Dwane and Velma (Lunt) Wallace, Wichita, and honors J. Harold Johnson, former state 4-H leader and first executive director of the 4-H Foundation. Johnson has devoted 50 years of service and leadership to the Kansas 4-H program.

Mrs. Claude V. Craig, Bonner Springs, was the 100,000th registrant at RSR in October 1962. Since its beginning in 1946, 350,000 persons have registered at the center.

Les Harrod is the resident director of Rock Springs Ranch.

Lake Perry 4-H Center

Following five years of negotia-

tions, 273 acres including several miles of access to Lake Perry were leased in 1971 from the Corps of Engineers. The Memorandum of Understanding between the Kansas 4-H Foundation and Kansas State University stated that the Foundation was to develop and operate a camp for underprivileged children, 4-H members, and other children and youth. The lease covers a 25-year period.

An additional 200 acres was purchased by the Kansas 4-H Foundation in 1972 from the Don Parker family.

Environmental education programs began in 1974. The first improvements on the site in 1974 included a graveled road, tents, canoes, barn storage area, backpacks, wildlife food areas established, and outdoor toilets.

Waterlines, storage cave, cold water showers, stress center area, canoe racks, bow range, and installation of multipurpose deck and shelter at the Point area were among the 1975-76 improvements.

Primitive camping is featured with canoeing, backpacking, fishing, learning survival skills and securing food and shelter in the wilderness some of the the activities.

Southwest 4-H Center

In 1975, 39 years after a 4-H camp was established near Dodge City, the Kansas 4-H Foundation was asked to assume the management of the Southwest 4-H Camp of 15 acres.

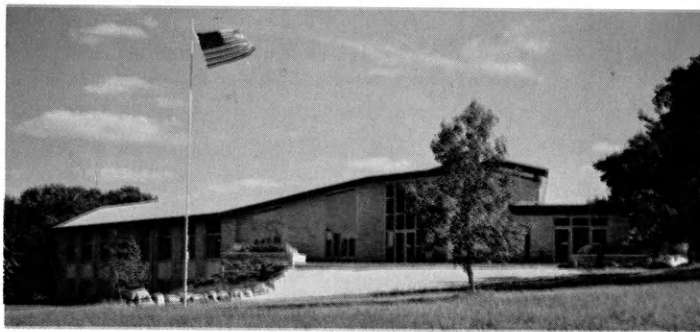
The center provides opportunities to youth in 22 counties and is a summer only facility for as many as 125 youths and leaders.

The original camp was dedicated on May 1936 on the site of the one-time State Soldiers' Home at Fort Dodge. Newspaper accounts tell of the dedication ceremony on the old parade grounds where "Generals Sheridan and Custer reviewed soldiers at the last outpost in the Indian country."

Following a major flood in 1951, the camp site was relocated on the Ford County Lake. The Southwest 4-H Camp Corporation continues to administer the operation.



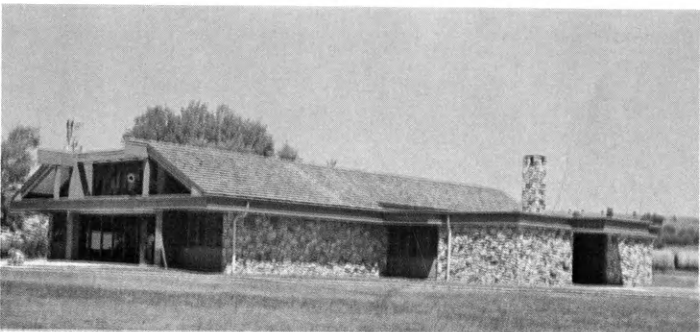

In the future thousands of Kansans will join "RSR alumni" in enjoyment of the beauty and facilities which make up this recreation and learning center.

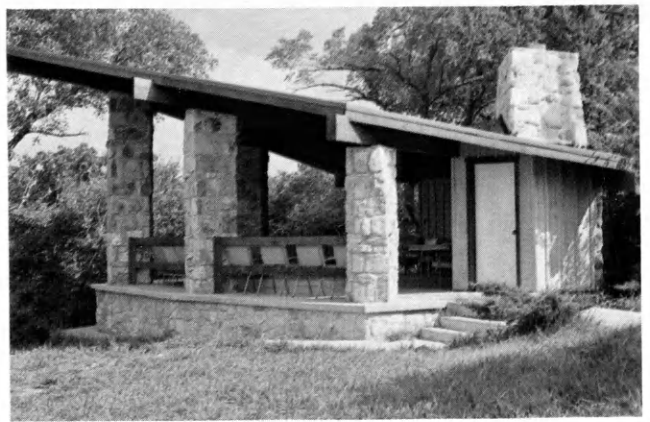

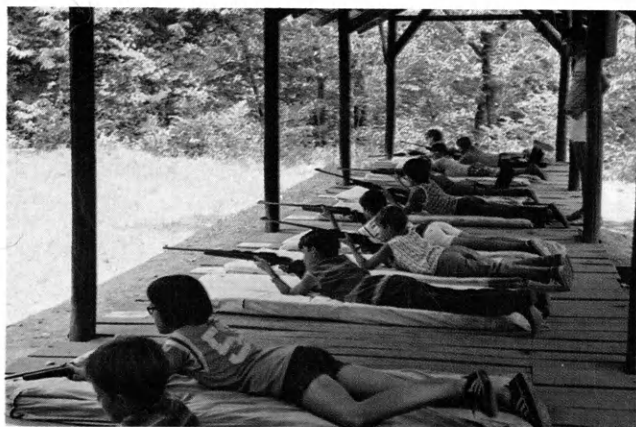

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An interview with Bill Riley

William M. Riley Jr., associate director of Kansas 4-H Foundation, is leaving the Foundation this summer to begin work as executive director of the Arabian Horse Registry of America Trust at Denver, Colorado.

In his work with the Foundation since 1968, Bill has been responsible for much of the management and supervision of Rock Springs Ranch, Lake Perry 4-H Center, and Southwest 4-H Center; he has been managing editor of Kansas 4-H Journal, also.

Previously Bill was a teacher and coach.

Because Bill has been associated with 4-H work both as a member and in his work with the Foundation, we asked him to share some of his thoughts with Kansas 4-H Journal readers.

Kansas 4-H Journal: Tell about your 4-H experiences in Washington County.

Riley: I was a member of a community club for several years. I attended Rock Springs Ranch three years and I always felt proud that I was once a 10 year old camper there.

Kansas 4-H Journal: Have your 4-H experiences helped you in your career?

Riley: I don't recall that I was unusually active as a 4-H member, but the personal benefits of participating in club activities and the experience of participating in demonstrations, holding offices, and similar activities are much easier to appreciate now as the beneficial, growing opportunities that they really were.

Kansas 4-H Journal: Who are some of the people who have had a major influence on your life?

Riley: That's a traditional but interesting question. The degree or type of influence, of course, varies, but I'm convinced that everyone you associate with has some influence on you. At the present time my family is the most consistent influence on my convictions and philosophies.

Kansas 4-H Journal: How did you come to work for Kansas 4-H Foundation?

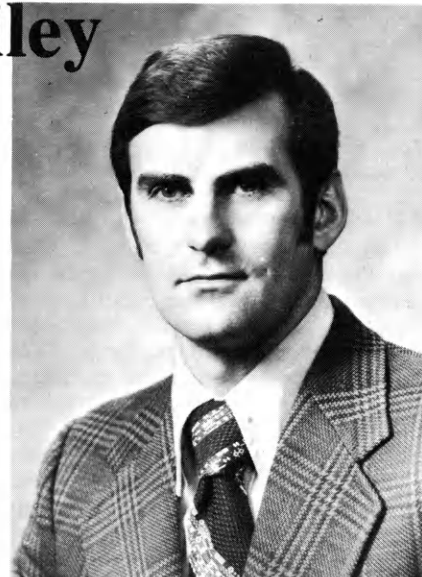
Riley: While teaching in Junction City, I had planned to return to Colorado to conduct horseback trips during the summer of 1965, but was at Rock Springs with a group of youngsters from school for a program in November of 1964 and decided to apply for the position of summer assistant director. I was on the summer staff then for three summers and in the spring of 1968 was planning to attend law school at Kansas University when the 4-H Foundation offered me an opportunity of a full-time position. I was quite impressed with the effort the 4-H Foundation was making in support of the 4-H program and felt that the experience of being involved with the Foundation would be too interesting and challenging to pass up.

Kansas 4-H Journal: I know you are an enthusiastic camper; what are some of the benefits which can come to people who are campers?

Riley: Many kinds of things, of course; probably to our family the simple joy of the natural environment or the "openness of the privacy available." Really, camping encompasses a variety of experiences that provide an opportunity for a family to be involved in a very total way that we think is most important.

Kansas 4-H Journal: What advice or suggestions do you have for boys and girls who are interested in camping?

Riley: Depending on the type of camping they have in mind, they need to simply participate; camping is really something you do. They may need to look in their communities for opportunities to participate in organized groups with organizations or agencies, or simply look for individual opportunities with qualified leadership. We feel the Lake Perry experience is ideally suited for the youngster needing an opportunity for a real camping experience. Lake Perry has the challenging, natural element, but yet has the security and benefits of supervision.



Kansas 4-H Journal: As a former coach and also in your work for the Foundation, you've seen all degrees of physical fitness in young people. How important is fitness for young people, and what suggestions have you for boys and girls as to how to develop their individual fitness to an optimum degree?

Riley: It seems to me that most youngsters are generally in good physical condition. The challenge seems to be in their, first, recognizing the value of good physical conditioning; second, accepting the challenge of maintaining it in their adult life; and third, appreciating the value of a good positive attitude about physical activities. Physical activities need to be enjoyable and participation must be consistent in order for true long-term adult life benefits to be achieved.

Kansas 4-H Journal: How important is it for young people to develop qualities of leadership? How can they do this?

Riley: I think John Kennedy said something to the effect that the most important product of democracy must be talented and capable leadership. It seems that it is more of a natural quality for some than others, but many people I respect as leaders are simply those persons with an understanding of their purpose, dedication to achieving that purpose with integrity, and a realization that few things are accomplished without the support of others.

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Cecil Eyestone retires

Kansas 4-H Journal: You've been involved with Kansas 4-H Journal for several years; how can 4-H members use it effectively, and how can it change and grow to serve 4-H work better?

Riley: In my judgment, the 4-H Journal provides Kansas 4-H'ers with the most unique communication tool in the nation. They should not consider the Journal as one way communication, but as an opportunity to share ideas, concerns, and experiences with other people throughout the state. I have long felt more active participation by leaders could open tremendous reservoirs of ideas as well as build stronger identity for the leaders in recognition of their vital role in the 4-H program. The success of the 4-H program seems to depend so much on the participation of the volunteer leader that every possible avenue or opportunity available to recognize and stimulate participation of these leaders should be explored.

and creates the luxury of our society to be concerned not simply about the **quantity** of life but about its **quality** and the action that will improve it.

The success of U.S. agriculture, which ironically has diminished its public image as surely as it has diminished its population, has—more than any other one force—fired up the expectations of society all around the globe for a better way of life. And the U.S. farmer's demonstration of matchless productivity provides the foundation upon which genuine hope for realization of those expectations can also rise.

Today, 146 years after the introduction of the reaper, we can, without using them all, count on the fingers of one hand the nations of the world that possess a surplus food

producing capability. Ours is first among them.

Well, a great many factors have combined to make U.S. agriculture what it is today—the American achievement above all others that the rest of the world wants and **needs** to emulate. But there can be no doubt whatever that, among those factors, the 4-H movement has played a mighty role . . . through its original, down-to-earth, learn-by-doing approach to education in the rapidly advancing science and technology of farming . . . through its years of promoting interest in agriculture among the young people of the nation . . . and through its unflagging assurance to them of the essential human dignity and worth of a life on the land.

4-H works. It works for the same reason this nation works—because it first developed a strong and productive base in agriculture. And the urban expansion of 4-H will succeed **not in spite of** its rural background but precisely **because** of it.

Kansas 4-H Journal: In today's busy world, what can being 4-H membs do for boys and girls?

Riley: It appears that the 4-H program today is attempting to provide opportunities that are compatible with the variety of interests youngsters now have. Hopefully, it will provide the full range of experiences that are available through the traditional club program in addition to the short term experiences. Presently 4-H can provide the opportunity many youngsters need for developing stronger identification with personalized participation and achievement of more intrinsic rewards. As parents, we will look for this type of activity for our children; I have always felt the unique value of 4-H is the emphasis on practical experience.

Kansas 4-H Journal: As a teacher and in your other work you've met hundreds of 4-H members and other young people. What advice do you have for them?

Riley: It is obviously presumptuous of me to give this kind of advice, but I personally feel that individuals should develop enough independence to do what they feel is right and the willingness to be responsible for their actions.

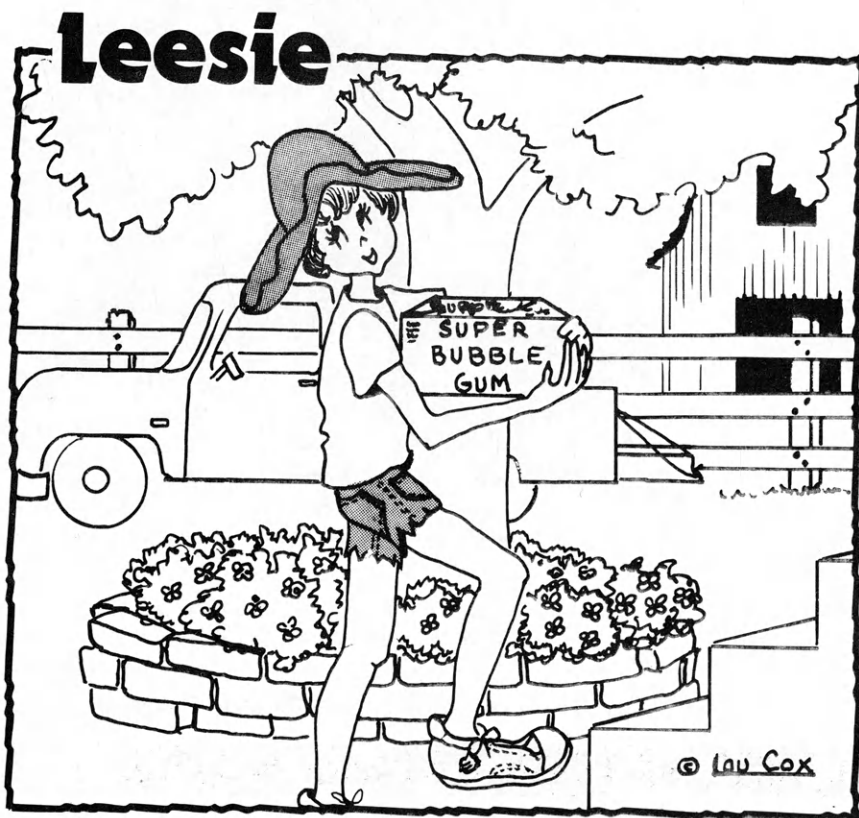

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Use of electric skills saves money

Having a knowledge of electricity has helped me to save money and helped our operation to save big electrical bills, along with the convenience of doing things when they need to be done. For my own personal use I wired my home stereo system again this year and replaced a speaker. In my new pickup I put in and wired my own CB (saved better than \$50), and installed and wired a dash Am/Fm/8-track stereo and speakers. I saved \$50 in parts and \$200 in labor compared to factory installation and \$146 compared to an independent installation.

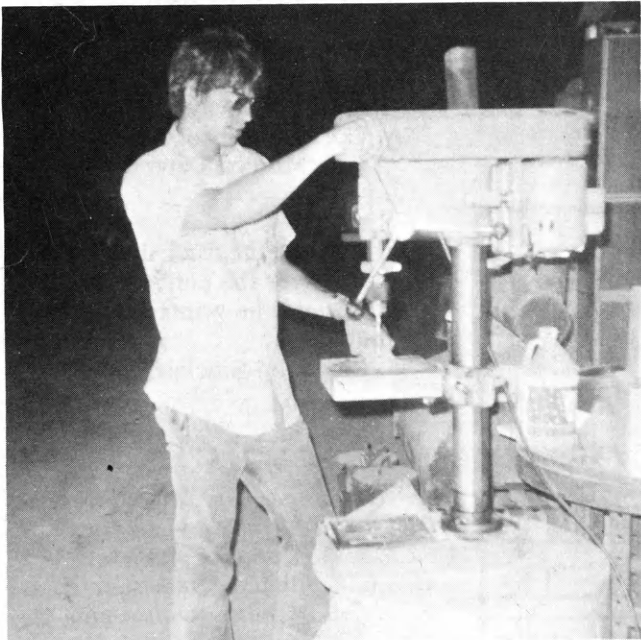
I made a 12-24 volt self-charging hookup for starting irrigation engines. I used an arc welder cable for the pickup hookup to the irrigation engine. The hookup,

made with male and female ends, connects in pairs so there is no chance of reversed polarity. I installed one in my dad's pickup, too. I also installed an alternate and/or extra fuel capacity system. This required wiring two fuel solenoids to the main switch in the cab.

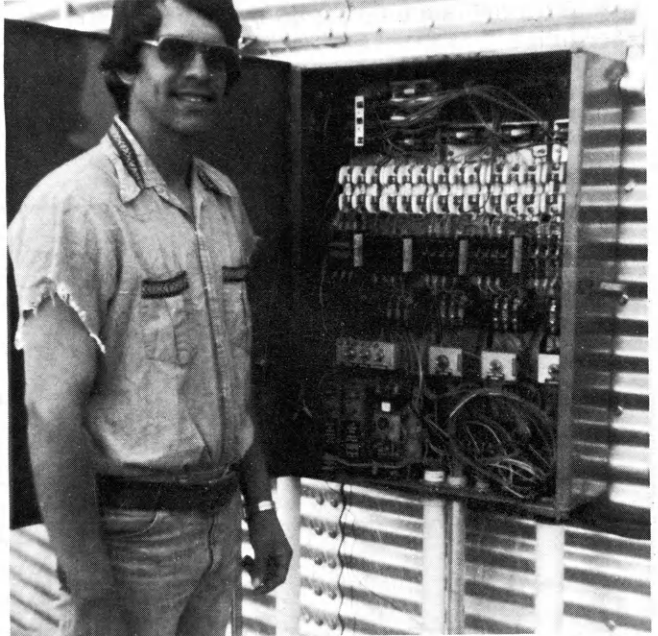
For the farm operation I helped wire several 220 volt motors, added to the Shivers drying system, made an outlet for the new welder, installed electricity to the cattle working shelter, cleaned motors, and wired the herbicide rig for an easy electric on-off.

My most trying project was wiring my dad's new drill press. It came without a motor so I had to get a two-speed motor that was capable of reverse rotation. I wired the motor, the main switch, and the high-low speed with little trouble but when it came to the forward and reverse it took a while.

Electricity is a worthwhile project.
