High Protein Flour From Cottonseed

The Agriculture Department has announced its scientists have developed a process for making an edible high-protein flour from cottonseed.

It said the flour has a bland flavor, is cream-colored and has a protein content of about 65 per cent. By comparison, wheat flour has a protein content of about 12 per cent.

The department said the process could make a major contribution toward easing a problem of protein malnutrition in much of the world.

Department experiments indicate 100 tons of cottonseed could yield about 36,000 pounds of high-quality flour. The United States could produce some two million tons of such flour annually, while the rest of the world could produce another six million tons, a spokesman said.

now it doesn't appear likely the commission will succeed.

The funds come from the two-mill-per-bushel tax levy on marketed wheat authorized several years ago by the legislature for the promotion of wheat. There are other cases in which the state acts as a collection agency for an organization which has been authorized by lawmakers but not funded by the state. Under a general formula the state has charged 20 percent of the gross revenue for its work and put its fee into the general revenue fund.

In the case of the wheat promotion levy (a farmer can decline to pay it, but few do) the 20 percent last year amounted to \$92,000. Wheat promoters figure it doesn't cost the state that much to collect and would like to reduce the collection fee to about \$20,000. But the House Agriculture Committee has killed a bill that would have cut the state's cut to \$20,000.

A legislator who is also the president of the National Association of Wheatgrowers, George Meeker of Garden City, says he figures it costs the state about \$7000 to administer the fund created by the wheat tax. He thinks \$20,000 is a

fair contribution to the general revenue fund.

Members of the committee sav the major talking point against the wheat tax measure is that it might set a precedent for other revenue agencies and might lead to a loss of nearly a half-million dollars out of the general fund.

According to figures state officials have given Meeker, only eight agencies pay more than \$20,000 into the general revenue fund under the present 20 percent formula.

"All of these other agencies are regulatory bodies. The wheat levy is made for a specific purpose of promoting wheat in the greatest wheat state in the nation. There's no regulation as there is in the other agencies," Meeker said.

There was a similar bill presented to the legislature three years ago, and that one got thru the House committee and sailed thru the floor of the House. But it died in the Senate.

Reportedly Governor Docking and GOP leaders in both chambers fear the bill might start a run on the general revenue fund.

No Inflation Like Medical Inflation

Alarmed at the soaring costs of health care, four Senate committees are preparing to investigate unprecedented increases in physicians' fees and hospital charges — the single most inflationary aspect of the U.S. economy.

"The spotlight is going to be on hospitals and doctors," said one Senate staff employee. But included will be studies of the relationship between cost increases and the policies of government and private health insurance programs.

According to the Labor Department, hospital charges have doubled in the last 10 years and physicians' fees have risen by about 40 per cent.

The government operations subcommittee on executive reorganization is expected to begin hearings next month or in March on physicians' income and possible fee abuses.

Doctors' fees jumped 7.8 per cent in 1966 and 7 per cent last year, compared with only 3.8 per cent in 1965 — before Medicare went into effect for 19 million persons.

This committee, headed by Sen. Abraham Ribicoff, D-Conn., former secretary of health, education and welfare, is expected to zero in on doctors who do most of their work in hospitals, such as radiologists and anesthesiologists.

The judiciary subcommittee

on antitrust and monopoly, headed by Sen. Philip A. Hart, D-Mich., has been conducting hearings on doctors' relationship with various health industries. It has found that some physicians are earning more than \$100,000 a year through obesity clinics. This investigation will resume.

The Labor and Public Welfare Committee, under Sen. Lister Hill, D-Ala., is expected to investigate hospital costs that have increased 31 per cent in the past two years.

The finance committee, headed by Sen. Russell Long, D-La., which oversees the Medicare program, will look into charges that some hospitals keep Medicare patients longer than necessary and that some doctors have overcharged Medicare patients.

The Bureau of Labor Statistics said that it now costs \$20.41 a day to buy hospital service that cost \$10 a day in the base period of 1957-59.

For every \$10 spent on physicians' fees in 1957-59, it now costs \$13.94. Dental fees now are \$12.88 for each \$10 spent in 1957-59.

The Internal Revenue Service said doctors in private practice averaged \$15,000 per year in 1957, against \$22,300 in 1965, the latest year on which statistics are available.





Only Fringe Changes In LBJ Farm Budget

President Johnson has proposed a 6.7 per cent increase to 7.7 billion dollars in spending by the Agriculture department in the 1969 fiscal year, with much of the increase going toward consumer protection and domestic and foreign foods assessment programs.

Under the budget submitted to Congress, the department would spend roughly 1 billion dollars — obtained from private lenders — on loans principally to low-income farmers and rural residents.

Little change would be made in the current level of aid to

farmers.

● Programs supporting farm prices and income would total about 3.4 million compared with 3.3 million this year.

● Domestic and foreign food aid programs would take a net of about 1.76 billion dollars compared with 1.6 billion this year. Domestically, there would be increased outlays in the food stamp and school lunch programs.

Modest reductions would be made in programs relating to conservation of natural agricultural resources. The President asked — as he did a year ago without success — that payments to farmers for carrying out cost sharing, fowl and water conservation during the 1969 crop year to be limited to 100 million dollars, down 120 million from that in recent years.

3600 orders are expected by mid-May if spring weather conditions are favorable for planting across the state.

Kansas landowners planted 1½ million tree seedlings and stratified nuts in 1967.

The largest single request for trees and shrubs continues to be for shelterbelt or windbreak plantings. Woodland plantings should rank second this year, Gallaher says, because of the growing interest in this type of enterprise. In prior years, Christmas tree plantings took the second largest group of trees.

There has been a steadily increasing effort to establish black walnut woodlands in recent years. Only about half of the orders for walnut seedlings and stratified nuts could be filled. But this year's larger supply of these items should be adequate to meet the demand.

The K-State foresters expect orders for about 400,000 Christmas trees this year. This reflects a steady growth in this category which is the third largest use of new trees.

Interest remains high in establishing pecan plantings in southeast Kansas, Gallaher says. A supply of 100,000 stratified pecans is available this year.

More than 2 dozen species of trees and shrubs are available in the tree distribution program. They are restricted to conservation plantings by Kansas landowners. Orders are taken through Extension offices in all counties.

Tree Orders

Meets Feb. 20

If Kansas landowners keep ordering tree seedlings at the present rate, they will set a new planting record, predicts Harold Gallaher, state forester at Kansas State University.

More than 400 orders were placed through the KSU Extension tree distribution program in January. A recordbreaking

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


Wage Law To Affect Few Farms

The minimum wage of workers on most large farms went up from \$1 an hour to \$1.15 February 1.

Walter S. Gick, supervisor of the Wage and Hour and Public Contracts Division of the Department of Labor, pointed out the 15-cent hike under the Fair Labor Standards Act does

not affect employees of small farms.

Gick said the minimum wage must be paid by employers who used more than 500 man-days of farm labor in any calendar quarter of the preceding calendar year.

A man-day is defined as any day in which an employee performs farm labor for at least one hour.

Exempt from the new base wage — even on large farms — are the following workers:

—Members of the employer's immediate family.

—Local, daily commuting hand-harvest piece workers who worked in agriculture less than 13 weeks in the preceding calendar year.

—Migrant hand-harvest piece workers 16 years of age or younger, who work with their parents and are paid the same piece rates as older workers.

—Employees principally engaged in the range production of livestock.

The \$1.15 minimum will apply until Feb. 1, 1969, when it goes to \$1.30 an hour, Gick said.

Game Commission Leases Land On Marion Lake

MARION — The Kansas Forestry, Fish and Game Commission has obtained a 25 year lease on some 3500 acres of land along the shores of the new Marion Reservoir near here.

The lease provides for fish and wildlife management in the area by the commission.

The commission is now leasing rights to use portions of the land for agricultural purposes. Normally, when land is leased for agricultural use by the commission, the commission's share of crops is left in the fields as wildlife food.

The commission's lease, granted by the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, applies to land located on the upper two thirds of the reservoir.

Raymond Parish of Marion, named manager of the area for the commission, manages a similar area at the Council Grove Reservoir.

The Marion Reservoir is located on the Cottonwood River about four miles northwest of Marion.

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Farmland Step Into Insurance

Farmland Industries — the Kansas City regional cooperative which supplies many G&G area co-ops — continues to branch out. Farmland has entered the life insurance business, acquiring the Farmers Life Co. from

the Farmers Elevator Mutual Insurance Co. of Des Moines, Iowa.

FEMIC is one of the major casualty writers in Iowa, its \$13 million in premiums ranking fourth in the state. The company got into financial straits in 1965, however, partly, officers say, as a result of poor returns on investments and partly from losses received from reinsurance on hurricane properties in the South.

In December 1966 Farmland made a \$3.5 million investment into FEMIC, which the co-op President Homer Young said was to prevent the company from losing its co-op identity in a merger.

The life company Farmland has just acquired was wholly owned by FEMIC and will continue to be operated by it, with no changes in personnel or management. As a part of the agreement Farmland invested an additional \$1.05 million into FEMIC.

Started in 1961, Farmers Life has \$64 million of life insurance

in force. Because of variations in methods of counting insurance in force and in amounts companies have in low risk-low premium lines, comparisons of companies are difficult to measure.

Much of the insurance FEMIC has written is said to be on co-ops, many of them members of Farmland. FEMIC operates in 13 states — Colorado, Illinois, Iowa, Kansas, Minnesota, Missouri, Nebraska, the Dakotas, Oklahoma, Texas, Wisconsin, and Wyoming. A Farmland subsidiary, Farmland Insurance Agency, has been writing FEMIC insurance in the Dakotas, Colorado and Missouri since 1953.

AFB Fear Of Government Stock Of Grains

The American Farm Bureau Federation has expressed opposition to proposals to set up a security reserve of farm products under government control.

John C. Lynn, the federation's legislative director, told a Senate agriculture subcommittee that farmers are against any program which would tend to build up stocks in government hands.

Government-controlled reserves, he said, are "bad from the standpoint of producers, expensive from the standpoint of taxpayers, unnecessary for the protection of domestic consumers, and not necessary for exports or foreign relief."

President Johnson advocated a security reserve in his State of the Union message. Several

bills proposing such a reserve are before the subcommittee.

L. C. Carpenter, Columbia, Mo., vice president of Midcontinent Farms Association, supported the reserve proposal. But he said the reserve commodities must be held "under such con-

ditions as to insulate them from the market and prevent any price-depressing influence."

Iowa Sale Grosses \$500,000

Attendance at the close-out auction of the Lakin Ranch at Osceola, Iowa, January 15, drew reported 5000 lookers, many of them from the G&G area. The sale, which included 30 tractors and 21 trucks and pickups, grossed around \$500,000, one of the largest ever to be advertised in Grass & Grain.

The ranch itself — some 10,000 acres — had been sold in September by Charles Lakin to the Shinn Corp. of Detroit, Mich.

The Hagel Auction Co. of Kansas City handled the sale of farm equipment.

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



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

Two-Minute Facial May Help To Clear Up Acne

A twice-daily two-minute facial treatment may be the answer to acne for 85 percent of girls in their teens, most doctors believe. Here are the suggested steps:

First, pin back your bangs or any hair which hangs over your face. Then wash your hands carefully, so that the bacteria which they carry will not be transferred to the face. Wet and soap your face, working up a lather, and by a gently circular motion of the fingertips, spread the lather all over your face and into the edge of the hairline. You may use any mild soap. Some doctors prefer the special antiseptic soaps; others feel they have disadvantages. Continue the soap and water and fingertip treatment for a full two minutes; it takes time to soften the outer layers of the skin. Then rinse thoroughly with warm water; follow with a cold water rinse and gently pat your face dry. Never treat the skin roughly.

Give Special Attention To Bathtub Mat

Don't forget the non-skid mats in bathtub or shower-stall when the bathroom gets its thorough scrubbing.

This is a good time to give the safety mat some special attention too. Spread it out in the tub and use a sponge dipped in a pine oil cleaner solution to both clean and sanitize it. Flip the mat and repeat the process. This is an important way in which to protect the family health.

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
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Tips For Trips

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




UNITED BUYS TWO AREA PHONE FIRMS

Two G&G area phone companies have joined the United Telephone System. The companies are the Consolidated Telephone Co. and the Ellinwood Telephone Co. Consolidated shareholders got 40,000 shares of United and Ellinwood stockholders got 29,000 shares for their company. At current values, 69,000 shares of United are worth about \$2 million.

Opportunities In Synthetic Foods

Supermarkets are selling a non-refrigerated milk substitute hard to distinguish from milk.

Delicious substitute fish and meats made from soybeans are available at many restaurants and supermarkets.

Consumers are purchasing other new foods for diet control. Supermarkets have expanded their dietetic food departments by 65 percent during the past decade.

Some food industry representatives, especially producers, view these product changes with concern. But to most producers, the new products represent a major opportunity to expand Kansas food production.

Most of the new food products are derived from conventional farm products, says Dr. S. E. Trieb, Extension economist at Kansas State University. Soybean protein, for example, is a typical base product for these

new foods. It is relatively inexpensive, will combine readily with other ingredients, and can be easily altered in taste and form.

Trieb points out that soybean protein substitutes have been part of the Oriental diet for centuries. Scientists only recently discovered how to process these protein sources into common foods practically and economically.

Adding shape, taste, and texture to a protein base, such as manufactured soybean, produces a synthetic soybean "steak" or a "fish" fillet or "chicken" fricassee.

Agriculture's New Frontier offers long-range possibilities for completely new food sources. Trieb points out several possible future breakthroughs in scientific agriculture.

Most farm crops and livestock do not fully utilize the sun's energy. Yet solar energy falling on 1 acre of ground has potential to produce 22,000 horsepower hours per day. This is enough to propel a 4000-pound automobile 38,000 miles.

Theoretically, this solar energy from 1 acre, converted to food, would provide enough nourishment for 5,860 persons. Conventional crops capture only 4 percent of the sun's energy. Trees, weeds, and salt marsh crops convert 87 percent of this energy to growth.

A tree-bark salad may not sound appetizing. But weeds and trees are efficient sources of cellulose which may be converted to simple sugars.

These sugars, along with nitrogen and other compounds, may be fed to Torula yeast to produce protein. A 1000-pound culture tank can produce 6000 pounds of yeast protein per day. A 1000-pound steer produces only about 1 pound during

the same period.

Waste materials which we now burn or bury offer other possibilities for food production. For example, the average household uses more than 6 pounds of newsprint per day. By extracting the sugar and producing Torula yeast, scientists could produce 1.2 pounds of protein from the 6 pounds of newsprint. The average serving of meat contains only 4 to 6 ounces of protein.

RUSSELL — Mules are making a comeback at Russell in a small way.

Don Chegwiddden, Russell high school biology teacher, is raising miniature mules. Chegwiddden's tiny mules are a partnership venture with Wallace Tinkler, Russell.

Chegwiddden and Tinkler bought them last year from L. L. Williams, Oberlin.

"We went to Oberlin to see about buying some harness from Williams," Chegwiddden explains.

Instead we bought his whole outfit, which included 81 head of horses, burros, Shetland ponies and miniature mules."

Most of the mules are out on

pasture. They stand about 40 inches at the withers and are the offspring of matches between Shetland mares and burros.

"They are tough as a boot and grow fat on anything," Chegwiddden said. "Miniature mules aren't just a novelty. They have been used for years in Welsh and Pennsylvania coal mines."



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Major Cut In Turkey Numbers

Kansas' 1968 turkey crop is expected to total only 406,000 birds, the Kansas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service said.

The figure would be 32 per cent below the 600,000 birds raised last year and 45 per cent below the 1962-66 average. Heavy breed numbers are expected to be down 34 per cent from 1967, while light breed numbers should be up slightly from last year's low level.

Expected figures are 394,000 heavy and 12,000 light breeds.

Kansas turkey production has fluctuated from 1.37 million in 1939 to the current low, with 1.3 million birds or more raised in 1940, 1941, 1942 and 1961. Numbers have run between 600,000 and 800,000 in recent years.

Farmland Buys Minnesota FB Service Company

Farmland Industries has acquired the Minnesota Farm Bureau Service Company, including the state headquarters building, a fertilizer plant, warehouse, feed mill, and 14 local co-ops.

The fertilizer plant, along the Mississippi river at St. Paul, has a 50,000-ton annual production and unloading equipment for barge, rail, or truck.

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

Sister Company of Abilene Flour Mills Was Bilked, New Suit Alleges

ABILENE — The reorganization of the Abilene Flour Mills in bankruptcy proceedings has struck a snag, when a sister company, the Security Milling Co. objected to a plan approved by other creditors last week.

Security Milling is the parent company of Naturich Mills. Officers of Security Milling say they object to the plan of settlement and have a claim of nearly a quarter-million dollars.

Judge Robert Morton, referee in bankruptcy court at Wichita, set Friday as a hearing date for Security's suit, which alleges it has coming \$220,000 because officers of the Abilene Flour Mills and a wholly owned subsidiary, Abilene Grain Co., diverted funds from it.

Jack Grubb, who had been general manager of Naturich and recently been elected president of Security Milling in a reorganization, said in the suit that in May 1967 the officers who then controlled both Abilene Flour Mills and Security instigated a four-corner transaction among Abilene Flour Mills, Abilene Grain Co., Security Milling, and Business Investments of Wichita, owner of the College Hill Medical Tower there.

The suit alleges that in the transfer of funds among the four organizations, Security ended up with a bank debt of \$150,000, a payment of \$412,500 to Business Investments, but nothing to show for it.

T. W. Welsh, vice president of Abilene Flour Mills, was president of Business Investments. It is the sale of the med-

An agriculture department survey indicated that the number of cattle feeders in this country declined from 217,185 at the start of 1967 to 211,473 at the beginning of 1968.

Feeders are livestockmen who, for the most part, buy young and lean cattle and put them on heavy feed for fattening for the slaughter market. There are, in a way, processors — that is, they convert corn and other livestock feeds into beef through the process of feeding. They de-

pend largely on cattle raisers for their animals.

Iowa had the largest number of feeders, 46,000 unchanged from the beginning of 1967. Illinois was second with 27,000, down 1000. Third was Nebraska

with 22,360, down 10,000. Fourth was Minnesota with 19,900, down 1800. Texas, a major cattle raising state, had 1,750,000 feeders compared with 1,778,000 a year earlier.

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

The annual fun auction will be continued, Welter said, and other parts of the program will be announced later.

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

The Geary County commission yesterday called a special election on the park issue to be held in conjunction with the primary election August 6.

Lee Hornbaker, city attorney, told the county commissioners Milford cannot develop the park with tax funds because of its limited valuation. The community was moved to higher ground two years before the town was inundated by waters of the reservoir.

"The county commission feels the park proposal should go to the voters for a decision," Keith Devenney, Junction City, commission chairman, said.

"We feel such a vote is the best way to get an answer as to whether the people of Geary County want this to be a county park."

Get Treatment For Cancer Eye

MANHATTAN. — Cancer-eye affecting the cornea in cattle can be treated successfully, if diagnosed and treated early, says Dr. John L. Noordsy, professor of surgery and medicine at Kansas State University's Dykstra Veterinary Clinic.

The latest technique involves surgical removal of the cancerous growth from the globe of the eye after which "Beta-ray" bombardment neutralizes any remaining cancer cells. The treatment is economically practical for saving the eye of any good breeding animal which has a very early stage of cancer-eye. Prior to "Beta-ray" treatment surgery was attempted in early cases with fair success, but 20 to 40 percent of the animals treated had cancer-eye return. As a result, many cancer-eyes were removed entirely, or the cows were sold for slaughter without treatment.

The exact cause of cancer-eye

is not known, but Dr. Noordsy says it appears to be closely linked with exposure to the radiant energy of the sun. Cattle with light skin about the eyes and white eyelids are more susceptible than are cattle with dark pigment around the eyes.

Dr. Noordsy says any abnormal structure on the eye should be checked closely for possible cancerous involvement. He suggests these be examined by a local veterinarian before the animal is brought to the KSU clinic for surgery and treatment.

Swift & M-N Take Opposite Actions In K.C.

Kansas City will gain some and lose some in changes of two packing companies.

Swift & Co. have announced that they will curtail their Kansas City operations, but Mauer-Neuer Meat Packers have announced a doubling of beef slaughtering capacity there.

Mauer-Neuer, which has another plant in Arkansas City, says it hopes to get up to the double capacity by July 15. The company is affiliated with the John Morrell & Co.

Doubling the weekly kill would mean an output of about 5000 head.

In number of employes, the Mauer-Neuer expansion will not quite replace the Swift reduction.

Mauer-Neuer does not as of now kill any hogs in Kansas City. Its hog operations are confined to the Ark City plant. It

is possible, company officials said, that more hogs now will be bought in Kansas City and shipped to Arkansas City.

John Morrell & Co. is the nation's fourth largest meat packing organization.

Livestock authorities on the Kansas City market were speculating following the Swift announcement that it is possible hog receipts at the stockyards might increase, altho slaughter in Kansas City will be down.

Swift bought many of its hogs direct — that is, purchased them direct from the farmers, either at the farm or at rural hog-buying stations. These hogs still will have to go to market, and the Kansas City market will be one of several competing for them.

Order buying companies, buyers who purchase hogs for packers elsewhere, particularly on the West Coast, have been taking more than half the hogs marketed at Kansas City.

But Will Other Countries Control Their Wheat Output?

American wheat growers are being asked by the Johnson administration to take a chance that other grain-exporting countries will join them in controlling production to help stabilize world supplies and prices.

This request is implied in an International Grains Agreement negotiated by the Agriculture Department last summer and recently submitted to the Senate for its approval.

The declared goal of the agreement is to put into effect a new system of minimum and maximum prices under which wheat would be sold by the participating countries in the world market. These prices would be somewhat higher than those that prevailed under an International Wheat Agreement long in operation but which expires this year.

Even under the dying agreement, there was great difficulty in stabilizing prices and supplies because the United States was the only major exporter that did much about trying to stabilize supplies. It alone carried out production controls.

As a consequence, it sometimes lost commercial markets abroad to price-cutting countries not having crop controls and needing to move grain they had no place to store for long periods.

The new international Grains Agreement—which would operate for three years—is being promoted by the administration as a measure that will provide new price insurance for wheat growers.

But critics contend the so-called insurance will pay off only if other wheat-exporting nations abide by the price schedules.

Some farm leaders argue that there would need to be production-control programs in all the exporting nations to make the program pay off. Without such controls, it is argued, some countries will run into surpluses and be forced to unload at cut prices.

The American Farm Bureau Federation, a major foe of the grains plan, says it believes the new scale of prices would encourage production in some countries and lead to increased competition with U.S. farmers.

But two other major farm groups—the National Grange and the National Farmers Union—support the new agreement.

A big question mark in the situation is the role of the Soviet Union. It is not known whether the Soviets will become members of the agreement. Should they not do so, they would be free to reduce prices in an effort usually supplied by this and other cooperating countries.

This country could run into a problem in selling its grain within the price range. In times when American supplies are large, as is the case now, wheat prices in this country could be below the world minimum.

This would mean that the United States would have to take action to raise its offering prices in world markets, or else be in violation of the arrangement under present law by lev-

ying an export tax on foreign sales.

Some critics contend American wheat growers are among

the most efficient in the world and could greatly increase foreign markets if not limited by international restrictions.

Reappraise U.S. Role In Food Crisis

What is the role of U.S. farm-

ers in solving the world food crisis? This question has been undergoing a period of reap-

praisal in the past few years.

Concern about world food shortages boosted prices of farm commodities in 1966. Acreage restrictions under government programs were relaxed. It was generally believed that U.S. agricultural exports would play a major role in supplying world food needs.

Since then USDA has made a more realistic appraisal of the food crisis and what the crisis will do to export markets and prices.

USDA now feels the crisis can be met only if developing nations improve their agricultural productivity.

Emphasis in U.S. and global economic assistance programs has shifted from reliance on surplus supplies in the U.S. and other "have" nations to financial and technical assistance for agricultural development in "have-not" nations.

The U.S. sent \$12 billion in food and fiber to developing nations under Public Law 480 between 1956 and 1965. This began as essentially a surplus disposal plan.

Food aid to developing nations at that time came almost entirely from the U.S. Canada has been the only other country which provided food assistance on a regular basis.

As the food crisis became more serious, surplus stocks in the U.S. dwindled rapidly. USDA realized that this country could no longer bridge the gap in supplying food needs of developing nations.

Public Law 480 was amended in November 1966 to provide a 2-year extension of food aid under a new Food-for-Freedom

program. But this was much more than simply a 2-year extension of the old program.

One significant feature of the new legislation is its "self-help" provisions. The food deficit na-

tions are called upon to improve their own food production.

The U.S. will provide financial and technical assistance for agricultural development, but the aid-recipient countries must contribute their share.



Seedgrowers Cite Two Area Men

Two Kansas farmers have been honored at Manhattan by the Kansas Crop Improvement Association for their contributions to the production of high quality certified seed.

O. R. Caldwell, Emporia, and Harold E. Dobrinski, Lorraine, were named "premier seed growers" at a luncheon of the Association on the Kansas State University campus.

Caldwell has concentrated on producing certified Ottawa wheat seed, a popular variety in the eastern portion of the state. His production the past five years has approximated 5000 bushels of certified seed and an equal amount of uncertified seed. In addition he raised some Gage and Parker certified seed wheat this past year.

The Lyon County farmer also has found that his 400-acre operation is suited to producing certified soybean seed. Clark 63 has been his pick of varieties for the past three years, and his 1967 output reached 900 bushels.

Caldwell's efforts at producing certified seed dates back to 1942, and his association with the Kansas Crop Improvement Association includes terms as the current vice president and formerly as a director.

Dobrinski, who handles a 700-acre farming operation in Ellsworth County, has specialized in producing certified wheat seed for the past 17 years. During the five most recent crop years, he sold approximately 11,000 bushels of certified seed. He favors the Scout, Kaw, and Triumph varieties, but also produces Parker, Improved Triumph, Gage, and Tascosa.

During the past two years, Dobrinski has used the seed plot method of planting, and has utilized repeated roguing to get pure seed, especially in the new variety releases.

Eye On Corporation Farm Losses

Corporation farming has caught the eye not only of state legislatures.

Some congressmen indicate they are scrutinizing the practice, and USDA officials are reported to be concerned about the alleged problem.

Senator Metcalf, a Democrat from Montana, has introduced a bill aimed at stopping use of farm losses to offset income from other sources when making income tax returns.

A recent IRS report showed that millions of dollars were lost on farming in 31 of the 86 largest cities in the U.S., from

which 380,000 farm tax returns were filed. Leading the pack were "farmers" from the Los Angeles area. They lost \$41.8 million farming in 1965.

The first Negro-owned supermarket has opened in Wichita. The store is in northeast Wichita, at the former location of Maxwell's whose building and stock was bought by Brothers Inc., a group formed by Negroes following riots in Wichita in the summer of 1967.

The new corporation, led by Chester Lewis, Wichita NAACP president, has raised \$30,000 from the sale of stock at \$10 a share. There are about 150 stockholders, who hold from one to 200 shares.

If the store is moderately successful in the next two months, Brothers Inc. has plans to buy two more supermarkets in Negro neighborhoods.

"If this works out, we intend to buy the whole ghetto," Lewis said.



Cancel Area Milk Price Adjustment Again

The U.S. Department of Agriculture has suspended for February and March 1968 the supply-demand adjustment to fluid milk (Class 1) prices set by the Greater Kansas City federal milk marketing order.

USDA's Consumer and Marketing Service officials said the action continues for two more months the earlier suspension in effect for December 1967 thru January 1968. The suspension was requested by cooperative associations representing more than two-thirds of the dairy farmers supplying the market.

The farmers have asked that supply-demand adjustments be deferred pending a hearing they propose that USDA hold, to consider revising present provisions of the order.

The action temporarily will maintain the minimum order price for the Kansas City market in line with prices in nearby markets where supply-demand adjusters are effective now also, C&MS officials said.


