

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Review of the 34th State FFA Convention April 29-May 1, 1962

State officers met throughout the day, Saturday, April 28, to make detailed plans and rehearse the ceremonies for the convention.

State officers, along with Virgil Lake, Kingman, J. A. Johnson, Buhler, and Marvin Castle, of the state staff, met from 1 p.m. to 6 p.m., on Sunday, April 29, to conduct individual interviews with 17 state officer candidates. This committee presented a ballot of ten candidates for state officers on Tuesday, at 1 p.m.

The convention opened with an excellent crowd present for the Vespers Service in Williams Auditorium on Sunday evening. Group singing was led by Mr. Nelson Galle. Jim Norton, of the LaCygne Chapter, presented a vocal solo. Larry Erpelding made announcements and welcoming remarks. A quartet of FFA members from the Smith Center Chapter entertained the delegates and members. "Tex" Winter, head basketball coach at Kansas State University, gave an inspiring message to those present. Coach Winter challenged FFA members to use whatever talent has been given them to the limit, and compared these talents with those of a basketball player.

The first official session of the convention opened on Monday morning, at 8:30 a.m., April 30. Gary Harmon, President of the Collegiate Chapter, greeted the delegates. The delegates were officially seated and the minutes of the 33rd State FFA Convention were read and approved. James Prewitt, National Vice-President of Kirbyville, Texas, greeted the delegates. Dr. James A. McCain delivered a welcoming address and impressed the delegates with his interest in agriculture and farm boys. Delegates were assigned to 16 different committees. and met from 10 a.m. to 12 p.m. to discuss common problems and make recommendations to the delegate body.

The second session opened at 1:30 p.m. with the Opening Ceremony. John Todhunter, of the Berryton Chapter, entertained the delegates with a ventriloquist act. Mr. Walter Pierce, President of the Kansas Farm Bureau, spoke on "The Road Ahead". Mr. Bill Cox, Public Relations Director of the Santa Fe Railroad Company, presented scholarships and other awards. The film, "Four Star Farmers 1961", was shown. Mr. Jim McGuire, Secretary of the Kansas Cooperative Council, presented the Kansas FFA Cooperative Activities awards. "Doc" Lorimor, of the Spearville Chapter entertained with a humorous reading. At 3:30, the delegates and guests heard the finals of the State FFA Public Speaking Contest. (Winners are reported in another section of this newsletter.) The second session adjourned with the Closing Ceremony.

The third session of the convention was held in the University Auditorium. The First State FFA Chorus, under the direction of Professor Morris Hayes, presented an excellent 30minute concert. One hundred and

thirty-two chapter farmers were raised to the degree of State Farmer. National Vice-President, James Prewitt, inspired those in attendance, with an address. Four supporters of FFA and vocational agriculture were initiated as Honorary State Farmers. Gary Creager, LaCygne Chapter, and winner of the State Public Speaking Contest, delivered his talk. Eight State FFA Foundation Award winners were presented \$100 checks with due ceremony. Dennis Dechert, Colby Chapter, Star Farmer of Kansas, along with six District Star Farmers, was presented as the climax of the third session. The session adjourned with the official closing ceremony.

The fourth session of the convention was held in Williams Auditorium at 8:30 a.m., May 1. Miss Joan Wilhite, Yates Center, President of the State Association of FHA, brought greetings to the delegate body. Forty-two district winners in the FFA Foundation Awards Program were introduced and presented checks for \$25 each. Eighteen chapters were named "Kansas Gold Emblem" chapters, and were presented certificates of this award. The Hillsboro Chapter presented an entertaining safety skit. Mr. Jim Gibson, representing the Peace Corps, of Washington D. C., talked to the delegates on activities and opportunities in the Peace Corps. A large portion of this session was used for committee reports and conducting the business of the association.

The fifth and last session opened at l p.m., on May l, and the election of state officers was conducted. Mr. Charles Manke, of the Union Pacific Railroad Company, presented 19 scholarship awards to graduating seniors. Mr. Perry Miller, Manager, Kansas Rural Electric Cooperatives, presented a \$100 scholarship to Rick Waldren, of the Greeley County Chapter, and winner of the Farm. Electrification Award. Dick Duling, Eskridge Chapter, and Doc Lorimor, entertained the afternoon session. The 1962-63 State FFA Officers were announced and initiated. The 34th State FFA Convention was adjourned at 3 p.m.

Dr. Charles Norton, Chairman of the College Contest Committee, announced the results of the various contests. Manhattan Chamber of Commerce presented appropriate trophies.

## 1962 CHAPTER AWARDS

The Kansas Association continued to use the State Gold Emblem, the Superior, and the Standard Chapter awards in recognizing the merit of chapter programs.

The Kansas Gold Emblem chapters were selected from the chapters that ranked in the Superior Division of the National Chapter Awards Program. Each Superior Chapter will be awarded a plaque or a plastic classification plate for attaching to their plaque. Standard chapters which received the Superior rating last year will receive a "Standard" plastic plate to be attached to their plaque. Kansas Gold Emblem chapters were also awarded certificates.

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

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# NATIONAL FFA CONVENTION TALENT NEEDED

The following are quotes from a letter from National Executive Secretary, William Paul Gray: -

FFA talent will play an important part in this year's national convention program. Present plans call for talent shows to be presented on Wednesday evening, and just prior to the closing session on Friday. In addition, talent will be used during the regular convention sessions and at special banquets or other activities such as service club meetings.

We solicit your aid in providing outstanding FFA talent for the convention.

The following rules and regulations will govern talent participation:

# I. Selection of Talent

- (1) Each State will be limited to two entertainment acts. The nature of these acts to be left to the discretion of the State association. (vocal or musical solos, quartets, small instrumental groups, comedians, novelty acts, master of ceremonies).
- (2) The manner in which the acts are selected at the State level will be the responsibility of the State association.
- (3) All entertainers and acts will be auditioned in Room 400 of the Auditorium from 1:00 -6:00 p.m. and from 8:30 -10:00 p.m. on Tuesday, October 9, 1962. Vern Freeh, Director of Talent and his assistants will select the acts which will appear on the various talent shows as a result of these auditions. No acts or entertainers will perform unless they have first been auditioned.

# II. Submitting Talent Entries

- State associations are to submit an entry blank for each individual or group entertainment act to the National Office on or before August 30, 1962.
- (2) Because of the time required for auditions and rehearsals, FFA members who are participating as talent should not have other specific responsibilities at the convention, such as being a delegate, member of a

judging team, etc.

## III. Recognition and Reimbursement

- (1) FFA members who are selected by State associations to participate in convention talent programs will be reimbursed for a portion of their expenses if they take part in the auditions, and are chosen to perform at the convention. Reimbursement will be in the nature of travel funds which will be paid to the individual performers at the convention. Funds will be allocated proportionately based on a system of four zones determined by the distance of State capitals to Kansas City. This is outlined in FFA Foundation Bulletin No. 2 - page 11.
- (2) FFA members who are selected to participate in the National Convention on the basis of auditions at Kansas City, will receive an attractive "talent pin" to signify that they have performed at the National Convention.
- (3) A group picture will be taken of all performers. One print will be presented to each performer and the directors.

NOTE: If any chapter desires to submit an entry in the talent program they should request the forms from the State FFA Office in Topeka immediately.-JWL

A livestock grading school for vocational agriculture students was held in the Kansas City Livestock Sales Pavilion on March 28. The school was arranged by Mr. Jim Leathers of the Kansas City Livestock Companies, and the major packing plants cooperated in furnishing the animals for grading demonstrations and practice. The noon lunch was provided by the Kansas City Livestock Yards. Classes were conducted in grading market cattle, feeder and stocker cattle, market hogs, and fat and feeder classes of lambs. We are now approaching the time of the year when incoming 9th graders will be selecting their courses for the 1962-63 school year or probably for their entire school career. If one of these boys were talking with you and you were a Senior vo-ag student, what benefits or values would you tell him you had received? What you say will probably weigh heavily on his decision. You know he will be looking to you as an enthusiastic and satisfied customer.

Would you tell him that your ultimate objective was to become established in farming and that vocational agriculture was a definite help to you in getting a "toe hold" in farming?

That your farming program provided you with an opportunity to accumulate some livestock, some equipment, and a balanced experience which you consider invaluable in managing these assets as you progress in farming?

Maybe you will give emphasis to the increased attitude you develop toward being responsible. You know it is different when you are preparing for a sow to farrow in which you have \$75 invested and which has already consumed \$30 worth of feed. To operate a \$4000 tractor in which you have a substantial partnership, or maybe a full owner, is different from driving the other fellow's tractor.

It may be that your emphasis will be in the direction of operative skills you acquired and the opportunity you had in developing leadership ability. Many boys have said that the experiences gained through participating in parliamentary procedure, public speaking, and serving as a delegate to the state and national conventions have been the high spot in their entire vocational agriculture career.

For those not particularly interested in farming, but in a career in agriculture, your vo-ag experience can be an invaluable experience. It will give you a better understanding and appreciate of life on the farm and its relationship to those with whom you will be working. Employers in related industires have definitely given expression to the value of a vo-ag experience when those not desiring to farm are seeking an opportunity in a related career.

Yes, these are some of the benefits a satisfied senior would express to a prospective 9th grader? What do you as a teacher have to add?
