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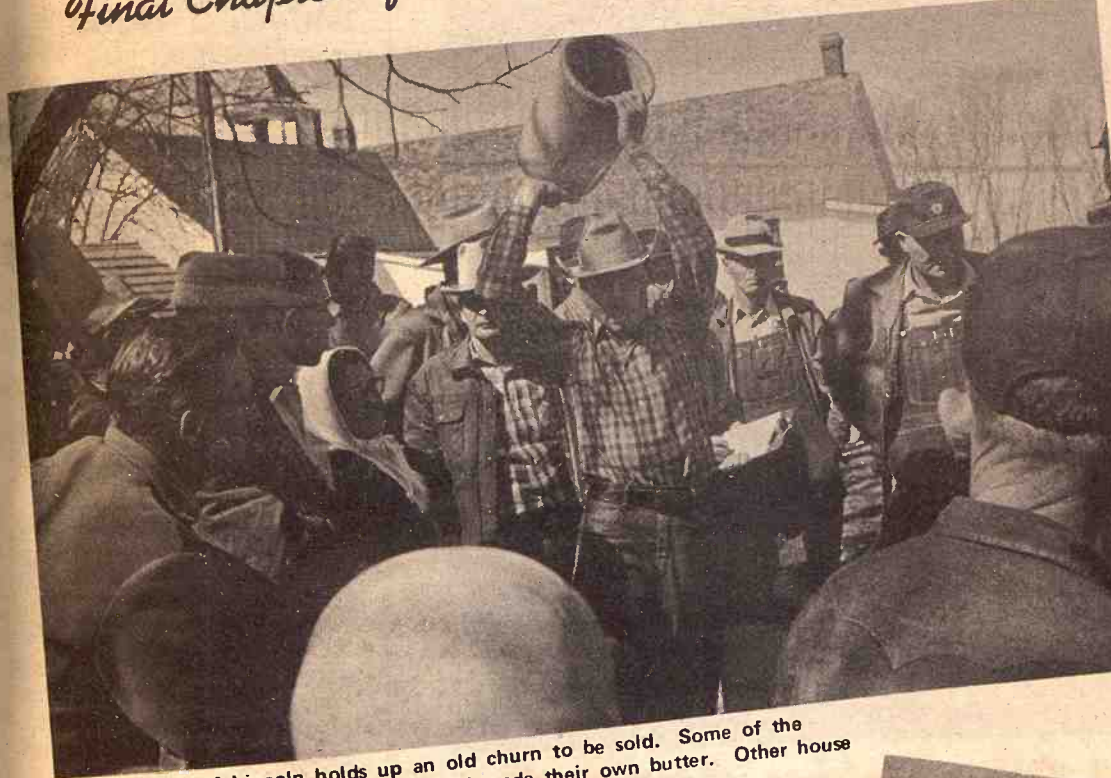

A large crowd turned out for the sale of furnishings and equipment of the Lutheran parochial school south of Lincoln March 18. A good percentage of the people were former students of this country school which was in operation for 85 years. The school building, the teacher's house, garage and other out buildings, and five acres of ground were purchased by Mr. George Panzer who was a former student here also.

The auctioneers cry, "Sold", wrote the final chapter in the life of St. John's Lutheran School, south of Lincoln. This country school was closed last May after serving the youth of the congregation and community for 85 years. Some three generations had attended the school. Many graduates have gone into professional work of the church and others have attained enviable records of achievement in the professional and business world. Enrollment peak was reached during the year 1907-08 when 92 pupils were taught in one room.

It is interesting to note that the teacher hired for the year of 1889, received a wage of \$300 for the year. The salary in 1903 was raised to \$400 plus free feed for two horses and two cows if so desired. Later the congregation bought this teacher a new buggy and new harness.

A complete division into grades was accomplished in 1919 making it a two-teacher school and also making it necessary to build more room. A new wing was added in 1920. The property consisting of the school building, teacher's home, garage, etc., with five acres of ground was purchased by a member of St. John's congregation, Mr. George Panzer.

Some of the congregations grade-schoolers are now being bussed to the Bethlehem Lutheran School in Sylvan Grove.

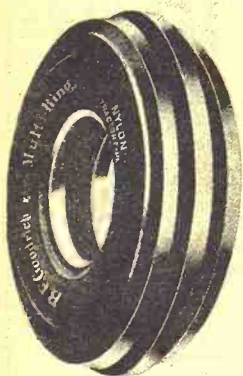

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**Herington City
Plans In New
Mayor's Outline**

HERINGTON — Mayor Rich-
ard Hager, who was sworn in
last week, said he intends to
have his reform plans well out-
lined in two weeks to a month.

Hager, a Herington insurance
man, said he prefers for the mo-
ment to keep his plans silent.

Hager was elected on a re-
form ticket. He defeated a lo-
cal veterinarian, Dr. William
Elliott, by 98 votes in general
elections, which saw most of the
town's 1,640 eligible voter go to
the polls.

Mayor Hager confirmed that
his first official act will be to
ask for the resignation of Po-
lice Chief William Iams, 65,
who recently was sued for false
arrest and for discharging a po-
liceman without cause. Hager
also said he will implement a
new bookkeeping system in city
hall.

Hager succeeds former Mayor
John Nagely, who did not seek
re-election. Another commis-
sioner in the old administration,
Donald O'Connor, resigned last
February. A Herington High
School chemistry teacher, Paul
Diabal was appointed to fill out
O'Connor's unexpired term.

Thus, the only carryover com-
missioner is C. F. (Red) Thomp-
son, an engineer for Rock Is-
land Lines. He was elected to
city hall on a reform platform
last spring with the promise
of probing alleged irregularities
in operation of the utilities de-
partment.

It was at Thompson's urging
that the city examined its books
and discovered alleged tamper-
ing with utility meters by city
employees. This prompted a
grand jury investigation which
so far has resulted in 10 indict-
ments against present and form-
er city employees.

During the grand jury inves-
tigation, Nagely tried to get
Thompson to resign. Thompson
refused.

Shift Again To Long-Term Land Diversion?

DES MOINES — A change in the method of taking "excess" farm land out of production has been hinted at by a high federal official.

Carroll Brunthaver, deputy administrator of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service, told a meeting of the National Corn Growers As-

sociation here that President Nixon is giving serious consideration to a long-range land retirement program.

"We believe that more land diversion for each tax dollar can be bought through a long-range diversion program, rather than through the short-term, annual programs that have been

in use for the last few years," he said.

He said agriculture secretary Clifford M. Hardin also leans toward a shift to long-range diversion plans, but he said Hardin will consider the matter carefully before ordering any changes.

Brunthaver said the federal

government expects about 57 million acres of land to be left idle this year, including about 40 million acres of land normally planted to feed grain.

Beet Growers Get Second Payment On '68 Crop

GOODLAND — Sugar beet growers in the Goodland area will receive their second payment for the 1968 crop April 18.

In the Colorado and Kansas Great Western Sugar factory districts, the April 18 payment will average \$1.32 per ton, making to-date total returns \$13.51 per ton.

Final payment for the 1968 crop will be made in October.

Under the terms of the beet purchase agreement, the grower's total return for his crop is tied to the net price to be received by the company from the sale of sugar in the marketing year to end September 30.

Meanwhile, some Goodland beet growers have already started hiring for the 1969 crop.

Most of the employees, who do weeding and thinning in the fields, are Spanish-American migrant workers.

From June 10-July 10, the peak work time, approximately 2700 persons will be employed to work in the fields, according to Francis Bishop of the state employment office at Goodland.

Bishop said the workers will be paid \$16 an acre the first time a field is gone over and \$9 an acre the second time. The pay scale varies somewhat with the condition of the fields.

Most of the workers live in housing provided by the growers.

Great Western Sugar, which has a factory at Goodland, recruits workers, growers and the employment office recruit field hands and some migrants come in and find their own jobs.

Last year, some 50 high school students worked in the fields, too. The students were employed through a program developed by the Goodland employment service.

Even more students may be employed this year, because growers have planted more beets than ever before.

No Signs Of World Wheat Price Firming

There weren't any signs from the major wheat-producing members of the International Grains Agreement, who wound up their latest round of discussions recently, that world wheat sales below the IGA's minimum prices will end any time soon.

After their meeting at the Agriculture Department, the participants — Canada, Australia, Argentina, the European Common Market (represented by France) and the U.S. — issued an optimistic-sounding communique declaring that the meetings "positive and constructive results" will be reported to the IGA's Price Review Committee in London.

A U.S. source, however, was more frank. He termed the talks unfruitful and said the current difficulties are likely to be cured only by a reduction in the abundant world wheat supply that seems to be in the offing.

The IGA is designed to provide orderly markets for wheat producing and buying nations through established price floors and ceilings. Since the arrangement became effective last July 1, however, a world wheat glut has placed far greater strain on the price floors than the arrangement's authors envisioned.

The weakness of the price floors began to show up last fall and was discussed at a December meeting of the five producers in Australia; the results of that conference also were referred to the Price Review Committee, without firm action so far. Then Canada, generally acknowledged as the most meticulous observer of IGA prices, announced last month that it will meet world competition at whatever prices necessary.

The chief problem is that IGA floors fail to deal with a large number of price variations that can arise from wheat quality and other differentials.

One U.S. official who has worked closely with these problems says, for example, that wet weather at harvest time has made current stocks of a standard Canadian wheat, Manitoba No. 3 northern, "an entirely different product from the one IGA planners had in mind when they established allowable prices for it. Another unanticipated development is the current 10% discounting of French currency in world money markets, which represents "an automatic 10% discount on official wheat prices," the official says.

Meantime, U.S. exporters are selling below the agreed minimums and Government subsidies are helping them, Agriculture Department officials acknowledge.



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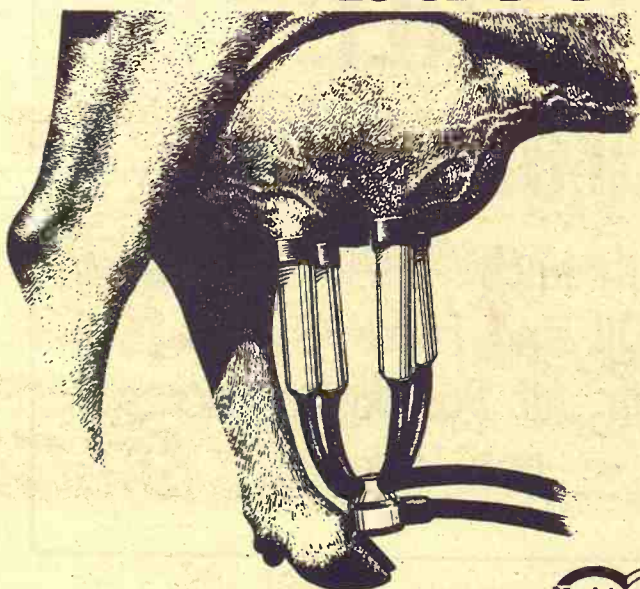

2 eggs, separated
1 1/2 cups sugar
1 1/4 cups sifted cake flour
3/4 teaspoon soda
3/4 teaspoon salt
1/3 cup Wesson oil
1 cup buttermilk
2 squares unsweetened chocolate (2-ounce) melted

Heat oven to 350 degrees. Grease generously and dust with flour: 2 round pans or 1 oblong pan 13x9 1/2 x2 inches. Beat egg whites until frothy. Gradually beat in 1/2 cup sugar. Continue beating until very stiff & glossy. In another bowl, sift remaining sugar, flour, soda, salt. Add oil, half of buttermilk. Beat 1 minute, medium speed on mixer, or 150 vigorous strokes by hand. Scrape sides and bottom of bowl constantly. Add remaining buttermilk, egg yolks, chocolate. Beat 1 more minute, scraping bowl constantly. Fold in meringue. Pour into prepared pans. Bake layers 30-35 minutes; oblong 40-45 minutes.

Mrs. J. E. Schwalm, Alma, sent the next recipe and describes it as an "easy dessert. Serve it with whipped cream, ice cream or a sauce."

APPLE COBBLER

2 cups sugar
1/2 cup shortening
2 eggs, beaten until light and fluffy
2 cups flour
2 teaspoons soda
1/4 teaspoon cinnamon
1/4 teaspoon nutmeg
1/4 teaspoon salt

Cream sugar and shortening. Add eggs to creamed mixture. Sift dry ingredients together, then add flour mixture to first mixture. Have 4 cups chopped apples and 1/2 cup nuts. Add nuts and apples to the batter. Put into large, flat pan. Bake in 350 degree oven about 40 minutes.

Mrs. Larry Elgin, Burlington: "Here is one of our favorite recipes. This cake is so easy to make and keeps well, too. I'd like to share it with the Grass & Grain cooks."

SHEATH CAKE

2 cups sugar
1 cup water

4 tablespoons cocoa
2 eggs
Dash salt
2 cups sifted flour
2 sticks oleo
1/2 cup buttermilk
1 teaspoon soda

Put sugar and flour in large bowl. Bring water, oleo and cocoa to a boil and pour over sugar and flour. Mix well. Mix buttermilk, eggs and soda. Mix in to first mixture. Pour into a large greased pan (12x18-inch) or two 9x13-inch pans. Bake at 375 degrees for 20 minutes. When cake has baked five minutes, mix and get icing ready:

ICING

Bring to a boil, 6 tablespoons milk, 1 stick oleo, 4 tablespoons cocoa and add 1 box powdered sugar, 1 teaspoon vanilla and 1 cup chopped pecans. Put on cake as soon as it comes out of the oven. "I use two 9x13 pans and freeze one if am not ready to use."

Mrs. W. J. Kerwitz, R1, Alma: "This is quick and easy to make and is good. Do not over-bake for a good moist cake."

CHOCOLATE CAKE

2 cups sugar
1/2 cup shortening
2 eggs
2 cups flour
4 tablespoons cocoa
Salt
Vanilla
3/4 cup cup buttermilk
2 teaspoons soda
1 cup boiling water (or coffee — "I prefer coffee")
Mix shortening, sugar, eggs and cocoa. Mix buttermilk and soda and add to first mixture. Add flour, salt and vanilla. Last add boiling water or coffee. Bake in greased and floured cake pan, 9x13 inches, 35 minutes at 350 degrees.

As in the past, G&G area cooks have responded very well in answer to a request for a recipe. The Fudge Cake recipe from the Hershey's cocoa can that calls for regular flour appears below:

FUDGE CAKE

2 1/4 cups sifted flour
1 teaspoon soda
1 teaspoon baking powder
1/2 teaspoon salt

1/2 cup shortening
1 1/2 cups sugar
1 teaspoon vanilla
2 eggs
1 cup sour milk
1/2 cup hot water
1/2 cup Hershey's cocoa

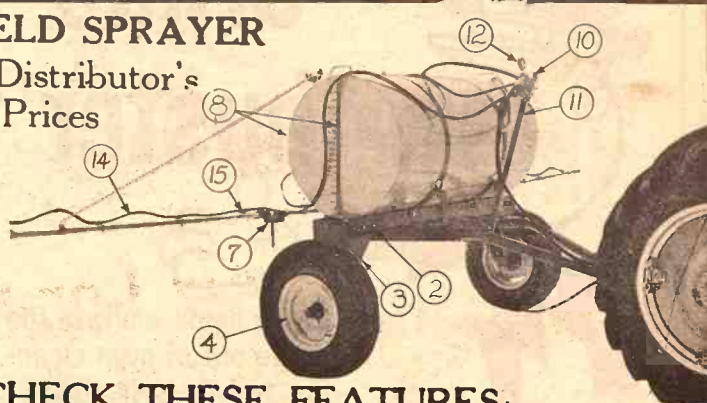
Preheat oven to 350 degrees. F. Grease well and dust with flour either three 8" or two 9" layer cake pans. Sift together the flour, soda, baking powder, and salt; set aside. Cream shortening; add sugar gradually, beating thoroughly after each addition. Add vanilla, then well-beaten eggs; beat until light and fluffy. Beat in flour mixture alternately with sour milk. Mix cocoa and hot water to form a

smooth paste; beat into batter. Pour into prepared pans and bake for 30-35 minutes. Cool; spread with any chocolate frosting.

Mrs. Vernon Kinsey, R 2, Olpe, included a frosting for the Hershey's Fudge Cake which many of you will want to try: **FLUFFY COCOA FROSTING**
3/4 cup Hershey's cocoa
4 cups confectioners sugar
1/2 cup butter or margarine
1 teaspoon vanilla
1/2 cup evaporated milk
Mix sugar and cocoa. Cream part of the sugar-cocoa mixture with the butter. Blend in vani-

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la and half of the milk. Add remaining sugar-cocoa mixture and blend well. Add remaining milk and beat to desired spreading consistency; additional milk may be added if required. Yields filling and frosting for two 9-inch layers.

Bark Mulch Will Give Beauty; Lower Maintenance

Spring is the season which brings more beauty to the exterior of the home than any other — and more maintenance, too! The efforts of the gardener must be redoubled in order to achieve his continuing goal: To provide a maximum decorative effect with minimum

amount of upkeep.

Mulches are an increasingly popular way to provide an attractive, low-maintenance garden and probably the best mulches are those produced from the bark of the Pacific Northwest Douglas Fir. This bark, a clean weed-free and firm material, forms a beautiful mulch which not only discourages the growth of weeds, but helps hold moisture in the soil and provide a rich, red-brown setting for flowers, shrubs and trees.

Bark does not "cake" on the soil during extremely hot, dry periods as do softer materials such as peat moss. It's ideal, therefore, for forming a neat border along fences and walls where temperatures tend to be high. Because the bark from the stately Douglas Fir consists of large uniform particles, it will not blow away as will lighter mulches such as sawdust or husks. This same feature makes it one of the longest-lasting mulches tested. A life-expectancy of more than five years is common — then it gradually becomes a soil-enriching humus.

Unlike purely decorative ground covers such as pebbles and crushed brick, bark combines the beauty and color of these decorative covers with the weed-discouraging and water-conserving virtues of a long-lasting mulch.

The bark mulch is available in 50-pound plastic bags in many garden centers, department stores and hardware stores.

Chunk Coffee

Watch for the new form of coffee. Chunk style instant coffee will join the familiar powdered coffee.

Processors decided to omit the final powdering step because the coffee dissolves easily. If shoppers like it and accept it, you'll see more brands of coffee in chunk style.

You'll see premeasured coffee. It's compressed into rings that just fit the basket on a standard percolator. It would only work if you want to make a pot full of coffee. If you just want to make a cup or two, you may still need to measure your own.

Carpet Muffles Noise

Carpeting in the kitchen muffles noise and saves breakage of dishes. You aren't as likely to skid as on a highly waxed floor and baby crawling around will be warmer. This carpeting can also be bought in tiles, which is a saving because you don't pay for wasted carpet and they can be reshuffled to regulate even wear. You can install them with double-face tape.

Freeze Casseroles

Casserole dishes are wonderful to freeze ahead and use when you are rushed. If you don't have enough dishes in which to store your casseroles, line your casserole dish with enough aluminum foil to wrap completely around the food. Freeze solid and simply remove the foil-wrapped contents. When ready to use, return to original dish and heat. Remember to label your frozen dishes.

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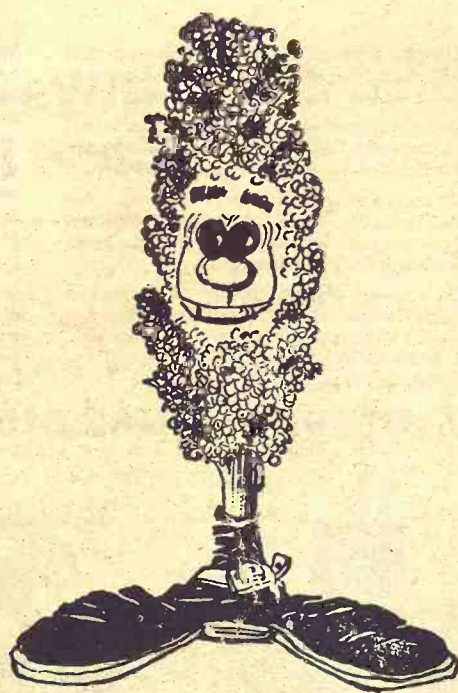

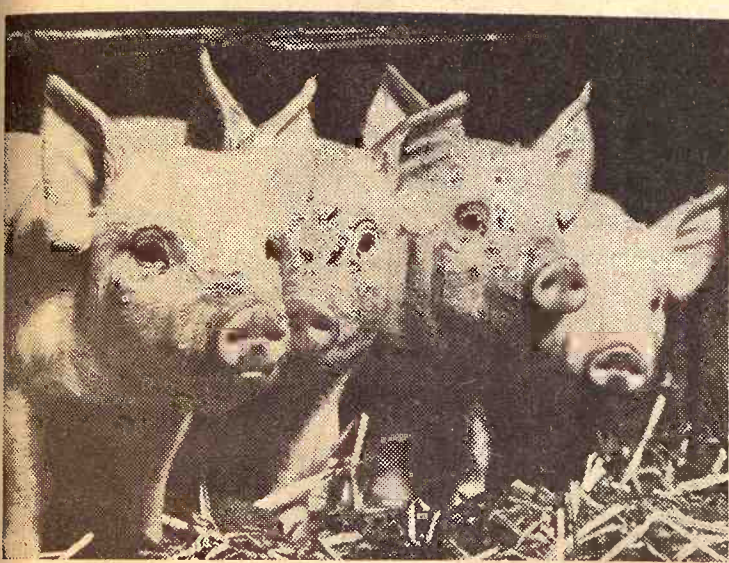

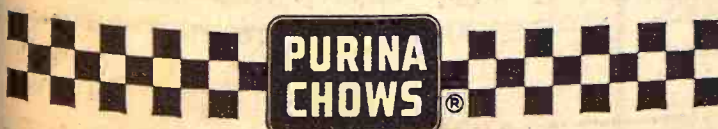

Old Baskets, Pottery, Churns, Make Fine Decorative Items

A tisket, A tasket, an old tired basket. If you're spring cleaning and have unearthed some old and odd baskets, don't throw them away. Restore them by first washing with a pine cleaner solution. Then rinse and air dry the baskets and they will be ready for flowers, fruit, bread or collector's items. Paint the baskets if you like, but the scrubbed, unfinished look is popular, too.

Old stone crocks, sipping jugs and other pottery items are decorative and can be practical, too. They can hold pussy willows, flowers or greenery, serve as planters, doorstep ornaments, or, when large enough, as umbrella holders.

The old butter churn can be used to good advantage. The body makes an unusual umbrella holder. The churning unit itself holds a bottle of wine in smart fashion. If you fall heir to an old butter churn, wash it first in a pine cleaner solution. Starting clean, you'll be

better able to see what the next steps will be. If there is a heavy old finish, use turpentine and No. 3 steel wool. Then sand smoothly with the grain of the wood, wipe off the dust and smooth with fine steel wool. Finish off with a turpentine-moist cloth.

Corn Prices Up To Expectation

Corn prices are about in line with earlier expectations. Recent quotations have been 2 to 5 cents above the price-support level, which is \$1.05 a bushel on a national average.

Farmers have put all excess corn — and more, too — under price support loans. It appears

that prices will have to move up enough to cause many farmers to pay off their loans and sell their corn. The price advance seems likely to be 5 to 10 cents a bushel.

More corn tied up. On March 1 of this year, the amount of corn under price support was

about 1065 million bushels. This total included 258 million in uncommitted CCC stocks, 447 million bushels of old corn under resale programs, and 360 million bushels of new (1968) corn under loan.

Some additional corn has March 1. The total of new corn been placed under loan since put under loan may reach 425 million bushels. That would bring the total amount of corn tied up under supports to around 1,120 million bushels.

Corn must be redeemed. Some of this corn will be needed for domestic use, some for exports and pipeline supplies. Such needs seem likely to total 150 to 200 million bushels. Thus, market prices may have to go high enough to cause farmers to pay off the loans on a third to a half of the 1968 crop placed under support. If prices should go 10 to 15 cents above the loan level, farmers would probably redeem that much corn.

Supply uncertain. Figures concerning the supply of corn now on hand are not very good. The usual survey of supplies on hand January 1 was not made this year. The latest official estimates that have been published are for October 1 of last year. At that time, the carryover of old corn was estimated at 1146 million bushels — up 39 percent from the 823 million carried over in 1967. The new crop was estimated at 4375 million bushels — 8 percent less than the 4760 million bushels produced in 1967. Hence, the total supply for the present marketing year was 5521 million bushels. This was 1 percent less than for the preceding marketing year.

While the total supply of corn is about the same as a year ago, more is tied up under price support, reducing the amount in "free" supply. As we have indicated before, this amount is not sufficient to meet expected needs.

Exports slow. The export demand for corn has been slow this year. Exports (plus in-

spections for export) October 1 to March 15 totaled 302 million bushels — down 35 percent from a year earlier. Most of the shortage developed before the dock strike. Europe, our best customer for corn, doesn't need as much U.S. corn as it purchased last year.

The domestic use of corn is probably a little greater than last year. Farmers are producing more pork, beef, and chickens — but not as much milk and eggs. Supplies of other feed grains were a little larger for this marketing year than for the preceding one.

New crop prospects. The USDA survey and report of prospective plantings indicates that farmers intended to plant about the same acreage of corn this year as in 1968. The figure listed for 1969 was 64.4 million acres — half a percent less than in 1968. In each of the past two years, U.S. average yields were 78 bushels per acre. Over the past 10 years, yields have increased about 3 bushels per acre per year. With a normal weather pattern this summer, the U.S. average corn yield should be 80 to 84 bushels an acre.

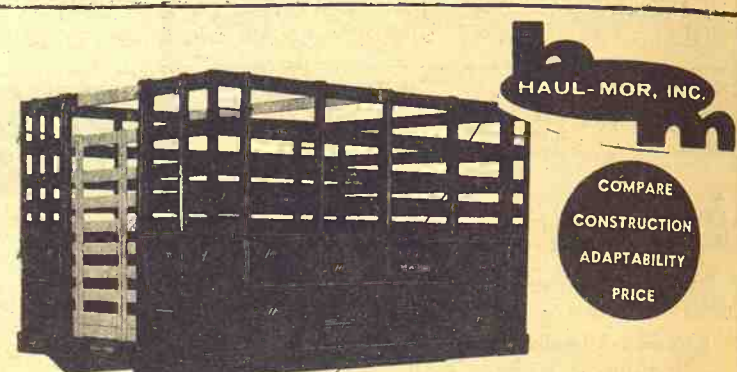

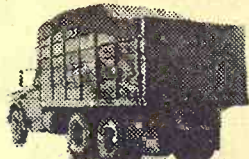

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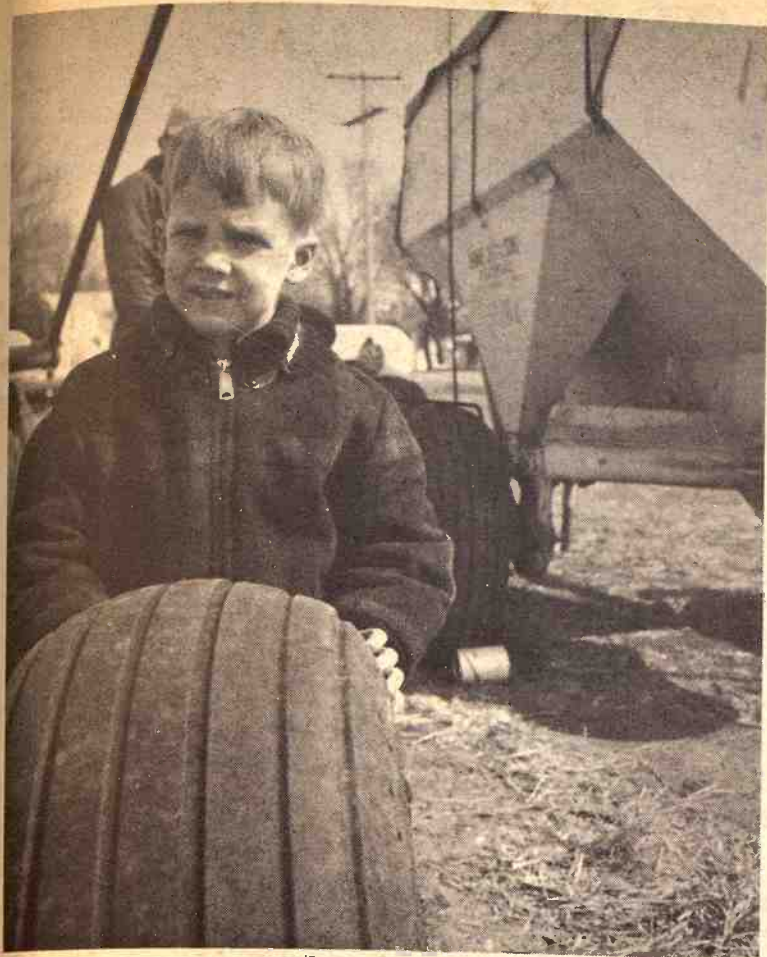

Dairymen Hesitate Over Another Big Merger

Enthusiastic over accomplishments of their big co-op, members of Mid-America Dairymen, Inc., meeting at Kansas City last week indicated caution about mergers which would make them part of an even larger organization.

The session was called the first annual meeting of the dairy co-op. The co-op has been in existence only about nine months.

Mid-America was formed officially July 1, 1968, when five smaller co-ops joined together.

They included Mid-America Dairymen of Kansas City; Sanitary Milk Producers of St. Louis; Producers Creamery company of Springfield, Mo.; Square Deal Milk Producers of Highland, Ill., and Producers Creamery company of Chillicothe, Mo.

Since then the group has been joined by the Harrison County, Missouri, Milk Producers association, Bethany; the St. Joseph, Mo., Milk Producers association, and Sunflower Dairies, Inc., Valley Falls, Kans.

Now under consideration is the formation of a huge co-operative that would include regional groups such as Mid-America Dairymen, Inc., from Minnesota and Wisconsin down through Texas. There would be 16 of these co-operatives in the new organization and it would be called American Milk Producers, Inc., and would represent 43,000 dairy farmers.

Already an organizational meeting has been held — March 28 and 29 in Brownsville, Tex. — and temporary officers elected. Selected temporary president of the new co-op was William A. Powell, Princeton, Mo., who is the president of Mid-America Dairymen, Inc.

Powell explained the plans and purposes of the giant co-op, but added that the directors of Mid-America would make a very careful study before deciding whether to join up.

"It is too big a step to be taken hurriedly," he said.

Mid-America Dairymen, Inc., has been in existence during a period of rising milk prices and takes some credit for the boosts in this area. The directors re-

ported yesterday that from July 1 to December 31 last year, the co-op had sales of \$107,900,000, and member dairymen delivered 1,700,000,000 pounds of milk and received in payment \$87,200,000. The co-op is the marketing agency for milk sold to processors and bottlers.

In resolutions adopted, the co-op urged the secretary of agriculture to support prices on dairy products at not less than 90 percent of parity, asked for continued support of the government's special milk program in which milk is distributed in schools, and recommended enactment of legislation to limit the amount of farming losses which individuals or corporations can use to offset nonfarm income for federal income tax purposes.

H. L. Forest, director of the dairy division of the U.S. Department of Agriculture, warned the 600 dairy farmers and their representatives at the meeting that bigness alone isn't going to accomplish the goals they seek. He urged them to be realistic about some of the problems they face.

Forest said there was a great potential for the production of grade A milk among farmers who now are producing and selling grade B milk for manufacturing purposes. Because of the higher prices paid for the grade A product, he predicted a rapid conversion of farmers to the higher grade basis. Farmers producing for the grade A market must follow stricter sanitation practices. How to handle the additional grade A milk is going to be the problem for the co-ops, Forest said.

Forest was followed by Jim Reeves, treasurer of Twin City Milk Producers, St. Paul, who also spoke of the trend to grade A production.

Minnesota and Wisconsin are the areas of great dairy production, Reeves said. Eventually, these states will be producing "an ocean of grade A milk," he added. Some way is going to have to be found to give a better price to other dairy products in relation to the price paid on the bottled product, Reeves said.

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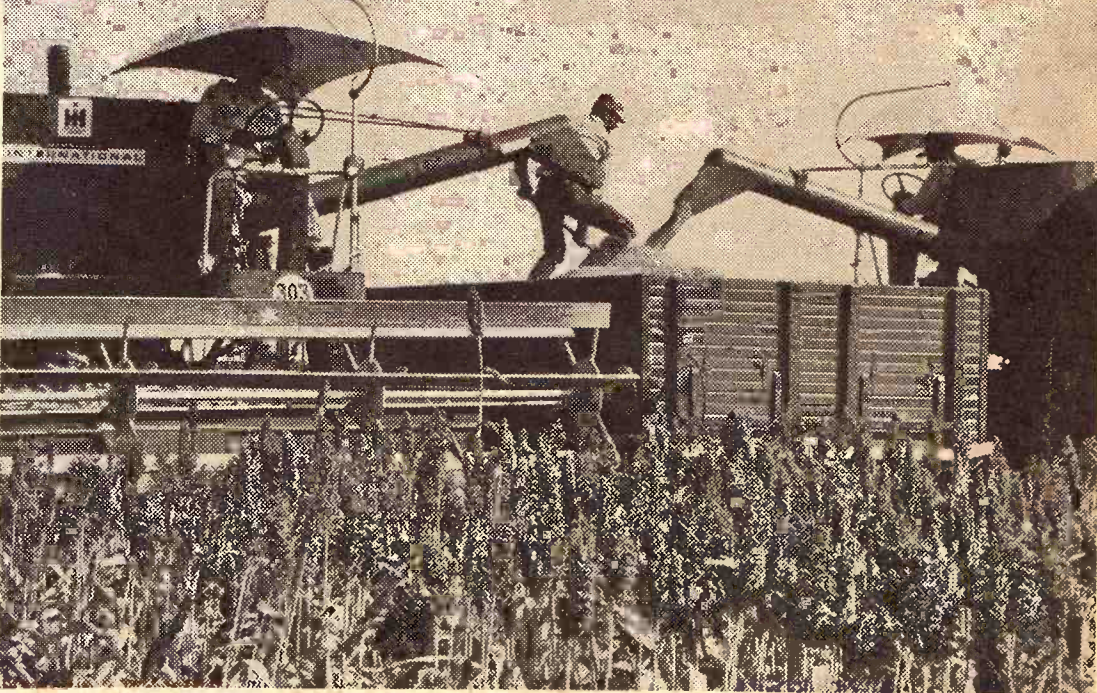

Here's Annual Flint Hills Leasing Report

Bluestem pastures in the Flint Hills of Kansas show exceptionally good early grass prospects with lease rates setting new record highs this year, according to the Kansas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service.

The April 1 condition was at 95 per cent of normal, up 5 percentage points from a year ago and the best in 7 years.

Native grass prospects were good over virtually all of the 14-county Bluestem area. Moisture has been plentiful and as the weather warms up grass is getting off to a good start.

Only 88 percent of available grassland was leased by April 1, 5 percent less than at the same time last year and the smallest percentage in 5 years.

Leasing rates for steers and heifers under 700 pounds averaged \$25.20 per head for the season compared with \$24.70 in 1968. The bulk of these rates fell in the \$20 to \$30 price range.

Lease rates for steers and heifers over 700 pounds averaged \$29.00 per head compared with \$28.60 a year ago. Most of these fell within a range from \$25 to \$35.

For cows with fall calves lease prices averaged \$42.90 compared with \$41.80 a year earlier, while for cows with spring calves the lease price averaged \$38.80 compared with \$37.40 in 1968.

The lease price for all cow-calf combinations averaged \$40.30 compared with \$39.00 last year. The bulk of this year's cow-calf leasing prices were in the \$35 to \$45 range.

The acreage guaranteed per head in connection with leasing arrangements for the 1969 season was in line with the previous year.

For steers and heifers under 700 pounds the average number of guaranteed grass acres per head was 4.0 acres, the same as a year earlier.

Grass acres guaranteed per head for steers and heifers over 700 pounds were 4.8 acres compared with 5.0 acres last year.

The number of acres per head for all cows with calves was 6.7 acres, slightly above the 6.6 acres last year.

The leasing price for pasture by the acre for the season averaged \$6.00 compared with \$5.90 a year ago.

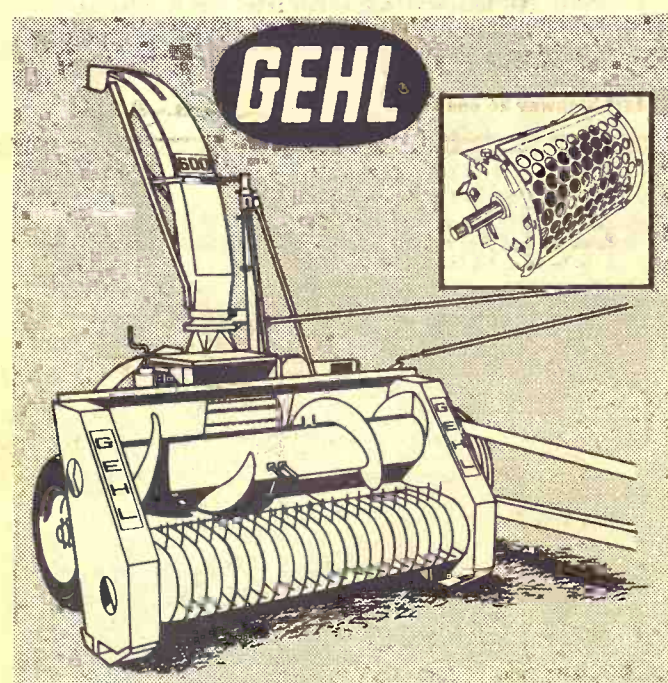

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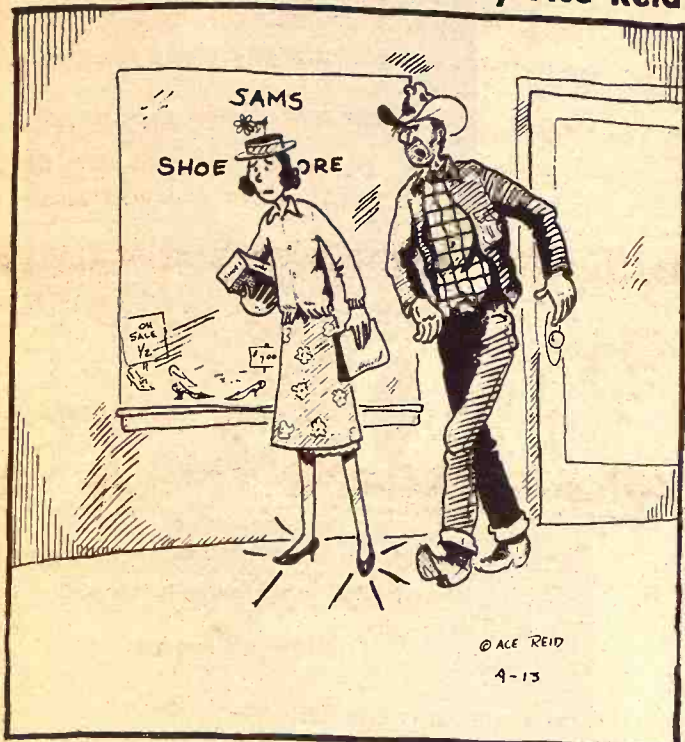

Census Bureau Predicts New Population Shifts In U. S.

Wichita will lose 2,000 people in the next six years, if predictions of the U.S. Census Bureau hold true.

The predictions, recently released by the bureau, list this city as one of the victims of a national population shift from cities to suburbs.

Wichita, along with several other urban centers serving farm areas, is expected to decline in population .6 of one per cent, the bureau says, from 350,000 persons in 1965 to about 348,000 in 1975.

But Topeka is expected to grow by 6 per cent to a 1975 population of 158,000, while Metropolitan Kansas City should boom with a 7.5 increase from 1,116,000 in 1965 to 1.2 million in 1975.

Missouri's other two large cities — St. Louis and Springfield — are expected to hold their own through 1975.

St. Louis, along with Detroit, Cleveland, Cincinnati, Buffalo and Pittsburgh, are expected to lose people by migration, although population figures will continue a slight increase from natural growth.

In the same predicament as Wichita are Sioux City and Des Moines, Iowa, and Spokane, Wash. They, too, face a predicted drop in population.

Nationwide, urban areas in the south and west are expected to get more people with the small or medium-sized cities growing the fastest. Cities in the north and east are expected to lose more people to less industrialized areas.

New York, Philadelphia and Chicago will continue to attract more people but only slightly.

St. Louis will grow by 7.2

per cent to 2,356,000 people in 1975.

Springfield, meanwhile, will enjoy an increase in population of 17.1 per cent from 140,000 in 1965 to 164,000 in 1975, the Census Bureau says.

The Census Bureau estimates show the 10 fastest growing urban areas through 1975 to be:

Fort Lauderdale, Hollywood, Fla.; Santa Barbara, Calif.; San Jose, Calif.; Huntsville, Ala.; Las Vegas, Nev.; San Bernardino-Riverside, Ontario, Calif.; WeWst Palm Beach, Fla.; Phoenix, Ariz.; Sacramento, Calif.; and Orlando, Fla., respectively.

The two companies and dozens of other makers of household products distribute the cents-off coupons each year

through newspapers, magazines, and those mailings addressed to "occupant," and one estimate is that over a half billion a year are redeemed. The coupons are designed to attract consumers to a new product, or give a fillip to a continuing marketing campaign.

Both Procter & Gamble and Lever, a member of the Unilever group, said they were making the increase in recognition of the higher costs incurred by stores in handling the cents-off coupons. These higher costs, the companies said, were detailed in a study conducted by Arthur Anderson Co., a marketing research group, for a number of food-industry organizations.

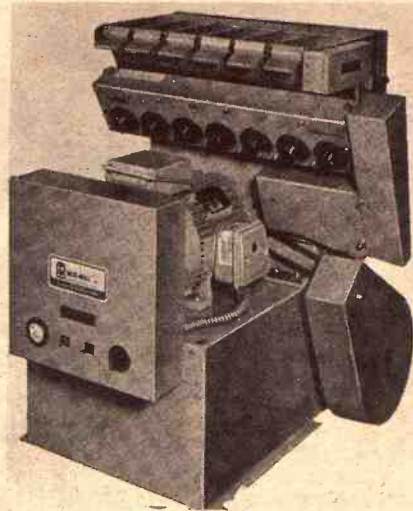

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What To Do In Tornado Season

WASHINGTON, D.C. — Someday soon, you may have to protect your family from a tornado.

Will you know what to do?

The deadly twisters are most likely to strike on spring afternoons, between 4 and 6 p.m. the full responsibility for your family's safety could be yours alone.

DON'T MAKE the mistake of thinking it can't happen here. Although tornadoes are most common in the continental plains of the United States, they can — and do — occur in every state and at any hour of the day or night.

According to the U.S. Department of Commerce, the tornado is the most violent of all storms. The funnel forms several thousand feet above the earth, usually during a thunderstorm. It strikes quickly, leaving total devastation in a fairly short, narrow path. Its winds whirl at speeds of several hundred miles per hour, twisting and ripping at everything they touch and causing buildings to explode outward.

In an average year, these storms kill more than 100 people in the United States and cause 180 million dollars in property damage. On a single day, April 11, 1965, 37 tornadoes struck the Midwest, killing 271 and injuring more than 5,000 people.

TO REDUCE the human toll taken by these vicious storms, the Commerce Department's Weather Bureau is introducing a new element called Skywarn into its 1969 community tornado preparedness program. Skywarn is an effort to save lives by encouraging individuals, families and communities to work with government to reduce the threat of tornadoes.

Every homemaker can be part of the Skywarn program. All you have to do is prepare now, while the sky is blue, to keep your family safe from tornadoes.

What are the steps you should take to do this? They are several. Find the safest shelter area in your home. Be sure — now — that your children know what to do if a tornado should form when they are coming home from school or playing away from home in open country. A family preparedness plan will prevent panic at a time when seconds save lives.

IN REGIONS where tornadoes are fairly frequent, a storm cellar is a good family safety investment. Otherwise, basements usually afford the greatest protection in the home. A sturdy workbench or heavy table placed in the basement will shield you and your children from falling debris.

If your home has no basement, plan to take shelter in a room in the center of the house, under the heaviest furniture available.

If you live in a high-rise apartment building, look around now for a protected area in the basement or interior hallways on lower floors. When you have found one, show your family where it is.

Mobile homes are exceptionally vulnerable to tornadoes. History is replete with tragic cases in which they have been lifted, overturned and smashed to the ground by the rotating winds of a funnel cloud. Trailer park residents should ensure that a convenient community shelter is available. To be doubly careful, residents can develop a plan to cooperate in keeping watch for tornadoes during threatening weather.

CHILDREN, and others who might be caught in the open, should know that the only possible way to escape a tornado is to move away, at a right angle, from its path. If there is no time for evasive action, find a ditch or ravine and lie in it, covering your head, until the storm has passed.

The Weather Bureau — a part of Commerce's Environmental Science Services Administration — is the Nation's first line of defense against tornadoes. At the Bureau's National Severe Storms Forecast Center in Kansas City, specialists constantly analyze weather conditions throughout the United States in order to issue tornado watches as far in advance as possible.

They cannot predict exactly when or where the twisters will strike. They can, however, identify areas about 100 miles wide and 250 miles long in which there is a high probability that tornadoes will form.

THE KANSAS CITY center issues tornado watches for such areas, specifying the period of time when the danger exists. The tornado WATCH will be broadcast over local television or radio, alerting the public to be ready to take precautionary action if a tornado warning should be issued.

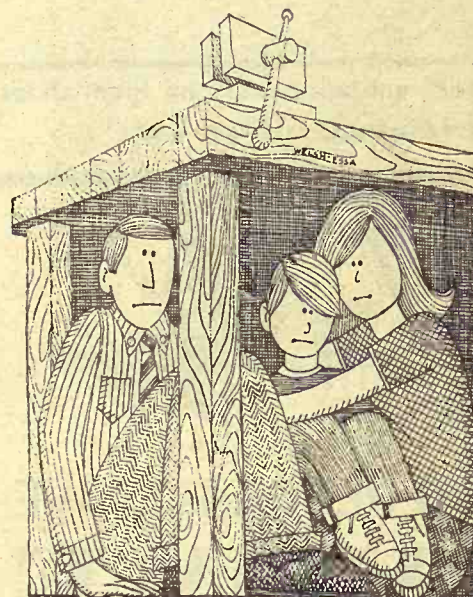
A tornado WARNING means that a tornado has actually formed. The warning will tell you where the tornado was seen and which way it is expected to move. If you are in or near its path, you have no time to lose. You must take shelter immediately.

Spend a few minutes now to rehearse your family's tornado plan. The seconds you gain may one day save your lives.

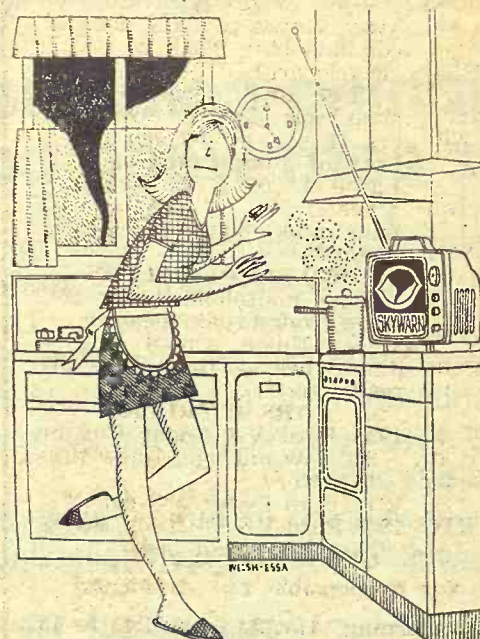

Land Retirement Thru Leasing Cropping Rights?

Clifford M. Hardin, secretary of agriculture, has told Congress a proposal to curb farm overproduction by retiring large acreages should be "explored all the way" as a possible Nixon administration policy recommendation.

Hardin said the administration has asked various professional and farm groups to work with the department in studying

alternate methods of controlling U.S. farm output. His testimony was delivered March 5 before a House Appropriations subcommittee, and released in an official report.

"One group is toying with the notion — whether it will ever fly I don't know — of not buying the land but buying the cropping rights through an easement type of arrangement,

buying them more or less permanently, but not buying the farm," Hardin said. "The land might be used then for grazing or trees, or it might be used for specialized recreation. If it happens to fall in the way of an airport, of course, they get a bonanza."

Hardin said, "It may be that we are going to hit some resistance" in asking Congress to finance such a plan.

No decision on major farm policy will be made until later this year, Hardin has told newsmen. He plans to conduct a series of grassroots meetings at land-grant colleges throughout the country this summer to hear what rural leaders want. The first such meeting is scheduled at the University of Nebraska, Lincoln, on April 12. Others will be announced.

Some Chemicals Banned By ACP

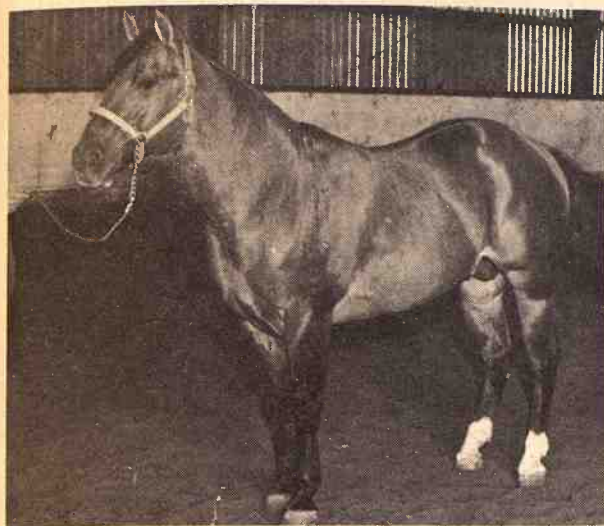
Certain pesticide chemicals used to control weeds are not eligible for cost-sharing use by farmers under the Agricultural Conservation Program (ACP) according to Chairman Lawrence E. Brennan of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation State Committee.

He urged farmers who have signed up for weed control practices to check with their county ASCS office before buying or using any chemicals to be sure they are within regulations.

Chemicals which can no longer be used if the Federal Government is sharing the cost of the practice under ACP include trichlorobenzoic acid (TBA) and Trysben 200, polychlorobenzoic acid (PBA), sodium chlorate for spot treatment on fallow land, and picloram (Tordon).

Registration of these chemicals for the above uses was discontinued by the U.S. Department of Agriculture when no requests were received from manufacturers for continued

Incentive Wool Level At 67c

Government payments for shorn wool sold last year will be based on 65.4 percent of the price producers actually received, the Agriculture department announced.

This compares with a rate of

65.8 per cent on 1967 marketings. The rate was adjusted to raise the average price producers received to an "incentive" level of 67 cents a pound for 1968 wool.

Producers averaged 40.5 cents for shorn wool last year, officials said. Thus the 65.4 per cent rate would mean an average federal payment of 26.5 cents a pound.

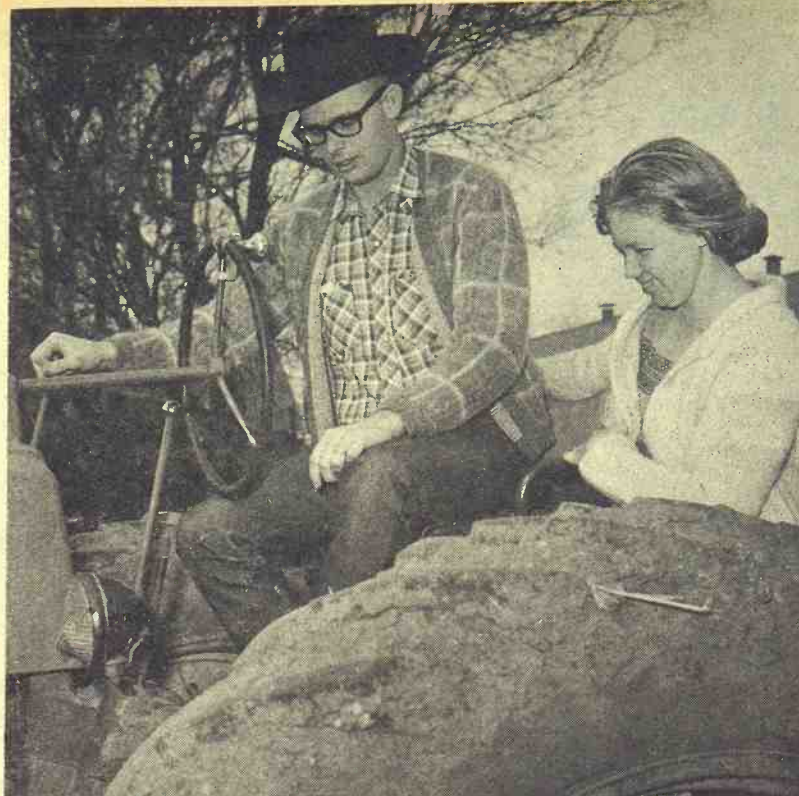

Teachers' Assn. Membership Down By 10%

Teachers Association faces a loss of members and internal dissension.

National Education Association membership has slipped by about 100,000 to one million since the end of the 1967-68 school year.

Main reason, staffers say, is an increase in dues to \$15 a year from \$10. Another factor: School administrators, though they're NFA members themselves, prove less willing to prod teachers to join as the association starts striking to back teacher bargaining demands.

Recent criticism of school administrators by the NEA's new president, George Fischer, anger principals. NEA Executive Secretary Sam Lambert tries to heal the growing rift between classroom teachers and administrators. But the Association of School Administrators, an NEA department, drifts toward independent status.

Some NEA officials believe the association could more effectively organize teachers in competition with the AFL-CIO American Federation of Teachers if administrators quit.

The weather for the 3-day show was so good that farmers used it to work early and late in the fields.

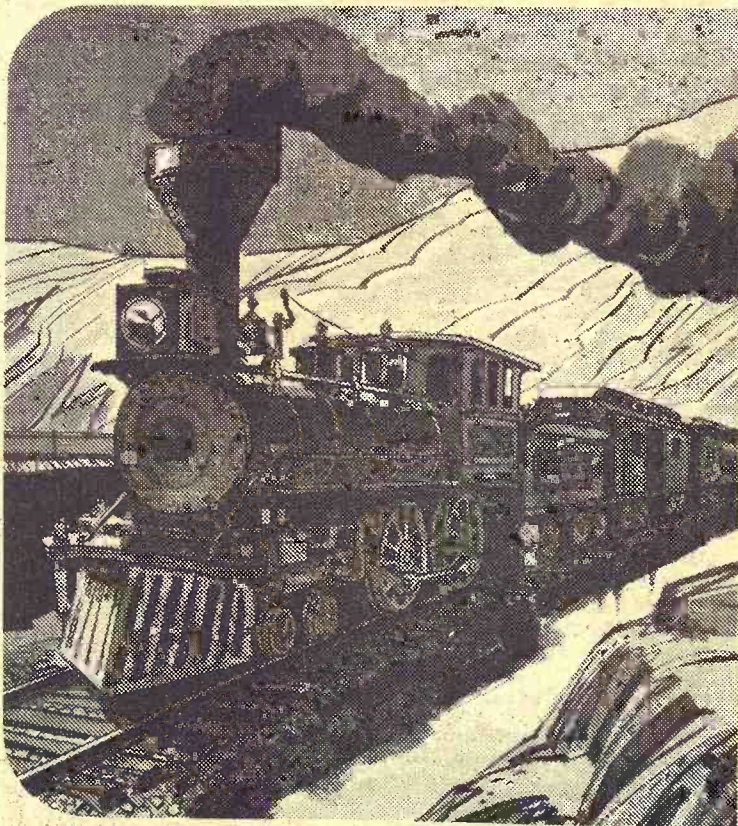
The Salina Chamber of Commerce admitted that it could have had more lookers for the show, though there were registrations from as far away as Hebron, Nebraska.

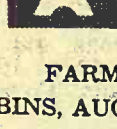

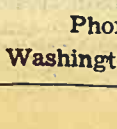

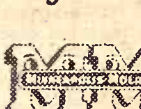

CLAY CENTER — A multi-
million hog killing and cutting
facility is to be built here, with
a projected employment of 200.

Whoops! Veto Backed 100%

The Kansas House of Representatives has voted to sustain Gov. Robert Docking's veto of a bill that relates to grain warehousing.

The vote was 103-0.

Docking said he vetoed the measure because it eliminates a provision of present law which he said is "imperative."

Docking said the bill would have eliminated from present law the provision that "the initials and number of each car (of grain) shall be stated on the receipts with the amount it contained."

Rep. Don Bell, R-Wichita, majority House floor leader, asked the House to uphold the governor's veto.

Bell said the way the bill was written there was a chance that prosecution would not be possible in cases of fraudulent grain shippage. He said that if that section was taken out it would affect the prosecution of anyone who violates the act.

Bell said the rest of the bill was merely a clean-up measure.

Docking said the provision is imperative because it enables law enforcement officers to determine the source and amount of grain.

He said without being able to identify the initials and number of each railroad car on the warehouse receipts, its determination is very difficult.

"I am also advised that the Commodity Credit Corp. re-

quires that the initials and number of each railroad car with the amount it contains be placed on the warehouse receipt for grain stored in any warehouse in the State of Kansas by the Commodity Credit Corp. "These considerations unfor-

tunately override other provisions in the bill which would be in the public interest."

Reformatory Getting Out Of Beef Business

The Kansas State Industrial Reformatory is getting out of the beef cattle business.

"We've run some real close figures on it," said Superintendent Joseph B. Noble, "and as far as we could tell we weren't saving a penny."

Beef is important to the institution, because inmates consume an average of one beef per day.

"We figure we can buy it just as cheaply on the market as we

can produce it," Noble said.

The institution will buy its beef by carcass and vocational classes in meat cutting will prepare individual cuts.

When Noble came to KSIR in January, the institution had 90 head of beef cattle on the grounds "and a bunch on pasture" at a section of land the institution controls near Hutchinson.

"We haven't bought any replacement stock since I arrived," Noble reported. "We still have 178 head, but we will be out of everything we can kill for our own consumption by July 1."

The cattle operation had caused some complaints from resi-

dents of the Careyville area who protested because of the odor.

KSIR is also in the midst of a change in its dairy cattle operation. "We're switching from Ayrshire to Holstein," Noble explained. "We figure we can get the same production from two Holsteins as from three Ayrshires," he said.

The changeover will take some time, and the section of sandhill pasture will still be utilized because "We'll always have to raise replacement stock for our dairy herd," Noble said.

The KSIR farming operation does not include production of such things as vegetables, because the land is not suitable. Also, Noble said, "We don't have the necessary canning equipment."

Talk On Meat Quotas

President Nixon's Council of Economic Advisers and leading cattlemen from around the nation will meet soon to discuss tightening beef import quotas.

Sen. Roman L. Hruska (R-Neb.) who will draft legislation once a figure is agreed upon, said yesterday a group of cattlemen met with President Nixon recently to discuss import problems.

He said the consensus was that the import quota of 1,087,000,000 pounds of beef a year is far too high. This quota was set in 1964.

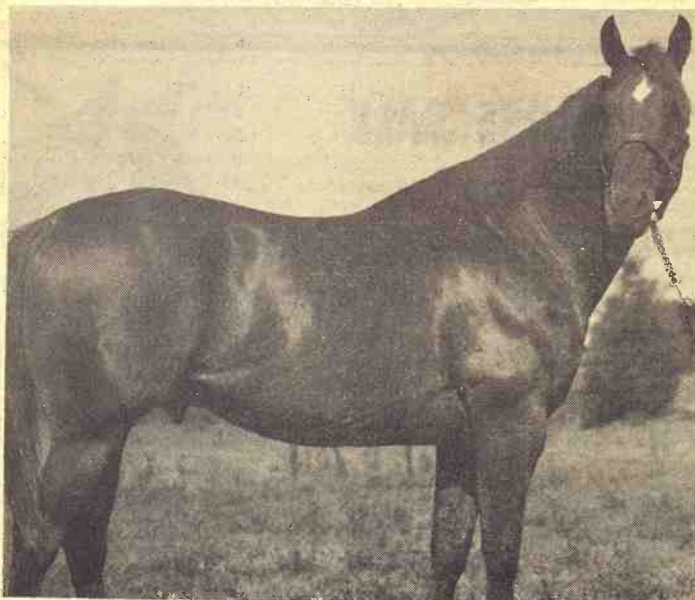

NFO Packs Hall At Grass Roots Session

LINCOLN, NEBR. — The first of a series of sessions intended to get grass roots opinions about farm problems to new Secretary of Agriculture Clifford Hardin was held here Saturday.

Hardin, and others in USDA, got an earful.

Most of the din came from the NFO, which urged its members to get to the meeting.

The NFO members "received the word," for they arrived in busloads from Kansas, Nebraska, Iowa, Minnesota, North Dakota and South Dakota.

The meeting room overflowed its 1000 person limit into another 1000-seat ballroom and closed circuit television was used to carry the proceedings to another group of perhaps 1000.

NFO members obviously made up a vast majority of the crowd. Their badges, placards and banners were everywhere.

Other farm organizations sent representatives but the NFO sent crowds.

Secretary Hardin and a group of staff members sat at a long table at the front facing the speaker's platform. The secretary opened the meeting with a brief talk in which he explained he was there to listen.

E. F. Frolik, dean of the college of agriculture of the university, told the "witnesses" that each would be limited to ten minutes.

The first farm speaker was William A. Selhorst of Dodge, Nebr., state NFO president.

Interrupted by frequent applause and cheering, Selhorst declared that the only thing going about agriculture is low prices. Then he protested the secretary's recent action in lowering the soybean support price from \$2.50 to \$2.25 a bushel. He also complained about prices on milk and said that in the view of the farmer's need for high prices, "farmers can't help but wonder how long these hypocrisies will prevail."

"How anyone can justify the fact that lowering the support price of a commodity will raise its market price of the same commodity, is beyond anyone's comprehension," Selhorst proclaimed.

Selhorst took longer than his seven minutes. In conclusion, he asked that instead of having the speakers appear as scheduled,

microphones be placed in the audience, turning the meeting into an open forum. Dean Frolik declined and proceeded to ask others to appear as listed.

This part of the program turned out to be anti-climactic as one speaker after another gave his ideas on what agriculture needs.

Most of those who appeared reiterated views that have been advocated by them or their organizations for years. James W. Ingwersen, master of the Kansas Grange, said the Grange endorses the present farm program and is convinced that government supply management is necessary.

"Nothing will aid agriculture more than adequate income for family type farming," Ingwersen said. "Despite what some others are saying, the farm program does help the small farmer. I know because I am one of them."

Herbert Pike of Whiting, Ia., said in the course of his remarks that "for a young farmer who is willing to work, swine is a good enterprise."

He was loudly booed.

Pike added, that the only way yet developed to control farm production, which he said is necessary, is for the government to do it. He was booed again. The NFO contends its members can control marketings of farm products through withholding actions.

Charles W. Pence, representing Great Plains Wheat Inc., of Kansas City, Kans., admitted that his organization is becoming disenchanted with the International Grains Agreement. It just isn't working as hoped, he said.

Bill House, of Cedar Vale, Ks., chairman of the American National Cattlemen's Association, said the cattleman is interested in good prices for the grain farmer as well as the livestock feeder.

"We go up and down together," he contended.

Speaker after speaker, most of them farmers or representing farm groups, mentioned inflation as one of the farmer's major problems with prices rising much faster on what the farmer buys than on what he sells.

The Farm Bureau was represented by Roland Nelson of Lin-

coln, president of the Nebraska Farm Bureau Federation. He said the Farm Bureau wants the farm program replaced when it expires in 1970. The Farm Bureau's proposal for a new program includes a long time land retirement plan.

Fred V. Heinkel of Columbia, Mo., president of the Midcontinent Farmers Association, who helped develop the present farm program, insisted it is working fairly well. He urged improvement of the program "carefully, on the firm foundation of past experience."

Shortly after the afternoon session got underway, the NFO audience revealed it was tired of listening to the scheduled speakers and demanded that the microphones be turned over to "real farmers."

Dean Frolik apparently concluded it was the better part of valor to heed the suggestion. Three microphones were set up and the meeting was turned into an NFO membership drive. Nearly every man who was able to get on the mike said that what the farmer needs is collective bargaining and the way to get it is to join the NFO.

One NFO member claimed, "It all boils down to this: 'Better farm income would solve almost any problems we've heard about today.'"

The secretary of agriculture has six more such regional conferences scheduled for this spring and summer.

With a pipe in his mouth, he listened calmly to the proceedings, rarely questioning those who presented their ideas.

Cut And Bruised, But Eudora Man Ready For National Jaycee Contest

"Sometimes you just end up on the wrong end of things," says 32-year-old Cletus Grosdidier, Eudora dairyman chosen this year's Outstanding Young Farmer by the Jaycees.

Grosdidier, who is at the Jaycees' National Outstanding Young Farmer Award Program in St. Paul, Minn., is recovering from a broken nose and other facial injuries caused when his cow pony slipped and kicked him in the face.

Grosdidier returned to dairy farming with his father on the farm in southeast Douglas County after graduation from St. Benedict's College and three years of teaching in Nemaha County.

In ten years the Grosdidiers

have built their own four-bedroom home, living in it while Grosdidier finished the interior; acquired a dairy herd of 120 Holsteins; designed, built and equipped a dairy parlor with pipeline milking system and automated feeding; and assembled and installed mechanized storage and feeding in outside bin and feed bunk.

Parents of four children: Gary 9, Glen 7, Lisa 6, and Kevin 4, the Grosdidiers find time for picnics, skating, swimming, skiing, fishing and ball playing as a family.

Grosdidier tries new farming ideas frequently. "We selected him as one of the farmers to discuss his cropping program at our annual Douglas County Crops and Soils Conference last year," says County Agricultural Agent Dan Pherigo.

Grosdidier was the first farmer in Douglas County to plant corn by the no-till method.

Active community 4-H leaders and members of Lawrence Young Farmers Organization, the Grosdidiers are members of the Holy Family Catholic Church of Eudora.

Other community activities include Grosdidier's position on the Board of Milk Producers' Marketing Company, and district officer of Lions International; and his wife's vice-presidency in Cardinal Extension Homemakers' Unit.

"Both the Grosdidiers are in

terested in people and adept at discussing their farm setup," says Pherigo. "For those reasons we at the Extension Office like to take visitors from foreign countries out to the Grosdidier dairy farm."

Still Time To Topdress Wheat

Farmers who have not yet topdressed their wheat with nitrogen due to snow and wet weather should not give up in their attempt to get this job done, says Dr. Larry Murphy, Kansas State University agronomist.

The generally good moisture supply over most of the state indicates this is the year to expect good nitrogen responses on wheat. But the extended period of cold, wet weather has resulted in a small amount of nitrogen uptake by the wheat.

Rapid growth brought on by warmer weather will place big demands on the soil to supply nitrogen to the plants, Murphy says. Without adequate nitrogen, spring growth will be slow which can result in stunted, spindly plants that have poor yield potential.

Cold soil temperatures may result in slow release of nitrogen from organic matter this spring, the K-State agronomist says. Wheat growers should be sure that their crop is not dependent upon this unpredictable source of nitrogen.

Normally, fertilizer recommen-

dations call for the completion of topdressing in Kansas by March 15-20. Nitrogen applied after that time has been found to have more effect upon grain protein content than upon yield.

This year, however, producers probably will be able to apply nitrogen up into the second week in April and still expect good yield increases, Murphy predicts. Even with current low prices for wheat, nitrogen remains a good investment.

When Is A Chickenfurter?

When might a frankfurter become a chickenfurter? When it's more than 15% poultry, the Agriculture Department believes. That, it proposed, is when label names should be modified not only for frankfurters but for knockwurst, bologna and other cooked sausages as well.

Currently, poultry may be used in such sausages only if the poultry ingredients, no matter how small, are reflected in some manner in the product name. But last fall the poultry industry, seeking to expand demand for its products, asked that no poultry identification be required unless the poultry accounted for more than 25% of the sausage.

The issue acquired special significance when the department announced public hearings to permit consumer comments, the first time such testimony would have been invited by its consumer and marketing service. But the Nixon Administration dropped the hearing idea, saying it would "unnecessarily delay" a decision. The latest proposal allows 45 days for written comment by interested parties.

Poultry has nutritional quali-

ties similar to other cooked sausage ingredients, the department said, and "trained testing panels have found that up to 15% poultry didn't alter the characteristics of cooked sausage."

There would be several restrictions, however, on ingredient terminology under the proposal. If poultry fat or skin were included in a product "beyond their natural proportions in the bird," for example, the ingredient statement would have to reflect this.

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Wheat Forecast Now At 272 Million Bushels

Grass & Grain

The 1969 Kansas wheat crop is forecast at 272 million bushels, on the basis of April 1 conditions, according to the Kansas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service.

If this production is realized, it would be 12 percent larger than in 1968 and the largest crop since 1961.

Early spring prospects for the 1969 wheat crop were good to excellent in most parts of the State. Late February and March precipitation materially improved the moisture situation in western Kansas. However, subsoil moisture is short in much of this area and additional rains will be needed to keep the crop there coming along well. In southeastern Kansas an excess of winter moisture has caused some uneven stands.

Seeding of spring sown small grain was well behind usual this year. By the first of April only one-third of the State's expected oat acreage and one-fourth of the expected spring barley acreage had been seeded.

Wet fields this spring have slowed tillage and seeding operations. Pasture condition on April 1 was 86 percent of normal.

mal, 15 points above last year and 29 points above 1967. Moisture is generally adequate for starting spring grasses this year but growth was slowed by cool weather in March.

Winter Wheat

The yield per seeded acre of Kansas wheat was forecast at 25 bushels on basis of April 1 conditions. This yield on the 10,886,000 acres planted last fall would indicate a 1969 crop of 272,150,000 bushels.

The prospective yield is well above the 20.4 bushel yield per seeded acre last year and would be the highest since 1961. Good late winter and early spring moisture has resulted in almost uniformly good to excellent wheat condition over the state except in some far western counties. Prospects for wheat were greatly improved from last fall in west central and southwestern portions of the state.

Some acreage had already been lost in these areas, and spring rains will be needed to maintain current expectations. Wheat has greened up but local growth has been slowed by cool wet weather during much of March.

Some local damage to wheat from winterkill and wind erosion has occurred but losses of acreage have been relatively small. Greenbugs caused problems in some areas last fall and some soilborne mosaic has been reported this spring, but damage has been of rather limited extent.

Rye
Rye condition on April 1 was 91 percent of normal, 16 points above last year and compares with a range from 62 percent to 95 percent in the preceding decade. Rye condition has shown much improvement in western Kansas as the result of February and March moisture.

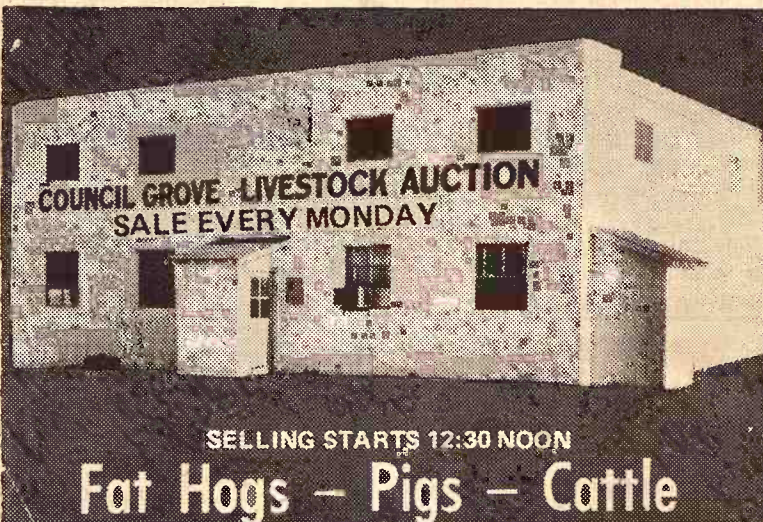

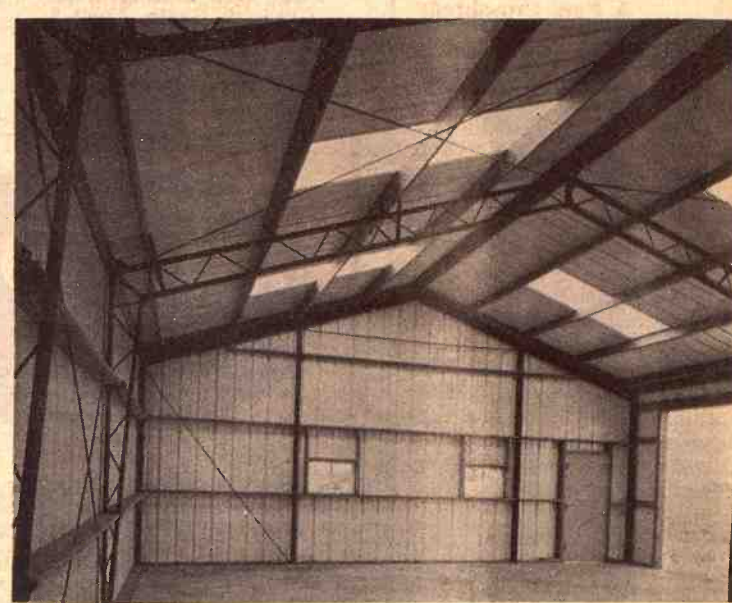

Rye Lost Out To Affluence

In 1922, U.S. farmers produced 101 million bushels of rye,

figuring they'd hit a new market in Europe, where production had not returned to normal after World War I.

That rye production was a record for the U.S., and it's a record not likely to be broken.

Since 1922, rye production has gone steadily down and was only 23 million bushels last year. Kansas produced only slightly more than half a million bushels.

The story of rye, its importance as a basic food for centuries, particularly in Northern and Central Europe, and the circumstances that have led to its decline, is told in a report by the foreign agriculture service entitled, "Rye, a Casualty of Our Affluent Society."

The report says the drop in rye consumption has come about because people preferred the lighter colored breads and because rye has been labeled an

inferior product.

Rye has been losing out even in the Teutonic and Slavic nations where, traditionally, it has been preferred to white bread.

Curiously, in the U.S., rye bread no longer is "poor man's food" and it usually costs more than other varieties. Also, rye flour is getting new acceptance in crackers and other snacks where it is blended with wheat or corn.

The FAS report says that world over, rye now holds the smallest share of feed grain consumption and the next smallest after oats in food grain consumption.

The Soviet Union ranks as the largest producer of rye. The crop, being better adapted than wheat and other grains to cold regions and marginal lands, found early acceptance in Northern and Central Russia.

However, Soviet policy has been to increase wheat production at the expense of rye, with the result that the acreage last year was only 30 million as compared to 72 million in the 1945-49 period. The Soviet Union once accounted for 60 percent of the world trade in rye; last year it had less than 11 percent of the total.

Poland is No. 2 in rye production and it is one of the few remaining countries where rye outranks wheat in output. Poland still consumes a lot of rye bread. With a production of some 8.6 million tons, almost nine times the output of the United States and Canada together, Poland usually has little to export.

Next in line in rye production is West Germany, followed by East Germany and Czechoslovakia. Consumption remains high in East Germany.

West Germany consumes a lot of rye bread, but the trend is toward blending wheat and rye flour. Also, West Germany is using more rye for livestock feed than for human consumption.

The same story seems to apply to most Western European countries. Even Finland is

consuming less, while the people contend that it is rye bread that gives them unusual strength.

English and Dutch settlers brought rye seed with them to this country in colonial days, and for a time, it was the grain most used for bread flour. It has had its ups and downs since, but its best year was in 1922 when production was 101 million bushels. This was just after World War I, when European production had not yet returned to normal. U.S. producers apparently thought they had a huge new market, as the export demand had been picking up during the war years. But in 1923, production dropped to half that of 1922 and the trend has been downward ever since.

Biggest states in rye production are Minnesota and the Dakotas.

Canada produces about 300,000 tons of rye annually and exports two thirds of it, some of it to the United States. The FAS report says that Canada and the United States together produce about 3 percent of the world's rye crop, yet they account for 60 percent of the exports in world trade.

These figures in themselves suggest that the U.S. and Canada are not the heaviest eaters of dark bread.

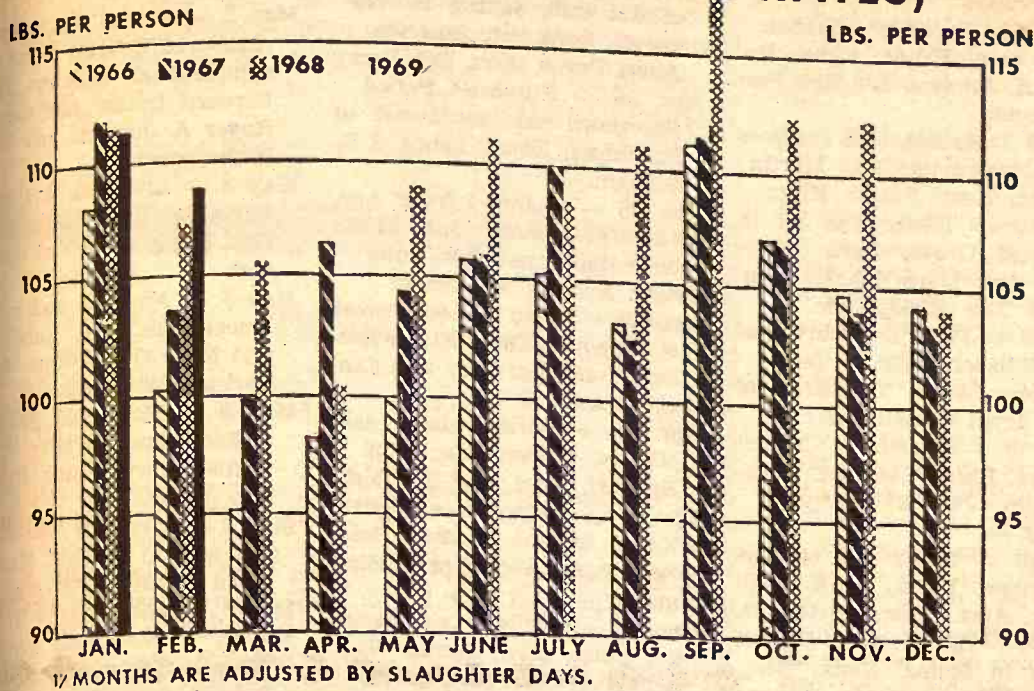

cent more oats and practically
the same acreage of barley.

Allowing for the upward
trend in yields, this acreage
would produce about 172 million
tons of feed grains, 4 million
more than last year. A crop of
this size, added to a carryover of
around 1968 levels, would give
a total supply above the 216
million tons last year and the
largest since 1961-62.

Through March 28, farmers
had signed up to divert 38,900-
000 acres from feed grain pro-
duction compared to last year's
diversion of 34,300,000 acres,

when barley was not included
in the program. Final actual
diversion usually runs about 95
percent of the acreage signed.
Because of bad weather, the
signup period was extended
through April 4 for 11 states in
the Northern Plains and the
Northwest.

Feed grain prices for the last
six months have averaged
slightly lower than for the cor-
responding period last year and
are near or above loan rates.
The large quantities under loan
and owned by the Commodity
Credit Corporation are expected
to stabilize prices.

But be patient, if when passing through the state, you ask a Hoosier for the time of day and he hesitates.

He may have switched his watch back and forth so many times that he is confused. Then again, he may just be trying to control his temper.

Indiana had been happy for years in the Central time zone until 1961, when the Interstate Commerce Commission pushed the time zone boundary westward from the Indiana-Ohio line, splitting 43 counties into the Eastern zone while 49 counties remained in the Central zone.

Each spring, mayors, city councils and county commissioners watched each other until, by informal and unofficial agreement, they learned what the majority of their neighbors planned to do for the summer and followed suit.

The result was that a person traveling from the southeast to the northwest could pull out his watch stem and turn the hands back and forth four times to stay with local times.

The U.S. Transportation department allowed Indiana to waive observance of the federal Uniform Time Act in 1967 and 1968 while petitions were pending to move the time zone boundary again.

In January, the department announced it would shift the boundary westward again to place all of Indiana in the Eastern zone except for six northwestern and six southwestern communities in the Central time zone.

Now local governments have withdrawn their horns and said they would fall into line.

Indiana Gives Up On Savings Time Balk

Indiana's local government chieftains have decided to quit fighting the federal government on time.

So, on April 27, most of Indiana will follow the rest of the nation in turning its clocks ahead one hour to Daylight Saving Time.
