of who was at fault. It would cover medical expenses and wage loss up to \$10,000.

"The primary way that the ills of automobile insurance can be cured is by removing the fault criterion for small and medium size claims," O'Connell said. "Whatever other steps are taken without taking that step cannot hope to achieve real success."

O'Connell cited studies for New York and Michigan which he said showed that from 25 to 50 per cent more victims would be paid than under the present liability system. The same studies showed a saving of at least 25 per cent could be realized in insurance costs, he said.

O'Connell said a poll of 2,000 Illinois families showed that 71 per cent favored the non-fault insurance system over the present method.

He said the p'an was drafted originally for enactment by the states but "if the lobbies opposing such non-fault automobile insurance succeed in blocking state action in the coming year, then congressional action might well be contemplated."

O'Connell said the plan would cut down on waste and delays in paying claims and would reduce costly litigation over who is at fault in an accident.


Great Bend Group To Hold Taxes

Predator Control Program Works

predator control program initiated by the Kansas State University extension service is proving successful on the Jasper DeVore hog farm here, where about 500 pigs have vanished since the first of the year.

Most of the losses were attributed to coyotes and bobcats, and DeVore contacted F. Robert Henderson, wildlife damage control specialist at KSU. Henderson and Pat Holmstrom, herder for DeVore, set traps.

"It's not so much how you set the traps as where you set them," Henderson pointed out. The best places, he said, are open places, away from trees and brush, but near a trail where coyotes would normally travel.

He said he understands how farmers who suffer poultry and

ARKANSAS CITY - A new livestock losses get emotional about coyotes and other predapredators, but not the predators."

"Coyotes are opportunists," Henderson said. "They are not natural pig or chicken killers, and those that do kill domestic bits, and in this respect they are stock are the exception rather beneficial to the farmer." than he rule."

Henderson said he does not believe coyotes are calf-killers, either.

"I think that only under peculiar circumstances, when perhaps pinched by hunger, or finding one alone, will a coyote attack ers to use a predator call to ata calf," he said.

He said that when a coyote is killing domestic stock it is that particular animal and not the one digging mice out of the back woodlot that must be ki'led to

save the remaining stock.

"We need to correct the astors, but he said "We want to sumption that every coyote, fox, control the damage caused by hawk or bobcat is just waiting for a chance to wreak havoc in flocks and herds," he said. "We must remember that coyotes feed primarily on mice and rab-

He feels double steel traps are the best way to catch coyotes, as they do not injure the animals. Thus, he said, if a dog or other domestic animal is caught, it can be released unharmed.

Henderson also teaches farm. tract coyotes within rifle shot. The call imitates the death cry a rabbit.

"I've seen coyotes come from as far away as a mile when hearing the call," he said

Since the beginning of the K-State control program here, De-Vore said, he has noticed a marked decrease in his pig loss.

The plant is closing, Marquis said, because remodeling to meet new state requirements for meat packing plants would be too expensive.

The plant was founded about 30 years ago by Grover Menzie and W. P. McFadden. Marquis purchased it in 1960. Approximately 32 employes will be af-





Plan To Double Income Tax To Help Schools

TOPEKA — A new state school finance plan funded thru a state income tax was endorsed by the Kansas Board of Education.

The state income tax should be doubled and the 100 percent surcharge returned to local schools, the State Department of Education staff told the board.

Members agreed to back the philosophy of state income taxes to support schools, but did not endorse a specific proposal at this time. The department staff was directed to meet with oher educaion groups to continue refining the new state finance plan.

The proposal is similar to one developed last weekend by a Kansas Association of School Boards (KASB) committee in Topeka.

The 100 percent surtax or doubling of income tax would produce more than \$59 million in additional revenue, it was estimated.

Whatever surtax plan is developed, state board members said, should insure the quality of educational opportunity in all school districts. The surtax proposed by the department staff would set a minimum local levy of 25 mills.

Individual income tax proceeds would be returned directly to school districts. Income tax from corporations, financial institutions and nonresidents would go into the state's general fund for redistribution to school districts.

Board and staff members noted that a proposal for \$47 million in additional state aid has been made by the educational subcommittee of the Kansas Legis'ative Council. Schools received \$26 million in supplemental aid last year over the veto of Gov. Robert Docking.

Combined with other miscellaneous sources of state aid, the income tax proposal would raise the level of state support to

school districts to 52.4 percent. Under the present finance plan, about 37 percent of school district operating cost is financed from state sources. The Legislative Council's proposal would raise the level of support to about 40 percent.

If additional aid is not provided this year, said Lawrence Simpson of the state department staff, "many schools are going to be in bad trouble.'

were adopted, said board chair. man Harry Lytle, Wichita, propbe reduced by \$90 million. This is assuming that supplemental aid would be in addition to what districts would receive through the state income tax.

Dr. Dan Moran, assistant executive director of the school board association, said the KASB plan is "very similar to this." The Kansas Farm Bureau and Kansas State Teachers Association also support a similar philosophy, he said. "I think we're all getting close."

The school board proposal will not be formally unveiled until the association's delegate assembly convenes Jan. 18 and 19 in Topeka.

State Board of Education declined to endorse a specific plan such as the surtax until the joint sessions are completed.

"I doubt very much if this plan or any similar plan is going to be bought in one session of the Legis'ature," Shenk said. He said he might be considered "very naive, but I do believe you have to start somewhere."



Highest Egg Prices Since 1953-**Eggmen Figure They Were Due**

For several years, the egg farmer has been about low man on the economic totem pole.

During the last decade, the forecasts of M. E. Jackson, the K-State poultry specialist whose opinions were read in the G&G area, could have been set to music — a funeral dirge.

But the tune has changed in the past year, reaching its happiest melody to an eggman's ears in the past 30 days. Prices vary a good deal both at the wholesale and retail levels, but they are higher than anytime since 1953.

In general, here's the range: to the farmer selling ungraded eggs, about 39c a dozen was most common at country stations last week; to the farmer selling a guaranteed amount of production with a high percentage of Grade A large eggs directly to one of several supermarkets in the G&G area, a sure 50 cents, probably 55c; to the farmer se'ling in large quantities direct to large produce markets in Kansas City and other large cities, a sure 60c, probably a few cents more for large, fancy grade A.

At the retail level, a dozen eggs in the G&G area could generally be bought for about 70-72c

80c for large ones. Last week in the last few years, figure they New York City a dozen large competitive situations had eggs of the past. at 89 cents.

Experts say prices generally are reflecting a backlash to low egg prices of 1967. "We had an oversupply that year and eggs dropped to a really low price," said a University of Georgia expert. As a result, many poultry operators were forced out of business and the number of laying hens declined.

Prices improved in 1968, but there have been no major moves the other way. Prices hit some peaks about four months ago, receded a bit, and then came back in late November and early December to hit their highest levels since 1953.

Per capita egg consumption in the U.S. is down to 313, close to a dozen less than a year ago, and more than eight dozen less than the per person use in the 1930's.

But egg production is down too. USDA says 57.3 billion eggs were produced from January thru October this year, compared to about 58.1 billion in the first 10 months of last year. G&G area eggmen, who have


Japan Taking More U.S. Wheat

The Agriculture Department says Japanese grain imports are expected to reach record levels during the Japanese fiscal year of April, 1969 to March, 1970, and the U.S. share of the inincrease is expected to be significant.

Larger wheat imports are necessary because Japanese wheat production suffered a 25 percent decline as a result of reduced planting and unfavorable weath er.

Imports of U.S. wheat are forecast at 2,250,000 tons, 23 percent above the 1968-69 levels and representing 50 percent of total expected imports.

The department also said increased imports of feed grains will be necessary in order to support Japan's mixed feed industry. The outlook for U.S. corn exports to Japan is particularly bright. The United States is expected to supply about 62 percent of the total forecast of 6.1 million tons.

Heavy Beef Runs Didn't Develop

The supply of beef has been plentiful this fall, but not excessive as as many cattlemen had feared. Official reports showing large numbers of cattle on feed have not been matched by increases in cattle marketings and beef production.

At the beginning of October, the USDA made a survey and report of the number of cattle on feed and of expected marketings. The report covered 22 major cattle-feeding states. It showed that farmers were fattening 10,082,000 cattle - 10 percent more than one year before. The report also said: "Marketings (from cattle on feed October 1) during October-December are expected to be 12 percent above the same period last year."

Little increase in market supplies. The actual marketings of cattle, however, have been little or no larger than a year ago. Commercial slaughter during October was only 0.7 percent greater than in 1968. Preliminary figures for November indicate that the weekly rate of slaughter in November was lower than last year.

Average slaughter weights and dressing percentages were a little higher this fall than in 1968. The average live weight of cattle slaughtered in October was 1014 pounds - up 10 pounds (1 percent) from last year. Commercial beef production totaled 1995 million pounds - 4 percent more than one year before.

Preliminary figures for November indicate that the weekly rate of cattle slaughter was 1 or 2 percent less than a year before. Apparently average slaugh ter weights were up about 1 percent. The dressing percentages were also probably up slightly. Thus, beef output for November is likely to have been about the same as in 1968 - perhaps 1 percent greater.

Prices nearing year-ago level. The demand for beef seems to have been stronger this fall than it was a year before. Prices of

beginning a spectacular sixmonth climb, during which the prices of Choice steers rose from around \$28 to over \$34. Prospects are not good for a repeat performance. There are even some reasons for expecting prices to weaken.

Cattle marketings might increase -- somewhat in line with the reported increase in the number of cattle on feed. There are several signs of a business recession, which could make many consumers less willing to spend their money for the luxury meat. Finally, marketing costs for beef are considerably

higher than they were a year ago.


Range Feed Above Average

The Dec. 1 range feed condition was "moderately above average" in the western two thirds of the state, the Kansas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service says.

The reporting service said supplies of cured range feed remained good over most of the area, while volunteer and seeded wheat, grain sorghum stubble and corn stalks still were being extensively used for grazing. Clear, warm weather late in November allowed maximum use of range feed and crop after. math.

Range condition was listed as 80 percent of normal on Dec. 1, down a point from October but five points above last year and four above the 10-year average for the date. However, in some extreme normwestern and south central counties, only "fair" grazing was reported.

Livestock roughage stayed generally plentiful, but wet weather earlier had caused some spoilage of bundle feed.

the company admits it refused to accept beets that had an average sugar content of less than 12 percent because "those beets are not merchantable, not suitable for the manufacture of sugar and otherwise do not conform to the conditions of the contracts."

The company said it has the option, according to the contracts, of refusing to accept beets that in the opinion of the defendants are not suitable for the manufacture of sugar, and are diseased, frozen or damaged. The sugar beet crop had an un-

usually low sugar content this year because of excessively wet weather in the growing season. Whether the suit can be handled as a class action by the growers is to be determined by the federal court.



Russians May Be Back In Wheat Buying Market


The Soviet Union, which managed to become a supplier of wheat to the world market after suffering through several lean agreement signed between the years, may become a buyer once again.

But this time, trade sources speculate, Russia may be negotiating to buy wheat for resale to the export customers it has carefully built up in recent years. Spurned customers, it has painfully learned, are quick to

take their business elsewhere.

One such wayward customer was the United Kingdom, which placed orders for one million bushels of top-grade hard and soft wheat with the U.S. after Russia said it couldn't meet Britain's needs.

Canada is one likely supplier of wheat to Russia. Under an two countries in 1966, the Russians were supposed to buy up to 336 million bushels of the commodity. When the pact expired last July, Russian buying fell 142 million bushels short. But Canada has indicated it would ignore the expiration date and sell Russia the wheat if suit-



able terms could be arranged. The Canadian government's



WICHITA - Each of the 18 million taxpayers in the United States who filed the new discontinued card 1040A form last year will receive a post card this week explaining the change to new consolidated 1040 form, Harry F. Scribner, District Director of Internal Revenue for Kansas announced today.

This year all taxpayers will. receive a larger complete tax package that includes the one page basic 1040 and additional pages of schedules which may or

may not be used according to the taxpayers needs.

Past 1040A users will find that except for a few lines the new 1040 asks for the same information as the old card form and that they will probably not need to fill out more than one sheet of paper to make out their returns, Scribner said.

In the past taxpayers who used the 1040A could not take advantage of certain tax credits and exclusions and could not itemize their deductions. A principal reason for making the change to the new 1040 is to enable taxpayers to take full advantage of the tax benefits the law provides, Scribner advised.

Potwin Feedlot About Ready

POTWIN - Construction is nearing completion east of Potwin on the new Flint Hills Beef Inc. feedlot.

Final touches are being put to the unloading and working pen area and the feedmill is undergoing a final checkout.

The feedlot was begun as a community endeavor by 28 local cattle feeders in Butler, Harvey and Sedgwick counties and the lot's completion will mark more than a year and a half of research and planning.

Estimated starting date is Jan. 1. Construction time is 125 calendar days, according to Louis H. Guthals, contracting officer for Turkey Creek Watershed.

The 2 dam sites in Dickinson County include No. 3, less than a mile northeast of the Dillon community, and No. 13, on the Morris Larson farm a mile south and 11/2 miles east of Elmo.

The 2 structures will require 136,000 yards of earth fill and are to have a total storage capacity of 829 acre-feet of water. Permanent surface water is esti-

The Turkey Creek watershed district includes 163 square mile; in Dickinson and Marion counties.







Joint Effort To Help With **Tree Problems**

Towns in Kansas are experiencing tree problems and Kansas State University may be able to lend a helping hand.

While larger towns are often staffed by capable professionals in city forestry, smaller communities are sometimes faced with tree management problems without the aid of professional arborists.

"Dutch elm disease is moving through the state and as a result lots of towns are losing trees and have sought assistance from K-State," explains James J. Nighswonger, Extension horticulturist.

"As there are a number of possibilities available in tree management, the towns are often confused and don't know what to do about their tree problems."

So Nighswonger arranged a meeting with state and area Extension foresters and county Extension personnel to discuss the towns' plight.

"Foresters and horticulturists have been doing some work with towns in this field for some time," says Nighswonger, but little organized effort has been made to help solve the prob-

lems. That is, until now. A steering committee was named at the Extension meeting. Its job will be to formulate a set

"Hopefully, these recommendations will help the towns cope with their tree problems," says Nighswonger, who is committee chairman.

Subjects discussed at the Extension meeting included park and tree design, tree management, tree pest control and Extension's role in the development of community tree programs.


Nebraska Wants More Time On **Pollution Control**

The state of Nebraska has asked the federal government to approve a postponement for at least a year of the deadline for establishing a compliance timetable for treating waste going into the Missouri River.

Under an agreement approved by state and federal governments a year ago, the Nebraska Water Pollution Control Council agreed to submit a timetable by Dec. 31, 1969.

Gov. Norbert Tiemann, now is asking Interior Secretary Walter Hickel to approve a decision of the Pol'ution Council to postpone establishment of the timetable until at least Dec. 31, 1970.

Tiemann said the agreement a year ago was made on the assumption that the same kind of timetables would be promulgated for neighboring states before the end of 1969. But Iowa is in conflict with federal authorities on the need to treat wastes going into interstate waters, and Kansas and Missouri want more time to consider the matter.





Large Walnut Stand Found In Western Kansas

The discovery of a natural walnut tree stand in northern Clark eter at a point four feet above

walnut stand is important for several reasons.

First, walnut stands in western Kansas are rare. Second, large portions of the stand are almost pure walnut. Third, the stand contains the largest walnut tree in Kansas — 56½ inches in diam-

some walnut trees but was unaware of the size of the stand or of its value," Reports Atchison.

The forester says someone inquired of Pyle about the walnut stand. This aroused his curiosity. and Pyle discussed his trees with Carl Barnes, Clark County Extension Agent.

Barnes contacted Atchison, who made a preliminary survey of the 1200° to 1500 trees in the stand. He then called in other K-State Extension foresters to collaborate in writing up data on the discovery.

"Mr. Pyle is a conservationist and doesn't want the walnut stand destroyed," relates Atchison. "He'll sell some trees for the purpose of maintaining and improving the stand. A planting program has already begun and some walnut seedlings will be planted next spring."

Walnut, says Atchison, is the most valuable hardwood tree in Kansas. Although the national supply of walnut is diminishing, Kansas still has good growing stock. Most of the walnuts are located in eastern portions of the state

The K-State forester observes that western Kansas has several small and less significant walnut stands. He's encouraging landowners to plant walnut seedlings.

"The demand for high quality walnut is great and it should continue," he believes. "Of course, walnut tree planting is a long range program and the location has to be right, such as in bottom land near creeks, particularly in western areas of the state."

In recommending that walnuts be planted in western Kansas, Atchison says they'll "make good presents for grandchildren in the years ahead."

Atchison has created enough interest in walnuts in the western areas that several persons

attended a walnut management clinic conducted by the Extension forester this fall. The clinic was held at Coldwater and was attended by landowners from Comanche and surrounding counties.

Atchison, a master's degree candidate at Fort Hays State, is planning to write his thesis on the big Clark County walnut tree find.



and declining American output are the chief reasons for the sharp rise.

And despite protests from U.S.

sheepmen, officials do not think Zealand and Australia, coupled lamb imports will be restricted soon. Unlike fresh or frozen beef which is subject to import quotas, lamb shipments are not held down by law.

But department officials admit some difficulties exist and hope to set up a meeting early next year with Australia and New Zealand to work out better marketing methods.

U.S. lamb production has dropped steadily in the last decade and this year will be about 50 million pounds less than in 1968, Donald Rubel, assistant administrator of the Foreign Agriculture Service, said. Meanwhile, lamb imports are expected to increase about 20 million pounds, not enough to offset the drop in U.S. output or the shrink in per capita consumption.

Consequently, department officials said, lamb prices paid to farmers have spurted upward this year. In November the average farm price was \$27.30 per hundredweight, compared with \$24.70 a year earlier and the average of \$19.90 a decade ago.

One department official noted that since 1955-57, retail lamb prices have gained 47 percent, compared with 27 percent for beef and 22 percent for pork.

But Americans prefer beef by a wide margin. This year the per capita consumption of lamb and mutton is expected to be 3.4 pounds, down from 4.4 pounds eaten in 1957-59. Consumption of beef this year is estimated at about 110 pounds, compared with 82 just 10 years ago.

This year's lamb imports thru October totaled 36.7 million pounds, compared with 14.5 million during the first 10 months of 1968, Rubel said. In terms of U.S. lamb production, imports have averaged a little more than 2 percent of total output during the five years ended in 1967.

with the higher U.S. prices, boosted imports in 1969 to more than 4 percent of domestic production, and to nearly 8 percent estimated this year.

Last year about 23 million pounds of lamb were imported by the United States, with New Zealand supplying 13 million and Australia 9.8 million of the total.

U.S. producers want the government to restrict lamb imports - about 18 million pounds a year has been mentioned - or at least negotiate agreements to spread out import shipments throughout the year so they will not compete so much with U.S. marketings.

Department officials see little chance of Congress passing a quota of lamb soon. "At least not as long as our meat prices are as high as they are," one official said.


