'Look What LBJ Has Done For You,' Freeman Tells Wheatgrowers

WICHITA — Orville L. Freeman, secretary of Agriculture, said elections in November will amount to a referendum on multibillion-dollar farm programs.

Vital phases of the Johnson administration's farm-aid programs will be extended or killed by the president and the Congress elected November 8, Freeman said.

Farmers To Judge

Speaking to a convention of the National Association of Wheat Growers, Freeman called on farmers to weigh candidates carefully.

"Look at the record," he said. "Ask the candidates for all of

fices in this election year where they stand on extension of the food and agriculture act of 1965, and what they would replace it with if they would change it.

"You have a right — and an opportunity — to know where the presidential candidates stand on your program. Exercise that right. Don't be satisfied with 'maybe' or general cries for improvement.

Freeman said President Johnson has signed into law 184 bills directly benefiting farmers.

"Time after time in the last four years I have been present in the White House while the President gave his wholehearted, personal attention to persuading the doubtful that

farm legislation was vital to the national interest," added Freeman.

For Reserve Program

There is urgent need now for a grain reserve program to help bolster prices at a time when grain markets are low, he said. Under such a program, the government would buy and store grain when prices were low and sell it when there were short supplies.

The secretary said farmers might now have such a program had republicans given legislation of this type stronger support during the recent session of Congress.

National Prep Rodeo At Topeka In August

TOPEKA — This city will be host to the National High School Championship Rodeo next August, and a committee has been set up to locate backers to insure against a deficit.

Wilbur Levering is chairman of the committee. He said about \$50,000 is required to put on the rodeo and that the last four years no city has had to call on its underwriters.

From 23 states over 450 contestants are expected to be in the rodeo. There will be 11 separate events in two show rings with more than 1100 head of stock being used.

The Mid America Fairgrounds will be the location.

Cite State Full-Depth Asphalt Roads

COLLEGE PARK, Md. — An international engineering magazine has cited Kansas roadbuilders as pioneers in full-depth asphalt pavement construction that could revolutionize road, street and highway paving worldwide.

Among full-depth pavements cited are Interstate 70, US 156 in Ellsworth County, K-99 north of Wamego, Third street in Hutchinson, Southwest trafficway in El Dorado, and 45th street in Topeka.

Asphalt magazine, in a major article in its January 1968 issue, tells of a method in which all the asphalt pavement layers are placed directly on the prepared earth foundation.

Although full-depth asphalt base payments have only recently begun to achieve wide-spread acceptance, the article points out that Kansas began successfully building this type of pavement as many as 40 years ago and now has some 3000 miles of full-depth pavements in service on the state highway system.

In contrast to granular base pavements with relatively thin asphalt surface courses, a full-depth asphalt pavement is defined as an asphalt pavement in which asphalt mixtures are employed for all courses above the subgrade or improved subgrade. It is laid directly on the subgrade.

No Mark Yet From NFO Hold

A grain-market boycott by the National Farmers Organization, now three weeks old, has had little effect on major markets, buyers and the NFO itself re-

ports.

Seasonably lower prices for wheat, oats, corn and rye were listed on the Chicago Board of Trade, following a sluggish trend that has prevailed since fall.

Soybeans gained five cents since the 30-state withholding action was announced Jan. 11, but this has been attributed largely to higher exports and increased storage under government loan.

Buyers said there has been neither shortage nor stockpiling.

Cash grain prices at Minneapolis for wheat and corn actually slipped as much as four cents per bushel between Jan. 11 and 23. The Federal-State Market News Service said the same was true for Kansas City and Chicago markets.

NFO president Oren Lee Staley says it is too early for the withholding action to have taken effect, and there has been no change in the organization's plan to extend the boycott to meat and milk in an effort to boost prices by shortening supply.

In its strategy of surprise, the NFO keeps secret the target dates for withholding actions. It also refuses to say how many members it has, a figure that has been estimated at about 300,000.

An Iowa State University economist said elevator stocks

of most grains on Jan. 11 would last 30 days, absorbing some of the potential effect of the boycott.

Samuel L. Rice, a Toledo, Ohio, grain elevator operator, said while his trade has not been affected some country elevators "undoubtedly have been."

Staley said "more dramatic results" would be seen in the weeks ahead. Farmers have been told not to sell until prices reach \$1.50 a bushel for corn, \$2 for grain and \$3 for soybeans.

Waite Bulls Average \$417

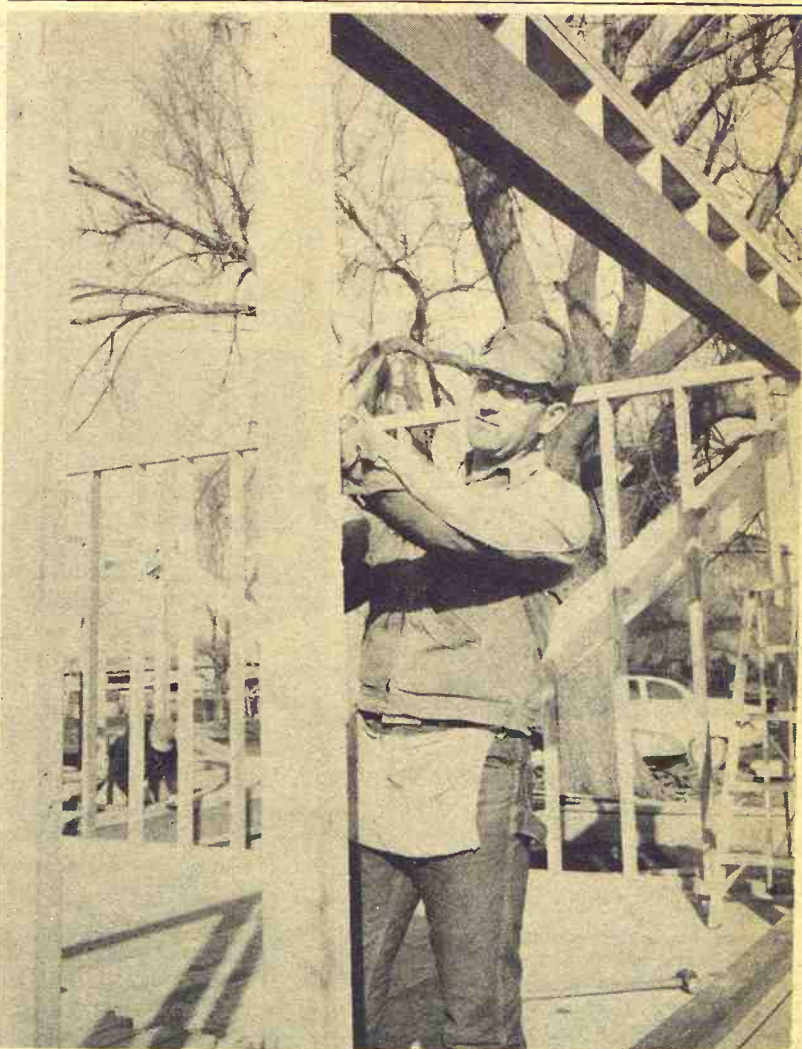

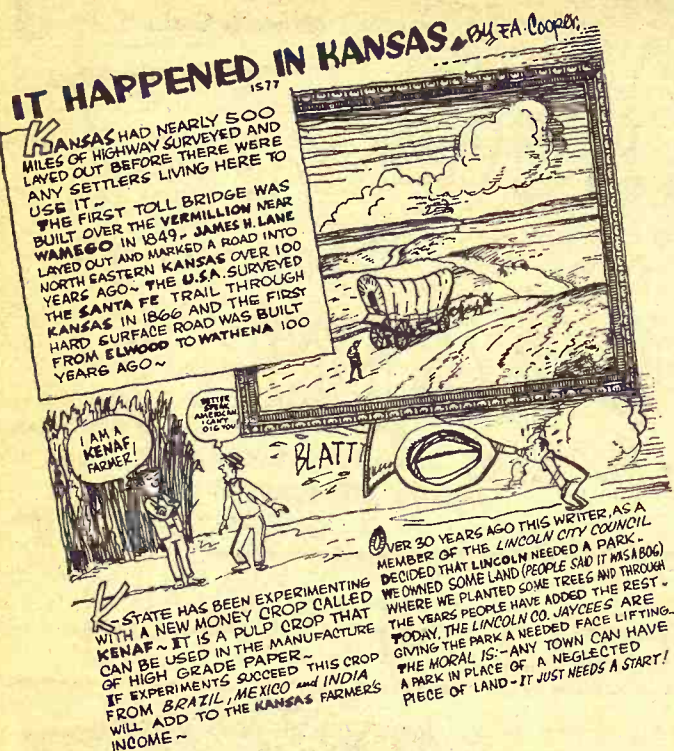

Merge Livestock Offices, Asks Governor Docking

TOPEKA — Gov. Robert Docking called an end run play in his long-standing fight with the Kansas Livestock Association by suggesting in his budget message that the offices of the brand commissioner and livestock sanitary commissioner be combined.

His refusal to appoint a livestock sanitary commissioner, dictated by the livestock association, brought the controversy to an impasse. Commissioner Glenn Pickett continues to serve without appointment although his term expired March 1.

He asked the legislators to statutorily combine the two agencies and to provide for a governor's appointment of the director of the joint agency.

"To have these two agencies

controlled by special interest groups yet operating as agencies of the state government, is difficult to defend," the governor said in his message.

"These agencies clearly should be made a part of the executive branch, responsible to the people through the elected governor."

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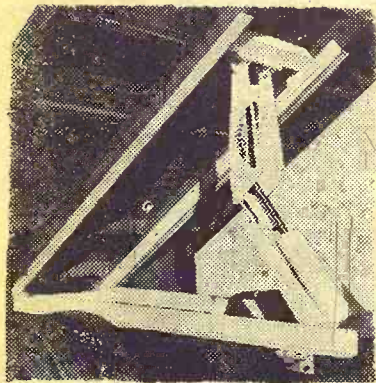

Puzzle In Current Corn Situation

This year's corn situation is remarkable in several ways. The abnormal features include the size and status of the carryover of old corn, as well as the size and condition of the new crop.

Carryover. The carryover was unusual in two ways — it was the smallest in several years, but the amount of "free" corn was quite large. "Free" corn is a term applied to corn that is in private hands. That is, it is not

owned by the government nor sealed under price-support loans.

The carryover on October 1 was estimated at 817 million bushels. That amount was only two-fifths as much as the record carryover of 2,016 million bushels in 1961. It was the smallest carryover in 13 years.

While the total carryover was small, the "free" supply was comparatively large. The amount of free corn was officially estimated at 443 million bushels. That was the second largest "free" stock in 10 years. During most of those years, the "free" carryover was down to around 100 million bushels.

New crop. The 1967 corn crop was a record-breaker, by a big

margin. But excessive rains in many areas during the fall prevented the crop from drying properly, causing a serious delay in harvesting and heavy field losses.

In December the crop was estimated at 4,772 million bushels — 15 percent more than the previous record set just the year before. The new crop plus the carryover make a total supply of 5,539 million bushels — 12 percent more than amount available during the previous year.

The January 1 stock of corn on farms was estimated at 3,353 million bushels — up 16 percent from a year earlier. The increase, however, consisted largely of corn that had not yet been harvested.

Demand for corn. The export market for corn has been very strong so far this year. Exports during the October-December quarter apparently were near 170 million bushels — 25 percent more than the year before. Exports for the entire marketing year may reach 575 million bushels — compared with 462 million last year and 670 million two years ago.

Processors use about the same amount of corn each year — 205 million for wet process (starch, syrup, etc.), 120 million for dry milling (corn meal), and 30 million for alcohol.

Farmers are expected to use slightly more corn for feed this year than in the 1966-67 marketing year. The livestock and poultry industries are not expanding much, but supplies of sorghum grain and oats are a little less than they were a year earlier. Some forecasters expect that the amount used for feed will exceed 3,500 million bushels — compared with 3,280 million last year.

The above figures point to a total in use and exports of something around 4,400 million bushels, and to a carryover of

around 1100 million bushels next fall.

The price-support loan program makes a foundation for prices. Farmers are reluctant to sell corn at less than the loan rate, even if their own corn is not eligible for price support. The national average loan rate is \$1.07 a bushel.

Second and third place winners respectively were Donald A. Wideman of Weld County, Colorado and Ervin Neyhouse of Gibson County, Indiana.

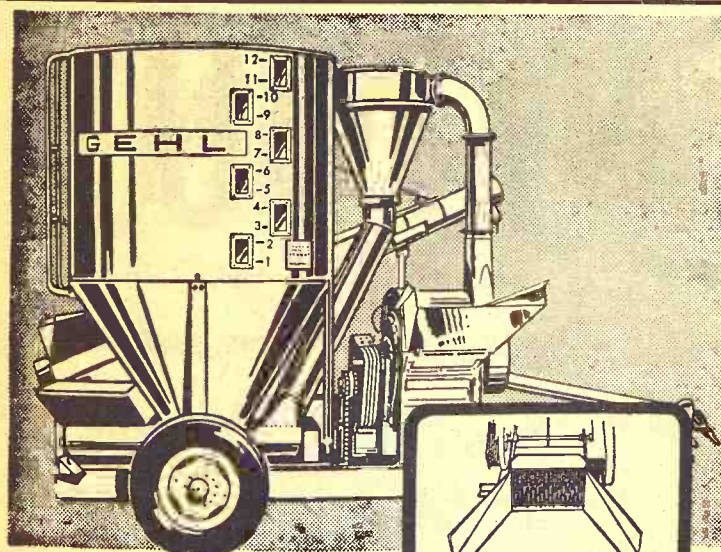

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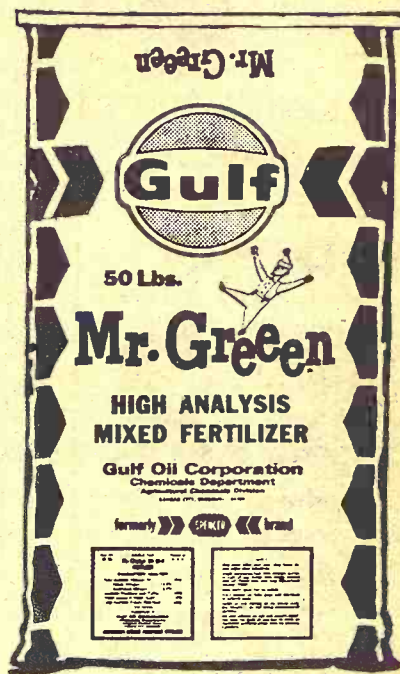
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14 Dehy Plants In Area Sold

HASTINGS, NEBR. — Fourteen alfalfa dehydrating and pelleting plants in Kansas were included in a multimillion dollar cash sale that changed ownership of 28 plants in four states.

The plants, owned by Archer-Daniels-Midland, were sold to Kansas-Nebraska Natural Gas Co. of Hastings. The sale was effective Jan. 1. Price was not disclosed.

Now known as Western Alfalfa Corp., a wholly owned subsidiary of Kansas-Nebraska Natural Gas Co., the 28 plants have about 430 employees in the four states with headquarters in Kan-

sas City.

The 14 plants in Kansas are at Lowe, Tice, Holcomb, Deerfield, Belle Plaine, Douglass, Hutchinson, Larned, Lawrence, Marion, Mount Hope, Neodesha, Topeka and Wellington. Other plants are in Colorado, Missouri and Nebraska.

Fewer Over Berlin Wall

East Germans may be less disenchanted with their Communist state, or protection around the Berlin Wall has improved greatly, according to West German police statistics. They say only 800 East Germans escaped over the wall in 1967, fewest since it was erected in 1961. In 1966 1736 East Germans left the communist section of Germany via the wall. Only one man was observed to have been shot dead while attempting to cross the wall last year.

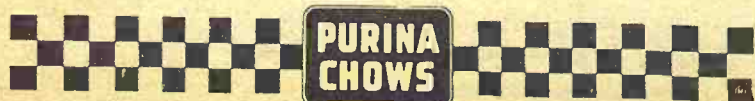

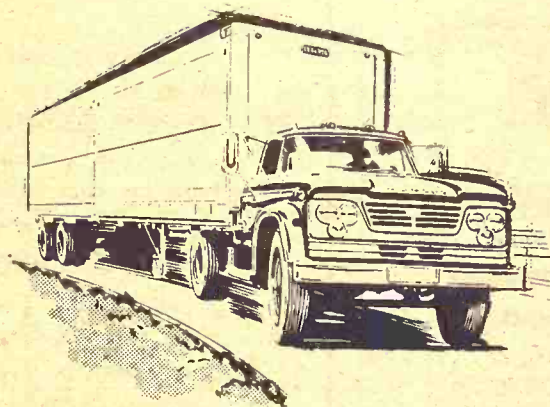

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Outline Kaw River Irrigation Project

January 30, 1968

A proposal for an irrigation research project in the Kansas River valley was outlined last week before a legislative committee by Dr. Floyd Smith, director of the Kansas State Uni-

versity Agricultural Experiment Station.

Smith appeared before the Irrigation Committee of the Kansas House of Representatives.

Smith said there are some

185,000 acres of potentially irrigable land in the Kansas River Valley and the Kansas portion of the Missouri River valley.

He said only about 21,000 acres of this land, located in 12 counties, is receiving some irrigation water at present.

"This area could become fourth in importance in irrigation in Kansas," Smith said.

He said it might be expected that 50,000 additional acres might come under irrigation in the Kansas and Missouri valleys in the next 10 years.

He estimated \$50 per acre increased net income from irrigation, or a \$2.5 million annual increase.

Smith said each dollar in crease in net income should gen-

erate three dollars in wealth, adding the equivalent of \$7.5 million a year in this area.

The K-State Experiment Station director said present irrigation research by the station is limited to that in differing climatic and soil sections of the state.

"We are not doing any more than touching on the irrigation problems in this area," Smith said. "What we are doing now is superficial."

Smith said Shawnee County would be a prime site for the proposed project which he estimates could be financed with an appropriation of \$50,000 a year. Ralph Skoog, R-Topeka, chairman of the irrigation group, said the project could bring about substantial benefits to a major part of the county's economy.

Skoog said the research project had not been requested by Kansas State and added, "we may be a year ahead of time."

But he said he thought it was something the committee should begin exploring at this time.

Bids will be opened at 2:30 p.m. Feb. 14 at the district office here.

Sixty-three parcels of land, available for grazing, hay or restricted agricultural purposes.

All of the land is within boundaries of the Perry Dam and Reservoir project. Leases will be for March 1 through Feb. 28, 1969.

State Dairymen Vote More Promotion Money

The American Dairy Association of Kansas has voted to increase money it sets aside for promotion of dairy products.

The fund will be 1 per cent per hundredweight of the market value of fluid milk deliveries.

J. W. Winfrey, manager, said the resolution means Kansas dairymen have earmarked about 15 percent more money to finance the program this year than last.

The fund will be used to help raise \$55 million nationally and locally to finance an expanded promotion program, he added.

The greatest new threat to the dairy industry, said Martin Framberger, Chicago, dairy association general manager, is an imitation milk substitute.

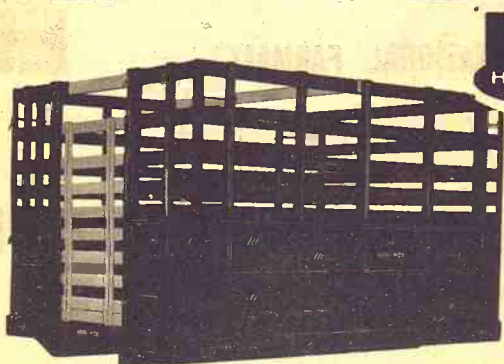

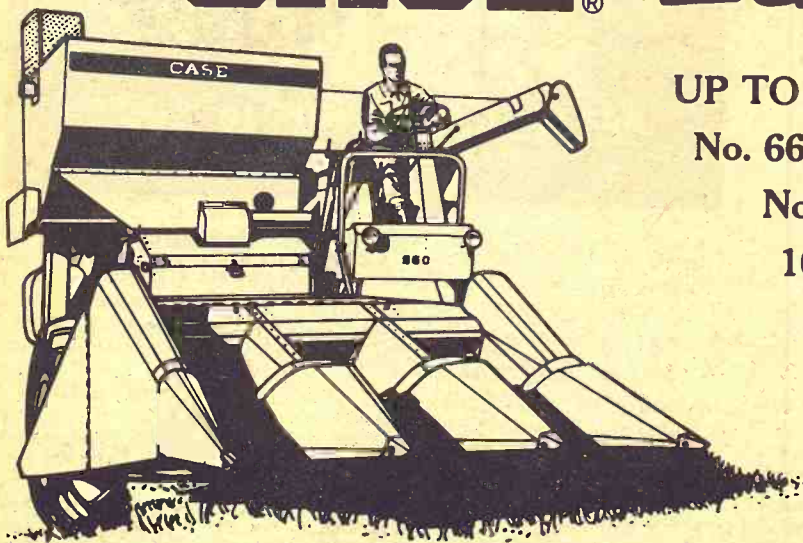

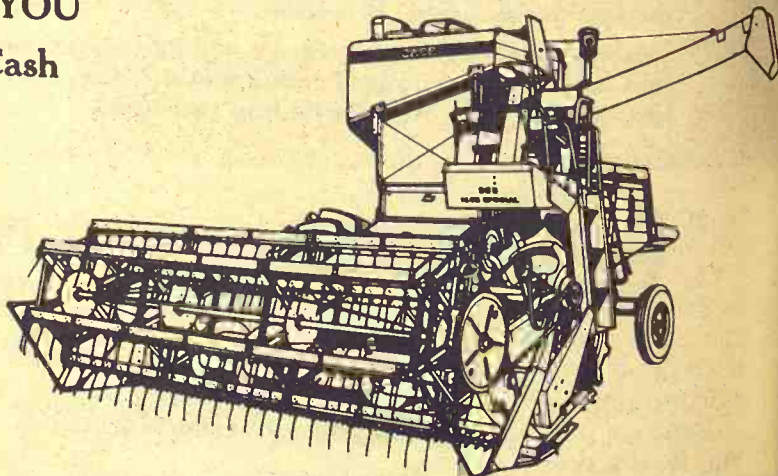

How To Choose Table Setting

Do you know how to set your table for a particular occasion?

At a formal dinner, the service plate is the only china on the table at the beginning. All forks except the oyster fork go at the left of the plate in the order in which they are to be used, from the outside in. Knives and spoons go at the right of the plate.

For an informal luncheon, the bread and butter plates are on the table, indicating that the meal is informal. The silver on the table includes a soup spoon, knife, fork and salad fork. The coffee service is on the serving table and dessert plates and knives and forks will be brought to the table later.

For buffet service, the china and silver for the main course are conveniently laid out.

When hanging wallpaper, wipe off any paste that gets on painted woodwork as soon as possible. If you allow the paste to remain, it may harm the paint on the woodwork.

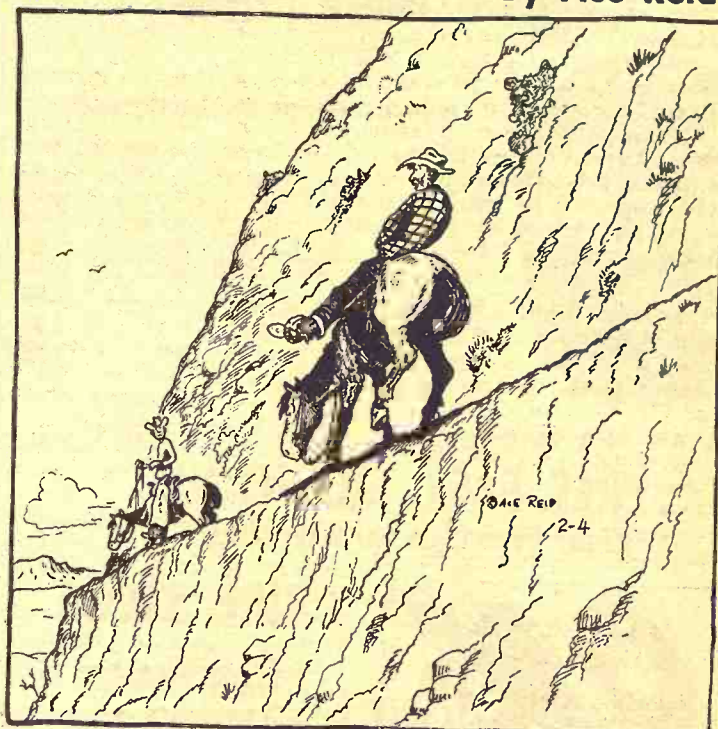

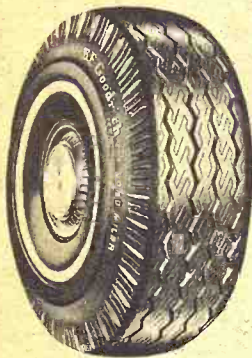

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Here Are Limits On Young Farm Workers

By John H. Coolidge
Kansas State University

A new child labor law pre-vents youths under 16 from op-erating tractors, working ar-ound self-unloading machinery, and performing other hazardous jobs on a farm.

However, the law, effective January 1, 1968, does not apply to children working on their parents' farm.

Vocational agriculture stu-dents who have met specific requirements and youths enrol-

led in supervised training pro-grams may also be exempted.

The law lists these jobs as haz-ardous in a farming operation:

1. Handling or applying anhy-drous ammonia, certain toxic herbicides, pesticides and fungi-cides, and cleaning equipment used in applying or mixing these chemicals.

2. Handling or using a blasting agent including dynamite, blast-ing caps, primer cord, and black powder.

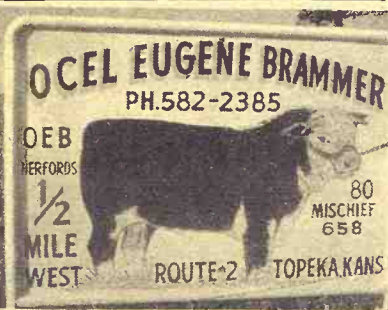

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Court Affirms Feedlot Pollution Judgment

The Kansas Supreme Court has affirmed a \$21,650.53 judgment against the Herington Cattle Co. and Swift and Co. for damages resulting from cattle feed lot pollution of a water

course.

But the court reversed that part of a Morris County District Court judgment giving the plaintiffs, Cecil and Lolita Atkinson, an additional \$7500 in

punitive damages.

The Supreme Court said there is no evidence to support the judgment for punitive damages.

The Atkinsons brought suit,

Plested, Jr., president of the bank, said 24 associations in Kansas made 2206 real estate loans for \$49.1 million to farmers and ranchers; 16 associations in Oklahoma 1187 loans for \$25.3 million; 13 associations in Colorado 954 loans for \$32.2 million, and seven associations in New Mexico 225 loans for \$9,657,000.

Loans outstanding by the bank were at a record high on Dec. 31, 1967, totaling more than \$483.7 million for the district.

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Success At Getting Bread Winners On Welfare To Win Bread

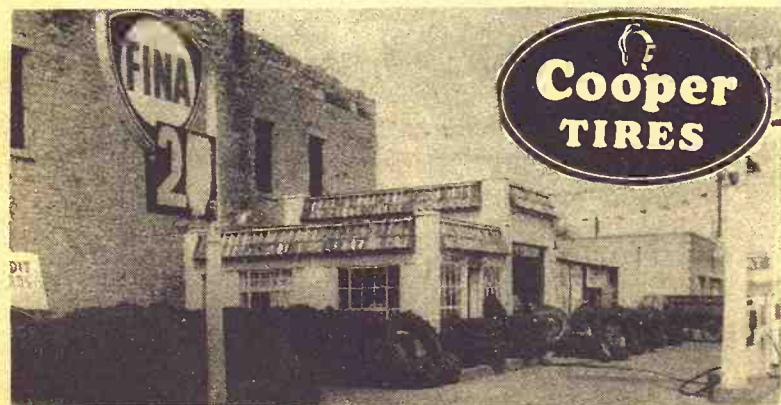
NEWTON—A program aimed at getting jobless heads of families off welfare rolls and capable of maintaining steady employment has had a successful initiation in Harvey County.

dependence instead.

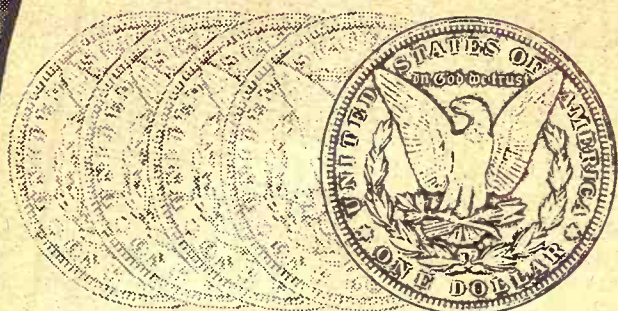

At the risk of Grass & Grain appearing to be a promotion piece for Senator James Pearson, another portion of one of the an election year for him. A couple of weeks ago, G&G used most of a page to reprint a Pearson treatise on rural poverty and development. The current letter is less specific but it certainly suggests that the Senator would make a powerful editorial writer for any newspaper should he — or his electorate — tire of his present position.

This is a rich and successful nation, but at the same time a nation deeply troubled and uneasy, a fact which President Johnson at least acknowledged in his State of the Union Message with the understatement that there is a "certain restlessness in the land."

There is disagreement as to why we find ourselves in such troubled times and how we should proceed in the future. But the symbols of this discontent are rather apparent.

As a nation, we have never been richer but at the same time we have never been more keenly aware of the poverty in our midst.

We have never been more powerful, but seldom have we been less certain of our ability to influence world affairs.

We have never been more vigorous in our efforts to assure equal rights and equal opportunities to all but never have the inequalities among us been more dramatically and violently brought to our attention.

We have never been engaged in an armed conflict in which we were more clearly the strongest of the combatants yet we have never been less certain of our purpose in a conflict that, despite our strength, we seem unable to control.

Our youth has never been better educated or better served but never have so many been so alienated from their elders.

Never have we been more humane in our treatment for those who violate society's law, yet

never has the disrespect for law and those who are charged with enforcing it been more widespread and intense.

The general level of wealth has never been higher but divisions between economic groups seem to have sharpened.

Never have we made such a massive effort to protect the quality of our natural environment but never has that environment been as threatened by pollution and contamination.

Seldom has violence and hatred been more widespread but seldom have we viewed such behavior with more indifference

and casualness.

Never has the public debate of foreign and domestic issues been more extensive or more vigorously pursued but seldom has there been less genuine communication and understanding.

Thus, these seem to be both the best of times and the worst of times. But history tells us that this is not unique. Each generation faces its own particular period of testing. But history also tells us that some generations do not effectively and responsibly meet the challenges.

Thus these can indeed be the best of times but only if we

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know what to do with them and only if we have the will to do what these times demand.

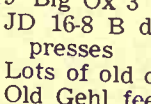

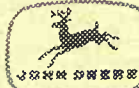

No Repeat On Big Honey Year

Honey production in Kansas during 1967 totaled 2,450,000 pounds, down 23 percent from the previous year's production but slightly above the 1961-65 average, according to the Kansas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service.

Yield per colony averaged 50 pounds compared with 65 pounds the previous year and the 5-year average of 54 pounds.

The 1967 honey was produced by 49,000 colonies of bees, the same as for the past 2 years and 9 percent more than the average number during the recent 5-year period.

Kansas farmers received an average price of 15.7 cents per pound for honey sold during 1967, in all forms (bulk, chunk, comb and extracted), including both wholesale and retail sales.

The average price for beeswax sold in 1967 was 62 cents per pound.

Grange To Build A Youth Camp

The Kansas Grange will construct a youth camp-conference center on 17 acres of ground northeast of Topeka on land donated to the organization by the late Claude Brey and wife Ina of Meriden.

Mrs. Verno Shorthill, director of youth activities for the Grange, explained, "Altho initial use will be to house the youth camps, the facility will be designed as an all-weather conference center. It will be adaptable to dormitory-style living or roomettes to house couples, adult conferences and meetings."

The camp will be available to other organizations when not occupied for Grange functions, Mrs. Shorthill said.

Facilities at the camp will include two dormitories and a main building to house dining kitchen and recreation facilities.

Outdoor fireplaces, picnic tables and recreational facilities will be added as the area develops.

The youth commission of the Grange will oversee construction and operation of the camp. James W. Ingwersen of Leroy, state Grange master, is president of the commission.

Other members of the commission are: Floyd Reynolds, Holton; Mrs. Shorthill; Otis Douglass, Burlington, and Ralph Augur, Mound City.

Ingwersen said it is hoped some of the facilities will be ready for use late this summer.

The Kansas Grange has held a summer camp for youth from 14 to 25 years of age each year since 1950 in rented facilities at Dodge City, Sedan, Elmdale and Oswego. A junior camp for children five through 14 years of age was held this past year at Lone Star Lake southwest of Lawrence.

Grange officials have studied the feasibility of building a headquarters building on a two-acre site on which an option will expire in 1971. The land is three miles north of Topeka on old US 75 at the present Indian Creek Grange grounds.

Such plans were tabled last year during the Grange's centennial year meeting in Topeka.

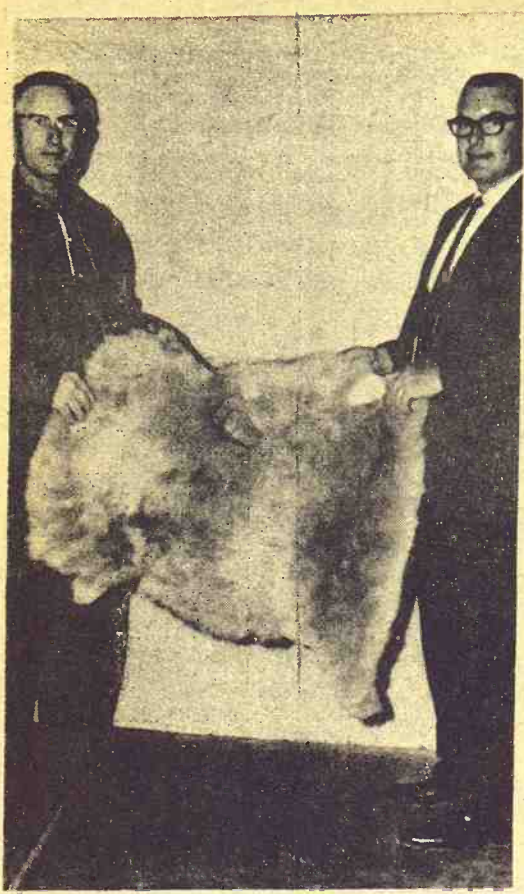

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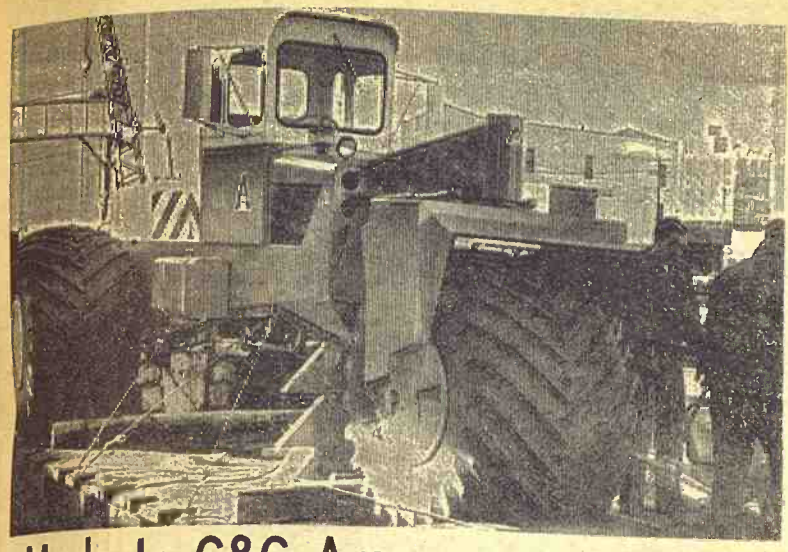

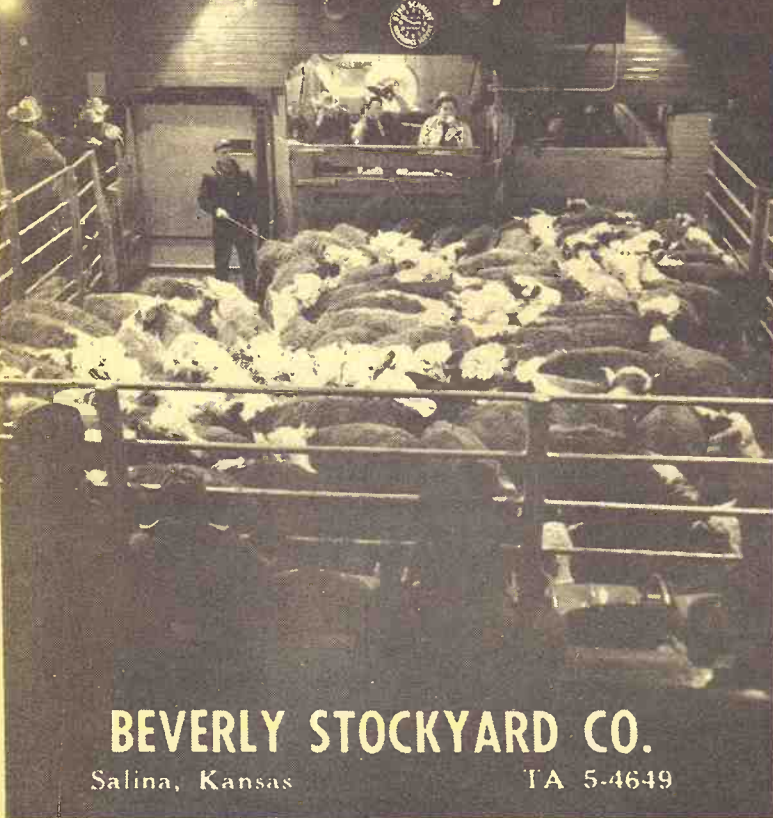

Kansas Farm Taxes Second High In Plains

Higher cost of public services is pushing up farm real estate taxes in Kansas and many other states.

Taxes on farmland in Kansas for 1967 will be about 12 percent higher than 1966, reports Wilfred H. Pine, professor of economics at Kansas State University.

Farm real estate taxes jumped 14 percent from 1965 to 1966. Taxes on non-real estate increased 11 percent during this period.

Average tax per acre in 1966 in Kansas was \$1.52, compared to an average of \$1.74 for all states. Kansas taxes were the second highest in the 10 Great Plains states, exceeded only by Nebraska with \$1.73 an acre.

Pine points out that 1965 farm real estate taxes in Kansas were about \$2 million less than a year earlier. States seldom experience such a decrease in taxes, he says. The School Foundation Program which provided a large increase in state aid to public schools accounted for this decrease.

Taxes per \$100 of farm real estate value were \$1.02 for the U.S., the same as in 1961. Thus land values increased as rapidly as taxes, Pine says.

Consolidation of rural and urban areas into new school districts is a major factor boosting farm property taxes more than any other taxes, the K-State economist says.

Re-evaluation likely has contributed to the relatively greater increase for rural property in that recent re-evaluations have included counties in which assessment-sale ratios were lower for rural than urban real estate.

Similar problems exist in other states. For example, Kentucky was forced to assess at 100 percent of full value in 1966. Florida and Georgia also were affected by re-evaluations or reassessment and had large property tax hikes.

Pine notes that farm real estate values in Kansas continue to go up at a rapid pace (5 or 6 percent a year) even with the increase in taxes.

Land values in 1966 were 41 percent higher than the 1957-59 base while taxes increased 47 percent. This proves that other forces are important in the real estate market, he concludes.

Lose Vote In Sheep Association

Kansas lost its only representative on the board of the American Hampshire Sheep Association at the annual meeting at Denver when Harry Hart of Nebraska was named to replace Howard Vernon.

George E. Scott of Ft. Collins, Colo., was named president of the organization.

The organization has increased its transfer rate to \$1, it was announced. A "type conference" is set for Kansas State University in June.

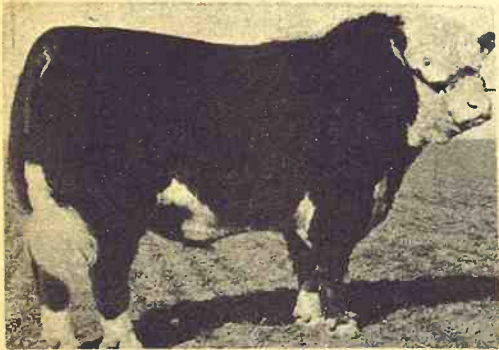

More than 500 wheat growers and their wives from a dozen states attended the convention.

The next convention will be in Boise, Idaho, in late 1968 or early 1969. Oklahoma City has been designated convention city for 1970.

In closing business, the wheat men adopted resolutions strengthening marketing development, research, quality control, public

relations and national farm programs.

A high point in the resolutions concerned the continuation of Public Law 480 (Food for Freedom) and its use as part of the U.S. foreign policy.

The growers asked that Public Law 480 food shipments be separated from the Department of Agriculture and paid for by tax support of the nation as a whole rather than as part of the Department of Agriculture budget.

They also asked for full parity on domestic wheat and an export certificate to be paid for from the general treasury for exported wheat.

The group voted to recommend passage of the Harris-Carlson bill, which would appraise land and business holdings for inheritance purposes at earning power rather than at inflated real estate prices.

They directed their executive board to explore means of getting more bargaining power for farmers in the market place.

Favor In Cattle Outlook—We Hope

For cattlemen, the most important news of the year is the report of Cattle on Feed as of January 1. This report, compiled by the USDA, should also be of interest to everyone who likes beef, since it indicates the probable supply that will be available during the first half of the year.

This year, the report shows no significant change from 12 months before; it showed 2 percent more cattle being fattened for market, no more than enough to meet the usual increase in the demand for beef. Thus, the widely forecast increase in cattle feeding as a result of the big corn crop has not appeared.

Average weights for cattle in feedlots were no more than a year earlier. We calculated the total tonnage of beef on the hoof at only 1 percent more than a year ago.

Marketing intentions. Cattle feeders reported plans to mar-

ket cattle at about the same rate as a year ago. Returns from farmers pointed to 5,274,000 cattle intended for market during the first 3 months of this year — 2 percent more than a year earlier. Such a rate would also leave 2 percent more for marketing after April 1.

Another method can be used to show possible marketings during the next few months: We take the number of steers in each weight group, then add the number of heifers weighing 200 pounds less. This is reasonable because usually, heifers are marketed weighing about 200 pounds less than steers.

Heavy cattle. The number of steers weighing over 1100 pounds plus the heifers weighing over 900 pounds was estimated at 762,000 — down 4 percent from last year. Most of those cattle will be marketed by the end of January.

The number of steers weigh-

ing 900 to 1100 pounds plus the heifers weighing 200 pounds less totaled 3,113,000 — 2 percent more than a year before. Most of these cattle will be sold by April 1.

The number of steers weighing 700 to 900 pounds plus the heifers 200 pounds lighter totaled 3,602,000 — 2 percent less than one year before. Many of these cattle will be on the market during March, April, and May.

More heifers. All of the increase in the number of cattle on feed was in heifers. The number of heifers was estimated at 3,394,000 — 5 percent more

than a year earlier. The number of steers was figured at 7,850,000 — practically the same as last year. The increase in the number of heifers being fed suggests that cattlemen are not increasing their cow herds.

Outlook in brief. In summary, the USDA report of Cattle on Feed as of January 1 points to a market supply for February, March, and April at very little more than the one last year.

The supply of pork for the next 90 days is uncertain, but the Pig Crop Report in December showed only slightly more than in 1967. The production of broilers seems to have leveled off, and that is favorable for the beef market.

Consumer buying power is up about 6 percent from a year ago. We think the prospects for cattle prices are moderately favorable. We expect prices dur-

ing February, March, and April to average \$1 or \$2 better than last year, when prices for choice steers at Chicago averaged about \$24.75 per 100 pounds.

Reopen Emporia Packing Plant By August, After Remodeling

EMPORIA — Remodeling and expansion of the former Armour Packing Co. plant here has been started by Iowa Beef Packers, Inc., Dakota City, Neb., which purchased the facility last November.

Company officials said the work is not expected to be completed before next fall. Target date for resumption of cattle slaughtering is August 1968.

Plans call for the eventual employment of 200 persons. Armour employed 90 persons at the time the plant was closed Sept. 29, 1967.

A crew of 35 workmen, mostly area residents, is taking part in the construction.

Kelly Smith, Dakota City, construction manager for Iowa Beef Packers, said the entire interior of the Armour plant will

be stripped, including machinery, so the kill floor may be widened 40 feet.

An 82 by 75-foot addition is being constructed on the south side of the building. It will be an engine room housing two boilers.

A 150 by 140-foot addition at the east end of the building will be used for dry storage and a rendering operation.

Smith said a larger addition of still undetermined size, is under consideration for the west end of the plant. It would provide additional cooler space and may extend as far as 300 feet westward over the former Santa Fe Railway spur track into the east end of the Anderson Cattle Co. feedlot.

Excavation of more than 50,000 cubic yards of dirt from an embankment may be required.

Company officials said when plant operations are commenced next fall, slaughtering will be confined to beef cattle. No hogs or other farm animals will be involved.

Clock 129 mph

Speeders aren't rare on the Kansas Turnpike, but trooper Verlyan Kroeger wondered if he wasn't clocking a record-breaker last week. Just north of Wellington Kroeger timed a speeder at 129 miles an hour. The driver was a young soldier heading for New Jersey. After a \$60 fine, the soldier was on his way again. Slower, this time.

The plant will operate on two shifts, six days a week.

Workmen employed on construction will be given first opportunity to work or take training for employment in the slaughtering plant.

Iowa Beef Packers officials said future plans call for establishment of facilities for break-

ing beef carcasses down to primal cuts for marketing.

The Armour plant was constructed in 1963 at a cost of \$3.5 million. Its immediate closing was ordered Sept. 29 and caught employees and the community by surprise.

The plant is located on a 40-acre tract near U.S. 50.

"Take Half, Leave Half" Still Good Rangeland Management

During the winter when a Kansas rancher is dipping into his hay and silage reserve, he may have a twinge of concern about how well he used his

rangeland during the previous summer months.

"Now is the time, at the close of the grazing season, to take a hard look at your complex ranching operation," suggests Dr. Robert M. Hyde, Extension range management specialist at Kansas State University.

If your livestock have been grazing the same area since May or June, definite grazing patterns have been established that will clearly indicate distribution and utilization.

Grasses may be overgrazed near the water supply. When the salt supply is also near the water, you can bet there will

be overgrazing near the water while slopes and high benches may be virtually untouched, the K-State agronomist continues.

The solution to this problem is to place the salt away from the water, Dr. Hyde says. Putting the salt in areas that are not grazed and moving them several times during the grazing season will help increase grass utilization in those "out-of-the-way" places.

Location of watering places is also very important. If watering places are too far apart, some areas between will be undergrazed. Perhaps you should consider adding another watering place during the off season, Dr. Hyde suggests.

The degree of utilization, or the amount of grass used, in a grazing season is often too high. Great Plains ranchers can expect to get greater net returns per acre from moderate grazing than from either heavy or light grazing. Numerous experiments verify this conclusion. An oft-quoted rule-of-thumb is "take half and leave half" of the current year's grass growth. "If this sounds wasteful, remember that grasses must have sufficiently stored food material to start growing next spring," Dr. Hyde notes.

There are thousands of acres of Kansas rangeland in poor or

fair condition that help illustrate this important point.

So during this off season period, take a good hard look at your grazing operation, the Extension specialist advises. See what adjustments you need to make to get the most uniform

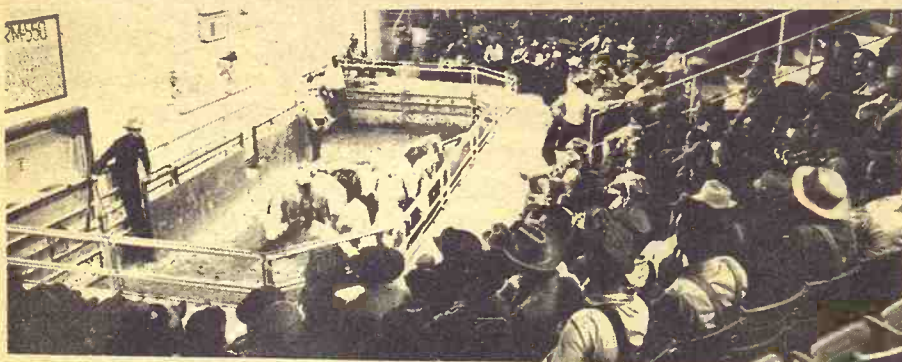
