

Many farmers will be studying the plan to farrow this fall (September-November). If substantial production cuts are made, this will production cuts are made, this will send hog prices into the high \$20 range again by late 1972.

As usual, the Crop Production reports will be based on conditions as of the first of the month. Hence, those who use them should make allowances for developments after that date.

The report to be released on July 9 will include estimates of planted acreages of small grains, corn, soybeans, and sorghums. It will also include fairly reliable forecasts of average yields per acre and overall production of the small grains, with state-by-state figures as well as national totals. In addition, the report will contain projections of national average yields per acre and total production of corn, soybeans, and sorghums for grain. These figures will be based on the assumptions that the weather, plant diseases, and insects will be no worse than usual. The July report will not include forecasts of yields

and production of these crop for individual states.

The Crop Production report to be available on August 11 will provide the first dependable forecasts about the production of corn, soybeans, and sorghums for grain. Even then, allowances must be made for developments after August 1. This report will include the first official forecasts on these crops for individual states, as well as the

revised forecasts of the national Feed that is to be released on July 16 totals.

The next quarterly report of Stocks of Grains will be published on July 22. It will show the farm and commercial supplies of all major grains, including soybeans, on hand as of July 1. 



Silt is the number one water pollutant in Kansas and the United States today. It is estimated that over 4 billion tons of sediment wash into the lakes and streams of the United States each year. Threefourths of this sediment comes from forested and agricultural lands. Erosion of agricultural lands is still occurring at an alarming rate. Serious erosion is also occurring within towns and cities, resulting in added pollution of bodies of water.

Farmers and urban people alike simply cannot afford the loss of the topsoil by erosion. Once the fertile topsoil has been eroded away, it takes generations to replace. The dark-colored upper layer of the soil called topsoil is high in organic matter. This organic layer is the action area of the soil where root growth takes place and where bacteria convert organic matter into plant nutrients. Phosphorus and potassium are also supplied to the plant from the organic matter.

Erosion thus causes a loss of the chief plant nutrients - nitrogen,

phosphorus, and potassium. Also lost with soil when erosion takes place is valuable water needed for crop production. This is especially true in this part of the country. If pesticides and herbicides have been used on the land, these also are carried along attached to the soil particles, and cause fish kills in lakes and streams.

It is not difficult to see that sediments from erosion, with its load of nutrients, pesticides, and herbicides is the primary hazard to surface water quality. These sediments cause eutrophication of streams and lakes; the increased nutrients in the water increases the growth of algae. The decay of the increased growth of algae robs the streams water of precious oxygen which in turn kills fish and other aquatic life. Erosion sediments in streams and lakes decrease their capacity. Once a lake has lost its capacity to hold water it is a liability rather than an asset. The cost of cleaning silt from a lake or stream is often prohibitive.

Damage caused by silt and erosion to the highway system is also heavy. Silt accumulates in culverts and eventually plugs them. Water eventually goes over the roadbed and cuts it out. The culvert must be replaced and the roadbed repaired.

Conservation practices are the answer to soil erosion. Where cropland is sloping, cross-slope terraces and down-slope grassed waterways will control the erosion. Grass should be planted on steep eroded slopes and it should remain in permanent vegetation. On sloping soils that have already been moderately eroded, closely grown crops such as wheat or sorghum should be planted. Stubble mulching or mulch tillage will control wind erosion and increase the water infiltration into the soil. It will also help maintain organic matter and good porous soil structure in the surface layer.

Little Variance In Growth Despite **Castration Age**

Calves castrated at various ages showed little difference in growth or carcass characteristics in a trial at Kansas State University's Fort Hays Experiment Station.

KSU researchers wanted to determine if late castration would increase total growth without affecting carcass quality adversely.

Of the four sets of calves used, one was left as bulls. The bulls grew faster and had more muscling, less fat, and less marbling.

Scientists said bull carcass grade would not have been higher even with more marbling because the meat was dark.







Organization Helps Thousands Of Needy People Obtain Glasses

When you're six years old, the world can be a wonderful place-if you can see it.



Tommy couldn't. He lived in a world of blurred images. School is tough enough when you're six. But it's even worse when your friends are learning to read, and you can't

To Tommy, letters were merely blurs; so were baseballs and faces. Because Tommy's father had long been out of work, glasses were simply out of the question—until this year.

The boy's glasses were paid for by a volunteer organization hundreds of miles away, called New Eyes for the Needy, Inc., of Short Hills, New Jersey.

New Eyes, as it is familiarly know, has earned the reputation of being one of the most effective sightsaving charities in the world. It has helped many thousands of needy people obtain glasses-here and abroad—and it has never asked for a cent in donations.

Since its inception, almost 40

years ago, New Eyes has asked only for used eyeglasses and precious metal articles such as old watches, jewelry (real, costume and antique), good or damaged silver and

The eyeglasses and glittering clutter are sent to New Eyes for the Needy, Inc., Short Hills, New Jersey 07078. Thousands of packages from all over the United States arrive in the neat stucco headquarters every year. There, volunteers, mostly housewives, sort out the glasses, separating those in plastic frames from those in metal frames.

Many of the 250 workers have learned to operate complex optical grading and testing equipment. They help fill specific orders from missions and hospitals in foreign countries where plastic framed glasses and sunglasses are sent.

The metal framed glasses have their uses, too. Through refining, they yield precious metals that are sold, along with the jewelry, to finance New Eyes funds in over 100 hospitals and health agencies throughout the United States. The money in these funds buys glasses for people who have nowhere else to

In addition to these funds, arrangements have also been made in 48 states through health and welfare agencies whereby New Eyes purchases glasses for carefully screened persons, to whom no other private or public funds are available.

Last year 8,000 people were helped under this program. Tommy was one of them.

But, as public response has grown throughout the years, so has the volume of requests. Therefore, New Eyes needs more discarded jewelry and eyeglasses to do its job. As one New Eyes volunteer put it:

"The wonderful thing about New Eyes is that we can ask people to send us things they no longer need." And these gifts can bring vision to a little boy, like Tommy.







A different type of wheat harvest is not suitable for milling, in conwas completed recently on the trast to the varieties commonly Porter Ranch near Miller which is northeast of Emporia.

This particular wheat yielded about 80 bushels to the acre and is being processed strictly for cattle feed

Walter Porter, owner and operator of the Lyon County farm, used an experimental machine custom built by a Maize manufacturer, for the harvest. Porter is experimenting in high-moisture dumping its contents into the truck. wheat as a feed grain.

Porter obtained a variety of seed wheat called "Blue Boy," developed for use on the southeastern seaboard

grown in Kansas.

The machine, called a chopper, harvests and pulverizes the grain, head of the wheat plant, as well as a portion of the stalk, before blowing it into a specially designed trailer towed by the chopper. Every 11 minutes a truck pulls beside the trailer which is equipped with an hydraulic system that enables the operator to tip the trailer's bed,

Use of the machine eliminates the need for running the wheat through a hammer mill.

Harvesting begins when the grain of the United States. This variety is contains about 60 per cent moisture, known for its high yield potential but Porter said. Material produced by

the chopper resembles crushed straw, but contains 70 per cent grain by weight. Porter said that efforts were made to keep the moisture content above 45 per cent. To do this it is sometimes necessary to add water to the material near the end of

Mashed grain and straw is taken from the field to a trench silo where it is packed to begin the ensiling process.

The high-moisture wheat ensilage will be fed to approximately 3,000 cattle on the Porter ranch while they are on grass pasture later this summer.

One advantage the high-moisture wheat has over wheat harvested at the normal 10 to 14 per cent moisture

At the A.M.A. convention held in antic City, N.J., statistics showed that for the first time in at least 50 years less than half the nation's doctors are dues-paying members.

And the percentage of dues-paying members is continuing to decline, although the actual number is rising slightly

As of the beginning of this year, there were 334,028 doctors of medicine in the United States. Of these, 168,214, or 50.3 per cent, were dues-paying members of the A.M.A.

However, in recent months five state medical societies - including creased advertising and dues. New York - have dropped the

requirement that a member of a state society also must be a member of the A.M.A.

An estimated 9,000 New York doctors, as well as an undetermined number from Nebraska, Nevada, Montana and Mississippi, have failed to pay dues to the parent organization this year, thus dropping the total ratio to under 50 per cent.

The decline has cut substantially into the A.M.A.'s projected income. The national organization collected about \$12 million in dues last year. A dues increase this year from \$70 to \$110 a year will bring in more money, but the dropping of membership by the 9,000 in New York alone will cost the A.M.A. about \$1

This comes at a time when the A.M.A. is seeking to improve its public image through an advertising campaign. The association's leaders term it an "education campaign" that will cost \$1.5 million over the next two years.

The dues increase and the expanded public relations campaign, which involves a 50 per cent increase in outlays in one year, have generated fierce controversy at recent conventions. Some doctors have expressed fears that the dues increase would constrain more doctors, especially physicians, from joining the parent organization.

In addition, other doctors have stated that the \$1.5 million advertising campaign is both too costly and unnecessary.

These actions have led the California delegation to submit a resolution to the A.M.A.'s policy-making House of Delegates asking that the parent group poll all A.M.A. members before tackling "critical basic issues" such as in-

Ban Of Hormone May Cause Rise In Beef Prices

Beef prices could rise as much as 31/2 cents per pound if the controversial growth hormone, DES, is banned from commercial use in cattle feeding, says the United States Department of Agriculture.

The Ag Department further stated that other meat prices would rise as the demand for them increased while the supply of beef declined.

Food and Drug Administration regulations allow use of the chemical but require cattle to be taked off the drug 48 hours before slaughter to allow their bodies to metabolize the hormone.



Work On Cantaloupe Harvester At K-State

Cantaloupe, that cool, delightfully delicious orange variety of muskmelon, could become less expensive for consumers and turn into a profitable industry for southwestern counties in Kansas if a mechanical harvester can be perfected.

In Kansas as in most other states, cantaloupe are picked by hand. This can be very expensive even when field workers are available at harvest time. Cantaloupe growers have long hoped for a mechanical harvester to save them time, cut costs to the consumer and increase their own profits.

The case is still out on the extent of consumer savings and increased profits for growers. But it is generally assumed that these benefits will accrue.

Southwestern Kansas, in particular, has climatic, moisture and soil conditions exceptional for the growth of cantaloupe. Yet only a fraction of the potential tonnage is

"This area produces high quality, sweet melons, but the lack of a mechanical harvester has hindered production. In years past, laborers from Mexico were hired to pick melons, but this labor is no longer available.

"A successful alternative must be introduced before production can be expanded," says Prof. G.E. Fairbanks of the agricultural engineering faculty of the Kansas Agricultural Expermient Station at State University, Kansas Manhattan.

In all candor, Fairbanks confesses that there may not "be a sufficient demand for these machines because of the relatively short picking seasons and limited acreage planted annually in Kansas, the U.S., and other countries.

"And a machine can't always pick the melons at the right stage of maturity like a skilled worker can. Melons need to be slightly green. At that stage, stems are hard to sever from vines," he said.

Kansas State University's agricultural engineers are not the only ones in the United States to develop a prototype cantaloupe harvester.

At the University of California, Davis, "a harvester has been developed that lifts the vines. Ripe melons fall off the vine and are

separated by size.

"But, unfortunately, this process results in considerable damage to the plant. When vines are lifted, small roots developing at joints along the vine are torn out of the

"Vines are also easily broken off and pulled up. The Davis harvester apparently has not been successful either since it has not been industrially-produced," Fairbanks pointed out.

K-State's prototype harvester, unfortunately too, needs considerable refinement before it can be used profitably

"The harvester is not as successful as it should be. It picks up only a fourth to a third of the melons it should and it damages quite a few," Fairbanks said. Many punctures and bruises result from the harvester's projecting fingers designed to pick up the melons.

Why does the K-State-devised harvester pick up so few? Quite simple. Fairbanks says, "we can't seem to get enough gravity fingers on a continuous shaft to pick up all the melons."

Max Fogelman, former horticulture researcher at K-State's Garden City Agricultural Research Experiment Station and now at the University of Kentucky, first thought of the ideas for the fingers. "He and I built the first machine together," Fairbanks said.


Here is Fairbanks' description of how it works:

"The picking unit consists of a series of projecting 10-inch fingers. There are eight sets of fingers on each of four picking units. These are mounted on discs set on a rotating shaft. The shaft is chain driven from the ground wheels. Fingers are fastened loosely to discs on the shaft.

"Discs are equipped with hubs set at slight angles to orient the fingers inward and outward by means of gravity as the discs rotate. When fingers are coming up, the set of fingers moves downward on the hubs. These angled hubs bring fingers close together.

"This principle allows the fingers to grip melons more securely. As fingers reach the top center and start downward, gravity pulls them forward and downward and spreads them apart," Fairbanks said.

When fingers come down on a

melon, their open position allows them to envelop the melon. As the fingers start ascending again, gravity and the angled hubs close the gap between the fingers and clasp the melon unless it is too small

The melon is lifted up by the fingers and, if mature, disjoins from the vine and is carried upward. If immature, it is held firmly by the plant and the vine pulls the melon from between the fingers.

Runners on the bottom of the harvester hold the vines down during the picking process. When the ripe melons reach the top, they are released into a trough.

At the time Fogelman left K-State's staff, "he was trying to develop a dwarf vine with a standard size melon which would mature uniformly so they could all be harvested at the same time," said Fairbanks.

His reasoning: this type vine would make the picking process that much easier for a mechanical harvester. So far as Fairbanks knows, Fogelman did not develop a uniformly maturing cantaloupe.

"The harvester is selective in respect to cantaloupe size and maturity. The mature melon will detach from the vine quite easily. Apparatus on the harvester orients melons in rows to be picked up by the picking unit on the machine.

"If they are the right size and maturity, they can be plucked from the vine relatively easy," Fairbanks explained.

Fairbanks added that a mature melon loses its firm adherence to the plant. "Horticulturists refer to this as slip."

If a person were to spend the time and money, Fairbanks thinks that a successful harvester could be fabricated. If harvesters were manufactured, only growers producing large acreages of melons would be able to afford the machines.

Fairbanks feels that several adaptations can be made to make the K-State prototype more efficient:

- Fingers still do not grip melons firmly enough. Short pieces of rubber hose have been placed over tips of the fingers to aid in their aggressiveness. He suggests that the fingers might be replaced with continuous flexible discs.

- A smooth bed surface is needed to orient melons right ahead of the individual picker units. This would



FDA Restricts Saccharin Levels In Diet Products

The Food and Drug Administration has placed mild restrictions on the amount of the artificial sweetener, saccharin, permitted in diet foods and beverages pending completion of health safety tests.

FDA Bureau of Foods, emphasized that there is no evidence that saccharin harms people, but the restrictions are precautionary to keep a person's consumption of the sweetener below one gram daily until its long-term safety is assured. Most diet foods and drinks will be unchanged by the restrictions, said the Calorie Control Council, a trade association.

Saccharin's previous classification, which Wodicka said is "generally recognized as safe," sets no limit on the amount of sweetener in diet products.

Hays Station Tests Shipped Calves

Shipped calves fed Aureo S-700 for seven days and for 28 days responded better to the shorter period in a test at Kansas State University's Fort Hays Branch Experiment Station. The tests were conducted to determine ways to reduce sickness in newly-weaned and shipped cattle.

The calves were shipped to the station from New Mexico and tagged, weighed, and allotted.

Calves fed Aureo S-700 for seven days gained more than those given the drug for 28 days. The average total gain was 209 and 188 pounds, respectively, while a control group averaged only 176.

In another test, 57 heifer calves were divided into two groups in an effort to determine the effects of pen size. One group was put in a .4-acre pen with 630 square feet per calf; the other was placed in a 2,200 square feet area (77 square feet per head). The more confined group started on feed sooner and weighed more throughout the trial.





The facts are, says the brochure, that the farmer is not doing all right, that he is getting the short end of the stick in the marketplace, that the USDA budget seems to go everyplace else and only incidentally to help the farmer.

New Holland printed 200,000 of the folders, and many farm people used them to show their side.

There has been a reprint of the folder, with new figures, and any farmer who reads a news story, hears a television commentary that he thinks is grossly uninformed of the farm profit picture in this country might want one to hand out.

G&G area New Holland dealers may have them, and the company says you can get them directly by sending a stamped, preaddressed envelope to Farm Facts, New Holland, Pa. 17557.

The full text of the brochure is printed here.

OVERHEARD ON MAIN STREET, ANYTOWN:

Joe: "Everything's up in price at the supermarket. Boy, the farmers must be getting rich!"

Jim: "They ought to be. With the tax money they're getting not to grow crops, they've got to be sitting pretty."

Heard any conversations like that lately? If so, were you able to jump in with some cold, hard facts and figures to set things straight?

If not, hold on to this little pocketsized "farm fallacy fighter" Developed from USDA and House of Representative Committee on Agriculture reports, it contains some right-to-the-point data you can use to clear the air of "popular misinformation"

Next time someone starts talking loosely about how farmers are "living off the fat of the consumertaxpayer", just bring out the facts and watch his expression - and story - change.


Food costs have risen less than most consumer items in the cost-ofliving index since 1957-59. From that period through mid-1970, food costs increased only 28 percent, compared with a 65 percent increase in medical care costs during the same period, and a 55 percent increase in the cost of services.

In other words the cost of marketing food has sent the grocery bills up to a large extent. Marketing agencies and processors received 75 percent of the \$52.5 billion increase in the cost of farm produced foods since 1947-49, while only 25 percent trickled back to the farmers



WHAT DOES THE FARMER GET WHO GETS GOVERNMENT FOR HIS PRODUCTS?

Farmers have not been getting the benefit of higher food prices. The average return from prices received by farmers in 1969 was 3 percent below the comparable 3 year period of 1947-49. However, in this same 20year period the prices paid by consumers for food at retail level increased by 48 percent.



- about \$1.57 per hour for farmwork performed - compared with the factory worker's 1969 average of \$3.19 per hour and a food marketing employee's average rate of \$2.83

In spite of the fact that modern North American farmers are the world's most productive and efficient food producers they've been caught in a squeeze between rising operating costs and a declining share of retail food prices. The wholesale price index of some farm products has been steadily decreasing.

Farmers are heavy contributors to the health of our economy and are the hope of the world in staving off mass famine. The farmer continues to have a far reaching effect on domestic and world affairs as an employer, a consumer, a taxpayeer and a supplier.

Agriculture is still the nation's biggest industry, with assets of better than \$307 billion. That's equal to about two-thirds the value of all current U.S. corporate assets. And farming involves 4.6 million workers - more than the combined work force needed to operate the nation's transportation, public utilities, steel and automobile industries!

Some 2.9 million EMPLOYER people are independent agricultural producers. That's the

number of farms listed by the USDA for 1969. But three out of every 10 jobs in private enterprises are related to agriculture. Eight million people have jobs just storing, processing and merchandising agricultural products. And six million work at providing the supplies farmers use.

Farmers spend above \$38 billion a year for goods and services just to produce their crops and livestock and another \$12 billion

for the things we all use like food, clothes, medicines, furniture, appliances and other goods and services







Can't Label Franks, Bologna 'All-Meat'

The U.S. Department of Agriculture has published in the Federal Register official notice of a May 5 Federal court ruling banning the use of the phrase "all meat" and similar terms on cooked sausage products, such as frankfurters and bologna.

The U.S. District Court for the District of Columbia, which said the terms are misleading to consumers, specifically ordered USDA to advise the packing industry of the ruling as a preliminary step in carrying out the order.

The court also ordered USDA to take necessary action to stop use of the "all-meat" or "all-beef" labels on cooked sausage products as soon as possible - and in any event within six months from the decision date or the final action on a USDA appeal, if one is made. The decision resulted from a Federation of Homemakers challenge of federal meat inspection regulations permitting such labeling. An appeal is still under consideration.



Q&A On Safety, Health Act

Question — Does the occupational safety and health act of 1970 affect farmers?

Answer — Yes, but it is not known at this time to what extent.

The act authorizes the federal government to set and enforce occupational safety and health standards applicable to businesses involved in interstate commerce.

The purpose is to assure every person in the United States safe and healthful working conditions.

The act provides that each employer must furnish employees even partimers — a place of employment free from "recognized hazards" that may cause death or serious physical harm.

The secretary of labor is required to publish existing "national consensus standards" and "established federal standards" unless he




Adversely-affected parties may seek judicial review of the secretary's standards.

The labor secretary also is authorized to grant temporary variance from standards to give an employer time to comply. The act authorizes civil penalties for violations and criminal penalties for willful violations resulting in death.

The secretary is to conduct research, experiments, and demonstrations relating to occupational safety and health stan-

As these standards are developed they will affect Kansas farmers. Just how and to what extent will depend on the standards promulgated by the labor secretary.

As these standards are published farmers will have to give more attention to correcting hazards on their farms.

Kansas wild turkey population has surpassed the 1000 mark and represents an increase of 256 turkeys by actual count.

There were 55 flocks reported reported during 1970. However, another eight flocks which were known to exist but from which no reports on exact numbers could be obtained in this study had a 1970 population of 101 birds. It is reasonable to assume the Kansas wild turkey population might be in the neighborhood of 1,200 birds.

The average flock size increased counted by the observers was 104 toms to 100 hens. This is the first time that the ratio has ever been above 75 toms to 100 hens, and the general average has been in the neighborhood of 70 tons 100 hens.

Major flock increases were noted in several areas. The Attica, Feterita, Pierceville and Aetna flocks showed major population increases. This past winter most of the remaining potential habitat for wild turkeys in the southwest region was stocked.

Fully established flocks in the southwest and the majority of the range stocked point to the increasing likelihood of holding a turkey season in this region in the next few years according to Steve Capel, big game biologist for the Kansas Forestry, Fish and Game Commission.

Urges Caution In Using Insecticides

The use of a respirator while loading and unloading insecticides for field application is recommended by a Kansas State University Extension entomologist.

Dr. H. Leroy Brooks says a respirator is of particular value when some of the more highly toxic insecticides are used, whether in liquid or granular form.

Some of the more commonly used insecticides for which a respirator should be used are carbophenothion, EPN, parathion, demeton, dyfonate, azinphosmethyl, mevinphos, phorate, and disulfoton. Some are in granular form.

By using a 150 magnification microscope, Teare carefully counted the stomata in the lemmas, paleas, glumes, and awns of wheat varieties. From these data he determined the resistance of the wheat head to carbon dioxide diffusion per unit of chlorophyllcontaining tissue.

He found that the glume and awn areas were 100 percent effective for photosynthesis, the lemma was 63 percent effective, and the palea just 17 percent effective.

After determining photosynthetic area of the wheat head in 30 wheat varieties, he checked average grain yields for the varieties.

It came as no surprise to him that in most cases varieties with the highest amount of photosynthetic area in the head also were the highest yielding varieties.

The reason is simple. When carbohydrates are manufactured by photosynthesis, they must be transported to a storage area in the plant. In wheat most of this carbohydrate storage is in the grain.

Consequently, carbohydrates manufactured in the leaves must be transported back to the plant stem and then upward to the grain head, a minimum distance of several in-

When carbohydrates manufactured in the plant parts immediately surrounding the grain, the transportation distance is only a fraction of an inch, thereby making photosynthesis much more efficient.

Teare's research holds exciting promise for the future. New wheat varieties can perhaps be bred with even higher amounts of photosynthetic area in the heads. Inversely, an approximation of new variety yield can be made by determining

the photosynthetic area of the head. Teare's research could become a vital step toward producing more

wealth in Kansas and toward feeding the hungry people of the




The government directive from the appeals board said Henkle was to be reinstated in his postmaster position and receive his back salary from the time he was suspended.



The feed industry in Japan has progressed rapidly. During 1970 compound feed manufacture there reached 14,851,963 metric tons — a 16.6 percent increase over the previous year. Feed industries in the Republic of Korea and China also are undergoing rapid growth and development.

The KSU short course was designed to provide the Asian feed industry with the latest developments in U.S. feed manufacturing technology and to help expand markets for U.S. agricultural commodities throughout Asia.

Among the procedures presented to the Asian feed executives during the short course were quality of ingredients, processing, mixing, and pelleting. The hydraulic system of the new K-State pilot feed mill was explained. The importance of equipment maintenance, safety, quality control, sanitation, and distribution was stressed along with discussions of special problems relating to the use of drugs and air

Dr. Robert Schoeff of the Kansas State University grain science and industry department was the coordinator of the short course. It was taught by faculty members of the KSU departments of grain science and industry, agricultural economics, entomology, animal science and industry, dairy and poultry science, and biology. Industry consultants assisted.

Study Muscling, Size, And Profit At Beef Sympolish and then review it every five years." and then review it every five years."

There is feedlot profit potential in almost every size and shape of beef animal if they are bought and managed correctly, but an advantage nearly always favors larger, faster gaining animals, Dr. Val Brungardt of the University of Wisconsin, told the more than 1,000 persons attending the recent American Beef Cattle Symposium in Madison, Wisconsin. Cattlemen were on hand from 41 states and seven foreign countries.

"We must keep in mind that the most important part of the cattle business is producing a live calf at a high enough rate to be profitable, and this is not measured in this study," Brungardt explained. The Symposium, held at the University of Wisconsin's Arlington Experimental Farms, was sponsored by the American Angus Association, American National Cattlemen's Association, and the University.

Three years of study have shown that there is very little difference between rate of gain or carcass cutout in animals that were designated as light or moderately muscled at weaning age. "The graders were probably rating the animals on condition rather than muscling," Brungardt concluded.

The larger animals almost always had the highest weight per day of age, and the fastest rate of gain, but in all cases the smaller cattle, regardless of breed, had the best feed conversion record. At slaughter, however, the larger animals netted more total dollars. Brungardt said this was because the larger animlas put on more total pounds and thus were able to convert more low cost feed to higher priced beef. The smaller steers also cost more per pound as weaning-age calves. This meant that they had to make up a larger margin between the purchase price and sale price before they could start to show a

This year nearly 100 head of Angus steers, 50 Charolais crossbreds, and 10 Herefords were evaluated. In addition, another 50 head of Angus are on a roughage and deferred feeding program to determine how size and muscling affect feedlot performance and profits under this type of management program. All the steers were born in March, 1970.

Last year some 50 head of Charolais crosses and 50 head of Herefords were tested. Another 50 head of Herefords were fed out and to compare breed against breed,"

Brungardt said. "Instead we are trying to sample a cross section of each breed from its smallest to its largest cattle and evaluate their feedlot performance."

There was not a great difference between breeds when all the cattle was when an estimated 80 percent of them would grade USDA Choice. The Angus were fed 153 days and probably should have been fed only 140 days, according to Brungardt. The Herefords were fed 155 days and the Charolais crosses were fed 185 days in 1970 and 194 days on the final test. The sizes ranged from Number I through Number 5 for the Angus and Herefords and 3 through 7 for the Charolais crossbreds. Number 1 steers were the smallest and were expected to weigh between 750 and 850 pounds at 141/2 to 15 months of age. The final feedlot weights on each group were within a 100 pound heavier range. This made the Number 5's weigh between 1,151 and 1,250 pounds and the Number 7's 1,351 pounds and over at slaughter.

There was no significant USDA grade difference between the large and small cattle when they were handled alike, according to Brungardt. "We must remember to always compare cattle at the same point in life, not at the same size, weight or days on feed. The best time to compare the feedlot performance of steers is when 80 percent of them will grade Choice. This conforms with current market demand," he explained.

the two pure breeds and the they want. crossbreeds came up with similar results, although the larger crossbreds averaged higher in almost every category. The crossbreds ranged in size from No. 3 through No. 7, while the straightbreds ranged from No. 1 through No.

Average daily gain in all breeds, for example, seemed to peak at the No. 5 body size. Among the individually fed steers the Number 5 Angus gained 3.09 pounds per day, the No. 5 Charolais 3.23 pounds per day and the No. 5 Herefords 3.29 pounds per day. Rate of gain for the past two years has shown either a decline or only a little increase in body sizes above No. 5. This year the No. 6 crossbreds averaged 3.11 pounds per day, and the No. 7's averaged 3.24 pounds. Average daily gain of the No. 3's for example, was evaluated in 1969. "We are not trying almost identical. The averages were: Angus 2.98 pounds; Charolais

crosses, 2.98 pounds and Herefords, 2.96 pounds.

Brungardt also announced the gross income from the cows that produced the No. 3's of the various breeds. Gross for the Angus was \$216; for the Charolais crosses, \$200; were fed to the same end-point. That and for the Herefords, \$206. The range in gross income for the breeds was \$170 to \$235 for the No. 1 through No. 5 Angus; \$204 through \$239 for the No. 3 through No. 7 Charolais crosses; and \$178 through \$226 for the No. 1 through No. 5 Herefords.

> "The tests have shown that we should measure and evaluate beef cows on what they can produce, not how big they are," Brungardt said, and he concluded by saying "What we need to do is stereotype production, rather than size and shape."

> In addition to the research reports the Symposium featured a full twoday program covering the main issues of interest to today's beef cattlemen.

"The housewife is not in a position to write beef cattle specifications for the producer," Irv Rinehart, of the Godfrey Company, Waukesha, Wisconsin, told the group. "We have the knowledge and ability to determine what type of beef the housewife likes best. It is up to us to identify and produce more of it," he said. Rinehart, whose firm owns over 70 Sentry Food Stores, said they get better results and fewer complaints by selling only beef that is in the upper one-third of the USDA Choice grade. Sentry pays a premium to the packer, he said, in Within a particular weight range order to select only the carcasses

and then review it every rive years, Dr. Ronald H. Nelson, chairman of records, hill r the animal husbandry department, Michigan State University, told the crowd. "Genetic change is slow and

you can't go too far wrong in only five years," he said.

To illustrate his point Nelson said that if all the herds in one breed decided to select cattle exclusively for weight at 12 months of age, and used natural service, it would take until the year 2000 to increase the average of the breed 100 pounds. Selecting for additional traits would decrease even this slow rate of genetic change. Nelson suggested that the goal of all cattle associations should be to produce a breed than can stand alone. Then the cattle can be sold to people who want to breed straightbred cattle or crossbred cattle.


