Booming Demand For Production Of Black Walnuts

More black walnut will be planted in Kansas this spring than in any year in the state's history.

Extension foresters at Kansas State University, Manhattan, who conduct tree distribution and management programs for the state, report they have ready for shipment a record total of 150,000 walnut seedlings and stratified nuts. But that total doesn't fill the requests of Kansans desiring to get into the profitable walnut-producing business.

"The present demand for black walnut is unprecedented by any year we've ever had," says Gene Grey, assistant state Extension forester. "People are recognizing the value of the black walnut as a blue-chip investment."

Total black walnut plantings during March and April of this year will easily exceed the 119,000 plantings made in 1970 — the state's top year, Grey predicts.

High quality Kansas walnut commands premium prices from manufacturers of furniture, veneer and wall paneling, Grey said in explaining the growing interest in one of the state's promising industries.

Marketing black walnut is not a

"jonny-come-lately" thing in Kansas. The foresters remind that the state already is a leading producer of quality black walnut veneer for such things as tables, chairs, stereos, desks, wall paneling, business furniture and gunstocks.

Harold Gallaher, state Extension forester, explains the economic importance of Kansas black walnut to the state.

"Kansas annually produces some 10 million board feet of walnut logs

worth six million dollars," Gallaher informs. He stresses that this is for log value only. It does not include such added value as the marketing of nuts — "a profitable business in its own right" — or windshelters, or the high monetary worth of uncultured timber.

"There are thousands of acres of existing walnut trees in Kansas right now that are crying for proper management," Gallaher says. "These are untapped sources of new income for the state."

John Strickler, associate state Extension forester who headed a recent inventory of Kansas woodlands, believes there are more pure walnut stands in Kansas than in any other state.

The Extension foresters are developing what may be one of the country's largest walnut seed orchards on a 75-acre tract northwest of Junction City at the Milford Reservoir. First plantings were made on the seed orchard last year. Both nuts and high-quality scion

wood grafted onto seedling stock were planted. When the orchard is in full operation it will contain walnut trees yielding an estimated 1.5 million seedlings annually.

STATE OF KANSAS

Notice of Submission of Proposed
Constitutional Amendment at
April 6, 1971
General Election

Senate Concurrent Resolution 12,
adopted by the Legislature of the State of
Kansas on February 8, 1971, reads as follows:

"Section 1. A special election is hereby called, to be held on April 6, 1971, pursuant to section 1 of article 14 of the constitution of the state of Kansas, for the purpose of submitting to the electors the proposition to amend the constitution contained in Senate Concurrent Resolution No. 11."

Pursuant to Section 1 of Article 14 of the Constitution of the State of Kansas and in compliance with Senate Concurrent Resolution No. 11 adopted by the Legislature on February 8, 1971, a proposition to amend the Kansas Constitution reads as follows:

"Section 1, article 5 of the Constitution of the State of Kansas is amended to read as follows:

"Section 1. Every citizen of the United States who has attained the age of eighteen years and who shall have resided in Kansas six months next preceding any election and in the precinct in which he or she seeks to vote at least thirty days next preceding such election shall be deemed a qualified elector. A citizen of the United States who has attained the age of eighteen years and who shall have resided in Kansas in the precinct in which he or she seeks to vote at least thirty days next preceding any general election, may vote for presidential electors and candidates for the offices of president and vice-president of the United States. A citizen of the United States, who is otherwise qualified to vote in Kansas for presidential electors and candidates for the offices of president and vice-president of the United States may vote for such officers either in person or by absentee ballot notwithstanding the fact that such person may have become a nonresident of this state if his or her removal from this state occurs during the thirty days next preceding such election. A person who is otherwise a qualified elector may vote in the precinct of his former residence either in person or by absentee ballot notwithstanding the fact that such person may have become a nonresident of such precinct during the thirty days next preceding such election if his new residence is in another precinct in the state of Kansas."

Sec. 2. The title appearing on the ballot by which this amendment is submitted to the electors of this state shall be the following:

"Shall the constitution be amended to permit persons eighteen (18) years of age and upwards to vote in all elections, to reduce the residency requirement from forty-five to thirty days for electors to vote only for presidential electors and candidates for the offices of president and vice-president of the United States, to permit electors who have moved from the state during the thirty days next preceding the election to vote only for presidential electors and candidates for the offices of president and vice-president of the United States, and to permit persons who move within the state within thirty (30) days of an election to vote?"

I hereby certify that the above Senate Concurrent Resolution No. 12 was adopted by the 1971 Session of the Legislature of the State of Kansas and that the original is now on file and a matter of record in my office. I further certify the foregoing Senate Concurrent Resolution No. 11 is a true copy of the proposed amendment to the Constitution of the State of Kansas contained in Senate Concurrent Resolution No. 11 adopted by the 1971 Session of the Kansas Legislature, the original of which is now on file and a matter of record in my office.

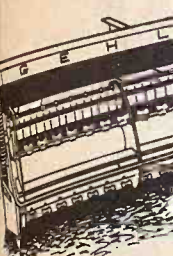

Six couples have been selected for recognition as Kansas Master Farmers-Master Farm Homemakers for 1970.

As guests of the Kansas Extension Service and the Kansas State Chamber of Commerce, the couples will be honored April 2 at a banquet in the K-State Union.

Selections were made on the basis of excellence in farming, homemaking, farm living and rural citizenship.

A selection committee in Manhattan picked this year's winners from information submitted on Kansas farm couples by county nominating committees in the six Extension districts.

The Friday evening program will feature an address by Dr. Glenn H. Beck, Vice President for Agriculture, Kansas State University. The six winning couples will be introduced by Wilbur Levering, Vice President of Merchants National Bank in Topeka. Each couple will receive a plaque recognizing their accomplishments.

Mr. & Mrs. Ralph Bergsten own 1,120 acres of choice farmland in northern Riley county. Their principal enterprise is livestock, centered on a 110-head cow herd, with some additional two-year-olds that will be calving this spring. Bergsten winters his calves, selling in March at 700 to 750 pounds. He wintered 110 head in 1970. To supplement beef production, Bergsten has 20 head of dairy cattle, and also raises around 150 pigs a year. In addition to his own 1,120 acres, Bergsten rents another 600 acres. He cultivates 380 acres, planting most of it to feed crops.

Mr. & Mrs. Ray Cudney of Edwards county are the third couple in

their family to be named Master Farmer/Master Farm Homemaker. His parents and aunt and uncle were recipients in the 1930s. The Cudney's operate 1,529 acres, of which they own 921. He cultivates around 1460 acres, putting 410 acres to wheat in 1970, 505 acres to grain sorghum, and 50 acres to corn silage. Not one to sit around and wait for rain, Cudney has 500 acres under pivot irrigation. As a result, he more than doubles his yield per acre, as opposed to dryland. He also winters around 240 calves.

Mr. & Mrs. Paul Hibbard started farming in 1946 when he returned to Greenwood county from the army. They had \$200 cash and a mortgage on 80 acres of land when they started. Today they farm 2,200 acres and have a smooth running livestock operation. Hibbard owns 650 acres, cultivating 228 acres to produce feed for his cattle. He has 147 cows of breeding age, with 139 calves weaned in 1970. He buys calves in the fall to add to those weaned, bringing his wintering program up to around 150 calves a year. Until this year, the Hibbards raised hogs, litter to market.

Mr. & Mrs. Raymond Konzem spent 30 years building up their 1,440 acre farm to what it is today, and they are proud of their accomplishment. However, they are even more proud of the accomplishments of their four children. Konzem owns 1,120 acres, and cultivates 1,040 acres of it. He has 380 acres in wheat, 100 acres in grain sorghum, and another 185 acres in feed crops. To utilize this production, Konzem has a 30-head cow herd, feeds around 100 calves, and grazes around 30 steers. The Konzems' three sons and daughter were all award winners during junior high and high school.

Mr. & Mrs. Bob McCrory have tried a variety of farming operations since they bought their first 80 acres of Rice county farmland in 1944. While their three boys were in junior high and high school, the McCrorys had 2,000 laying hens, 12 sows, and handled over 500 head of feeder calves each year. Now with his oldest boy, Jim, farming with him, and the two younger boys, Phil and

Don, at Wichita State University, McCrory concentrates on cattle feeding supplemented with a wheat program. He tries to finish out 1,000 head of cattle a year, and has 523 acres planted to wheat.

Mr. & Mrs. Clarence Vesecky know how to get the most out of their farm operation in Rush county. Farming on less than 800 acres, Vesecky manages a cash crop, a cow herd/feeder calf operation, a hog program, 350 laying hens, and until this year, 100 turkeys a year. He dryland farms around 238 acres of wheat, 11 acres of grain sorghum, and 30 acres of sorghum for fodder. Only the wheat is sold, and additional grain is purchased for the livestock operation. Vesecky has a

cow herd of 30 head, and feeds 78 calves a year. He has facilities to handle 300 hogs at one time or 600 a year.

All of this year's winning couples have been and are currently involved in many church, youth and community programs. Without exception, they have given more than their share to make their communities a better place in which to raise a family.

The Kansas Master Farmer organization had its beginning in 1927 at about the same time the movement was getting under way in 28 other states and Canada. The Master Farm Homemaker Guild began a year later in 1928. The purpose of these projects was to give

public recognition for excellence in farming, homemaking, farm living, and rural citizenship.

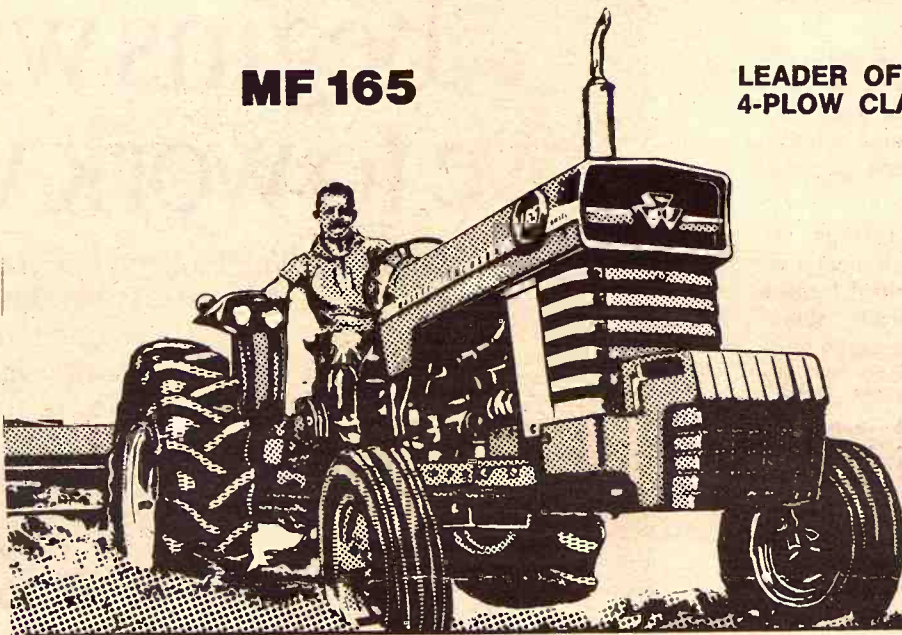

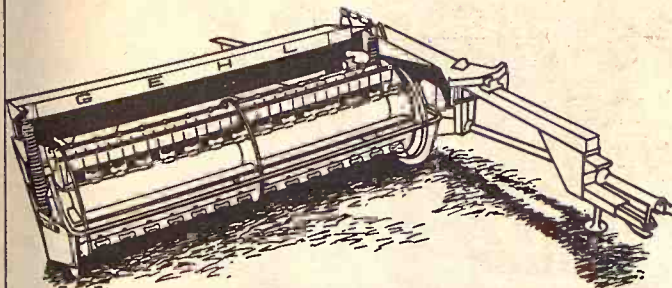

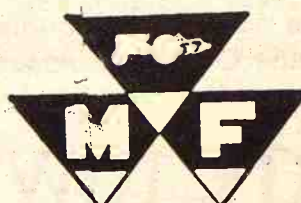

Milo Plantings Up 13%

On March 1, Kansas farmer's intentions for 1971 acreage of spring planted crops indicated a sizeable increase in sorghum acreage but comparatively small changes in most other major crops, according to the Kansas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service.

Prospective sorghum plantings of 5.0 million acres were 13 per cent above 1970.

Intended corn plantings of 1.7 million acres were down 1 per cent from last year, but larger than in most other recent years.

Prospective soybean acreage was up 2 per cent to 1.1 million acres.

Expected plantings of sugar beets were moderately higher, oats up slightly, barley unchanged, but dry beans sharply lower than in 1970.

Acreage of hay for harvest was 5 per cent above last year.

The combined acreage of all Kansas crops grown in 1971, including a somewhat reduced wheat acreage, is expected to be 19.5 million acres, up 2 per cent from last year. This compares with a range from 19.2 to 22.2 million acres in the 1960's.

Milo Acreage Largest In 8 Years

If these 1971 early season planting intentions are realized, acreage of feed grains — sorghums, corn, barley and oats — in Kansas will total 7,156,000 acres, nearly 9 per cent above 1970 and largest since 1963.

Intended plantings of sorghum for all purposes at 4,962,000 acres were up 13 per cent from last year and largest in 8 years. Expected gains in sorghum plantings were general over the State.

Intended corn plantings of 1,672,000 acres, although declining slightly, were still the third largest acreage in the last decade. White corn plantings are expected to total 117,000 acres, 7 per cent of the state's total 1971 corn acreage.

Barley acreage sown last fall plus intended spring plantings total 220,000 acres, the same as in 1970, but only one-fourth the acreage in the earlier 1960's.

Intended oat seedings were up 4 per cent to 302,000 acres, although

only about one-half that sown a decade earlier.

Prospective soybean plantings for 1971, if realized, will total 1,095,000 acres, 2 per cent more than last year's previous record high.

Sugar beet plantings were expected to reach 50,000 acres, 10 per cent above 1970 and the largest acreage of record.

Expected plantings of dry beans at 18,000 acres, compare with 23,000 in 1970.

This year's potato plantings of 1,300 acres were unchanged from the 1970 acreage.

Acreage of all hay intended for harvest in 1971 was 2,503,000 acres, 5 per cent more than a year earlier. Moderate increases were shown for both tame and wild hay.

Spring Seeding Slow Start

Spring work and early seeding of small grains has moved ahead slowly due to wet fields and lack of good drying weather during the last few weeks.

By March 13, only 5 per cent of the State's oat acreage had been seeded, well behind the usual 24 per cent.

Spring barley seeding was only 1 per cent completed by March 13,

compared with an 11 per cent average for this date. There was considerable fall and winter plowing this year and seedbed preparations should move ahead as weather permits.

Wheat Growing

Fall seeded wheat was greening and growing during last week's warmer weather. Some fields still need additional ground cover to reduce the possibility of serious blow damage.

Moisture supplies were improved by snow and some good intermittent rains during February. However, some sections of western Kansas were still short of topsoil moisture at mid-March and wheat in some other areas will need additional moisture for good spring growth.

United States

Acreage intentions for the Nation's 17 major spring planted crops included in the March 1 Survey totaled 269 million acres, up 4 per cent from last year.

Expected acreage for the four feed grains was 5 per cent larger than a year earlier including a 17 per cent gain in sorghum, a 6 per cent increase in corn, and a 4 per cent rise

in barley, but a 5 per cent decline in oats.

Intended soybean plantings were up 7 per cent from a year earlier.

The expected sugar beet acreage declined 2 per cent and dry bean intentions were 4 per cent below last

year.

Hay acreage expected for harvest in 1971 totaled nearly the same as year earlier.

The intended white corn plantings for the 10 major producing States was 922,000 acres.

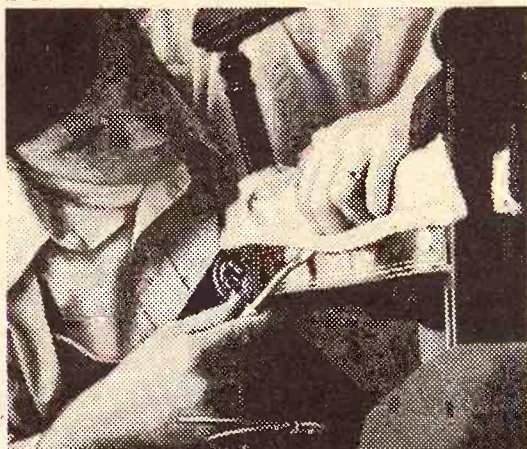

Marion-Florence Board Sticks To School Decision

FLORENCE — School board members of USD 408 have voted in a special meeting to uphold their original decision to merge the Florence and Marion junior and senior high schools. The vote was 6 to 1.

The board originally made such a decision in October. School patrons at Florence and Marion have been vocal in disapproval of the proposed plan.

Marion junior high students would be sent to Florence and Florence senior high students would be sent to Marion.

An opposition group, United Parents of USD 408, mailed letters to district residents and circulated petitions saying they were opposed to changing the use of attendance

facilities at Florence and Marion. Petitions were signed by 1,208 patrons, 21 or older, and presented to the school board March 8.

Ray Davidson, Florence, cast the dissenting vote.

"Even though 1,209 persons, representing 44.7 per cent of the 2,679 residents over 21 in the district, signed the petition," Davidson said,

"the board chose to ignore the wishes of a large group of taxpayers and school patrons."

Davidson is a candidate for reelection.

Candidates for the upcoming school board election for four positions are split on the consolidation issue.

Candidates in the two Marion districts supporting consolidation

are Bill Meyer and Bill Finke. Jerry Hett and Jack Taylor are Marion candidates opposing the plan.

In the Florence district, Ronald Kirkpatrick is running on a platform opposing consolidation while James Hett approves the plan.

Ron Fruechting and Davidson are candidates for the position at large. Fruechting is for the plan.

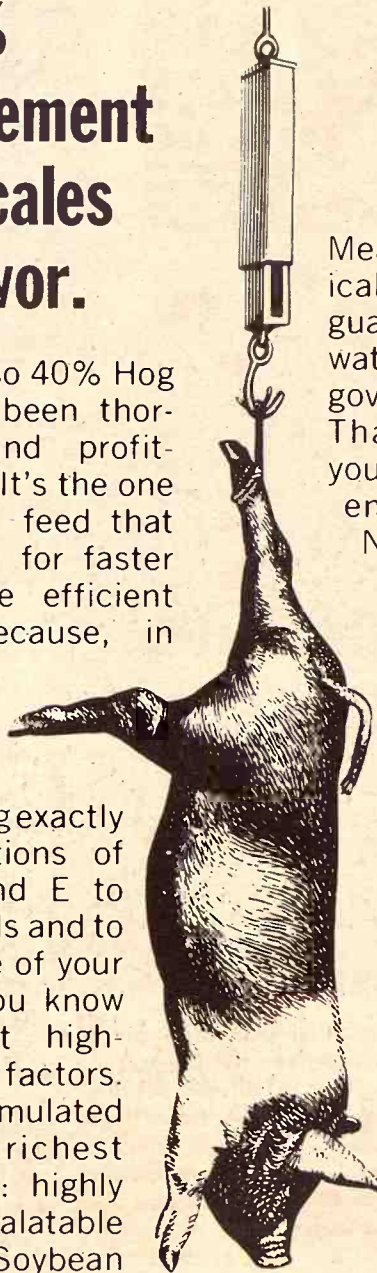

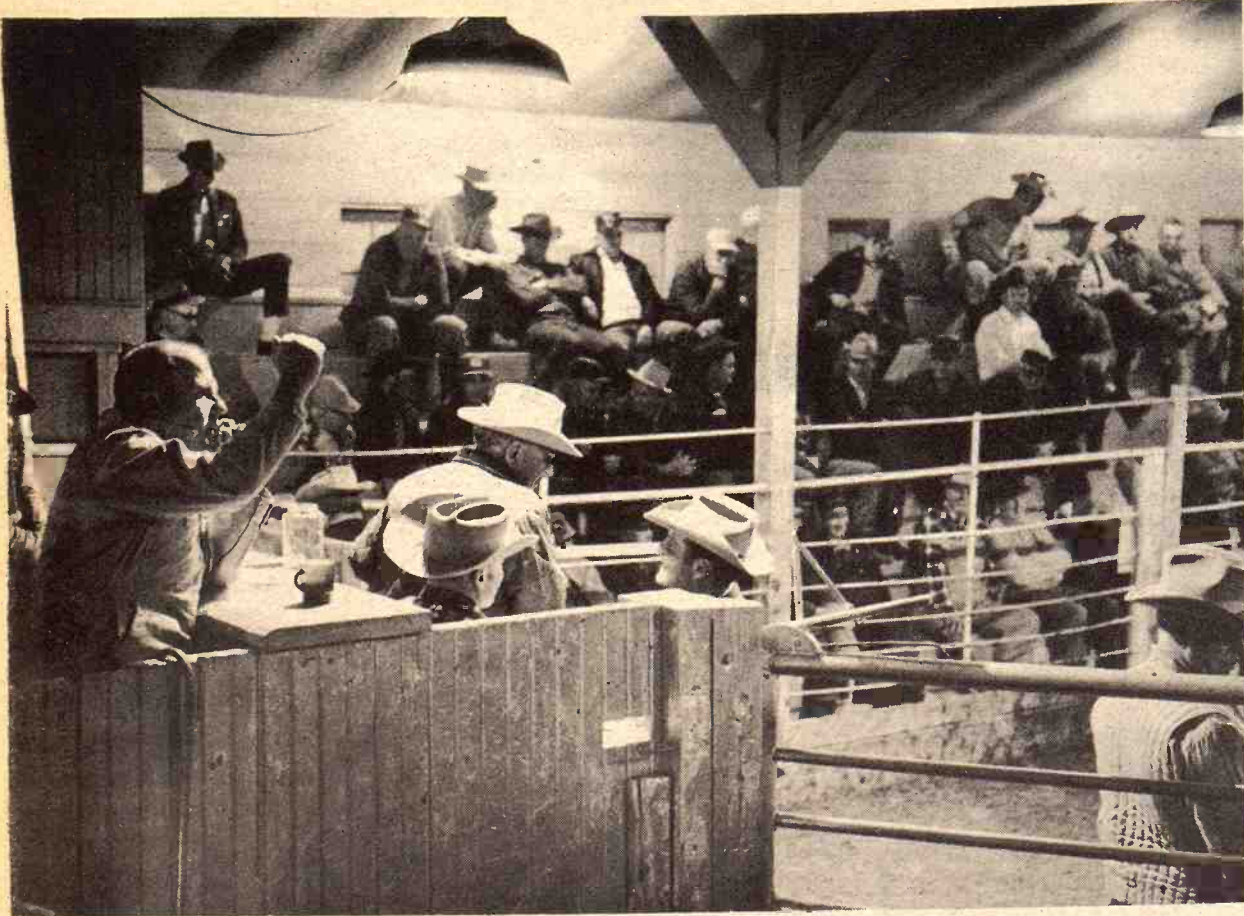

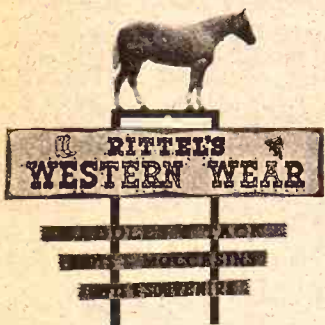

USDA 'Chicken' On Farm Subsidy Limits

The well-publicized limits placed on farm subsidies by Congress a session ago are not turning out to be very meaningful. The Department of Agriculture should get much of the blame, says the Hutchinson News, which in an editorial last week said this:

The U.S. Department of Agriculture is about to perpetrate an inexcusable fraud on taxpayers and on those concerned about the future of farm legislation.

It is sidestepping the \$55,000 limit on federal crop subsidy payments,

approved by Congress last year after much debate and public airing.

The USDA has ruled that a large landowner may split his operation among family members "and others," with each qualifying for the \$55,000 maximum.

That's subterfuge.

One USDA official says this loophole was approved because his department had decided Congress intended for a loophole to be in the law.

Congress should take a dim view of that accusation of hypocrisy.

The \$55,000 limit was predicted to save taxpayers some \$30 million. Under the USDA rule, the saving is not expected to be more than \$5 million.

Farmers have a stake in this because the excess payments to a handful of big operators jeopardized

their entire support program. The big beneficiaries of this ruling will be a few Southern cotton operators, but the reaction will hit Kansas wheat producers.

This is no time to pose a new threat to farm price maintenance. Congress should act promptly to correct the USDA's sabotage, and it would be good to hear that the Kansas delegation is leading this fight.

Fugitive Warrant Out On Garton

BELLEVILLE — A fugitive warrant has been issued in Republic county for Gail Garton, 29, Concordia, operator of the Cloud County Livestock Commission Co., charging Garton with unlawful flight to avoid prosecution.

Republic County Sheriff Robert Blecha has been looking for Garton since February 9, when a warrant was issued for his arrest, charging him with grand theft.

The charges against Garton allege he was involved in taking and moving 40 head of cattle from a feedlot near Belleville to his own farm in Rooks county.

Reportedly, Nebraska law enforcement officers have also been seeking information on Garton in the Concordia and Belleville areas.

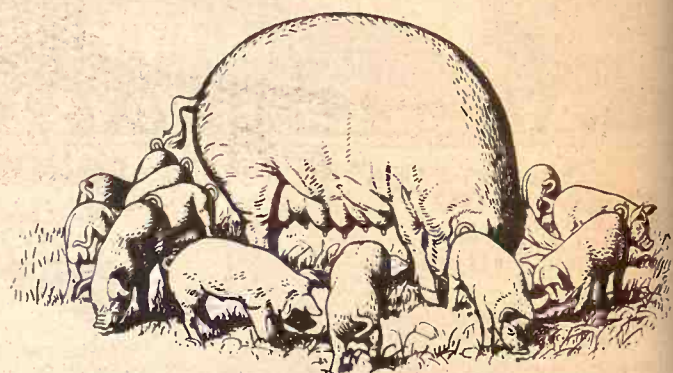

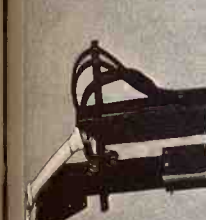

Sheep Shearing School At Hutch In Early April

Farm Lobbyists Keeping Active

Agricultural lobbyists say they're busier than usual in this session of the Kansas Legislature because of the number of ecology bills introduced which affect farming.

And while the lobbyists are busy trying to protect the state's biggest industry from some ecology bills that farmers might consider unnecessarily strict in protecting the environment, there are a number of other issues which concern farming.

Two bills offered by the Senate Agriculture Committee deal with

feed-sack labeling and the state's meat inspections laws.

Sen. Joe Warren, D-Arkansas City, said the labeling measure will continue the requirement that the percentage of food elements, such as carbohydrates, be listed, but will not require a statement of the source of the various elements.

The meat inspection bill will bring the state into conformity with federal standards.

A third committee bill currently under study deals with updating of

the state's fencing laws.

A House bill which would change the criteria for assessing real estate is gaining some attention and considerable backing from farm groups.

This bill provides for assessing all real estate in a county on the same basis — productivity. The proposed law would set the following criteria as basis for evaluation:

- Full classification of the land as to use.
- Complete details of size as to acres, road frontage and so forth.
- Location of the real estate site with reference to its value in relation to city and highway accessibility and so forth.
- Productivity, with net income to be figured on the basis of 10 years' gross production average, reduced to the landowners' share in the case of income property, with the income to be reduced by taxes paid, and figured to yield 7 per cent on net income, before the figure is applied in determining value.

A similar bill died on the calendar in the House as legislators went home last year at the close of the session. This year, farm groups including the Kansas Association of Wheat Growers, Taxpayers Association, Kansas Livestock

Association and Kansas Farm Bureau are hopeful the bill may pass into law, thus correcting some differences in evaluation and assessment throughout the state.

Perhaps the bill getting the most farmer interest currently is a bipartisan proposal by eight senators which would set up legal machinery for handling unionization of farm labor in the state.

The law is designed to protect both laborers and farm owners, proponents said. They indicated the bill will prohibit secondary boycotts and strikes during harvest time.

An example of the secondary boycott against farm products, they said, is the current boycott against lettuce being conducted at Wichita State University because of a labor movement among workers in lettuce fields in Arizona and California.

School financing is high on the list of legislative items that farmers are following closely in this session. A proposal getting attention would relieve the ad valorem tax load for counties by increasing sales and use taxes by one-half of 1 per cent with the extra half-cent yield to be returned to counties. The attention is both favorable and unfavorable.

The best point about this tax proposal, farmers say, is the fact

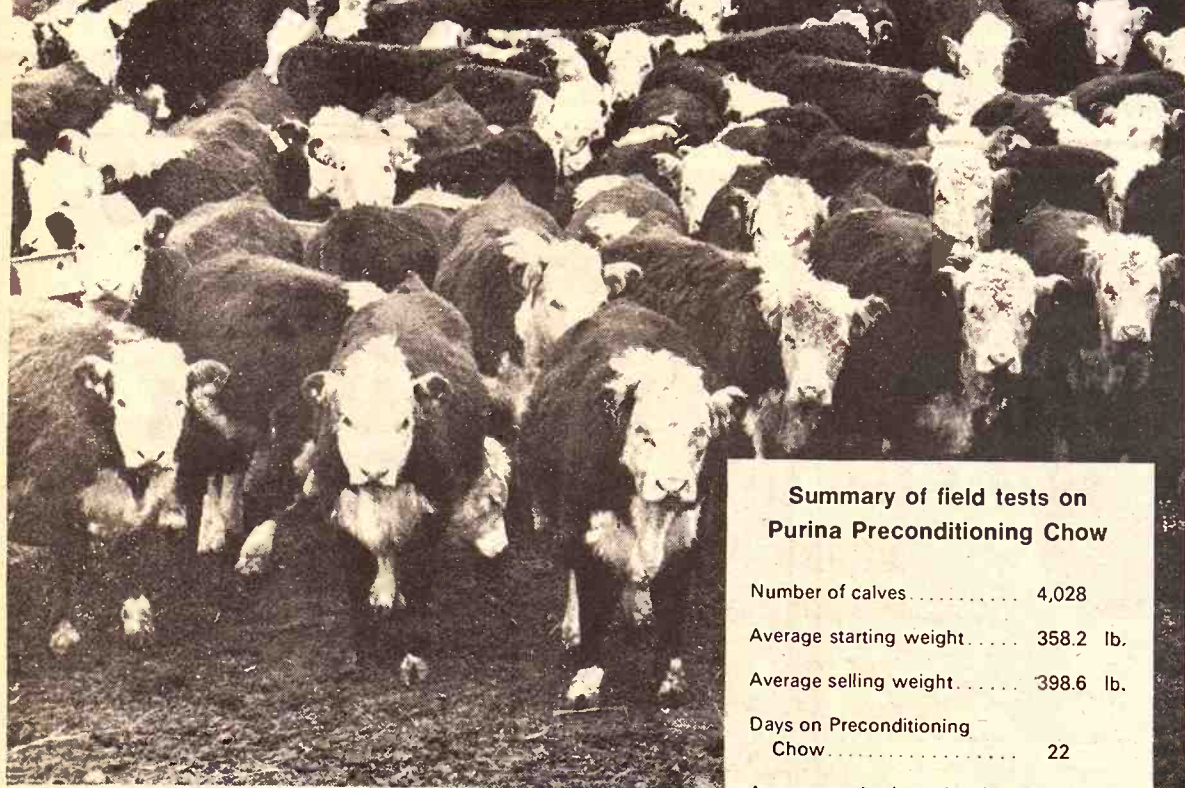

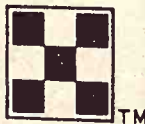

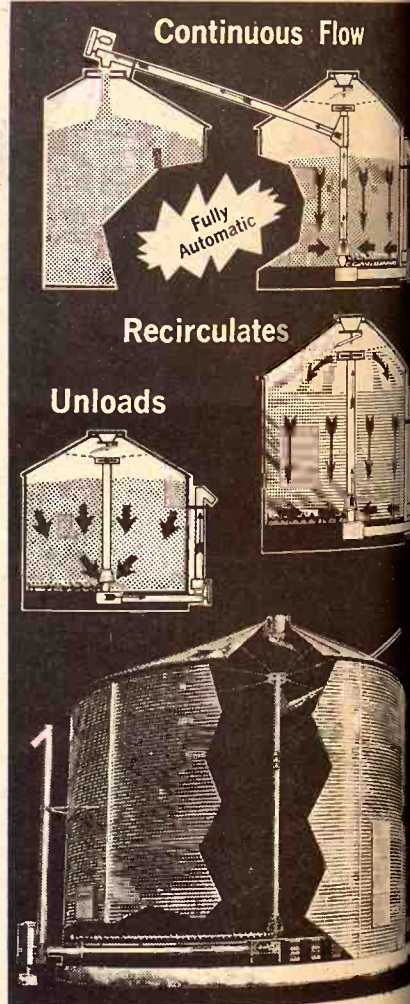

Environmental Reviews May Delay Road Building

New federal guidelines that govern environmental quality on new highway locations and construction now require that individual project plan reviews be made in Washington by a presidentially appointed council, John Montgomery, director of highways says. Montgomery estimated that review of the environmental statements on each project will delay the highway planning process

"by several months. Still to come are guidelines on traffic noise controls which will extend the planning time even more," Montgomery said.

The executive director of the American Assn. of State Highway Officials, A.E. Johnson, estimated it would take "a minimum of six months to satisfy all of the new environmental quality procedures."

Assistant state highway director R.L. Peyton explained that a draft of the environmental statement on each project will be sent to the President's Council on Environmental Quality. The council has 30 to 90 days to review it, but additional review time may be requested.

Peyton said preparation of an environmental statement by the Highway Commission's engineering departments can probably be completed "in a few days" on rural projects and in 30 to 60 days on more complex urban improvements.

The environmental statements document the decisions highway designers make as they design the road and describe the probable impact of the proposed projects on the environment.

The first highway project on which an environmental impact statement has been submitted is the proposed improvement on US-75 beginning at a junction with US-50 in Coffey County and extending north and northeast about 9.3 miles. A project description states, "Environmental changes which affect fish and wildlife, archeological and historical areas, and mineral and natural resources are nonexistent or insignificant" in the primarily agricultural area.

It lists two "probably adverse environmental effects which cannot be avoided": the use of borrow areas (using material from one area as fill for another) for the construction of embankments, and the drainage of some farm ponds.

After noting that by 1990 portions of US-75 are projected to carry 3,945 vehicles per day, the draft states

that access for many of the recreational facilities available in the area, Melvern Reservoir, for example, has a positive long-range effect.

This effect, the draft continues, is positively compatible with all planning and potentially that element which will accelerate this development.

In a summation of the unavoidable adverse environmental effects, the commission's draft concluded that the project's "use of the environment terminates in a cumulative enhancement rather than abuse of its effect."

Peyton defended the state's

tradition of environmental protection in the construction of highways. "Kansas has been a leader in erosion control activities using solid soil management principles. Our engineers have worked closely with the Soil Conservation Service on the federal level, and with the Forestry, Fish and Game Commission and the Park and Resources Board in state government. We also keep in close liaison with county and city officials on improvements in their areas," he said.

Ark City Pig Show Titles

Rick Weir

Rick Weir of Gueda Springs, won both carcass contests and shamans notched the top spots in barrow placings at the recent annual Kansas Spring Barrow show in Arkansas City.

Young Weir won both the sunflower Derby Class — a first-ever contest in which the barrows competing were nominated for the show November — and the regular class carcass show.

Both contests Weir's winning entries were Hampshires with extremely fine carcasses showing high summer acceptability.

The Sunflower Derby Class with entries, Weir's 221.5 pound barrow had a carcass with 17.52 per cent ham (of live weight), loin-eye

area of 6.19 sq. in., carcass length of 19.80 in., average backfat thickness of 1.30 in., and a ham-loin index of 137.1 Prize money for first place was \$200.

Second place pig in the Sunflower Derby was a crossbred belonging to C & R Hog Farm of Dexter, Kan. Young Weir also had the third place barrow. Fourth and fifth place went to John Balthrop of Peabody.

In the open barrow class with 109 entries, Weir's 209.4 pound Hampshire had 18.53 per cent ham (of live weight), loin-eye area of 6.73 sq. in., carcass length of 30.05 in., average backfat of 1.21 in., and ham-loin index of 152.6.

Second place in the open carcass show went to a Hampshire belonging to Jerry Kobyluk of Jones, Okla. Third place went to a Kansas State University Yorkshire.

The grand champion of the live barrow show was a Hampshire belonging to Kent Starks of Stillwater, Okla. The live reserve

grand champion was a Duroc owned by Jerry Boyer of Marland, Okla.

Dr. Don Kropf, meats scientist in the Kansas State University Department of Animal Science and Industry, judged both carcass contests. He indicated that the quality of entries showed how far the swine industry has come in the production of consumer-acceptable pork.

He cited the results of the open carcass class as evidence to back up his point. Of the final 63 entries in that contest, 10 animals had 18 per cent or more ham (of live weight), 33 had 17 per cent or more ham, and 20 had less than 16 per cent ham.

The range in carcass length was from 28.5 in. to 32.9 in. Only 20 per cent of the carcasses was disqualified because of shortness.

The range in backfat thickness was from a minimum of .95 to 1.8 in. Only 10 carcasses had more than 1.5 in. of backfat and were disqualified from the contest.

The loin-eye area measurements ranged from a high of 6.73 sq. in. to a low of 3.63 sq. in. Seven pigs had loin-eyes of more than 6 sq. in. The average loin-eye measurement of all entries was a respectable 5.06 sq. in. Only one carcass was disqualified because of pale, watery pork.

Charles Smith, Cowley county Extension agricultural agent, said the results of both carcass contests were gratifying to show officials.

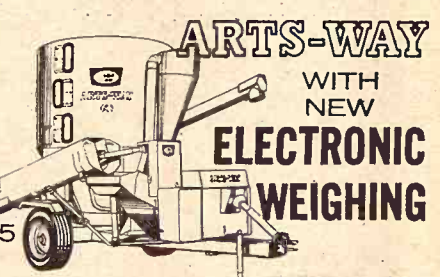

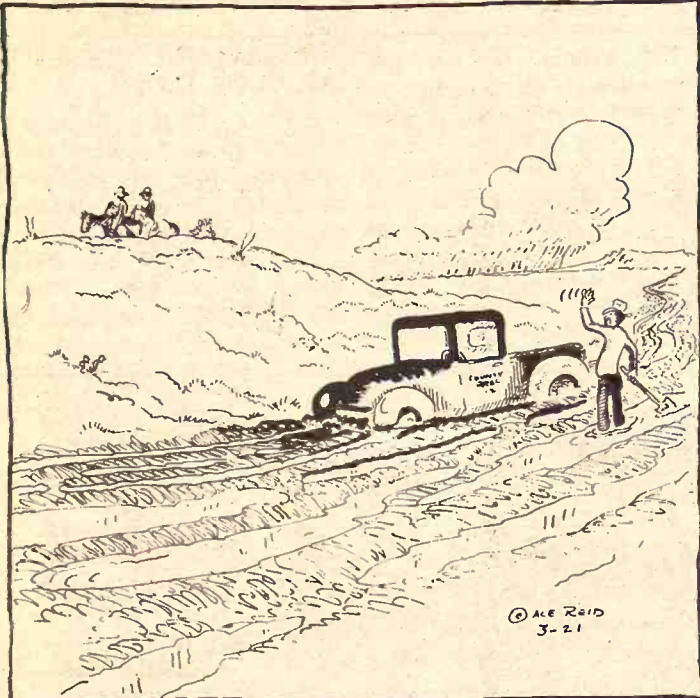

Experts Call Hog Disease Syndrome 'SMEDI'

Kansas swine producers suffer probable high annual losses from a swine disease syndrome commonly known as SMEDI, reports Dr. Del Miles, Extension veterinarian at Kansas State University.

SMEDI is a term derived from the first letters of the words stillborn, mummification, embryonic death, and infertility. A syndrome is a number of symptoms that occurs together in an animal characterizing a specific disease.

Miles notes that researchers at Pennsylvania State University have isolated eight strains of SMEDI viruses that live in the intestines and are eliminated in the feces.

Finding visible evidence of SMEDI infestation is difficult because infected swine show no outward signs of the disease. Miles explains that the primary signs of the disease are reproductive problems in sows and gilts.

If sows or gilts are infected with a new strain of virus during pregnancy, problems may develop. If the infection is early in pregnancy, all embryos in the reproductive tract may die and be reabsorbed by the sow, who then comes back into heat.

This type of SMEDI problem is expensive to sow owners because their sow maintenance costs rise significantly. Often they believe a sow is infertile when she is actually suffering from SMEDI.

If a SMEDI virus infects a sow later in pregnancy, she may have stillborn pigs, mummified pigs, and small litters.

In some instances of infection the sow or gilt appears to be pregnant but as time passes, further signs of pregnancy progression fail to develop.

When this happens, the fetal pigs are dead in the uterus and have developed into mummies. Any time a gilt has four or fewer pigs per litter, hogmen should consider SMEDI as the culprit, Miles points out.

He says the best way to prevent SMEDI from causing damage is to manage shows and gilts in a way which allows them exposure to all SMEDI viruses in the herd prior to breeding.

"With our present knowledge of the disease, we have to assume that all swine carry at least one or more strains of SMEDI virus," advises the veterinarian.

"When we introduce new pigs into the herd, we must assume they are carrying different virus strains. Consequently, if possible, sows and gilts should be mixed together for at least a month prior to breeding."

If they cannot be mixed, sows and gilts should at least be exposed to each other through a fence. This exposes all females in the herd to all strains of SMEDI virus and they develop an immunity to them.

Miles says that replacement boars brought into a hog operation should be isolated for a month and observed for any disease. After one month of isolation, healthy boars should be penned for another month immediately across the fence from the

sows and gilts they will be immune. Since the SMEDI viruses are in the manure, Miles suggests that manure from the boar pens be removed during the 30-day period and putting the gilt and sow pens to SMEDI exposure.

He strongly advises against selling sows and gilts who have SMEDI syndrome because subsequent pregnancies they are immune to the virus strains caused problems in the pregnancy.

"Once sows and gilts have SMEDI immunity, hogmen should keep them for many more years without further SMEDI problems providing new virus strains are introduced onto the farm," concludes.

Custom Locker Owner Tells Of Cooperation

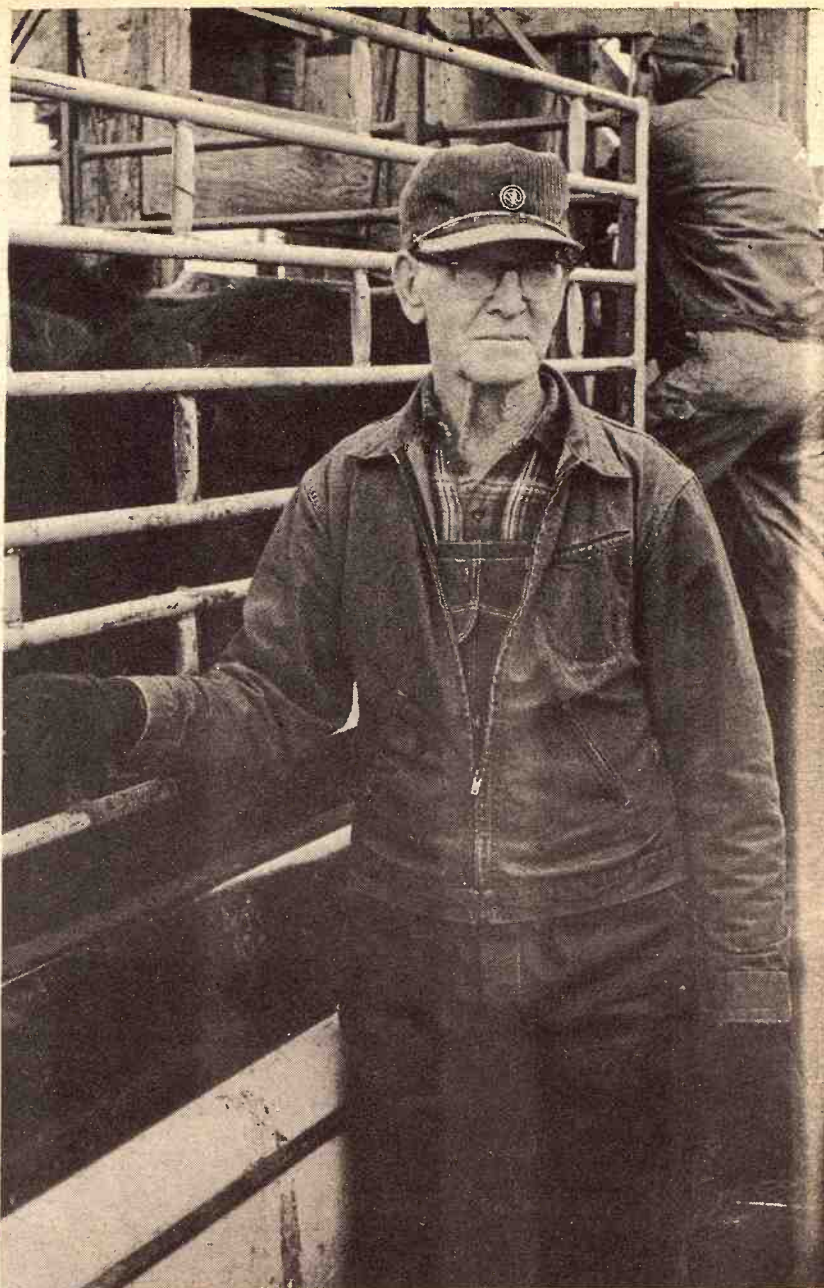
JAMESTOWN — Kenneth Hutchinson, owner and manager 27 years of the Hutchinson Sales and Locker plant at Jamestown, wants to tell "another side" of the story regarding federal requirements for all small meat lockers in the state.

Hutchinson said he recently had to make numerous changes in his operations, but it was all carried on "most cooperatively and to the best advantage of the federal law that required plants to sanitize, disinfect and clean up around the plants."

"I spent an estimated \$5,000 on my place," he said.

"This included lowering the ceilings in the slaughter room for sanitization; in the cooler, installing a sterilizer and constructing a rack to keep all items 12 inches off the floor; providing an air-conditioned room for processing; installing metal in as many areas as possible for sanitization, and using a brand for all carcasses with a stamp that reads, 'Custom — not for sale'."

Hutchinson reported that he found the members of the State Board of Agriculture "most cooperative" in working out his problems to comply with the law.

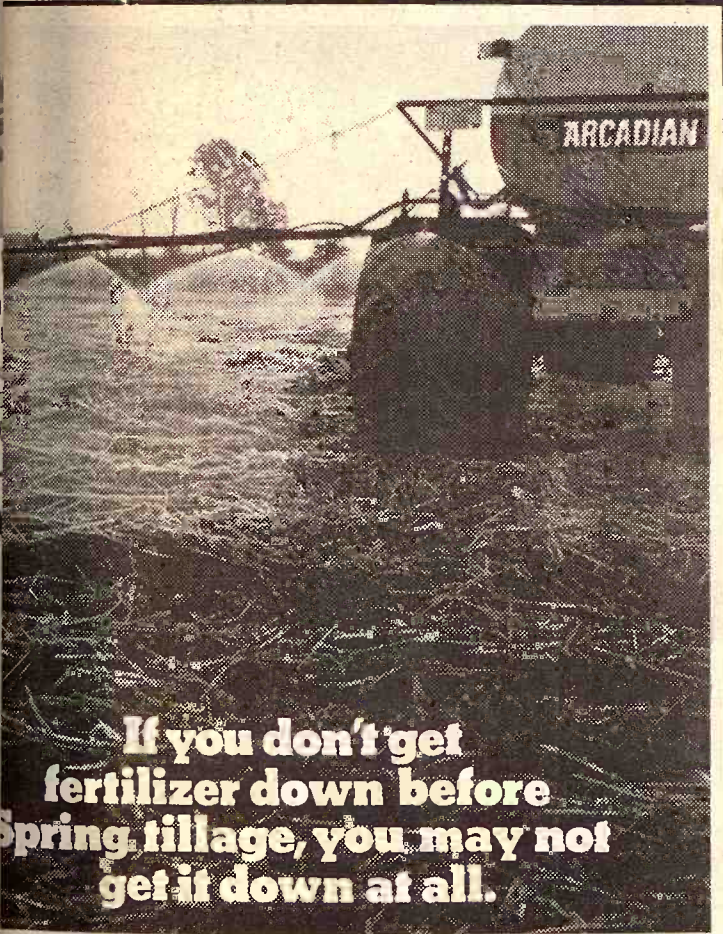

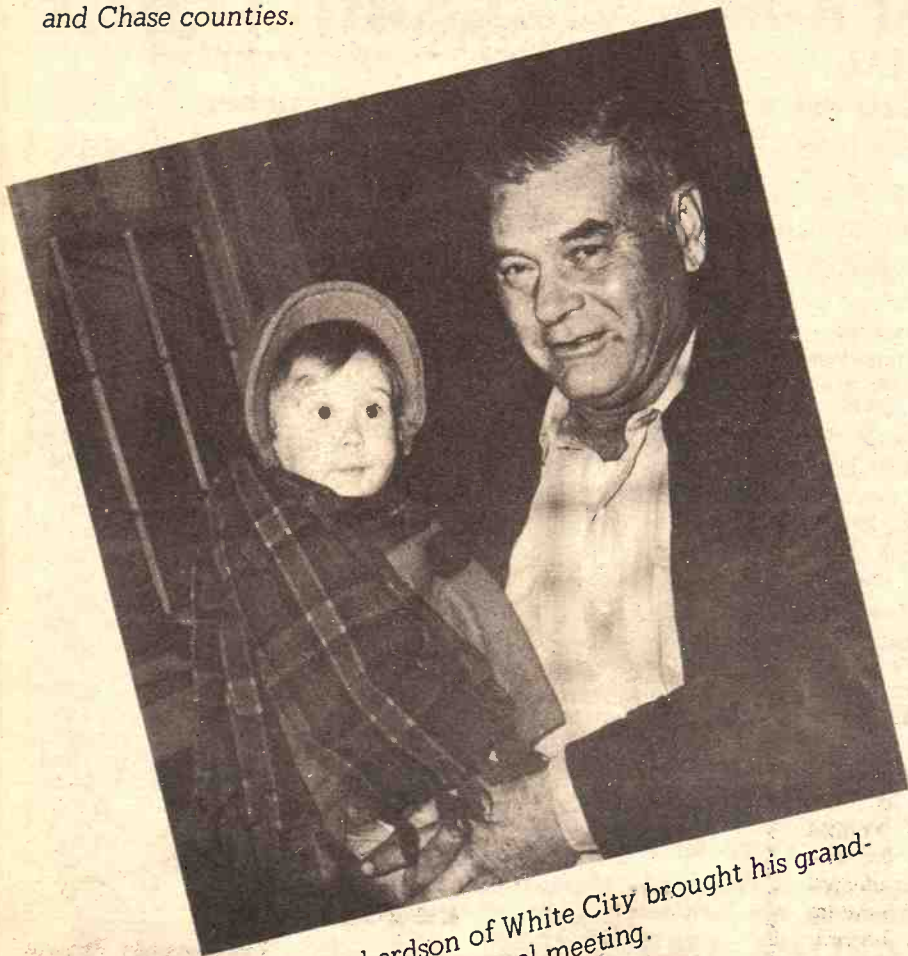

Prizes for Garden City Beef Show

Beef show with something for everyone, including \$6575 in prize money for exhibitors and visual appeal to consumers that the beef industry is producing desirable beef, describes the third annual Empire Live and Carcass Show in Garden City, April 28-May 1.

Gene Francis, Extension area livestock specialist in charge of the carcass portion of the event, says "the purpose of the show is to let commercial cattle feeders from Kansas and other states obtain valuable information to help them correlate live animal characteristics with desirable carcass and economic characteristics."

Competition for the \$1000 first prize in the live show and the \$1000 first prize in the carcass show is open to any bona fide cattle feeder from any state. Premiums ranging

down to \$25 will be paid to the top 20 live placings. The premiums range down to \$50 for 20th place in the carcass contest.

Each exhibitor can enter two animals of any breed or crossbreed, steer or heifer, from each feedlot where he has cattle. The animals must be owned by the exhibitor at least 90 days prior to the show and must have been fed as part of a pen of cattle in a licensed commercial feedlot, Francis explains.

Cattle must weigh at least 900 pounds on foot at show time and they must not show any signs of grooming or fitting. The cattle will be judged loose in the show-ring, not at halter.

All entries must be mailed not later than April 15 to John H. Dohogne, Beef Empire Live and Carcass Show, Box 699, Garden City, Kansas 67846. A \$25 entry fee must be sent in for each animal.

All entries must be certified by a local county Extension agricultural agent, feedlot manager, or show official. All cattle shown on foot will be slaughtered at Farmland Foods, Inc.

All entries will be identified, weighed, and sifted Wednesday, April 28. Cattle will be judged live Thursday morning, the 29th, and slaughtered that afternoon. Carcasses will be judged Friday, the 30th, and show participants can attend the annual Garden City Experiment Station Field Day. There will be a banquet Friday evening.

The awards breakfast and carcass display Saturday, May 1, will conclude the show. A beef cookout contest which will continue throughout the show will be another highlight.

Francis reports that the show has grown in numbers and improved in quality each year since its beginning in 1969. In 1969, seventy steers and heifers were entered and 46 per cent of them graded prime, 50 per cent choice, and three percent good.

In 1970, 139 animals were down with 20 per cent grading prime, 60 per cent grading choice, and 20 per cent grading good. Francis notes that these figures show a marked decrease in undesirable fat on the carcasses and an increase in carcass value of \$3 per carcass.

"We expect more growth and improvement in the show this year," Francis continued.

Judge of the live show will be Dr. Don Good, head of the Kansas State University Department of Animal Science and Industry. In the two previous shows Good has selected first place live animals that hung up first place carcasses on the rail, netting their owners \$2,000 in prize money.

Dr. Harold Tuma, KSU meats scientist who judged the carcass

contest last year, made some suggestions after the show that should help exhibitors choose the kind of cattle to enter this year.

Tuma, who has frequent contact with retail beef buyers from coast to coast, said that these buyers — who control 15 per cent of all beef bought annually in the U.S. — are "looking for animals with good interior meat quality, with not more than one-half inch of cover fat at the 12th rib, with a cutability grade never less than three, and with a 600-800 pound carcass on the rail."

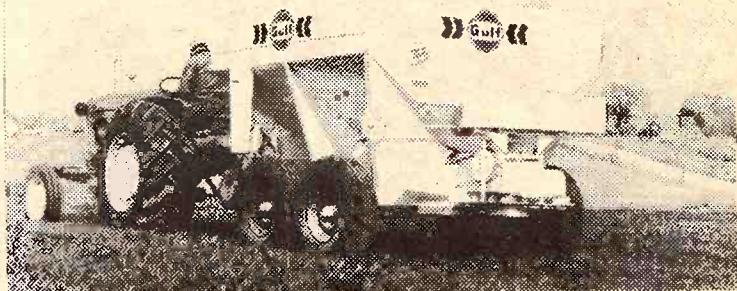

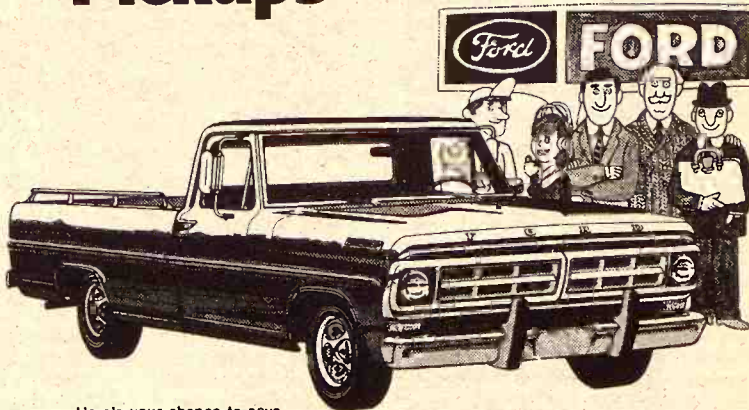

Cattlemen See 'How Other Fellow Does It' 18

Grass & G
March 23, 1971

Cowley county cattlemen and other businessmen recently spent three days touring "finding out how the other fellow does it" in the beef business.

Extension agricultural agent Charles Smith, who arranged the tour, reports that approximately 50 Cowley countians joined the bus tour of beef enterprises and beef-related

industries and research facilities.

After visiting the Wayne Rogler feedlot and cowherd near Matfield Green, the cattlemen traveled to Emporia to tour the Iowa Beef Packers Inc., an ultra-modern beef processing plant where live cattle walk in the facility and leave packaged into wholesale cuts of beef.



BEEF RESEARCH GROUNDS

Cowley county cattlemen and businessmen toured Kansas State University's beef research facilities on their recent three-day tour.

The next stop was the Flinthill Feedyard northeast of Emporia. There the touring cattlemen saw a feedlot built to health department specifications on pollution control.

The Walter Porter ranch near Admire was the next stop. Highlight of the stop was a 200,000-bushel high-moisture milo storage facility.

The cattlemen spent the night in Topeka where an evening program was livened by presentations by Gov. Robert Docking, state senator Joe Warren, state representatives Pete McGill and David Mills, and Kansas Livestock Association executive secretary John Meetz.

The following day began with a tour of the Goodyear Rubber Plant where tires for agricultural purposes were seen manufactured.

Second stop was at the 19,000 acre Raymond Adams, Jr., ranch near Maple Hill. Adams raises Hereford cattle and registered Quarter Horses.

Following lunch in Manhattan, the cattlemen toured the Kansas Artificial Breeding Service Unit at Kansas State University, the university's beef research facilities, and the KSU campus.

That evening KSU president James A. McCain spoke about his views on campus unrest. Also addressing the group were director of the Kansas Agricultural Experiment Station Dr. Floyd Smith and head of the KSU Department of Animal Science and Industry Dr. Don Good.

On the final day the first stop was on the Warren St. Pierre ranch near Clyde. Main feature was a wagon-wheel designed feedlot with 1,000 head capacity.

Next visit was the Solomon Valley Feedyard east of Beloit. This new 9,000 head feedlot has a milo popper to prepare feed. The newly organized Kansas Bull Test Station is also located there.

The C-K Ranch west of Brookville, which has 2,000 purebred Hereford cows making it the largest purebred herd in the world, was the next stop on the tour.

The Frisbie Construction Company near Gypsum featured IBM records on 130 Charolais cows. At this stop the cattlemen were told of the unique leasing arrangements on the ranch.

Another ranch near Gypsum, the Hubert Redden and Sons operation, was the next stop. The Redden's have a family corporation and a patented feeding system utilizing a tape control system.

The final stop of the three-day tour was at the Hesston Corporation in Hesston. Of special interest was a presentation on new haying innovations.

Charge Attempt To Blackmail Lyon Co. Farmer

EMPORIA — Two men have been charged with attempting to blackmail Lyon County farmer Porter Estes, 65 of Allen.

The suspects, Adam B. Woolf, 51, Independence, Mo., and Roy D. Clemence, 32, Manhattan, were arrested while with Estes.

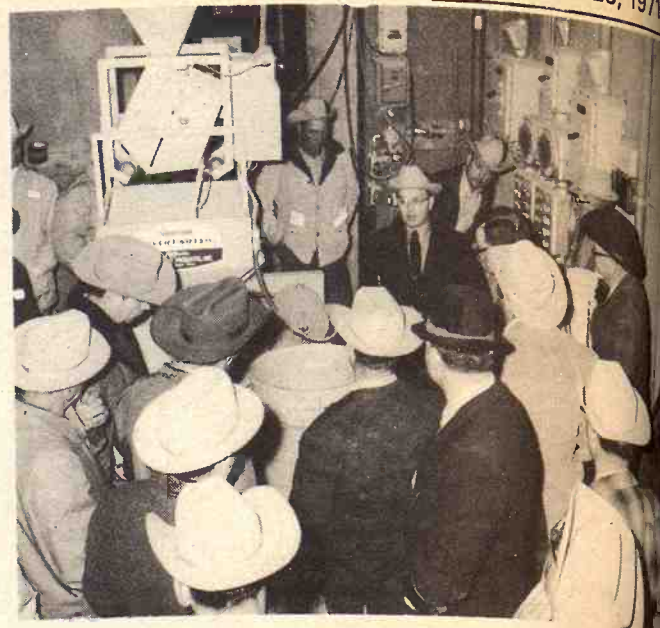
They were released from Lyon County Jail after posting \$20,000 bond each.

They allegedly threatened to harm a member of Estes' family or reveal a past incident in his life if he did not pay them \$25,000.

Sheriff's officers said Estes had notified them of the blackmail threat, but later phoned them and asked them to discontinue the investigation. Officers became suspicious, went to Estes's home and arrested the pair.

More than \$10,000 in cash from Woolf's car and items of jewelry were impounded by officers.

Preliminary hearing was scheduled for March 26. Woolf is charged with conspiracy to commit blackmail and Clemence with attempted blackmail.

Split Over Proposed State Farm Worker Bill

The Kansas Farm Bureau and the Kansas Federation of Labor had noticeably different views last before the Kansas Senate over establishing procedures for employer-employee relations. Yount, the labor representative, said the bill prohibits certain practices by employers but doesn't balance it with on farm employers.

Ray Frisbie, representing the

Kansas Farm Bureau, expressed general satisfaction with the bill.

Sponsored by Sen. Leslie Droge, R-Seneca, and seven other senators, the bill is not likely to be acted upon this session but will be held over for study for legislative action next year.

The measure would establish the right of farm workers to organize to bargain collectively with farm employers. But it would limit the right of a farm union to strike and would prohibit strikes during periods of marketing of livestock or harvesting of crops.

It would allow negotiations on wages, hours and conditions of work but would establish the right of the employer to make all decisions on the equipment and materials used to grow and market his crops.

It also would authorize an employer to employ himself on his own operations and to join or refuse to join either employer organizations or labor organizations.

The bill also would set out a number of prohibited practices, including picketing a retail store and threatening or encouraging a secondary employer to refuse to handle or sell a commodity of an employer involved in a labor

dispute.

Ray Frisbie, representing the Kansas Farm Bureau, told the committee it is "imperative" that ground rules be enacted soon so that Kansas will be spared problems regarding the unionization of farm labor which have occurred in a number of other states.

He cited a grape strike in California several years ago, which became a nationwide issue when consumers were urged to boycott California grapes, as an example of what the bill is designed to regulate.

Frisbie said the Farm Bureau is primarily concerned about making sure that a farm worker's right to refuse to join a union is safeguarded, that secondary boycotts are outlawed, and that actions which would impede the harvesting of crops or marketing of perishable goods be prohibited.

He said the California grape strike was painted by the strikers as an issue involving class discrimination.

"This was absolutely untrue," Frisbie said. "The issue is simply who will control the food supply of the United States."

Yount objected to several parts of the bill.

He said allowing the agricultural employer to belong to a union of farm workers would defeat the purpose of the union.

He also said the bill would prohibit farm workers from striking at any proper and reasonable time, and that the bill's prohibitions against

farm workers are not balanced by sufficient prohibitions against unfair practices by employers.

Yount also pointed out that the bill provides for investigations of charges that labor organizations are

engaging in unlawful acts but not in cases of charges of unfair practices by employers.

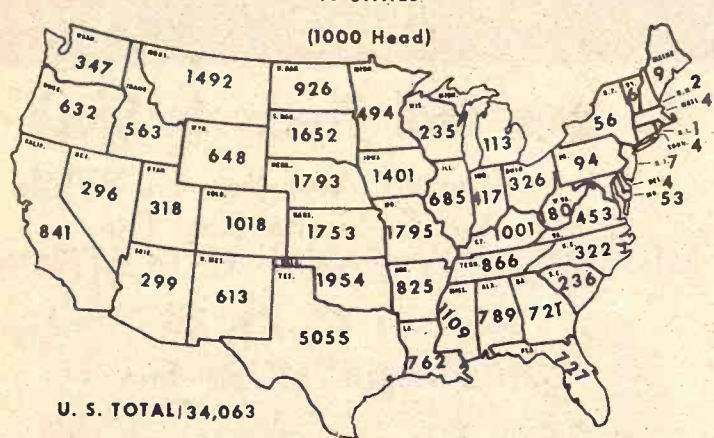

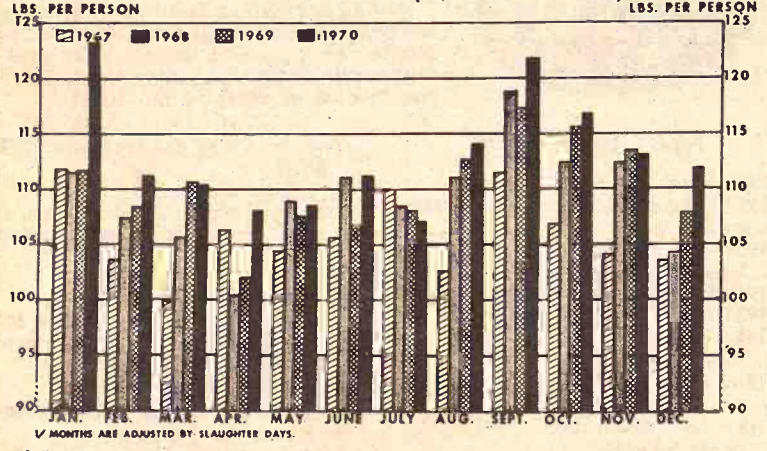
Beef Cow Numbers Continue To Gain

BEEF DISAPPEARANCE (ANNUAL RATES)

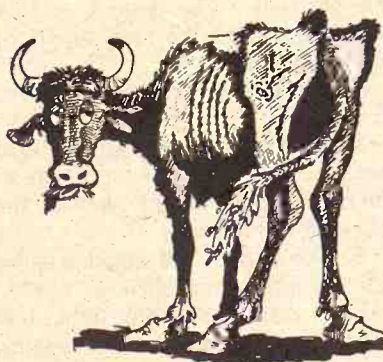


This chart shows consumption of beef by months for the last four years.

Cattle numbers in the U.S. on January 1, 1971, were estimated at 114.3 million head, an increase of 2 1/4 million head, with one million head of the increase being in cow numbers.

The number of heifers being held for beef cow replacements was up 224,000 head. The increased number of heifers being held for beef cow replacements indicates that if cow slaughter stays the same as last year, the increase in beef cows this year can be slightly more than during 1970.

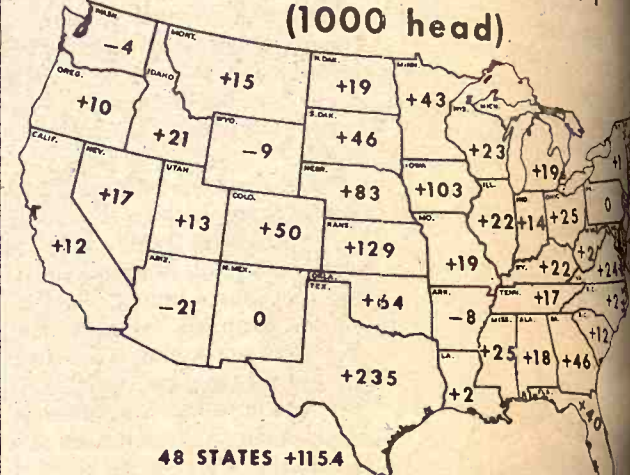
Some experts see increases that are taking place as meaning increased slaughter in 1972 and 1973.



Consumption of beef was a little over 113 pounds per person in 1970, three pounds more than in 1969. Higher average slaughter weights and increased beef imports account for most of the increase in consumption, since cattle slaughter was a little less in 1970.

Population is increasing just a little over 1 percent a year. Beef disappearance in January and February of 1971 are likely about the same as a year ago. Supplies of beef are likely to be similar to 1970 during the first half of the year. Beef supplies and consumption may be a little larger in the second half. Any increases are likely to be due to increased slaughter rather than heavier weights — the opposite of the picture in 1970.

About 40 percent of the total gain in beef cattle in the last year is in the increase in beef cows. Increases in beef cows were widespread with the largest gains in Texas, Kansas, Iowa, Nebraska, Oklahoma, Colorado, South Dakota, Georgia, Minnesota, and Florida.

Little Static On Meat Import Levels

When USDA Secretary Clifford Hardin finally announced the 1971 limits on meat imports to be the same as the figures used in 1970, the federal action drew surprisingly little fire from livestock groups.

The American National Cattlemen's Association and other livestock groups apparently figured that holding imports to 1970 limits was about all that could be expected.

Said ANCA President W.D. Farr: "The Meat Import Act of 1964 was passed to control reasonable import levels and to provide a basic stability to domestic beef production—not to be tampered with by meat-exporting countries and U.S. importers."

"Under these trying circumstances," Farr said, "we feel

the administration did the best job it could to hold meat-import tonnages to last year's levels."

Oscar Bredthausen, Grand Island, Nebr., president of the National Livestock Feeders Association, also gave restrained endorsement of the administration's action.

"Opposing factions in this country and abroad would lift all restrictions on meat imports and allow our market to be flooded with low-grade meat products," Bredthausen said.

The long-awaited estimate by Secretary of Agriculture Clifford M. Hardin on how much quota-type meat will be imported this year was announced March 13, some 10 weeks after the Jan. 1 due date specified by law.

No official would say specifically

why Hardin's estimate was so tardy. Part of the answer obviously is in the complicated method for making such estimates.

Since late in 1968, the United States has used so-called voluntary agreements with the meat-supplying countries, including the major sources, Australia and New Zealand.

The 1964 meat-import law provides that each year an adjusted basic allocation be established, based on U.S. beef production, for arriving at allowable meat imports. This year's basic figures is 1.025 billion pounds.

The secretary is required to estimate each quarter the amount expected to be imported for the entire current calendar year. The

law provides that if the estimate exceeds the basic allocation by 10 per cent the president must announce strict quotas for the remainder of the year.

Hardin's March 13 estimate was for 1.16 billion pounds, or more than the 10 per cent above the "trigger level" requiring quotas. But the estimate was also virtually the same as the 1970 import total, thus meaning that this year's volume will remain the same.

But because the estimate also was more than the maximum trigger level, President Nixon, also on March 13, announced a simultaneous action involving quotas and then suspending them on the basis of "overriding economic interests" of the United States.

Is All-Meat Diet Good For A Dog Or Not?

Two federal agencies are checking into promotional claims made for all-meat dog foods.

The Federal Trade Commission is looking into advertising claims for the dog foods, and the Food and Drug Administration is investigating labeling.

Under study is whether canned dog foods made exclusively from meat or meat by-products are promoted as complete or balanced diets for dogs.

The FTC and FDA investigations have been going on for some time. But more questions about the dog-food promotions were raised in Washington in a new study showing that exclusive feeding of all-meat dog foods may cause adverse effects in dogs, even death.

The study by three Topeka, Kan., veterinarians, headed by Mark L. Morris Jr., was printed in the Feb. 15 issue of the Journal of the American Veterinary Medical Association.

In the report, the three veterinarians contended that heavy promotion of all-meat dog foods has led many dog owners to wrongly believe that such foods are all that a thriving dog needs. The result has

been an increase in the number of dogs treated for what veterinarians refer to as the "all-meat syndrome," the report said.

The report was based on a 12-week study comparing the health of five puppies fed only all-meat dog foods with four litter-mates fed dog food containing grains and other

ingredients as well as meat.

Dr. Morris said the tests didn't involve products fortified with vitamins, as some are currently.

The long-selling brand of nutrient-fortified meat dog food is Alpo, which claims on the label to provide a "complete and balanced diet."

James G. Schmoeyer, an Alpo vice

president, said the "complete-and-balanced" claim followed a move last fall to add vitamins and minerals to the previously unfortified product.

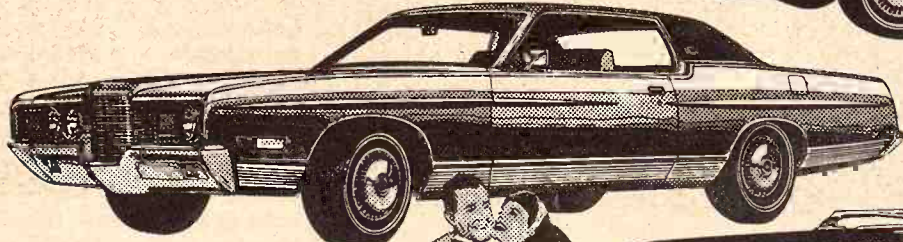

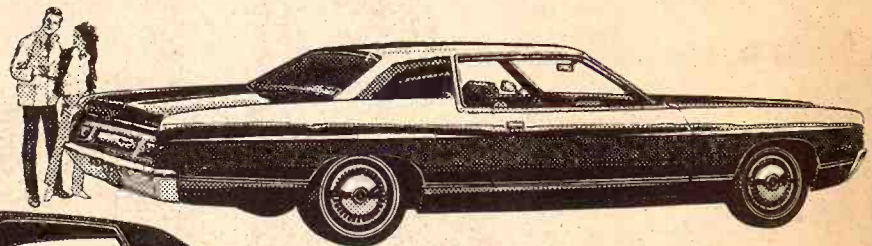

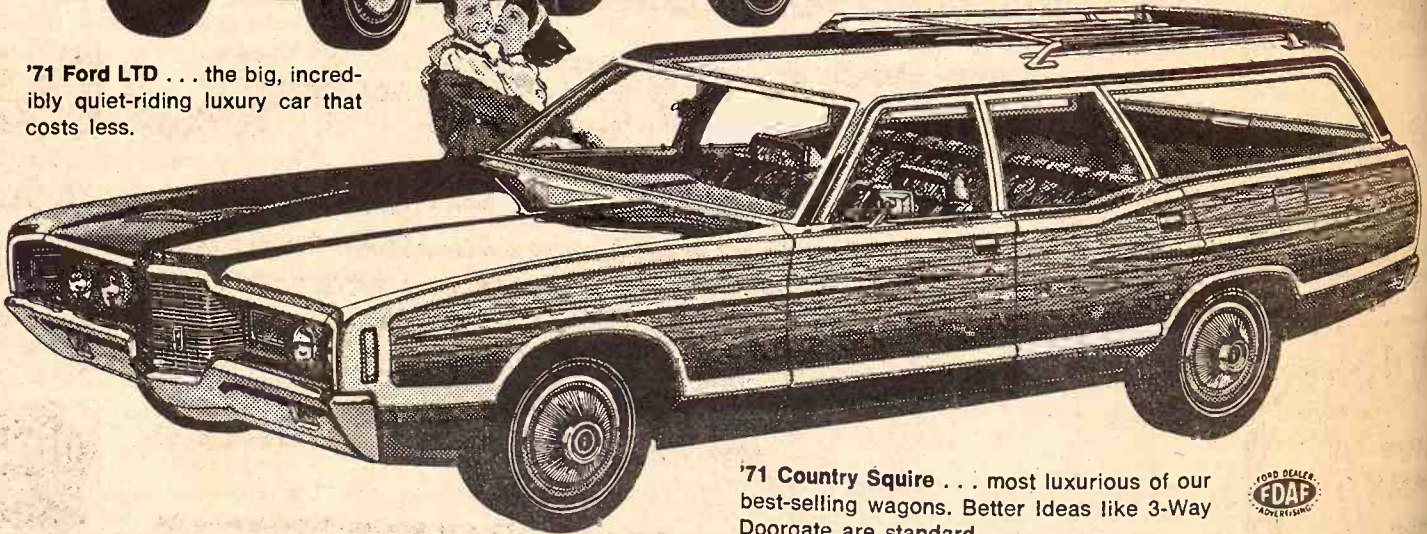

Over the years most of the tornadoes in Kansas have occurred in May, and June. The season usually starts early in 1971, and ends late in 1971. Tornadoes were reported in Kansas February through May, and only minor property damage occurred with these storms, according to Brown County, Mo., climatologist. In 1970, there were 15 injuries (no deaths) and \$14 million in property damage. Twenty-two of these were in the three peak months of the year: May, June, and July. The 18-year annual average is 7 deaths, and \$10 million in property damage in Kansas.

The Kansas climatologist with SKYWARN, the national network of volunteer observers, said that the weather service conducted by the Weather Bureau (formerly called the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration) was created within the Department of Commerce on

State Natural Gas Output Gains

State Has Averaged 51 Tornadoes A Season

What To Do When You Spot A Tornado

A **TORNADO WATCH** means tornadoes are expected to develop. Keep a battery-operated radio or television set nearby, and listen for weather advisories — even if the sky is blue.

A **TORNADO WARNING** means a tornado has actually been sighted or indicated by weather radar. Seek inside shelter (in a storm cellar or reinforced building) and stay away from windows. Curl up so that your head and eyes are protected. Keep a battery-operated radio or television nearby, and listen for further advisories.

IN OFFICE BUILDINGS, go to an interior hallway on the lowest floor, or to the designated shelter area.

IN HOMES, the basement offers the greatest safety. Seek shelter under sturdy furniture if possible. In homes without basements, take cover in the center part of the house, on the lowest floor, in a small room such as a closet or bathroom, or under sturdy furniture. Keep some windows open, but stay away from them.

IN SHOPPING CENTERS, go to a designated shelter area (not to your parked car).

IN SCHOOLS, follow advance plans to an interior hallway on the lowest floor. If the building is not of reinforced construction, go to a nearby one that is, or take cover outside on low, protected ground. Stay out of auditoriums, gymnasiums, and other structures with wide, free-span roofs.

IN OPEN COUNTRY, move away from the tornado's path at right angles. If there is not time to escape, lie flat in the nearest ditch or ravine.

MOBILE HOMES are particularly vulnerable to overturning during strong winds and should be evacuated when strong winds are forecast. Damage can be minimized by securing trailers with cables anchored in concrete footing. Trailer parks should have a community storm shelter and a warden to monitor broadcasts throughout the severe storm emergency. If there is no shelter nearby, leave the trailer park and take cover on low, protected ground.

If tornado history is any guide, at least 51 potentially lethal tornadoes could touch down in Kansas this year, and the bulk of them before August, according to Merle Brown, Kansas climatologist for the Commerce Department's National Weather Service.

Over the years most of the tornadoes in Kansas have occurred in April, May, and June. The season started unusually early in 1971, as several tornadoes were reported over western Kansas February 18. No deaths and only minor property damage occurred with these storms.

In 1970, according to Brown, 29 tornadoes ripped across Kansas, causing 15 injuries (no deaths) and over \$1½ million in property damage. Twenty-two of these occurred in the three peak months. The tornado data for 1970 compare with the 18-year annual average of 51 tornadoes, 7 deaths, and \$9.4 million in property damage in the Sunflower State.

The Kansas climatologist announced the 1970 figures in connection with SKYWARN, the annual campaign to save lives from tornadoes conducted by the Weather Service (formerly called the Weather Bureau) and its new parent organization, the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA was created within the Department of Commerce on October 3, 1970, as part of the Federal Government's increased attention to environmental concerns).

Although spring and early summer, between 4 p.m. and 8 p.m., is the danger period, "Don't let this lull you at other times," Brown said. "Tornadoes are erratic. Kansas has had them in every month and at all hours of the day."

The 1970 Kansas crop of tornadoes was highlighted by an early season twister which hit in Harvey and Marion counties March 2, causing \$600,000 property damage. This storm accounted for 10 of the 15 tornado injuries reported during the year. The area along the tornado path was buried beneath several inches of snow two weeks later.

An unusually large tornado hit in Sheridan and Decatur counties June 14. This tornado, which was a half mile wide, injured five persons and caused \$660,000 property and crop damage. It was one of the largest tornadoes of record for the western portion of the state.

Included in the 1970 tornadoes was a small out-of-season twister that touched down briefly in the northeast edge of Topeka November 8, causing \$50,000 property damage. It was the first tornado of record for Topeka for November.

Other notable tornadoes during the year were as follows:

- Lincoln and Ottawa counties, May 8, 7:40 p.m., no deaths or injuries, \$40,000 property damage.
- Manter, May 30, 2:55 p.m., no deaths or injuries, \$50,000 property damage.
- Pawnee County, June 13, 6:15 p.m., no deaths or injuries, \$40,000 property damage.
- Kinsley (near), June 13, 9 p.m., no deaths or injuries, \$125,000 property damage.

The year 1970 was quiet in comparison with the devastating tornado season of 1955, when Kansas was raked by 68 tornadoes in two months — May and June — causing 80 deaths. The greatest single disaster of recorded Kansas history occurred May 25, 1955, when a night-time tornado almost wiped out the town of Udall, killing 75 people.

The state's most damaging tornado struck Topeka June 8, 1966, killing 16 and destroying over \$100 million of property. This one storm accounts for more than half the tornado damage in Kansas during the period 1953-1970.

Climatologist Brown says Kansans can take pride in the relatively low number of tornado fatalities. "I feel sure there is a saving in lives as result of greater public awareness of precautions to take against tornadoes," he said.

State Natural Gas Output Gains

Kansas natural gas fields produced about 2.4 percent more cubic feet of gas in 1970 than they did in 1969, bringing in an estimated \$127 million at the wellhead.

Most of this income goes to landowners and producers of fields in southwest Kansas. The Hugoton field accounted for 71 percent of the total production.

The income at the wellhead was based on an estimated average of 14 cents per thousand cubic feet. Some people in the industry think the estimate from the State Corporation Commission is too low, as there have been some contracts as high as 23 cents per cubic foot.

and Labette Counties.

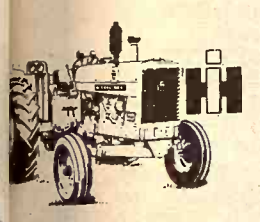

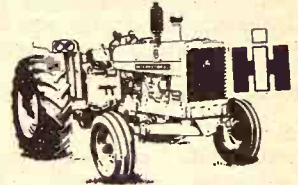

Lamb Feeders Getting Less Of Consumer Market

Agriculture department officials say consumption of lamb and mutton, never a favorite with Americans, may be in for another downturn this year. Per capita consumption of the meat, mostly lamb, held steady at 3.4 pounds in 1970 after slipping gradually most of the 1960s.

But this year, according to forecasters, lamb consumption is expected to decline again while consumer demand for other red meat continues to climb. Total per capita consumption last year of all red meats was 185.5 pounds, including 113.4 pounds of beef, 2.9 pounds of veal and 65.8 pounds of pork.

The latest USDA report on sheep and lamb-feeding bears out predictions on consumption. On March 1, the report said, sheep and

lamb feeders in the seven major producing states for the slaughter market totaled 898,000 head, down 11 per cent from a year earlier.

Feedlot placements increased during January and February, up 6 per cent from a year earlier, the report said. But officials pointed out that much of the increase resulted from more lightweight lambs being put in Texas feedlots because of poor pasture conditions.

The March 1 feedlot total of lambs and sheep and the percentage of year-earlier totals in major states: Iowa 104,000 head and 88 per cent of a year earlier; South Dakota 58,000 and 94; Nebraska 75,000 and 95; Kansas 50,000 and 76; Texas 227,000 and 91; Colorado 320,000 and 88; and California 64,000 and 88.

Greening Lawns Suggest Planning For Season

While the first green grass of spring is a welcomed sight, it is also a signal that it is time to start the season's lawn care.

Spring care for established lawns begins with a good raking to remove dead, thatch, and other debris that may have accumulated, says Larry Leuthold, Extension ornamental horticulturist at Kansas State University.

Power equipment is a real labor-saver for this job. Renting these tools is usually the most economical way to handle a small lawn. "But by hand or with power equipment, use care in raking deep enough to scratch the soil without removing

too much live grass," reminds Leuthold.

Contrary to popular belief, catching grass clippings during the mowing season does not eliminate thatch. Heavy thatch can build up from roots and stems growing near the surface. Bluegrass is more troublesome in this respect than K-13 fescue. "Never burn a lawn to remove mat or thatch," Leuthold stresses.

Thin or bare spots should be reseeded after the soil has been loosened by raking. Bluegrass should be planted in a few days, K-31 fescue by early April. Work the seed into the soil. For a quick repair job, use sod to fill in small bare spots.

A soil test is the only sure way to determine what type of fertilizer your lawn needs. Your county Extension agricultural agent will handle this for you for a nominal cost. When you send a sample, in-

dicating that it is from a lawn, the type of grass, and whether the lawn is established or to be planted.

Adding a fertilizer element — nitrogen, phosphorus, potash, lime, or organic matter — to a soil already abundant in that element is somewhat like adding gasoline to an already full tank, says Leuthold.

Nitrogen is the only fertilizer element for which a general recommendation can be given without a soil test. Most bluegrass and fescue lawns can use one pound of actual nitrogen per 1,000 square feet applied in early spring.

To get one pound of actual nitrogen, you can use 20 pounds of a fertilizer with a 5 per cent nitrogen analysis, 10 pounds of 10 per cent, 5 pounds of 20 per cent, 3 pounds of 33 per cent, etc.

The type of fertilizer used is not as important as applying the correct amount. Apply any fertilizer after the thatch has been removed, and when the grass is dry. Water the fertilizer into the soil immediately after application.

"Weeds, especially crabgrass, are

more troublesome in the spring," says the KSU specialist. "The best weed control is a good stand of grass — and proper care of it. Weeds are not a cause of, but rather the result of, poor turf."

Applying a pre-emergent crabgrass killer before April 15 is good insurance, Leuthold believes. Dacthal, Betasan, Azac, and

Tupersan give good results, but must be applied before the weeds' seeds germinate. They may be applied separately or in combination with fertilizer.

Although maintaining a topnotch lawn may require considerable effort, the best labor-saving device for growing good turf is following good management practices.

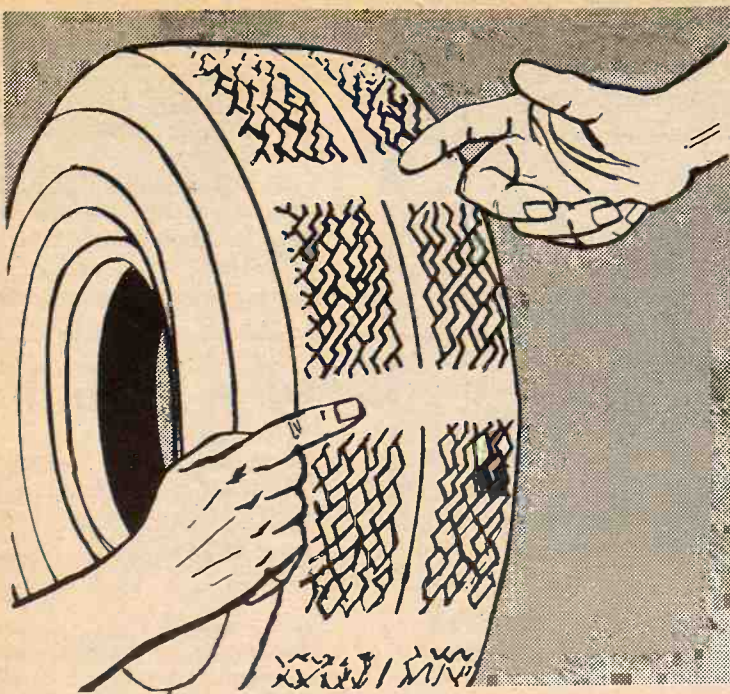

May Lose State Dollars On Local Waste Treatment

A recommended \$2.7 million allocation to local units of government to help construct waste treatment plants was eliminated last week by the House Ways and Means Committee.

The money was recommended by Gov. Robert Docking so local units could qualify for a higher percentage of federal matching funds for the construction project.

The State Department of Health had requested \$5.5 million to finance the anticipated applications but Docking recommended only \$2.7 million.

Without state participation in the program, local units of government would pay about 70 per cent the cost of construction while the federal government would pay only about 30 per cent.

However, with state participation at the 25 per cent level the federal share would jump to 55 per cent with the local unit paying only 20 per cent.

Rep. Duane S. (Pete) McGill, R-Winfield, made the successful motion to eliminate the recommended appropriation and it was seconded by Rep. Franklin Gaines, D-Augusta.

Melville, Gray, director of the state health department's environmental health services division, warned the Ways and Means Committee earlier that even with the \$2.7 million appropriation the state will lose millions of dollars in federal funds because the state matching money is lacking.

Rep. Richard C. (Pete) Loux, D-Wichita, said he understands that with some minor changes in the existing law, cities will be able to send funds to the state in order to qualify for higher federal participation in the waste treatment facilities construction.

He said a bill making the changes in the law is under consideration in the Senate.

May Lose State Dollars On Local Waste Treatment

A recommended \$2.7 million allocation to local units of government to help construct waste treatment plants was eliminated last week by the House Ways and Means Committee.

The money was recommended by Gov. Robert Docking so local units could qualify for a higher percentage of federal matching funds for the construction project.

The State Department of Health had requested \$5.5 million to finance the anticipated applications but Docking recommended only \$2.7 million.

Without state participation in the program, local units of government would pay about 70 per cent the cost of construction while the federal government would pay only about 30 per cent.

However, with state participation at the 25 per cent level the federal share would jump to 55 per cent with the local unit paying only 20 per cent.

Rep. Duane S. (Pete) McGill, R-Winfield, made the successful motion to eliminate the recommended appropriation and it was seconded by Rep. Franklin Gaines, D-Augusta.

Melville, Gray, director of the state health department's environmental health services division, warned the Ways and Means Committee earlier that even with the \$2.7 million appropriation the state will lose millions of dollars in federal funds because the state matching money is lacking.

Rep. Richard C. (Pete) Loux, D-Wichita, said he understands that with some minor changes in the existing law, cities will be able to send funds to the state in order to qualify for higher federal participation in the waste treatment facilities construction.

He said a bill making the changes in the law is under consideration in the Senate.

No Ban Yet On DDT, Other Chemicals

William D. Ruckelshaus, administrator of the Environmental Protection Agency said he had decided that the pesticide DDT and herbicide, 2,4,5-T were not "imminent" hazards to human health.

Therefore, he told a news conference, he would not suspend all uses of these poisons pending an administrative review of their safety. The review, he said, would be completed in a year.

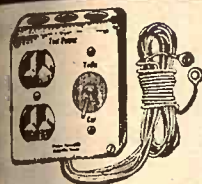
Ruckelshaus said he hoped the administrative review, which he had ordered to begin immediately, would be completed in a year.

He also declined to suspend the use of three other chlorinated hydrocarbons — Aldrin, Dieldrin and Mirex — which environmental groups had requested. But he said he had issued notices of cancellation for all three, which would set the review process in motion.

The administrator's decision against immediate suspension of DDT and 2,4,5-T disappointed environmental organizations that had filed suits seeking court orders for initiation of cancellation proceedings and for a suspension of all uses of the poisons pending the outcome of those proceedings. These organizations believed they had reason to think Ruckelshaus was inclined toward suspension.

At the same time, they recognized that the National Agricultural Chemical Association, farm

organizations, and some members of Congress, including Jamie L. Whitten, D-Miss., had been putting pressure on the White House, against immediate suspension of the pesticides.

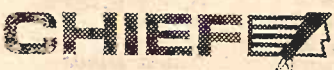

K-State Assigns Ahlschwede As Sheep Specialist

A Kansas State University animal scientist, Dr. George Ahlschwede, has been assigned new duties as Extension animals science and industry specialist in charge of sheep production work.

Ahlschwede, who has been on the Extension staff as a meats specialist for five years, assumed his new duties March 1, reports Dr. Don Good, head of the KSU Department of Animal Science and Industry.

Ahlschwede is a native Nebraskan with long-time educational ties to Kansas State University.

He received his B.S. degree in animal science from the University of Nebraska. As an undergraduate he was a member of the university's livestock judging team and

president of the Block and Bridle Club.

He completed work for his M.S. degree in meats science at Kansas State University in 1965, then assumed part-time duties as Extension meats specialist while continuing work for his PhD degree.

He received his PhD degree in 1969 from KSU, doing his dissertation on the heritability and correlations between live animal and carcass traits of market lambs. Dr. Carl Menzies, a former K-State staff member now head of the animal

science department at South Dakota State University, directed his research studies.

Ahlschwede's efforts as Extension sheep specialist will be directed toward increasing sheep numbers in Kansas. He will work with purebred sheep producers in establishing performance testing programs.

His work with commercial sheepmen will be directed toward increasing profitability of ewe flocks by increasing the number of lambs marketed per year per ewe, primarily through accelerated lambing programs.

Hearing Set On Multi-Level Business Charges

A hearing to determine if the has another business promoting pyramiding distributorships operating on multi-levels will be held in Topeka this week. The hearing at Topeka concerns the business practices of Interplanetary Inc., a customer marketing firm which bases its business on the sale of Florida and has a regional office in Wichita.

Koscot has run afoul of the New York and Iowa and has other legal troubles in other states. There have been complaints that Koscot conceals facts regarding its sale of distributorships and misrepresents how much a person can make in the program. Many of the complaints claim that Koscot uses a multi-level operation, one in which the emphasis is getting more people to join the chain of distributors. Little emphasis is placed on sales.

Such a plan brought legal action against Koscot in New York. The firm signed an agreement to contact 1604 members of operation and make an offer of restitution that could amount to a total of \$3.8 million.

More Females, Days Census

Females outnumber males in Kansas — 1,145,000 to 1,101,000 — according to the 1970 Federal census.

They live longer, say the census figures. There are 68,000 women over 75 years of age, compared with 60,000 men who have reached that age.

People outnumber the state's total folk about 2 to 1. The census counted 1,466 million living in towns of 500 or more, with 779,000 living on farms or in rural towns of less than 500 population.

Blacks account for about 4 per cent of the population. The census figures were 107,000 Negroes in the state, to 217,000.

The state's population, by the census counting method, is up 3.2 per cent from the 1960 census. But 74 of the 105 counties showed declines in the decade.

Johnson county was the state's largest gainer by far, up more than 50 per cent in population, to 107,000.

Johnson county, which includes the state's largest city, is easily the state's largest with over 350,000 persons.

Johnson county was second, with 187,000 was third; and Shawnee, up 10 per cent to 155,000, fourth.

return to his investment, then adding his other costs to determine the total. The problems are (1) to arrive at a fair value for the investment, and (2) to agree on the fair rate of return on this quality of an investment.

For example, it may be agreed that a 100-acre tract is worth \$20,000 and that a fair return to this investment is 4 per cent. If \$2 per acre per year taxes are the only costs to the landowner, then 4 per cent X \$20,000=\$800, plus \$200 taxes=\$1,000 cash rent, or \$10 per acre.

The renter wishing to determine if this is reasonable should find out what the land will produce and what the usual share arrangements for this type of land may be.

Perhaps this land ordinarily produces about \$4,500 worth of crops; the landowner ordinarily pays about \$500 for his share of

fertilizer and other shared expenses; and he would receive one-third crop-share rent in a typical crop share lease for the area.

Then a \$10 cash rent would be about equal to the typical crop share leasing arrangement. Ordinarily the owner would receive \$15 per crop value per acre after having contributed \$5 per acre in shared operating expenses.

Advantages to the landlord for use of the cash lease are that he avoids the risks of bad weather, the uncertainties of prices and sharing in production expenses, such as the cost of fertilizer.

Typical fair cash leases may provide slightly less return to the landlord than share leases because the operator is providing more of the production expenses and taking more of the risk. — Dr. John Schlender, Extension economist, Kansas State University.

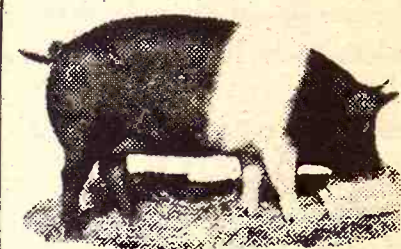

Budget Concern Delays Some Campus Decisions

The heads of the six state universities and colleges did not deal with faculty promotions and paid leaves of absence in their meeting at Manhattan last week, action they usually take in their March meeting.

Presidents of the schools agreed to delay action until April, because they are yet not certain of how budgets will fare before the legislature.

Talk in the legislature of a 5.8 per

cent across-the-board cut in spending by all state agencies has apparently disturbed the Board of Regents, who fear that such a proposal might get a serious reception in the legislature.

If instituted, the cut would total about \$22 million for all state agencies and amount to a \$4 million decrease in budgets at KU, K-State, Wichita State and colleges at Hays, Pittsburg and Emporia.

Governor Docking had recommended 1 per cent raises for faculty at KU and K-State and 1 1/2 per cent faculty increases at the other four schools. Increases in recent years have averaged five times that amount.

Earlier, government observers at Topeka figured that university heads would likely persuade the legislature to come up with something sweeter than the Governor's recommendation.

But talk of an across-the-board cut in spending had become strong enough that Max Bickford, regents executive officer, said, "The

Legislature is still a little bit upset with some of the things that have happened (on campuses) and they are talking about a lot of things that could be devastating."

The 5.8 per cent cut for all state

agencies "is being talked about by a lot of people," said Bickford. "It is strongest in the House, he said."
