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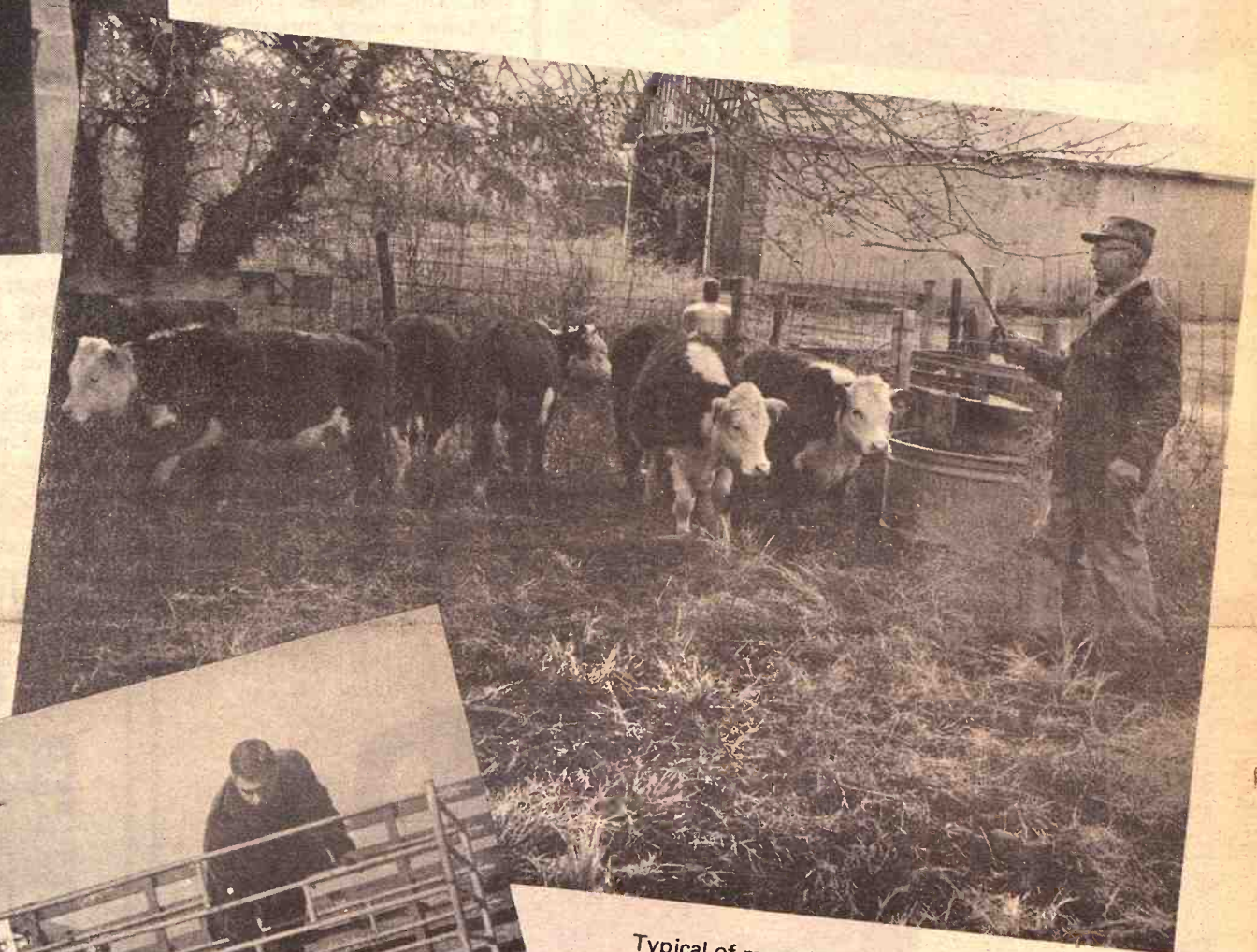

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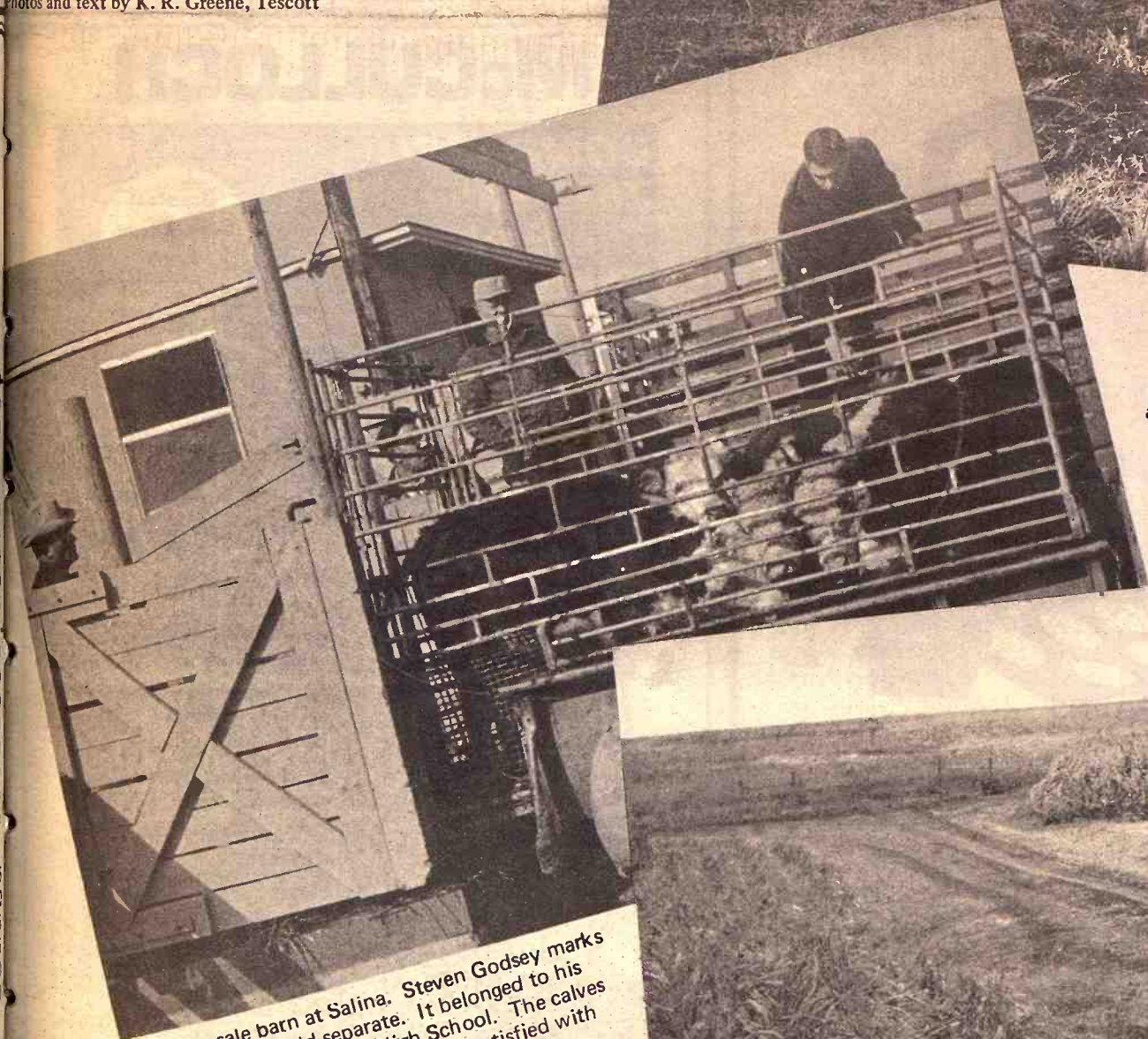

Typical of many farm scenes this time of year is sorting off the spring calves and hauling them to market. Gene Godsey of Bennington had 25 calves ready to go last Monday. Godsey has 60 Hereford cows. These were in a pasture near Glendale.

Calves With 'Booster' Hearts Watched By Medical Profession

Four calves potentially are making medical history while grazing calmly in Maryland pastureland.

All four have artificial "booster" hearts in their bodies. They are believed by government scientists to be the first animals to have such equipment remaining operative for appreciable periods.

The boosters are designed as aids to their natural hearts in experiments studying heart failure.

One of the calves, a Hereford named Butterball, holds the record so far. She's been alive and eating grass in her Gaithersburg, Md., pasture for the last six weeks.

Her three companions, including a male named Victor, and a female and a male that so far have not been given names, have had their heart-assist devices in place for lesser periods, one of them only a week.

Dr. Lowell T. Harmison, assistant director of the National Heart Institute's artificial heart program, said the success of the experiments to date represents a major step toward developing

total artificial heart substitutes. The goal of the heart institute program is to develop such substitutes for trials in animals and, eventually, perhaps for trial in humans.

In Houston Wednesday night, Dr. Denton A. Cooley said he believed a new type of mechanical heart — presumably meaning a total heart substitute — would be ready for trial in animals within a month.

Asked to comment on this, Dr. Harmison said that in the heart institute's program at least, total heart substitutes have not yet been developed to the point of trial in animals.

Describing the experiments on the calves, he said that in previous ventures of this type the power source for an internally implanted heart booster pump had always been on the outside of the animal's body.

In the new tests, rechargeable batteries inserted inside the calf's body are recharged every 40 minutes by electrical induction. This involves transmitting electrical energy through the intact skin by means of a system of coils.

Nothing is apparent from the outside except a small lump under the skin where a coil arrangement is placed.

Doctors Liberal On Abortion But Tough On Pot

A majority of American doctors polled say that a woman who wants an abortion should be able to have one.

Most also said that discreet homosexual acts between consenting adults should be permitted.

But the doctors overwhelmingly rejected the idea of legalizing the sale of marijuana.

These were the major results of a poll on sociomedical issues conducted by the publication Modern Medicine.

Dr. Donald W. Hastings, professor of psychiatry at the University of Minnesota, who analyzed the findings, said it appeared that physicians were leading the way with a critical look at the issues.

"One might predict," he wrote, that the views of physicians will become the common attitudes of tomorrow."

But of the doctors' views on marijuana, Dr. Hastings said:

"In view of the scientific ignorance about marijuana, one concludes that the strong physician dislike of it, which cannot rest on logical grounds, must be emotional in kind.

"One guesses that the rejection of 'pot' represents physical backlash toward all that it stands for: long hair, uncleanness, nonconformity to accepted standards of conduct, disregard of duty to country, and an uncomfortable sense that hippies, unless stopped somehow, represent the weak, ineffectual, effeminate American of the future."

On the abortion issue, the physicians were asked:

"Should abortion be available

to any woman capable of giving legal consent upon her own request to a competent physician?"

Of the 27,741 who took part, 62.8 percent said yes, 37.2 percent said no. Of the "yes" group, 11.8 per cent qualified their answers — saying that they approved of abortion for medical reasons, for example, or only following incest or rape.

Fifty-one percent gave an unqualified yes, while only 4.4 percent gave an unqualified no.

On allowing homosexual acts, 67.7 percent were in favor, 32.3 percent against.

On the sale of marijuana, 85.1 percent were against legalizing it, 14.8 for.

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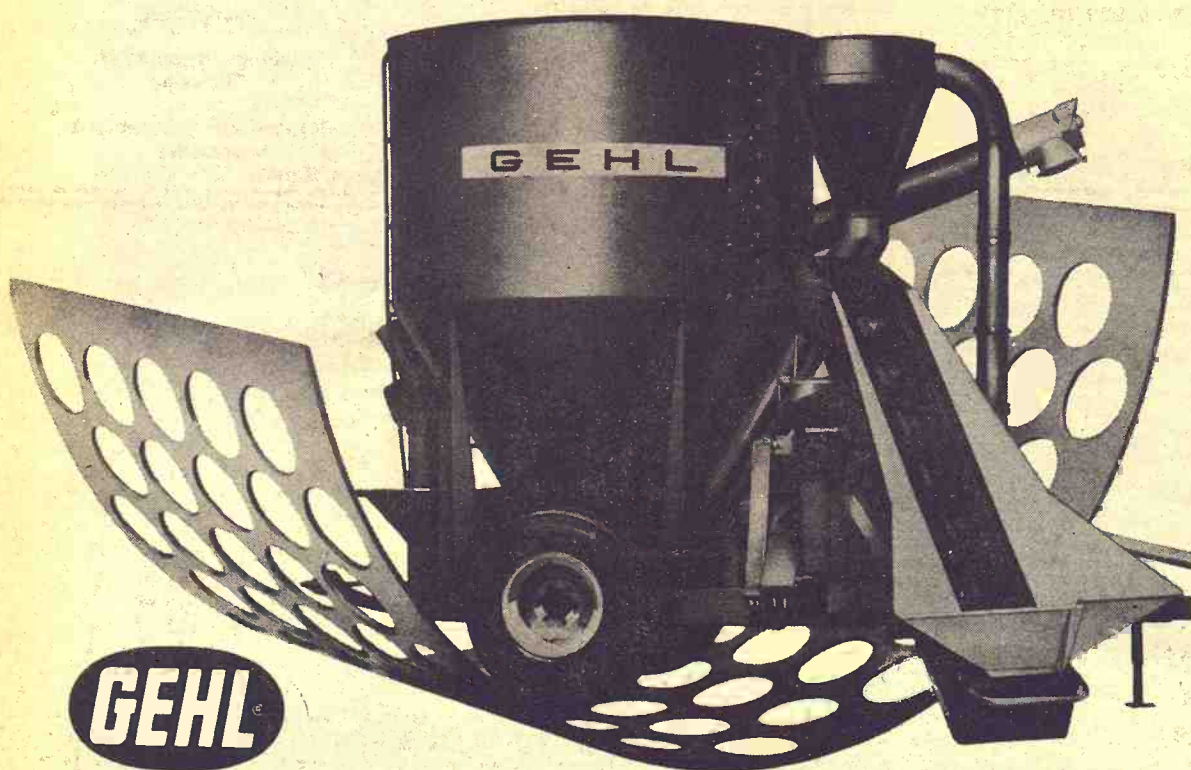
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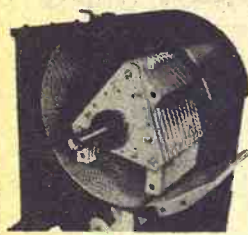


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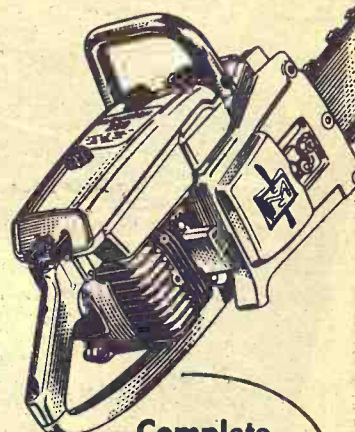

Iowa Packers Files Lawsuit Against Union

Iowa Beef Packers has filed a \$10 million suit against Amalgamated Meat Cutters and Butchers Workmen of North America at Fort Dodge, Iowa. The company, which has some history of labor strife, alleges illegal work stoppages and acts of sabotage at plants in Mason City, LeMars, and Fort Dodge, Iowa.

The company said the walk-outs were in support of a strike at Iowa Beef's Dakota City, Nebr., plant, which have endured for nearly three months.

Altho only nine years old, Iowa Beef is one of the nation's largest meat packers, with 1968 sales of \$534 million. It runs packing plants in Iowa, Nebraska, Minnesota and Kansas. The one in Kansas is at Emporia.

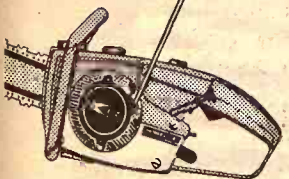
The Wall Street Journal noted that the company has traditionally taken a hard-nosed approach to labor relations. The company has acted as prime contractor in the construction of its own plants, allowing it to employ nonunion construction workers who eventually take jobs in the plants. The Dakota City plant was built a few years ago by 250 such workers, who were paid \$1.25 an hour, far below the rate for construction workers at the time.

Vote On Future Of Longford HS

CLAY CENTER — Patrons of the former Longford rural high school district will vote, probably in mid-December, on whether to close the high school at the end of the current school year.

If the vote is favorable, students would go to Clay Center or Wakefield senior high schools.

Such a vote is required under unification law. The old high school district now is part of the Clay County unified school district.

Regardless of the vote results, the school board will retain grades 7 and 8 at Longford.

The decision to call the election was made after meetings of school administrators and school board members with patrons of the former district.

Declining enrollment was cited as the reason for the decision. The Sept. 15 enrollment was 68 students in 1966 but had dropped to 36 by the same date this year. Sept. 15 is the official reporting date for state aid purposes.

Students now enrolled in the Longford and Oak Hill elementary schools won't bring that enrollment up unless area population increases, school officials have said.

Some junior high subjects now

are taught at the Longford high school. Closing of the senior high grades would make the junior high system similar to those at Clay Center, Green, Morganville and Wakefield.

Major Cut In Phone Toll Coming

The Federal Communications Commission says the American Telephone & Telegraph Co. will reduce long distance telephone rates about \$150 million a year.

The FCC said the proposed reductions are being submitted by the company in connection with a comprehensive review recently completed by the FCC of the Bell System's operation.

The new rate reductions for interstate telephone calls is in addition to reductions of about \$87 million which AT&T previously agreed to file.

The \$87 million represents an offset to increases in revenue resulting from higher rates recently filed for program transmission, Telpak and teletype-write exchange services.

The FCC said it anticipates that the new rates will permit the Bell System companies to achieve earnings in the range needed to attract capital.

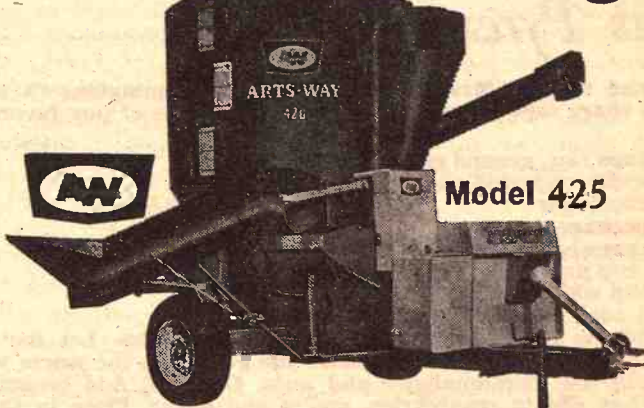
The FCC said the proposed reductions take into account in-

creases in AT&T's cost of capital but recognize that the growth in interstate communications traffic is continuing unabated and that the average revenue per message has shown a steady

increase.

The interstate earnings of the company have consistently grown despite the increases in its costs due to the inflationary spiral," the FCC said.

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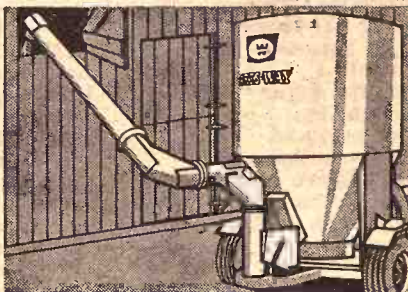

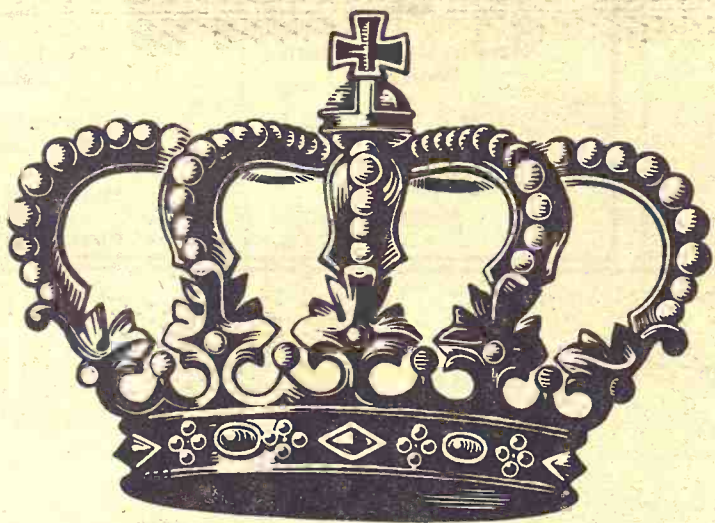

Points To Consider

When Choosing Blankets

Beds, like people, come in assorted sizes. There are twin, full, queen, king and western king beds. Each of these should be outfitted with properly fitting blankets.

When selecting blankets, consider whether they will be used by gentle Granny or a rugged teen, in a warm room or a barely heated one. Whatever your needs, today's blankets are engineered to meet them. Most modern blankets are synthetic, with acrylics leading the market.

Acrylics are soft, light, warm, resilient, moth and allergy proof and machine washable. They closely resemble wool, but cost much less. Unless treated with a finish such as "Supernap," however, they pill and shed.

Although "Vellux" blankets have been on the market for only a few seasons, they are also popular for lightweight warmth and easy care. These nylon flocked polyurethane foam blankets laminated over a core of nylon mesh are strong, machine washable and will not pill or shed.

The newest development in blankets is the growing impor-

tance of ones fitted at the bottom. These provide more foot room, make bedmaking easier and result in a more tailored, less bulky appearance. However, they cannot be rotated for even wear.

Other specially made blankets are those woven in a leno pattern. Called thermal blankets, their open weave makes them effective as light summer covers. They become warm in winter if another blanket is placed on top to "trap" heat.

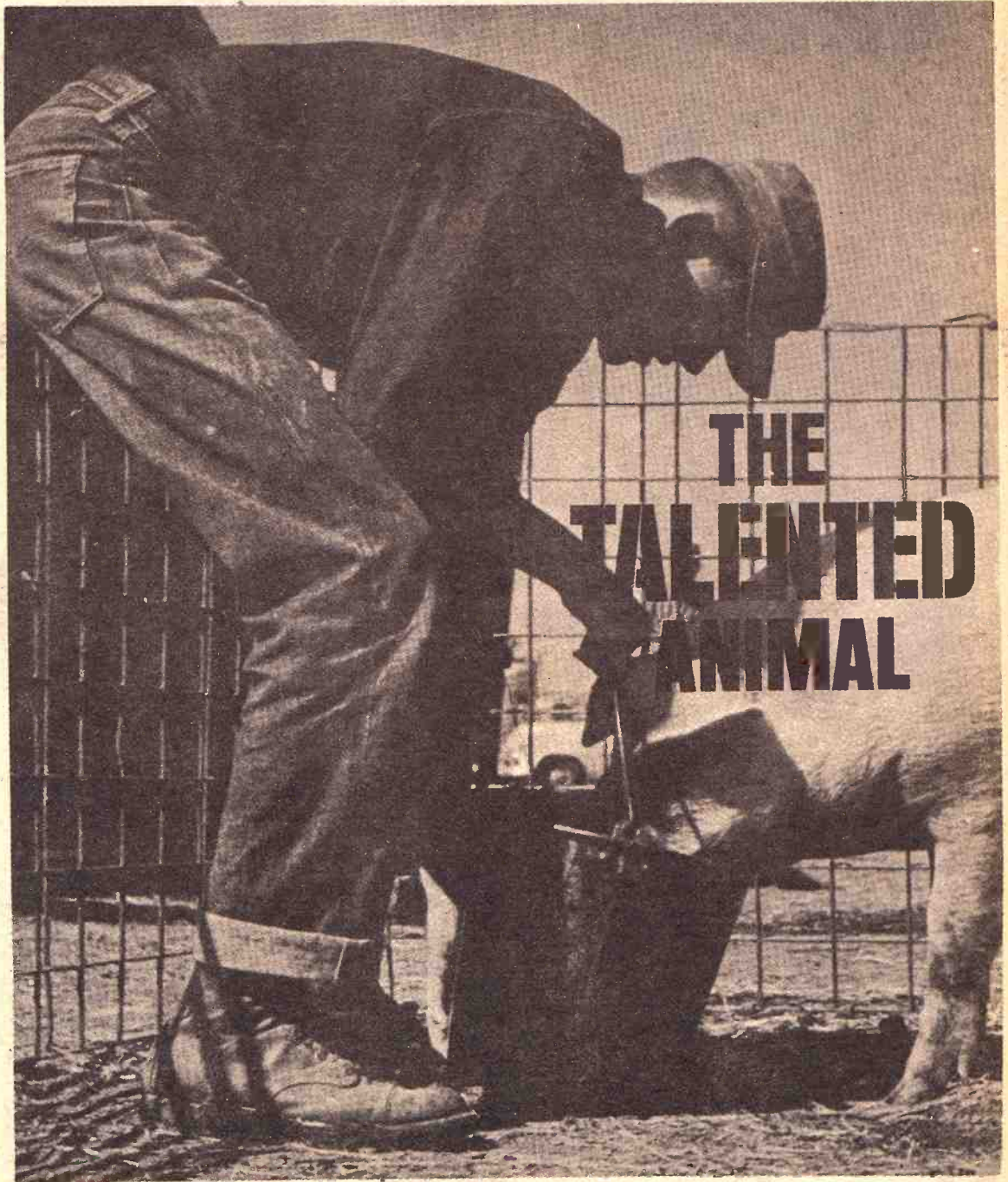

Make Colorful Posies From Cotton Fabrics

For perennial posies that bloom all year long, try your hand at making flowers from colorful cotton fabrics.

Make a set for your own table, for gifts, or for the holiday ba-

zaar. Use the same fabrics in one bouquet, or vary them with a mixture of calicos, gingham and solid color cottons.

One of the simplest designs is a tulip. For a striking effect, use striped black and white pique for the outer petals and solid white pique for the inside.

To form the basic seven-petaled flower, start by cutting a 5x10-inch rectangle from each fabric. These are to be glued together — print side out, with household cement.

However, to make the petals flexible, place strips of florist's wire — allowing one strip for each petal — between the fabric layers at 1½-inch intervals before gluing. Make the wire strips about seven inches long so they will overhang the rectangle and can be used to attach the flower to the stem. Next, glue the 5-inch sides of the rectangle together to form a cylinder. Then snip out petal shapes, cutting so that each wire strip is in the center of a petal. Make flower centers from cotton ball ruffe pompoms and fabric-covered wires twisted in curlicue shapes to resemble tulip stamens.

Tape the completed center to a stem made from heavy florist's wire or a coat hanger and insert through the petal-shaped cylinder. Then twist wires at bottom of cylinder gathering fabric around the stem. Wrap the entire stem with florist's tape.

Once you've started making these fabric flowers, you can use your own imagination and come up with a variety of original creations.



Clean Phone Regularly

Don't neglect to give the phone regular cleanings. Do by wiping it thoroughly with a damp cloth that has been wrung out of warm soapsuds. Wipe the cloth tightly, so that it will be almost dry and go all over the telephone with it, moving briskly.

Rinse immediately with a cloth wrung out of clear warm water and dry with a soft cloth.

To Splice Yarn

When yarn breaks or comes to the end of one ball, you want to begin another. To splice the ends together with a needle. Thread the needle with one end and weave in and out of the other end. Make easy running stitches. Make spliced section about three inches long, then pull gently on strands until the ends go out of sight. The splice is invisible when you begin to knit again.

Protect Lingerie

To cut down on snags and insure delicate lingerie or fragile fabrics longer life, the inside of bureau drawers and apply a coat of enamel. This does away with rough places that catch or snag fine material.

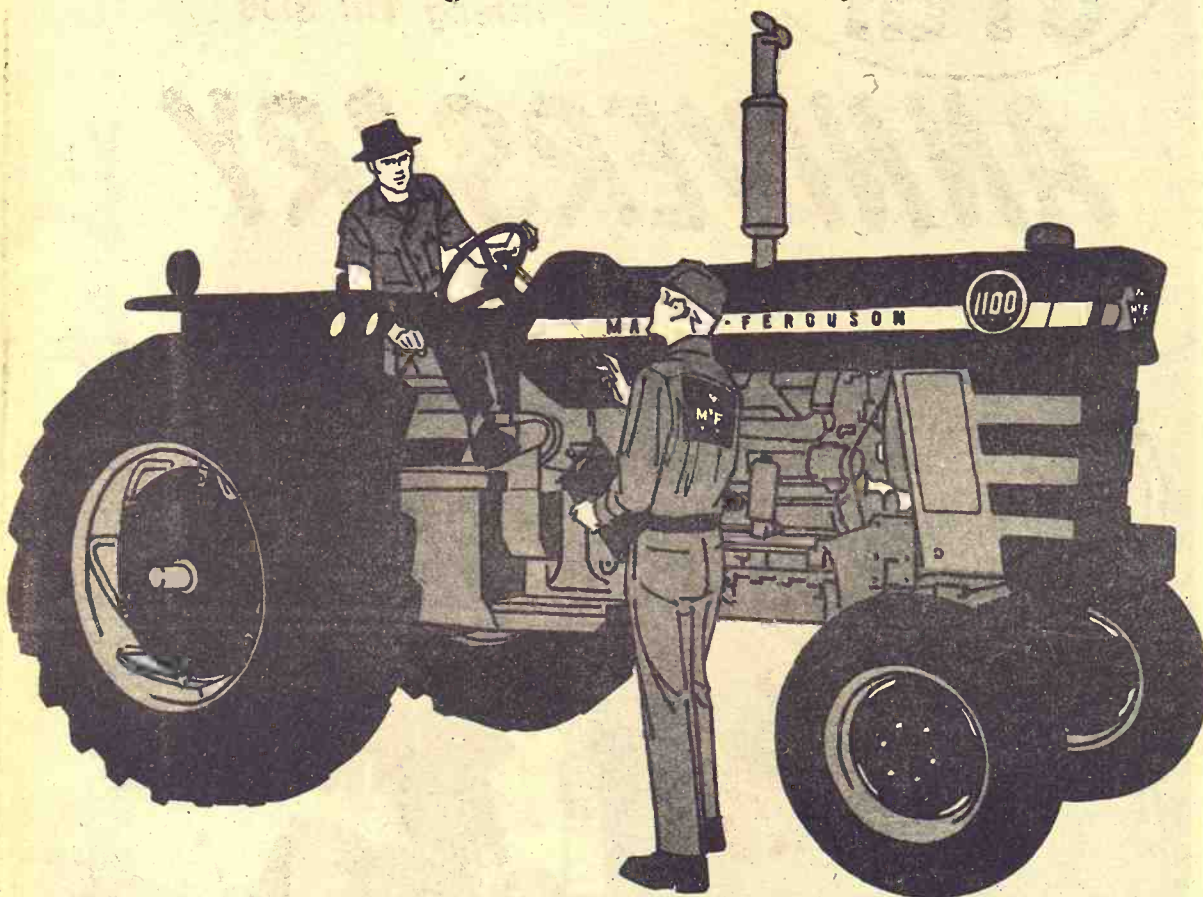

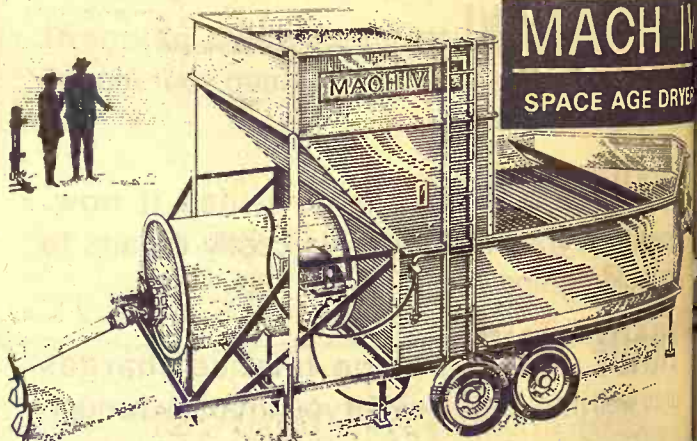

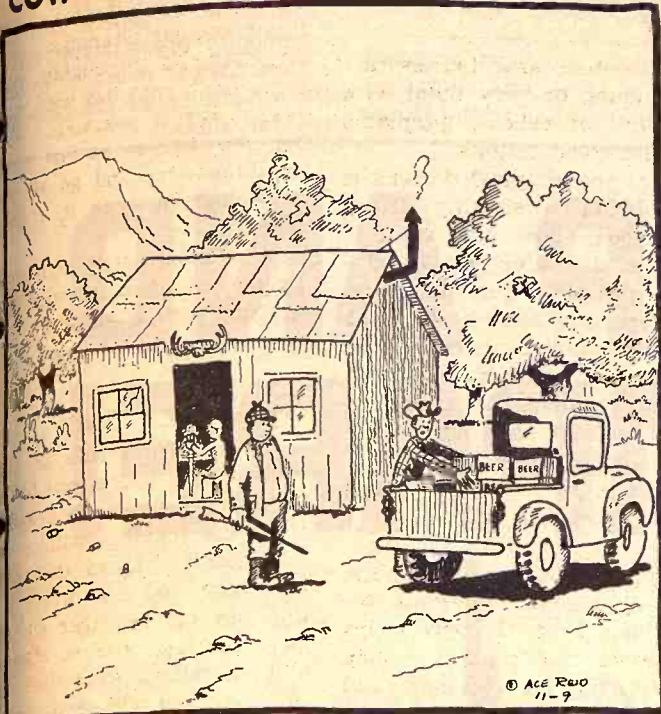

Octane Marking— Would It Mean Anything?

The bulk of the oil industry say the octane ratings are such a minor part of quality considerations that they would be meaningless.

The matter was aired before

the Federal Trade Commission, which is considering whether to require octane ratings should be ordered posted. There's no result so far since the hearings brought out apparently irreconcilable differences.

Even the air-pollution people got into the hearing records with a claim that octane ratings could contribute to reduce noxious emissions. Somebody from the Health, Education and Welfare Department wrote in saying that too low octane numbers made an engine run hot and give off nitrous oxides. He claimed that too high an octane for the engine was equally bad because it contributed to the emission of lead compounds.

The big gun of the forces in favor of posting the ratings was

Mrs Virginia Knauer, consumer adviser to the President. She said the octane ratings would be a good way to "inform the motoring public of the quality of a gasoline." Another proponent, Sen. William Proxmire, a Democrat, said oil companies exchange the fuel among themselves on the basis of octane numbers, so they must have some meaning.

The industry, except for some independent filling station operators, opposed the order on various grounds. This side supported its arguments by setting up a small engine and instruments in a room down the corridor from the hearing hall to show how different octane fuels could give the same results in an engine. The basis of the industry claim was that the only real test of a fuel is how it performs in an engine, having regard to the type of driving, temperature, altitude and humidity. Octane ratings are merely one of many characteristics, industry spokesmen said.

One group of filling station owners brought up even another problem. How, they asked, can the dealer be sure of the octane

rating of what he buys, since it may have started out from the factory as 100 octane but been mixed with something else in unknown proportions.

Hog Carcass Show At Great Bend

GREAT BEND — A live and dressed swine carcass show has been planned here for Nov. 13 and 14.

It will be conducted by Eugene Francis, area livestock specialist from Garden City.

Running from 10 a.m. until

noon, the show will be held in the Great Bend Livestock Commission Co. sale barn Nov. 13. All pork producers in this area are invited to enter one market hog in the show.

The entries will be slaughtered by the Thies Packing Co. and a dressed carcass show will be held the next evening at 7:30 at the plant.

Purpose of the show is to help producers produce and breed top quality pork. A top quality carcass should show less than 1.5 inches of backfat, four square inches of loin eye, 29 inches of carcass length, and have an acceptable lean quality.

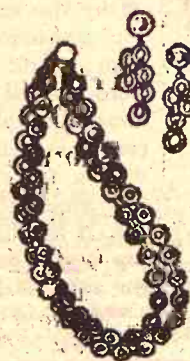

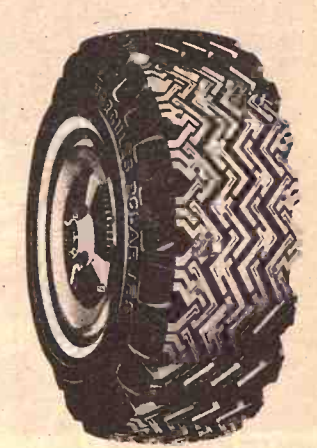
ped from 3.5 million tons to 3.1 million tons for a 13 percent decline.

Mobil Sells Fertilizer Unit

The Mobil Oil Corp. is getting out of the retail fertilizer business.

Assets of Mobil Chemical, a division of Mobil Oil, have been sold to Swift & Co. Mobil has not been active in the G&G area in fertilizer sales, altho Swift has been selling in some parts.

Swift officials disclosed that their own operations have experienced a substantial turnaround in the past year and have been operating profitably, contrary to general industry conditions.

The transaction involved most of Mobil's retail fertilizer assets, which include its liquid and chemically fixed fertilizer operations and its marketing force.

However, Mobil Chemical will continue to wholesale fertilizer

materials and to operate its nitrogen complex in Beaumont, Texas. Swift will assume control of about 65 blending operations, 15 mixed goods plants, and six redistribution warehouses, employing a total of some 1400 persons.

Swift officials said they anticipate "shrinking the assets" obtained from Mobil to make them profitable. Joseph Sullivan, president of Swift's agricultural chemicals division, said the company expects to follow moves that it has been making in its own operations by eliminating areas considered obsolete and unprofitable. He said Swift probably would be able to hire only about half of the Mobil operation work force.

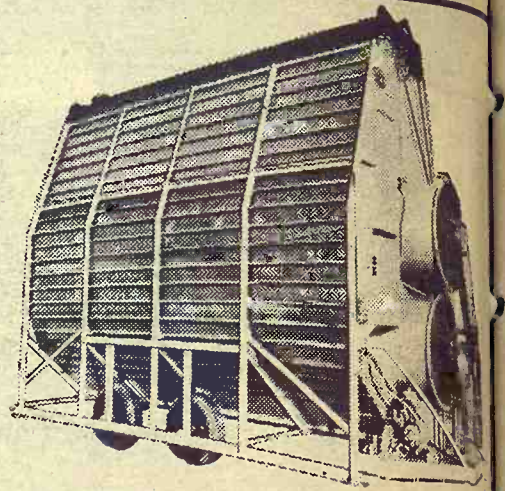

Set Procedures For KU Discipline

LAWRENCE — New rules of procedure have been adopted by the Kansas University disciplin-

ary board, Martin Dickinson Jr., associate professor of law and board chairman, has announced.

Under the rules any student, faculty member or administrative official may file charges against a KU student with the dean of men or dean of women.

The deans may deal with the matter administratively or refer the case to the disciplinary board.

The person bringing the charge or the person charged may appeal to the board action by a personnel dean or disciplinary action by any other party.

The new rules establish means of setting up a hearing and of notification of the charges, the rights of the person charged and the conduct of hearings.

The person charged may have an adviser of his own choosing.

A person charged under the new rules may choose a public or private hearing.

A private hearing will not limit announcement of the board's action and circumstances of the case, but the name of the person charged may be divulged only to appropriate university officials.

- To oppose use of the assessment ratio laws of the state.

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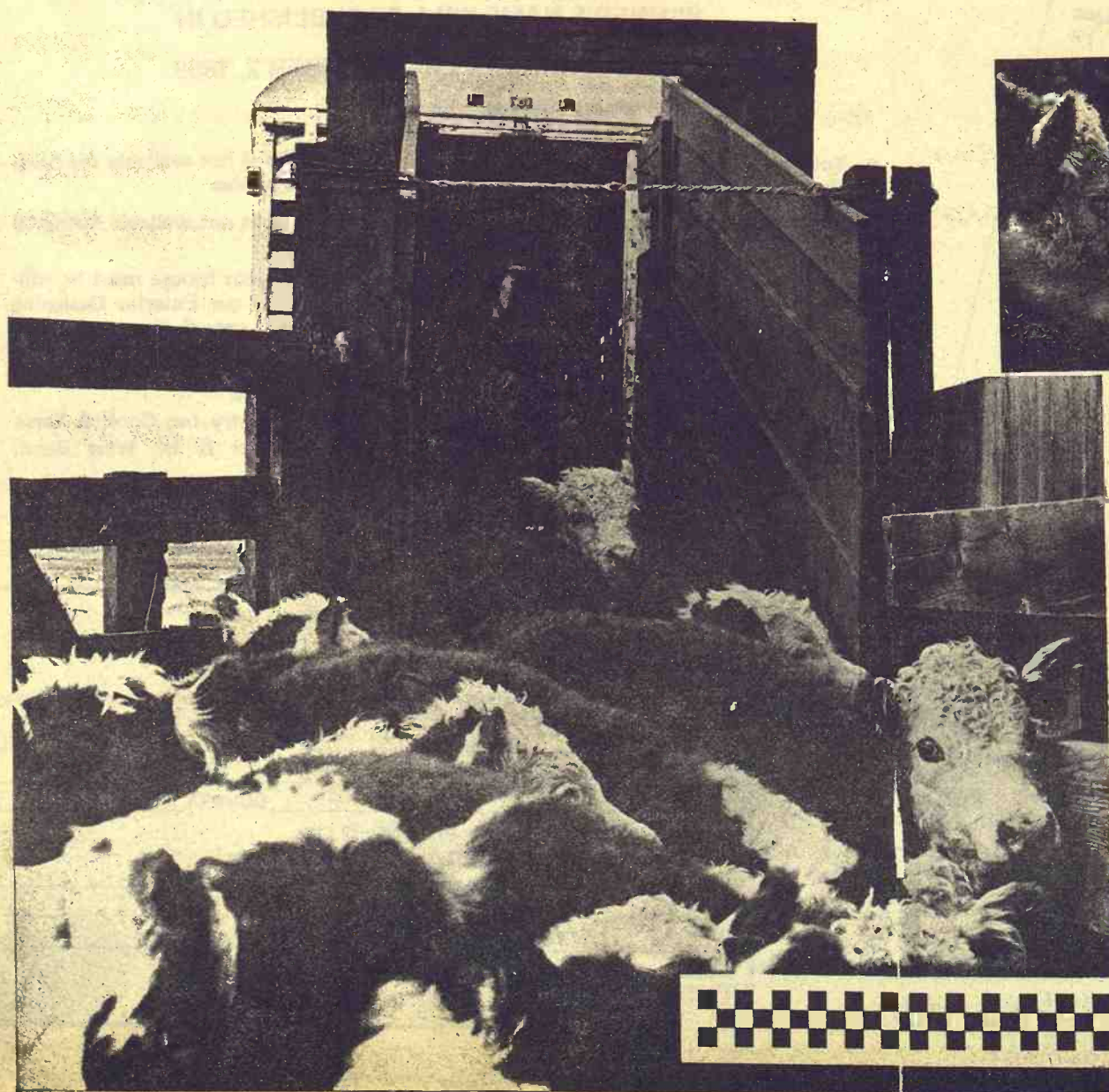

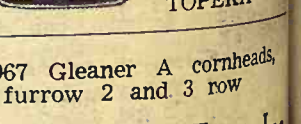

Some Hints On Stretching Pasture

Grazing capacity of Kansas
rangeland could be increased
considerably with the proper
distribution of cattle.

That's the word from a pair of
Kansas State University agron-
omists — Robert M. Hyde, Ex-
tension specialist in range and
pasture management, and Clen-
ton E. Owensby of the resident
agronomy staff.

In a new Extension leaflet en-
titled "Livestock Distribution
Tools," Hyde and Owensby main-
tain that "proper stocking of
rangeland is a myth if livestock
grazing patterns are not manip-
ulated."

Rangeland is like a chain with
a weak link — the first place of
consequential size that is over-
grazed determines the capacity
of the whole range.

"Cattle are creatures of habit
and habitually over-use some
areas of most range units, and
under-use others," the agrono-
mists note.

"Overuse or under-use are
either injurious or wasteful —
both are costly."

Hyde and Owensby have come
up with 10 effective tools to
manipulate grazing patterns,
use grass more effectively and
increase ranch income:

- 1 Separate vegetation types by
fencing.
- 2 Feed winter supplements in
under-used areas
- 3 Build hillside catch-ponds for
livestock water
- 4 Salt in the best possible
locations
- 5 Have sufficient, well-develop-
ed water
- 6 Spot-fertilize with nitrogen
(2-5 acres) in under-used areas
- 7 Spot burn (5-10 acres) in un-
derused areas (applies to east-
ern Kansas only)
- 8 Drift cattle by riding or drift
fencing
- 9 Properly locate oilers or rub-
bing posts
- 10 Use rotation grazing

"No matter how lightly your
range is stocked, how well your
cush is controlled, how well
your old fields and depleted
range are seeded, or whether
your range is in fair, good or ex-
cellent condition — the odds
are that you can profit by using
one or more of these tools," the
agronomists conclude.

The range management leaf-
lets are available at county Ex-
tension offices in Kansas.

Hansen Aligns With Superior, Nebraska, Barn

stock Commission Co. of Super-
ior, Nebr., soliciting cattle in

building a barn there and open-
ing this fall.

Hansen said he had resigned
from the Belleville operation be-
cause he could not "abide by the
rules and wishes of the majority
of the directors."

In a statement Hansen said he
"felt that several of the rules
under the Packers & Stockyards
Regulations were being circum-
vented under these rules and
our consciences would not let us
condone such practices."

Eldon Pugh, one of the direct-
ors of the Belleville corporation,
who had also been in cattle
sales, has taken over the gen-
eral operation of the Belleville
firm.

Fewer State Tax Refunds

Kansas taxpayers have received \$5 million less in state income tax refunds this year than last, the Revenue Dept. reported

The average amount of the refund also dwindled this year, compared with the previous 12-month period. The average income tax refund in 1969 in \$22.55 per return compared with an average of \$30.27 per return in 1968.

The refunds granted this year are on income that was earned in 1968, and the refunds granted last year were on income earned in calendar year 1967.

Officials in the Revenue Dept. said the decrease in income tax refunds this year was due largely to a cut in the state withholding rate that was in effect during all of calendar year 1968.

The state withheld at the rate of 10 percent during 1968 in contrast to a withholding rate that averaged out to 12.5 percent during calendar year 1967.

Here's Current
Corn Situation

The present corn situation is like that of a year ago in some ways, yet different in others. The supply is nearly the same as last year, but prospective needs are larger. Prices were higher during most of this year's harvest season, so they may not increase as much as they did last year.

The supply of corn in sight October 1 totaled 5470 million bushels — 1 percent less than a year before. Stocks of old corn are a bit larger than was expected earlier. The carryover on October 1 was estimated by the USDA at 1,122 million bushels — 3 percent less than the year before. Some early forecasts had indicated a reduction of 10 to 15 percent. The new crop was estimated in early October at 4,500 million bushels — down less than 1 percent from the 1968 figure.

More corn may be needed. Looking ahead, the amount of corn used and exported during the present marketing year would be around 4,550 million bushels. This is figuring 3 percent more than the disappearance last year. A little more corn than last year may be needed for beef cattle, broilers, laying flocks, and exports. Little change is expected in the amount of corn needed to feed dairy cattle and hogs, and for processing.

The projected disappearance exceeds the new crop by about 200 million bushels. The excess needs over production will be made up by using some of the old corn now in storage. Additional old corn will be needed to offset any new corn that is put under price support and not redeemed.

What price will it take? The big question is, "What prices will be required to bring the needed amount of corn to market?"

The required price range may be \$1.20 to \$1.25 a bushel, the same as that of last spring and

summer. At that time, such a price was high enough that farmers redeemed most of the 400 million bushels of 1968 corn placed under loan. Those prices were also high enough to bring out some of the older corn that farmers had been holding under resale loans.

The 1122 million bushels of old corn on hand October 1 could be divided into three parts, according to ownership and the prices expected to bring it to market. These three divisions would be: (1) Corn owned by the CCC, (2) corn under resale loans, and (3) "free" corn.

Selling prices for old corn. The official figures for each classification of corn are not complete. (Late recording occurred on some 1968 corn that was redeemed or resealed.) Therefore, some of our figures are estimated ones.

Although the CCC has about 300 million bushels of old corn, this is not likely to sell because the asking price is too high. In October, the CCC offered corn in central Illinois at \$1.33 a bushel, and the price will be raised

1 1/2 cents each month.

Apparently, farmers are holding more than 350 million bushels of old corn under resale loans, most of which could be sold at a few cents profit when prices reach \$1.20 to \$1.25 a bu-

shel. A profit could be realized on all of it at \$1.30.

The remainder of the carryover, perhaps 475 million bushels, is "free" corn, neither owned by the CCC nor under any form of price support. The supply of

this "free" corn seems to be about the same as a year ago.

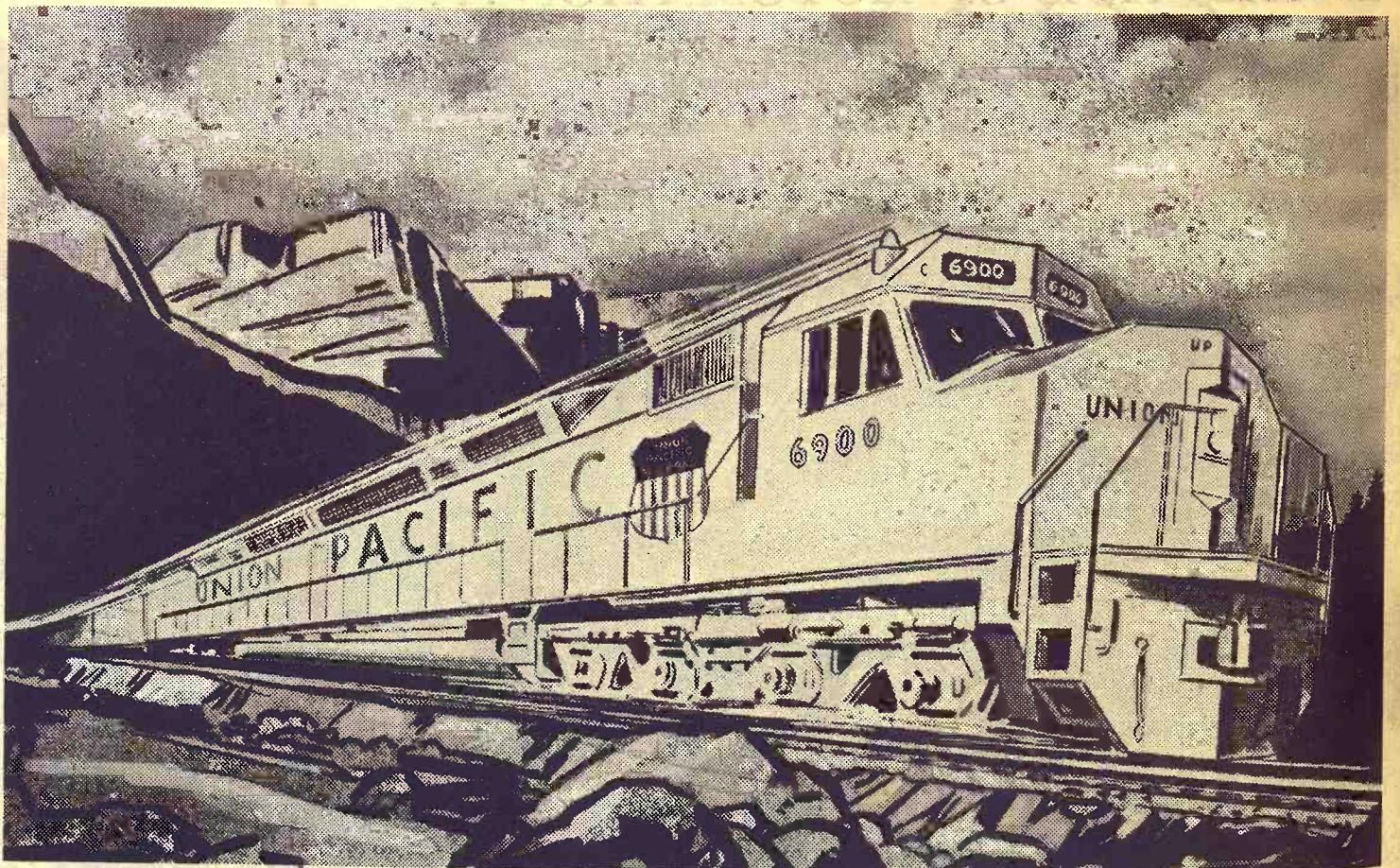

Declines In Milk Output May Be Over

The Agriculture Department says declines in milk production the past five years may end in per cow and a slowdown in the rate of cutback in dairy herds. Officials said in a dairy report summary that 1969 milk output

may total 116 billion pounds, 1 percent less than last year. But, the report said, production began rising in August above a year earlier and is expected to continue larger through the rest of 1969.

"The fall in milk cow numbers has slowed steadily in 1969," the report said, "and this winter the decline likely will be less than in recent winters. The gain in milk output per cow this fall is sharper than in recent years."

Last June the department estimated 12.7 million milk cows on farms, down 2.8 percent from a year earlier, and the fewest since 1887. But the rate of decline was much slower than the sharp drop of 6 percent in 1966.

Traditionally, dairymen cull herds severely when beef prices are high — as they were earlier this year — and some observers expected dairy cow numbers to be cut more sharply than they were.

But milk prices paid to farmers have softened culling, officials say. For 1969, the price of all milk may average about 3 percent more than the \$5.24 per hundredweight received last year, the report said, and total farm cash receipts from dairying may rise 2 to 3 percent from 1968.

The report said, however, that for early 1970 at least "the prospect of increased production without growth in commercial use" may cool off chances for continued boosts in farm milk prices.

Officials said milk prices received by farmers this fall are running about 2.5 percent more than last year, compared with gains of around 5 percent ear-

lier in 1969.

Commercial sales of milk in all products during July-September were estimated more than a year earlier after declining during the first six months. For all of 1969, the report said, sales will probably be 1 percent less than the 110 pounds milk equivalent of last year.

"Per capita consumption will drop more than the average decline of recent years because of lower sales and declining farm household use of home-produced milk," the report said.

Government-owned stocks of milk this year may be less than six billion pounds, compared

with 7.5 billion at the end of 1968. The report said more milk owned by the Commodity Credit Corp. has moved this year into domestic family feeding programs and foreign aid.

Total exports in 1969 may be near last year's 1.2 billion pounds. Imports this year are expected to be down from 1.8 billion pounds shipped into the United States in 1968, the report said.

Western Kansas Auction Might Hit Half Million

HUGOTON — A corporation with \$1 million capital has been established here to provide funds for purchase of feeder cattle and to accept some of the risk or gain of the cattle feed-

ing business.

Cattle Funds Inc. provides a means for investors entering the field and takes over the problem of purchasing cattle, financing and placement of the animals.

The corporation was started by 14 businessmen, cattlemen, bankers and farmers from southwest Kansas. It has 250,000 shares of no-par capital stock, which is expected to be com-

pletely sold by the first of next year.

Company officials said the fast-growing beef-feeding business in the area has put the squeeze on available feed crops in some parts of southwestern Kansas and a resultant squeeze on an adequate supply of feeder calves in other areas.

The major squeeze, they say, is the financing of the growth of the industry.

Funds for the construction of feedlots have been provided by life insurance companies, Small Business Administration guaranteed bank loans and commercial sources.

The \$1,250,000 needed to construct a 30,000 head feedlot does not compare with stocking the lot with feeder cattle, which runs into several million dollars.

This cost and the additional contract cost of feeding prohibits many would-be investors from getting into the cattle feeding business.

Cattle Funds Inc., will offer an investment plan for persons interested in purchasing cattle for feeding whether they be farmers, professional men, blue collar workers and others.

An interested investor will notify the company that he wishes a certain number of cattle purchased for his account. The corporation will purchase the animals, place them in a feedlot, provide financing and sell the cattle.

The purchaser will pay a set amount, which is expected to be \$15 per head when the program starts early in January.

In cases where the cattle are purchased, fed and sold at a profit, the investor and Cattle Funds will split the profit. When cattle are sold at a loss, the investor will pay the amount of the loss down to his original \$15 investment.

Any loss over \$15 per head

will be paid by Cattle Funds.

Company officials said a survey indicated Cattle Funds would have to pay part of the loss on 10 percent of the cattle handled, based on market conditions over the past several years.

An estimated 1000 head of feeder calves and steers will be handled each week, providing a feeder market of approximately 70,000 head a year.

"We feel that with the growth of sprinkler irrigation of pasture there is an unlimited future for the development of calf raising

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in southwest Kansas," a spokesman said.

Officers of the corporation are Dr. Marion Spikes, Garden City, chairman of the board; B. Winter, Satanta, president; B. Robinson, Hugoton, vice president; and Edgar White, Elkhart, secretary.

Cattle Funds will have an office staff consisting of an assistant manager, secretary and buyer and seller.

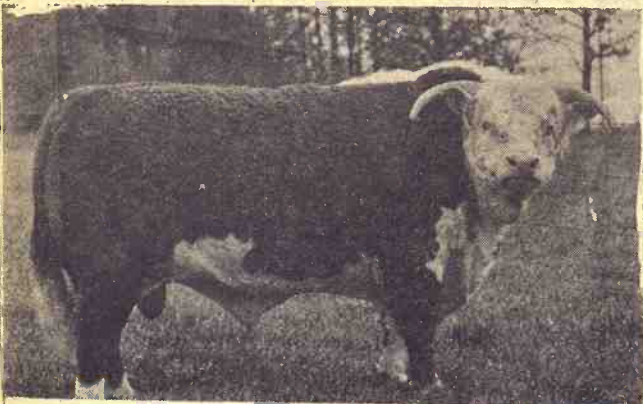

How To Dress Big Game

Dressing a game animal isn't hard when you know how, says Ray Field, University of Wyoming meat specialist.

There are probably as many techniques for bleeding and dressing the kill as there are hunters, but here are a few suggestions which may make the job easier:

To bleed an animal, insert a 4 1/2 to 5 1/2 inch blade directly above the top of the breast. Aim the blade point toward the tail (Point B in Fig. 1). Plunge it to

the hilt; press down to the backbone and withdraw it with a slicing motion.

Elevate the rear portion of the animal so the blood will drain. If your shot struck near the heart or another major or-

gan, internal bleeding will limit the amount of blood which flows through the opening.

To remove the intestinal tract and pluck (the pluck is the heart, lungs, gullet and windpipe), place the animal on its back and block it on either side with logs or rocks.

Open the middle of the body from breast to udder or scrotum. Remove udder or scrotum. Cut around the rectum and pull it through the pelvic opening into

Hang the carcass by its head in a tree and wash the interior clean. Use water from your canteen if none is available from a nearby creek or spring. You can also use snow to wipe the inside clean.

"Washing or wiping is important because it helps remove odors and off-flavors from the meat, Field explained.

Before transporting the carcass, make holes at either side of the midline opening and lace it up. "This is especially important if you have to drag the animal," Field said.

When you get the animal to camp, you can remove the head and shanks. Cut the lacing and split the brisket with a knife or saw. Hang the carcass in the shade and prop it open so it will cool rapidly (Fig. 2). You may

have to wrap it in cheesecloth or mosquito netting, or hang it in a tent to protect it from dust and insects.

"It is usually advisable to leave the hide on until you arrive home or at the locker plant. The hide protects the carcass from harmful bacteria and dirt and keeps the meat from drying out," Field said.

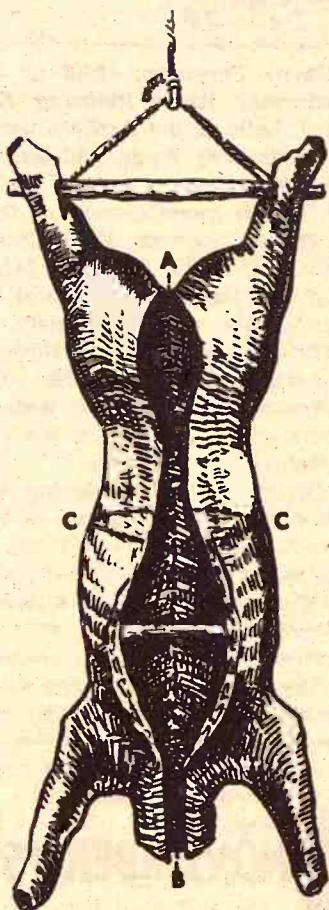

USDA Sees No Cattle Price Break

Cattle prices slipped for the fourth straight month and at mid-October were \$4.30 per hundredweight less than the post-Korean War peak of last June, but still were \$2.30 more than a year ago, according to the Agriculture department.

The Crop Reporting Board said the average for all beef cattle for the month ended October 15 was \$25.30 per hundredweight, down 70 cents from September.

But department officials remained optimistic that no major cattle price break was imminent. They pointed to continuing high consumer demand and prospects for tighter pork supplies this winter.

Overall, the average of all farm prices rose during the month by 0.75 percent and stood at 277 percent of their 1910-14 average, compared with 275 in September and 262 a year ago.

The five-year high for the price index was 284 percent last June when cattle prices averaged \$29.60 per hundredweight, the most since 1951.

The board said higher prices for milk contributed most to the increase. Milk averaged \$5.77

per hundredweight compared with \$5.62 in September and \$5.63 a year earlier.

Hogs averaged \$24.70 per hundredweight, down 10 cents from September, but still were nearly \$7 ahead of last year at this time.

Livestock industry observers have pointed out that this is the normal season for large marketings. The department reported cattle receipts rose nearly 8 percent during the months from a year earlier and hogs were up 7 percent.

In its regular livestock slaugh-

ter report issued earlier this week, the report said total red meat output during September was 5 percent more than a year earlier. Beef output rose 7 percent and pork 1 percent.

However, consumer demand has remained strong despite only slight decreases in retail meat prices.

With less pork expected on the market this fall and winter than earlier indicated, economists and industry officials see stronger markets ahead — particularly for cattle.

The first morning session concerns water development activities in the lower Arkansas River basin. Lt. Col. Edward Fike, deputy Tulsa District Engineer, and

Wayne Ferguson, chief of the Arkansas River Planning Section, both of the Army Corps of Engineers at Tulsa, will lead the discussion.

Second morning session features Jay Spencer, Flow Control Division of the Rockwell Mfg. Co. His topic of "Just Add Water" deals with the timely and efficient use of water through concise measurement. He will demonstrate some new water-metering devices from his company.

Dr. Floyd Smith, acting vice-president for agriculture at Kansas State University, will discuss irrigation research aimed at the 1970s during the first afternoon meeting.

New developments in sprinkler irrigation will be pointed out by Donald Sisson, manager of tech-

nical services for the L. R. Nelson Mfg. Co. Lynn Shuyler, KSU Extension irrigation engineer, will discuss the broadening application of pipelines for irriga-

tion. The annual business meeting at 4:00 p.m. will be highlighted by the election of new officers for the organization.

Traders Warning To Pork Bellies

Pork bellies may be anatom-ically low down but when it comes to commodity market futures trading they rank high on the hog, says the Agriculture Department.

The department's Commodity Exchange Authority, which has herded on farm products bought and sold on the market, says in a new report that frozen pork bellies are "one of the most active" of all items now being traded.

Pork belly trading began on the Chicago Mercantile Exchange in 1961 but attracted little attention until 1964 when futures contracts — used as indicators of market speculation and hedging — rose to 154,679 from only 1728 the previous year.

In 1968 pork belly contracts totaled 1,400,000 and are expected to be more this year.

It took a while for the public — including traders — to realize just what a pork belly was and to comprehend that when frozen for storage this pig part offered a likely front for futures trading.

"A pork belly is cut from the carcass of a hog," the CEA report said. "Because a hog carcass is cut in half, each carcass yields two bellies. A belly is cut from the carcass just below the last rib between the ham and the shoulders.

"Then the spareribs are removed, leaving what is called a pork belly. Most pork bellies are eventually marketed as bacon, but heavier pork bellies are sold as salt pork."

Hog slaughter normally is lowest during June-August. Heaviest slaughter periods the remainder of the year may vary, says the CEA, but during months of heaviest kills —

when supplies exceed demand for bacon — excess pork bellies are frozen and stored for later

It is this flexibility which al-

lows pork bellies then to move into customer channels during summer periods when hog slaughter is down, and provides much of the incentive for market trading by speculators and hedgers.

The report said "an unusually high percentage of speculative positions" sets pork bellies apart from the typical futures market. Speculators apparently are attracted by the wide and frequent price movements, the report said.

Last January 31, for example, some 5835 traders held positions totaling 18,942 contracts of

30,000 pounds of pork bellies each. Speculators held 96 percent of the long positions, and 88 percent of the short, the report said.

Frozen pork belly trading rose so rapidly that the CEA brought it under federal regulation in June 1968. The report just issued is the first by the CEA on what

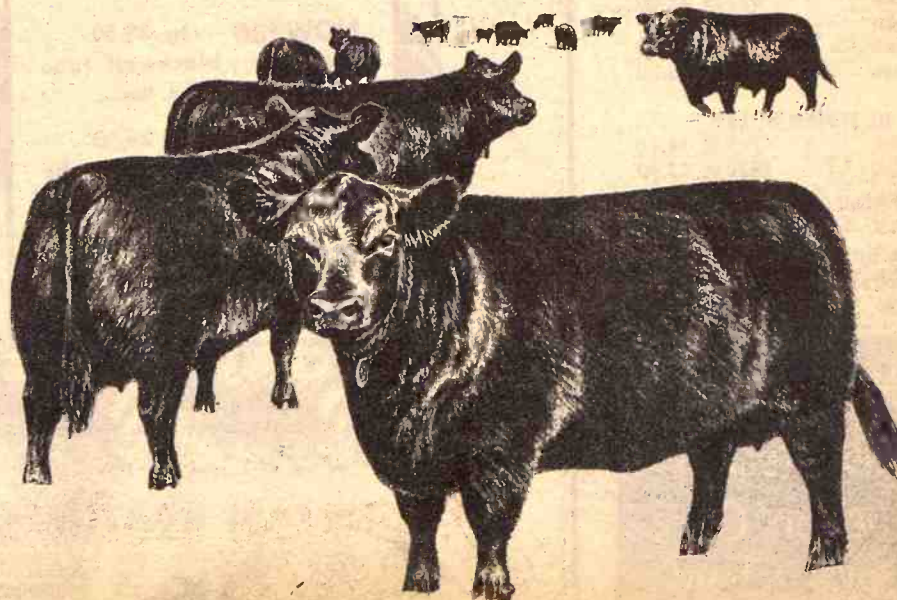

25,000 Christmas Trees To Harvest

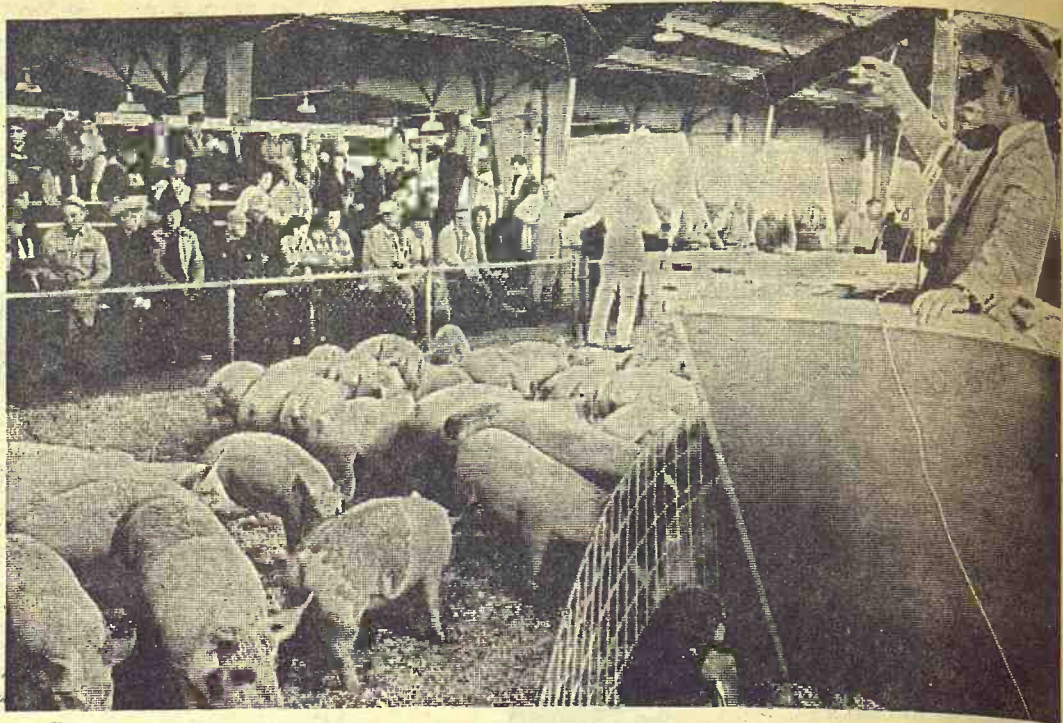
GREEN — A Washington County farmer has expanded his crop during the last six years to where he now has more than 25,000 Christmas trees to harvest this year.

Austin Hogan made the first plantings on his farm in 1961 and now has about 1000 per acre. He devotes 28 acres yearly to Scotch Pines.

Hogan attributes his success with the crop to spraying techniques he uses. He sprays the trees three or four times yearly to prevent insects from ruining the bark. The trees also are trimmed and shaped during the year to keep them growing.

Hogan later sprays all trees with a fireproofing chemical and said it creates a 90 percent reduction in fire hazard, which will last through the Christmas season.

A large percentage of Hogan's crop will be sold here.

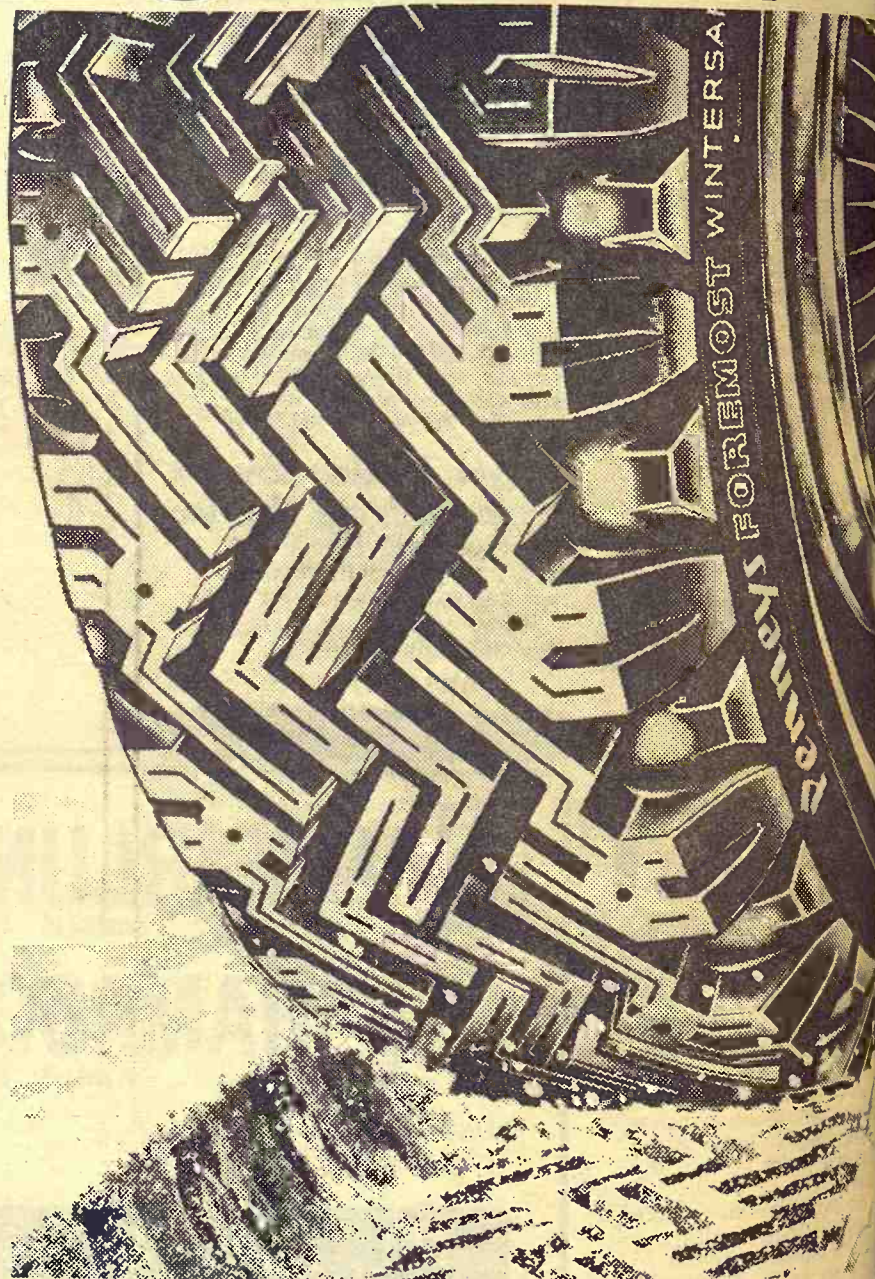

Safety Risks In Moving Irrigation Pipe

Kansas irrigators have been warned to use extreme caution when moving irrigation pipe around high voltage electrical lines.

This is the time of year when irrigators are repairing and cleaning irrigation pipe for winter storage. In picking up pipe, the irrigator may place it on the ground to remove dirt or even small animals in some cases.

Elwyn S. Holmes, Kansas State University Extension engineer, cautions that serious electrical shock or death can result if the irrigator isn't careful in handling the pipe.

"A high voltage spark may even jump a considerable gap and cause injury," Holmes said.

He suggests these rules to follow when cleaning and storing irrigation pipe:

—Store pipe away from overhead power lines or power supply.

—Do not clean pipes close to power lines.

—Become familiar with field before moving pipes.

—Do not touch persons who

are in contact with high voltage lines. It may be necessary to call the power supplier to shut off the current.

—If a person receives a severe shock, it may be necessary to give artificial respiration or closed cardiac massage.

—In case of electrical shock, get the person to a physician as soon as possible.

On the subject of safety, Holmes also cautions farmers that acts of carelessness around cornpickers can lead to serious injury.

"It isn't necessary for a farmer to gamble his life away by carelessly working around a cornpicker," Holmes said.

"No person who ever got caught in a cornpicker thought he was taking a chance."

Holmes said that some operators try to unplug a corn picker by leaving the machine running and then poking at the plugged rollers with a stick or cornstalk.

"This is extremely dangerous since the stalk may be caught by the picker and actually pull the operator into the machine," he said.

"In short, nobody can take a chance and come out a winner where the cornpicker is concerned." Here are some safety rules for a safe corn harvest:

- Don't unplug a picker from the underside.
- Stop the picker before dismounting from power unit
- Wear close-fitting clothing.
- Prevent hurry and fatigue as

much as possible.
—Take a break at mid-morning and mid-afternoon.

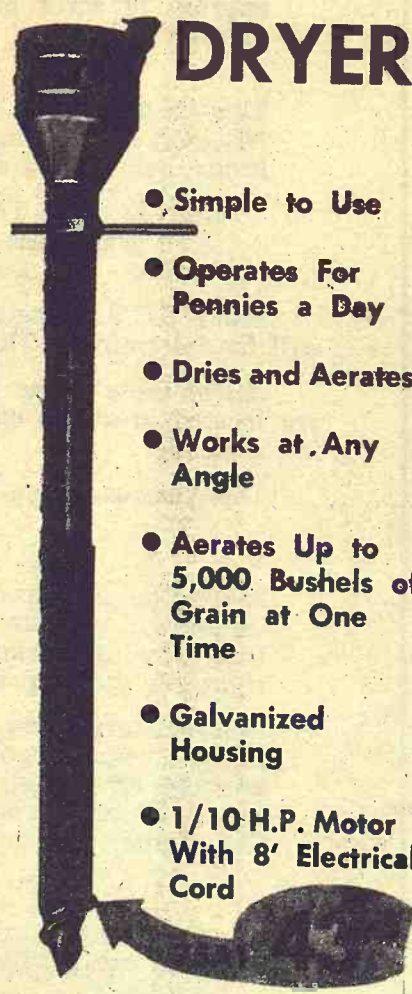

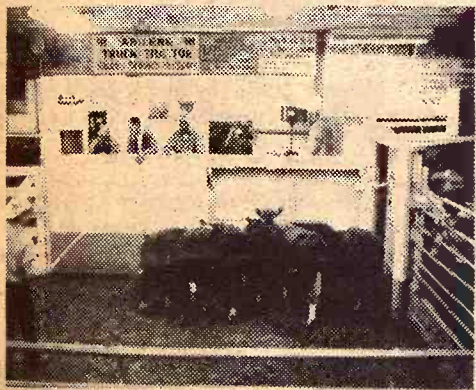
