Smaller Set-Aside Option Should Get Soybean Gain

Soybean production in Kansas should increase considerably next year in Kansas due to a recently announced U.S. Department of Agriculture feed grain program.

The assessment was made by Frank Mosier, state executive director of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service in Manhattan.

The plan gives farmers two options concerning the percentage of the grain base acreage they may set aside, Mosier said.

"The 30 percent option will pay farmers in Kansas approximately \$49 an acre for idle land," Mosier said. "It will allow them to produce as much wheat, corn and grain

sorghum as they desire on their remaining acreage."

Farmers, particularly those in western Kansas, probably would prefer this option, Mosier reasoned, because they wouldn't want to restrict themselves to the amount of feed grains they could produce.

He speculated farmers in areas of the state best suited for soybean production—primarily southeast and areas of northeast Kansas—would opt for the 15 percent set-aside.

This option would provide increased payments for idled acres as well as providing the farmer with the opportunity to increase his soybean production.

Mosier said this plan would make more acres available for soybean production because of the smaller set-aside.

He noted the farmer would receive about \$59 per acre under the 15 percent option. To receive the higher

payment, the farmer must agree not to exceed his 1972 production of wheat, corn or grain sorghum. This, he said, would allow the farmer additional acres for planting soybeans.

The full effect of the program on Kansas farmers may not be known for some time, Mosier said, because insufficient data from the agriculture department made it difficult to assess the situation of individual farmers as well as the statewide situation.

State Eye On Another Hike In Blue Cross Rates

The State Insurance Department announced it will conduct a public conference Dec. 20 on a schedule of proposed rate increases filed by Kansas Blue Cross-Blue Shield.

Fletcher Bell, state insurance commissioner, said the conference will be at 10 a. m. in the State Office Building.

It will be the first of its kind since the 1972 Legislature gave the insurance commissioner authority to approve Blue Cross-Blue Shield rate hikes.

Bell said the amount of the requested increases vary from 3 to 11 percent, depending on the benefits purchased.

He said the rate filings are applicable to community rated categories including community groups of less than 25 contracts, farm organizations, non-group and Blue Shield Plan 65.

Those covered categories apply to about 54 percent of the subscriber contracts covered by Blue Shield

and 21 percent of those covered by Blue Cross.

"The filings to be discussed at the conference affect an estimated 187,000 Blue Shield and 74,000 Blue Cross contracts held by Kansans," Bell said.

Not included in the rate filings are contracts on student groups, federal or state employee groups and existing merit rate groups or Blue Cross Plan 65.

"—My staff has become involved in an 'in-depth' study of these organizations' charges, and we intend to take whatever appropriate action is deemed necessary," Bell said.

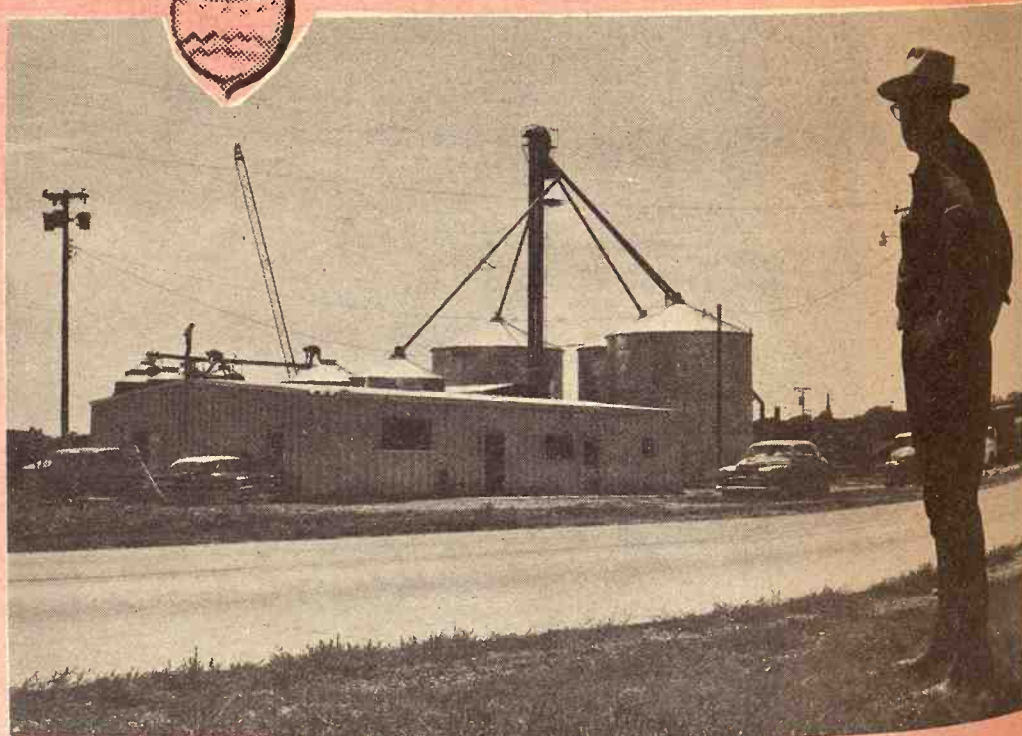

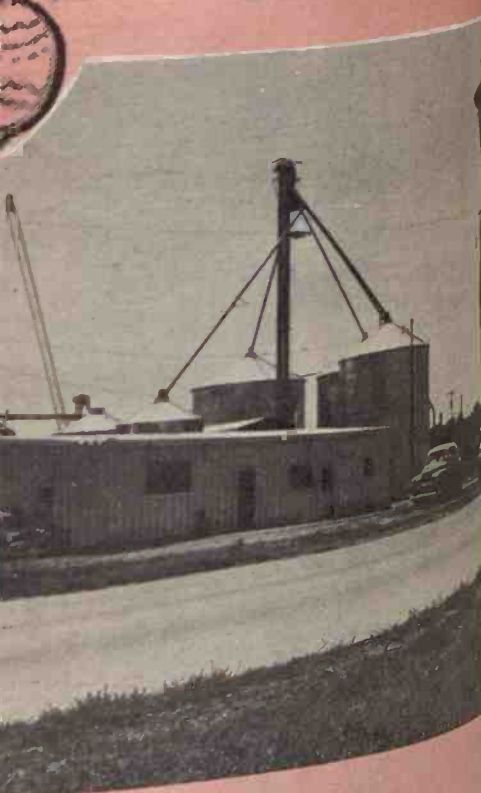

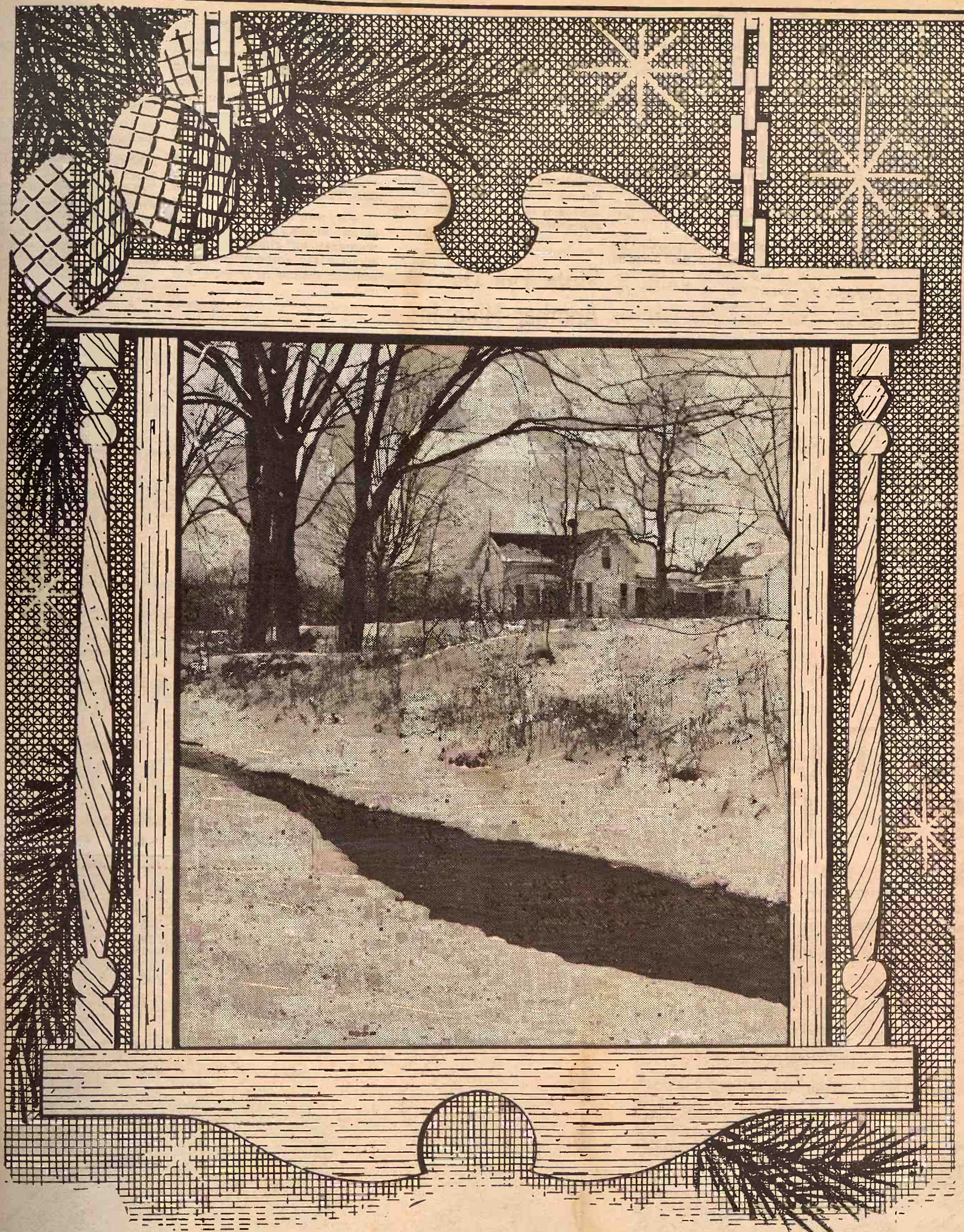

Set Program For 102nd Kansas Ag Convention

Governor Robert B. Docking and Dan Dalrymple, Washington, D. C., Agricultural Consultant to Environmental Protection Agency Administrator William Ruckelshaus, will be among the speakers for the 102nd Kansas Agricultural Convention, according to Kansas Secretary of Agriculture Roy Freeland.

Registration for the three day meeting will begin Wednesday afternoon, January 10, in the Topeka Municipal Auditorium.

Robert L. Rawlins of Holton, president of the State Board of Agriculture, will preside at all convention sessions.

The annual convention dinner program, Wednesday evening, features an address by Governor Docking; an address by Gene Conklin, Vice-President Emeritus, Sterling College, and entertainment by the Washburn Belles.

Thursday morning speakers include Harold L. Smith, Assistant Occupational Safety and Health Administration Regional Administrator for State Programs; Dalrymple; Senator Leslie A. Droge, Chairman, Senate and Livestock Committee, and Chairman, Pesticide Advisory Board; Senator Joe E. Warren, Member, Senate Agriculture and Livestock Committee; and John H. Vogel, Chairman, House Agriculture and Livestock Committee.

Thursday afternoon speakers will

be Ray F. Uehling, Board of Directors Ex Officio, Kansas Wheat Growers Association, and member of the Secretary of Agriculture's Advisory Committee on Wheat and Feed Grains; Roderick Turnbull, Director of Public Affairs, Kansas City Board of Trade; Rex Cozad, Chairman, Kansas Wheat Commission; Jim Ploger, Organization Fieldman, Kansas Farmers Union; John Junior Armstrong, President, Kansas Farm Bureau; Bill Amstein, President, Kansas Livestock Association; and Robert N. Speer, Kansas President, National Farmers Organization.

Friday morning's program includes Guy E. Gibson, Chief Engineer, Water Resources Division, Kansas Department of Agriculture; and Dr. Hyde Jacobs, Head, Kansas State University Department of Agronomy, and Director, Kansas Water Research Institute.

Slight Cutback In Japanese Farm Purchases

The Agriculture Department reports that the United States exported \$8.05 billion worth of farm products to 165 countries in the fiscal year ending last June 30.

Fifteen countries received 69 percent of the total.

For the third consecutive year,

Japan's purchases of U.S. farm commodities exceeded the billion-dollar level. Japan bought \$1.16 billion worth of our farm products to top all other nations.

However, Japan's purchases were 4 percent less than those of the previous year.

Japan led all other outlets for U.S. oilseed, animal fats, wheat, feed grains, cotton, and hides and skins and ranked second or third for tobacco, fruits, meats, nuts and poultry meats.

Shipments to Japan accounted for a fourth of total U.S. oilseed exports, nearly a fifth of the seed grains and

21 percent of cotton exports.

Canada was the second biggest importer with \$805.7 million worth of U.S. farm products. This included grain and oilseed exports transshipped through Canadian ports.

Canada remained our top foreign outlet for fruits, vegetables and meats and a major market for cotton, protein meal, vegetable oils, rice, hides and nuts.

Trailing Japan and Canada, others in the top 15 importers of U.S. farm products were The Netherlands, \$616.4 million; West Germany, \$607.3 million; United Kingdom, \$429.9 million; Republic of

Korea, \$316.9 million; Italy, \$214.1 million; France, \$214.1 million; Spain, \$200.8 million; India, \$169 million; U.S.S.R., \$138 million; Mexico, \$130.8 million; and Indonesia, \$120.4 million.

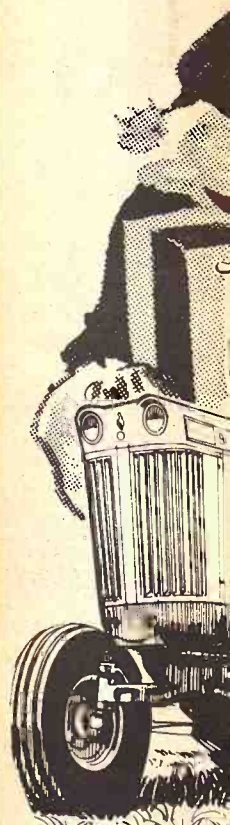

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Lower Marbling Standards Opposed By Breeds Assns

Members of the U.S. Beef Breeds Council at their annual meeting December 9 in Dallas, Texas elected officers for the coming year and went on record as opposing any changes in USDA grading standards that would short change the consumer at the super market.

The group of executive officers of the nine major beef breed associations elected Lloyd D. Miller, of the American Angus Association, president for 1973. He succeeds C. D. Swaffar of the American Shorthorn Association, who was elected president when the council was organized in 1971.

New vice president is W. T. Berry, Jr., American Hereford Association. J. Scott Henderson, American-International Charolais Association, was re-elected secretary-treasurer of the council.

Action on the possible grading changes came after an explanation by John Pierce, head of the USDA beef grading service, of proposed grading changes now under consideration by the department. The change questioned by the Beef Breeds Council and proposed by three meat packing organizations would lower the amount of marbling needed for all cattle to get into the top four USDA quality beef grades. The effect would be to allow nearly two-thirds of all A-plus maturity cattle that now fall into the USDA Good grade to graded USDA Choice. Likewise about two-thirds of the A-

plus maturity steers and heifers now graded USDA Standard would qualify for the USDA Good grade.

"The U.S. Beef Breeds Council is not against changes in USDA grading standards, providing they do nothing to short change the consumer by lowering the taste, juiciness and tenderness of beef in the current USDA Choice grade that Americans have come to depend upon and trust," Lloyd Miller, the new Beef Breeds Council president said. But he reminded that "to date there is not enough evidence to prove that standards should be lowered or raised. And until that evidence is provided we feel that there is no justification for lowering the marbling requirements of USDA graded beef."

The U.S. Beef Breeds Council represents associations with a membership of more than 128,000 registered cattle breeders in the United States. One of its stated purposes is to promote action that will improve economic production of quality U.S. beef for the consumer. Members of the council are;

Breeders Association, Red Angus Association of America and Santa Gertrudis Breeders International.

Wheat Institute Research Grant To Far-Mar-Co?

Members of the National Wheat Institute visited Far-Mar-Co, Inc., laboratory facilities in Hutchinson collecting information on which to make a decision on a \$600,000 research grant. The grant would be made from the fund of slightly less than \$2 million left in the inverse wheat subsidy fund by wheat producers in 1970.

E. L. Hatcher of Lamar, Colo.,

chairman of the NWI, said the visit was a "fact finding mission" for the Institute board members. The board will take its information back to Washington, D. C., Hatcher said, and a decision will be made, probably in January.

"Decisions on these awards will be made by the whole board," Hatcher said, "and an announcement made after the action has been reviewed by the U.S. Department of Agriculture, which holds the funds."

"We have had a total of 136 requests for grants," Hatcher said, "Which would cost a total of about \$15 million, on which to spend our fund of less than \$2 million."

The proposal submitted by Far-Mar-Co, the Kansas Wheat Commission, and the Kansas Association of Wheat Growers, was to refine

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manufacturing techniques and practical applications and for wheat components in a process already developed by Far-Mar-Co laboratory in research sponsored by Far-Mar-Co, the Commission, and Wheat Growers a three-way program. The research already has separated the components of wheat with no damage to the various components, which can be used as a basis for engineering products from wheat. "This gives an opportunity to find an industrial home for the products of wheat," says Dr. Wayne Henry, director of research for Far-Mar-Co.

Great Western's Beet Payment Cops \$75 Million

For the second consecutive year, Great Western Sugar Corp. will set an alltime record for the second consecutive year, the Great Western Sugar Corp. announced. A total of \$75 million was mailed to Great Western Sugar growers Nov. 20, passing the 1971 record of \$61.7 million.

George E. Wilber, Jr., president of

the Denver-based beet sugar manufacturing company, said the checks will be issued for 1972-crop beets delivered through Nov. 4 by about 4,200 growers in Colorado, Kansas, Nebraska, Montana and Wyoming. Wilber said the harvest was about 94 percent complete as of that date.

The payment not only tops the previous record total set last year, but also sets a new record in average price per ton at \$14.35. The 1971 record price was \$13.07.

In addition to the money paid by Great Western Sugar, growers will in the near future, receive con-

ditional payment for their 1972 beets under the U.S. Sugar Act. This payment, which is expected to average \$2.26 per ton and boost the total received by growers to over \$87.5 million, is financed through a federal tax on the sugar industry.

"Payments from Great Western Sugar for beets delivered after Nov. 4 are being made this month. Additional payments for all 1972 beets will probably be made in April and October of 1973," Wilber said. Under terms of the beet purchase agreement, Wilber said the growers' total return for the crop is tied to the net price to be received by the company from the sale of sugar in the marketing year to end Sept. 30, 1973.

"Our growers in the Northeast Colorado and Kansas district will receive about \$27.8 million of the \$75.6 million total," Jack Powell, district general manager said, "which means they will receive an average initial payment of \$13.82 per ton. The Sugar Act payment is expected to add an average of about \$2.20 per ton Growers conditions

have been good this year except for the Goodland, Kans., area where yields were reduced somewhat by hail damage. Overall, I'm sure the growers are as pleased as we are with the excellent crop."

Commenting on growing conditions in Great Western Sugar's five western growing area, Wilber said. "Weather during the planting and growing season throughout most of the harvest was almost ideal this

year. This, combined with the efforts of our growers to use the latest in agricultural technology, has resulted in an excellent 1972 crop. Average yield per acre at nearly 19 tons is the highest since 1963 and average sugar content is the highest since 1968. This has been one of the best crop years in the history of the company."

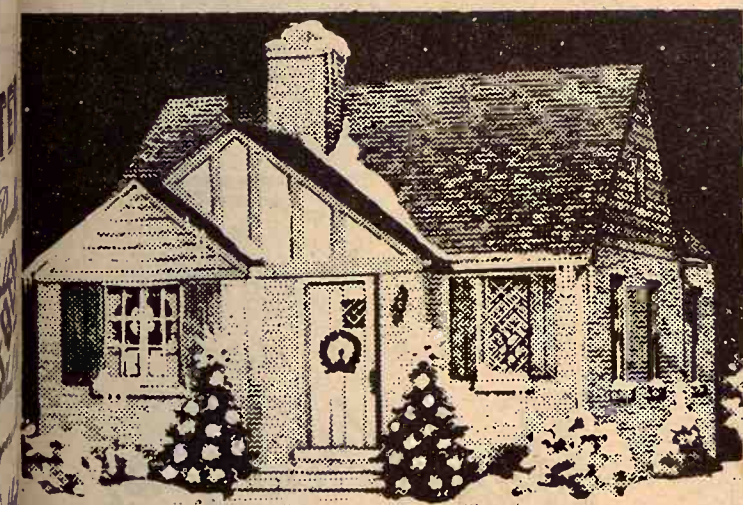

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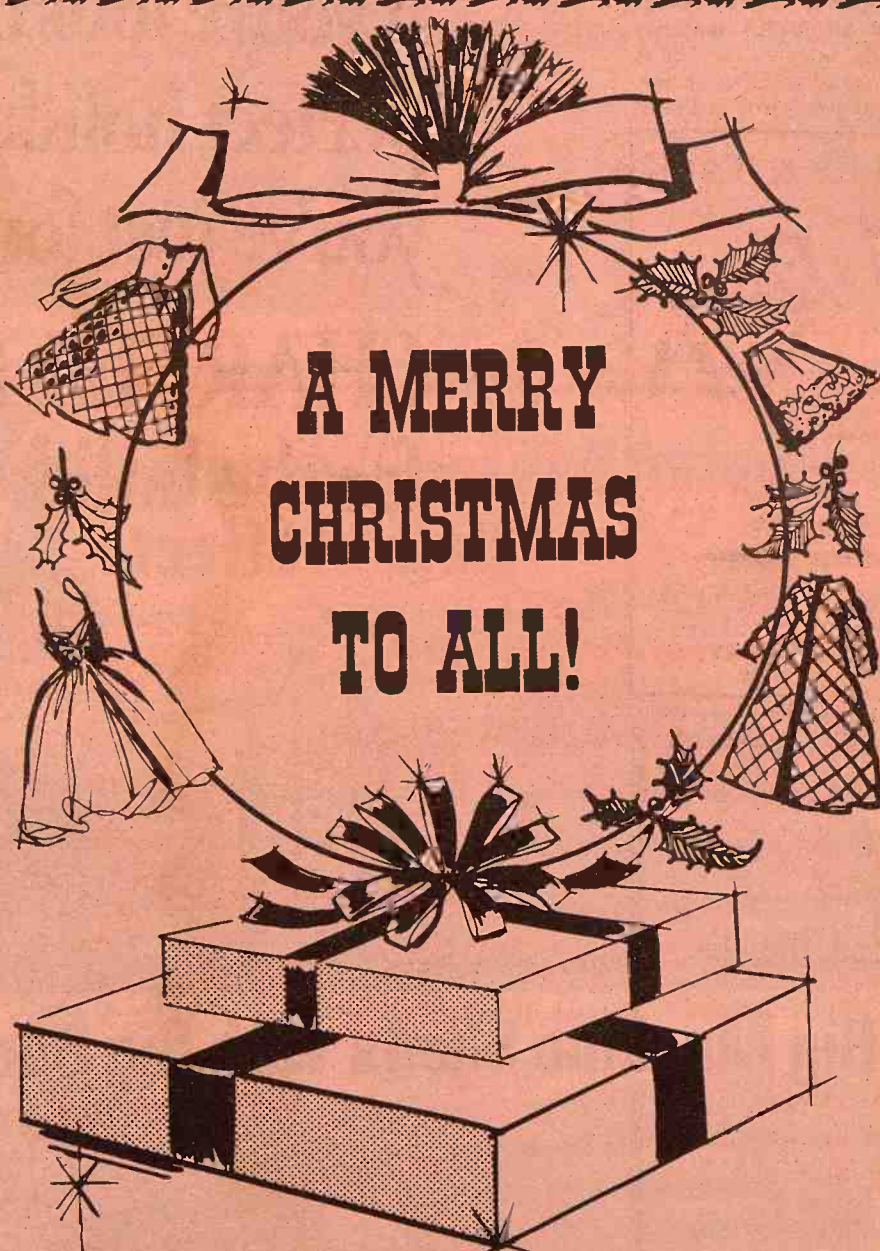

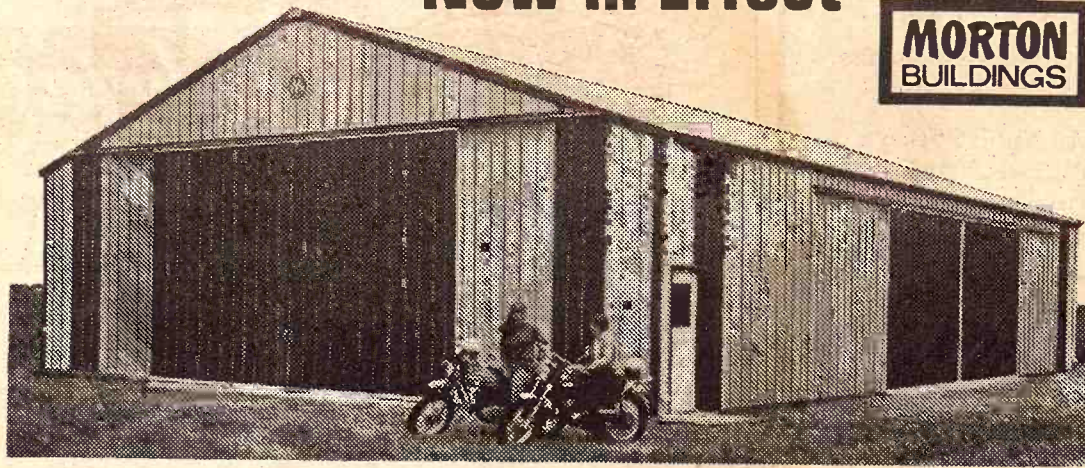

- ¾ cup commercial apricot preserves or jam

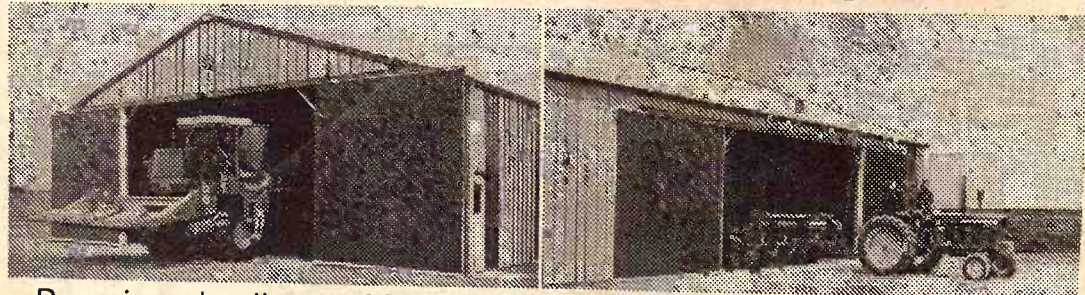

Prepare topping: 3/4 cup flour, 3/4 cup melted butter, 1 1/2 cups quick-cook oatmeal, 1 1/2 cups brown sugar, 1/2 cup chopped nuts. Pour cranberries and syrup into pan over apples. Spread topping over all. Bake at 350-degrees about one hour. Cool to room temperature before serving. Good topped with whipped cream or ice cream. I use a 9-inch flat cake pan. Makes plenty for company.

POUND CAKE

1 pound sweet butter
2 cups sugar
2 cups cake flour
4 medium-size eggs, beaten
1/2 cup coffee cream
1/2 teaspoon vanilla
Bake in 6 level tablespoons
Whip the egg whites adding

the sugar as you whip. Place this in the refrigerator until needed. Thoroughly cream butter, gradually add remaining sugar and whip until light. Add egg yolks, about 2 at a time, beating well after each addition. Add cake flour and cream alternately to the creamed mixture. Whip until mixture is as light as possible. It takes ten minutes at low speed on electric mixer. Still beating at low speed, whip in the egg whites just long enough to mix well, adding

the vanilla at the same time. Pour into slightly greased tube pan, ten inches in diameter and four inches deep, or two tube pans of a smaller size. Bake at 300-degrees for one hour and 25 minutes. It should fall about one inch after taken from the oven. This gives desired waxy texture. Powdered sugar may be sprinkled over the batter before baking, if desired.

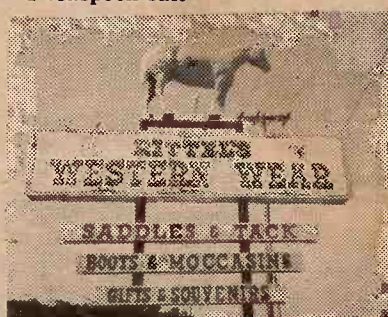

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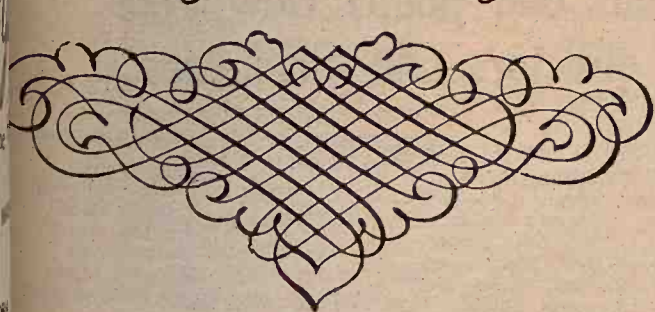
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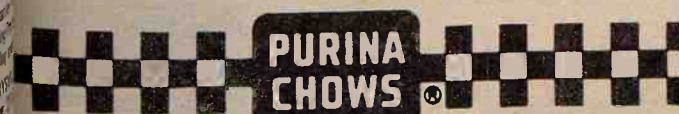

While still warm frost with powdered sugar icing flavored heavily with maple flavoring. These may be frozen without frosting, then heated in a 225-degree oven and frosted as desired. (This recipe makes approximately 3 1/2 dozen Long Johns).

Gulf Oil Co. Selling Out In Kansas

The Gulf Oil Co. plans to sell all the service stations it owns in Kansas within a year or 18 months, according to published reports.

Ralph Lewis, Houston, Gulf vice president, was quoted as saying "we will retain no facilities we own in Kansas."

He indicated the move is part of a \$250 million worldwide cutback.

"We are closing out in an orderly manner and are negotiating with buyers now, but will make the withdrawal orderly if it takes a year or 18 months," Lewis said.

In Houston, a statement from Gulf headquarters said the company has not yet announced the number of stations in 14 states it plans to dispose of.

The other states named included Missouri and Nebraska.

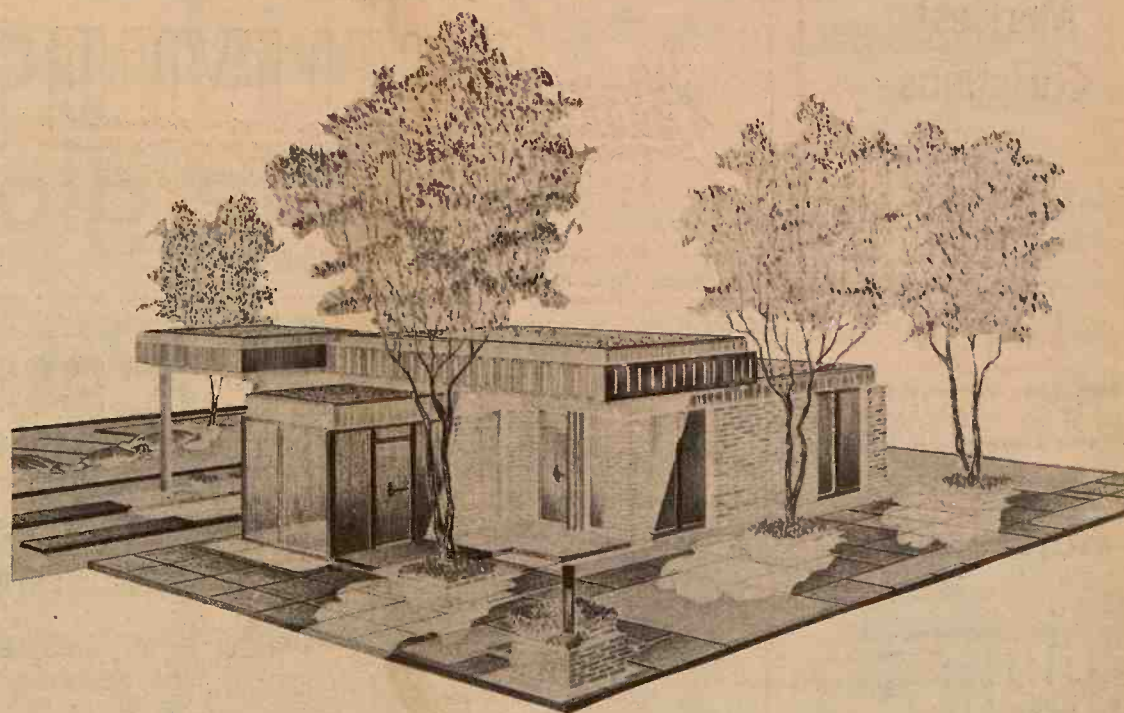
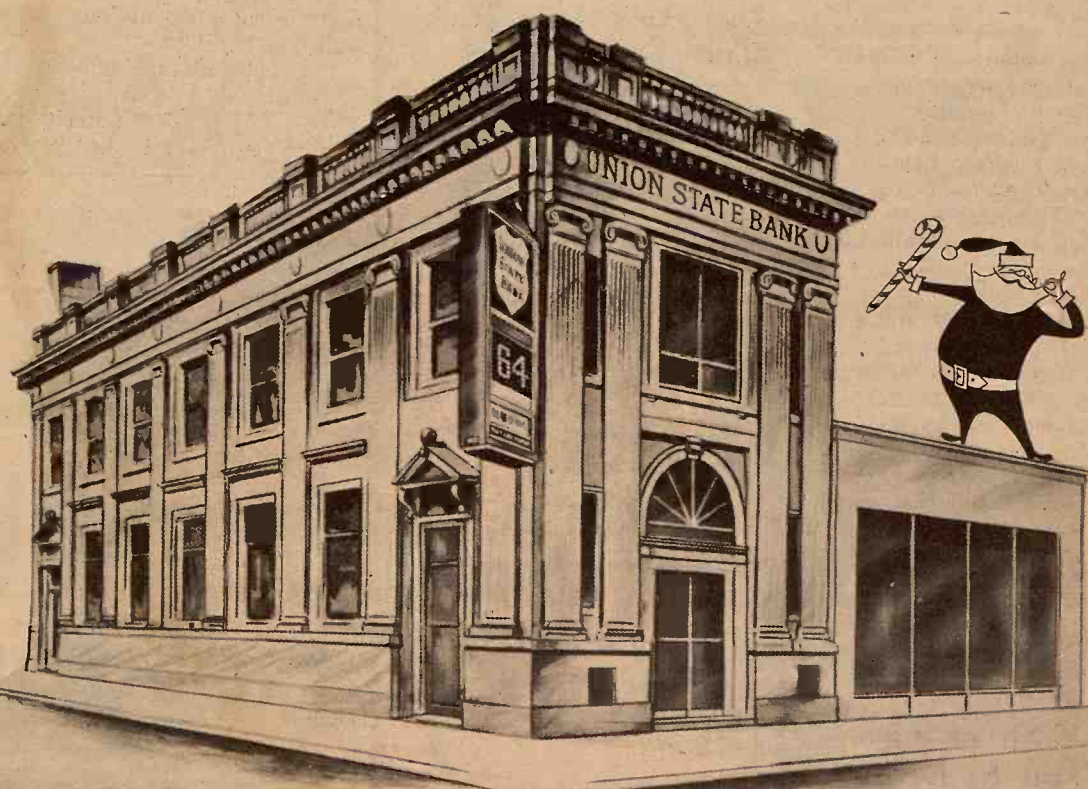

'More Fertilizer, More Water' As Yields Bulge Higher?

A state agricultural leader predicts another 25 years of "epochal" achievements lie ahead for Kansas farmers.

Dr. Floyd W. Smith, director of the Kansas Agricultural Experiment Station, said his prediction was based on the assumption that continued research and development are allowed in the fertilizer industry and elsewhere with agricultural

chemicals.

Speaking at the 25th annual meeting of the Kansas Fertilizer and Agricultural Chemicals Conference at Topeka, Smith said he was also basing his optimistic outlook on two other assumptions: that we adopt a better understanding of our natural resources, and that water use efficiency improves as rapidly as fertilizer usage efficiency since 1947.

Smith said agriculture in Kansas can continue to progress without adverse effects on the environment.

He noted that Kansas farmers, combining fertilizer application throughout the state with irrigation water in western areas, produced more corn this year on 1.25 million acres than they produced on 7.3 million acres 40 years ago.

He cited other accomplishments resulting from increased fertilizer usage on the farm:

- Wheat production efficiency has been increased 70 percent.
- Corn yields were only 22 bushels per acre in 1946, compared with a projection of 101 bushels per acre average for 1972.
- Kansas farmers will produce nearly \$1.25 billion worth of crops in 1972.

"Looking ahead," Smith continued, "it is safe to conclude that similar progress will occur in the next 25 years."

Smith said the fertilizer conference concept stemmed from efforts by Dr. Harold E. Myers in 1947, when he was head of K-State's Department of Agronomy. Myers is now dean of agriculture at the University of Arizona.

Smith said Myers believed considerable benefit could be derived from a joint meeting of industry and

college representatives. Early conferences, held at K-State, drew only 50 to 100 persons, Smith recalled.

At the same time, Kenneth A. Spencer, president of a chemical company, was promoting fertilizer development and use. He assembled a technical staff to direct the Military Chemical Works, which resulted in Kansas ammonium nitrate production in 1943.

Spencer is credited with providing leadership and incentive which enabled establishment of several fertilizer manufacturing plants in Kansas and adjoining states.

Smith said Spencer's dreams for a major industrial development in Kansas and Myers' desires for cooperative efforts among industry and university representatives with paving the way for the "epochal agricultural transformation" which took place during the last quarter century.

Comparing the use of fertilizer at the start and finish of this era, Smith pointed out fertilizer sales involved only 33,000 tons in fiscal year 1946-47, compared with 1.25 million tons this year, a 40 fold increase.

This tonnage included 10,000 tons of actual nutrients for Kansas farms

in 1947, compared with 622,000 tons this year, or nearly 70 times as much in 1972.

In the 1940's, fertilizer recommendations were "scant in scope" and limited in scope," Smith recalled.

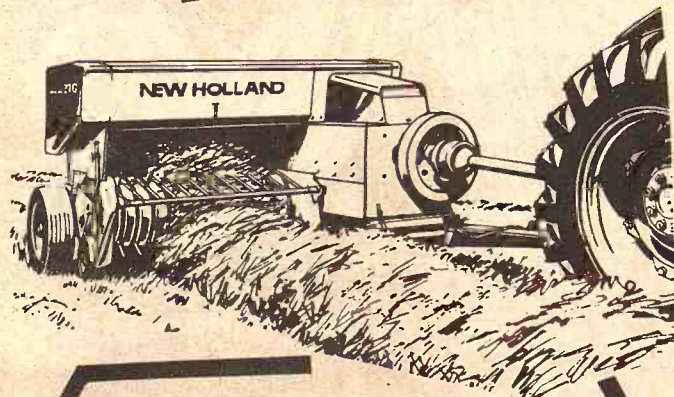
"A generalized statement related to nitrogen for wheat, a suggestion for using starter fertilizers on alfalfa and wheat, and for corn and sorghum, constituted our program."

"In addition, fertilizer recommendations were offered solely for eastern Kansas; none was offered for western Kansas, even irrigation."

"Extensive fertilizer use is recommended for all parts of the state for wheat, corn, sorghum, alfalfa, soybeans, numerous other crops."

Smith noted that fertilizer university relationships were non-existent 25 years ago, but in recent years a system of cooperation has evolved among researchers at Manhattan and outlying areas, "enabling industry to receive progress report simultaneously from all research segments of Kansas State University."

Infrared Heat In Farm Buildings

Farmers thinking of heating systems for farm buildings should consider electric infrared heating.

Infrared heat is radiant heat that passes from the heat source through the air to the heated object, affecting the object but not the air.

Elwyn S. Holmes, Extension agricultural engineer at Kansas State University, says the heat lamp has been the most popular type of infrared heat source. A 250-watt lamp is useful in heating small places such as brooding areas.

More recently, quartz tubes and quartz lamps have become popular infrared heat sources. Both are

resistant to thermal shocks. The quartz lamp is more efficient than the tube, but the lamp should not be used if the light affects objects being heated. The life of either the tube or lamp is about 5,000 hours.

Another source that fits in the same type fixture as the quartz lamp and tube is the metal sheath heater. This heater is resistant to both thermal shocks and vibrations but is less efficient than the other sources and should not be used in windy locations.

Infrared heaters are versatile and are best utilized in areas where a large temperature difference exists between the object being heated and the air temperature.

For example, says Holmes, they are frequently used in open-front

animal buildings, farrowing houses, milking parlors, calf pens, and farm shops.

By using infrared heaters in farrowing houses, little pigs are kept at a temperature of 80 to 90 degrees while the air temperature around the sow will be maintained at 60 degrees. Thus, both the sows and pigs are comfortable.

When this type of heat is used

constantly, operational costs can run high. Temperature controls are expensive, because standard thermostats are unsatisfactory. They operate most effectively in limited time situations under conditions mentioned above.

Although infrared heaters are safe, take some precautions. Don't hang them within reach of animals and connect only to circuits designed

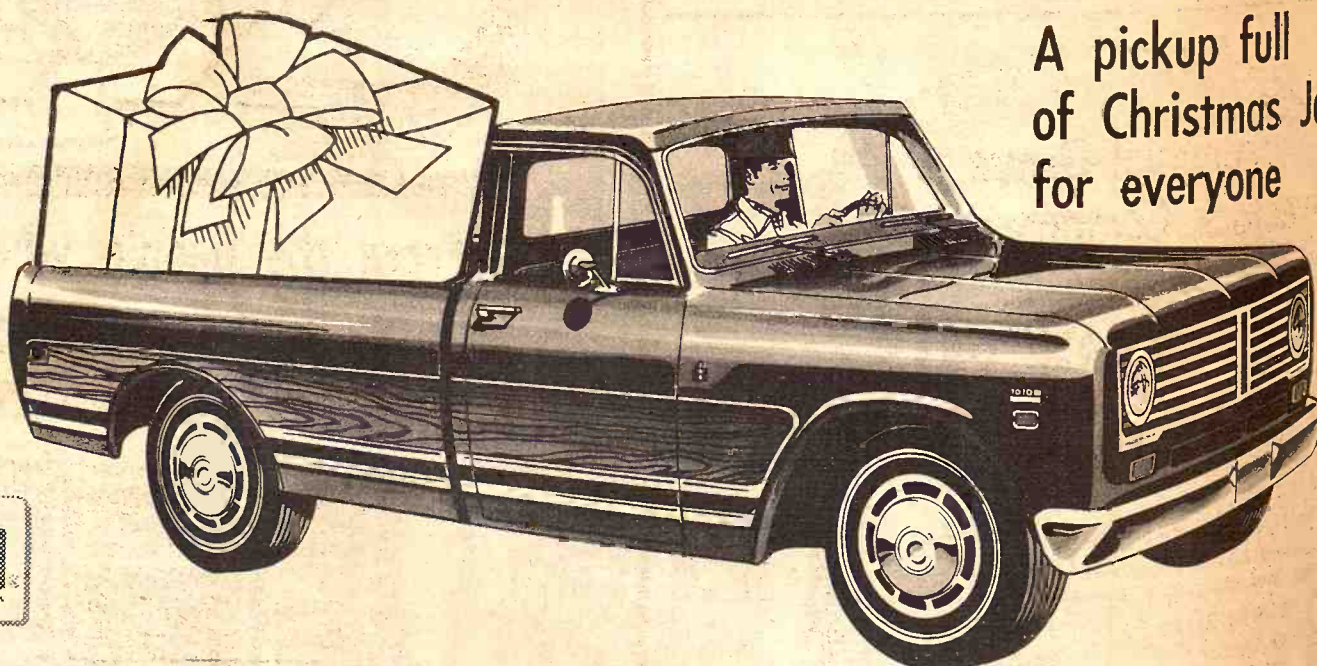

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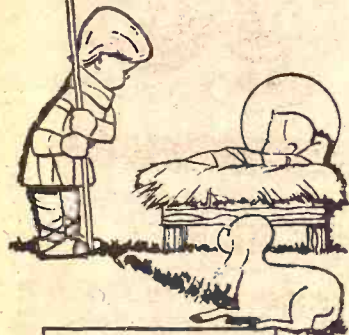

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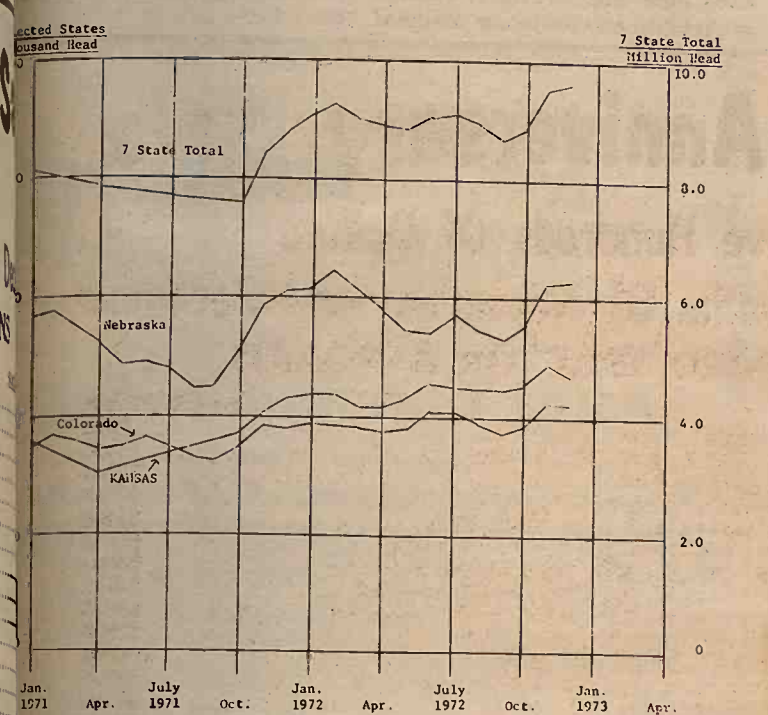

Marketings

Kansas cattle feeders marketed 200,000 grain-fed cattle during the month of November, compared with 150,000 in November 1971.

Placements

There were 160,000 cattle and calves placed on full grain feed during November, compared with 217,000 in November 1971.

Seven-State Total

The number of cattle and calves on grain feed for slaughter market on December 1 in the seven monthly States was 9,636,000, slightly more than on November 1, 1972, and 9 percent more than on December 1, 1971.

The number of grain-fed cattle marketed during November in the seven States was 14 percent more than a year earlier.

The number of cattle and calves placed on feed in the seven States during November was 5 percent less than the November 1971 placements.

Woodbine Dam Proposal Dumped For Fifth Time

For about the fifth time the Kansas State Board of Water Resources has disapproved inclusion of the proposed Woodbine Dam in the official State Water Plan.

This has been consistently op-

posed by the Lyons Creek and Turkey Creek Watershed Associations in this and adjoining counties, as well as the Abilene Chamber of Commerce and other groups. There are a few Kaw River flood groups between Junction City and Kansas City, however, who keep reviving it on the grounds that it would tie in with the overall Kaw river flood control program for Kansas City and elsewhere.

Opponents have pointed out such a proposed project at this stage would

overlap and render useless the benefits of the watershed programs which are already well underway.

Not including Woodbine in the state water plan has the effect of killing it for consideration by another session of the legislature. Several other proposed dams were rejected and the state water plan remains basically unchanged from previous recommendations to the legislature.

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Hard-Sell Evades Welfare Rules

The state director of social welfare said that part of the blame for high living by public assistance clients can sometimes be laid at the feet of merchants.

Dr. Robert Harder commented on his agency's budget request for next fiscal year, "As long as there are merchandisers wanting to move goods, they're going to find ways of beating us (the Welfare Dept.) and they have."

The welfare director made his remarks during a brief discussion about automobiles owned by welfare recipients.

He said ownership of a car less than four years old automatically disqualifies a person from receiving most types of welfare assistance.

Then Harder declared that some auto dealers have "rented" cars to welfare recipients and labeled the payments "rental" rather than car payments. The cars are "rented" to the welfare client with the full understanding that he will own it after paying rental on it for a specified period.

The welfare director said his agency has "tightened down on cars."

Harder indicated the "rental" practice is not widespread among auto dealers, but also indicated that retailers in other lines of business use similar gimmicks to circumvent welfare rules and sell goods to public assistance clients.

Goals For Kansas' Cowherd Operator

The goal of a cowherd operator should be to produce a 500-pound calf (at seven months) from each cow

every 12 months at a cost of less than \$120 each.

Sound impossible? "Not for the hard-working cow-calf man who knows nutrition, maintains good breeding and health management of his herd, and knows how to use his crops, pasture, and drylot," says Dr. Keith Zoellner, Extension livestock specialist at Kansas State University.

Zoellner points out that feed makes up more than half the total cost of producing a calf and is the area offering the greatest opportunity to reduce costs.

From November through March (during the gestation period) the manager can get maximum use of crop residues, diverted acres, or medium to poor quality hay, straw,

chaff or other harvested crop residues. Cow nutrients needs are lowest during this period.

"But nutrient requirements pick up within two months of calving time because more is required to maintain rapid growth of the developing calf," Zoellner explains. "This need is added to the maintenance needs of the cow."

April through August (or from calving until rebreeding) is the period of greatest nutritional need because the cow has lost about 100 pounds from wintering and calving. While getting back "in shape" to breed, she also must provide milk for her calf. Nutrient needs remain high between re-breeding and weaning but readily available feeds can easily be utilized.

Roughage In Ration Determines Corn Preparation

The amount of roughage in the finishing ration determines whether dry shelled corn should be fed whole or crimped to beef steers, say researchers at Ohio State Univer-

sity.

It was found that whole shelled corn gave better performance as long as the ration contained 10 pounds of corn silage per head per day. That equals 23 percent roughage in the total ration (on matter basis), assuming the corn silage contains 50 percent roughage. When roughage content passed this level, crimped shelled corn gave better performance.

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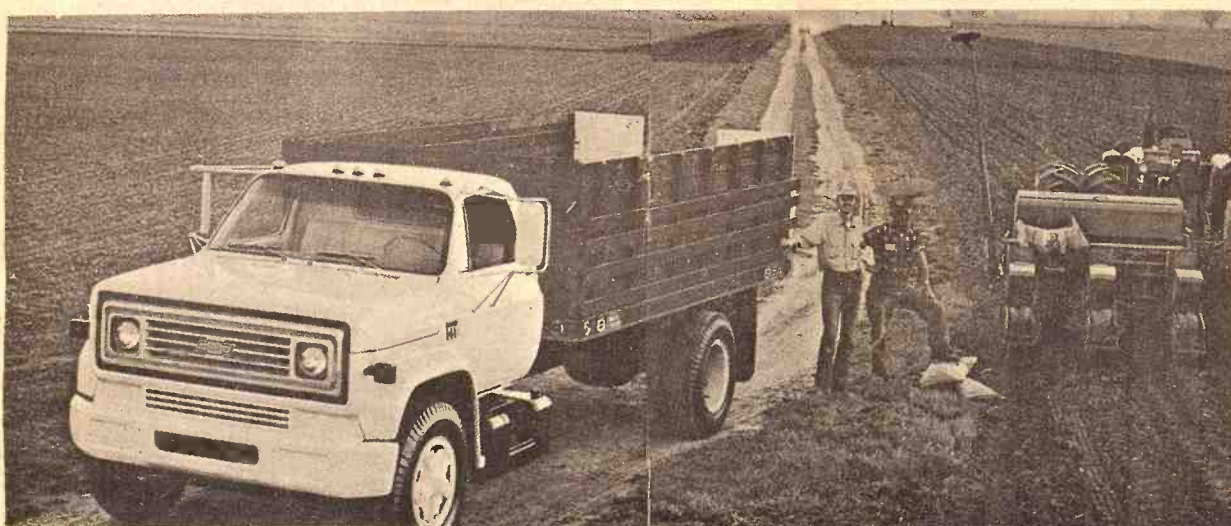

The Agriculture Department announced a feed-grain-a program aimed at boosting soybean output next year, trimming taxpayers' costs.

Under the plan, which includes two-way options for farmers, plantings could go up between 1 million and six million acres. The 66.8 million planted for crop.

Soybean plantings could increase from around 52 million compared with 46.4 million for 1972.

The 1973 feed program directed at putting about 12 acres idle in 1972 back into production next year. Officials said the total expected taken from production next year about 25 million acres, compared with 37 million in 1972.

Asst. Secretary of Agriculture Carroll G. Brunthaver told news that 1973 feed-program cost expected to be about \$1.1 billion compared with \$1.9 billion this year. As announced earlier, next cotton program is expected.

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French Weather Balloon Winds Up In Wheat Field

NORTON—A weather balloon launched in France has ended its journey in a Norton farmer's wheat field.

Duane Wray, whose farm is about 6 miles northwest of Norton, found pieces of the balloon draped along 200 yards of fence. The instrument package was missing, but Wray recovered a tag written in French from one piece of the balloon.

Wray's daughter Connie, a sophomore at Norton Community high school, took the tag to school where French instructor Duncan Boutwell and science instructor Jep Bryum translated the message.

The tag advised the finder not to smoke near the balloon because it was filled with flammable hydrogen, and to call collect the French

laboratory which launched the balloon.

Anticipating language problems, the Wray's arranged for French-speaking Christian Massy, American Field service foreign exchange student from Belgium at Norton high school, to make the call.

Massy said the French institute would mail the Wray's information on the balloon type and the research program in which it was used.

Meanwhile, Wray is trying to decide what to do with the plastic in his wheat field.

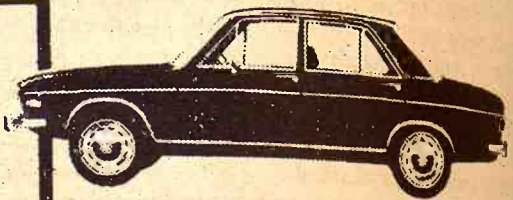

Farm Bureau Wants Farm Subsidies Ended

The nation's largest farm organization said it wants Congress drop farm subsidies and end production controls. The agriculture industry is robust enough to stand on its own feet, the American Farm Bureau Federation said in a resolution adopted at the concluding session of its annual convention. The two-million-member organization said its no-subsidies, no-production controls goal would be in the new Congress. The aim, the resolution stated, is to create a climate which will allow agriculture to return to the free market price system. "There is an indication that the government is moving along that line this week when the Department of Agriculture indicated that the feed grain payment program would be cut to \$1.1 billion in 1973 from \$1.8 billion in 1972. The federation said it was opposed to continuation of direct commodity payments to farmers to support prices and limit production. Federation President William J. Fuss, a grain and livestock

grower from Mackinaw, Ill., expressed optimism that Congress would be more inclined in 1973 to modify current government farm policies and programs.

"I think the reaction in the 93 Congress will be different than in the past because of the pressures to reduce the federal budget," he said in an interview.

"This will no doubt have influence on what happens in regard to government farm payments.

"With 95 per cent of the American population being nonfarmers, pressures from them to cut government spending will have influence on congressmen who largely represent urban constituencies."

Roger Fleming, secretary-treasurer of the federation, explained that while his organization had in recent years expressed a desire for phasing out the subsidies and controls programs it was difficult to get such statutes off the books.

"Once a subsidy program is inaugurated, inevitably there are people who have a vested interest in their continuance," he said. "On this score, agriculture is not much different than other segments of the economy."

The federation called such reserves "bad for producers, costly for taxpayers, and unnecessary for the protection of consumers."

Great Western Sugar Co. Sells For \$40 Million

The sale of Great Western Sugar Co. to the Great Western Producers Cooperative for \$90 million was approved both by stockholders in the parent company, Great Western United Corp., and members of the

cooperative.

Officials of the parent company, which also owns a land development firm and a pizza parlor chain, said Dec. 28 would be the closing date for the sale of their sugar subsidiary, the largest in the nation.

A spokesman for a group of Great Western's common stock shareholders protested restriction of the vote to those holding preferred stock, but a company spokesman said the law did not require approval of the sale by common shareholders.

At the meeting of members of the growers cooperative, a group of beet producers from the Scottsbluff, Neb., area complained that the purchase was not being handled in accordance with the original proposal made last year, but the group was defeated in the balloting.

Of the \$90 million, \$36.6 million is to be paid to Great Western United in cash by Dec. 28, \$38.5 million used to retire a longterm debt and the balance paid the company in annual installments.

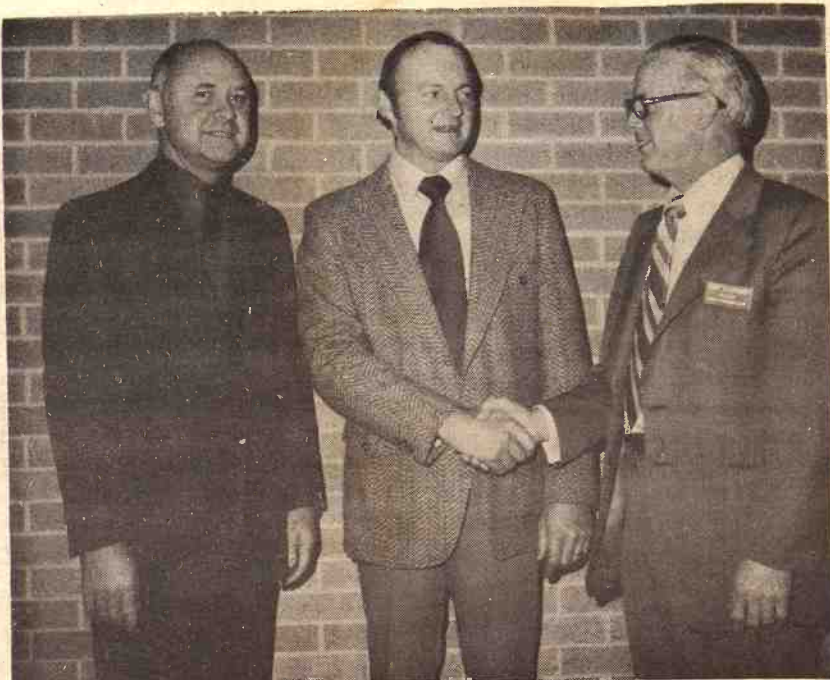

Part of the confusion over the road stems from the way roads are maintained in the two counties. In

Geary County, road maintenance is the responsibility of the county. In Dickinson County, townships are responsible for maintaining roads.

In 1964, the U. S. Corps of Engineers provided \$35,000 for rebuilding of a county line road leading to Milford Reservoir. Geary

County got the money, even though upkeep of the road had belonged to Fragrant Hill Township in Dickinson County.

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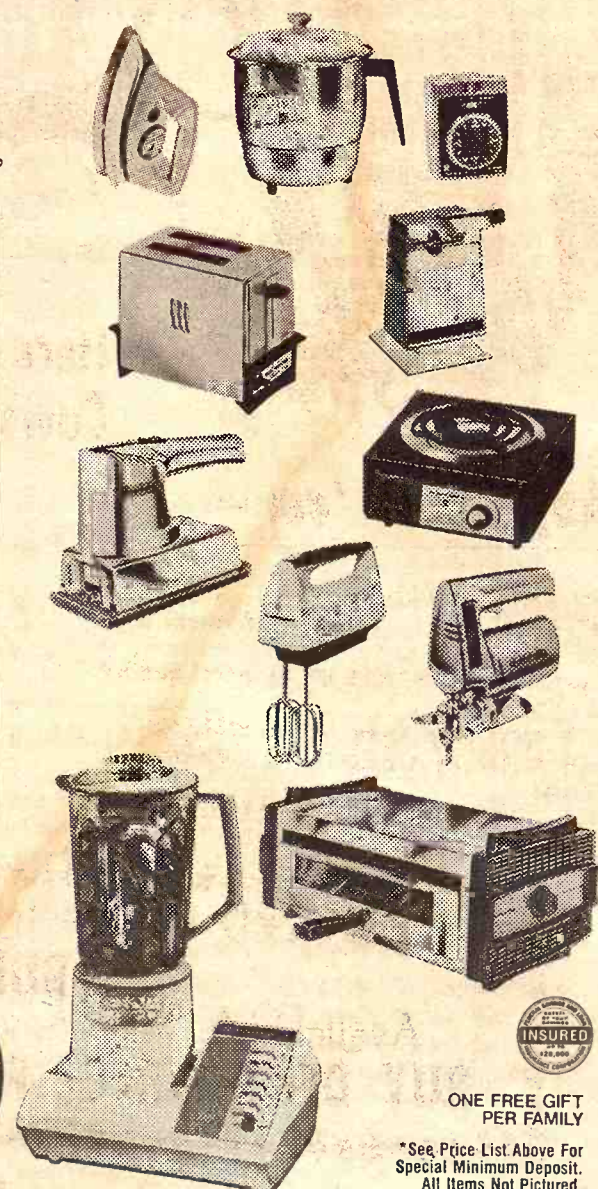
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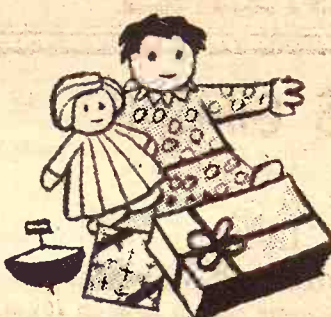

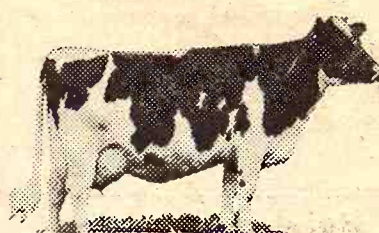

State Machinery Costs Lower Than National Average

Kansas was used as a reference point in a recent USDA study of a farm "market basket" that included everything from a medium-sized combine down to a pitchfork and motor oil.

The study by the Economic Research Service compared average prices on various farm purchases made in June 1971 in several states.

The average prices paid at that time in Kansas totaled \$23,902, which was about four percent less than the \$24,820 average from all states.

Included in the market basket were a 13½-ft. combine with medium equipment, a 70 to 79 horsepower tractor, a farm wagon without box and tires, a pickup hay baler and an 8-ft. tandem disc. Included also were three non-machine items—a 4-prong pitchfork, 30 gallons of all-weather oil and five 35-

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Record 314 Million Bushels, Says Final Wheat Tally

Kansas wheat farmers produced a record 314.90 million bushel crop in 1972, a Crop and Livestock Reporting Service summary said.

The 1972 production figure, up 5.70 million bushels from earlier estimates, surpassed the previous record of 312.61 million bushels in 1971.

The service said farmers seeded 30 million acres for the 1972 crop, 70 per cent from a year earlier. Of 9.40 million acres were harvested with an average of 33.5 bushels per acre.

This was one bushel per acre over the per-acre yield in 1971 but far below the largest of record.

In reviewing progress of the 1972 crop, the service said planting was usually complete by the end of October 1971, and that stands were generally good with only a limited amount of replanting necessary.

Near-Record Yield

Wheat yield per harvested acre averaged 33.5 bushels this year, a bushel under the 1971 record high but a dozen bushels above a decade earlier.

Wheat planting in the fall of 1971 lagged a little in early September, but proceeded rapidly after mid-month, reaching normal progress by early October and virtual completion by the end of the month.

Stands generally were good with only limited replanting required. Most of the seedlings rooted down well and top growth provided considerable pasture in most areas. The crop wintered well, with relatively little freeze or blowing damage. Lack of early spring moisture in some western and southern counties and April freezes in some southern areas hurt the crop in spots, but cool, damp filling weather in May and June was exceptionally favorable over most of the state.

Quality Generally Good

Harvest began about the normal time in early June, was slowed by rains in the last half of the month, but wound up rapidly in July with virtual completion by mid-month. Quality was generally good, with a slightly above-average test weight of 61.6 pounds per bushel, a slightly below-average protein content of 11.5 per cent and 78 per cent of the state's wheat acreage. Other leading varieties were Triumph, Satanta, Parker and Gage.

This year's oat production totaled 7,348,000 bushels, 12 per cent below

compared by rains that increased production outside the damage area. last year and the sixth smallest crop since 1874. Per-acre yield averaged 44 bushels, down a bushel from last year's record high average.

Oats were planted on 225,000 acres in 1972, 10 per cent below a year ago. Cool, wet weather in the last half of June help filling of heads but slowed harvest operations.

Barley production was 4,620,000 bushels, down 38 per cent from 1971 and the fifth smallest crop in 19 years. However, the 44-bushel per acre yield was a new record, well above the previous high of 40 bushels set in 1971.

Barley Crop Lags

Barley was harvested from only 105,000 acres in 1972, sharply below the 187,000 acres harvested a year earlier. Seeded acres for the 1972 crop were 120,000 acres, the next to smallest acreage planted to barley in Kansas records of seeded acreage began in 1926.

The 1972 rye production totaled half a million bushels, smallest crop since 1967. Only 25,000 acres were harvested for grain, about a fifth of the previous year and the smallest total for the state since 1934.

Per-acre yield was 20 bushels, only two bushels below the record high 1970 and 1971 yields. Rye was planted on 120,000 acres, with a large part used as livestock pasture.

Condition of pastures and range feed in Kansas on Dec. 1 was placed at 85 per cent of normal, compared with 77 per cent a year ago and equaling the best since 1962.

Oren Lee Staley Re-elected NFO President Again

Oren Lee Staley, beating back the
challenge of dissidents who sought to
depose him, was re-elected by a
margin of slightly less than a 3-2 to

Rhea Hackler of Fair Grove, Mo.,
election committee chairman,
disclosed the vote of the
organization's annual convention as
2,624 for Staley and 1,872 for Bill
Struckmeyer of Arbuckle, Calif., the
only other nominee.

Area Grainmen Go Broke In Export Deal

COURTLAND—Receivers have been appointed for 2 Courtland grainmen caught between massive U.S. grain exports and bad Kansas weather.

Robert Maher and Don Gorton say they are broke because they sold grain for export which they could not deliver because bad weather has kept farmers from harvesting their corn and milo.

Maher told the Belleville Telescope the loss may exceed \$2 million.

Maher is principal owner of the Maher Grain Co., Courtland, the Formosa Elevator Grain Co., and the Belleville Grain Co. Gorton is the manager of Maher's elevators.

Republic county District Court Judge Marvin O. Brummett appointed Mankato attorney Robert H. Meyer the receiver of the Formosa

elevator and Frank Spurney Jr., Belleville, the receiver of the Courtland and Belleville elevators.

The receivers will manage the property and settle the claims of Maher's creditors.

Maher said his companies had sold "huge quantities" of milo and corn to at least 6 national grain concerns. The monthly contracts for delivery were to begin in September and continue until early spring.

When mud and snow kept farmers from harvesting their grain, Maher had nothing to deliver. The national companies, which had already contracted to export the unharvested grain, were forced to buy it elsewhere at higher prices. Maher may be liable for their losses.

Maher and Gorton closed the elevators Dec. 7. State grain inspectors have been taking inventories and checking warehouse receipts at the elevators.

Don Noah and Jay Harrison, both of Beloit, are Maher's lawyers.

"We are going to protect the producers as much as we can in our efforts in this case," Harrison told the Kansas City Star. "We don't

want to damage the financial position of farmers who have done business with these elevators."

Gorton said all 3 elevators are bonded.

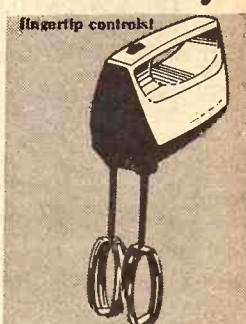

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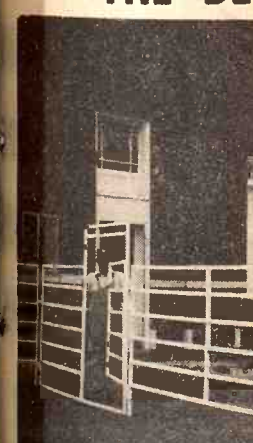

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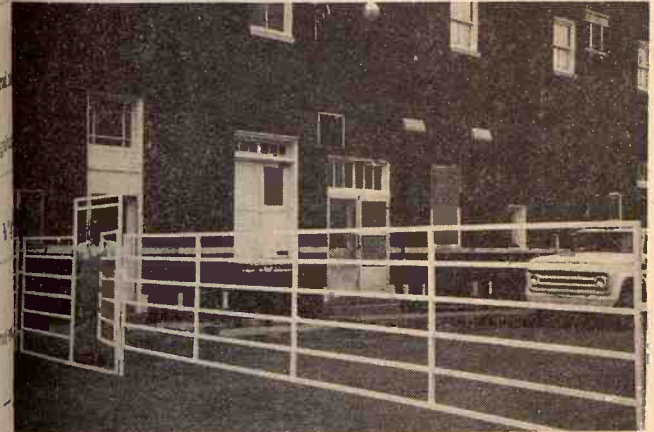

Car-Makers Ordered To Back Advertising Claims

A dozen car manufacturers have been ordered by the Federal Trade Commission to explain how they back up more than 100 advertising claims they have made for 1972 and 1973 models.

An FTC spokesman told a news conference that the commission has not accused the manufacturers of false advertising. He said the

commission will make available to the public the information which must be submitted by the manufacturers within 60 days.

It is the second time in 18 months the FTC has challenged the auto industry to back up what it says in advertising. This time the commission added five more foreign manufacturers to the list.

In three cases this year, two involving General Motors and one involving Volvo, the FTC charged the automakers with false advertising.

The 12 firms named in the orders are:

American Motors Corp., Chrysler Corp., British Leyland Motors Inc., Fiat-Roosevelt Motors Inc., Ford Motor Co., General Motors Corp., Renault Inc., Saab-Scania of America Inc., Subaru of America Inc., Toyota Motor Distributors Inc., Volkswagen of America Inc., and Volvo Inc.

Among the claims the commission ordered substantiated and documented:

—That American Motors' Gremlin is still "heavier, wider and more horsepower than any car near its price."

—In the front seat of a Volvo, "you have more room to stretch your legs than you do in a Cadillac De Ville—more rearseat leg room than a Buick Electra, and Volvo's trunk is bigger

than a Lincoln Continental's."

—"Why a \$2,000 Volkswagen costs a lot less than any other \$2,000 car."

—"Cadillac resale value is traditionally the highest of any car built in the land."

—"The majority of 50 airline pilots rated the Mercury Marquis "smoother, steadier, quieter, easier to handle, more comfortable to drive" than a \$31,000 Rolls Royce.

—"Chrysler Corp.'s 1973 big Dodge "never needs retiming in normal use."

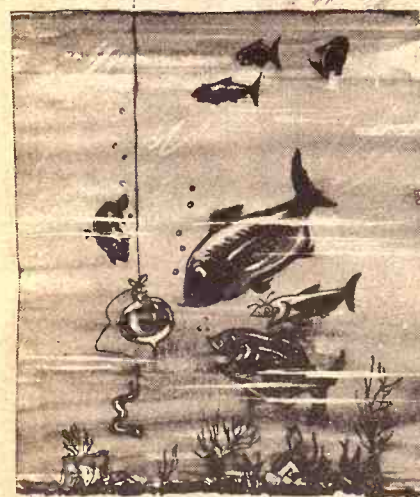

Reseal Grain for Summer, A Says

Wheat stored on farms dating back to 1968 production will be put into the market, with 1970 and 1971

Agriculture Department's "reseal" program will have to turn loose of the grain by next summer.

The department has decided not to continue the reseal program beyond 1973 loan maturity dates for grain held under extended price supports.

Wheat stored on farms dating back to 1968 production will be put into the market, with 1970 and 1971

wheat stored in commercial warehouses.

Farm-stored corn from 1969 to 1970, with 1971 warehouse-stored grain, also will have to be released.

Stores of barley, oats, grain sorghum and rye from some recent crops also will be called up at the

end of the storage year, officials said.

In an allied development, the department has tightened loan programs for financing farm grain storage and drying facilities.

Among the changes is a reduction in the loan maximum from \$35,000 to

December 19, 1972

\$25,000.

Government price support loans are not made on corn having a moisture content of more than 15.5 per cent. The wet corn stored for feeding in sealed silos often has moisture of 20 per cent or more.

Butz Talks Side Of Farm Bureau

Secretary of Agriculture Earl L. Butz says that government controls over the nation's farmers and ranchers should be sharply trimmed.

At a news conference and later before delegates to the convention of the American Farm Bureau Federation, he said Congress would be asked to approve legislation reducing government controls.

The major problem facing the Department of Agriculture is "to get new legislation that keeps the momentum going to get farmers out from under government domination," the newly re-appointed secretary said.

Such an accomplishment "will mean a continuation of cheap food," he said.

In his speech after receiving the federation's distinguished service award, Butz said: "The soundness of the Farm Bureau's position of gradually yet persistently moving government out of the center of agriculture—without hurting farm income—is more apparent than ever.

"Yet, the battle is not won. A critical legislative year lies ahead. A new Congress—more urban dominated and less oriented toward farm matters—will arrive on Capitol Hill just as our current farm legislation expires. There will be no shortage of alternatives—from tightly controlled, backward looking mandatory programs on one extreme to complete elimination of all programs on the other. Some decision will be made by this Congress."

In response to a question at the news conference, Butz said, "We think there is likelihood of continued wheat sales to the Soviet Union."

He pointed out that the Soviet Union continues to face crop shortages due in part to bad weather.
