Six Kansas farm couples have been honored by the Kansas Chamber of Commerce as Master Farmers and Master Homemakers. Three of the couples are from the G&G area. The other three couples are from western Kansas.

Selections are based on excellence in farming, home-making, farm living and rural citizenship. The Chamber of Commerce program is in cooperation with the Kansas Extension Service.



MR. AND MRS. GLENN HANSON - Chanute, Neosho county
The Hansons farm 800 acres in the Neosho river bottom north of Chanute. Wheat, corn, alfalfa, soybeans and prairie hay are raised on 405 acres of cropland. The remaining acreage is pasture, meadow and woodlots. The Hansons run between 40 and 60 cattle.



MR. AND MRS. MELVIN MUSTOE - Norton, Norton county
The Mustoes run a 2666 - acre farm in northeast Norton county, handling about 200 cows and calves each year, selling them as feeders at about 700 to 800 pounds. Last year Mustoe averaged 35 bushels per acre on wheat and 54 bushels per acre on sorghums.



MR. AND MRS. EDWARD MILLER - Mullinville, Edwards county
The Millers run a 5200 - acre farm, with 1500 acres of cropland and handle about 1000 cattle a year. The Millers started irrigating in 1956. A cutting horse of Miller's was reserve state champion in the open class last year.



MR. AND MRS. WILLIAM HICKS - Goodland, Sherman county
Hicks came to Kansas as a farm laborer in 1931, now owns about 1200 acres and rents 800 more. Primary crop enterprises have been wheat and sorghums for a cattle feeding operation that now averages about 300 head a year.



MR. AND MRS. HAROLD GOFF - Manhattan, Riley County

Lifelong residents of Riley county, the Goffs live on the farm where Harold has lived since he was six. As a young girl, Mrs. Goff lived on a farm a few miles north of their farmstead four miles of Manhattan.

They operate a dairy farm, selling whole milk from a herd of about 50 Holsteins. They also keep about 50 replacement heifers. Nearly all the cows are sired by Kansas Artificial Breeding Service Unit bulls. Production by the Goff herd has averaged as high as 17,000 pounds of milk and 660 pounds fat per cow.



MR. AND MRS. PAUL MEARS - Beloit, Mitchell county

The Mears started farming in the early 1930s on a farm rented from his mother. They purchased their first land in 1934, adding to their holdings from time to time and now farm 6863 acres.

They operated a 20-cow dairy herd for 14 years, raised several hundred broilers for 15 years, kept a flock of laying hens for 25 years, and fattened 30 to 100 feeder pigs for 14 years. Today they specialize in crop production and deferred steers. On the livestock side they feed about 750 head of deferred steers, flood irrigate about 400 acres of corn and milo.

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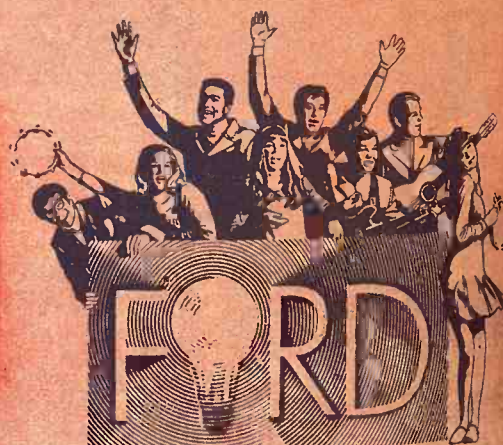

Let Health Handle Me Inspection

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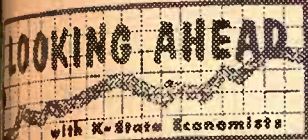
Worst Inflation Since '46-'48

Average prices of consumer goods and services in the U.S. have risen nearly 25 percent in the past 10 years. Fifteen percent of this rise has occurred in the past 4 years and nearly 5 percent in the last year.

This has been the most rapid period of inflation in the U.S. since 1946-48 when prices soared more than 25 percent in two years.

The recent rise in prices is the highest rate of inflation the U.S. has ever experienced during a prolonged period of high production of civilian goods. It has been accompanied by the highest interest rates in 50 years.

Why is this inflation occurring? Will it continue in the future?



Runaway inflation generally occurs when there has been a great expansion of money and credit or disruption of production or both, says E. S. Bagley, professor of economics at Kansas State University. Usually it occurs in a nation devastated by war or revolution such as

Germany after World Wars I and II or China after World War II.

However, serious inflation has afflicted some nations in peacetime — nations whose production has not been disrupted by war. A recent example is Brazil, where prices have more than doubled every year for the past 5 years. Inflation there has been caused by excessive spending, mostly by government, financed by debt and monetary expansion, Bagley says.

When inflation reaches such proportions, people no longer have confidence in the value of money. They try to protect their economic position by spending money as fast as possible before it loses its value. They invest in land, commodities, or anything which will go up with the price level.

On the other hand, they go into debt excessively. They raise the price of the things they have to sell. They strike for large wage increases and this only aggravates the problem.

This is certainly not the situation in the U.S. today, Bagley says. However, there are signs that expectations of inflation in the minds of the American people are more widespread than at any time in many years.

Yields on common stocks which have continued for several years below yields on the less risky bonds, the high interest rates, exorbitant demands for wage increases by many unions and the rapidly rising land values support this view.

Bagley says that debt financing, monetary expansion and a developing inflation psychosis are the main causes of the current inflation. The diversion of resources into the Vietnam War is contributing to the problem, but the percentage of the national income devoted to this purpose is actually relatively small.

He believes that a tight rein on monetary expansion and fiscal restraint would ultimately bring inflation under control. But it would be difficult to accomplish this without causing a major unemployment problem, he says.

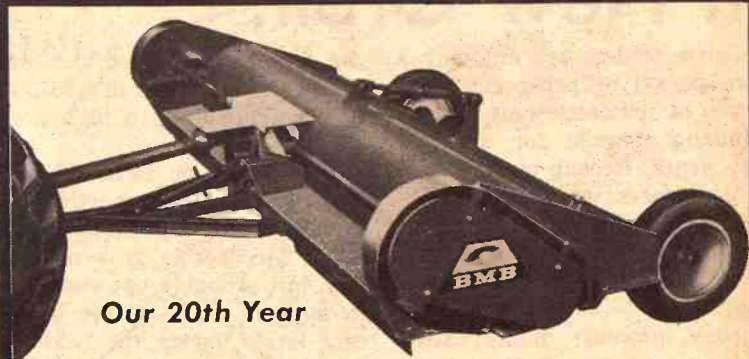

There are signs that the "boom" in the U.S. is on the verge of coming to a natural end. Strong anti-inflationary measures coming at such a time

could be harmful, Bagley adds. The most important thing to accomplish, he says, is to persuade people to quit acting as though inflation is inevitable.

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Let Health Dept. Handle Meat Inspection Law

If Kansas is going to have mandatory meat and poultry inspection, it should be done by the Kansas Health Department, not the Kansas Board of Agriculture.

That seemed to be the unanimous view of several processors, packers and frozen food locker operators who appeared before a House committee last week. A bill had already gone thru the Senate, stipulating the Agriculture Board would administer the program.

The legislature is seeking to write a meat inspection bill which will meet federal requirements. If a satisfactory bill is not written, meat inspection in the state will become a federally administered program.

The latter is considered undesirable by most processors, especially the locker operators who think federal regulations fit large packers but not smaller operations.

Health Department officials say they want to administer the program. The Board of Agriculture has been reserved in its public statements, but officials have privately said they do not want the meat inspection responsibility.

Cattle Prices In New Orbit?

Cattle feeders are enjoying a rare period of prosperity. The prices of fed cattle have been climbing upward for about two years. Recent prices for choice steers were near \$30 per 100 pounds — up 20 percent from two years ago. That price level is the highest since late 1962.

Now, however, many cattle-men are concerned. They won-

der whether cattle prices will crash, as they did in 1963, or tend to remain in a higher orbit.

There may be some of both elements in the prospective cattle situation. Consumer demand for beef is growing rapidly, but probably not enough to support cattle prices at recent levels during the next six months.

Growing demand for beef. Consumer demand for beef has been growing rapidly in recent years. For example, consumers spent about 9 percent more money for beef in 1968 than in 1967. They bought 4.5 percent more beef and paid 4 percent higher prices for it.

A part of this stronger demand for beef was returned to farmers in the form of increased receipts from the sales of beef cattle. Farmers sold 3 percent more beef on the hoof in 1968 than in 1967, yet prices of slaughter steers averaged 6 percent higher.

Demand may be checked. The demand for beef may not grow as much this year as it did in 1968. The government has taken steps to check inflation, or "cool off the economy." Credit has been restricted and income taxes have been increased. Some families may have to tighten their belts when their spendable income is reduced.

Larger supplies of beef expected. The increase in beef output seems likely to continue during the next six months. The number of cattle on feed appears to be up about 7 percent from 1968 levels, although a part of this increase may reflect more days in the feedlot for each animal.

Shipments of stocks and feeders into the Corn Belt have been down from 1967 levels, but there are more cattle available within the area. There are also reports of more heavy

cattle being taken back to the country for further feeding.

Danger areas seen. Consumers may become cost conscious about beef again. If cash becomes scarce, some housewives will check prices more closely before buying steak. If only a small percentage of women were to look for something cheaper, they would undermine the price structure for both beef and cattle.

Retailers also may remove some support from the cattle market. They can do this by featuring pork and poultry more frequently. Broiler supplies may exceed 1968 levels by 6 to 8 percent, and pork output is expected to be up 4 to 6 percent.

Cattle futures rise. The prices of cattle futures contracts have risen even more than those of slaughter cattle. August cattle, for example, have moved from under \$25 to around \$30. This does not necessarily mean that long speculators believe cattle prices will be over \$30 in August. It probably means that they expect prices to go higher before turning downward, and that they expect to sell out before prices slide very far. In the meantime, the futures market provides an opportunity for cattle feeders to insure a profitable return on replacements for sale later this year.


Big First Sale By New Assn. Of Herdsmen

AHI is a private professional training school for purebred beef cattle herdsmen.



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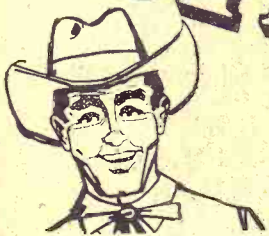

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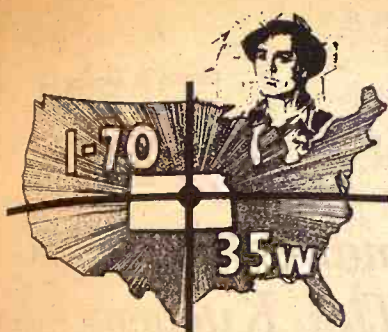

16 sticks of peppermint candy (about 5 ounces)

1½ cups milk

½ cup cool water

1 package unflavored gelatin

1 package Dream Whip

½ cup milk

1 milk chocolate bar (1 ounce)

Graham crackers

Break up candy sticks in saucepan. Pour in milk. ("I usually let this set awhile before putting on low heat"). Soften gelatin with water. Scabiosa Fine For Bouquets

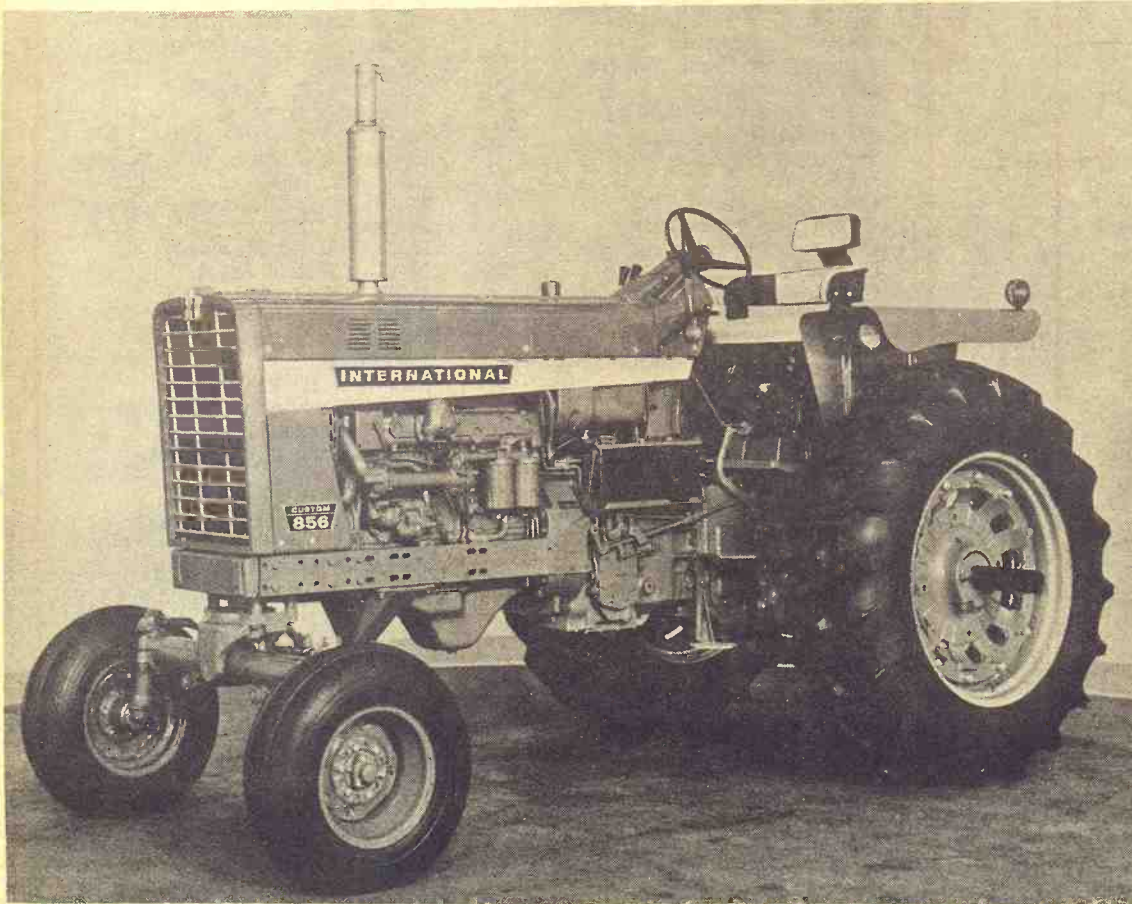

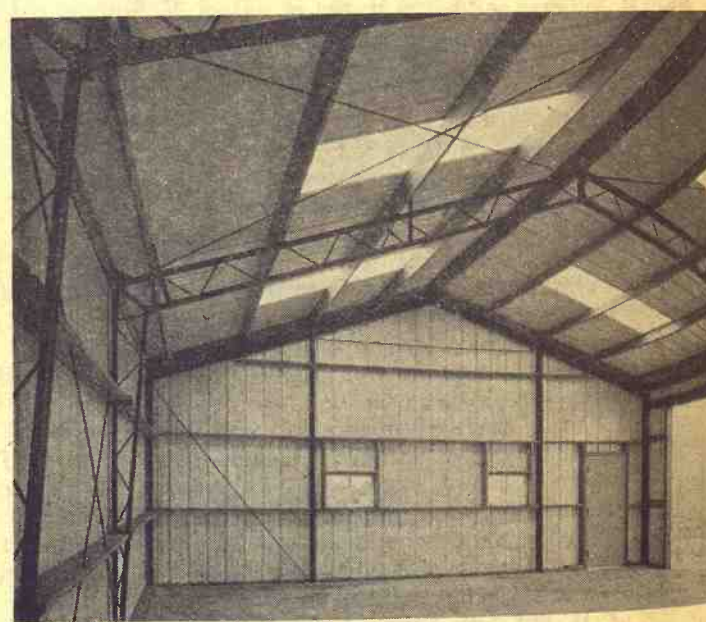

Perky Easter Favors For Easy Hatching

For easy-to-make Easter decorations, try your hand at chick 'n egg favors.

Created from pastel-colored cotton cosmetic balls and dyed eggshells, the fluffy chicks are ideal for table centerpieces and party favors. They can also be used to brighten a hospital tray or to tuck in among colored eggs in the children's Easter baskets.

To make baby chicks, press out the center of a yellow cotton cosmetic ball, forming a small cone. Shape tip of cone into a head for the chick and fashion the beak by making a point at the front of the head. Use a felt-tipped pen to make the eyes and color the beak.

Before dyeing the eggshells, punch a hole in the pointed end of the egg — making it large enough to empty the egg contents. Rinse eggshells thoroughly with cool tap water. When they're completely dry, carefully break away pieces of the

shells . . . leaving jagged edges. Color shells with cold water fizz tablets.

Make nests to cradle the eggshells out of large colored cosmetic balls. Press your thumb downward at the center of the cotton ball, rounding it into a "nest" shape.

The cotton chick 'n egg favors can be kept for years to come. Store in an empty egg carton and cover with tissue paper.

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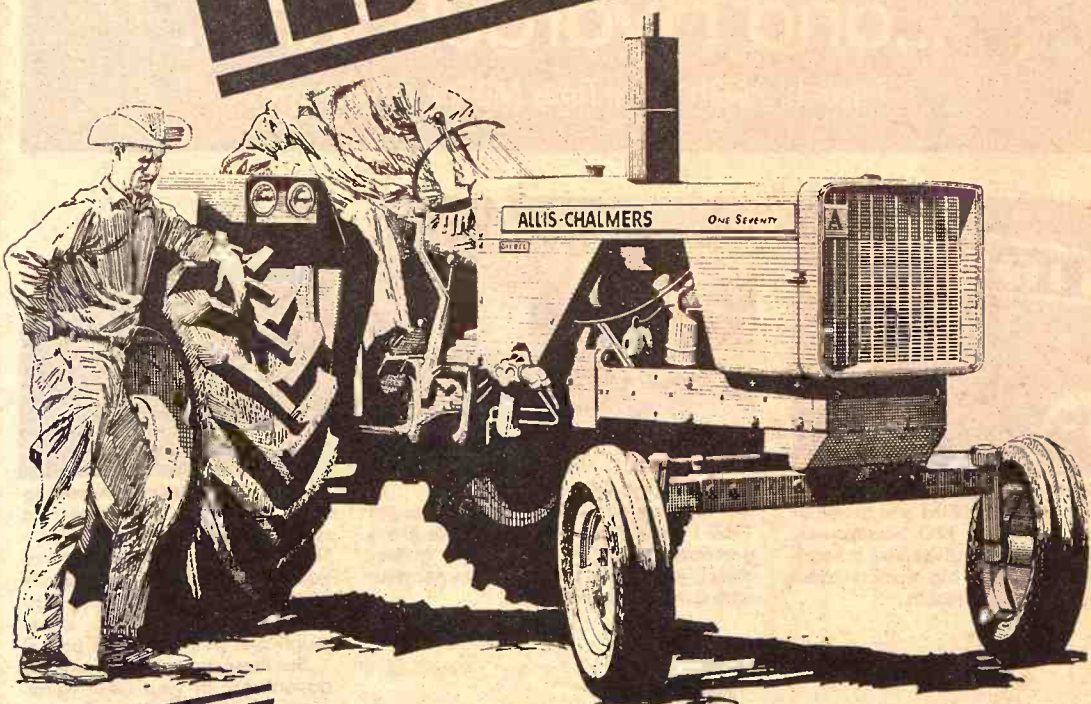

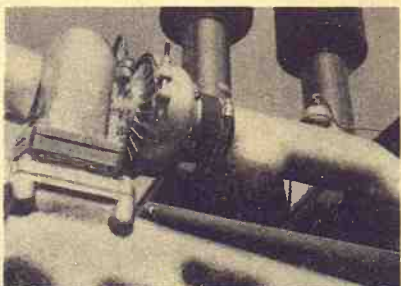



Banker Needs To See Farmer As Prime User Of Credit

Farming is shifting from
brawn to brain, craft to science,
cash to perpetual credit and
from worker to management,
all of which is producing a new
breed of farmer and investor.

The decisions farmers make
will therefore become increas-
ingly dependent on the business
decisions of farm-related indus-
try, Dr. C. F. Davan Jr. told
the 13th annual Agri-Business
conference of the Missouri
Bankers Association at Kansas
City.

Dr. Davan, manager of busi-
ness development, Great West-
ern Sugar company, Denver,
said the new breed of farmer
no longer looks on his banker
as a cold-blooded creditor but
rather as a partner.

Because of the vast number
of changes in the farming in-
dustry, such as fluorescent
lights to grow plants, shock
waves to control hailstorms,
greenhouse crops and controlled
environment for breeding live-
stock, Dr. Davan said the farm-
er must look to technology for
his profits.

Bankers need to develop a
more enlightened look at the
farmer, to be more familiar
with what is at stake for both

of them.

"There is no more place in a
farmer's program for outrage-
ously high interest credit from
dealers, suppliers and credit as-
sociations than there is for a
horse-drawn plow," he said.

"What he will seek and get
is access to prime money sourc-
es. The banks that lose their
business will be those that con-
tinue traditional approaches —
that is, offering credit only on
assets or full recourse paper,
with associate bankers taking
only the paper that has full re-
course or hard goods backing
it."

There is really a small future
in the world today for this kind
of farm banking, Dr. Davan
said, as there is no future for
the marginal farmer.

For both the banker and the
farmer, agriculture imposes
great risks but, as never before,
technology has opened the way
for vast resources and business
opportunities.

Watershed Plans Still Held Up

Watershed boosters are hop-
ing the Nixon administration
will soon give attention to the
nation's watershed program
which has been limping for
months. A number of Kansas
projects are involved.

Executive and legislative
branches of the government
are tied up in the matter of ap-
proval for watershed work
plans by congressional commit-
tees. The Johnson adminis-
tration held that this procedure in
the hands of Congress is uncon-
stitutional, despite the fact it
had been used since 1954. Con-
gress argues it is legal.

As a result, the watershed
program has been virtually at
a standstill. Nearly 100 work
plans, approved by the public
works and agriculture commit-

tee of the Congress, are lying
dormant in the Department of
Agriculture.

Substantial amounts of sup-
plementary state funds appro-
priated to carry out local re-
sponsibilities have been lost.
Planning schedules are in dis-
array.

A box score on watershed
projects over the nation at the
end of February showed a total
of 2,750 applications on file, of
which 1,493 had been authorized
for planning. Approved for op-
eration were 838, with 418 un-
der construction. Only 231 had
been completed.

President Nixon promised in
his campaign last fall he would
get this watershed controversy
straightened out. It will take
action by his administration to
get the program on the track
again.

Judge Denies Claim Over Cattle Poisoning

KANSAS CITY, Ks. — A fed-
eral district judge has denied
the claim of two Kansas dairy-
men who sought \$50,000 in
damages for the death of 42
head of cattle due to lead
poisoning.

The plaintiffs alleged the
lead poisoning resulted from
the dropping of metallic chaff
by the Air Force in 1964 and
1965 on land in Leavenworth

and Wyandotte counties. The
suit was against the federal
government.

Judge George T. Templar,
sitting without a jury, found
that the Air Force did commit
acts of trespass by discharging
a foreign substance in the air
space over the land of A. W.
Dearing and J. W. Hughes
and awarded them nominal
damages of \$1.

The judge ruled that the evi-
dence did not show that lead in
the chaff proximately caused
any lead poisoning of cattle or
damage to crops, and, he said,
there was no evidence by
which any measure of amount
of damage could be calculated.

Fourth Statewide Vote On Liquor

When Kansans go up to the polls in November 1970 to vote on whether or not to drop the prohibition against the "open saloon" from its constitution, it will be the fourth statewide referendum to the populace to decide if and how it will drink hard liquor.

The constitution was silent

on this subject in the rip-roaring days when cow towns marked the end of cattle trails and railroads.

In 1880, after Kansas settled down to a life built around farms, a majority of voters decided the state constitution should spell out a prohibition against manufacture and sale

of intoxicating liquor.

An exception for "medical, scientific and mechanical purposes" made enforcement difficult. In the 1890s and early 1900s, Mrs. Carry Nation made history by wielding her hatchet against saloons operating in defiance of constitutional prohibition.

Despite the end of national prohibition in the 1930s, a majority of Kansas voters still believed in the noble experiment. In 1934 they voted 437,000 to 348,000 to keep the liquor ban.

The question was submitted again in 1948 with the repeal amendment containing the phrase "the open saloon shall be and is hereby forever prohibited."

This time the amendment carried 422,000 to 358,000. But the phrase, a major factor in the repeal campaign, was interpreted as barring liquor by the drink.

For the last 20 years, Kansas had a strict package store law. Recent development of private clubs has created increasing pressure for relaxation of the sale by the drink ban.

Proposed amendments were introduced in the 1963, 1964, 1965 and 1968 legislative sessions. But they were either killed outright in committee or died there.

The trip thru the legislature this session was on a tightrope. Dry leaders conceded that a resolution to submit the question as a constitutional amendment might get thru the Senate. But the House, with a greater rural influence, was not expected to give the resolution the two-thirds support it needed. In fact, many observers on both dry and wet sides figured the resolution wouldn't get out of committee. One who didn't was Jess Taylor, onetime House Speaker and still regarded as an astute vote-counter.

The resolution needed 27 votes to get by the Senate, and it got just that number. It came out of House committee, to the chagrin of the Drys, and

needed 84 votes for the necessary two-thirds support from the House. It got just that number.

Voters should clearly understand that liquor by-the-drink was not approved by the legislature. It approved submitting an amendment to the constitution which would eliminate the prohibiting phrase in the 1948 amendment.

The amendment does not require the two-thirds support the resolution needed from the legislature. A simple majority will do.

Right now, politicians and newsmen seem to think that the amendment would pass. But between now and November 1970, both sides will have plenty of time to make their persuasion felt. And plenty of time to make mistakes that could lose potential supporters.

On the one side are many who simply believe that hard liquor should be more available than it is thru package stores and clubs. The clubs themselves are an embarrassment to many people, considered uncontrollable by police officers, and drink influence many people also, some who foresee additional taxes produced and some who figure the state loses considerable income because liquor is not available at hotels, restaurants and convention sites as it is in most states.

Votes against the amendment in 1970 will come from others besides the inflexibility dry group, presumably still substantial in numbers. These will include voters who figure that the present law is operated tolerantly and see no reason to open the gates further. Some will see it as a moral issue, and

others may figure that the various arguments in favor of liberalizing liquor laws are not sufficient to counterbalance its problems.

Undoubtedly a substantial number of uncommitted voters will finally make their decision not because they were persuaded by one fraction or the other, but because they were antagonized by the arguments.

It should be noted that popular approval of the amendment would not necessarily insure liquor by the drink in Kansas. That would be up to the legislature to decide if the amendment carries.

Elimination of the phrase prohibiting the open saloon would allow a future Legislature to enact a law providing for liquor by the drink — something it can't do now because of the ban on open saloons.

This means the liquor question may be dividing voters for many months to come. It is more than a year and half before the constitutional amendment itself will be on the ballot. If that passes, both sides will be reapplying force on the legislature which will be deciding what restrictions will be placed on sale of liquor by the drink. The local option feature will still apply and there will be further debate on the question on the county or city level.

In short, the liquor question is going to produce lots of talk between now and November 1970, but the statewide referendum at that time won't end the debate even then.

G&G Area Legislators Voted Against Liquor Resolution

The effects of reapportionment of the legislature are seldom so evident as they are in relation to the vote in the House on the liquor amendment.

Of the 48 House members who represent Topeka, Kansas City and nearby Johnson and Leavenworth counties, and Wichita and suburbs, the vote for the liquor amendment was 46-2.

Excluding the city representatives, the G&G area legislators not only wouldn't have given the resolution a two-thirds approval, they wouldn't even have given it a simple majority.

Including the G&G area as all counties east of US81 and including a triangle with a leg northwest of Wichita thru Hutchinson, Great Bend, to Phillipsburg, the vote would have been 28 for and 31 against.

Western Kansas, counting some counties included in the C&G area, favored the resolution, 13-9.

The metropolitan areas, which have 38% of the representation in the House, provided 54% of the support for the resolution. The city influence can be further noted by the vote from all representatives from cities of 10,000 population and over — 59 for, 9 against.

The vote by parties was Republicans 52 for, 33 against; Democrats 32 for, 5 against. Three representatives avoided voting — Republicans Raymond King of Hesston and Dan Thies of Independence, and Demo-

crat Elmer Holt of Wellington.

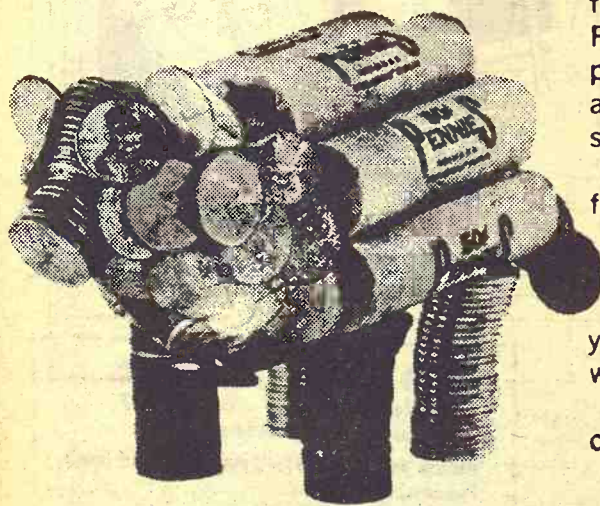

'Bragging Size' Fishing Award

A program to honor anglers who catch "bragging size" and record fish in Kansas waters has been announced by the Kansas Forestry, Fish and Game Commission.

George Moore, director of the Commission, said colorful "Master Angler Award" certificates and "Record Fish Award" certificates honoring large catches

among 10 popular game fish species, will be awarded to all who qualify.

He added that the existing formula for registering record fish catches will be followed in issuing both certificates.

The angler who takes a large fish, which might qualify for either award, will have to make application with the Commission, listing the weight, length and girth of the fish, where caught, type of tackle used, bait or lure used, and other informa-

tion. The weight must be registered on scales which are legal for trade, and the weighing must be witnessed by two disinterested persons.

Application blanks can be secured from the Information-Education Division of the Commission at Box 1028, Pratt 67124, from Fish and Game personnel, or may be clipped from future issues of the Commission's Fish and Game magazine.

Master Angler certificates, listing the angler's name, where his large fish was taken, its weight, lure used and other information on the catch, will be issued for the following species and minimum weights of fish: Large mouth black bass, seven pounds; Spotted (Kentucky) Bass, two pounds; Channel Catfish, 15 pounds; Flathead Catfish, 55 pounds; Northern Pike, 15 pounds; Walleye, eight pounds; Crappie, three pounds; White Bass, 4 pounds; Bullhead Catfish, two pounds; Bluegill, 1½ pounds.

State Record Awards will be issued to all current record holders, Moore said, and at any time a new record is set on any

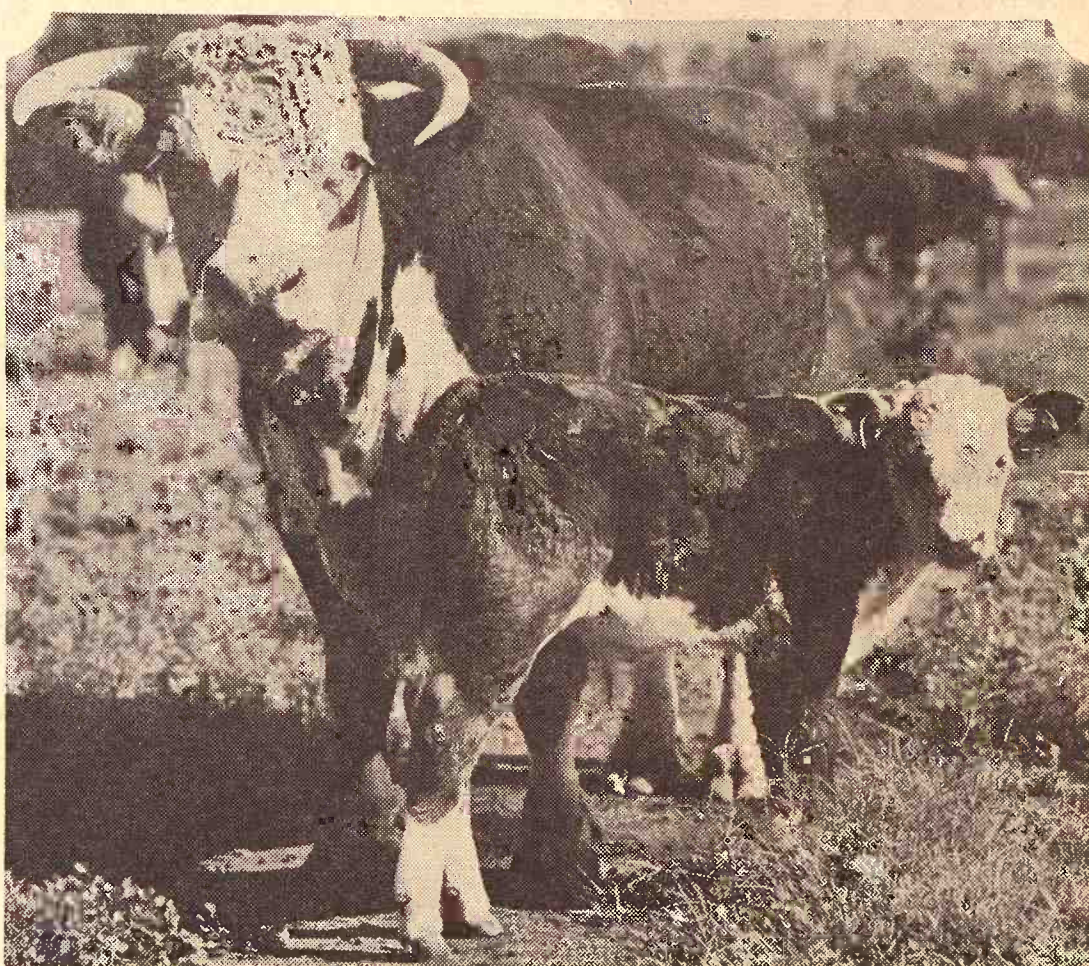

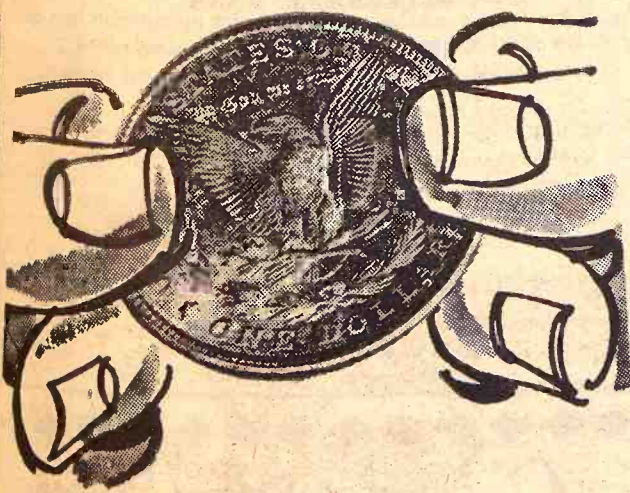
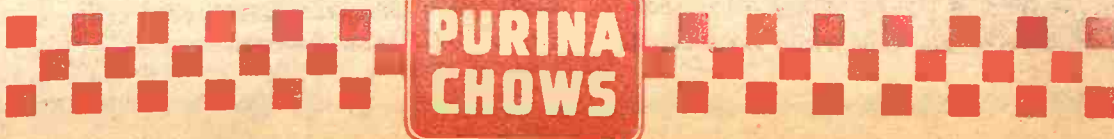

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Dock Strike Hurts State Wheat Sales

HUTCHINSON — Kansas Wheat producers could be hurt by actions of longshoremen on the West Gulf Coast who have shut down ports in a dispute over container shipments, Aaron E. Hawes, Larned, chairman of the Regional Great Plains Wheat Inc., says.

Hawes, also a member of the Kansas Wheat Commission, said that Houston and Galveston ports are facing a glut of wheat and if it is not moved there will be no place for the new crop. Some Kansas wheat

moves down the Mississippi river to New Orleans, but the grain is also shipped to Galveston by train from Hutchinson and Wichita and by truck from southwest Kansas.

Hawes said 90,000 tons of hard winter wheat ordered by Brazil is stopped on the Gulf, and Brazil now has a tender for 110,000 tons more, better than 4 million bushels, which that country badly needs. If shipments cannot be made from the U.S., Hawes said, Brazil will have to go elsewhere and the "American farmers will lose these sales."

Hawes said the longshoremen have settled their strike on the East Coast and the east part of the Gulf coast, including New Orleans.

Wild Turkeys Catching On

A highly successful turkey trapping season has been ended by the Kansas Fish and Game Commission with the capture of 41 birds from a south-central Kansas location.

The last catch included 19 hens and 22 toms, bringing to 73 the total number of wild Rio Grande turkeys trapped by the Commission this year.

Fifty-five of the birds have been moved to other sites, while 18 were banded and released in the trapping area.

Among those taken in the final effort, 12 were released at a new site on the Medicine River

in Barber County, and 15 near the Seward-Meade County line on the Cimarron River. Four others were transported to northwest Kansas for supplemental stocking of two previously released flocks.

Among the birds trapped was a two-year-old hen which had been captured and banded last year during a similar operation. This is the first instance of recapture from a wild flock since the relocation program was started.

Soggy Spring Cuts Fertilizer

A soggy spring seems certain to dampen fertilizer sales.

One big chemical company has already written off the Southeast market where wet fields have prevented fertilizer applications which should have started two weeks ago.

The Midwest is faced with a short, concentrated selling season because of wet weather; cold temperatures have held up field work in Kentucky and Tennessee.

Even in the Southwest, where chemical applications got off to a good start, recent rains have dimmed the outlook.

Anxiously being watched is the Mississippi River Valley area which includes part of the Corn Belt and accounts for a third of the country's fertilizer consumption.

So much snow has piled up over the winter in the area that experts say a normal thaw will almost certainly produce flooding, which would wash out fertilizer sales. "The headwaters have the potential for scoring the highest water mark in history," groans one chemical company man.

One To Five, \$30,000 Fine On Addington

The second trial of William Addington, onetime Kansas grainman and politician, resulted in a sentence of one to five

years in the state prison and a \$30,000 fine covering six counts of a 10-count warrant. Earlier Addington was sentenced to one to seven years and a \$50,000 fine on another count of making false entries in a corporation's books but the jury at that time failed to reach a verdict on the other 10 counts.

Addington said several employees had falsified his records and lied to the jury. He is free on bond from the first conviction and will appeal the sentence imposed last week in Wichita.

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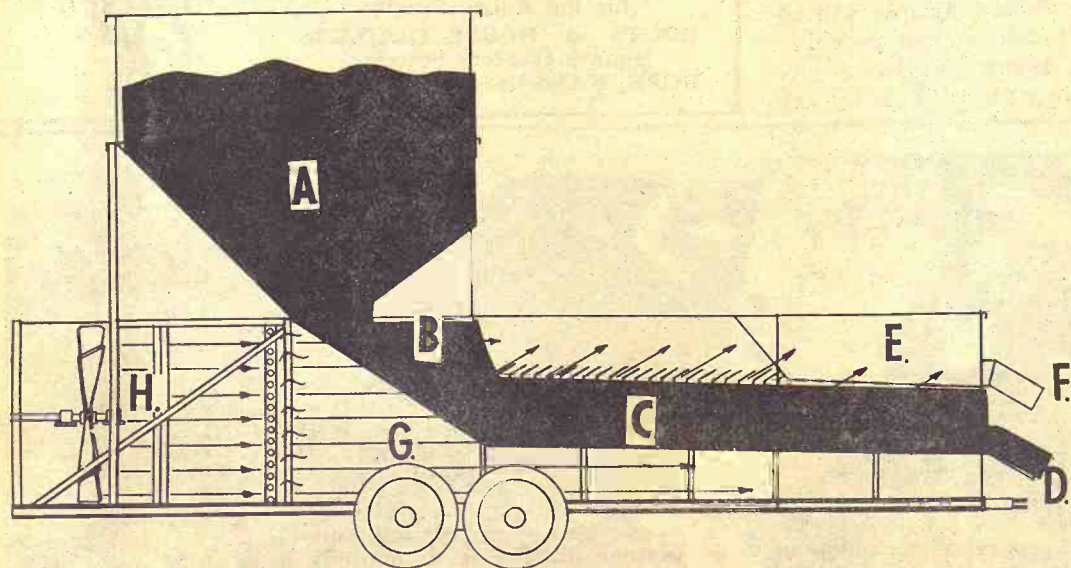
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Large capacity with gravity flow into the dryer.

B. PRE-HEATING AREA:

Hot air is delivered in high volume and velocity into the plenum. It enters the grain through directional louvers which fluidize the grain; drying and cleaning it as it is conveyed forward.

H. FAN:

This large 44" duct axial fan delivers the air to dry, clean and convey the drying grain through the dryer.

Sunflower Turnabout On Iowa

If Iowa doesn't like the official Kansas flower, then Kansas is going to take a dim view of the state bird of Iowa.

At least that is the general import of a resolution introduced in the Kansas House of Representatives.

The resolution by six representatives would declare the Eastern Gold Finch to be a public nuisance.

The resolution notes the Iowa Legislature recently declared the Sunflower to be a noxious weed.

The resolution states the Eastern Gold Finch is "unattractive, bothersome and raucously noisy" and "possesses no other redeeming qualities."

The resolution proposes to make it lawful to hunt and kill the Eastern Gold Finch at any time without a license.

The resolution would appear to be at wide variance with the opinions expressed in the book, "Birds of America." The book says this bird, also known as a wild canary, is one "the most casual observer can enthuse over" and "one that the bird student will never tire raving over."

Surcharge Causing Tax Errors

It's still two weeks before April 15, but early U.S. income tax returns make it clear that the surcharge is not only costing the taxpayer but it's making him make more mistakes.

The Internal Revenue Service says one taxpayer in 50 is stubbing his toe on the surtax.

At the end of the first week of March, IRS said 6.9% of 18.7 million returns processed had errors. Mistakes such as neglecting to include W2 forms or failing to record Social Security numbers were running at their usual rate of 1% or less, but math errors and using the wrong tax table or column — the sort of goofs that would include the surcharge errors — were running at a 4.2% rate.

Here's a quick cram course on the surtax:

- Figure your regular tax as in years past, then add 7 1/2% to it. That 7 1/2% is the surtax.
- Forget everything you've read or heard about a 10% tax. If you make any computation involving 10% you're sure to go wrong.
- The reason the key number is 7 1/2% is that the surtax is at a 10% rate for only that portion of 1968 from April 1 onward, in other words, three-quarters of the year. To make the arithmetic simpler, IRS has you take 7 1/2% of your whole year's income tax rather than 10% of the tax on three-quarters of the year.
- As your form 1040 will tell you, the way to figure 7 1/2% of another number is to multiply it by .075.
- If your regular tax is less than \$734, you won't have to compute your surtax at all. You'll find it in a table in your IRS instruction booklet.
- Last, but not least, you must add the surtax to your regular tax, not subtract it. It's a bite, not a bonus.

Highest Hog Count In Two Decades

The Kansas pig crop for December-February and the number of all hogs and pigs on farms March 1 were the largest in over two decades, according to the Kansas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service.

The winter quarter pig crop was 16 percent larger than a year earlier and on March 1, 1969 there were 11 percent more hogs and pigs on Kansas farms than a year earlier.

The pig crop in the December 1968-February 1969 quarter was 625,000, compared with 537,000 a year earlier.

Sows farrowed during the quarter totaled 81,000, a 10 percent increase from the same period a year earlier and also a new record.

Pigs saved per litter averaged 7.71, well above last month's 7.26 average and the previous high for the quarter of 7.40 set in 1967.

An estimated 109,000 sows are expected to farrow during the March through May quarter, up 5 percent from a year earlier.

Kansas hog producers reported an intended 85,000 sows to farrow during the June-August quarter. If realized, this would be an increase of 10 percent over the same period last year and would be a new record high for the quarter.

The March 1 inventory number of all hogs and pigs on Kansas farms is estimated at 1,698,000, up 11 percent from March 1, 1968.

The number of hogs being kept for breeding was 255,000, an increase of 4 percent over a year earlier. Market hogs and pigs totaled 1,443,000, up 12 percent from a year ago.

In most of the weight groups,

numbers increased over a year earlier except in the 120-179 pound group, which showed a small decrease.

The number in each of the other weight groups and the changes from a year earlier are: Under 60 pounds, 577,000, up 18 percent; 60-119 pounds, 318,000, up 12 percent; 120-179 pounds 289,000, down 4 percent; 180-219 pounds, 216,000, up 20 percent; 220 pounds and over, 43,000, up 34 percent.

Corn Belt States

Hogs and pigs on farms in the 10 Corn Belt States on March 1, 1969 were up 4 percent from a year earlier.

An estimated 41.3 million head were on farms compared with 39.8 million a year earlier. Market hogs in the 10 States were estimated at 33,815,000 head, an increase of 4 percent from a year earlier.

Hogs and pigs kept for breeding totaled 7,439,000, up 2 percent from March 1, 1968.

The December-February 1969 pig crop is estimated at 13,440,000, up 3 percent from the

same period a year earlier.

Sows farrowing during this period totaled 1,860,000 compared with 1,789,000 in the year earlier period. Hog producers in the 10 states reported intentions to farrow 5 percent more sows during March-May 1969 and 6 percent more during June-August 1969 compared to the same periods a year earlier.

Lab Schools At Emporia In Jeopardy

EMPORIA — School officials here are afraid the Kansas State Board of Regents will close two laboratory schools, Butcher Grade School and Roosevelt High School.

The regents asked last year for a cost study on the use of the two schools in Emporia and the laboratory schools at Kansas State College at Pittsburg.

The board of regents will study a report submitted by the Emporia college and another to be submitted by a committee at Pittsburg.

"Our committee report is due in mid-April and we don't know

what the findings are yet," said Dr. Alvin Proctor, dean of academic affairs at Pittsburg.

The total cost of the program to the college at Emporia, according to the report, was slightly less than \$300,000 during the fiscal year ending June 30, 1968.

The primary issue being studied is whether the benefits of the schools meet the cost involved. Outside of a small fee — \$15 per year per pupil at Butcher and \$32 per year per student at Roosevelt — the finances come from college funds.

Anti-Smoking Campaign May Be Making Headway-This Time

In 1964, cigaret smoking declined a bit after decades of steady increases. Antismoking crusaders rejoiced — prematurely. Smoking quickly recovered to reach new heights.

Then, last year, cigaret consumption again declined slightly, and again, antismoking crusaders are rejoicing — with more reason they hope. This time, they think, the drop will prove to be the real thing: The start of a long, gradual but steady erosion of cigarets' popularity. And even cigaret makers are taking a serious view of the decline. Though they expect cigaret usage to remain widespread, they concede the era of growth may be over.

Why so much fuss about a mere 1% drop in the number of cigarets smoked — particularly in light of the 1964 experience? Because, analysts say, there are some major differences between the 1964 and 1968 declines that make the current drop (it seems to be still in progress) considerably more significant.

The 1964 decline was triggered by the Surgeon General's report, published early in the

year, that recited evidence linking smoking to lung cancer and other diseases nadadelco and other diseases and called cigarets a major public health problem. The report apparently shocked many smokers into quitting temporarily, but its effect soon wore off.

The current decline, by contrast, can't be traced to any one cause. It seems to reflect the cumulative effect of many years of health warnings and a steady stream of publicity unfavorable to cigarets. Anticigaret men and at least some tobacco executives think the most important influence has been the airing of antismoking commercials on prime time TV.

The 1964 decline was over in a few months; by the second half of the year, smoking was coming back strong. But the current decline in total consumption has been going on at a fairly steady pace since September 1967 (when the first anticigaret commercials appeared on TV). And per capita consumption of cigarets by people 18 and over has now declined for two full years; it began going down at the start of

1967. The per-capita drop now measures 1.7% — from 4287 cigarets or over 214 packs of cigarets per person in 1966 to 4213 cigarets or under 211 packs last year.

Though the declines aren't yet very great, their persistence encourages antismoking men; the longer the declines continue, they think, the more resolute will become those trying to quit smoking. "The decline will give more support to smokers to give up the habit, and the decline in overall consumption will accelerate," predicts Daniel Horn, head of the U.S. Public Health Service's National Clearinghouse on Smoking and Health (At present, the Service estimates, some six million to seven million of the 50 million U.S. adult smokers try to quit every year, but only 1.5 million succeed.)

Buttressing the belief that a long-term decline in cigaret smoking has set in are some indications that fewer youths are taking up the habit. Such a trend could result in a steady decline in consumption even if adult smokers continue to find it difficult to stop.

Studies on this point aren't entirely consistent, but one indicates that only 26% of the 17-year old boys in the U.S. smoked last year. From sketchy data, the rate in earlier years appears to have been much higher. In 1957, for instance, one study found 35% of the 17 year old boys in Portland, Ore., smoking, and the Portland rate was believed to be below the national rate at the time.

Perhaps the most important factor in the apparent long-term decline in smoking is that attacks on cigarets are far more vigorous, sustained and varied than they were in 1964. There's no letup in sight, either.

The sharpest attack is coming from the Federal Communications Commission, which is trying to ban cigaret advertising on radio and television. Though Congress may block

this attempt, tobacco companies concede the publicity surrounding the FCC move has hurt already.

Even if the FCC move fails, assaults on cigarets from other directions are intensifying. Voluntary health agencies, for instance, are broadening their attack. Besides talking about health hazards, they are beginning to portray smoking as a dirty habit that is a personal and social handicap — an approach anticigaret men think

may be highly effective. Though no one disputes that all these developments add up to trouble for the cigaret industry, opinions as to how much trouble vary widely. The Department of Agriculture predicts that total consumption of cigarets will about hold steady between now and 1975 — but only because of population growth. By 1975, it predicts, only 41% of U.S. adults will be smoking cigarets, against 46% last year.

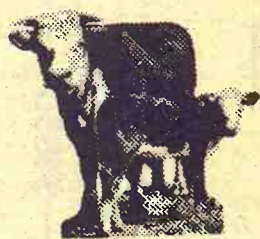

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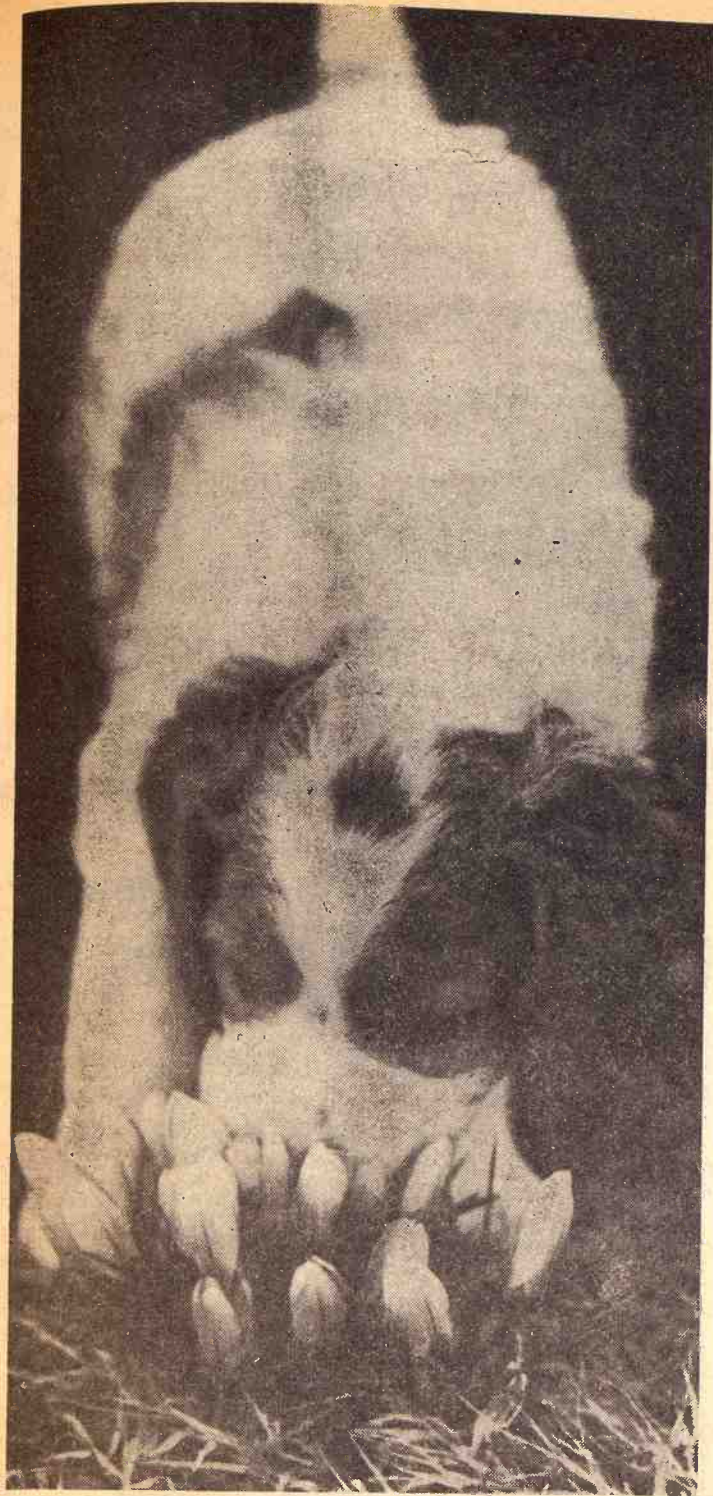

Screwworm Scare In Southwest

Veterinarians in USDA's Agricultural Research Service anticipate one of the worst outbreaks in the seven year history of the southwest screwworm eradication program. As a sign of the screwworm buildup, ARS officials point to the January-February reports of 18 confirmed cases in 10 Texas counties and some 400 cases in

northern Mexico. By comparison, Texas had no screwworm reports during the same period in 1968 and Mexico had only about half as many. Officials hope that recently increased production of sterile screwworm flies may blunt a massive spring buildup. Sterile fly production is back up to 150 million per week. But for two months, the program was severely limited and this has given the screwworms a head start. ARS

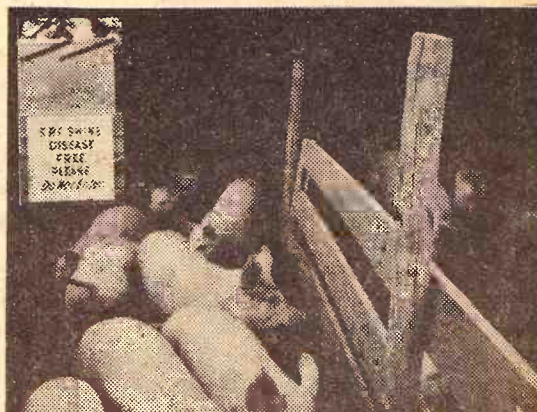

Direct Selling May Be Answer For Small Egg Producer

MANHATTAN — Selling direct to the consumer may be the answer for the small egg producer who is having trouble making ends meet, a Kansas State University Extension economist suggests.

The general market price for eggs is not favorable for the

small flock owner, M. E. Jackson says. The little man needs to develop his own market and sell direct to the consumer, he says.

A good many producers are getting only 25 cents a dozen for their eggs. These operators are losing money on every doz-

en eggs they sell, he explains.

In many areas producers who sell direct get 50 cents a dozen for eggs, regardless of the current market price. These producers get paid for their labor as well as for other costs, Jackson points out.

Direct selling will continue so long as the customer gets a high quality product. That means handling the eggs carefully — as a food product. This calls for refrigeration to main-

tain quality in the summer time. It also means eggs that are clean, free of checks and cracks and of uniform size.

Eggs direct from the farm appeal to the consumer. And consumers who buy from the producer are willing to pay more for a top quality product. Quality, plus service, mean repeat sales and profit the year around, says Jackson.

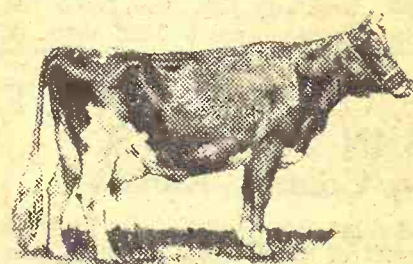

Area Water Expert Back From India

A Kansas State University specialist in water management who has been in India for the past two years, Robert H. Dubois, observes contour furrow irrigation on the Azamgushan Farm near Hyderabad. Water flows from wells into the fields through underground asbestos pipelines and there is minimum wastage of water in transit. Prior to his assignment on the K-State technical assistance team Dubois operated a large farm near Burdett, Kansas.

Predators Take Third Of Total Sheep Toll

Sheep producers in Kansas lost a total of 66,000 sheep and lambs from all causes during 1968 with an estimated value of \$1,814,000, according to the Kansas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service.

A special survey of losses during 1968 showed that pred-

tory animals were responsible for 31 percent of the losses, with such physiological causes as disease, weather, lambing conditions, old age, etc., accounting for the remainder.

Coyotes Principal Predator
Predatory animals killed 20,400 head of sheep and lambs in 1968 worth \$365,000. Of these, 12,700 were lambs and 7,700 head were mature sheep.

Coyotes were the major predator causing losses of sheep and lambs accounting for 18,500

head. The combined value of losses caused by coyotes was \$331,800, or 91 percent of the total losses caused by all predators.

The larger sized flocks lost relatively fewer lambs to coyotes than smaller flocks primarily because of the additional safety measures for large bands such as confining young lambs to corrals at night. Coyote losses were reported from all areas of the state but were heaviest in central and western areas.

Value of losses caused by dogs was \$30,100. Reported losses from other predators were mostly small and primarily confined to young lambs.

Physiological Causes
Sheep and lambs lost from causes other than predatory animals during 1968 numbered 45,006 head with a total dollar value of \$816,400.

The most important of these was lambing complications which caused losses of 12,800 sheep and lambs worth \$214,300.

Diseases and parasites of various kinds ranked as the second greatest cause of loss other than predators. Sheepmen lost 4,900 lambs and 3,500 sheep from these causes with a combined value of \$152,500.

Principle diseases and parasites causing loss were pneumonia, shipping fever, scours, tetanus, "water-belly," worms and other parasites. Old age was a major cause of loss of sheep, with over one-fourth of the reported losses of older sheep attributed to this cause.

Weather conditions also caused substantial losses with 7,300 head of lambs and 800 sheep lost, mostly from storms and frigid temperatures. The value of lambs and sheep lost from bad weather was \$130,000.

Overeating caused sizeable losses, particularly of lambs in the larger feedlots. A total of 3,200 head of sheep and lambs were lost from overeating, worth \$54,500.

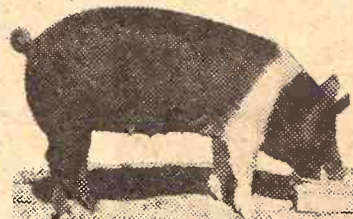
Bloat caused losses of a sizeable number of older sheep and some lambs. The 2,700 lost from this cause were worth an estimated \$53,500. Poisonous plants caused some moderate losses of both sheep and lambs, with the 1,000 head lost having a value of \$18,000. Nitrate and prussic acid poisoning were the major causes reported.

Losses from miscellaneous and unknown causes included 2,000 lambs and 500 sheep with a combined value of \$41,800. These included death losses

from drowning, accidental hanging, being run over or stepped on, starvation, hardware, suffo-

cation, and a sizeable number for which no specific cause was determined.

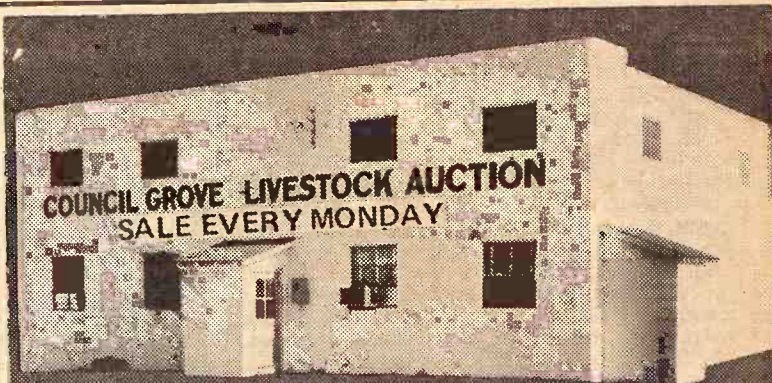

Cash receipts by Kansas farmers hit an all-time high in 1968 but net realized income was moderately below the 1966 record, according to the Kansas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service.

The cash receipts from farming totaled 1780 million dollars in 1968, including 1,553 million dollars derived from marketings of crops and livestock and 228 million dollars in Government payments.

Government payments represent 13 percent of the total cash receipts Kansas farmers received.

The 1968 realized net income of Kansas farmers was approximately 520 million dollars, some 6 percent above the 1967 amount but 7 percent below the record set in 1966.

Cash receipts from the marketings of livestock and livestock products pushed above 1 billion dollars for the first time in history.

Moderately higher cattle prices and increased hog marketings were reflected in the gain of 7 percent from 1967 to 1968.

Cash receipts from crops totaling 538 million dollars were the highest in 5 years, but well below the level of the early 1960s.

Lower prices received for farm crops in 1968 moderated fairly substantial increases in marketings, so that cash receipts were up only 2 percent from 1967.

Net realized income per farm averaged \$5716 in 1968 compared to \$5285 a year earlier and the record of \$5880 set in 1966.

Realized gross income per farm set a record high of \$20,251 in 1968, 7 percent above both 1967 and the previous record established in 1966.

However, record high farm expenses in 1968 held net income below the level two years earlier.

Hog Report Sees Continued Profit

The quarterly report on hogs and pigs, released by the USDA March 1, indicates that farmers are producing about 4 percent more pork this year than they did in 1968. If actual production is in line with the figures obtained in the government survey, consumers will have ample supplies of pork at reasonable prices, and hog prices should continue at profitable levels through the next 12 months.

The report covered 10 corn belt states that produce about 77 percent of the nation's hogs. It is in two parts, the first being estimates of the number of pigs and hogs on farms Mar. 1; the second, a summary of farmers' intentions concerning sow farrowings from March 1 through next August.

Number of hogs up 4 percent. The number of hogs and pigs on farms in the 10 states on March 1 was estimated at 61.0 million — 4 percent more than one year before. A few years

ago, price analysts would have said that such an increase in hog production would bring prices down by about 5 percent. But the demand for pork has been increasing strongly during the past five years. If this trend continues, hog prices may average about the same during the next 12 months as they did a year earlier. That would be \$19 to \$20 per hundred pounds for barrows and gilts at central markets.

The monthly distribution of hogs marketed during this spring and summer apparently will be about the same as last year. All weight groups of hogs and pigs show similar increases, mostly 3 and 4 percent.

From the first of April through early July, the number of hogs going to market usually decreases. Prices frequently lag a few weeks, but generally climb \$3 to \$5 from the spring low to the summer high. The best chances for price increases are in May and June.

Farrowing intentions up 5 & 6 percent. Farmers in the 10 states reported the intention of farrowing 5 percent more sows during the spring quarter (March, April and May) than they did a year ago. They also said they planned to have 6 percent more sows farrow during the summer quarter (June, July, and August) than in 1968.

Actual farrowings probably will differ slightly from reported intentions. We expect more farrowings, not less, but we see no reason to expect market supplies large enough to depress prices to unprofitable levels.

Some Illinois hog producers quit. Illinois is the only state

among the "Big Ten" in pork production to report fewer hogs on hand than one year ago. Illinois farmers reported a reduction of 2 percent. The other nine states reported increases as follows: Iowa and Minnesota 4 percent; Missouri 5 percent; Indiana 2 percent; Ohio 7 percent; Wisconsin 1 percent; Nebraska 7 percent; South Dakota 10 percent, and Kansas 11 percent.

There were many reports of pig losses from TGE and other diseases, but such losses probably were not as great as they seemed from the reports. Apparently the losses were more than offset by increased farrowing on many farms in other states.

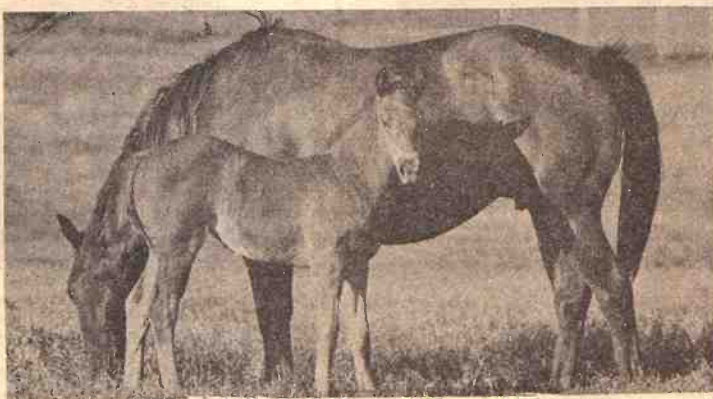

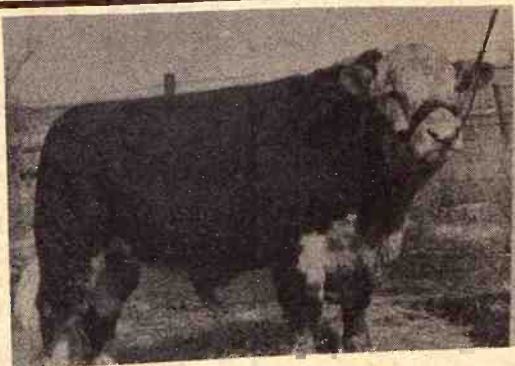

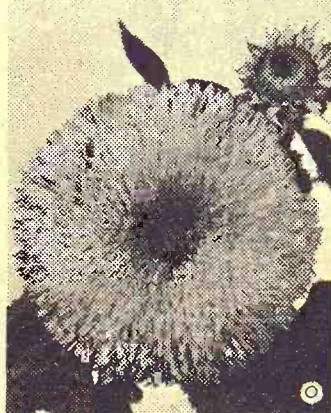

New Sunflowers

Say the word "sunflower" to the average gardener and he immediately conjures up a vision of a 15-foot-tall plant with huge, single, yellow blossoms. (Gardeners in the know no longer think that way. They are familiar, through the seed catalogs, with the ornamental sunflowers of today.

While the seeds still furnish food for chickens or birds, the plants aren't huge and the flowers are not necessarily yellow.

So, if you're looking for a hedge or background plant, try one of these:

Red and gold hybrids have single flowers of bright red, tipped with gold and on 6-foot

stems.

Red (just one word) has blossoms of varying shades of red: Brick, bright or crimson, solid or in combination with yellow.

This same strain also has yellow flowers suffused with red. Plants grow 5-6 feet high.

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'68 Beef Prices Best Since '52

Livestock producers in Kansas received an average price of \$23.30 for all beef cattle sold during 1968, according to the Kansas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service.

This was \$1.10 higher than a year earlier and the highest annual average beef cattle price since 1952.

By months, prices for all beef cattle in 1968 started relatively low at \$21.40 in January, climbed to a high of \$24.30 in August and varied in a \$22.50 to \$23.80 range during the late months.

Steers averaged \$25.30 per cwt. in 1968 up \$1.50 from 1967 and 60 cents above 1966. Monthly prices ranged from a low of \$23.50 in January to a high of \$26.40 in July.

Heifers sold for an average of \$23.70 per cwt. during the year, up \$1.40 from the previous year and 80 cents above 1966. Monthly heifer prices started at \$22.00 in January, rose to \$24.80 in August, dropped back a little in succeeding months, finally peaked out at a high of \$25.20 in December.

Cows sold at an average of \$17.00 per cwt. during the year, up 50 cents from 1967 and 20 cents above 1966. Monthly prices were lowest in January at \$15.00 and highest in June at \$18.50.

Calves sold by farmers during 1968 averaged \$26.60 per cwt., up \$1.50 from both 1967 and 1966. The range of mid-month prices received by Kansas farmers for beef cattle and calves - 1968

Steers comprised 51 percent of the live weight of beef cattle sold, excluding calves, in 1968. Heifers represented 25 percent, cows 21 percent and bulls 3 percent of the liveweight marketed.

This compares with 56 percent for steers, 23 percent for heifers, 19 percent for cows and 2 percent for bulls during the previous year.

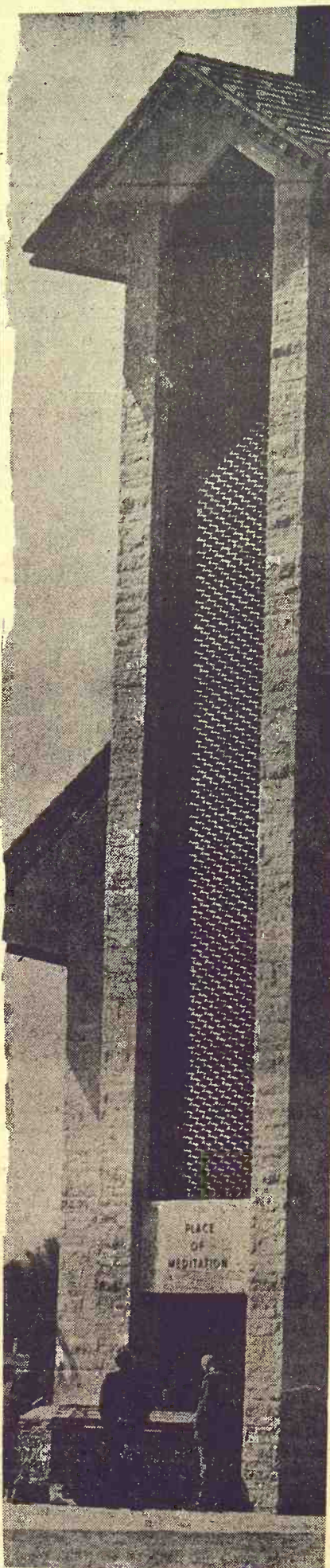

Bigger Wheat, Milo, Signup Than In '68

A new deadline for wheat and feed grain signups for the federal control programs will make little difference in Kansas is the belief of state Agriculture Stabilization Conservation Service at Kansas State University, Manhattan.

Wheat acreage signup already was 14 percent above last year and the feed grain signup 10 percent above 1968 at the original deadline date on March 21.

Harold Haubick, assistant director of the programs at Manhattan, said this week a consen-

sus of county ASCS office managers across the state is there may be "some changes of intentions" regarding acreage amounts, but very few farmers will either add their names to the lists or have them removed.

The deadline was extended to April 1 after inclement weather, including blizzard conditions, struck much of the hard red winter wheat area after the signup began in early February.

This year, the Kansas wheat area after the signup began in allotment is 9,669,686 acres, compared with the 1968 allotment of 11,116,320 acres. By March 21, there were 7,247,612 acres on 83,288 farms signed. There are about 143,000 farms

having wheat in Kansas.

In the enrollment for feed grain diversion, farmers had enrolled enough land to provide for 2,519,152 diverted acres from the 130,000 feed grain farms in the state.

This diversion from the 9,450,434 acres of feed grain base of the state is approximately 35 percent. Payment for diverted acreage in the state is \$25 to \$35 an acre.

Officials said the percentages

of registration and amounts of land involved indicated an even stronger participation in the program for 1969 than there was in 1968.

NFU NO TO WICHITA AS CONVENTION SITE

The G&G area will not host the 1970 convention of the National Farmers Union. The NFU board has decided the next convention will be San Antonio or Denver, not considering a bid

from Wichita, which was led by delegate Wayne Worthington of Haven at the recent convention at Hot Springs, Arkansas.

Not Yellowstone But Kansas

One doesn't have to go to Yellowstone Park to see a large herd of elk. A herd of 50 elk can be seen at the Maxwell Game Preserve near Canton in McPherson County.

The elk are not easy to find in the summer time, when they hide in the wooded areas of the 2560-acre

preserve. But in winter when grass and foliage is insufficient, they follow the pickup of caretaker Glen Davis when he brings range pellets out to feed them.

The animals go thru 25 tons of pellets during the feeding season, which started in December and will continue for another two or three weeks.

Tear Out 1886 Telegraph Line

MCPHERSON — The old Missouri-Pacific telegraph line,

built in 1886 alongside the railroad, is being torn down between here and El Dorado, because the company has now decided the telephone is better suited for communication.

The railroad bed and tracks were relaid a few years ago and the modernization will be almost complete when the telegraph line is removed.

A total of 2010 poles will have

to be removed as the 67 miles of line is torn down. Some of the wire, poles and insulators will be sold — the rest scrapped.

Many consider the insulators on the old poles to be collectors items. Built of cobalt, they are about four inches around. Two of these are on each pole, thus the company will have 4020 of them when the line is taken

down.

Collectors have taken the insulators in recent years, heated them and dipped them in cold water to give them a bizarre cracked appearance.

Along with the tearing down of the telegraph line, the Missouri Pacific will be laying 110 pound rails to allow faster traffic along the line.
