



Marion county carried off the county herd title during the seventh annual Kansas All Breeds Junior Dairy Show at Salina.

Marion and Riley counties have won the county herd trophy twice to lead all other counties. The next time either county wins, the trophy will be retired.

Showing the winning herd for Marion county were 4-H'ers Christine Enns, James Enns, Richard Enns, Glen Kliewer, and Lynn Schmidt.

Breed champion winners were Karl Burgess of Rice county, Ayrshire; Rick Jensen of Wilson county, Brown Swiss; Karla Allen of Sedgwick county, Guernsey; James Enns of Marion county, Holstein; Vanetta Blevins of Doniphan county, Jersey; and Patricia Lisenby of Reno county, Milking Shorthorn.

George Pretz of Miami county was the show's senior fitting and showing champion, while the honor in the junior competition went to Terry Lust of Allen county.

The annual show, which attracted 186 exhibitors, mostly 4-H club members enrolled in dairy projects, is sponsored by the agricultural committee of the Salina Chamber of Commerce and the Kansas Interbreed Dairy Council in cooperation with the Cooperative Extension Service at Kansas State University.

Six breeds of cattle were judged in

8 age divisions at the contest, the state's biggest annual showcase for young exhibitors and their cattle. To speed up judging, the Hall was divided into 2 arenas. Brown Swiss, Holstein and Milking Shorthorn were shown in the south ring, and Ayrshire, Guernsey and Jersey breeds were exhibited in the north. Saline county's 18 exhibitors were

the most entered from any county. Sixteen entered from Marion county and 13 from Riley county.

The cattle were judged primarily for 3 qualities:

1. Size and scale—Height, weight, bone structure and how weight is distributed.

2. Dairy character—The shape of the legs, size of flanks and potential to breed calves.

3. Milking ability—The size and shape of the udder is crucial. If the udder, for example, sags, it will not last long and will not produce as much high-quality milk.

Instructions Given For County, State **ASCS Elections**

The Agriculture Department has sent to state and county offices detailed instructions on conducting annual elections this fall for community committeemen who supervise local operations of federal farm programs.

Among the directives is an order to county offices of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service to review boundaries for the local communities.

The number of farms and eligible voters will be tabulated and compared with other communities in the county, the ASCS said. The review will be handled by the county committees.

"They also consider the availability of community communcation and transportation facilities, type of farming, geological conditions and local political subdivisions," the ASCS

The ASCS nationally administers general farm programs, including set-aside acreage controls for wheat, cotton and feed grains. The chain of command extends through state committees, to county and community officials.

The community committeemen, who are familiar with local crop and acreage situations, are elected for

one year each on an annual basis, a spokesman said. They, in turn, elect county committeemen who then are responsible to the state office.

Most community elections are held in November.

"After evaluating each community, the ASC county committee will send a map with any proposed changes to the state ASC committee for approval," the agency said.

Another requirement prior to the annual elections is the compilation by each county office of the eligible voters in each community, often on a township basis.

"A farmer who is eligible to participate in any ASCS program is eligible to vote in ASC elections," officials said. "This includes not only producers of legal voting age



"Studies and field checks indicate Kansas State University's Depart- 85 to 90 percent of machine losses occur in the gathering operation," says Johnson. "Header losses usually average 10 percent of the crop yield. With the use of combine header attachments, they can be reduced by more than a half."

The header attachments include a 'cutterbar-extension' moving the cutting knife 8 to 18 inches ahead of the conventional cutterbar. This allows more room for the tall soybean plants to change direction before entering the cross-auger which reduces the recutting loss.

Also, the knife is "free floating" and cuts close to the ground, leaving a stubble height of about one inch even though the combine may rock back and forth on uneven ground. Johnson says this stubble height compares to a usual height of 3 to 5 inches or more with the conventional

Stubble loss (pods left on the stubble) normally averages about 2.5 percent of yield, shatter loss (beans freed by the combine) about 4.5 percent of yield, and recut and lodged stalkes (stalks partially or wholly left on the ground) about 3 percent of yield.

With the floating cutterbar extensions, the stubble loss should be reduced because the knife is no longer cutting through the pods. The re-cutting of stalks should be reduced because of the better feeding of material to the cross

Some shatter loss will occur

because the pick up type reel is still needed to feed the soybeans into the cross auger. The reel produces some shattering of bean pods especially at bean moisture levels of 10 percent or less. The net result, however, should be a saving of one to two bushels per acre, says the K-State department

Header attachments must be installed as extra equipment, causing additional expenditure of time and money. In addition, the combine should have a hydraulic reel height control and a variable speed drive. More care may be required in operating this header as heavy weed infestations can be troublesome.

Protect Family - Keep Germs From Food

Over casual kitchen practices can cause such forms of food poisoning botulism, staphylococcal poisoning and salmonella infection. Today's homemaker has the responsibility of following strict hygienic practices for the health and welfare of her family.

One way to battle bacteria is by making greater use of paper throwaways such as towels. It has been pointed out that an absorbent, sturdy two-ply paper towel can do most of the work of a sponge, whereas a sponge is a potential germ spreader.

The U.S. Public Health Service's rule for food handlers in public eating places is important for the

Don't dry or wipe your hands on a towel intended for dish-drying. Change dish towels daily.

Mildew May Cause Wall Discoloration

If the walls in your home are becoming discolored, having a gray or black filmy appearance, it may be because paints sometimes develop mildew. This is caused by constant exposure to warmth and moisture. So if the discoloration won't wipe off easily with soap and water, try a mixture of household bleach and water.

To eliminate excessive humidity, adequate exhaust fans in the kitchen, bathroom and laundry will help. Connect moisture exhaust vents from your automatic clothes drier to the outdoors. Use a concrete sealant paint on the foundation walls and floors of a damp basement.

You may also want to investigate the possibility of getting a dehumidifier.

Make Good Clothes Hampers

Use large plastic wastebaskets for clothes hampers. There's no problem with snagging of the clothes and they are light enough in weight to carry to and from the laundry

Countertop Care

When kitchen counters and work surfaces are covered with linoleum or felt-base floor covering, you can keep them clean by washing them with a damp, soapy cloth, drying with a soft cloth. Give them a coat of paste wax frequently.

Masking Tape Removes Decals

To remove old decals, place the sticky side of masking tape on the decal, rub down, then after a few minutes pull the tape off and the decal will come with it.

Solution Removes Sugar

To clean sugar crusted stainless steel or enamel pots, fill them with warm water. Add baking soda, using three tablespoons to a quart of water. Let stand 15 minutes. Fill glass pie plates with warm water. Add two teaspoonsful of baking soda and let stand until crust dissolves.

Konza Prairie Part Of K-State Research Project

Some of the first work on the Konza Prairie is currently being conducted by Dr. John Zimmerman, KSU associate professor of biology.

The Konza Prairie, a 920-acre native grassland area of natural prairie, was donated to K-State last December for long range ecological research. The land, which is to be used strictly for scientific research, is located along the north edge of a three mile stretch of Interstate 70 starting one mile west of the K177 and I-70 interchange.

Zimmerman is measuring grassland bird populations. He and associates visit the area weekly and determine by observation which species are present and in what densities, or pairs per unit area.

"Primarily, we're trying to see what's there," Zimmerman said. "We're also trying to provide a base for further research in the area."

Zimmerman said bird populations on areas of the prairie which will never be burned and on areas which will be burned each spring will be compared over several years to determine the effect burning has on densities and species over the years.

"This is one of the few places in the United States where tall grass prairie exists in a relatively undisturbed state and which will remain undisturbed in the future."

MEAT PRICES UNLIKELY TO BE ALTERED MUCH

Meat prices in the U.S. are unlikely to be altered much by imports because demand is far ahead of supply elsewhere in the world. The European Community recently suspended import duties, and high prices there also are attracting export meat.

Deadline Near For Free Game

PRATT-The time is approaching when it will be too late for Kansas pondowners to apply for this year's free game fish from the Forestry, Fish and Game Commission.

Verl Stevens, Pratt, hatcheries supervisor, has set a tentative deadline of early September for those persons who wish to apply for the stocking.

'Any applications coming in much later than the first week of September will have to be saved for next year," said Stevens. He said all applications have to be in several weeks prior to the delivery time in order to process them and plan a delivery schedule. He expects more than 1,500 applications from pon-

Fish delivery will begin in eastern Kansas the first week of October and proceed through the rest of the state in the next six weeks, according to Stevens.

Stevens added that this year's hatchery production will enable the Commission to provide fish for all the applicants whose ponds meet the requirements.

Those requirements include: the pond must be at least one-fourth surface acre in area; it must be of adequate depth, or have adequate water supply to maintain fishlife during average periods of drought and winter ice cover; and it must not already have been stocked, or otherwise contain an established fish population.

The main reason cattle prices calf crops. seem destined for a temporary slump is the large number of animals suddenly showing up in many of these cattle are ready or nearly ready for slaughter.

For the first time in several months, meat packers seem assured of plentiful beef animals, at least for the short term. And the huge number of candidates for slaughter is pushing prices down.

Industry experts say, however, that the number is misleading. They say there hasn't been any big expansion of the beef "factory" - beef cattle on farms and ranches plus steers from dairy herds - which is the sole source of animals funneled into the feedlots. What has happened, the experts say, is that a lot of animals have been borrowed from the future supply back on the ranch and bunched into the feedlots prematurely, largely because of the highest cattle prices in two decades but partly because of drought in sections of the cattle country.

"Only 2 to 3 percentage points of this (additional) 14 percent can be attributed to more production of cattle," says Kenneth Monfort, president of Monfort of Colorado, the world's largest operator of cattle feedlots. "The rest," he says, "are cattle that have gone into the feedlots early."

Many ranchers, deeply in debt after lean years of rock-bottom cattle prices, rushed to cash in earlier this year when prices began climbing to a 20-year high. And in parts of the Southwest and Southern California, after months without rain, pastures had begun to wither; many ranchers had to trim their herds because of a lack of grazing

But now, rain has fallen on large parts of the drough area, and pastures are improving. The cattlemen there, seeking to rebuild their herds, have halted their rush to sell. The result: new upward pressure on prices of cattle going into feedlots.

Meanwhile, ranchers in other areas, convinced now that prices will go back up and stay strong for some time, have also begun expanding their herds. Meat packers report, for example, that fewer female animals are coming through their slaughter pens, after a conspicuous surge earlier. Topper Thorpe, general manger of Cattle-Fax, the marketing and research arm of the American National Cattlemen's Association, predicts that the number of beef cattle, now just under 39 million, will rise 3 percent this year. The usual expansion rate has been 2 percent a year.





More than ever before, apparently, Corn Belt farmers have made forward sales of their 1972 corn and soybean crops. Some business also has been done with milo in the Southwest.

This is an impression gained from brokers, elevator owners and grain merchandisers operating at the Kansas City Board of Trade. There are no statistics available on such transactions. No one even suggests what percentage of the crops have been sold. But casual conversations with grain men here indicate they are involved in more business in this line late this Summer than they ever have experienced previously. They say they hear a similar situation prevails in Illinois, Indiana and other Corn Belt states.

Two main reasons are given for the activity in forward sales.

No.1-Farmers are becoming more and more knowledgeable on the operations of futures markets, and they understand better how to take advantage of futures prices if and

No. 2-Futures prices are above, government loan values. If prices are at or below loan levels, the loan itself is the best hedge the farmer can have against a price decline.

In making a forward sale that is, selling his crop before it is harvested-the farmer does not necessarily involve himself in futures trading. In fact, probably in most cases he does not use the futures market personally. But he is basing his decisions on the futures market. What he does is make a cash sale to his local elevator.

The local elevator, then either already has a market established for the corn or soybeans, or it hedges its purchases on the futures market. That is, when the elevator buys a grain on the basis of a futures price, it also sells an equal quantity for future delivery.

One merchandiser at the Kansas City Board of Trade described what he is doing about as follows: Each afternoon after futures trading ceases at 1:15, he is in contact with a large group of elevators he services

advantages are in Missouri and Iowa. He informs the elevator operator of the closing futures prices. The elevator operator thus is enabled to establish a price which he could pay for corn delivered, say in December, or soybeans delivered in November. The price is the futures quotation in Chicago, backed off with freight and other charges to the elevator. On soybeans, the local elevator price for Fall delivery in many locations has been \$3 a bushel or above.

On any day, then, the elevator operator can say to a farmer, "As of today, I can pay you so much a bushel for your corn delivered to me in December, or your beans delivered in November." The price would include a handling charge or profit to the elevator operator.

The elevator operator does not try to "sell" the farmer on the idea of forward sales, the Kansas City merchandiser insisted. The decision is entirely up to the farmer. But if the farmer is satisfied with the price, everything considered (such as probable price trends because of the carry-over, size of the nation's crop, indicated demand, the problems of storage on the farm, and anything else that might enter the farmer's calculations), then a contract is signed.

The contract, of course, specifies that the elevator will pay the price established upon delivery of the grain after harvest.

In addition, there is a clause that should the farmer suffer some sort of disaster and have no grain to deliver, he would agree to reimburse the elevator for the difference in the futures price at which the trade was made, and the cash price at the time established for delivery. It should be understood that the elevator has sold the grain the farmer has promised to

The grain merchandiser in Kansas City, in turn, either buys the grain (which the farmer has contracted to deliver) from the local elevator, or he hedges the transaction in the futures market. It also follows, if he buys the grain, that he knows he has a market for it later on.

An actual deal consummated by the Kansas City merchandiser several days ago, followed the pattern as follows:

A farmer in North Missouri expected to harvest 5 carloads of corn. He told his local elevator that if he could get \$1.09 a bushel, which would be 3 cents over his loan value he would like to sell. This required a December futures price in Chicago of \$1.26 a bushel.

On the day in question, futures prices were rising gradually, 1/8 of a cent a time. Finally, they hit \$1.26. The merchandiser signaled his broker to call Chicago and sell 10,000 bushels of corn. He then immediately called his Missouri elevator client and told him he could buy the farmer's corn for October or November delivery at the \$1.09 price.

In many other instances, elevators have contracted to buy the corn at harvest and have immediately simply sold similar amounts on the futures market. In other words, they did not have the corn or soybeans actually sold, but would use futures for price protection until they did get the commodities sold following Fall delivery.

Selling short

In some instances-no one knows how many-larger farmers have protected themselves on price by calling their brokers and selling short (selling for delivery at a later month). In this case, they pay the broker fee. Where the farmer sells directly to the elevator, he does not pay the fee.

In all cases of forward selling based on futures prices, the farmer protects himself against a drop in prices at harvest time. He also foregoes the opportunity to get a higher price. In effect, the farmer balances the possibility of a higher price against the possibility of a lower price. Presumably, he is

satisfied that he has made a good deal. If he is satisfied, that's that. He quits worrying about a lower price and ceases to hope for a higher level.



Shatter Cane Control Possible In Corn, Soybeans

Applications of herbicides alone won't give a high level of wild (shatter) cane control in corn and soybeans, reports a Kansas State University weed control scientist.

Oliver Russ says supplemental cultivation and rogueing or hand weeding are necessary to complete the job.

Carbamate herbicides (Eptam and Sutan) for use in corn production and Vernam for soybeans must be applied preplant and in-corporated at once in a dry field, says Russ.

The scientist cautions that Eptam and Sutan can cause injury to corn plants. He recommends planting 7 to 10 days after application to reduce Eptam injury. Sutan injury may occur in early spring under unfavorable growing conditions. Corn usually recovers from moderate Sutan injury.

In K-State trials, "Protect," which has received label registration as a treatment to protect corn from carbamate injury, reduced Eptam injury to corn.

Russ says Treflan, Vernam, and Planavin will obtain some wild cane control in soybeans, but supplemental cultivation and hand weeding will be necessary for best

The scientist reports no herbicides are available to control wild cane in grain sorghum. His advice: avoid planting grain sorghum on land that is heavily infested with wild cane.

A final note from Russ: always use herbicides at rates recommended on the labels.

Looking Ahead, **Soviet Wheat Imports** Limited

The recently concluded \$750million agreement to sell American grain to Russia, the largest grain deal in history, will have few longterm effects on world wheat trade. J. H. Parotte, executive secretary of the International Wheat Council, said.

Poor Russian harvests and a new Soviet emphasis on improving the nation's standard of living combined to force the Russians to make the huge 3-year grain purchase, Parotte added.

He predicted that once the Russians are able to produce enough food for their own needs, they will stop such large purchases as the current one that has boosted wheat sellers' spirits and prices throughout the Midwest.

Russia normally pruchases some wheat on the world market for shipment to Siberia, Parotte said, but this year's purchases from America and Canada have increased Soviet grain imports several times over.

"My feeling would be that the U.S.S.R. would attempt to increase its domestic production in order to avoid having to resort to massive purchases in the future," Parotte

Parotte said he anticipates that although the sale may boost world wheat sales to as much as 60 million tons annually for the duration of the agreement, the levels will return to the 50-million-ton range as the Russians again become selfsufficient.

While Soviet-American trade continues, however, Parotte predicted the increased grain trade would halp stabilize the world wheat market.





"You would have, too, about a 70per-cent chance of being served fresh — or home-prepared — fruits and vegetables rather than commercially canned or frozen ones... Use of processed forms did not surpass fresh use until the mid-

But meat-eating habits have been the prime change. Since 1930, says the ERS, Americans have increased per-capita meat eating about 45 pounds to 168 pounds annually on a retail-cut equivalent.

"The popularity of beef accounts for just about the entire 45-pound increase," the economists say. "Pork consumption is currently about five pounds per person higher, while veal and lamb and mutton use has declined."

On the whole, says the ERS, consumption has increased for meat and poultry, processed fruits and vegetables, margarine, salad oil and cooking oils.

Meanwhile, the average American has reduced his eating of dairy and cereal products, coffee, potatoes, and fresh fruits and vegetables.

The economists cite several reasons for the changing eating patterns, including price and the emergence of convenience items such as frozen and canned foods.

A revolution in the production methods of poultry, for example, has put chicken potentially into every pot every day. Consumption notes the ERS, has doubled in 40 years.



Spraying Livestock For Screwworms Not Required Now

The USDA has changed Federal regulations so that livestock are no longer required to be dipped or sprayed before shipment from one screwworm-infested State to another.

However, all livestock shipped from or through areas where screwworms are a recurring problem must still be inspected, any wounds treated, and the shipment certified free of screwworms, officials of USDA's Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service report.

Should a screwworm-infested animal be found in any shipment, the entire shipment must be dipped or sprayed. The affected animal will be treated and held back from shipment until free of the infestation, APHIS officials said.

The USDA requirement for dipping and spraying remains in effect for all shipments from the infested parts of California, Arizona, New Mexico and all of Texas, Oklahoma and Puerto Rico into or through the Southeast (Louisiana, Arkansas, Mississippi, Alabama, Tennessee, Georgia, South Carolina and

The amended regulations will permit easier movement of animals within the infested areas. APHIS officials said the requirements for inspection, treatment and certification by veterinarians or inspectors reduce the chance of screwworm spread - through livestock movements.

Officials said, however, that no relaxation of the spraying or dipping requirements could be permitted for shipments to the southeastern States, where screwworms could become re-established. This area is highly vulnerable because livestock owners no longer systematically inspect their animals for wounds and infestations.

New Federal regulations cover interstate livestock shipments from screwworm infested areas became effective July 29 and will continue through Nov. 30. They will be in effect in subsequent years from April 15 through Nov. 30.

The need for such regulations became apparent this year when highly favorable climatic conditions in northern Mexico and the southwestern United States resulted in a massive invasion and spread of the deadly parasites from Mexico. The prevalence of screwworms over such a large area, combined with

rapid livestock movements increases the possibility screwworms being reestable the Southeast if precautions taken.

Screwworms do not established in northern because they are killed each by prolonged frosts.

A built-in system of flexibility allows farmers to select only the output reports that are of specific value for analyzing their own operations.

The main components of the computer program:

+Periodic Report-A current analysis of the business operation on a monthly or quarterly basis.

+Depreciation Schedule Report— Up-dates annual schedule by incorporating purchases, trades, losses, and sales of capital assets. +Year-End Business Analysis-

Financial results of year's operation and management factors. +Summary of Income and Expense-Complete summary of all input data by category, including

calculation of net farm income. +Table of Purchase-Sale Items-Complete analysis of items purchased for resale, including

livestock balance table. The K-MAR-105 system is a comprehensive record analysis, the economists explain. Eighteen subfarms, in addition to the main farm pperation, may be included. Subfarms are designed to provide

special reports for use by tenants, landlords, partnerships, corporations, or non-farm businesses.

Now that the system has been properly tested, Kansas State University is interested in encouraging the widest possible use of the new electronic record program, says Dr. Paul L. Kelley, head of the KSU agricultural economics department.

The computerized farm records system and program routines will be released to a limited number of Kansas agri-business firms for a three year test period.

Firms that have adequate computer hardware and technical staffs to handle such a program can negotiate a memorandum of understanding with Kansas State University, Dr. Kelley says.

Such firms will agree to work closely with K-State. The memorandum of understanding will

-Provide testing for a limited number of the firm's cooperators. -Allow Kansas State University

access to research data from the cooperating firm -Include a stipulation that user

Novice Needs Plenty Of Advice In Buying Horse

So you're thinking about buying a horse? Join the crowd. Horse owners are increasing rapidly in Kansas and animal numbers are higher than at any time since the heyday of the plow-horse.

There are 30,000 registered Quarter Horses in Kansas today more than twice the number of a decade ago.

The rub is, many people buying horses these days have limited or no experience with the animals. The experience is probably more limited in selecting and buying than in any other area.

"This is a very critical area and one that can easily lead to mistake and disappointment," comments Lowell Breeden, extension veterinarian at Kansas State University.

"Making a good selection of a sorse can lead to a happy and pleasant experience, but a wrong selection can result in loss of interest and abandonment of horses altogether," he added.

Breeden has some suggestions that may benefit inexperienced horse buyers.

know anything about selecting a horse, go to someone who does and get their help. Find someone who is experienced and trustworthy.

Consider Use

Next, select a horse according to the use that will be made of the animal: a big horse for a big rider, small horse for small rider; older, experienced horse for younger, inexperienced rider. The younger, less experienced horse is for the older, more experienced horseman.

"It's for sure," Breeden cautioned, "one or the other - horse or rider — should be experienced."

The sex of the horse can also be important. Breeden points out that a gelding — a male that has been castrated — will likely be the most even tempered of the three possibilities. The mare, or female, is likely to be more unpredictable than a gelding. And the stallion is the most unpredictable of all and can be dangerous.

experienced horseman only particularly if it is a breeding stallion," Breeden said.

What about breed? There are a number of breeds suitable for pleasure riding and showing. "Which one a buyer chooses will depend on what he wants the horse to do," the KSU specialist said. Disposition of the horse is more important than breed, I believe. But, of course, if you want a gaited horse, The first of these: If you don't you probably wouldn't want a

Quarter Horse or Appaloosa. On the other hand, if the horse will be used strictly for pleasure, those two breeds or any of the other would be acceptable."

Price Important

Price is another factor. "It is tempting for parents buying their young son or daughter a first horse to select one that costs the least," Breeden said. "The danger here is, the lowest priced animal is likely to be young and half-trained. The horse throws the child on the first ride, the child develops a fear of this and possibly all horses and the family ends up with a horse that isn't used and a potential horseman who is no longer interested."

Breeden believes that, in most cases, "a few dollars more will get the kind of horse that a child or other inexperienced rider can enjoy for a long time."

"I think the stallion is for the most Wheat Shipments Tying Up Box Cars, Shortage Possible

A Union Pacific Railroad official said he is concerned there may not be enough grain cars to move wheat shipments this fall.

Jack Bowen, UP general superintendent of transportation, said the Russian wheat order will place a heavy demand on cars through the fall and winter.

'No-Plow' Seedbed **Preparation Helps Control Erosion**

"no-plow" seedbed preparation increase crop yields and profit?

Dean Dicken, Kansas State University area Extension agronomist, says observations of the no-plow technique in northeast Kansas fail to show a yield or economic advantage.

However, no-plow does appear to have one important advantage: crop residue left on or near the surface is more effective in controlling soil erosion than residue that is plowed

under.

Dicken points out that surface applied plant food can be incorporated into the soil with a disk, chisel, or plow. And an anhydrous ammonia applicator can be attached to any of the implements.

"Some farmers think that no-plow tillage requires that more plant food must be applied to get equal results, but this point is seriously questioned unless the crop residue is lost," says

There is evidence that some insects and diseases could be a greater problem under the no-plow practice.

Although weeds could be more of a problem when a plow is not used, they can be controlled with herbicides and crop cultivation. A



Every year, some farmers and animals are made seriously ill by silo gas. In some cases, humans, as well as livestock and pets, are killed by the toxic gases.

• Run silo blower for 10 to 15 minutes before entering.

• Get out at the slightest sign of throat irritation or coughing and call a doctor.

Lowest Production Since 1925 For State Laying Hens

Kansas poultry flocks produced 61 million eggs during July, down 5 percent from the same month in 1971 and the lowest for July in records dating back through 1925 according to the Kansas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service. The rate of lay during July averaged 1,987 eggs per 100 layers compared with 1,900 a year ago. There were 3,055,000 hens and pullets of laying age on Kansas farms during July, 9 percent less than a year ago.

The Nation's laying flock produced 5,911 million eggs during July, 1 percent less than in July 1971. Layers on hand during July averaged 304.2 million, 3 percent below a year earlier. The average rate of lay during the month was 1,943, up 2 percent from a year earlier, partially offsetting the reduction in layers.

Chicks hatched in commercial hatcheries in Kansas during July totaled 533,000, up 54 percent from a year ago and the largest hatch for the month since 1958. Egg-type chicks hatched during July totaled 520,000, up 51 percent from last year.

July broiler-type chick hatch was 13,000 compared with 3,000 a year

Prices received for chicks by commercial hatcheries on July 1 were \$43.00 per hundred for hybrid egg-type pullet chicks, \$36.50 per hundred for pure and cross breed pullets and \$19.00 per hundred for broiler-type straight-run chicks.

Hatcheries in the United States produced 312 million chicks during July, up 1 percent from last year

Broiler-type chicks produced during July totaled 273.2 million, an increase of 2 percent from the 268.6 million hatched a year ago. The number of broiler-type eggs in incubators August 1 at 228.9 million was only slightly more than a year ago. Egg-type chicks hatched during July totaled 38.7 million, down 6 percent from the 41.4 million produced during July 1971.



'72' Corn Crop Forecast Million Bushels Less

1 had a few surprises for some people. The most unexpected figure was the forecast of corn production, which was about 200 million bushels less than many market observers expected.

The 1972 corn crop was forecast at 4,948 million bushels, which is 11 percent less than last year's recordbreaker. Such a crop, however, would be larger than any produced up to last year. The average yield per acre was listed at 86.6 bushels, only two-tenths of a bushel less than the record yield last fall.

The important fact is that such a corn crop would probably fall short of needs for domestic use and export. Any deficit, which might be as much as 200 million bushels, would have to be made up by drawing upon some of the 1971 crop that will be under reseal loans. The price of soybeans depends largely upon the value of soybean meal. Recent quotations showed that soybean meal provided about 69 percent of the value of soybean products, while the oil contributed only 31 percent.

While there are many present and potential substitutes for soybean meal, none of them are expected to increase greatly in the coming year. On the other hand, increased supplies of soybean meal will be needed for beef cattle, broilers, turkeys, and dairy cows. The increased demand for these purposes will help to prevent a large decline in the price of soybean meal.

Large crop of sorghum grain The 1972 sorghum grain crop was forecast at 803 million bushels. That would be 92 million bushels less than the record a year ago, but it would be 47 million bushels larger than the previous record crop harvested in 1967.

The production of the four feed grains combined - corn, sorghum grain, oats, and barley - was estimated at 183 million tons. This production would be 22 million tons short of the record set last year, but it would be 7 million tons more than the previous record set five years



include mallard hen, wood duck and hooded merganser. Tagged as 20point ducks are the mallard drake, black duck, pintail hen and ringnecked duck. All other ducks are assigned 10 points, with the exception of canvasback and redhead which can not be hunted this year.

The daily bag limit is reached when the point value of the last bird taken added to the sum of birds already downed reaches or exceeds to Council Grove beginning Monday, 100 points. The possession limit is two, legally taken, daily bag limits.

The point system has several advantages, Marvin Schwilling, waterfowl project leader points out. "Such a system permits hunters to display varying degrees of skill by allowing expert hunters to take a large bag of low-point birds, while the novice probably will take a smaller bag of high-point birds. This hunters to learn in-flight identification," said Schwilling.

The point system directs hunting away from ducks in short supply and increases the harvest of ducks that are abundant and have been underharvested in standard bag limit

The point system increases mandays of hunting while reducing the drain on the resource, Schwilling

Also, Schwilling noted, fewer mallard hens are taken under the point system-insuring better production of the most popular duck.

With Kansas adopting the point system, North Dakota is the only Central Flyway state still using the standard bag system.

Along with the point system comes a bonus of 20 more days of hunting in western Kansas. The season opens Oct. 21 and runs through Dec. 10, then re-opens Dec. 13 and continues through Dec. 31 east of U.S. Highway 283, but to Jan. 20 west of U.S. Highway 283.

Farm Credit Banks Of Wichita Plan November Meeting

WICHITA-The Farm Credit Banks of Wichita, including the Federal Intermediate Credit Bank, the Bank For Cooperatives, and the Federal Land Bank, are planning a joint four-state stockholders conference in Wichita, November 26-28.

This will be the first time the three banks have held their annual stockholders conferences in a joint event and over 2,000 people are expected to attend.

The following gives a brief description of the types of service offered by each of these three banks.

LAND BANK-The oldest bank, makes long-term loans, primarily using land as security. The Wichita bank has more than \$750 million in outstanding loans. This is 10 times the 1950 amount, and double that of just 6 years ago. Bank loans are made and serviced by Land Bank Associations.

INTERMEDIATE CREDIT BANK-Discounts production loans from Production Credit Associations and other financial institutions for short and intermediate-term credit. This is usually for seasonal-type lendings such as the financing of crop production or livestock operations. Somewhat longer loans can be made for financing breeding herds and machinery that can't be paid off in just one year.

BANK FOR COOPERATIVES-Its loans are made to farmer-owned cooperatives. Under new legislation a co-operative can qualify if 80 percent of its stockholders are afrmers and do at least 50 percent of their business with stockholders.







ansas farmers for years has been ne 700-pound butterfat content roduced by a dairy herd on a rolling 65-day basis.

well, they can rewrite the dairy ecordbook now. Crist Yoder, a ender, soft-spoken Reno county rmer, has set a new goal for other airymen to shoot at.

When his Dairy Herd Imrovement Association production sting report came in for July, it howed the 49-cow Yoder herd had oul veraged 705 pounds butter-fat and The trouble - \$2,267 pounds of milk for the past 12 curves and the onths.

"But they were not on a rolling Vern Boswell Werd basis (including dry periods)," points out. "Crist Yoder has the st herd in the history of production sting in Kansas to average 700 ounds or more butterfat." Yoder began dairying 14 years

Another magic figure eluding for him to do, since his father was a dairyman. A brother, Fred Yoder, and a brother-in-law, Mahlon Miller, also operate dairy farms in Reno county

Why has Yoder met with so much success on a relatively small, family-size dairy farm?

"He's innovative and pays attention to the little things," says Bonewitz. "A lot of farmers say they don't have the time to do these things, but Crist proves that taking the time will pay dividends."

Clyde Ewing, veteran DHIA supervisor, credits Yoder's success to a "real good feeding system. He hit 700 pounds (Butterfat) easier then he hit 600 pounds because of the feeding system."

Ewing adds: "Crist has the facilities to do the job."

To which Yoder replies: "Some farms have more cows than facilities. This is a mistake. I believe in starting with good facilities."

Here are examples of the "little things" that contribute to Yoder's SUCCESS.

• In the holding pen prior to milking, the cows are "encouraged" to move near the parlor door by an electric squeeze gate activated from within the parlor, usually by Jerry Yoder, Crist's son. It is a homemade device that saves time and labor

during the milking operation.

"I'd rather have the cows scared of that thing (the gate) than me," says Crist matter-of-factly.

• The best producers are diverted to a side lot when they leave the milking parlor for supplemental feeding. Here they are given an 18 percent protein mixture in grain.


"You can't get it out of 'em if you don't put it in 'em," is Yoder's reply to a question on why he gives extra feed to the best cows.

• The regular feeding operation in the barn consists of wheat, milo, and

Yoder says wheat adds palatability to a milo ration. He's a believer in grain, feeding approximately one ton a day. "Some dairymen don't agree with my ideas on grain, but I feel it's the route for me to take," observes Crist.

A synthetic amino acid (methionine hydroxy analogue) is added to the grain mixture to help improve butterfat tests and to help avoid ketosis. Yoder believes in a balanced ration to avoid deficiencies, feeding vitamins and minerals daily along with the amino acid. Minerals are metered in the haylage.

He mixes grain with haylage, which Yoder feels encourages the

cows to eat more haylage. The results, he says, are reflected in the higher butterfat tests.

 Yoder controls flies with a tractor-mounted automatic mistblower. Yoder built a roof over the feeding area in the cowlot in hopes of solving fly problems. "This didn't do the job, but the mistblower sure does," says Yoder. "You can't get all the flies, but you can at least keep them under control."

Ewing points out that Yoder has fewer cases of mastitis than most dairymen, another tribute to his attention to details.

Yoder does his own artificial breeding and follows a good herd health program.

As he moves toward a purebred


herd, Yoder plans to continue pressing for higher milk production, and therefore, more profits.

Harold Gottsch, Reno county Extension director, notes that Yoder is also a good crops farmer.


"Crist has an excellent feed supply (corn) brought about by a sound irrigation and fertilization program," he adds.

As for culling, the Reno county dairyman has a pat practice: culled cows go to town, not to another dairy

"I want other dairymens' friendship, not their money," says Crist, which confirms the suspicion one might get during a visit to the farm that Yoder is not only successful in his business, but a mighty good neighbor, too.







Screwworm Threat Worst Since 1960

Screwworms might not concerntoo many Kansans because they can't survive the winter in this state but there are a lot of cattle coming into the Flint Hills region that were in infested areas in the south.

Meaning, Kansas buyers can be manuvered out of valuable stock just like Texas stockmen.

The screwworm, for the uninitiated, is a once-prevalent larva resembling a woodscrew. Its eggs are deposited by flies in wounds in the bodies of beef cattle, other livestock and, occasionally, people. When the eggs hatch, the thousands of worms can eat Stetson-size holes in the body of their host. Unless treated in time, a screwworm attack can be fatal. In 1935, screwworms killed some 180,000 head of livestock in Texas alone; altogether, some 1.2 million cases were reported in the state, including 55 human. Nationwide, the value of cattle lost to market because of the screwworm in those days ran at an estimated \$100 million annually.

Then-in what was heralded as a combination of peaceful use of atomic energy, pest control without pesticides and man's defeat of a natural enemy-the screwworm was virtually eradicated in the U.S. in the early 1960s.

Exploiting the unsexy nature of the female fly, which normally breeds only once a lifetime, scientists here raised and released billions of male gigolos sterilized through atomic radiation. The female's subsequent caper with the sterile lovers failed to produce the fertile eggs that, laid in open wounds, hatch flesh-devouring screwworms that later develop into adult flies.

The victory seemed to be total. There hasn't been a reported case of screwworm infection in the Southeast since 1959, and Texas in 1969 had a mere 200 cases.

But this year the screwworm is back in the Southwest in what one which had 17 reported cases in July of 1971, infections last month soared to 15,331. "The situation is out of control," concedes Dr. M. E. Meadows, who heads the Agriculture Department's Southwest screwworm eradication program. He predicts that this year's total will be worse then the 50,000 confirmed cases in 1962, the year the screwworm eradication program was launched. That seems a safe prediction, in that year-todate reported infections now total 48,794, with much of the screwworm season still ahead.

Experts say it's impossible to predict the screwworm toll of livestock this year, because only one in every 15 to 20 cases is reported to agricultural agencies. Texas, the nation's top beef producer, is hardest hit. Oklahoma has reported 33 cases, its first in nine years, and Arizona, New Mexico and California are reporting increased infections.

Also impossible to measure is the expected impact on wildlife, particularly deer, but experts say the cattle herds were daily scanned by screwworms are certain to erode the fawn population.

In addition to causing widespread destruction and expense, this year's outbreak is raising some long-range ecological questions. Explains Weldon Newton, a Texas A & M entomologist: "When you start dealing with an adaptable organism like this, you've got to realize they don't read the textbooks. Perhaps through the pressure of continual selection, there could develop a strain of females that mate more than once. If this happened, the chances of one mating with a native fertile male would increase."

Primarily, scientists blame the current outbreak on the weather. Screwworm flies are always present in Mexico, where the screwworm population ebbs and flows. In past years the eradication force, con-

In Texas, 200 million sterile screwworm flies weekly, was able to create a buffer zone by using 30 Agriculture Department aircraft to seed the zone along the 2,000-mile-long border with sterile males.

But weather in both Mexico and the Southwest last winter was mild and moist. ("We didn't have any winter," says an eradication worker), ideal for screwworm reproduction. "The whole state of Texas became a screwworm incubator," says an Agriculture Department scientist. As a result, sterile males were badly outnumbered by fertile males, and females found plenty of productive

mates. Other factors have compounded the outbreak. Western cattle breeding once was carefully timed so that calves, the most vulnerable, were born from December to February, when flies aren't around. Nowadays, breeding goes on year the dangerous summer months.

And unlike earlier times, when watchful cowboys, today's cattle are contained in fences and often graze unseen for weeks. Unless the screwworms are detected and treated early, most animals die or are badly damaged, and the flies working somewhere else," he says. spread.

Cattlemen admit they were lulled by the scarcity of screwworms in recent years. Screwworm flies find their most common spawning sit in the bloody navel of newborn calves or other open wounds. Ranchers complain that many 'cowboys'' just don't want to straddle a saddle. "We just can't find the cowboys to ride these pastures like we used to," says William Donnell, president of the Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association.
