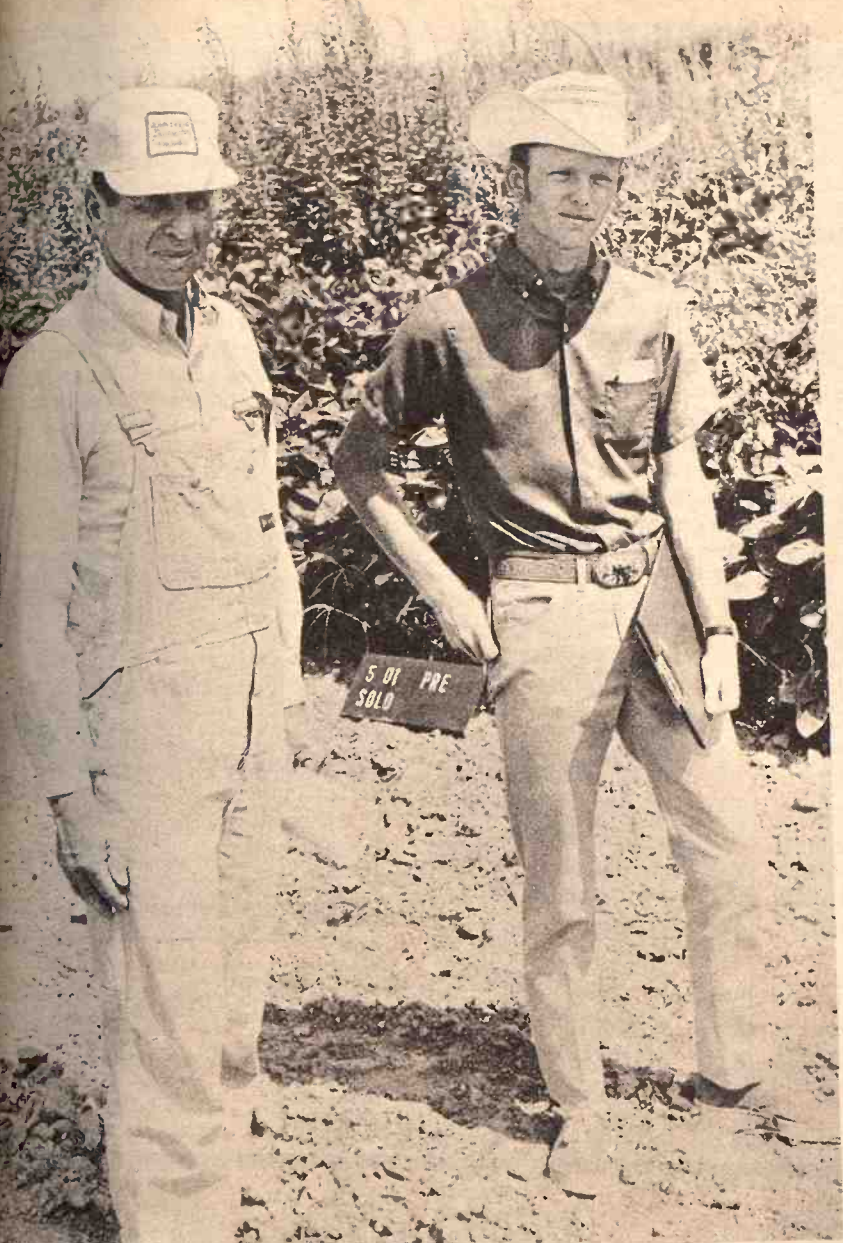

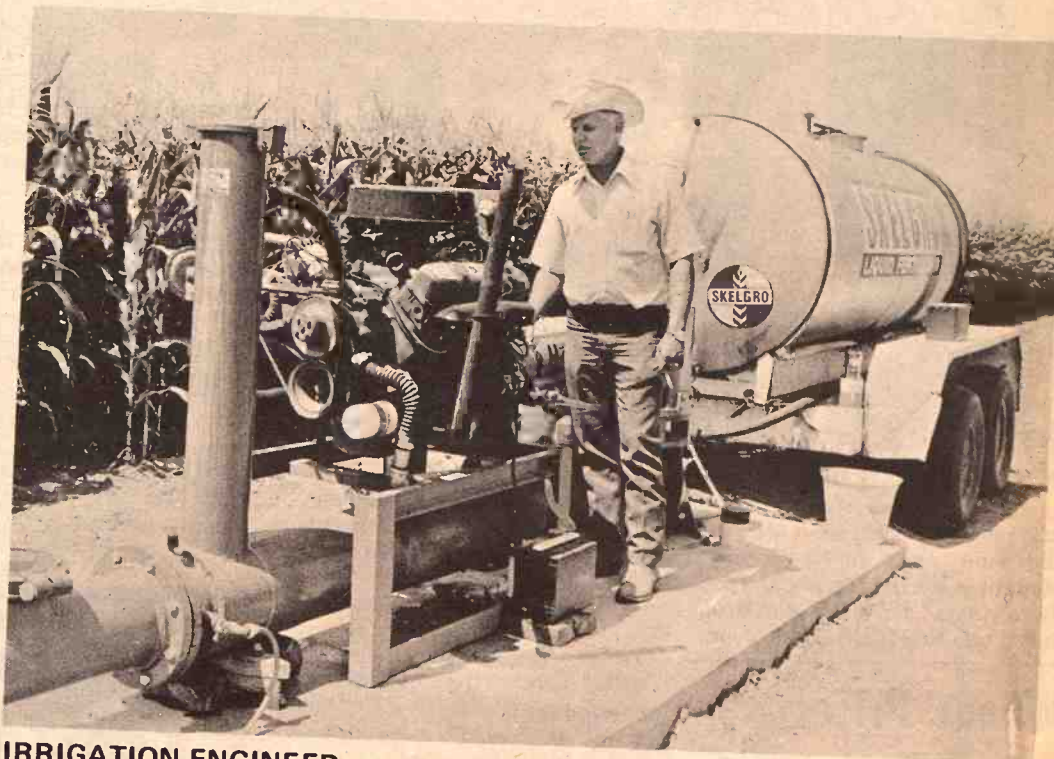
SOYBEAN HERBICIDES

This is the first year for the event but farmers seemed to be encouraged by the work done with shatter cane and weed control in soybeans. Several chemicals that haven't been released yet were showing excellent control. But, researchers caution high hopes because accurate predictions can't be given on just one year of test-
ing. According to one researcher, development, management, and utilization of irrigation water are most important. "Kansas farmers are trying to control their water. Over one million feet of pipe have been put in each year for the last eight years. That's just short of 200 miles per year," an ag extension man said.

Great Plains Conservation Gets Financial Boost

The Great Plains area of Kansas—the 62 counties west of Salina and Wichita—has had an environmental boost in the past fiscal year.

Lee Morgan, state conservationist of the USDA Soil Conservation Service, reported today that cost-share funds obligated under the Great Plains Conservation Program in Kansas during the 1972 fiscal year totaled \$1,023,499. This amount is an increase of 11 per cent over the previous fiscal year.

The program is aimed at bringing about needed land use adjustments and supplying the conservation measures needed to stabilize agriculture in this area of special

climatic hazards.

Morgan reports that this special program for the higher risk agriculture of the Great Plains continues to be popular in Kansas.

For the past several years, we have wound up with a backlog of applications equal to about one and a half year's allocation of funds. However, each year a poll of our county offices reveals that we could have twice as many contracts if sufficient funds and personnel were available," Morgan said.

"There are several reasons for this. Farmers and ranchers can see the value of developing a complete conservation plan for their land at one time. But even more importantly, the three-to-ten-year contract enables them to realistically schedule the conservation measures they decide upon. Cost sharing is guaranteed as they carry out each year's program."

Practices for increasing fish, wildlife and recreation resources; feedlot pollution abatement; and promoting economic use of land are now eligible for cost share. Practices for these purposes were included in 17 recent contracts.

Forty-one per cent of Great Plains program cost sharing in the past fiscal year was for constructing terraces and diversions; 12 per cent for grass waterways; nine per cent for irrigation land leveling; eight per cent for building livestock water ponds and pits, and seven per cent for establishing permanent vegetation.

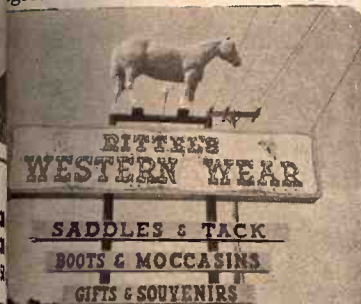

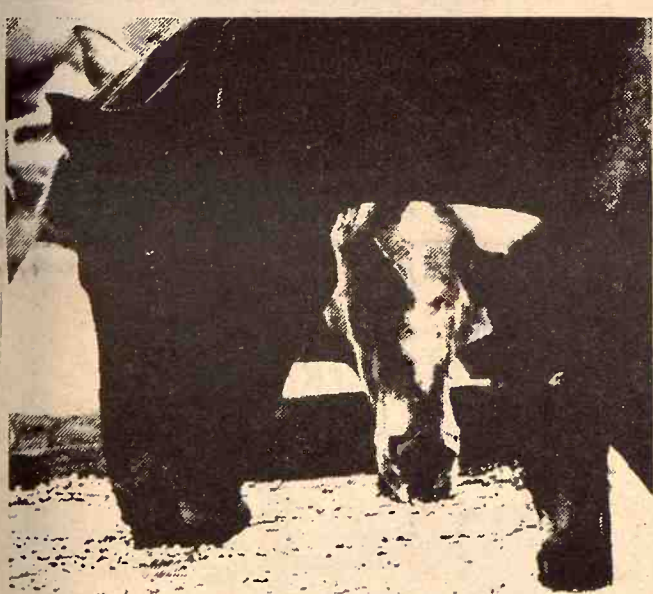

Farmers Find Less Money For Living Expenditures

At a time when farm income continues to fluctuate — up one year and down the next — Kansas farmers can bet on one thing: those family living costs will keep going up each year.

Family living expenditures for one group of Kansas farm families increased more than five and one-half per cent a year between 1966 and 1971, according to Don Pretzer, a Kansas State University Extension economist. Average net farm income, however, was only \$100 higher in 1970 than in 1965.

The income figures in the comparison are for the period 1965 to 1970, because farmers base much of their family spending on their previous year's income, Pretzer explains.

"Farmers tend to tighten their belts and delay living expenditures following a low income year. However, many expenses — such as food and medical care — are fixed. These items must be purchased in years of low income as well as high."

One may be tempted to believe

that farmers' standard of living is rising sharply each year. But a closer look at the figures shows that inflation accounts for most of the higher living expenses.

The consumer price index was up an average of 4.6 per cent a year during the five-year period. It's another example of the cost-price squeeze which has plagued the farmer for years.

Average family expenditures in 1971 were \$6,087 for 728 Farm Management Association families which keep home account books. Average family size was four.

"Last year's expenditures were lower than 1970 in some areas of the state where farm income was down the previous year," Pretzer explains.

Pretzer points out that only cash expenditures are included in his figures. Rental value of the home and food raised on the farm are excluded.

The economist believes that farmers spend a smaller share of their annual income for family living than non-farmers. "The farmer's priority system and goals require heavy use of self-generated income either to expand the business or to retire debt," he says. "This means that many farm families simply have less money to spend on living expenditures than non-farm families with a similar income."

Virginia Benton agrees. She and her husband, Floyd, operate a dairy farm in partnership with their son, Lynn, northwest of Burlington in Coffey County.

"The farm comes first," she says. "If the expenses are heavy out there, we get along with less in the house."

The Bentons have just added a new concrete silo. We've been wanting to carpet the house, but now it will have to wait, she says.

The Bentons are long-time Farm Management Association members. Virginia does the farm records, and keeps one of the most detailed home account books in the state. She can tell you exactly how much the family spent for living expenses each year since 1946.

A glance through her account books shows that living expenditures

increased 77 per cent between 1966 and 1971. "Our spending peaked in 1969 and 1970, when our two oldest children were still at home," she says. "We remodeled the kitchen during those years, and this added to our expenses. But now that Lynn and Darla have homes of their own, our family spending has gone down."

The family also includes two younger sons, Gail, 17 and Marlin, 13, who still live at home.

The Bentons' living expenditures agree with the statewide trend which shows expenses varying with the age of the children. Families with children over 18 years of age spent the most. Those with preschool children, and couples with no children, spend the least.

Families with children in high school, however, spent the most for food and medical care.

Medical expenses went up the most during the five-year period, increasing an average of 12 per cent a year for all Farm Management members. Cost of food purchased jumped four per cent and clothing about three per cent annually. Education costs were up about five per cent.

Savings and life insurance expenditures increased more than five per cent a year. This shows that

farmers are saving more even as the cost of living goes up each year, Pretzer notes.

The Bentons' medical expenses soared 85 per cent during the five-year period. "Office calls used to be \$3 or \$4 in 1965, but now to around \$7 now. Health insurance also have gone up a lot."

Food costs increased 84 per cent and household operations 53 per cent for the Bentons during the five-year period. Virginia cans a lot of vegetables from her garden. Home grown and milk also help hold food costs down.

"Our food expenditures started going up in 1970," she says.

Much of this was due to rising prices. However, two weddings and a family reunion also helped the food budget that year. "I buy more convenience foods to save time," she recalls.

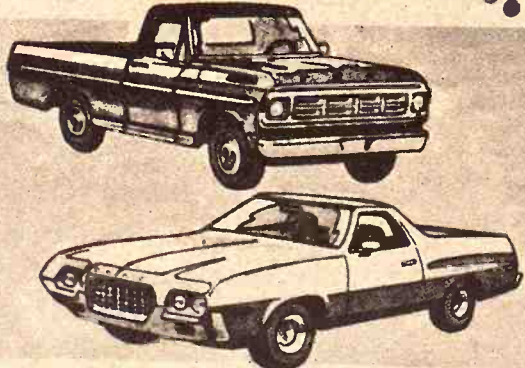
Clothing costs were up one per cent for the family during the period. Virginia sews much of the family's clothing, and likes to buy the sales for finished clothes material. She proudly told of her latest purchase — \$88 worth of double-knit slacks on sale for

Grain Supply Report Helps Forecast Market

The USDA reports of stocks of grains for July 1 are always important to farmers. The reports show the supplies of grains remaining on hand in all positions—elevators, mills, and warehouses as well as on farms. These figures can be used to calculate the amounts of grain available for various uses. In turn, the use figures for previous months help us forecast the needs and use for next quarter and next year.

Corn stocks on July 1 totaled 2,176 million bushels, up 39 percent from last year. Subtracting these stocks from the total supply last fall shows a disappearance of 4,028 million bushels during the first nine months of this marketing year. That was 14 percent more than a year before, and 7 percent more than two years ago. Nearly half of the stocks of corn on hand July 1 were under price support.

per acre, which is the average of the two best years, 1971 and 1969. The result would be a crop of slightly more than 4.8 billion bushels. But what if the average yield is only 80 bushels per acre? In that case, production would total only about 4.5 billion bushels. Finally, if you believe that corn yields are still going up like a skyrocket, as some good farmers do, plug-in 90 bushels per acre. That would mean about 5.1 billion bushels in total production.

How much corn will be needed in the year beginning October 1? Probably a little more than is being used and exported this year, which seems likely to total about 5 billion bushels. If next year's requirements are 2 percent greater, the disappearance during 1972-73 would be around 5.1 billion bushels.

If the crop harvested this fall turns out to be substantially short of needs during the next marketing year, the deficit will be made up largely by using some of the large carryover of 1971 corn that will be under resale loans. Many farmers who hold that corn will be able to redeem and sell it at a profit when prices are about 5

cents above those of recent months.

Chances Increase For Ag-Related Business Loans

The U.S. Small Business Administration announced a policy change that will allow more agricultural and agricultural-related businesses to obtain SBA financial assistance.

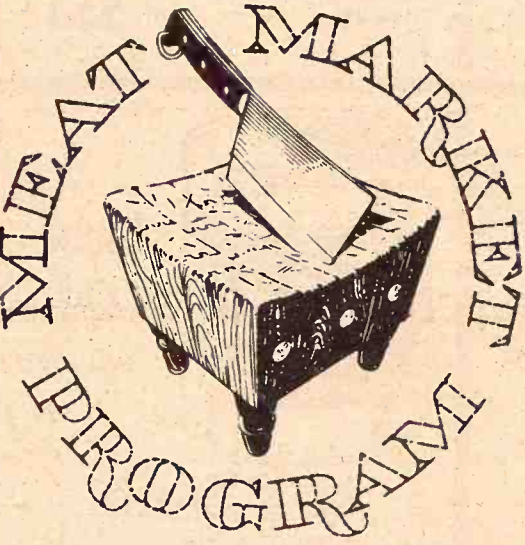
Under the new policy, small businesses in certain agriculture-related industries are eligible to apply directly to SBA for financial assistance. Certain farming and agriculture-related businesses may now apply for SBA assistance if their loan applications have been turned down by the Farmer's Home Administration or agencies of the Farm Credit Administration.

agencies of the Farm Credit Administration, may now apply to SBA if they have first been turned down by FHA or FCA.

These include businesses who have annual receipts of not more than \$250,000, are not eligible to receive U.S. Dept. of Agriculture support payments of production loans, and are engaged in the production of mushrooms, fruits, vegetables, edible nuts, castor beans, and field crops.

Other businesses which will now be eligible and for which size standards are being developed, include those engaged in the following activities: operation of a hydroponic farm; production of fur-bearing animals; operation of dry-lot dairies; participation in beef cattle or dairy cow pools; production of bees and honey; oyster planting; and operation of a hatchery for the production of baby chicks for sale to others.

Trash Compactor Cuts Down Garbage Problem

A household trash compactor, now on the market, can be used free-standing or built in to help homemakers put an end to messy and unsightly garbage cans.

This kitchen appliance crushes cans, bottles, plastics, milk cartons, tea bags and other garbage. The trash is deposited in a moisture-proof polyethylene-lined disposable bag in the unit's slide out drawer and, when the drawer is closed, the push of a button activates a powerful ram which compacts the waste to about one-quarter its original volume in less than a minute.

The compactor can accommodate approximately one week's accumulation of garbage and trash for a family of four, compressing the equivalent of three to four 20-gallon garbage cans of waste into a 1½-foot cube. Each time the slide-out drawer is closed, a measured amount of deodorant spray is automatically injected into the trash to control any unpleasant odors.

The trash compactor has a textured mar-resistant top and finished sides and is designed to replace a 15-inch base cabinet in under counter installation or it can be used free standing at the end of a kitchen counter. An optional wood cutting board is offered.

A key feature of the unit is in-

clusion of two removable and reversible front panel inserts which allow the owner to select a choice of avocado, harvest gold, coppertone or white decorator colors. The panel color can be changed whenever desired by simply removing the screws from the handle, selecting the appropriate panel front and sliding it into place. The panels can also be covered with wallpaper or contact paper.

The appliance is equipped with a key operated on-off lock so that it can be secured against unauthorized usage.

Leveling legs permit height adjustments so that, with an optional wood cutting board top, it can be level with kitchen counters.

Another feature which makes the appliance a favorite with many, is that it requires no plumbing and can be plugged into any 15-ampere circuit with an adequately wired 115-volt outlet.

Don't Press Cotton Corduroy

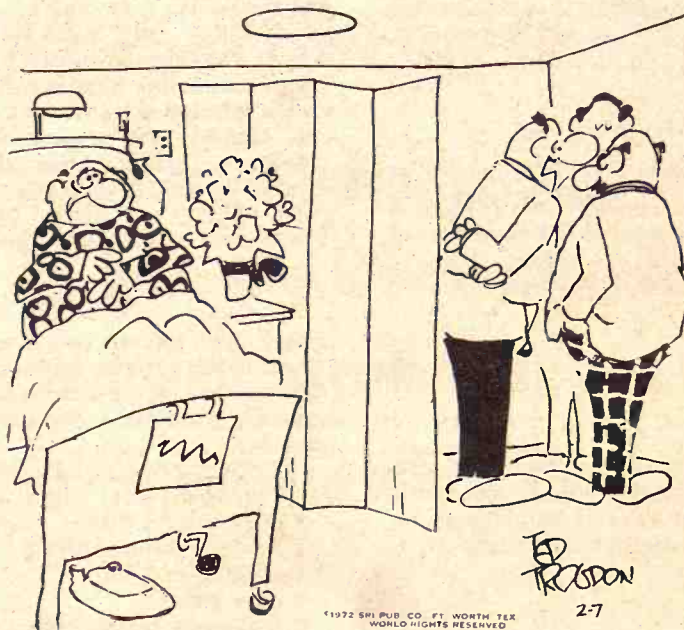

Genetic Uniformity In Crops Imperils U.S. Food Supply

The National Research Council
says the nation's food supply is
imperiled by too much uniformity in

seed farmers plant.

Thus, the NRC said in a report
about the genetic vulnerability of
crops, when a disease or insect finds
a crop that is vulnerable, a large
share of it is open to damage. An
example, the report said, was the
1970 corn crop which was hit by
southern leaf blight.

"The corn crop fell victim to the
epidemic because of a quirk in the
technology that had redesigned the
corn plants of America until, in one
sense, they had become as alike as
identical twins," the report said.

But uniformity in good crops is
desirable today because they are
easier and more economical to
harvest, mass process, handle and
sell, the NRC said. However, this
means that varieties of most
genetically alike crops are highly
susceptible to any mutant strain of
organism that has the capability to
attack them, the report said.

The report also said an epidemic
similar to the 1970 corn crop, "might
well have struck any of a number of
crops, because uniformity has also
become characteristic of com-
mercial varieties of sorghum,
millet, sugar beets, onions, cotton
and cantaloupes, and it could
become important in wheat."

The report proposed a "complete
watchdog system" including a
national monitoring committee be
set up to keep track of potential
hazard to genetically vulnerable
crops.

Stockmen Efforts Are 'Conscientious' On Drug Use

Kansas livestock producers and feeders are making "conscientious efforts" to abide by animal drug certification regulations, a beef cattle nutrition expert contends.

"Producers and feeders recognize that it is to their benefit, as well as the public's, to follow all regulations in regard to drugs and feed additives administered to livestock," emphasizes Dr. Stephen L. Armbruster, Extension specialist in beef cattle nutrition and management at Kansas State University.

Armbruster's comments were prompted by a recent decision of the Food and Drug Administration banning the use of diethylstilbestrol (DES), a growth stimulant fed animals to help shorten the feeding period prior to slaughter.

The use of DES implants was not affected by the decision.

Ironically, the FDA decision banning the use of DES after Dec. 31 of this year came in the month which had been designated Livestock Certification Month by the National

Animal Drug Certification Committee (NADCC).

The committee, made up of many segments of the livestock industry, is conducting an educational program this month to inform producers about the proper use of drugs and feed additives, and about the certification program. Certification is voluntary on all drugs and feed additives, except DES.

Armbruster says the certification program dramatizes agriculture's willingness to take extra steps in assuring consumers that meat products will continue to be both economical and wholesome.

NADCC was formed this year and instituted the animal drug certification program. Certification forms were developed whereby a producer could signify that animals he marketed for slaughter either had not received drugs or feed additives, or had been withdrawn from such products according to manufacturer's directions.

In January, 1972, certification of DES uses became mandatory. Since residues have been detected in some beef liver tissue in the last few months, the FDA decided to rule out altogether the use of DES in either liquid or dry feeds.

Armbruster says the development

of detection devices sensitive to residues in parts per billion instead of just parts per million is partly responsible for the furor over DES.

By law, no human food can contain any additive that has been found cancer-forming in mice or other laboratory animals — even if the amount is so small that the possibility of danger is beyond question. While DES has caused cancer in certain strains of mice, there is no evidence that it can cause cancer in humans, Armbruster points out.

The KSU specialist believes consumer confidence in U.S. meat products will be maintained as long as livestock producers follow animal drug and additive regulations.

"Certification reassures the housewife that the meat, milk and eggs she buys are healthful and free of harmful residues," he adds.

Some market analysts have predicted that the banning of DES will lead to a rise in meat prices of five or six cents per pound. "Being realistic, I believe an increase is coming, but citing a figure at this point would be mere speculation," concludes Armbruster.

Vandals Shoot \$30,000 Bull

HAYS — A \$30,000 Charolais bull was killed by two shots apparently fired by vandals from a high-powered rifle.

Maurice Rohr, the registered bull's owner, found the animal dead in a pasture. Ellis County Sheriff Clarence Werth said the bull had been dead about two days.

The 2-year old bull was the only animal shot in the pasture, where other cattle were grazing. Rohr operates the Smoky Hill Charolais Farm about five miles south of here.

Werth said the two shots may have been fired from a deer-type hunting rifle. They entered just behind the bull's shoulder and were about four inches apart.

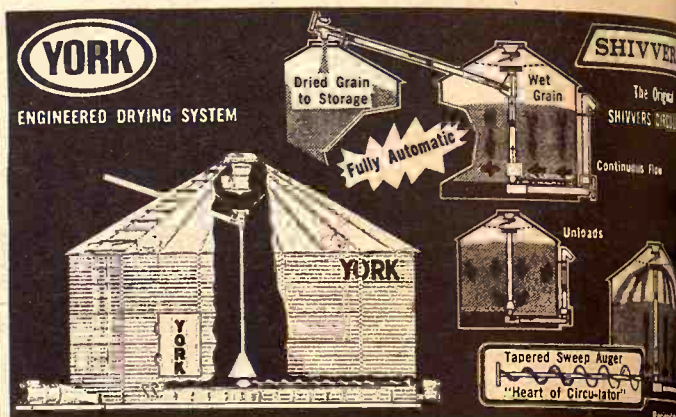

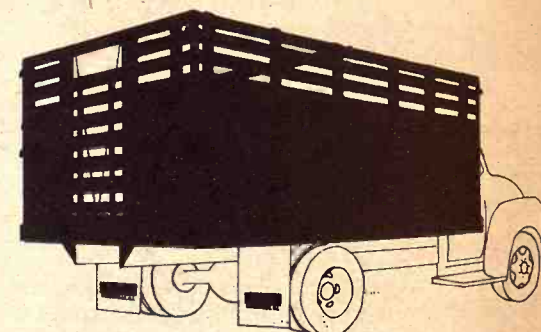

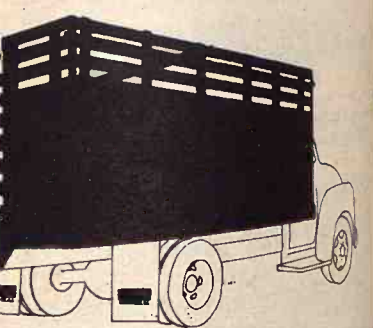

S Implant Just ay Answer Cattle eders Questions

yearling steer with radioactive hormone pellets behind its ear soon provide a good idea as to long cattle feeders will be able use DES implants.

An effort to find out quickly whether hormone pellets leave residue in the carcass as does the hormone, the U.S. Department of Agriculture's research division has launched tests which it hopes will point way. Interest in the use of hor-

more implants has jumped sharply since the federal Food and Drug Administration last week banned the feeding of DES to cattle and lambs because of the residue problem.

If tests show DES in implant form is completely eliminated before slaughter, it is believed many beef producers would quickly shift to implants despite the added time and effort required to do so.

However, if the experiments using sensitive radioactive tracer techniques indicate that the residue problem is just as acute as it is with feeding DES to animals, the now partial ban on DES for fattening livestock probably would promptly be made total.

The tests, being made at the

agricultural research station at Beltsville, Md., near Washington, involve several steers. The first steer will be fed through a normal fattening period of four months before it is slaughtered to check for residue in its tissues. The second steer implanted will be slaughtered more quickly, perhaps a week after implantation, to check on whether tissue residues are present at that early stage. The information from the "short period" steer may be available in "several weeks," officials explained.

How practical is the use of DES in implant form? Dr. L. N. Hazel, head of the animal science department at Iowa State University, where the hormone was researched and developed as a growth-booster for ruminants, said the implant method is more difficult and less certain than the feeding method. He explained that implanting can prove rather erratic, in that if a pellet is placed too close to a vein, it may be absorbed into the bloodstream too rapidly, and if not near enough, it may provide too little of the potential benefit.

Another scientist, Dr. William Buck, said control is less certain in the implants. If DES is removed from the ration, the residue in the body rapidly disappears, he explained. But if it is implanted, it cannot be removed at will and keeps on working as long as it lasts, he added.

Scientists note that in practical use, most of the DES pellet implanting now is done on small calves three to four months old and weighing several hundred pounds. Handling such cattle is easier and more efficient than the older cattle which constitute most of the feedlot replacemtns.

Cattle Numbers In U.S. Feedlots Up 18 Percent

The number of cattle in feedlots on Aug. 1 was up 18 per cent from a year earlier, pointing to more beef in the consumer pipeline this fall, says the Agriculture Department.

The inventory, in six major cattle feeding states, showed the largest gain was in Texas, currently the No. 1 producer. In all, there were nearly 7.8 million head on feed as of Aug. 1 compared with 6.6 million a year earlier.

Another report on the livestock and meat situation says sales of fat

cattle this fall will be "moderately larger" than last season but under the record volume this summer.

By state, the number of cattle being fed as of Aug. 1 and the percentage gain from a year earlier included:

Iowa 1,561,000 on Aug. 1 and a gain of 5 per cent; Nebraska 1,386,000 and 23 per cent; Texas 2,120,000 and 29 per cent; Colorado 989,000 and 16 per cent; Arizona 543,000 and 14 per cent; and California 1,185,000 and 17 per cent.

Kansas added to the monthly inventory report last November, showed 1,130,000 cattle and calves on feed Aug. 1.

Placements of cattle on feed during July totaled 1.15 million head, up 8 per cent from July last year. Placements were up in California, Nebraska, Arizona and Texas but down in Iowa and Colorado, the report said.

Market weights of cattle are up this summer, with steers averaging 12 pounds per head in July and heifers up six. Officials say the heavier weights are expected to continue for a while, at least.

Last year, because feed costs were higher, producers sold cattle a little earlier. Now, with feed prices lower, the tendency is to hold cattle a bit longer.

"Some cattle feeders would rather

hold cattle on feed a little longer because the cost per pound of gain in the feedlot is generally less than the price per pound of choice slaughter cattle," says the Economic Research Service.

"This situation is expected to continue in the second half, and fed cattle weights may run one to two per cent heavier than a year ago, adding to the total beef tonnage available for consumption and putting a bit more pressure on prices," officials said.

Choice steers at Omaha this fall are expected to sell a little under summer prices, but above the \$33.40 per hundredweight average in October-December last year, the department said.

Number Of Producing Oil Wells In United States Continues To Decline

The number of producing oil wells in the United States is continuing to decline.

The nation had 512,471 producing wells at the end of 1971, compared with 566,869 five years earlier and with the all-time high of 617,057 at the end of 1961.

The decline is a result of a sharp domestic drilling operations slump that has plagued the industry since 1956. The number of new producing wells has fallen far short of depleted and abandoned wells.

Domestic operators completed only 27,837 wells last year compared with a record 58,160 in 1956. Current trends indicate 1972 operations will show some improvement over the 1971 level.

Huge blocks of leases were abandoned as the prolonged drilling slump gained momentum. This trend was reversed, however, in 1968 and operators have increased their holdings gradually.

At the end of 1971, the domestic industry had 350.7 productive and non-productive acres under lease, compared with 324.9 million at the end of 1967 and with the record high of 424.2 million acres at the end of 1959.

The year-end 1971 reports on producing wells and acreage leases are in the new edition of "The Oil Producing Industry in Your State," an annual publication distributed by the Independent Petroleum Association of America. The booklet includes a statistical history of operations for each of the 32 states with oil and gas production.

The new edition makes no direct reference to developing oil and gas shortages but reports that, despite record demand, the United States has yet to be discovered reserves that are estimated to be more than adequate to satisfy national requirements for the foreseeable future.

The 2,222,312 wells drilled since 1859, the booklet reports, have discovered 143 billion barrels of oil and 247.4 trillion cubic feet of gas excluding Alaska. Actual 1971 production exceeded 3.2 billion barrels of oil and 22 trillion cubic feet of gas.

The number of producing wells and the total acreage under lease have declined sharply in Texas since 1959.

Texas had 174,207 producing oil wells at the end of 1971, compared to 188,821 in 1967 and 190,905 at the end of 1959. Texas leases totaled 42.9 million acres at the end of last year,

compared with 59.5 million in 1967 and 79.1 million in 1959.

Operations also have declined in

Louisiana, runnerup to Texas as the nation's top producing state.

Producing oil wells in Louisiana totaled 25,750 at year-end 1971, compared with 30,946 in 1967 and 26,309 in 1959. Louisiana leases totaled 7.3 million acres last year, compared with 10.7 million five years earlier and 12.5 million in 1959.

"Dairymen whose herds are average or better are not in trouble, but those with herds of calving intervals exceeding 400 days are not realizing the profit potential from their dairy projects," says Bonewitz.

The KSU dairyman offers these suggestions for shortening the calving intervals.

Vitamin D should be added to concentrate rations. Each ton should contain at least 4 million units of vitamin A and D. Research at K-State has shown 37-day shorter calving intervals for cows getting vitamin D.

Cows should get the grain they

need early in lactation, limited only by their appetite and the minimum roughage needed to keep butterfat tests normal.

They should get needed calcium and phosphorus. Many rations are low in one or both of these minerals, says Bonewitz.

Cows should be vaccinated for viruses, "lepto" and other diseases that might affect breeding.

Good quality semen or fertile bulls should be used. Low grade infections in the reproductive tract should be kept under control.

Dairymen need to keep good records, with special attention to heat periods, which are often overlooked. A well planned and executed heat detection plan is a must. Bonewitz contends time spent in detecting cows in heat may pay more per hour than any other single chore on the dairy farm.

Dairymen need to know that cows don't ovulate at the same time, some ovulating early and some late.

Breeding early and late in the period may be helpful on problem cows, he suggests.

The K-State study mentioned earlier indicates that cows freshening in May, June, July, August and September don't produce as well as those freshening in January, February, March, April, October, November, and December.

"Plan your program so you can get cows settled to freshen in months indicated for production," Bonewitz advises dairymen.

MOORMAN SCHOLARSHIPS TO FOUR K-STATE'S

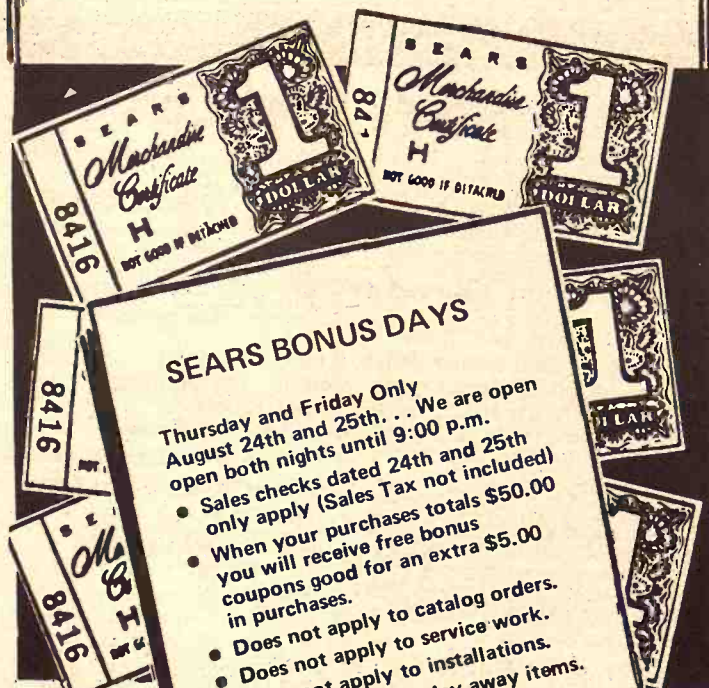

Bogus Angus Steer Big Mac Finally Sold By Auction

Big Mac, a Charolais steer which brought \$14,250 as the National Western Stock Show grand cham-

pion under the alias of an angus, was sold at auction for \$4,907.

The winning bidder was Eddie Collins of Red Oak, Iowa, a farm journal writer and broadcaster who said he planned to take Big Mac to New York City and display him as a protest against federal action increasing meat import quotas.

"I want to show American

housewives that it isn't the rancher that's getting rich and Big Mac is the way to do it," Collins said.

Big Mac was auctioned last January after being named grand champion steer at the National Western here. MacDonald's Hamburger Systems in the Denver area paid a record \$11.40 per pound.

After the auction it was determined that Big Mac had been dyed black and was not an angus, but a charolais and not eligible for the grand champion competition.

This raised other questions concerning his ownership and the state brand commissioner demanded that his owners, Rex Miller, 16, and his father, Ildon, of Alta, Iowa, show proof of ownership and breed.

Eventually, the Millers returned all trophies won by Big Mac and they were awarded to Arendt Brothers of Highmore, S.D., which had shown the reserve grand champion.

The controversy resulted in the loss of license for the Denver Livestock Market, Inc., which auctioned the steer originally, and a suit by MacDonald's to get back the money it had deposited for the purchase.

District court later ordered the money returned to MacDonald's and ruled that Big Mac be considered an "estrays," or unclaimed steer, to be sold at public auction.

The proceeds from Wednesday's sale will be held by the state for six years should anyone come forward with proof of ownership to claim the money.

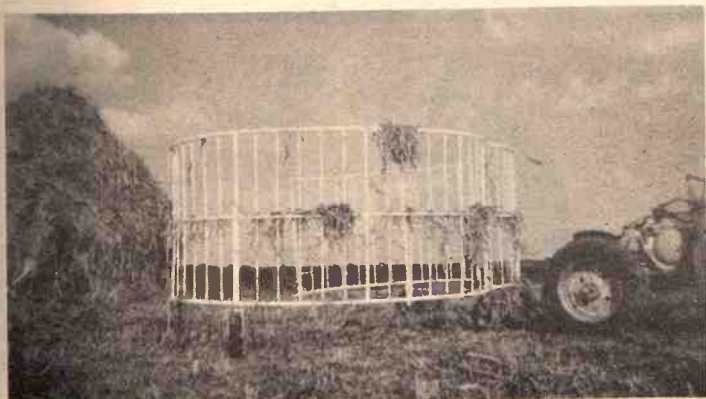

Upland Game Numbers Increase Biologist Says

PRATT — Populations of pheasant, quail and cottontail rabbit in Kansas have made a most substantial comeback in numbers over last year's low levels, announced Ron Little, McPherson, game biologist of the Forestry, Fish and Game Commission.

Winter storms and poor nesting conditions during 1971 influenced a 20 per cent decrease in pheasant and 14 per cent decrease in quail harvests per hunter in last fall's hunting season compared to 1970. But this year the story is different, according to Little. He is supported by the results of the July rural mail carriers wildlife survey, coordinated by the Commission.

The July mail carrier survey, which has been taken every year since 1962, is used to show the annual percentage fluctuation in the numbers of upland game. Coupled with the Commission's brood count survey conducted from July 24 to Sept. 3, the two surveys provide the information needed so biologists can recommend bag limits and season lengths for upland game.

"Pheasants, quail, rabbits and prairie chickens all recorded significant increases over last year's numbers," said Little. "If our brood count surveys go along this trend, this fall should find the upland game harvest a whale of a lot better than last year's."

In the pheasant portion of the survey, 485 mail carriers traveled nearly 185,000 miles in the state. Their statewide sightings of pheasants totaled 39 per cent higher than last year. In the following regions of the state increases in pheasants seen per 100 miles were: Northwest, 25 per cent; Southwest, 43 per cent; Northcentral, 62 per cent; Southcentral, 52 percent; and Northeast, 31 per cent.

In the quail survey, 653 mail carriers traveled more than 250,000 miles, sighting a statewide increase of 46 per cent more quail than last year. Per region, the increases were: Western (both north and south), 285 per cent; Northcentral, 38 per cent; Southcentral, 43 per cent; Flint Hills, 38 per cent; Northeast, 67 per cent; and Southeast, 34 per cent.

Cottontail numbers were shown to have increased in the regions over last year's numbers by: Western (both north and south), 191 per cent; Northcentral, 137 per cent; Southcentral, 78 per cent; Flint Hills, 41 per cent; Northeast, 133 per cent; and Southeast 28 per cent.

Little reports that while the survey showed dramatic increases of prairie chickens in some regions, the July survey doesn't provide an accurate index on prairie chicken numbers.

A similar survey conducted by Nebraska's Game and Parks Commission showed that state's pheasant population up 16 per cent over last year's numbers and quail up 36 per cent. Like Kansas, Nebraska upland game also suffered through a hard winter and poor nesting conditions in 1971.

Season openers already set by the Kansas Commission at Nov. 11 for quail and pheasant and Nov. 4 for prairie chicken. The Commission will meet early in September to take action on biologists' recommendations to set season lengths and bag limits.

Kansas Towns, Counties Cited In Safety Program

Topeka, Prairie Village, Iola, Pratt, Herington, Yates Center and Sharon Springs were listed as the top city winners in the Kansas traffic safety program for 1971.

Johnson, Barton, Dickinson, Washington and Grant counties were the top winners among the

counties.

Topeka was the winner in the classification for the state's largest cities for the 21st consecutive year. Johnson County was the winner in the classification for the largest counties for the third consecutive year.

Prairie Village was first in the class for cities with a population of 10,001 to 75,000; Iola and Pratt tied for first in the class for cities of 5,001 to 10,000; Herington and Yates Center were tied for first among

cities of 2,001 to 5,000, and Sharon Springs was first in cities of 2,000 population and below.

Barton County was first in the 30,001 to 90,000 population class; Dickinson first in the 15,001 to 30,000 category; Washington in 8,001 to 15,000, and Grant in the class for 8,000 and below.

Second place awards in the various classes went to Overland Park, Garden City, Great Bend, Manhattan, Newton, Ottawa, Mission, Russell, Marysville,

Plainsville, South Hutchinson, Buhler and Washington.

Third place awards went to Kansas City, Wichita, Hutchinson, Leavenworth, Leawood, McPherson, Salina, Winfield, Augusta, Haysville, Columbus, Garnett, Scott City, Sterling, Ulysses, Cimarron, Douglass, Glasco, Lyndon, Macksville and Sedgwick.

Among the counties, second place awards went to Sedgwick, Crawford, Ellis, Franklin, Harvey, Sumner, Harper, Jackson, Kingman,

Pawnee, Hodgeman, Meade, Stafford and Wallace. Third place county awards went to Cowley, Douglas, Saline, Barton, Finney, Miami, Brown, Clay, Jefferson, Rice, Barber, Coffey, Gove, Graham and Jewell. Docking said bronze plaques donated by the Kansas State Council, will be presented to place winners in his office Aug.

Kansas Cows Produce More Milk In June

Kansas milk production during June totaled 150 million pounds, 1 percent above the same month last year, according to the Kansas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service. Cumulative production during the first six months of 1972 totaled 872 million pounds, 1 percent below the same period a year earlier.
The number of milk cows on farms in Kansas during June totaled 10,000, compared with 194,000 in June 1971.
Milk production per cow in June averaged 790 pounds, the highest average production on record for the month of June.
U. S. Milk production during June totaled 11,021 million pounds, 2 percent more than a year earlier. Daily average production in June was up 0.5 percent from May.
Total milk production during the first six months of 1972 was 2 percent more than in 1971.
Milk production per cow averaged 72 pounds during June, 3 percent more than last year. The June rate per cow reached a record high level of 26 of the 33 states with monthly estimates.
Milk cows on farms totaled 2,219,000, down 1 percent from June 1971.

Sexless Mating Part Of New Type Of Plant Breeding

The government says a new way of cross-breeding plants could create new crop varieties and change present ideas of world food production.
It could lead to development of hardy plants yielding food both above and below the ground, it said.

The new method announced by the Atomic Energy Commission involved a kind of sexless mating of different species without any cross-pollinating help from the bees or the wind.

A team of biologists at the AEC's Brookhaven National Laboratory, Upton, N.Y., has produced the world's first known "mature hybrid" plant grown from fused genetic cells of two different species, completely circumventing the normal sexual and reproductive processes," the AEC said.

"Although cells have been fused before," said the announcement, "they have remained only as cells." "The standard genetic method of producing a hybrid," said the AEC, "is by cross-pollinating mature plants. Most sexual crosses between different plant species do not yield live or fertile offspring, since plants as well as animals have specific mechanisms to insure that fertilization with reproductive ability occurs only between individuals of the same species."

"The new technique... called 'parasexual hybridization'... circumvents many of these natural barriers to intergeneric reproduction, and opens the potential of cross-fertilization at the cellular level between widely divergent plant species."

genetically developing totally new crop species or the modification of existing species having improved yield, resistance to disease, and so forth.

"For example, one can imagine that it might be possible to devise plants which produce edible food above ground and an edible root below ground. This could cause our present concepts of world food production to be changed

Grain Scientist Separates Parts Of Wheat Kernel

A research scientist told Kansas Wheat Commission that his laboratory staff has developed a method of separating the components of a kernel of wheat without destroying the usefulness of the components.

Dr. Wayne Henry, director of research for FAR-MAR-CO Inc., a large wheat cooperative with headquarters in Hutchinson, announced the breakthrough in reporting progress on cooperative wheat use research being done for Kansas Wheat Commission. "We've found the key to unlock the door, in my opinion."

The processes developed in the FAR-MAR-CO research laboratory also could be applied to other grains, Henry said.

The discovery resulted from research initiated to develop new

uses for wheat.

Henry earlier told the commission that, if some commercial uses for separated components before full products, costs of grain alcohol might be reduced to a more competitive price for use as a gasoline additive.

More research is needed to discover feasible commercial uses for separated components before full advantages of the separation discovery will be known, Henry said. Previous attempts to separate chemical components of wheat had succeeded in retaining only about half of them in useful form.

Henry suggested the development of a plant for separating wheat into its components be developed as a cooperative effort between FAR-MAR-CO and Kansas Wheat Commission. He estimated a pilot plant to handle the processing of 1,000 pounds of grain per hour might cost about \$600,000. A full-size plant could cost \$6 million, he said.

Some members of the commission said they were "scared of those kinds of figures" which would be beyond the ability of the commission

budget. "The potential payback of this is so great that \$600,000 or \$6 million should not scare you," replied Henry.

Henry said he probably would present the proposal for a pilot plant to the next meeting of FAR-MAR-CO directors. He estimated development of the plant would take about one year. That time could be used in more laboratory research on uses for the separated wheat components, he added.

The commission postponed action on the pilot plant until its next meeting Sept. 7 and 8.

Wheat Prices Holding Support Loans Down

Higher market prices for wheat have had an effect on the number of 1972-crop bushels farmers are putting under government price support loan, according to Agriculture Department figures.

As of July 31, the department said, farmers put 22 per cent less new-crop wheat under loan than they did a year earlier. Wheat prices strengthened in July, and in August, on reports of massive sales of grain to the Soviet Union.

When a farmer takes a price support loan, the grain cannot be sold until he loan is paid off. When cash prices are higher, farmers tend to sell rather than take out loans.

Off-Farm Income Climbs

Revised figures by the Agriculture Department show farmers continuing to build up yearly earnings from jobs in town and other outside sources no matter how much they produce from the land.

The figures also show that outside income averaged more per farm than net profits from sales of crops and livestock.

Department economists say the trend will continue, despite

predictions that net farm income — from agricultural sales — will rise to a record of more than \$18 billion this year.

The new statistics, published recently in an annual "farm income situation" report, showed that in 1971 there were fewer than 2.9 million farms. Of those, slightly more than 1.07 million sold less than \$2,500 worth of products last year.

That category, which often includes part-time farmers and semi-retired persons, earned an average "off-farm" income of \$8,479 per farm, up from \$7,977 in 1970 and \$3,054 in 1961.

The \$2,500-and-under category last year netted only \$1,039 per farm from agricultural sales, down from \$1,077 in 1970 but up from \$905 a decade earlier.

The next category, those with sales of \$2,500 to \$4,999 accounted for 409,000 farms which averaged \$5,743 from off-farm sources, compared with \$5,455 in 1970 and \$2,128 a decade earlier. Each averaged \$1,993 from farm sales, compared with \$2,128 in 1970 and \$2,057 a decade ago.

Farms with agricultural sales in the \$5,000 to \$9,999 bracket totaled 385,000 units last year. Those averaged \$5,221 from off-farm sources, compared with \$4,972 in 1970 and \$1,859 a decade earlier.

Their income from sales of farm goods averaged \$3,397 last year, compared with \$3,634 in 1970 and \$3,501 in 1961.

Farms in the \$10,000 to \$19,999 sales class last year numbered 392,000, the report said. They averaged \$3,676 from off-farm sources in 1971; \$3,495 in 1970; and \$1,437 in 1961.

Net income from agricultural sales in that category averaged \$6,026 per farm last year, compared with \$6,475 in 1970 and \$5,739 in 1961.

The report showed some 365,000 farms in the \$20,000 to \$39,999 class, with an average of \$3,825 in off-farm income, compared with \$3,629 in 1970 and \$1,816 a decade earlier.

Net income from farm sales averaged \$9,721 last year, compared with \$10,473 in 1970 and \$9,293 in 1961.

At the top end of the scale, 253,000 farms with annual sales of \$40,000 and over averaged \$6,447 from off-farm sources last year, compared with \$6,141 in 1970 and \$2,577 in 1961.

All farms last year averaged \$6,230 from off-land sources, compared with \$5,921 in 1970 and \$2,417 in 1961.

But while off-farm average income rose in 1971, net earnings from what farmers grow and sell dropped to \$5,581 for all classes from \$5,757 in 1970. The average in 1961 was \$3,309 for all.

Thus, on a per farm basis, producers last year averaged more from off-farm jobs than they did from selling what they raised, according to the report.

The report showed, however, significant shifts and changes by sales class.

"For example," the report said, "in 1960 nearly one-third of all cash receipts from farming were accounted for by farms with value of sales \$40,000 or more. By 1971, their share had risen to nearly 60 per cent."

Choice Steer Prices Dropping

Producer prices for choice grade steers began to move down in early August but were still averaging well above a year earlier, according to the Agriculture Department.

Steers at Omaha averaged \$36.82 per hundredweight in early August. In mid-July averaged were nearly \$2 higher.

The early August price, however, was well above the \$33.43 reported for a year earlier, a report showed.

Weed-Eating Fish Could Make Fishermen Smile

For a disgusted Kansas fisherman who spends much of his time cleaning weeds and moss from lures, stocking fish that work at a weed-fouled plug might like a good idea.

There is a fish that will do just what is needed to solve the problem, too. It is the grass-eating carp, or whitefish. Though his fans say he is a super that will clean out weed waters, a Kansas State University outdoors expert is against this fish into ponds and streams.

While the grass carp might give good support to anglers and some table fare, too little is known about it yet, says Extension specialist Bob Henderson.

He calls attention to the fact that fishermen should have been by the haphazard introduction of common carp into U.S. waters years ago.

"Before fisheries" specialists introduce another foreign fish here, they want some answers. Henderson says, for example, would the grass carp reproduce in U.S. waters? Would it overpopulate and crowd out species? Would it eliminate vegetation, causing another ecological disaster? Would it be the weed diet, or would it compete with game fish for another species?

Research is underway in several states, and if studies provide right answers, then the grass carp introduction will be given serious consideration.

Federal Funds For State Range Fires

Federal funds to reimburse governmental units in Kansas for combating range and forest fires may be forthcoming in the near future.

Reimbursement would be available if costs should exceed \$500,000 in any calendar year, state, according to a new agreement signed with the Office of Emergency Preparedness. In about \$750,000 was spent by counties and townships in fighting grass fires.

Prior to the agreement signed by Governor Robert Docking, range fires had been considered outside the scope of the federal disaster relief provisions.

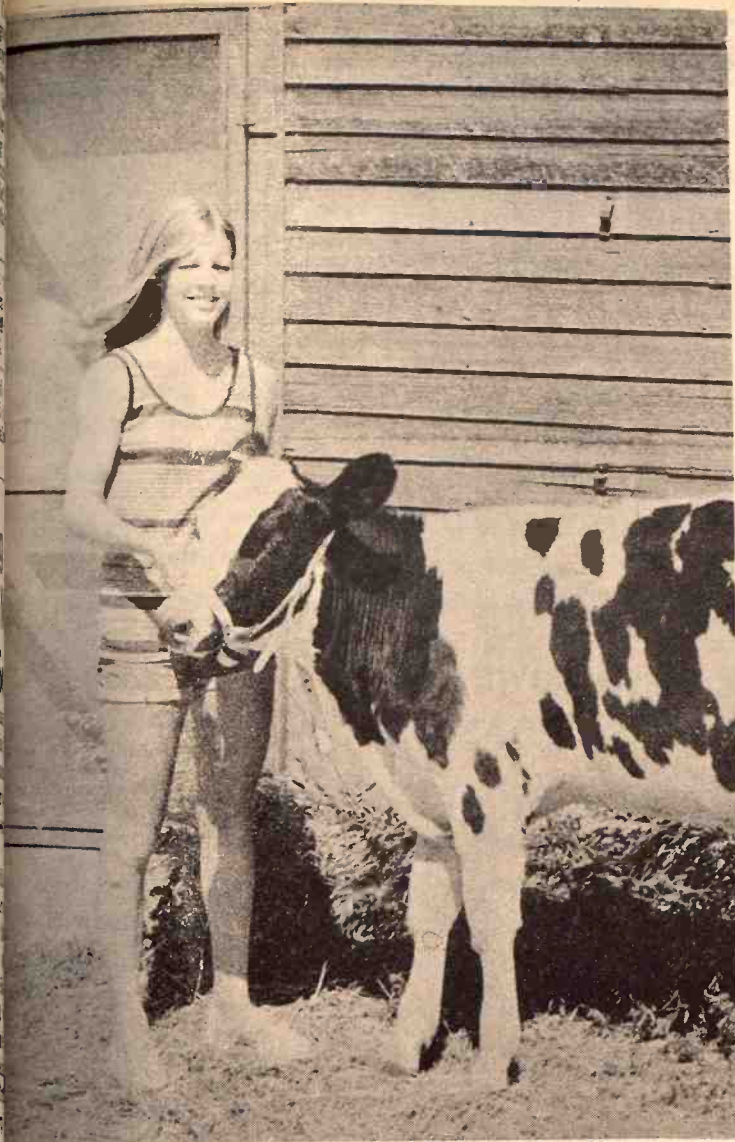

Don't be surprised if the next time you're looking for a job, your prospective employer asks you to take a lie detector test.

Experts in the field say more companies are using such tests.

George Danish of the San Antonio Police Department said many firms have large polygraph-lie detector — staffs of their own.

Most businesses, however, rely on the services of the approximately 260 licensed examiners in Texas.

One of the state's largest is Truth Verification Inc., a subsidiary of Smith Protection Services.

Jim Hamilton, acting chief examiner for the agency, said most of his clients are businesses with employees heavily involved in money and merchandising. "Grocery stores, service stations, nightclubs and restaurants come to us a lot," he said.

Hamilton recommends use of the polygraph to businesses to control loss — either outright theft or time wasted by hiring the wrong man for the job.

Hamilton said a polygraph examination normally costs the business less than \$20, compared to \$40 or \$50 for a conventional investigation.

The typical polygraph test takes about 45 minutes to administer, Hamilton said. Most of that time is spent establishing a rapport with the subject and calming his fears of the machine. Only two or three minutes of actual attachment to the machine's sensing devices are required.

During the test, the subject is fitted with an elastic waistband, an arm wrap and tiny metal sensors on his hands to test his breathing pattern, heartbeat and sweat reaction.

The examiner runs through a series of questions concerning the subject's health, education, financial condition and medication usage.

"Most people admit to petty theft," Hamilton said. Also, most young applicants admit to having used marijuana.

Hamilton said the most damaging outcome of the polygraph test is the admission of an arrest record. Even if the arrest did not result in a conviction, he said, an employer frequently holds it against the applicant.

Some consider the tests an invasion of privacy.

Hamilton said examiners are aware of the need to keep the information gained from the tests confidential. "We are extremely limited on who we give our reports to," Hamilton said.

How reliable are the tests?

"In most cases," Hamilton said, "if conditions are under the proper controls and the examiner is qualified, the possibility of telling if the subject is telling the truth is 92 percent."

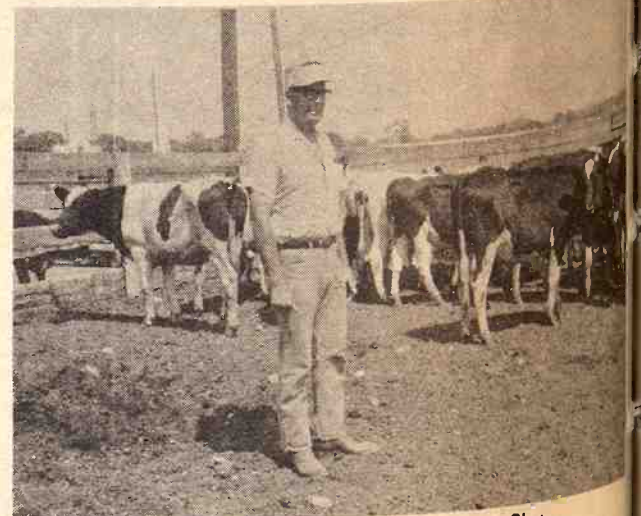

Butz Mission to Help Increase Farm Income

Secretary of Agriculture Earl Butz has said the prime mission given him by President Nixon was to raise the income of rural people. Another objective, Butz said, is to get competent young men and women to make a career of farming. In order to do this, we must make agriculture attractive and profitable to them," he said.

Butz spoke at a meeting in Enid, Okla., in a question-and-answer session before some 350 farmers and ranchers — plentifully sprinkled

with politicians.

Butz denied that America is subsidizing Russia by the sale of wheat to that country.

"The Russians are buying at the world price level," he said.

"We are extending \$500 million of Commodity Credit Corporation credit for this, and are receiving six and one-eighth per cent interest. We do pay an export subsidy, but this is not to Russia."

The secretary was optimistic that wheat prices will remain up after the Russian quota of grain is met.

"My best prediction," he said, "is that the export market will be sustained. We've got to export in order to live in agriculture, and this will tend toward rural productivity. I think farmers are happiest when

producing."

In order to encourage mutual trade, Butz said, the U.S. must find some way to buy Russian products, even as we trade with Japan.

Concerning the beef imports, Butz explained that pressure was tremendous on the administration to place ceilings on food prices.

"I'm dead set against that and would not go along. But the beef we need just isn't out there. We will probably import about 60 million

pounds, so as to keep people in the habit of eating meat."

He said the only way to increase domestic beef production is to make it pay.

He assured the group that imported beef meets sanitary standards that are imposed domestically.

"I've had foreign ambassadors complain about the rigid standards, as well as the quarantine law for cattle on the hoof," he said.

"Ecologists and environmentalists are doing much great work, but it is lamentable that they feel that coyotes are beautiful," Butz replied.

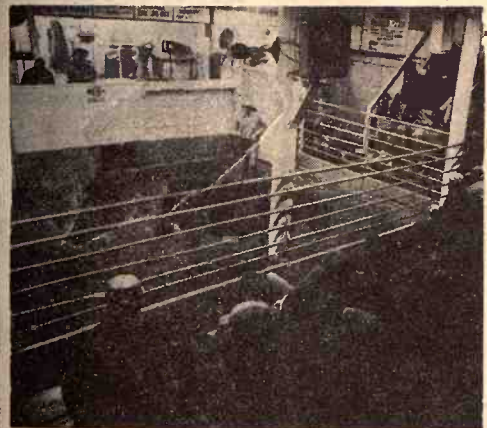

South Koreans Learn To Farm Kansas Style

Two South Korean farmers are receiving on-the-job agricultural training with Central Kansas families.

Sung Kwang Mo, 28, and Myoung Soo Yoon, 26, are among 80 South Koreans brought to the United States each year in the Korean Agricultural Training program for 2 years of practical and classroom training in modern farming.

The program is sponsored by the National 4H foundation, the George Buck agency, the South Korean embassy and the U.S. government.

Sung is working with the Dave Weibert family near Tampa, Myoung with the Paul Nelson family northwest of McPherson. Both will spend 20 months with their host families.

Myoung, who as yet speaks little English, owns a 12-acre farm in Korea which he cultivates with a small garden-type tractor.

"That's why he was so excited when he saw our big tractor," Mrs. Nelson said. Myoung is proficient at handling machinery, she said, but there is still something of a communication problem.

"When he first arrived it was difficult to communicate verbally. But now it's amazing how much of the language he's picked up," she said.

Myoung is the 4th foreign farmer the Nelsons have helped train. Earlier they were hosts to 2 Japanese farmers and a Brazilian student.

Myoung is paid \$225 a month for assisting with farm work.

Participants in the Korean Agricultural Training program are single men between 18 and 30 years old with at least a high school education and experience in 4H.
