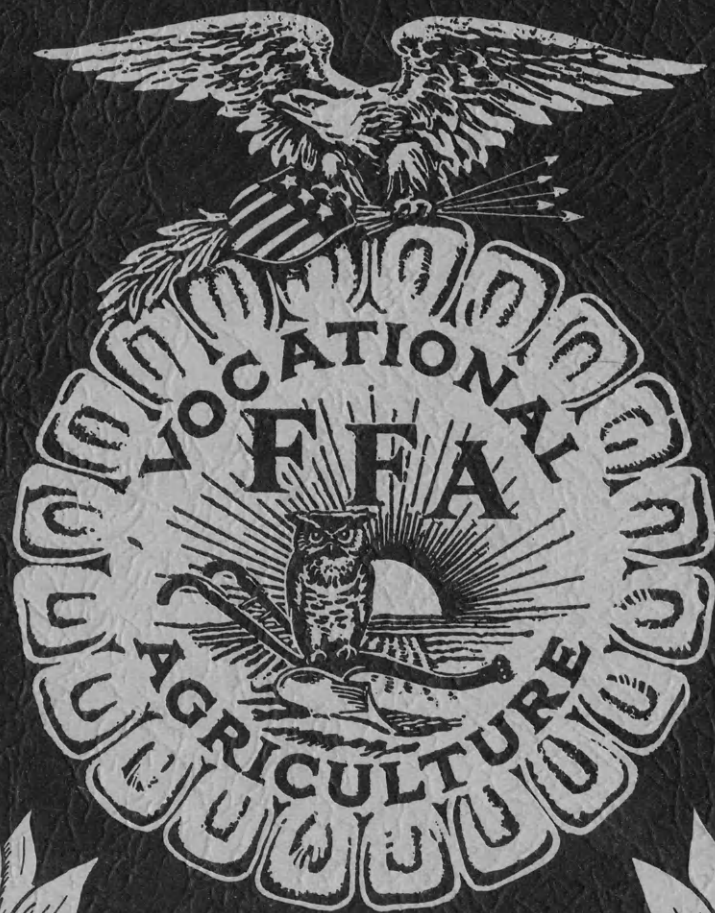

NEW FFA ADVISOR

H. Neville Hunsicker, newly appointed Chief of the Agricultural Education Service, U. S. Office of Education, was selected as the National Advisor, Future Farmers of America, at the 1965 National FFA Convention in Kansas City, Missouri, in October. He replaces Dr. A. W. Tenney who has been named the Director of Organization Relations for the Division of Vocational and Technical Education in the Office of Education. Mr. Hunsicker is the first National Advisor who is a former FFA member and a former high school student of vocational agriculture. He is a graduate of the Boyce, Clarke County, High School, and holds degrees from VPI and the Ohio State University. He also completed graduate courses at West Virginia University.

The new National Advisor taught vocational agriculture from 1931 to 1935 at Wayne, West Virginia, and served as assistant State Supervisor of Vocational Agriculture and State FFA Executive Secretary in West Virginia for 11 years. In 1946 he became the Head State Supervisor of

Agricultural Education and served in this capacity until 1952 when he joined the staff of the U. S. Office of Education as Program Specialist for Agricultural Education in the North Atlantic Region.

Mr. and Mrs. Hunsicker reside in Arlington, Virginia.

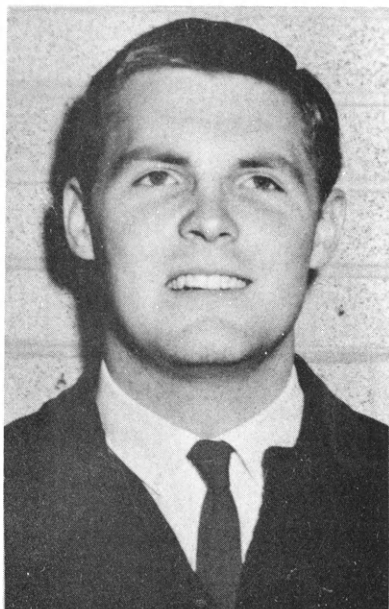

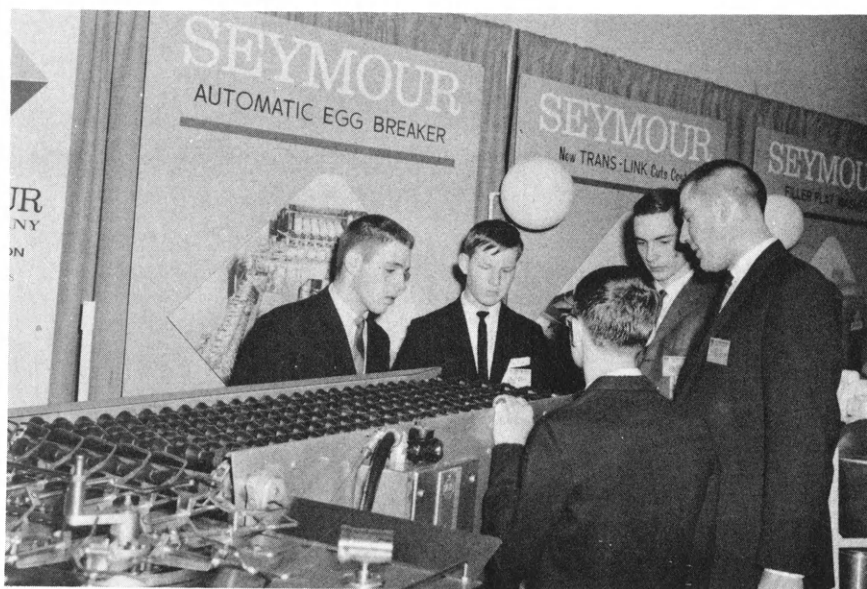

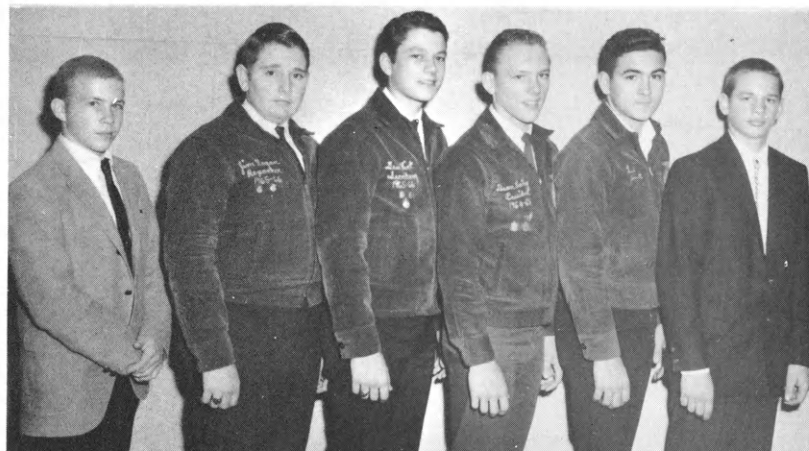
SEARS RANGE EWE PROGRAM - EASTERN DIVISION

Dean Bailey, son of Mr. and Mrs. Wesley Bailey, of the Uniontown FFA Chapter, is the Eastern Division winner of the 1965 Sears FFA Range Ewe Program. The award was presented at the Eastern Division Dinner, held at Emporia on December 1.

Most of Dean's lambs were dropped about January 26, and were marketed on June 2 and July 20. The 30 ewes weaned 30 lambs and averaged 10.3 pounds of wool. The lambs averaged 96 pounds and brought \$25.25 per hundred at market time. Dean had a gross sale of lambs and wool of over \$825 and a net income of over \$530.

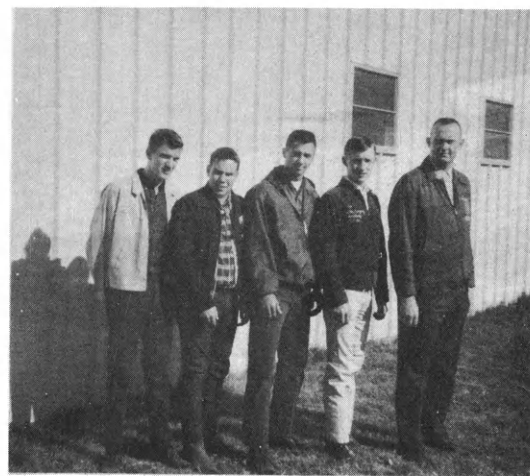
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KPSBA Sheep Judging Contest

Chapters Gather for Trap Shoot

On January 16, 1966, the Marysville, Washington, Westmoreland, and Frankfort FFA Chapters gathered at Frankfort for a trap shoot which was sponsored by the Frankfort Chapter.

"SAFETY IS VICTORY OVER .
ACCIDENTS"

"Safety is Victory Over Accidents" is the theme of Kansas Farm Safety Week, May 1 to 7, and National Farm Safety Week, July 24-30, 1966. The Kansas Rural Safety Committee has chosen the slow-moving vehicle sign as its major emphasis. FFA members and advisors are asked to assist in an educational program encouraging farmers to purchase these signs and display them on the slow-moving vehicles. Two goals are necessary for the campaign to succeed. First, farmers must buy the sign for approximately \$2, and second, town people must know what they are.

During the two above-mentioned weeks, FFA chapters are urged to have the signs available for farmers to purchase at implement dealers or other places convenient for farmers. It is felt that if all our efforts are to be put on one area we can accomplish our objective this year.

According to research that has been made in Ohio, 52.3 percent of the slow-moving vehicle accidents occur on open level highways. Seventy-three percent of the slow-moving vehicles involved farm tractors and machinery. Sixty-two and five tenths percent of the accidents were rear-end accidents. Here are the major traffic violations:

Driver's speed too great for existing conditions
Driver on wrong side of road not in passing
Think before you drink
Driver failed to obey curve speed limit
Driver passing improperly
Driver failed to yield right of way at intersection
Driver failed to LOOK AND LISTEN
Driver failed to STOP
Turning from the wrong lane.

DID YOU KNOW . . .

That there are 460 million hogs in the world. Latest estimates show the 1965 figure is about six percent above the 1956-60 average. There has been a marked drop in hog numbers in the United States, but there have been increases in all other areas. Russia's hog population is estimated to be 29 percent above what it was a year ago.
