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
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
Eight Rock Island railroad cars carrying milo and lumber almost landed in the backyard of Grass and Grain. Nobody was injured, but damage was estimated at more than \$200,000.

This derailment, the first to pose a possible danger of loss of life in the area and a train that jumped the tracks near Keats the following day, were the sixth and seventh in a seemingly extended series of derailments in the Manhattan area.



The big bell-ringer sale of the week was the feeder cattle and calf auction held on Thursday, when a total of 6,793 head of young cattle in many sections of the producing areas of the country filled the auction sales arena with an overflow crowd of cattle buyers throughout the nation. Buyers this sale paid \$1,709,158 for the offering, setting a \$37.04 average per hundred weight and a per-head price of \$251.61. The average weight was 738 pounds.

The champion carload of feeder

cattle, 25 Hereford steers, consigned by Richard Dougherty, Great Bend, Kan., averaged 780 pounds and brought \$44.50 on the bid of Rabe Bros., Lake View, Iowa. The reserve champion load, 29 Hereford Steers, owned by Kirkpatrick Ranches, Las Vegas, N.M. sold for \$45.25 to Sid Walter, Boonville, Mo. They averaged 738 pounds.

The champion load of Angus steers, shown by Albert Dunbar & Sons, Richmond, Kansas, brought \$42.25 from Producers and Texas Livestock Marketing Assn., Kansas City. The blacks weighed 760 pounds. The reserve champion Angus were owned by the Little Women Ranch, St. Louis, Mo., and went at \$59, averaging 371 pounds.

Reid Farms, Peculiar, Mo., exhibited the champion and reserve champion loads of Shorthorns in the feeder show. The champion load averaged 792 pounds and went for \$38.80 to Swift & Henry Commission

Co., Kansas City, while the reserves weighed 716 pounds and brought \$40.90 from B. and J. Commission Co.

Buyers from seven states purchased cattle in the pen of five feeder steer sale. A total of 177 head averaged 482 pounds and grossed \$43,367. The champion pen was owned by Holler Ranch, Cody, Neb., on Angus. The top calf in the lot weighed 455 pounds and sold at \$536.90.

The grand champion steer at the Royal, an Angus-Charolais crossbred, owned by Louie Perino, Deer Grove, Ill. He sold to the Plaza Inn, Kansas City, for \$5.05 per pound and grossed \$6,171. The reserve grand champion steer, another Angus-Charolais crossbred, was owned by John Kisse, Ozark, Mo. He sold to Putsch's Restaurants, Kansas City, for \$1.50 per pound.

A total of 305 head of market barrows and gilts grossed \$22,428 in the Royal hog sale. The grand champion hog, a Duroc, shown by Alan B. Wolfe, Villisca, Iowa, sold at \$3.30 per cwt. to the Kansas City Southern Railways and donated to Childrens Mercy Hospital, Kansas City. The reserve champion hog, a Duroc, owned by Barbara Jeter, Stratford, Okla., sold at \$2.05 per cwt., going to Hammond Mills, Oklahoma City.

The grand champion lamb, a 120-pound Suffolk, shown by Jill Bonham, Cordell, Okla., was purchased by the Kansas City Southern Railway, for \$4.04 per cwt. The reserve champion lamb, owned by Mike Devine, Lawton, Okla., returned home unsold.

October Wheat Boosts Price Of Farm Products

The farm price of wheat averaged \$1.89 per bushel in October, the most for the month in nearly a decade, and helped boost prices of farm products generally to another record high, the Agriculture Department said Tuesday.

Buoyed by huge sales to the Soviet Union, wheat prices were up 16 cents per bushel from September and 38 cents from August.

The wheat price average was 59 cents above October last year, the department said.

The Crop Reporting Board said

over-all farm prices rose 1 percent in October to a new record high. They had held steady in September.

Officials said higher prices for cattle, milk, cotton and oranges, in addition to wheat, helped raise the index.

It averaged 13 percent more than a year ago.

October wheat prices were the highest since the fall and winter of 1963-64, according to department records. At that time, they rose during the season to a peak of \$2 per bushel in January 1964.

The report, issued one week before the Nov. 7 elections, showed beef cattle averaging \$34.20 per 100 pounds of live weight, compared with \$33.20 in September, only slightly below the record high of \$34.60 last July.


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

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Figures Show Kansas Stored Wheat Down 6

Stocks of wheat in all positions in Kansas on October 1 were fourth lowest for the date in 17 years, according to the Kansas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service.

Feed grain stocks were of moderate size with old crop corn stocks rather large but holdings of barley and old crop sorghum grain quite small for this time of year.

Wheat stored in all positions in Kansas on October 1 totaled 356,889,000 bushels, 8 percent below a year earlier and smallest for the date in four years, but moderately larger than in the 1966-68 period.

Farm wheat stocks of 52,565,000 bushels were nearly one-fourth below a year earlier and off-farm stocks of 304,324,000 bushels were 4 percent less.

Total rye stocks of 1,713,000 bushels were only three-fifths of last year but otherwise highest for October 1 in a decade.

Stocks of four major feed grains—old crop sorghum grain and corn combined with all oats and barley—in all positions totaled 63,844,000 bushels, one-third greater than on October 1 last year but fairly well in line with other recent years.

Sorghum grain holdings from the 1971 or earlier crops totaled 26,042,000 bushels, nearly double a year earlier but otherwise the smallest in fifteen years. Holdings included farm stocks of 9,342,000 bushels and off-farm stocks of 16,700,000 bushels.

Old crop corn stored totaled 26,781,000 bushels, about one-third more than a year earlier and fourth largest in a 30-year record. Farm stocks of corn were 6,031,000 bushels and off-farm stocks 20,750,000 bushels. Combined farm and off-farm stocks of oats on October 1 were a moderate 7,804,000 bushels, and barley in storage totaled 3,217,000 bushels, second lowest for October 1 in almost two decades.

Stocks of all wheat in the U.S. on October 1, 1972 was slightly below a year earlier but above two years ago.

Rye stocks were 4 percent lower. Total stocks of the four feed grains (oats, barley, old crop sorghum grain and corn) amounted to 61.6 million tons, 23 percent more than a year earlier. Large increases were noted in corn and sorghum grain while oats and barley were down moderately.

All wheat in storage on October 1 totaled 1,879 million bushels, slightly below the 1,881 million of a year earlier but 5 percent above October 1, 1970. Farm holdings of 739 million were down 11 percent from the record high stocks of a year earlier, more than offsetting a 9 percent increase in off-farm stocks. Disappearance during July-September quarter was indicated at 545 million bushels, compared with 489 million a year earlier.

Rye stocks in all storage positions on October 1 totaled 63.0 million bushels, 4 percent less than a year earlier.

Old crop sorghum grain stored in all positions on October 1 totaled 142 million bushels, 57 percent above last year but the second smallest October 1 stocks since 1957. Off-farm stocks were up 44 percent while farm stocks were more than double those on October 1, 1971.

Old crop corn stored in all positions on October 1 totaled 1,119 million bushels, 69 percent more than a year earlier and the largest for this date since 1968. Old corn

stored on farms was nearly 745 million bushels, 76 percent larger than October 1 last year. Stocks in off-farm facilities, at 375 million bushels, were up 56 percent.

Oat holdings in all storage positions on October 1 totaled 967 million bushels, 11 percent less than a year earlier. Off-farm holdings of 249 million bushels were second to last year's record high. Farm holdings of 718 million bushels were

lower than on October 1 last year.

Barley stored in all positions on October 1 totaled 3,217,000 bushels, 8 percent below a year earlier. Off-farm stocks of 1,600,000 bushels were below a year ago but 320 million bushels were greater.



F Waterville, Blue Rapids Hold Open House In New High School

High School students in the Waterville and Blue Rapids area had open house in their new school. The completion of the open classroom concept building comes six years after consolidation of the Waterville-Blue Rapids school districts in 1966.

The \$990,000, air conditioned and carpeted school building is two miles east of Waterville and three miles west of Blue Rapids.

The bond issue to build the new school was defeated twice by 2 to 1 margins in 1967 and 1968, before the third vote in September, 1970, passed 624-582.

The elementary school in Blue Rapids and the building used by the junior high in Waterville were condemned by the state fire marshal in June, 1968, shortly after the second defeat. This probable helped

make the third bond issue attempt successful, Supt. Melvin Brooks said.

He explained the defeats probably were due to strong feelings right after unification. The school patrons thought the present facilities were adequate with the junior high students attending school in Waterville, senior high students in Blue Rapids and elementary schools in each town, he said.

The unification of the district was in name only at first, he said, and he added there are probably a few parents who aren't happy now about everything.

One board member said the new school building's completion certainly will help heal wounds between the two towns. Just five miles apart, they were rivals many years.

The bonds totaled \$1,256,000 and

covered purchase of land and equipment and construction of the junior-senior high school and also helped in the cost of a new elementary school in Blue Rapids.

The new elementary school was occupied in March of this year and the high school Aug. 30, at the beginning of school term.

The mill levy needed for the bond payback is 10 to 11 mills, Brooks said.

The \$181,000 elementary school building construction wasn't covered completely by the bond issue.

Both new schools are designed with open classrooms divided by furniture, or partial partitions, shelves, etc., Brooks said.

The district has enrollment of 570 students; 300 students in grades 7 to 12 attend the new Valley Heights school.

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
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
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K-State Swine Industry Day



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
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Long Hair Requires Extra Special Care

Long, lovely locks are beautiful to behold, but what a problem to maintain with air pollution, coloring and permanents. However, there are survival techniques for those who refuse to accept defeat and cut.

Since hair is a protein, it needs a diet balanced with protein and a limit on sweet and oily foods that activate oil glands and make hair

greasy.

As hair gets longer, it gets into worse condition because the natural protective oils from the scalp cannot travel down a long length of hair.

Brush at least twice daily with a natural bristle brush.

The next step is cleaning. The new thinking on shampooing means every two or three days for oily hair,

every five days for dry. Rinse in warm (not hot) water and work shampoo over the scalp, then through the hair. Rinse thoroughly and repeat. Then rinse again with cool water. Blot gently with a towel. Finally, use a conditioner.

REAP To Share Conservation Costs With Ranchers

The U.S. Department of Agriculture this month unveiled its 1973 Rural Environmental Assistance Program (REAP) which shares with ranchers the cost of carrying out conservation and environmental protection measures on their ranches.

Initially, funding for the 1973 project will be \$140 million. This figure, the same as the initial funding for the current program, reflects the effort of the administration to hold down federal spending to help control inflation, according to a program official.

A final decision on the total program level will not be made until general spending targets have been determined. (The program is usually run on a 50-50 cost sharing basis.)

Next year, ranchers taking part in the new REAP will receive federal cost-sharing for two new practices:

1) Installation of excess water management systems where essential to combat conditions dangerous to the environment.

These would include water pollution from contaminated water runoff caused by high water table and/or complete recycling of animal or human wastes; sedimentation and salinity or alkalinity.

2) Use of conservation tillage on a demonstration basis to reduce soil loss from land devoted to intertilled

crops.

Also, the 1973 REAP expands the authority to cost-share for the practices to solve agriculture-related air pollution problems.

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
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

the buying activity in the world market in the summer which confirmed that Russia not only suffered losses in its winter wheat crop, but was having trouble with the spring crop too.

It is a practical statement too, that until trade was opened up between the United States and Russia, making Russia a potential regular customer of grains, the American farmer wasn't particularly interested in Soviet crop conditions. Neither was the trade. It was only after the sale by U.S. firms of the 400 million bushels of wheat that the cry rose, "why didn't somebody tell us?"

In what is this apparent effort to supply more information about the Soviet Union, the USDA recently published a foreign agriculture circular which comments on Soviet crop conditions, utilization of grains and government policy.

A large part of the circular is devoted to explaining how difficult it is to get factual data — simply because Russia doesn't gather such data itself, or if it does, it is not disseminated worldwide.

One important observation in the foreign agricultural service circular is that the U.S. government believes the Soviet Union has made a major

shift in policy toward its consumers. In previous years, when that country had a short crop, it simply cut back in usage. Now the policy is that when a short crop is harvested, the Soviet government will import grains to make up the difference. The implementation of this policy would mean that the Soviet Union will be a major importer of grain — from some country or countries — perhaps over the next 3 to 5 years. It is assumed, also, that the Russians will do their best to increase their own production.

One difficulty in predicting crop yields in Russia is the vast acreage farmed. The United States this year harvested about 48 million acres of wheat. The annual wheat harvest in Russia is from 146 to 173 million acres. Thus the area to be covered

by estimates is 3 times that of the United States.

Russian wheat crops often are more than 3 billion bushels. The indicated yield this year, according to USDA data, is only 2.3 billion bushels.

Though sparked this year by the Russian sales, it is obvious the time has come for the American government, the farmer and the trade to pay more attention to world crop conditions. With more than half our wheat and soybeans and a substantial chunk of our feed grains sold overseas, worldwide supply and demand factors have a tremendous impact on our domestic market.

The USDA hasn't ignored around-the-world conditions in the past, but it is apparent even more information on conditions would be useful now. To be useful to farmers, however, such information would have to be read and analyzed.

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Chinese Corn Buy Won't Shake Market Much

A Kansas State University Extension economist says the sale of 300,000 tons of U.S. corn to Mainland China probably will have little impact on corn prices in the immediate future. But the deal may help strengthen the market over the long haul.

Roy Frederick believes the law of supply and demand will prevent a run-up in corn prices similar to the surge which carried wheat prices to the \$2 level following the massive Russian deal last summer.

"The 300,000 tons of corn purchased by China represent only 11 million bushels, or about two-tenths of one percent of this year's projected crop," he says.

"This is nothing like the wheat sale in relative magnitude. The Soviets purchased about 420 million bushels of wheat, or slightly more than one-fourth of this year's crop."

Frederick points out that October

1 carryover of corn totaled 1.12 billion bushels. That's up 69 percent from a year earlier and the largest carryover since 1968.

The massive stocks coupled with prospects for a crop second only to last year's record harvest tend to moderate any substantial increase in prices, he says.

Looking ahead, the economist notes that the corn sale could serve to open the door to future trade relations with Peking. "China represents a tremendous potential market for U.S. feed grains," he says. "Future sales to this country could help strengthen prices in the future."

Despite the huge carryover and prospects for another bumper crop, corn prices received by farmers in eastern Kansas have been running about 15 to 20 cents per bushel higher than last year. Prices peaked at about \$1.28 in late September,

slacking off to around \$1.23 by the end of October.

Higher overseas shipments account for most of the market strength, Frederick says. The export picture was brightened by the sale of 260 million bushels to the Soviets last July and strong demand from Japan and European nations. This comes at a time when supplies seem to be short in other exporting countries.

Overseas shipments for the current marketing year which began October 1 are expected to reach 875 million bushels, up from 785 million in the 1971-72 marketing year. The psychological factor associated with higher exports also has helped strengthen the market, Frederick says.

Continued expansion in cattle feeding also has contributed to the higher prices, the economist says. Cattle feeders continue to feed large amounts of corn and appear to be shooting for slightly heavier weights.

The weather also has been a factor, he says. Fall rains have slowed harvest in parts of the Corn Belt. This has delayed the movement of corn, avoiding a glut in the market and its depressing effect on prices.

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
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Consumer Gets Beef Price Hike

Consumers paid less for beef last month because of a slide in cattle prices and the first dip in middleman markups since last June, the Agriculture Department said.

The September retail price of beef, a key indicator in the cost of living, was slightly less than \$1.13 per pound on an all-cut basis, including hamburger as well as steak.

That was almost three cents less than in August and 4.4 cents cheaper than the record high in July. In August, however, the price spread—the markup—from cattlemen to consumers was a record 44.8 cents per pound.

Last month, according to a "market basket" report on U.S. farm-produced food, the middleman share for beef was 43.3 cents per pound, a decline of 3.3 per cent in a month.

Statistically, however, the middleman beef margin was 20.3 per cent more than last June and 14.9 per cent more than a year ago.

All grocery store foods averaged 0.1 per cent less in September but 5.6 per cent more than a year earlier.

Last week the Bureau of Labor Statistics reported take-home food in September rose 0.1 per cent from August. But covered only food produced on American farms and did not include imported items and seafood products.



Old Rancher Retires — Not That He Wants To

COATS — "It ain't that I want to retire," said H. E. Hoss, looking across the creek and into the Gypsum Hills he has known so long. "It's just that I gotta. I ain't sick — just worn out, I guess. Just like that old cuttin' horse over there. He's the best I ever had, but he's 32 now. I'm 88, and we're both worn

out, so I guess it's time to quit. "Harold — that's my boy — he's gonna come in here and take over. I'm gonna stay here and probably keep working. That's all I've ever done. "I'm just a dumb, old cowboy. Always monkeyed with horses and cattle and dunno anything else.

Always worked for everything I got, even when I was a kid up around Whitewater and Potwin. Dad always said I'd never make it, but I did. "Came out here in 1916 and just stayed. You know, when a man gets into debt he just has to stay. I got out of debt in '39 and haven't owed anybody a dime since. Still have 1,760 acres left out there.

"This is shortgrass country out here. It's good for cows, and you can get by with a yearling steer, but when he's a 2-year-old, you better go to long grass with him or he ain't going to make it too well.

"They wasn't any roads — just some trails across the pasture when we come here. We lived in an old cabin by the creek for awhile. Built all the buildings, even the house, myself. A tornado come through here in '68 and got the barn. I spent a whole year hauling burch where it tore up the trees and cleaning up.

"I liked it best when we used just horses. Used to farm about 100 acres with them. Used to have to stack all the feed in the fall and it was hard work, but that never hurt a man.

"It's too bad, but kids don't know how to work any more. It ain't their fault — they ain't been taught, and there's just too much money any more. It don't mean anything now. Hell, I've sold a lot of cattle for \$30 a head and was glad to get that. These cattle prices now got me stumped. Don't know what to make of them.

A young man can still make it on a ranch or a farm. Can't do it if he's got to buy the land, though, and he can't do it unless he's willing to do all the work himself. You just can't afford to hire a man, and a lotta times he's not interested in what he's doing.

"You get a feeling about the land after you've spent your life working it. You know what it needs and what it can do and how to treat it. It never looks the same way twice and you kinda get the feeling it's almost talking to you.

"Used to be, people was great hands to go visiting on Sundays, but I never was. I'd come home from church and eat dinner and saddle up and just go riding alone over the

place. You could always see something different and it sorta made the work seem worth it. I just never learned how to set around or stand around when here was something to do.

"I was on the State Livestock Commission for three years, but it got so they was all young bucks and I wasn't and I got off.

"They ain't many of the old timers left out here that was here when I come here. Maybe a couple of them still around, but they can't do anything any more.

"I'm about worn out too, so I guess it's time to quit."

Russia On Top In Wheat Deal

The 1972 Russian wheat deal, target of at least a half-dozen investigations, is emerging as a James Bond-like intrigue that may prove to be an expensive lesson in international trade for the United States.

A Washington Star-News study of the Russian purchase—one of the largest and most complex short-term commercial transaction in history—shows that:

—A fast-dealing Russian grain buying team was able to corner one-quarter of this nation's 1972 wheat crop operating in almost total

secrecy. Incredibly, the highest officials at both the Agriculture and Commerce Departments insisted later they did not become aware of the magnitude of the Soviet purchases until after their completion.

—The secrecy, which led many U.S. farmers to sell their wheat cheap, was actually assisted by the Department of Agriculture, which suppressed 2 reports detailing Russian wheat crop disasters that were prepared in July and August.

—News of the immense purchases finally broke in August only after a trade publication received a series

of strange telephone calls from one "John Smith", who claimed to belong to a British intelligence unit. His true identity and nationality remains a mystery.

—While belated public interest in the wheat deal has centered on charges of inside information and windfall profits within the grain trading industry, the greatest manipulation of the U.S. marketplace may have been carried off by the Russians.

The impact of the trade: Demolished a federal export subsidy system; pitted U.S. trading companies against each other; has sent 30 bread and food products companies before the Price Commission seeking immediate increases; and may be the reason why Russian ships are reported to be unloading flour in Chinese ports for shipment to Hanoi.

Some investigators believe \$500 million in benefits to taxpayers resulting from the trade, touted by the administration, will soon be substantially exceeded by the costs of the sale, including subsidy payments and retail price increases. Baking industry spokesmen believe consumers may even be in for a small bread shortage as part of their share of the deal.

While buying huge amounts of wheat secretly from various American companies—never letting any of them know of deals with the other companies—the Russians apparently fooled U.S. Agriculture department officials into thinking they really wanted to buy corn.

While the wheat purchases were being made, U.S. Secretary of Agriculture Earl Butz was making a

round of speeches to farm groups, telling them the Russians had "plenty of wheat—for now" and that their target very likely was huge amounts of corn.

Meanwhile, a couple of reports from U.S. embassy officials in Moscow, saying the Russian wheat crop was a failure, were "classified" in the Agriculture department here and never revealed to the public.

Farm-City Week Set In November

Governor Robert Docking has proclaimed the week of November 17-23 as Kansas Farm-City Week.

Charles Ross, chairman of the Kansas Farm-City Week Committee, said the purpose of the week is to promote a better understanding between rural and urban segments of Kansas. Ross, General Manager of Kansas Electric Cooperatives, Inc., Topeka, said this year's theme will be "Quality of Life—Our Mutual Responsibility."

Ross said a November 17 luncheon for rural and urban leaders at the

Downtown Topeka mark the beginning of Farm-City Week in Kansas. Governor Docking says in part, "The well-being of this state depends upon cooperation between two great elements: rural and urban. Both groups have a stake together in pollution protection, land community involvement problems must be solved. Rural and urban are to preserve resources and quality of life."

Frank A. Moore, Vice-Chairman of the Kansas Farm-City Week and State Extension Agricultural Conservation Service, said the week will promote the talents of rural and urban people to educate and solve mutually. A variety of joint meetings of people will be held during the week.

Beef Production Grows

Beef is our national food, and beef production is our largest agricultural industry. Hence, the recent USDA report of cattle on feed had important news for almost everyone—consumers as well as cattlemen and feed producers.

Judging from the report, beef output will continue to be moderately above year-before levels for several months, but not large enough to severely depress the prices of fed cattle. Here are the principal figures in the report and our analysis of them.

Cattlemen with good memories may recall that an unusually large number of cattle were placed on feed during the April-June quarter—17 percent more than one year before. Consequently, by the first of July the number of cattle and calves on feed was listed at 12,457,000 head, 14 percent more than in 1971.

The large movement of cattle into feedlots during the second quarter reduced the number available for placement in the third quarter. The number placed on feed during the July-September quarter was listed at 6,266,000—2 percent less than a year earlier. Marketings of fed cattle during the period totaled 6,919,000—up 5 percent from the 1971 figure. These movements of cattle left 12,457,000 in feedlots on October 1—10 percent more than a year ago.


Feedlot operators reported that they intended to send 6,621,000 fed cattle to market during October-December, which would be 7 percent more than were marketed in this quarter a year ago. Actual marketings of cattle often differ by as much as three or four percentage points from the intentions reported by farmers.

A part of the increase in the number of cattle on feed seems to be the result of placing the animals on feed when they are younger and lighter—and feeding them longer and to heavier weights. This is indicated by the fact that all of the increase was in the heaviest and lightest weight groups.

At the heavy end of the weight range (steers over 1,100 pounds and heifers over 900) there were 1,129,000 cattle—32 percent more than last year. A part of this large percentage increase is the result of holding the cattle to heavier weights. So, we do not expect a corresponding increase in slaughter. We count the steers in a weight group with the heifers weighing 200 pounds less than steers.

WHEAT SUMMARY SHOWS KANSAS ON TOP OF PILE

Wheat is produced in virtually every state in the Union. The smallest U.S. crop since 1950 was 937 million bushels in 1956, a year of severe drought in the Plains. That year, Kansas produced only 143 million bushels, and the next year that harvest was just over 100 million bushels. This year, Kansas produced 309 million bushels, and last year 313 million.

The next heaviest weight group (steers 900 to 1,100 pounds and heifers 200 pounds lighter) totaled 3,996,000—up by 13 percent. These cattle and those in the heavier group will make up most of the market supply from October through December.

The number of mid-weight cattle (steers 700 to 900 pounds and heifers 200 pounds lighter) totaled 3,809,000—2 percent less than last year. Many of these cattle will reach the market from early December through February.

The number of lightweights (steers under 700 pounds and heifers under 500) was listed at 2,790,000—up 17 percent. But don't expect a corresponding increase in marketings in the spring, because the marketings of these cattle probably will be stretched over a longer period of time than last year.

Farmers Look For Safety, Comfort

Farmers are thinking more about safety and comfort than ever before, if measured by their increasing investment in cabs on tractors and combines.

The Farm and Industrial Equipment Institute, at a recent meeting of FIEI cab manufacturers, estimated that there has been a 28 per cent increase in the sale of agricultural tractor cabs in the past three years. Data shows an increase from approximately 50,000 units in 1969 to 64,000 in 1971, and that the use of air conditioning has tripled. Air conditioning is now being installed in about one out of seven cabs.

Cabs are reportedly very popular on the 60 to 200 horsepower tractors, a trend which appears to coincide with the continuing trend in increased sales of tractors in the higher horsepower brackets.

Cabs on self-propelled combines also are in great demand. Sales have nearly tripled in the past three years with about 85 per cent of all new combines being equipped with cabs, 20 per cent of which are air conditioned.

This increasing popularity of cabs is probably based on the significant safety and comfort that has resulted from intensive research and development. Cabs can provide pressurized, clean, filtered air, heating and cooling, large windows and mirrors for all-around visibility, reduction of noise, operator control and monitoring devices, comfortable wrap-around seats with seat belts, roll-over protection, radio systems for market news, weather reports and two-way communications to the farmstead.

Cabs provide an environment that reduces operator fatigue, a major cause of risk-taking, and contributes to increased operator efficiency and

therefore greater safety, a safer, comfortable that long, hot, dry for all-seasons.



Two County Agents Cited For Work In Agriculture

MANHATTAN—Two county Extension agents whose service to Kansans spans more than 33 years will be cited in Atlanta, Ga., this week for their contributions to agriculture and rural living.

Receiving Distinguished Service awards at the annual meeting of the National Association of County Agricultural Extension Agents will be Kenneth W. Fromm of Beloit (Mitchell county) and Raymond E. (Ted) Wary of Columbus (Cherokee county).

Fromm's citation calls attention to the fact he initiated a water development program that will eventually serve 900 rural households, 10 communities in a five-county area, and irrigation districts which he helped organize. The irrigation program could result in increased production amounting to millions of dollars annually.

The Mitchell county agent has worked with livestock producer organizations to increase beef,

sheep and swine production. An 8,500-capacity commercial feedlot organized in Mitchell county in 1970 has marketed more than \$4 million worth of cattle.

Fromm has also helped expand

countywide fire protection and training through fire districts and community involvement.

Shawnee County and Topeka State in percentage of population over the previous year according to census figures released by the State Dept. of Agriculture. Shawnee County population accounted for 54 per cent of total state population during the period from January, 1971, to January, 1972. Topeka County accounted for 44 per cent of the total state population during the year.

The State Board of Agriculture said the total population of Kansas Jan. 1, 1972, was 2,277,905, an increase of 28,657 persons over the date in 1971. The total increase amounted to a percentage growth of .0125 per cent.

Agricultural Census The State Board of Agriculture said Shawnee County had 222 persons on Jan. 1 last year, a total population in the county of 171,999 on Jan. 1 of this year. Topeka had a population of 126,000 on Jan. 1, 1971, as compared to a population of 138,964 on Jan. 1 of this year.

Figures used in the agricultural census were taken from reports submitted by county officials across Kansas. The State Dept. of Agriculture said Sedgwick County remained the largest county in Kansas with a population of 333,771 persons. Johnson County was second largest in Kansas with a population of 231,943 persons. Wary's work with cool season grass and bermudagrass demonstrations have helped point to the production in his county.

He organized a livestock producers association and initiated brucellosis eradication programs, in addition to conducting schools on beef, swine and soil fertility.

Wary's county is first in Kansas in soybean production.

State Ag Department Tabulates Census Figures

Shawnee County and Topeka led in percentage of population over the previous year, according to census figures released by the State Dept. of Agriculture.



Batteries Explode More Frequently in Cold Weather

With winter coming on, auto and battery chargers will be used frequently.

Wyn S. Holmes, Extension cultural engineer at Kansas State University, cautions that batteries can explode, especially in cold weather.

A Atomic Energy Commission test of a battery explosion which occurred when booster cables were connected during sub-zero temperatures. Fortunately, the person connecting the battery cables was seriously injured because he had the acid off quickly.

In addition to the danger from the battery casing can shatter and send pieces of shrapnel flying through the air. What causes this? A charged battery, or one being charged, generates hydrogen gas which is highly explosive, explains Holmes. It takes as little as four percent hydrogen in air to form an explosive mixture. It is important to not sparking near the cell caps where the hydrogen gas is present. In actual cases the following are some reasons why battery explosions occur:

- Connecting or removing the terminal cables while the battery charger is in the "on" position.
- Creating a spark in connecting the cable to the improper pole.
- Using a match or other potential source of ignition for lighting the work.
- Fastening cables to a battery post which is internally damaged.
- Installing a fully charged battery with some switches in the "on" position.


The danger can be minimized by following certain procedures. Make the booster cable connection on the "charged" battery first; this way, there will be no path to ground and no sparking. Make the connection on the motor or frame, away from the discharged battery, instead of on the terminal which is grounded.





Reminders For Dairymen

An important factor relating to diarrhea in calves is the site of calving.

Ralph Bonewitz, Extension dairyman at Kansas State University, cautions against calving under unsanitary conditions in the corral, such as those caused by dust in the summer and muddy lots.

Today's herds are larger, resulting in concentrations of feces and urine in the corral and more contamination of soils by infected birth fluids and waste.

"Every dairyman should have a maternity stall that can be cleaned and disinfected between calvings," suggests Bonewitz. A maternity stall close to other facilities permits closer supervision at calving time. And Bonewitz is a firm believer in close supervision at calving time.

The K-State specialist says some dairymen want to have a clean pasture for calving in the summer.

Approximately 80 percent of a calf's birth weight is gained the last three months of pregnancy. The dry period is important from a feeding standpoint because of nutrient requirements of the fetus.

The cow must be conditioned for high feed intake 2 or 3 weeks before calving by starting a lead feeding program.

Bonewitz says the dry cow should have vitamin A added to the grain ration. If a vitamin A deficiency is suspected, vitamin A shots should be considered.

There is no active immunization of a cow's fetus by the transport of antibodies across the placenta, such as occurs in humans. If a calf is to receive benefits of antibody immunization, colostrum must be consumed as soon as possible following birth. Research indicates that calf raising is more difficult when colostrum is not fed.

Calves may be better protected when colostrum from several cows is mixed and fed, says Bonewitz. Colostrum milk is valuable as calf feed and should not be wasted. When fed to older calves, it may need to be diluted, or fed in smaller amounts.

"Don't forget the iodine for the navel as soon as the calf is born," advises the K-State specialist. Iodine should be placed inside as well as on the outside of the navel

cord. Calves should be identified following birth by a photo, sketch, tattoo, eartag or chain number. Don't forget to record the sire and dam, too.

Bonewitz points out that commercial grade cattle of the future will be identified and classified to increase the accuracy of the type information in a bull's summary as well as to assist breeders in evaluating the type strengths and weaknesses in their herds.

Grade females will receive only a descriptive type evaluation of grade animals. The classifier will use the eartag number and sire's registration number to check the identity of all grade animals.

If the sire's identification is not recorded on the DHI or breeder's herd books, the animal's descriptive type information will not be included in the sire summary.

"Start an identification program now and classify your grades so faster improvement can be made on workability and wearability traits of your dairy cattle," advises Bonewitz.

Hog Cholera Quarantine Ends In Osborne County

The quarantine on movement of hogs from a portion of northcentral Kansas has been canceled, the Department of Agriculture and the Kansas Livestock Commissioner's office announced Monday.

Officials said the animals infected with hog cholera have been destroyed and no new infestations had been found.

Dr. George Gurss, livestock commissioner, said the state did not lose its hog cholera-free status from the USDA, since the infection did not spread from the cases first reported about a month ago in the north-central sections of the state.

Livestock officials continued to urge that hog producers maintain surveillance and report immediately any symptoms resembling those of cholera.

The quarantine was reduced a week ago to include only Osborne County, and that restriction was lifted Monday. Officials said the number of animals destroyed was minimal.



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



Flood Insurance Information Drive Started In Kansas

Kansas State Insurance Commissioner Fletcher Bell said he has asked all licensed property insurance companies to embark on an extensive informational program to advise their policy holders of the availability of flood insurance.

Bell said he asked the companies to formally advise homeowners and businessmen in eligible communities that lowcost flood insurance is available. The formal notice is to be made simultaneously with the solicitation, issuance and renewal of all property insurance policies.

Bell said at the same time he was advising the insurance companies that applications for coverage may be submitted by any licensed insurance agency on behalf of a prospective policy holder. He said he was informing the companies also where information and material regarding the flood insurance program could be obtained.

Bell said citizens and property

owners in nine Kansas cities are now eligible to apply for covered under the national flood insurance program. The cities are Topeka, Wichita, Overland Park, Leawood, Fairway, El Dorado, Garden City, Coffeyville and Dodge City.

The insurance commissioner said property owners in Topeka and Fairway have been eligible to purchase flood insurance for more than two years, yet only 47 policies have been purchased.

"This, in my opinion, indicates that federal, state and private efforts have not been successful in informing the general public concerning the availability of the flood insurance program," Bell said. "Obviously we all hope that a flood disaster such as that which struck Rapid City and localities in the eastern part of the country earlier this year does not occur in Kansas, but if a tragedy of this nature does strike, we simply cannot afford to let people in eligible floodprone areas suffer needless economic loss because they were unaware that insurance protection was available."

Oklahoma Republican political motivation a million lawsuit filed by wheat farmer alleging grain companies and assistant secretary conspired in the bumper crop. Edgar W. September 1972 was 134 million pounds, up 8 percent from September last year. The number of cattle slaughtered totaled 212,000 head, an increase of 5 percent from September a year ago.

Average live weight per head at 1,069 pounds, was up 29 pounds from September 1971. Beef production during the January-September period of 1972 was 1,165 million pounds, compared with 1,085 million pounds a year earlier.

Pork production in Kansas during September 1972 was 27 million pounds, down 9 percent from September 1971. The number of hogs slaughtered totaled 180,000 head, down 12,000 head from September a

year ago.

The average live weight per head was 233 pounds, down 6 pounds from the previous September. Cumulative production of pork during the first nine months of 1972 totaled 250 million pounds, 5 percent less than in 1971.

Lamb and mutton production in Kansas during September 1972 totaled 23,000 pounds, compared with 20,000 pounds during September 1971. Lamb and mutton production during the first three quarters of 1972 totaled 177,000 pounds, down 1 percent from the same period in 1971.

Commercial production of red meat in the 48 States totaled 3,033 million pounds in September, down 6 percent from a year earlier. Cumulative production during the January-September period of 1972

totalled 27,156 million pounds, 3 percent lower than in the same period last year.

Commercial meat production includes slaughter in federally inspected and other slaughter plants, but excludes animals slaughtered on farms.

Beef production in September was 1,883 million pounds, less than 1 percent change from the 1,889 million pounds in September 1971.

Cattle kill totaled 3,045,700 head, down 3 percent from a year earlier. Live weight per head was 1,026 pounds, 18 pounds heavier than last year.

The Nation's beef production during the first nine months of 1972 was 16,489 million pounds, compared with 16,319 million pounds during the same period in 1971.

Pork production totaled 1,072

million pounds, 13 percent below a year ago. Hog kill totaled 6,809,400 head, down 15 percent from September 1971. Live weight per head was 237, up 1 pound from a year earlier.

Cumulative production of pork during the January-September period of 1972 totaled 9,948 million pounds, 8 percent below the same period a year ago.

There were 44 million pounds of lamb and mutton produced in September, down 6 percent from last year. Sheep and lamb slaughter totaled 893,400 head, down 7 percent from last year.

Average live weight was 100 pounds, the same as a year ago. Lamb and mutton production for the first nine months of 1972 totaled 396 million pounds, down 3 percent from a year earlier.



Ag Consulting Firms Poll Shows Nixon The Farm Favorite

An agricultural consulting firm said last week that commercial farmers in a dozen midwestern states favored President Nixon more than 3 to 1 over Sen. George McGovern when they were polled in early October.

Doane Agricultural Services, Inc., St. Louis, said the results showed: Nixon 66.0 percent; McGovern 17.6; undecided 12.8; other candidates 3.6 percent.

Forest Goetsch, president of Doane, said in a statement the survey "would probably be indicative" of how those farmers vote.

The survey was conducted during the first ten days of October among 5,300 of the firm's "farm panel" members who are used regularly by Doane to help construct profiles of farmers and help determine trends associated with agriculture.

The survey was conducted in Kansas, Nebraska, Wisconsin, Minnesota, Missouri, Iowa, Illinois, Indiana, Ohio, North Dakota, South Dakota and Michigan.

Some 2,735 of the questionnaires were returned, Doane officials said. Projecting these mathematically,

Doane said Nixon was preferred by 549,074 farmers and McGovern by 146,725 in the 12-state area.

The Doane survey also showed 73.9 percent favored current government crop programs. That compared with 11.9 percent who said they liked "tight allotments" or controls over crop production, and 14.2 percent who said they were undecided.

The St. Louis firm said it has not conducted a comparable presidential poll among farmers in the past.

However, Doane officials said, "You would have to go back to the 1952 election to find a similar high percentage of farmers voting for the Republican candidate." Then 67 percent of all farmers voted for Dwight Eisenhower, Doane said.

Projected among all farmers, Doane reported the following Nixon-McGovern figures based on its early October survey, not including undecided and other preferences:

Illinois—Nixon 74.7 percent and McGovern 12.4; Indiana—72.5 and 10.5; Ohio—68.4 and 14.3; Wisconsin—66.5 and 20.4; Iowa—64.7 and 17.5; Kansas—72.2 and 11.6; Min-

nesota—61.7 and 21.2; Missouri—66.8 and 15.7; and Nebraska—60.7 and 16.3.

Doane officials said the samplings in North and South Dakota were too small to make separate calculations. However, Nixon with 54.4 and McGovern 36.6.


