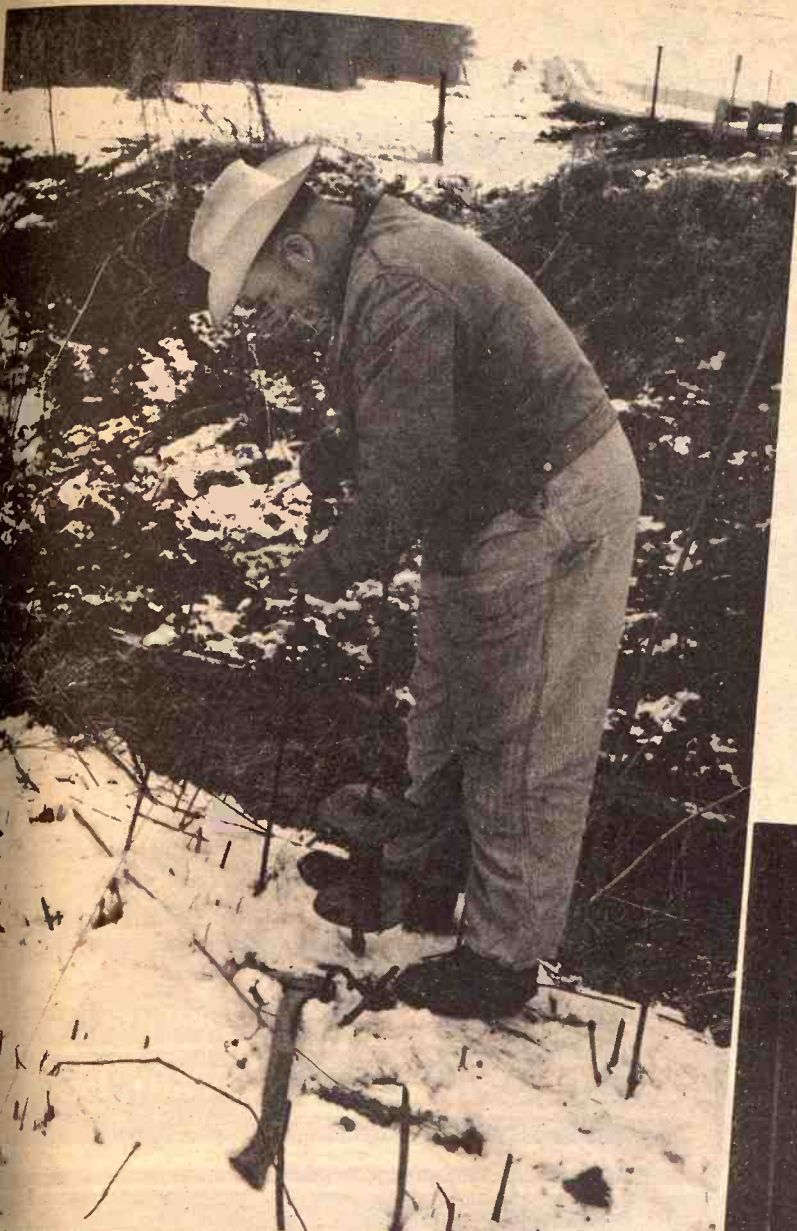

# Set Program For State Agriculture Convention

Governor Robert B. Docking and U. S. Under Secretary of Agriculture J. Phil Campbell will be opening night speakers at the 1970 Kansas Agricultural Convention, according to Roy Freeland, Kansas Secretary of Agriculture.

The three-day meeting, in Topeka's Municipal Auditorium, will be January 14 to 16, 1970. Registration at the annual farm meeting will begin Wednesday afternoon, January 14. Paul Buchele, Cedar Vale, president of the Kansas State Board of Agriculture, will preside at all convention sessions.

The annual convention dinner program, Wednesday evening, includes addresses by Governor Docking and Campbell, and entertainment by Wes Harrison, "Mr. Sound Effects." Outstanding farm youth will be recognized.

The Thursday, January 15th morning program includes talks by F. Robert Henderson, Extension Specialist, Wildlife Damage Control, Kansas State University; Raymond F. Roemer, president, Kansas Livestock Association; and Dr. Wesley Buchele, professor of Agricultural Engineering, Iowa State University.

The Thursday afternoon program will feature addresses by Dr. Floyd W. Smith, acting vice president for Agriculture, KSU; Morgan Williams, Kansas Director, Farmers Home Administra-

tion; and Jack Lacy, Director, Kansas Department of Economic Development.

Friday morning speakers include Frank F. White, Cedar Vale; Kenneth T. Boughton, director, Marketing Division, Kansas Department of Agriculture, and Mary Jo Huseman, Home Economist of the Marketing Division. Three speakers will discuss the Kansas Meat and Poultry Inspection program. They are Blaine Bowlin, Whitewater, Chairman Legislative Committee, Kansas Frozen Food Locker and Provisioners Association; Dr. M. A. Nelson, Regional Director, Consumer Protection Programs, Consumer and Marketing Service, U. S. Department of Agriculture; and Jim Petr, Director, Meat and Poultry Inspection Division, Kansas Department of Agriculture.

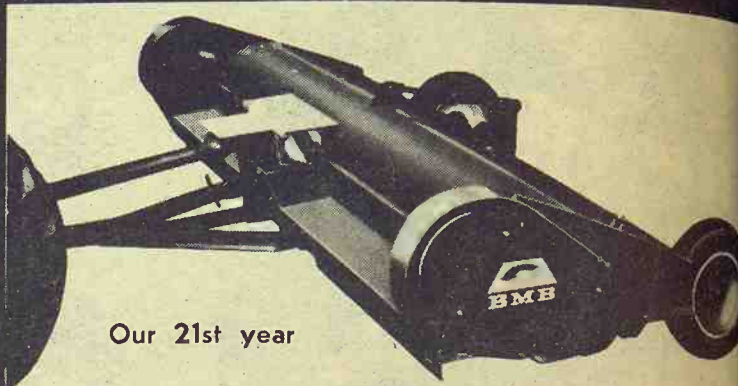

## Claim Saving Without Finding Insurance Fault

A "no-fault" system of paying traffic accident claims would cut automobile insurance costs by 25 per cent while reimbursing more victims, a Senate subcommittee was told.

Jeffrey O'Connell, law professor at the University of Illinois, told the antitrust and monopoly subcommittee his plan would make payment of automobile insurance "expeditious, widespread and fair."

Under the plan, a traffic victim would be reimbursed by his own insurance company for his out-of-pocket losses, regardless of who was at fault. It would cover medical expenses and wage loss up to \$10,000.

"The primary way that the ills of automobile insurance can be cured is by removing the fault criterion for small and medium size claims," O'Connell said. "Whatever other steps are taken without taking that step cannot hope to achieve real success."

O'Connell cited studies for New York and Michigan which he said showed that from 25 to 50 per cent more victims would be paid than under the present liability system. The same studies showed a saving of at least 25 per cent could be realized in insurance costs, he said.

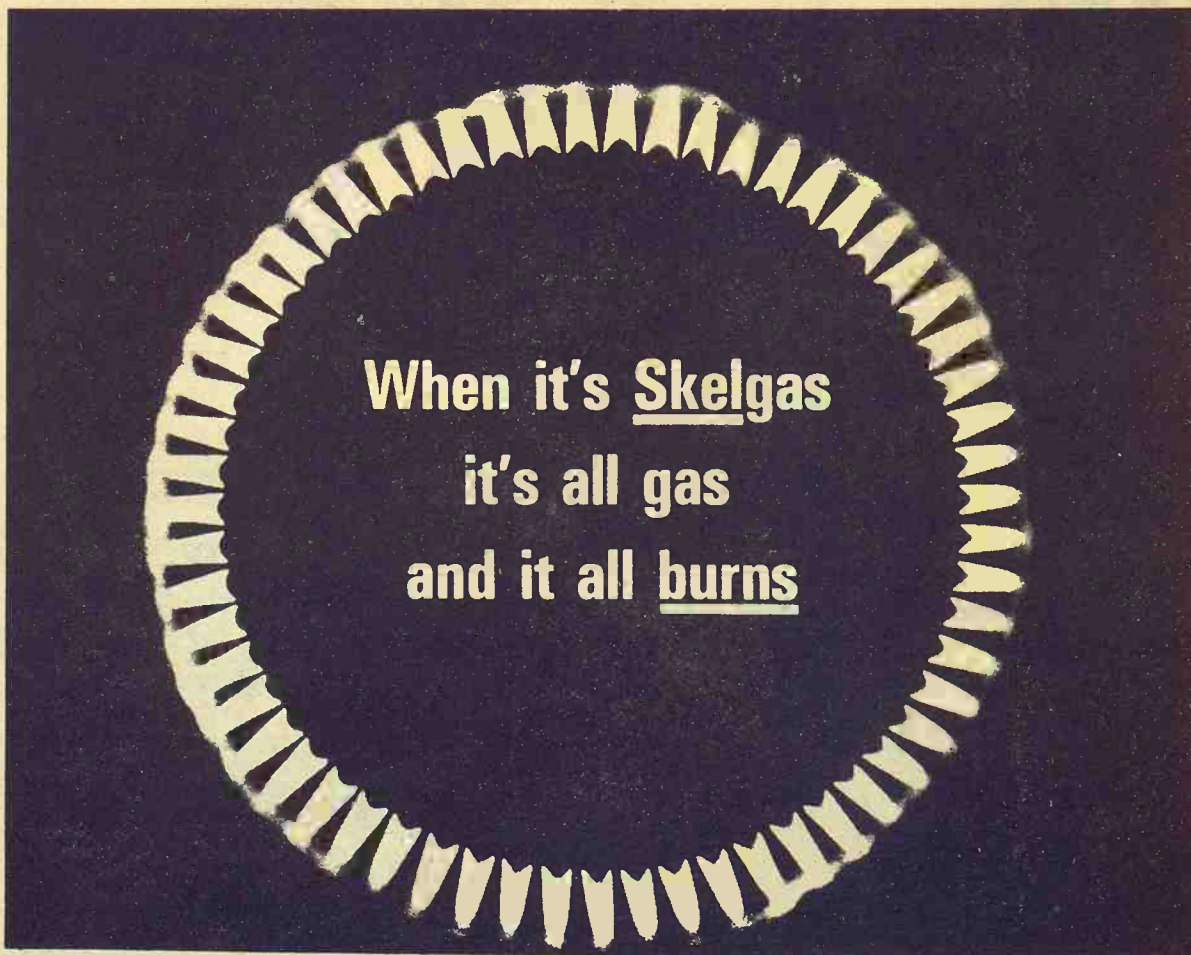
O'Connell said a poll of 2,000 Illinois families showed that 71 per cent favored the non-fault insurance system over the present method.

He said the plan was drafted originally for enactment by the states but "if the lobbies opposing such non-fault automobile insurance succeed in blocking state action in the coming year, then congressional action might well be contemplated."

O'Connell said the plan would cut down on waste and delays in paying claims and would reduce costly litigation over who is at fault in an accident.

## OUR DAILY BREAD

— by G&G Area Cooks

### Weekly Prize Won By Mrs. Robert Steele, Pomona

Mrs. Robert Steele, Sr., R 1, Pomona, suggests serving this dessert with whipped cream and a cherry or strawberry on top for the holidays.

#### OREGON APPLE DAPPLE

1/4 cup butter or margarine  
1 cup sugar  
1 egg  
1 cup sifted flour  
1 teaspoon baking soda  
1/2 cup chopped walnuts  
1/4 teaspoon salt  
1 teaspoon cinnamon  
1/4 teaspoon nutmeg  
1 teaspoon vanilla  
2 cups grated tart apples

Cream together the butter and sugar. Beat in egg. Sift together flour, soda, salt and spices. Stir into creamed mixture. Stir in vanilla, apples and nuts. Bake in a greased (8x8x2-inch) pan in moderate oven (350 degrees) about 45 minutes. Serve warm with sauce or ice cream. Makes six to eight servings. Or freeze when torte is cool; wrap, label, date and freeze. Storage time, two to three months. To serve, place unwrapped in slow oven (300 degrees) about 30 minutes. Excellent served with sauce: Heat 1/2 cup butter or margarine, 1/2 cup light cream and 1 cup sugar to boiling point and simmer, stirring occasionally, 20 minutes.

#### BIEROX

(A German Hamburger)  
1 1/2 pounds lean ground beef  
1 medium size onion, finely chopped  
2 cups shredded cabbage (fine)  
1/4 teaspoon pepper per 1 pound

**hamburger**  
1 package hot roll mix (or own dinner roll recipe)  
Fry hamburger and season with salt and pepper. Drain excess grease off. Add finely shredded cabbage and chopped onion. Cover and simmer a few minutes. Have prepared one package hot roll mix ("I prepare my own favorite dinner roll recipe"). When ready, roll out to 1/4-inch thickness and cut into squares approximately 5x5-inch. Spoon hamburger mixture into each square; bring opposite corners toward center and seal by pinching together. Fold over to form a ball and place on a greased cookie sheet, sealed edges of ball down. Let raise for one hour or till double in size. Bake at 375 degrees until brown (15-20 minutes). Serve immediately. Makes 10-12 hamburgers. May be decorated for the holidays with slices of stuffed green olives on top before baking.

#### CHRISTMAS TREE SALAD

Put to set 1 package cherry gelatin, using 1 1/4 cups hot water. Put into shallow pan, about 1/2-inch deep. Put to set, 1 package line gelatin same way. When set, cut into squares. Dissolve 1 package unflavored gelatin as directed on package. Add 1 cup cooked rice, 1 cup well drained pineapple chunks and 1 cup English walnut bits. When this has begun to set, whip 1 cup heavy whipping cream and fold in along with your gelatin squares. Turn into Christmas tree mold and let set. Using a large plate or tray, turn salad out on it, put greenery around salad. Sprinkle salad with coconut and sprinkle a few redhots on the greenery.

#### CRYSTAL-CUT CANDY

2 cups sugar  
1/2 cup water  
1/2 cup white syrup  
Dash salt

Combine these ingredients. Cook to hard crack stage (290 degrees). Add a few drops of either red or green food coloring and 4 to 6 drops of one of these flavorings: Oil of cinnamon, oil of wintergreen or oil of anise. Swirl mixture to blend. Pour into 8x8x2-inch pan. Let stand a few minutes till film forms over

top. With broad spatula, mark across pan ever 1/4-inch to form puffs, being very careful not to break the film. Retrace lines as candy cools till spatula can be pressed to bottom of pan without breaking film. Cool completely. Turn out of pan and break into pieces.

#### ORANGE BARS

Juice and rind of 1 medium size orange  
1 cup raisins or dates  
1/2 cup shortening  
1 cup sugar  
2 eggs  
2 cups sifted all-purpose flour  
1 teaspoon soda  
1 teaspoon salt  
1 cup sour milk  
1/2 cup nuts, chopped

Grind raisins and oranges in food grinder. Set aside; cream shortening and sugar. Add the eggs, one at a time, beating well after each addition. Add the raisins and orange mixture. Sift the dry ingredients together and add alternately with the milk. Mix in the nuts. Pour into greased 10x15 inch pan and bake for 25 minutes in 350-degree oven. Frost with the following:

1 1/2 cups powdered sugar  
1 tablespoon butter  
2 to 3 tablespoons orange juice  
Mix all ingredients to a nice spreading consistency.

#### OLD FASHIONED NUT TORTE

1/2 cup flour  
1/2 teaspoon baking powder  
1 1/2 cups walnuts, chopped fine  
1/4 teaspoon salt  
3 eggs, separated  
1/4 cup sugar  
1/2 teaspoon vanilla

Sift flour, measure. Mix with baking powder and chopped nuts. Set aside. Then add salt to egg whites and beat until stiff

but not dry; gradually beat in half the sugar. Now beat egg yolks with remaining sugar until thick and yellow; add vanilla and fold in the nut and flour mixture. Last, fold in the beaten egg whites. Pour into a greased square pan and bake at 325 degrees for 50 minutes. Cool for 30 minutes; remove from pan. Before serving cut into squares, split and fill with whipped creaming between and on top to which 1/2 cup chopped dates have been added.

# Predator Control Program Works

ARKANSAS CITY — A new predator control program initiated by the Kansas State University extension service is proving successful on the Jasper DeVore hog farm here, where about 500 pigs have vanished since the first of the year.

Most of the losses were attributed to coyotes and bobcats, and DeVore contacted F. Robert Henderson, wildlife damage control specialist at KSU. Henderson and Pat Holmstrom, herder for DeVore, set traps.

"It's not so much how you set the traps as where you set them," Henderson pointed out. The best places, he said, are open places, away from trees and brush, but near a trail where coyotes would normally travel.

He said he understands how farmers who suffer poultry and

livestock losses get emotional about coyotes and other predators, but he said "We want to control the damage caused by predators, but not the predators."

"Coyotes are opportunists," Henderson said. "They are not natural pig or chicken killers, and those that do kill domestic stock are the exception rather than the rule."

Henderson said he does not believe coyotes are calf-killers, either.

"I think that only under peculiar circumstances, when perhaps pinched by hunger, or finding one alone, will a coyote attack a calf," he said.

He said that when a coyote is killing domestic stock it is that particular animal and not the one digging mice out of the back woodlot that must be killed to

save the remaining stock.

"We need to correct the assumption that every coyote, fox, hawk or bobcat is just waiting for a chance to wreak havoc in flocks and herds," he said. "We must remember that coyotes feed primarily on mice and rabbits, and in this respect they are beneficial to the farmer."

He feels double steel traps are the best way to catch coyotes, as they do not injure the animals. Thus, he said, if a dog or other domestic animal is caught, it can be released unharmed.

Henderson also teaches farmers to use a predator call to attract coyotes within rifle shot. The call imitates the death cry of a rabbit.

"I've seen coyotes come from as far away as a mile when hearing the call," he said.

Since the beginning of the K-State control program here, DeVore said, he has noticed a marked decrease in his pig loss.

## Iola Packer To Quit

IOLA — Meat packing operations will be discontinued Feb. 1 by the M&M Packing Co. here, Ed Marquis, president, has informed employees.

The plant is closing, Marquis said, because remodeling to meet new state requirements for meat packing plants would be too expensive.

The plant was founded about 30 years ago by Grover Menzie and W. P. McFadden. Marquis purchased it in 1960. Approximately 32 employees will be af-

ected by the shutdown. Marquis said he plans to continue buying hogs for resale to Wilson & Co. in Oklahoma as a commission buyer.

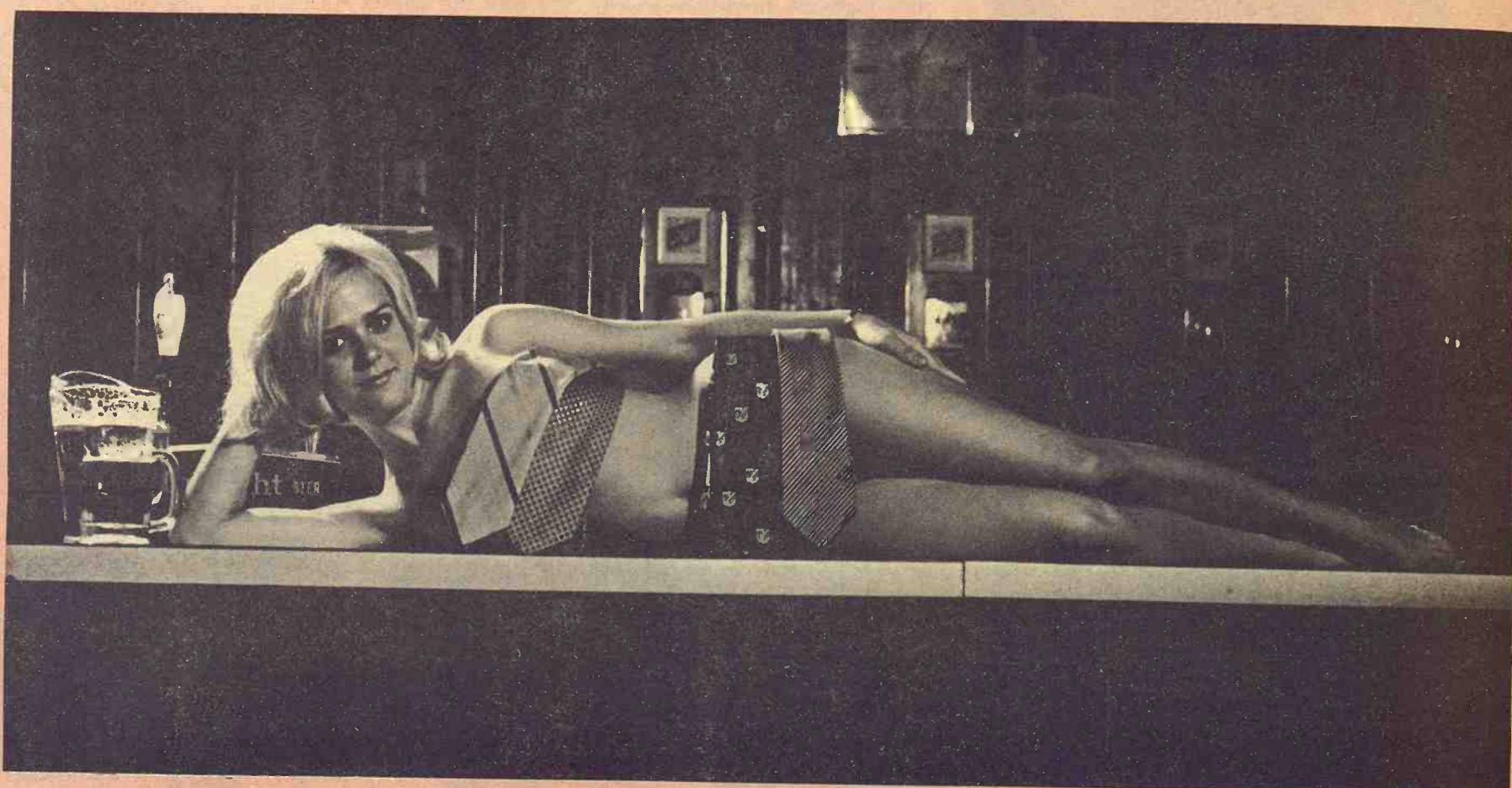

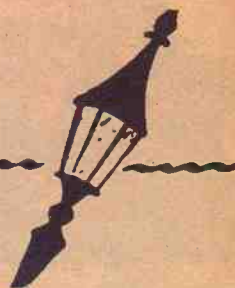

# Pinch On Funds For Farm Lending

Kansas farmers, like all businessmen, are caught in the tight money-high interest squeeze. Money availability has declined and interest rates have advanced sharply.

Now with cattle feeders replacing their herds, demand for credit is growing and there is less money available. The Farm Home Administration, a credit source for both real estate and operating farm loans, finds itself pinched for funds.

Morgan Williams, Kansas director of the FHA, says his agency will have about \$3 million less for real estate loans next year than it had this year. The agency now has loans approved but no available funds until the next allotment, due on Jan. 1, is received. Funds for operating loans are now available.

Banks are caught in the same pinch. Rural banks, which finance most farmer operations, are caught in the tight money squeeze and when they turn to their correspondent banks in urban centers they find the same situation exists there.

Rural banks historically are slower to raise interest rates than those in larger centers. They are reported in Kansas to be lending to their farmer customers at 7 1/2 percent while the going rate for such loans is now 8 and 9 percent.

The FHA has raised its minimums for purchase of government-insured loan notes to \$25,000 for one-year and two-year notes, and to \$15,000 for longer term notes. The previous minimum was \$10,000. The purpose is to discourage the flow of money from banks, where depositors have turned increasingly to FHA

securities which pay 8 1/2 to 8 3/4 percent interest.

The FHA is basically financed through insured loans, using the money to finance loans for family farm ownership, housing and rural community projects.

The Dept. of Agriculture last week reported new farm mortgage money loaned by insurance companies, the federal banks and the FHA during the first half of 1969 was \$949 million. This was 2 percent below the comparable period in 1968 and 23 percent below the peak volume of the first half of 1966.

Interest rates advanced sharply during the first half of 1969 on loans made by each of the major reporting farm mortgage lenders. The average interest rate on new farm mortgage loans by life insurance companies was 7.9 percent compared with 7.2 percent for the same period a year earlier.

# Plan To Double Income Tax To Help Schools

TOPEKA — A new state school finance plan funded through a state income tax was endorsed by the Kansas Board of Education.

The state income tax should be doubled and the 100 percent surcharge returned to local schools, the State Department of Education staff told the board.

Members agreed to back the philosophy of state income taxes to support schools, but did not endorse a specific proposal at this time. The department staff was directed to meet with other education groups to continue refining the new state finance plan.

The proposal is similar to one developed last weekend by a Kansas Association of School Boards (KASB) committee in Topeka.

The 100 percent surtax or doubling of income tax would produce more than \$59 million in additional revenue, it was estimated.

Whatever surtax plan is developed, state board members said, should insure the quality of educational opportunity in all school districts. The surtax proposed by the department staff would set a minimum local levy of 25 mills.

Individual income tax proceeds would be returned directly to school districts. Income tax from corporations, financial institutions and nonresidents would go into the state's general fund for redistribution to school districts.

Board and staff members noted that a proposal for \$47 million in additional state aid has been made by the educational subcommittee of the Kansas Legislative Council. Schools received \$26 million in supplemental aid last year over the veto of Gov. Robert Docking.

Combined with other miscellaneous sources of state aid, the income tax proposal would raise the level of state support to

school districts to 52.4 percent.

Under the present finance plan, about 37 percent of school district operating cost is financed from state sources. The Legislative Council's proposal would raise the level of support to about 40 percent.

If additional aid is not provided this year, said Lawrence Simpson of the state department staff, "many schools are going to be in bad trouble."

If the income tax surcharge were adopted, said board chairman Harry Lytle, Wichita, property taxes across the state could

be reduced by \$90 million. This is assuming that supplemental aid would be in addition to what districts would receive through the state income tax.

Dr. Dan Moran, assistant executive director of the school board association, said the KASB plan is "very similar to this." The Kansas Farm Bureau and Kansas State Teachers Association also support a similar philosophy, he said. "I think we're all getting close."

The school board proposal will not be formally unveiled until the association's delegate assembly convenes Jan. 18 and 19 in Topeka.

Clifford Shenk, assistant commissioner of education, said all major Kansas education groups will meet Jan. 7 at Newton to discuss school finance plans. The

State Board of Education declined to endorse a specific plan such as the surtax until the joint sessions are completed.

"I doubt very much if this plan or any similar plan is going to be bought in one session of the Legislature," Shenk said. He said he might be considered "very naive, but I do believe you have to start somewhere."

Lytle, however, said he felt "there is a good possibility that

something will be done to strengthen school finance in Kansas."

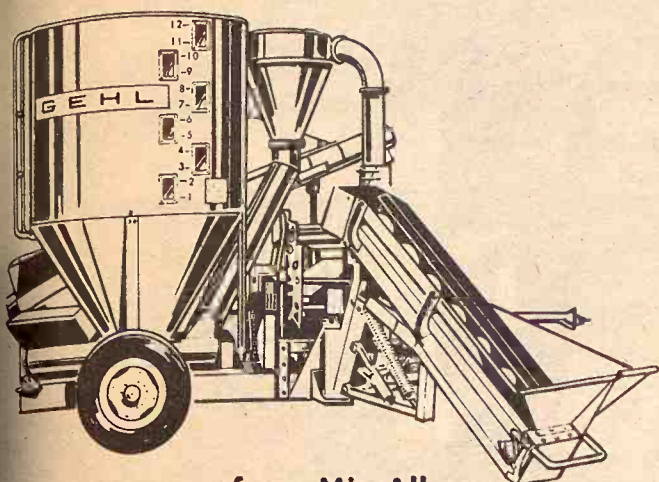

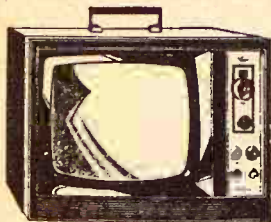

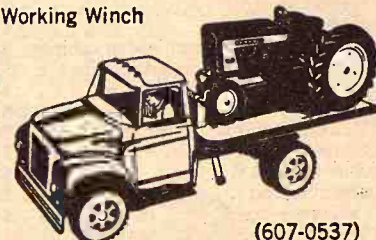

## Eggmen Figure They Were Due

For several years, the egg farmer has been about low man on the economic totem pole.

During the last decade, the forecasts of M. E. Jackson, the K-State poultry specialist whose opinions were read in the G&G area, could have been set to music — a funeral dirge.

But the tune has changed in the past year, reaching its happiest melody to an eggman's ears in the past 30 days. Prices vary a good deal both at the wholesale and retail levels, but they are higher than anytime since 1953.

In general, here's the range: to the farmer selling ungraded eggs, about 39c a dozen was most common at country stations last week; to the farmer selling a guaranteed amount of production with a high percentage of Grade A large eggs directly to one of several supermarkets in the G&G area, a sure 50 cents, probably 55c; to the farmer selling in large quantities direct to large produce markets in Kansas City and other large cities, a sure 60c, probably a few cents more for large, fancy grade A.

At the retail level, a dozen eggs in the G&G area could generally be bought for about 70-72c

for medium size and closer to 80c for large ones. Last week in New York City a dozen large eggs cost 95 cents. Even highly competitive situations had eggs at 89 cents.

Experts say prices generally are reflecting a backlash to low egg prices of 1967. "We had an oversupply that year and eggs dropped to a really low price," said a University of Georgia expert. As a result, many poultry operators were forced out of business and the number of laying hens declined.

Prices improved in 1968, but there have been no major moves the other way. Prices hit some peaks about four months ago, receded a bit, and then came back in late November and early December to hit their highest levels since 1953.

Per capita egg consumption in the U.S. is down to 313, close to a dozen less than a year ago, and more than eight dozen less than the per person use in the 1930's.

But egg production is down too. USDA says 57.3 billion eggs were produced from January thru October this year, compared to about 58.1 billion in the first 10 months of last year.

G&G area eggmen, who have

survived the price pressures of the last few years, figure they still have plenty of good months coming to make up their deficit of the past.

## Japan Taking More U.S. Wheat

The Agriculture Department says Japanese grain imports are expected to reach record levels during the Japanese fiscal year of April, 1969 to March, 1970, and the U.S. share of the increase is expected to be significant.

Larger wheat imports are necessary because Japanese wheat production suffered a 25 percent decline as a result of reduced planting and unfavorable weather.

Imports of U.S. wheat are forecast at 2,250,000 tons, 23 percent above the 1968-69 levels and representing 50 percent of total expected imports.

The department also said increased imports of feed grains will be necessary in order to support Japan's mixed feed industry. The outlook for U.S. corn exports to Japan is particularly bright. The United States is expected to supply about 62 percent of the total forecast of 6.1 million tons.

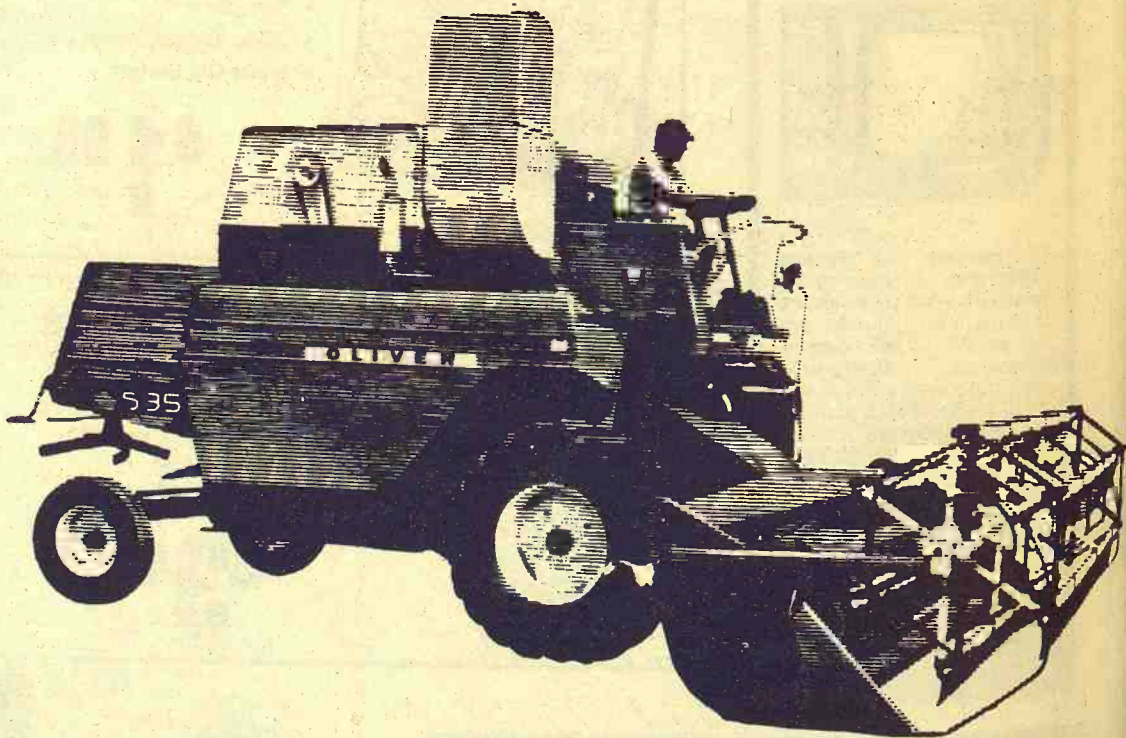

# ANCA Advice 'Restraint Of Trade?'

Two members of Congress have asked the Justice Department to investigate whether a 1967 recommendation by the American National Cattlemen's Association for growers to cut production 5 percent constitutes "an illegal conspiracy in restraint of trade."

The investigation was asked by John S. Monagan (D-Conn.), chairman of a House subcommittee that investigated the 12 percent jump in beef prices last summer, and Rep. John W. Wyder (R-N.Y.), a subcommittee member.

Bill House, ANCA president,

said in Tucson, Ariz., the association is simply trying to help member cattlemen keep supply from outrunning demand and said the charges "just won't hold water."

House and C. W. McMillan, ANCA's executive vice president,

acknowledged at the special studies subcommittee hearings in October that the effort to balance supply with demand may contribute to rising prices but insisted the biggest factor is the rapidly growing demand for beef.

## Heavy Beef Runs Didn't Develop

The supply of beef has been plentiful this fall, but not excessive as many cattlemen had feared. Official reports showing large numbers of cattle on feed have not been matched by increases in cattle marketings and beef production.

At the beginning of October, the USDA made a survey and report of the number of cattle on feed and of expected marketings. The report covered 22 major cattle-feeding states. It showed that farmers were fattening 10,082,000 cattle — 10 percent more than one year before. The report also said: "Marketings (from cattle on feed October 1) during October-December are expected to be 12 percent above the same period last year."

**Little increase in market supplies.** The actual marketings of cattle, however, have been little or no larger than a year ago. Commercial slaughter during October was only 0.7 percent greater than in 1968. Preliminary figures for November indicate that the weekly rate of slaughter in November was lower than last year.

Average slaughter weights and dressing percentages were a little higher this fall than in 1968. The average live weight of cattle slaughtered in October was 1014 pounds — up 10 pounds (1 percent) from last year. Commercial beef production totaled 1995 million pounds — 4 percent more than one year before.

Preliminary figures for November indicate that the weekly rate of cattle slaughter was 1 or 2 percent less than a year before. Apparently average slaughter weights were up about 1 percent. The dressing percentages were also probably up slightly. Thus, beef output for November is likely to have been about the same as in 1968 — perhaps 1 percent greater.

**Prices nearing year-ago level.** The demand for beef seems to have been stronger this fall than it was a year before. Prices of steers at seven markets averaged \$28.07 per 100 pounds in October — 3.5 percent higher than a year earlier. Corresponding prices for heifers averaged \$26.22 — up 3 percent. November prices for cattle apparently were 1 or 2 percent higher than during the same period last year.

## Range Feed Above Average

The Dec. 1 range feed condition was "moderately above average" in the western two thirds of the state, the Kansas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service says.

The reporting service said supplies of cured range feed remained good over most of the area, while volunteer and seeded wheat, grain sorghum stubble and corn stalks still were being extensively used for grazing. Clear, warm weather late in November allowed maximum use of range feed and crop aftermath.

Range condition was listed as 80 percent of normal on Dec. 1, down a point from October but five points above last year and four above the 10-year average for the date. However, in some extreme northwestern and south central counties, only "fair" grazing was reported.

Livestock roughage stayed generally plentiful, but wet weather earlier had caused some spoilage of bundle feed.

CHICAGO — After researching the contract for five years, the Mercantile Exchange board of governors voted to open a domestic frozen boneless beef contract Monday, Feb. 2, 1970.

Everette B. Harris, president, said: "Trading is being initiated at that time because we have had requests from all elements of the industry for a price-protective device which has been available for other meat products for several years."

Delivery units will tentatively consist of 40,000 pounds of beef with fat content not to exceed 10 percent. Initial margins will be \$600 and maintenance margins will be \$400. Round-turn commission will be \$40.

## Russians May Be Back In Wheat Buying Market

The Soviet Union, which managed to become a supplier of wheat to the world market after suffering through several lean years, may become a buyer once again.

But this time, trade sources speculate, Russia may be negotiating to buy wheat for resale to the export customers it has carefully built up in recent years. Spurned customers, it has painfully learned, are quick to

take their business elsewhere.

One such wayward customer was the United Kingdom, which placed orders for one million bushels of top-grade hard and soft wheat with the U.S. after Russia said it couldn't meet Britain's needs.

Canada is one likely supplier of wheat to Russia. Under an agreement signed between the two countries in 1966, the Russians were supposed to buy up to 336 million bushels of the commodity. When the pact expired last July, Russian buying fell 142 million bushels short. But Canada has indicated it would ignore the expiration date and sell Russia the wheat if suit-

able terms could be arranged.

The Canadian government's wheat marketing agency, the Canadian Wheat Board, imposed restrictions on wheat shipments that prompted some trade specialists to suggest with agreement with the Russians could be imminent.

The wheat board ordered a halt to all sales of No. 2, No. 3 and No. 4 wheat if delivery was required before April from East Coast ports.

During the winter, when navigation is blocked on the St. Lawrence Seaway, Halifax and St. John are the only Canadian East Coast ports capable of handling grain for foreign shipment. But together they can handle only about seven million bushels of grain a month.

Traders theorized that Canada may be clearing the ports for substantial sales to the Russians by barring trade in the cheaper grades.

## Airlines Fear Liability Risk

### New 747s

These super-big jets which airlines will have in the year won't be insured for as much as the airlines would

passengers and planes will be protected, but industry officials are shopping for insurance coverage that of the payment will have come out of corporate funds. The airlines think it will take average of \$150 million a year to cover that risk. So far, they say they will only go up to \$110 million.

Costs now carry between \$100 million and \$110 million in insurance. But that's for a maximum of 200 persons on the

flight. Some of the new Boeing 747's, which Pan Am and others will have in operation this year, will carry 360 passengers.

So far no single air disaster has ever had more than \$15 million in liability settlements. But the airlines fear that a single large collision between two such airliners killing all the occupants might result in some claims that could ruin an airline.

Liability on international flights is limited to \$75,000 a passenger by world agreements. But there are no limits on liability on a domestic flight. Recent settlements have been running \$100,000 to \$150,000 a passenger. And that figure has hit \$1 million for a single death, a businessman whose potential earning capacity earned his estate that figure after a Miami disaster.

This year all taxpayers will receive a larger complete tax package that includes the one page basic 1040 and additional pages of schedules which may or

may not be used according to the taxpayers needs.

Past 1040A users will find that except for a few lines the new 1040 asks for the same information as the old card form and that they will probably not need to fill out more than one sheet of paper to make out their returns, Scribner said.

In the past taxpayers who used the 1040A could not take advantage of certain tax credits and exclusions and could not itemize their deductions. A principal reason for making the change to the new 1040 is to enable taxpayers to take full advantage of the tax benefits the law provides, Scribner advised.

## Potwin Feedlot About Ready

POTWIN — Construction is nearing completion east of Potwin on the new Flint Hills Beef Inc. feedlot.

Final touches are being put to the unloading and working pen area and the feedmill is undergoing a final checkout.

The feedlot was begun as a community endeavor by 28 local cattle feeders in Butler, Harvey and Sedgwick counties and the lot's completion will mark more than a year and a half of research and planning.

Local feeders have been aided by a feasibility study and technical information provided by the extension service and by specialists from Kansas State University.

The facility will employ up to 12 people and will concentrate in this area some \$6 million annually in cattle, feed and services. It has been designed both to meet

the needs of local feeders and to make them competitive with commercial lots in Western Kansas.

A new grain "popper," only the second one to be used in the state of Kansas, will provide a unique grain processing method utilizing super heated dry air to actually pop grain like popcorn.

While testing of the new process is limited, early results indicate that the process is equal to the more conventional "flaking" of milo and corn where the grain is saturated with steam and rolled into a thin flake.

## Start Watershed Work Near Hope By January 1

HOPE — Bids for construction of the first 2 flood water retarding structures in a series of 15 planned for the Turkey Creek watershed were opened here last week.

Apparent low bidder was Umscheid Trenching of Manhattan with an offer of \$94,078.54. Seven firms submitted bids.

Work can begin after the bid is approved by the Turkey Creek Watershed and the Soil Conservation Service.

Estimated starting date is Jan. 1. Construction time is 125 calendar days, according to Louis H. Guthals, contracting officer for Turkey Creek Watershed.

The 2 dam sites in Dickinson County include No. 3, less than a mile northeast of the Dillon community, and No. 13, on the Morris Larson farm a mile south and 1½ miles east of Elmo.

The 2 structures will require 136,000 yards of earth fill and are to have a total storage capacity of 829 acre-feet of water. Permanent surface water is estimated at 41 acres.

The Turkey Creek watershed district includes 163 square miles in Dickinson and Marion counties.

The area covers 25 miles beginning about 5 miles south of the Marion County line to where Turkey Creek empties into the Smoky Hill River at Brown's Park just south of Abilene.

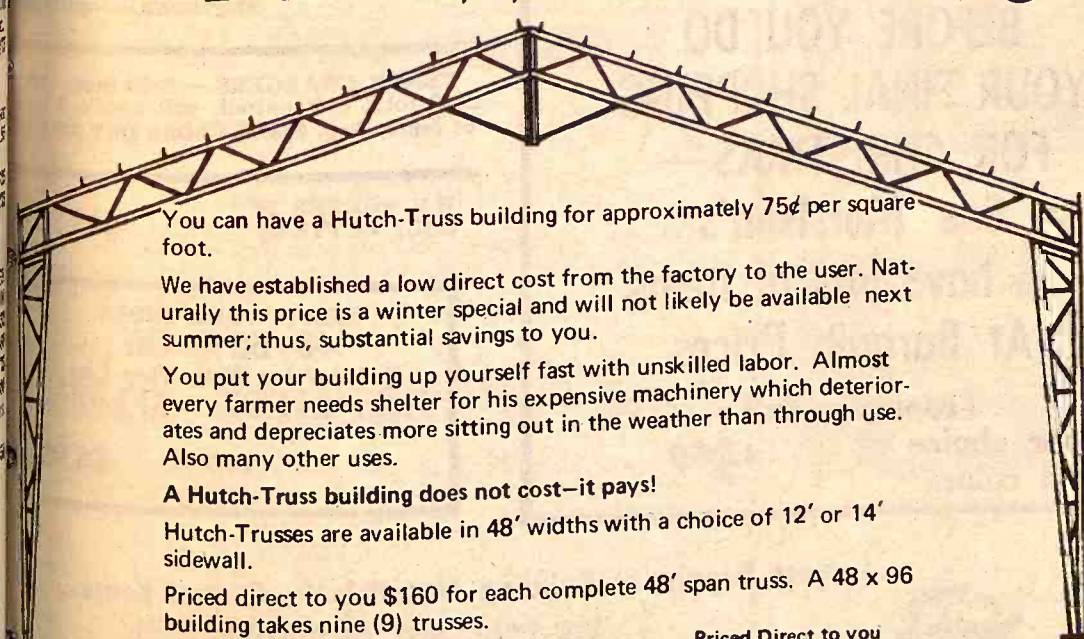

## New Grove Dam Location On Water Plan

The Kansas Water Resources Board voted unanimously to include the Grove Reservoir in the state water plan at a new site.

The new location is at the confluence of Big and Little Soldier creeks northwest of Topeka.

The reservoir had been planned for a site upstream on Big Soldier Creek, away from Topeka.

Topeka officials had testified in favor of the new location, saying it could provide a vital new source of water for the growing city.

But the new location was protested by several residents of the area on the grounds that the reservoir was not needed and that it would take valuable land off the tax rolls.

The 7-member board also approved inclusion of the proposed Woodbine Reservoir near Junction City in the state water plan.

However, the plan still is subject to action by the Kansas Legislature.

## Off Year For Pecan Growers

A light to moderate pecan crop in Kansas was indicated by growers at a Kansas Pecan Growers Association meeting at Chanute.

Nearly 100 persons attended the one-day event.

Summarizing the report, Dr. Frank Morrison, Kansas State University Extension horticulture specialist, said the pecan crop would have a value of about \$1 million. This is about half the potential of a full crop, he added.

The crop looked quite good early in the season but insects and disease took a heavy toll, he said.

Jack Winsor, superintendent of Southeast Kansas Pecan Field, Chetopa, said in a report on work at the field that thinning pecan groves and application of fertilizer can triple production. He also pinch-hit as a speaker for Dale Conard, Chetopa grower and sheller. He said a pecan sheller needs both quality and quantity to hold markets which he develops.

The association elected Joe Nixon, Belle Plaine, president; Paul Brennecke, Chanute, vice president; and re-elected Morrison secretary and treasurer.

A plaque presented to an association member who has made an outstanding contribution to the pecan industry was given to Charles Murray, Pleasanton. He

## Farm Bureau Sticks With Policy Stand

The American Farm Bureau Federation easily adopted its policy recommendations at its national convention at Washington for phasing out current farm programs and went home to wait on the Nixon administration and Congress for the fruits of its labors.

Not all the 179 voting delegates were happy. An earlier Southern revolt aimed at excluding cotton farmers from the policy statement calling for a gradual end to government crop programs failed to materialize again.

Delegates from major cotton states proposed that the existing food and agriculture act of 1965 be extended. When this flopped, they asked that cotton be considered separately from the official resolution urging a phase-

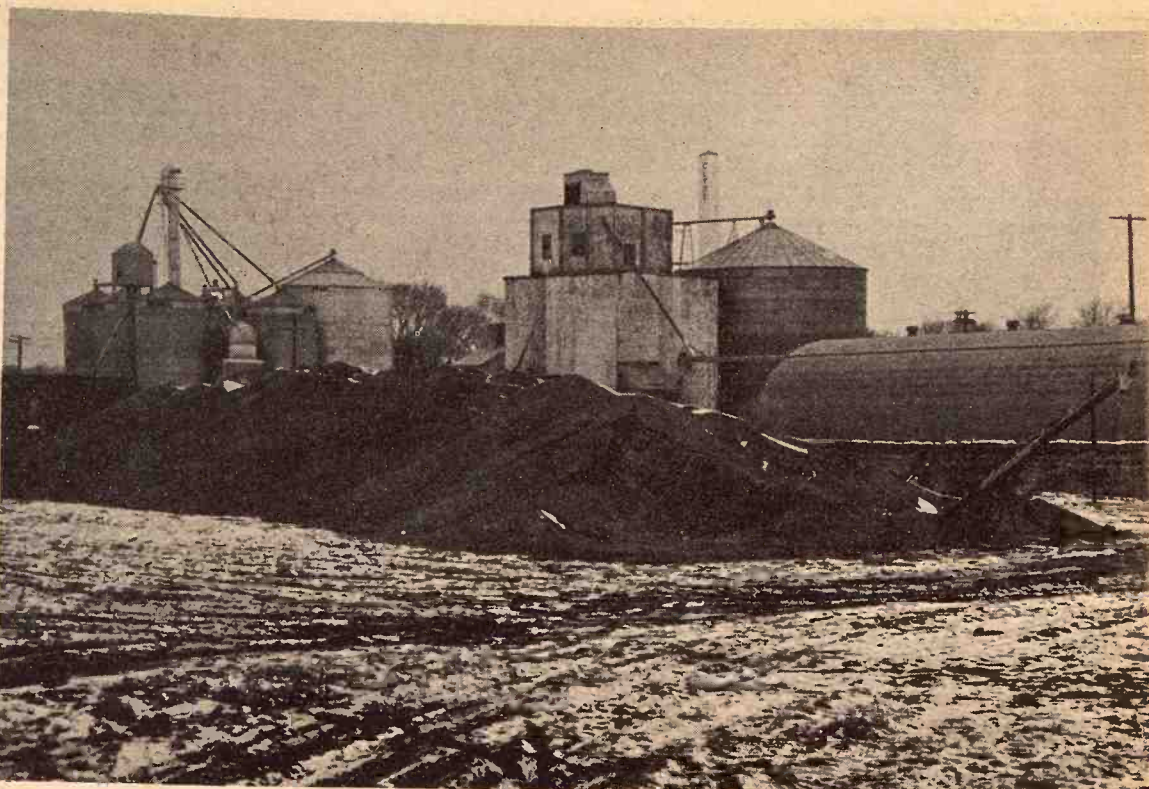

out of control payment programs.

Both requests were rejected by voice vote.

Some observers thought the issue might be revived as delegates voted finally on a long list of resolutions ranging from the war in Vietnam to pornography.

But it wasn't, and the delegates approved as written a policy statement for "phasing out acreage bases, acreage allotments, marketing quotas and compensatory payments" in favor of a free market system for farmers.

Delegates failed to agree on the question of favoring limits on the amount of money wealthy investors can write off under a "tax-loss farming" operation.

Measures to tighten restrictions on this practice are now before Congress as part of a broad tax reform package.

Last year the farm bureau favored a limit on the amount of farming losses that can be used to offset nonfarm income for federal tax purposes.

But this time the policy framers asked opposition to Congress setting a limit on farm tax writeoffs, primarily because of the complexity of the issue and farm bureau uneasiness over how legislative proposals had developed.

Both views were rejected by the delegates and no policy decision was reached on the issue.

#### Joint Effort To Help With Tree Problems

Towns in Kansas are experiencing tree problems and Kansas State University may be able to lend a helping hand.

While larger towns are often staffed by capable professionals in city forestry, smaller communities are sometimes faced with tree management problems without the aid of professional arborists.

"Dutch elm disease is moving through the state and as a result lots of towns are losing trees and have sought assistance from K-State," explains James J. Nighswonger, Extension horticulturist.

"As there are a number of possibilities available in tree management, the towns are often confused and don't know what to do about their tree problems."

So Nighswonger arranged a meeting with state and area Extension foresters and county Extension personnel to discuss the towns' plight.

"Foresters and horticulturists have been doing some work with towns in this field for some time," says Nighswonger, but little organized effort has been made to help solve the problems. That is, until now.

A steering committee was named at the Extension meeting. Its job will be to formulate a set of procedures or proposed programs which will be available to towns.

"Hopefully, these recommendations will help the towns cope with their tree problems," says Nighswonger, who is committee chairman.

Subjects discussed at the Extension meeting included park and tree design, tree management, tree pest control and Extension's role in the development of community tree programs.

#### Nebraska Wants More Time On Pollution Control

The state of Nebraska has asked the federal government to approve a postponement for at least a year of the deadline for establishing a compliance timetable for treating waste going into the Missouri River.

Under an agreement approved by state and federal governments a year ago, the Nebraska Water Pollution Control Council agreed to submit a timetable by Dec. 31, 1969.

Gov. Norbert Tiemann now is asking Interior Secretary Walter Hickel to approve a decision of the Pollution Council to postpone establishment of the timetable until at least Dec. 31, 1970.

Tiemann said the agreement a year ago was made on the assumption that the same kind of timetables would be promulgated for neighboring states before the end of 1969. But Iowa is in conflict with federal authorities on the need to treat wastes going into interstate waters, and Kansas and Missouri want more time to consider the matter.

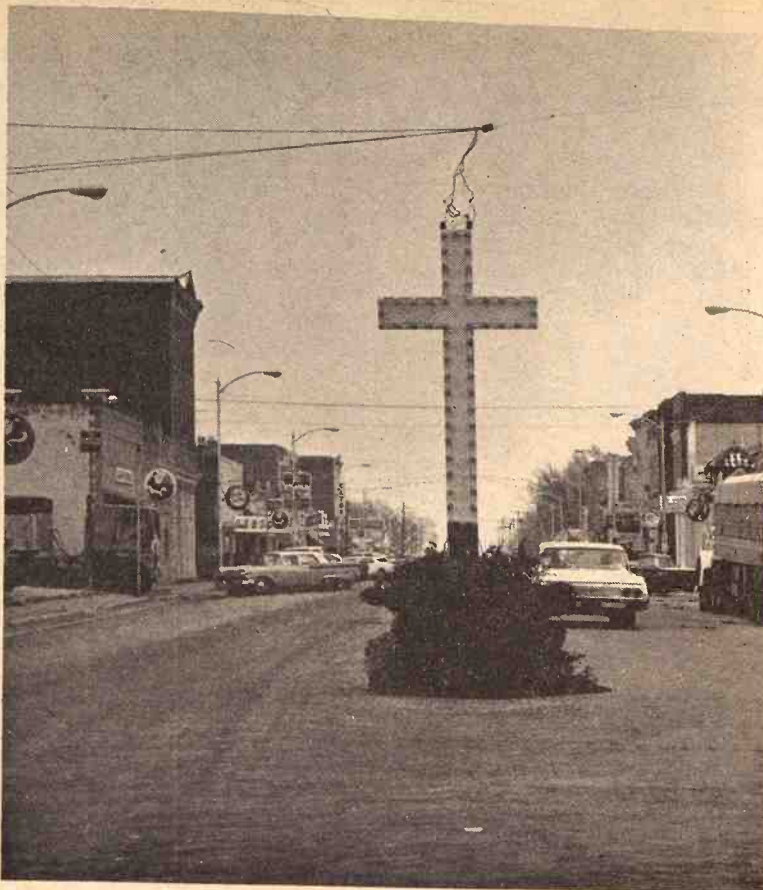

### Large Walnut Stand Found In Western Kansas

The discovery of a natural walnut tree stand in northern Clark County is called "significant" by Fred Atchison, Kansas State University Extension district forester.

Atchison says the 150 acre

walnut stand is important for several reasons.

First, walnut stands in western Kansas are rare. Second, large portions of the stand are almost pure walnut. Third, the stand contains the largest walnut tree in Kansas — 56 1/2 inches in diameter at a point four feet above the ground. Fourth, it is further west in Kansas than any other walnut stand.

Owner of the walnuts is E. M. Pyle III, who "knew he had

some walnut trees but was unaware of the size of the stand or of its value," Reports Atchison.

The forester says someone inquired of Pyle about the walnut stand. This aroused his curiosity, and Pyle discussed his trees with Carl Barnes, Clark County Extension Agent.

Barnes contacted Atchison, who made a preliminary survey of the 1200' to 1500 trees in the stand. He then called in other K-State Extension foresters to collaborate in writing up data on the discovery.

"Mr. Pyle is a conservationist and doesn't want the walnut stand destroyed," relates Atchison. "He'll sell some trees for the purpose of maintaining and improving the stand. A planting program has already begun and some walnut seedlings will be planted next spring."

Walnut, says Atchison, is the most valuable hardwood tree in Kansas. Although the national supply of walnut is diminishing, Kansas still has good growing stock. Most of the walnuts are located in eastern portions of the state.

The K-State forester observes that western Kansas has several small and less significant walnut stands. He's encouraging landowners to plant walnut seedlings.

"The demand for high quality walnut is great and it should continue," he believes. "Of course, walnut tree planting is a long range program and the location has to be right, such as in bottom land near creeks, particularly in western areas of the state."

In recommending that walnuts be planted in western Kansas, Atchison says they'll "make good presents for grandchildren in the years ahead."

Atchison has created enough interest in walnuts in the western areas that several persons

attended a walnut management clinic conducted by the Extension forester this fall. The clinic was held at Coldwater and was attended by landowners from Comanche and surrounding counties.

Atchison, a master's degree candidate at Fort Hays State, is planning to write his thesis on the big Clark County walnut tree find.

### Longford Votes To Keep School

**LONGFORD** — Voters decided to keep the Longford Rural High School open by a vote of 125 to 38. About half the eligible voters in the district showed up at the polls, officials said.

If the school had been ordered closed, the 34 10th through 12th grade students would have been sent to either Wakefield or Clay Center high schools.

## Lamb Imports On Rise Despite Less Consumption

Imports of lamb from New Zealand and Australia are running about 2½ times larger than last year despite declining U.S. per capita consumption. The Agriculture department says high U.S. prices, booming production in the two countries and declining American output are the chief reasons for the sharp rise. And despite protests from U.S.

sheepmen, officials do not think lamb imports will be restricted soon. Unlike fresh or frozen beef which is subject to import quotas, lamb shipments are not held down by law.

But department officials admit some difficulties exist and hope to set up a meeting early next year with Australia and New Zealand to work out better marketing methods.

U.S. lamb production has dropped steadily in the last decade and this year will be about 50 million pounds less than in 1968, Donald Rubel, assistant administrator of the Foreign Agriculture Service, said. Meanwhile, lamb imports are expected to increase about 20 million pounds, not enough to offset the drop in U.S. output or the shrink in per capita consumption.

Consequently, department officials said, lamb prices paid to farmers have spurted upward this year. In November the average farm price was \$27.30 per hundredweight, compared with \$24.70 a year earlier and the average of \$19.90 a decade ago.

One department official noted that since 1955-57, retail lamb prices have gained 47 percent, compared with 27 percent for beef and 22 percent for pork.

But Americans prefer beef by a wide margin. This year the per capita consumption of lamb and mutton is expected to be 3.4 pounds, down from 4.4 pounds eaten in 1957-59. Consumption of beef this year is estimated at about 110 pounds, compared with 82 just 10 years ago.

This year's lamb imports through October totaled 36.7 million pounds, compared with 14.5 million during the first 10 months of 1968, Rubel said. In terms of U.S. lamb production, imports have averaged a little more than 2 percent of total output during the five years ended in 1967.

But larger production in New

Zealand and Australia, coupled with the higher U.S. prices, boosted imports in 1969 to more than 4 percent of domestic production, and to nearly 8 percent estimated this year.

Last year about 23 million pounds of lamb were imported by the United States, with New Zealand supplying 13 million and Australia 9.8 million of the total.

U.S. producers want the government to restrict lamb imports — about 18 million pounds a year has been mentioned — or at least negotiate agreements to spread out import shipments throughout the year so they will not compete so much with U.S. marketings.

Department officials see little chance of Congress passing a quota of lamb soon. "At least not as long as our meat prices are as high as they are," one official said.

## Trueblood Sale Grosses \$30,590

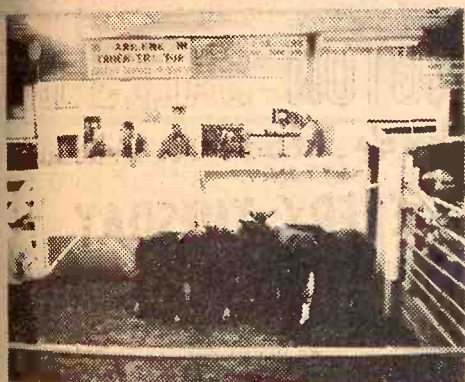
