## Sees A Trend Back To The Country

A trend back to rural areas to relieve big-city congestion is in the offing for Kansas, Floyd R. Souders of Cheney predicted in an address to the Kansas State Historical Society.

Souders, outgoing president of the historical society, spoke at the society's annual meeting in Topeka.

Despite a general population loss in several Kansas counties over the last 15 years, youth "are starting to wonder why they can't enter a business or profession in the rural areas of the state," he said.

**Help Themselves**  
Leaders and citizens of rural

communities must "help themselves" to keep the towns from dying, he said.

Earlier three panelists discussed a state survey of historical sites and criteria of their importance.

Souders indicated that the problem is, "How are we going to keep them down on the farm or in the rural communities."

Today, more than 70 per cent of the population lives on 1.3 per cent of the land, he said, because young people move to urban areas to seek work. About 92 percent of Kansas counties have lost young people to cities, he said.

A few counties have lost as much as 68 per cent of their young people over a 15-year period, he said.

To attract and keep young people, "more and more towns are discovering their shortcomings," he said. "Rural Kansas should be on the upswing."

### Attract Citizens

He suggested landscaping, remodeling, attraction of commuters and specialized businesses, and revival of homemade goods as well as studies and seminars

on business methods as means of keeping and attracting citizens.

Only 10 per cent of expansion comes from new industries, he said. "There are untapped fortunes in human talent," he said.

Souders, publisher of the Cheney Sentinel and a former legislator, has been president of the historical society during the past year. Clifford Hope Sr., Garden City, former U.S. congressman, is the newly elected president.

## If Wheat Won't Sell, Try Flour —Mills Hustling To Meet Demand

Flour is selling like hotcakes.

So much that for the first time in several years the demand for U.S. flour exceeds the available supply. Mills are grinding wheat at practically capacity levels, and some have been operating around the clock for three or four weeks to fill orders. Even so, some orders, including a few from the Federal Government, are going begging.

The upsurge in demand is bringing some relief to flour millers. Overcapacity has plagued the industry for years, particularly in the last decade, forcing the closing of many mills. At the turn of the century, about 8000 flour mills were in operation; now there are little more than 200.

Increased exports and Government purchases are the two major factors strengthening flour demand. From July 1, the start of the 1968-69 season, through September, flour exports totaled an equivalent of about 12 million bushels of wheat, up about 40% from a year earlier.

Big sales to Indonesia and Ceylon made up a large part of this increase. Both these countries have recently changed government leadership and become much more friendly to the U.S. Ceylon was a good flour market for the U.S. after World War II, but between then and now the island country had purchased its flour elsewhere.

U.S. flour exports in the 1967-68 season totaled 22.4 million hundredweight, down more than 20% from the previous season and the smallest in a dozen years. Cessation of flour shipments to the United Arab Republic and Sudan accounted for most of the decline.

Government purchases for overseas aid programs also have increased. C. L. Mast Jr., president of the Millers' National Federation, a trade group, estimates that the Government

will buy in calendar 1968 between 11 million and 12 million hundredweight of flour, about 35% more than in 1967. Through September, he says, the Government already has purchased nearly as much as during all of 1967.

One flour broker contends the government is anxious to spur export flour sales because of disappointing wheat exports. In the three-month July-September period when flour exports soared 40%, wheat exports declined 30%. Increased world supplies and hotter competition among exporting countries is resulting in some trade estimates that wheat exports this season may fall 100 million bushels or so short of the 760 million exported in 1967-68.

The bigger exports and Government purchases are hitting flour millers just as domestic demand is at the heaviest of the year. There's some feeling, therefore, that capacity production won't last too long, but others in the trade think that Government and export demand will continue strong at least through December and possibly into 1969, providing a longshoreman's strike doesn't disrupt shipments.

Still, it's too early to predict what production will be in fiscal 1969. U.S. flour production in the 1967-68 season was 250 million hundredweight, up slightly from the previous season, but sharply under 20 years ago when output was 286.4 million hundredweight.

Other factors contribute to the flour millers' bright outlook. One is the leveling of the steady drop in per-capita flour consumption in the U.S. at 112 pounds last year, the lowest on record, but the same as in 1966. In 1948 per-capita consumption was 142 pounds. Family flour sales have fallen sharply because housewives do much less home baking; but more and

more flour is going into consumer convenience products such as prepared mixes and refrigerated foods.

And, there's an abundant supply of wheat — a record crop of 1.6 billion bushels was harvested this year — available at low cost. Because the wheat surplus has pushed down prices, flour also is selling for less; the New York price is at \$6.25 a hundredweight, down 5% from a year earlier. (Wheat prices, however, are 13% below a year earlier).

Depending on how long the flour resurgence lasts, some trade sources think the bigger export business could slow the rate of mill closings. About 50 mills have been closed down in the last five years alone, and several more are scheduled to close this year (but have, ironically, been kept going because of the current high demand.)

It wasn't that all the mills were falling down obsolete — though some were — or that the companies that owned them were going bankrupt. But because of freight rate revisions, changing markets and expanding business opportunities elsewhere, many mills located out in wheat country have been closed while the fewer mills close to consuming centers were modernized and expanded.

The Millers' National Federation estimates that less than half of the mills in operation 20 years ago are in use today. This represents a closedown of around 600,000 hundredweight in daily capacity. However, about two-thirds of this capacity has been regained through expansions and building of mills near consuming centers. The net result is that U.S. flour milling capacity is now less than 950,000 hundredweight daily, down from 1.1 million hundredweight in 1948.

## Phone Tempest Simmers Down

McLOUGH — The telephone service dispute between rural patrons and the Kansas Telephone company is losing some of its punch, Cecil M. Luce, McLouth mayor says.

"I can't find anyone with any phone problems in town or in a few miles surrounding the town," he said.

The dispute erupted a few weeks ago when area customers banded together to form United Kansans for Better Phone Service. The organization, with petitions bearing about 1,000 sig-

natures, claimed the phone company had not been providing adequate service and should not be permitted to impose rate increases.

There was heated debate at a recent meeting of the organization in McLouth. Highlighting the meeting was a statement by a woman who contradicted Luce's charge.

She said her service has been "extremely poor" and indicated that the company should not be allowed to raise the rates because of the poor service, but she refused to give her name.

Luce countered by saying he had talked with about 50 patrons since the dispute began and could not find anyone with

complaints.

"There was one woman who protested the service until about a month ago and now she has good service," he said.

Luce vehemently denied that the Kansas Telephone Company was guilty of rendering inadequate service, and insured prompt service to any patron who would contact him when their phone was out of order.

"I would almost guarantee that corrections would be made for anyone who is willing to tell me about them," Luce said. "I will call the phone company myself."

The United Kansans for Better Phone Service have filed a formal protest with the Kansas Corporation commission along with the petitions. They expect to have a formal hearing with the commission about the price rises November 26.

Presently, there are five ex-

changes involved, Perry, Meriden, Ozawkie, Silver Lake, and Wellsville, Kans.

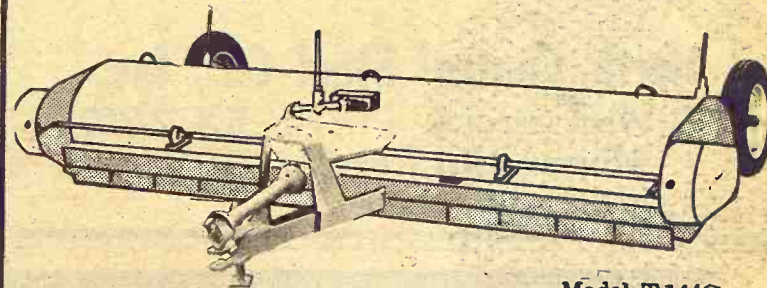

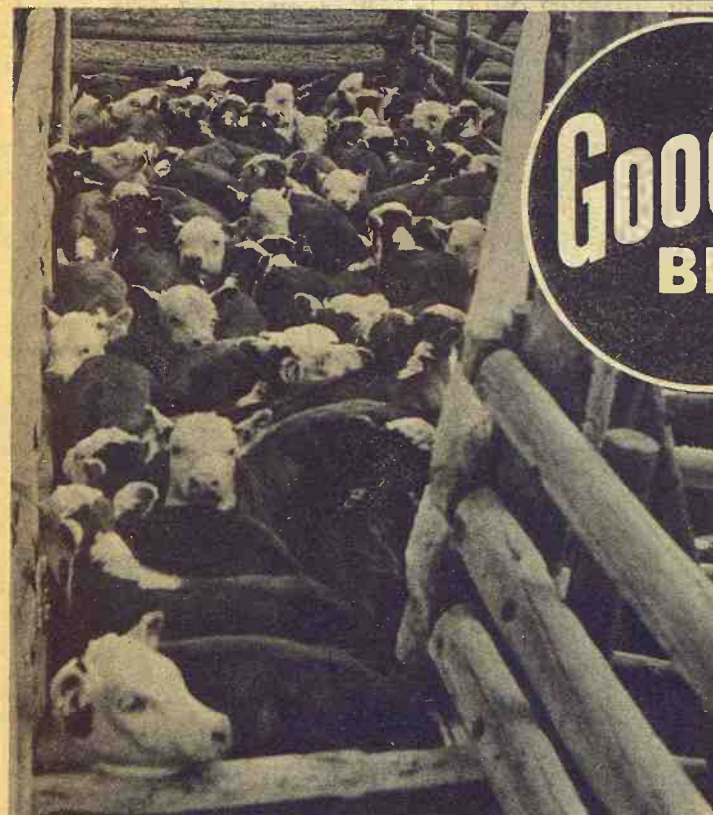

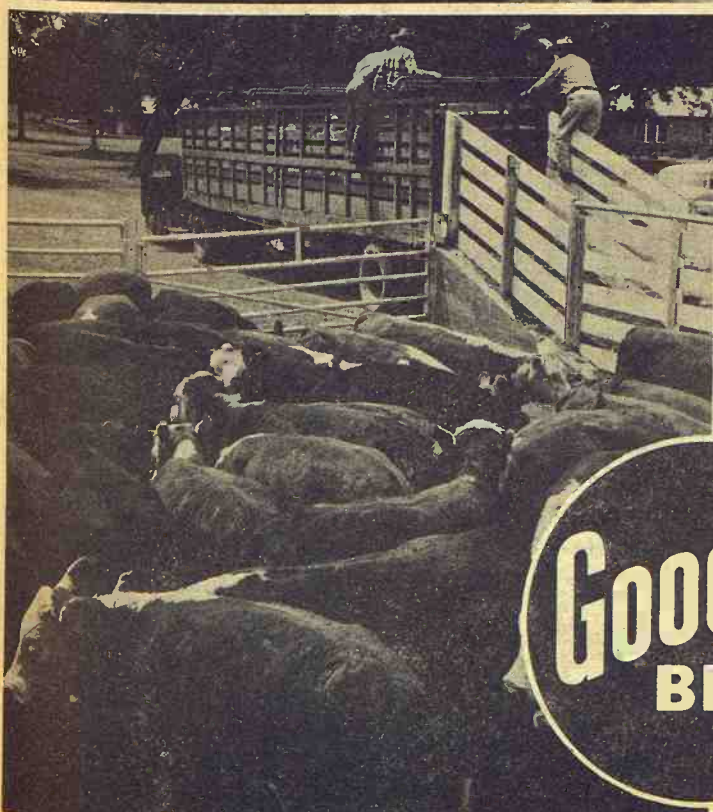

## FIBA Loans To \$523 Million

A record of loans outstanding was set by the Federal Land Bank of Wichita during the past fiscal year, William Pledsted Jr.,

president, told 250 stockholders at the annual meeting.

Loans outstanding aggregated \$523.8 million, highest in the history of the bank. This is more than double the 1963 level, Pledsted said.

The increase was from \$457,189,376 a year ago.

Federal Land Bank Associations from Kansas, Oklahoma, Colorado and New Mexico heard a report on the national and international agricultural

picture from Sen. James B. Pearson, R-Kan., and Dr. A. D. Weber, vice president emeritus, Kansas State University, Manhattan, at the afternoon session.

Pledsted in his annual report said that the year was characterized by credit restraints, historically high money costs and continuing strong demand for bank loans.

"New money loaned totaled \$97.8 million, the second highest in the bank's history, exceeded only by the \$101.5 million for fiscal 1966," Pledsted added. Lending covered Kansas, Oklahoma, Colorado and New Mexico.

The land bank made 30.8 per cent of the total amount recorded by all lenders compared to 30.1 per cent in 1966, he said.

Because of increasing costs on the wholesale money market, the margin between the money borrowed by the bank and lent to the farmers was narrowed to .42 percent compared with .66 percent a year earlier, he said.

Pledsted sees no important reduction in interest rates of money lent to the farmers and ranchers the coming year "because of the tremendous demand on the money market and increasing higher rates."

But delinquency rates at the bank were the lowest in history — only .18 per cent in amount and 3 percent in number, Pledsted said.

## Vet Medicine Open House Set At K-State

A trip through a papier mache gastro-intestinal tract is in store for visitors at Kansas State University's Veterinary Open House, Saturday, October 26.

The mock gastro-intestinal tract is just one of the exhibits

to be displayed during the annual event. The exhibits will be open to the public in Dykstra Veterinary Hospital from 9 Saturday morning until 8 that evening.

Three committees are working on the gastro-intestinal tract according to Tom Jacobitz, Stella, Nebr., publicity chairman for the event. They are creating a mock esophagus, stomach and intestines. Heading up the committees are Cliff Kumamoto, Honolulu, Hawaii, anatomy; John Barnes, Shawnee, surgery; and Gene Kluck, Watertown, S.D., physiology.

Other exhibits will include a public health exhibit, relating how veterinary science can contribute to public health; the life cycle of a dog; and how radio isotopes can be used in treatment of cancer (carcinomas) in horses.

The large animal exhibit committee has been working on displays explaining why some drugs have been removed from the market, potential dangers of drugs in meat animals and shipping procedures and disease. There will also be a chance to view a film on anaphylactic shock in the guinea pig.

Visitors will have an opportunity to view slides on the work of veterinarians in zoos and to see how mice, rats, rabbits, gerbils, guinea pigs and the rhesus monkey are used in research.

# Some Dangers In Beef Forecast

Cattle prices have been running slightly above 1967 levels, despite a larger output of beef this summer. We believe that these prices will hold near recent values for several weeks.

The winter may see the beginning of a change in the price level. The direction of this change is not clear, but we expect that prices will average about the same during the next

12 months as they have over the past 12 months.

**DANGERS.** There are, of course, some danger spots in the outlook. These include: (1) excessive weight per head, (2) bunched marketings, (3) increased imports of beef, and (4) a general increase in cattle slaughter.

**Excessive weight** on too many cattle is a possibility, but a less likely one now that cattle feeding has largely become a business of professionals. Many of the farmer-speculators who used to feed cattle to "top the market" have retired from that expensive hobby. Furthermore, average slaughter weights seldom increase by more than 30 pounds, which would increase beef output only 2 percent. The big danger of excessive weights is to the owner of the heavy cattle. Generally, he suffers from the high costs of such

gains and often from declining prices for Prime cattle as well.

**Bunched marketings** are still a hazard, but less so than in former years when most farmers fed out only one drove of cattle each year. The large movement of cattle into feedlots this past summer is likely to reduce the possibility of bunched marketings.

**Imports** of beef, like hemlines on skirts, have gone about as high as they can go. Recently, imports were near the level at which quotas could be imposed. We do not believe that the exporting countries want to ship so much beef to the U.S. that quotas will be imposed.

**A general increase in cattle slaughter seems unlikely.** There is no indication in official figures that farmers and ranchers have been building up their cattle herds by any large amounts. There were some drouth areas this past summer — notably in the Central Great Plains and in the Southeast. But other areas have abundant feed, and no large forced sales will be necessary. The prices for feeder cattle and calves have been very good so there will be no sell off of herds because of low prices and profits.

**Prospective supplies of competitive meats** are moderate. Pork output is expected to be near year-before levels during the next few months, and up by 4 to 6 percent during the coming winter. Broiler production is near 1967 levels. Turkey production was cut about 15 percent

this year.

**Consumer demand for meats** is holding very strong. Almost everyone who is able and willing to work has a job, and at record wage rates. The increase in income taxes and the much-talked-about cut in government spending has not brought on a recession — at least not yet. That may come next winter, when millions of taxpayers find that they owe Uncle Sam more than they expected.

## Method For Drying Entire Arrangement Of Flowers

An arrangement of fresh flowers that could just as easily be an arrangement of dried flowers is a feat that any arranger would be proud to duplicate. And, if the right annuals are selected, it's not really difficult. Choose from among a list that

includes blue salvia, red salvia, cockscombs, bells of Ireland zinnias, marigolds, straw flowers, larkspur and many other commonly grown garden flowers. Every one of those mentioned can be dried either in or out of an arrangement.

If this is a new idea to you — that of arranging first and drying later, be advised that it can be done.

But, because accidents can happen, be sure to also dry extra spikes or individual blooms of each kind of flower you use in the arrangement. And discard the leaves before arranging the blooms, since leaves rarely dry attractively or without crumbling.

There are several methods in general use for drying flowers — sand, silica-gel, cornstarch are all used heaped around and under flowers, carefully placed in flat boxes. But the old method of drying is still the easiest — and in many cases as satisfactory as any for the flowers named. That is simply stripping

leaves from stems, tying a few stems together at their bases and hanging the tied bunches upside down from a line strung in any warm, dry place. In a few weeks the blooms will be ready for use — or for storage. To dry a whole arrangement, first choose a warm, dry spot that is out of household traffic. Put a little water in the container so that the flowers dry grad-

ually. Select those with sturdy stems and arrange them without leaves.  
Let the arrangement stand for a few weeks. Do not add any water; that in the container will gradually evaporate as the flowers gradually dry. Then move the arrangement where you wish to display it and enjoy it.

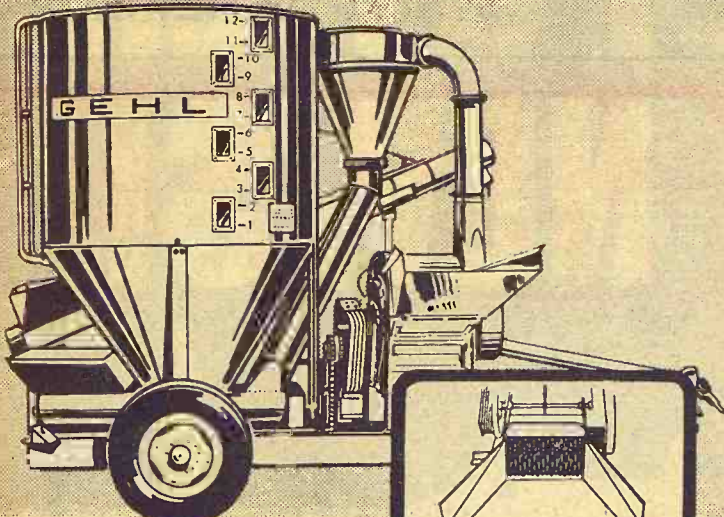

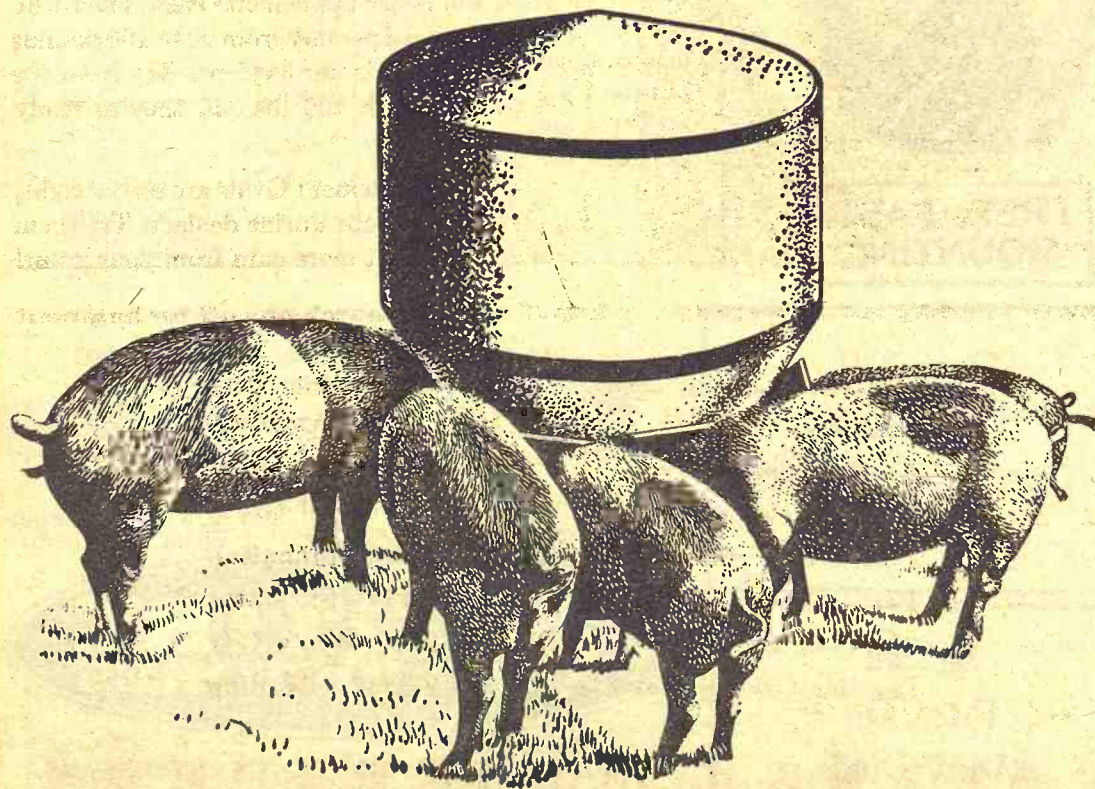

## Most Wheat Under Loan Since 1960

Farmers had placed 259,119,947 bushels of 1968-crop wheat under government price support loan through September, the most for the period since 1960, the Agriculture department announced.

Last month, the department announced that nearly 200 million bushels of new crop wheat had been placed under loan through August.

The department has encouraged farmers to take advantages of the price support program in an effort to keep wheat out of normal marketing channels so cash prices will rise.

Wheat has been selling in many areas this season for less than the average government price support loan rate of \$1.25 a bushel available to farmers who co-operate in the farm pro-

gram.

The department said 467 million bushels of wheat produced this year and from previous crops were under government loans by the end of September.

The 259,100,000 bushels of new crop wheat under loan through last month compared with 139,000,000 bushels from the 1967 period last year.

Other earlier harvested grains also showed increases in price support totals from a year earlier.

New crop barley under loan through September total 54,400,000 bushels, compared with 15,900,000 bushels last year; oats 41,900,000 and 17 million; and rye 2,700,000 and 857,558 bushels.

Major producing states with new crop wheat under loan through September included: Kansas 76,708,966 bushels; Ne-

braska 30,887,158; Oklahoma 32,604,864; Colorado 7,764,162; North Dakota 10,621,147; South Dakota 16,414,497; Texas 16,434,380 and Washington State 23,219,588.

Almost 194 million bushels of this year's wheat under loan were stored in warehouses and about 65 million on farms, the department said.

Fall harvested crops also were moving under loan at a higher rate. Corn through September totaled about 1,400,000 bushels,

compared with 404,919 a year earlier; soybeans 132,228 and 86,471; and sorghum grain 3,600,000 and 295,068, the department said.

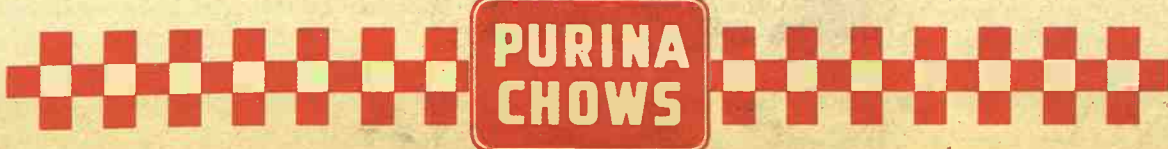

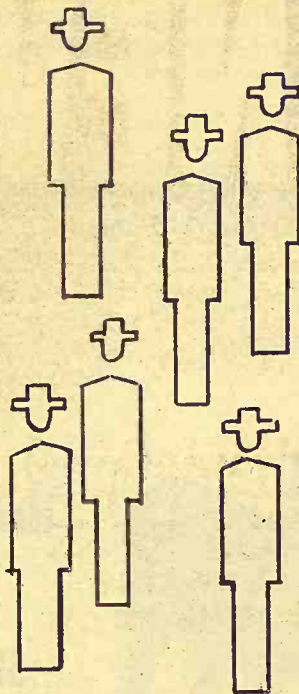
## Area Boys Devise Bidding System

## USDA Pares Reporting Cost

The Agriculture Department says that as part of a cost-saving effort, it is discontinuing its regular Jan. 1 and April 1 reports on commodity stocks.

The usual off-farm and on-farm grain stocks reports on holdings as of July 1 and Oct. 1 will be continued, the depart-

ment said, along with the Aug. 1 rice stocks and Sept. 1 soybean stocks.

The reports being discontinued had covered stocks of wheat, rye, corn, oats, barley, sorghums, soybeans, flaxseed and rice. On-farm estimates, "stocks of grain in all positions" and the January and April rice stocks reports all are covered by the discontinuance order.

A department spokesman not-

ed that in the past the reports that are being discontinued have been criticized for inaccuracies. To improve them would require a substantial increase in reporting costs, so, the department chose instead to eliminate them entirely, he said.

## CONTINUE RILEY RURAL PARK DEVELOPMENT

MANHATTAN — Shelter houses will be built in Leonardville, Ogden, Randolph and Riley as part of a Riley County park improvement program. Last year, restrooms were built in Riley, Leonardville and Randolph and tennis courts constructed in Ogden. In previous years, the county commission has upgraded mowing equipment in each of the parks. Riley County also allocates funds to the city of Manhattan for the improvement of parks within the city.

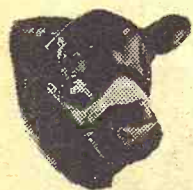

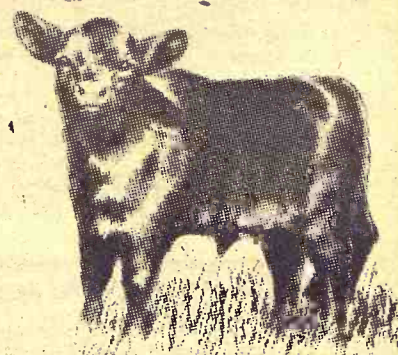
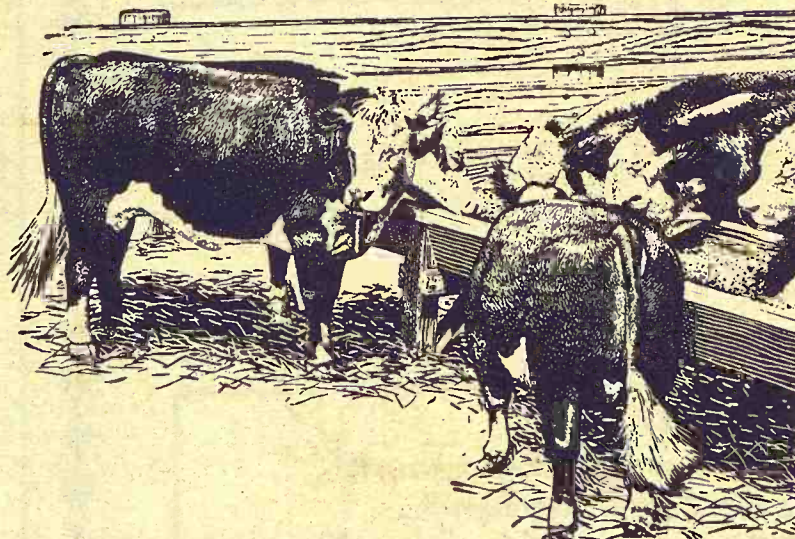

## Aussies May Continue Meat Export Limits

Meat industry officials in Australia and New Zealand may continue voluntary restrictions on meat shipments to the United States next year in an attempt to avoid tight import quotas.

The two countries last month imposed voluntary restrictions for the remainder of 1968 after it became apparent that further shipments would trigger U.S. import quotas.

Department officials say the voluntary action by Australia

and New Zealand kept the estimate below the 1,045,000,000 pounds of imports which would require quota action.

Australia and New Zealand currently are supplying 70 to 75 percent of the quota-type meat — mostly beef and mutton — coming into the United States.

American cattle producers repeatedly have urged tightening the meat import law to prevent what they consider excess supplies which tend to lower domestic prices.

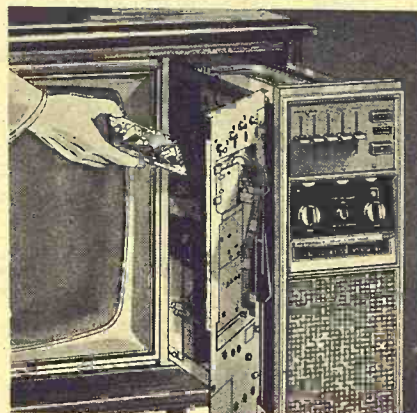

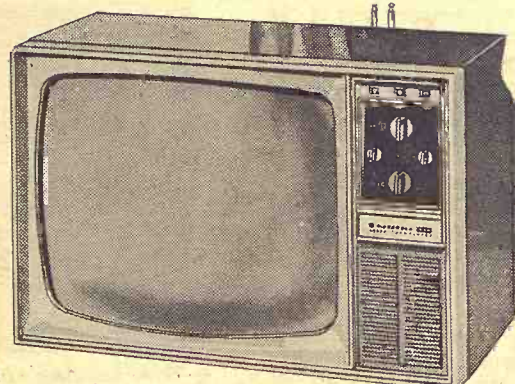

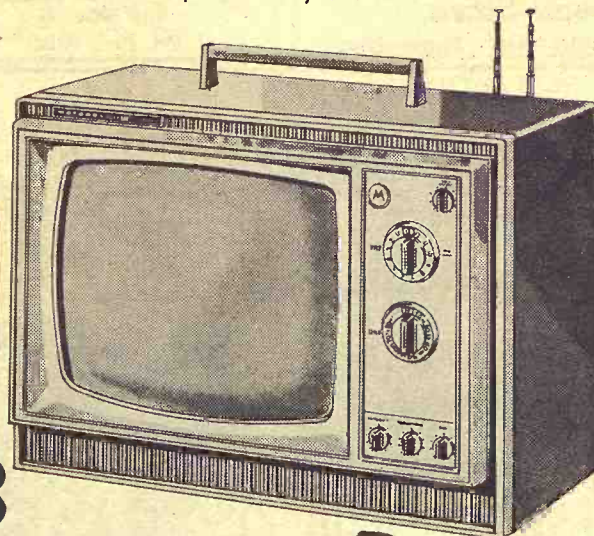

## State Fair Gate At \$262,000

Admission receipts for the 1968 Kansas State Fair at Hutchinson totaled \$262,861.31, the state auditor's office reported. The total was \$25,570.91 above the 1967 figure.

# U.S. Eyes Own Meat Export Market

While the United States has not been traditionally a beef exporting nation, markets abroad may play an important part in the future of domestic meat production, speakers at a meeting on the export potential for Kansas meat said at Topeka.

The meeting was sponsored by the Kansas State Board of Agriculture and the Kansas Independent Meat Packers Assn. Speakers included authorities from the foreign agricultural service of the U.S. Dept. of Agriculture and a major airline, and marketing specialists from Kansas State University.

Kansas, where beef production is rising rapidly, will be greatly affected by development of foreign markets, Dr. Paul L. Kelley, head of the K-State department of agricultural economics, said. Combined effects of population and income increase will expand the domestic market to as much as 28 per cent above present consumption by 1980, he said.

Exports could have a dramatic effect on prices, not only of beef but also of other farm production. Meat demand could increase three to six per cent a year. A three per cent gain, he said, probably would pressure prices down, while a six per cent gain would result in upward pressures.

Ivan Johnson, chief of the foreign agricultural service of the USDA, detailed steps to develop beef sales abroad through trade fairs and personal contacts in Western Europe.

High prices, too much fat, and government regulations have stymied most efforts, but progress is being made, he said.

Expansion of foreign demand for U.S. meat in the years ahead as income grows was predicted by Johnson. He listed as potential consumers of Kansas beef such nations as Mexico, Japan, Sweden, and West Germany. The Caribbean area, with an increasing tourist trade, also is a potential market for Kansas beef.

Airlines can help meat producers who want to sell abroad, Thomas L. Allman Jr., manager of perishable air freight sales for Trans World Airlines, said. He cautioned, however, that a quality product plus a reliable source of supply are essential.

Allman said West German supermarkets, restaurants and hotels are interested in top quality fresh U.S. beef. West Germans are paying five cents each for fresh strawberries, air transported from California, he said.

"If they pay that for strawberries, they'll pay for prime beef," Allman continued.

The economic future in terms of beef is bright, John McCoy, K-State marketing specialist, said in projecting demands of consumers to 1980. He said cattle feeding is growing in Kansas. The state's capacity to produce feed grains is large enough to permit substantial increases in livestock numbers in the future, he said.

The state's commercial feedlots have grown from feeding 16 per cent of the state's beef cattle in 1956 to 55 per cent now, making Kansas second only to Texas in the increase in numbers of cattle on feed.

McCoy said the future of pork production in Kansas is better than it is in the rest of the nation, but the future of the state's

sheep industry, which is on a downward trend, depends not only upon research but also on steps by sheepmen to interest the consuming public in their product.

Roy Freeland, secretary of the board of agriculture, said beef production in Kansas is at a record high. Livestock, he said, represents 56 percent of the annual Kansas agricultural income of \$1.5 billion.

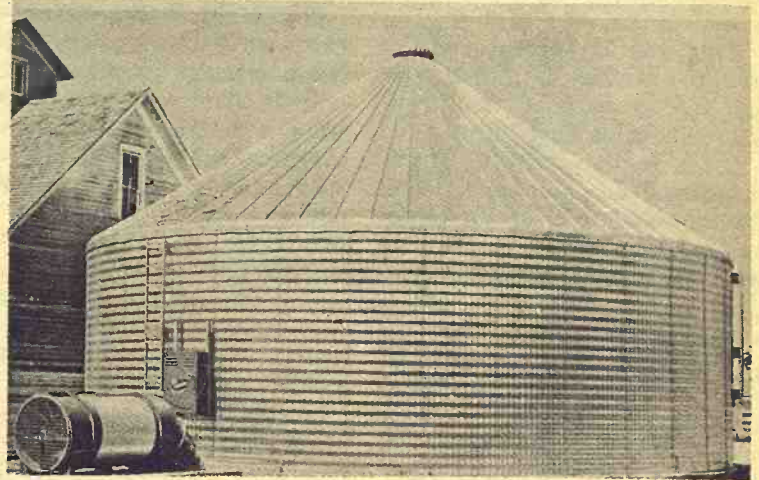

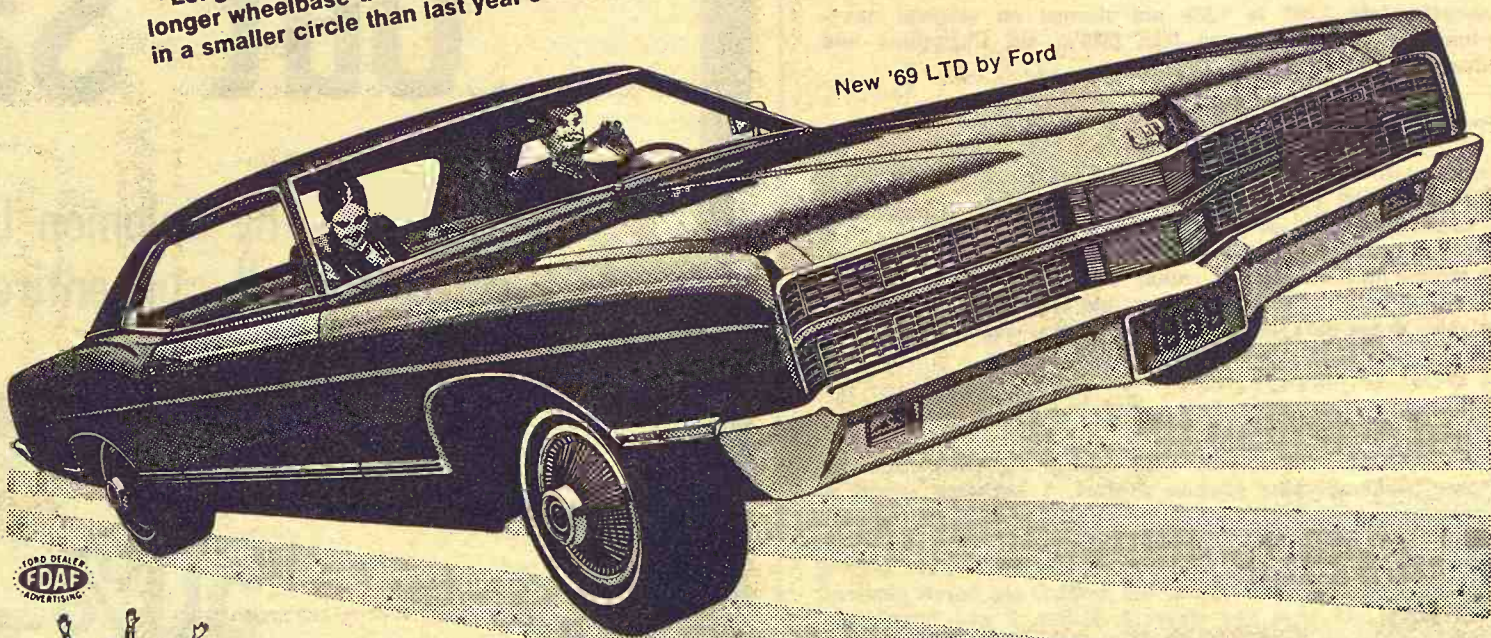

# Record Fall Feedlot Count

Cattle and calves on grain feed for the slaughter market in Kansas feedlots totaled 570,000 head as of October 1, a record number for this date, according to the Kansas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service.

This was 22 percent more than the number on feed a year ago and up seasonally from the 421,000 head on feed July 1.

Large feedlots, with a capacity of 1000 head or more, were feeding 400,000 head of cattle and calves, a record number on feed for this size group.

An additional 170,000 head were on feed in farm feedlots, 16 percent less than a year earlier but 20 percent more than were on feed July 1 this year.

Marketings of grain fed cattle during the July-September quarter totaled 307,000 head compared with 310,000 head for this same period in 1967. Cattle and calves placed on feed during the July-September quarter were estimated at 456,000 head compared with 376,000 head a year ago.

An estimated 390,000 head of steers and steer calves and 180,000 head of heifers and heifer calves were included in the total cattle on feed October 1. A year ago there were 333,000 steers and 135,000 heifers.

By weight groups 6000 of the cattle on feed were less than 500 pounds in weight compared with 10,000 a year ago; 131,000 were in the 500-699 pound group compared with 100,000 last year. 304,000 were in the 700-899 pound group compared with 211,000 in 1967; 118,000 were in the 900-1099 pound range compared with 117,000 a year earlier and 11,000 weighed 1100 pounds or more compared with 30,000 on October 1, 1967.

By length of time on feed about 80 percent or 454,000 head had been on feed under 3 months compared with 362,000 or 77 percent a year ago. Some 113,000 head had been on feed 3-6 months and only 3000 head had been on feed for more than 6 months.

Kansas feeders intend to market about 308,000 head of grain-

fed cattle in the October-December quarter of this year, or 54 percent of the number on feed October 1. If realized, this would be 10 percent more than during the same period last year.

## Major Feeding States

Cattle and calves on feed for slaughter market on October 1, 1968 in 32 major feeding states is estimated at 9,506,000 head, 11 percent more than a year earlier.

Cattle and calves on feed in the lighter weight groups were up sharply while those in the heavier weight groups showed only small changes from a year earlier. The number of cattle and calves on feed October 1 increased 2 percent from July 1 compared with a 2 percent decrease during the July-September quarter in 1967.

## NFO Gets A Third Director On National Board

SALINA — Chris Walker of Mayetta was re-elected as a national director of the National Farmers Organization by acclamation last week at the state convention here.

Besides Walker, two others were elected national directors: Vince Kostell of Abbyville and Ron Burnett of Thomas County.

Don Evertson, Melvern, who served as a national director six years, asked not to be renominated.

One of the directorships is a new post. Walker described the addition — significant of NFO growth in Kansas from representation in 50 counties 10 months ago to 72 counties today — as "something we have waited for for a long time."

About 460 delegates attended

the convention. They adopted essentially the same resolutions passed last year with one exception — they endorsed "holding the line" on state and local taxes in Kansas.

The organization suggested that the tax status, evaluations, assessments, and taxes paid by industries be studied with the categorical relationship to farmers.

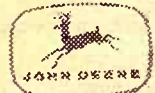

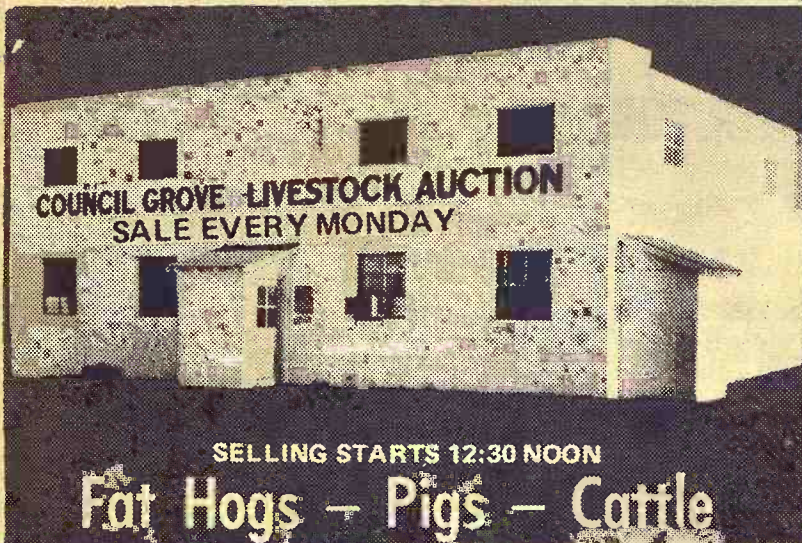

The board has proposed regulations fleshing out the new truth-in-lending act which takes effect next July 1.

In writing the law, Congress said consumers need more information than they've been getting when they make time-payment purchases.

The proposed regulations would require the seller to spell out to the purchaser all the important details of their transaction — details often left unspoken at present.

For instance, the advertiser who says on the air or in print his product can be bought for just a few dollars a month, won't be permitted to stop at that point. If he quotes a dollars-a-month figure, the regulations will insist that he also tell:

- How many months
- How big a down payment
- What the finance charge

is when expressed as an annual percentage rate.

- What the merchandise would cost if bought outright for cash instead of on time payments.
- How much greater this cost will be with the addition of the finance charge.

The regulations literally outlaw "fine print" when it comes to the essentials of finance charges.

Ten-point boldface type (darker and a fourth larger than the type of this story) is specified for the seller's disclosure to the buyer of the rate of the finance charges, the amount of each payment, frequency of payments and other credit details.

Even larger type — 12 point, all in capitals — is required for a notice telling the consumer that if he has pledged his home as collateral in certain types of installment contracts he may change his mind and back out without penalty at any time in the three days following the signing.

## Ag Center Starts Its Hall Of Fame

The portraits of the first five men named to the Agricultural Hall of Fame and National Center were presented last week at the annual Future Farmers of America convention.

The honorees for the Hall of Fame, near Bonner Springs on the western edge of the metropolitan Kansas City area, are Thomas Jefferson, George Washington, Cyrus Hall McCormick, George Washington Carver, and Justin Smith Morrill.

Sen. Frank Carlson, R-Kans., told the FFA that one of the purposes of the Hall of Fame is to provide an opportunity for today's children and the children of the future to understand agriculture's role in our lives.

Another purpose, he said, is to "honor farm leaders who have helped to make this nation great by their outstanding contributions to agriculture."

Paul Diehl, national secretary of the FFA, said the first five

# \$3 Million Worth of U.S. Polled Herefords To Chile

A \$3 million cattle deal between Chile and U.S. Polled Hereford breeders was completed at the American Royal at Kansas City last week.

The sale involves 7000 head of commercial Polled Hereford heifers, and they will be shipped by air.

Involved in the signing of the contract for the big cattle deal were officials of Corfo, the Chilean government's agency for livestock production and development, and the American Polled Hereford Assn., which headquarters in Kansas City.

Representing the Polled Hereford group were Walter M. Lewis, Larned, Ks., president, and Orville Sweet, Kansas City, executive secretary.

The heifers still must be purchased from American breeders. The breed association will coordinate the location of the heifers for purchase.

This is the second big deal the Polled Hereford breeders have concluded with Chile. Just a year ago, the first was announced and it resulted in the shipment last February from Houston of four shiploads containing 3518 commercial Polled Hereford heifers and 55 registered bulls of the breed.

The shipments early this year were valued at 2 million dollars.

Both the Chilean cattle purchases of last year and those now coming up are being financed as part of a 23-million-dollar loan issued to Chile through the Agency for International Development.

The heifers will be used in Chile to build up breeding herds. There are many Polled Hereford bulls in Chile, but not yet enough, breed officials said. They hope to persuade the Chilean government to buy more U.S. purebred and registered bulls.

The heifers, while not registered, will be of good quality. The Chilean purchase order calls for heifers under 12 months of age, preferably close to weaning age, about 5 to 7 months old, and weighing about 350 pounds. The obvious reason for wanting relatively small calves is that they will take less space on the cargo planes. Some of the biggest cargo planes can haul up to 350 head of the calves, it is said.

The heifers will be going to

Punto Arenas, which is in the southern tip of Chile, which also means it is on the southern tip of South America. In fact, the next stop would have to be the South Pole.

The locality is said to have huge areas of pasture land, some of it open for grazing 12 months out of the year.

Chile's need for increased beef production is indicated by the fact the 8 million citizens are under government restrictions to serve the meat only three days a week, Friday, Saturday and Sunday.

Flying time by jet cargo planes is said to be about 24 hours with stops for refueling, the distance being about 7500

## Farm Policy Not Major Issue To Farmers

ST. LOUIS — Farmers don't put government farm programs in the No. 1 place among issues in the coming election, accord-

ing to results of a poll conducted by the Doane Agricultural service.

Law and order, Vietnam and inflation outrank farm policy in the minds of farmers. A slim majority feels that current farm programs help maintain income, but a greater majority think government should put a top limit on farm payments. Inter-

est in farm bargaining power also remains high.

These are the highlights of a survey sent to the Doane countywide farm panel — representative sample of commercial farmers in the U.S. grossing over \$2500 per year.

Panel members were asked to select from a list of current issues the three most important issues facing federal government today. Here's a brief summary:

84.2% selected law and order  
78.6 selected Vietnam  
53.8 selected inflation  
35.3 selected agricultural policy  
17.5 selected civil rights  
10.3 selected international trade  
9.7 selected air and water pollution  
3.0 selected draft revision  
2.4 selected gun control  
2.7 selected other

## Judge Turns Back Oil Companies' Tax Complaint

RUSSELL — Oilmen who long have complained that their

property is on the tax rolls at a higher figure than non-oil property of the same value have suffered a setback in Russell County District Court.

The case had been watched as a test of whether the state assessment schedule for oil properties complied with the new

law's requirement for all property to go on the tax rolls at 30 per cent of "justifiable" value. Judge Benedict P. Cruise ruled that it did and that "justifiable value" did not mean "market value" or "sale value."

The judge rejected outright a Sohio contention that Sohio holdings had been assessed at 44 per cent of value while other properties were assessed at only 22 per cent.

Sohio presented figures to Judge Cruise alleging its properties to be valued by the assessor at \$906,480, while they were actually worth only \$459,416.

Tax assessment ratio studies did not apply to gas and oil leases and personal property, Judge Cruise held in pointing to changes made in property assessment by the 1963 legislature.

The ratio study is based entirely on sale prices and can't be used as a guide.

The case had been taken to the Kansas Supreme Court once before. It is expected to be appealed again.

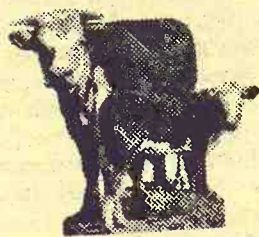

## Order A Cut In Uninsured Motorist Cost

Recent reductions in premium rates on uninsured motorist coverage will save Kansans about \$2 million annually, Frank Sullivan, state insurance

commissioner, says.

Effective last week, nearly all automobile insurance companies operating in Kansas will be charging \$2 a year, the commissioner said.

Under a 1968 statute, insurance companies are required to offer uninsured motorist coverage although policyholders are not required to subscribe to it.

"Uninsured motorist coverage

is included in automobile liability insurance policies, unless rejected by the insured in writing and is designed to protect the insured against bodily damages inflicted by an uninsured motorist," Sullivan said.

Previously, most insurance companies operating in Kansas had charged \$4 a year for the coverage. Now, in accordance with the commissioner's orders, the companies will charge only \$2 a year until experience indicates that some adjustment should be made.

Sullivan said a few companies had been charging \$2 but the majority were listed at the higher figure.

Sullivan said his office took the position that if uninsured motorist coverage were sold on all automobile liability policies, the rate should be lower because the risk would be spread.

"Although the new law did not make the purchase of this coverage compulsory, we felt that sufficient Kansas premium volume would be obtained to warrant some rate reductions," Sullivan said.

While some companies decreased their rates voluntarily, the commission said, a hearing, involving two rating bureaus, was required to obtain reductions from their members.

Members of the two bureaus collect about 20 per cent of automobile insurance premiums in the state.

The 163 member and subscriber companies of insurance rating board and mutual insurance rating bureau will comply with the new rate Saturday.

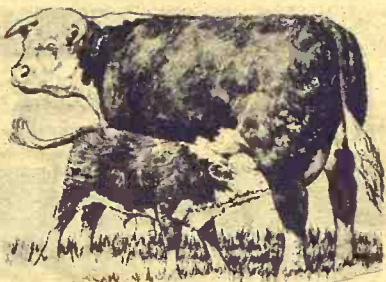

## Spreader Still Best Use Of Feedlot Waste

AMES, Iowa — Problems of animal waste disposal are increasing for some specialized Iowa livestock producers, according to Ted L. Willrich, Iowa State University extension agricultural engineer.

Avoiding water pollution and controlling odors are the major

problems. Spreading manure on cropland still is the least expensive and the most practical way to minimize water pollution, the agricultural engineer said.

Livestock producers who do not have enough land on which to spread manure are advised to contract with other landowners to take the manure. Or they must find some other means to dispose of it.

Willrich said Iowa State and several other universities have experimented with many processes for converting animal wastes

into marketable products or for disposal without salvage where land application can't be used.

Methods such as composting and dehydration are not feasible in Iowa because of high humidity, frequent rains, and lack of nearby markets for processed manure.

The agricultural engineer said "Whether the objective is utilization or just getting rid of the solid wastes, land application continues to be the most economical and practical solution for Iowa conditions."

Channeling dilute liquid wastes such as cattle feedlot runoff or waste water from a milking parlor and milkhouse into a lagoon avoids surface water pollution, said Willrich. Lagoons can be constructed to operate aerobically (where there is oxygen) without odor.

Lagooning concentrated wastes such as liquid manure from a hog finishing building can cause a serious odor problem. Concentrated wastes decompose anaerobically (without oxygen) which causes stinking gases to rise from the lagoon. Objectionable odor may be detectable as far as a mile downwind from an anaerobic lagoon.

Anaerobic lagoons must be located to keep offensive odors away from residences, particularly if they are occupied by persons other than the livestock producer.

Avoiding odor complaints is a potential problem confronting all livestock producers, according to Willrich. "The best solution is segregation," he added. "Keep livestock out of residential areas and keep the most easily offended people, such as nonfarmers, out of the agricultural areas where all odors cannot be prevented. Effective and complete county and city planning and zoning is the best

way to prevent odor complaints," the engineer advises.

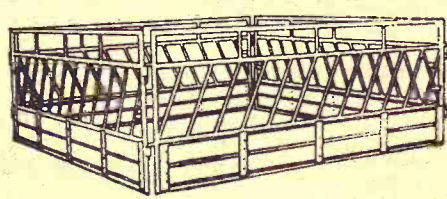

# Japan To Give Other Nation's Wheat A Trial

U.S. wheat merchants are facing new and formidable competition in the lucrative Japanese market.

Argentina and France, both previously shut out of Japan's wheat import market, recently have sought to secure a toe-hold there. Both apparently have been successful.

Late last month, the Japanese government, which purchases most of the wheat brought into the country, agreed to

make a trial purchase of Argentine wheat. If the quality of the wheat proves acceptable, the government probably will import important quantities from the South American nation.

The government also is studying a similar trial for French wheat. The Japanese are interested particularly in a French offer to export high quality wheat at prices lower than those offered by Japan's current suppliers, including the United

States.

Other wheat exporting nations have charged that the lower price France is offering the Japanese is a violation of the international grain agreement.

But a spokesman for the Japanese government's food agency said in an interview that if the French offer were what it seems to be, Japan very well may be importing wheat from France next year.

Japan is the biggest commercial importer of wheat in the world, taking over the role from Britain last year. In the fiscal year ended March 31, Japan bought 4.2 million tons of wheat from foreign suppliers.

In recent years, the U.S. has dominated the Japanese wheat import market. Last year, for example, 55.8 per cent of all Japanese wheat imports came from the U.S., while 30.4 per cent came from Canada and 13.8 per cent from Australia, according to food agency figures.

Now, it appears the U.S. along with Canada and Australia, will have to share the rich Japanese wheat pie with two more countries.

That pie may be smaller next year in any case. After years of expansion, Japanese wheat imports are expected to decline next year to about four million tons.

Even if Japan's wheat needs did not decline, however, the U.S. probably still would lose some of its share of the market.

The food agency official explained that the government

wishes to expand its sources of supply to be in a better bargaining position to obtain the best possible grain at the lowest possible price.

More important, the Japanese recently have indicated that they wish to diversify their foreign markets for all imports and exports for reasons of na-

tional policy.

There is a growing feeling in some segments of government and industry that Japan is too dependent on the U.S. for its economic security.

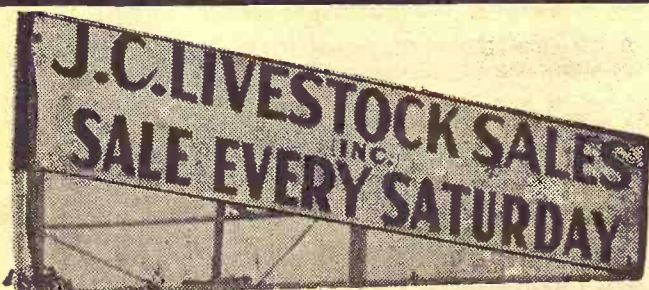

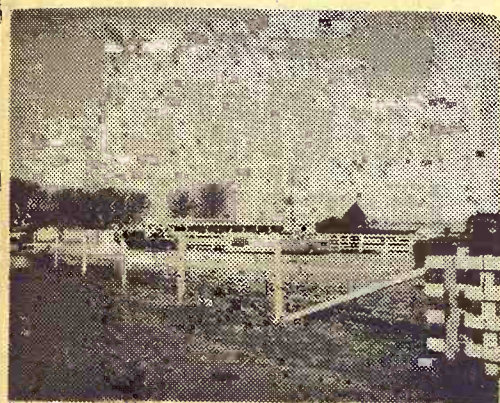

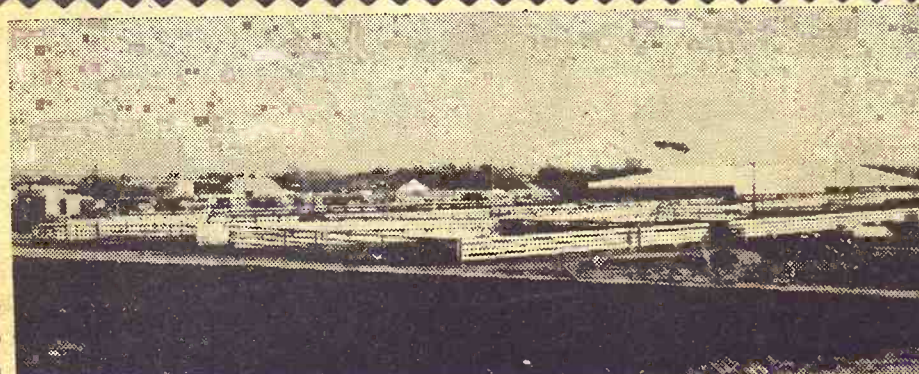
