### KANSAS ASSOCIATION OF FFA HIGHLIGHTS 1959-60

- 1. Terry Hager of Norton was declared Farm Mechanics displays at the Topeka the 1960 Star Farmer of Kansas.
- 2. There were 196 departments of vocational agriculture in Kansas, with a total enrollment of 6,303.
- 3. One hundred ninty-five chapters have paid state and national dues. One chapter failed to pay dues.
- 4. The Kansas Association has an active FFA membership of 6,737 members. This is 107% on the basis of enrollment.
- 5. Seven Kansas FFA members were awarded the American Farmer Degree at the 32nd National FFA Convention.
- 6. The two Kansas chapters, Effingham and Oberlin, won the gold emblem classification in the 1959 national emblem awards program.
- 7. Ten Kansas FFA members sang in the 1959 National FFA Chorus and eight members played in the National FFA Band.
- 8. Kansas teams participating in National FFA judging contests won two gold and three silver emblem classifications.
- 9. Steven Robb, Lawrence chapter, represented Kansas in the regional speech contest at Urbana, Illinois and won third place.
- 10. Kansas claimed 22 prize winners to lead the states for the second year in a row in the James F. Lincoln Arc Welding Foundation program.
- ll. The Seaman chapter placed first in the booth exhibits and the Powhattan chapter placed first in the

- 12. State FFA Convention delegates met in five business sessions, while attending the 32nd Annual State Convention in Manhattan, Delegates were members who were not judging contestants.
- The Salina chapter placed first in the farm mechanics exhibits at the State Fair at Hutchinson and the Minneapolis chapter placed first in the county booth displays at the State Fair.
- 14. One hundred thirty-six chapter farmers from 84 chapters were raised to the State Farmer Degree at the 32nd Annual Convention of the Kansas Association of FFA.
- 15. Twelve Honorary State Farmer Degrees were awarded.
- 16. Four State FFA Officers participated in the first national FFA leadership training conference in Washington, D.C. and in the dedication of the National FFA Building at Alexandria, Virginia.
- 17. Two Kansas men were awarded the Honorary American Farmer Degree. They were Mr. John Lowe, Advisor of the Winfield FFA Chapter and Prof. Tom Avery, head of the Poultry Dept. at Kansas State University.
- 18. At the 32nd State FFA Convention, 157 chapters seated 309 official delegates. Each delegate worked on one of 16 different committees, which considered various items of business of the State Association. Each of these committees gave a report to the delegates.

- 19. The Kansas Association was honored by having the National FFA Vice-president, Richard Poor, Neosho, Missouri, present to assist with the State Convention.
- 20. One hundred six three-man teams entered the 1960 annual high school judging contest in agriculture, 76 two-man teams entered the farm mechanics contests, 25 two-man teams entered the entomology contest, and 22 teams entered dairy products judging. In addition, 21 individuals competed in the FFA public speaking, and 18 competed in the news writing contest.

# STATE FFA CAMP COMMITTEE

The 1960 State FFA Camp is to be at Camp Fellowship--Lake Afton, Goddard, Kansas. Approximately 250 newly elected FFA officers will be enrolled. The camp will start at 2:00 p.m., August 12 and will close at 2:00 p.m., August 15.

# BUDGET COMMITTEE REPORT

The facts presented in this report came from the report submitted by R. L. Davis, auditor for the State Association. The value for the State Association Savings Bonds has increased \$106 and now is \$1210.16. The value of the General Fund is \$6403.88 and the Sears Foundation Sheep Fund is \$1727.50. That leaves a total balance of \$8158.38.

#### We recommend that:

# ACTIVITIES AND BANQUETS COMMITTE

2. Participation in National Band & Chorus officers. Some of the local band instructors are not receiving due credit for developing musicians who play in the National FFA Band.

# 3. Any chapter activities and community service:

In the pest control program, it was found that in some cases boys are going with the FFA boys and are not as careful. It was decided that each boy present his credit card while hunting so the FFA will not get unnecessarily blamed for accidents. Some chapters charge a penalty for a boy who does not reach his goal. It was suggested that there should be another activity to substitute for pest control since we have all of the modern poisons for controlling pests. We might then turn our attention to making picnic tables and other projects for the community.

# 4. Money raising activities:

A chapter can sell popcorn at the local ball games. Take projects and booths to the fairs and exhibit them. By selling raffles some of the chapters come into difficulty in that raffling is considered in some areas as a form of gambling. It might also be possible for some of the chapters to rent ground for the chapter to farm. The farming can be done by owning and renting their implements or by the boys using and comparing their tractors.

5. Social activities and recreational activities: Some chapters have FFA basketball teams and play other chapters The FFA and FHA can go together and sponsor a dance. The highlight of the FFA year is the banquet.t It was suggested that every chapter have a banquet to

inform the people of the FFA activities. Chapters might have a swimming party and invite the 8th grade boys. A chapter can also have a meeting of all of the new officers.

# FARMING PROGRAM STORY

TROY CHAPTER: Harold Whitten

Harold, a senior in the Troy Rural High School, now owns a Minneapolis Moline Z tractor and cultivator, two 20' x 10' portable sheep sheds, and several other items of sheep feeding equipment... In Vo-Ag shop Harold has built many items useful on the farm. A few of these are a 8' x 16' two-wheeled dump trailer equipped with a winch, a 10 bushel hog self-feeder, an electirc sickle grinder, two 20' x 10' sheep sheds, and three hay and grain feeders for sheep

Farming Program Story (cont.):
Harold's vocational agriculture farming program has consisted of one fattening steer, one gilt, and seven ewes and their lambs during his Freshman year. In his Sophmore year he bought a crossbred beef heifer calf, his gilt had a litter of 10 pigs, and he raised 10 lambs from his eight ewes. Also he had five acres of corn which yielded 43 bushels per acre.

During Harold's Junior year he raised 12 lambs from 10 ewes and bought 31 other ewes. By culling out some of the older ewes he ended the year with 29 head. He also bought 14 feeder pigs from from which he saved back five gilts for his senior year. He had five acres of popcorn and five acres of milo which yielded 85 1/2 bushels per acre.

During the past year Harold has had 14 acres of wheat and 10 acres of corn. He now has one beef heifer, five gilts, 52 ewes, and 45 lambs.

Harold has been active in the local FFA chapter. He has served as Treasurer and is now Vice-president. He has also served on many committees.
