## Set A Fund For Injured Feed Truck Driver

A fund has been set up to financially aid a feed truck driver well known over much of the eastern part of the G&G area.

The man is Boyden Dufva, 71, a longtime feed truck driver for the Manhattan Milling Co., who suffered massive injuries September 20 in an accident on his farm near Zeandale, east of Manhattan.

Dufva's head was caught between a falling scoop of a front-end loader and the frame of the tractor, as he, two of his sons, and neighbors were trying to repair the loader. They were filling a trench silo on the Dufva farm.

Dufva is in Stormont-Vail hospital at Topeka, the progress of his recovery still uncertain.

An effort to raise money to assist Dufva has been started by friends, who have admired his industry and cheerfulness in raising a family of nine after his wife died in childbirth in 1955.

Dufva took on the multiple roles — running the farm, driving the feed truck, and raising nine kids. Neighbors say he never shorted the latter role, despite the dual breadwinning.

His children were all active in school and 4H affairs, a neighbor, Mrs. Everett Everson says, and Dufva never let his middle age, working hours, and being the lone parent keep him from taking his turn in community programs.

Dufva's oldest child was a sophomore in high school when his wife died giving birth to the youngest, Melvin, now 14. Melvin and Dennis, 17, are the only children still at home. Another son, Loren, 21, has returned from Marine duty in Vietnam as a result of the father's hospitalization.

For the last couple of decades, Dufva has driven a truck for the Manhattan Milling Co., becoming acquainted with hundreds of farmers in Riley, Pottawatomie, Wabaunsee, Clay, Morris, Marshall, Geary, Washington and Nemaha counties. "I'd guess Boyden knows the location of more feed bins than anybody in this area," says one farmer.

## Bonus In Volunteer Wheat Pasture

An unusually large acreage of volunteer wheat in Kansas had made sufficient growth by mid-September to provide pasture for livestock, according to the Kansas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service.

The September 15 wheat pasture survey indicated 32 percent of the 1969 harvested wheat acreage in the western two-thirds of the state had sufficient volunteer growth for pasturing, but only 3.5 percent was actually being utilized by livestock.

Rainfall during late August and early September stimulated

the growth of volunteer wheat over much of central and western Kansas, but parts of the northwestern area have been dry.

Much volunteer wheat has been or will be destroyed to control mosaic, Hessian fly, army worms and greenbugs, limiting the amount that will be grazed.

### Volunteer Wheat Growth Sharply Above Last Year

Of the 1969 harvested wheat acreage, 32 percent showed sufficient growth of volunteer wheat to be used for pasture by September 15.

This compares with 12 percent last year and is the best growth in the last 5 years for which September 15 information is available.

Supplies of forage available on volunteer wheat acreage by September 15 were rated as fair. Livestock were grazing 3.5 percent of the available volunteer wheat pasture compared with 2.7 percent last year and a range of 0.8 to 2.9 percent in the 1965-67 period.

Most stockmen are keeping their livestock on native grass which is in good condition. Reports indicate that many stockmen will move cattle to volunteer wheat around October 1.

### Seeded Acreage Prospects

Seeding of winter wheat was progressing normally this fall with moisture supplies generally adequate for planting in most areas. The outlook for grazing of

seeded wheat is currently favorable but will be dependent on additional moisture in coming weeks.

## Higher Truck Parts Prices

General Motors Corporation indicates the truck price boosts are in the offing and has announced parts prices "will be increased in line with the increases announced on passenger cars."

Tentative truck prices sent dealers show an average increase of \$130 or 4.6 percent for 1970 Chevrolet and GMC models. G.M. said \$37 of the increase represented adjustments caused by making formerly optional equipment standard.

General Motors' 1970 trucks do not go on sale until October 16 but dealers are quoted tentative prices ahead so they can make firm sales prior to formal introduction. Any revision downward is rebated.

The price increase for spark plugs, batteries and other replacement parts will approximate 3.9 percent, since this was the increase in G.M. passenger car prices for 1970 models.

G.M. said the parts adjustments would be made "over the next several months." There are some 400,000 service parts and G.M. said they are "subject to the same pressures as are passenger cars."

## Soybeans Under Acreage Controls?

A tug of war has developed among farm groups and the Nixon administration on whether soybean production should be included in government acreage control and export subsidy programs.

Soybeans, hailed as a miracle crop because of quadrupled acreage since 1948, come under the Agriculture Department's price support program but are not subject to acreage restrictions or marketing quotas.

Production has risen to more than one billion bushels a year, and when domestic and export markets slump the excess becomes the property of the taxpayer under the price support loan program.

One of the Nixon administration's first acts after taking office last January was the decision to cut soybean price supports for the 1969 crop by around 25 cents a bushel.

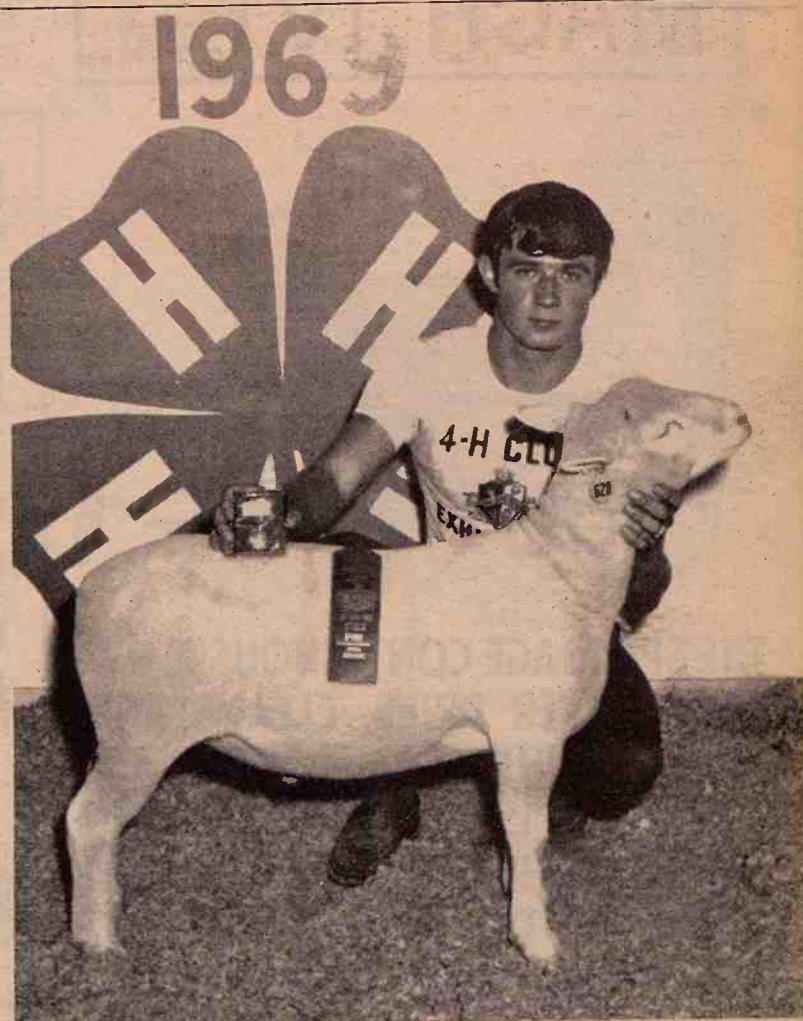
"The lower supports will permit soybean products to compete effectively in the market, and thus provide the basis for growth of the industry," Agriculture Secretary Clifford M. Hardin said on March 6.

Several months ago officials predicted the soybean carryover on Sept. 1 would be about 300 million bushels, compared with 166 million a year earlier.

Meantime, apprehension has grown among some farm organizations that lower support prices do not create expanded markets and that the department may seek further reductions for the 1970 crop.

The American Soybean Association, which represents farmers, recently urged the administration to keep price supports at the present \$2.25 a bushel at least for 1970. The ASA also asked that soybeans be kept free of government acreage allotments and compensatory payments.

Another producer group, the Soybean Growers of America, wants Congress to enable the secretary of agriculture to impose acreage allotments and make payments for idled land when conditions warrant.

# Kansas Pig Crop Up, But Corn Belt Count In Check

The numbers of hogs and pigs on Kansas farms continued above a year ago on September 1, and increases in the fall and winter pig crops are expected to be larger than this summer's modest gain, according to the Kansas

Crop and Livestock Reporting Service.

The estimated 1,734,000 head of all hogs and pigs on September 1 was 1 percent higher than at the same time in 1968 and 9 percent above 1967.

Pigs saved in the summer quarter (June-August) totaled 604,000 head, 2 percent above 1968 and 10 percent above two years ago. During the quarter 79,000 sows farrowed, 3 percent more than a year earlier, while pigs per litter averaged 7.65, slightly below the 7.69 in 1968.

Sows to farrow in the September-November quarter are forecast at 104,000 head, 10 percent more than in 1968, and prospective farrowings for the December-February quarter are 87,000 head, up 10 percent from a year earlier.

The September 1 number of all hogs and pigs on Kansas farms, estimated at 1,734,000, included 260,000 breeding hogs and 1,474,000 head kept for market purposes.

The number of breeding hogs was 4 percent larger than in 1968.

Market hog numbers were up only very slightly from a year ago. Numbers of market hogs in each weight group on September 1 were 516,000 under 60 pounds, 361,000 in the 60-119 pound range, 324,000 from 120 to 179 pounds, 229,000 in the 180-219 pound group, and 44,000 of 220 pounds and over.

The number of market hogs under 120 pounds was up 3 percent from a year earlier, while the number in the 120 through 219 pound group was down about the same percentage. The relatively small number over 220 pounds was unchanged from a year earlier.

Hogs and pigs on farms on September 1, 1969 in the 10 Corn Belt States are estimated at 46.0 million head — 5 percent less than a year earlier.

Breeding hogs are estimated at 6.6 million, down 1 percent from a year earlier. Market hogs in the 10 States are estimated at 39,409,000 head, a decrease of 6 percent from a year earlier.

By weight groups, changes in market hogs from September 1, 1968 were as follows: Under 60 pounds, down 2 percent; 60-119 pounds, down 8 percent; 120-179 pounds, down 10 percent; 180-219 pounds, down 3 percent; and 220 pounds and over, down 1 percent.

The June-August pig crop in the 10 states is estimated at 17,090,000 head, 3 percent below a year earlier. The number of sows farrowing was down 3 percent to 2,325,000 head.

When a number of producers were asked why sows farrowing were below June intentions, the reasons most often given were

prices disease and fall sows to breed. Many farrowed gilts and sows because of the high prices. Some indicated that breeding problems were tried over from the spring.

Sows bred for September-December farrowing in the States total 2,314,000 head, 1 percent less than farrowing the same period last year. Farrowing intentions for the September-February 1970 quarter in the 10 Corn Belt States are 2 percent from a year earlier.

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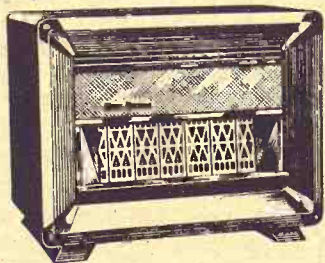


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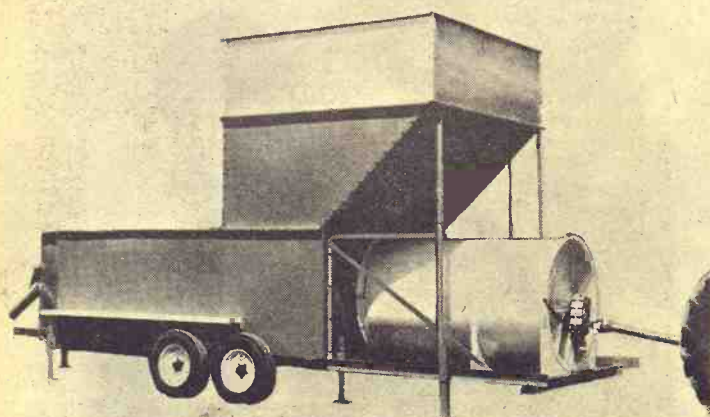


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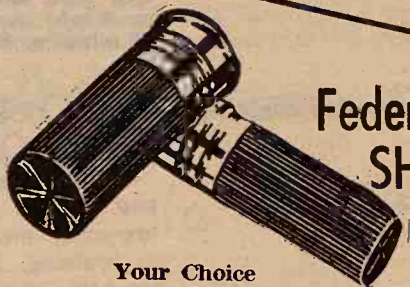
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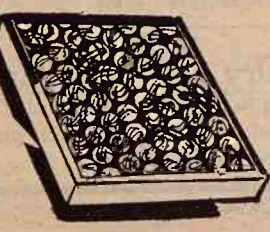
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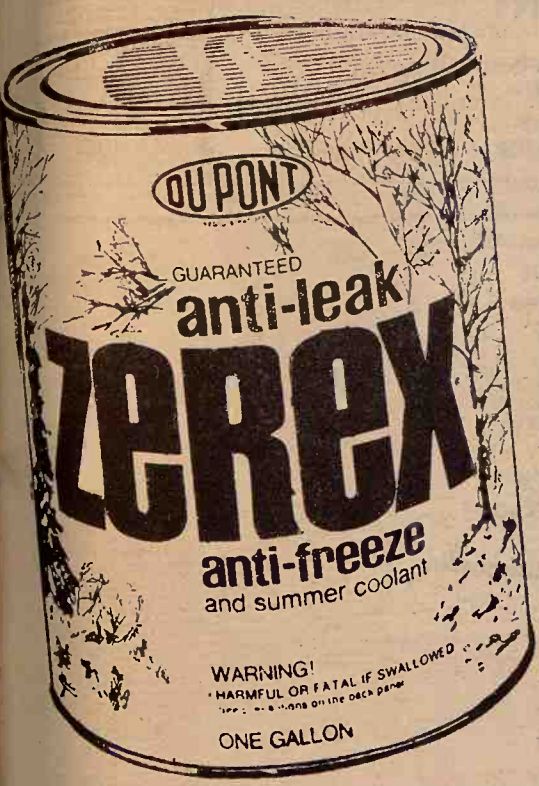
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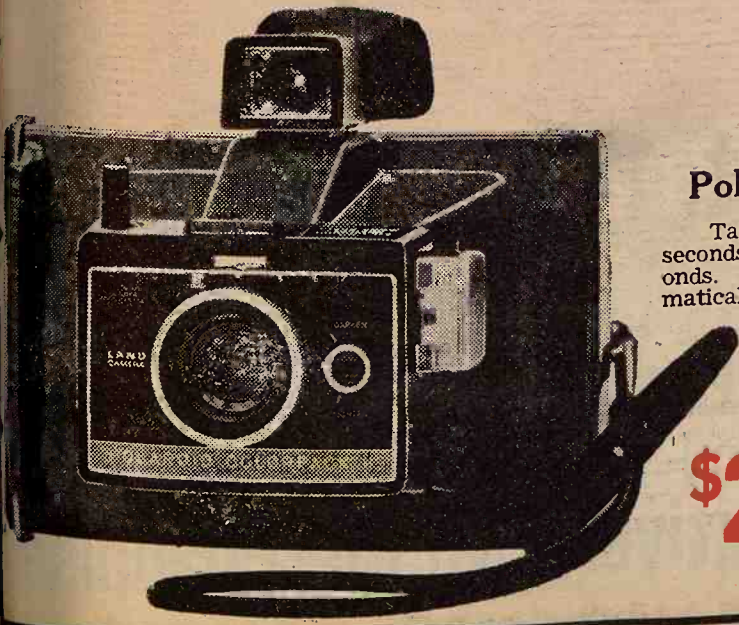
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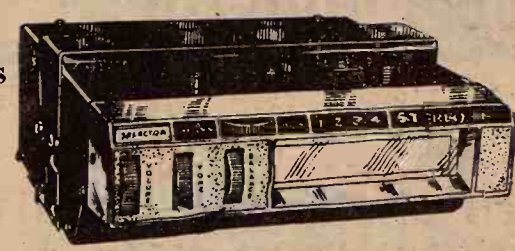
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## OUR DAILY BREAD

### Use Green Tomatoes To Make Succulent Pie

Here is a recipe to use up those green tomatoes that might be nipped by the frost if they're left on the vines.

#### GREEN TOMATO PIE

- 8 medium sized tomatoes
- 1 cup raisins
- 2 tablespoons butter
- 2 tablespoons vinegar
- 1 1/4 cups sugar
- 4 tablespoons cornstarch
- 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon
- 1/4 teaspoon cloves

Quarter tomatoes, put through coarse grinder. Drain off excess liquid. Measure pulp to have 2 1/2 cups. Combine raisins, butter and vinegar in saucepan. Blend together sugar, cloves, cornstarch and cinnamon. Add Dry ingredients to tomato mixture, mixing well. Cook over moderate heat, stirring constantly until thickened. Spoon mixture into unbaked 9-inch pie shell. Cover with top crust. Sprinkle crust with sugar and cinnamon. Bake at 450 degrees for ten minutes. Reduce heat to 350 degrees and bake 20 minutes.

A perfect casserole for a crisp autumn day:

#### CORN TAMALES CASEROLE

- 1 can tamales
- 1 can corn, size 300
- 1/2 pound ground beef
- 1 teaspoon chili powder
- 1/2 teaspoon cumin powder
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 teaspoon pepper
- 1/2 teaspoon powdered garlic salt
- 1/2 teaspoon onion salt
- 5 crackers, rolled for topping
- 1/4 stick oleo

Brown meat and add the six spices as listed. Then cut up tamales and add to meat. Stir all together well, then put in 1 1/2 quart casserole. Now fix corn, add a little salt and pepper to taste and 1 teaspoon sugar, 1/2 cup milk. Stir well, then pour over the meat and top with cracker crumbs and dot with oleo. Bake 45 minutes or one hour in 325 degree oven. Take cover off casserole to brown.

Perk up an ordinary meal with this touch of something different:

#### CHERRY JAM FRITTERS

- 12 slices white bread
- 1 egg
- 1/4 cup cold water
- cherry jam
- 1 tablespoon lemon juice
- 3 tablespoons butter or margarine

Cut the slices of bread in rounds using a cookie cutter. Spread each with cherry jam and cover with another round as in a sandwich. Beat the egg until it is very light. Add lemon juice and cold water and continue to beat until the ingredients are well mixed. Dip each sandwich into this mixture and brown in a frying pan using the butter to fry them in.

Straight from the land of Erin comes this bread recipe:

#### COUNTY CORK SODA BREAD

- 4 cups sifted flour
- 3 tablespoons baking powder
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 teaspoon soda
- 1 cup seedless raisins
- 1 tablespoon caraway seeds
- 1 1/4 cups buttermilk
- 1/4 cup cooking oil

Resift flour with baking powder, salt and soda. Toss in raisins and and caraway seeds. Add butter-milk and cooking oil. Mix just enough to moisten dry ingredients. Shape dough into two mounds on greased baking sheet. Cut deep cross in top of each loaf with sharp knife. Bake in moderate oven 350 degrees for 50 minutes. Makes two loaves.

### Cut Cooking Losses On Meat

If there is smoke when you are pan frying, pan broiling or browning meat as a first step in braising, the temperature is too high. Turn down the heat or valuable juices may be lost during cooking.

Cooking losses are cut down if all meats are prepared at moderate temperature. More meat for the money is the result, as well as better eating.

For pan broiling, the griddle or frying pan need not be heated before adding the meat.

However, there is this exception: If the meat is frozen and pan broiling is begun, it is necessary to have a hot griddle or frying pan so the meat will brown before the meat defrosts on the surface, thus retarding browning.

When coating frozen steaks or chops with egg-bread crumb mixture, make certain the meats are partly defrosted so the coating will adhere to the meat, not the pan.

## Beef And Kidney Pie Is Easy On Budget

The next time company comes, serve up a beautiful Beef and Kidney Pie for savings in style.

#### BEEF AND KIDNEY PIE

- 1/4 cup butter or margarine
  - 1 1/2 pounds round steak cut in 1-inch cubes
  - 2 veal kidneys, thinly sliced
  - 1 onion, chopped
  - 1/2 pound mushrooms, sliced, or 1 can (6 ounces) sliced mushrooms, drained
  - 1 can (10 1/2 ounces) beef bouillon
  - 2 teaspoons monosodium glutamate
  - 1 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce
  - 1/4 teaspoon Louisiana hot sauce
  - 3 tablespoons flour
  - 1 single crust pastry recipe
- Heat butter in large skillet; cook steak until browned. Add kidneys, onion and mushrooms; saute about five minutes. Stir in bouillon, monosodium glutamate, Worcestershire, hot sauce. Cover; simmer until meat is tender, about one hour. Mix flour with a little cold water; gradually stir into liquid in skillet. Cook over low heat until liquid thickens. Prepare pastry. Place beef-kidney mixture in 2-quart oven-proof dish. Cover top with pastry. Bake in 450 degree oven 15 minutes; reduce heat and continue baking at 375 degrees 15 minutes until crust is brown. Yield: six servings.

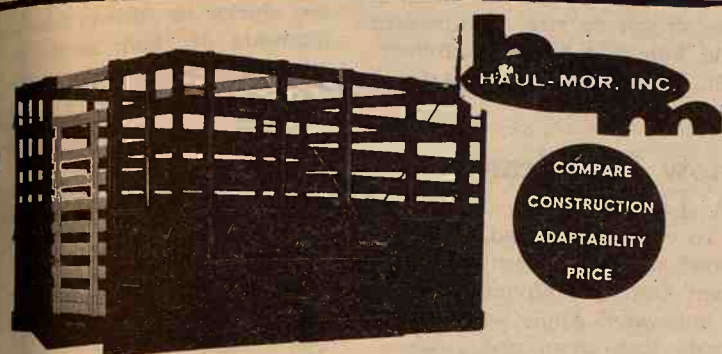

## Here's How To Judge Your Yeast Bread

How does your yeast bread look when you take it from the oven?

The loaf should have an evenly rounded top with no bulges or bumps. The break between top and sides should be uniform.

Color of the bread will depend on the ingredients but regardless of the actual color, it should be uniform. There shouldn't be light and dark streaks. The holes should be small and uniform.

The crumb should feel soft. A tender, moist crumb will easily tear and show uniform texture. The characteristic yeast smell should be detectable in cold bread even though it is much more pronounced when the bread is hot. Breads should taste as good cold as when hot.

If your bread didn't rise probably it was the result of too

much or too little heat directly on the yeast. This will reduce the yeast's action.

When shaping the bread you must be sure to get rid of all the gas bubbles in the dough. Gentle, but firm rolling with a rolling pin will do this and eliminates large air holes.

Over-fermentation can cause bread to crumble. You don't always have to wait an hour for the dough to rise. Temperature and humidity in your kitchen will make dough rise faster or slower.

## How To Clean A Diamond

To clean a diamond, add 1 teaspoon of baby shampoo and a scant dash of ammonia to a cup of hot water. Apply with a toothbrush. Rub clean and rinse.

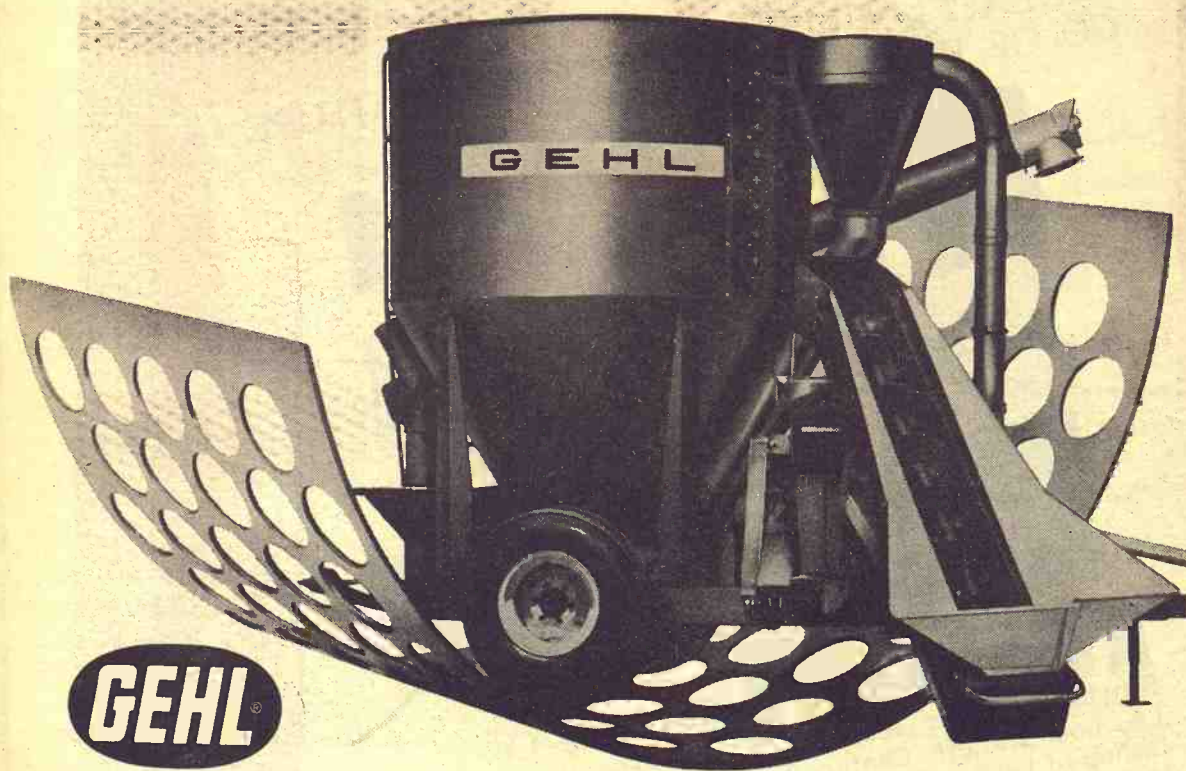

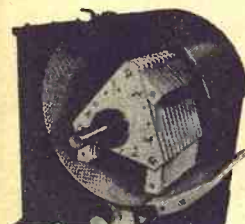

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# No Ease On Meat Import Pressure

Heavy pressure is being put on the United States, particularly by Australia and New Zealand, to ease up on voluntary meat import restrictions to permit larger shipments the remainder of the year.

As it stands, meat exporting countries have voluntarily agreed to limit U.S. shipments to 1035 million pounds this year. Australia and New Zealand normally supply about 70 percent of the annual total of quota meat, mainly fresh, frozen beef.

The voluntarily limitations were worked last year and U.S. officials have been hopeful a similar arrangement would hold meat imports to the legal level again in 1969. Under the 1964 quota meat law, the Agriculture Department sets a basic quota of meat annually, based on U.S. production and consumption. In addition, foreign shippers are allowed a 10 percent override on the base allotment before automatic country-by-country quotas are imposed.

The complicated system hinges on quarterly estimates made by the Secretary of Agriculture on what the current year's quota-meat import total is expected to be. If any estimate exceeds the 10 percent override on the basic allotment, then automatic quotas are triggered. This year's basic quota-meat allocation is 988 million pounds. The last quarterly estimate put quota-meat imports this year at 1035 million pounds — or around 50 million pounds less than the trigger level.

But, department officials point out, the estimate has been based on the voluntary restraints agreed to by the meat-shipping nations and if any one of them chooses to break the agreement the whole system could be in jeopardy. There have been reports that Australia has asked the United States to let it exceed its own voluntary quota by about 50 million pounds for the remainder of the year, or roughly the margin between current estimates and the automatic trigger level.

"Of course, they all would like to increase shipments" a spokesman said, "but they know they'd be skating on thin ice. The whole system could break down."

But the Nixon administration would like to do something to ease currently high retail prices consumers have to pay for meat without disturbing the U.S. livestock market.

Thus, it may be tempting for

administration officials to let a bit more enter the country and still keep total meat under the mandatory trigger level. Also, a spokesman said, it appears that several countries will ship less meat to the United States this year than last and Australia reasons that it should have at least part of the deficit.

Australia's shipments through July were only 2.1 percent more than a year earlier, while the total from all sources was 8.9 percent larger than the first seven months of 1968. Australia, however, would like to boost her shipments during the remainder of the year to help dispose of increased production.

At this rate — if supplying countries do not stick to voluntary curbs — the mandatory trigger level for quota meat easily could be exceeded during the next few months.

The Australian bid for a larger share of the U.S. meat trade also has stirred up New Zealand, whose Prime Minister, Keith Holyoake, presently is in Washington.

Holyoake spent 1½ hours conferring with Hardin on a variety of trade matters including meat imports. Department officials at the meeting would not comment on details, but other sources indicated it seemed logical to as-

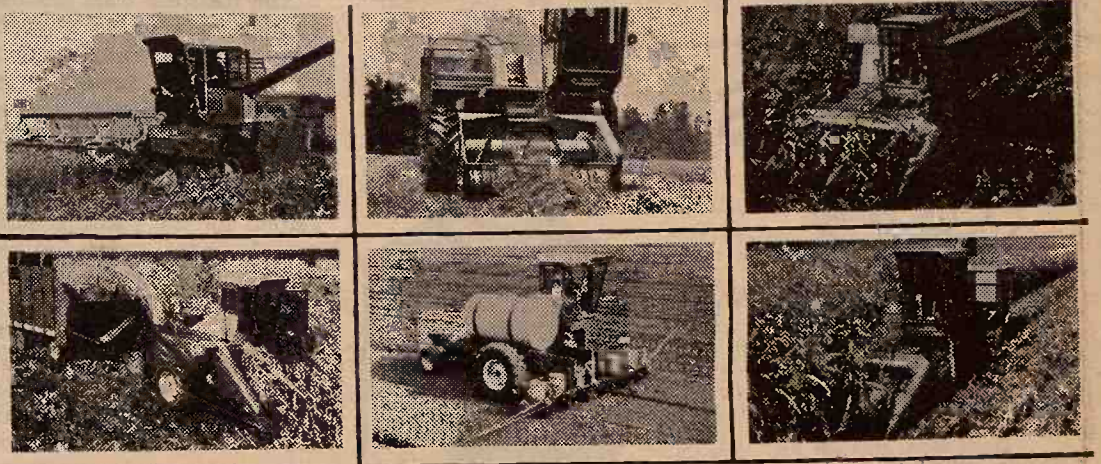
sume that New Zealand wants to be counted in if the United States decides to give Australia a larger

share.

Meanwhile, farm-conscious members of Congress and the livestock organizations are watching the situation closely in case the administration de-

cides to let more meat come in under what some officials consider loopholes in the quota law.

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## 152 Slices Of Bacon

The American Meat Institute, Chicago, says bacon, a long-time favorite on the American table, gradually is gaining in popularity.

So far this year production of

sliced bacon in federally-inspected meat packing plants is up 3 percent over the same period last year.

Even with the population increase, this means the average American will eat 152 slices of bacon (22 to the pound) this year, about two and one-half slices more than he consumed last

year.

In the first eight months of this year, bacon production was running at an annual rate of 1,380,000,000 pounds. The totals for:

1968	1.34 million lbs.
1967	1.20 million lbs.
1966	1.07 million lbs.
1965	1.06 million lbs.

The institute contends that bacon has to be fat to be good. The fat, it says, contributes the characteristic bacon flavor and texture, adding that too much lean may result in a tougher, less desirable product.

The institute (the trade association for the packing industry) explains that generally packers provide three or four different selections of sliced bacon. The top selection contains slices which are uniform and have the best ratio of lean to fat. Also, they are selected for size and location of fat and lean streaks.

The slices from the lower selections of bacon have the same flavor as the first, but they are less uniform and may be a bit less tender or slightly more coarse in texture. In some cases the lower selections may contain fewer slices to the pound be-

cause of wider, heavier slices in the package.

The institute recommends that housewives buy only enough bacon for one week. For the peak aroma and flavor, bacon should be used within five to seven days of home storage. Bacon may be frozen for short periods of time, but for best flavor, the institute advises, long storage in home freezers is not recommended.

## TO ASK FOR 10% SOCIAL SECURITY HIKE

President Nixon says he will ask Congress for a 10% increase in social security benefits, to be effective April. The present benefits, which increased by 15% in March 1968, range from a minimum of \$55 a month to a maximum of \$160.50. Average is \$100.

## KANSAS CITY HAIRCUTS RAISE TO \$2.75

The price of haircuts in Kansas City has gone up to \$2.75. The Barber Association voted for the 25¢ increase by a vote of 228 to 37.

## Propose Major New Taxes On Civil Aircraft

Increased user taxes and a new annual registration fee for all aircraft that could raise more than \$9 billion in 10 years have been tentatively approved by the House Ways and Means Committee.

Most items in the package had been proposed by the Nixon administration but the registration plan was added by the tax-writing unit.

Committee sources made it clear that the proposals all were subject to change.

The registration charge for all aircraft would be \$25 plus 2 cents per pound on piston planes and 3 cents per pound on jets. Committee aides said this could range up to about \$10,000 for big jets.

The registration charges under the tentative proposal would be prorated downward to take into account the amount of interna-

tional travel involved. Committee aides said this was proposed for competitive reasons.

Other points in the revenue package include:

- An increase in the existing passenger ticket tax from 5 percent to 8 percent as proposed by the Nixon administration.

- A new \$3 tax on passenger tickets for most international flights beginning in the United States and for flights between the contiguous 48 states and Hawaii, Alaska or outlying possessions. This was approved by the administration.

- A new tax on air freight waybills of 5 percent, suggested by Nixon.

- An increase in the fuel tax for general aviation from 4 cents a gallon to 7 cents a gallon and elimination of the present 2-cent refund. The administration had suggested the new ceiling be 9 cents.

# Less Of Paycheck Goes For Food

Grocery bills are eating up less of your paycheck than they were five years ago.

And according to U. S. Department of Agriculture figures, food will cost 1.6 per cent less by 1980.

These figures were cited by Bob Blakey, general chairman of the Kansas Food Dealers' Association convention at Wichita.

Blakey is Wichita division manager of the Fleming Co. He mentioned several reasons why food prices seem to be increasing.

"The big difference Mrs. Consumer sees is, when she goes to the grocery store, she buys health aids, cigarettes, beer and other non-food items that she used to buy at the dime store or the corner drug store. A lot of supermarkets even sell garden tools and hoses for watering the lawn."

But the cost of food, he emphasized, is going down.

According to a recent Department of Agriculture price index, the total cost of foods personally consumed was 17.2 per cent of total income in 1968. By 1975 it is projected to be 16.1 per cent, and by 1980, 15.6 per cent.

It was 18.4 per cent in 1963, Blakey said.

He noted that housewives' demand for specific prepared food products was pushing up those prices. The USDA figures are computed from the cost of basic commodities.

"Of the 600 different products in the frozen food case, 95 per cent were non-existent 10 years ago," Blakey pointed out. "The housewife wants a pie she can just grab from the freezer, instead of one she has to spend hours baking. And it's the same story in the cake mix department."

He mentioned several economic factors making it more expensive to feed your family.

"Even two years ago," he said, "we weren't exporting any pork to Japan. Now we're taking them 25 million pounds annually. And the laws of supply and demand say that things like this will drive quotas up."

Factors such as unions and the cost of owning and operating a fleet of trucks have put financial pressure on the distributor, Blakey continued.

There are also a variety of reasons why grocery stores are

struggling to keep up.

"Today's supermarket, with the building and fixtures, runs about \$600,000," Blakey explained. Ten years ago, one the same size cost about \$325,000.

"This is due to the cost of labor, materials, prime location, land and rent."

He said that rent, which long was held to 1 per cent of a market's total sales volume, now ranged from 2 to 2.25 per cent of sales volume.

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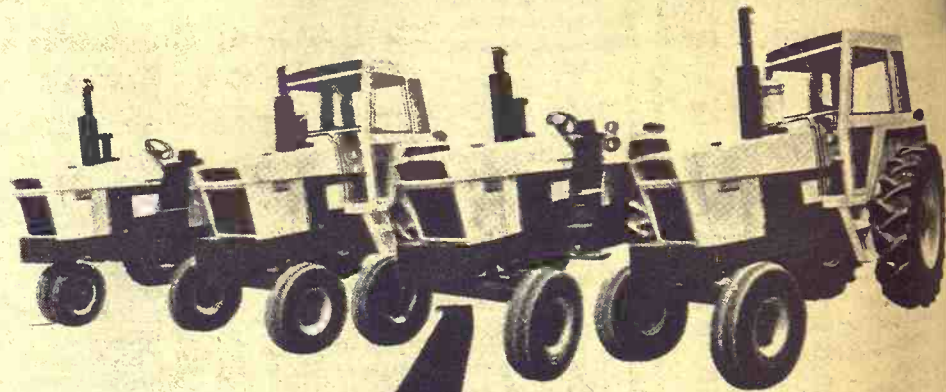
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# Cattle Warning On Nitrate Poisoning

Nitrate poisoning could present some problems for Kansas cattlemen this fall. Dr. Homer K. Caley, Kansas State University Extension veterinarian, said he had already received inquiries from several county Extension agents on the subject. The source of nitrate poisoning

can be plants (forage crops and weeds) and water from ponds, wells, streams and even temporary puddles.

Many crops may contain high levels of nitrate under certain conditions — after heavy applications of fertilizer and manure, during a drought and following a spray application, frost or hail.

Signs of acute nitrate toxicity in animals include staggering and weaving, chocolate colored blood, bluish colored mucous membranes and rapid, labored breathing.

Signs of chronic poisoning include retarded growth, abortion, runny eyes, and diarrhea. Weak newborn is also a clue.

Dr. Caley said farmers who suspect high nitrate levels in plants or water can submit the substance to a laboratory or conduct on-farm tests. He suggested the following solution for on-farm testing:

Mix 0.5 gram diphenylamine in 20 ml. distilled water; add enough sulfuric acid to make 100 ml; dilute 1-1 with 80 percent sulfuric acid for use. (Solution will keep for six months.)

In testing solid substances, split plant stem lengthways; test each node from ground up with a few drops of reagent. Blue color indicated present of nitrates.

In testing liquid substances, grind sample in a few drops of distilled water; place a few drops of solution and equal

amount of reagent on a white porcelain surface; blue color will develop at the point of contact between the solutions within 30 seconds.

In a solid material test, a light blue color indicates normal nitrate content. If the blue coloring is slow to develop, a slightly elevated nitrate content is indicated. If a dark blue coloring develops rapidly, a quantitative test should be made before feeding.

In a liquid test, light blue coloring at the point of contact indicates 30 parts per million and dark blue coloring indicates 50-75 ppm.

If the entire reagent layer turns dark blue, a quantitative test is suggested.

## Japanese Like U.S. Pork

Japanese consumers like U.S. pork so much the government has raised its import quota another 25,000 tons, says the Agriculture Department.

The Foreign Agricultural Service said Japan's latest import quota increase was the third this year in an attempt to hold down retail pork prices to consumers.

Quotas were boosted by 15,000 tons in April and by another 10,000 in June, the FAS said, but demand was so great retail prices continued to spiral. U.S. pork exports to Japan during the first seven months of this year totaled 31,800,000 pounds and were valued at \$13,800,000, compared with 890,000 pounds and \$132,000 for the same period in 1968, officials said.

All U.S. meat exports have risen this year, the FAS said, and through July totaled 119,300,000 pounds, compared with only 46,100,000 a year earlier. The United States imported 918,800,000 tons of red meat during the Jan.-July period, compared with 863,900,000 a year earlier.

Dr. Caley said all farmers should test all feed and water to locate the source and amount of nitrate. If forage testing indicates high levels of nitrate, harvesting should be delayed, he said.

Other control methods include feeding more grain or molasses for energy, increasing Vitamin A and diluting nitrate feed with food stuffs known to be nontoxic.

In any event, Dr. Caley said farmers would be wise to consult their county Extension agent or veterinarian before nitrate troubles arise.

He also issued a reminder that silo gas, which can form when high nitrate forage is ensiled, can be dangerous to both humans and animals. He said that no person should enter a "fuming" silo until a blower has been used for several minutes.

## Archery Deer Season Opens

EMPORIA — Kansas archers, nearly 4000 strong, will be taking to the woods on October 1 for the opening day of the 1969 bow and arrow deer season.

Prospects for archers appear good, according to Bill Peabody, Emporia, big game biologist for the Kansas Forestry, Fish and Game Commission, with an estimated 32,000 to 36,000 deer in the state. Peabody reminds hunters that no firearms may be carried while they are bow-hunting for deer. The legal hunting equipment is a long bow with broadhead tipped arrows. Archery hunters may take one deer of either sex.

The archery season for deer continues statewide through the months of October and November with the closing date on November 30.

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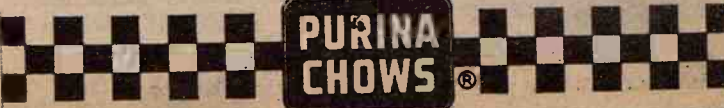

## Would Government Ease Imports To Cut Meat Prices Down?

Concern about whether the administration might suspend beef import quotas for the rest of the year in an effort to lower retail prices was expressed by Bill House of Cedar Vale, president of the American National Cattle-men's Association.

House said he had talked with the Council of Economic Advisors and came away with doubts on what the administration may decide.

"We had some assurance they would consider our position," he said, "but I have no final answer at this stage and won't until Hardin announces his new estimate."

Secretary of Agriculture Clifford M. Hardin is scheduled to estimate quota meat imports — mostly beef — Wednesday, as required by law. He must do this every three months.

If the estimate exceeds a basic allotment by 10 percent the President is directed to proclaim country-by-country quotas for the remainder of the year.

However, the law provides for suspending quotas for "overriding economic or national security interests" or when domestic supplies run short.

House said he had been told some administration officials

have been considering economic justification for quota suspension on the basis of cattlemen receiving the highest prices since the Korean War.

House said, however, that while cattle sold for around \$35 a hundredweight last June, prices have dropped and now are around \$26 or \$27 in production areas, the lowest price this year.

In recent weeks Australia and New Zealand have sought to ship more meat into this country in spite of large shipments which, some sources say, may be on the verge of triggering strict quotas under the 1964 meat import law.

### DOLLAR TROUBLES CURTAIL SYMPHONY

Denver's symphony orchestra will have a curtailed season this year because of inability to negotiate a contract between the symphony society and the musicians union.

## Big Expansion At Hesston

HESSTON — Construction has started on a new fabrication shop at the Hesston Corp. plant. The present fabrication shop occupies about 25 percent of the floor space in the plant. That space will be converted into an assembly line for the new Hesston StakHand hay handling wagon.

The expansion will cost about \$750,000 according to Lyle E. Yost, president, and represents a major item in the firm's expansion plan which was developed in 1965.

As a result of the change, the StakHand production is expected to increase 250 percent in 1970 over its first year in 1969.

New equipment will include a numerically-controlled punch press, valued at more than \$100,000, and a new railroad spur will be extended into the building where sheet metal, metal plate, coil steel and angle iron can be unloaded out of the weather.

When the building is completed, Hesston will have more than 11 acres of plant and office buildings. Also approved for construction within a year, Yost said, are additions to the engineering shop and test laboratory.

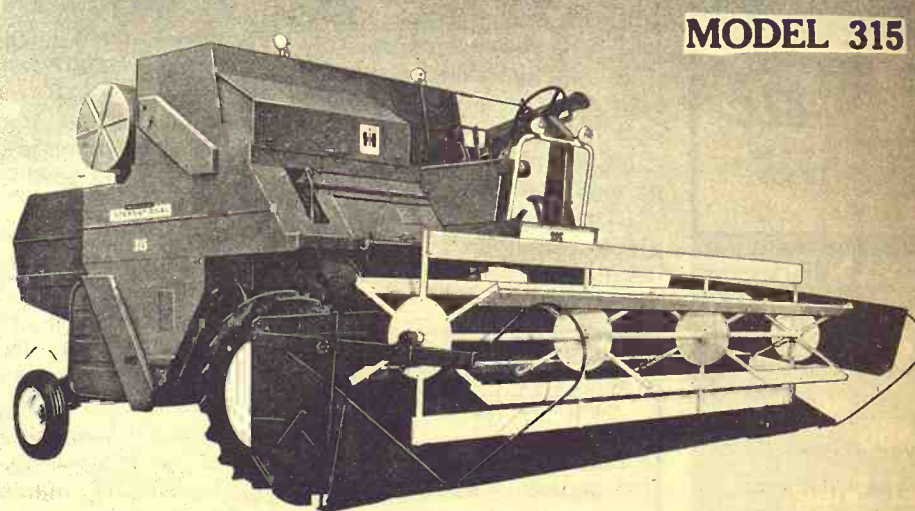

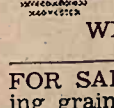

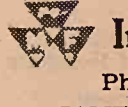

#### Anti-Trust Limit On Chemagro

The Chemagro Corporation  
of Kansas City is nearer to set-  
tlement of an anti-trust suit  
with the government after being  
accused of restricting resale of  
certain pesticides.

John N. Mitchell, U.S. attorney  
general, said a proposed consent  
judgment settling the 18-month-  
old case was filed in federal  
court here. It is to become final  
in 30 days.

Under the settlement, Chema-  
gro and its parent firm, Farben-  
fabriken Bayer A.G. of West  
Germany, would be barred from  
restricting pesticide sales thru  
patent licensing agreements.

The original suit challenged a  
series of agreements between  
Chemagro and more than 100  
other corporations concerning a  
systemic pesticide called Di-Sys-  
tom.

The proposed settlement bars

Chemagro from entering into  
any contract, agreement or un-

Chemagro also would be pro-

under specific trademarks. Bay-  
er would be bound under the  
judgment not to cause its sub-  
sidiary to enter any such agree-  
ments.

The Justice department said  
the judgment would enjoin re-  
strictive practices involving the  
sales of all other chemical Chema-  
gro products, as well as Di-Sys-  
tom, over the next 10 years.

#### California Cotton Endangered By Pink Bollworm

The pink bollworm, almost im-  
mune to pesticides, is ravaging  
unchecked through the cotton  
fields of the Imperial Valley in  
California, where more cotton  
grew per acre last year than  
anywhere else in the world.

Growers expect to lose from  
50 to 60 percent of their cotton  
crop by November harvest. Thir-  
ty percent has already been de-  
stroyed.

A half dozen small ranches re-  
cently went out of business after  
the "pinkies" as growers call  
them, decimated their cotton  
fields.

"If this infestation continues  
next year Imperial Valley will  
soon be out of the cotton busi-  
ness," says Farm Bureau direct-  
or William DuBois.

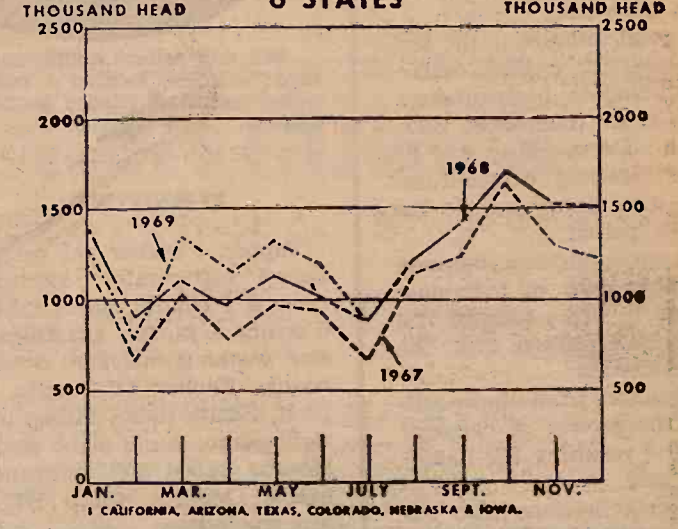
One reason the quarter-inch  
"pinkies" are doing so much  
damage is that insecticides are  
now almost useless against them,  
DuBois said.

"Repeated doses over the years  
have built up a high tolerance in  
the pink bollworms against all  
chemical poisons," he explains.  
"The amount it would now take  
to kill them is unsafe by state  
standards."

The Imperial Valley is nestled  
near the Mexican border. Though  
it is one of the nation's smaller  
cotton growing areas, with 650-  
000 acres under cultivation, the  
area is blessed with fertile earth  
and daily sunshine which result-  
ed in it turning out 2000 pounds  
of cotton lint an acre in 1968 —  
the world's highest.

DuBois says he and many  
growers feel the only way to pro-  
tect future cotton crops is to  
starve the insects to death by  
not planting any cotton next  
year.

# New Farm Plan Really Only A Framework

The Nixon administration's proposed new farm program is a skeleton that can be used to build almost any kind of farm support structure that can get through an urban dominated Congress. At least, that is the belief of congressional and administration leaders.

But in the wake of Agriculture Secretary Clifford M. Hardin's presentation of new farm program "alternatives" to the House Agriculture Committee Wednesday, farmers can conclude this much:

- If either of Hardin's new plans for wheat, feed grain and cotton programs is accepted, the mechanics of farm production control in the future — beginning in 1971 — will be roughly similar to programs of the past.

- If either program is adopted, the mechanisms used for supporting farm incomes — commodity support loans plus direct supplemental income payments — will be much the same as in the past.

Hardin's proposals are hard to evaluate because he omitted pre-

cise recommendations on income support levels, leaving this key detail along with many others, to later administration-congressional negotiation. In a Congress increasingly more urban, any farm program must have the support of Capitol Hill and the White House, Democrats and Republicans, to get passed. Hardin knows this.

## Strain Between Auto Makers And Big Steel

Steel price increases have strained the long-standing relationship between General Motors Corporation and U.S. Steel Corporation, the Wall Street Journal said today.

General Motors, the largest automobile maker, last July attempted to dissuade U.S. Steel, the biggest steelmaker, from increasing prices by 4.8 percent.

Now, the Journal said, the war of nerves between the two companies is escalating. It quoted informed sources as saying General Motors had canceled some big orders with U.S. Steel and has reallocated them to other steel companies.

General Motors' only comment was that it hadn't changed its buying policies. U.S. Steel declined comment.

"It is clear that G.M.'s action over the last month has been substantial and goes beyond moves it has taken in the recent past," the Journal said.

"At the end of August various buyers within G.M. were told that G.M. was suspending buying of some cold-rolled sheet from U.S. Steel. Some orders were being reallocated to other steel suppliers, including Republic Steel Corporation, McLouth Steel Corporation and the Great Lakes Division of National Steel Corporation.

"The early December order for cold-rolled sheet from U.S. Steel's Gary, Ind., facility was withheld. This sent a high-ranking U.S. Steel official to Detroit for some fence mending earlier this month but to no avail. It is understood he left Detroit without the order.

The Journal said that in addition to price, G.M.'s move was in reaction to what the newspaper described as failure of large amounts of U.S. Steel's cold-rolled sheet to meet G.M.'s quality requirements and less than desirable delivery schedules.

He said he doubted government farm spending could be cut quickly, though costs might come down later as the need for government aid decreased.

The big difference between present farm controls and the system Hardin proposed lies in the greater flexibility the new plans would give farmers in choosing their crops.

Now, growers of wheat, feed grains and cotton must comply with fixed planting restrictions on each individual crop if they want federal support.

Under Hardin's first new proposal, called a "set aside," farmers would be required to idle a

fixed number of crop acres on their farms. But once this was done, remaining acreage could be used for virtually any crop the farmer wanted to plant except controlled items such as rice, sugar, peanuts and tobacco. This plan would allow a farmer to grow more of his major crop — wheat, for instance — than in the past, without losing price support rights.

Under the second new proposal, termed a "domestic allotment and grain base" plan, cotton growers would have no acreage restrictions at all, though they could get payments only on the number of acres eligible for pay-

## A Smallmouth Record Catch

PRATT — The Kansas Forestry, Fish and Game Commission has now officially recognized the first record on smallmouth bass for the state of Kansas.

Clyde Mong, Ogallah, Kansas, is the record holder with an 11½ ounce smallmouth taken from Cedar Bluff Reservoir on September 9. Although not a monster, it is still the first fish of this species to be submitted in the state for the official record. It measured 11½ inches in length.

Mong took the smallmouth to game protector George Anderson at Ellis for identification and weighing the evening it was caught. Since no scales were available at the time, Anderson kept the fish overnight in water and it was weighed the next morning on state inspected grocers scales in Ellis. Confirmation of the species identification was

## State Collects More Taxes Than Expected

Kansas wound up its last fiscal year with a surplus of 20.4 million dollars above estimates, James Bibb, state budget director reports.

As of June 30, the ending general fund balance was estimated earlier to be 74.2 million dollars, but the actual unencumbered balance was 94.6 million, or an increase of 20.4 million over the estimate, Bibb said.

Of the total increase in the ending balance, 8.2 million dollars was attributed to higher-than-anticipated tax collections, 3.2 million to underspending, and 8.8 million to shifting expenditures from the 1969 fiscal year to the 1970 fiscal period.

The most significant increase in collections was in individual income taxes, with a total of 72.4 million, or 4.8 million over the revised estimates.

This resulted from under-estimates of the growth of personal incomes and resulting tax liabilities, Bibb said.

Sales tax collections also exceeded estimates by 1.9 million dollars, Bibb said.

Increased interest rates on bank deposits of inactive state funds also accounted for an additional \$494,000, the report showed.

# Kansas 7th In Farm Income

Texas moved past Illinois last year to rank third among the states in total receipts from sales of farm products, says the Agriculture Department.

A revised report on farm income ranked California first and Iowa second, the traditional leaders in farm sales. California reported farm marketings of nearly 4.3 billion dollars, and Iowa had 3.5 billion.

Texas reported 2.7 billion and Illinois about 2.6 billion, the first time in three years Texas has slipped into third place.

Other top 10 leaders included Minnesota 1.9 billion, Nebraska 1.8 billion, Kansas 1.5 billion, Wisconsin 1.5 billion, Missouri 1.4 billion and Indiana 1.4 billion.

Iowa led in livestock sales with 2.5 billion, followed by California 1.6 billion; Texas 1.4 billion; Minnesota 1.3 billion, Nebraska 1.3 billion, Wisconsin 1.2 billion, Illinois 1.2 billion, Kansas 1 billion, Missouri 955 million, and South Dakota 753 million.

Leaders in value of farm crops sold were California 2.7 billion, Illinois 1.4 billion, Texas 1.3 billion and Iowa, Florida, North Carolina, Indiana, Minnesota, Kansas and Washington, each with less than 1 billion.

The sales figures, rounded out from precise estimates, do not include all farm income sources, only receipts from sales which totaled about 44.4 billion last year for the country as a whole.

Government payments, for example, totaled about 3.5 billion last year and are included when computing net income.

Texas was No. 1 in government payments with 465.4 million, followed by Iowa 246.3 million, Kansas 282.2 million, Nebraska 185.3 million, and Illinois 160.9 million.

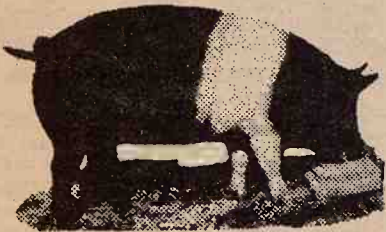

## High Interest Cuts Returns Of Co-op Lenders

OMAHA — "Current high interest rates have had a tendency to slow some expansion programs among farmer cooperatives in the Midwest," H. W. Cox, president of the Omaha Bank for Cooperatives, told some 500 representatives of agricultural cooperatives attending the bank's recent annual meeting here.

"Return on investment is exceptionally important when entering any new venture, and current interest rates have lessened that return. At the same time, needs for credit are greater because cooperatives are experiencing a period of exceptional growth. Farm supplies needed for production were never greater and cooperatives are growing to meet demand," he said.

"The Bank has experienced no restrictions on availability of money. Cost on loan funds obtained by the sale of debentures to private investors are high but money is available and we expect this situation to continue," Cox stated.

In his report to stockholders, he noted that because of the bank's policy of providing credit at the lowest possible rates — absorbing some of the high cost of money — net earnings in 1969 dropped to \$556,000 from \$706,000 in 1968.

Loan advances last year totaled over \$112 million. The amount of gross loans outstanding reached a new peak of \$116 million at the close of the year on June 30, he reported.

# State Livestock Income Hits Billion Mark

Realized net farm income for Kansas farmers in 1968 was up moderately from 1967 but was still well below the record 1966 income, according to the Kansas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service.

Increased sales of livestock and

higher prices were reflected in larger income from livestock and livestock products as the receipts rose to a record high in 1968.

Receipts from crops were also up but the increase in combined cash receipts from crops and livestock was just about offset by increases in production expenses to a new high record.

Realized net farm income in 1968 for Kansas was \$482 million, 3 percent more than in 1967 but 14 percent below the record high set in 1966.

The realized net income for 1968 was the second highest in records dating back through 1949.

In 1968 the realized net farm income was 26 percent of the gross farm income compared with 31 percent in 1966.

The per farm realized net income was \$5294 in 1968 compared with \$5009 in 1967 and \$5871 in 1966.

Cash receipts from marketings of farm products were \$1536 million, an increase of 5 percent over 1967.

Livestock and livestock product sales were \$1002 million, the first time in history to top a billion dollars. Cash receipts from the sales of livestock and livestock products were 5 percent above 1967.

Cattle, hogs and dairy products were the major sources of livestock income.

Crop sales in 1968 were \$534 million, also up 5 percent from 1967.

Wheat was the major crop item, but sorghum, corn, soybeans and hay were also contributors.

Government payments to farmers in 1968 were \$228 million compared with \$212 million in 1967.

Production expenses on Kansas farms during 1968 reached a new record high of \$1349 million

compared with \$1269 million in 1967. Current operating expenses for feed, livestock, seed, fertilizer, machinery operation and repair, hired labor and miscellaneous items made up 65 percent of the total.

Depreciation and consumption of capital goods comprised 17 percent of the total expenses while the remaining 17 percent included taxes, interest on mortgage debt and net rent to non-farm landlords.

# Easement Plan' Appears To Be Blocked

Much of southeast Kansas and cropland up thru the Flint Hills might have been included in an "easement" plan of land retirement which was trial-ballooned this summer but met resistance from nearly all sides of the crop and livestock industries. The Nixon administration is expected to announce a general farm policy sometime this week, and odds now are that it will favor continuing production controls in some form and some form of cropland retirement. The "easement" approach to cropland retirement came out of a self-named "ad hoc committee" for a better agricultural policy, which did not identify its financing, authorization, or full membership but it is understood that members all came from the National Advisory Commission on Food and Fiber. The plan was originally disclosed by the Chicago Tribune as one intended to increase farm income, save the government \$20 billion, and eliminate federal subsidies for wheat, corn, feed grain and cotton.

The "easement plan" would take the government out of the grain business and kill subsidy payments. But it puts government in the land business thru the "easement" leasing of marginally productive cropland up to 73.5 million acres. Owners of this land would be required not to plant grain crops, but could plant grass or timber. The plan also was aimed to appeal to urbanites' complaints about the cost of beef. It would have allowed beef to graze off half of that 73 million acres, thus increasing the supply of beef to 144 pounds per capita by 1975, and bringing the price of beef down to an estimated 19 cents a pound on the hoof. The Kansas Stockman, magazine published by the Kansas Livestock Association, describes the easement plan in its September issue, terming it a "Blueprint for Disaster." The "easement" approach apparently had the effect of closing ranks among farmers. The Farm Bureau continued to press

for its "whole farm" cropland retirement program but emphasized that they were against grazing any retired lands. Seventeen other farm organizations met to attempt to present a unified front to Congress before a new farm bill is written. They included the NFO, Farmers Union, Grange, various associations of producers of milk, grain sorghums, corn, potatoes, soybeans and peanuts; electric co-ops; and the American National Cattlemen's Association. All but the latter were willing to extend the current farm programs with some expansion of the Cropland Adjustment Program already in the law. The cattlemen's group said it would not oppose a land retirement program but was strongly against any grazing of retired lands or any artificial attempts to stimulate more beef production. A cattle feeders group did not go on record with the other farm groups but has recommended

cropland retirement of 10 to 12 million acres annually, no disruption of the economy, and continuation of the current farm program. No farm organization has espoused the cause of the easement approach. The Kansas congressional delegation was unanimous in opposing the easement approach.

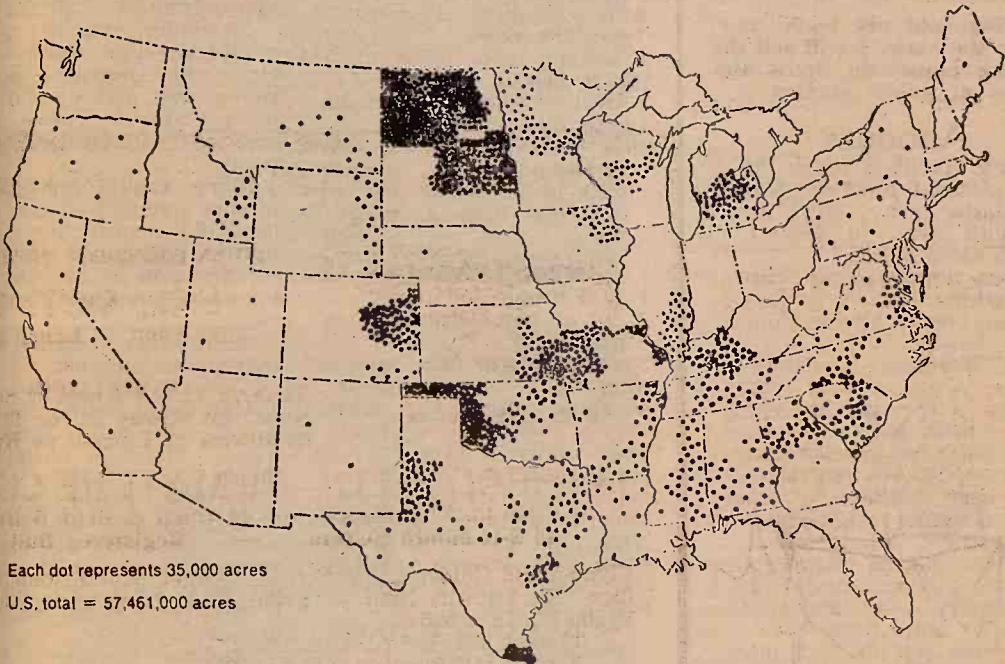

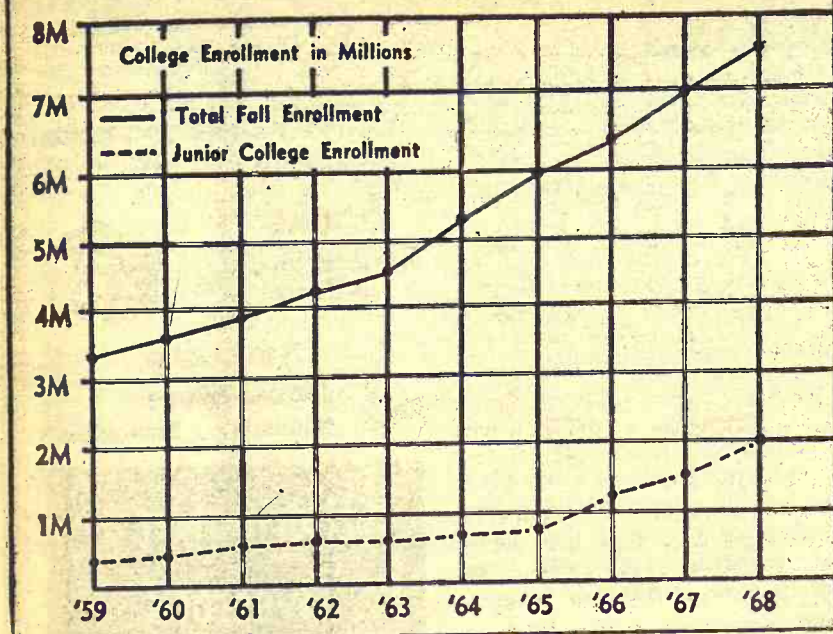

### THE STUDENT EXPLOSION

Higher education enrollment has been climbing steadily during the past decade, more than doubling from 3.4 million to 7.6 million in last year's fall registrations. The greatest spurt in recent years has been in junior colleges. Full and part time students in 2-year schools numbered 411,000 in 1959, about 12% of the total student population, but by 1968 had jumped to nearly 2 million, 25% of all students.

## Separate Tuttle Milford Staffs

JUNCTION CITY — Operation of Milford Reservoir here has been placed on a separate and independent basis from the former joint basis with Tuttle Creek, near Manhattan, Col. R. L. Anderson, Kansas City district engineer for the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, said Wednesday.

Leland Brown, reservoir manager, has been promoted to resident engineer of the Milford facility.

James Johnston, Manhattan, resident engineer at Tuttle Creek, had served in that capacity at both reservoirs. He will now devote full time to the Tuttle Creek operation.

Upgrading of Milford was approved because of the responsibility involved in the two operations, according to Anderson. Milford is the largest reservoir in

Kansas and Tuttle Creek is the second largest.

Added to the Milford staff this week were Charles Vandervoort, Dwight, equipment mechanic, and Clayton Riffel of Navarre, carpenter. Both are full time employees.

Milford's full time staff now contains nine employees. It is expanded to 24 during the summer months.

## Bad Year For Army Worms

This has been a bad year for army worms in Kansas and adjacent states, reports Dell E. Gates, extension entomologist at Kansas State University.

The moths that produce the worm came on in early July which is extremely early for the state, Gates said. Also unusual was a late brood which hit the

state around the first of September.

Fortunately, now, Gates said, the army worms seem to be concentrating on volunteer wheat in the central and western part of the state rather than newly seeded grain. However, wheat seeding is just getting underway.

The current brood of the worms should be gone before most of the newly seeded wheat emerges. While no one can predict for sure what will happen, Gates said it would be natural to assume that cold weather will arrive before a new crop of worms develops.

The worms have wiped out a few fields of newly seeded rye and some fall-seeded alfalfa. Gates said he had no reports of established alfalfa fields being killed.

The worms shifted from corn and sorghums to the volunteer

wheat. Damage to the grain crops was not severe because the worms worked mostly on leaves of the plants rather than on the ears of corn and heads of sorghum.

There have been reports of heavy damage to ranges in New Mexico in recent weeks. Apparently this is not the same worm that hits Kansas, Gates said. There are about 20 kinds of cut-

worms that fall under the general term of army worms. This has been a bad insect year in Kansas — army worms, green bugs, grasshoppers and others. Early in the year it was thought the opposite would be true. But along in midsummer the insect numbers began to multiply. It is hard to say what Gates commented.

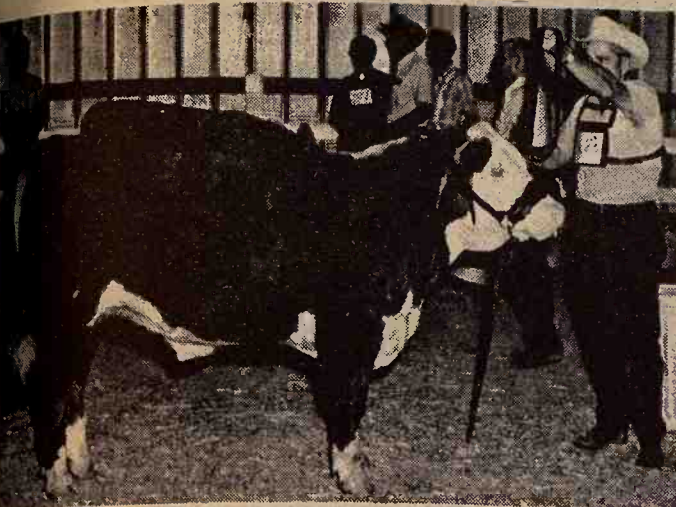

## USDA Sees More Pork By Next Summer

Consumers can expect less pork this winter than a year earlier, but the Agriculture Department says an upturn in supplies is in sight by next summer.

The tight pork situation was signalled Friday by the department's quarterly report on hogs and pigs on corn belt farms as of Sept. 1.

Hog prices paid to farmers have been the highest in several years and only recently have begun to ease. Consequently, the department said, many producers have sold breeding stock for slaughter at the higher prices and plan to cut back on pig production until next year.

Officials said farrowings of baby pigs in the September-November period will be down 1 percent from a year earlier, although 2 percent more than last December-February.

But Corn Belt farmers plan to boost pig litters two percent during the December 1969-February 1970 quarter, which means more pork by midsummer.

The survey, made in 10 major producing states in the Midwest,

showed 46 million hogs and pigs on farms as of Sept. 1, 5 percent less than a year earlier.

The June-August pig crop was estimated at 17.1 million head, down 3 percent from a year earlier.

Officials said hogs and pigs on farms in Iowa, the top producing state, were 10 percent less on Sept. 1 than a year earlier. Other declines included Illinois 7 percent, Nebraska 6 percent, South Dakota 5 percent; Missouri 4 percent, and Indiana 1 percent.

Increases were reported for Ohio and Kansas 1 percent each, Wisconsin 3 percent, and Minnesota 4 percent.

"When a number of producers were asked why sows farrowing were below intentions," the report said, "the reasons most often given were prices, disease, and failure of sows to breed. Many farmers sold gilts and sows because of the high prices. Some indicated that breeding problems were carried over from the spring period."

Reduced hog slaughter this fall has been indicated for some time, which has contributed to speculation that meat-hungry

consumers will continue competing for beef and pork, thus keeping retail prices near currently high levels.

## "Deductible" For Medicare To \$52

There may be a 10% benefit hike in social security coming, but retirees are going to have to pay more of the costs of Medicare.

The Department of Health, Education and Welfare last week issued a carefully worded statement indicating that the basic "deductible" for hospital stays will be \$52 after January 1 — \$8 more than at present.

The department stressed that law requires such annual increases, when as now, hospital costs have risen substantially.

The Medicare health insurance program for the elderly is part of Social Security. Instead of the present \$44, Medicare recipients will pay the first \$52 up to \$60. From 60 to 90 days the patient's share will rise from \$11 to \$13 of

daily costs; over 90 days the patient will pay \$26 a day rather than \$22.

The announcement followed President Nixon's prediction of a substantial increase in the present \$4 a month which beneficiaries must pay for supplementary Medicare benefits.

The supplementary coverage used by 19 million persons helps pay doctor, ambulance, outpatient and other medical costs. The secretary of welfare must set the new supplementary rate by December 31 for effect next July 1.

Nixon recommended Congress enact a 10 percent across-the-board hike in all Social Security benefits effective for checks April 1, 1970 and thereafter.

Medicare will continue to pay the bulk of most beneficiaries' hospital bill's despite the \$8 increase.

The average Medicare hospital stay now costs \$700. The pa-

tient's share will rise from 6 percent to 7 percent with the new increase.

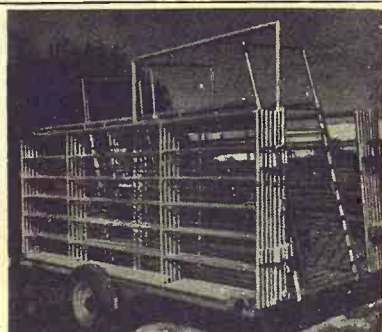
The \$52 deductible amount is intended under law to make the Medicare beneficiary responsible for expenses equivalent to the average cost of one hospital day, said Robert M. Ball, Social Security commissioner.

The increase will also affect nursing home stays following hospitalization. The patient will pay \$6.50 rather than the present \$5.50 for each day over 20 in a nursing home or extended care facility.

The increase will not affect patients whose hospitalization begins in 1969 but extends into 1970.

# No Big Year For Machinery Makers

The bright green and yellow John Deere tractor remains the workhorse on many American and overseas farms, and most likely will continue to be for years to come.

But like other makers of farm machinery, which have been experiencing declining sales since early 1967, Deere is pushing increasingly for future growth in nonagricultural products, such as its brightly painted mowers for weekend gardeners, and construction equipment.

Despite long term optimism, farm industry executives gathered for the seventy-sixth annual convention of the Farm and Industrial Equipment Institute expect to have fewer members over the next decade. Mergers, some of them say, will be forced by diminishing volume and a continuing profits squeeze.

"I think there should be some shrinkage in the industry, because the economy is not grow-

ing fast enough to accommodate everybody that's in it now," commented James L. Ketelsen, president of the J. I. Case Co., subsidiary of Tenneco Inc.

John E. Mitchell, president of Massey-Ferguson Inc., North American and group vice president for industrial and construction machinery of Massey Ferguson Ltd., the Toronto-based parent company, says there is "a plateauing of the farm machinery business in North America. It's a very mature industry with an adverse trend."

However, despite government reductions in wheat acreage allotments, laggard housing starts, tight money and high interest rates, executives at this convention are cautiously optimistic that 1970 sales might increase slightly.

Hopes for higher sales are based on the likelihood of improving farm cash receipts, the underlying demand for residential and

commercial construction and the continuing trend towards bigger and more powerful machines that have higher price tags.

But with the farmers not in a buying mood this year, the big equipment items have suffered. Sales have spurted in the last three months, but not enough to offset what one executive called an "awful first quarter" and smaller, less costly machines are selling better than the big jobs.

Retail sales of tractors this year are expected to amount to 145,000 units, down 7 percent from the 1968 total and combine sales are expected at some 30,000, about 13 percent below last year's level. But price increases averaging 3 to 6 percent among producers this year and the bigger units will keep dollar volume about equal with 1968 for most companies.

Business is not as bad as it appears, in the view of E. F. Curtis, president of Deere. While industry shipments are off, retail sales measured in dollars will be about the same, Curtis says. And retail inventories are down from last year to "close to the normal level."

For the thousands of small farmers in Guerrero, Jalisco, Nayarit and Sinaloa who supply the trade, cash income from marijuana of \$500 to \$1000 a year is far more than they could dream of earning from any other crop on the poor soil.

For the successful dealers, the risks of arrest and prosecution under Mexican federal narcotics control laws have been relatively slight measured against the huge profits to be reaped from moving marijuana, as well as more potent drugs, to the United States.

With the announcement recently that a major new drive by U.S. authorities to reduce the inflow of narcotics from Mexico, this traffic has become a highly sensitive issue in relations between the two countries, which share a border from Brownsville, Tex., to San Diego.

The traffic was one of the major points discussed at the meeting between President Nixon and President Gustavo Diaz Ordaz at the inauguration of the Armistad Dam on the Rio Grande. Diaz Ordaz, like other Mexican presidents before him, said that Mexico was aware of the seriousness of the problem and would cooperate in attempts to halt the illegal flow.

In disclosing the discussion on narcotics, Mexican officials have also emphasized other problems in U.S.-Mexican relations such as the treatment of Mexican migrant farm workers who enter the U.S. illegally but are employed for wages below union levels, and damage to irrigated Mexican farms near Mexicali from salt waste in the Colorado River originating in Arizona.

## No Pasture, Mexican Grass Provides Income

For thousands of small farmers in the rugged hills of the western Sierra Madre, the treasure is marijuana.

From Guerrero, a poor state southwest of Mexico City, to Sonora, which borders Arizona and California, the going prices in the isolated villages where marijuana is brought down from unseen plots on pack donkeys is \$4 a kilo (2.2 pounds).

Dealers in the towns, with ready cash, small warehouses and friends in the local police, moisten the gray-green leaves and flowers with sugarwater, pack and re-dry them in one-kilo blocks, wrap them in cellophane or newspaper, and accumulate enough to prepare a truck lot for shipment.

Each one of these one-kilo blocks that reaches Los Angeles becomes worth \$75. As it moves northward a kilo of marijuana can come to be worth \$150 in Minneapolis.

Clandestine factories in Mexico reduce marijuana to the more potent hashish, which then sells for \$900-\$1200 a kilo.

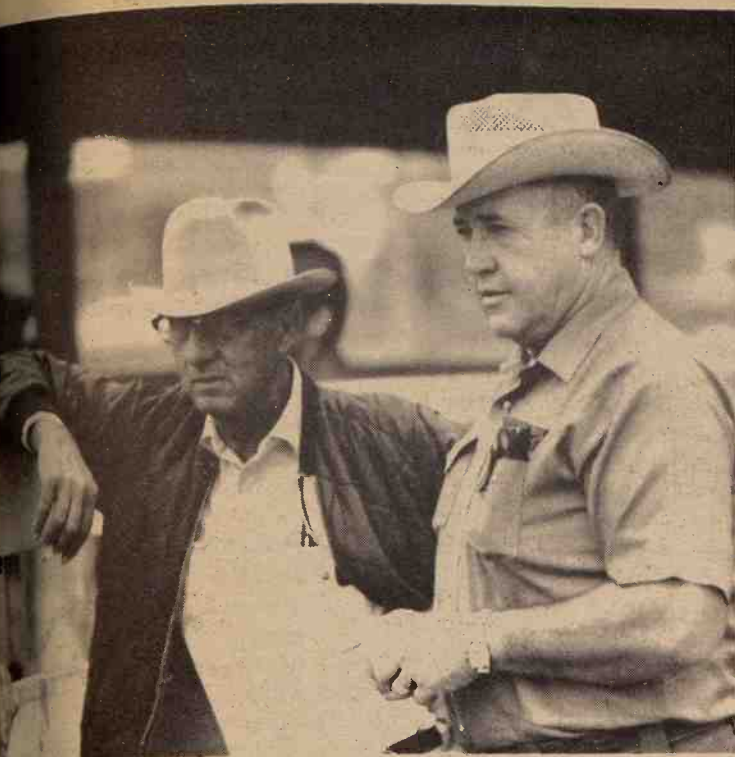

### Mixed Reaction To 9-Day State Fair

HUTCHINSON — The first nine-day Kansas State Fair has ended with an estimated total attendance of 798,000. Total estimated attendance of the last six-day fair in 1968 was 593,000.

The Board of State Fair Managers conducted its final business meeting of the fair Sunday and began preliminary discussions of plans for next year's fair. The board was asked by a group of milking shorthorn feeders to consider hosting a national milking shorthorn show next year, but took no official action.

One of the major topics of the planning session was proposed changes for the 4-H and open livestock shows. Fair Presi-

dent Andrew Olson, Dwight, said the board is seriously considering moving the 4-H Livestock Show to the first three days of the fair in facilities formerly used only for open classes. Open class shows would then follow in the same barns and show rings in the last six days.

The executive committee of the fair board will meet in Hutchinson Nov. 6 and 7 with representatives of departments to discuss possible changes. It will then make specific recommendations to the full board meeting in Topeka Nov. 19.

fair board. They were "given an appointment with the board for Nov. 7.

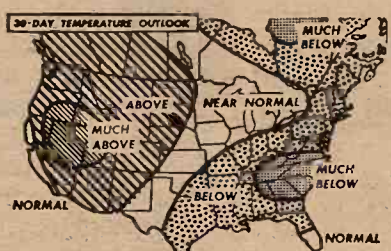
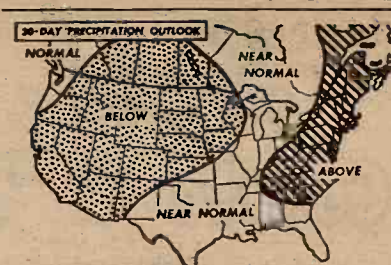
"We're going to try to keep it as businesslike as possible," said one manufacturing representative.

Co., Belleville; Herb Greenstreet, Dodge City, secretary of Western Kansas Mfg. Assn.; Hugh R. Houston, Livestock Equipment and Supply Co., Glasco; Julius Becker, Becker Mfg. Co., Downs, and Hugh Sa'isburg, A. O. Smith Corp., Kansas City. Representatives from Western Hardware & Implement Dealers Assn. and Central Kansas Manufacturing Assn. also will be invited to join the group, Hardy said.

"It isn't all the nine-day show that everyone is squawking about," said Bill Von Demfang, representing the Herman Co., Kansas City, who helped organize the exhibitors.

Among the exhibitors' problems to be aired with the fair board, Von Demfang said, are a shortage of gate passes for exhibitors' crews; lack of availability of reasonable winch truck service for loading and unloading of exhibit equipment; high cost of electrical hookups (\$20 compared to \$7.50 at Missouri State Fair), and suggestions for a tractor pulling contest, which is popular at Missouri, Nebraska and Iowa fairs.

Von Demfang said the exhibitor group indicated interest in meeting annually while exhibiting at the fair. He said some sentiment for a national association of exhibitors was expressed, but most favored separate state organizations.

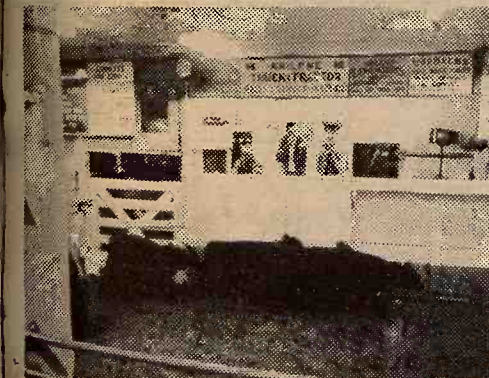
